MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? Citizens' participation. Todd Hartman.

MR. HARTMAN: Good evening, Council.

I'll be very short with you. I am having a little problem, maybe you guys can help me out with it, whoever is familiar with it.

My name is Todd Hartman, I'm from East Mountain section of town. I reside at 107 Moltke Avenue and I'm building a new home in the 1600 block of Birch Street, okay?

As you know, there is an ongoing property dispute between me and Mr. Bolus here over a deeded easement between Bob and myself and my wife and the property dispute is currently making it's way through the Lackawanna County Court system. Colleen and

I are aware where it needs to be worked out is there, however, Bob has decided to make it into a childish game like he does with many things. I am certain from this that many appearances here you can all sympathize with me because Bob usually does.

My concern is that he is turning the 1600 block of Birch Street into a junk yard, okay? He has junk tractors there on the side of my house, okay, that have been sitting there for just about three months, okay? You know, the neighbors are complaining to me, Mrs. Slotterback is my next door neighbor, there is litigation with them two. It's a terrible eyesore for the people that live in the 1600 block of Birch Street, okay? What I'm asking you Council to do is have the zoning officer investigate his blight property.

I'm trying not to involve council in my -- into my property dispute, however, I do firmly believe that the taxpayers, including myself, should not have to look at junk lining their streets on the City of Scranton and, like I said, I will be very

brief, I won't hold you up. I do have a couple of pictures if you guys would like to take a gander at them. Mrs. Slotterback would like to have a word, also.

MS. SLOTTERBACK: I'm Carol
Slotterback. My husband is Michael Oaks.
We have lived on East Mountain for 13 years.
We recently purchased an undeveloped lot
1625 Birch Street, which is right next to
our property 1527 Birch. It was purchased
two years ago, we pay the taxes. I even
successfully appealed the taxes when we
first bought the lot and we maintain -- the
deed is in our name.

Mr. Bolus -- there is an easement on the property, Mr. Bolus has permission to use that easement to go back and forth to the property behind us, but he has turned it into a parking lot. There are these huge, I don't even know what you call them, they look like tractor-trailer ends without the wheels on them and they are that big. He also has a car parked on the property and he does not have permission to have these things on our property. We have asked them

to remove them, he will not remove them.

Because of the placement, he can't get dump trucks back to his property. We don't know what he is doing back there, but he constantly has dump trucks going back and forth.

On Monday, November 16, my husband found Mr. Bolus bulldozing our property on the other side of the easement knocking down small trees, damaging larger trees and then he put down gravel essentially enlarging the area for the his trucks to go back and forth. This was done without other permission. It was not on the easement, he is encroaching on our land.

We called the police, they did nothing to stop Mr. Bolus and, in fact, they told him to continue with what he was doing and he doesn't own the property and it just -- this is driving me insane. We want the city to enforce their own laws. Give the police officers the power to arrest the transgressors, develop a spine and arrest him for damaging our property, and that's about all I can think of you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, 6-B, this has to deal with setting up a new authority for our library system. Now, I don't -- nothing is worth sitting up there when we transfer the deed for the South Side complex to the SRA under the impression they were going to take care of the South Side Complex, but they had no intention of taking care. They were already talking to the University about them buying it.

Now, let's look at this,

Mrs. Fanucci wanted to know when they borrow

if they have to come before council, she was

going to ask her lawyer, but I tell you, the

better question to ask is if the deeds are

transferred to this authority do they have

the right to sell it without --

MS. FANUCCI: I did ask. I asked that also last week.

MR. SBARAGLIA: And what did he say?

MS. FANUCCI: We got the answers. In fact, he is looking at them tonight, we just

discussed that in caucus, but I also did ask him that because that is concern for all of us.

MR. SBARAGALIA: That's more of a concern --

MS. FANUCCI: I agree.

MR. SBARAGLIA: The paper already months and months ago, I gave Janet the copy, where they said Scranton/Lackawanna College was interested in buying that building and they are probably still interested in buying it.

MS. FANUCCI: Attorney Minora is checking that out now for us and he should have an answer by the end of the meeting.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Now, you also know this is a lame duck session of the legislature, two of yous will not be here come -- that's voted for this in January, so hence that's what they call a lame duck, and the laws of the Commonwealth do have recourse in things like this.

Now, if one of the council that's newly elected that's going to serve there should bring this up in Court, which they

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have all the rights to, because this is very controversial, maybe they can stop it, and I would think that would be the better thing to do because we can't trust this mayor. The South Side Complex has shown this, not only he did that, but he went down to Harrisburg and hired a company to talk all of the legislatures how bad that complex was and it wasn't bad. There is no reason for it, it's not bad even today. We still own it all because I guess Mr. Pilchesky filed a lawsuit and that's the reason we didn't lose it completely yet. How that may turn out, I don't know, but it's in litigation with the federal.

But this with the library is not a good thing. It shouldn't be brought at this session, it should be left for the next session and let them handle it. That's more prudent. If you really care about the library system let the new council handle it because people are going to remember you long after this happens. You can laugh all you want.

MS. FANUCCI: I think it's funny.

1 You're saying if I really care let other people handle it. 2 3 MR. SBARAGLIA: I don't think you do 4 care. MS. FANUCCI: That's a --5 MR. SBARAGALIA: Mrs. Fanucci, you 6 7 don't care about anything or you wouldn't 8 have voted for 90 percent of the things you 9 voted for, but I don't want to get into that 10 with you. 11 MS. FANUCCI: Oh, that's very sad of 12 you to say and very inaccurate. 13 MR. MCGOFF: Please, let 14 Mr. Sbaraglia --15 MS. FANUCCI: Keep going, Andy, 16 you're always on a roll, and it's pretty 17 good --18 MR. SBARAGLIA: No, you try to break 19 it up all the time. 20 MS. FANUCCI: Break it up? 21 MR. SBARAGLIA: But my job doesn't 22 depend on how I talk before you, I don't know if yours does. 23 24 MS. FANUCCI: I don't know. 25 MR. SBARAGLIA: I don't know anything

about you and could care less, but how you 1 vote does make a difference and I believe 2 3 you should let this go to the new council. There is no reason for you to be voting on 4 That's why it was brought up at 5 it now. this time only because the new council would 6 7 not be there and he is afraid it wouldn't go 8 through the new council, so don't give me 9 any of this bull. I'm quite familiar with 10 what happens at this council, I have been 11 coming here for ten years, I understand how 12 it works. MS. FANUCCI: I will continue to do 13 14 my job until I leave, Andy. 15 MR. SBARAGLIA: No, you're not doing 16 your job. 17 MS. FANUCCI: I will continue to do 18 my job until I leave. 19 MR. SBARAGLIA: Forget it. There is 20 no sense talking to you. 21 MS. FANUCCI: Exactly. 22 MR. MCGOFF: Ozzie Quinn. 23 MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn, I'm 24 president of the Scranton/Lackawanna County 25 Taxpayers' Association, Incorporated. When

Mr. Doherty came into office there was a deficit and indebtedness of 26 million. He has now increased it seven fold, we are now in debt \$182 million principle only. Can you fathom that, \$182 million?

Now, I just got the new debt from the school board and it's \$142 million, the county has -- I've gotten October, it's \$221 million so I had to prorate that based on the housing and so on and I figure that's about another \$77 million, so we are talking about over \$400 million the taxpayers in the City of Scranton is in debt. That's principle only. How the heck are we going to get out of that? You know, we are presenting a budget here and it's got a hole in it, okay? Everything, too, in the budget is based on presupposition, okay?

You have the fact that you have a golf course, you know, that's going to be ironed out because when the golf course was supposed to be for recreation and parks and now he wants to plug it in as a one-time infusion to help with the last year's budget. You have real estate, he again

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wants to hire the Draconian real estate -the collection agency that is raping our
people in the City of Scranton and putting
them out in the street. He wants to give
them another \$2 million of revenue in the
city.

He has the parking tickets, parking meters raised up to \$750,000. I was glad to see the Scranton Times not support that today and the fact is, too, that you know, PEL says it should be a dollar fifty. Now, who in the heck is PEL? They are not elected by us, actually we elect the state representatives, the local representatives and the federal representatives. PEL is a bunch of cronies that operate an agency who are cronies of Rendell, okay? And they should have nothing to say about the City of Scranton. Comcast, that's got to be bid out, it's \$3 million in there.

Now, I want to mention a point, I tried to get a meeting with the oversight committee, Mr. Welby, Tom Welby, and he agreed to meet with us but he said he wanted to talk to John Darcy, okay, from ECTV and

John Darcy told Tom Welby that the mayor calls the shots and they will not meet with the oversight committee, subsequently, they won't meet with us, okay. Because what's the sense of meeting with them, okay? Now, this is bizarre. We all know the mayor calls the shots. You look at ECTV and they don't have a program listing.

We had a forum with the city council, we had a forum with the judges and it was shown -- no program listing, it was shown at 3:00 in the morning. I mean, is this fair to the people in the City of Scranton. Does Mr. Doherty own that?

Now, the wage taxes, the wage tax
has decreased from last year from
\$34,041,181 to \$28,421,107, well, round it
out \$5,600,000. Now, Mr. Doherty is going
around the state saying he has created
thousands of jobs. Why is this wage tax
lowered if he's created thousands of jobs?
You know, he's delusional. The man is
delusional and we are suffering because he
doesn't care. All he cares about is getting
a resume out there, getting his budget

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passed, no matter if it's all -- if it's all axiomatic and he wants to get it out there so that he can say, "I have a budget out there," when he goes over to Fall Spring out there by Allegheny County where people don't know him. He is not going to fool me, he is not going to fool the Taxpayers' Association.

Now, I hope he is not going to fool the city council and I hope at this time you will consider looking at this budget very closely, all right? And, you know, if you have to put it on hold because he wants to cut jobs as a way of doing things, my God, you know, if he is going to cut jobs let him cut the managerial jobs where all of the fat I want to point out that he is, you know? has hired so many people, millions of dollars that he has given for new hires in this city hall and the ones he didn't hire in city hall he sends down to the Sewer Authority and to the Parking Authority. Не has hired 38 people down in the Sewer Authority, average wage is \$35,000.

Now, why do I say that? Because

every expenditure that the Sewer Authority might effect the rate of the taxpayers, so we are looking at the budget that's coming up and we are looking at the Scranton Sewer Authority who is leaning over our shoulders in regards to the Chesapeake Bay and the new rate for the Sewer Authority. Thank you very much.

MR. MCGOFF: Bob Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council,
Bob Bolus, Scranton. I'm kind of glad I
attended tonight to listen to Hartman come
in here whining and crying. We own property
on East Mountain since 1984. I have a
right-of-way to go in and out of there, it's
a deeded right-of-way. Slotterback bought
the lot, they have to accept what's in the
deed. I'm not going to try and challenge
the council here tonight or dispute anything
they are doing. We are in Court, we will
let a Court of law to determine who is right
and who is wrong.

I will say, however, on the other part that Slotterback came in and complained about is on an adverse possession where the

last 100 years. The merits of the case will be determined in a Court, not by the city council. I am protecting my asset that I invested in. When the trees and everything were cut infringing on my right-of-way, I protected myself by putting containers there to prevent Hartman from coming across on my. Property. As simple as that. The Court will determine whether they stay or they go.

However, since he come in here

roadway had been since -- well, almost the

However, since he come in here whining and crying, the subdivision that was granted by the city has allowed Mr. Hartman to build his home on a deeded right-of-way, a waterway owned by the City of Scranton that goes right under his house. In fact, 16 1/2 half foot of his home, the center of his home, is on the deeded right-of-way that this city allowed him to do. The city was notified, the solicitor was notified and they permitted him because of his political connections in the city, he has got a featherbedding job at the Sewer Authority, used Sewer Authority equipment up on his house, sat there on city time and watched

his house being built and I took pictures of it.

So this goes on with your authorities, but Hartman wants to come in and cry and I want this council to enforce the law that he is crying about to remove his home from the 16 1/2 foot right-of-way that this city owns. It's land and water of the Americas. I have been in contact with the Army Corp, the DEP and the other bodies out here who simply say the City of Scranton turns a blind eye and allowed the subdivision to happen when they shouldn't have.

So that's what before the council, too, to enforce the laws that Hartman is crying about and Slotterback when they infringe on my privacy and my quiet enjoyment, charges are being filed tomorrow for the destruction of my personal property by Slotterback's husband that removed dirt, not dirt but fill that we put in to protect the road that had been damaged by Hartman and everything else, so that's what's before council and I'm glad I came tonight. More

importantly, as you are about to vote --1 MS. GATELLI: Mr. Bolus, I do 2 3 understand that there is a dispute between you and Mr. Hartman --4 MS. BOLUS: Is this losing my time, 5 Judy? 6 MS. GATELLI: No. 7 8 MR. BOLUS: Thank you. 9 MS. GATELLI: No, of course not. 10 However, when I look at these pictures and I 11 see these tractor trailers, you know, the 12 one has no wheels or these --13 MR. BOLUS: They are containers, 14 Judy, they are considered containers. They 15 are no longer tractor trailers, they are 16 containers and you will see them parked at 17 Target and --18 MS. GATELLI: My question is why 19 would you park these there? Why are they 20 parked there? 21 MR. BOLUS: To protect Hartman from 22 crossing from his property where he built 23 his home thinking that he could go from his 24 garage and drive right out into the easement 25 that's my easement. They are there to

protect me. We put up signs that said -- -1 2 MS. GATELLI: My point is why do you 3 have to do that? Why can't you just let the Court decide it? 4 MR. BOLUS: Because Hartman wouldn't 5 pay attention when I said, "Please don't do 6 7 it," he intended to continue. MS. GATELLI: Well, because he thinks 8 he is right. You know --9 10 MR. BOLUS: Well, he gets --11 MS. GATELLI: And the Court --12 MR. BOLUS: He gets --13 MS. GATELLI: Listen to me. Listen 14 to me for a minute, the Court will decide 15 it. 16 MR. BOLUS: Absolutely. 17 MS. GATELLI: That's what you said. 18 MR. BOLUS: That's correct. MS. GATELLI: Your own words said the 19 20 Court will decide it so why are you being 21 spiteful and leaving these junk trailers there? 22 23 MR. BOLUS: They are not junk, first 24 of all. Number two, Judy, they are used all 25 over and I'll show you we got over 300 of

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these that are at stores and warehouses all over, number one. Number two --

MS. GATELLI: I don't think so, Bob.

MR. BOLUS: Let me finish, Judy, so you understand --

MS. GATELLI: Two wrongs don't make a right.

MR. BOLUS: -- he took it upon himself to trespass over and I asked him to stop, he threatened me physically, and I can go into the language he used and everything that he was threatening me to do there, okay? The police were up there, he called the TV cameras, he brought attention to what he was doing and he infringed on my privacy. Remember, he moved into my neighborhood, I didn't have move into his. I never infringed on anybody. He cut all the trees, the barrier between his property and my easement. I'm entitled to my privacy. decided to continue to come over there. He threatened and told me off my own privacy by calling DeNaples he said to come move the stuff, but we have bigger trucks than DeNaples as you know our records.

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MS. GATELLI: I just don't think that's the way to solve an issue.

MR. BOLUS: The way I solved it is he continued to keep doing it and the only resource I have was the protect my property rights and that's what I put there in lieu of a fence or a wall at my expense I put there to protect my rights and my privacy that they were infringing on and the Court will determine whether they stay or they leave. It's not a city ordinance that controls that, and if the city ordinance is going to worry about that, then the city ordinance should worry about him building his house on a federally mandated waterways that goes from East Mountain Lake, the dam there if there is a disaster you cannot drain the dam now because he infringed on waterway to release the water. That should be more than important than the dispute we have right here, but -- you had taken my time --

> MS. GATELLI: Go ahead.

MR. BOLUS: -- on that and I would like to continue what I really came here

for.

MR. MINORA: I included the time.

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MR. BOLUS: Judy had given me time,

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by the way.

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MR. MINORA: I included the time.

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You had six minutes.

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MS. GATELLI: He included it.

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BOLUS: Well, I didn't know that MR. or I would have stopped when we were discussing that with Hartman. I'm here about the golf course money that's in the budget that we fought to put in there, the \$3 million dollars, a million five went out, there is a million five left. Four members of this council voted to leave it in the budget, leave it there and never touch it I don't believe three members of again. this council can now vote to take that money back out and give it to the mayor. That was put away for the people of this city for the parks and recreation and only the interest be used, and I don't believe you now have the authority after the last time you put it in here to now try and take it and put it in the budget.

There are other revenue sources other than taking from the people of this city and taking from what their future is and to give to a mayor who has just squandered money hand over hand at the expense of the taxpayers in this city.

You've got a library authority that shouldn't even be considered because the next thing you will see the library sold to Lackawanna College or the "U" and for purpose? We had the chance to buy Southern Union's building and make that a library for a quarter of the cost, so people don't seem to see the issues here by looking for new ways to create fees and bringing additional revenue to the city.

This mayor has run rampant, he has got to be controlled and you can no longer take this golf course money without a legal challenge from the people in this city to protect our interests. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Lynn Bloom.

MS. BLOOM: Oh, fun, fun, fun. I find it interesting that so many laws -- oh, first I'd like to say thank you to

Mr. Courtright for providing the legal answer onto when why there can't be a change of venue for these meetings.

MS. FANUCCI: State your name.

MS. BLOOM: I already did. Lynn Bloom. The word law is thrown around in these chambers an awful lot, but yet we have one council member who was upset because a police officer actually did his job. I looked at properties on Eynon Street, I wouldn't buy on Eynon Street. These people pay less property taxes because of Eynon Street, but you felt it was inappropriate for a police officer within his scope of duties to ticket cars, but I am expected to follow the laws. Humm, really makes me wonder.

Mrs. Fanucci, about two weeks before Veteran's Day you criticized the taxpayers' involvement in these chambers. I want to let you know as the wife of a career serviceman you have offended me and everyone who has ever worn the uniform. The 21st century has less people involved in our political process in the United States than

1 almost at any other time in history and you 2 have the audacity to sit there and because 3 you simply disagree put people down. People don't understand, you don't want solutions, 4 maybe it's your job as elected official to 5 educate them on the process instead of 6 7 saying they simply don't understand it. 8 MS. FANUCCI: I'd like say you 9 haven't been here for the last four years --10 MS. BLOOM: Excuse me. 11 MS. FANUCCI: You would understand 12 that's what I've been trying to do. 13 MS. BLOOM: Excuse me. This is my 14 time. 15 MS. FANUCCI: Did you address me? 16 MS. BL00M: It's --17 MS. FANUCCI: Do you want an answer 18 or not? Do you want an answer? Keep going 19 You just keep badgering me and I'll 20 sit here and --21 MS. BLOOM: I'm not badgering you at 22 You are a very rude woman. all. 23 MR. MCGOFF: Please. 24 MS. FANUCCI: See, there you go. 25 MS. BLOOM: You don't think what you

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just did is rude?

MS. FANUCCI: You're setting a better example. Go ahead.

MR. MCGOFF: Please, continue Mrs. Bloom.

MS. BLOOM: You are an elected official. If you are personally offended, take a training class, learn to deal with There is something called professional presence. I have lived all throughout this country and around the world and I have never seen, expect in Japan where they break out in fights, anyone take things that are said to heart and attack their own critics. If you can't handle it, you shouldn't have That's political life in the United It's nothing unique to this States. council, it's nothing unique to the City of Scranton, and how dare you, you don't now long I have been watching it on TV or how long I have been reading the Scranton Times. I planned for six years before I moved into in city. A lot of planning goes into everything I do, something some of you should benefit before you pass legislation.

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And as far as this library authority, give me a break. It is the only recourse you guys have to transfer a deed is to create a new authority? You got an attorney, there has to be another way. you all going to sit there and deny that the other two authorities have run amuck? did not listen to anything any of the people that take the time and come here to say. It's like they are beneath you. You seem to think that you upon high on know so much more.

Well, the fact is we are all adults, we stopped relying on our parents a long time ago and it's not up to any of you to chastise other adults. Mike Dudek, 608 Depot Street, Scranton, I
live -- I still live down there in the Plot
and I certainly hope I don't add to what I
feel is somewhat of a hostile room today,
but I did come to reiterate and to if
anything strengthen my opposition to a
library authority.

Throughout the history of the City of Scranton going back at least to 1957 and 1958, with the Scranton Redevelopment Authority and looking at all of the other authorities that have been created in this city since then every one of them has committed a tremendous amount of mischief and there is absolutely no control that city council has over an authority once it is

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created. Let me repeat that. There is absolutely, positively no control a city council has whatsoever over any authority once it is created. It becomes a monster unto his itself.

Now, when I look at -- you know, last week it was Mr. Sbaraglia who beat me to the punch and today Bob Bolus beat me to the bunch. Mr. Bolus pointed out that a new library would fit quite well into the Southern Union building. My God, what a perfect location. The New York Public Library, Midtown Manhattan. Philadelphia Public Library, downtown Philadelphia. same thing in Pittsburgh, the same thing in most important American cities, a convenient location for a large centralized public library. Why not? I was thinking in terms of just the current housing across the street from Lackawanna Junior College, Mr. Bolus has a better idea. The Southern Union building would be magnificent and you don't need an authority to do that.

MS. FANUCCI: It's already owned by someone.

MR. DUDEK: Well, one thing about -okay, if it's already owned by someone then
as a city council you've got two options:
The first option would be buy it back from
them and the second option would be look for
another location. But, you know, again too,
the area that I had talked about last week,
that decrepit housing could be irreplaceable
with a new library building, but in any case
we don't need an authority to do this. A
created authority will have created waste to
raise our taxes. Our taxes have gone up
enough as they are. The authority method is
the absolute positive wrong way to go about
this.

Please, please, understand where I'm coming from on this, I'm not just an ordinary citizen without any kind of background in this. I have a background in government, I have an academic background in it, and from everything I have ever learned about government the biggest problems that have been created since the enabling of the legislation was passed in 1946 in this country was that authorities tend to cause

more problems than they will ever solve and this one is just a looming monster that will have an awful lot of power that we will not control once it's created. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Joe Dwyer.

MR. DWYER: Good evening, members of council and citizens of Scranton. I would like to share with you what's going on with the working poor and the homeless situation in our community. We have been taking kerosene heaters and fuel to the encampments providing a heating source for the people who are living in the woods and along the rivers and railroad tracks in our community and today we are just blessed by somebody who heard about what was going on and offered us four apartments to use as we feel the need, so the word is getting out.

And some people after the meeting
last week asked or offered their help and
offered to donate certain things and what
had happened out of that as well is two
people were able to go back to work.
Somebody needed a pair of shoes because
their soles were completely off their shoes.

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We provided a pair of shoes and now they have work. They still don't make enough money yet to get into an apartment because they require first month, last month and security deposit to get into a house. are trying to work on that.

There is money appropriated through the President Obama and the homeless stimulus program -- initiative, I'm sorry. Homeless Initiative Program, that program is specifically designed and said to facilitate the people who are on the edge of losing their house or have recently lost housing. The Department of Community Development has access to those resources, they didn't disburse all of these funds to the local community support groups. What they are doing is squandering the money buying homes, sitting on some of homes, but what they did with one is they invested \$300,000 into it and sold it to somebody who didn't need a house for \$95,000. That's the type of stuff that needs to stop. They don't --

MS. FANUCCI: They put \$300,000 into a home?

MR. DWYER: Yes.
MS. FANUCCI: Do you know what home
that is?
MR. DWYER: Over in South Side.
MS. FANUCCI: Really? \$300,000 from
OECD.
MR. DWYER: They paid \$185,000 for
the house, paid \$95,000 to renovate the
house and then sold that house for \$95,000.
MS. GATELLI: Do you have an address
for that?
MR. DWYER: We can get that.
MS. FANUCCI: I can't imagine that.
MS. GATELLI: Was it Lackawanna
Neighbors?
MR. DWYER: No, the Office of
Community Development.
MS. GATELLI: They don't do houses.
MS. FANUCCI: They don't do houses.
MR. DWYER: That's how they are
the ones who did the house.
MS. FANUCCI: No, they don't do that.
MR. DWYER: The Office of Community
Development did the house.

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without coming through us, so we'll take the address and we'll check into it, but they certainly could not have done that, it had to go through this.

In fact, I'll bring the MR. DWYER: information next week because it needs to stop. They won't get out and visit the people in the community that are living along the woods. Reverend Phil Schultz from the Scranton Rescue Mission this past Sunday, man, there were -- if there weren't 200 people down at this church this Sunday night just looking for -- just looking for help. They weren't looking for a handout, but the people that were working, they are not looking for a handout, they are just looking for a hand to lift them up, to take them over that bridge with a guy with a pair of shoes.

We called up a temporary employment agency and they said, "Send the people up, we will give them jobs."

All they need is a hand. They are not looking to be a burden on the community.

They want to -- the ones who are working are

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paying taxes and living in the woods. That isn't right. I thank you for your time.

MR. MCGOFF: Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Council. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. Job cuts in the budget, I think these job cuts are a joke. Cutting clerical people, I think it's five vacant fire positions, a couple of other vacant jobs, I think it's an insult to the taxpayers' intelligence here. We are paying those vacant jobs? How is that cutting jobs? How is that cutting money out of the budget? If I can get paid for a vacant job I'd love that. The jobs that should be cut were cronies at the top of the line. for instance, Ray Hayes and his whole office should be gone. PEL wouldn't let Mayor Connors have a public safety director, that office should be gone.

Jeff Brazil is making the same salary as George Parker was, George Parker was an engineer, Jeff Brazil is not. His salary should be cut in half, and I could go and on, but I only have five minutes. There

is many other ways. The job cuts Chris

Doherty made -- they're an outrage.

I have to echo what everybody else said about the library. The Albright library is a beautiful historic building, there is no reason why we can't have it there. It's centrally located, to make a library authority is, like I said, everybody else said it, it's just another way that Chris Doherty will be able to steal money like he has been.

Last week when he announced his run for mayor -- or governor officially, he said he created 5,000 jobs. That's a lot. It's an out-and-out lie. Is he going to go around the state saying that he created 5,000 jobs lying all of over the state. This man is just -- he is unbelievable. How people can believe all of the lies that this man says is beyond me.

Okay, Carl Graziano, Jr., again. He cited Joe Pilchesky for doing work on someone's work, he told him he wasn't supposed to be doing. It went to a magistrate, the magistrate said Mr.

Pilchesky was not guilty. Just another example of an incompetent crony hire and this is another person who shouldn't have a job. The only reason he has got a job is his father is a police captain and he's just another example of the incompetence in this administration.

And speaking of incompetence, it brings up Chief Elliott again. Unless -- if anybody missed it in the paper, as of this moment there is a female detective training in Florida and her hotel room is three miles from the training site. MR. SPINDLER: Oh, I know that.

MR. COURTRIGHT: But if you see a plate, give me the plate.

MR. SPINDLER: Well, I'm going to bring something up, at our picnic that we had in the summertime in the parking lot there, I don't know who they were, but a couple officers stopped one on Dorothy Street and they just let him go, they didn't cite him. They should have cited him.

Maybe citing these kids will stop them from

doing it, because they are damaging property now. They are digging up the lawn and the side of the building so something has got to be done. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Ron Ellman.

Renda says he can generate six to seven hundred thousand dollars through increased fees for licenses and permits and here we have the mayor waiving it to all of these big million dollar concerns, he has a responsibility to the people of this city. You know what, he is laughing at all five of you. He is laughing at me and these people back there because he thinks he is getting

away another one of his damn deals. It's time this stop double standard stops. It's disgusting what goes on around here.

And about the library, I was at Redner's -- this will just take a second, and a lady that can't hardly speak a word of English she was asking me -- she was commenting if they built this new library would it have Spanish books in it, too, and of course, I don't know and I use the world out of the library downtown, I go twice a month, and I think it's something to consider for all of the expense.

You know, Doherty tore down the building that should have been used for the city, that was the old post office, a building built in the 50's and it was good because I have been in there several times. It's just -- this city is so mismanaged from top to bottom it's just pitiful. I know what you are going to say -- it's just --

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Ellman --

MR. ELLMAN: He is a disgrace to the City of Scranton. He is not -- I just don't understand two to five miles, wants to build

a \$16 million library in an 80 year old 1 building. It's just completely incompetent 2 3 the way the city is run. Thank you. MR. MCGOFF: Jim Stucker. 4 MR. STUCKER: About the 5 four-wheelers, a lot of them are on the 6 highways, a lot of them around, I seen them 7 8 a lot. They have a couple of cars I seen 9 with loud mufflers, real loud. MR. COURTRIGHT: We have taken care 10 11 of it, Jim. 12 MR. STUCKER: And the skateboards 13 now they are across the street tonight at 14 the garage, at the bottom of the garage. 15 MR. COURTRIGHT: We are going to 16 tell the cop when he leaves to chase them 17 out of there. 18 MR. STUCKER: Just tell them. 19 MR. COURTRIGHT: Okay. 20 MR. STUCKER: What about that Army 21 Navy building on Lackawanna Avenue? 22 are they going to do with it, tear it down 23 or --24 MR. COURTRIGHT: They tore it down, 25 didn't they?

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MR. STUCKER: No, they didn't tear that down on Lackawanna Avenue. They tore the --

MR. COURTRIGHT: It's gone, Jim. You better take a walk down there, Buddy. I think it's gone.

MR. STUCKER: They had the -- the bakery shop that was on fire they tore that down.

MR. COURTRIGHT: Yeah.

MR. STUCKER: And the Army-Navy store never got taken down, I went by there last time and I seen it wasn't down. Okay, we have -- on Mulberry we have the people running red lights again. We need more cops. The other day me and my buddy, Pat, right, and we are coming up from the South Side, a cop pulled right out in front of a Blazar the other day and he almost got clipped. He didn't stop or nothing. He was just going right through and almost got hit by a Blazar, so when is your -- when are you having your vacation?

MR. DOBRYZN: The county is going to put you out of the building and then they are going to lay off your work force.

MR. COURTRIGHT: I'm popular, huh?

MR. DOBSON: Yes, you are a popular guy, man. I don't know. I don't know. It's very concerning because I feel that we are laying off the worker bees and, you know, everybody needs a job nowadays, but there should be some other way of doing it other than to cripple the tax collector office. That's crazy. I think half of the trouble with the last one, the guy, was them moving him around. He no sooner walked into

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that office and they are shipping him around, you know, all of these computers unplugged and, you know, nothing works. I don't know, Bill. Maybe you should stay on council, Buddy.

MR. COURTRIGHT: No thank you.

MR. DOBSON: Let council pick the tax collector, okay. On this library business, I said it once, I'll say it again, no more authorities, please. It's just once they are in it's like everybody else, they are out of control and they do what they want to do or what they have agreed to do or whatever and I don't want to insult the But, also, you know, it might be people. helpful if we got maybe Jack Finnerty or somebody down to explain things and get some stuff out in the open here, and we don't have a caucus on this and this is one of the major pieces of legislation, so irregardless of who votes for it, there is not enough information there to decide if it's worth it.

And on a final note, I would also like to say shame on every state legislator

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that voted to withdraw money for museums and libraries on so forth. It's really ashame. They should be ashamed of themselves and they don't deserve -- they don't deserve a job as dog catcher and with any luck the dog would bite them. Have a good night.

MR. MCGOFF: Marie Schumacher.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening. Marie Schumacher, member of the Taxpayers' association. Tonight I would like to take a trip down memory lane. Let's start around 100 years ago when the Albright Memorial Library was deeded to the City of Scranton. There were criteria for selection of the board of trustees including members of the clergy. This was the will of the giver, which some don't like, however, accepting the property the city accepted the conditions. I have even heard it said that selecting clergy from a specific Protestant denominations is unconstitutional. Clearly, this person does not know the constitution.

The 6-B item notes that the deeds specifies the management and control above provided for may be changed at any time to

conform to any general laws passed by the Commonwealth regulating free public libraries. Now, unless you can provide the bill number of the law passed by the Commonwealth there is no legal basis for his change of management.

On December 14, moving to more recent times, of 2006 Mrs. Gatelli said, "I'm also working next year on another revenue item that we think can bring in 1.5 million. It's a new rental registration program. We will add inspectors and clerks that will be strictly assigned to this program. All properties will be registered including single family homes that are not owner occupied."

The legislation passed in July 2007.

Last year, one of Mrs. Gatelli's amendments was to add two health inspectors to help with the rental registration, and still quoting, "We are going to have someone, a company, do the registration part."

The budget for the revenue from rental registration in the current budget, despite approval of the two inspectors, was

not that \$1.5 million, but \$120,000.

Revenue for this item is further reduced in the proposed 2010 budget to \$33,000.

Something is very, very wrong.

Let's move up another year to

April 12, 2007. Mrs. Fanucci said, "What's happening, they are actually expanding to two floors, the first and second floor and the third floor. They believe a more realistic number of positions that would be created will be 15, and that would be the first year. These positions will result in additional professionals, staff meetings.

I'm sorry, needed for medical spa. What they are going to do, the first floor will be the salon, second floor will be a new fitness center, third floor is going to be a medical spa."

That was, of course, about the
Alexander's loan. Why then did the
November 8 Times-Tribune offer 3,600 square
feet of nicely appointed office space
available on the third floor above
Alexander's Salon and Dayspa? I don't think
they are meeting the parameters.

Still in 2007, the David Wenzel treehouse opened on May 2005 -- or May 25, excuse me. Why then just one year and four months later was it necessary for the VA to advertise exterior cleaning and woo finishing of the treehouse? Is this going to be an expense every 16 months? Why wasn't this in the capital budget?

Let's move up to 2008, that was the year the city provided \$100,000 to ECTV, 90,000 directly and 10,000 laundered through a business association. Last I heard the county commissioners were paying ECTV \$1,000 per month. They get steaming video on their website. Why doesn't Scranton get streaming video of meetings as does the county? It seems to me, again, something is wrong.

Nixel. It's advertised on the city website as "A service that allows you to receive trusted up to the minute neighborhood information."

Now, according to the Nixel website public information such as crime patterns and police -- I can't read my writing, excuse me, police law-type posting. When

will this information be available for Scranton? It's on the website, but while on the safety issues, also has anyone followed up to affect a meeting between Dunmore and the city to see how the pact will be impacted if our firefighters and our public public safety when Dunmore cuts back on their firefighters? Mr. Courtright?

MR. COURTRIGHT: I didn't know if you wanted me to answer that.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Either of these?

MR. COURTRIGHT: I don't know if they had communication, I haven't talked to the fire chief. I would hope so.

MS. FANUCCI: We have been operating with that for the last year, so I would imagine it would be the same because the positions that are eliminated have not been filled in a year, so we could probably find that out what they have been doing for the past few months.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, it's Dunmore that's cutting back, so we are going to have field --

MS. FANUCCI: Yeah, they are cutting

1 back, too, but we have been cutting back, 2 also, so I would imagine they are doing some 3 type of together --MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I would 4 something a lot better than just warm and 5 fuzzy I would imagine they are doing 6 7 something. I would like to know what has 8 been doing and how it affects my person and 9 property and the persons of our 10 firefighters. 11 MR. COURTRIGHT: To the best of my knowledge nothing so far. 12 13 MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. 14 MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? 15 MR. PATILLA: Good evening, Mrs. 16 Evans and Mr. Courtright. What's the real 17 Scranton? Is it the one being advertised. 18 MR. MCGOFF: Please state your name for the record. 19 Sam Patilla. 20 MR. PATILLA: 21 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. 22 MR. PATILLA: Scranton homeowner, 23 taxpayer, member of the Scranton/Lackawanna 24 County Taxpayers' Association and totally 25 anti-Doherty administration. What's the

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real Scranton? The one advertised in Business Week as a place to raise your children and your family or the one we hear that we have individuals living alongside of the train tracks or 60 percent of our children are at or below the property level.

Now, for years now I have come before the council and I have stated and requested that they stop taking money from two programs, the Emergency Shelter Program and the First Time Home Buyers Program. Now, I haven't seen either one of those programs listed on the agenda in the last month or so, I guess maybe because they ran out of money, but those programs were set up to prevent those very same people and individuals and families that came upon hard times and hardships from being forced to live in those type of conditions, but everybody turned a blind eye to that and they allowed your mayor to continue to bilk those programs. That money was not meant to be diverted to anyone else. allocated to help people and families that met hard times.

You know, that's the real Scranton, not this baloney that I'm hearing about on the news and printed in Business Week where Scranton is such a lovely place to raise your family and your children. You know, like I stated, 60 percent of our school age children are on or below poverty level.

Now, I actually for the past week have been reading the deed in regards to Albright, and I take my hat off to Mr. and Mrs. Albright because they had the foresight to put in writing the necessary stop gaps to prevent the very thing that certain individuals in this city are trying to accomplish right now by removing the deed, the title of that deed, and putting it in the hands of certain individuals.

The way he had the trustee board made up it was a diversified board, he put it in writing so that one individual, one group could not gain control of that property. That's the way he wrote it, they wrote it almost 100 years ago, and there was a purpose for that. You know, he gave that to the citizens. He didn't give it to a

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mayor, he didn't give it to a political group or a political party, he gave it to the people and it was his dream and her dream that that property always remained in the hands of the people.

Now, after Veteran's Day Bill Jackowitz took me down to South Side and I actually met a long-time Scranton business owner which leads me to the next topic of discussion here. I have never had so much fun in my life, but in reading the agenda item where it states: "5-E, Neighborhood Housing Revitalization Initiative," all right, you are revitalizing houses. What about small business owners? I have never in my life since I have been -- the 50 years I have been on this planet ever seen a neighborhood be refurbished or renovated without including small business owners, all right? Scranton is becoming a renter city and I have never seen a block of renters that took care of their property like a block of homeowners do. Maybe it's just the wording, which wouldn't surprise me, but I am under the impression that you are not

going to include the backbone of any society that are small business owners because is it just certain individuals who are friendly with certain individuals going to be privy to this money or is it United Neighborhood Community Development or the way of the first time homeowners buyers program and emergency shelter program, all right?

Doherty has got to stop, okay, revisiting the library, one more time, you know, the agenda item. Signifying the intention and the desire of the council of the City of Scranton to organize an authority to be known as the Scranton Public Library Authority.

If this was the intention of the council, all right, the vote would have 5/0 not 3/2, so this is misleading. We know, those of us in the general populous know that this is a dream and aspiration of a few individuals. It's not the dreams and aspirations of the Scranton taxpayers, all right? Most of this I could live without because I know hopefully the people's council will revisit all of these items come

1 January, but like I stated before, you sit there and you allow that man to milk the 2 3 Emergency Shelter Program and the First Time Home Buyers Program don't do him the same 4 5 thing with that Cedar Avenue project. MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? No other 6 7 speakers? 8 MR. SLEDENZSKI: Hi, Bill. 9 MR. COURTRIGHT: Hi, Chris. MR. SLEDENZSKI: These are for next 10 11 year, Billy. 12 MR. MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening, Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment Rights. budget has been presented to council. Just some comments and observations about the budget. It's less than the last two years, which is good, but it's still higher than the five previous years. The raises and new hires are still in the budget, over \$20 million for this year so it's going to be maybe four or five million more. The expenditure pie chart percentages are still inflated. The percentages, if they follow the previous years, will be inflated by the amount of the TANS or tax anticipation This makes it appears that the cost per employees is more than it actually costs the city per employee. The mayor and Stu Renda said it cost \$80,000 per new patrolman. At that amount they are saying it costs the city 37,000 more per employee over their wages which is preposterous. that is the case, Stu Renda would be making 37,000 more than his 85,000 salary putting him at 122,000 per year, one of the highest

paid in the city.

There will be no tax increase supposedly, but I have a question about the garbage fee -- or tip fee. We have been paying \$178 per year per unit but reading page 11 of the budget I believe we are getting a \$20 rate hike or tax hike, whatever way you want to interpret it.

Page 11, landfill refuge fees, account description: The city has established a residential refuge fee. This fee was required in order for the city to maintain essential public works services at their existing levels. This is an annual fee of 198 per unit for per week year. Then it has here landfill tipping fee for 2009, \$4,050,000; 2010, \$4,156,960, that's 157,000 more than 2009 for 20010, a three percent --

MS. EVANS: Mr. Ancherani, if I could interrupt for just a second, to my knowledge the refuse fee has not been increased.

Council was given a proposed budget last Friday that contained a number of pages with incorrect information and since then council has received the corrections, so the fee

remains at 178.

MR. ANCHERANI: Okay. The total of the budgets from 2002 through 2009 is at least over \$600 million. That's a lot of money. 132 million is extra from those budgets. More. That's -- if you divide it by two we got \$61 million budgets, two extra, \$61 million budgets.

Mrs. Evans presented budgets and they were ignored, they weren't addressed by most of the people on council. Now we are using -- we are filling the budget gap using 1.8 million from the sale of the golf course. I thought that money was supposed to be used for something else.

Going back to the pie chart, the question I asked last year and never received an answer for was why does nondepartmental expenditures which total \$23,190,000, not be reflected in the pie chart by having a slice of it's own, but I guess I answered the question previously when I said inflating the pie charts and the pie slices makes it look like the employees get more than they actually cost the city.

Scranton Parking Authority citation issuers on page 29, 2009 the total was \$879,830 that we gave the Scranton Parking Authority. 2010, it's been dropped to \$650,000 and the difference is \$229,830, but now we are going to have two less SPA citation issuers. Does that mean that their salary was \$115,000 per year? That's a lot of money.

Public safety, page 54, there were three housing inspectors last year, but it shows five this year.

Page 57, there is one juvenile officer still in the budget. We only have four officers.

Nondepartmental expenditures, page 79, we have \$60,000 for First Night. That's a lot of money, but I guess we have it to give out. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MS. DESANDO: Good evening, Council.

Marie DeSando, I work at the tax office, I

so don't want to be here, but here I am. I

am so far still at the tax office, one of

the few. I just have a couple of questions,

I'm not very knowledgeable about the whole budget process and I didn't really write anything down, just some notes, but I noticed that there is a decrease in wage tax revenue in this budget and I'm kind of curious as to why that would be and if it has anything to do with the two wage tax positions that are being eliminated in the tax office, one of which bills for tax that's due and one that claims money from outside collectors for Scranton residents that don't work in Scranton, those will both be gone.

I am also wondering about there is business privilege revenue in this budget, but the only job in the tax office that collects business privilege tax for the city is eliminated in this budget, so I'm kind of curious as to who is going to collect what they are claiming there is going to be in 2010.

And I think -- well, I don't want to get into rumors, but -- so I'm not. I just-- can I get the answers on these now or do we have to ask someone specific? Like I

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said, I'm not very --

MR. COURTRIGHT: One question I was going to ask, Marie, when it came my turn to speak and I'll give people time to think about it before my time comes to speak, I was just going to ask this council here, be it for some of us it will be the last budget we vote on, to really think hard because I don't know, I would like to know if anyone on this council knows, anyone on this council knows how they arrived at these cuts? My understanding is they did not go to the current tax collector and ask her so I do not know how they arrived at these They just said we need a dollar cuts. amount and started hacking, I don't know. So does anybody on this council knows how they arrived at these specific jobs and these specific cuts? Anyone?

MS. EVANS: No.

MS. DESANDO: And it seems what they are saving in these cuts in the tax office is just a small portion of \$5 million decrease in revenue. So, you know, if I could get some kind of answers I'd

MS. GATELLI: Bill, when they take some of the power and make a new tax office are some of those positions going to be what's collected by who they appoint as the person?

appreciate it.

MR. COURTRIGHT: If at the time when they decide who is going to collect the wage tax in the county if it's the single tax office, which I'll say right now I think it should be, if it's the single tax office I think there would be an increase in employees. If at that time they give it to another entity then I'm sure there will be a decrease in employees at that particular time. I mean --

MS. GATELLI: And I just have one question --

MS. DESANDO: But that's more than two years away, and if I can since you brought this up, the rumor that I heard was that the city was interested in giving the countywide tax collection to NCC. Did any of you hear that information?

MS. FANUCCI: No. I don't know how

1 they could do that. MR. COURTRIGHT: I would hope not. 2 3 MR. DESANDO: I would certainly hope 4 not. MS. GATELLI: You might as well say 5 it, you know, you could just say it, but I 6 7 just have a question for you --8 MS. FANUCCI: It would have to come 9 here. 10 MS. GATELLI: The people in the tax 11 office are not cross-trained to do other 12 jobs? 13 MS. DESANDO: Yes, they are. 14 MS. GATELLI: Oh, they are. Okay. 15 Thank you. 16 MS. DESANDO: Thank you. 17 MS. KRAKE: Good evening, Council. 18 My name is Nancy Krake, and they are 19 cross-trained which just proves that they 20 are currently now doing several jobs so when 21 you eliminate them you are also eliminating 22 many other jobs, not just the one named. 23 I would like to know how much of the 24 \$12 million sitting in the bank has the city 25 received and is any of that revenue plugged

into the 2010 budget? If so, how much of it? I'd also like to echo some of the statements of the previous speakers. Per the mayor there are 6,000 new jobs, which is like five Mercy Hospitals, and I can't believe the Mayor Doherty wouldn't be telling the truth, so either we are not interested in collecting the wage tax because it's so much decreased in the budget yet we are eliminating people or he isn't telling the truth.

We are also eliminating the grants writer for the police and fire. If the police chief and the mayor would allow the grants writer to do her job the last problem with procedure would never have happened. That was for the Justice Assistant Grant, JAG, and it would have been read before council, she has done it in the past, she had it her notes. She would have followed the requirements to the letter as she does in everything.

Some of the examples of her work, she straightened up all of the reports and filed them that were scattered. She filed

MR. GERVASI: Good evening, city My name is Dave Gervasi, I'm a council. firefighter with the City of Scranton. I want to echo what Mrs. Krake said. I never had a chance to write a grant with our grant writer, but a couple of our members have. The city has failed over and over trying to receive grants for different programs from the Department of Defense, Department of Homeland Security, but a year and a half ago, and you should realize this, that we notified the city probably for two or three years in a row that our SCVA, our self-contained breathing apparatus, our cylinders and our equipment was so outdated that they didn't make parts for them anymore and we told the city for a few years that they are going to run out within a few years and the city would be stuck with about a \$730,000 bill to revamp our entire SCVA, but the grant writer that was just eliminated did so well at writing that grant along with two of our members, two of our unionized members who helped her with it, that the

city received I believe about \$400,000 toward that grant.

So I would really, really think about, according to my members, this is a very, very capable person and she has brought in hundreds of thousands of dollars to the city with her successful grant writing and I would just contemplate that. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MS. EVANS: Good evening. Two significant issues appear on city council's agenda tonight, the mayor's 2010 proposed operating budget and the creation of a library authority, both of which require equal study and attention.

Although, I am pleased this budget contains no tax increase and no borrowing, I do have questions that must be answered before this legislation can be considered for final approval. I ask that all questions will be answered in writing by Stu Renda on or about Monday, November 23, 2009.

(1). What is the total savings realized for any and all clerical union

employees who do not work a 40-hour week?

- (2). Why has the contingency account decreased from the \$995,486 in the 2009 operating budget to \$274,706 in the 2010 budget? For what purpose was the \$718,080 used?
- (3). For what purpose was the \$1 million included in the 2009 budget for police contract increases used? If it was not used, where does it appear in the 2010 budget?
- (4). Included in the 2009 budget was an expenditure of \$100,000 for a South Side Library which no longer appears in an account number 01.401.15315.4299 in 2010. For what purpose was this money used? If \$100,000 remains, where does it appear in the 2010 budget?
- (5). What is the total dollar amount to date received from the Scranton Single Tax Office for 888 funds due to the city and placed in the 2009 budget at 5.5 million?
- (6). Why has a position been created at a salary of \$32,000 in OECD? The

limited duties of the newly created stimulus reporting assistant can be absorbed by one or more of the 11 current OECD employees.

Will this position be filled by a current employee whose position is eliminated in the 2010 budget and if so, by whom?

- (7). It appears that some of the figures included in the controller's office are not correct. Please make connections.
- (8). The elimination of the position of grant manager for the police department appears to be in violation of a police SIT clerk's arbitration award since the grant manager is one of the original SIT clerks which the city was ordered to reinstate. Provide justification for this apparent violation of an arbitration award.
- (9). Explain in detail the \$879,830 expenditure for citation issuers in the 2009 budget and the \$650,000 expenditure for the same in the 2010 budget. Provide a specific accounting for each budget's expenditure for this line item.
- (10). On page 38 of the 2010 proposed budget, you state that the 2010

balance for citation issuers does not include capital expenditures. Provide a detailed list of all capital expenditures within SPA citation issuer's account for 2009, 2008, and 2007.

- (11). When will legislation for a new payroll service be presented to city council? You indicate that a request for proposals will be prepared during the fourth quarter of 2009. Provide a copy of the proposal submitted that includes a \$74,944 decrease in payroll service for 2010.
- outsourcing of work previously performed by a grant manager for the police department and the DPW traffic maintenance division.

 Include the names, locations and owners of companies that will perform these duties and responsibility. Include the annual cost for each service and/or contract. Was this work put out for bid or proposals? If so, provide copies of all bids and/or proposals?
- (13). Explain specifically how the duties and responsibilities for each of the staff cuts made to the Single Tax Office

will be carried out in the future.

- (14). Did PEL approve of the 2010 budget? Does it meet all requirements of the revised Recovery Plan.
- (15). How does the administration intend to provide sufficient funds for salary increases for the police and firefighters if contracts are settled in 2010?
- (16). On page 24 cable TV revenue is listed at \$780,000 for 2009 and \$826,000 for 2010. The cable franchise agreement expires in December 2009 and to date there is no new contract agreement. Also, what percentage of the cable franchise fee will be allocated to the peg channel? Does this figure listed on page 24 of the 2010 proposed budget include funding for the peg channel?
- (17.) Are proceeds from the Nay Aug Christmas light show included in the operating budget? If so, in what account does the money appear. If not, why are these monies not included in the operating budget?

(18). Since mortgage foreclosures have increased while earned income taxes have declined, how did you project no change in 2010 real estate taxes and an increase in 2010 delinquent real estate taxes on page ten?

Kay, please be sure to forward these questions to Stu Renda tomorrow.

Also, Mr. Renda has refused to provide management information which was requested under the Right-to-Know law on September 25, 2009. Attorney Minora, I would like you to pursue this matter legally and immediately and if you have any questions about it we can discuss them following tonight's meeting.

Next, I will address the creation of a library authority during the voting portion of tonight's meeting.

Finally, I have a few citizens' requests for the week:

Number one: Please collect leaves in the 200 block of North Garfield Avenue.

Two, a city resident requests that the following potholes be repaired: The

intersection of Cedar Avenue and River

Street; the intersection of Linden Street

and Arthur Avenue by CMC and in front of the

Penn Security Bank on Spruce Street.

Third, and I'm not sure that city council has the influence that this city resident believes us to have, but nevertheless, if we could send a letter to the Scranton Postmaster. A resident of Mulberry Towers in downtown Scranton reports that mail service at this highway rise has been changed from 12 p.m. to 5 p.m., making it impossible for the elderly and disabled to make same day banking deposits. Because this has been a great cause of concern and anxiety for these elderly residents, I respectfully request that mail deliveries might occur earlier in the day if possible, and that's it.

MS. GATELLI: Next week Mr. Renda
will come to caucus to discuss the budget. I
just have a few other items. I attended a
hearing yesterday for what most people know
as Tom and Jerry's Restaurant on Pittston
Avenue. It does have a different name now,

but that's what most people know it by. They are violating the zoning law by operating a tavern rather than a restaurant for which it was originally zoned. The gentleman plead guilty at the hearing and was ordered to go before the zoning board at next month's zoning hearing, so I would like to notify all of the people in South Scranton that I won't be able to notify personally that the zoning hearing will be the second Wednesday of December at 6:00 p.m., and I will keep you notified if they are on the agenda.

Also, on December 3, we are going to reinitiate our Community Justice Program in South Scranton to coordinate with our Elm Street Program. Our first meeting will be December 3, from 3 to 5 at United Neighborhood Centers, 435 Alder Street. Any South Side resident is welcome to come and to discuss problems in their neighborhood and fill out a complaint form and we will also be taking a tour of the neighborhood. Last year we had -- Ms. Fowler is in the audience she was a participant in many of

our Community Justice Program walks and she knows very well the benefit of the Community Justice Program through the District Attorney's Office.

I'd also like to ask if we can send a letter to the police chief, I have been getting complaints near the vicinity of Kelly's Restaurant that there is someone breaking into the cars and breaking windshields and that the police were aware of it they weren't' doing anything about the person that's doing it, so I would like to see if there are any police reports within the last several weeks concerning car thefts and windshields that are broken in this particular area and then I'll go from there maybe to setup a meeting and find out what's going on.

I would also like to comment on an article that was in the paper this week about a couple that was accused in a mortgage scam. Unfortunately, all of the homes were located in South Scranton and many of them have been on the demolition list for many years. They weren't being

demolished because people -- these people that were charged were saying that they bought them and had a mortgage on them, which wasn't true.

So I would like to send a letter to Mr. Seitzinger and the mayor urging them to demolish these homes as soon as possible.

One is really, really in bad condition and the rear was in a fire and is still standing and that would be the 422-424 Fig Street and also in the rear. The other properties are 1309 Prospect, 1207 Cedar, 1209-1211 Cedar and 1511 Cedar.

It's very disheartening when you are trying to make some progress in your neighborhood and you have things of this magnitude going on trying to get away with something that isn't true and it's really a shame that this is happened, but these properties have been a problem for I'd say the last 20 years, long before these people were involved a relative of them was involved with the properties and they were always a problem, so I would like to get them down as soon as possible, and that's

all I have for this evening. Thank you.

MS. FANUCCI: Speaking about the library authority and as you were talking about it, Attorney Minora, we had spoken in caucus about finding out what the deed said and if it was given over to the authority if they can still then in turn sell it or if the deed would still hold true and also what the exact terminology of the deed was, and I want to make sure that we were making sure they weren't able to take the library out from the public and put it into a private sector.

MR. MINORA: A couple of things, it appears that the Albright Memorial Library deed requires the building to be maintained as a public library. There is also the Greenridge Library and the Silkman House in West Side, and honestly I just read them now, I hadn't seen them before. The -- and I may be getting these backwards, the Silkman property just said library, not public library, so theoretically it could be maintained as a private library somehow, so that might be able to be transferred to it

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by a nonmunicipal library, which seems to be the concern.

The other one is the Greenridge, I may be getting them backwards, does have a restriction in it that it be maintained as a public library, so two of the three buildings that are now maintained by the public -- Scranton Public Library must be maintained as public libraries and, therefore, could not be offered to -- I'm saying private. Obviously, we are talking about a school or something of that nature. I suppose that, you know, there is a possibility of a transfer to a school that would agree to keep is it open to the public. I mean, that's certainly if it is maintained over to the public by something other than a municipality that would not violated the deed restriction, so I know it's a complicated answer, but real estate sometimes is very complicated.

MS. FANUCCI: I think our concern was that the Albright Library would be given to someone or deeded to someone that they would not use it for what the intent was, so

that's actually a good answer.

MR. MINORA: Additionally, obviously the authority could be restricted in it's charter from transferring properties.

MS. FANUCCI: Right. We discussed that.

MR. MINORA: That's certainly a possibility as well if that's an issue, and I know we talked in caucus, I don't know -- I spoke to Attorney Bob Milan who is a bond council, I actually called and just asked a question about the ability of the authority to issue a bond without the city's approval and his answer was pretty clear, but he had a lot more to say than that. His answer on the issue of the ability of an authority to issue bonds is legally they can't and they don't have to come to council to do that. When they do that, of course, they do not bind the city and the city's taxing authority to pay for those bonds.

Consequently, only authorities that have some revenue base such as the Sewer Authority have a great deal of difficulty getting money by bond because there is no

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revenue stream to support it, so I asked him specifically about a library authority and he said unless there is some revenue stream for this authority itself it would be very unlikely that they could issue a bond without -- a bank wouldn't support a bond unless they came to city council and had the city's taxing authority supporting the bond issue itself. So that was the simple answer on that.

However, he was actually in the process of doing one in Western Pennsylvania, one, a library authority in Western Pennsylvania, and had some really creative ideas on not only financing it, but the possibility of using the library as a service organization and as an umbrella for things like the adult education and literacv and a number of other ideas which would then be able to attract money directly from other government bodies and federal government and so forth under different programs. So I asked him if he would be willing to speak to council, he said he would be glad to and I think if that's where the council is going

with this legislation he would be an awfully good source of information and I can certainly get his name for you.

MS. FANUCCI: I think we agreed in caucus that Mrs. Evans would try to be the point person for that and reach out and see what we can find out.

MR. MINORA: I'll be glad to get that for you.

MS. FANUCCI: Thank you.

MR. MINORA: You are welcome.

MS. FANUCCI: So that puts a lot of the questions that we had last week, I was really worried about the fact that nobody wanted to lose the Albright Library and the rumors that were out there were that it was going to be taken over and given away and I'm glad that we found out that the loophole was -- I was afraid that it just said library as opposed to saying public, so it's more important that it does say public, so that's a good thing.

Also, on the budget, we really have not had tons of time to go over it, but there are some changes that I believe that

speakers that were up tonight presented some good reasons on some of the things that we should change, and we are going to meet next week hopefully to sit down with the administrator and find out exactly what the reasoning was behind what they were doing and that the job eliminations, some of the cuts that were made and also discuss other options, so hopefully by next week we will have a better gauge on exactly what the final budget will look like.

we all want to make to it, a lot of things

I have a feeling it's going to be a little while because we all seem to have different ideas and when you put them altogether that will take awhile. And that is all I have. Thank you.

MR. COURTRIGHT: All right, before I go off on the tax office, Mr. Spindler left here, but I did check into what he had asked me about last week with the police officer's ticketing in the evening. Captain Graziano had spoke with Lieutenant Arby in person and Captain Graziano sent an e-mail to him with a response that came from Lieutenant Arby

and Lieutenant Arby is saying that what Mr. Spindler indicated was going on at nighttime that if you got "X" amount of tickets that you were allowed time off is not happening. Captain Graziano told me without any type of proof there is not much he can do it about it, but he will continue to monitor it, so that's the answer I got, Les, and I'll keep on top of that.

I've sat on this council for six years now and I have seen a budget every single year, I have never seen a budget that had gone after one office like this budget has gone after the tax office, and I don't know why. Is it because it's me going over there? I don't know.

I would ask this council sitting here right now that I have been with most of you for four years, you know me, maybe you don't like the way I vote sometimes, maybe I don't like you way the vote sometimes, but I think I have been honest with all of you the best that I could be. I think we all know that there were some problems over at the tax office, it was a house in need of repair

and I was fortunate enough that the people of this city voted for me to try to head up that repair, but how could anybody on this council in good conscience vote for all of these cuts and expect me to repair this house with no workers? It's -- I think it's going to be an impossibility.

I feel like it's purposefully trying to set me up to fail and that wasn't my intention when I ran for in office. My intention was to try and straighten it out. I think the workers for the most part have gotten a bad wrap and I hope that I can over there and do the best possible job.

Remember, this is the office that brings the money to the city. You know, you are cutting jobs on the people that are bringing money into the city and I usually stay calm here, but I'm a little mad so bear with me. I'm going to start with some of these things and the first one I'm going to start with is the solicitor and I don't want anybody to tell me that back in 1932 they said that the city solicitor should be the solicitor because Mr. Walsh served for two

terms, eight years. I believe Mr. Doherty for two terms, eight years. Ken McDowell for six years and the current tax collector for two years so 20 some years they had a solicitor but now because it's me going there we don't need a solicitor? I think that's strictly political. It's either me they are after or they don't like Mark Walsh because they know that's who I want for my solicitor.

When he came to this council chambers to be the solicitor for the city's council office they cut his salary in half. Now, that they know it's going to be him coming over, they eliminate the job. The job is \$11,650 a year. We gave the police chief and the fire chief \$13,000 raises.

MS. GATELLI: Bill, I just want to interrupt you there for just for one second, the same people that are clapping out there stood at that podium and said we were violating state law because there was a solicitor there and it should be the city solicitor, and if I have to I'll have Kay look for the minutes of those meetings.

Now, if we are going to -- I don't have 1 nothing against anybody being over there, 2 3 but if we are going to violate state law then we have to change something in order to 4 put a solicitor there. 5 MR. COURTRIGHT: Twenty some years --6 7 MS. GATELLI: Well, that doesn't make 8 it right. 9 UNKNOWN AUDIENCE MEMBER: It sets a 10 precedent. MR. MCGOFF: Please. 11 12 MR. COURTRIGHT: Here is my own 13 opinion, why wasn't it brought up until now. 14 That's all I'm saying. MS. GATELLI: We brought it up when 15 16 I first met with the one and only meeting 17 that I was invited to that we had over at 18 the commissioner's office. Remember when I said first went over there? 19 20 MR. COURTRIGHT: Let me say this --21 MS. GATELLI: And I did talk about it 22 hen. 23 MR. COURTRIGHT: If there needs to be 24 a change then there needs to be a change, I 25 just --

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MS. GATELLI: I think that should be changed and then certainly there wouldn't be a problem.

MR. COURTRIGHT: I would hope that you people would agree with me, I'm going to move on a little further, I'm trying to remain calm but I'm really irritated here. I'm looking at the auditor for business privilege and mercantile tax, there is only one individual that does that, okay? don't know about the cross-training, I'm not there yet, but I don't know how we cut that individual out. I just don't know how it's possible, and if you take a look at some of these salaries, here is one here, \$14,000 it costs the city. The other one another \$14,000, \$11,500, right? \$14,305. They are not big salaries, you know? It's not making -- if we -- the thing that bothers me is the gentleman that crated this budget, if that's what you want to call it, he is making \$85,000 a year and I didn't see him cut his salary, you know?

I do not know if he didn't speak to

Mrs. Vitali how he arrived at these specific

cuts. I'm guessing that they need a certain dollar amount and they said, well, we'll hack this one, this one and this one? I would give you my word if you would be good enough to indulge me in this that if I get over there and this is jobs that need to be cut I would cut them. I worked for 15 years with a trade company, I got tossed out on the street, you know, they didn't worry about me, I understand that, that's part of lie, but to just cut these people without any rhyme or reason to it, which I believe is happening, is just ludicrous.

I think most of you know I'm not a liar. I think we haven't agreed on a lot of things here, but I think I have always been honest and straight forward and I'm just asking you to give me the tools to work with so I can try to do a good job here. I think it could be done, but if you adopt this you might as well tell me, "Hey, Bill, we want you to fail."

All right? And again, if I were to get over there and I saw there was changes to be made I would make them. I know it's

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tough to lose their job and these are tough times, and I understand there needs to be cuts. They are cutting down at the DPW, I know it's clerical union, but I still call it DPW, the traffic division down there. but if you take notice in the paper, and we all know better to believe the paper, but the paper is saying that they would hire an outside source to come in and complete the Who I am going to get to complete the job. job? Am I going to be allowed to hire an outside source? I don't think so, you know. I don't see anything, I'm looking through this and I don't see anything in the budget saying I can do that.

Now, you might say, how can we fund these jobs? I got to be honest with you, and again I know we are not going to get rid of Stu Renda, but his salary alone would fund every job that you are cutting from me. I would show you where I think cuts can be made and the money can be made up and I would welcome you once I get over there to come over and I would explain to you what I think needs to stay and what I think needs

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to go, but I just -- I don't know how I'm going to live with this. I don't know how you can expect me to do this job with this kind of a staff. I, again --

MS. GATELLI: Just ask Stu next week.

I mean, we didn't write the budget.

MR. COURTRIGHT: And again, that's what I'm saying so I don't know how council is possibly going to be able to vote on the this. You know, I guess Stu he must be a genius, I guess if he knows how I'm going to do this, but I just think it's wrong. think a lot of it is political. I think it's because it's me, and I think that's wrong, so when he gives his reasons, and I'm sure he will have reasons, I'm sure he has them all prepared, but when he gives them I would just ask you to do this, please do this, when you decide how you are going to vote on this, if you like me or dislike me if you would put that aside, if you like that tax office or dislike it put it aside, but I would ask you do it for the people of this city because that's the office that sense the revenue over here.

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My goal really and still is my goal to try and send as much money as possible to this city so that we can function so we don't have to have another 25 percent tax increase and we don't have borrow anymore That was my goal. That's one of the money. reasons I ran for that office and I thought that maybe they lacked a little bit of leadership over there and I was hoping -- I was hoping that I could be the guy to do it. And again, I was fortunate the people in this city have some faith in me, but I got to tell you, if this goes through the way it is I'm going to end up letting them down because I don't think I'm going to be able to do the job that they elected me to do, so if I have to beg you I'll beg you, but I'm just asking you to do the right thing, and that's all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: I know I had many questions on the budget and they were tedious to listen to, but one of them involved what you just said. I wanted an explanation as to how all of these duties and responsibilities are going to be

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covered.

MR. COURTRIGHT: I understand people are cross-trained and maybe we could absorb some of them, but there is no way we are going to absorb all of these.

MS. EVANS: I agree, which is why I want to know, I want to see a plan when you are making this deep a cut into, you know, what the city and the school district relies on for it's revenue then have you to be able to tell me how you intend to successfully cover that starting in January, and it's not enough to just say people are cross-trained. You are going to have to tell me what person and show me because we can't afford at this juncture to jeopardize the money that's coming into this city. We have had enough debacles in the past which I still believe were very wrong and should have been addressed legally, but we have to make every effort to make sure that doesn't happen in the future, and so if someone has to show me unequivocally that these duties are covered because I am the one who has been concerned about that wage tax and delinquent wage

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taxes for years now, and you are going to
tell me that we don't need the person -- we
don't need one of the people that collects
that. We don't need the person that --

MS. GATELLI: Are we hiring a controller, too?

MR. COURTRIGHT: I think that's the intent, and if I can -- before I lose my train of thought, as she was speaking I was going to say something to you, Judy, when we talked about this solicitor, Mr. Renda, someone from the county and someone I believe it might have been Greg Sunday from the school district when they were looking at this analysis, it was supposed to be a forensic audit, one of the things they crafted and sent to them, and I thank God that they didn't pass before I got there was that they all agreed there should be a solicitor, and they all agreed that the three taxing bodies should vote on who it is so I think it's hypocritical of Mr. Renda to cut out the solicitor when he was one of the guys that crafted it, and we all saw it, it all came to us, but they never moved on it.

He was one of guys that crafted the thing saying there should be a solicitor, but they should have a say in who it is. He had no problem when hiring one then, and I don't have an input on who it is. I don't have a problem with the city or the county or the school district having input, they are the ones paying the bills. I would be more than happy to have their input. I would like to see their input.

They asked me about a budget, the Times did, would I be willing to see a budget, I would prefer that I have a budget. If I knew I was going to go over I could come to the taxing bodies and say, "Look it, we are going to go over this budget and here's why," all right? Because one thing you are not going to catch me doing, you are not going to catch me doing, you are not going to catch me spending money, I'm not going to spend because I don't desire to sit behind bars anywhere, so I just, you know, I'm getting a little irritated, so I'm going to stop speaking. That's it.

MR. MCGOFF: As has been indicated,
Mr. Renda will be here to answer questions

posed by council. I would also suggest if there are specific questions that council members have prior to our next meeting that that they either call or see Mr. Renda. He has been accessible in the past and I'm sure he will provide whatever answers he may have.

I have also suggested to council that after we have had an opportunity to more thoroughly look at the budget to consider some of the things that have been said this evening and after our own discussions that any amendments that they would like to have made to the budget that it be given to all of the council so that we can discuss them and in conjunction with the questions and answers that we -- the answers that we get from Mr. Renda that perhaps we can make changes to the budget that we feel are necessary and hopefully that that process that we can do that by next week.

As far as PEL and the Recovery Plan and the budget, after attending -- I attended the weekly meeting that they have and it would appear that PEL is -- that

there will be no revised Recovery Plan prior to this budget and, Kay, if I misspeak Kay was also at the meeting, but I believe what they said was that they are, you know, taking a -- they will review this budget and if it's within certain parameters that, you know, they will figure it into the revised Recovery Plan when that is, in fact, completed. They are awaiting a number of things and a number of items, one the Court decision involving the unions and until that is given they said they can't really do anything.

And again, Mr. Cross said that what he would really like to do is to sit down with the next council and, you know, discuss the revisions and his major concern -- his concerns were as long as they budget was -- please, for lack of a better word balanced, that he was more concerned with budgets going forward and the Recovery Plan, so I don't know if that answers the one question that you had, but he does want to meet with people and he does want to provide some explanation to how it's all going to work

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together hopefully.

One last thing I was asked to announce, refuse collections, I guess there has been some -- people have varying types of recyclables out at the curbs, I was told that if I would please announce that this week, and I know we have already missed a couple collection days, but this week is for mixed recyclables and that next week will be paper recyclables just so the people understand the schedule. I had been putting out both because I had no idea what they were collecting and I figured whatever they took I would put the rest away, but that seems to be the schedule and I guess they are also collecting leaves or taking care of the leaves throughout the city at the same time, and that's all I have.

MR. MCGOFF: You have heard reading by title of Item 6-B, what is your pleasure?

MS. FANUCCI: I move that Item 6-B pass reading by title.

MS. EVANS: Yes. As I stated at last week's council meeting, the creation of a municipal authority is a highly significant and unusual action that must be examined carefully. According to 53 Pa.C.S.A., Chapter 56, Municipal Authorities, the powers of authorities are numerous and include among others the following abilities:

"To acquire, purchase, hold, lease, and use any property for carrying out of the purposes of the authority; and to sell, lease, transfer and dispose of any property at any time acquired by it.

To finance projects by making loans which contracts or agreements may contain such provisions as the authorities shall deem necessary for the security or protection of the authority or it's bond.

To borrow money, make and issue negotiable notes, bonds, refunding bonds,

and other evidence of indebtedness or obligations called bonds of the authority.

Bonds shall have a maturity date not longer than 40 years from the date of the issue.

To have the power of eminent domain.

To have existence for a term of 50 years."

Such imposing powers will impact the city of Scranton for the next 50 years obviously, therefore, the decision to create another municipal authority should never be made hastily, recklessly or without the input of the taxpayers.

In addition, I learned that members are appointed by a governing body of the municipality and that board members shall be a taxpayer in, maintain a business in, or be a citizen of the municipality by which he is appointed. Thus, the law appears to contradict the emergency resolution passed by the Scranton Public Library Board which states that the library authority will consist of at least the nine members, all I which will be appointed from the existing board of trustees of the Scranton Public

Library.

Further, the Scranton City solicitor states that the library authority will consist of not less than five members in keeping with 53 Pennsylvania C.S.A Section 5610 and suggests that board members might serve as advisory board -- or an advisory body to the authority members. There seems to be at best a degree of confusion and at worse a power struggle in play already.

Consequently, my research has convinced me this action should not be railroaded through city council, so I will be voting "no".

MR. MCGOFF: I would just like to say that I am not totally opposed to the creation of the authority or, you know, the ultimate creation of an annex to the library. I do think that there are some questions that need to be answered, hopefully the gentleman that Attorney Minora has suggested to us may be able to answer some of these things. I think one of the -- I think you bring up a very legitimate question about the membership of the

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authority itself and how they will be appointed into the future. I think that perhaps as we look into legislation if it is moved forward there may be amendments that need be to included that would place limitations on the authority and also a definitive method of placing new members on the authority and maybe the, you know, membership itself, so I will vote "yes" for it, but I do have some questions and I think that, again, we have a 30-day wait for a public hearing. Within that time perhaps we can find some answers, perhaps some solutions and make it a viable piece of legislation for all of us.

MS. GATELLI: I would just -- my only comment is that I will be voting for it. As you know, I am supporting the library in South Scranton, it is part of our Elm Street project that we have been working on for seven years, so I will definitely be voting, yes.
