3	to see how much money we are getting from
4	the other before we again have to borrow
5	both?
6	MS. EVANS: Yes.
7	MR. SBARAGLIA: Or are we going to
8	use that money from the tax bureau as
9	throw-away money like we usually do in the
10	city?
11	MR. COURTRIGHT: Andy, I even sent a
12	letter asking what was going to be done with
13	the money, but we didn't get a response.
14	MR. SBARAGLIA: I don't think you
15	will either.
16	MR. COURTRIGHT: I gave it a shot.
17	MR. SBARAGLIA: Everything is a
18	throw-away. I mean, as you know the police
19	buy their own cars, we lease everything, we
20	don't own very little and what we did own we
21	sold off. You remember you sold off our
22	good loans.
23	MS. EVANS: Yes.
24	MR. SBARAGLIA: Them are gone. I
25	wish he had sold off city hall. Thank you.

19	That's one ad. It's a bid for specs,
20	31 inches long, okay? And that is for
21	Office of Economic and Community Development

Office of Economic and Community Development legal counsel. Now, to me, to me this is unbelievable. It's a government grant monopoly. There is no competition. It is made up, it wasn't drawn up by the city

solicitor, it was drawn up by the OECD and
who is the OECD lawyer, Attorney Grecco. He
drew up his own specs. I looked at the

4	specs and there is no way in heck can
5	anybody ever be able to comply with these.
6	Now, November 1 there were published and you
7	have until November 10 to have the bid
8	opening. Now, how in the heck can anybody
9	meet these specs and you have to have at
10	least the last three years you had to be
11	doing municipal governmental things such as
12	in redevelopment, community development.
13	Nobody is going to be able to actually meet
14	that criteria but one person, and that is
15	Attorney Carl Greco who has been taking
16	hundreds and hundreds of thousands of
17	dollars from the City of Scranton. Last
18	week I complained about the \$600,000 why is
19	that needed for administration. Well, part
20	of it is for this guy, okay? I believe he
21	is also the SRA lawyer.
22	Now, it's a quid pro quo that
23	Doherty is playing. Mayor Doherty is
24	playing that. Here is the campaign
2.5	financial roports. In horo Mr. Croco

1	Attorney Greco has contributed to
2	Mr. Doherty's campaign \$9,675, that's a lot
3	of money, so what he is doing he is getting
4	this here bid, there is no doubt about it.

5	The specs are designed to rehire him. Ten
6	days to put in the bid.
7	Now, another thing, too, is OECD

selected a committee to determine. Who -excuse me. Please excuse me, who would be
the winner of the bid. It's just
unbelievable that you can throw away
hundreds of thousands of dollars to this
man, okay? And, you know, two years ago you
argued about it and he went to Court and he
won but nobody appealed it and everybody
knew what the game was he was just going
through the motions, but you got to stop
this kind of corruption. This is terrible.

I went over to the school board and I tried to tell them two weeks ago about the school board that are receiving the contributions to hire Hyland Associates and that design team of Palumbo, Aker and Quandel, and I pick up the paper and they are going to do the same for the NEIU. They

Now, this is getting to a point where it's so obvious it stinks and no wonder the

5	people realize that this part of
6	northeastern Pennsylvania political.
7	Now, you know, coming into the new
8	year and we are looking at my experience
9	with this food drive, okay, and seeing
10	people and how much in need they are and
11	seeing the debt that we are in in the City
12	of Scranton, you know, over a half a million
13	dollars in principle only, okay, and the
14	school board has already said they are going
15	they can tax up to 6.4 percent, so,
16	please, we cannot, you know, go ahead and
17	tax our people here in the City of Scranton
18	again. We just can't afford it and we can't
19	afford a contract again for a person to keep
20	on making \$100,000 plus a year, okay?

tonight we all know winter is just around

the corner. With winter comes snow and

typically an increase in home fires. With

home heating costs rising it is possible

there may be more fires than in prior years

as residents try to stretch their heating

budget. Time, of course, is critical in

fighting fires. Several times I have stood

at this podium to ask the city to help the

firefighters by painting the caps of the

fire hydrants to indicate available flow.

Now, as we face winter and snow even color coating might not help if a hydrant is buried with snow. With many of the hydrants on corners, they tend to get covered as the plowed snow stacks up at the corners. I have seen hydrants in other communities with visibility markers, which are nothing more than poles attached to the hydrants with flags on top. Scranton professes to be a progressive city, but when it comes to aids to help our firefighters protect our lives and property we miss the mark by miles. It

may be too late for the color coding this
season, but it's not too late for visibility
markers and I urge you to find the funds to
procure and install visibility markers
before the snow falls and I beg you to

ensure there are funds in the 2009 budget to

color code each and every hydrant in the

city.

And now I would like to switch to a new topic. There are a laws to protect consumers that fall into the general category of truth in advertising. Companies can be sued tore fraud if they misrepresent a product or a service. Government, on the other hand, appears to be protected. For instance, there are two loans I recall, one to ECTV and the other to Alexander's Salon, that were presented on the agenda but the devil was in the detail. Each of the loans turned into grants in three years.

In February of this year, a contract presentation was made to execute a contract with a Palumbo group to do a study to include historic preservation, environmental reviews and design for the Cedar Avenue

revitalization area of Scranton, an area I
might add that extends from Cedar Avenue
bridge back to Brook Street, and what you
might wonder was the end result of this
contract? Drawing for a new public library.
So, I'm asking for consideration of a New

7	Year's resolution, that all presentations
8	for loans or contracts placed on the agenda
9	will be truthful and present all pertinent
10	facts such as loans that morph into grants.
11	On other subject, I would like to
12	know how much longer we are going to have to
13	wait for the 2007 audit now that the parking
14	audit has been received, does anybody know?
15	MS. EVANS: Now or
16	MS. SCHUMACHER: Go ahead.
17	MS. EVANS: It appears that we are to
18	receive the audit by the end of 2008.
19	MS. SCHUMACHER: That's something
20	has got to be done about the timing on those
21	agenda, those audits, they really have to
22	this is ridiculous. I don't know even know
23	why we bother when it's so late.
24	Now, on 3-A onto tonight's agenda
25	can anybody share what the tax collection

sit here on the end and I was amazed that
these people would keep coming those council
meetings trying to bring change to this city
and the only change we have seen in this
city is the very steep decline and it's
continuing, and when I get the opportunity
to drive through the city for my own
personal business I'm amazed at all of the
condemned houses and the lack of maintenance
in the city and I truthfully can't blame the
residents completely because the wage base
has been so stagnated by overtaxation and
wastes of all types of money including grant
money, and I just think that somebody needs
to run against this mayor and take him out
of this office because it seems that we have
appointed people that keep spending his
agenda forward and as has happened.

And this isn't a shot at Mr. McGoff
either, I mean, I do understand the mayor
came up to break a tie to put you on the
seat, Mr. McGoff, but there were many other
instances, and I really don't have a lot of
arguments with you, Mr. McGoff, because you
seem to be somewhat fair minded, and I'm no
trying to patronize you either, but just to

be honest, you know, I do disagree with many things you do, but some of the people that were appointed were just complete figure heads, and this city suffered so much that really it's time for a change and if we can't even complete audits or we don't know what's going on it's just -- it's beyond belief. And I think it's -- I think we need to pass the burden to this council to stop introducing anything the mayor wants, as I have said many times before, until we have studied what he wants and we have a firm opinion of what's going on in facts.

I mean, we are paving streets with no curbs. We have city blocks with no sidewalks. We have an infrastructure in this city that's completely collapsed and we

have had people who have abandoned their
homes and left the city while they are still
for sale, that tells you that they are
trying to run as fast as they can and I know
that everybody on this council can make a
change for the better, but do you want to,
that's the question. Thank you.

5	they implement a new shifts. I'll check it
6	though, second shift.

7 MR. TALIMINI: Because it seems to me 8 there is a lack of police available and I 9 think there is a scheduling problem.

10	MR. COURTRIGHT: I'll check into it.
11	MR. TALIMINI: And another thing I
12	would like to know is just how many cars we
13	have who have cages in them because when
14	they make arrests, I mean, you got car 18
15	which is on
16	MR. COURTRIGHT: Not enough.
17	MR. TALIMINI: Birney Avenue and
18	then you've got something on Greenridge and
19	they got to go down and pick somebody up and
20	here's a cop standing there for 15 minutes
21	waiting for somebody to come down and pick
22	up a transporter for them, that's another
23	vital thing because like it or not we do
24	have an increase in the crime in this town,
25	considerably.

1	I'd like to ask why we cannot go
2	back to Thursday night meetings because I
3	think it's very, very important for us. For
4	instance, the last couple of weeks on
5	Tuesday nights when we had meetings, there
6	have been other meetings going on on Tuesday
7	nights which a lot of us would like to
8	attend. We had the choice of either
9	attending the council meeting or attending a

debate. We had choice of either attending a council meeting or attending another agency's meeting. Thursday night seems to be the best night for the council meeting.

Now, why we can't go back to Thursday nights, I don't know. I don't know why we had to change them to begin with, but for the last few weeks there has been a conflict all the way around, everything happens on Tuesday nights. There is no reason in the world why we cannot have council meetings back on Thursday nights. Now, I see a lot of you snickering, well, I'm sorry about that if it's an inconvenience to you, but the point of it is your schedule is easier to change than it is to change the whole

community's schedule, and I see no reason
whatsoever why we can't go to back to
Thursday night meetings. They worked very
well before and they should work very well
now, but if it's a choice between missing a
council meeting or another meeting, I don't
think that's fair to the citizenry and
that's exactly what's going on. Everything
happens on Tuesday nights in Scranton for
some reason unless you are out drinking and

What puzzles me, however, is the fact that an appropriate government agency already conducted a study and recommended that change in zoning to protect the residents. Obviously, this seems to be of no consequence to the zoning board solicitor. Attorney Penetar ends by

stating, "Unless a specific violation of
these regulations can be proven in Court,
allegations remain just allegation."

I'd like to add that I do not find the comparison of Daron Northeast to

Marywood construction vehicles made by

Attorney Penetar to be equivalent, sound or appropriate. Zoning laws are designed not only to provide a coexistence of industrial, commercial and residential uses, but also to protect human beings from the adverse quality of live effects of businesses which encroach on residential neighborhoods. If any zoning department guards the rights of business to the detriment of homeowners and residents, then it has lost sight of it's balance mission.
