MR. COOLICAN: Please stand for the pledge of Allegiance and please remain standing for the invocation of Reverend Burke.

(Pledge of Allegiance recited and invocation given by Reverend Burke.)

MR. COOLICAN: In accordance with the Home Rule Charter and the City of Scranton designating the first Monday of January as the day for city council to reorganize, I hereby call this 2010 reorganization meeting to order. Roll call, please, Sue.

MR. MCGOFF: Here.

MS. MAGNOTTA: Mr. Courtright.

MR. COURTRIGHT: Here.

MS. MAGNOTTA: Mrs. Evans.

MS. EVANS: Here.

MR. COOLICAN: I have before me the certificates of election for Janet
Tomko-Evans, Pat Rogan and Frank Joyce as city council persons. Will council adopt the motion to the effect that the certificates be received and were filed and made part of the minutes.

1 MR. MCGOFF: I so move. MR. COURTRIGHT: Second. 2 3 MR. COOLICAN: All those in favor 4 say aye. 5 MS. EVANS: Aye. MR. COURTRIGHT: Aye. 6 MR. MCGOFF: Aye. 7 8 MR. COOLICAN: Those opposed? The 9 I will now ask ayes have it and so ordered. 10 Judge Terrence Nealon to step forward to the 11 podium and administer the oath of office to 12 Janet Tomko-Evans to the elected office of 13 city council. 14 HONORABLE JUDGE NEALON: I want to 15 thank Janet for the honor of swearing her in 16 today. I had the pleasure of swearing her 17 in when she was first elected to city 18 council and it's a real honor to do it 19 again. Janet, if you could raise your right 20 hand and repeat after me. 21 (JANET TOMKO-EVANS was administered 22 the oath of office by the Honorable Terrence 23 J. Nealon and was sworn in as a Scranton 24 City Council member.)

MR. COOLICAN: I would now ask Judge

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Terrence Nealon if he would stay at the podium to administer the oath of office for Pat Rogan for the elected office of city council.

to thank Pat as well. I had the opportunity to get to know Pat and Frank pretty well during this past campaign season. Every political and civic event that I attended in the city they were at. I would leave one event and before I would get to the next one they were somehow there already. I thought they had stunt doubles during the campaign but they worked very, very hard, and again, it's a pleasure and a privilege for me to administer the oath to them. MR. JOYCE: I will now ask Councilman Rogan to come forward to the podium to be sworn in as council vice-president by Judge Terrence Nealon.

(PATRICK ROGAN was administered the oath of office by the Honorable Terrence Nealon and sworn in as vice-president of Scranton City Council.)

MR. JOYCE: I will now ask Nancy
Krake to come forward to the podium to be
sworn in as city clerk by Judge Terrence
Nealon.

THE COURT: Again, I want to thank Nancy. Nancy and I went to high school together, I actually went to grade school with her husband, Ray as well. I don't think he has had a Bible in his hand since Nativity grade school, we won't go there.

(NANCY KRAKE was administered the oath of office by the Honorable Terrence Nealon and sworn in as City Clerk.)

MR. JOYCE: We are now ready to consider the rules of the procedure by which this council will be governed during the

next two years, what is your pleasure? 1 MR. JOYCE: I move that the Rules of 2 3 Council be adopted by Resolution No. 1, 2010, as required by the Home Rule Charter. 4 MR. like to congratulate Councilman Courtright on his election as our tax collector. As your councilman, it is my duty to work each and every day to represent the interests of the citizens of the Scranton. I am truly honored by this opportunity. I pledge to you that I will work tirelessly every day to make Scranton a better place for all of us.

For many years council meetings have been know for chaos and comedy instead of productivity. Today we have an opportunity to erase the mistakes of the past and begin an era of productive cooperation.

Over the next four years we will face many challenges. Our city is strapped with many problems that did not occur overnight and they will not be fixed overnight, but through hard work, creative ideas and love for City of Scranton we will overcome these challenges.

President Reagan once said,

"America's best days are yet to come, our

proudest moments are yet to be and our most

glorious achievements are still ahead."

Today as we mark on a new beginning I'm both humbled and honored to sit here before you as one of your councilmen. With no prior service in this office, I was elected on the promise of what I would provide to the residents of Scranton. This is a promise that I vow to keep. I vow to thoroughly research all of the matters in which I will vote on and use my best judgment as to what I feel is best for the city and it's residents, that I will listen to your concerns and put forth my

We also thank all of you who have taken the time to be present at today's ceremonies, demonstrate your support and

wish our new council well.
