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1	MR. MCGOFF: I'd like to call this
2	public hearing to order. Roll call, please.
3	MR. COOLICAN: Mrs. Evans. Mrs.
4	Gatelli. Ms. Fanucci.
5	MS. FANUCCI: Here.
6	MR. COOLICAN: Mr. Courtright.
7	MR. COURTRIGHT: Here.
8	MR. COOLICAN: Mr. McGoff.
9	MR. MCGOFF: Here. Notice is hereby
10	given that a Public Hearing of Scranton City
11	Council will be held on Tuesday, December 1,
12	2009, at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers, 2nd
13	Floor, Municipal Building.
14	The purpose of said Public Hearing
15	is to hear testimony and discuss the
16	following:
17	FILE OF COUNCIL NO. 97, 2009 -
18	APPROPRIATING FUNDS FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE
19	CITY GOVERNMENT FOR THE PERIOD COMMENCING ON
20	THE FIRST DAY OF JANUARY, 2010 TO AND
21	INCLUDING DECEMBER 31, 2010 BY THE ADOPTION
22	OF THE GENERAL CITY OPERATING BUDGET FOR THE
23	YEAR 2010.
24	Speakers on the question will be
25	given three minutes time. Marie Schumacher.

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1	MS. SCHUMACHER: Do we get a second
2	round if everybody is well, as we did
3	last year. Well, anyway. The budget's
4	local tax description notes the city's wage
5	tax is 2.4 percent, but is commonly
6	incorrectly stated as 3.4 percent because
7	the city wage tax is collected along with
8	the Scranton School District's 1 percent
9	wage tax. To me, this means 3.4 percent is
10	collected and split about 70/30 between the
11	city and school district.
12	However, the school district revenue
13	estimate from the wage tax is 7.5 million.
14	This means wages would have to total
15	\$750 million. This city budget is
16	estimating 21.9 million in collected and
17	uncollected wage taxes which would mean
18	total wages are 912.5 million. The
19	difference between 912 million and 750
20	million is significant and both can't be
21	correct. Which is correct? If the Scranton
22	school district is correct then the city
23	will only collect 18 million and there will
24	almost a \$4 million shortfall.
25	Regarding the increase in both meter

parking and tickets, I would really like to know the percent of occupancy available in the parking garages. As it appears, this is an effort to drive parkers into the garages from the meters. Further, if, and I emphasize "if" these increases are approved the increase in ticket cost time before the \$10 penalty applies needs to be extended from 24 hours to perhaps five days. Also, if parking meter fees are doubling why is the forecast revenue up one and a half times.

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I also must object to the misuse of the proceeds from the sale of the golf course for operating expenses unless we taxpayers get a public apology from those elected and appointed officials who told us those monies would be invested and the income would be used for funding recreational programs.

The IT description states they are information and telecommunications. Why aren't they also automation? How are the invoices for the permits and licenses currently prepared? Why is the equivalent

of another employee required as professional services for the IT Department? Also, there is \$60,000 of equipment maintenance which seems high, very high. Should there perhaps be a capital expense to replace equipment that appears to be high maintenance?

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Also, I would like to see the job description of the enforcer of sign licensing -- licenses. It appears highly illogical that we collect \$52,800 in sign permits and spend \$33,000 -- may I finish this one, and spend \$33,895 plus benefits for an enforcer of sign licenses yet have no rental housing license enforcer when it's been estimated one and a half million could be brought in and renters better protected from substandard housing. I hope we get another round. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, the fees that you are going to institute for the parking meters and the parking fines are actually counterproductive. You are going to drive people away from the city to the places where they get free. I mean, the first time somebody gets a ticket they are going to say to heck with this town and I don't blame them. You get a ticket for that much for wanting to shop in your city? I am surprised a lot of these people that don't have parking, business people downtown ain't up in arms at this. I would be. I looked at it and the only really deal that may be some beneficial to the city is you may stop the parking authority from going into bankruptcy because you are going to force a lot of people that are on the streets into the parking garages if they have to be in Scranton.

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But another thing is, as you know the revenue for the parking -- the revenue on the parking meters is all mortgaged, so hence if you increase the parking meters revenue you also let Scranton Parking Authority be able to borrow them because it's all based on revenue. I think they got up to a million they can actually borrow. I wish I knew exactly if some of these deals that went through our still in effect or

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1	not. I mean, they did borrow at one time on
2	their letter of credit, but as you can see I
3	think you are going to be counterproductive
4	really.
5	One mayor actually had free parking
6	downtown if you lived in the city long
7	enough to remember it and they tried to do
8	that, too, to bring people in, not drive
9	people out. That's the whole idea. We also
10	had satellite where people could actually
11	park and take a bus in. You may end up with
12	that again because people don't want to pay
13	that kind of money and I don't blame them.
14	Not to shop here.
15	I men, the only deals is some of the
16	doctors that doesn't have parking and you
17	are stuck. When have you to go to a
18	doctoring town, you got to park but hence if
19	them doctors decide they should move out of
20	town you are going to have a lot of empty
21	space downtown. I wish you would look at
22	them fines and really go down to some of the
23	business people and knock on doors and ask
24	them what they feel about it. Ask them if
25	they think it's going to be a plus or a

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1	minus regardless of what we have to do for
2	the Scranton Parking Authority. Like I say,
3	what happens there happens. Thank you.
4	MR. MCGOFF: Ozzie Quinn.
5	MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn. President
6	of the Scranton/Lackawanna County Taxpayers'
7	Association. The whole budget to me is iffy
8	as I've said for the last two readings
9	because of the fact that as Andy said, you
10	know, we don't know if we are going to get
11	that revenue for parking and also the LIPS
12	program as was said, Ron Ellman told you
13	last week that the mayor waived that
14	multi-million dollars project down there.
15	No, he didn't waive it, he charged Austin
16	Burke \$19, so I mean this is pretty iffy,
17	this whole thing.
18	I want to ask a question now and
19	maybe you can answer this, Mr. Courtright,
20	that 888 funds, you were supposed to get
21	4.2 million and you received two million and
22	it was supposed 2.4 million coming to us.
23	MR. COURTRIGHT: They didn't privy me
24	to that. I don't know what was in the
25	paper. They said we are going to see come

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1	before the end of the year.
2	MR. QUINN: And if it doesn't come we
3	are going to go into a deficit; right?
4	MR. COURTRIGHT: Yeah.
5	MR. QUINN: How can we work like
6	that? The other thing here is I'm going
7	to we're going to eliminate the
8	Department of Public Safety? The Department
9	of Public Safety. What about the jobs
10	there?
11	MR. MCGOFF: I'm sorry?
12	MR. QUINN: The Department of Public
13	Safety is going to be eliminated?
14	MS. FANUCCI: They are moving the
15	jobs back to where they came from.
16	MR. QUINN: I'm asking Mr. McGoff.
17	MS. FANUCCI: Oh, okay.
18	MR. MCGOFF: Yes.
19	MR. QUINN: What about the jobs,
20	like the secretary and clerks?
21	MR. MCGOFF: If passed, the amendment
22	would place the secretary in the law
23	department and the assistant public safety
24	director and housing inspectors that part of
25	the department would move to licensing.

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1	MR. QUINN: Okay, so in essence
2	you're eliminating Mr. Hayes' job.
3	MR. MCGOFF: Yes.
4	MR. QUINN: Which to me is tantamount
5	to a plumb job since he is no longer needed
6	and this is what Mrs. Evans has been saying
7	for four years in her budget, you don't need
8	a Department of Public Safety and you sat
9	there and now is the mayor finally listening
10	or are you trying to embarrass Mrs. Evans?
11	I don't know.
12	The other thing is this here, under
13	intergovernmental you have the OECD renting
14	down at the Scranton Life building, I
15	believe, Mr. Rinaldi who is big contributor
16	to Mr. Doherty's campaign, and the fact is
17	that if that department of OECD came up here
18	to city hall and had their headquarters here
19	in city hall that rent that you are paying
20	Mr. Rinaldi could be paid for
21	intergovernmental department and will be
22	more revenue for the City of Scranton. Am I
23	right? So I would hope that you would look
24	into that because it's to long that we have
25	been down there and it's just unbelievable

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1	even the county is looking how they can get
2	their programs together.
3	I appreciate it, but again, I won't
4	be able to come tonight, but my God how this
5	budget, you know, can pass on all of these
6	if's, I don't know. Thank you.
7	MR. MCGOFF: Lee Morgan.
8	MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.
9	I just would like to say that I am in total
10	disagreement with this budget. My opinion
11	is probably much different than everyone
12	else here today in some ways, but in my
13	opinion some of these positions we're
14	cutting I most certainly don't agree with.
15	I don't agree with the master mechanic. I
16	don't agree with the traffic department. I
17	don't agree with getting rid of the sign
18	maker.
19	You know, I did look through this
20	budget, I just I think that what we are
21	doing here is we are making personnel cuts
22	in my opinion to service debt. Mrs. Gatelli
23	talked about going to the nonprofits and
24	some other council members, but that hasn't
25	changed. It's still \$118,000. We are

taking the last \$900,000 from the sale of the golf course and we are plugging it into this budget. This was -- there was an asset that the city had that raised over \$200,000 and the city never, ever paid anything in regards to the golf course because when you read about how the golf course was created it was a created by a citizen of this city.

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I really do have a problem with council because for a whole year this council knew that we were in financial straights and then we have a very short time frame to come up with an alternative budget, so I would just like to say that the way wage taxes is decreasing, the city is really in my opinion the only avenue of approaching in my humble opinion is bankruptcy. Some people don't want to hear this, some people think it's just not a credible idea, but there are other communities in Pennsylvania that are doing it.

We are talking about a cable TV, I don't know if the city has a new cable TV franchise agreement with the provider, but we have increase in that. We have a lot of

increases here in the budget that I don't how you can really say they're realistic. I find this budget to be totally unrealistic because all we are doing is continuing the decline of this city which has occurred over decades and the truth of matter is that I don't see the city being able to service it's debt for much longer and sooner or later the city will have no employees.

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I think that we need to go to the Courts and ask for intervention. We can't blame the employees of the city because they weren't elected officials that created contracts and jobs for people in my opinion for their support, and I just would like this council even at this time to table this budget and come up with ways to cut it by an additional 10 percent in reality.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. DOBRZYN: Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton, member of the Taxpayers' Association. On this employees being laid off once again. In the past I mentioned that it would be interesting if the city would get a committee of clerical employees

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1	to collect delinquent taxes and so forth as
2	opposed to letting it fester until they have
3	to be sold over to the NCC and apparently
4	now we are going to have less people do
5	that.
6	You know, when you call down to city
7	hall and have you a question it took me a
8	year or two to get the hang of it and you
9	couldn't get a question answered. I called
10	about a garbage bill because I didn't get
11	one the second year I had my house and there
12	was nobody there that knew where I lived
13	even though the place has been there
14	100 years and it's probably just somebody
15	that didn't have a working computer or
16	access to it, what have you, but they
17	shouldn't be left to fester like this as the
18	last ditch attempt.
19	We could even be counseling these
20	people in these reverse mortgages and so
21	forth where you could mitigate some of the
22	damage instead of having somebody from
23	Hoboken, New Jersey, buying a note and
24	charging three times more or whatever.
25	That's what I've heard and also I'd

like to resound about the parking because it's -- it's really. I mean, some merchants downtown have gotten wonderful things and they have gotten malls and they have gotten this and they have gotten that and other people have just been there for years and nothing has been done for them. I was just down at Coney Island this weekend and they said they put pavement in at their expense and they are waiting for a light to be put in on the corner.

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So, you know, it's really not right to charge people -- charge people extra to park and everything when you are doing this for everybody else. I mean, the mall just got a couple of million dollar loan and what have you to stay open and small places just left to hang by the thread, so hopefully we could come up with some kind of alternatives to this, but when you start dumping people off the rolls that are actually worker bees it's not -- I don't feel it's productive.

> Furthermore, Mr. Courtright's department there, he was the man that was elected to run it so I don't know why

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1	everybody is asking the person that hasn't
2	been elected to run it with. Catch you
3	later.
4	MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?
5	MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Council.
6	Les Spindler, city resident. For two weeks
7	now I wanted to talk about these parking
8	fees and I didn't have a chance to, but I'm
9	totally against these parking fees. We
10	can't get people to come downtown as it now,
11	raising these parking fees will just
12	guarantee that nobody is going to come down
13	here. You know, like I said they're not
14	coming there now, I'll tell you a quick
15	story. On black Friday my daughter when
16	shopping with her friend and her mother,
17	they went to Wal-Mart at five in the
18	morning, there was a three-hour wait in line
19	to get into Wal-Mart. They went to the
20	Viewmont Mall it was jammed. I called my
21	daughter about 8:00 that morning and said,
22	"We're at Steamtown Mall, there is nobody
23	here."
24	Every place else was jammed, nobody
25	in the Steamtown Mall, so why would anybody

1	come to shop at Scranton when the parking
2	fees are going up, they could park free at
3	the mall and they are still not coming
4	downtown, they are going all over but
5	they're not coming to downtown Scranton.
6	As Andy said, under some mayors
7	there was free parking, I know under Mayor
8	Connors from Thanksgiving to Christmas there
9	was free parking. Right now in Wilkes-Barre
10	there is free parking until Christmas, so
11	raising these fees is just going to chase
12	people out of here, it's going to be more of
13	a ghosttown than it is now and I definitely
14	think they should be voted down.
15	And, yeah, I'm glad to hear you
16	people are finally listening. I asked for
17	Ray Hayes' job to be eliminated and now I
18	hear it is, so maybe you are finally
19	listening. Thank you.
20	MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?
21	MR. MARTIN: I'm here so, I just
22	I thought I was coming down for a budget
23	hearing, but I guess that's not going to
24	happen tonight. I have just had a couple of
25	questions

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1	MR. MCGOFF: This is. This is the
2	budget hearing.
3	MR. MARTIN: Oh, okay. I have a
4	couple of questions that affect our contract
5	in the budget and the two positions that
6	have been in particular the grant writer and
7	the SIT and I hope everybody is aware that,
8	you know, there is an SIT decision that's
9	looming right now over the city be it to the
10	tune of about million dollars for violating
11	that original SIT agreement and now it's in
12	the budget to violate it again and just so
13	you know we are going to fight for those two
14	positions because they are very valuable to
15	us, not only to the entire department, of
16	course, is these grants, extremely valuable,
17	and secondly the other SIT clerk that does
18	the dictation.
19	I mean, those reports were
20	notoriously behind. A couple of times we
21	were tripped up, I think there is a position
22	that sat vacant right now that hasn't been
23	filled, I don't know why they aren't doing
24	that, but those are very valuable positions
25	because we rely on those now. I mean, those

are the positions we gave up originally as police officers for the SIT clerks and now we are finding out hunker down and we'll have a victim who will call and say, "My house was burglarized yesterday, what are you guys doing about it?"

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And we'll say, you know, "What's your address," and we stark looking in the reports and the report is or five days behind because those positions were vacant. But I just didn't -- I just wanted you to be aware that those are valuable positions, they are in our contract and again the city -- I mean, very soon the Labor Board is going to hand down a decision and it's going to be very expensive and I just don't want everybody blaming us for that.

And then there was a couple of other little things in there, I noticed the -- it says corporal of training, the actual title of that is special services supervisor. Now, that was placed in the Recovery Plan, we discussed that, we negotiated, the director and I negotiated somewhat as to the exact description of that and they took the

position that they were going to do the entire job description, which they did. We haven't, you know -- we haven't had any problems with that and we are going to let be as it may, they are going to write it the way they want to write it, that's fine, but it was agreed upon that that was a supervisor's position so it has to be the minimum of a sergeant's pay. I'm not sure exactly what the budget said, but I noticed it said in there corporal in training and that's not the exact title. The exact title is supervisor, special services supervisor who is going to oversee all of the special units including the bomb unit, the SOG Team, canine, everything that's specialized in the in those technical terms that would be -that would be what that position is created for and the City agreed to that in the Recovery Plan, so I just want to make sure that -- you know, that you take a look at that not a training corporal or whatever is in the budget. Thank you.

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MR. JACKOWITZ: Bill Jackowitz, Scranton resident. All I can say about the

budget is I just hope that council really looks at this budget very careful and very closely. I mean, the budget is \$77 million, our population is approximately 72,000, so I mean, that's a large amount of money for a small population and we have a lot of people who work for the city or who are employed by the city who are making an awful lot of money and you really need to look at those people, not these people who are making \$22,000 a year or \$23,000 a year, because that's not even a per capita -- that's not even a good per capita or medium family income wage. Those are the not the people who need to lose their jobs or get their pays cut. The people who are making \$85,000 a year and the \$150,000 a year jobs those are the ones that need to be looked at because Scranton is not a very large city. You know, it's relatively a small city compared to a lot of other areas.

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I mean, there is people probably in this city making more than people who are working in New York City or Philadelphia who are doing the same jobs. We have a public

1 safety office that doesn't need to be there, Ray Hayes, and I believe he has two 2 3 secretaries. You know, that position is not even supposed to be there and this guy is 4 5 making a lot of money and I don't know what his secretary is making, at least cut maybe 6 7 one of his secretaries or someone from that 8 office because, you know, that office 9 doesn't need -- it's not even supposed to be 10 there. 11 MS. FANUCCI: Bill, actually they are 12 eliminating -- we are eliminating that 13 department and we didn't get to speak on 14 that. 15 MR. JACKOWITZ: You are eliminating 16 all three positions or just one? 17 MS. FANUCCI: Ray Hayes' position 18 will be leaving and the rest will be going, 19 and we discussed that earlier, licensing and 20 That's where most of the positions permits. 21 came from in the first place except for one 22 so they will be going back. 23 MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay. And then we 24 also need to look at this rental thing. I mean, 60 some percent of the people who live 25

in the City of Scranton are renters. We are losing a lot of money and this was implemented two or three years ago passed on by maybe not this council, I think some of you are on here, I don't know if you all were or not, that that was -- and this ordinance was approved. Well, enforce the darn thing. You know, if you're not going to enforce it then take it off the books and don't make the people who pay the taxes and who have problem with taxes pay for all of these other people who aren't paying for it. I mean, so let's look at this budget

very, very closely and let's do the smart thing, let's do the right thing, and let's make Scranton a very popular city like it was at one time.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else on the budget?

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20 MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening, 21 Council. Nelson Ancherani. I just have 22 some questions and comments. The questions 23 I'm going to ask never got answered during 24 regular council meetings. Maybe you can 25 think about these before you vote on a

budget. Why in the expenditure pie chart on page five do all of the pie slices representing the various offices, example the Director of Public Safety or the Law Department have inflated percentages? All of those inflated percentages are not what is actually spent for each department.

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Number two, why is the difference approximately equal the total of the nondepartmental expenditures and why isn't there a pie slice for nondepartmental expenditures? Examples, the lease backs, the museum, they are all nondepartmental.

Number three, why is the expenditure for citation issuers 600 thousands plus? I believe there is only four of them or even six. Does that make their salaries \$100,000 each? Good questions. Is that money used for the wages or what's it used for?

Comment. The amount of money for raises and new hires over the years -- this year was 20 million, it goes to 25 million next year. Where in the budget -- question, does it show where the attorneys that the city is using to fight the unions get paid
