- 18 MS. GARVEY: 3-G, MINUTES OF THE
- 19 FIREMEN'S PENSION COMMISSION MEETING HELD ON MAY 24,

- 21 MS. GATELLI: Are there any comments?
- 22 If not, received and filed.
- 23 MS. GARVEY: And that's it. I have no
- 24 clerk's notes at this time.
- 25 MS. GATELLI: I don't have any notes

- 1 prepared, because I thought today that we should talk
- 2 about the flood project and what has been happening
- 3 over the last several days.
- 4 All of Council has been to the flood
- 5 site, and we have seen the devastation in certain
- 6 neighborhoods. And I talked to Mr. Hayes this morning,
- 7 and he was walking with Congressman Kanjorski.
- 8 As you know, President Bush has
- 9 declared it an emergency area, and we will be getting
- 10 the proper funding from whoever will come here. FEMA
- 11 will be on their way.
- 12 I just have one letter here that was
- 13 E-mailed to me that I was asked to read. Honorable
- 14 City Council Members, on Tuesday, June 27, The Plot
- 15 neighborhood was once again under the threat of
- 16 flooding by the Lackawanna River as the result of
- 17 several days of heavy rainfall.
- 18 As you know by now, The Plot sustained
- 19 only minor flooding and was spared a major flood event
- 20 through the efforts of many people working throughout
- 21 the night building up a temporary levy and pumping out
- 22 storm water from the streets. These workers physically

- 23 saved our neighborhood while under emergency
- 24 conditions.
- 25 The residents and businesses of The

- 1 Plot would like to send a heartfelt thank you to all
- 2 the people that were involved in the efforts to save
- 3 The Plot neighborhood.
- 4 The following are some individuals and
- 5 organizations that prevented a major flood event from
- 6 occurring in The Plot, City of Scranton DPW workers and
- 7 Director George Parker, Scranton Sewer Authority
- 8 workers and supervisor Paul Ludovici, Tri-State Casey
- 9 construction workers and supervisor Frank Henderson,
- 10 the Army Corps of Engineers, supervisor Al Zarnosky and
- 11 Director Jim Moore, P & W Washo construction workers
- 12 and all the independent truck drivers hauling material
- 13 throughout the night.
- 14 It is necessary to note that many
- 15 people put their lives in harm's way by working
- 16 alongside the violent floodwaters of the Lackawanna
- 17 River.
- 18 While this kind of dedication and hard
- 19 work can never be repayed by us, we truly believe it

- 20 was a team effort by many people, and for their
- 21 successful efforts, we say thank you. Tom Preambo,
- 22 President of The Plot Neighborhood Association.
- 23 Just one more quick update before we
- 24 get to the speakers for today. They are purchasing
- 25 bleach and brooms that will be distributed to the

- 1 residents that have been flooded, and they'll be
- 2 distributing them sometime this afternoon.
- 3 Anyone who needs anything, please call.
- 4 You can call the clerk's office, and we'll get the
- 5 message to the right people. Thank you. The first
- 6 speaker is Helen Cook.
- 7 MS. COOK: Good afternoon, City
- 8 Council. First of all, I would like to thank the
- 9 Council people for coming to The Plot and the other
- 10 areas that did get flooded these past few days. They
- 11 also made phone calls to a lot of people that resided
- 12 in The Plot, and we appreciate that very much.
- 13 Tuesday was a very scary day for a lot
- 14 of us, and this is the first time we were really spared
- 15 by all of those floodwaters.
- 16 But Scranton Sewer Authority and DPW

17 workers are to be so highly commended. They worked 18 until probably 3:30 yesterday morning, all of Tuesday

19 and all through the night with their spotlights, and

20 they moved that black material that was on that levy

21 system all night long.

22 You have no idea how wonderful it was

23 to see them. And many of the people, you know, were

24 sitting on their porches and watching.

25 The biggest problem that we always have

1 in The Plot is people coming to see grief of other

2 people. We are inundated down there with cars with

3 people just amazed that you had washers and dryers and

4 refrigerators on your porch, because people have to

5 move them out of their house, because we've always

6 gotten it before up to our first floor or including our

7 first floor.

8 So, some time down the road there has

9 to be something we can do to keep these people out,

10 even though we had a flood gate, and they did open that

11 about an hour ago, which was great, because it did keep

12 a lot of onlookers coming out from upper Green Ridge or

13 from other areas.

- 14 But I just wanted to say thank you,
- 15 that was all, to all of you and everyone that worked
- 16 tirelessly for these two days. Thank you very much.
- 17 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Bob Bolus.
- 18 MR. BOLUS: Good afternoon, Council.
- 19 Bob Bolus, Scranton. I will it was enjoyable to have
- 20 been able to sit in caucus with Council regarding the
- 21 potential of working on implementing a fee program that
- 22 would involve KOZs and non-profits in the city to start
- 23 generating additional income into the city to help with
- 24 the residents that live here that are paying taxes and
- 25 paying their way.

- 1 So, it made my afternoon worthwhile
- 2 coming down here today, and I'd like to thank Council
- 3 for their attention in doing what they're doing.
- 4 We discussed a variety of issues. One
- 5 thing is, I still talk about The Icebox deal from a
- 6 long time ago where we pay a dollar a year and somebody
- 7 is going to make millions of dollars over there and
- 8 we're being shortchanged in the city.
- 9 And, again, that goes back to the
- 10 Doherty administration putting themselves first and not

- 11 the residents in the city. And I think that's just
- 12 totally wrong, and I think it should really be looked
- 13 at to see how the city could resolve itself and get
- 14 some money back in our pockets instead of waiting
- 15 20 years at a dollar a year.
- 16 There are some people, and I know we
- 17 have the flood issue here in the city, some people have
- 18 a problem. If they are in need of some storage
- 19 trailers or something to load stuff into temporarily,
- 20 you know, we would like to provide that to them.
- 21 So, they could contact us at my Throop
- 22 office and make arrangements to get a storage trailer
- 23 on to help our people out in the city.
- 24 On Elm and Blucher, I live up on East
- 25 Mountain, I was coming down there this morning after

- 1 the rain, and as soon as you make the turn there,
- 2 there's a whole pile of trees.
- 3 Now, I don't know if it's the property
- 4 owner's responsibility or the city's, but as you make
- 5 that turn, you can't see anybody coming up Blucher
- 6 Avenue and turning onto Elm. And they should be
- 7 trimmed. I mean, it's really very dangerous.

- 8 And I know Doug Miller brought that up
- 9 a while ago when they had some potholes up there that
- 10 they fixed, but nobody's bothered anything with the
- 11 trees.
- 12 I think we need to get the motorcycle
- 13 back on East Mountain. We had it there. I think we
- 14 need to put it back up there again.
- 15 One of the things I'd like to discuss
- 16 now, and there has been a lot of publicity, I guess, on
- 17 the robbery that happened up at our place, but the
- 18 robberies happening here in the city.
- 19 And people sitting back and saying, Oh,
- 20 well, you know, you shouldn't do this and you shouldn't
- 21 do that. Well, on our property we believe that if
- 22 you're hungry, we will feed you. If you want to rob
- 23 us, we'll deal with you. It's as simple as that. .
- 24 I think the businesses in this
- 25 community have to start taking a very firm stand to

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- 11
- 1 protect our property, not because of what I did, but
- 2 these people have no right to think there's a free ride
- 3 in America by robbing people to support whether it's a
- 4 drug habit or whatever their other problems are.

- 5 And I'd like to participate with
- 6 businesses and people that want to sit down and discuss
- 7 how we better protect our business.
- 8 You know, you may walk in with a weapon
- 9 and get the money and run out. The question is, are
- 10 you going to get to spend it when you get out of there?
- 11 You know, and that's the bottom line. And we've got to
- 12 take a firm stand.
- 13 The District Attorney's got to stop
- 14 cutting deals and letting people out on the street. We
- 15 attended a hearing yesterday where this individual --
- 16 they want to reduce bail and they want to do this and
- 17 do that, and the guy tried killing us in a car. So,
- 18 let's be realistic.
- 19 They've got to start doing their job.
- 20 The county prison's got to start doing its job to keep
- 21 these people in-house and treat them in the jail, not
- 22 send them out on some so-called rehab deal and they're
- 23 back out on the street, you know, and they're back
- 24 robbing.
- 25 Everywhere you go in the city, right

1 after we were robbed, they're in the city robbing

- 2 stores and markets.
- 3 They're walking into the mall with
- 4 guns. I mean, it's got to come to a halt. And the
- 5 only ones that are going to take this positive position
- 6 are the citizens who are being robbed.
- 7 The police could only do so much, but
- 8 if we don't help them, they can't do their job. And
- 9 quite frankly, some of the things I've seen in Central
- 10 Court and with the judicial system with these people
- 11 going out, I don't even know why police don't just turn
- 12 their ahead and drive the other way, because the
- 13 efforts and the risks these men are doing and women are
- 14 doing to bring these people to justice are being
- 15 overshadowed by the way they're being let free and the
- 16 efforts for nothing.
- 17 So, we need to take a firm stand. And,
- 18 again, I'd like to work with the city or any other
- 19 business, contact us, that we get together and we start
- 20 implementing training for our people or security or we
- 21 get people on there to start protecting our interests
- 22 to let them know, you come into our place of business,
- 23 you're going to be dealt with, not just run away and
- 24 think you're going to get away and terrorize somebody
- 25 else tomorrow. Thank you.

1 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Mr. Bolus,

2 also thank you for volunteering and volunteering your

3 equipment the other day. I did pass the information

4 on.

5 MR. BOLUS: That's what Scrantonians

6 are about. Thank you.

7 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Nancy Krake.

8 MS. KRAKE: Good afternoon, Council. I

9 have a couple questions this afternoon. The first is,

10 Mrs. Gatelli, have you heard anything back from OECD

11 about if they're following up with the KOZ compliance?

12 MS. GATELLI: I talked to you Chuck Cox

13 yesterday, and he said that as far as he knows,

14 everyone so far has been compliant, and, also, that we

15 should talk to the state. But I told him I already

16 talked to Lee Namey, and Lee didn't have any

17 non-compliance issues presently.

18 MS. KRAKE: Didn't Mr. Namey put the

19 responsibility back on OECD from the conversation?

20 MS. GATELLI: Yes.

21 MS. KRAKE: Would he be able to make

22 public the documents he has been keeping -- using to

- 23 keep track of the compliance? Would you kindly ask
- 24 OECD to do that?
- 25 MS. GATELLI: Sure, sure.

- 1 MS. KRAKE: I thank you.
- 2 MS. GATELLI: You're welcome.
- 3 MS. KRAKE: Mrs. Fanucci, have you
- 4 heard when the next Pennsylvania Economy League meeting
- 5 will be?
- 6 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: No, I have not.
- 7 They put everything on hold until the budget and
- 8 everything has been passed.
- 9 MS. KRAKE: Which budget?
- 10 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: All of the -- I
- 11 guess all of their budgets. They're being auditing and
- 12 they're doing independent auditing for PEL and everyone
- 13 else, I guess. So, they just wanted to wait until
- 14 everything was cleared up. I guess in the next two
- 15 weeks we should know the next schedule.
- 16 MS. KRAKE: That was their answer to
- 17 you, the budget? And they didn't specify whose budget
- 18 or what budget?
- 19 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: No.

- 20 MS. KRAKE: That's awfully sad. Well,
- 21 assuming their consultants for the entire state, it
- 22 would be odd --
- 23 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: I don't think
- 24 their meetings had ceased. I belive their meetings
- 25 with us have ceased. I don't believe that they've

- 1 stopped figuring out or doing their meetings or stopped
- 2 their jobs. They just figured they would not meet with
- 3 the city until then.
- 4 MS. KRAKE: I'm confused. Until then,
- 5 then being what?
- 6 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: They told me in
- 7 the next few weeks they would call me and give me the
- 8 next schedule.
- 9 MS. KRAKE: So, they will be calling
- 10 you in the next few weeks to tell you when the next
- 11 Pennsylvania Economy League meeting is?
- 12 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: Yes.
- 13 MS. KRAKE: Okay. And that being said,
- 14 I know Council was looking into having the distressed
- 15 status lifted. Has there been any further discussion
- 16 on that, Mrs. Gatelli, or Mrs. Fanucci?

- 17 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: No.
- 18 MS. KRAKE: No? Would that be a topic,
- 19 do you believe, at your next Pennsylvania Economy
- 20 League meeting, having the distressed status lifted?
- 21 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: It can be.
- 22 MS. KRAKE: Well, I would like to
- 23 request that it be, and maybe Council may back you up
- 24 on that.
- 25 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: Well, I'll discuss

•

- 1 it with Council and then we will decide.
- 2 MS. KRAKE: And, also, I wanted to
- 3 remind you, and I'll remind you again in two weeks at
- 4 the next -- at the last meeting before Council
- 5 adjourns, to remind them to look into the actions of
- 6 the Single Tax Office and how and if they are
- 7 collecting all of the taxes they need to be collecting
- 8 from everyone fairly, okay? As you said --
- 9 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: What I think,
- 10 Nancy, is we seem to have a problem here with you and I
- 11 with information.
- 12 You can get this information yourself.
- 13 I believe that you want me to get information for you

- 14 that you can actually acquire yourself.
- 15 You keep asking me for these documents
- 16 and everything that I'm trying to get, but I cannot get
- 17 them. So, you being a resident actually can write and
- 18 ask them, and maybe we wouldn't have -- I know you have
- 19 a problem with me being the designated person with
- 20 Council and my job, so I think being that the case, I
- 21 will get my information and you get your information,
- 22 and then we can come together and maybe come to some
- 23 type of conclusion.
- 24 MS. KRAKE: I didn't understand that,
- 25 but if that's how you feel, that's fine.

- 1 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: Yeah, I think you
- 2 should get it.
- 3 MS. KRAKE: Okay.
- 4 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: Okay.
- 5 MS. GATELLI: Is there a problem that
- 6 that can't -- information can't be obtained by --
- 7 MS. KRAKE: Yeah. It's always been
- 8 non-obtainable. I thought everybody knew that.
- 9 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: But why would you
- 10 want me to get it then?

- 11 MS. KRAKE: I don't want you to get it.
- 12 I've asked you to ask PEL to look into how that office
- 13 is collecting.
- 14 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: My meetings with
- 15 PEL are not to designate what PEL does for the city.
- 16 That's where I think we have a problem.
- 17 Our meetings were to look at what PEL
- 18 was doing and then come to a conclusion. I can't guide
- 19 them, like, along the way. That's where I think we
- 20 have a misunderstanding. I'm not in charge of PEL.
- 21 MS. KRAKE: So, we have no input with
- 22 them?
- 23 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: You have input
- 24 with them. You do have input. Everybody has input
- 25 with PEL. You write a letter, you tell them what you

- 1 think. Of course you have input with t hem. But my
- 2 job is not to input to PEL exactly what, you know, our
- 3 -- it was just to look at the information. That's all
- 4 our meetings were they were to look at information.
- 5 They were not to decide, they were not
- 6 to make decisions until after everything was over. And
- 7 I had stated that many times.

- 8 It wasn't to say, let's try this or
- 9 let's do that, because I'm not qualified to say what
- 10 should be done or what shouldn't be done.
- 11 MS. KRAKE: I still don't understand,
- 12 but --
- 13 MS. GATELLI: Nancy, I think that what
- 14 we should do is, I don't think PEL has any jurisdiction
- 15 over the Single Tax Office. I think that Council when
- 16 it comes to motions will make a motion and send it to
- 17 Mr. McDowell and ask him the specific questions.
- 18 MS. KRAKE: I appreciate that.
- 19 MS. GATELLI: And I think that that
- 20 would probably work better than her trying to let PEL
- 21 do it.
- 22 MS. KRAKE: My point was for PEL to say
- 23 that we are distressed, they have not looked at the
- 24 revenue side in anything at all as far as this last
- 25 Recovery Plan, where the first Recovery Plan under

- 1 Connors addressed both sides of the budget, revenue and
- 2 expenditures. They did nothing on the revenue side.
- 3 So, there is the -- (COUNCIL MEETING AUDIO STOPPED.)
- 4 MS. GATELLI: When we get our answer.

- 5 MR. COURTRIGHT: Back on.
- 6 MS. GATELLI: Mr. Spindler.
- 7 MR. SPINDLER: Good afternoon, Council.
- 8 Les Spindler, Scranton resident. I was thrilled to
- 9 wake up and read the morning paper on Tuesday and see
- 10 that Council is looking into doing something about the
- 11 pit bull situation.
- 12 For the benefit of Mr. McTiernan and
- 13 Mrs. Evans, they weren't here at the June 8 meeting
- 14 because of Scranton High's graduation. I'd like to
- 15 repeat a little of what I said that evening. I don't
- 16 know if they watched the replay of the meeting or not.
- 17 On June 1, I was walking my dog at
- 18 about quarter of ten at night, which I just purchased
- 19 two weeks before, and we were attacked by two pit
- 20 bulls, and I would like to give them copies of what I
- 21 gave to Council.
- 22 MS. GATELLI: Les, were they on a
- 23 leash, the dogs? No?
- 24 MR. SPINDLER: No. Those dogs were
- 25 loose and they ran and they were attacking my dog. And

1 thank God the owners heard me yelling. They came and

- 2 got them in a pretty quick manner, and thank God the
- 3 dog and I were both okay, because there were two pit
- 4 bulls against one dog. Thank God I got a big dog now.
- 5 I think Council, according to this, you
- 6 can't ban the pit bulls, but I think we can do what
- 7 Pittsburgh did, because if Pittsburgh did it and
- 8 Monroeville did it, we can do it in this city. They
- 9 can put the 8-foot fence up and get the special license
- 10 and have the liability insurance.
- 11 Oh, and for Mr. McTiernan and Mrs.
- 12 Evans, the paper I just gave you on Page 3, the
- 13 highlighted area, by Pennsylvania law, those dogs that
- 14 attacked mine are supposed to be put down, if you read
- 15 that Section B right there that's highlighted. And as
- 16 of right now, as far as I know, those people weren't
- 17 even cited.
- 18 And I know we have no more animal
- 19 control officer now; is that true? I heard he
- 20 resigned, because it was too much of a work load.
- 21 Well, why don't we hire somebody else to help him out?
- 22 MS. GATELLI: I don't think it was the
- 23 work load. It was another reason I'll discuss with you
- 24 later.
- 25 MR. SPINDLER: Well, I know I was

1 speaking to a policeman that's looking into the

2 situation for me, and he said the animal control

3 officer is overworked.

4 And, Mr. Courtright, I don't know the

5 name of the officer that responded, but it was June 1

6 at a quarter to ten at night. I'm sure there's records

7 of all of that. Could you look into that for me, if

8 and when these people are going to be cited? And I'll

9 leave the address with Neil? I don't want to say it on

10 air.

11 MR. COURTRIGHT: All right. Give Neil

12 the information. I will ask.

13 MR. SPINDLER: Okay. Next, Mrs.

14 Gatelli, last time I was here also, I brought up about

15 Council maybe writing new legislation to have Nay Aug

16 free swimming. Did you look into that?

17 MS. GATELLI: No, I didn't.

18 MR. SPINDLER: Are you going to?

19 MS. GATELLI: I can ask Attorney Minora

20 to look into the Recreation Authority.

21 MR. SPINDLER: No. Council has the

22 authority to write legislation. I know that for a

- 23 fact.
- 24 MS. GATELLI: To get rid of the
- 25 Recreation Authority?

- 1 MR. SPINDLER: No, no, to have free
- 2 swimming. Council could write legislation for
- 3 anything. So, why can't you write new legislation to
- 4 have free swimming at Nay Aug? You have the power to
- 5 do that.
- 6 MS. GATELLI: Well, I will ask Attorney
- 7 Minora that question.
- 8 MR. SPINDLER: Well, can he answer now?
- 9 MS. GATELLI: I think he'd have to
- 10 research it.
- 11 MR. SPINDLER: Well, I know when
- 12 Attorney Walsh was here under the last Council, he
- 13 wrote new legislation for certain things. I know that
- 14 for a fact.
- 15 MR. MINORA: The fact is the
- 16 legislation that was drawn up excluded -- the
- 17 legislation drawn up by Mark Walsh excluded Nay Aug
- 18 Park because it was a fee generated by the Recreational
- 19 Authority.

- 20 MR. SPINDLER: I'm not talking about
- 21 Nay Aug Park. He wrote legislation for other things.
- 22 MR. COURTRIGHT: We can write
- 23 legislation, Les. I think what Mr. Minora, and I'm not
- 24 trying to speak for him, is saying that we don't know
- 25 if we can write it pertaining to Nay Aug Park. He

- 1 would have to research that. Is that correct,
- 2 Mr. Minora?
- 3 MR. MINORA: I believe it's on the
- 4 agenda for tonight -- today, eliminating fees for
- 5 everywhere.
- 6 MS. EVANS: The neighborhood pools.
- 7 MR. MINORA: The neighborhood pools
- 8 except Nay Aug.
- 9 MR. SPINDLER: Okay. The next thing,
- 10 correct me if I'm wrong, part of our 3.4 wage tax goes
- 11 towards garbage collection; am I correct? Does anybody
- 12 know?
- 13 MS. GATELLI: I think your property tax
- 14 goes towards the garbage collection.
- 15 MR. SPINDLER: Well, I think the wage
- 16 tax does, also. But anyway, if that's true, then why

- 17 do we have to pay a garbage fee also?
- 18 MS. GATELLI: Because they instituted
- 19 it I don't know how many years ago.
- 20 MR. SPINDLER: Well, that's another
- 21 thing. Council can do away with the garbage fee.
- 22 Because I know under Mayor Connors, Mayor Connors
- 23 wanted to do it, but he couldn't get Council's okay.
- 24 I think we're paying for a fee twice.
- 25 We're paying with our wage tax and we're paying it with

- 1 the garbage.
- 2 MS. GATELLI: We are. And I remember
- 3 back then the neighborhoods fought that garbage fee.
- 4 MR. SPINDLER: Mayor Connors wanted to
- 5 do away with it and Council wouldn't let him.
- 6 MS. GATELLI: I remember they wanted
- 7 people to not pay it, and it didn't happen.
- 8 MR. SPINDLER: Okay. Well, could you
- 9 look into doing that? See if you can do that.
- 10 MS. GATELLI: We can look into it and
- 11 see how it would impact the budget, because I don't
- 12 want to cause property taxes to go up. You know, if
- 13 you're going to take one away and the other one is

- 14 going to go up, you're in the same boat. We need some
- 15 revenue producing items, that's what we need.
- 16 MR. SPINDLER: Okay. Next thing. Two
- 17 weeks ago I went down to Weston Field to sign my
- 18 daughter up for soccer, and I drove into that parking
- 19 lot, and that parking lot is like a mine field. I
- 20 think there's roads in Bagdad that were better than
- 21 that.
- 22 I was told two years ago that lot was
- 23 going to be paved, and it's still not paved. Can we
- 24 look into getting that done? And during soccer season,
- 25 that parking lot is filled every Saturday. Like I

- 25
- 1 said, it's two years, and they still haven't done
- 2 anything.
- 3 Lastly, everybody is aware of the rain
- 4 that we've had the last couple of days. I couldn't get
- 5 out my front door for obvious reasons. Rain was --
- 6 water was a couple inches high. You said you gave all
- 7 the information to Mr. Parker. Could you follow up on
- 8 that, please, Mrs. Gatelli?
- 9 MS. GATELLI: Yes, I will see if he can
- 10 check that.

- 11 MR. SPINDLER: I wish you could have
- 12 come up and seen the front of my house during that
- 13 rainstorm, because it was like a lake. I mean, this is
- 14 outrageous. I mean, I've complained about this for
- 15 four years. It looks like maybe I'll have to wait for
- 16 a different administration to take over until it's
- 17 fixed, but I don't know. That's ridiculous.
- 18 MS. GATELLI: Did you get any water in
- 19 your basement?
- 20 MR. SPINDLER: Just normal. It seeps
- 21 through my foundation a little bit, but that's normal.
- 22 I'm not upset about that, but I am upset about the
- 23 outside, because this is a problem the city caused by
- 24 taking the curb out and making it handicap accessible,
- 25 but they didn't do it the correct way. The sidewalks

- 1 slope down into my property. It should be sloped down
- 2 into the street.
- 3 MS. GATELLI: Okay.
- 4 MR. SPINDLER: That's all I have.
- 5 Thank you.
- 6 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Andy
- 7 Sbaraglia.

- 8 MR. SBARAGLIA: Good afternoon, City
- 9 Council. Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow
- 10 Scrantonians, I would like to see when your Council is
- 11 going to be appointed point so when that money starts
- 12 coming in from the federal or from the state or
- 13 somewhere along the line, that we get an idea of who
- 14 needs money, who does not need money, because I know
- 15 you have money in home rehab.
- 16 So, I would imagine that you would want
- 17 to rehab these homes that were flooded, so money could
- 18 be taken from home rehab to rehab those homes that were
- 19 flooded, but I don't want to see anybody make out like
- 20 a bandit either, but I would like to see a fair shake
- 21 done to any of the victims.
- 22 Now, on the pools, I know this is on
- 23 the agenda. I'd like to see that moved up, you suspend
- 24 your rules and move that for final passage. Summer is
- 25 waning. This thing went before we even opened the

- 21
- 1 pools and it's still hanging over us.
- 2 I mentioned, too, about Nay Aug, that
- 3 the best thing to do with Nay Aug is see if you can
- 4 actually lease it from the Sewer Authority -- I mean

5 the Scranton Recreational Authority for a buck a year

6 for 198 years, and that should make everybody happy,

7 because the mayor loves that 198 years for a buck a

8 year.

9 Okay. I'm going to say a little on

10 your -- let's see. I guess on your agenda there for

11 5-G, 5-G, Emit and Chris Pisano. What is a revolving

12 loan for? What is the meaning of a revolving loan? Is

13 that to generate income or just to give income without

14 anything coming in besides what you give out?

15 Because I notice it's a no interest

16 loan, and that's a lot of money, \$250,000 for no

17 interest, into a revolving fund. Why, your next one

18 underneath it for Scranton-Dunlop and Corporation has a

19 five percent tacked onto it.

20 MS. EVANS: Andy, we discussed this

21 during our caucus a while back now, and it appears that

22 the loan given to Dunlop is a CDBG loan; whereas, the

23 loan given to Pisano is a commercial industrial

24 revolving loan.

25 CDBG evidently has an interest rate

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28

1 attached to it, although we also learned that if the

- 2 designated number of jobs that they have proposed to
- 3 create are indeed created within a three-year period,
- 4 that mortgage is forgiven by the city.
- 5 Conversely, when we're looking at the
- 6 Pisano loan, it's at a zero interest rate, however, it
- 7 will be -- the \$250,000 will be repaid over 30 years.
- 8 And it appears that he received a zero percent interest
- 9 rate.
- 10 I'm not going to make a blanket
- 11 statement and say that all commercial industrial
- 12 revolving loans receive a zero percent interest rate.
- 13 If you are interested, though, I do
- 14 have a list of those organizations, companies,
- 15 individuals, who also have received a zero percent
- 16 interest rate.
- 17 However, it appears that since the
- 18 developer is putting so much of his own monies into the
- 19 project, and because its located in an area that's
- 20 considered a gateway to the city, that administration
- 21 has granted a zero percent interest rate to the
- 22 individual.
- 23 MR. SBARAGLIA: I thought the loan was
- 24 just to buy a building. Am I incorrect to assume
- 25 that's what the loan was for, for him to acquire a

- 1 building? I think that's what it's in there for. I
- 2 think it requires a building.
- 3 In other words, he wants to buy a
- 4 building, but the money we're loaning to him somewhere,
- 5 like you say, the gateway into the city. It's over on
- 6 Moosic Street, I believe.
- 7 MS. EVANS: Right. But it appears that
- 8 buildings were demolished there by the city at the
- 9 city's cost, and in order to replace those vacancies, a
- 10 restaurant and some retail stores will be constructed.
- 11 MR. SBARAGLIA: Yeah, I think there's a
- 12 bunch of retail stores, little mom and pop stores
- 13 there.
- 14 Okay. One other thing. This is just
- 15 for information. The school board on Saturday voted to
- 16 borrow \$60 million. Now, the cost to the taxpayers of
- 17 Scranton if this thing goes through is \$6.50 per
- 18 thousand, so all you have to do is figure how much your
- 19 house is accessed at and you know what this loan is
- 20 going to cost the city -- your residents of the city.
- 21 Thank you.
- 22 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Ray Lyman.

23 MR. LYMAN: Ray Lyman. Mrs. Evans,

24 could I have a copy of that, too?

25 MS. EVANS: Of the information I

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30

1 discussed with Mr. Sbaraglia?

2 MR. LYMAN: With Andy.

3 MS. EVANS: Surely.

4 MR. LYMAN: Mrs. Fanucci, you know that

5 audit that you're getting from PEL? Would you give me

6 a copy of that? Okay. Thank you, Sherry, Mrs.

7 Fanucci. Mrs. Gatelli, I had --

8 MS. GATELLI: You're going down the

9 line, I guess.

10 MR. LYMAN: Yeah. We had flooding in

11 our basement from the wall from the rain. I was

12 wondering, like, I don't know where you get -- where

13 you could fill out for assistance for that.

14 MS. GATELLI: Do you still have water n

15 the basement?

16 MR. LYMAN: No. We got it out, but

17 it's wet, the floor. Because we have -- the one side

18 is dirt and the other side is wood on it, but --

19 MS. GATELLI: Did it affect your

- 20 furnace or your hot water heater?
- 21 MR. LYMAN: I checked it.
- 22 MS. GATELLI: It didn't go that night?
- 23 MR. LYMAN: We have dirt there and it
- 24 went down into where the dirt is.
- 25 MS. GATELLI: If it didn't affect your

- 1 furnace or your hot water heater or your electrical
- 2 panel --
- 3 MR. LYMAN: But the wall -- we have the
- 4 water heater by that side.
- 5 MS. GATELLI: And was it damaged?
- 6 MR. LYMAN: It's working.
- 7 MS. GATELLI: Was it under water?
- 8 MR. LYMAN: It was -- just that side
- 9 where the pipes are, it was, like, I would say about
- 10 like that (INDICATING).
- 11 MS. GATELLI: If you have any question
- 12 about any of those things, whether they were under
- 13 water or not, you should call Mr. Fiorini and have an
- 14 inspector come out and check, because if they were
- 15 under water, you may need to have them replaced.
- 16 MR. LYMAN: Well, what is his number?

17 MS. GATELLI: 348-4193.

18 MR. LYMAN: He will give me the number.

19 MS. GATELLI: You can probably just go

20 right upstairs and leave a message with his secretary.

21 MR. LYMAN: On the third floor?

22 MS. GATELLI: No, the fourth floor. If

23 they were under water, they should be checked.

24 MR. LYMAN: Okay. And today around ten

25 o'clock we had a big drug bust on Capouse Avenue. And

32

1 I told the police, and there were other people that

2 these people -- first they were living on my street.

3 This was over a year ago, these people were -- with

4 drugs. And then they moved on Capouse Avenue.

5 Because I was talking to the two cops

6 and they -- and there were other cops. There were

7 undercover detectives. They were watching them. They

8 pulled over the car, and then one of them threw the

9 drugs.

10 And this poor -- I'm not going to

11 mention the lady, but they threw the drugs in her yard,

12 and then they went -- and one of them must have

13 squealed.

- 14 The other one ran down, you know, down
- 15 the -- you know where the -- where the Sandy Banks.
- 16 You know where that is, Judy. And then he got away,
- 17 and then later they caught him, like, 35 minutes later,
- 18 you know, where the flood gates are.
- 19 Then the first guy they caught, he
- 20 squealed. Then they went to the one I told you where
- 21 the drug house is. They pulled out four more people
- 22 out. And I went into the, you know, the Pine Brook
- 23 Market. I come out, and they're still pulling people
- 24 out of that house.
- 25 And the Vice President of the Pine

- 1 Brook Association says there's no crime in Pine Brook.
- 2 And I said to her face, You said there's no crime in
- 3 Pine Brook, Mary Chilipko, and I said, Look At this.
- 4 And it amazes me. No beat cop. So,
- 5 Mr. Courtright, I'm asking you, you're the fourth one
- 6 down the line. What happened to our beat cop?
- 7 MR. COURTRIGHT: Your beat cop is being
- 8 shared with other areas until what time that I think
- 9 they have approximately three their training, and I'm
- 10 being told that once those three are out on the street,

- 11 that they should be put back in your area.
- 12 MR. LYMAN: Oh, okay. Now, I got two
- 13 more --
- 14 MR. COURTRIGHT: Maybe four. I'm not
- 15 sure.
- 16 MR. LYMAN: I got two more questions.
- 17 Now, the Pine Brook Association got a grant for flags
- 18 they put on Capouse Avenue and flowers. I was
- 19 wondering. She said, Mary Chilipko said, they got a
- 20 grant from the City Council from the city, and I was
- 21 wondering if they could put it on Phelps Street, the
- 22 American flags and flowers. She said she got a grant
- 23 from the city.
- 24 I was wondering if you guys could do
- 25 that for Phelps Street. She said she got a grant from
- 34
- 1 you guys.
- 2 MS. GATELLI: If she's talking about a
- 3 block grant, then you have to apply for that within the
- 4 next few weeks.
- 5 MR. LYMAN: She said she applied for
- 6 it, but she never put it on our street, but she put it
- 7 on Capouse Avenue and I was wondering if she got the

8 money for that, why didn't she do it to our street?

9 MS. GATELLI: I don't know. You'd have

10 to ask her that question.

11 MR. LYMAN: I asked her and she said

12 she did it. And I was wondering. I know you can't

13 accuse somebody.

14 MS. GATELLI: Okay. Thanks, Ray.

15 MR. LYMAN: Okay. Thank you.

16 MS. GATELLI: Mr. Jackowitz.

17 MR. JACKOWITZ: Good afternoon, City

18 Council. Bill Jackowitz, city resident and taxpayer,

19 retired United States Air Force.

20 I'd like to start off this evening by

21 -- or this afternoon, I would like to thank Mr.

22 Courtright on finding the location of the pothole

23 machine. Now where is the asphalt machine? Has the

24 city used the machine yet?

25 Also, I would like to thank Mr. Minora

1 for answering my questions two weeks ago. Although I

2 did not agree, but I do appreciate your answers, Mr.

3 Minora.

4 We have experienced a natural disaster.

- 5 My prayers and best wishes are for everyone who
- 6 suffered a loss. I would like to thank all citizens.
- 7 We had no looting, no shootings, no whining, no
- 8 complaining, shelters were not destroyed. Civilization
- 9 is alive in the northeast.
- 10 It was nice to read that Mr. Parker
- 11 investigated himself and cleared himself of all
- 12 wrongdoings on the Hollow Avenue project, and Attorney
- 13 Farrell agreed with him. Scranton justice at its
- 14 finest. I hope I get to investigate myself if I ever
- 15 have a problem.
- 16 Okay. The Rinaldi project. Two years,
- 17 what has been accomplished? When will the project
- 18 start?
- 19 Southern Union, when will the two
- 20 tenants move in? How many jobs? That's been, what,
- 21 four, five weeks ago we were getting two tenants? They
- 22 ain't here yet.
- 23 2006 financial report, late. When can
- 24 we expect a report? It should have been here in May or
- 25 June.

1 The mayor's invitation to attend a

- 2 Council meeting. Deadline 30 April 2006. Was the
- 3 invitation ever issued? Was there a reply? Still, I
- 4 haven't gotten an answer on that one.
- 5 Austin Burke's invitation to attend
- 6 Council meeting. Was the invitation ever issued? Has
- 7 he ever replied? What is the status? Waiting and
- 8 waiting and waiting.
- 9 Sara Hailstone invited to attend
- 10 Council meeting. Was the invitation ever extended? Is
- 11 she coming? Again, waiting, waiting, waiting.
- 12 Soldiers' pay, are they paid up to
- 13 date? What about the bonus that Council voted on?
- 14 What is the status on that? Waiting, waiting, waiting.
- 15 House numbers, do all homes in Scranton
- 16 now have house numbers? We had a 28-minute debate on
- 17 that right before the election. What's the status on
- 18 that one?
- 19 MS. EVANS: I can respond to that one.
- 20 MR. JACKOWITZ: Well, can you wait
- 21 until 5-A motions, please, because I don't want to lose
- 22 my time.
- 23 MS. EVANS: Absolutely.
- 24 MR. JACKOWITZ: Tax exempt non-profits
- 25 committee status. Please update tonight. Is it DOA?

- 2 How much taxpayer money has been spent so far? Rumor
- 3 has it work on the bridge to nowhere has stopped
- 4 because of problems. Can you clarify that for me,
- 5 please?
- 6 Free swimming, is it free? Nay Aug

1 Tree house, bridge to nowhere, status.

- 7 Park, \$3 to swim. I have a picture. I'll show it to
- 8 you when I'm done. The sign states right there,
- 9 Swimming \$3 at Nay Aug Park, not \$1.
- 10 How much taxpayers' money was spent
- 11 tearing down tearing down the Granito's building on
- 12 Moosic Street? Why did we tear it down? Why couldn't
- 13 the developer tear his own property down? He's going
- 14 to reap the fortunes.
- 15 How much taxpayers' money has been paid
- 16 to PEL? When will the distressed city status be
- 17 removed? We had a quote a few weeks ago of \$1,700,000.
- 18 Is that accurate? Let's get an accurate number,
- 19 please.
- 20 DPW workers, other than Mr. Parker who
- 21 allegedly live outside city limits, is that factual or
- 22 not? Do we have someone who's violating the rule or

- 23 don't we? DPW worker living outside city limits, other
- 24 than Mr. Parker.
- 25 MS. GATELLI: I will get that answer,

- 1 too.
- 2 MR. JACKOWITZ: Three months ago you
- 3 were going to investigate that. Did you investigate
- 4 it? Do we have an answer? Is it factual or not?
- 5 MS. GATELLI: Yes, I have.
- 6 MR. JACKOWITZ: The parking garage
- 7 report. Mr. Courtright asked for it in November 2005.
- 8 Do we have that report? Police cars, why was the order
- 9 for the new cars late? Who is responsible for that?
- 10 Will dash cameras be mounted in the new police cars as
- 11 part of the new city camera program? Dash cameras are
- 12 a valuable assets to police officers and citizens.
- 13 What is the status of Mr. Pocius'
- 14 retirement? How much does he receive for the year and
- 15 has he been receiving it and when will this be
- 16 resolved? City Council voted in favor of it, one
- 17 member of City Council did anyway.
- 18 How many paid vacation days a year for
- 19 City Council? Also, how many paid sick days? If you

- 20 only attend half the meeting, are you paid for the
- 21 entire meeting?
- 22 And, also, I have asked on several
- 23 occasions, this is my third time asking this question
- 24 in the year 2006, are taxpayers entitled to honest and
- 25 accurate answers to their questions and concerns? So

- 1 far today it's just been nothing but spin and argument
- 2 back and forth.
- 3 You five are elected officials. You
- 4 make \$12,500 a year. When citizens have questions and
- 5 concerns, they go to their elected officials.
- 6 Elected officials are required and part
- 7 of their oath is to assist the citizens who elected
- 8 them. We don't need arguments, we don't need
- 9 complaints. What we need is answers. We don't need
- 10 people keep saying, I don't know this. We ask a
- 11 question, the five of you look at each other. We don't
- 12 know nothing about this. Remember Sergeant Schultz? I
- 13 know nothing, nothing, nothing.
- 14 MS. GATELLI: Would you like your
- 15 answers now or under motions? Stan Narsavage.

15 So, when we read it and we have our

16 solicitor review it, we will tell you what we have

17 received.

18 MR. NARSAVAGE: That won't be today.

19 MS. GATELLI: I don't imagine, because

20 we just got it.

21 MR. NARSAVAGE: All right. Well, the

22 point I guess I was trying to make is the difference

23 between this probe at SHA and the way the city handles

24 their problems. There's quite a bit of room there for

25 improvement.

1 I stopped at the Novembrino Pool last

2 Wednesday. They were charging a dollar to swim. I

3 stopped there today on my way here. It was twelve

4 o'clock, and I guess they don't open until -- is it one

5 o'clock they open, the pools?

6 MS. GATELLI: I think twelve.

7 MR. NARSAVAGE: No one was there at

8 twelve. I wanted to find out if the pool prices have

9 changed. I assume they did not. And you have

10 something on the agenda today?

- 11 MS. GATELLI: Yes.
- 12 MR. NARSAVAGE: Is it feasible that
- 13 Council can write legislation to change that pool fee?
- 14 MS. EVANS: For the neighborhood pools?
- 15 MS. GATELLI: Yes.
- 16 MS. EVANS: Yes. It's been done. It's
- 17 on the agenda today.
- 18 MR. NARSAVAGE: Okay. Oh, is this what
- 19 you're going to talk about today?
- 20 MS. EVANS: Yes.
- 21 MR. NARSAVAGE: Mrs. Fanucci, I have to
- 22 bring up the HUD report again. I mean, this is about
- 23 seven or eight weeks. I think the original request
- 24 that I made you said, yes, it's available and you could
- 25 have it next week. That's about seven weeks ago.

- 1 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: It was definitely
- 2 seven weeks ago. I think it was almost eight actually
- 3 now.
- 4 MR. NARSAVAGE: Okay.
- 5 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: But I still have
- 6 not received it. I will keep asking. They keep saying
- 7 that if citizens want to write letters and ask if it's

11 MR. NARSAVAGE: Okay. That's

12 redundant, because two different friends of mine have

13 written letters and got unfavorable answers like what

14 authority are you applying under. I'm a taxpayer.

15 MS. GATELLI: Mr. Narsavage, anyone is

16 entitled to OECD documents. It is the federal

17 government, and if they are being denied, tell them to

18 call us and we will call HUD in Philadelphia and make

19 sure you get that report.

20 MR. NARSAVAGE: Well, then how about if

21 I go beyond that? How about if I do it myself?

22 MS. GATELLI: That's fine. And if you

23 have a problem, just let us know. One question that I

24 think may be hindering you is people keep saying

25 audits. It's not really an audit. It's called a

43

1 monitoring review. And maybe that's where the

2 confusion is coming in.

3 MR. NARSAVAGE: Okay. But isn't it

4 also -- hasn't it also -- hasn't HUD also hired

- 5 independent people to do audits in cities?
- 6 MS. GATELLI: Yes. That's financial.
- 7 I think what you're looking for is to see if all the
- 8 projects are legitimate, if they're all spending the
- 9 money the right way, et cetera.
- 10 MR. NARSAVAGE: That's what I want to
- 11 know, if the money went to where it was supposed to go
- 12 ---
- 13 MS. GATELLI: Right. That's called a
- 14 monitoring review.
- 15 MR. NARSAVAGE: Okay. I just didn't
- 16 want it to go to Nay Aug Park, okay? Thank you.
- 17 MS. GATELLI: You're welcome. Joe
- 18 Nardella.
- 19 MR. NARDELLA: Joe Nardella of
- 20 Scranton. Good afternoon, Council members. I'd like
- 21 to take this time to share my feelings I had this past
- 22 Tuesday.
- 23 I woke up to a rainy day, and shortly
- 24 after I heard the flood siren in my neighborhood, The
- 25 Plot Section of Scranton.

1 The siren filled me with a sense of an

- 2 inevitable fear knowing, that as in the past, my
- 3 family, friends, neighbors and myself would be facing
- 4 muddy waters followed by weeks, if not months, of
- 5 stress, worry, cleanup and repair.
- 6 I know there was much planning and
- 7 consideration in making the decision to build a levee
- 8 system, but with the project that was not expected to
- 9 be completed until 2008, I felt as if all Plot dwellers
- 10 were going to face a major flood disaster; however,
- 11 this time was different.
- 12 Several Scranton DPW and Scranton Sewer
- 13 Authority employees worked tirelessly through the night
- 14 in order to build a temporary levee system so that our
- 15 homes may be spared.
- 16 Their efforts allowed us to dodge a
- 17 bullet as their temporary solution worked. Scranton
- 18 police officers also patrolled the night tirelessly in
- 19 order to insure our safety.
- 20 I would like to thank all who were
- 21 involved in coordinating this event, especially those
- 22 who worked through the night to help.
- 23 We're often quick to criticize when
- 24 things go wrong, but I would like to praise members of
- 25 the Scranton DPW, Sewer Authority and police department

1 and all others involved for a job well done. You are

2 all to be commended. As one neighbor said, you are our

3 heroes. Thank you for your time and this opportunity

4 to share my feelings.

5 MS. GATELLI: Thank you very much. Ron

6 Elman.

7 MR. ELMAN: Ms. Gatelli, you're not the

8 only one got a fan letter. I got one telling me I need

9 to move. I was talking about the one in the paper last

10 week.

11 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: I've gotten a few

12 of those myself.

13 MR. ELMAN: Mine was signed Joe. The

14 only Joe I could think of was Snedeker. Maybe I got

15 him on the run or something. He's afraid I'm going to

16 run for weatherman. I don't know.

17 I had a bunch of notes here that aren't

18 important. We had a meeting last week at The

19 Taxpayers. One of you get a pencil and paper out, just

20 a scratch paper.

21 At that meeting it said the city owed

22 \$241 million, the county \$290 and the school \$200. How

- 23 are you all going to pay for that in 30 years? Really.
- 24 Nobody writing -- the last year
- 25 nobody's come up with any kind of idea. Our mayor

- 1 hides behind his secretaries' skirts or something. He
- 2 won't address the fact.
- 3 Now, if any of you are foolish enough
- 4 to be here in 30 years, that's what you're going to be
- 5 paying for. It's just terrible. I feel sorry for
- 6 you.
- 7 And I think the biggest blame is the
- 8 KOZ program. I'm out there. I don't know. Nobody
- 9 ever sees you people at grocery stores or the mall or
- 10 anything. That's -- every time I go someplace,
- 11 somebody seems to think that I'm under commission.
- 12 They tell me problems and tell me things they want
- 13 changed and done, you know?
- 14 MS. GATELLI: Mr. Elman, there will be
- 15 two seats in two years. There's always a possibility
- 16 you could be sitting up here.
- 17 MR. ELMAN: I'm not interested in that.
- 18 In two years, I probably -- that letter will probably
- 19 be right and I won't be here.

- 20 But I think -- you don't realize how
- 21 enormously disappointed the people are about the KOZ
- 22 program. And you talk about the \$250,000. The paper
- 23 said they were going to invent some \$40,000 a year
- 24 jobs. That money will be gone just like The Globe
- 25 Store and, what was it, Walker's School. You know, we

- 1 lost a million in these two motels. It just doesn't
- 2 stop.
- 3 And now these -- all the money going
- 4 into this white elephant over here -- down that way,
- 5 that electric building. You people just don't hear
- 6 what the public is saying.
- 7 I think there's going to be five
- 8 vacancies up there if something's not done. People
- 9 aren't happy in this city like the newspaper. I think
- 10 you pay too much attention to what a third rate paper
- 11 that's full of distortion prints.
- 12 Everybody's just -- couldn't make heads
- 13 or tails out of this article, I guess it was a month
- 14 ago, how great the KOZ program is. It's a failure. It
- 15 is a complete failure.
- 16 It's cost all these people out here and

- 17 everybody else tens of millions of dollars in tax money
- 18 that we need right now.
- 19 And if Mr. Spindler would move up to
- 20 Tripp Park, all his problems would probably be taken
- 21 care of immediately, because all I hear about is fixing
- 22 this, that and the other thing in Tripp Park, building
- 23 them a school.
- 24 You know, the hell with Tripp Park.
- 25 Why don't you worry about this city right here?

- 48
- 1 Everybody in the city is complaining about things and
- 2 -- I'm sorry.
- 3 You know, the property taxes can't be
- 4 paid. They can't go up no more. You said at the
- 5 beginning of the meeting to Mr. Spindler, you don't
- 6 want to see taxes going up no more. What do you think
- 7 another KOZ program has done? They sure didn't help
- 8 the tax base any.
- 9 The tax base is just stretched -- it's
- 10 just nowhere else to go -- to get any more money from
- 11 people. There's 80-year -- I pulled out of the parking
- 12 lot yesterday up here, and the lady told me her mother
- 13 is 80-years-old moved out of the house and couldn't

- 14 afford the taxes no more.
- 15 Everywhere you go people are
- 16 complaining about the tax base, and this inapt school
- 17 board is wanting to build another school instead of
- 18 fixing anything. I don't know.
- 19 I didn't hear anything. How are you
- 20 going to pay for that? You got 25, 26 years by the
- 21 time you start paying taxes, and these people in Tripp
- 22 Park still won't be paying taxes when you are. Think
- 23 of it. That's what your KOZ program has done to this
- 24 city.
- 25 MS. GATELLI: Thanks, Mr. Elman. And

- 1 just for the record, I don't think anyone sitting up
- 2 here voted for the KOZ, I might be wrong, in Tripps
- 3 Park.
- 4 So, you know, nobody sitting up here
- 5 voted for any of those KOZs, so -- Frank Tyson.
- 6 MR. TYSON: Good afternoon, Madam
- 7 President and Council members. My name is Francis
- 8 Tyson. I'm a resident of Scranton.
- 9 I appear here before you this afternoon
- 10 and all in attendance and your viewing audience to ask

- 11 you to join with us on the Fourth of July up at Nay Aug
- 12 Park on Tuesday to celebrate Independence Day.
- 13 There will be presentations from 30
- 14 Veterans groups, many of which are World War II
- 15 Veterans, Korean War Veterans, Vietnam Veterans, and of
- 16 course we have a few that's involved in the current
- 17 event we have over in the Middle East. There will be
- 18 boy scouts, religious leaders and community leaders in
- 19 attendance.
- 20 The public is cordially invited, and we
- 21 encourage everyone to attend and bring your children
- 22 and your grandchildren. This is a good way to
- 23 demonstrate to them personally good citizenship and
- 24 also a little bit of history of what happened to our
- 25 country.

- 1 The band concert is going to start at
- 2 10:30 by The Ring Gold Band, and our ceremony will
- 3 start at eleven o'clock sharp.
- 4 Our keynote speaker is Lieutenant Carl
- 5 Weinshank, United States Army retired, and currently
- 6 he's the head of the Veterans Center down here in
- 7 Scranton, the Merli Veterans Center.

8 Of course there's free parking for

9 everyone. There's ample parking. We ask you to bring

10 a comfortable folding chair. Come early. And please

11 support your community. Thank you. And I hope to see

12 you on the 4th of July.

13 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Mike Dudek.

14 MR. TYSON: Incidentally, that's at the

15 swim complex. I forgot to mention it.

16 MS. GATELLI: Thank you.

17 MR. DUDEK: Mike Dudek, 608 Depot

18 Street, Scranton, PA. I live in The Plot, and I owe an

19 awful lot of people a multitude of thanks.

20 One of the speakers I said -- made it

21 very plain. If you are going to be stuck in a

22 disaster, have it in Scranton, because we know how to

23 show the rest of the world how to handle it.

24 No looting, because everybody is too

25 busy helping everybody else. And I think that's the

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51

1 whole bottom line there. I want to alert the people of

2 the City of Scranton to a scam. I was almost the

3 victim of it.

4 There is a company called North

- 5 American Telephone Company from Atlanta, Georgia.
- 6 They're sending bills to people in Scranton,
- 7 Pennsylvania on your telephone bill.
- 8 My bill was for \$39.12. Now, the
- 9 reason why I don't have it here is because I was
- 10 evacuated out and I forgot to take it with me.
- 11 North American Telephone will play a
- 12 tape for you telling you why you have to pay that bill.
- 13 But what they don't realize is that when you run into
- 14 somebody like me who has been around the block a few
- 15 times with various issues, this company is subject to a
- 16 \$10,000 fine if you pay that bill.
- 17 Now, all you have to do is call the
- 18 company and tell them that you are a customer of dah,
- 19 dah, dah, in my case Verizon, and that I'm going to
- 20 take my last three months Verizon telephone bills and
- 21 the North American Telephone bill to the Attorney
- 22 General of the State of Pennsylvania. And all of a
- 23 sudden, your bill will be forgiven.
- 24 I would imagine there will be anywhere
- 25 from 50 to 100 people in the City of Scranton alone,

1 probably in other parts of Lackawanna County, who may

- 2 be the recipients of one of these letters or one of
- 3 these bills. I am one of them.
- 4 So, I thought with the reach of Channel
- 5 61 going up and out, I think maybe we should alert
- 6 people to something called North American telephone
- 7 from Atlanta George.
- 8 Okay. Second item I want to talk
- 9 about, Mayor Barletta got himself on CNN and all over
- 10 the news, all over the country with his idea of making
- 11 the English language the official language of Hazleton.
- 12 Well, that's wonderful, except that
- 13 he's leaving himself and the City of Hazleton open to a
- 14 massive civil rights lawsuit, not to mention a
- 15 violation of the First Amendment right of Freedom of
- 16 Speech.
- 17 May I please make a suggestion to City
- 18 Council that may work? The best that I have read from
- 19 any mayor of the United States on this issue, believe
- 20 it or not, is the stance taken by Mayor Chris Doherty
- 21 of the City of Scranton.
- 22 He is 100 percent on the mark.
- 23 Immigration is a federal issue. We cannot make illegal
- 24 immigrants subject to any kind of penalties, because we
- 25 are only a municipal government. The mayor is right on

- 1 the mark.
- 2 What we can do is this, we can open up
- 3 the Home Rule Charter to make the English language the
- 4 official language of city government, that all laws,
- 5 resolutions passed in the City of Scranton must be in
- 6 the English language, okay? That's one thing we could
- 7 do.
- 8 Let me give you an example, if you are
- 9 a traveler, if you are in St. Petersburg, Russia and
- 10 you get on that airplane that's going to take you to
- 11 Moscow or Russia, what's the language in the cockpit
- 12 and the air traffic control?
- 13 MS. EVANS: Russian.
- 14 MR. DUDEK: It's English. If you are
- 15 in Shanghai, China and you get on a plane and you go to
- 16 Bejing, it is English. In China there are a thousand
- 17 languages spoken by more than a million people each.
- 18 How can you have a cacophony of
- 19 languages running your airplanes? Russian alone has
- 20 different dialects.
- 21 If you get on a little paper cub in Li
- 22 sotto and you fly 40 miles to Johannesburg, your air

- 23 traffic control is English.
- 24 English is the language of worldwide
- 25 travel. It has been done, believe it or not, at the

- 1 request of the Soviet government when Krushef was Prime
- 2 Minister, because in terms of investigating airplane
- 3 crashes, the Russians found out that if you have just
- 4 one dominant language, it makes things easier. That's
- 5 why we need English as the language of our government.
- 6 And make it very plain that if, for
- 7 instance, we want to negotiate with a company like
- 8 Aventis Pasteur, put language in there that says,
- 9 Nothing shall forbid the City of Scranton from using a
- 10 foreign language if it is necessary, you know, in its
- 11 daily operations.
- 12 But we must make it understood that
- 13 English be the language of government. If you go up to
- 14 McDade Park, you take the mine tour, did you ever see
- 15 the safety instructions that were on those cars in
- 16 Lithuanian, Slovak, Polish, German?
- 17 When it was needed as a cultural thing,
- 18 as a work thing, all the languages were used in this
- 19 valley, but the language of government has always been

- 20 English.
- 21 I think we need to mandate that. That
- 22 way it protects everybody's culture and everybody's
- 23 still free to be welcomed here knowing that the
- 24 government will be run intelligently here. Thank you.
- 25 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Mr. Bobzerik.

- 1 AUDIENCE MEMBER: (UNTRANSCRIBABLE.)
- 2 MS. GATELLI: Okay. Thank you. Erik
- 3 Johnson.
- 4 MR. JOHNSON: Good evening, City
- 5 Council. I mean, good afternoon, City Council and
- 6 staff.
- 7 As you all know, I had no choice in
- 8 selling my house and had to move out almost immediately
- 9 and find a suitable priced apartment to my income and
- 10 find people as best as I can to help move me from my
- 11 sold house to my apartment.
- 12 After the painful huge move, only a
- 13 month later I received an eviction notice in the mail
- 14 of my new property. I have to move all my belongings
- 15 out of the property that was sold immediately to the
- 16 University of Scranton.

- 17 If it is not moved out, all of my
- 18 belongings by August 1, the property and my belongings
- 19 will be demolished. I already paid two months' rent
- 20 upfront and now threatened to lose all of my
- 21 belongings.
- 22 I almost -- I also want you all to know
- 23 that I had to pay \$500 from my escrow sale of my house
- 24 for the removal of my moving garbage on the front
- 25 pickup curb of my sold house.

- 56
- 1 The garbage belonged to both the new
- 2 owner and myself, but I had to foot the whole bill, the
- 3 whole cost.
- 4 Now after all past hardships, a new
- 5 hardship springs up due to no fault of my own, but the
- 6 owner of the property in which I'm being evicted of.
- 7 In the mail it says, I regret to inform
- 8 you I have sold my property here in Scranton on Webster
- 9 Avenue. You have until August the 1st to remove
- 10 everything from the property -- the garage property.
- 11 It will be scheduled to be demolished. And it has
- 12 Tim Porter, chinchilla, PA, Box 69.
- 13 The landlord knew his property was

- 14 condemned and a sale was in the process to the
- 15 University of Scranton. I moved in May the 20th last
- 16 month. He gave me no knowledge of any kind in
- 17 advertising or as he was renting to me.
- 18 I moved all of my belongings to this
- 19 property, now I'm losing almost everything. It was a
- 20 huge and expensive move, and I'm giving you each a
- 21 copy.
- 22 If I -- I'm not going to go to another
- 23 church to be a refuge like I did last time. And this
- 24 time if -- I think I'll have to try to find a relative,
- 25 Tom Larson, he was head of PennDOT. He lives out in

- 1 Clearfield, and I will have to get a hold of him to see
- 2 what he can do for me, you know.
- 3 I've exhausted almost everything here
- 4 for help here in Scranton. I can't get low income
- 5 housing immediately, because they said that they had
- 6 others to take care of, you know, I mean, before me.
- 7 So, you know, I have no other choice.
- 8 I have to do the best I can on my own. Thank you for
- 9 allowing me to speak. And I'm not making all this up.
- 10 I don't want pity. I'm just going to see what I can

- 11 do.
- 12 MR. COURTRIGHT: Erik, did you go to
- 13 the Housing Authority? Did you ask the Housing
- 14 Authority?
- 15 MR. JOHNSON: I did that, and they
- 16 said, Hey, we can't help you. They said, an emergency
- 17 case like yours, we can't help you. They said, we've
- 18 got an overload of people coming in. So, I --
- 19 MS. GATELLI: Can you wait around until
- 20 after the meeting? Do you have time to stay here for a
- 21 little while?
- 22 MR. JOHNSON: Yes, I do.
- 23 MS. GATELLI: Stay, and then we will
- 24 meet with you in Council.
- 25 MR. COURTRIGHT: To see if we can help

- 1 you out.
- 2 MS. GATELLI: Okay?
- 3 MR. JOHNSON: I appreciate it very
- 4 much.
- 5 MS. GATELLI: Yes. Stay for a little
- 6 while.
- 7 MR. JOHNSON: I don't know how much

8 more of this hardship I can take. I'm ready to go

9 loco. I'm going to the nut house or something.

10 MS. GATELLI: Is there anyone else that

11 cares to address Council at this time?

12 MR. DAVIS: Assalaam Alaikum. Peace

13 and blessings of Allah be with you. I'm here today

14 because of two things. Number one, we have a town full

15 of kids or young adults who are currently unsupervised

16 in the evening, and there's no plan in this city that I

17 have found to exist that cares about it.

18 I said this to you some four weeks ago

19 when you spoke about there's not going to be a fee on

20 any of the satellite pools, and now I find that to be

21 untrue also.

22 And I was told by someone who works --

23 who is on the board of the recreation department or

24 recreation that the fee at Nay Aug Park is going to be

25 \$3.

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59

1 Whether you use the sliding pool or

2 just swim, it's \$3 across the board one flat fee. And

3 that was going to be a dollar at all the satellite

4 pools.

- 5 I said, But that's impossible. I heard
- 6 it when they passed it right here at City Council that
- 7 there would be no fee. And that was four weeks ago,
- 8 and now it's on the thing again under fifth order.
- 9 I can't understand. What are we going
- 10 backwards? Okay. Not a problem. I'm quite sure you
- 11 are going to remedy this before the summer is over
- 12 with.
- 13 But many of the people that I've talked
- 14 to, many of the people who've talked to me said they
- 15 can't afford Nay Aug, not for a whole summer.
- 16 And even the satellite pool at a
- 17 dollar, when you fill -- when your children in one
- 18 household or four or five kids, you can't do that more
- 19 than once a week or once a month, and that's when the
- 20 check comes. But that's all right, too.
- 21 You really don't know what we're
- 22 talking about. You have no idea. I mean, I think
- 23 everybody here is so rich and so affluent that really
- 24 what we're saying --
- 25 MS. GATELLI: Mr. Davis.

1 MR. DAVIS: Oh, Mrs. Gatelli, don't --

- 2 MS. GATELLI: Please. Don't insult us.
- 3 MR. DAVIS: Don't insult me.
- 4 MS. GATELLI: My parents worked in a
- 5 factory. Come on.
- 6 MR. DAVIS: You're wonderful. My
- 7 father worked in a coal mine and my mother worked as a
- 8 domestic. That doesn't mean anything to you. I'm
- 9 telling you like this.
- 10 MS. GATELLI: We have it on the agenda.
- 11 MR. DAVIS: I'm telling you like this.
- 12 MS. GATELLI: No child is denied from
- 13 going in the pool, because I've seen it.
- 14 MR. DAVIS: There are people who are
- 15 being denied every single day from going in these pools
- 16 that don't have a dollar.
- 17 MR. COURTRIGHT: Mr. Davis, I said here
- 18 a few weeks back hat if anyone is denied, if they
- 19 contacted me, I would see to it that they got in.
- 20 I spoke to Mr. Brazil from -- he's in
- 21 charge of Parks and Recreation now. He said that no
- 22 one will be denied. I said here on the air, if anybody
- 23 was trying to get in the pool and was being denied,
- 24 contact me and I would see to it that they got in.
- 25 I haven't been contacted by anybody

1 yet. If you know individuals that can't get in, give

2 me their names. I will call Mr. Brazil, they will get

3 in.

4 MR. DAVIS: You know what, seriously,

5 nobody is going to beg, not in Scranton.

6 MR. COURTRIGHT: Well, I'm not asking

7 them to beg.

8 MR. DAVIS: And really -- but you

9 already said that you were going to eliminate it. You

10 said it here --

11 MR. COURTRIGHT: It's on the agenda

12 tonight.

13 MR. DAVIS: But now. That's four weeks

14 later.

15 MR. COURTRIGHT: I'm not going to argue

16 with you. You just want to argue.

17 MR. DAVIS: Okay. Never mind. You're

18 right. This is not a place of confrontation. The big

19 thing is, I've got a community here, the Tech/Central

20 community. I call it my community because I love it,

21 because I was born there, I was raised there, et

22 cetera.

- 23 I had a family that suffered and died
- 24 there, and et cetera. We have put more people from our
- 25 family from the Davis family in the Fairlawn Cemetery,

- 1 I mean, over the generations, over the years, and yet
- 2 the land that we gave for that school to elongate
- 3 itself under -- under eminent domain is now a parking
- 4 lot for the Mercy Hospital or when the teachers decide
- 5 to come to school there.
- 6 We cannot even use it from dusk to
- 7 dawn. There's signs up on the buildings that say so.
- 8 You know what, it's kind of hard to keep the kids in
- 9 check when all you've done so far for these kids in
- 10 Central City is insult them and their intelligence and
- 11 their ability to be kids.
- 12 Take a walk. Go up there and see it
- 13 for yourself. Don't sit here and look at me like I
- 14 have two heads. This is real. These are things that
- 15 actually occur in this community today.
- 16 MS. GATELLI: And what would you --
- 17 MR. DAVIS: You don't believe it.
- 18 MS. GATELLI: They're not being allowed
- 19 to go where? I don't understand.

- 20 MR. DAVIS: Who am I talking to? Do
- 21 you know where Tech High School is?
- 22 MS. GATELLI: Yes.
- 23 MR. DAVIS: Have you ever been there?
- 24 MS. GATELLI: Yes.
- 25 MR. DAVIS: You know how there's

- 1 grounds all the way around it?
- 2 MS. GATELLI: Yes.
- 3 MR. DAVIS: You know where there's a
- 4 great big field there --
- 5 MS. GATELLI: Yes.
- 6 MR. DAVIS: -- that hasn't been taken
- 7 care of in four years by the school board?
- 8 MS. GATELLI: But, Mr. Davis, we are
- 9 not the Scranton School Board.
- 10 MR. DAVIS: You are the city. You are
- 11 the city representatives for us.
- 12 MS. GATELLI: Yes, but you've got to go
- 13 to the school board if you want to use that property.
- 14 MR. DAVIS: You don't do anything about
- 15 that. You don't go to the school board. I've asked
- 16 you four weeks ago, because I haven't been here for the

- 17 last three weeks.
- 18 I asked you four weeks ago to go to the
- 19 school board, send your ambassador or your so-called
- 20 you have a group meeting between the county and the
- 21 city and all the tax --
- 22 MS. GATELLI: Okay. We will ask Mrs.
- 23 Evans. She's our intergovernmental chairperson, and we
- 24 will ask her.
- 25 MR. DAVIS: I know. I've asked her

- 64
- 1 already.
- 2 MS. GATELLI: We'll ask her to call up
- 3 there and see about using that property for the kids.
- 4 MR. DAVIS: That was four weeks ago.
- 5 I've got a summer in front of me. We're in the middle
- 6 of a summer right now. The kids are out of school.
- 7 What have you done?
- 8 What have you done as a person of this
- 9 city, as a person in the City Council that's supposed
- 10 to be looking over the families?
- 11 MS. GATELLI: What have I done? I made
- 12 a motion to give \$10,000 to United Neighborhood Centers
- 13 so the kids could go to camp. That's what I did, and

14 that's what everyone up here did.

15 MR. DAVIS: The camp is over two

16 o'clock in the afternoon. Did you know that?

17 MS. GATELLI: Well, what do we want,

18 24-hour service?

19 MR. DAVIS: What do you have in your

20 community?

21 MS. GATELLI: Well, in my community my

22 kids go to the playground and I take them.

23 MR. DAVIS: And do you have any kids --

24 MS. GATELLI: I walk over to Connell

25 Park with my grandchildren.

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1 MR. DAVIS: Okay. All right. Now,

2 what we would like to do, what we would like in our

3 community, is to have a beautifully open area, which we

4 have, which has been supplied because you took our

5 homes to have it, not only our homes, but everybody in

6 the community.

7 You destroyed our community literally.

8 You took it and destroyed it and put everybody that you

9 could imagine back in there. Every foreign government,

10 every foreign representative, indigenous or otherwise

- 11 were allowed to come and live there, rather than to
- 12 have the local natives that were there. This is a
- 13 reality. This is a fact that I can prove to you every
- 14 single day of your life.
- 15 Now, we have come to a situation now
- 16 where all of these kids from all of these different
- 17 countries are here and they're playing together and
- 18 they played last night, we had tennis classes last
- 19 night, we had basketball games going on last night all
- 20 in the same place.
- 21 But I'm saying to you, you've done
- 22 nothing to insure that the ground would be safe for
- 23 those who wanted to play softball. You have destroyed
- 24 it. You've allowed the school board to destroy it, and
- 25 you've done nothing about it. I may be wrong, but I

- 1 brought it up to you enough times --
- 2 MS. GATELLI: Well, I don't know that
- 3 -- Attorney Minora, would you check if we can have any
- 4 control over the school authority?
- 5 MR. DAVIS: You have no control --
- 6 MR. MINORA: You have no control.
- 7 They're an autonomous body. They're autonomous from

9 MR. DAVIS: They're --

10 MS. GATELLI: Mr. Davis, let him speak,

11 please.

12 MR. MINORA: We have no control over

13 them. They have no control over us. They are an

14 autonomous municipal body, as are we.

15 MR. DAVIS: Are we taxpayers?

16 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Mr. Davis,

17 sit down. Your time is up. Anyone else care to speak

18 before Council? Mr. Morgan.

19 MS. SUETA: Jean Sueta, 1549 Gardner

20 Avenue. And I don't live in The Plot. I live in the

21 forgotten city, part of town rather.

22 Well, went to bed Tuesday night, there

23 was no water on our street. Woke up Wednesday morning

24 with no warning, no sirens, no nothing, ba-boom. I got

25 five foot of water in my cellar for the first time

67

1 since 1809. Why weren't we warned?

2 I called the dispatcher to ask why we

3 weren't warned. He said, Well, it was on the news. I

4 said, Well, why didn't the sirens go off? I almost got

- 5 gaveled then.
- 6 So, he put me to the police dispatcher.
- 7 So, I asked him the same question, why we weren't
- 8 warned. He said to me, I'm not the God dam person
- 9 you're supposed to talk to, and hung the phone up on
- 10 me. Is that nice? You can listen to the recording,
- 11 because they're recorded.
- 12 Now, Judy, I'm glad you took care of
- 13 The Plot. What about us peons? When they were done
- 14 over The Plot, why didn't they come over and help us
- 15 out? Nobody, not one bull dozer, nothing. You got --
- 16 well, you seen it.
- 17 MS. GATELLI: Yeah.
- 18 MS. SUETA: No. You were more
- 19 concerned about the puppies, you and Janet. I got
- 20 Shiatzu puppies 500 bucks. Beautiful, boy. You want
- 21 to buy one?
- 22 Why didn't they help us over there?
- 23 Thank God they built up by the M & I, or we would
- 24 really be devastated. But I had to bitch about that,
- 25 too. When are they going to help us peons? Anybody?

1 MS. GATELLI: No. I don't know, but

- 2 Mr. Hayes is going to call FEMA and the Army Corps of
- 3 engineers and we're going to have a meeting over there.
- 4 MS. SUETA: Could I come to the
- 5 meeting?
- 6 MS. GATELLI: Absolutely.
- 7 MS. SUETA: Yeah. Because they put
- 8 that son of a bitch -- oh, I'm sorry. Sorry.
- 9 MS. GATELLI: No cursing. No cursing.
- 10 MS. SUETA: All right. They put that
- 11 bridge in. If you remember the old bridge on Albright
- 12 Avenue, it went up and over and there was no divider.
- 13 Now this one, it's lower. They got a divider and it
- 14 holds everything back. That's part of our problem.
- 15 Get that thing out of there, you know? I never got it
- 16 before, not one drop. You seen what I had.
- 17 MS. EVANS: Yes.
- 18 MS. GATELLI: You told me.
- 19 MS. SUETA: You know. You seen the
- 20 puppies. You didn't see down the cellar.
- 21 And as far as Mr. Davis, where did he
- 22 go? Where was his kids? They could have made money
- 23 yesterday helping us clean out. We would have paid
- 24 them. They would have had money to go swimming.
- 25 When we were kids, we went picking

1 beans to get money, swam in a creek. There's money to

2 be made. Where are the kids? Now we had three come

3 down, they were going to loot. We had to get rid of

4 them, you know. And I --

5 MS. GATELLI: Now today I told you but

6 the brooms and the bleach.

7 MS. GATELLI: Yeah, I got that this

8 morning. Red Cross came this morning, gave us

9 breakfast.

10 MS. SUETA: Did you have a hot shower?

11 MS. GATELLI: Pardon?

12 MS. SUETA: Did you have a nice hot

13 shower today?

14 MS. GATELLI: Yeah, I did. And if you

15 want to take one, you can come up.

16 MS. SUETA: I had a nice cold one.

17 MS. GATELLI: Come on up. You can take

18 one.

19 MS. SUETA: No. I'm strong. When are

20 they going to help us? Not only me --

21 MS. GATELLI: I note the levee is going

22 to be built up there, but unfortunately it's phase

- 23 three, and they didn't finish phase two yet, so --
- 24 MS. SUETA: Yeah. I mean over by the
- 25 West Market Street bridge --

- 1 MS. GATELLI: It went over there, too.
- 2 MS. SUETA: Oh, big time.
- 3 MS. GATELLI: Cottones was up into the
- 4 first floor and CK and --
- 5 MS. SUETA: Yeah. They closed the
- 6 flood gates and it went over three parts of the -- they
- 7 took care of the other side. Us poor peons again --
- 8 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: From what I was
- 9 told, they said that the reason they could not build up
- 10 over by you is because the groundwork was not done.
- 11 So, if they kept putting dirt on, it would have just
- 12 washed away.
- 13 The only reason they could have pulled
- 14 that off on the other side was because the ground work
- 15 was done and it was panked enough. So, that's why they
- 16 didn't.
- 17 MS. SUETA: While they were over the
- 18 plot, they had that secured, why didn't the hell didn't
- 19 they come over and help us a little bit? All we needed

- 20 was a couple dirt up there.
- 21 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: They said it would
- 22 have washed away because the groundwork was not in
- 23 place.
- 24 MS. SUETA: They don't know that until
- 25 they try it. What they say and what they do is two

- 71
- 1 different things. We're the ones that are suffering.
- 2 MS. GATELLI: I'm sure they didn't
- 3 know, Jean.
- 4 MS. SUETA: We didn't know the flood
- 5 was coming. How come we weren't warned? How come we
- 6 weren't warned?
- 7 MS. GATELLI: Whoever knew had no clue
- 8 that it was going to happen by you.
- 9 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: Yeah, Jean,
- 10 there's no --
- 11 MS. GATELLI: Our hearts go out to you.
- 12 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: -- you could not
- 13 hear any of the sirens or anything where you are,
- 14 correct?
- 15 MS. SUETA: Yes, ma'am, we can hear the
- 16 sirens, and there was no sirens going off, not one

17 siren went off. So, don't tell me. We weren't even

18 warned.

19 MS. GATELLI: I believe it went off in

20 the morning.

21 MS. SUETA: No.

22 MS. EVANS: It went off in The Plot, I

23 believe, three different times.

24 MS. GATELLI: Albright Avenue, too, it

25 went off.

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72

1 MS. SUETA: That was Tuesday.

2 MS. EVANS: And --

3 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: It was Tuesday.

4 MS. SUETA: There was not nothing on

5 Wednesday. The problem --

6 MS. EVANS: I believe the problem with

7 the sirens, one of the issues at hand is, at least from

8 having spoken with some of the residents of The Plot,

9 for example, they do not know what each siren

10 indicates. That was never explained to them by the

11 Office of Public Safety, however, I agree with you,

12 this is twice I've seen your area, and twice --

13 MS. SUETA: The first time --

14 MS. EVANS: Actually this time I know

15 that your damages are far more severe than they were

16 during the Ivan flood.

17 MS. SUETA: Ivan, I didn't get a drop

18 of water. They started building this God dam thing,

19 nothing.

20 MS. EVANS: Well, we have to make sure

21 ---

22 MS. SUETA: Oh, I'm cursing.

23 MS. GATELLI: We are going to have to

24 put a little beeper on there for you. They always

25 thought the beeper was for me.

73

1 MS. SUETA: Well, I control it a little

2 bit.

3 MS. EVANS: We have to make sure that

4 this doesn't happen yet a third time. We should have

5 learned from the Ivan flood, and indeed we learned

6 quite a bit, because thank God The Plot was very well

7 addressed, however, I do understand --

8 MS. SUETA: I don't want to hear The

9 Plot.

10 MS. EVANS: -- you've been completely

- 11 neglected again.
- 12 MS. SUETA: And again.
- 13 MS. EVANS: I don't know all the
- 14 reasons behind this, so I'm really not going to comment
- 15 on that at this point, but I do want answers on it, but
- 16 more than answers for the neglect. I'm looking for
- 17 solutions that are going to work to protect lower Green
- 18 Ridge until such time that that flood project on
- 19 Albright is 100 percent complete, because it isn't fair
- 20 that nothing's been done for you.
- 21 MS. SUETA: Well, you know when it's
- 22 going to get fixed? Lackawanna Junior College is going
- 23 to move into the Laceworks. Low and behold, we will
- 24 have everything, everything.
- 25 MS. EVANS: Well, actually, you know,

- 1 Ms. Sueta, I was wondering that myself yesterday.
- 2 MS. SUETA: I mean, we will have paved
- 3 roads, we'll have the sweeper, we'll have everything.
- 4 MS. EVANS: I had to wonder why
- 5 Lackawanna would want to move into that location, since
- 6 the building was in mid lake yesterday. How would they
- 7 possibly survive or construct athletic facilities?

8 MS. SUETA: It's a very secure

9 building, very strong. They knew how to build them in

10 them days. Just get us a little protection, will you

11 please?

12 MS. EVANS: Yes.

13 MS. SUETA: Not only me, everybody on

14 Gardner Avenue and Marion. They didn't even put no

15 dirt up there yet.

16 MS. GATELLI: We'll announce when the

17 meeting is and make sure you know and the neighbors

18 know when there's a meeting with FEMA.

19 MS. SUETA: Do I have to watch my mouth

20 there, too? Do I have to watch my language there, too?

21 MS. GATELLI: Oh, I think so.

22 MS. SUETA: Oh, all right. Bill, find

23 out about that dispatcher that hung up on me. It's on

24 tape.

25 MS. GATELLI: Was that 911 you called?

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75

1 MS. SUETA: Yeah, police dispatcher.

2 MR. COURTRIGHT: Police dispatcher?

3 MS. SUETA: Police dispatcher. He put

4 me to the police dispatcher.

5 MR. COURTRIGHT: You've got to give me

6 the time and the date.

7 MS. SUETA: It was yesterday morning

8 between nine and 9:30.

9 MR. COURTRIGHT: 911, right?

10 MS. SUETA: 911.

11 MR. COURTRIGHT: All right. I'll call

12 over and ask.

13 MS. GATELLI: Thank you.

14 MS. SUETA: All right. Thank you.

15 MS. GATELLI: And call if you need

16 anything, Jeanie.

17 MS. SUETA: Yeah, I need a couple of --

18 never mind. You had to ask that question.

19 MR. MORGAN: Good afternoon, Council.

20 The first thing I have is Junior Council, the Scranton

21 Lackawanna Taxpayers Group, we'd like them to send a

22 representative to be seated on our board. We haven't

23 decided whether we're going to waive the \$15 or not,

24 but if there's a \$15 fee, I will pay that myself. I

25 think it's important the Junior Council has a

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76

1 representative on that board.

- 2 And Mr. McTiernan spoke about the
- 3 garbage fees briefly. The \$171 garbage fee was to help
- 4 cover the tipping fees, but the city collects more than
- 5 its tipping fees in the garbage fee, which is a
- 6 problem. And that money shouldn't be going into the
- 7 general revenue of the city.
- 8 The city, to be honest, you know,
- 9 Council, when you take your break, I think it's
- 10 important for you to take a good hard look at where
- 11 this city is fiscally.
- 12 We have to move away from the PEL. The
- 13 PEL has nothing to offer this city. We don't need the
- 14 state to pay a bunch of bureaucrats money to hold our
- 15 feet to a debt we can't pay. And in my opinion, that's
- 16 all the PEL is.
- 17 This city has to file bankruptcy. We
- 18 need to stop talking about how we're going to solve our
- 19 problems, because to be honest with you, we're not
- 20 going to solve them.
- 21 I think this Council and previous
- 22 Councils haven't faced the reality of the problem that
- 23 this city confronts. And I think that nothing shines a
- 24 light on it better than what's going on at the Scranton
- 25 Sewer Authority with Mr. Barrett and Mr. Scopelliti.

- 1 Do we really need to employ both of
- 2 those gentlemen? Wasn't American Anglican brought in
- 3 here because they couldn't run the authority? And now
- 4 we're going to make Mr. Barrett the head of it? And
- 5 we're going to higher Mr. Scopelliti to be his partner?
- 6 I mean, for how much, 150 Gs? Between
- 7 the two of them, do we really need that? And when you
- 8 take a look at what's going on at the Scranton School
- 9 District, did they vote Saturday to borrow money
- 10 because the law is going to change on Monday?
- 11 And when Council sits here and they say
- 12 that there's separation of powers, there is a
- 13 separation of powers and it's a very pathetic thing.
- 14 I think that to do the -- all the
- 15 voters and all the residents of this city and the state
- 16 a major favor, I think we should start removing the
- 17 lawyers from the legislature, because I think the
- 18 problem we have is that we're legislating the people
- 19 into utter poverty.
- 20 We're creating laws to insulate one
- 21 commission from another commission. You know, with all
- 22 these authorities we have and with all the debt they

- 23 have, they should have been abolished a long time ago.
- 24 Since all the debt is going to come
- 25 back to the City of Scranton anyhow, why doesn't the

- 1 city do that, abolish all the authorities, figure out
- 2 all the money we owe and let's start over. And when we
- 3 do that, let's take the city right down in through
- 4 bankruptcy. Let's not wait two years.
- 5 You know, when Mr. Elman was here
- 6 speaking, the guy looks like Ozzy Osborne sort of, you
- 7 know, Council is, basically from what I heard, said,
- 8 Well, in two more years some seats will be vacant.
- 9 We don't need to wait two more years.
- 10 We've been waiting four years, two years, four years,
- 11 two years, and there's been no solutions to any of the
- 12 problems this city faces.
- 13 So, what I think is, when this Council
- 14 goes on its recess, all five members of this Council
- 15 have you seat themselves somewhere and begin to start
- 16 discussing breaking away from the PEL, filing
- 17 bankruptcy, okay?
- 18 There has been discussions here about
- 19 KOZs. Mark Walsh was the President of Council at the

- 20 time they were passed through. I stood right there and
- 21 told him it was going to bankrupt the city.
- 22 Well, you know, it wasn't a very
- 23 important thing at that time. And to be honest with
- 24 you, it's not very important now, because you look at
- 25 the city, the city is just a mess. It can't carry all

- 1 this debt.
- 2 You know, and we seat five councilmen
- 3 here, we seat a school board, and all we see is more
- 4 and more borrowing, more and more passing the buck. We
- 5 don't have any say over this. That has nothing to do
- 6 with us. That's separate.
- 7 It's not separate. It's all one city,
- 8 one group of debt that needs one solution. And that
- 9 that solution is abolish all the authorities, take all
- 10 the debt the authorities owe and bring it to the city.
- 11 Let's start over. Let's file bankruptcy.
- 12 As far as the Sewer Authority, I think
- 13 that the Scranton City Council should go down to the
- 14 mayor and together you should decide that Mr. Barrett
- 15 really doesn't need that job, and Mr. Scopelliti, he
- 16 doesn't need it either.

- 17 Because if we're going to spend \$100
- 18 million to bring the Sewer Authority, all right, we
- 19 need to spend that money wisely.
- 20 And, you know, Mrs. Gallagher comes
- 21 here, well, she did, she's an elderly lady and I think
- 22 she was a school teacher, you know, she came here at
- 23 Council one time and talked about how her father and
- 24 her uncle helped to create that authority.
- 25 You know what, that's when Scrantonians

- 1 were really involved in their government, and you've
- 2 got to really, really thank the people who built this
- 3 city. But you know, we've got to look to this Council
- 4 to make some smart choices.
- 5 And you know, for that month that
- 6 you're not going to sit, I think you need to find some
- 7 of these solutions, and the 2.4 wage tax should be
- 8 repealed.
- 9 Those are the answers to the rebirth of
- 10 this city. Overtaxation has destroyed it. And we've
- 11 got to peal everything back, and that comes to you. We
- 12 shouldn't have to wait two years. Thank you.
- 13 MS. GATELLI: Thank you.

- 14 MS. SUETA: I forgot one thing. I have
- 15 to thank our firefighters for the job that they did.
- 16 They're fabulous. That mayor should have no qualms
- 17 against these guys. They're good, they're polite, and
- 18 very good, very good response, once Mr. Hayes told them
- 19 they could come up.
- 20 MS. GATELLI: Yes.
- 21 MS. SUETA: Because he didn't allow
- 22 them to come out on Tuesday, but Wednesday they were
- 23 Johnny On the Spot and they worked all day, and they're
- 24 very good. Give them what they want. They're worth
- 25 their weight in gold. Thank you.

- 1 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Anyone else?
- 2 MS. HUBBARD: Hi. My name is Elizabeth
- 3 Hubbard. I live at 1507 Gardner Avenue in the city.
- 4 On Tuesday my basement was flooded for the second time,
- 5 first time being in 2004 with Ivan.
- 6 When the contractor left, the bank
- 7 opened to the street for the water to rush up. Well,
- 8 apparently they have done a little bit to alleviate
- 9 that part, not enough, because Tuesday my basement was
- 10 filled again to the rafters.

- 11 The water went down Tuesday night. My
- 12 son pumped the basement. He had it almost pumped out.
- 13 Wednesday morning at ten to seven, he was yelling for
- 14 me to get out of bed because the cellar was full again
- 15 and now it was going to go on the first floor. By the
- 16 time I got downstairs, the water was in my first floor.
- 17 Now, my family's lived in that house
- 18 for almost 100 years, and I've never had water. The
- 19 city, if these contractors, they should never have put
- 20 that flood gate in and screwed around with the bank
- 21 that was there, because they didn't put it back to what
- 22 it should be. We never had a problem before they
- 23 started to put that flood gate in.
- 24 We don't need a flood gate, when we
- 25 don't have a levee. We have no levee there, except

- 1 what was there for the last, whatever, 100 years. But
- 2 the city has got to do something.
- 3 I turned the TV on Tuesday night and
- 4 all I heard about was DPW and the Sewer Authority over
- 5 there helping out in The Plot.
- 6 Well, I feel sorry for the people in
- 7 The Plot, but I feel sorrier for myself, because it

- 8 never happened before.
- 9 Why didn't the city come over and try
- 10 to build that bank up where they know there was a
- 11 problem in '04?
- 12 Now, I haven't been down there. My son
- 13 and daughter-in-law, they've been kayaking all over the
- 14 place Tuesday and Wednesday, and he said there's more
- 15 than one breach in the levee.
- 16 Now, I'm hoping that the city will come
- 17 over and repair that so every time it rains, I don't
- 18 have to worry about flooding.
- 19 I had to buy two water heaters, a
- 20 furnace, two electric panels in '04. Now I have to do
- 21 it all over again, plus send oriental rugs out to be
- 22 cleaned, duct work cleaned. I'm tired of it.
- 23 And, I mean, they're going to work like
- 24 dogs to make sure The Plot is safe? Let them do a
- 25 little something on our side of the river. I'd

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- 83
- 1 appreciate any help you guys could give me.
- 2 I wanted to thank Janet for coming down
- 3 there yesterday, and, you, too, Judy. I missed you. I
- 4 didn't see you last evening. So, anything you guys can

- 5 do to help would be great.
- 6 Another thing, these pictures don't
- 7 belong in here. Why are they here? This is City
- 8 Council chambers. They should be down in the front
- 9 hall where they always were. I mean, the mayor doesn't
- 10 show up at meetings, but at least you have all these
- 11 mayors here.
- 12 MS. EVANS: Mrs. Hubbard, I think most
- 13 of us would agree with that, however, it was, I think
- 14 -- the portraits were removed when City Hall's first
- 15 floor was being remodeled, and from that point forward,
- 16 they were left in a room and no longer displayed.
- 17 And the former Council had requested
- 18 that they be once again hung downstairs for all the
- 19 public to enjoy and to learn from, but the
- 20 administration was adverse to that idea, and as a
- 21 result, City Council took it upon itself to display the
- 22 photos in our chambers with the thought that this
- 23 certainly was preferable to all of these precious
- 24 pieces of history being hidden in a closet.
- 25 MS. HUBBARD: Exactly. Oh, another

1 thing about the flood, I think that the public safety,

- 2 who's ever in change of the police, they need to buy a
- 3 couple of boats, because Wednesday when the Special
- 4 Operations Unit came down our way, they had to borrow
- 5 canoes from a couple of our neighbors, because we were,
- 6 of course, under water, to see if anybody needed
- 7 rescuing.
- 8 They came over to my porch, three of
- 9 them in a canoe. And he said, Well, do you want to go
- 10 out? I said, No, but if I did, where would I sit?
- 11 But, I mean, it wouldn't hurt you guys
- 12 to buy a couple of 16-foot row boat that they --
- 13 because he said they don't have boats. They borrow the
- 14 canoes from the neighbors.
- 15 And I have to thank the firemen, too.
- 16 Because as soon as they could get there, they were
- 17 there, except one of them said -- somebody said that
- 18 they weren't allowed to come on Tuesday, that they
- 19 couldn't come on Tuesday night to pump.
- 20 MS. EVANS: We're going to look into
- 21 all of that.
- 22 MS. HUBBARD: Okay. Thank you very
- 23 much.
- 24 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Anyone else?
- 25 Douglas.

- 1 MR. MILLER: Good afternoon, Council
- 2 just a few announcements and reminders. On Friday July
- 3 28 from six to nine at the South Scranton Renaissance
- 4 Center there will be a comedy show, fundraising event
- 5 that will go towards the proposed skate park. Tickets
- 6 are on sale now, and you can purchase them from any
- 7 Council member.
- 8 Also, September 9 on a Saturday from
- 9 five to nine at The Icebox in Scranton there will be a
- 10 fundraising event for the proposed skate park.
- 11 I would also like to remind everyone
- 12 that on Saturday, July 8, the Scranton Junior City
- 13 Council will be having their park cleanup at the
- 14 Dorothy Street playground. We hope to see everyone
- 15 there and get involved with that.
- 16 Lastly, I would like to take this time
- 17 to commend DPW and the residents of this city for their
- 18 hard work during the flooding that we experienced over
- 19 this week. It just shows you that when Scrantonians
- 20 come together, we can accomplish so many things and we
- 21 get the job done. Thank you.
- 22 MS. GATELLI: Thank you, Douglas.

- 23 Anyone else? Mrs. Garvey.
- 24 MS. GARVEY: 5-A, motions.
- 25 MS. GATELLI: Mrs. Evans.

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- 1 MS. EVANS: All of our attention and
- 2 concern this week has been focused on flooding
- 3 problems. And as I walked the streets of lower Green
- 4 Ridge, I saw firsthand the damage to basements and
- 5 first floors of homes to landscaping furniture,
- 6 appliances, but most importantly I also felt the
- 7 emotional damage to hardworking people who suffered
- 8 more in the flood this time than they had during the
- 9 Ivan flood.
- 10 The Sachetti family, for example, was
- 11 frantic to rebuild a handicap ramp and clear damage to
- 12 their handicapped accessible home so that Mr.
- 13 Sachetti's needs would continue to be met without
- 14 incurring loss to their insurance claims.
- 15 And Mr. Hubbard described taking
- 16 neighbors from homes in kayaks and inflatable boats.
- 17 The anguish of losing hot water and electricity in the
- 18 midst of such turmoil was relentless.
- 19 In the midst of such heartbreak, I

- 20 offer a piece of good news. I spoke with Mr. Barrett,
- 21 executive director of the Sewer Authority yesterday
- 22 about sewer bill relief once again for citizens of
- 23 Scranton affected by flooding.
- 24 Following the Ivan flood, I had asked
- 25 Mr. Barrett to provide such relief to our citizens, and

- 1 it was generously given.
- 2 Once again, the Sewer Authority will
- 3 help our people with an adjustment to their bills to
- 4 assist them with their cleanup costs. I thank Mr.
- 5 Barrett, not only for this financial assistance, but
- 6 also for the monumental work performed in The Plot
- 7 Section that prevented the reoccurrence of flooding
- 8 seen during the Ivan flood.
- 9 I wish to send a letter to the Sewer
- 10 Authority officially requesting financial adjustments
- 11 to sewer bills.
- 12 And I realize that we had a discussion
- 13 in caucus today concerning motions, but considering
- 14 that I would expect that begins next week and the Sewer
- 15 Authority would like this A.S.A.P., I move that
- 16 Scranton City Council send a letter to the executive

- 17 director and to the board of the Scranton Sewer
- 18 Authority requesting special consideration for flood
- 19 victims. Such consideration will include rate
- 20 adjustments for costs incurred by cleanup.
- 21 MS. GATELLI: Second. On the question?
- 22 All in favor.
- 23 MS. EVANS: Aye.
- 24 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: Aye.
- 25 MR. MCTIERNAN: Aye.

- 88
- 1 MR. COURTRIGHT: Aye.
- 2 MS. GATELLI: Aye. Opposed? The ayes
- 3 have it and so moved. That was unanimous, Kay. We
- 4 have to tell her. Unanimous vote, and it is to go to
- 5 Gene Barrett. Thank you, Mrs. Evans.
- 6 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Pardon? We
- 7 actually had a discussion concerning the other
- 8 utilities, water and gas, for example, and Mr. Barrett
- 9 did indicate that it's not nearly as simple where those
- 10 utilities are concerned, because as Mrs. Gatelli
- 11 stated, you would have to receive the approval of PUC
- 12 to make such adjustments, since it would be affecting,
- 13 you know, quite a number of ratepayers, and that could

- 14 be a very long drawn out process. So, I'm looking for
- 15 immediate help for you. That will be all of Scranton,
- 16 the flood victims affected throughout the City of
- 17 Scranton. It's not for every Scranton resident.
- 18 MS. GATELLI: Excuse me. You can't ask
- 19 questions, please.
- 20 MS. EVANS: I also wish to recognize
- 21 the extraordinary work performed by the DPW, the fire
- 22 department, police department citywide over the last
- 23 few days, and I also wish to thank Mr. Fiorini for
- 24 extending a 24-hour electrical shutoff deadline to
- 25 lower Green Ridge and for his tireless work yesterday.

- 1 I am very pleased that legislation for
- 2 free swimming is included in today's agenda, but I also
- 3 request that a special meeting of Scranton City Council
- 4 be conducted as soon as possible to pass this
- 5 legislation from sixth to seventh order.
- 6 And I believe, you know, the point
- 7 being that the children of our city should be able to
- 8 enjoy free swimming throughout months of July and
- 9 August, and this has been an issue since June 5.
- 10 I'd also like to address a few issues

- 11 raised earlier by some speakers. With regard to the
- 12 Moosic Street project and the loans that were
- 13 discussed, I had requested information concerning the
- 14 demolition of those buildings.
- 15 I understand that OECD did not incur
- 16 the costs for that demolition. The city, rather did,
- 17 and I have requested to know if that money is being
- 18 taken from the city's operating budget, if so, which
- 19 department, and even more specifically, which line item
- 20 within that department.
- 21 I understand that Mr. Fiorini will
- 22 provide those responses to me for next week's meeting.
- 23 I'm sure I would have had them today, however, due to
- 24 the crisis situation within the city, it's certainly
- 25 understandable that he could not prepare that for this

- 1 particular meeting.
- 2 With regard to the house addresses
- 3 throughout the city, it's my understanding haven spoken
- 4 with some city inspectors that letters citing
- 5 homeowners for lack of address numbers are no longer
- 6 being sent, and those individuals who had received the
- 7 letters were not cited.

- 8 And the inspectors have been directed
- 9 to address the situation as they are traveling on their
- 10 job-related duties daily by notifying the homeowners
- 11 that they lack the address numbers and providing them
- 12 with an ample timeline in which to get the numbers up
- 13 on their homes.
- 14 Also, the OECD loan to Paperless
- 15 Practice leaves me very concerned. Was a credit
- 16 history checked for delinquencies and liens by OECD, or
- 17 did the company withhold this vital information from
- 18 OECD, or was OECD aware and awarded the loan
- 19 regardless?
- 20 Anyone of the three options is really
- 21 unacceptable. So, it's my hope that OECD will screen
- 22 the credit history of each loan applicant with a fine
- 23 tooth comb, and in the future decline loans to any
- 24 individual or company with tax delinquencies, whether
- 25 local, state or federal. Loans should not be used to

- 1 pay tax liens.
- 2 I noticed that, in fact, the very day
- 3 that The Scranton Times published their article under
- 4 the heading Wink Owes \$36,000 In Back Taxes, when I

5 perused The Court notes, which indeed I must do

6 regularly now because, as Mr. Sbaraglia pointed out, if

7 we are not to do so, obviously we are not going to be

8 aware that any of these companies to whom the city is

9 lending money even have delinquencies.

10 It just so happened that very day there

11 was yet another listing for Paperless Practice, and

12 this is for \$6,621.69, and it is an Internal Revenue

13 Service lien. And I would suppose that's in addition

14 to the \$36,000 lien already filed by the IRS.

15 And, of course, the owner does not

16 respond to the question if these funds, if the city

17 loans provided will be used to pay these liens. I

18 think that response gives us our answer.

19 Also, Mrs. Gatelli, were you able to

20 speak to the mayor about putting the cameras out to bid

21 rather than RFPs?

22 MS. GATELLI: Yes, and he said he would

23 do that.

24 MS. EVANS: Thank you. I also have a

25 letter I was asked to read. In fact, I received it

1 June 8, but it was far too late at that point to read

- 2 the letter, and of course we were not in session last
- 3 week, so I do apologize for the tardiness.
- 4 Dear Mrs. Evans, Thank you from the
- 5 people of Pine Brook for your help with our recent tree
- 6 trimming project.
- 7 You quietly came into our neighborhood,
- 8 advised us and provided direction to people and
- 9 services who made a long-awaited project a reality.
- 10 Through your efforts, the experience of
- 11 a fine gentleman, Mr. Tony Santolli, and a very
- 12 cooperative Mr. Al Senofonti of Titan Tree Company, we
- 13 had great success, despite our very limited funds.
- 14 Thank you also to the Scranton Police
- 15 Department, Lieutenant Namiotka, Officers Gaeta and
- 16 O'Brien and Lieutenant Marty Crofton for posting and
- 17 clearing our streets of vehicles on specified days.
- 18 We're shy \$1,500 for one remaining
- 19 block of trees. We in Pine Brook are resourceful and
- 20 hope to complete this project by the end of 2006.
- 21 You set in motion a project that makes
- 22 our neighborhood streets brighter and safer. This
- 23 project is an example of citizens, police, business and
- 24 government working together in our community.
- 25 Sincerely, the Pine Brook Neighborhood Association.

1 And I do hope that they're able to

- 2 complete that wonderful project that was really
- 3 spearheaded by Mary Chilipko by the end of 2006.
- 4 And then finally a few citizens
- 5 requests. And ask you to bear with me. We haven't had
- 6 a meeting now in two weeks, and things have really
- 7 mounted up.
- 8 The 1200 of Blucher Avenue, a property
- 9 experiences flooding during every hard rainfall. This
- 10 is as a result of a deteriorated pipe which has been
- 11 cleaned in the past.
- 12 The problem is not a cleaning, rather
- 13 it is a replacement of the pipe. So, I respectfully
- 14 request a written response in this matter and a
- 15 solution beyond pipe cleaning.
- 16 I'm well aware of the numerous flooding
- 17 problems within East Mountain and the number of
- 18 problems fails to excuse the lack of solutions.
- 19 Residents in the area of Clover Field
- 20 would like to see year round use of the field and they
- 21 request the installation of swings and slides for
- 22 younger children who can't travel a distance to Sloan's

- 23 playground.
- 24 Many people in lower West Side voiced
- 25 to me that they are the forgotten area in terms of

- 1 children's activities.
- 2 South Webster and Palm Street, an
- 3 overgrown abandoned lot. Sherwood Court, DPW was
- 4 dumping trees and brush recently in Sherwood Court and
- 5 stated they would return to remove the debris and were
- 6 very happy that they're cleaning abandoned lots,
- 7 however, no one returned to do so last week.
- 8 And the dumping particularly occurred
- 9 after a neighbor had privately paid workers to clear
- 10 this lot on Sherwood Court. So, naturally she's quite
- 11 upset, and I'm sure the DPW, as soon as they're able,
- 12 will get back there and clear the debris.
- 13 An abandoned house on the corner of
- 14 Wheeler and Sherwood Court. A large dead tree lies in
- 15 the yard. I would like the status on that house. A
- 16 streetlight is needed on Henry Street in North
- 17 Scranton.
- 18 In October 2005, a petition was
- 19 submitted to Council for installation of a light, and a

- 20 representative of MEM approved that installation.
- 21 When will the light be installed? I
- 22 know it's a costly addition, but the residents do pay
- 23 taxes and they do deserve the services.
- 24 The 1700 block of Beaumont Avenue. A
- 25 water main had burst two months ago, and following the

- 1 repair of such, the street was patched, however, it is
- 2 not level with the remainder of the street causing
- 3 ponding in front of a particular driveway and garage,
- 4 which is not only a health hazard in the summer, but is
- 5 going to create hazardous safety conditions in winter
- 6 months.
- 7 The 528 of North Everett, a handicapped
- 8 woman would like to know if another streetlight can be
- 9 installed. And I request an update on the purchase of
- 10 an industrial pump to alleviate flooding on Parker
- 11 Street. Can we purchase this pump with money received
- 12 from a sale of the pothole machine?
- 13 I remember two weeks ago Mr. Courtright
- 14 suggested that because we do not use the pothole
- 15 machine and it has been idle for so long that perhaps
- 16 it could be sold. And I agree with him.

- 17 And I think those monies could be put
- 18 to use toward industrial-sized pumps that could help
- 19 these areas and help the fire department to alleviate
- 20 the flooding that's being experienced citywide. And
- 21 that's it. Thank you.
- 22 MS. GATELLI: Thank you. Mrs. Fanucci.
- 23 MS. NEALON FANUCCI: I want to first
- 24 start by thanking everyone for all of their help. We
- 25 were very unfortunate to have such a tragedy this

- 96
- 1 weekend or this week.
- 2 I can't get over the amount of people
- 3 who have come out to help the residents all over the
- 4 city. I know we had also problems in South Side and
- 5 all over the city with basements and flooding.
- 6 It's just unbelievable. It really
- 7 bring you to realize what we are capable of as not only
- 8 people, but citizens.
- 9 The Army Corps of Engineers has done an
- 10 unbelievable job down in the Plot Section. We were
- 11 very, very lucky to be able to even have the amount of
- 12 people and the forces, let alone just to bring that
- 13 kind of dirt and then do what they were doing. It was

- 14 amazing. It was amazing to watch. They were staying
- 15 literally two inches ahead of the water at all times.
- 16 We were standing on that levee, and I
- 17 seriously could not believe the amount of work and
- 18 effort that it took to just be able to pull something
- 19 like that off.
- 20 We all know that this is just a work in
- 21 progress and it will never probably be as efficient as
- 22 we would like it to be, but I do want to say thank you
- 23 to all the people who helped out and came to the rescue
- 24 of the citizens down there. And that's exactly what it
- 25 was.
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- 1 The DPW, PPL. I mean, we went through
- 2 these before, but it was something that is excessively
- 3 humbling when you get down and you see exactly what
- 4 these people do for a living, and probably are never
- 5 appreciated enough.
- 6 We need to thank he firemen who pumped
- 7 out 50 basements as of yesterday afternoon. Right
- 8 there alone just to help the citizens be able to
- 9 function and feel, you know, capable of functioning in
- 10 their houses.

- 11 But what they asked me to do was to
- 12 tell you the numbers that you need to call. There's
- 13 still a contact number for anyone who is having any
- 14 flooding, and it is 342-7821, and that's where any
- 15 resident needs to call if they're having any problems
- 16 with water.
- 17 Also, you're going to need after that
- 18 to be inspected. What happens is the electrical
- 19 problems that this can cause is not something we can
- 20 just say, Okay. Start your house up and get going.
- 21 You really need to make sure that your
- 22 house is inspected afterwards by the city so that we
- 23 can say it's safe and you can go on and live your life.
- 24 I have contacted -- well, the Red Cross
- 25 is here, as we know, but they have a wonderful manual,

- 1 it's online. For people who cannot get online, I'm
- 2 going to leave a copy of this with Kay.
- 3 This might be helpful to people who
- 4 have not been flooded before. It's Repairing Your
- 5 Flooded Home, and it tells you the steps to take to
- 6 actually go in and say and evaluate everything, find
- 7 out if you're going about it the right way, take your

- 8 photos, document, and tell you how to go about saving
- 9 your home and getting it back to the way it was.
- 10 So, this is going to be in the office.
- 11 And if not, it's also www.redcross.org will give you
- 12 all the information you need to get you on the way
- 13 hopefully to some type of recovery.
- 14 I know that we have not made all of the
- 15 contacts we need to make for the recovery yet, because
- 16 we need the water to go down before we can have people
- 17 come in and assess, like, assess exactly what our
- 18 damage is, but I know that they're on the way to doing
- 19 that.
- 20 What else did I want to say? Okay.
- 21 The dike. The dike, that was a problem on the one end
- 22 of the avenue where -- we had speakers come today
- 23 saying that they could not -- they did not have water
- 24 before and now they had it.
- 25 Well, this process unfortunately is

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- 1 just in the midst of this project. I don't believe our
- 2 project is going to be completed until 2008. Hopefully
- 3 by then with the citizens' input, we will have some
- 4 type of ease for them.

- 5 FEMA has not been contacted yet. I do
- 6 know that. And they said they would be doing so in the
- 7 next few days.
- 8 Also, on a lighter note, I want to
- 9 discuss the fact that the Art in the Park program has
- 10 come to fruition.
- 11 July 10th is going to be the first Art
- 12 in the Park program. It's going to go from 10th to the
- 13 14th, and that's going to be at Nay Aug.
- 14 The second part of this program will
- 15 take place in Connell Park, and that will be from
- 16 July 17 to the 21st.
- 17 And from July 21 to the 28, it will be
- 18 at Weston Field. These projects are going to be from 9
- 19 a.m. until twelve. The project heading is called
- 20 Metamorphosis.
- 21 And what the children will do are come,
- 22 decorate these huge butterflies. Almost like --
- 23 remember the mules and the horses and all that, it's
- 24 going to be like that, but these are going to be for
- 25 the kids to actually have some type of voice in our

1 city.

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- 2 They're going to hang the butterflies
- 3 up in the different areas of the park, and they can
- 4 express themselves in that. They're also going to
- 5 teach them art through this way of expressing
- 6 themselves.
- 7 They're going to have a nice, which
- 8 will be fun, they're going to teach them writing,
- 9 poetry. All different events and venues are going to
- 10 be scheduled.
- 11 And I believe somebody was talking
- 12 about music, but I'm not sure that's going to come into
- 13 fruition either.
- 14 We need a contact number for this.
- 15 This is going to go. Danielle Joyce is the director of
- 16 this program, and it is called Art in the Park. And
- 17 they have gathered together with the Heart to Art
- 18 program so that we have a contact number for sign-up
- 19 for this will be 961-2743.
- 20 This program is for children between
- 21 seven and twelve years old. Now, your parents can come
- 22 with you, if you'd like, which would be fun, too. It
- 23 is family friendly. And they ask that you only bring a
- 24 smile and your imagination.
- 25 This is a free, free project, and the

1 citizens and all ages are welcome to come and even

- 2 participate and watch.
- 3 This is something that we worked on.
- 4 This is pretty much the trial for the first year.
- 5 Hopefully will go very well and we can continue to do
- 6 projects like this.
- 7 The reason we did not do your normal
- 8 arts and crafts projects was because we feel that all
- 9 over the city they're sort of available. This is
- 10 something that's different and maybe can coincide with
- 11 those type of projects.
- 12 So, I'm going to see if maybe 61 could
- 13 put this on their screen. So, that's something I'm
- 14 very proud of.
- 15 Also, I was asked to talk to you about
- 16 Shiloh Baptist Church. They're having a block party on
- 17 August 19. What they are doing, their goal is to fill
- 18 300 backpacks, and they're distributing these to the
- 19 children so that they're ready for back to school.
- 20 They don't have to go get their pencils and their pens
- 21 and their notebooks. They want these filled.
- 22 All of this is going to take place at

23 this block party. They would like donations, if

24 possible. And you will be contacting Carol Mason,

25 963-2542.

1 Carol is unbelievable. She really will

2 make this work in a wonderful way. And you can go down

3 and have a good time, too. There's going to be food

- 3 Prison, I would like to thank you and your staff for
- 4 taking time to tour our facility.
- 5 It was an honor and a pleasure to meet
- 6 those who put their lives on the line every day to save
- 7 others and their property in the City of Scranton.
- 8 This administration recognizes the fact
- 9 that it was imperative that we open up the lines of
- 10 communication between our departments and open up our
- 11 doors to you and your staff.
- 12 We're in the process of revising our
- 13 emergency management plans in conjunction with
- 14 emergency management department.
- 15 The drafting of these plans could not
- 16 be complete without the fire department having an
- 17 internal knowledge of the prison's design.
- 18 Again, we thank you for your time in
- 19 walking through our facility and your assistance to us.
- 20 We sincerely hope that we do not have to call you in
- 21 the future. But if we do, we know, as so many people
- 22 do, that you will be there. And that's from the warden
- 23 of Lackawanna County Prison. So, we would like to
- 24 thank the fire department for their cooperation.
- 25 I got a letter from an individual, and

- 1 I've got to be honest, I believe they watch the
- 2 meetings, but I can't really read your writing, a lot
- 3 of it anyway, but it's front and back of two pages.
- 4 So, there's a lot of stuff in here.
- 5 It makes references to just about all
- 6 of us here on Council and it makes reference to some

- 15 confidential. I get calls all the time and letters and
- 16 they ask me to keep it confidential. But it didn't
- 17 even go to my right address. I don't know how they got
- 18 it to me.
- 19 But anyway, I'm sure you're watching.
- 20 If you can give me a call and ask me what it is you'd
- 21 like me to do with this letter, I will certainly do
- 22 that, but in the meantime, I will turn it over to Mr.

- 23 Minora because there's some legal questions in there.
- 24 I too, just because everybody has
- 25 thanked everyone that's worked down in the flood area,

- 1 and we're all grateful, and the residents really asked
- 2 if I would most definitely the DPW and the Sewer
- 3 Authority, they really on Race Street and Brown Avenue,
- 4 and all the other departments, but also the neighbors
- 5 and the people that did come down to help.
- 6 Some people had to move their
- 7 furniture, some people had to take it actually out of
- 8 their house, so we thank everyone that came down there
- 9 and helped.
- 10 Kay, one letter possibly if you can
- 11 send to Mr. Parker. 33 Forest Glen Drive, there's a
- 12 depression that runs the whole width of the road.
- 13 Actually there's two depressions there, and I was
- 14 hoping they could take a look at that, being that the
- 15 weather is good now and possibly we can get something
- 16 down with it. It runs the entire width of the road,
- 17 and that's 33 Forrest Glen Drive.
- 18 I believe Mr. Jackowitz or somebody
- 19 asked about the police cars, whose fault it was. I

- 20 don't exactly know whose fault it was. I know whose
- 21 fault it wasn't. It was not the purchasing
- 22 department's fault and it was not Mrs. Novembrino's
- 23 department that the purchase order did not get out
- 24 there in time, so we don't want anybody pointing the
- 25 finger at those individuals. It was not their problem.

- 1 The company that we're buying the
- 2 police cars from asked me to call back at the end of
- 3 this month, so I will do so tomorrow and find out just
- 4 when the police cars are going to get here. And I
- 5 believe that's all I have, Mrs. Gatelli. Thank you.
- 6 MS. GATELLI: Thank you.
- 7 MR. COURTRIGHT: Oh, one more. I'm
- 8 sorry. I'm sorry.
- 9 MS. GATELLI: Go ahead.
- 10 MR. COURTRIGHT: Kay, I got this
- 11 message and we didn't have a meeting last week, so I
- 12 couldn't bring it up. 700 of West Elm Street, it's a
- 13 lot that the city has been to before, but now it needs
- 14 to be cut again that the city's been to before, but now
- 15 it needs to be cut again. If somebody could go out
- 16 there from the DPW and take care of that lot, we'd

- 17 appreciate that.
- 18 When the picnics go around, we come
- 19 across a lot of people and they ask questions, and,

- 22 A long time ago, back in April of 2004
- 23 and June of 2004, April again in 2004, I have three
- 24 letters here, and it's from City Council, actually from
- 25 when Jay Saunders was still here, asking Mr. Scopelliti

- 2 plaque that the family members have been asking about
- 3 at the South Side Sports Complex, and, again, this goes
- 4 all the way back to 2004.
- 5 And I know Mr. Brazil probably has no
- 6 knowledge about this at all, but I'm going to give you
- 7 these letters, Kay, and maybe we can forward them to
- 8 him, because when the family members asked me this two
- 9 weeks ago, and then maybe when he gets an opportunity,
- 10 I understand he's extremely busy now with the flooding
- 11 situation, maybe he can look into this, because, again,
- 12 I got April 20, June 29, April 15, all of 2004.
- 13 So, I will turn those over to you and

- 14 if you can give those to Mr. Brazil, I'd appreciate it.
- 15 And now that's all I have.
- 16 MS. EVANS: Mr. Courtright, is that
- 17 about the Schmidt plaque from the South Side Complex?
- 18 MR. COURTRIGHT: Yes. They still
- 19 haven't gotten any kind of answer there, and so I was
- 20 confronted at a North Scranton picnic.
- 21 MS. EVANS: Someone, though, it might
- 22 have been a DPW worker or perhaps a member of that
- 23 family who told me they were told the plaque is --
- 24 well, maybe at the time we have a new DPW, but it was
- 25 down at the DPW.

- 1 MR. COURTRIGHT: I guess someone was
- 2 supposed to be doing this, and this was back June 29 of
- 3 2004.
- 4 MS. EVANS: Yeah. It goes back to when
- 5 we first sat on Council.
- 6 MR. COURTRIGHT: And it would have been
- 7 done in two weeks they said, so nothing has happened.
- 8 MS. EVANS: Right.
- 9 MR. COURTRIGHT: And, again, Mr.
- 10 Brazil's new, so I'm not trying to drop this on his

- 11 lap, but if he gets an opportunity, if he can take a
- 12 look at it. Now that's it. Thank you.
- 13 MS. GATELLI: Okay. I'm just going to
- 14 reiterate what everyone else said to thank everyone
- 15 that's helping down at the flood.
- 16 If you haven't been down there, I know
- 17 they don't need visitors, but it's just heartbreaking
- 18 to see what all these people had to go through.
- 19 And I'm happy The Plot didn't have to
- 20 be subjected to that, but some parts, did the East
- 21 Market Street and the Gardner Street, and even on
- 22 Gordon Avenue, six or seven houses there are were
- 23 flooded.
- 24 So, we hope they'll all work out well
- 25 in the end. And we are going to have a meeting. I've

- 1 been asking Mr. Hayes to contact FEMA and the Army
- 2 Corps to set up a meeting for all those neighbors so
- 3 they can see what's going to happen.
- 4 As far as the non-profits, the meeting
- 5 will be next week at 11:15. And also at that meeting I
- 6 would encourage Council to be there, because I think we
- 7 need to discuss some revenue producing items that we

- 8 may bring up for the budget for next year.
- 9 I know there are some things like a
- 10 dollar on a ticket at a concert up on Montage and hotel
- 11 taxes. I mean, there's a lot of things we can look at.
- 12 So, I think we need to start doing that. Someone
- 13 mentioned that, and I think they're correct.
- 14 We need to do that, and I'm interested
- 15 in that. And I would hope that Council -- some of the
- 16 Council members could make it. And anyone else is
- 17 welcome to come. If you have any ideas about ways that
- 18 we can raise revenue, I think would be an excellent
- 19 idea.
- 20 I listen to all of these people saying
- 21 get rid of this and get rid of that and get rid of the
- 22 garbage fee, and, you know, frankly, I'd like to do all
- 23 that, and we all would. You know, who wouldn't want to
- 24 have low taxes? You'd have to be crazy not to.
- 25 But if we get rid of one thing, then

- 1 we're not going to have something to pay something
- 2 else.
- 3 So, I think the focus should be on
- 4 revenue producing items, and, of course, not

5 squandering in other ways with exorbitant salaries, et

6 cetera. But I don't think that's going to get us out

7 of the \$200 million. I think we need to do some

8 revenue producing things, and I'm willing to do that.

9 So, we'll try to do that next weak at 11:15 for anyone

10 that's interested in coming. And we will also do the

11 non-profits right after that meeting.

12 Single Tax Office, I'm going to talk to

13 Mrs. Krake first before I send a letter over to Mr.

14 McDowell so I'm sure of what she's interested in. So,

15 I'll call her first.

16 Someone else brought up about a

17 non-resident person working for the city. And when I

18 did call to try to find out, it is the controller's

19 office that does those type of investigations.

20 And when I called, they said that, yes,

21 the person I was asking about, they were investigating,

22 but they can't just do one person, because it's

23 discriminatory.

24 So, they were going to do an update on

25 all city employees, and they would have to bring in

1 various items of identification and utility bills, et

- 2 cetera.
- 3 So, they told me that it would take a
- 4 while for that to be done, but they're going to keep me
- 5 and this Council informed of what the results.
- 6 So, yes, it's being investigated, and
- 7 we should have an answer. I don't know when, because
- 8 it will be lengthy with all the employees being asked.
- 9 Someone else brought up about being
- 10 paid for the meeting and you're not here for the whole
- 11 meeting. Now, I know they were referring to one of my
- 12 colleagues, but I did get an E-mail from a gentleman in
- 13 Dickson City questioning why meetings are cancelled and
- 14 that we're off the whole month of August, and he had it
- 15 calculated down to the penny of every time we miss a
- 16 meeting, what we owe the city.
- 17 And I E-mailed him back and I said that
- 18 I put at least 20 to 25 hours a week into my Council
- 19 position, and that's on a slow week. I mean, just this
- 20 week alone I was out eight hours yesterday and about
- 21 six the day before, and so has everyone else here.
- 22 So, I don't want you to think that we
- 23 don't do anything but come to a Council meeting for our
- 24 salary. We do other things. We investigate, we make
- 25 phone calls, we go visit neighbors. So, it's not just

- 1 coming to a meet that we're getting paid for. So, I
- 2 just wanted that clear with anyone that it's way beyond
- 3 that. It's what you put into it and what you give in
- 4 your position.
- 5 As you all know, I went on the
- 6 Pennsylvania League of Cities Convention out in
- 7 Pittsburgh. Didn't see too much of Pittsburgh, because
- 8 it was overburdened with conferences.
- 9 And I was disappointed, because they
- 10 did not have a trip where you would go around and see
- 11 their revitalization and/or their neighborhoods. I was
- 12 interested in seeing their neighborhoods.
- 13 And when it comes here next year, the
- 14 convention will be in Scranton, and I recommended that
- 15 we do have time to take people around to see our
- 16 different neighborhoods and see our different
- 17 facilities, because I think that's important to get to
- 18 know a city and see what other cities are doing.
- 19 I received a lot of information,
- 20 historic preservation, downtowns, Elm Street Programs,
- 21 health care issues, and I brought a lot of the
- 22 information into Mrs. Garvey.

- 23 So, if anyone, including Council, is
- 24 interested in perusing any of the material, please have
- 25 Mrs. Garvey make a copy of it. It's very interesting.

- 1 And one of the things that was in there
- 2 and the company that was there was the new asphalt
- 3 machine, that of course we haven't seen yet, but the
- 4 gentleman said, Oh, I sold one to Scranton and it was
- 5 being used by three different municipalities.
- 6 So, I'm going to call George Parker
- 7 this week and ask him when we can -- maybe we can all
- 8 be there when it's first used to see it, but it was
- 9 interesting that one of the vendors that was at the
- 10 conference was one of the pieces of equipment that we
- 11 have.
- 12 So, it was very worthwhile, and I hope
- 13 that next year when it's here, all of the Council
- 14 members will attend.
- 15 I met Council people from all over the
- 16 state. And there were quite a few women Council
- 17 Presidents. As a matter of fact, I was telling Stacy
- 18 that one of them from State College was a neighborhood
- 19 president, and she's now the president of State College

- 20 City Council. So, it was interesting to network with
- 21 all of these people. And I have their numbers, and we
- 22 can get ideas on maybe how to raise revenue or lower
- 23 taxes or whatever. So, it was very, very interesting
- 24 and I'm glad that I went. And I think that's all I
- 25 have. Thank you.

- 1 MS. EVANS: Mrs. Gatelli, just one
- 2 quick thing before we go on. I think on behalf of all
- 3 of us, I would like to wish everyone a very happy and
- 4 safe Fourth of July weekend, and we hope you will get
- 5 out to the swim complex on Tuesday, July 4 to celebrate
- 6 with our community one of our most important holidays.
- 7 That's it.
