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MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Council. Les Spindler. City Resident, homeowner and taxpayer. First of all, I'd like to make a correction about something that was said last week. I was speaking about freedom of speech and the man in Luzerne County who had his case thrown out for having the four-letter word and the sign on his truck, and Mrs. Gatelli said the reason why is because he took out two letters from the word. That's incorrect. That night the mayor was on WILK news radio with Steve Corbett and he said himself the judge threw it out because he said under the First Amendment, which is the right of freedom of speech, that was a protected word and the man had every right to use it. I don't agree with it and I don't use the word but

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that is part of freedom of speech, he is
allowed to use that word on the sign.

3	MS. GATELLI: I don't think you can
4	use that word here though.
5	MR. SPINDLER: It's right from the
6	horse's mouth.
7	MS. GATELLI: I don't think you can
8	use that word here.
9	MR. SPINDLER: I'm not saying you can
10	use it here. That's how strong the First
11	Amendment is, that's my point. There's a
12	lot you can get away with. And while we are
13	on that subject because last week Mrs.
14	Fanucci asked the solicitor if political
15	candidates can get up here and speak. Well,
16	I can answer that, yes, they can. We went
17	down that road years ago and anybody, a bum
18	off the street can come in here and talk
19	about almost anything they want, because you
20	can't yell fire in a crowded theatre, but
21	you can get up here and say almost anything
22	you want, political candidates can speak at
23	this podium.
24	And moving on, Mr. McGoff, you and
25	Mrs. Fanucci always talk about Rules of

Council, do Rules of Council also apply to
the council people, Mr. McGoff?

3	MR. MCGOFF: Yes.
4	MR. SPINDLER: Why don't you enforce
5	them because last week you didn't. You
6	didn't enforce them last week.
7	MR. MCGOFF: You are asking me a
8	question, do you want a response or not?
9	MR. SPINDLER: Yeah, it was a
10	one-word answer. Last week
11	MR. MCGOFF: No, it wasn't.
12	MR. SPINDLER: Last week when Doug
13	Miller left the podium unprovoked and
14	uncalled for Mrs. Fanucci said, "Well, I
15	guess you started your campaign, Doug."
16	Uncalled for. You did nothing.
17	When I was talking to Mrs. Gatelli that
18	evening she put her two cents in, you did
19	nothing. When I walked away she made some
20	kind of silly comment about getting roses
21	for Valentine's Day.
22	MS. GATELLI: No, I didn't.
23	MS. FANUCCI: That was me.
24	MS. SPINDLER: I know, that's what
25	I'm saying, yes. Mr. McGoff, again, you did

nothing, so I think you showed partiality toward council members and I forget the word --

4	MS. FANUCCI: Les, I invoke my
5	freedom of speech as well, and I certainly
6	will do it.
7	MR. SPINDLER: After I'm done.
8	MS. FANUCCI: Wrong.
9	MR. SPINDLER: Mr. McGoff, would you
10	invoke the Rules of Council, please? I'm
11	talking now, it's my time. Oh, and anyway,
12	you don't deserve roses, Mrs. Fanucci. The
13	only thing you deserve is poison ivy.
14	The next thing, last week there was
15	a speaker here, a speaker criticizing our
16	police department and our fire department.
17	She was mad at a police officer for stopping
18	her daughter who had four children, four
19	kids in the back seat. Well, the policeman
20	did his job. It's illegal to have four
21	people in the back seat of a car, and then
22	she went onto say that a Sewer Authority
23	worker, which I have no disrespect towards
24	Sewer Authority worker's, they say they are

lives every day when you go and fight a

fire, I never heard of a Sewer Authority

worker risking their life coming down the

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dangerous as a firemen, firemen risk their

4	sewer.
5	Next thing, about a year ago,
6	Scranton Ford on Franklin Avenue bought the
7	building next to them, tore it down, and now
8	they park their cars there. I wasn't going
9	to say anything, but I think they have a
10	safety hazard there. They park their cars
11	right to the end of the street, right
12	there is no sidewalk. You can't walk on the
13	sidewalk there because the streets are
14	blocked the cars are blocking them. Now,
15	you have to walk out in the street to get
16	around the cars, last week I almost get hit
17	by a car walking there. Isn't there some
18	kind of an ordinance where you can't put
19	cars blocking the sidewalk?
20	MS. FANUCCI: Yes.
21	MR. SPINDLER: Can we look into
22	that?
23	MS. GATELLI: Is that in the back?
24	MR. SPINDLER: Send an inspector or
25	pardon me?

1		MS.	GATELLI:	Is t	hat in	n th	ne back?	
2		MR.	SPINDLER:	No,	it's	on	Franklin	
3	Avenue.							

4 MR. COURTRIGHT: Is it where the --

5	MR. SPINDLER: It's where the old
6	fire station used to be. It was a printing
7	shop, they park their cars right to the
8	edge, you got to walk all the way into the
9	street to get around them, and I almost got
10	hit by a car. I walk by there every single
11	day back and forth to work, and I think
12	there is something wrong with that. That's
13	a safety hazard.
14	Lastly, I have to run out of here
15	tonight, I have a Crime Watch meeting, does
16	anybody know when these meetings are
17	repeated so I could watch the meeting again?
18	MS. FANUCCI: I don't know.
19	MS. GATELLI: I know tomorrow morning
20	at 9:30.
21	MR. SPINDLER: Oh, I work. That
22	won't be good.
23	MS. GATELLI: The tomorrow night at
24	the same exact time.
25	MR. SPINDLER: Tomorrow night?

1		MS. (GAWEL:	: No,	it's	10:0	0 to	morro	W
2	then I	think	it's	noon	Satur	day	and	8:00	on
3	Sunday.								

4 MR. JACKOWITZ: I can give you the

5	exact times, it's 10 a.m. tomorrow, it's
6	2:30 in the afternoon on Wednesday or on
7	Thursday, and it's 12:00 on Saturday and
8	it's 8:00 Sunday night.
9	MR. SPINDLER: Thank you.
10	MS. GATELLI: Isn't that scrolling on
11	the station?
12	MS. GAWEL: It does scroll.
13	MR. MCGOFF: Joanne Williams.
14	MS. WILLIAMS: Good evening, Council.
15	Joanne Williams, taxpayer and homeowner in
16	this great city of Scranton. After speaking
17	here last week, I received a letter of
18	harassment from whom I considered a coward
19	who had no courage to sign their name. I
20	have made copies to present to each of you.
21	May I approach? Is that okay to approach,
22	Mr. McGoff?
23	If anyone has a problem as to what I
24	stated at this podium we should be able to
25	discuss it as normal adults. I want to make

1	it perfectly clear that I consider
2	firefighters heroes, as I have stated last
3	week, but this coward heard what he wanted
4	to hear. In this letter they called me foul
5	names, used foul language, and they informed

6	me never to come back to a council meeting
7	again. A point is proven. A selective few
8	who are here every week, it's only a few,
9	who do not want anyone in chamber who speaks
10	positive about our city and mayor. It's
11	starting to become a private club meeting.
12	Instead, by law, it's a city council
13	meeting open to all to speak on city issues.
14	Let's not allow a few cowards to grandstand
15	here weekly. Enough is enough. It's time
16	to focus on the positive in this city. Week
17	after week all we hear is negative and put
18	down. I have made a police report on this
19	letter, they said it's harassment. And,
20	Mr. Minora, if I may ask you for your legal
21	advice, I'm contemplating turning this
22	letter over to the district attorney; is
23	that possible?
24	MR. MCGOFF: Attorney Minora
25	represents council.

1	MS. WILLIAMS: Well, all right.
2	Well, I have already spoken to my lawyer
3	also, so this letter this isn't going to
4	stop here. This has to end. The first man
5	who came up here and spoke about the First

6	Amendment, I have every right to come here
7	and speak how I feel about this city, like
8	it or not that's the way I feel. I do feel
9	sorry for a few of you people sitting on
10	council. Once again, you and the mayor were
11	elected to serve us and some of you are so
12	disrespected it is disgusting. I'm not
13	alone here in this. I could show you
14	letters of praise I get and people who stop
15	me on the street and say pat me on the
16	back and say, "Good job, Joanne, keep it
17	up."
18	And just in closing I just want to
19	say thank God for this great city and it's
20	great people. Thank you.
21	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs.
22	Williams. Bill Jackowitz.
23	MR. JACKOWITZ: Bill Jackowitz, South
24	Scranton resident and member of the
25	Taxpayers' Association. I probably got

about 15 to 20 letters threatening my house
is going to be burned down and everything,
so I don't worry about stuff like that.
Okay, you know, there is so much to
say and so little time to speak about it up
here. You probably all saw the headlines

7	this morning 7.7 regional unemployment. I
8	have been speaking about this for five years
9	now. I have asked council how many times to
10	invite Austin Burke and the Chamber of
11	Commerce and the mayor to these meetings and
12	I have been ignored each and every time.
13	Now, Austin Burke states that they
14	were unaware of this. Well, you know what,
15	if he had came to the meetings like I asked

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I would have made them aware of it because I stay on top of it. This is what I concentrate on most of the time.

Now, the state is at 6.7 percent, the nation is at 7.2 percent. The nation is actually starting to catch up to Scranton. Now, I predicted in October that we would be at 7 percent by the end of the year, well, we are at 7.7 in December. And again, the Chamber of Commerce president says he was

1	not aware of it, but yet he has the gaul to
2	blame the people. He is saying we need to
3	educate our people more. Well, guess what?
4	If there is no jobs here and there is no
5	wages here you can have three masters
6	degrees and you are going to be flipping

7 burgers at McDonalds or Wendy's because 8 there is no place to get a job, and I'm not talking about jobs I'm talking about wages, 9 10 okay? 11 You noticed Austin Burke and nobody 12 ever uses the word wages. It's always jobs. Well, if you have a 6 or 7 dollar an hour 13 14 job you are not making enough money to feed 15 your family, to go on vacation, to do things 16 that you would like to do. 17 So, again, Council President McGoff, I respectfully request that you invite 18 Austin Burke, the Chamber of Commerce and 19 20 Mayor Doherty to a public hearing or a

public caucus so citizens can address our
leaders and make them aware of the terrible,
terrible situation we have in Scranton and
in Lackawanna County, and this is not based

25 upon the current national situation. It's

been this way for five decades, 50 years.

2 Isn't it about time that someone takes the

3 bull by the horn. Again, please,

4 Mr. McGoff, I'm requesting that you invite

5 Austin Burke, Chamber of Commerce, the mayor

6 and anyone else who can help us get jobs,

7 paying jobs in this city.

Okay, now, Al Boscov. I see they
made \$28 million in the a month of December,
can we send Al Boscov a letter requesting
our \$3 million back? He made a profit of 28
million in one month. If we have given him
the three million, I don't know if we have
or we haven't, but if we have given him that
\$3 million can we please send Al Boscov a
letter requesting the taxpayers' money back,
because \$28 million in one month is a pretty
good chunk of profit I think. So again, you
know, what's fair is fair and what's right
it right, okay?

And I'm going to predict that the unemployment rate by the end of the year, the next one will be up over 8 percent, and I'm further going to predict by June we are going to be at 10 percent. This has been

going on forever. Forever. And our Chamber
of Commerce will state that they know
nothing about it. We were shocked. We were
blindsided. Read the paper, Courtright,
that's where it's at, Buddy. You are
looking at me like I'm making this up. I'm
not making this up.

And speaking of the paper, I hope
the Times and Tribune and the Times Leader
will actually take the time to do some
investigating reporting and really look into
the situation and not buy into the sound
bites they get from the mayor and Austin
Burke. Really take the time to investigate
it. See who is right. Them or me. I'm
asking you, the Times-Tribune and the Times
Leader, do some investigating reporting and
find out for sure. We have been at the top
of the unemployment list, lowest wages in
the state, everything, and I'm just going to
ask one request from the mayor, from the
Chamber of Commerce and from Scranton City
Council, fix it.
MR. MCGOFF: Thank you,

1	MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia,
2	citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I
3	have been coming to this podium for maybe at
4	least ten years, but I don't know why some
5	people get derogatory. I have never had got
6	derogatory committed to me, nobody ever sent
7	anything bad to me. As long as you tell the
8	truth and you don't make up stories, and I

try to give you the truth as best as I can,
but coming before you now is, I don't know,
under I plan to bring it before you, but
it's the "F" word which means fighting KOZ.
North Scranton has sat idle for ten years.
Now, KOZ's are being renewed and many KOZ
projects nothing has been done with it other
than the fact is they haven't paid taxes.
The tax burden has shifted from the
manufacturing and from people in the system
to the people. I believe if it wasn't for a
lot of our nonprofits and the KOZ's you
would have no need for that 25 percent hike.
When this came up I said that, many, many
years before anybody probably any of you
were even on that spot, I said all of the
KOZ's are going to do in this city is raise

1	the taxes for the little people, and they
2	have, and the taxes will consider when the
3	new KOZ coming in, I left some copies, I
4	think with the Neil. I don't know if you
5	all got them.

6 MS. GATELLI: Yes.

MR. SBARAGLIA: But the importance of is it could push out the 27 years without

paying taxes. Like I said before, I would have paid -- at the current rate I would have paid about \$50,000, but there is lot of people in this city who paid 100,000 or even more. You got to reign in the KOZ's because the law is flawed. They didn't restrict people from moving to one area of the city to the other area of the city to avoid paying taxes. They never went around and checked on if the KOZ's were doing what they were supposed to be doing.

The guy said at a meeting, I don't know if you were even around then, but he said if they got the KOZ, that's it. They didn't have to adhere to some of the points in the law. There is one KOZ in Scranton where there is a fence around it, and that's

it. That's all that was done. A fence was put around the property, and you know what was done at the height of the Junior High School, if it wasn't for public money that was poured into that project it wouldn't even had a roof, and that's a sad part of this whole deal. Not only do they want the KOZ they want the people to fund that KOZ and when people move into that KOZ they

don't pay taxes.

I don't know how much more you can
put on the people of Scranton. You have
really overload our backs. We are bending
back real bad, we are all becoming stoop
backed from the tax burden placed upon us.
And what's happening with the economy is
even worse, there is a lot of people that
aren't going to make it and it's just sad,
but it's going to happen. I already see
layoffs coming from even the department
stores they are starting to layoff, the
papers are always talking about layoffs, and
these things are happening, but no one has
figured a way to lower our tax burden, and
without that lowering of our tax burden a

lot of people aren't going to be able to keep up their homes.

If you were read about, well, the gas company, they want a big raise. It's not time to be raising our gas. It's time for the government to step up. I know some of these things you can't do, but the government should step up to the plate and do something.

You had that Comcast meeting, I
didn't sit and listen to it because I went
through it all before for hours when we had
it at the library with Spano, and it was a
good one, and the questions were what she
said then, we can't do nothing about the
funding. You are going to pay that rate and
that's it. But somewhere along the line you
should request the Housing Authority that
maybe they put up an antenna and because of
the cost there is a lot of people would get
satellite cheaper than Comcast and the city
would lose money, but they should have that
option like I have an option. I thank you.
MR. MCGOFF: Thank you,
Mr. Sbaraglia. Ozzie Quinn.

1	MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn. Taxpayers'
2	Association. Mrs. Evans, I want to thank
3	you for bringing out the debt that is in the
4	city, okay? You know, the taxpayers
5	appreciate that because, actually, it was
6	never really explained in those details and
7	you explained it because otherwise they
8	usually sideskirt the authorities, but you
9	specifically said that the authorities are
10	the responsibility of the cities, the

11	taxpayers.
12	MS. EVANS: You are welcome, and I
13	hope next week to have an additional
14	comparison for you.
15	MR. QUINN: Thank you again. What I
16	want to from what I understand was
17	\$159,340,000 and that's what the that's
18	without the 2008 refinancing and letter of
19	credit
20	MS. EVANS: And that's the principle
21	only.
22	MR. QUINN: Principle only, yeah.
23	Okay, so that is our debt, how did we get
24	like that, you know? I'll tell you, one way
25	I know how we get like that, okay, is during

1	Mayor Doherty's term he gave an incentive
2	package to people in the clerical union to
3	leave and what he did is doubled the
4	pension, so if somebody was going to get a
5	\$1,000 pension, they left for life, they
6	left with \$2,000. Now, that means that
7	that's costing the city \$800,000 a year.
8	\$800,000 a year. That's how we go into debt
9	by just frivolousness, not thinking and
10	causing this problem, and you know what?

11	The people that are were laid off not
12	laid off, that got that incentive package
13	and got a good deal, they double dipped.
14	They are working down the school district.
15	They went out the back door. Out the front
16	door here and in the back door. I mean,
17	this is unbelievable.
18	I brought this to the attention of
19	the school board last night and they didn't
20	say anything, they agreed, you know, they
21	never publish they never publish when a
22	job was open or whatever or who gives it,
23	you know? But anyway, the school district
24	mand we spoke about the KOZ's, they tabled
25	the KOZ's, thank God. We just can't afford
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1	it With this debt that we are south
1	it. With this debt that we owe we can't
2	afford to give anybody free taxes.
3	Now, this Bewitched over there, that
4	was a KOZ, now are they going to get seven
5	years because Kildaire's are going to go in
6	there, an extension? How do you know?
7	MS. FANUCCI: How do I know? Are you
8	asking me?

9 MR. QUINN: Yeah.

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MS. FANUCCI: Well, we would have to extend per project. It's just not a full

12	fledge extension.
13	MR. QUINN: Well, they will get it,
14	don't worry, but thank you.
15	MS. FANUCCI: Well, you know better
16	than me, Oz.
17	MR. QUINN: Okay, you know, then
18	they are saying 1,000 jobs and you don't
19	know how it's going to be transferred there.
20	It's ridiculous. You know, it's really
21	ridiculous, and the fact is now we have like
22	with our debt, with the school board's debt,
23	which is 144 million some hundred odd
24	thousand dollars, and the county 220, we are
25	over half a million dollars in principle,

1	but we owe, the taxpayers. This is
2	ridiculous. This is crazy. How are we
3	going to pay it as Andy said? It's just
4	it's unheard of in a community of this size.
5	We got to do something about it and I hope
6	that something is done by this council, that
7	they get a little more thrifty on things
8	that come up before them.
9	Now, last night I went up to the
10	school board meeting, they passed a
11	resolution where they hired an association

known as the Northwest Pennsylvania
Incubator Association from Erie, and you
know what they do? They go out and they
purchase the delinquent taxes for the school
district and they do it for three years and
each year it's \$5,720,000 no penalties. I
asked if there was any penalty, no
penalties. No poor soul on making \$8,000 a
year on social security is going to get
taken over to Keyser Avenue and wind up with
\$1,500 penalties. It's unbelievable. So
why don't you start trying to do that for
look into that again, Mr. McGoff, why don't
you try to a little lead. I'm sick of the

triangle between what's going on with you
three, and actually the quadrangle, and
Mayor Doherty. It's getting out of hand,
and the other fact is here. I want to speak
oh, I do want to mention one other
anyone.

The freeze I saw in the paper is now lifted from DCED, lack of communication, but one thing I did learn, too, and I never knew is that in 2006 -- no, 2007, March 2007, July 2008, and August 2008, they were lacking communications then, too. There

13	were froze then. A lack of communication or
14	lack of competence.
15	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Quinn.
16	MR. QUINN: And the Hill
17	Neighborhood Association Housing Blight, one
18	second there is two
19	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Quinn, you have five
20	minutes.
21	MR. QUINN: Two inspectors that were
22	just joined, two new housing inspectors
23	joined, okay? They are going to South Side
24	where Judy is again. There is the triangle
25	again.
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1	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Quinn.
2	MR. QUINN: And none are going up to
3	the Hill Section and we are very
4	disappointed that nobody else is getting it
5	but South Side. Thank you.
6	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Quinn.
7	Reverend Simmons.
8	MS. SIMMONS: Good evening, Council
9	members, my name is Reverend Kathryn
10	Simmons, and I'm a life-long Scranton

11 resident. I have not been here in quite

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sometime because I believe that unless you

13 have something productive to say or ask for 14 you shouldn't come. You shouldn't waste people's valuable time. Also, I spend 15 16 12 hours a day ministering to the homeless 17 shelter, to Scranton's homeless population, to Lackawanna Prison Ministry and 18 Florence-Midtown Crime Watch and this is 19 20 down seven days per week, 12 sometimes 21 14 hours a day. And, no, I don't get paid for any of it except from my father above. 22 On January 18, 19 and 20, a great 23 24 celebration took place in my church, in my

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community, and even in my family. I don't

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believe I have to describe the reason for the celebration. Unless someone was in a coma, everyone knows what took place that weekend.

On January the 19th at Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Junior's service, I took a moment and thanked our mayor, Chris Doherty, for all that he had done this past year to help the homeless community. I don't want to hear from anybody about what he didn't do, I know what he has done because I'm out there and I work there, okay?

Afterward, I received a phone call telling me I should never again praise the mayor, and I had no right to speak for, and I quote, the colored people. Well, I'm here tonight to say that my purpose in coming here over the years has nothing to do with politics. Never has been. I'm not a political person. Everyone or anyone who has heard me over the years knows I come to this lectern only when I feel I have something productive to say.

 $\ensuremath{\text{I'm}}$ a great supporter of the unions.

That will never change. Every time I hear a siren or alarm or I hear a school bus pull up, my thought immediately goes to the hope that my father God will find finally intercede and bring peace between the city and those are in position.

I do not seek out and nor look for a friend because we only think and or believe alike. I respect all of my fellow citizens, and this past presidential election has shown that there is no more my people, there is only our people.

I fear no one so you can tell

whatever you want to tell me because I know
who protects me and I will continue to thank
persons such as Scranton firefighter Dave
Gervasi, Larry Moran, Scranton police
officers Jill Foley and Lieutenant Leonard
Numeika and, yes, even Mayor Doherty. The
hungry will eat tonight, the dirty will take
a shower. The naked will be able to get
some clean clothes and those that are ill
will get medical attention, and when the
dark of night descends and there is no place
left for them to wander to, there is a

building in place where they can get a cot and a blanket and all of this is done because of people such as those that I just mentioned.

I say to you tonight from this lectern, don't ever approach me again to show hatred because I am not afraid of you. Don't ever tell me again I can't speak for your people. You have no people. We are all one and always have been. The love I have for my city will go on until I myself am called home.

So on February the 24th at 7:00 I ask you to show your support of the homeless

15	and the poor and the needy. Purchase a
16	table at a dinner that we are having to help
17	waylay the costs of running a shelter.
18	There is going to be some awards given out
19	that evening, some people will be uplifted
20	by them. United States Senator Robert Casey
21	will receive an award; Mr. Patrick McMann
22	will receive an award, and our beloved
23	Reverend Daniel O'Waters, Jr. will receive
24	an award, but also Mayor Chris Doherty will
25	receive an award, and if you want to know

1	why come on over to /16 North Washington
2	Avenue. Any night 32 or 33 people will show
3	you why. Thank you.
4	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Reverend
5	Simmons. Lee Morgan?
6	MR. MORGAN: Hello, Council. The
7	first thing I have here is I can't
8	understand why there is a delay with ECTV,
9	and I really think it does a disjustice,
10	misjustice to the people in the neighborhood
11	to like to see this live. I just can't
12	understand why there is still technical
13	problems. One other thing I have here is
14	NCC. Now, today well, not today, two

days ago I received a bill from NCC for \$249 for a garbage fee. I have a receipt for the fee. I called them. The person I needed to talk to wanted me to leave a voicemail, but that's not the whole problem, that's just a very small part of the problem. I called the city today about the fee, \$249, and I stated to them that I had

I called the city today about the fee, \$249, and I stated to them that I had paid in fee for the properties I owned and I received a bill for one and I paid them all at the same time. Now, the problem with the

city is they destroy their receipt book at
the end of the year. Now, I mean, that's
what this individual told me that as of the
end of 2008 they destroy their receipt book,
so if you are a person that paid your waste
removal fee and you lost your receipt and
NCC comes to you and they tell you you owe
us \$249 and you lose your receipt then you
can't prove you paid it, so then you pay it
twice.
MS. FANUCCI: That's incorrect.
MR. MORAN: Well
MS. FANUCCI: The receipt book is not

MR. MCGOFF: I was told the receipt

destroyed at the end of the year.

16	was destroyed. I was told that today.
17	MS. FANUCCI: Then you received the
18	wrong information.
19	MR. MORGAN: Well, I don't know. You
20	know, I called the people who should know
21	what's going on.
22	MS. FANUCCI: You are wrong.
23	MR. MORGAN: Okay. Well, maybe I'm
24	wrong, but you know something, I only know
25	what people who tell me who work in those
	36
1	departments.
2	MS. FANUCCI: Do you have the name
3	of who told you that that works in the
4	department?
5	MR. MORGAN: No. No.
6	MS. FANUCCI: I'm sure you don't.
7	Thank you.
8	MR. MORGAN: Well, it doesn't make
9	one I'm saying to be invalid, it just means
10	that I didn't remember the person's name.
11	And I said to this person, "How can you
12	destroy a receipt book?" "That's
13	procedure."
14	That's what I was told, okay, and

I'm really troubled by that because in my

own opinion the city is seriously
mismanaged. That's not a cheap shot at any
single individual, but we have statements
made from council itself, council members,
and I'm not going to single out any single
council member, but I believe I read it last
week in the Scranton Times about slum lords.
Give you something to think about, is it
possible that the mis management of this
city has lead to it's demise, and it has

very little to do with individuals who have come here and bought properties?

I have gone through South Side, I have gone through other parts of the city, we have an awful lot of rental properties condemned even across from Scranton Dog and Cat Hospital all over the place. These are people that invested in this city. I just can't understand it. There seems to be a war on people who want to invest here, but we seem to have a lot of money for special interest people, whether like Andy Sbaraglia said, KOZ's or other people who come here and they get grants, but any time there is a small investor who comes here and puts all of his assets on the line it's a terrible

thing because they lose them all. Now, I have a house up on East Locust Street, there is five houses on that one block, maybe six for sale. One of them has been for sale for five years, and some of them, I hate to say this, but there is only five or six for sale, but some are empty. They have nobody in them. I mean, it's the most troubling thing, and my

question is as we tear these houses down, does the city maintain the lot after they tear the house down or is does the grass grow up waist length or higher?

Are there any curbs and sidewalks in this stay? What infrastructure repairs or revitalization are going on in this city? I mean, I see a lot of fees, we are talking about a franchise fee here, we are talking about taxation, but what's going to the ordinary taxpayers who own all of these homes in the city? We have come to the point where we are hiring inspectors to go in and try to in my opinion condemn as many properties at possible because the population base has actually fled the city.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Morgan. Hopefully one of the future speakers will address the receipt book problem. Doug Miller. MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council, Doug Miller, Scranton. I was driving into the city today coming off the expressway near Moosic Street, and certainly received a big wake-up call as I was greeted by one of

the Scranton big famous potholes. Certainly a nice Scranton greeting as usual, and I think we can all agree that we won't have to worry about anybody falling asleep behind the wheel as we are driving through town.

Regarding 61, some issues were raised with 61 earlier. It came to my attention and I realized we only have one camera here. I can recall in the past we had various cameras around the room that focused in on the meeting from different angles, so maybe Council can address this issue in the future, maybe I missed out on the details.

Regarding agenda Item 7-A, you know,
I'd truly like to know when the city is
going to receive the thousands of dollars

18 that were owed from the Ice Box. It 19 certainly was a poor decision by previous 20 council to approve the sale of this piece of land for a dollar to begin with. You know, 21 22 I believe that this deal certainly begs for 23 an investigation. 24 I'm certainly not here to apologize, 25 however, I believe the statements that I 40 made here last week were taken out of 1 2 context by this council. Regarding the 3 issue of the raises, no matter what money 4 was given back, and I'm not going to argue that it was certainly a good gesture, but 5 the bottom line is the raises were on the 6

table and I do feel that the mayor's raise

should have been addressed as well as the

9 controller's raise.

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As for the University, my comments were only an add-on to all of council members to ask the University to consider expanding their project by traveling all over the city cutting trees and installing lights. Those statements were aimed at all for council, not just one member.

I opposed the cancellation of the

meetings, we only need three members from
majority. Any council member can vote on
legislation the way they feel is necessary,
but the bottom line is they chambers should
never be closed to the public. Council was
elected to serve at the pleasure of the
people. Those were the issues that I had
with this council last week.

I certainly don't look to pick
arguments, there is no reason to. I want to
see this city move forward just as anyone
else does, but if I see things I don't like
along the way I'm going to raise the issues.
I spent two years on this junior council as
president, served along with other high
school students. As we know, it was
supposed to be an internship for each of us
to work with council, but we know that never
happened, and I'm still disappointed, as you
know, that this council has not put in any
effort to restoring this council. We see
areas around us that followed our lead and
here we are at this date no high school
students at the table, but the experiences
and observations and actions of this council
is what motivated me to come before you here

19	and address issues that I believe to be
20	discussed openly and forthright. Thank you.
21	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Miller.
22	Bob Bolus.
23	MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.
24	Bob Bolus, Scranton. First off, does anyone
25	have an answer to my questions that I raised
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1	last week about the balance of the golf
2	course money from the first time it was put
3	in, wherever it went, for the \$3 million
4	including the interest to date, and I'd ask
5	that and I would like to really know where
6	it is and what's it's accrued since it's
7	been put away there, and I intend to ask
8	every chance I get where it's gone.
9	Next, I brought up about windmills,
10	somebody should research about putting
11	windmills around the area to help defray the
12	cost of operating the city and give
13	taxpayers a break. I also brought up about
14	the leachate line and that will be asked
15	time and time again.
16	I'd like to see you bring impact
17	fees on Lackawanna Avenue. There is a

development there, there has been traffic

tie-ups and everything, those are the
realistic part about what an impact fee is.

On Washington Avenue where the parking
garage is there should be an impact fee.

They are done everywhere else, but Scranton,
we don't do it. We want the taxpayers to
pay.

Thought possibly about raising the tax on liquor being sold in the city. The governor wants to raise it on cigarettes, I haven't seen anybody getting a DUI smoking a cigarette unless it was a joint, but we have seen a lot more problems with alcohol, okay? So maybe someone would want to go look at it.

Another thing I think we should do, and this is important, that we need to look at grants to possibly save the Catholic churches in this community. Marino has taken it upon himself to literally close what we have all grown up with for generations. I think it's wrong. I don't think he should have the power to do what he is doing. I believe it has to be something we have to take charge of and it should be done through council or through the city or

20 through the county commissioners. There are 21 grants that are out there. We give the 22 Connell Building away, we waived hundreds of 23 thousands of dollars in taxes, we gave them \$4 million so these people could afford to 24 25 pay the taxes and they could afford to pay 1 for the building. They have a place up off 2 81 there that is still vacant for how many 3 years, the old Corning Building, so it's not like they were out of money. So we need to 4 go on that part that I'm looking at. 5 6 Now, I'm going to get a little 7 technical here tonight, it was something that happened last week that I'm going to 9 raise this issue. On candidates, Mrs. Fanucci, are you going be a candidate this 10 11 year? 12 MS. FANUCCI: I haven't made my 13 formal announcement yet, so when I do I 14 certainly will let you know. 15 MR. BOLUS: Well, let see say this, 16 the statements you made last week regarding Doug Miller, I think you were out of order 17 18 with and the reason I'm --

20	though?
21	MR. BOLUS: Pardon?
22	MS. FANUCCI: He is running for
23	council? I mean, it wasn't out of order
24	MR. BOLUS: Yeah, that's fine.
25	MS. FANUCCI: he came to the
	45
1	podium and said something. It was already
2	known.
3	MR. BOLUS: It was the way it was
4	brought up, and I'm going to raise an issue
5	here because I think you were out of order
6	and saying an issue about who is running as
7	a candidate and wether they can speak here.
8	I want to set the record straight. Council
9	members every time they have ran here have
10	been on this seat, have used that forum to
11	their own benefit to run for office right
12	where they are sitting. Every member
13	running for reelection is a candidate, yet
14	you get to speak about council issues and
15	some personal issues. Nobody faults it, but
16	what you have to understand, people running
17	while they are running, do we ever see
18	council members come back here? Very rarely
19	after they have left this seat.

MS. FANUCCI: We have one that comes

21	back a lot.
22	MR. BOLUS: Very rarely you see
23	them. Very, very rarely once they go they
24	don't come back, but this kid showed up here
25	two years. I'm not here defending him, I
	46
1	think he could do a pretty darn good job and
2	his own.
3	As far as a candidate that is
4	running for public office coming before
5	council and council denying them the right
6	to speak, it has already been tried to Court
7	and they were defeated. I was that person
8	that defeated them, okay?
9	MS. FANUCCI: I wasn't looking to
10	stop people from coming, I was looking from
11	stopping it to be a quorum just for
12	political activity constantly, and I was
13	more worried about what the law was with
14	camera time because I knew that was
15	something
16	MR. BOLUS: Well, I don't think
17	that's even an issue and that's where I was
18	going.
19	MS. FANUCCI: Well, we did figure
20	that out last week, so you are coming here

21 with something we already talked about. 22 MR. BOLUS: Well, that's why I'm here 23 to set the record straight whether it was 24 figured out or not. It really wasn't cast 25 in stone, but I don't even think it was an 47 issue that should have been raised by you, 1 2 and I have a lot of respect for you and 3 every council member here, whether we are in 4 chambers or outside of the door, but I think 5 there is one thing here that people have to say, and I think that goes for everybody in 6 this administration or the city or political 7 8 office, and it's one I was raised with and 9 it was recommended many, many times with, it 10 said engage the brain before putting the mouth in gear. We all need to think about 11 12 what we are saying before we say it and we 13 won't have these issues. Thank you. MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Bolus. 14 15 Mrs. Schumacher. 16 MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, Marie Schumacher, resident and member of the 17 Taxpayers' Association. Mrs. Gatelli, last 18 19 week as I was leaving the podium after

harping about the status of the resolution

on the city's neighborhood stabilization

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22 application you questioned my South Side credentials as I had spent a number of years 23 24 out of town. I chose to leave Scranton to 25 seek employment based on my God given 48 ability and my parents' investment in my 1 education instead of staying in Scranton so 2 I wouldn't have to kiss somebody's butt or 3 sell my soul to get a decent job. 4 5 That does not mean I'm ignorant. Mrs. Gatelli, there were several rather 6 famous retail businesses in South Side such 7 as Kolomark's Bakery, Goodhinz and 8 Schumacher's Meat Market. I would expect 9 10 anyone with the knowledge of South Side to 11 know the family name is Schumachers not 12 Schumacher. 13 I grew up in the heart of the Elm 14 Street project area and stayed connected 15 through the family business. I am well 16 aware of what happened to South Scranton. I 17 still worship in South Side, my auto 18 mechanic is in South Side as our many 19 friends, my bank and my hairdresser, and all of my personal services. 20

21 Even if I hadn't stayed connected, I

have been back in Scranton five years and it doesn't take that long to observe what has happened and why. I would love to see South Side return to the wonderful neighborhood in

which I grew up.

On October 29 of last year, I attended a meeting on the Elm Street project in South Side at which a professional firm provided the results of a survey of what people wanted done with the Elm Street funding. The results of their survey included the fact that only 2 percent of the survey responders want the library, but who is listening. They will get what others want for them as a library continues to be a priority for the mayor.

At the last library board meeting held in Scranton, it was reported that the mayor has been lobbying Senator Casey to insure the library is in the stimulus package, and the board is thinking about dipping into reserve to rush blueprints so the project is shovel ready. All of this for a project desired by 2 percent. I do believe that it is unfair to the neighborhood stabilization proposal to

23	desire to spend the entire \$3 million in
24	South Scranton.
25	In last year's state of the city
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1	address, Mr. Doherty laid out plans for West
2	Scranton that included knocking down 30
3	dilapidated structures in West Side, so it
4	would make sense to at least at a minimum
5	share that \$3 million with West Side, if not
6	the entire city.
7	The rental registration has been on
8	the books since I believe July of 2007, and
9	yet it has yet to be enforced. That is
10	something that could help the entire city.
11	Now, to a few other loose ends and
12	items. Last month Mayor Doherty committed
13	excuse me, maybe it was December,
14	committed \$3 million to a Section 108 loan
15	to Boscov's NUCO. I believe city council is
16	required to approve Section 108 loans, so I
17	wonder when this loan will appear on the
18	agenda. Maybe this can be addressed in
19	motions.
20	Last week at the school board
21	meeting, Scranton Chamber's Austin Burke

reported the city has given \$225,000 for the

23	Mt. Pleasant Corporate Center
24	infrastructure. I don't believe that items
25	has come before council as yet either and I

1 would like to know when that might occur or 2 when it occurred if I did miss it. I believe it was two weeks ago that Mr. Burke 3 made his stealthy visit to a council caucus 4 regarding extending KOZ status for this 5 project. When will that be on the agenda? 6 7 And then just a few words on KOZ's and KOEZ's. For instance, the Moon Shine 8 Theatre has had KOZ status since the 9 10 beginning. They have had one production at 11 this facility and they do not bother to show 12 them their snow from their sidewalks. I 13 could go down the entire list of KOZ's and 14 KOEZ's, but I hope that you are as deadset 15 against approving any extensions for KOZ's as I am in opposing them. There are many 16 17 KOZ properties which have had nothing built 18 on them, and would be eligible or over the 19 ten-acre minimum and they would be eligible, and I don't know how you would say no to one 20 21 or yes to one and then no to all the rest, 22 so you are opening a Pandora's box if 23 approve just one. There are a lot of

24	KOEZ's, as I say, such as the Moonshine
25	Theatre which has had one single production,
	52
1	don't keep the place up, and I'll be back
2	next week, good Lord willing. Thank you.
3	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs.
4	Schumacher. Stephanie Gawel.
5	MS. GAWEL: Good evening, Council.
6	First off, I'm a happy girl. Steelers. I
7	got to kind of pickup, I never hang around
8	after I speak, I have to get home, I
9	couldn't believe what I heard last week
10	finishing watching the meeting when I got
11	home. I can't believe we are going to have
12	the mayor or any other untrained person
13	manning the police and fire department. I
14	mean, that doesn't even make sense to me.
15	We need the police and fire. They are
16	semi-military who serve the city with honor

18	thankful that they are there, and we should
19	thank god that they are there, which I do
20	ever day by the way. But, are they fighting
21	this, do we know?
22	MS. FANUCCI: I think Mr. Gervasi
23	could probably tell you better. I'm not

24	sure what their plans are. I would imagine
25	that they are going to Court with it. I
	53
1	would think since that's what their
2	statements are in the paper and I'm sure
3	that it's
4	MS. GAWEL: Oh, it's just I
5	appreciate Mrs. Williams' opinion, and like
6	her I would love to talk about the good
7	things of the city which are the
8	architecture that we keep tearing down and,
9	you know, that's sort of stuff, but we have
10	issues that need to be settled.
11	The police and firemen are in more
12	danger on a regular basis, especially
13	nowadays with the drug houses and the drug
14	dealers, the houses could blowup very easily
15	from a Meth lab. The policemen could get
16	killed very easily with fully automatic
17	weapons out there, so I just disagree with
18	her a little bit.
19	I'd also like to get back to the
20	safety issues that I was discussing. Just
21	could you humor me on this, Mr. Courtright,
22	would you explain to everybody out there
23	what a defibrillator does?

MR. COURTRIGHT: I don't know if I

23	MS. GAWEL: Again, safety device?
24	MR. COURTRIGHT: Yes.

1	only my opinion, but I will
2	MS. GATELLI: Excuse me for one
3	minute, do we have ADD's in any fire trucks?
4	MR. COURTRIGHT: I'm sorry, I don't
5	know the answer to that. I don't believe we
6	do, do we? Does rescue have one?
7	MR. GERVASI: We have some, I'm not
8	sure how many are actually functioning right
9	now.
10	MR. COURTRIGHT: This is certainly a
11	legitimate complaint. We should have ADD's
12	out there. I just got trained in it not too
13	long ago. It's pretty simple.
14	MS. GAWEL: Here is my point behind
15	this, my point is that 99.9 percent of the
16	time the cops are there first, they are
17	trained to give the First Aid, they are
18	usually going to beat the fire department
19	there, they are going to beat any ambulances
20	there because they are in the neighborhoods,
21	they are going to get there first, they
22	should have these.
23	MR. COURTRIGHT: I agree with you,
24	yes, and we did have them and why we don't
25	have them now is

1	MS. GATELLI: Can we find that out?
2	MR. COURTRIGHT: What happened is
3	MS. GAWEL: Go ahead.
4	MR. COURTRIGHT: I don't want to take
5	your time. What happened, we had them, the
6	batteries either died and some of them were
7	damaged and we never replaced them. Some
8	people would say that some of them were
9	damaged purposely, I don't think we can
10	prove that. The batteries are I know,
11	I'm just telling you what I was told, the
12	batteries die and they are expensive and we
13	didn't purchase any.
14	I believe there was a gentleman
15	willing to donate one from a company, I'm
16	not going to say his name on the air because
17	it's somebody running for office and I will
18	get yelled at, and I think we need them and
19	I will ask Director Hayes why we don't have
20	them in there and if he is going to do

1 have to have at least intermediate service 2 to receive this and that already puts you at 3 about --MR. COURTRIGHT: Excuse me, 4 5 Mr. Dobson, I asked that woman that question and she said that the package that would be 6 7 coming up \$16 would carry Channel 61. 8 That's the question I asked her. 9 MR. DOBSON: That's not what is I was 10 told. They are trying to do it, but there has been other issues there. That extra 11 12 channel that they had to broadcast took up I 13 think Channel 11 or something like that, so it was being announced that it was Channel 14 15 11. Well, it can't be 11 anymore, so they 16 are working towards it, but it's something that you people could try and facilitate and 17 expedite it would be a big help. People 18 19 wouldn't have to pay as much if they would 20 just were interested in local programming. On our president's stimulus plan, a 21 thought occurred to me the other day and it 22 23 was mentioned by another speaker here, sewer 24 and water separation should be part of our 25 shovel ready economic stimulus package

eligible for money and at over \$100 million to separate these, the sewer and the drainage water, I think that would be a very meritorious cause to spend that money on and try an acquire money for 100 million dollars. 5	gave all of his money away and described

himself as a poor millionaire with a hammer and he accepted a \$15,000 a year job which he carried for six years. It's kind of a big loss. I know a lot of people in this area don't know who he is, but people around the country know who he is and he was a very, very important man and he did an awful lot by helping homeless and helping people who couldn't afford to buy homes.

I'd like to ask a question of council, I hope somebody can come up with an answer, it doesn't have to be tonight, but I'd like to know how many KOZ's we've had in the past ten years, how many of them are still in existence and just what they were supposed to accomplish.

And secondly, I would like to know how many jobs, I'm talking about new jobs that were created by these KOZ's, I'm not talking about transferring from Department A

to Department B, from Building A to Building
B, I'm talking about new jobs which the
KOZ's are supposed to create, and I think it
would be behoove Mr. Burke if he came back
and he addressed this council publically and

let the rest of the city know exactly what he has in mind because I think very, very seriously we do not need another KOZ in this town. We need to clamp down on the ones we had, collect the money that's owed, I'm sure there is a lot of people out there that owe money on these KOZ's, and I recall one particular business last year that was mentioned as a KOZ and some of their tenants came up here and asked for loans and they were denied, but I think this is a tightening of the belts that we need to look at.

We talk about blight in this city,

demolished, and I'm not trying to make light
of it, but I think we can save an awful lot
of money if we can take all of these
buildings which we are knocking down, make
them into compost and fill the potholes we

have in the city we would save an awful lot
of money, and I would like to see nothing
better than DPW and Mayor Doherty out here
with shovels filling these holes. We got a
big one on Prospect. The street was closed
down for guite while. I think it's still

19	In 1994 there was a landmark study

In 1994 there was a landmark study by J. Curtis Barone concerning fire department staffing. It indicated that four-man engines will pay for themselves with the savings from injury reduction of firefighters. The four-man staffings lead to quote: A 23.8 percent reduction in

injuries, a 25 percent reduction in time
lost injuries, and a 71 percent decrease in
time loss due to injury when compared to
three-person staffing.

These are significant decreases that should be considered with the average firefighter overexertion injury and costing \$10,000. Obviously, when we are dealing

9	with the economics of Scranton this is
10	something that we need to consider.
11	When you are dealing with
12	firefighter injuries in general, the
13	National Institute of Standards and
14	Technology averaged that annually
15	firefighter injuries cost 2.7 billion to 7.8
16	billion estimate. That's for 80,000
17	firefighters injured every year.
18	Obviously, I'm not going to tell you
19	that we need to take care of firefighters
20	for injuries from an ethical point of view.
21	If the mayor does not want to take care of
22	his firefighters certainly because it is the
23	ethical thing to do, then perhaps he needs
24	to consider that it is the economic thing to
25	do, and cutting firefighters staffing is not

1	the economic smart thing to do. Thank you

chance or mortality as each minute goes by,
so it is very important and, Mrs. Gatelli,
if you are worrying about anyone having a
problem here right now down the hall there
is always eight emergency medical
technicians on duty so we could be here
immediately with just a quick phone call, so
if you really did want to get CPR trained
some of our guys are CPR instructors. I'm

not sure if they do it through Red Cross
anymore. I haven't been an CPR instructor
since 1988 or '89 when the ambulance went
out of business, but we do have instructors
and we would be happy to instruct anybody if
they would like to get certified in CPR.

And one more comment I would like to make, I mean, usually every week there is someone talking about safety or something, I would be happy to sit here, but it's not exactly my place. As you see, you know, the

city want to have sole discretion over
everything in our department, apparently we
are not going to be getting involved in too
many things anymore because we never had
control, but at least we were allowed at
times when they messed something up to
correct it, but, you know, I think they are
just going to be calling the shots from this
point on. But the point I'm trying to make
is we have a chief that just got a \$13,000
last year, maybe you should have him here
periodically to answer questions, you know?
Where is ADD's and things like safety

20	My name is Nancy Krake, and first of all I
21	would like to tell everyone that the
22	delinquent city real estate taxes are still
23	in the Treasurer's Office until April 1. If
24	you are able to pay them you will avoid the
25	25 percent that Northeast Credit is allowed

Τ	to charge, which does not go to the city, it
2	just stays with them. I have many
3	MS. GATELLI: Nancy, before you
4	start, do they throw the receipt book away?
5	MS. KRAKE: Oh, I'm sorry. I forget

	apparently had been told. She said they are
4	going down when, in fact, they have gone up.
5	And what I would like to ask you
6	right now is that if you would please supply
7	us with the total collections or
8	disbursements to the city for wage tax for
9	the last two years. I have very good reason
10	for asking this question, so I hope we would
11	be able to have those answers at next week's
12	meeting. We can see from
13	MS. GATELLI: Would you repeat that?
14	MS. KRAKE: Yes. The total

collections or disbursements to the city for

16	wage tax for the last two years.
17	MS. GATELLI: 7 and 8, 2007 and 8?
18	MS. KRAKE: Yes. Now, if that's what
19	Mrs. Fanucci was referring to, those numbers
20	have gone up, they have gone up dramatically
21	since the FBI was investigating the Single
22	Tax Office.
23	MS. GATELLI: Yes, they have.
24	MS. KRAKE: People have come in
25	droves to pay their current year wage, not

their delinquent real estate, so those penalties you may have been assuming the money was effecting that did not.

And, Mr. McGoff, when you said it's punitive, it's hardly punitive and it's not, unfortunately, dependent on people that are slum landlords. All of that is untrue. I could go tax by tax by tax and give you a comparison, but what I know working there I know those things to not be true.

For instance, you also said they have only applied one of those penalties, I have a tax bill here, they applied \$75 lien fee, \$480 for opening the file and issue of legal demand letter. We had children in the

16	summer who wrote those out under my
17	direction for free. Preparing and filing of
18	liens, that's my job and the City
19	Treasurer's job, \$525. This is \$1,087 that
20	the person was forced to pay on a face value
21	tax of \$246. None of this went into the
22	city. It's not bringing any money to us and
23	it's certainly not stopping people from
24	being delinquent as you can see by the
25	figures.

I'm sorry that people aren't telling you the right things and I hope in the future you will look to amend that. I think it's very, very important to do so only because it's the right thing to do for people. They are suffering in these times.

I had much more to say, but I will continue to address all of the other things you missed last time, but I do have one thing I would like to say, with all of the Court cases and awards that have been coming down, I truly want to know why is it so difficult to fairly compensate our police and firefighters? These are the men and women who carry our greatest burden for us. Thank you.

17	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs. Krake.
18	MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening. Nelson
19	Ancherani, First Amendment Rights.
20	Yesterday, 2009, an arbitrator handed down
21	an opinion on the police 2008/2004 contract.

22	Back to the arbitration award, the
23	city was represented by Attorney Tim Reilly

city was represented by Attorney Tim Reilly, apparently he didn't like the award so he wrote a ten-page dissent. On the previous

1	arbitrator's award for 2003 to 2007 that is
2	in the Courts, he wrote a two-page
3	dissention, but he wrote partly, "On behalf
4	of the City of Scranton, I'm compelled to
5	dissent from the interest arbitration award
6	issued by arbitrators Edward J. O'Connell
7	and Thomas W. Jennings, Esquire. The
8	majority of our panel has advocated the
9	responsibility at arbitrators, has ignored
10	existing case law, including the
11	Municipalities Financial Recovery Act," a
12	bunch of numbers, "Act 47, the controlling
13	order of the Court of Common Pleas of
14	Lackawanna County dated January 15, 2008,
15	the Court order, and the current economic
16	condition of the financially distressed City
17	of Scranton."

My question to him is where did they advocate their responsibility? He also said, "The City of Scranton has been operating under a revised financial Recovery Plan since May 2002. The proposed award is blatantly inconsistent and violates the Recovery Plan that was adopted by the City pursuant to Act 47. Furthermore, the award

illegal ignores the Court order that expressly directed this panel to comply with the Recovery Plan."

What about the mayor violating the Recovery Plan and now it's to the tune of approximately 20 million cumulatively since 2002 through 2009? The attorney for the city against the firefighters, Ken Jaron, has submitted bills for \$259,000. The attorney for the city against the police O'Reilly's bill has to be at least the same or if I was a betting person I would bet it's much higher.

What I noticed during the hold dissent by Reilly, which is 10 pages, he never once mentioned that the city violated the revised Recovery Plan that he referred

In addition, the auditing firm forwarded on January 28, 2009, a timeline and list of required information to

Mr. Renda, city business administrator, in

order to issue the 2008 audit by May 31,

20 2009. And so the 2008 audit has begun.

On tonight's agenda Item 7-A appears

for final approval. It authorizes revision

of the existing traffic signal along 7th

Avenue and Providence Road at the

intersection with Munchak Way and Olive

Street, etcetera. The Ice Box wishes to construct a bank and possibly a Turkey Hill store on the front area of it's property.

As a result, a second traffic light would be installed approximately 100 yards from the existing light on Providence Road to help with access and exit of a new driveway on Providence Road for the Ice Box. Vehicles will no longer be allowed to cross in front of traffic on Olive Street when traveling toward Capouse Avenue, but can continue to enter as well as exit the off Olive Street driveway if heading towards 7th Avenue or Providence Road.

This stretch of road is dangerously congested every day during the opening and closing of Scranton High School. Before and after those times there is little traffic.

Scranton High School houses well over 2000

students, faculty, staff, and
administrators. The vehicular and
pedestrian traffic is already unsafe. There
are many young drivers entering and exiting
the high school and many students who walk
or meet their parents for rides in the

immediate vicinity. Teens often dart across
Providence Road towards their friends or
their rides and the frustration of drivers
is already unusually high. The legislation
would enable three traffic lights in the
distance from Scranton High School to just
past the Glider Diner.

Further, I have consulted with school officials and police officers regarding the Ice Box proposals and all were adamantly opposed. The additional traffic light and driveway will create even greater problems than are currently experienced. I cannot jeopardize the safety of students and parents of the Scranton High School community in this way.

And, in addition, the Ice Box owner still have not paid the city the \$600,000 for the land vacated by the old DPW. As

20	they look to expand and continue to enjoy a
21	KOZ, their lack of payment is shameful.
22	Thus, I will not be approving this
23	legislation.
24	I was also appalled to learn about
25	the sewage problem on North Garfield Avenue.

It seems the good news is that the house has been condemned and, consequently, all utilities would be shut off. Also, the frozen sewage was removed by the Sewer Authority and was taken to it's plant according to Mr. Brazil.

Council did not receive a copy of a report to NEPA containing proposed projects for inclusion in the stimulus package.

Mr. Brazil stated that the mayor is handling anything to do with the stimulus program, and tonight I learned from one of the council speakers that the mayor's focus appears to be the new South Side library, but I have seen too many problems in the last five years in all of the neighborhoods across this city and the answer has always been, "We can't do it, it's too expensive for the city to undertake, there is too much red tape and paperwork involved."

21 And so many of these problems
22 addressed and these are road problems,
23 infrastructure problems, and water and
24 sewage problems and I believe that my
25 colleagues and I should provide a list with

road infrastructure and water sewer projects to Mrs. Garvey so that a council list of proposed projects can be submitted to the mayor as soon as possible, and I would encourage city residents with serious road infrastructure, water or sewer problems, to write or call the mayor's office and insist on using an available funds from the stimulus package to be used in our city neighborhoods to address these long-standing problems, not to be used on an issue that was decided only by the mayor.

I also have citizens' requests for
the week. Oh, but, before that, I'm sorry,
there is something else I wanted to report
on. Council did receive an update from
Goodwill Industries regarding the North
Scranton Junior High School project, and I'd
like to read that letter to you since so
many citizens in the last year or two have

inquired about the progress of that
location. "Goodwill Industries and Pennrose
Properties have formed a partnership, North
Scranton Partnership, to acquire and develop
the building. The primary focus of the

development efforts are to stabilize the building, return the exterior to it's former elegance, and to rehabilitate the auditorium as the first phase of this development. The stabilization of the building includes replacement of the windows, an elevator shaft, and elevator canopy, electrical work and finishes.

The remediation of all unsafe and environmental conditions including the removal asbestos installation, asbestos floor tiles, asbestos caulking, lead painted windows, lead painted walls, PCV light ballasts and miscellaneous chemicals, drums, paints and inks was already completed.

The partnership endeavors to close on the remaining construction and permanent financing for this phase of the development, the rehabilitation of the auditorium of the bidding into a multiuse performance space.

This will include a 500 soat theatre space.

This will include a 500 seat theatre space

with backhouse space necessary for the production and staging of theatrical and musical performances. To this end, we have requested the first draw of funds from the Commonwealth's Commitment of Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program Funds. Once the state has released these funds, we will be able to finalize the design with architects and complete construction.

The state is reviewing the drawdown submission and confirming the matching funds provided for this project. Specifically, reviewing the value of the school as the match and we anxiously await their response to our request.

In addition to drawing down RACP funds, we are finalizing our agreements with other funders for this project. PNC has committed to act as the construction lender and purchaser of the historic tax credits for the project. We are eager to proceed to closing with PNC on these funding sources.

Once the Commonwealth has released the committed RICP funds, we will be in a

22	position to access these funding sources as
23	well. It is our goal to resume construction
24	in the first quarter of 2009."
25	So, it appears as if great progress
	105
1	has been made in terms of necessary
2	replacements and renovations, but the
3	remainder of the project appears to be
4	dependent upon funding.

19	traffic. Please address this problem ASAP.

Citizens complain that parking at courthouse square is it very difficult due to snow and ice banks. One city resident was stuck while parked at a meter, so the resident called the DPW who directed him to call city council since employees have no overtime and, hence, no machines on the road to handle snow and ice problems. Now, again, according to Mr. Brazil the DPW does, in fact, have overtime, so if those who respond to calls at the DPW are making such statements to city residents I would ask them to stop, please, and handle the problem appropriately.

I would like to thank the DPW for the great work they performed cleaning the sidewalks on the bridge on Olive Street nature Scranton High School. I know that at least two other bridge walkways were also cleaned successfully. Great job to the DPW

23	employees. And the condemned house at 615
24	Beech Street was also taken care of.
25	Utilities were shut off and it was being

1	boarded up yesterday. That's another great
2	job done.
3	Now, in response to some questions
4	posed by a speaker earlier this evening, I

9	investigate that with Mrs. Aebli and maybe
10	sure some of that money can go to some of
11	the other neighborhoods.
12	It's interesting that people seem to
13	want to criticize that the money is going to
14	South Scranton, particularly because I'm on
15	city council and that's my neighborhood.
16	Yes, it is my neighborhood and I fought
17	there for 28 years of my life and I will
18	continue to do so. I have said it from this
19	podium many times, if anyone else wants to
20	start an Elm Street Program just call and we
21	will assist you in starting any type of
22	rehabilitation program also in your
23	neighborhood.
24	So, you know, if the allegations are

being made that other neighborhoods aren't

1	being helped, all of the neighborhoods are
2	being helped and they will continue to be
3	helped as long as I sit on this council. I
4	would never deny a neighborhood from getting
5	what they deserve. That's the heart of the
6	city and that's where my attention would
7	focus.
8	And I will continue to fight the
9	blight, I will continue to request houses
10	being demolished because grass is better
11	than what lives next to most of these people
12	in these slum houses. Just ask any person
13	living on the block, "Do you want the house
14	there or would you like to see tall grass?"
15	And I'll guarantee you every time
16	they will say, "Put the grass there. We
17	will cut it."
18	Because some of these homes cause
19	nothing about heartaches for the neighbors,
20	and I'm going to stick to that and that's
21	where my focus is and always has been the
22	blight in the neighborhoods, and that's
23	where it will stay.
24	What else did I have to say? I
25	don't want to make it too lengthy. I think

1 that's it.

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2 MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Fanucci?

MS. FANUCCI: Okay, if we can write a letter one of the speakers that got up tonight and asked a few questions that I think we should look into, how many jobs were created with the KOZ, if we can send that to find out, and also how much money will be coming in after the first waive of the payments start? I'd like to know exactly how much money taxpayer money was created. And also when or if we do approve one project at a time I'd like to know do other projects just automatically get approval or does it have to come on a first come first serve basis and we have to go on each project because I don't believe that it's a blanket, but I want to make sure, and that was the first letter.

Oh, so let's talk about how fun are meetings are. No, I'm kidding. In light of Kathryn Simmons tonight and Joy Williams and people getting up here and speaking and taking over the forum and sending letters to other people claiming that this is not for

everyone to come, it's ridiculous. It's no secret and Bill Jackowitz has been telling us that we are in the midst of the second worst economic crisis in the last 100 years, and since we are quoting people I'd like to quote, I'd like to make a quote, and funny that I can pull this off, but I can, I think it's time to go back to basics and as President Roosevelt said during our first economic crisis, there is nothing to fear but fear itself, and to use this forum and come up here and invoke fear and hostility and doom the only reason you do it is to pit citizen against citizen.

When people come up here and say
evil things and point out evil things to
anyone or anyone around it's to pit people
against people, and there's nothing we have
learned since this last election that
doesn't work anymore. Those days are over.
People are done with that. It's time to
move on and move forward and do the right
thing.

It has nothing to do with what people do for a living or what they have

done in the past for a living. It has to do with what's going on now. I don't believe people who are educated or not educated can't come up here and sit and make good council people. Why? Because it has to do with the work and what you are doing on a daily basis. I believe moms make great decisions and I believe doctors make great decisions, but to come up here and try to create havoc and constant chaos for someone's own benefit shows me that this is -- this is where you are going. You want -- you want havoc and chaos, so if you want to reap what you sow it's time to move on from that.

I also want to say that the tactics have no other purpose. There is no reason, you know, I have been writing these things down this whole time, choosing fear over hope is a problem and will be a problem forever. If you don't want to optimistic about what we are and where we are going and use your political or personal agendas, you are ruining the future of our city because we have a lot to offer. There is a lot

2	doing. I understand we have a long way to
3	go our problems weren't created in a week
4	and they certainly aren't going to cure
5	themselves in a week. There is no way that
6	unless you work hard and try to figure out
7	solutions that you are going to get
8	anywhere.
9	So next time speakers come up and,
10	Mr. Bergerhoff, yes, I'm speaking to you
11	directly, next time you come up here with
12	your
13	MR. BERGERHOFF: I wasn't
14	MS. FANUCCI: No, wait, with your
15	tactics of attack on everyone, which I have
16	to say it's the first speaker that has come
17	up and actually went down the line, so it
18	does
19	MR. BERGERHOFF: That goes in
20	MR. MCGOFF: Excuse me.
21	MR. BERGERHOFF: She is directing
22	comments toward me, sir
23	MR. MCGOFF: Excuse me.
24	MR. BERGERHOFF: She gets the last
25	word I don't know?

MS. FANUCCI: Actually, you directed
comments towards me and I'm actually
responding to the comments you made, so if
you don't want to answers don't make
comments during your speech.
MR. BERGERHOFF: Well, that's fine.
Make legitimate comments
(Mr. McGoff repeatedly bangs the gavel.)
MS. FANUCCI: Just keep spewing your
hate and we will see how far you go. That's
all I have to say. That's all I have.
Thank you.
MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs. Fanucci.
MR. COURTRIGHT: Okay, I'm going to
try to answer some of your questions,
Mr. Bergerhoff. As far as laughing about
the steps in front of city hall, I know you
haven't been here much, but Jeannie Suetta
when she comes up to the podium, I kind of
know her and I wasn't laughing about what
she said, I was laughing with Jeannie. I
think if you speak to her she will explain
that to you. We have a we don't have
anything going on between us, but I have

1 to move on from that one.

2 What I meant when I was talking

about that we can't get some things done,
and I have said this in the past, and I'll
try to explain it, either myself or anyone
else here on city council we have no
authority to tell a clerical worker, a DPW
worker, a police officer or a firefighter
what to do. We simply don't have that
power.

You know, I think sometimes when we request we might get it done a little bit quicker maybe than the average person, some of us have a little bit more clout than others, and that's the way it goes, but I think that's what I meant -- or I know what's that I meant. I think it's possibly what you have might have been referring to, if not, maybe next week you can correct me if I'm wrong me, but I don't know, there must be something wrong with me, but I kind of like how you went down the line at all of us.

The ADD's, Kay, maybe if you can send a letter to Director Hayes and ask him

what has become of the ADD's that we had in the police cars, does he have any plans on

3	replacing them and, if so, when? I've got
4	think that they don't have any plans of
5	replace them because I think it's must be
6	about two years now since we have seen them
7	in there.
8	As far as Oxygen tanks, I don't
9	recall us ever having Oxygen tanks in the
10	police cars.
11	MS. GATELLI: I think it would be
12	dangerous if they had an accident.
13	MR. COURTRIGHT: So I don't know if
14	they would do that, but I don't believe we
15	ever had them.
16	MS. GATELLI: Actually, in an
17	emergency with a cardiac victim nurses and
18	doctors don't have Oxygen.
19	MR. COURTRIGHT: Right.
20	MS. GATELLI: Because it's the heart
21	that has to be brought back.
22	MR. COURTRIGHT: I think that one
23	other thing, unfortunately, you know, I know
24	Mrs. Gatelli has stated that we have a lot
25	of trouble in South Side, but I think you

- 1 are pushing it to West Side.
- MS. GATELLI: I think so, too.
- 3 That's why I keep asking them, but nobody

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MR. COURTRIGHT: Here's what I got, I
got a call from somebody from the Times, not
Jeremy here, you guys keeps getting new
employees there and I don't know them all,
and he told me a statistic that I can't
remember the exact numbers, but he said as
far as armed robberies go that West Side is
number one, you know, all of the robberies
that they have had, so he said we have far
more robberies with weapons than we had last
year at this time and that the bulk of them
were in West Scranton, and I don't want to
misquote him, I think he said out of 11
armed robberies this year eight were in West
Scranton, but that figure could be wrong.

And if he asked if I was -- you know, how I felt about that. Am I surprised? No. I think we have all seen that coming that crime is rising. Am I upset? Yes. Am I upset it's getting closer to where I live? Absolutely. That's why

that we don't we need more, more police

officers, so maybe I'll asking Jeremy after

the meeting to go over who this gentleman is

that called me and where he got those stats

from because I wasn't aware of those, and

I'm usually pretty up on those, but I wasn't

aware. I was aware there was an increase,

but not the numbers he had told me.

And I'll ask, Kay, if you can just do two things. Kay, Elm Street coming out of South Scranton onto Washington Avenue, so at the corner of Elm and Washington, I have gotten some complaints that when they are coming down Elm Street, which would be heading west on Elm Street to turn left onto Washington Avenue they can't get any cars. They are looking to see if we can ask the engineer if he can take a look and see if it's possible to get an arrow for a left turn, I know that takes some doing, but if we can ask that gentlemen if he can take a look at it.

1	And I'll do this myself
2	maybe tomorrow when I call Mr. Brazil, at
3	Meridian and Luzerne Street a woman blew her
4	tire out there last night on a huge hole

right in front of the bridge, so I'll take
care of that one myself. And that's all I
have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you,

Mr. Courtright. In response to a number of things from this evening, and Mr. Jackowitz made mention of the article, a number of people made mention of the article that was in the paper today, and I thought there were a couple of interesting things in here that were mentioned. What I thought was interesting was that the number of people who have jobs as unchanged. What's changed is the fact that we are not creating jobs for those entering the work force, and the one John Syzmanski, PhD, professor of economics at Misericordia, it's not a job loss problem it's a job creation problem. And the focus, as he seems to indicate, should be as the creation of the jobs and preparation of a work force to take those

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jobs.

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2 The other thing I thought was
3 interesting, it says the only sector with a
4 significant gain over the year was education

5	and health services. At a time nobody, you
6	know, at one point in time teachers were,
7	you know, doing all kinds of things, I guess
8	maybe the education profession is now a good
9	thing to get into, I don't know, although, I
10	here that there are schools that are
11	considering laying people off, and obviously
12	health services which are needed, but I just
13	thought that was interesting.
14	But, I do agree with was said that
15	we are facing some difficult times and the
16	more opportunity we have to create jobs and
17	to keep people working, more significant and

more important it will be.

I did receive a letter from

Mr. Brazil, Mr. Jeff Brazil from DPW, a

couple of just brief comments that he made.

The snow removal policy, he says, "I would

like again to remind council that the school

bus routes are the first to be plowed, then

we plow the Colts bus routes, next would be

1	all	secondary	streets	and	lastly	the
2	coui	cts."				

I don't know that, you know, that there is much more detail to the snow removal policy, but that is what he replied

6 to me.

Second thing he mentioned was that
requests for stop signs, that all requests
for stop signs have been sent to the city
engineer for his review. That it's only
after the things are reviewed by the
engineer that, you know, then it's not up to
DPW to determine where stop signs are
are placed and not placed, so he is just
saying that, you know, any requests that
they get are sent to the engineer to be
looked at.

And the last thing he did mention was the snow on the bridges he said is being looked into and he, too, mentioned what somebody else did last week that the bridges in question are state-owned bridges and he claims the responsibility of PennDOT, but he says in the spirit of cooperation four of the bridges were cleared on January 31, so

that was Linden Street, Harrison Avenue,
River Street and Broadway.

In response to the things on the KOZ, I would like that at next week's caucus that we do in caucus discuss what Mr. Burke

6	presented to us last week and at least, you
7	know, have a discussion what we see would be
8	anything positive and negative about the
9	proposals.
10	As far as I can ascertain from
11	speaking with Mr. Burke and from his
12	presentation, we are not we are not being
13	asked to approve the extension of the KOZ's,
14	that needs to be done at the state level.
15	What they were asking for were letters, I
16	guess it's semantics, letters to accompany
17	their application for an extension for the
18	KOZ at Mr. Pleasant and the KOEZ at Mt.
19	Pleasant, letters saying that we are not
20	that we do I guess approve of them applying
21	for the extension. It would then be up to
22	the state to determine whether that
23	particular extension would be granted. We
24	as a council do not have the right or power
25	to extend the KOZ's. And I guess that's
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1	what we can discuss now wook what stone we
2	what we can discuss next week, what steps we
∠	want to take or do not want to take. So, I

would ask that, you know, next week's caucus 3 be somewhat devoted to that pursuit.

MS. GATELLI: And the stimulus 6 package.

7	MR. MCGOFF: Yes. Fine. I just want
8	to make sure we get we'll have a busy
9	caucus I guess.
10	I would also like that.
11	MS. GATELLI: Maybe we should have it
12	at a quarter of.
13	MS. FANUCCI: Yeah, we could.
14	MS. GATELLI: We have those two
15	things.
16	MR. MCGOFF: That would be fine.
17	We'll put that on the 5:45 caucus for next
18	week. I would like, Mrs. Evans brought up
19	the request about the audit for 2008, I
20	would like us to make a request to the
21	auditors on behalf of council that we
22	receive monthly reports concerning the
23	progress of the audit and any problems that
24	are deterring their progress.
25	MS. EVANS: We get that already.

MR. MCGOFF: Well, somewhat, but I
would just like to make it as a formal, you
know, that it's formally recognized by
council and by the auditors that they are
required to do that and also that then we
can respond to any problems that do occur.

7	MS. EVANS: I don't know anything to
8	do differently though.
9	MR. MCGOFF: I know.
10	MS. EVANS: They have already given
11	us every month.
12	MS. GATELLI: I don't know that
13	there is anything we can do differently.
14	MS. EVANS: Because we are not
15	MS. GATELLI: We are not in charge
16	of all of those other people, you know, it's
17	just it's just the way it is. We can't
18	control the other entities of when they get
19	their audit to us. You know, it's
20	unfortunate, but we are not on all on the
21	same fiscal calendar, etcetera.
22	MR. MCGOFF: Well, at least we can
23	MS. GATELLI: Expedite it.
24	Absolutely.
25	MR. MCGOFF: We can expedite it, we
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1	can place whatever pressure we need, you
2	know, we can to encourage people to be more
3	expeditious in their reporting.
4	And the last thing just in response
5	to some things that were said, I do disagree

7 believe that all the votes count, whether

with you, Mrs. Evans, on one point, I

they are positive, negative, in the
majority, in the minority, I think we on
council, and I believe I speak for everyone,
we all we all attempt to do what we think
is right. What we think is right may be
different and we may have differing
opinions, but it's only through those
differences of opinion that we can make
progress, and if we all agreed and there was
no disagreement then nothing would ever
change, and I think that I for one welcome
differing perspectives and an opportunity to
analyze and make judgments of things that I
had not considered, and while you may you
know, people may feel that those decisions
that I make aren't in their best interest,
they are, as I said, based on the believe
that I am trying to do what I think is right

1	and I believe that we all do that. And that
2	is all I have. Let's get to our agenda.

when I asked Attorney Minora to look into it he did and we can't require him to pay us anything, so that's all I have to say on that. And I will agree with Mrs. Evans, I also work at a school building and if it affected my school and my students I would feel the same way, so I will be voting with Mrs. Evans. MS. EVANS: Thank you. MR. MCGOFF: I don't see how this

MR. MCGOFF: I don't see how this traffic signal will affect traffic in any negative way. I think that the signal itself would be synchronized with the existing one. It would offer better access not only to the Ice Box, but also to riverfront, maybe that's a bias on my part since I spend sometime there, but I don't

see how -- I don't see how this is going to negatively impact traffic on Providence Road and the existing problems near the school, while there may be problems at arrival and dismissal, I don't see how a light is going to alter that in any way, whether it's going to help or hinder the problems that exist.

I think that as described to me the project that they have for the area in the

10	Ice Box is good and that changing it, this
11	has already been looked at by PennDOT and
12	approved, they saw no problems, and I
13	believe that it's a positive thing to do.
14	MS. EVANS: Well, the only thing I
15	could add is that I think that's going to be
16	a very tough sell to the students and their
17	parents that are traveling there to and from
18	their five days a week because really you
19	drive through there and you are holding your
20	breath and you are watching every direction
21	as you are moving because, you know, even in
22	some areas there aren't even sidewalks, so
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24	MS. GATELLI: And there is no lights
25	either at night.
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1	MS. EVANS: Right.
2	MR. MCGOFF: So another traffic light
3	might slow down traffic and be helpful.
4	MS. EVANS: Well, actually, we have
5	got a police officer who handles that one
6	traffic light every morning and decides, you
7	know, pretty much how long he is going to
8	let it run, so it's not actually, you know,

I don't know what they do, computerize it or

such, it's being controlled by a police officer. MS. GATELLI: Maybe in the interim we can have someone from the school district meet with the city engineer and PennDOT. I think that several years ago, and I know I'm going off the question, Mr. McGoff, but I'll trust that you will let me speak, there were people, and I know there was one person from council and they worked on a committee about all of the problems down at Scranton High School because it is a nightmare. The traffic is horrendous in and out of school, I'm surprised someone didn't get hurt yet. MS. EVANS: We have. There have been accidents.

MS. GATELLI: Yeah. Well, I'm not
surprised. So maybe, Mrs. Evans, that you
work there you can ask Mr. McGraw and then
we'll call, you know, Mr. Swanson and maybe
he can get somebody from PennDOT and they
can have a meeting and see what they can do
down there to help correct the problems that
exist their already and maybe this can be
part of it.

MS. EVANS: They already -- I know

11	the school district officials already met
12	with PennDOT because they had envisioned
13	opening up roads, giving alternative routes
14	in and out of the high school and PennDOT
15	refused it.
16	MR. MCGOFF: For the record a yes
17	vote would defeat 7-A or a yes vote would be
18	to defeat 7-A, a no vote would be approval
19	of 7-A. Roll call, please?
20	MR. COOLICAN: Mrs. Evans.
21	MS. EVANS: Yes.
22	MR. COOLICAN: Mrs. Gatelli.
23	MS. GATELLI. Yes.
24	MR. COOLICAN: Ms. Fanucci.
25	MS. FANUCCI: No.
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1	MD GOOT TOWN A CONTRACT
1	MR. COOLICAN: Mr. Courtright.

2 MR. COURTRIGHT: Yes.

3 MR. COOLICAN: Mr. McGoff.
