Tell

me, does a doctor at the hospital that performs an operation subject to this tax?

MS. EVANS: Actually, I am going to refer this to Attorney Hughes. We had a brief discussion this following last weeks meeting.

MR. HUGHES: I'm looking for the button here, but somehow it doesn't go on. I have no idea on that. From a legislation standpoint it's a business privilege tax. It would seem that any doctor who resides or that has his office in the City of Scranton would be paying the tax on his total income for services performed. Whether doctors from outside of Scranton that come in and perform operations whether they are paying the tax, I have no idea. I believe that's an issue that probably the solicitor's office should look at or the single tax office with their solicitor.

It would be similar to what Mrs.

Evans and I discussed that if a contractor comes into Scranton, builds a property or puts an addition on to a house for \$10,000 he would be paying a business privilege tax

on that and taking out permits and paying the tax and certainly I think he would be getting the bill for all of the services that he performed in the city, all of the construction.

Personally, I see no difference than when a doctor comes in who has his office outside of the Scranton and performs operation and performs a service here then goes back his office, bills it outside of the City of Scranton, even though that revenue would come in outside of the City of Scranton the service to be performed, at least the cost of the operation.

I have no idea what the answer to that is. I believe it should be looked into. I believe that that would be up to the single tax office. I believe they are the ones that would be responsible for that. Probably most of the operations I would venture, I would make an educated guess they are performed in Lackawanna County are probably performed in the hospitals here within the City of Scranton.

MS. EVANS: And I might just quickly

add that I did meet with Mr. Courtright on a different issues last week, but prior to that discussion I did bring your idea to him, he wrote it down, it's something that I would like him looking into.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Well, as you know, it's attached to our paying our tax and I would hate to see us pay our tax and other people that are -- should be taxed the same way are not, but that's -- we'll find out. That has to go a long time anyway. I didn't have the opportunity to write down, I wish I did, if I had known you wanted it written I would have written it, because we got to find out the status of the South Side Complex. That's sitting there too long without having some kind of a status and another with the DPW site. As you know, we are paying liability on both parcels which would say that will we still own them, at least I hope we still own them, but anyway, to get some clarification on it, and as far as the money from the DPW site, I think I'll long dead before he comes up with that, but that isn't the point. The point is the

liability. They are going to build a garage. I mean, not a garage a Turkey Hill there. Are we liable if somebody gets hurt at the Turkey Hill being we are liable for all of the parcels? Somewhere along the line we got to set limits on the liability for the parcel.

MS. EVANS: Actually, Mr. Sbaraglia, I think you mentioned this last week and we had sent a letter requesting what insurance coverage the city has for both the complex and for the former DPW, what's being paid and why.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Okay. That will help somewhat, but you notice on the legislation they had they were on the -- both parcels was on it under the liability and city-owned property.

The only other thing I had to comment was that ludicrous article that I read in the Times. We had two council persons that sat up there that got a pension and weren't entitled to it and yet you have a new council that is entitled to a pension they want to take it away from him. Where

is the justification in that? Why should a man who was entitled to a pension going to serve his government be striped by two people that were up there that weren't entitled to a pension, were given a pension. To me, that's ludicrous, but in this city everything is ludicrous. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Sam Patilla.

MR. PATILLA: Sam Patilla, Scranton resident and Scranton homeowner. Good evening, City Council, minus one.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. PATILLA: I'd like to first commend you, Madame President and council, for the legislation that I read on the agenda 5-B, the repealing of that library authority. It really brings a smile to my face and joy to my heart, but to hitch a ride along with what Andy was speaking about earlier in reference to the fees that will be imposed, he used the example of the doctors. I would divert from that and use the one where I would include attorneys, the lawyers. My thing is how are we going to -- what format are we going to use to account

MS. SUETTA: How are you? Suetta, Scranton. And congratulations on your win and, Bob, I still like you. calling about the medical school. I know it's a great asset to our community. Mercy Hospital donated a floor for the contractors to park their car. You go by any given day at Pine Street there is between 15 and 18 pickup trucks there and the people in the United House have nurses, coming, drug stores coming, blah, blah, blah, and they have to park over Cooper's parking lot, and if the contractors can't park in the parking lot they are giving the free space. And I don't think the elderly and the blind and the cripples should have to go over to Cooper's.

Another thing, the 500 block of
Lackawanna Avenue looks beautiful. When are
we are going to get tenants? There is no
stores down there. Are they done inside?
Is it finished? Is it complete? I mean,
the mall is getting emptied. Let's put
something in the 500 block of Lackawanna
Avenue. There is nobody there. That's it.

Nothing. I'm being good. 1 I ain't cursing. 2 MS. EVANS: Very good. Thank you, 3 Jeannie. MS. SUETTA: All right? 4 But do something about that parking, all right? 5 Hi, Neil. 6 Thank you. 7 MR. COOLICAN: Hi, Jeannie. 8 MS. EVANS: Marie Schumacher. 9 MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening. 10 Marie Schumacher, city resident and member 11 of the Taxpayers' Association. I'd like to 12 start tonight, we talked about the next 13 Sewer Authority meeting and it will be per 14 legal notice in today's paper it will be 15 held at 6 p.m. next Tuesday, the 26th, in 16 their headquarters on Adams Avenue. As a 17 matter of fact, all of their meetings this 18 year will be in there headquarters at Adams 19 Avenue. And again, I would urge all 20 ratepayers who are concerned about the \$90 21 quarterly flat fee to attend that meeting. 22 Now, let's ask a question, who owns Nay Aug Park? 23 24 MS. EVANS: Who owns Nay Aug Park? 25 I would believe the residents of Scranton

do.

MS. SCHUMACHER: So it's the city.

Then the Home Rule Charter, Article V,

Section 502, and Ozzie Quinn I thought was
going to speak on this tonight but he is not
here, so I'd like to quote. Section 502 are
the actions requiring ordinances, and eight
under 502 reads: Convey or lease or
authorize the conveyance or lease of any
lands of the city must be by ordinance.

Yet I understand from a friend who attended the Recreation Authority meeting the fourth of January, that a lease was executed with Lackawanna College for the former zoo area and parking lot behind it and I wonder how that's possible if the Home Rule Charter states otherwise?

MS. EVANS: I agree. We'll look into that with the Recreation Authority that it's certainly should come before council in the form of an ordinance.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, and another sort of legal question because I don't know, which takes precedence, state statute or Home Rule Charter?

 $\mbox{MS. EVANS:} \quad \mbox{I'll defer to Attorney} \\ \mbox{Hughes.} \\$

MS. SCHUMACHER: If there is a conflict?

MR. HUGHES: First of all, you would have to find out what the statute is. The statute generally would control the Home Rule Charter. I said the statute would generally control over the Home Rule Charter because the Home Rule Charter what could be adopted is limited by the enabling legislation, so without knowing specifically what state statute and what section of the charter, it's a virtually impossible question to answer, but any home rule city could only adopt within certain limitations it's form of government and in accordance with the state statute.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. Perhaps I'll bring something more specific next week. Also, I noticed on the website Mr. Loscombe has not been added as a council person and there are no e-mail contacts for him or for Mr. Joyce, and I hope that those will be available soon.

Also, I would like to know the status of the Comcast contract which I understand expired at the end of last year and when we can expect to hear from PEL since it's been several years since the recovery plan expired? Do we have -- are you aware of either of those tonight?

MS. EVANS: No. As far as I knew the negotiations with Comcast were beginning, were ongoing. An attorney was hired by the city to represent the city who specializes in cable television franchise agreements, but we have received no updates on that.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And what about the PEL and the Recovery Plan, updated Recovery Plan?

MS. EVANS: Actually, city council has received no summaries, meeting minute summaries from PEL's meetings with city representatives for over two months now.

That is something that I was going to request this evening that Mrs. Krake as council's representative to those meeting would indicate to them that council would

1 like to be updated and receive all of the meeting minutes for the last two months. 2 3 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. And as I recall on the former council, the person who 4 had liaison with the economic development 5 was also a liaison for PEL. Is that not 6 7 correct? And are you going to appoint 8 someone to that function? MS. EVANS: I don't know that it 9 10 would be an appointment in that our previous 11 representative actually volunteered for that 12 duty, so certainly we can discuss the matter 13 and hopefully there will be a council person 14 amenable to serve as the representative. 15 MS. SCHUMACHER: Mr. Sbaraglia is 16 one of the -- may I finish that? 17 MS. EVANS: Yes, finish. 18 MS. SCHUMACHER: One of his comments 19 tonight was on the ice -- what's known as 20 BRT, the contract with BRT, and may we expect an ordinance from council so that 21 22 \$600,000 can be collected? 23 MS. EVANS: Well, I think that's 24 certainly something that I will refer to 25 Attorney Hughes. I'll have him take a look

at all of the contracts and agreements and if can be done I believe council would be interested in pursuing it.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I think it's very clear. I have all of the documentation, including the ordinance that was here before if anybody wants it. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Yes. It would be great if you could provide that to me. Neil, if you can make copies for Attorney Hughes and the new council.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening,

Council. Bill Jackowitz, South Scranton resident, member of the Taxpayers'
Association. Last week's meeting was most professionally conducted meeting that I have witnessed in the past seven years. It was about time that the police officer has been removed from council chambers and placed back on the street where police officers belong and are being paid to protect the citizens of Scranton, not council persons

that are frightened by the speakers who appear at the council meetings. There have been occasions where council members frightened me, LOL, laugh out loud.

I would like to welcome the newest is council person. I do not know you, but I am sure we will get to know each other as time goes on. Do not give in. You have as much right being on council as any of the other four members.

The Scranton Times-Tribune all of a sudden has become interested in Scranton City Council. Why? Because the newspaper and Mayor/Governor Doherty are desperate and when you are desperate you will try anything. Losing power is a tough pill to swallow. Hang in there. The people are behind you. Work for the people your support will grow. Do like Mayor/Governor Doherty does, tie it up in court -- in the court system. Do not quit.

I have 67 unanswered questions from the past four years. I do not have time tonight to ask all 67 questions, aren't you lucky? So I will ask two tonight. Are the

cameras working that have been installed in the various locations through the City of Scranton? If so, who is monitoring these cameras? If not, why not?

Also, I have made several requests that have fallen on deaf ears. Again, I would like to have council invite Mayor/Governor Doherty to attend a council meeting and answers questions for the citizens of the Scranton, and also Mr. Austin Burke, president of the Scranton Chamber of Commerce.

My last request, have any tenants been found for the 500 block of Lackawanna Avenue? If so, how many and what addresses? If not, why not?

Ex-councilwoman Fanucci promised me an answer four months ago, but I never did get that answer. Tonight Mayor/Governor Doherty, Commissioner O'Brien and Washo and Austin Burke are speaking at the Radisson Lackawanna station about how much great Scranton is. Maybe, just maybe, they should be speaking at city council, you know, where the citizens of Scranton are at and are

watching on television. Instead, they choose to spoke to nonresidents, rich people. By the way, it only costs \$10 to attend this noninformal meeting. City council is free.

Last week Ozzie Quinn, president of the Taxpayers' Association, stated he had been informed that the Scranton Sewer Authority was going to rescind the \$90 increase. Councilman McGoff received a phone call from one of the political appointees to the authority stating that was not going to happen. On Thursday, the Scranton Times-Tribune reported that the Sewer Authority was going to delay the rate increase and look at it again based upon the amount of phone calls and complaints they have received. Can anybody tell me what the qualifications to be on the Sewer Authority and Parking Authority Recreation Authority are? Please, during motions tonight.

Let's hope that the Sewer Authority
does the right thing for the people, not
Mayor/Governor Doherty or any other
politician for that matter. Representatives

Smith, Murphy and county commissioners,

Congressman Kanjorski should be right in the middle of this fight. Also, Hillary

Clinton, Joe Biden, Bob Casey who all claim to be Scranton natives when they wanted your vote. Now it's payback time for the Scrantonian natives who ask for your vote.

They even marched in the St. Patrick's Day parade.

Mr. Barrett stated he would be happy to attend a council meeting once he had more information. What? He sent out letters to inform residents and taxpayers without having all of the information? Another sign of unqualified people running the authorities. You never make a major decision without having all of the information in front of you. Although, the previous council did just that every Tuesday night and that goes for the four Mayor/Governor Doherty's appointees to the Sewer Authority who voted in favor of this ridiculous rate hike.

On four, January, 2010, the Recreation Authority rented out the zoo

building and parking lot to Lackawanna College. Rent: \$1 a year for 25 years.

College. Rent: \$1 a year for 25 years.

Total: \$25. You think the college can afford a dollar a year rent? Another bad decision by Mayor/Governor Doherty's appointed authority members. It must stop.

I guess Lackawanna College have not sold enough seats at the Mellow Center. I have a copy of the leases with me.

Finally, I hope that the speakers will be allowed to speak without being interrupted by council members and ruled out of order by council president. I have my rights and I expect elected officials to respect my rights just like I will respect their rights.

And, Mr. Joyce, can you repeat that information that you repeated about that young man, Logan, at the end of the meeting so people will have time to write that information down?

MR. JOYCE: Thank you, I will.

MR. JACKOWITZ: So they can get ahold of that website. And, also, here is a copy of the lease from the Scranton

Municipal and Recreation Authority, right here in Section 5, rent. "The rent during the term of the lease," the term of the lease is 25 years, "Rent during the term of this lease is \$1 per year."

Twenty-five dollars for 25 years of Nay Aug Park which is the park that belongs to the citizens, not Lackawanna County, not? Mayor/Governor Doherty, to the citizens of Scranton and we are giving away the old zoo, the parking lot and front and the parking lot behind for \$1 a year. Council, do something. The citizens of Scranton should be outraged.

MS. EVANS: I just wanted to add something to what Mr. Jackowitz just said, many of you may remember that in 2009 when this issue was first raised, the issue specifically of Lackawanna Junior College taking over the Genesis Wildlife Center, I sent a letter to the president of Lackawanna Junior College asking for payments in lieu of taxes and I specifically asked that it would take the form of free swimming for children at Nay Aug's pool complex which

lies, you know, quite close to the zoo, and the response that I received from Lackawanna Junior College was that, no, they would not be making that contribution, and so certainly this is something I think council should be investigating in terms of the transfer of this property within Nay Aug Park. And if, Mr. Jackowitz, you would be so kind as to provide the information that you have to Mr. Coolican and he can make a copy of that for each member of council so we are better informed. Thank you. Spindler. I apologize, Mr. Spindler, for taking your time.

MR. SPINDLER: That's okay, I wasn't up here yet. You weren't taking my time.

Les Spindler, city resident, homeowner and taxpayer. First, I'd like to congratulate

Mr. Loscombe on his appointment and wish you the best of luck, and I just have one question for you. If something comes down the road having to do with the fire department, would you abstain from voting?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, I will. I will be commenting on that later on.

MR. SPINDLER: That's what I wanted to hear. Thank you. Mr. Jackowitz mentioned this already, I wasn't going to say it. I know, Mrs. Evans, I asked I don't know how many times the last council to put the police officer out on the street and I'm glad to see that you have done that. They're not of any use here, they should be out on the street fighting crime. Does that mean you are not afraid of us terrorists that come here weekly?

MS. EVANS: I think we all feel-
MR. SPINDLER: That's a rhetorical
question.

MS. EVANS: -- fairly secure, Mr. Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Thank you. I'm going to bring up an old subject, I brought it to the last council quite a few times, it has to do with Gary DiBileo's campaign signs being stolen last year and thrown in the Lackawanna River. As some people might know there was a police report filed, two city employees were identified on videotape, the report was given to the mayor, to Ray Hayes

and to Chief Elliott and Chief Elliott
denies, he said there was still an ongoing
report. Attorney Chris Cullen has a copy of
the report and Attorney Minora said he
called Attorney Cullen and he never returned
his call. I don't believe Attorney Cullen
was ever called. So, Mrs. Evans, I would
kindly ask if maybe Attorney Hughes can give
Mr. Cullen a call and see if maybe he could
fax that report here or send it over
somehow?

MS. EVANS: Yes, I'll certainly discuss it with Attorney Hughes and I think it's an issue also for our Chair of Public Safety.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay.

MS. EVANS: He will be happy to look into it.

MR. SPINDLER: Because I have spoken to Attorney Cullen many times on this subject and he says he has the police report and, like I said, it identifies two city employees and nothing is being done. These people committed a crime and I think something should be done.

Moving on, Mr. Jackowitz stole a lot of my thunder tonight. I also want to talk about the Recreation Authority giving the away the zoo for a dollar a year for 25 years. This is more of Chris Doherty giving away assets in this city and it's got to stop. We can't keep giving away assets, we are going to have nothing left in this city to make money for this city. At one time the zoo was making money for the city and people would donate when they went there. We can't be giving away anything to the University and Lackawanna College. It's got to stop.

Next, I read somewhere, I don't know if it was in the newspaper, the mayor wants to hire an outside firm to run the tax office. Didn't we just elect somebody to do that. It's about time we stopped this mayor from hiring consultants, wasting the taxpayers' money, so if that ever comes before council I hope it gets voted down.

And last week I spoke about the Library Authority and had some questions.

yesterday's paper that there is going to be legislation on tonight's agenda and from reading the paper I know which way

These fees are astronomical. Nobody can afford to come downtown and pay a dollar an hour to park. It's just ridiculous, and I hope if you open

up the budget that you will do something about this. I think that's all I have this week. Thank you for your time.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Brett McCloe.

MR. MCCLOE: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. MCCLOE: My name is Brett McCloe, resident of Scranton and taxpayer. Two weeks ago, the citizens witnessed the swearing in of a new council, a council born of valued rights of citizenry, fiscal responsibility and an awesome task of trying to put this city's people first, but they cannot do it alone. It would be wrong to lay the burden of progress in this city on this council without the citizens first realizing that progress does not only mean economic opportunities for individuals of the City of Scranton, but progress must also include a fostered sense of duty and purpose throughout the boroughs and the county as a whole in order to help build and achieve a more equitable regional society.

There are many pitfalls and legal

problems associated with trying to get blood out of Scranton's nontaxable stones, but it also highlights the possibility that we may be aiming at the wrong targets. I think we need to explore new forms of local taxation instead of constantly morning the death of millions of dollars in losses due to properties that have been removed from the Maybe a loss of revenue tax to tax roles. be paid by the seller of the property. you own or by a property, you have entered into a covenant with other tax paying citizens of this city and an agreement to pay taxes on that property as long as you own it. There is very -- there is every reason to believe that this property will stay on the tax roles. If you cannot afford to pay your taxes there are remedies. are helpful, most are not so helpful, but regardless the property stays on the tax roles.

I believe that owners who transfer properties to these nontaxable entities should pay a fee or a tax of 15 to 25 percent of the sale price to go directly to

the city coffers because once that property has been taken off the tax roles it's dead and gone forever or simply rolled over to another nontaxable. The seller of the property has broken a covenant with the people.

We should also tax some of these large parking structures. Maybe look into creating lodging taxes for the dorms.

Registration fees, also, or just cut off building permits and I believe, I'm not quite sure if that's legal, but until they start doing something. We should not be persuaded that nothing can be done.

Mr. McGoff talked about how many counties, state and federal buildings there are in Scranton that are also not on the tax roles. I fail to see the similarities. The business of running various government and judicial institutions versus privately-owned multi-million dollar tax free institutions and organizations. It's apples and oranges. It's not the same.

Many who believe in regionalism either ignore or can't seem to grasp the

County and most of the surrounding counties use Scranton services as county seat as well as regional center for governmental affairs for nothing. Yes, we all pay for the buildings and the services they provide, but only Scranton residents pay for the nontaxable footprint. We end of paying

the burden of county seats.

I think this council should come up with a proposal and bypass the state and ask for some kind of relief for the taxpayers of Scranton at one of the county commissioners' meetings. It's time to go beyond Scranton's borders for help. I understand the boroughs didn't cause our massive 300 to 500 million dollar debt, but they definitely benefited from the results of eight years of Mayor Doherty's expensive vision, lack of fiscal responsibility, and Scranton's 30 percent nontaxable properties. Be it educational,

concept that it is Scranton residents who

are always footing the bill. All of the

boroughs, villages, townships of Lackawanna

while others benefit. We shouldn't wait for

the state to pass legislation pertaining to

real, state, federal or county or charitable institutions. Those who would love to instill the virtues of regionalism should take the lead by convincing the surrounding communities throughout the county to pitch in and ante up because the citizens of this city should no longer be held financially hostage, slave or accountable for someone or some thing's nontaxable ambitions. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Charles Newcomb.

MR. NEWCOMB: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. NEWCOMB: Before I get into what I came here for I just want to bring something to your attention so if anybody else comes to the podium you'll be aware. I got a bill in the mail from NCC, that's who collects, you know, our taxes and I opened it up, I figured, you know, I shouldn't have one of these. I looked at it and had mine and my wife's name on it and my address on and it said amount due \$136 and change, and

I seen in the bottom on the bottom it said municipal -- waste garbage tax. So I called them and I asked them what it was about and the gentleman said that, well, we have you down -- the city recorders have you down as your April or May, you know, when the first payment is due, but you never sent in your second one so with the fees and the penalties and everything it's \$136. And I said, "Well, there's a reason I didn't send in the second one."

And he said, "What's that."

I said, "Because if you look at the first one it was for \$178."

"Oh, we don't have a report of that."

So anyway, to make a long story short just, you know, I just figured it was a typo on mine so I went to my bank to get a copy of the check, the front and the back to send it to this gentlemen. And he said, "Well, we'll send it to the city and, you know, the worst it could be is there is a small fee that you would have to pay."

Well, why I would have to pay your

fee when I paid my garbage fee? But the point of it is you might be running into trouble. Remember when the people to use to come to the podium a couple of years ago with their bill?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. NEWCOMB: Well, when I went to my bank today to get a copy of this check, I called her on the phone and I went to pick it up at my bank and she said, "Boy, there must be something going on."

And I said, "Why?"

And she said, "I had about 12 or 13 requests for this already."

So my point of it is just be on the alert that I think there might have been an mistake made in the wage -- in the garbage fees from last year, but mine was paid.

That's why I only paid it one check instead of two.

But why I came tonight is,

Mr. Loscombe, congratulations, too, and I'd

Mr. Loscombe, I seen you there. If anybody else was there apologize if I didn't see anybody because I am very happy to say that we did over \$10,000 just at the door.

MS. EVANS: Wonderful.

MR. NEWCOMB: And, you know, we don't have the final numbers yet because we had baskets and some donations will be coming in, but on behalf of, you know, we only had like a week and a half to put this together, so it was a success. We put it together in a week and a half, but I'd just thank everybody that came and supported, the community out there that came, and all of the musicians that did a great job. It went on until after 11:000 at night, and like I said, we did a little over \$10,000 just at the door, you know. MS. EVANS: Because he said he was

going to be able to attend, so I thought that would the fastest way --

MR. NEWCOMB: Oh, okay, so you contributed already, okay.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I handed it to the doorman.

MR. NEWCOMB: Oh, okay. I know I seen you when you came up me, there was just so many people there, I didn't realize. And thank you, Mrs. Evans.

EVANS: Before I call the next speaker, I just wanted to add that I did receive some phone calls today about the issue raised by Mr. Newcomb, phone calls from citizens who had actually paid their garbage fees for 2009, had the cancelled checks, but nevertheless, were receiving a delinquency notice from NCC. Mrs. Krake is very well-versed on the Treasurer's Office and this particular situation since we had, as Mr. Newcomb noted, so many problems with just this a few back.

explain from the public what the proper procedure is for them to follow if they should receive a notice as did Mr. Newcomb indicating that they owed delinquent garbage fees and any type of fee on top of that how they can successful rectify this.

MS. KRAKE: The first thing a person should do would be to call the Treasurer's Office. There seems to be one general error that has occurred, but your error may be different than the one that's going on, so the first thing to do is to call the Treasurer's Office. They will direct you, as Mr. Newcomb said, to bring in proof that you paid. In many cases they will accept a bank statements, they don't necessarily need to see the cancelled check. If you do, hang onto those. They also most likely would accept a copy of the check if you have checks that have a register that you have a copy with.

I did hear that the error today was that if you did not send your bill in a certain fashion, your stub, that they were unable to and "they" I'm assuming means

Northeast Credit, I'm not sure, they may mean the bank, were unable to apply your check to your account. The city did receive the money, so it's -- it is within the city, the problem is it hasn't been applied to the exact account that it needs to be. said the error was that there is a pull line along your bill and in that line is your map number and if that part did not rip off correctly with your check then they weren't able to apply it to your account. However, the account number is farther down on the stub so I'm not really sure that's a valid explanation, so the best bet is to contract the treasurer and follow their instructions.

MS. EVANS: And just one other word of advice that I might add, if you own more than one property in the City of Scranton the best policy is to write a separate check for each one of the properties that you own. If you combine the garbage fees for all of the properties owned by you, it seems that there has been a great deal of problem involving that particular situation where the resident would be credited only

partially, and I believe someone indicated to me today who has been to the tax office that the Treasurer's Office is not looking at what you are writing in the memo portion of your check. So, please, if you do own more than one property make sure to make out separate checks for the garbage fee for each one of those properties only to save yourself a lot of grief and misery which basically shouldn't be happening, but for whatever reason it is. Next, Joseph Ruggiero.

MR. RUGGIERO: Joseph Ruggiero,
Scranton resident and homeowner, taxpayer.
First, I would like to congratulate the new
appointee for city council. I would also
like to briefly state that I can best serve
the city from this side of the room.

I'm here tonight to discuss Scranton school children being left behind by an outdated and cruel transportation system.

Unlike the case of Abraham Lincoln who walked five miles to school during the time when there were no cars, trucks or buses, and no child predators roaming the streets

by car, today if a child lives under one mile from the school they are required to either walk or have a parent or guardian take them to school. In my opinion, to force a child to walk a mile in today's world with the amount of cars on the road, crime on the rise, sex offenders loose is simply I remember responsible. Times are not what they were 30, 40 years ago, not even five years ago. Many of these laws are outdated.

In the mornings and afternoons at our schools parents are forced to park illegally in order to pick up their kids while creating traffic nightmares on the streets and obstructing the free passage for homeowners who reside near the school. I'm not one of those. Road rage is also common during these unnecessary and dangerous excursions and police are not always around to help out and many don't own cars or cannot drive and parents of those children are at the highest risks.

I'm asking for a vote among council and parents to consider a new law changing

the bus eligibility to anyone living over half a mile a way from a school instead of a mile. I believe parents like myself would not mind paying a little more knowing that their child would be able to go to and from school safely. We cannot afford to continue allow our children to be left behind. Such a law would create less congestion while employing more drivers.

The federal government can and should help foot the bill for this. The "No Child Left Behind Act" must include adequate transportation. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Ruggiero, I might suggest though that you would very likely be better served by presenting all of this information and your very valid request to the Scranton City School Board. I know that there are state regulations that govern transportation. I also recognize there are a lot of financial difficulties within the school district at this time, but they would be the source to best address I feel what you are looking for.

MR. RUGGIERO: Thank you, and I will

1 go that route at well. MS. EVANS: You are welcome. 2 3 MR. RUGGIERO: I would like to submit this. 4 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 5 MR. RUGGIERO: You're welcome. 6 7 MS. EVANS: Lee Morgan. 8 MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council. 9 MS. EVANS: Good evening. 10 MR. MORGAN: I asked a few questions 11 last week, do you have any answers for the 12 questions I asked last week? 13 MS. EVANS: All of the questions 14 that you posed have been sent out in letter form to the appropriate parties rather than 15 16 -- in some instances, rather than council 17 attempting to answer it single-handily we 18 are looking for also the opinion and the 19 statements of the administration since they 20 are the ones that basically are in control 21 of what you are asking. For example, about 22 the garbage and the tipping fee, etcetera. 23 MR. MORGAN: Well, how about, and I 24 only want to touch briefly on this, but how

about the question on the Scranton Sewer

25

Authority and whether you use your council to try to gain control of the rates and the other one about putting the agenda and all of the backup documentation on the city council's website and the part about putting in paper form possibly in this building and at the two Scranton public libraries the agenda and the backup so that the residents would have an opportunity to study that?

Maybe next week I can get an answer to that.

You know, there were a couple of questions that were asked here, I would just like to offer my opinion. The Scranton -- the South Side Sports Complex from my understanding has been returned to the lower Court because Mr. Pilchesky appealed it, went into court to pursue it and it went up to the higher courts and the higher courts sent it back here because he had standing to oppose the transfer.

You know, I would like to know about the city's municipal pension fund and where it stands, how many of it is funded and how much the city owes to the Pennsylvania fund which hasn't been funded yet?

In regards to the Lackawanna College taking Nay Aug Park, I think that the right place isn't to go to the authority, the right place is to go to the deed because that may be in conflict with the deed.

And as far as -- I think Mr. Stucker came up and asked about signs, but we don't have a sign writer, do we, so how are we going to make signs to post them?

MS. EVANS: Well, it's my understanding there are some individuals who are still working within that department because as far as I know the intention of the mayor was to privatize that of sorts, to give it to a private form to perform all of these duties while retaining one city employee who would oversee the work of whatever private firm, and as I was saying to my knowledge, I don't believe that any firm has been hired yet.

MR. MORGAN: Is it city council's intention to open the budget?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MORGAN: Is there any support, maybe it's too early to ask this question,

but is there any support on the part of the council to restore some of the positions that have been cut?

MS. EVANS: I don't know that we can answer that at this point in time until we actually sit down and work out line by line, department by department every part of the budget.

MR. MORGAN: Well, the only other thing I have here is that in the end in order for this city to pay it's debt, it shouldn't lose all it's employees because that's not constructive and I just think that we need to find new solutions to old problems, but maybe I can get the answer to those questions relatively in the next couple of weeks. Would that be possibly?

MS. EVANS: That's what we are aiming for, but this is why we are asking that all of the attendees would put their questions in writing with your name and submit it to our assistant city clerk so that we are certain that we are not going to be omitting anything. It certainly isn't done purposefully, it's simply a matter of

so many speakers, so many questions, and it's very difficult to listen to you to give you full attention while trying to copy down four or four or five questions --

MR. MORGAN: Well, I can see that.

MS. EVANS: -- so from that point on then, yes, these letters go out, we are making phone calls, and we fully intend to be able to provide you with the answers and if we cannot get the answers to your questions we are going to tell you that we didn't and why we didn't, what was standing in our way.

MR. MORGAN: Okay. But, you know, two of my questions only have to do with council, okay? One of them is whether you are going to use your attorney in regards to the Scranton Sewer Authority and the one other one which falls only on council's lap is whether you are going to put the backup and the agenda on your website and make it available to the two public libraries and maybe a copy in this building, and I think council could answer those two questions.

MS. EVANS: Well, I think that it's

certainly a very good idea, something I would hope our office would be able to do. However, we work with a skeleton staff. I think we can say, quite frankly, it's a very good idea to have the backup placed into libraries, the Albright library, for example, for use. I honestly will have to consult with those who work with the office to see who is going to have the time to be able to get the full backup you are requesting --

MR. MORGAN: Yes, but could I say something on --

MS. EVANS: -- onto the city website.

MR. MORGAN: The minutes are on the website, aren't they? Are the council's minutes on the website?

MS. EVANS: Yes, I believe so.

MR. MORGAN: So I just think that even if it came to the point where it was just entered on the website people would have access to it. I think the people in this city want to see legislation as it's being crafted and I think it's very important for the people to feel like they

are part of the process; and I also believe they'd have a lot more confidence in this council if they new that council was voting on things on the agenda in form, okay, and I just hope that this council would try to actually do that. That's all I have. I appreciate your time.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Dave Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave Dobrzyn, member of the Taxpayers' Association, also a resident of Scranton. First comment I have is on, what is it, 5-D, I have to compliment you on the review and I just have a few suggestions or a little food for thought. If we had an independent library system we would still be paying county taxes anyway, and the area proposed is very close to, once again, Scranton University. Our current library is dominated during the daytime by Lackawanna Junior College, and it may be a totally prosthetic observation there, but two blocks is too far to block if you are going to dominate the next one in five years or

whatever, so I am reasonably certain that you people are addressing that, and I will go no further. Also, why not deeper into Minooka and then how about West Side and North Scranton, nothing is being proposed for them, so that's all I have to say on that matter.

And I have a question about the Sewer Authority, how much from landfills, is Alliance part of Taylor's sewer? It's something that you probably wouldn't know, but it would be interesting to find out because I understand that Taylor residents are also entered into our sewer system and paying a certain amount, but who is getting the sweetheart deal here? You know, are we processing an entire landfill worth of leachate for 90 bucks a month -- or \$90 a quarter, maybe?

Okay, and on Nay Aug, please do what you can to prevent leases, especially long-term. And also, I think you might have seen in the paper, I think it was this morning, a lot vandalism went on up there, please do what you can to prevent the

landfill. We sink a lot of money into that park and that's the last thing I want to see is that money being wasted because of vandals.

And finally, last week it was pointed out nonprofits can be required to pay anything and it's part of the state constitution and people up and down and outside of the valley and around the state really don't agree with us trying to recoup any losses from this on our taxes, however, please don't give up. Please keep on it and keep pointing this out. Every time I talk to somebody about taxes from Scranton they -- and -- "I wouldn't live there, you have a big tax here and a big tax there."

Well, they are living off of us and there is little burgs and towns and shires don't have such high taxes because they don't have 30 percent tax free property and it's really ashame, but they surely -- it's very annoying to hear that at the very least, very annoying to hear that, oh, well, Scranton taxes are higher and then you turn around and, well, we don't want to pay

anything towards Scranton or the use of nonproperty by nonprofits, so the only situation that I find is that the state has to start to contribute some day. They have to contribute. And furthermore, one wav I would suggest of controlling this is with zoning and planning boards. At some point it's time you can say, no. You know, in retrospect I spoke up for the medical college, well, maybe I was wrong. Maybe I should have just said, no, and that would be it. No, we can't afford it anymore, sorry. Put it up the valley or put it down the valley or wherever. But, obviously when I talked to one legislator here a taxpayers' he suggested moving more businesses up to Scott Township, well, they are paying taxes up there, and I mean, what's the point? The people live here not -- and the place that we were discussing you could not afford to work there and buy a house in Scott That's the bottom line. Township. You couldn't afford it. They're a quarter-million dollar, half-million dollars houses and then, you know, somebody working

on in an industrial park all we are doing is paying for their roads and that's our Chamber of Commerce that has a big effect on that. So once again, I would like to see them questioned and maybe we could press them a little harder in the future.

Jack, I hope that problem in the paper is straightened out for you and that's -- hopefully things won't be to -- obviously, I don't see why when you get appointed to a position it should be considered a job, you know. That's all I have to say. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Are there any other speakers?

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Ronnie
Ellman, Taxpayers' Association. I would
have been here earlier, but I was watching
an Elvis Presley movie, and this a rather
important and I'm glad I followed Dave

I went -- I'm going to put up -- I'm planning on taking down my old wooden carport and putting up one of those metal buildings you see for sale around town for seven, eight hundred dollars, you know? I went up there to the get a permit, you know, to see what it costs, a permit is \$44 for \$1,000, and that's what I figured I was going to spend if I get it. But here Austin Burke's \$33 million project is only paying \$19, I don't see why I have to pay \$44, you know, instead of 19 at least. They ought to give me a break.

That's the trouble. There is a double standard in this city. There is it standard for Doherty and his friends and

there is a standard for all of the poor working people and the retired people which most of them don't have children in school either. You know, take Pettinato, he had \$200,000 on the Electric Building, nobody was after him. There is that building out here on Mulberry that owes \$400,000, they are still open. Why? You know, why aren't they -- why? You know, there was a guy that owed \$350 on that sheet, I think he lived on Jackson Street or Luzerne or something, the poor guy they caught him right away, but they can't catch somebody that owes over \$400,000 and do something?

I went down to pay my taxes and Mr. Courtright said I was too early, he didn't have the paperwork yet, but you know, I paid my taxes twice in 2005 and I can't get no one to see what, you know, I can't get the run around. Go here and go there. I got in black and white I paid it twice, you know. I guess -- I would be happy if I got a credit for my garbage fee out of it. That's probably, you know, with that 2 million dollars that Jarbola says don't

worry about it. I bet if his salary wasn't paid and we found it would show up real fast. Well, now I got him mad at me for saying that. I hope I don't have to go before and see him so it doesn't matter.

You know, like I said though,

Mr. Doherty says Scranton is a role model.

You know what, a role model of what? It's

grants and corruption and nepotism and, you
know, favoritism. It doesn't stop. That's

his city of a role model.

And, Mr. Hughes, Phyllis told me I could talk all I wanted to tonight so you don't have to worry about my time.

MR. HUGHES: You have five seconds.

MR. ELLMAN: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Next?

MR. TALIMINI: Joe Talimini, City of Scranton. I have been investigating 501-C-3's and I come up with some very interesting facts and I think it would behoove the council to take a good look at the IRS rules and regulations for 501-C-3's. Any business which is conducted and is not conducive to the purpose of the 501-C-3 is

taxable. Consequently, if you take a good look at that I think you can find a lot of taxable properties at Lackawanna College and at the University and a lot of other so-called 501-C-3's in this community.

Secondly, I would like to comment on a very disturbing fact that I think they are going to rename the Steamtown Mall the ghost town mall. They have lost some more businesses, they are losing more. They've lost two more restaurants in town. I don't know where Mr. Doherty is getting his information, but I sure wish he would share it with us because from what we see the town is deteriorating. From what he sees, it's growing. There is something wrong someplace.

Thirdly, I'd like to really compliment the council, I never thought I would stand up here and say this, but I would like to compliment the council. I think you have given us a more open forum here, you have been much more citizen friendly, and I particularly would like to thank Mr. Rogan who went out of his way last

week to go up and talk to a gentleman that I had mentioned. This gentleman owns three businesses, one in Dickson City, one in Dunmore, and one in Moosic and he thought very seriously about moving into Scranton and Mr. Rogan took it on his own to go up there and did a fact finding tour and he found out why the gentleman would not move into Scranton, and I think it will serve him well and I'm sure he will share it to the council as to why this is not a business friendly community.

And again, I would like to thank all of you because you have made this a much more relaxing atmosphere. I mean, we feel like we are welcome up here and your response is fantastic, so I'd like to personally applaud all of you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MS. HUMPHRIES: I am. I'm coming up. I'm sorry, but you got to do what you got to do, boys and girls. I'm just bringing one thing out for. These were items that have been damaged. It's been a

that this council inherited, I want to remind everyone that Mrs. Evans presented budgets that she made on her own time that saved this city much money. She didn't get many of then council person's attention to save the taxpayers money. I hope,

Mrs. Evans, that you are working on amending this current budget with the intent of saving money for the taxpayers and city with the goal of lowering some taxes.

I have been going over this budget and have a few remarks about it. The 2009 budget format was changed from the previous budget formats under Renda's reign as business administrator. The format changed to a department breakdown from budget items. The budget items were compensation or health care, pension. All of the budgets have expenditure pie charts, both under the old and new formats, and I talk about pie charts a lot, so under the old and new formats all of the pie chart percentages are inflated as the percentages don't match the numbers listed in the budget. In fact, with the list of percentages being inflated, the

differences all add to the amount borrowed for the Tax Anticipation Notes, and that was for the budgets previous to 2009 before the format changed.

Both 2009 and 2010 budgets also have inflated percentages in the expenditure pie charts, but the difference in 2009 and 2010 is that the inflated difference now equals the total of the nondepartmental expenditures and with both years the pie chart percentages are inflated over 23 million dollars each year.

As I was leaving my home I heard that another attorney was being hired to work on a Comcast contract. I have a question then, why do we need a law department? They are a budgeted \$185,000 this year in professional services alone and since 2002 \$1,905,000 has been budgeted in the law defendant department for professional services alone. Over the years professional services in all of the departments since 2002, professional services total six million -- I'm sorry, \$6,014,510 and most of the departments have

1	professional services. This one this year
2	is \$185,000 for the law department and
3	\$100,000 for the LIPS, the building; 100,000
4	for human resources; 70,000 for the DPW
5	engineering. Don't we have our own engineer
6	or are we paying for an engineer out of
7	professional services? Thank you.

I think the comment is that how could new sources of revenue be looked and are these being charged for services performed within the city? And I believe that the question was I think that with doctors a doctor. That performs an operation in the city is it performing a service. If he is from outside of the city and he comes into perform it, is the legislation that currently exists would that be taxable income and would he have to pay tax on that portion of his bill which would be applicable to performing an operation in the city hospital.

I don't know if the legislation is there, but I believe that that would have to be something that be looked into I believe that that would be the single tax office, they are familiar with the regulations as to how to tax that revenue.

MR. MCGOFF: I guess my point was going to be that I feel that that's -- that would be a difficult thing to determine costs, how much it would cost, you know, is

involved in somebody doing a service in the city as opposed to the overall total cost of the service that they provide. It just seems as though it's a -- it could be a burdensome situation.

The other thing, somebody asked about the current status of PEL and the Recovery Plan, Mr. Cross from PEL had requested a meeting with council back in December and he had requested a meeting with the old council and also with the newly elected members of council. That was never acted upon, I believe he also sent correspondence to council requesting a meeting with the current council to discuss the Recovery Plan; am I correct?

MS. EVANS: I haven't seen that, but I'll believe what you are saying.

MR. MCGOFF: And so there had been attempts on the part of PEL and to take a look at the Recovery Plan, so it's not being ignored and the -- I'm not sure what month it was that I did attend one of the meetings of the -- of PEL and the Recovery Plan and I believe that at the time I did report on

what was said there. I really don't know exactly what that report was, but I guess my point again is that there have been some attempts on the part of PEL to communicate with council and to work with council on the new Recovery Plan.

And I believe that that is all that I have. I will reserve comments on the library and the Library Authority for when the legislation is presented. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Many of you have seen the devastation in Haiti following last week's earthquake. Hundreds of thousands of people have died and many more have injured are homeless. I would urge Scranton's residents to make a donation to the American Red Cross. Donations can be made by calling 1-800-REDCROSS or online at www.redcross.org.

I had received a e-mail this week regarding the intersection of Harrison Avenue and Pine Street. Residents complain that there have been numerous accidents at that intersection over the past few years.

Due to parked cars, it is very difficult to make a left-hand turn when traveling west from Pine Street onto Harrison.

Mrs. Krake, can you please send a letter to the DPW requesting a larger "No Parking" area on this corner between increase drivers' ability to make a left-hand turn.

And, Mrs. Krake, this is also for the DPW as well, I have received a list of four areas where there are potholes in the city. The first one is on Spruce Street in front of Penn Security Bank and this hole includes a pave cut as well as a pothole.

Seventh Avenue in front of Scranton High School, the 100 and 200 blocks of Meadow Avenue and the 300 block of Bolan Court, and I will give you a list after the meeting as well.

And Mr. Jackowitz brought up the cameras that the city has bought and I'm curious myself as to the status of those.

So, Mrs. Krake, would please send a letter to Chief Elliott regarding the status of the cameras? And that is all.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Loscombe?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. I have a few comments. First off, I would like to thank everyone over the past week who have phoned me, e-mailed me, faxed me, and personally offered me their congratulations, their words of wisdom and their condolences. It didn't take long to find out why.

A couple of citizens' concerns, Mrs.

Krake, I don't know if there is a paving
list, but I had someone from Glinko Street
and Anna Court towards the Taylor line
behind that Keyser Avenue complex, there is
lot of pave cuts there and there is a large
section of the street that's just dirt, it's
a mud hole, if that can be checked out.

I have met with representatives of the Scranton Fire Department regarding the operation of the a fire department based QRS system. I will continue to meet with them on a regular basis to see that this enhancement to your public safety becomes a reality.

I will be contacting Mr. Mark
Seitzinger, excuse me, Seitzinger, in the

nature future to start discussion on a more user friendly builder permit system.

I would like to reiterate some comments that I made last week regarding my intentions as your councilman. I many pro-taxpayer and I will work for all of the people of Scranton in order to earn their trust in this appointment that I have been given. Any assertion or implications to the contrary such as my blind support of a particular agenda or interest group is a falsehood.

In addition, any contract or piece of legislation concerning the Scranton Fire Department that comes before this council that directly involves me will not be voted upon by me. I will abstain and I intend to be cooperative and productive during my tenure on this council, not divisive.

I also wish to set the record straight regarding my career as a firefighter. I suffered a 12,000 volt shock and continued to work for nearly a year and a half until my left side pain from nerve damage became unbearable. At that point I

was put on a temporary disability known as heart and lung. The records will show that I attempted to come back in some capacity and I was prevented from doing so and was forced to take my pension. I have subsequently undergone quadruple heart bypass surgery.

I take offense at some of the rumors and innuendoes going around and I don't want my character and reputation damaged by such. Had I not been electrocuted, I would still be enjoying my career today on the fair department, which as a public servant as been the most fulfilling occupation that I have enjoyed to-date.

I will always be available after these meetings to personally discuss any questions or concerns that anyone may have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Joyce?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. Some members of the city administration have demanded all council requests in writing and by motions since this new council has assumed office.

Perhaps the reasoning for this was to ensure

that the majority of council's approval of all requests, I'm not sure. In order to alleviate the time and supplies necessary for the demand, I would like to make the following motion:

I move that all council members written requests for information as well as all citizens' requests for information and for city help solving city-related problems that are forwarded by council members on behalf of any and all city residents and which are sent to all city employees, including city administrators and all union and nonunion employees be sent on behalf and in the name of Scranton City Council retroactive January 4, 2010, and continuing through the first Monday in January 2014.

MR. ROGAN: Second.

MS. EVANS: On the question?

MR. MCGOFF: I don't -- I don't disagree with this, but I don't understand how we could foresee every written request and that all of us would necessarily agree to all written requests and to make a motion that they be sent on behalf of all of

council I think is presumptuous.

MR. JOYCE: Well, I think the intent of this is just to make sure that citizens' requests are being answered as far as, you know, if they are looking for a piece of information, if they are looking for a problem solved, if they are looking for something or for some information that as a taxpayer and as a resident of the City of Scranton they should have. I firmly believe that they should have the right to know this and I don't see why anyone that is sitting up here on city council would have any objections to preventing them from doing so.

MS. MS. EVANS: Thank you. Good evening. I have several updates to provide. First, I had a cooperative, productive meeting with Mr. Courtright, Scranton tax collector, and Mr. Renda, city business administrator last week. After discussion of the missing or unaccounted for \$1.6 million the city was shorted, we jointly decided on the following actions:

Mr. Courtright will determine what records are available in the tax office for

a ten-year period included in the Nihill and Ridley report. Thereafter, a second meeting will be held to draft a scope of work in preparation forbids for a financial investigation followed by advertisements. At such time as this question is answered, I will report the cost and portion of payments made by each of the three local taxing bodies.

Adams Avenue in downtown Scranton, however, he has been asked formally to attend a public caucus of council on February 2 and we await his reply. The purpose of the caucus is to discuss any manner of rate increase that will be exercised by the Sewer Authority.

Third, I spoke with the mayor last week regarding the relocation of Recreation Authority public meetings to council chambers where live and repeated television broadcasts of authority meetings can be provided. The mayor expressed no problem with council's requests and advised me to speak with the chairman of the Recreation Authority, Mr. Sam Shera, which I did immediately thereafter. Mr. Shera agreed to place this request on the agenda for the February 1 evening meeting of the Scranton Recreation Authority at Weston Field. emphasized to Mr. Shera the importance of good government and open meetings to the residents of Scranton who have been currently inundating council with their requests to see authority meetings occur in

In the interim, with the agreement of my council colleagues, I would like to see the financial information of the Scranton Recreation Authority. Mrs. Krake, and again, this is in agreement with council, council would like to file a Right-to-Know request with the Scranton Recreation Authority. Scranton City Council requests all financial statements and records of the Recreation Authority from January 1, 2002, through January 31, 2010, particularly including the current dollar amounts in any and all accounts, the names and locations of the banking institutions where such accounts are contained and deposits occur, the name of the individuals who makes bank deposits and withdrawals, the total amount of debt the Recreation

Authority has incurred since 2002 to the present, and a detailed specific breakdown of all of revenues and expenditures from January 1, 2002, to January 31, 2010.

Finally, all requests made by council speakers during last week's meeting were forwarded by Friday, January 15, to the appropriate parties in writing as requested by members of the administration. When responses are received or lack thereof, council will announce them during it's meetings.

Further, a handicapped parking sign that was requested by a visitor and speaker to council last week, Mr. Suchak, had been waiting for installation of that sign since approval was granted last July and that sign has been installed.

Because council has not received PEL meeting summaries in the last two months, Mrs. Krake, please send a letter to PEL requesting detailed summaries from the date of the last submission of meeting summaries to the present on or about before February 5. 2010.

And finally, one additional letter, I might imagine th is should be sent to the Office of the Mayor, are there any qualifications for service on city boards and commissions. I am assuming that one must be a city resident and one must be an adult and of voting age. I really don't know if there are any qualifications above and beyond that and so because someone has asked that tonight I would like to know if indeed there are and what those would be.

I should add that all members of boards and commissions with the exception of the members of the zoning board of the City of Scranton are appointed by the mayor, and that's it.

and now to repeal it I would like to know why.

MS. EVANS: The Home Rule Charter, Article V, Section 5019, addresses the ability and manner in which city council can amend or repeal any ordinance previously adopted unless proposed by initiative and referendum. The City of Scranton remains a distressed city for close to 20 years and is buried in well over 300 million dollars in long-term debt. It has guaranteed significant bond issues for the Scranton Parking Authority which refused to attend a council caucus to justify it's financial maneuvers to the taxpayers of Scranton, and a portion of debt of the Scranton Redevelopment and Scranton Sewer Authorities, local unemployment numbers are high, the tax base has eroded thanks to the constant expansion of the nonprofits and Scranton like so many other municipalities suffers from a recession.

Library funding further was cut in the state budget and the county commissioners have refused to financially,

support the construction of a new library.

Further, the overwhelming opinion expressed at the public hearing conducted on December 15, 2009, was against the creation of a Library Authority and the construction of a new library.

In addition, I have received countless e-mails, letters, and calls in opposition to this new authority and a new library.

Further, I learned that the
Authority's application for articles of
incorporation was rejected by the state, and
at this time I defer to Attorney Hughes for
his comments.

MR. HUGHES: Yes, Madame President, when I was instructed to draft this ordinance the first thing that I did was check the Department of State website to see if the authority had been created. There was nothing on the Department of State website. I also checked the land dex and the Recorder of Deed's index for Lackawanna County to see if any properties had been transferred, they hadn't.

On Friday morning I called the Department of State to see what the lag time was between the receipt and approval of articles of incorporation and being posted on the website. I talked to a woman there by the name of Louise. She said that it had come in on Thursday, it had been rejected and was being returned to the city. Since yesterday was Martin Luther King Day, I don't know if the city has received the application back. There were certain items that were not completed in it, so as a result it had been rejected. There is nothing before the Department of State right now and, of course, since the authority has been never properly formed the deeds from the city that were authorized in any resolution cannot be transferred until the authority is properly created.

So there is nothing before the

Department of State right now. The city

would have to -- I guess it would be the

mayor's and the solicitor's office would

have to take the application as submitted,

review it and the reasons for the rejection,

and resubmit the application.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else on the question?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. I'm sorry.

MR. MCGOFF: Go ahead.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I just want to say
I'm going to vote in favor of the repeal,
and the reason is numerous people have
approached me, many people that I brought
the subject up with, I haven't had one
person that I had spoken to or e-mailed or
me or called me that was in favor of this.

As I stated last week and during my interview for the council position, I do not wish to saddle the city with any further debt at this time, that's why I will be voting for this legislation. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Number one, there is no legislation here to build a new library.

There is nothing in the legislation to create the authority that would saddle the city with any debt, and as a matter of fact, it would probably by creating the authority the city would be alleviated of the liability on the three properties and,

therefore, would be a savings to the city.

MS. EVANS: Well --

MR. MCGOFF: The purpose of --

MS. EVANS: I'm sorry.

MR. MCGOFF: The purpose of creating the Library Authority was stated by those who are most familiar with the library.

They desire to have an authority so that they can consolidate resources, so they could manage the library system more properly, also so that they could adequately insure the library and the assets therein.

It would also -- the authority was also -- they also felt that they would be better able to seek federal and state funding for the library system since the deeds had placed constraints on their ability to do that and the antiquated nature of the board had also created some problems for seeking funding.

The reason for creating the authority was on behalf of those people who are most concerned with the library. The members of the board of the library have I think an average of something like 15 years

on that board. They are people dedicated to the continuance of the Scranton Public Library. The director of the library who is in favor of this, of creating the authority, has worked in the Scranton Public Library since he was in high school.

This was something that was being done not to saddle taxpayers with debt, which it won't do. It was not being done so that people could -- so that a new library could be built, it was being done so that the continuance of the library as we know it and perhaps into the future the expansion of the library into something that is of which we can be proud could take place.

This was being done for -- I don't want to -- the people that were members of the board and the director of the library saw this as something desirable and something necessary for the continuance of the library, and I think that maybe we should take heed of what they have to say about the library system.

MS. EVANS: I'd like to add, and I think probably Mr. Rogan and Mr. Joyce could

attest to this, we spoke to the mayor about the library, a Library Authority and his response was, "I need a Library Authority because I want to build a library in South Side and I need an authority formed so that we can look for state funding to help with that."

Now, we all know that the state funding to budgets has been cut and the establishment of an authority is not going to create a wealth of money in Harrisburg to be drawn from.

In addition, members of the board of trustees I believe of the Albright Memorial Library, as we are all aware, held an emergency meeting to pass a motion that they were in favor of this, and that was I believe after they were informed about it by the administration, so I think we need to get the facts clear here.

Now, the bottom line again is two things: Money and the people of this city. The taxpayers have told us loud and clear they cannot afford a 16 million dollar library right now. They have also told us

they fear authorities, they fear the unchecked power of municipal authorities over them.

And I can finally add if I am in office when those three things happen: The distressed status is lifted, the annual structural deficit is resolved, and our debt service is manageable, I will be the first to support and place a new library on the agenda.

I would like to echo MR. ROGAN: what President Evans just said. My concern with the Library Authority is once they are up and running we have no control over them. They could do whatever they want, they could borrow money, and in the end it's the taxpayers who are going to have to pay. would love a new library in the City of Scranton, but just like some of my colleagues said, we can't afford it. have to focus on basic things in this city, you know, keeping the neighborhoods safe, paving streets. This authority, you know, contrary to what Mr. McGoff says, I firmly believe this authority is being setup

exclusively to build a new library in South Scranton, and it's a library that we can't afford, so I will be voting to repeal the Library Authority.

MR. JOYCE: I would just like to add, throughout the course of my campaign I walked the streets of Scranton and knocked on thousands of doors and every section of the city, might I add, when knocking on those doors I learned a lot, a lot about the needs and concerns of our residents.

After knocking on so many doors and hearing the concerns of so many residents, it was no secret that the majority of residents have serious concerns regarding the financial state of Scranton. Residents from all over Scranton have expressed to me that they can't afford to incur more debt. They are afraid of tax increases such as the 25 percent tax increase that was imposed on them from the last council majority. Many city residents, especially many senior citizens, have expressed to me that they are living on fixed incomes and that they have fallen on hard times. Many have expressed

to me that if they have to withstand one more rate increase or any increase in taxes for that matter, they don't know how they will make it.

One of the reasons I was elected to this office is to protect the residents of Scranton and watch out for frivolous spending that may occur which can have grave consequences for the residents that live in Scranton. Given the current state of the city, I cannot approve the construction of a 16 million dollar library at this time nor can I approve of creation of any new authority to oversee a project of this magnitude knowing that this authority could possibly have free reign and not have to answer to this council.

By and large, the public outcry was against the creation of this new library and this new authority. We simply cannot afford it at this time, and therefore I will be voting "yes" to repeal this authority.

MR. MCGOFF: Once again, there is no legislation to build a new library and we are voting -- you are making statements

based on supposition. What the mayor said that he would like to build a new library in South Scranton, that's public knowledge.

Nobody said it was going to be tomorrow, nobody said it was going to be five years from now and anybody who has any dealings with the library knows that there is a needed expansion of the library at some time. Nobody has claimed that that's going take place in the near future and all we are doing is, again, just using scare tactics and supposition to prove a point.

MR. ROGAN: It's not --

MS. EVANS: Well, actually, it's not scare tactics, there was \$100,000 placed to the 2009 budget for the purchase of the bank building in South Side which is the site of a new library, so there is no suppositions. There has been in the works.

MR. MCGOFF: Yes, it has and I don't deny that, but there is no -- no where have I seen -- is there any legislation for a 16 million dollar building.

MS. EVANS: Well, that's because you've got to form the authority first.

That's the first step, so the authority is not going to be formed.

MR. MCGOFF: The second thing I would like to say is before -- before approving the repeal of this, I would suggest that maybe members of the council speak with the board of trustees of the library and speak with the director of the library rather than painting them as people who are going to in some way do something serious, do something to deliberately hurt the city, maybe you should speak to those people.

MS. EVANS: I don't think we have painted them that way and I think if any council member would like to get in touch with any of the members of the board of trustees or Mr. Finnerty they are certainly welcome to do so over the next week. I do know though that many of them made an appearance at the public hearing on December 15, 2009, and stated their case both publicly and to the council prior to the final vote on the Library Authority which had been railroaded through by a lame duck

1 council. MR. ROGAN: Mr. McGoff, I do agree 2 3 with you that we should get in touch with everybody, and we will be doing that, but 4 5 you should also be in touch with all of the people who myself and my running mates over 6 the last year have talked to. 7 8 MR.
