MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MS. GATELLI: I just have one announcement. Victor Alfieri is having their macaroni dinner tomorrow evening and Thursday evening from 5 to 8 in the Victor Alfieri Club on Main Avenue, and that's all.

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MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? Thank you.

Citizens' participation. Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, your 3-B, City of Scranton Independent Auditor's Report for the year ending December 31, 2008. I hope you all read it before you come up with a new budget really and -- the total long-term debt, a whole lot of it, was \$182,884,864. Now, that's not counting interest. You realize what's happening, that's all of the authorities, too, that was a total report on all of the authorities. Somehow or someway you have to get into that. The budget will come up and you really got to find a way to cut the costs, and the only way you can cut costs is cut spending, because what's going to happen as you were returned on the pension plans you all were told about the pension plans, what is going to curtail us when we have to makeup a deficit in that plan, and it's a tremendous amount of money that will go for pensions of state and school teachers for one thing. That's all in there, and

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there is nothing you can do about it. It's going to be mandated.

You also know about the Sewer Authority being mandated another 200 million plus, God knows how much more. That's in there, too. Where are we going to start? Some of these things are mandated, some we can control. I went in there, even the amount of vehicles we lease in that report is tremendous. If you read all of the vehicles we lease and we are going to keep paying on it until the lease runs out or we turn them in or release. There is somewhere along the way we have to look at that. know a lot of the police bought their own cars now, so we lease them, but I guess we don't pay for them other than the upkeep. But, we have to go. We have to look at nickles and dimes. The best thing that you can do is go back to that \$10,000 that we used to have when somebody spends \$10,000 over that they have to come to bids. it's 20,000, you don't even see it. have to camp down there in the controller's office really to keep track of that and

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that's not something anybody should have to do. And it's tough, it's really tough what you got.

And the Redevelopment Authority and their borrowing is tremendous too. borrowed what is it \$2,296,570 to by our delinquent, okay, delinquent real estate taxes and then they in turn resold it. Now, why would that be done that way? deals got to stop. These buyback lease back, back, back, back that that mayor has. You got to stop this. This has to got to be stopped and the only place it can be stopped is here at your point because it has to deal with finances, and you control the finances. He may send the legislation to you, but you can say, no. You cannot put it on the agenda, you can do whatever you want basically, but something has to be done and it has to done soon. We can't go through another four years of this or nobody in the city will be able to live.

There is no way we can afford the taxes as it is now and a lot of people, the majority, there is 95 -- I think it was

9.5 percent unemployment rate around here and all of these taxes and spending and so forth and so on it just reaped on the shoulders of the poor individual taxpayers.

Most of your money comes from I think it's 511 Tax Act which is wage tax so forth, so forth, so forth. Business taxes are very reasonable, but most of the businessmen don't live in the city, so they pay their 1 percent, but they ain't paying that 511 tax that the rest of us are and God knows what the real estate taxes is going to be. As you know, the county is sort of going to hold it, but the school board is going to be in real trouble and there is no way out of the school board trouble because the fact is they borrowed a lot of money and they got to pay a lot back. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mike Dudek.

MR. DUDEK: My name is Mike Dudek,
608 Depot Street, I live down there in the
Plot. The election will change city council
in two weeks, but we will have a lame duck
council until the swearing in ceremony is
concerned, and it will be this council, this

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lame duck council that's going to prepare a budget. We know the mayor is going to prepare his, we also know that Mrs. Evans will also have some proposals, she will probably have a formal budget like she normally tries to do, please do it. Please do it. We really need some sensibility here.

I would like you to incorporate just a couple thoughts besides what Mr. Sbaraglia pointed out. New York City is a city of about seven and a half million people, give or take a handful, they have a police department and they have a fire department. They have a chief of police and they have a fire chief. They are the top people in those respective divisions, and when they report to somebody, chief of police and the fire chief report to Mayor Blumberg. Why do we have a public safety director in a town of only 70,000 people? For the life of me I don't know why we are paying out that kind of a salary for that kind of a position that doesn't even exist in New York City.

If New York City can get along

without a public safety director, why can't we? There is a nice little spot there to save the city some petty change. The post pays what, about \$70,000 a year? Does anybody know what that position pays?

MS. GATELLI: I think 62.

MS. EVANS: I'd like to have look.

MS. GATELLI: I think about 62.

MR. DUDEK: Well, whatever you do just look it up and see and just see that's a position that could be totally eliminated saving the city that amount of money. We can do that.

Also, something that we could do, and I have been talking about this in councils for at least the last ten years, why not bring back initial responders ambulance service to the fire department? Let the fire department operate the ambulance for first response in the City of Scranton rather than have private companies do it. There is enough work out there for private companies to do, but let the first responders be the fire department. It was like that all the way from I guess the time

that the automobile was invented until Mayor McNulty was mayor. Then on a political hissy fit he took that away from the fire department and the city has been losing income from that ever since the. The fire department will be more than happy to show you the numbers they have on restoring the service and how much money you could make for the city, so I think those are two things we could look at.

And one little anecdote from a few weeks ago, if you remember the parade of people that came in here with their sidearms? I couldn't -- it just occurred to me last week, and I mentioned it to Mr. McGoff last week, when the National Rifle Association held their convention in the Philadelphia Convention Center, you remember that famous meeting? That was the one where Charlton Heston held up that revolutionary musket and pry it from my cold hands? That meeting. Wayne LaPierre, the president of the National Rifle Association used his position as president to declare that no person may bring a firearm into the

convention hall. The firearms were kept outside of the convention hall and no arms were allowed inside it except for Charlton Heston's little demonstration for the cameras. Just thought I would pass that one onto you. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, City
Council. Bill Jackowitz, South Scranton
rest tent, member of the Taxpayers'
Association. Jobless rate hits 9.5 percent.
Again, the Scranton/ Wilkes-Barre/Hazelton
area is ranked third from the bottom the
highest employment rate. On the brighter
side, Business Weekly magazine ranks
Scranton 21st for economic improvements.
Wow, this country must really be in bad
shape.

Some day there may be a restaurant down town where you can get bacon and eggs at 2:30 in the morning after you leave Kildare's and the Mexican restaurant.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Yeah, Judy, if the

1 budget comes in short would you vote for 2 city taking out more loans and buying more 3 bonds, how would you handle that situation? MS. GATELLI: I have spoken to the 4 5 mayor and I told him I was not interested in anymore loans or tax increases and that we 6 7 should cut some jobs as the county has. 8 MR. JACKOWITZ: Thank you very much. 9 MS. GATELLI: So I don't know, we 10 will see when the budget comes down. 11 MR. JACKOWITZ: Right. I just 12 wanted -- I has asked the other four council 13 people a couple of weeks ago, you weren't 14 here, so I didn't want to cheat you out of it. 15 16 MS. GATELLI: Thanks, Bill. Are you 17 feeling okay? 18 MR. JACKOWITZ: Much better. Thank 19 you. 20 MR. MCGOFF: Nancy Krake. 21 MS. KRAKE: Good evening, Council. Mr. Courtright, Barry told me to say hello 22 23 to you. 24 MR. COURTRIGHT: Who? 25 MS. KRAKE: Barry.

MR. COURTRIGHT: Oh, okay.

MS. KRAKE: I am going to be rebutting the Times editorial tonight. We will be stating Mrs. Evans' record over the past -- her past terms. It appears to me that the Times either doesn't watch this council meeting or that they are lying, one or the other, probably both. This will be the truth.

Janet Evans has effectively created four budgets in six years, even a budget with a tax decrease. PEL has renewed reviewed those budgets and never disagreed with them. Mrs. Evans firmly stood her ground and voted in the best interest of all Scrantonians when she voted against the mayor's 26 percent tax increase. She voted against the millions and millions of borrowing which, by the way, was part of the reason he needed to raise taxes. She has voted against KOZ's and corporate welfare.

In fact, Mrs. Evans' budgets, which added public safety with more police, were all created without the tax increases, without the borrowing and without freebies

for certain businesses.

She has supported long-standing hard working businesses such as Buona Pizza and Coney Island. Mrs. Evans, even the Times says this, is an effective vote getter, but that's because she consistently looks out for the poor and middle class of our city. Her record shows she obtains sewer bill relief for flood victims in lower Greenridge, she promoted and voted for free swim for children. Mrs. Evans has demanded accountability from the Scranton Redevelopment Authority. Janet Evans cried foul over the tax office long before the current tax collector and the missing \$12 million.

MR. MCGOFF: Lee Morgan. 1 Les Spindler. 2 3 MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Council. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner 4 and taxpayer. Last week Mrs. Williams 5 criticized Mrs. Evans and her candidates for 6 7 not being in the debate. Well, it's a good 8 thing they weren't in a debate because they 9 would have embarrassed Mrs. Williams' candidate. First of all, he couldn't make 10 11 it through one semester at Lackawanna College before flunking out. That's not the 12 13 person that --14 MR. MCGOFF: Excuse me --15 MR. 1 MS. FANUCCI: Les, I don't want you representing anybody anywhere. 2 3 MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Fanucci --MR. SPINDLER: Rules of council, she 4 5 is supposed to not say anything/STPWHR-FRPBLTS. 6 7 MR. MCGOFF: -- please, let me handle I asked at the beginning of the 8 it. 9 meeting, and I should have stopped 10 Mrs. Krake, I asked that we not do any 11 politicking and --12 MR. SPINDLER: It's not politicking. 13 MS. FANUCCI: It was. 14 MR. MCGOFF: When you start speaking about who to vote for and who not to vote 15 16 for -- -17 MR. SPINDLER: But you let 18 Mrs. Williams speak last week. MR. MCGOFF: Excuse me. 19 It's 20 inappropriate and we should not do it. 21 MR. SPINDLER: But you let 22 Mrs. Williams speak last week and you didn't 23 stop her. 24 MR. MCGOFF: It is inappropriate and 25 I would ask that you please refrain.

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MR. SPINDLER: Then have you to treat everybody like that.

MS. FANUCCI: I agree.

MR. SPINDLER: And I want all of my time back. As I stated last week, some people might not know I call the Times-Tribune the Doherty newsletter because they are so pro Chris Doherty they don't put anything for anybody else in the paper. Again, this person that writes on-line called me a hypocrite again, and I sent a response into that and nothing put in for me, for the Times-Tribune, but the Doherty newsletter, so I have to say my peace here so it gets on the TV. I didn't intend to be up here, that's why I just have some little notes instead of my envelope lie I usually do. But, you know, it seems like have half of the people in this city are supporting the other half, a fourth of the city is -- goes under the guise of being nonprofit. This is just a bunch of nonsense.

The University of Scranton is taking almost \$30 million in taxes just from the school board and they keep on going now we got another college doing it. That money had to be made up to the school board. not right for these two colleges they rent rooms to the -- you know, the University is the biggest slumlord in probably the state, and you can ask anybody that is unfortunate to live next door to one of the pieces of property it's a bad deal. They got how many dormitories rented out and they shouldn't be The same with Friendship House. nonprofit. If they can give \$241,000 to the city they shouldn't be nonprofit. People took --

well, income tax deductions to give
Friendship House donations because I know
one that did and it was a large amount of
money. Then they gave it to the city, you
know, that just -- I wish the FBI would tell
us who they are investigating around here,
it's about time they send some. There is
some people that it's just time for an
investigation like they did down there.

You know, we are talking outside when I came in here, Mr. Doherty could get rid of me real easy. He could turn me one, two, three if he gave me one of jobs at the Sewer Authority, those \$1,000 a week jobs. I would probably even show up once in awhile. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

from, so I think it is fair game that we -that it could be discussed possibly without
using names and without endorsing anyone
from this podium, but it is -- it is fair
game, you know, because basically -- because
legislation is going to be based on that, on
the endorsement because they start off by
saying that some candidates are a instrument
of progress and others are going to be an
obstruction that will form a decision in
people's minds.

They aren't saying who is who, but it's obvious, of course, so I changed their values around a little bit, tried to look underneath the issue because in my mind one side wants to promote progress through fiscal responsibility, cutting the fat of management levels, being deliberative and careful about expenditures of taxpayers' dollars. The other side wants to obstruct this fiscal progress, find ways to spend and inflate budgets and possibly create is debt that can exceed \$300 million over the course of the next four years of a possible Doherty reelection, and it's very expensive vision

for our city.

She talked about a team that is short on solutions simply because the majority of this council and the Scranton Times does not agree with what has been put forth does not mean that they are short on solutions. Fiscal responsibility is always a solution no matter what the issues are. On the other hand, this administration and the present council had treated city as if it were their own private Mohegan Sun taking our tax dollars and gambling away our future in a Doherty slot machine.

Right now we are \$270,000,000 in the hole and get willing deeper. There is no reason to believe that a young council member won't rubberstamp and toss our dollars into it any different than the current majority. As far as someone being an ineffective council person with a 3-2 vote that regular dismisses any fiscal responsibility or fiscal responsibility of anything, I guess they are probably right.

She is ineffective at pulling the majority of this council away from the

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Doherty slot machine. She is ineffective at 1 convincing that a budget based on --2 3 MR. MCGOFF: Mr. McCloe. MR. MCCLOE: I'm talking about the 4 budget. 5 MR. MCGOFF: I asked you to not do 6 7 this. 8 MR. MCCLOE: All right. I'm not 9 saying anybody's name. It could be her. MR. MCGOFF: Excuse me. 10 11 MR. MCCLOE: Who are we talking 12 about? 13 MR. MCGOFF: But you are. 14 MR. MCCLOE: Okay, I'll -15 MR. MCGOFF: Please stop. 16 MR. MCCLOE: How shall I continue? 17 How shall I continue? This has to be said 18 because here is the thing --19 MR. MCGOFF: Then you say it in a 20 venue where it's appropriate and not here. 21 MR. MCCLOE: I'm trying to stop you 22 from making other decisions that will effect 23 the budgets of future budgets. Some of the 24 things that I'm saying here are totally 25 about what's going to be passed in the next

couple of weeks. 1 MS. FRANUS: Point of order, Mr. 2 3 McGoff. He has the right to say --MR. MCGOFF: Please. 4 MR. MCCLOE: Never mind. You know 5 what, never mind, Folks. 6 MS. FRANUS: Point of order. 7 8 MR. MCCLOE: Never mind. I have 9 nothing to say. 10 MS. FRANUS: He had every right to 11 say that. 12 MR. MCCLOE: You know what, never 13 mind. I have nothing to say. 14 MS. FRANUS: You have no right to tell him he can't. 15 16 MR. MCCLOE: All I just wanted to say 17 is that it's the mindset of the people of 18 this city that will change the legislations 19 that are passed up there. It is very 20 important that people think about how they 21 are doing it, not just take everything at 22 face value. If that's what you want them to 23 do is to take everything at face value, 24 that's fine. That's fine. Have a good day

These nonprofits, you know, a thought occurred to me, they are not paying any fees for city maintenance, and I was wondering if some day we can look into the viability of as long as it's not a tax why can't it be charged in the city maintenance fee. We have to remove their snow, we to produce police, fire protection. We have to have a Sewer Authority and all kinds of other authorities so that they could have a town to exist in, why can't somebody come up with a city maintenance fee so that they could pay their fair share, at least. They don't have pay school taxes, but when it comes to maintenance a city is a tough place to maintain and deal with and they are certainly not much of a help.

So, on a final note, good luck with everybody and hopefully we will be seeing the right people in next year. Have a good night.

This is it. It's done. This is it.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Morgan, did you wish to speak? We went past your name? .

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Yeah, I stepped out in the hallway for a discussion on the Scranton Times article today. You know, I just find it so very troubling for politics to even be injected into in a decision by editors of a

newspaper. We have -- we are faced with so many problems here and the long-term debt continues to spiral out of control. And, you know, I appreciate everybody's opinion who comes to this podium, but I've really come here a very long time, longer than anybody in this room, and my perspectives are a lot different than everyone else's.

And I would like to say without turning this into a political conversation, including the Scranton Times gentleman that I spoke to, it's my opinion, strong opinion that it's the council's fault that this city is where it is. It's not the mayor's fault, you are the legislators. The problem that have come upon the Scranton Sewer Authority the Parking Authority, every one of the council members on this council has standing and can go into the Court if they have to. Have they? No.

We have talked about illusions of budgets presented and, you know, in lieu of the mayor's. Has anybody on this council ever broken down the whole budget and prepared a new budget? I don't recall that.

I don't recall anybody ever going to the Scranton Sewer Authority or going to the Court to try to fight the Sewer Authority's rate increases even though the Scranton Sewer Authority is a municipal utility. I have never seen anyone on this council offer to sell the assets of the Scranton Parking Authority. I remember when the Scranton Sewer Authority came here for an extension of their charter and they didn't need it to receive the Pennvest funding for the work that's being done in this city.

I think what's happened here is politics is completely out of control and people are under an illusion that certain individuals are bringing change here, and I have sat here and watched many individuals sit at this council and they all promised to change, but our debt is, if I may use Andy Sbaraglia's figures, \$182 million.

Now, when I sat with the editors of the Scranton Times I only used \$170 million as a figure and they all agreed that the residents of this city cannot pay that debt and my question is can we ever stop talking

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about politics here? Can we ever get
leaders on this council who are independent
thinkers, five individuals voted at large in
this city without forming a team to the
detriment of the residents of this city?
Can we? I haven't seen it yet and I have
been here a long time.

The other thing that I think is troubling is we elect people to council who never sat in this chamber, never spoke from this side of the podium. Mr. Jackowitz made a comment today about people speaking from this podium. We have never had anybody elected from this podium to council. That's People get elected to council, a problem. have no clue what they are doing there and propel very dangerous agendas forward in this city. The debt, okay, various ordinances in the city. You know, there is even a time up by the University of Scranton that the city vacated the alley, one block down on Mulberry Street heading towards town on the left side, didn't even come to council yet because all the votes were there. Teams and teams and teams. I really

think it should happen -- it should stop and what I really think is whoever gets elected on Tuesday, so be it, but we need independent thinkers who aren't afraid to take issues and present them at council. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. VITRIS: Sam Vitris, homeowner in Scranton. An issue last night took place where I feel the citizens of this city were punished, homeowners in this city with no warning at all where they -- in other words, if you park your car on the street that's narrow, and it's very serious situation that if you park -- your street is narrow and your sidewalks butt up against the street and there is no curbs and a car, so to speak is a foot or two on the sidewalk but still plenty of room for a pedestrian to walk down the sidewalk people were given tickets last night.

Now, it didn't happen at 9:00 in the morning or 12 in the afternoon or 6:00 at night, at 4:00 in the morning they gave out tickets to homeowners, people who live on my

street, I'm there 25 years, longer than me. Residents, taxpayers who some people have a hard time just putting money in their gas tanks let's alone paying a \$10 ticket because their car, they are trying to protect their car from being sideswiped because it's a narrow road.

Discretion, common sense to the officer who walks up the street in the middle of the night when everybody is sleeping and not to even take a walk and take a look, can a pedestrian fit down this sidewalk or I could see if a car was blocking the whole sidewalk so that a pedestrian had to walk out into the street because the car was blocking their pathway.

MR. COURTRIGHT: Mr. Vitris -- excuse me, Mr. McGoff, is it okay if I ask him a question?

MR. MCGOFF: Just hold the time.

MR. COURTRIGHT: Sam, I think you have been around long enough that most of the time when they come out and do something like that there was a complaint and they were dispatched. I know where you live, I

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will find out why that person did that because you have been around as long as I have, there ain't nobody coming out 4:00 in the morning for the fun of it. Somebody must have called and complained or he must have been told by his supervisor, I will find out why.

MR. VITRIS: Billy, I understand that, but the truth is --

MS. GATELLI: And I want to interject something too because I go on that road every day on my way to work, I go up Eynon Street, and if those cars parked where they should park my little Volvo would not even get through there, let alone an ambulance or a fire truck. There is a serious, serious problem on Eynon Street as there are on probably many of the streets in the City of Scranton, but I was -- I saw Sam here this morning on my way to work and, you know, he flagged me down and I got out of the car and looked around, that's appalling that the police officer would do that at 3:00 in the morning to go to a neighborhood and ticket cars, why isn't he on Main Avenue where the

crimes are or down at Tom and Jerry's or, you know, places where this is high crime? To ticket neighbors, I don't think it's right. Should you park on the sidewalk? No, probably not, there is an ordinance, but to do that at 3:00 in the morning and ticket a whole neighborhood when they can't park on the street. It's impossible.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Courtright said that he would look into the incident tomorrow.

MR. VITRIS: I realize that and I have, too, and from what I can understand it wasn't just Eynon Street and it was --

MS. GATELLI: It was a block in North Scranton, too.

MR. VITRIS: It was a city --

MS. GATELLI: I got a complaint from North Scranton.

MR. VITRIS: Apparently there were other sections in the city it was done in, so after work I just happened to ride around and I noticed, I feel bad for a lot of the people in the city, that they would have to put up with that at that time in the morning where there is so many streets, believe me,

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people are just trying to protect their cars because over 25 years I had my car sideswiped twice, so after that happens to you, you start inching -- everybody has --I'll use Eynon Street as an example, has a retaining wall in front of their home so you kind of inch your way toward the retaining wall because you are afraid that your car is getting sideswiped and then the school buses when they are coming up the street, when people are parked out too far into the street, well, now the school bus is slamming it's brakes on, he is inching his way through, not to mention we didn't get into -- if they start doing this on narrow roads and snow plows can't get through we're going to -- I mean, there is going to be issues here.

And that's why I only said discretion and common sense judgment that if you are a police officer and you walk and you are going to ticket somebody you need to walk over on the side of the sidewalk and see if the pedestrian can fit through. if the pedestrian can't fit through then

1 it's justified but --MR. COURTRIGHT: Sam, I don't think 2 3 it was the individual officer, if you are 4 saying --MR. VITRIS: No. 5 MR. COURTRIGHT: Was it part of the 6 7 city -- there must have been a directive or an order sent down. I will find out tonight 8 9 when that shift comes on who gave the order 10 and why they gave it. 11 MR. VITRIS: I agree, Bill, and I'm not blaming --12 MR. COURTRIGHT: And see that we 13 14 can't --MR. VITRIS: Trust me, I'm not 15 16 blaming the officer, but it's the whole 17 situation needs to be addressed because 18 people are scared, now they are parking their cars out in the street now because 19 20 they are afraid they are going to get 21 tickets. 22 MR. COURTRIGHT: I'll find out. 23 MR. MCGOFF: We'll find out. Mr. 24 Vitris. Anyone else? 25 MR. PATILLA: Good evening,

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Mr. Courtright and Mrs. Evans. intentionally stayed away from council until this day. Okay, now within the coming week Scranton is going to face a situation where we can actually finally start moving forward, all right? I had a heated discussion with Lee Morgan out in the hallway in regards to independent thinkers, Scranton doesn't need all right? independent thinkers, we need taxpayer first public servants. We need people elected to these offices who are going to look out for the taxpayer, for the homeowner, for the school children, for our seniors, all right?

Now, I recently heard on the news on the radio where the mayor again has hired another individual who has no qualifications for a position he was hired for. These are the type of things that are putting Scranton in the financial bind that she's been in for the last 40, 50 years, all right? You can't survive especially as second class citizen with a work force of unqualified, uneducated, unknowledgeable individuals.

This has nothing to do with anybody

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personally, has nothing to do with their political affiliations, but it does have --I have 15 years in the building -- the home building industry. There is nothing that anybody in this city can tell me as far as code goes, insulation, windows, wood, the framework, I could care less because I know this, and this is when I come to the building -- the building -- the inspection station that's who I want to address. want somebody that has that knowledge that can converse with me why the fiberglass insulation isn't up to code. Why the plumbing isn't up to code. I don't want somebody that's been hired and said, okay, well you can study on the taxpayers' dime to pass a certification or any test that might be forthcoming, I want somebody to have that experience already, be it school or be it working knowledge. I don't want to pay for somebody to go through college or to take classes to learn what I already know, what I have learned through hands on experience.

When I need my grass cut I don't go to my butcher, all right? And it's time for

the Scranton public to understand we don't need crony handpicked has-beens representing us. We need people who are going to represent us, not the people who put them there, not the political affiliation that they back.

Now, granted, I'm all for OJT, but there is a time and place for everything. I don't want the come to this council and have a million dollars budget put in the hands of a 19-year-old kid. I don't want to face another 25 percent increase in taxes in 2010, and that decision lies with somebody who never paid a damn property tax in their life.

I don't care who the Times endorse.

I don't care who they don't. Endorse. I have been a friend of Lee since I have moved into this city and I don't believe in half of the things he says, but I will vote for him before I vote for somebody just because they are Democrat or their political affiliation. MCGOFF: Ma'am, I'm sorry, I was 14 trying to say something before you came to 15 the podium, I'm not speaking to you 16 directly. I thought that the behavior was 17 inappropriate from people clapping and being 18 rude to other. 19 MS. MCCALLUM: No point taken. No 20 point taken. 21 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. 22 My name is Jeanine MS. MCCALLUM: 23 Eagen-McCallum. Good evening to all of you. 24 I am not here for anything whatsoever 25 political, unfortunately, it's personal. Ι

happen to be one of the millions of this 1 so-called city. I was a little curious as 2 3 to if anybody is familiar with Shakespeare's merchant of Venice? No? Portia's speech. 4 MR. MCGOFF: The quality of mercy is 5 not strained. 6 MS. MCCALLUM: Everybody has to 7 8 memorize it in the eighth grade. Anyway, 9 I'll get to it at the end of this. I 10 suggest you read it. It would be very 11 helpful in serving the less fortunate which 12 there are many, many of us in Scranton. 13 think some of you are aware of the fact that 14 I own Eagen's Pub. Mrs. Gatelli? MS. GATELLI: Yes. 15 I'm sorry. 16 MS. MCCALLUM: Yes, I know you didn't 17 hear me. 18 MS. GATELLI: I can't hear hardly 19 anybody up here because it echos. 20 MS. MCCALLUM: I think some of you 21 are aware that I own Eagen's Pub. MS. GATELLI: Yes, you have been to 22 23 our meetings. 24 MS. MCCALLUM: Yes. The building is 25 currently up for sale. My neighbors and it

seems every city agency does not want the bar at this location. Fine. It took me four years to accept it, but I accept it.

I only wish that someone had the gumption to come to me as an adult to discussion this paradox, particularly after I had gone up and down Prospect Avenue to introduce myself to my neighbors before I closed on the property. Believe me, had I had known what I was about to experience four years in Leavenworth would have been a kinder and wiser experience and being raped for four years, that would have been better than what I have been through.

I am a retired special ed teacher, my son is a Gulf War veteran and a 9/11 survivor. We are conscientious, hard-working people who deserved a chance and a modicum of respect. Being negative New Yorkers does not immediately translate to thugs, thieves, rude, impolite or disrespectful. By contrast, I find it amazing that what I have -- what has been done to us with absolutely no retaliation, never lifted my voice in retaliation, people

probably regard the two of us as simple minded.

The Zoning Board, Health Department, Housing Authority, Sign Commission and Noise Commission, etcetera, etcetera, etcetera, have visited us many times. At one point over a period of seven months the Liquor Control Board received 13 complaints. There are bars in South Side that haven't received 13 complaints in nine years. All unfounded and dismissed.

Our first year here the Scranton police were summoned I lost count. No charges were made, I was told by a city official, if you want his name I will provide it, I was told by a city official I could not park my own licensed state inspected vehicles on my own property without being towed. Therefore, I have a 36-foot motor home that I have to pay \$125 a month to park elsewhere.

I have spent every spring, summer and fall picking up litter along both sides of Prospect Avenue from Orchard Street to River Street and the same length of Donnelly

Court, which is the alleyway behind me, to have a neighbor almost attack me for being in the alley.

I have also been admonished for having trash on my property. Pizza boxes, Pampers, old tires, we don't sell these in the bar, Burger King trash and refuse or whatever anyone wants to dump there. Tires I have to pay to have taken -- I have a brand new Hyundai. I get free tires. I apologize for all of my rantings -- may I finish, please?

MR. MCGOFF: Please.

MS. MCCALLUM: I apologize for all my rantings. I tried to attend neighborhood meetings and found them somewhat hostile. My only input at one meeting was to request a litter basket to empty the bags of trash I collected. That never happened, I never got it. In the spirit of the Golden Rule I will not do to Scranton was has been doing to my son and me. My life savings and my son's retirement pales in comparison to the loss of our trust in others, my compassion and empathy for others and is now something --

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my compassion and empathy for others is now somewhat compromised. Worst of all, my son is a different man. I want to leave here. Hopefully in time, the man he was will return.

As far as Eagen Pub goes I am selling the license and property separately. Scranton will prevail, okay. Piece of history 135 years old down the tubes, that's Excuse me. That has me more upset okay. than anything because I'm a history and buff and so is my son. All I ask -- all I ask of city council and the City of Scranton and all of the neighbors who are friends of city hall and Scranton and whatever all I ask is to allow me to do this without further interference as a perspective buyer has already been confronted by a neighbor. real estate agent is not very happy with that.

I am leaving next Tuesday, I'm gone, and my son will follow me in two weeks. I many facing two surgeries before Christmas.

Is it too much to ask to leave us alone?

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn. Taxpayers' Association. As president of the Taxpayers' Association I've been listening to Mrs. Williams for the last couple of months coming up here with the allegations of some candidate that shouldn't be on the -- slated to run, so I called the Department of State and talked to the attorney in the Ethics Commission there and I was told that Mrs. Williams is in the wrong venue coming here and coming to the Taxpayers' Association, her recourse is in court, so all she is trying to do is through that whole thing against the wall as much as she can, something will stick and it's tainting somebody and it's bad.

And the fact is that 2007 we were \$170 million and now we are 182, so that's a difference of \$156 million that Mr. Doherty has tacked upon on us and you three councilmen, whether you were here or not, okay? But the fact is also that when Mr. Connors left office there was 26 million, now it's 182 million. That's how much, \$156 million Mr. Doherty put on us?

And also now he said he wants to leave before even election -- that he wants to leave us holding the bag and run for governor. Now, come on, let's go here. I know people that's walking around the streets going to food pantries. Now, that's a blatant lie and yet you sit there, the majority, and you don't address it. Shame on you.

You know, you are pathetic for what you are doing to the poor people in the City of Scranton, and I have to praise for Mrs. Evans for getting up there and standing up and against the three of you. Thank you.

MR. TALIMINI: Good evening, Council. Joe Talimini, citizen of Scranton. I have heard both sides of the fence tonight, I'm glad we are not discussing politics in any way, shape or form.

MS. FANUCCI: You are so right.

MR. TALIMINI: And I'm so glad that the council abstained from doing the same thing, but one of the things I'd like to know is this lady here who represented Eagen's Bar, it's been a pretty reputable place. There are some dives in this town. There are real dives in this town that have never once been cited. This lady is being driven out of Scranton. There is shame in that. That shame is on the shoulders of everybody in this community, but especially the city officials who let it happen.

Now, there is also shame in this city when we talk about 6,000 jobs which were created and nobody can show us one, not one, but they talk about 6,000 jobs created in this city. I am not talking about 80 and \$70,000 jobs created at city hall, I'm talking about for the people of this community.

Now, I get it through all walks of life, people not only in Scranton, people in Pittston, people in Clarks Summit, people all over who watch these proceedings on the TV and who read very faithfully what's going

on in the City of Scranton they find it, as I do, deplorable. That this situation is a load to exist and it's incumbent upon the Scranton City Council and the mayor to do what's right.

ECTV, for example, airs these proceedings at 3:00 in the morning. The Taxpayers' meetings are shown at obscene hours when most people can't see them. I can't go into a store in this area, be it Walmart or Price Chopper's at Taylor Hill where I don't encounter somebody who says the same thing, what in the hell is going on in this city?

Well it's about time you people took a good luck in the mirror and asked yourself the same thing, what is going on in this city and why am I allowing it to happen because you are the people had charge. You don't hear us, you don't listen to us. Our voices are unheard. You sit there and you snicker, you stare, you feign indifference, but you don't give a damn about the citizens of this town, it's about time you did, and that is why this political situation is in

such an uprise as it is now and I hope it continues until something changes. Thank you very much.

MS. CHALIPKO: Mary Chalipko, resident of the City of Scranton. I don't usually come to these meetings, but I felt that it was time with all of the turmoil in the city, and I just want to say that the only thing we have seen other than in the Pinebrook Section again in the last eight years are tax increases, more potholes, two burned out buildings in the 800 block of Capouse Avenue and not one change for the better.

And I only hope when change comes in January that whatever is done in this city is done fairly, whether it be help for the neighborhoods, whether it be code enforcement, and it does sound like you, Mrs. Gatelli, sending the dogs out in South Side after that lady, right or wrong doesn't matter.

MS. GATELLI: No, it wasn't.

MS. CHALIPKO: Right or wrong doesn't matter.

1 MS. GATELLI: We met with that woman 2 at our neighborhood meeting. 3 MS. CHALIPKO: All I'm asking -- I've been to a lot of neighborhood meetings, they 4 can be just as brutal. I just hope that --5 MS. GATELLI: If you don't know the 6 other side of the story then you really 7 8 shouldn't comment. 9 MS. CHALIPKO: I have been involved 10 in our neighborhood association in Pinebrook 11 for almost 30 years. MS. GATELLI: Yeah, well, so I have. 12 MS. CHALIPKO: Right, and you know --13 14 MS. GATELLI: So the other side of 15 the story. 16 MS. CHALIPKO: And I know your quote 17 you never received a cent. 18 MS. GATELLI: Right. 19 MS. CHALIPKO: Right. Jobs, 20 whatever, they don't matter, but you have 21 never received a cent. Most recently, we've 22 watched the mayor try to give away part of 23 the Chick Feldman Complex to Lackawanna 24 Junior College and as I stand before you 25 that will not happen. So thankfully when

change comes in January I hope that things 1 are just done fairly for the future of 2 3 Scranton, my neighborhood and the rest of the city. Thank you. 4 MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? 5 MR. SLEDZENSKI: Hello, Bill. 6 7 MR. COURTRIGHT: Hi, Chris. 8 MR. SLEDENZSKI: Billy, this is going 9 to change next year, you know, Buddy? MR. COURTRIGHT: What's that? 10 11 MR. FANUCCI: You are asking a 20 question, do you want an answer? 21 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, during 22 motions, yes, not on my five minutes. 23 MS. FANUCCI: For the love of God, 24 you either want the answer or not. 25 drive us crazy with the questions. If you

want the answer --

MS. GATELLI: It IS a street. It is a street so how could it be theft of services. It is a street. It's a city street.

MS. FANUCCI: No, she is saying that the money was missing.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Anyway, may I continue?

MR. MCGOFF: Please.

MS. GATELLI: How could the money be missing, it's a street?

MS. SCHUMACHER: With the price of gas going up daily it is very frustrating to sit at a red light and have absolutely no other traffic on the road and you have to wait and wait and then you go another block and the same thing happens and you another black block and the same thing happens.

For ten years we had money in this city to do a timing project and properly time the lights throughout the city, at least on the main thoroughfares, and I have asked this before and I'm going to ask it again and maybe keep asking it until you

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actually do it, if you would please send a letter to the Department of -- the Department of Transportation and ask them to expedite this project. Again, you know it was funded, you know it had to be -- a request had to be made to extend it, and I think it's time that we get a letter in there and we actually get the project accomplished.

With respect to the parking, we have demolished many, many homes and we have lots that are sitting there empty and I think it's time the city looks at some infill parking lots on these streets where the streets are narrow. It's very dangerous. It's dangerous for pedestrians, as you know I pushed a wheelchair around for over five years and I know how difficult it is and we have been forced out into the street and many areas don't even have sidewalks, but I think some of these empty lots could certainly be used as infill parking for an entire street and it needs to be investigated.

A couple of weeks ago I talked about

a pothole at the corner of Adams and Spruce that you really can't avoid when there is a traffic because you have to make -- if you are maybe being the right turn you are going to hit it. I don't know if it's, again, if it's a Sewer Authority project that needs to be fixed or if it's just a DPW, but that's a terrible hole.

If you go up toward Connell Park on Gibbons Street there is a horrendous, horrendous pile of asphalt with a humongous hole besides it that I'm surprised -- I'm surprised anybody can sell a new car. I drive a ten-year-old car and a 20-year-old car and I'm going to put off buying a new car as long as I can because the damage that's done to your car just driving on the city streets and obeying the traffic rules are just horrendous and something need to and done.

And speaking of holes, I would like to know if during motions again if there are any ideas on how the humongous hole in the 2010 budget is going be filled. The 2009 budget was filled with a \$5.5 million

windfall, hopefully it will be windfall from the Single Tax Office. What's going to replace that? How are we ever going to stop the flight to the suburbs when we have -- when we don't have parody with all of the surrounding municipalities when it comes to what we charge people to live here. More next week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. JONES: My name Bob Jones.

Hello, Council, Scranton resident. I won't talk about politics, I will just quote George Carlin, no foul language though.

It's a great city, you know, you got your rich, they do none of the work, pay none of the taxes and have all of the money it seems, right? You got your middle class, they do all the work, they pay all of the taxes, and you got your poor. They are just here to scare the hell out of the middle class so they keep showing up to their jobs.

Like before I was going to address somebody about a traffic problem, I went to Main and Parker at the light, and it seems the first person to pull up to the light has

He's got to outdo that. Then, of course, the truck that pulls up behind him with the jake brakes, he's got to outdo the guy on the motorcycle and the guy with the boom Well, it seems this happens about 24/7, you know, three in the morning you hear the boombox and the motorcycle, about 6:00 you hear the jack brakes starting and, well, I'd like to see more cops out there. That would be cool. The first time I would ever welcome cops around my house. Anyway, they are always out there --

MS. GATELLI: Maybe we'll send the one that gave all the parking tickets last night to you instead.

MR. JONES: Yeah, that'd be perfect.

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Put his power to good instead of evil.

Okay, thanks. Good luck with the election and have a good one. I got rid of the Comcast so I don't have to look at my face on the replay so that's why I came up here.

MS. GATELLI: You do a good George Carlin, too.

MR. JONES: Oh, yeah. I used to look like him. That's my George Talimini George Carlin.

MR. NEWCOMB: Good evening, City
Council. Charlie Newcomb, homeowner,
taxpayer. First I have to say that I love
this city also and I'm not going to say
anything negative and I was going to come
here with the election was Tuesday or it was
seven months from now because I'm here on
the issue that I said I'm going to come
every four or five weeks and ask what you've
got done about it, and if anything got done

I sent e-mails to all of council as far as the Washburn Street Cemetery goes. I sent letters to the mayor's office,

Mr. Seitzinger in the director of LIPS department to get no response. The only person that responded to me all of the time was Mrs. Evans and it's very frustrating to know that this is a true concern of ine and nobody will respond to me.

MR. COURTRIGHT: Charlie, there is a woman, I was on vacation, when I came back she left me message, I believe she said her name was Shirley. She has been very active in that and she is looking to do some kind of a fundraiser, so she told me that

Pevasanto's --

MR. NEWCOMB: Monuments.

MR. COURTRIGHT: Monuments, right, they will match her dollar for dollar to fix the stones and she is going to try to start with the Veteran's stones first, so she is working on something. I'm going to try to help her out and --

MR. NEWCOMB: My point is, I know what you are talking about and I was over there last weekend to help, but there wasn't many people over there, but the cemetery has been cleaned up.

MR. COURTRIGHT: It looks a lot better.

MR. NEWCOMB: It looks 100 times better because people that have family members there are doing it. My point is why aren't you going after the owner of this cemetery to do this? No individual should have to do that. We paid, and when I say "we", may family paid money for these people to do this, so everybody that is over there can't be commended.

MR. COURTRIGHT: It's supposed to be

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perpetual care.

MR. NEWCOMB: Right. But how is it not happening? That is my question. Why is everybody ignoring this? I mean, it's just a terrible thing and I have called the owner myself, didn't get a return call. Many people have called not getting response. Ι don't want to say who he is friends with, but when you put the pieces of the puzzle together it really doesn't look to good and as far as the neighborhood that he lives in, really doesn't look too good, and the size of the house that he is in, and you pay a landscaper to cut your own grass I think he should send them over to the Washburn Street Cemetery to cut the grass that people paid for because I really think it's disgusting to put it bluntly, but the people that are cleaning up, again, need to be commended for that.

lawnmower because I love this city, also,

but anybody that wants to come over to the

Washburn Street Cemetery I'm going to donate

flags to put, my grandfather was a veteran, there hasn't been a flag on his stone, every time we put it there it gets taken away or whatever, but anybody that wants to come hopefully if the weather is pretty good we will be over there cleaning it up.

Evans because every single time we go on she makes the effort to do it and she sent me a copy of the letter that she sent to LIPS and to get no reply and it's really, really sad that the people that run this city can't even do something of this nature to help and that every single e-mail and every single letter in this city that you send to people go ignored. That's truly a crime, so have a good day.

MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening. Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment Rights. All of those people, everybody that sits back and does nothing, that's fine if that's what we're comfortable with, but these are times of extreme importance, everybody should if they can attend council meetings. We as taxpayers of the City of Scranton were faced

with 25 percent tax increase in 2007.

Bankers, PEL puppets and city officials came before city council and begged for a \$44 million loan, 25 percent tax increase for 2007, two more for 2008 and 2009. 2008-9 council found the fortitude to stand up and opted out of passing a \$44 million loan, but they passed the first 25 percent tax increase and three council members, Ms. Fanucci, Mrs. Gatelli and Mr. McGoff voted in favor of it.

Even though had in 2008 and 2009 the taxes did not increase to 75 percent, we still continue to pay the 25 percent each of those years and will pay them until 2010.

So think about that when you are sitting back in your easy chairs and too lazy to get out and attend council meetings and let people, council members know what your feelings are. We have a right that our forefathers and soldiers gave us to vote, so I hope everybody gets out and vote. To sit back and do nothing is unconscionable.

Record budgets, since 2002 we have had records budgets, every one of them was

more than the Connors' administration. We paid for the record budgets totaled \$556,443,224. With all of the loans it's approximately 750 million dollars you could say is revenue. That's three-quarters of a billion dollars. The increases of the loans is \$110,110,480. That's the increases from the Connors' budget.

The slimes said that, for example, we had Ms. Evans almost annually has failed to follow-through on her promise to deliver a comprehensive budget to counter the mayor's. I'm just reiterating what other people have said. She has. They called council speakers Halloweeners, but it seems like this is only when they come out. They are Halloweeners themselves.

Issues, you know, we have forgotten a lot about them, but union busting, the 25 percent tax increase while 12 million was found in the tax office but why was it there? Two million lost to accounting errors. 5.5 million American Anglican arbitration loss. That means we get a 56 percent -- or, I'm sorry, yeah,

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56 percent rate hike. \$300 million in long-term debt; 20 million given out in raises and new hires.

Full benefits. PD parking lot, police department parking lot, not finished, paved. Last used during snow removal. 722,000 defaulted loans. Gangs where no gangs existed. A green fish pond at Nay Aug 1.2 million. Undersized bathhouse. Raw sewage on the Davis trail. Over one million paid for attorney fees to fight the unions. 267,000 wasted on the Casey Parkway renovations only to have the building torn down. Connell building reservation sitting idle. you.

"To be clear, regarding an assertion by a speaker that Janet Evans chose not to participate in a debate among city council candidates, neither Janet Evans nor any other council member is responsible for the canceling of the debate for city council candidates. The original date for the debate was mistaking set for a Tuesday night by a noncity resident that was not aware of the regular council meeting. When it was brought to the attention of the League of Women Voters of Lackawanna County, that date was immediately withdrawn.

While I am a member of the Board of the League of Women Voters of Lackawanna

County, I am not acting officially on behalf of the League, however, I am aware of the details regarding this and I do want to make it clear that Janet Evans is not the person responsible for their not being a debate.

The League itself is responsible. Thank you. Tom Welby."

Last week council received the independent auditor's report for 2008. As expected, the city's debt grew in 2008. The total principle debt of the city, it's municipal authorities for which the city has guaranteed either bonded debt or debt and capitalized leases is \$183,261,478. This total represents an increase of \$24,000,099 over 2007 audit figures.

The total long-term debt of the city, it's municipal authorities for which the city has guaranteed either bonded debt or debt and capitalized leases is \$316,107,741, an increase of \$42,767,513 over 2007 audit figures. This long-term debt extends to the Year 2043 for the Parking Authority alone. A 22-year-old college graduate who wishes to remain in Scranton will be 56 years old when this debt is completely paid. Have our children and grandchildren's futures been mortgaged? You better believe they have.

In addition, it is important to

remember that these figures do not include fiscal year 2009. It seems the Parking Authority may be trying to obtain another line of credit or a loan to make it's debt payments and at this time I don't know what financial avenues the mayor will propose in his 2010 budget outside of cuts to workers rather than management, another sale of real estate tax receivables to the Redevelopment Authority and Municipal Revenue Services, and possible increased parking fees.

Further, these 2008 figures do not include the city's looming 2011 increased pension obligations.

It is important to note that the city may well use January 1, 2007, valuations for the 2010 budget. What this serves to do is to postpone the big hit, the big financial hit to 2011. It is also crucial to your quality of life in Scranton to remember that our long-term debt, total long-term debt is over \$316,000,000, well over a quarter of a billion dollars.

Do you want to pay down this debt or continue the status quo of borrowing and

spending? Do you want to stop 25 percent tax increases or are you happy to keep paying for them? We are in a serious recession, ladies and gentlemen. Many Scrantonians don't have family-sustaining jobs and the elderly receive no increase in their social security checks. Can you really afford four more years of the same? Please answer these questions for yourself before you vote on November 3.

Finally, as a city council woman and a resident of Scranton, I want patrol women

Jill Foley and Melissa Forsetti to know they have my full support. I do not approve of the apparent ongoing discriminating treatment they have received while trying to perform their daily jobs.

And lastly, I did receive, as did other council members, a request from a citizen regarding a very dangerous situation in South Side. I have made this request before possibly two weeks ago, but I would like this once again, Kay, passed onto the police chief, please.

And then finally if we can fill the

depression or pothole at the corner of Adams and Spruce and I believe I asked for that as also, several weeks ago and, in fact, I spoke to Mr. Vitris personally about it, he told me it would be taken care of the next day, but unfortunately, I am hearing tonight that that was wasn't the case, and that's all.

MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Fanucci.

MS. FANUCCI: I am going to respond to a few of the question from tonight.

First, let me say that the word not political went really well tonight. It was a downright disgrace as always. This forum is beyond corrupt. Everything that has been said here and pointing fingers to other people it's so funny because it seems to be okay when it's your people. Amazing to me. Absolutely amazing. As long as you use it to your advantage I guess it works.

Remember that everything that is wrapped in a pretty bow is not always a great package.

We hear here all of these solutions constantly, they sound great, they really do. When you pick them apart piece by piece

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they don't work. They don't work. why don't we park in lots, we have lots all over this city, we don't own the lots. have to understand the procedure that goes Ideas are as good as can be implemented, but to come out here and to toss all of these things around and get mad because they are not being done you have no idea what it takes, so maybe when you are talking about research and who doesn't do their homework you should be looking back at yourselves. You come here criticizing week after week without doing your own homework. Why? Because it's so well played out when you have, you know, 20 of you coming here with all of your wonderful scripts and your plays and it all looks so wonderful to the taxpayer, at the end they are going to realize they are been duped in such a big way it's going to be sad and not sad for everyone, sad for the normal taxpayer home, the people that you claim to be here representing. It so sad. It is so sad. You take advantage of that. That is sad.

You come here week after week saying

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about the tax increase. Yeah, terrible decision. Hard to take. Didn't want to do Would never want to do it, but guess What's going to happen in the future, what? you don't raise taxes. It's going to go to a judge, they are going to declare bankruptcy, it's going to go to a judge and the judge is going to raise it three times Why? Because that's exactly what's going to happen. You are taking it out of your elected officials and into somewhere where it's a Court making decisions about your taxes. Mark my words you go into bankruptcy that's what going to happen.

Please, I'm going start being like
Mr. Ancherani and I'm going to start making
predictions, that's one of my predictions.

If you let this go these are the problems.

You can't ignore them. You can't ignore
them. Just like you can't say let's take
the budget and cut half of it out and still
function as a city. Not feasible, and you
can't do it. You can't do it. Its sounds
wonderful. I would love to. Four years ago

I would have sat here and said, you know what, I'm going to get rid of every tax in this city, I'm going to cut the budget in half and we are all going to live in this wonderful fairytale, but you know what the whole entire United States of America couldn't do it. Why? Because it's the way we are functioning as a country. It's awful. It's awful.

I sit here week after week listening to how I am corrupt. I'm corrupt. It's a disgrace. I'm corrupt because I sit and discuss and try to figure out solutions instead of just putting out the anti? so easy to be anti, you don't have to do anything. I would love that job. I have been saying it for four years. Give me a place where I could say, you know what, you are wrong, you are wrong, you are wrong and sit back. It's a perfect storm. that. In fact, maybe some day that might be me, but for now I'm still trying to figure it out and trying to make good decisions, decisions that aren't just about the ten people in this room because the ten people

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in this room still have agendas. Even after the elections, after all of that we still have taxpayers.

Some people come here and represent people who aren't paying their taxes for years and years and years and that's okay. Because they are our friends. Why? That's different. It's okay. They are running a website for us and we are thrilled. don't care about taxes. We don't care they are not paying the firemen or the policemen standing anywhere in this city or the workers who are in city hall or all over, it's okay. Let's not worry about paying them, they are our people. It's awesome. It's not right. It's not right.

You talk about independent thinkers, you talk about being anti everything, it is your taxpayer and you who are suffering. I sit up here as a taxpayer, we all do. Week after week we make decisions because of the way we feel and think and beliefs.

I had a speaker come up tonight and say they can't find one job that was created. I don't know where you weren't

paying attention. Every time we give out a loan there is jobs created. It's part of the program. You have to create the job so there you go. You want your one job, there was two last week, so if you don't understand where these things are happening or how they are happening it's okay.

We also have a big company right now who actually are increasing I think to like 165 jobs paying \$90,000 a year salary.

Yeah. Check it out. You might want a job.

Well, I wouldn't think you would, really.

But the thing is you can't sit here and say and accuse people and point the finger without all of your facts. This is not about elections, this is about your government and you have hijacked it to the point of insanity, quite frankly, and I'm not saying you are insane, don't go off on your website tonight and all get all nervous, I am saying that you have really duped the public into a real sad, sad situation.

Another question from one of the speakers, why aren't we investigating?

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Personnel issues are personnel issues. When it is a personnel problem personnel has to take care of it, just like the unions have that same deal like -- there is a lot we can't do because they are union protected. Personnel has the same, they have to take care of it in the way that they have, we can't do that, that's us. We can't. So that is why we didn't have a big investigation for you.

Maintenance fees, one of the things that came up tonight, sounds great. Still a Still can't do it. Still illegal. I'm so offended by what it is that you think you know. On a daily day basis I'm offended because you have no clue what goes into this You have no clue. You have a clue of job. what you want out of in job and why you are here what you want out of it, what you want to get, and I hope when you get it you are as responsible as you claim to be because I actually feel sad. I feel sad for the city because protecting and going against everything is not making anyone any better. You will be a stalemate, instead of four

years ago I'm going to say it now, you will actually just keep going backward and that's what you want.

Do I believe that any of this should take place in this forum? No. But I have lost that battle four years ago. This has been -- this is nothing but politics at it's worst. When you go out there and vote do your homework, and remember if it's wrapped pretty and it looks nice doesn't mean that it's going to do the job and sometimes the job is not easy, but just going against the job all of the time is also not the answer. Working and actually pretending are two different things, and that is all I have. Thank you.

MS. GATELLI: I just have a few items. I wanted to thank the DPW for taking down the houses at 518-520 Emmett Street.

It was done today by our own DPW.

I would also like to see if we can send a letter to Jeff Brazil. They are having a problem on the corner of Cedar and Genet Street. There is a bus stop there in the morning and the cars are speeding down

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Cedar Avenue so if we can't put some signs on both sides saying "School Bus Stop," you know, "Drive Slowly Children" in the area there or something to that affect that Cedar Avenue does not have many traffic lights and people tend to speed down that hill rather quickly and they are having the problem with the children.

I would like to announce a meeting, I don't know if this is the proper forum, but I'm going to do it anyway. St. Francis Church, which I have talked about in the past, is where I am a parishioner and our church has been made a worship site. have been consolidated with two other parishes. We are meeting on Monday evening at 6:30 at the Dante Club. We have been meeting for several weeks now. trying to get a different mass at our church and we are trying to prevent our church from being closed, so I wanted to make the announcement because we don't see all of the parishioners anymore and we want to get it out to them that we are having these meetings on Monday evenings at 6:30 at the

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Dante Club and any parishioner of ST.

Francis of Assisi Church is certainly welcome to come.

The only other thing I have to say is I know Mr. Ancherani likes to talk with all of his numbers and his borrowing and, you know, I like to answer him back and he won't make the bet for the lunch this year I don't know why he won't make that bet with me, he did every other year but this year he won't make it. I know that quite a few of you in this particular audience right now don't care for Mr. Doherty and your choice for mayor will be Mr. DiBileo, but I wanted to bring out the fact that the three people sitting here whose name are brought up all of the time for borrowing Mrs. Gatelli, Mrs. Fanucci and Mr. McGoff, I could say your speech in my sleep, Nelson, I have heard it so many times, but he fails to tell you that Mr. DiBileo borrowed money, too. They don't want to tell you that. In 2002 he borrowed \$7.7 million, in 2003 he borrowed four million, in 2004 he borrowed nine million and in 2005 he borrowed

14.5 million for a total of 35.2 million dollars. So I just want the public to know that this isn't all about us borrowing money. It's about who they want to pick for their mayoral candidate. He also borrowed money and they don't bring that issue out into the public and I think the public should know that, that he also borrowed money over the years that he served on council.

It's not always an easy decision when you are sitting up here to raise taxes, that's not an easy thing to do to tell people you have to pay an extra \$75 a year tacked onto your bill, but sometimes you think you are doing the right thing.

Would I have liked the police contract to be settled, yeah, sure I would. And if it was settled and they needed a raise I would vote to raise the taxes for that, I'd have to be honest with you, and I told you that to your face, Nelson, that that's the only reason I would raise the taxes again would be to fund the police and fire department. So, yeah, sometimes we

have to raise the taxes. They weren't raised in 12 years. The school district raises them every year and I don't see any of you up there saying anything up there. You are only down here. You don't go to the county, of course, they are doing a great job, you know, cutting their budget and laying people off which is what we plan to do in the city this year. There is going to be layoffs because we are not going to raise the taxes again and we are not going to borrow anymore money, so we can promise you that, there will be layoffs in this budget.

Use your head when you are going to the polls and see what people have done and what they are all about and whether they will answer the public's questions or whether they won't. I'll still be around, I told you that. I always tried to do what I thought was best for the community. I never intentionally wanted to hurt any poor people or put them out of their house, I only wanted to do what I thought in my opinion was the right thing. I will continue in my neighborhood and I will continue to work

with the city council that's elected and home this they will have the same idea for my neighborhood as I have had for the last 30 years, and that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Courtright.

MR. COURTRIGHT: First, Mrs. Krake referenced Barry, I hope -- I think she is referencing Barry Pierce. If it is Barry I hope you are feeling well.

I think I spoke on this last week about the lots and somebody brought up about it tonight, just because the city tears down a property and the lot is empty doesn't mean that the city owns it and so, therefore, they wouldn't be able to just put parked cars on it and if, in fact, they did own it then in order to park a vehicle on it where there was a house they would have get a variance to come across the sidewalk and neighbors aren't too pleased with you doing that, but just a little information.

Oh, I'm glad Mrs. Williams stepped back in, I was not laughing at you, Mrs. Williams, what I was laughing at was the situation we find ourself in this evening

because in the back room we said we weren't going to allow any politics and I guess that went to the wayside. That's what I was laughing at, I wasn't latching at you. I think I have tried not to laugh at anybody here since I have been here. You got to --my mother used to yell at me when I first got on council for that. "You can't laugh, that doesn't look good."

You got admit, sometimes there is some funny things that happen here and I just can't help but laugh, you know, so I hope I haven't offended anybody by my laughing.

And Sam Vitris came, when we get done here I'll call down to roll call and see if the shift commander is there, if they went out and they ticketed at 4:00 in the morning, believe me, unless it was some rogue officer I don't think at 4:00 in the morning they're happy things calm down at that time, they are not looking to ticket people. There must have been a directive or an order coming down. How do I say this without offending anybody? Sometimes you

will get a neighbor that just keeps on calling and keeps on calling and keeps on calling and maybe you parked your car that way for the last 25 years but this neighbor just keeps on and they finally say we got to go out and ticket to do something about it, so I'm sure it was an order or a directive came down, I don't think it was one rogue officer running around the city the other night, but I will find out tonight and I will report back to Mr. Vitris next week.

And lastly, when I do work the polls, and I'm going to say for any candidate not even for myself, I work at Keyser Valley, and we have been fortunate, I haven't seen anybody have any trouble at this poll arguing or fighting even though obviously there are opposing sides there, but I have seen it or heard of it anyway at other polls and, you know, whoever is going to win is going to win and I just hope that election day we don't see any of that, there is not going to be anybody fighting or not getting arrested and if your candidate wins great. If your candidate loses life goes on

so try to not carry it with you forever and although we won't see you next week we will see you the following week, and that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: I believe that we as a council, and me in particular, made a huge mistake this evening. Instead of barring all political talk I think in the future I would suggest that we just give everybody five minutes to speak about whatever candidate they want or candidates and just let it go. Trying to -- trying to stop people from making political speeches here, as I found out this evening, is an impossibility and a no-win situation.

Council is not meant to be -- the podium is not meant to be a political podium, it's meant for business, but unfortunately, since everyone here is elected it becomes -- it becomes part of the electoral process and I guess maybe unavoidable that people will speak on behalf of their candidates, so in the future perhaps I would suggest that whoever has to sit in the seat that they make no attempt to

try and stop it, they simply allow it to
happen and move on. And that's all. Fifth
