13	and that he will be unable to attend
14	tonight's public hearing and meeting due to

3	The civic participation, we'll do
4	three minutes for participation. Andy
5	Sbaraglia.
6	MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia,
7	citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonian.
8	I'd like to speak on the tax on the Kids
9	Swim Free Program that we put in for a grant
10	for. Could I approach?
11	MR. MCGOFF: Please. Mr. Sbaraglia,
12	could I have one for Mr. Courtright? I'll
13	put it in his box.
14	MR. SBARAGLIA: Sure. No problem.
15	In the past two years the Scranton
16	Lackawanna County Taxpayers' Association has
17	offered nine free swimming events for the
18	children 15 years old and younger at Nay Aug
19	Park. These swimming events remain to be
20	free due to the exclusive donations from
21	citizens, taxpayers or local business
22	owners. Due to their generosity on the day
23	of the event, all children 15 and under have
24	unlimited access to the pool and slide. In
25	this city all neighborhood pools are free

except Nay Aug Park that is located in the Hill Section, so for the children in the East Scranton section of the city that either need to pay \$3.00 a day or by your pass or to provide information to receive a free past to use the pool which sometimes leads to embarrassing or unsafely swims in the gorge. If you can help to keep this community program going, we would greatly appreciate it.

And we have really taken a lot, a lot of kids up there. The totals here are 1,114, but actually it's 1,500 kids have been able to swim at the park. This year was a bad year because of the whether, but still 400 children were allowed to swim up there. And we would like counsel to look at see if you can look favorable on our application for a grant for us. We do not charge any administration fee. Every penny we get in the grant will actually be given back to the city in the form of the fees we pay up at Nay Aug, so actually it's a win-win situation for the city and for the kids at the City of Scranton, so somewhere

1	along the line we hope you will look
2	favorable on that application. Thank you.
3	MR. MCGOFF: Ozzie Quinn.
4	MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn, Taxpayers'
5	Association. I'd like to ask a question,
6	how much is set aside for housing
7	rehabilitation throughout the City of
8	Scranton? If you go through our
9	neighborhoods there is a lot of homes that
10	need repairs and there is a lot people
11	because of our low income and the elderly
12	that need roofs, heating plans and whatnot.
13	Can you answer that?
14	MS. AEBLI: Mr. Quinn oh, I'm
15	sorry.
16	MR. QUINN: I'm sorry, go ahead.
17	MR. MCGOFF: You should address it to
18	council if you would like.
19	MR. QUINN: I think that there is a
20	dire need for housing rehabilitation, a
21	comprehensive housing rehabilitation and
22	what I see here is Lackawanna Housing is
23	going to do five rehabs. I mean, come on,
24	five rehabs you can do that in half a block.
25	You know, we got to do something about a

2	really going down. People can't afford
3	record it. Thank you.
4	MR. MCGOFF: That you, Mr. Quinn.
5	Marie Schumacher.
6	MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher,
7	city resident and member of the Taxpayers'
8	Association. I, too, would like to speak in
9	favor of more housing rehabilitation. There
10	is no money in this year's budget for
11	emergency utility assistance and I think
12	with all of the utilities going up it's
13	going to be needed this year more than ever
14	before, and I would also like if you could
15	rearrange the money so that the Kids Swim
16	Free Program could be funded. Thank you.
17	MR. MCGOFF: Phyllis Humphries.
18	Phyllis, this is the on this is a is
19	public hearing.
20	MS. HUMPHRIES: I know it's a public
21	hearing.
22	MS. FANUCCI: On the block grants.
23	MR. MCGOFF: It's on the block grants
24	only?
25	MS. HUMPHRIES: On the what?

2	MR. MCGOFF: Exactly.
3	MS. HUMPHRIES: And then could I
4	speak?
5	MS. GATELLI: Yeah, later on.
6	MS. HUMPHRIES: Okay, do your
7	blocking and all and I'm going to do my
8	blocking.
9	MR. MCGOFF: Lee Morgan.
10	MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.
11	I'd just like to basically say about the
12	same thing that Ozzie and the tax group has
13	said. We need a lot more money put into the
14	neighborhoods for rehab and I would really
15	like to see the Kids Swim Free Program be
16	funded and if possible I would like to see
17	some of the this money be spent for youth
18	programs in the city and I'd like to see a
19	council member try to draft something and
20	try to move some money in a way to help
21	fight vandalism and gang violence and all of
22	the other problems we have in the city, but
23	I really would like to see an awful lot of
24	money from OECD go into the neighborhoods
25	and as Ozzie said, now, there is a lot of

blocks with three or four or five condemned
properties in them and I think that if we

3	can move OECD money probably the bulk of it
4	into programs like that we could really do a
5	lot of good for the neighborhoods. Thank
6	you.
7	MR. MCGOFF: Jean Suetta.
8	MS. SUETTA: Jean Suetta. I think
9	you should have more money for the funding
10	and I think all kids should swim free. I
11	know when I was a kid if we had to pay to go
12	swimming we would be using the Lackawanna
13	River, which wasn't too good, so get the
14	kids to swim for nothing, all right? Thank
15	you.
16	MR. MCGOFF: Ron Ellman.
17	MR. ELLMAN: I'M on the other sheet.
18	I'm sorry. Anyone else?
19	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Ungvarski.
20	MR. UNGVARSKI: Good evening, City
21	Council. I also would like to speak on
22	behalf of the Kids Swim Free. It seems like
23	it's a win-win situation for the city. All
24	of this money that you grant to the Kids
25	Swim Free Program will come back

1 100 percent, in other words, you will grant
2 that to the Kids Swim Free Program and Kids

3 Swim Free Program will give it right back to 4 the Bureau of Recreation. There is not a penny lost. All of that money will come 5 6 back to the city and the kids will be able to swim free. MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? 8 MR. MCCLOE: Good evening. My name 9 is Brett McCloe. One of the things that I 10 11 think that is missing, if it's about economic development I think that we 12 13 hopefully if there are any grants out there that can help adults further their education 14 15 to actually develop an economy by upgrading 16 their existing -- their existing -- what 17 they know how to do, to try to develop more 18 managers out of the mini-marts or whatever. 19 Whatever it takes to bring incomes across up that will develop an economy. 20 21 I don't know if there are any grants 22 out there like that, but I know that there 23 are grants to help people go to school, but 24 I think there should be something more

citywide based because the city actually

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needs adults to upgrade on their whatever 1 2 specialty they have. Instead of always 3 looking for outside sources, maybe the city

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4	can do something or the OECD can do
5	something to help develop an economy from
6	the bottom up instead of just constantly
7	depending on entrepreneurs. Let's get the
8	workers to raise up to a certain level to
9	get us moving forward, actually not trying
10	to create well through millionaires or
11	hundred-thousandaires out of people, but
12	adding an extra dollar an hour to their pay.
13	It is creation of wealth. Thank you.
14	MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?
15	MS. FANUCCI: Linda, I have a
16	question for you. All of the evidence that
17	we received, would they all meet the
18	approval of being able to get this funding.
19	I want to make sure that, you know, this is
20	not something you know, people said in
21	the audience today, which is a great idea,
22	we need more housing programs, we need this,
23	we need that, but without applicants
24	actually asking for the funding it's not
25	something we can just create out of thin

air.

MS. AEBLI: Right.

MS. FANUCCI: So what the applicants

we have and our choices, are all in 4 5 compliance and would we be able to, you know, if we choose from this list is 6 7 everyone able to receive the funding? 8 MS. AEBLI: We receive over 100 9 applicants a year. Anyone can put application in, but that does not mean they 10 11 are eligible for federal dollars. The one 12 big thing you have to -- and I guess it's 13 more in the public service, and you have to 14 remember if we get \$3 million a year in CDBG 15 funding only 15 percent of that funding 16 could be used on public services, so you 17 times that, that's 450,000, the majority of 18 our public service goes to our neighborhood

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And if you are going to fund anyone new that we have never funded before in this day and age you have to -- especially with the public services, you have to be careful, they have to document everyone's income, so the organization has to have security in

police patrol. That is a public service.

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place. You are dealing with people's social security numbers, their income tax returns, their paystubs, so be very careful when you select anyone that there is security in

5	place and who is going to see oversee the
6	security of these incomes.
7	MS. FANUCCI: So we are looking at
8	\$450,000 out of service regardless
9	MS. AEBLI: Correct.
10	MS. FANUCCI: So that's going to be
11	split up, so if you are deciding on anything
12	that is not
13	MS. AEBLI: And I believe we have 300
14	in for neighborhood?
15	MS. FANUCCI: Right. We have 300 for
16	neighborhood; right.
17	MS. AEBLI: Correct, and if we have
18	ten police, I believe we have maybe six or
19	seven at the moment, but when we have ten
20	police it goes close to the 400, but we have
21	additional money from other years, so we
22	never run out of money.
23	MS. FANUCCI: Okay.
24	MR. MCGOFF: Prior to the meeting I
25	asked Mr. Mitchell if he would provide me

with a list of applicants who were not
eligible for funding. That may help us in
our determination if we know that they are
not eligible then we won't --

5	MS. FANUCCI: We won't if won't
6	be included in our decision.
7	MR. MCGOFF: They won't be included.
8	Rather than going back and forth constantly
9	with things that are eligible or not
10	eligible. That would help greatly.
11	MS. AEBLI: No problem.
12	MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? I now
13	declare this public hearing closed.
