MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? Fourth Order. Citizens participation. Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, 5-C, this administration desire another authority. Another authority means more lawyers, more government, a government inside of a government. We already got a government, but why at this time? Why would this legislation appear at this time and not before the election? It's obviously why

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because this is another slap to the taxpayer. We all know that Lackawanna College wants our library. We also know that the mayor want to build a new library. Now, why would he want to build a new library? It's obvious why. It's the same old story, money is generated from contracts. You just have to look at how much money the mayor received from the last election on the people who got bidding on iobs. There is no way -- I wish there was a way of collaborating, but you can't. Boscov's gave a lot of money to the mayor and the mayor signed for a loan to Boscov's. Rinaldi gave a lot of money to the mayor, they got a \$30 million project, and this goes on and on and on. It's a never ending story. What we need is less authorities, not more authorities. Every authority costs us money one way or another way and the worst part about it, they hardly ever come before the council.

You three members of this council will not be here come January. At this time this legislation should not be brought up,

It's true that at least you did something with the local pools, but we should be getting rid of authorities. The Scranton Parking Authority Theatre is Everybody knows it, but yet you defunct. predicate all these authorities. We don't need authorities, we need every piece of legislation coming before council, that way everybody in the city knows what council is doing. It's the only way you can actually get an intelligent election is to have them look at what council does and that's why I support 61 no matter who runs it -- or 19 whatever you want to call it now. believe in it. Even no matter who runs it.

At least people could see what's happening and know where to point their finger, it's the only way, but this thing shouldn't even be on the agenda.

January. It's obviously somebody hopes to

get it passed before the new council takes

over and it's a sad thing you would think so

little of your city that you would do that

MR. DUDEK: My name is Mike Dudek,
608 Depot Street, I live down there in the
Plot. First of all, congratulations to Mrs.
Evans and her team. We are going to be
looking forward to a very interesting
session of city council for the next ten
years and I hope to be able to help you with
that.

Now, as to Mr. Sbaraglia and I, we are probably on two different ends on the library. I'm a big supporter in our library system, many other people aren't, but he is 100 percent right on the mark that he comes up here to criticize the concept of an

authority. I did my master's thesis on authorities, specifically the SRA back in the 50's. An authority is a like a God and a general unto itself. There is no constitutional way to supervise it and to create a library authority in my view is the wrong way to go. I don't like the idea of an authority, we don't need to create an extra governmental layer to create a good library system. All we need to do is to work with the county to create is good library system. We to not need an extra layer of government.

At the very least, I would ask city council to table this thing until after the election is over. Let's get a new city council seated and let's take a very good long hard look at those proposals because the proposal on it's face really reeks to me, as far as I'm concerned, and I'm one of these people that would like to see a library built basically where the housing development was vacated because of, you know, the insufficient fire wall, I would like to see the library built there and I

would like to see a library, but I don't want to see a library authority.

A library authority could end up, you know, think of the SRA and the library authority moving to put something and I think you will begin to see that you can create a monster unto itself. It's a governmental level that I don't like to see created. I don't think we need it.

We do need library upgrades, we need facility services, yes, but let's do it the traditional way. Let's not create a new level of government that we are not to going to need and that could back to bite us in the butt thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening,
Scranton City Council. Bill Jackowitz,
South Scranton resident, member of the
Taxpayers' Association. Retired master
sergeant in the United States Air Force. I
would like to remind everybody that tomorrow
is Veteran's Day. There will be a ceremony
in front of the courthouse, Washington
Avenue side at 10:30 a.m. I encourage

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everyone who has the day off to attend the ceremony.

My sympathy to all of the warfighters who were killed at Ft. Hood, Texas, Afghanistan, Iraq and all other conflicts, also their families.

I would like to share something with They fold the flag. I watched hands you: fold the flag today. I watched and cried and went away. I wanted to, but could not stay, they fold more flags another day. They fold a flag for honor one, a fallen daughter, a fallen son, so careful so that when they are done it's fit to hand to the loved one. A hand is careful and so slow. no need to impress, no need for show. smooth each crease then fold and go, we honor them so all we know. Thirteen folds so careful and true. Thirteen folds before they're through. Thirteen folds they're asked to do before they hand the flag to You smooth and wrinkles so minute, your sacrifice none can refute. The grief and sadness can't dilute the meaning of your staunch salute. You turn and face their

loved ones there, you march to them so you can share. A sense of just how much we care, the warrior's lost that's hard to bear. A grateful nation still stands tall. A grateful nation loves them all. This flag is a symbol of the call, for freedom lives where great men and woman fall. I watched them fold a flag today. I watched and cried and went away. I wanted to, but I could not stay. They fold more flags another day.

Again, I ask the citizens of the Scranton and Lackawanna County to attend the Veteran's Day ceremony at 10:30 a.m., especially the elected officials including the newly elected officials. STUCKER: So they got to get that 16 working, so everything has been good up 17 where I live. 18 MR. COURTRIGHT: Very good. 19 MR. STUCKER: So I'm going out 20 tonight. I'm going into the hospital. 21 MR. COURTRIGHT: What? 22 MR. STUCKER: I'm going to be up in 23 the hospital, the CMC. 24 MR. COURTRIGHT: Why, what's wrong? 25 MR. SUTCKER: My knee.

1 MR. COURTRIGHT: Oh, not your heart 2 again. 3 MR. STUCKER: No. No, no. So I'm happy for you and Janet for getting in for 4 5 voting. MR. COURTRIGHT: Thanks, Jim. 6 MS. EVANS: Thank. 7 8 MR. STUCKER: And I voted for the 9 other guy, that judge, I don't know his 10 name. 11 MR. COURTRIGHT: Okay. 12 MR. STUCKER: But I voted for him. 13 MR. COURTRIGHT: All right, Jim. 14 MR. STUCKER: Hope you see me out in 15 two or three weeks, it might be longer. 16 MR. COURTRIGHT: Good luck. 17 MR. STUCKER: Okay. Bye. 18 MR. COURTRIGHT: By, Jim. 19 MR. MCGOFF: Joe Dwyer. MR. DWYER: Good evening, members of 20 21 city council and community. I want to 22 congratulate Mr. Courtright and Ms. Evans on 23 their elections and I wish you a grand four 24 years, and I'm sorry that Mrs. Fanucci that 25 you didn't make it in.

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MS. FANUCCI: Thank you.

MR. DWYER: I hope you continue your activism and continue with your good works.

MS. FANUCCI: Thank you very much.

MR. DWYER: You are welcome. I would like to share with you an accounting that I had with Malena Doherty from the Community Development Department. I went to her looking for help for a housing for girls, single girls who were living in the campus along the valley, and I was really shocked and surprised that didn't even know what she was talking about. I quizzed her on the shelters and how many beds were available for women in this community to stay in for the homeless. She had no clue. In fact. she gave me so much misinformation she didn't know whether she was coming or going and she became real belligerent over the phone and so I just said that was enough.

So now with that, when I found out it wasn't going to be of any help going there, and Mayor Connors suggested I go talk with her and I thought okay and --

MS. FANUCCI: Who is this?

. .

MR. DWYER: I tried, but that door didn't work, so I met with a couple of ministers in the community and their outpouring was so great that we decided that it's going to be such a difficult time finding housing we are going to work with the camps the way they are, so we have started collecting kerosene heaters and bringing them to the people that are living in those encampments.

The first camp that we brought a kerosene heater to the people just fell to their knees and started crying because they didn't have any heat other than what they were getting out of the wood they were getting out of the woods and this made their life so much easier. They were so humbled by our gift and so moved they didn't even want to receive it, they just left it in the box. We returned later that evening with kerosene fuel to heat that unit and they still had it in the box because it was like Christmas to them. They received a gift that nobody ever offered them before.

So I'm asking if anybody has any

kerosene heaters that are not using if they would either bring them to the Greenridge Assembly of God Church or their own church and let us know they have them available. We would be more than happy to distribute them.

I would also ask if we can get an accounting of what the Community Development is using the homeless and stimulus monies for other than that one pet project where they wasted \$300,000 on a house for a family that only wanted an upgrade in their living conditions. There wasn't a family that received that house, did not need a house, they just wanted an upgrade and they got one and they got a beautiful one.

Also, I had some wonderful success with HUD. We are going to meet with them and they are going to show us because we didn't have any luck here in our own community, so that is good.

And what else can I say? I am appalled with what our county commissioners just did with the medical care provider that's supposedly providing medical care

1 over at the prison. It is ashame that the 2 they passed that contract and I will ask for 3 a forensic audit of Dr. Zaloga's personal practice as well as the medical care that he 4 5 is providing over at the prison because what he claims he is not doing. 6 The service is 7 not there. With that, I thank you for your 8 time. 9 MR. MCGOFF: Les Spindler. 10 MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Council. 11 Les Spindler. As of last Tuesday, happy 12 Scranton resident. Mrs. Evans. 13 congratulations to you and Pat Rogan and 14 Frank Joyce on your great victory. MS. EVANS: Thank you. 15 16 MR. SPINDLER: And also you, 17 Mr. Courtright, although, it would have 18 tough for you to lose to yourself. 19 MR. COURTRIGHT: I didn't hear you. 20 MR. SPINDLER: It would have been 21 tough for you to lose to yourself. 22 MR. COURTRIGHT: Oh, yeah. 23 MR. SPINDLER: I think the people 24 made a statement last Tuesday that they are 25 tired of Chris Doherty's politics in this

city. They don't like the direction the city is going and finally after eight years they won't put up with anymore of Chris Doherty's BS, that's borrowing and spending, I think the people finally made a statement that we are going to put a council in there that will hold Chris Doherty's feet to the fire, and I hope they do it.

And they also made another statement, Mr. Courtright, being that you were running unopposed and you got more votes than I believe else in the whole election, and I think that sends a statement that people are very unhappy with what's going on in the tax office and good luck in your job and I think you are going to need it.

18	MS. SPINDLER: And threatening his
19	girlfriend with a gun that wasn't
20	registered?
21	MS. GATELLI: He shouldn't lose his
22	job for that.
23	MR. SPINDLER: He threatened his
24	girlfriend with a gun that wasn't
25	registered.

MS. GATELLI: Oh, come on, Les. You can't say things like that.

MR. SPINDLER: The Doherty newsletter will report it's a fact. Moving on, last week Mike Dudek said about public safety director about New York City not having one, I agree with him and I have said that years ago that PEL wouldn't let Mayor Connors have one, but they let Chris Doherty have one, so I think that's one cut we can make in next year's budget, get rid of the public safety director.

Next, again, the city is fighting another arbitration loss and the Doherty newsletter says that it's -- I have to get my glasses on -- the contract violates the Recovery Plan, but they didn't print about Chris Doherty violating his own recovery plan with huge raises to the crony hires he makes.

Mr. Courtright, I wonder if you could answer this question, I heard something. Is that true that on the midnight shift that if the police officers give out a certain amount of tickets they

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get four hours off?

MR. COURTRIGHT: Um, I have heard that rumor. I don't know for a fact it's I will be speaking with Captain true. Graziano about that, I have heard that rumor, and I can't confirm or it.

MR. SPINDLER: Thank you. Another thing, I want to talk about Chief Elliott still and what he did to those two police officers, the two policewomen, who I know personally, these women are wives and mothers and how he treats them is inexcusable. He is an embarrassment to our police officer force, an embarrassment to the city, and like I said, he should resign or be fired.

And lastly, I couldn't believe my eyes last Thursday on Channel 16, Chris Doherty was on "Does It Really Work" segment and they were testing a Riddex pest control device. If you plug in the electric device it gets rid of pests. Well, they plugged it in and it didn't work, the mayor was still there. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

The first thing I have here is this library authority. I don't know if council is going to vote to approve that, but in my own opinion I just can't -- I really can't see it. You know, I really enjoyed sitting down with that editorial writer for the Times and if there is anything that everybody agreed with, including him, the city can't meet it's debt obligations and we are creating another authority. I just can't really understand why we aren't abolishing these authorities instead of creating them because

I mean, I really hope when the new council comes that they look at the city's debt, they look at the city's pension program to see maybe if it's time to hand it back over and hand it over to the state, maybe it's time to really think about bankruptcy. I'm really being honest here. I'm just wondering why are we even debating a Scranton Public Library Authority with all the nightmares we had and with a council that was afraid to use it's powers of

they are just an instrument for borrowing.

subpoena. I mean, I just -- I really can't understand how we can put this and how he could even assume that more borrowing is the better interest of the residents of this I tend to believe that Lackawanna College has the first option on the municipal -- the Scranton School District's building right across from the library and I think that was written into the agreement when they bought Central, so now if we are going to play games with an authority and we are going to create a library where are we taking the city? Don't you think we should be looking for answers to our long-term debt and to a lot of other problems this city has?

The shocking thing is we are not even talking about youth programs in the city or playground programs or remedial education programs and the shocking thing is that some of the members on this city council are school district employees. I mean, can we get some sense of reality here and try to move away from these authorities? Maybe we should consider abolishing them. I

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really can't come up with any good reason to keep them going at all.

I mean, Andy Sbaraglia talked about the Parking Authority, but I can't really say the Sewer Authority has done this city any justice either. I can't -- I really can't think of anything these authorities have done except become an instrument for So. I mean, I think it's really borrowing. time to really -- what I'd say to the next council is set yourselves and get ready to face the real problems that this city faces instead of shifting money from one account to the another, stop looking for quick fixes for borrowing money. The last thing we need is one team against another team. We need a little cooperation and I'm not sure if the mayor will cooperate, and to be bluntly honest, I'm not sure that council will cooperate because we have had these problems for a long time and everybody has talked about saving us you.

But, I mean, as far as this library authority it's just ridiculous. How much borrowing can the residents of this city

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sustain? They can't sustain the debt load we have now. Somebody needs to pack the PEL luggage for them and send them on a little journey, and this city really needs to consider bankruptcy. Look what's going to happen to Dunmore here. They are talking about 11 percent rate increase in taxes and then people are making promises about no more 25 tax increases, and what I'd like to ask this council is how are you going to fund the city's debt without money? I don't understand it and then people are talking about paving roads and with when money? What money does this city possess that we can really do anything? You know, I hope some day that somebody would say something. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Marie Schumacher.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, Marie Schumacher, resident and member of the Taxpayers' Association. I'm here also to speak on 5-C. The fifth "whereas" states, in quotes, The trustees of the Scranton; Public Library have recommended that a new municipal authority be created in accordance

with the terms in the Pennsylvania Municipal Authorities Act for the purpose of owning and operating public libraries in the city of Scranton."

I have personally attended the last several meetings of the library board of trustees and there was no, I repeat no mention of creating a library authority.

The next scheduled meeting was announced to be a combined November/December meeting to be held on 12-3.

In your packet of backup, you should have minutes of an emergency board meeting giving approval for Scranton City Council to create this new authority. This means the fifth whereas I read is an out and out lie. The board did not recommend this creation. Now, what I might ask, if I didn't already surmise the answer, what is the emergency the library didn't advertise this special meeting which would have allowed public input? Were life and limb at risk? Certainly not.

I submit the emergency was more likely ramming this ordinance through

council before the new majority takes control. Recall, if you will, the last time the city property was transferred to an authority. That property was the Schmidt Sports Complex in South Scranton. What happened to that property? It was sold. Do we want the Albright Library sold? No. My answer is no, a thousand times no.

A number of other questions are raised by this ordinance such as: One, the Silkman House is not a library and has not been for several years. That building is occupied by the Lackawanna River Corridor Association. According to the business administrator, though the city owns that property there is no lease with LRCA and LRCA pays no rent. A new furnace is to be installed using stimulus funds and we taxpayers pay the insurance on this nonlibrary library, so why is it being transferred to a library authority? Is to be sold perhaps for a dollar?

The fifth whereas states, "The new authority is created for the purpose of owning and operating public libraries in the

City of Scranton."

Operating funds currently come from a number of sources including the county.

They have agreed to fund operations of an authority or will property taxes be increased to pay for the operation of this authority. In the current structure, areas outside of the City of Scranton are serviced by a bookmobile, including all of the Wyoming County. Will these services cease outside of city limits and will the county cut back funds for nonservice of areas within Lackawanna County but outside of the city limits?

The fourth whereas states, "A portion of the deed reads: The management and control above-provided for maybe changed at any time to conform to any general laws passed by the Commonwealth regulating free public libraries."

I would like the number of this bill, as I don't believe it exists. I believe this to be a backdoor maneuver which will allow the funds currently held by the board of trustees to be used for building a

new library outside of central city. The county is already on record as saying they are not supporting operations of another library in the City of Scranton, so that means funds would have to come from the city's operating budget and there are higher priorities such as reducing the debt. This authority could also borrow and we the taxpayers would be stuck with yet more debt.

Finally for tonight, but there is plenty more for next week, it's bad enough the mayor want to give more power to appointees and take it away from our duly elected council, but five, half of the ten members of this authority, don't even live in the city. Three of these outside terms wouldn't expire for five or six years and two would expire in 2011. This should be defeated tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Sam Patilla.

MR. PATILLA: Good evening, Mrs.

Evans and Mr. Courtright. I'm going to hold my congratulations because the real job starts now, so the people in the audience and those of us listening, I don't see ECTV,

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but those listening out there in television land, the new people's council are really going to need your help now because we have a long road to travel and it's not going to be an easy one.

I come before Council to speak on 5-C. Now, it says here in the literature that it's the intention and desire of Scranton City Council to form this library authority and my personal feelings and the history of the authorities in this city we don't need this. We truly don't, you know, we have got more pressing needs, the police and fire departments, the debt. attention should be focusing on reducing that debt and settling those contract disputes with the fire and police organizations. We don't need another authority, and if this resolution isn't defeated, you know, as an Afro-American male, as a man who served this country as a member of the United States Marine Corp, as a resident of the Scranton, as a resident of South Scranton, as a patron of the library authority, if this authority is created I

want on this authority.

Just like Marie stated, a lot of people that are involved with this, these authorities, don't even live in this city. They could care less about our finances and wether we're in the black or whether we're in the red. We need honest Scrantonians, new and old, who actually have the city's best interest at heart manning the firing line. We need people who are going to work to get Scranton back on the road to recovery so she can hold her head high among the other municipalities in the Commonwealth, all right?

This is nothing but a dog and pony show. You know, it shouldn't even have been entered into this agenda. There is no reason, no reason that anybody sitting on council give me - that will explain why we need this authority, especially in hindsight knowing that the county is already stating on the record they are not going to help finance this, all right, because we actually don't need it. Like I stated, I go to the library. I'm a patron of the library. It's

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perfectly situated where it is so that everybody within this city can utilize it's services. We don't need a special library in that part of Scranton, we don't need this over here. We need to work with what we got, correct the mistakes that we made in the past so we don't go down this path again.

This whole country is in a tailspin, all right? Where are you going to find the money to fund not only the creation of a new library, but this authority. We don't need bigger government. The times that I come and spoke you have always heard me say, reduce government, reduce government, reduce Those are the type of decisions government. that we need from our elected and appointed officials, the hard decision that's going to help just not a certain section of Scranton or this individual, but the city as a whole, the majority of the city to progress and move forward.

I don't know if I have to go to the Federal Courthouse to seek relief there, but like I said before, as a Scrantonian, as a

taxpayer, a resident of this city, as a disabled individual, as a former marine, if this authority is created I want to be on that authority because we need watchdogs in every department, every authority. We need people who are going to hold our elected and appointed officials to the fire to make sure they are making decisions that are going to benefit this city and not just certain sects, not just certain individuals. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: AJ Munchak.

MR. MUNCHAK: AJ Munchak, Scranton resident. I have heard a lot of the -- excuse me, for my foggy voice, a lot of the previous speakers, some are well-informed and some weren't and I'm here tonight to address what the law is regarding the authority.

Now, I don't know anything about the timing of this before or after the election, I have nothing to do with that and I don't know how the appointees will be made to this authority, but in researching this with the members the Lackawanna library system

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authority, the purpose of this is to convey the title for those three buildings from the city to a board.

Now, what you may not know is that the library up in Taylor, up in Abington, Mid-Valley, they all have their separate boards, they own buildings, and there is a reason for that. The reason being that the city cannot sell it as it is right now, it has to be given or sold, but given to an authority. That allows the authority, and I believe that they are nonpaid members, at least the other ones are so it shouldn't increase any costs, one of the reasons is that the Albright Memorial building is underinsured. They can only insure for \$2 million, and speaking with the director when the board takes over, and I know this for a fact, it could be insured for what it's worth 10 to 15 million dollars as it should be, but \$2 million won't even cover the stained glass as it was told to me.

Now, I have gotten calls this past weekend, particularly this morning, people are worried that f this is conveyed to an

authority South Scranton library is going to be built. Well, that may be true, but it's not going to happen in the near future.

Governor Doherty came into our office in the spring and asked for a tax increase.

MR. MCGOFF: Mayor Doherty?

MR. MUNCHAK: Governor want to be, wanna be governor. Did I say governor? Want to be governor, and he asked the three commissioners, if you remember I came here on that, to increase the library tax and we are not doing it. We can't do it. It won't be done next year, in 11, in 12 and 13, there is no room for that. And, as you know, the state has cut the library funding mercifully, unbelievable. So there won't be any tax increase.

Now, some of you mentioned in here, and I respect everybody's opinion that the authority could go out and borrow money.

They can't. They won't -- they can't go to a bank and say, "We want \$20 million for a new library," because they will need council's approval and they will need the

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approval of Lackawanna County. No authority can borrow the money by themselves because the first question a banker is going to ask, "Well, how are you going to pay it back?"

They can't raise taxes, the authority itself, it's got to be the municipality or the governing body that controls that particular operation, so don't worry about a tax increase, don't worry about the authority going out and borrowing money, they can't do it. I don't know anything about the timing, that's another thing, but I just want people to remember that when you have that quote/unquote 14 million tax increase, the famous 48 percent, 14 mils, included in that was an arts and culture fee, included in that was a one mil raise for the library fee tax because, as you know, the bookmobile was down, the hours were cut and what with the arts and culture fee we also gave, we being my administration, it was Bob Cordaro's idea, by the way, he never gets enough credit, we gave \$250,000 to the Everhart who was closing; we gave \$250,000 to the Cultural

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Center which was falling apart; and we gave an additional \$250,000 to the library system, and that has continued and my colleagues have continued it now.

Without that money, without that extra money your library is going to close. Right now the City of Scranton only has two. Does it need a new library? Absolutely. No question about it. They are bursting at the seams over at Albright, but there is no money now or in the immediate future to build one, so I know you don't like authorities, but this time it's necessary, and your council now is reading this into law, the next council, obviously, will be approached by whatever, and I don't know how the determination is going to be as far as appointments, but there can't be any funding and there can't be any tax increase without city council imposing a tax or without Lackawanna County increasing your taxes, and I can tell you from the county it's not going to happen. So I don't know if you have any questions or anything, but that's all I have to say.

been?"

I have been unhappy so I'm not going to pick
on my beloved mayor tonight. I quit
watching Channel 16 months ago because they
just don't seem to talk about Scranton
anymore. You know, we don't have a
newspaper. If you can't read the truth in a

paper there is no sense reading it so I don't read the paper very good. I read the -- you know, peruse it real fast, but Wednesday which was an important day to me for news, I put 16 on and I watched it for 19 minutes, this was after the elections, finally they mentioned a new flag pole at one of the schools, I think it was Morrison or something, then they jabbered in the end, they never said a word about the elections. You know, when you watch it they talk about Wilkes-Barre and Williamsport and Stroudsburg, I don't know why they don't talk about Scranton anymore. That -- this isn't right.

I try to watch Mr. Snedeker in the morning to see what the weather is going to be and then Jackie is jumping around trying ask 16 again and when she talks it's like getting a tooth pulled without getting a shot or something, so I just quit watching it, but I can't understand why they are here in town and don't talk about Scranton. We ought to have some kind of outlet that for the people.

And again, I was going to say about the parking on the sidewalks, it's just impossible. I have left my house with the dog and I couldn't go a couple of blocks in either direction on either side of the street because of illegal parked cars and it's not -- like I said, it's not inconvenience, it's safety. You know, you try to walk this silly Bassett hound and he is pulling all over the place and he has no fear of cars, I don't belong in the street, I belong on the sidewalk. The cars don't belong in the sidewalk, I don't care what time of day it is.

Today, I went to my bank downtown on Spruce and the D.A.'s Office got -- they use the turn lane for their parking. You know, that's not right. I don't care -- I don't care whose car it is. Across the street was the same way that the jewelry store they think that their customer parking is the left-turn lane, and I seen the girl coming down the street, the ticket lady, and if you are double parked she doesn't do anything, but some poor guy that's shopping or went to

the dentist or something and he doesn't get back to the car in time they will get a ticket, but cars that are parked illegally like in the turn lane the first car or two, they don't get tickets.

You try to push a grocery cart out on Keyser Avenue and Gerrity's you have to go up four and five cars, they are bumper to bumper in the fire zone, and the policeman told me they can't go over there to give tickets when they have signs for saying "No Parking, fire zone."

If they started ticking, there was an article in the paper, I don't know, quite awhile ago, if they ticketed the people in this city that deserved it we probably wouldn't have any budget trouble.

And I got one other thing I want to talk about real quick, that's the little quads running all over the place, you know. It's just a matter of -- just a short time before one of these fools gets killed on North Main Avenue. I was watching them yesterday they must have been going 70 miles an hour racing down North Main, I don't

They were

know, 4:00. It wasn't dark out. 1 racing two boys, I don't know how old they 2 3 were, but they were racing up to the gas station up there because I was walking the 4 dog. You know, this busy traffic and here 5 is those kids on those quads, well, there is 6 7 some grownups ride them, I don't know. think they ought to be heavily fined and 8 9 confiscated and, you know, the owner's 10 fined. Enough is enough. There is one boy 11 that rides that thing, day and night, one, 12 two in the morning and he has no muffler on 13 it. 14 MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Ellman, your time 15 was up. 16 MR. ELLMAN: Oh, I'm sorry. 17 MR. MCGOFF: That's okay. Attorney 18 Scanlon is not as heavy on the button as 19 Attorney Minora. MR. ELLMAN: You should have the 20 21 sheep's hook. 22 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Mr. Dobrzyn. 23 MR. DOBRZYN: He said I need a 24 haircut. The nerve. I'm trying to beat Nancy back there. I'd also like to speak on 25

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5-C. Mr. Munchak made some interesting revelations, but I'm still skeptical, very skeptical of authorities and I don't trust the situation, and further comment if you go over there during the day during regular school sessions it's very difficult to get onto a computer or anything else with the kids from Lackawanna Junior College, so maybe sooner than swiping our library off of us why don't they consider building one of their own.

Last week on that -- the last meeting on that sewer, I was interested in what it would take to -- I would never say zero emissions, but near zero emissions because, you know, years back we are told that this was okay to put in a sewer system this way, and now it's not okay, and I'm wondering if five years down the line somebody will repeal some of the regulations or they will tighten regulations even further after we have tons of money invested into a sewage treatment plant, that they are current prescribed changes and so forth.

And I was walking out in the woods

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the other day and right below 307 on Moosic Street, right above Moosic Street going up to East Mountain there is some big dumps being formed there and some of it looks like the highway department, but there is also some other people dumping, so it looks terrible and once they defoliate the woods we have some invader species of bamboo coming in and once there is a defoliation that takes over and it's a real problem with the ecology, so I would love to see people stop dumping and maybe hopefully somebody some day will get caught at it. They should pay \$300 for every piece of garbage at the bottom of that hill. The mound will be on the left-hand side, I think it would be before -- before the turn to Elmhurst Boulevard, so it's something to look into because it's really bad. I mean, there is maybe 5 or 10 50-ton triaxials worth of dirt and construction debris, old concrete dumped there, and now there is refrigerators and rusted old washing machines appearing with a little pristine section of the woods.

It's really ashame that this stuff

starts to develop because it lays there for years and never goes away. Old tires, you name it, it's there.

The last time I was here I machined about tax exempts, and I would agree that maybe there is nothing you can do on the current ones that are here, but I would think that there should be something about future development here. There should be some kind of way of boxing them in or giving them as much as they are going to get and saying no more.

I talked with a Mr. Novasky at a taxpayers' meeting and I will have to contact him because he seemed to have knowledge of a college that bought the big old hotel and they were told not to, that this was it, you don't buy a hotel because it's not going to be tax exempt and my understanding was it wasn't tax exempt at that time. So, you know, at some point they really need to be told to build up and instead of out. Thank you and have a good evening.

MR. MCGOFF: Other speakers?

MS. RUGGERO: Hello. Good evening.

My names is Joseph Ruggero, Scranton resident, property taxpayer, income taxpayer and library taxpayer. As we know, the library funding, state funding, has been cut by a significant amount. Therefore, I believe it is necessary to have this authority and I stand any support of it. Thank you have a good evening.

MR. MCCLOE: Good evening. My name is Brett McCloe, Scranton taxpayer, homeowner. I would like to congratulate Mrs. Evans, Mr. Rogan, Mr. Joyce and Mr. Courtright on their victories in last week's election. I feel that this will begin to add stability to Scranton's new lease on life, a new focus on prosperity and a more pragmatic approach to city government.

The voters of this city showed overwhelming that so-called malcontents, crazies, doomers, did not, in fact, hijack this city council, but instead exposed a real problem in how we govern this city. It showed how you get to the land of progress matters. It showed that the citizens of

this city realize that the ends do not always justify the means. It showed that the people of this city were not against progress but could not swallow the vision, the debt and the waste associated with it.

It also showed that elected officials can no longer hide behind bureaucracy to coverup legislative mistakes or lapse in judgment. Citizens voted accordingly. I am sorry that there are those who are sad about the outcome of the elections for city council, but the citizens of this city won a very important battle, not for someone's generic version of progress, not for fiscal responsibility, the battle that was won was for ourselves, our values and our vision.

At no point in time in Scranton's history have the citizens ever this city had rapid use and access to information technology. No longer did we have to wait until the newspaper told us what to believe. No longer were we forced, bound or expected to do as we are told because of someone with religious, political or social standing. We

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had the ability to fact check every single word, every single statistic and every single balance sheet. We had the ability to share what we had learned, compare it, prove it or disprove it.

In the restaurants, at the fire stations, at the bus stops and on patrol, in the salons, at the water cooler and most importantly at the kitchen table is where the conversation were started. Here at this podium citizens of this city began their own journey in the progress of this city, and in the voting booths on November 3, 2009, is when citizens came to the end of one chapter and began to write another. A chapter based on progress that did not include buildings and swings, dog parks and coffee shops, the promise of \$90,000 a year jobs and expensive All are very nice, but not the progress on I'm talking about.

A chapter of progress forged out of the intangible, forged out of the courage to speak one's mind, forged out of the willingness to challenge the status quo.

This is the battle that was won. This is

the progress citizens who came to this podium were willing to be chastised for, sued for, made fun of, called names, interrupted, and is the reason why they were willing to take quite a beating in the local media.

Citizens should never forget or take for granted this victory. There still exists a very large and still growing bureaucracy totally void of common sense and conscience. It is the job of every citizen in filling those voids and on election day they did just that, but we cannot stop there. There is much work to be done individually on ourselves as well as on our society in order to change our local government because time and events did not and will not change who we are as a people. It's simply unfolds who we already were and what we are destined to become. Thank you.

MR. TALIMINI: Joe Talimini, city of Scranton. A couple of weeks ago or last week I believe it was we had a lady who came up here and told us that she was leaving Scranton because she had believed all the

propaganda about moving here, it was one of the places to do businesses and to live and she found the opposite.

Yesterday I was downtown, there was an elderly couple who had to park on Olive Street because all the meters on Washington Avenue across from Lackawanna College were tagged. They all had the orange bags on them, there was no place for those people to park. I guess last week we had the same problem with Lackawanna College homecoming which is all, you know, it's a great tradition to start, however, there is revenue just lost, I believe, unless Lackawanna is paying for that thing.

Same thing happens with the Cultural Center when they are a function the buses are parked all over of the place, the meters are bagged and there is no place for people to park, these are residents of the city.

But this elderly couple walked downtown and they had planned on moving here, from what I gather they stopped and chatted, and she asked me a question. She said, "Where is beautiful downtown

Scranton?"

And I said, "This is it."

And she said, "Well, from the time that we got off the sidewalk on the corner of Vine Street all the way down we either had to walk around people, we had to walk out in the road because the sidewalks were all blocked off," obviously, the national bird of New York City has now become the national city bird of Scranton, that's the crane, and they walked all the way down to Lackawanna Avenue and back. And she said to her husband, "This was your idea, and believe me, darling, if you are going to move here you are going to do it by yourself because all the brochures we read, all the nice things we have heard about Scranton, uh-huh, not from what I have seen I wouldn't move here."

And where are you going to drive if you can come downtown? Are you going to keep repairing tires or keep repairing tie rod, are you going to keep repairing cars? Little bumps here and there, which have not been taken care of since I have been here,

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and I don't think anything in the future is going to happen.

I would hope that this new council, if it does take place, will consider the fact that paving these streets is a very, very vital thing. I personally am tired of buying new tires. I am tired of having repairs done to my car from potholes that shouldn't be there to begin with. know when the last time was that this whole downtown area was paved, but there was a water main break on Vine Street, right at the corner of North Washington Avenue, and I guess the water company came in and repaired it and they paved it beautiful. Beautiful spot there. It's too bad they couldn't do the whole street, but it looks really good from what they did.

Now, I don't know why this city can't do it and I don't know why we don't have any money, but we have money for development, development, development, development. Well, thank God, hopefully this boutique city concept is going to go down the drain and it's going to be go pack

to being a bedroom community and possibly, just possibly, we can bring industry in here because there would be adequate housing, the roads will be suitable to drive on and people will be proud of their city once again.

I'd like to congratulate the winners from the election and to the losers of the election and those of you who are on your way out, you finally got your wish, no more hard work. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anybody else?

MS. KRAKE: Good evening, Council. I would like to congratulate Mrs. Evans and Mr. Courtright and also to thank everyone that made the effort to run, I know that takes a lot of lot of work. I'm here to speak on 5-C and the first sentence is, "Signifying the intention and desire of the Council of the City of Scranton to organize an authority."

I was wondering who requested this be put on as legislation?

MR. MCGOFF: Who on council approved or asked that it be put on the agenda?

MS. KRAKE: Yes. 1 MR. MCGOFF: I did. 2 3 MS. KRAKE: And did you write the legislation, Mr. McGoff? 4 MR. MCGOFF: No, I did not. 5 MS. KRAKE: Did the law department of 6 the City of Scranton write it? 7 8 MR. MCGOFF: I don't believe so. 9 MS. KRAKE: So it initiated with you 10 and then you had them write it or did it 11 initiate with them? 12 MR. MCGOFF: It was initiated by --I'm assuming by the administration. 13 14 MS. KRAKE: I see. That was my 15 question, because it's very misleading the 16 way this sentence reads, "It signifies the 17 intention and desire of the council of the 18 City of Scranton to organize an authority." 19 When in reality it should say the 20 administration, so you may want to change 21 that for the next reading. 22 My next part of this is after I 23 listened to everyone speak tonight, and 24 especially the gentleman that just simply 25 said one sentence because it was a great

loss that the state cut the funding to libraries, it's a huge loss. Someone very close to me is a librarian and it's her life and it's very sad. However, council because of Mayor Doherty's past record with the authorities needs to be extremely cautious for the taxpayers. Once he gets ahold of an authority there is no oversight from council, there is none of the municipal accounting practices which force accountability and transparency, so these are all valid gripes that the people have against having this become an authority.

It may be a very great way to help the library, but I do think there needs to be a lot of legwork to prevent the abuses of the past going forward. You all know what they are, you have all been here a long time, they need to be addressed. This may very well be the right way to go only it needs to be fixed so that they -- it cannot be abused.

In fact, it occurs to me, this is very -- probably wouldn't happen, but we have seen strange thing happen, if the

authority were to sell the library would that not force council to build one? Maybe you would have a seated council that would not want to borrow if the authority approached it, but now if the authority -- because that was part of what Mr. Munchak said, the purpose is to convey the title to the board that they go so far as to try and sell that, you are going to be forced to build a library, so there is a lot that needs to be considered before this gets passed and I hope council will do that. Thank you.

MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening. Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment Rights. First off, I would like to start out commenting on completion of the case going to Court as reported in the Slimes tabloid:

"Lawyers for the city argue that the new Scranton police union contract granting 45 percent pay increases through 2014 should not be allowed to stand."

I'm going to read in a part Bob

Martin, president of Lodge 2, FOP,

explaining the raise concept: I would like

to set the record state and clear up some of the misstatements in regard to the Labor dispute between the City of Scranton and the fine police officers in the fraternal order of police that represent these outstanding officers.

The Times-Tribune got it mostly wrong and now I'm hearing completely erroneous reports on WILK radio. First and foremost, in the 2008 arbitration award the wage increases are not 45 percent as portrayed by the city and Mr. Levine at the hearing. The actual award is for 44.8 percent with a vision that if there were any increases in the preceding award it would be deducted in equal amounts over the life of the 2008 through the 2014 contract.

We received the 7 1/2 percent wage increase from the Commonwealth Court order on February 6, 2009, which also included a statement that the city's Recovery Plan had not contained any language to prevent wage or personnel cost containment after 2005. So the actual number we are looking at now is 37.3 percent, so if you do the math over

the life of this dispute from 2002 through 2014 the wage increase would be 3.1 percent each year, not even a cost of living for most of these years.

Now, when you couple this with the fact that the mayor's staff, some of which received 10,000 to 15,000 for one year, city administration employees, DPW employees, received substantial pay increases and benefit improvements and the clerical employees also received wage I am profits since 2002.

This award hardly seems unreasonable. I must add, favorites got raises and approximately 50 new hires plus attorneys and consultants received over 20 million cumulatively since 2002. Police and fire got nothing from this mayor.

Now, onto the excerpts from the slimes: Scranton budget cuts inevitable and super majority irate against Doherty offers great theatre, but what of government?

Quote: If we could have more officers that would be great, the mayor said. He quickly added that when benefits

are added to the base salary each new officer costs the city about \$80,000, a number confirmed by Mr. Renda, he is speaking about the police. 80,000, that's 37,000 more man I make so that means Stu is getting \$122,000 a year when you add on the 37,000 to his 85,000 yearly salary and who also got a \$46,000 dollars increase in pay since he started working for the city in 2003.

I'm challenging Stu to show me where it costs \$80,000 for a police officer. The mayor talks about paving four to five miles of streets during his tenure as mayor. How many of those streets were paved by the utilities after tearing up the streets for the water main reconstruction?

Quote: The city has only 30 at-will workers, in other words, nonunionized management staff, he said. The balance of workers include 150 police, 150 firefighters and 110 public works and 60 clerical workers. Mr. Doherty said staff with salaries are defined by contract. That totals 500. Where are the other 48 workers?

There are 548 employees listed in this year's budget.

Quote: Things go up every year, he said. Health care gest more expensive, salaries increase for employees.

Sure, force out 100 employees with full benefits and hire 100 more to replace with them with full benefits and then fire the health care consultants who saves the city five million. The increased salaries were not police or fire. They haven't gotten a raise in eight years from this mayor, but raises to his favorites, new hires and attorneys and consultants have increased over 20 million since 2002.

Quote: That leaves Mr. Renda, the mayor and council left to figure out how to deal with balancing services -- can I just finish this?

MR. MCGOFF: Please.

MR. ANCHERANI: Balancing services against tax levels in an environment which the city continues to face structural deficits. That number was 5.5 million in 2009, Mr. Renda said. Get ready, taxpayers,

here comes the 25 percent tax hike, the money from the tax office won't get here in time. We are you really up the creek.

Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? Mrs. Evans?

MS. EVANS: Good evening. I wish to thank everyone who voted for me on election day, although, I still don't know exactly how many of you actually did. I thank all who called and e-mailed to congratulate me and I deeply appreciate the many calls, e-mails, cards, and well wishes I received during my illness. I'm sorry that I wasn't able to respond personally as I have always done. Please know all your messages and cards were received and I'm forever grateful for your kindness, support and loyalty.

I'm also very proud of my council team Frank Joyce and Pat Rogan and I thank the Joyce and Rogan families for their tremendous support and hard work throughout the campaign. The time has come for new blood in city government and for a new generation of Scrantonians to take the

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mantels of leadership. As their mentor, I have been privileged to see both young men develop into tireless campaigners and fearless candidates who have the courage and strength to stand up for our working families, our senior citizens and the poor. Beginning in January, they will become exceptional councilmen who will serve faithfully all the people of Scranton.

The voters spoke loudly in May and again in November. They demanded change and accountability. For the first time in many years, there will be not only a strong executive, but also a strong legislative body and the checks and balances in city government will be restored. Through their votes for council and mayor, Scrantonians also voiced a desire for cooperation between the branches of government and in that spirit the new majority, Frank Joyce, Pat Rogan and I met with the mayor yesterday. It was a positive session and the first of what I hope will be many future meetings between the mayor and council as we try to work together to improve city finances, and

the quality of life of all Scrantonians.

Further, the mayor agreed to hold his state of the city address in the evening rather than at noon in order that all council members may attend.

In addition, we invited the mayor to attend council meetings so that both branches of government can work in concert publically. There was unanimous agreement to work toward the betterment of our city.

On a less encouraging note, I am disappointed that I never received management information from Stu Renda, business administrator, that I had requested since early 2009 and for which I ultimately filed a Right-to-Know request on September 25, 2009. So, Kay, I would ask that you please call Mr. Renda one last time and request this information is sent to our office on or before Friday, November 13.

Several weeks ago, residents of Emmett Street contacted me regarding a hazardous structure at 518-520 Emmett Street, and they also appeared before council asking for relief. On Friday,

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November 6, an emergency declaration was signed by Mayor Doherty and city controller Novembrino to demolish the structure immediately and the problem has been successfully addressed.

Finally, I have a few citizens'
requests for the week: Residents report and
request that trees need to be cut in a
city-owned lot located in the back of the
1600 block of Church Avenue between
Ferdinand and Putnam Street. Please ask the
DPW to address this problem as soon as
possible.

Residents report a home located at is 102 Moltke Avenue that was abandoned following a fire, siding is hanging off and neighbors feel the structure poses a safety hazard. Please provide a report to council on or before November 23, 2009.

A letter to the city engineer:

Please provide council with a written update
and timeline for the Crisp Avenue bridge on
or before November 25, 2009.

A memo to PEL: Please provide detailed meeting summaries from October 12

to the present, and that's it.

MS. GATELLI: I just have a few items. Just for the residents that live near Tom and Jerry's, the hearing for that will be held Monday, November 16 at 1:00 at Bob Russell's office, anyone that can attend.

Also we discussed in caucus tonight about PEL and whether they would have a Recovery Plan ready for council to vote on. We all were in agreement, the ones that attended the caucus, that we think that that should be up to the new council to decide about PEL.

Also, we got a memo from OECD, with all of the money that goes to shelters and emergency programs within the city out of block grant money, the emergency shelter grant, there were nine contracts signed, one was for Catherine McCawley Center, that's where mothers and children live. Another one for St. Anthony's shelter, another one at Catholic Social Services for the Nativity shelter. Catholic Social Services for mental health programs. Catholic Social

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Services for Veteran's programs. The Community Intervention Center. United Neighborhood Center. Women's Resource Center, and Bethel AME.

Also there were contracts given, 11 of them, one was for the Bellevue Center, over in Bellevue that is run by United
Neighborhood Centers, those are children's programs.

Also for Project Hope where there is a camp in the summertime for underprivileged Boys and Girls Club for the park children. at summer program that runs the full length of the summer and it's held in various school playgrounds throughout the city. Friends of the Poor. The Deutsch Institute. Catholic Social Services again for permanent supportive housing. United Neighborhood Centers for supportive housing. Salvation Army for help with utilities. Condemnation money that goes to the City of Scranton to put people up when their house is condemned and those are some of the places where our block grant money went, so I wanted people to know that yes there are -- the poor and

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the homeless who are being very well taken care of in the City of Scranton, and that's all I have. Thank you.

MS. FANUCCI: Actually, Judy, you read off my list, but that's okay, but I also want to add to that, obviously there is always more we can do, and I don't think there is any of us who don't feel for the people who are out there and have issues in that area, we wish we could do more, but unfortunately, you still have to do with what you have. We are not any different than anyone else is and there is always more than we can do and hopefully we can strive for that later on and try to raise some more money for them.

Also, I want to also congratulate the new majority and I am thrilled to hear that they sat down with the mayor. I have said from day one the only which we can get anywhere is working together regardless if you agree it's the only way to move forward and I'm very happy to hear this. This is still my city and I still will be a taxpayer and am very happy to hear that we can

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actually look forward to seeing some progress on all ends, and I just wanted to congratulate you on that.

Also, I wanted to talk about legislation with the library. I was really thrilled that Commissioner Munchak did stop by because he did clarify a lot of the issues. I do understand the concerns with another board. I, too, understand and feel the same way, but I also know that the only way that this system could survive is to be able to go on it's own and be able to raise money to do things that they couldn't do This is going to be a very tough before. time all over the state for lots of programs, not only just the library system but, much our programs and I think that we need to give them the opportunity to be able to could that. It was good to hear know, him explain that, yes, they can get money but the only way they can do that is going from counsel and voting for the county, they can't just go off on their own and get it.

I also would like to leave a note for Attorney Minora to check into the

Albright library now. I believe that existing is a an agreement saying that we cannot give that building or sell that building it has to always be a library. To make sure that that is the case even after this board is formed, if that building is given or sold does it still have to consist of what it is now and will that change if that goes over to the board or the authority to make sure that we still are protected in that area.

It is one of my favorite buildings in the city. It's absolutely beautiful, so I do want to check on that, but otherwise I mean, I understand but I do believe that this is not a terrible thing for us. I know that everybody said, well, you shouldn't be worried about that, you should be worried about other things. No, we have to worry about it all and, you know, we can't just pick and choose. It is before us and I appreciate the sentiments that because now I am not going to be official after January that I should stop doing my job, but that certainly won't happen and it didn't happen

to the council before me and it won't happen to the council after me. We do what we do until we are -- while we are here, so I will be voting in favor of that and we'll see what happens after I receive what Attorney Minora has to say and then I will go from there to decide next week, also. And that is all I have.

MR. COURTRIGHT: One of the speakers brought up about making money from tickets. If you've ever got a ticket in this city and take a look at it the city gets a very small portion of the money, there is about five or six different people that have their hand in the pot, so we don't make a whole lot of money and tickets, the city itself I should say.

Election day you get an opportunity to speak to people that you don't get to speak to that often and probably there was two main issues at that election poll that I work out, one was the Crisp Avenue bridge, and I don't blame the people for being upset, that should have been fixed a long time ago. I used it every day when it was

available, now I have to go a different route. I couldn't understand, it's not like it's a raging river there, I couldn't understand why the Army Corp couldn't come in and put a temporary bridge in there.

They could probably do it in a day.

So, Kay, when you send that for what Mrs. Evans brought up, when you send the letter can you ask them is it possible to put a temporary bridge in there and until they get the permanent one in there. I mean, if anybody knows this, if you have a big SUV you can drive through there. It's not like a raging river going down there and the people have paid the price long enough, I think it's time we do something for them and myself.

The other thing big issue was, and I tried to -- I told people that asked me this, several people asked me this, if you stand at that poll all day long in the parking lot of the Keyser Valley Community Center when you go home, I always wear a white shirt, it's all dirt from if the wind blowing, because it's dirt. This time it's

all mud because the water just lays in there and I asked if the past to get it done and we couldn't get it down because it's not low to moderate income area, so we couldn't use OECD money, and I have asked on more than one occasion to use UDAG money, but I was never able to use anybody UDAG money since I'm here. I hope their next counsel can get their hands on that mysterious UDAG money and fix that parking lot at the Keyser Valley Community Center.

And I guess I think it's funny, but not that funny, I had people, two people come out of the poll and tell me they didn't vote for me because they wanted me to stay on council, you know, and there were two people I helped with something. And I said, "I wish you talked to me before you went in."

Whether I'm here or not, you know, if you need some kind of help you certainly found me before, I'm sure you will find me again. So whether I'm here or not if you need any kind of help I will be more than happy to help you. When I was able to help

people while I have been on council it certainly wasn't because I had any in, because I think we all know I didn't have any in. Usually, it was me telling them the right way to go or who to go to or where to go to, to get done what they needed to get done, and I would still be happy to do that for you, so if you talked to me before maybe you would have voted for me, but I think that's about all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. First, I too would like to congratulate all of the candidates that won. Attorney Moyle, who will now become Judge Moyle. Also, Mr. Courtright who will be leaving us, and certainly to Mrs. Evans, Mr. Rogan and Mr. Joyce who will become the -- part of the council next year. My congratulations to you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: A couple of things were mentioned tonight that I did have a chance to speak to Mrs. Evans prior to meeting, not for very long, Mrs. Gatelli brought up the Recovery Plan and PEL, I was in contact with

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Mr. Jerry Cross from the Pennsylvania Economy League I believe, and he expressed a desire to meet with members of the current council and also members of the new council. It is probably that the new Recovery Plan may come to the current council, but not in time for it to be voted upon, you know, not the necessary time frame in order for it to be completed before the end of the year, so, therefore, it would be the work of two councils, two separate councils and so Mr. Cross did indicate that he would like to meet and I will try to arrange a time and place that's convenient to those who are interested in meeting with Mr. Cross and discussing the new Recovery Plan. think that was all and move to 5-B.

MR. MCGOFF: At this time I'll entertain a motion that Item 5-C be introduced into it's proper committee.

MR. COURTRIGHT: So moved.

MS. FANUCCI: Second.

MR. MCGOFF: On the question?

MS. EVANS: In addition to the formation of a new library authority and appointment of authority board members, this legislation includes conveying title to the

library authority for the properties on which the Albright Memorial Library, the Greenridge Library and the Silkman House are located. Further, all inconsistent ordinances or parts of ordinances as well as resolutions and parts of resolutions are repealed by this legislation.

Throughout my six years as a council woman, I have never been presented with such legislation. It is, indeed, a highly significant and unusual action which is why I do not believe this legislation should be introduced at the 11th hour for consideration and possible approval by an outgoing council. All deeds and prior ordinances and resolutions must be studied carefully.

In addition, the members of the board of trustees of the Scranton Public Library have provided their written intention to serve as the members of the library authority.

And, Kay, if you could please determine who appointed the members of the board of trustees of the Scranton Public

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Library, please, and update me prior to our next council meeting.

Coincidentally, as was mentioned earlier, Mayor Doherty made an official announcement of his candidacy for governor earlier today and though it is his objective to construct a new library in South Side, which is the primary purpose of tonight's legislation, he may not continue to serve as the mayor and see this complicated and costly project to fruition. It is reckless to proceed at such a time, particularly in light of the significant cut to library funds within the new state budget and the inability of the county and city governments to financially support a new library at this Therefore, I will be voting "no." time.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? I would just like to comment on just a few things. First, the nature of the existing board makes it difficult for, as was said, for the library to receive money. The board was created under an ordinance back in 1890 and the way in which it's -- the way in which it's setup it probably violates any number

of ordinances at this time and would make it just, for example, "There shall be selected five members nominated by the mayor one from each the city's pastors resident in the City of Scranton of the following religious denominations," and says what religious denominations will be represented on the board which I think in today's day and age, you know, is probably in violation of a few things and would make it very difficult to receive any type of funding.

Also: "No more than two from the same political party. Three chosen by a board of trade."

I think a change is needed. The library is in difficulty and as Commissioner Munchak indicated one of the ways of maybe -- the only way of saving or preserving the library system is to make some changes to it. Right offhand, as was mentioned, the insurance and the liability that goes along with the buildings would be assumed by the authority which would be a savings to the city and I think that some changes need to be made and I think this is a way of going

about it.

MS. EVANS: I just wanted to add, perhaps Mr. Munchak's opinion with regard to council's approval being necessary for any type of borrowing or floating of revenue bonds by an authority may not be entirely accurate.

For example, last December of 2008, the Scranton Parking Authority pursued and received a million dollar line of credit without the knowledge or consent of Scranton City Council. I know that the Sewer Authority is very capable and has pursued funding without the knowledge and consent of Scranton City Council.

that this new authority would have to obtain approval from city council for any of it's funding for current and new libraries, it isn't necessarily entirely true and because of the examples I have stated that's enough to leave a great doubt in my mind. And we have incurred great debt from the Parking Authority, for example, through issuance of revenue bonds and revenue bonds by nature of

their being require a city to pledge the full faith and credit of it's taxpayers and this city and I believe this county can ill-afford to support anything else at this point in time and continue to keep moving forward.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MS. FANUCCI: Can we have attorney Minora also look into that, please, to find out? I do believe there is something that has to do with state funding when something is funded solely at this point by the state that there is some check and balance that goes into it so I believe that might be what the county commissioner was speaking of that's why it has to go through where the Sewer Authority and the other authorities might not have that stipulation, so maybe if we can look into that and find out from Attorney Minora if that would be the case for next week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anything else?

MS. EVANS: Yes, just one thing that you brought to my mind as you spoke, just one piece of information that I was made

aware of several years ago when I first took my seat on council. Once a -- well, once an authority is created it becomes very difficult, almost impossible to dissolve that authority and the greatest obstacle is the fact that it cannot dissolve an authority that carries any debt, and so that is why there has to be such caution exercised in this matter. It's not anything to take lightly and though I agree that much of what Mr. McGoff and Mrs. Fanucci have said, I think, for example, in terms of their current board members, the board of trustees, though some of the provisions of the statement you cited may have been adhered to, I don't think all of them have, you know, yes, it is antiquated and as a result as time has passed adjustments have been made.
