The Office of Scranton City Council is currently accepting resumes and cover letters to fill it's anticipated vacancy in January. Resumes will be accepted until 12 noon on December 20, 2009. I would also like to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukah, joyous Kwanza and to all a happy, healthy and prosperous new year.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? Citizens' participation. We will have three minutes for each speaker. Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Well, thank you,
Mr. McGoff. I would assume that you would
vote on everything before people got a
chance to speak. You surprised me. Okay,
let's talk about the accomplishments of
council, okay? We are still in distressed
status, okay? We sold millions of dollars
worth of assets, which you have done. You
have transferred the DPW site so many times

I lost track who owns it. That's how bad it is.

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And as far as the library goes, I do believe we pay the liability on the library because we own it. We also pay the liability on the South Side complex and I hope with the new council we are going to find out why. We also pay the liability sitting down there with the old DPW site. These are things that we pay the liability on, but for the life of me I don't know why, but we already do it. It would be foolish of me to even get into the library because in my three minutes it don't make a difference anyway. It's a lost cause and we all know what's going to happen, but to take credit for what was done in this city in the last four years is really sorry.

We are more in debt now than when you people took office to sit up there that are leaving, and we haven't changed a bit.

The city is still distressed, the people are distressed, and all we have to do is hope for the new council and that's one of the reasons why we never put in an application.

You need people where I am now speaking against no matter who sits up there. I have done it all the way through from Murphy to DiBileo, Judy, all the way through and I will continue to do it as long as I got breath in my body to do it. I believe in open, honest and efficient government and I hope to see it, I really do before I die, but it's really something I probably won't see.

For some reason or another they have told you that when they get this library board it's open. It is open, but you are open, too, but your decision don't matter. It doesn't matter one iota. They get to do what they want to do and there is nothing you can do about it. Once a board is established they can run amuck and that's probably what's going to happen. The mayor has already took a bidding on the bank in South Side and that's where he plans to do this library and he is going to do that library because I don't know what you are going to stop it once the authority is formed. That's it. Thank you.

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MR. MCGOFF: Terry Brennan.

MS. BRENNAN: Well, I don't think that my other three minutes for this is in vain because it's very important to get this organized with the library. If we have an authority I would humbly suggest that we just add academics to the current people who are on the board of the trustees and have no one involved in reference to politics whatsoever. The whole purpose of this authority was to make sure that the deeds are at the library. The city has nothing to do with the South Side or that would be in the charter and they don't give us any money and so on and so forth, so everything would go and we wouldn't have to be surprised because they don't know what they are doing because we have the best minds we could possibly find in Lackawanna County.

Now, on this authority, if they were all retired and lived in Lackawanna County and worked here for a long time or forever and lived in Monroe or Wyoming that would be very suitable, as long as they would be qualified and have the heart of the library

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and know something about it and have academic degrees, that's number one.

Getting back, I would love to see that administration building belong to us at the library. It really belongs. Everything is there together. logical. three -- just fix it up inside. There is -people want to go to the Children's Library and then to the Albright and then to go for technologies. Everything could be moved over there plus offices. If there is any other space it could be with the law library and also rent out to lawyers, it's conducive to going to the courthouse. There is no other way. It's right there. Plus, of course, meaning that we have parking. That's about it.

As far as South Side goes or anyplace else, this is besides the point.

Every area could stand some kind of renovations or some court or some blah, blah. We need something at the library that's close by where it's conducive for the taxpayers. Thank you very much.

MR. MCGOFF: Marie Schumacher.

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MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher, city resident and member of the Taxpayers' Association. Again, I'd like to continue speaking on the library and I would like you to ask yourself at least this question, why was the \$100,000 payment for that South Side property removed from the 2010 budget if one of the purposes of this -- a newly established authority was not to raid the funds that had been raised, and I would say that would disrespect any person who has donated to the library or put their efforts forward to raise money thinking it was for the three libraries that the city already held and now it will be that those monies will be diverted to a new library that has not had sufficient public vetting.

Why are the authority members from outside of the city? Now, I agree the board of trustees has done an excellent job, but now you are setting up a city authority and I think the majority of the members, if I'm recalling correctly, are from outside of the city and they have five to six-year terms of office? What is the role of the current

board of trustees? Will they continue to exist? Will we now have two or will this new authority contract out to the trustees to do their work for them? It's very confusing and I think those answers should be given.

And then finally I would like to state my disappointment that, Mrs. Gatelli, I think it's a real slap in the face, when it comes to walking the streets of South Side you can get off of work, but when you don't have --

MS. GATELLI: That was after work, Mrs. Schumacher.

MS. SCHUMACHER: You have motions, I don't. The fact that you couldn't come and listen to me and all of these other people who came here in morning and spoke for almost an hour, you didn't care what they

spoke. That tells me you already committed, your mind is made up --

MS. GATELLI: I already said I was committed to the library, yes, I did.

MS. SCHUMACHER: You don't care what the city pays -- excuse me, but I think I have the floor, Mr. McGoff. Would you please use your gavel? Thank you. Thank you very much.

MS. GATELLI: There are some people that have to work.

MR. SPINDLER: Good morning, Council, Les Spindler, city resident. Two weeks ago Mrs. Gatelli said none of us that come here do anything in our neighborhoods. Well, I don't know how she knows that, she must have special powers to know what everybody else does. As a matter of fact, I had to leave that meeting before I could speak because I went to a neighborhood association meeting and a crime watch meeting, so for her to say that is totally untrue. I'm sure there is other people that do stuff in their neighborhood. She is not the only one that does stuff in her neighborhoods in her city

like she likes people to believe.

Also, Mrs. Gatelli said that people come up here and say they don't know how she can put up with us. Well, I think the voters said it loud and clear who can't put up with whom. Not once, but twice.

And going back to our crime watch, according to Lieutenant Leonard Namiotka, since our crime watch was created police calls to Tripp Park have gone down and that's a good thing.

Mr. Courtright, I think it was two weeks ago, you said you thought we should have a public safety director. I don't think I have ever disagreed with all of your time on council, but I have to disagree with you on that one. I think our police and firefighters have done a great job in spite of Ray Hayes not because of him and I think all we need now is to get a competent police chief and a competent fire chief and we'll be fine. We don't need a public safety director.

One more thing, Mr. Courtright, I think our ATV problem in Tripp Park is

solved. They have started construction on the new school back there and since they started and I haven't heard any ATV's go back there. I mean, I'm not there all of the time but a lot of time they would go by my house I would have heard one. I haven't heard once since they started grading the landscape and everything. They aren't building yet, but they are leveling everything else.

MR. COURTRIGHT: They probably ruined the trails that they were riding on. Good.

MR. SPINDLER: So hopefully that problem is solved. I still have more time. Mr. McGoff, once again you are violating our constitutional rights. This is the council meeting part, we should have five minutes to speak not three, but thank God this is the last time we will have to listen to what you say. Starting next month you will see how it feels to be a minority of one like Mr. Courtright and Mrs. Evans went through the last couple of years banging their heads off the walls trying to help the taxpayers and nobody listening, so you will see what

it feels like next month.

And one last thing, as I said last week, the library doesn't belong to the city, it belongs to the people and voting for this library authority will take the library away from the people no matter what three of you think just like the South Side Complex was taken away from the people with the Redevelopment Authority. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Dave Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton. Once again, hopefully and probably not, this charter for this library authority has not been adequately examined for ambivalent and questionable language and I have -- I agree that the library needs to be expanded and that previous speaker had an excellent idea that the administration building would be great for it and too bad if somebody else has their eye on it. They keep buying buildings and buying buildings, are they improving their education? Who knows.

Every student in a school as far as a college before they are handed a book they

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should be handed a computer with wireless and rechargeable and could go anywhere and tap right into the school program and perform their lessons or whatever, so if there is overcrowding up there might I suggest that some of these schools start to develop new ways of thinking and start thinking out of the box.

Also, we don't have a lot of money and we all talk about the deficits and so forth, so whether or not that's going to come to fruition, and once again, I will state that if a library were to be built in South Side seven blocks or six blocks from the original library is not the place and there is no guarantee that that neighborhood once again will improve and who at this time if you just had the library sitting there right now in that location would you want your 15-year-old daughter or granddaughter walking down that street at 8:00 this evening? Ask yourself that. Would you really want your daughter walking that? Would you want a 30-year-old woman walking down there?

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You know, it's just the -- I stopped at a bank there at an ATM and two guys called across the street, "Hey, you want to buy any drugs?"

You know, I mean, what a neighborhood and to assume that somehow if we put a library there it's just going to make things wonderful again it's -- and, unfortunately, when we get these projects people -- they are very disturbing because people have been locked out, people wind up locked out, 30 years ago a Baptist minister I worked with told me the only thing urban renewal does is push young families out into the street and, you know, at this point he may be right. Look at the corner of Cedar and Lackawanna where Coney Island is. There is still no light, but they didn't even put a streetlight. They paid for everything themselves. Thank you and have a good day.

MR. MCGOFF: Fay Franus.

MS. FRANUS: Fay Fraus, Scranton. I would just like to reiterate, I don't believe you should be voting for this library authority, but we all know you will.

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I guess you want to go out with the way you came in voting against the people.

I don't know, Judy, why are so gung-ho on picking up garbage in South Side. I don't know if you are planning to run for election again, I don't know, something is to it, but all I'm trying to say is your garbage bags it won't do you any good.

I will still be back at council to pursue this lawsuit whether you are sitting here or not because I'm going to make sure that's paid by you back to the taxpayers. about the library since I got here. I have
seen one side and another side and usually I
can have -- I'm right in the middle, but if
I have -- if I speak on it, I'm going to
offend people and I don't want to do that
because there is something else I'm looking
for. What exactly is the status of the
South Side Complex? Who owns it, who can
use it, anybody know this or where do I go
to find this out? Is this field being
replaced, that's what I really want to find
out?

MS. EVANS: Though the city
administration had promised a replacement
field, and I believe that was to have been
provided by 2005, that never occurred.
There is no replacement field. I believe
the University of Scranton owns the South
Side Complex, however, there is ongoing
litigation concerning the sale of the
complex and as a result it appears that the
University has not actively assumed
ownership, let us say, in terms of the

improvement or maintenance, etcetera. I do believe the fields have been in use at least during the summertime by some softball leagues and soccer leagues, but that is very likely due to the permission of the University of Scranton.

MR. FRANCE: Well, the South Side
Teener League used to use that field, that
one field to play. They can no longer play
there because you got goal posts in the
outfield. They don't have anywhere to go.
They were up Connell Park, they were trying
Scranton High School's, you know, I can't -I can't say definite, but from attending the
meetings at South Side Little League it
doesn't seem like it's working.

What about the Redevelopment

Authority and the new field? How -- I mean,
is that just a done deal or is there going

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has been called for final consideration of the legislation which creates a Scranton Public Library Authority, authorizes the execution of articles of incorporation, appoints the first members of the authority and conveys title to the authority for the Albright Memorial Library, Greenridge Library and the Silkman House.

For the record, I strongly support the revitalization of South Side. Μy maternal roots are in South Side. Μy mother, her parents, grandparents, and extended family lived on Moosic Street and River Street. My grandparents began their courtship at Granito's Market. Like so many of you, I am saddened to witness the decline of various sections of South Side. Thus, I voted in favor of File of Council No. 26 of 2006 in which \$1 million was allocated to the South Side Cedar Avenue Strategy Area Project.

On November 24, 2009, I voted in favor of Resolution No. 187 of 2009 for the Cedar Avenue Neighborhood Housing Revitalization Initiative.

Further, I have served the residents of South Scranton throughout my six years as a seated council woman by providing sewer repairs on Ripple Street, fighting for road repairs and paving, demolition of condemned properties and neighborhood patrols, and offering individual help to solve countless resident's problems.

In addition, I have fought against excessive and unnecessary borrowing, an unnecessary 25 percent tax increase and wasteful spending while calling for accountability, professionalism, and transparency. These are the duties and responsibilities I address not only for South Side, but for all residents from all sections of our city.

Realistically, I am sure my council colleagues will agree that we must serve the best interest of all Scrantonians. No decision pleases everyone, but as elected officials we must do the greatest good for the greatest number.

I have always been an advocate of reading and lifelong learning. My parents

gifted me with these priceless lessons and in turn I passed these lessons to my own children as well as thousands of students throughout our region. I am an adamant supporter of libraries and recognize the essential and noble roles they hold in societies. Unfortunately, now is not the time for a new library and it is not the time to create a library authority. The reasons are numerous and significant.

(1). A library authority has the power to sell, lease, transfer and dispose of any property at any time acquired by it. Although the deed to the Albright Memorial Library states that it must remain in perpetuity a free public library for all of the people of Scranton, it is possible that the authority could transfer the property to a college or University, for example, that it turn would allow public accessibility in addition to that of it's students. Thus, the people of Scranton lose an architectural gem and an asset against the expressed desires of the Albright family.

(2). A library authority has the

power to finance projects by making loans or agreements that may contain such provisions as the authority shall deem necessary. It can borrow money, make and issue negotiable notes, bonds, refunding bonds and other evidence of indebtedness or obligations.

Such bonds shall have a maturity date not longer than 40 years. As we have witnessed recently, authorities such as the Scranton Parking Authority do not always seek local government approval for borrowing.

- (3). A library authority has the power of eminent domain. What will be the impact to surrounding businesses in the direct vicinity of the proposed South Side Library.
- (4.) A library authority has existence for a term of 50 years. Citizens will be forced to survive and subsidize this authority until the year 2060. Most of us in this chamber today with the exception of those lovely young people up in the balcony will not live to see the termination of any authorities.
  - (5). Authority members shall be a

taxpayer and maintain a business in or be a citizen of the municipality by which he is appointed. It is troubling members of the Scranton Public Library board in an emergency meeting appointed themselves to the proposed library authority without the input of the governing body, the Scranton City Council, Scranton City Council who must decide for or against the organization of the Scranton Public Library Authority.

(6). The Lackawanna County commissioners are on record opposing the construction of a new South Side Library and state that they will not fund or increase library taxes to sustain this project.

In fact, just this morning, a letter was delivered to each of us from

Commissioner Munchak who gives us all his apologies for his inability to attend and speak at today's public hearing because he has so many meetings of his own. He is in favor of a new library, he is in favor of the creation of a municipal library authority. However, he raises some notable points and I will read now from his letter:

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"The most important question applies to Phase II. Where is the funding coming from to build a new \$16 million library somewhere in the city? Even if it is downsized to \$10 million who is going to pay for it? Unlike the other city authorities, sewer and parking, the library has no revenue stream other than late fees from overdue books. Therefore, the city and/or the county will be asked to sign on as guarantors of any and all borrowings which actually means making the monthly loan payments. Since the city has not contributed one dime to the operation of the Scranton Public Library and it's branches in at least 50 years, the county will be forced to add the loan payments at that the annual funding of operations. We cannot do this. We will not do this. All three commissioners are in agreement."

- (7). The Pennsylvania State budget significantly cut funding to the libraries throughout the Commonwealth.
- (8). The mayor has been planning a new library in South Side since at least

2007. Included in the 2008 capital budget, which was presented to Scranton City Council in September 2007, is 3.5 million for the renovation, acquisition and construction of new property under the title "Scranton Public Library." In November 2008, he included \$100,000 in the 2009 operating budget for the South Side Library.

Coincidentally, the \$100,000 does not appear in the 2010 operating budget and where it went nobody knows. The only response giving by Stu Renda was: It was cut. However, I still don't know for what purpose it was or will be used or into what rabbit hole this money has disappeared.

Nevertheless, Mayor Doherty is an official candidate for governor and although it is and has been his intention to build a library, which is why we are here today deliberating the creation of a library authority, he may not continue to serve as mayor and see this complicated and costly project to fruition. This is his very clear intention, to start something and leave it unfinished on unfunded.

(9). Employee's salaries, health care, equipment, books, magazines, computers, utilities, cleaning and maintenance will be paid biweekly and monthly by whom? The county declined to provide financial assistance. The city is myriad in over \$316 million in long-term debt so who is going to pay the operating expenses of the new library?

afford a new library at this time. Scranton is in double digit unemployment figures, houses a population of approximately
24 percent who live at or below the poverty level, suffers from a 25 percent loss of taxable property to nonprofits, has long included a significantly high percentage of senior citizens on fixed incomes, some of whom you have seen plead with us this morning, and it very likely owes millions in salaries, health care, overtime and longevity to it's police and firefighters and it seems that day of reckoning may be coming.

Equally important of those here

seated only Mr. McGoff and I will remain in office to live with the ramification of this library authority and the financial consequences. The other two council members walk away after today and the mayor hopes to leave this behind him by the end of 2010.

If this project is the right thing to do and can be managed financially, please table or if you must vote, vote against this legislation. Provide the time to see if Mr. Doherty remains as mayor and if the economy and our tax base better emerges from this recession. A 50-year decision should not be made at the 11th hour by those who have no further responsibility for it's success, failure or survival. That's it.

MS. FANUCCI: My belief on the authority is that as it was for the past five weeks, it is not just about the new library. In fact, that is probably putting the cart before the horse especially in light of what has been happening with the funding on the state level. We need to be able to do things appropriately. Public

that certain entities can survive anymore.

A public library is not going to be supported by just the public. It can't be done. Funding cannot be done in that light. You need to be able to have someone who is able to fundraise, think outside of the normal procedure to be able to keep these -- to keep these public -- to be able to keep these options open for the public.

You are saying that this is our library and we don't want to lose it, but yet do not want to make any provisions to make sure that that is not what's going to happen. Who is going to pay for the people to keep the lights on, to be able to work the library system if all of that funding has been cut already this year. We are talking about this year and this year alone. Don't look ten years down the road because as of right now it's functioning on a daily basis that's going to be the problem after getting all of that money taken away.

I understand the concerns about the future and the new library. To me, they are

very wishful thinking at this point. To be able to say that some day we are going to have that, well, yeah, maybe some day in the future that would be wonderful. As of right now, that's an extreme wishlist as far as I'm concerned.

Your home, everything is going up. It costs you more to live every single year. It costs you more to maintain your homes, your life-style, your -- it's not any different for these entities. Keeping the lights on at Albright is something we all want for the rest of our entire lives. I never want to see that place not be a library. It is beautiful. That building is amazing. They made provisions for that. They made sure that this is not going to happen.

We have a board that has been sitting saying they love the library, they have given their lives to making sure that this library does what it's supposed to do, be open to the public, making sure that they are giving you the services that they can. They are saying that they believe this is a

good idea yet that is still not enough.

We have speakers come up and say,
"You are not listening to the public," but
yet some of the public and as many of the
public is saying the opposite of what you
are saying so at what point do you believe
who is the reality, you know, who is giving
you the real check here? People who are in
charge of the library, people who are saying
this is what's been going on and the board
that is overseeing the library, they don't
know as much as the other people who seem to
be saying no.

That is not my belief. My leave is that we need to continue to do things that are for the public. Maintaining a board, it's going on all around us. We have people everywhere around us has a library board and seem to be functioning well. They don't -- aren't having the money which the funniest thing I have heard today that people are making money off of this deal. This is not about making money off the deal, as you said before, we just heard they are not making any money because the only thing they have

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are library fees so how much money are we talking about pocketing?

People who sit on board do it because of their passion not any different than people who sit on council, not any different than people who sit in all of the other government seats. They do it because it's something they believe in. So to not entrust that to someone who honestly has the same passion is -- it's just something that I don't understand. I know that the fear is that we are trying to move this library to South Side and I'm not sure if that will happen or not happen, but right now my thought is that we need to do what's best so we can keep what we have going in a better direction and for the people who are not like us, who do not have computers at home, who cannot access the media that we can do from our own homes and to make it better.

So that is my feeling on it, and as far as the lame duck and acting like my responsibilities will be finished here the day I leave is ludicrous. I certainly didn't give four years of my life to this

city so that I can walk away and be done with my decisions. In fact, I am sure that my passion will come out in other areas and work hard in other areas, so to say that I would just walk away from my decisions is very, very not only disheartening, but excessively not true and it seems to be that that is used to benefit other people, certainly not on my reflection or why I ran and what I did for the city so far, so that is all I have. I certainly will be voting in favor of this and feel that my decisions are founded, and that is all I have. Thank you.

MR. COURTRIGHT: You know, today we have heard from a lot of different people, a lot of different angles about the authority and about the library and where it's going to go and I want to talk a little bit about where some people think it's going to go and why some people think it's good and why some people think it's good and why some people think it's bad. Now, I believe that most people believe that the library if it's built will go in South Scranton, I believe that, but the people that are opposed or

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opposing it have their reasons and I would speak for the people who are favor of it going in South Side and I would say don't fool yourself, because I think many of you know for the last six years or so I served on a state police commission and I have been to every single part of this state several times over. I have ridden with the Philadelphia police department, Harrisburg. I'm friends the Chief in Carlisle and Reading and Montgomery County and everywhere they have all problems like we see in South Side and the rest of this city, you know, prostitution, stabbings, shootings, drugs. Drugs is probably the biggest thing and now gangs and contrary to what people believe in this city we have every gang here.

Do I think if the library goes into South Side it will anchor the Elm Street project, sure, I think that, but I don't think it's going to solve the problem the people think it's going to solve. You are going to push the people two blocks up the street, three blocks up the street. You are not going to rid the city of that. I think

we saw it years back we pushed them out of South Side and they landed a lot of them in West Side, I think most of them in South Scranton that's why I think we have the problems in South Scranton that we have.

I think if you are going to solve this problem of drugs and crime in this city you are going to have to put 25, 30, 40 more police officers on this street and force them out of this city, not from one part of the city to the other, not two blocks up.

So for that part of it, I think you are fooling yourself if you think that's going to solve the problem. It might solve the problem on Cedar Avenue, but they are going to be two or three blocks in the other direction. I just wanted to bring that up sitting here thinking.

There has been so many different sides of this issue brought up and I think what we are voting on is the authority not where the library is going, but the authority itself, but other aspects of it have been brought up and I just wanted to touch on that, and that's all I have. Thank

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you, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: First, very briefly, I'd just like to thank the students from Yellowwood for attending today's meeting.

It's good to see students here and participating in municipal government.

On the legislation that we have today, first of all, to reiterate there is no legislation on today's agenda for a new library. What we are talking about is all supposition. Nothing necessarily based on fact. We are dealing with Phase I, Commissioner Munchak, you know, said Phase II, we are here to deal with Phase I and that should be our concern, and I believe that Phase I of the legislation that we are dealing with today is good for the extended life of the library system in the City of Scranton.

There are clauses in the legislation which I believe will ensure that the library system is maintained in the same way in which it is today. Section 6 of the legislation says: Properties shall be conveyed to the authority subject to all

conditions, covenants, restrictions, reservations and easements as may be set forth in documents in the chain of title, including the conditions that appear in the deeds to all three properties stating that they are to be used for library purposes.

I think that's important to understand. This authority is not being created with the idea of changing the library system in any significant way. It is going to maintain what we have and perhaps since the one property is not currently being used as library hopefully it will return to that under the conditions of this authority.

The second thing that Section 8 also includes the words: The city reserves the right to amend this ordinance or any portion thereof from time to time as it shall deem it advisable in the best interest of the promotion of the purposes and intent of this ordinance.

So right in the legislation the fears that this authority will somehow run amuck with the library system I think are

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There are provisions that the 1 unfounded. 2 city can refer to it, in fact, the authority 3 does not act in the best interest of the city. So with that, I feel that these are 4 qualifications that make this an advisable 5 things to do as we have heard from members 6 7 of the library authority or the library 8 board. 9 One other thing that I would like to 10 add to the legislation, I would like to make 11 a motion to amend Ordinance 95 of 2009 to 12 include: Pursuant to the Authorities' Act. 13 The board to be formed and thereafter seated 14 shall consist of a majority of members who are residents of the City of Scranton. 15 16 MS. FANUCCI: Second. 17 MR. MCGOFF: On the question? 18 MS. FANUCCI: Second. 19 MR. MCGOFF: On the question? 20 in favor signify by saying aye. 21 MS. FANUCCI: Aye. 22 MS. GATELLI: Aye. 23 MR.
