25	responses this week. The first was to

Councilman Frank Joyce in reference to his question about the 2009 municipal annual audit and financial report to DCED. He had asked Roseanne Novembrino, our controller, if we were on track to meet the March 1 deadline. Her reply is that the controller's office is always on track for any reporting requirements assigned to this office. Unfortunately, the public accounting firm must complete their audit to enable this office to complete our reporting and DCED is well aware of this fact as well.

I would like to request at this time, Mrs. Evans, would you like our office to forward a letter to Rossi & Rossi, the auditors, and ask them when they plan on completing their audit?

MS. EVANS: Yes, absolutely.

MS. KRAKE: Our next response is from Jeff Brazil, director of the Department of Public Works. It's a response to our letters of January 20 and 21: The potholes in front of Penn Security Bank and Spruce Street in front of Scranton High School on Seventh Avenue are both state highways. He

is telling us PennDOT in Clarks Summit will need to be contacted.

The potholes in the 100 block of Meadow Avenue as well as 300 block of Boland Court were repaired on this date, that would have been January 22.

Also, he says he will see what can be done to the corner of Glinko Street and Annex Corner, so our office has sent a letter to Mr. George Roberts, district executive of PennDOT in Dunmore. We are asking him per Jeff Brazil to repair these roads and he will be letting us know in writing by February 16.

MS. EVANS: Very good.

MS. KRAKE: Our next response is from Mark Seitzinger concerning our letter of January 29 regarding Field and Grove Street where there is a junk vehicle, a camper and piles of dirt and other debris. He is telling us he would dispatch an inspector this week to find out what the situation is with the property and the vehicles and the at the debris thereon.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

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MS. KRAKE: Councilman Rogan will be addressing the Crisp Avenue Bridge with us, so we'll leave that for him.

1101 Cedar Avenue. Mark Seitzinger, Director of Licensing and Inspections, called the council office today to report that the owner of 1101 Cedar Avenue, Eddie Main from Magnotta Construction called him to say that the permit is posted in the window and construction will start next Mr. Main stated they did not begin week. the work because they were awaiting for a temporary power to start the project. Seitzinger was glad for this, but he felt the city has stuck their neck out quite a bit for Mr. Main and that's why he called our office directly, so we will continue to be in touch with him to make sure that are starting the project as they said.

MS. EVANS: Excellent.

MS. KRAKE: I also spoke to the IT

Department concerning the backup of the weekly council meeting agendas being posted to the city's website. They are working to format the files that for the most part they

receive from the law department and that's concerning any of the legislation that we have. They may be able to download the backup with the agendas as PDF files. We will continue to monitor their progress and in the meantime all of the backup can be viewed in the city clerk's office.

Stu Renda, the business administrator, reported to the council office today that the actual cost for the landfill tipping fee for 2009 was \$1,583,135. This was a follow-up to the question referencing the revenue receipt from the refuse fee which current and delinquent which is 4.3 million for 2009.

Second requests were sent out for Bunker Hill Street and Wheeler and Olive street and we will report on the status of these at the next council meeting, and that's all we have for today.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much. Do any council members have announcements at this time?

MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker is

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Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonians. listened to Mr. Barrett's presentation. brought a lot of questions in my mind. are the people that sit on the board appointed? I know you have to appoint them, but what are the qualifications to sit on any board other than you're a living, I guess breathing person that lives in Scranton? I assume they must have some kind of criteria for choosing these people and that's important. You have to concur. that mean you can disagree? I have never seen anybody disagree up there. At least -well, there is no way you could have disagreed all you want, it wouldn't have mattered.

MS. EVANS: Correct.

MS. SBARAGLIA: But now it does matter. Now, you can check into the qualifications. All of these things they are doing like sitting there at the Scranton Parking Authority. You watch them take their letter of credit and borrow on it, now

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they are going to borrow again under a letter of credit. You watch the parking rates go up, you watch the revenue from the parking meters go up and there is a definite reason for that.

As you know, them letters of credit with the Parking Authority has all to do with the revenue coming from the parking meters, so hence, if you decrease parking meter revenue, obviously, you can borrow more, but at what point does it collapse and we are -- that's what I said, the board members that's being put on you have to scrutinize a lot better before you pass them on and make sure they are the best for the city because this is where all of the trouble is coming from. They keep saying, "We only respond to our board members," well, that's bull. They respond to the people of Scranton and anybody -- if we back their money and have to pay if they fault then they are responsible to us and not just to an authority.

An authority is not Scranton and the more we should realize it the better we'll

be. Scranton is Scranton and every authority should always think of that. You think of the city and that's the most important thing. You don't give away parking spaces 100 parking spaces and then you only got money. And God knows what the Connell building got to say. What happens with the Connell building? God knows what they are giving away there. We know what they give away at the Hilton, at least that's on record.

That's what I said, spend more time now that you got the choice, you can do something now and check out the authority members as they come before you and look for the best qualified. That's all I can say. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening,
Scranton City Council. Bill Jackowitz,
South Scranton resident, member of the
Taxpayers' Association. Simple solution,
eliminate all authorities since the
authorities are not being paid and they are
appointed to these positions, let the

elected officials who are being paid who are elected to govern and to legislate let them handle everything. Eliminate all authorities since it was brought out tonight very eloquently they are not paid.

I have learned that you never take the word of an elected official or politician. What you do is take a look at their voting record. If the elected official is telling you that he or she are for the citizens and taxpayers but continues to vote against them then that should tell you he or she cannot be trusted. If they tell you that they have no political ambition or agenda and then run for office again that should tell you that they can't be trusted.

We all know that we have some local, state and federal politicians that fall into in category. Remembers, words are just thoughts and they mean nothing until they are put into no action. In this case, you are voting on the fact they ran again for office. I urge all concerned citizens, voters and taxpayers to pay closer attention

to your local, political environment. For example, Mayor/Governor/Lieutenant Governor Doherty, ran for a third term knowing full-well that he has aspirations to become governor or lieutenant governor. He wants out of Scranton. I feel that he should have passed on the mayor's job and spent his full-time running for governor or lieutenant governor on his own time and the not the residents'/taxpayers' of Scranton time.

I imagine that Mayor/ Governor/
Lieutenant Governor, is drawing his full
salary from the City of Scranton. I also
have been told that he has a full-time
employee driving him around the state as his
campaign for governor or lieutenant
governor. This employee also is receiving a
salary while not doing the job he was hired
to do.

Now, County Commissioner/Congressman O'Brien is doing the same thing. If he has aspirations to be Congressman then he should not have run for county commissioner. While he is out campaigning for Congress, who is doing his job as county commissioner?

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Lackawanna County has many

problems facing them just as many as Luzerne County has. The FBI does not have enough agents to cover both counties. That is why I still recommend leasing or selling the Southern Union building to the FBI and the ATF for a training academy. This way taxpayer dollars can being saved and the Southern Union building will be completed utilized thus enhancing downtown Scranton. We need full-time dedicated elected officials in the City of Scranton and Lackawanna County. We also need a battalion of FBI agents to clean the mess up in Luzerne County and Lackawanna County soon to be.

Recreation Board meeting, but my alternator on my vehicle had a different agenda. MR. JACKOWITZ: Pardon me.

MR. MCGOFF: Mary Alice Jacquinot.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, Mary Alice, she contacted me this year, 2009, excuse me, and said they went to the Recreation Board, they were denied and said they would have to pay the full \$3. It came to the Taxpayers' Association and we paid for 80 kids three years in a row from Children of the Poor out of the money that we collected from the citizens and business people of Scranton. So children have been denied. I can go on, but I'll run out of time.

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Local unemployment rate hits 9.7, highest in 17 years. We know it's actually higher than that, but yet just two weeks ago the Power of Scranton, small business association, Mayor/Governor/Lieutenant Governor Doherty, County Commissioner Washo, Commissioner/Congressman O'Brien and Austin Burke were patting each other on the back talking about how great of a job we are doing and bringing more work into the area. Again I say, Mr. Burke, retire already.

I see where we have a new steakhouse and seafood restaurant moving into the new parking garage located at the 100 block of North Washington Avenue. This will greatly stimulate the local economy. I see where Councilman McGoff attended the ribbon cutting ceremony. Maybe they should also have a closing ceremony at the ghost town mall. 40 percent vacancy rate at the present time. National average at malls, 10 percent, but at the same time Cinram is losing jobs that pay the higher wages compared to waitresses, bartenders and hosts wages.

One day my hope is that Scranton will wake up and realize the city cannot survive on restaurant, bars and movie theatre jobs. I am waiting patiently for Mayor/Governor/Lieutenant Governor Doherty's state of the city address at the Chamber of Commerce for invited guests only. Citizens are not invited just people from outside of the city, the elite.

I know the Times-Tribune will make it sound like the City of Scranton is a 24-hour-town that is just bustling with energy and family-sustaining jobs.

Hopefully one of these days we will get an investigative reporter who will actually report the truth.

A final thought, if Mayor/Governor/
Lieutenant Governor Doherty is elected, will
he attend meetings with the House of
Representatives and the State Senate or will
he blow them off like he has city council
for the last eight years. It was nice to
see Mr. Barrett council chambers. Hopefully
the Recreation Authority, Parking Authority,
Hosing Authority and any other authority or

appointed servant of the people will also cooperate with the new revised Scranton City Council. It was also nice to hear Mr. Barrett admit that they sent the letters without doing any research which shows total irresponsibility on that board, the Sewer Authority Board. Total irresponsibility to send those letters out scaring people. You want to talk about scare tactics, those are scare tactics.

MS. EVANS: Sam Patilla.

MR. PATILLA: Sam Patilla, Scranton resident and member of the Scranton/
Lackawanna County Taxpayers' Association.
I'd like to thank Councilman Loscombe and
Council Joyce for attending the park and recreation meeting last nigh with me. Good evening, Madame President.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. PATILLA: Okay, real quickly. I questioned the authority, the Park and Recreation Authority on a few items here.

The first one is the transfer of the deeds of the property to Lackawanna College of the building formerly housing the zoo and the

- -

two adjacent properties which they stated no, but there was no mention if there was any language included within that lease agreement that that could ever occur. You know, somewhere down the line would they ever transfer those properties is it a possibility and there was no mention of that.

Okay, real quickly. In regards to the question of Park and Recreation
Authority meeting in council chambers, they did say, no, and they did say because there were five of them -- I mean, seven of them, only five council members and I have to correct my friend and road partner,
Mr. Jackowitz here. I count seven seats back there, okay? When I first told him I included the council, but I didn't include the seats of the solicitor nor the city clerk. There are seven seats there.

And I also make mention when the Taxpayers' Association meets in this chamber we sit at this table and there are a lot more than seven of us. So, you know, that's a poor of excuse of why not to have at least

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one meeting, you know, within these chambers.

I have a couple of questions. First: I choose to believe the city solicitor in regards to the language written in the lease agreement between Lackawanna College and the Park and Rec Authority in regards to the building formerly housing the zoo and those two adjacent parking lots because last night they mentioned that the lease was only for 25 years, but here again they didn't have -- there was no mention of any language included in that lease agreement which would extend that period which would add up to 150 years, you know, there is no mention of that.

MS. EVANS: There is renewal within that agreement.

MR. PATILLA: Right, I know because I believe our city solicitor and that's kind of strange coming from me, but I have a lot of respect for the solicitor there.

MS. EVANS: Well, I think probably--MR. HUGHES: If I could just correct you, I'm council's solicitor, not city

1 solicitor. 2 MR. PATILLA: I'm sorry, council 3 solicitor. I have a lot of respect for council solicitor. 4 MR. HUGHES: 5 Thank you. MR. PATILLA: Now, I do have a 6 7 question for city council in regards to who 8 is responsibility for the maintenance and 9 upkeep of all city parks? MS. EVANS: The city and the 10 11 taxpayers. 12 MR. PATILLA: Which department, 13 Madame President? Would it be DPW? 14 it be --MS. EVANS: 15 Both. 16 MR. PATILLA: -- park and rec. 17 MS. EVANS: Parks and recreation. 18 MR. PATILLA: The reason I ask that 19 is because outside of Nay Aug Park the rest 20 of our city parks are war zones, you know, 21 there is nothing for them kids to get their minds off of the environment from which they 22 23 are trapped, so to speak, you know, 24 basketball, baseball or kickball or soccer, 25 all those things I had as a child when I

grew up, you know, mainly because the neighbors provided those things for us to do to keep us out of trouble, to keep us busy.

Idle hands or the devil's workshop they always told me.

Now, one more thing and I'll close for the night because I have lot of other stuff to do is in regard to the statement of transparency and accountability of the Park and Recreation Authority made by the newest member, Miss Gleason, okay? She stated at the closing of that meeting that the authority didn't have anything to hide. There are as transparent as transparent can be. This is your first day on the job. How can you make that type of statement? You know, you don't know what's going on. This is your first day on the job.

Now, I could accept it, you know, that she on a personal note she had said, "Well, my personal experience with them I doubt that there is anything to hide and the transparency shouldn't come into question," but for her to jump on board and agree with the present and current members of the

authority I found it kind of disheartening and kind of shocking.

MS. EVANS: Did Ms. Gleason express her desire to hold Recreation Authority meetings in council chambers?

MR. PATILLA: Madame President, and the two council members can correct me if I'm mistaken, but my interpretation from what she said and what I heard was that she would basically go along with whatever the rest of the members said. She said she didn't have any problem with it, but she would go with what the authority members voted on, you know.

And like I said, seven seats is a lame excuse for not coming before those who are housebound or those who are for fear of a lack of a better term because I still have people come up to me who are afraid of retaliation from the current administration who are afraid to come out in public. The only thing that was stated to me that I would agree with at that authority meeting last night was that the citizens as a whole don't show up at their meetings. You know,

many of us didn't show up because we are too busy with the problems that we were having within city council, but now that we have a council that we have our trust in we can branch out and sort of attending more of these meetings that the authorities and the other departments might hold, you know?

But, you know, that's a lame brain excuse.

Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Mike Dudek.

MR. DUDEK: My name a Mike Dudek, 608 Depot Street, Scranton. I live down there in the Plot and I'm going to try to cover two areas as quickly as I can. Mrs. Evans, under the Robert's Rules I'm not allowed to speak to a councilman without your permission. I'd like your permission to speak to Mr. Rogan?

MS. EVANS: Certainly.

MR. DUDEK: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: But you don't need my permission. You can address any council member you so desire.

MR. DUDEK: Thank you. I want to thank you very much for asking the most

important question you could possibly have asked of Mr. Barrett, the question being has the Sewer Authority considered trying to get more money from the people who supply the leachate coming through the city through the system and you pointed out, and Mr. Barrett pointed out that, no, that had not been considered. Whether or not that's something that's under contract I think it might be, as Mr. Morgan thought and he told me thinks that it might be something under contract, is neither he nor there. If you are going to raise rates on everybody, bring them into the equation, also.

And I buttonholed Mr. Barrett on the way out and gave him a suggestion. Take a look at me, I pay \$17 to \$20 a month for water. That's it. I live alone, so 17 bucks. If they raise -- and the idea is on the sewer rates for every dollar you spend on your water you spend a dollar on the outpost, that was the predication. Instead of using a one on one formula, I think that as a senior citizen myself and on a fixed income I could live on something like a one

to say 1.2. If I'm going to pay 20 percent more than somebody whose got a family of eight is going to be 20 percent more it's going to come out equally distributed as far as making the pain equal, but by making me pay 90 bucks every three months and making that family of eight pay 90 bucks every three months, that's the point that I expressed to Mr. Barrett and he did tell me he would consider it and he would bring it to the authority members.

Now, I don't know if the City of Scranton -- if the Sewer Authority is like the SRA, but the volunteer members of the SRA fired a director named Bernie Blierwood 50 years ago I think it's the volunteer directors that could take Mr. Barrett and drop kick him any day they want to and you don't have a word to say about it. Such is the life of an authority.

Oh, I tried so hard to get you guys not to have a library authority, but that was the old council and that's water over the damn.

The second point I wanted to make is

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Mr. Jackowitz, the second week in a row he came up here and stole my thunder. talked about economics. He pointed out the Times ran with the story about we only have If we use the rules that 9.7 unemployment. were in effect when the Roosevelt administration was calculating unemployment, they calculated the actual numbers of people The Regan administration out of work. changed it so that once you've used up your unemployment benefits you were no longer counted as unemployed. I mean, talk about fudging the numbers. Let's face it, guys, the local unemployment rate is going to be closer to 20 percent.

And unlike the great depression when it hit here, and this something to really remember, in the days of the great depression the mines lost some miners and the railroads got leave, but we still had the industry here to reabsorb those workers once the depression started to ease. We are losing the jobs and the employment along with the people who are out of work. We are running into a situation where people are

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being put out of work and the jobs are disappearing.

Get a good look at what happened to Cinram today. They lost a contract with Warner Brothers and something like 28 to 30 percent of their CD production is going to go out of the door, not just the workers, but also those jobs. That's what's so insidious about what's happening here in our economy today.

So when you have the City of Scranton Chamber of Commerce come in, don't let Austin Burke try to give you smoke and mirrors, he is very good at it. Mr. Jackowitz hit it right on the head. It's not going to be a seafood restaurant that's going to bring this city back. need a bigger industry than that. The thing about small business is going to drive the economy, baloney. We need key industries. Look at how the City of Pittsburgh what they They replaced their steel had to do. industry. I think a good example would be for us to see how we could emulate the City of Pittsburgh in order to rein vent the City

of Scranton.

Now, I do not in any way, and I will never, ever criticize Mayor Doherty for trying to bring in Southern Union. That was a good faith effort. Southern Union itself imploded, okay? He didn't implode it, we didn't implode it, this was a private concern that imploded on itself and left us with a shell of a building. I will never criticize him for making a good faith effort to do something for this city, but I will slam forever more the Austin Burke and his crew.

I once asked Mayor Connors, who was more portrayed on a full front page presentation of Newsday, the whole paper was a photograph of Mayor Connors sitting on a desk and the caption was "Just who is this fellow anyhow?"

We had taken Natwest from Newsday circulation here and brought Natwest up here to Scranton. I asked Mayor Connors, "I'd like you to detail for me everything that the Chamber of Commerce did to help you bring that big job here?"

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I'm going to quote Mayor Connors:
"Nothing."

So like I said, be very careful when you dealing with these people. They really don't know as much as they think they do.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Dudek.

MR. DUDEK: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Marie Schumacher.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,

Council. Marie Schumacher, city resident and member of the Taxpayers' Association. I'd like to start off with the Library Authority just very briefly. Last year we were told that the sole reason for establishing the Library Authority was so that adequate insurance on the structures could be obtained, yet last Thursday at the first meeting of the Library Authority that privilege of paying for the insurance was passed down to the library board of trustees and I don't know why. I mean, it just blows a hole -- a humongous hole that will sink that authority because they could have leased it from the city then. If that's all it took and they knew that then why didn't

they just lease it from the city, so there has got to be something more to it, and I guess that something more really is the really committing to the South Scranton Library.

And now I'll move on. The controller's report for December 2009 shows expenditures exceeded revenues by over 5 million dollars. How will this deficit be addressed?

Two: May I suggest that council obtain minutes of all authority meetings and make them available at one location, that being the city clerk's office at least for the time being?

Three: Regarding the invitation to bid for air filtration systems for city hall, fire department, police department and the Department of Public Works, is this due to a new regulation and if so, is it a federal or state regulation? If not, why --two of these buildings are quite new and I'd like to know why this system wasn't included in the specs for the two new buildings at the time they were being built.

Four: An article in the

Times-Tribune made public details of Brian Murray's finances. The article states a 40-city commercial downtown parking lot as one of the assets. Would council please ensure that the \$15 per spot per year is paid up-to-date, and if not ensure that the city files a claim by the March 17 deadline in the hope of recovering any fees owed to the city.

Five: When the quarter of a million dollar loan was made by OECD to Alexander's Spa and Salon, council's economic development liaison reported collateral including expensive medical equipment being procured for the medical procedure unit that would occupy the third floor of the building. Since that time, the third floor of Alexander's has been put on the real estate market for lease. I would like to know if the outstanding balance on the loan is now protected by adequate collateral.

Six: About four years ago a loan or grant in the amount -- another quarter of a million dollars was made to 407 Cedar

Avenue. Yesterday, I drove past 408 Cedar

Avenue and it was covered by a "Kevin

Haggerty for Representative" banners and it

appears to be a political headquarters, so I

would like to know if 408 Cedar Avenue is

still in business, and if so are they still

located at 408 Cedar Avenue.

Seven: Months ago we were promised a NIXXI system that would allow us to go on-line and check police reports from our specific areas or wherever we wanted in the city and I would like to know if the safety rep could find out when this system is going to be functional and I would also like to know whether or not the TV cameras that were being installed or procured and installed are being used if they are being functional at this point in time and monitored on a regular basis.

And then finally I would like to know also, I guess it would also be the safety person, if a member of council keeping abreast or liaisoning in any way with the Borough of Dunmore with the fire department situation since their solution if

something falls through on their fire department seems to be to combine with Scranton to make sure that we know what's going on and we are -- we don't end up, I mean, I don't know how they can cover a shortfall by combining with us if that doesn't mean we pay more and they pay less. So as a taxpayer I have some real concerns and I hope we are keeping on top of that.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I did plan on meeting with the Dunmore fire chief and some of the men up there to see what's going on.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Thank you, they concludes my comments for tonight.

Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Carl Kupchunas.

MR. KUPCHUNAS: Good evening. My name is a Carl Kupchunas. I'm a life-long resident of the lower Greenridge section of Scranton. The reason I'm here this evening was to hear Mr. Barrett and his reasoning for the unfair distribution of the proposed sewer rate increase. I do realize that the Sewer Authority is under a federal mandate

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to update the system to new standards which are better for the environment. However, why should light users of the system have to pay the same rate as much heavier users of the system.

Like I said last week, all utilities except for cable television are based on consumption. With the recent 30 percent increase in the PPL electric rates, the extremely high cost of gasoline, how can a single homeowner like myself afford the increase in costs? I especially feel sorry for senior citizens who are on a fixed income and may have to choose between paying their utilities or having food on their table and medicine. The flat rate will also not encourage conservation.

As responsibility citizens of the world, it is our duty to conserve our natural resources to the best of our ability? When and if the flat rate takes effect it's basically saying use as much water as you want.

Also, I'd like to know the annual salary of Mr. Barrett and if the mayor had

recently given him a raise. I would also like to know how many new hires have occurred in the Sewer Authority in the last eight years of Mayor Doherty. I know that council cannot change something that the Sewer Authority does, but I do hope that there is enough public outcry so Mr. Barrett can come to his senses. He has to realize this is Scranton, Pennsylvania. It's not Pittsburgh, it's not Philadelphia. It's a lot more affluent down in that area much.

The other thing I wish to briefly mention this week is last week I read the Scranton highly biased newspaper that the deeds to the library properties had already been transferred to the nonexistent library board. Also, that the nonexistent board had already had their first meeting. Is council going be able to get these properties transferred back to the city where they should be? Also, who will have to pay for this transfer? I think Mayor Doherty and members of his library board should be responsible for paying this costs not the city taxpayers.

I am all for public libraries,
however, we do not -- definitely do not need
to spend another 16 million dollars for a
new library when the Albright Memorial
Library can be updated for much less.
Spending for important things like police
and fire protection, improvement to our
roads and filling potholes are not important
to Mayor Doherty. I hope the mayor can get
his priorities straight. However, I don't
think that will ever happen. I appreciate
your time and thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Cathy Beck.

MS. BECK: Good evening, Council.

Cathy Beck, Scranton resident and taxpayer.

I a here this evening to speak about the

Scranton Public Library Authority. I would

love to see a new state of the art library

constructed, however, not during this time

in the financially distressed city and not

under the terms that have been set forth.

In the Scranton Times-Tribune editorial dated January 22, 2010, the paper is quoted as saying: "Scranton City Council's attempt to dissolve a newly

created authority is rooted in supposition rather that an in-depth examination of the underlying issues. It goes onto say that council should embrace the library and the project.

Here lies my deep concern. Let's concentrate on what is not supposition, but fact. Number one, the new library was the mayor's grandchild without any input from council or the citizens of the city.

Two: The location of the new library was decided without any input from council or the residents.

Three: The artists' rendering of the library must have been requested by the mayor since there was no formal committee that were made aware of. Again, without input from council or the citizens.

Four: The cost of the project, \$16 million is somehow arrived at with no input from council or the taxpayers.

Five: The argument was that forming the authority would put the city in a better position to obtain partial outside funding for the library. There was no indication of

what possible dollars from outside sources might be available, what the amount of the shortfall might be and where the funds to makeup the shortfall might come from.

Again, this was done without any discussion with council or the taxpayers of the city.

The county commissioners have already stated that they would not fund the library because they would have to raise our taxes and they were not about to do that. This is a very interesting point because if the county cannot contribute without raising taxes then the full burden of any added expense would fall directly on the shoulders of Scranton taxpayers. Equally interesting is the fact that Scranton Times-Tribune is only suggesting an in-depth examination by this council since the mayor no longer has unquestioned support of the majority council.

Let's continue with the rest of my concerns that are not supposition by looking at the history of actions taken by assisting authorities that, by the way, are appointed by the mayor. The Scranton Recreation

Authority sold the municipal golf course shortly into the first term of this mayor.

Authority sold the South Side Sports Complex to the University of Scranton. Two important notes here, while still on council, Mayor Doherty said he was against selling city assets and would not do so; and secondly, the proceeds from the sales of the golf course that were supposed to be placed in a trust fund for strict use in parks and recreation never got there. The sale of the complex, by the way, is still rightfully in litigation.

Nine: The Recreation Authority was also behind the infamous swimming pool fees that became such a heated topic.

Ten: The Scranton Parking Authority has floated so many bonds that it had to borrow more money to meet a bond payment due at the end of the last year.

Eleven: When Roseanne Novembrino refused to pay a \$240,000 bill for the water slide at Nay Aug Park because she claimed it wasn't bid out properly. The bill was

presented to the Scranton Redevelopment Authority for payment.

Twelve: The Board of the Scranton
Library Authority has been determined to be
the same ten members that serve as the board
for the Lackawanna County Library System.
This requires that four of these members
must be residents of Lackawanna that live
outside of the City of Scranton. I am
certain they are all reputable persons,
however, it also means that four votes on
any motion come from board members that do
not pay the taxes in the City of Scranton.

Thirteen: Even if the deed pertaining to the Albright Memorial Library prohibits the sale of the facility, it may not prevent the establishment of a long-term lease to some other entity that would gain significant control over this facility.

This possibility cannot be ruled out because we have already witnessed this type of activity.

And last, but not least, the Sewer Authority's recent decision to go to a flat rate rather than a current rate based on

consumption, a change that has at least temporarily been placed on hold due to the outcry of the ratepayers.

In closing, let me state again that cooperation, understanding and an embracement of this library by council wasn't suggested or even considered while the previous council majority had control to enact anything this administration wanted.

Out of mistrust created by all of the above, I respectfully request that this council follow the development on what has already been started very, very closely and act in the best interest of the taxpayers of the City of Scranton. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Ronnie Ellman, members of the Taxpayers'
Association. I went downstairs before -this morning to the safety office and I couldn't believe -- you can't imagine how -I had a little minor complaint and I just went in there to talk, they were just as professional and helpful and everything.
They are to be commended. That's how an

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office should be run. I mean, I phoned Ray Hayes' office probably a dozen times and never got him. I went there three times and he wasn't there. He never answered a phone call. I just couldn't believe that, you know, the way this place was this morning. They got on the phone and everything about a little minor complaint.

I had a little girl, six, eight years old ask me the other day about a saying, and I didn't know what she meant, but last week I used it and expression and what I said was these things will go until today and day come to an end. I don't know what she wanted to know that for, but she did and I forgot what it was. She asked me where I get some of these things I talk about. I plagiarize. I hear all of these things from people. People out there and people here. You know, I'm not smart enough to think of these things. People tell me all of these things. There is so much intelligent conversations, you know, you can have out there. I won't go into that.

I would like to talk a minute about

the nonprofits. You know, nonprofit means at the end of your business year you just don't have any money, you have spent it all on bonuses and parties, dinners, cars, airplanes and, you know, some of it on the business probably, but I'm the first to concede, you know, like the Salvation Army should be tax exempt and the progressive center, Sister Adrian, but there is hundreds and hundreds of nonprofits on the sheet that are just phoney. It's time, you know, can't we dissolve them and have them all come in here to be reason reinstated or something like that? You can't go on with a fourth of the city like this. It's an impossibility to do it.

I had a man tell me the other day about our three new members, he said we need three fighters up there, not three gentlemen. After the questions tonight I believe, you know, I believe there is going to be three fighters up there. Everybody questioned him and I've never seen so much sidestepping and double talk. He ought to get an award, probably could.

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But to get back to the nonprofits, it means you just don't acquire nothing. You don't have anything valuable. University of Scranton is a multi-million dollar business. They could start paying some money to the city. There is over 150 properties that are taken off the rolls, you know, to build dormitories and that lousy sign they put up where there was a house cost \$100 a week. You know, it's time to put an end to this. They got all of these dumps up there that ought to be condemned if it weren't for their contributions to Mayor Doherty because I have been in one, I guess it has been two years ago. My son and me went in and we were looking for someone, the place should have been condemned, and it was bought by the University of Scranton for the students. It wouldn't past any kind of code There's somebody that really otherwise. gets mad at me when I badmouth this University, but, you know, it's just time they pay their taxes.

A couple of years ago now when our believed mayor had that deal with Friendship

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House for \$240,000 to pave the streets, if they have \$240,000 to give away they should lose their exemption. You know, why should they have -- and that was in the middle of a campaign to raise money for building, which they haven't done nothing, and last month the soup kitchen that I support financially all of the time. They bought a house I think for 130,000 some place. If they have it they don't need to be tax exempt. Let them pay taxes on the house. You have got to help the people of this city do something. You know, you are sure not going to get any help from Mr. Barrett. wants to know how to run a business he ought to go over to Mr. Dexter at the Keystone Landfill and go on a tour of the water recycling plant that they take all of the leachate, the garbage water comes through it, and it's dumped into the sewer, it's clean enough to drink. And it costs a minute amount of money compared to what he is talking about, 200 million. They don't care what anything costs. They don't care about the people of this city. He is a

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disgrace to the people of this city just
like the mayor is. They have a double
standard that Andy was talking about like -it just doesn't end with this double
standard and it needs to stop. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

Dave Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave Resident of Scranton and member of the Taxpayers' Association. In listening to Mr. Barrett tonight and at other times I have listened to people from the Lackawanna River Corridor Association, and I don't know if anybody is familiar with the Old Forge bore hole? It was drilled back in the 60's down in Old Forge to let mine water out of the mines into the river and the federal government never did anything after that to help us very much with mine reclamation, but that bore hole contaminates that whole river from there on in and it's just basically dead. So if the federal government wants to pull at our nose, I mean, I mentioned this before, we really need to get on them about getting more mine reclamation money.

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dollar a ton is charged for every ton of coal that's mined in the country and it's supposed to reclaim mining -- be a mine reclamation fund, but it usually stays in a few states that coal mining is going on at this time, and it's really a shame that we have to spend this kind of money and then only to have the river polluted right down the line to a point where the path water is actually poisonous.

And last week I mentioned about the South Side Community Justice Program and a person had his house vandalized by graffiti twice, and the second time around he was cited and he had a \$630 fine leveled against Now, the other day in the paper him. they -- it was made mention that they are going to give him until March to remove this graffiti. But, you know, the man is a crime victim basically and you're penalizing a person that's been victimized by a crime, but I'd like to express some kind of support where somebody shouldn't have to see an immediate fine for this. They should try and work with the property owner. Thev

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didn't apply to have their property vandalized, I'm sure they don't consider it a privilege, so somebody from that South Side Community Justice could develop a little more compassion and hopefully they will learn to work with people to mitigate those things instead of fining them upfront for something like that.

The corner of the Lackawanna Avenue and Washington I haven't looked at the lights to see if anything was addressed as of recent, but if you need any clarification on that you could possibly contact me, but there is a serious problem there and those lights basically the walk signs need to be altered so that tractor trailers when they are making the turn or whatever or large trucks don't hit them because they are constantly knocked out of whack and pointed the wrong way. People from at police department discussed that with me one time or one or two occasions where -- that's the exit from the mall, exit and entrance from the mall, so it's really a bad traffic area there.

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And I'd like to talk about, you know, I notice with small businesses in Scranton when we let them in, I mean, we have an Irish bar that went belly up and a few weeks before they finally decided to go belly up another Irish bar opened right up the street and now, I mean, we have a small steakhouse or something opening up, a steak and seafood house. Well, you know, for years Cooper's Seafood House has been in business and they haven't asked the city for anything and what I'm trying to bring across here is we should be a little -- a little remindful of redundancy. I mean, we don't need one business after another mimicking the last guy that moved into town, it's too redundant, and basically they wind up stealing business back and forth off of each other, so nothing is achieved and it's really we want to be very mindful of who we are letting into central city and make sure that we have a variety of businesses and hopefully they will survive.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Instead of having, you

know, redundancy.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Have a good night.

MR. ROGAN: Ken Martin.

MR. MARTIN: My name is Ken Martin.

I'm a city taxpayer, Scranton. I'm also

president of the West Side Falcon Youth

Organization in West Side.

MR. GORDON: I'm Al Gordon, and I'm also a taxpayer and I'm the vide-president of the West Side Falcons. I wish I could tell you I'm here for good reasons, but I'm definitely not. I never thought anybody would ever say anything bad about my organization or the organization that I truly love.

I received some phone calls recently and I believe there is a website under Scranton Political Times public forum message board under Dohertydeceit.com. It brings you up about the playground that used to be down at Lackawanna. I know there was a lot of finger pointing on what I read so I'm here to set the story straight and maybe, I don't know, but anyway.

To this Joe, I'm sure you are a nice guy, but I really think you got the story wrong. Minor paint on the playground. All I got to say to you, Joe, what was the picture of on the back wall because me and my wife painted that over twice and both times it came back, and I mean obscene.

Nothing that you would ever want a five-year-old or a seven-year-old or any kid to ever see.

The way it smelled, it smelled like a sewer. Beer cans, liquor, used condoms, dirty needles. We had a child that was poked with a needle a few ago. It made my organization wake up that the year that that happened with the child being poked with the needle we actually -- imagine this, I actually had to send out flyers when kids signed up for the West Side Falcons what a hypodermic needle looked like and not to touch it. Drug wrappers.

We had children that got hurt over there as far as falling from some broken pieces over there and broken bones might have you. There were fires even Joe

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believes that it can't burn. I got news for you, it does burn to a certain point and you don't have to believe me, I'll tell you why. There was a man that devoted his life down there, somewhat like me and maybe I'll wise up and leave, the man's name was Paul Paul was down there, he cut lawn, Morcum. cut the grass, worked on the tractors, water, whatever you ever wanted Paul would do until the day of the fire at the playground. Paul went over and tried to put it out, firemen showed up, the police showed up and now all of a sudden they were blaming poor old Paul. I really don't know what happened. I know Paul talked to me on many occasions, I know there was an investigation, I don't know if he ever called me. I imagine he would call somebody else to see what was on, but he couldn't believe that he was being investigated over a fire over there.

I know it's probably tax dollars
that probably went to waste. I know my
organization put up lights and security
cameras trying to curb the problem. I know

the last straw was on the one night late after practice and me being president and Al being vice-president, we never leave early, it was way after 9:00 and there was a ruckus going on over there, you could hear it. We walked over, we told the kids to leave and at that time some kids just don't take no for an answer. The one boy picked up a bolder, cinder block, yelled racial slurs to Coach Al, told him he was going to bash his head in. This is stuff that went on constantly.

So to Joe, again, my steps that I took as president of the West Side Falcons, first I contacted Bill Courtright, which I hope I'm allowed to finish.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MARTIN: First I contacted Bill Courtright who told me that my maybe my best chance because it was possibly tax dollars that put it up to form a petition, and I did have at that time my secretary of two years ago form a petition, and she works at a Scranton law office so she is quite good at it, and I was about to push forward on it

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and one of my board members, which I have 14 board members, told me I should just see the mayor. And with that there was an opening of the Fidelity Bank on Main Avenue and it's the first time I ever got to meet the mayor. I told him my problem and I told him what was going on over there. I know he probably wasn't happy with me, but he did tell me, "Just take it down."

Within a week's time Mark Dougher showed up at the field and in-between us, a few members of my board and the Lackawanna Little League we discussed about taking the playground down. Mark was really interested in -- we were trying to save some stuff as far as some of wood, which we did, I can't say we saved all of it, and I will explain The playground was built extremely It should have lasted forever if it was well-maintained. It was studded and bolted. It was -- there was a lot just to take down a piece of a board. How these kids managed to take some of it down I do not know, all right, but just to take off a nut and bolt you weren't just taking it off,

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you were hacksawing it off or you were taking torches to burn it apart. So with that we tried our best and we hardly got anywhere the days that we were over there.

Finally it got to a point that I believe another kid got hurt over there, got me a little bit more upset. Somebody came up with the bright idea let's just bulldoze it down and that's what we did. All right? There was somebody that owns a backhoe and also had a dumpster that was delivered to us at no cost to the Falcons, all right, and we proceeded to throw everything out. can't tell you that -- not everything is gone, but his last pictures aren't a true -true what's their left now. There is even less now. You have to understand, this is a volunteer organization, all right, and everybody has lives, all right? And I will tell you honestly this wasn't the only project that the West Side Falcons took on this year. Most people know we put up stadium lights, all right, and I'll be honest with you, they were delivered and the Falcons took care of the rest. I worked

night and day, and I'll be honest with you,
we were ready within what was it, a week and
a half?

MR. GORDON: A week.

MR. MARTIN: A week's time. We actually beat PPL. We actually beat them putting up a generator. I can't tell you, again, I'm very disappointed that anybody would smudge by organization that I love so much, and I came here and I'm not pointing a finger at anybody, but I think before you put it in print because we have a website of our own, and certainly if somebody would want to contact me all you'd have to go under is our website which is www.WSFalcons.com and you could easily talk to me, all right?

If anybody would have more questions, anybody from city council on the matter because again I do feel bad, my own grandson is mad at me for taking it down, but I didn't want to see anybody get hurt. He lost his dad last week and I'm not going to allow that to happen to him. Again, and I'll leave this if somebody really wants to

investigate this thing a little bit more because you don't have to believe me, maybe you might believe five to 600 people that show up at my banquet every year. If one of you council people want to come to my banquet you contact me and you can talk to the people. Thank you for letting me voice my opinion tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Martin, and thank you for the service you perform.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. GORDON: A year ago we were having the police there between one and three times a week with that playground being there. This year with it gone we went through all the summer and all through football season and I don't think they have been there yet, and we are still -- I haven't heard anything from some of the police that are in the area, Chief Elliott, and it's very well-straightened out now, but you can't let it go because there are gangs in the area.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. GORDON: And over in West Side

which was proven this year with a kid being killed, so we have to watch out for them.

MS. EVANS: Yes. Thank you for what you do. Is there anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, city council. I'm Tom Ungvarsky.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. JOYCE: Good evening.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Last week I attended the Sewer Authority's meeting and while they were quite willing to listen to us and they were very polite, I really don't know that we had any effect on them. They are going to do what they wanted to do anyway. I believe that they already know how much money they want to raise and perhaps we can save them the \$24,000 by just taking the money they need and dividing it by the number of ratepayers because they already know what they are going to do.

Now, on the library. Several years ago there was a building down in South Side on the 500 block of Orchard Street. The city bought it for \$250,000. It cost them

about \$200,000 to tear it down. At that time I suggested that that building could have been remodeled and turned into a nice library or a meeting place for the younger generation. Right now it's a park and this kind of weather it just sets idle. It's unfortunate that we had to spend that kind of money just to tear it down and turn it into a park. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you,
Mr. Ungvarsky. Next?

MR. TALIMINI: Joe Talimini, City of Scranton. I know you people have got a lot on your plate, a lot more than I would want on mine, believe me. I have several points here tonight. One of them, I would like to know if Nay Aug Park is considered part of the city parks and recreation program. Can anybody answer that for me? Is Nay Aug Park a part of the city or is it not?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. TALIMINI: Okay. Because I noticed that they are getting a little preferential treatment, for instance, they are putting out for bids for pool supplies

for the city pools, but it's very noticeable exclusive of Nay Aug pool. I mean, are they using different chemicals at Nay Aug pool than they use for the other pools in the city? It doesn't make any sense to me, but I would just like to know why if anybody could find out, and I would like to see the city council introduce an ordinance which would remove Nay Aug Park from any special consideration and would allow free swimming to all the kids in the city.

Now, Mr. Jackowitz, Mr. Sbaraglia and the Taxpayers' Association have been raising money, but I want to know how in the hell you tell a seven-year-old kid who asks the question, "Why can't I swim or use the slide for me and my sister?"

How do you explain that to him?

Perhaps Mr. Doherty or the Recreation

Commission might want to go and talk to

these kids and explain that to them. They

can't go up there and swim because their

family doesn't have the three bucks to pay

and that is absolutely ridiculous. If this

is not the most discriminatory organization

that you have in this city, I'd like to know the hell is, and I'm very angry about that because a seven-year-old kid asked me last week, "Why can't I swim and why can't I take my sister swimming at Nay Aug pool?"

Well, his father isn't working, they have another one on the way and they are up to their neck in debt because of the taxation in this city and you are going to deprive these kids from the chance to swim and ask a private organization to go out and raise money so they can. Well, I'd like to know why Chris Doherty doesn't take some out of his pocket and do it because he is the one that's responsible for it directly.

Now, another factor, and I would like to see this council find out from our illustrious mayor because nobody else seems to be able to contacts him, he created 3,000 jobs a couple of months ago. Last month he created 6,000 jobs. I watched him on television in his campaign for governor where he created 5,000 jobs. Now, if his math is that bad how in the hell did he ever get to be mayor of this town?

And I would like to know if he knows what job creation is. If I hire a kid to shovel my sidewalk I have created a job. Is that his definition of job creation?

Because I haven't seen any jobs that he has created besides in this particular building when he has his little stooges come in here and etcetera. I don't know why this man is so scared or why any of these people who head these authorities are so afraid to deal with the public.

I asked a simple question of one of the authorities and I was told, "We have nothing to hide."

Immediately that proves red flags to me. If I ask you a question and you tell me you have nothing to hide, you damn well better believe I'm going to find out why you even had to make a statement like that and I intend to pursue it for the benefit of these people on that authority who may be watching or who will get the information I'm sure.

Now, I'd like to know by what authority the University of Scranton closes off streets? For instance, Linden Street

and Play Street. They are part of the city and the public system, are they not? Who is going to maintain them if the City of Scranton closes them off? I mean, the University of Scranton closes them off and by what authority did they close off these streets?

MS. EVANS: The city provided the authority if they made an agreement with the University.

MR. TALIMINI: Well, you know, I mean, you are taking the city streets away from the city, who is going to maintain them? Is the University going to maintain them or do they expect DPW to maintain them? That's what I'd like to know.

In addition to which, it's brought to my attention that the city recently completed a very nice repaving and remodeling for handicap crosswalks in the Plot section which is all well down and good, I have looked at the project, it is all very nice. However, despite considerable advocacy to this city, the vast majority of the people who have wheelchairs

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and are handicap live right in central city and you tell me that this mayor and this DPW cannot fix these crosswalks? Well, there is something radically wrong with this department and with that mayor if that can't That is sad. This is it not We do not have a caste system in India. this country even though the City of Scranton administration and certain politicians would like to think we do. think it's about time we got rid of this discrimination and this stupidity and got it all over with. I mean, you are an elected official, and I'm not blaming this council, but you are an elected official. elected by the people. You are not elected by the businesses, by the Chamber of Commerce or by anybody else, and by damn Democracy Rises is putting out a petition for a constitutional convention. Anybody who would like to sign one those. or like to have a copy of that please contact me because it's long overdue that he we reverse this 1820 policy that we have in this town and in this state. I mean, bring

Pennsylvania up to the 20th century at least 1 2 and bring Scranton up to the 18th century if 3 we can. There is no reason not to. 4 you very much. MS. EVANS: Thank you. Hi, Chris. 5 MR. LOSCOMBE: Hey, Chrissy. 6 7 MR. JOYCE: Hi, Chrissy. 8 MR. SLEDENZSKI: Mr. McGoff, who 9 gave this to me? Who gave that to me? 10 gave that to you think? Who gave it to me, 11 the jacket? 12 MR. LOSCOMBE: I don't know. 13 MR. SLEDENZSKI: Who gave it to me? 14 Kenny Smith gave it me. Your buddy over at 15 Smith's Restaurant. Do you see the jacket? 16 MS. EVANS: I can't read it from 17 here, I'm old. 18 MS. SLEDENZSKI: Janet, we are all 19 getting old. Right, Jack? 20 MS. EVANS: But we are getting 21 better. 22 MS. SLEDENZSKI: Janet, I got a 23 question for you, Fellows Park are smashed 24 right now where I live, Fellows Park where I 25 live, they smashed the bus stop down there.

The whole front is all smashed. 1 MS. EVANS: 2 0h. no. 3 MR. SLEDENZSKI: They smashed it all over, I was wondering if somebody could take 4 care of that for me, Janet? 5 MS. EVANS: Yes. 6 7 MR. SLEDENZSKI: Okay, thanks, 8 Janet. Thanks. 9 MS. EVANS: You're welcome, Chris. 10 MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening, 11 Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment Council. 12 Rights. Last week council repealed 13 legislation organizing a Library Authority 14 that would have been known as the Scranton 15 Public Library Authority. If you want to 16 call it arrogance, spitefulness, defiances 17 or whatever, the repealed authority had a 18 meeting after they were dissolved. 19 defiance. If it is their intention to go 20 ahead and try, and I said try to borrow 16 million dollars to build a new library. 21 22 Should they lose if it goes to Court it's my 23 belief that they should be held responsible 24 for any monetary monies that are forwarded

on their behalf for the construction of the

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library, like 16 million dollars worth, but then again like someone said it is easy to spend someone else's money. In this case it will be taxpayers' money.

Sixteen million is a lot of money when you consider that City of Scranton taxpayers are already on the books for over 300 million in long-term debt. When you combine that money with the 35 million plus the one million that the Scranton Parking Authority borrowed two years ago, and their payback being 94 million over the course of their loan with 59 million of that loan being interest, we are at the 400 million long-term debt mark. And if someone tries to use the argument that the Scranton Parking Authority is a separate entity, responsible for their own bills, they have another thought coming.

If that was the case, if that was the case that they are a separate entity why are we paying the Scranton Parking Authority 1.5 million for Scranton Parking Authority citation issuers, that's just for 2009 and two ten. That blows their theory away. If

we apply the same principal for interest from the Scranton Parking Authority loan to the 16 million, the total payback on the 16 million dollar loan will be approximately 38 million with the approximately 22 million of that being interest.

As of 2010, 25 million will be paid out cumulatively by the city in raises and new hires. We can't go on putting on a millionaire front while we have a hobo hind end. We can't spend our way out of the debt we have. We are crippled in debt while our leader is contemplating leaving for greener pastures. He will be escaping our debt if he lands the governor/lieutenant governor job and goes to Harrisburg. We are going to be left to sink with 400 million debt.

We are in debt up to our eyeballs and the only hope at this time to stop the bleeding is this council. Help us out.

Help the taxpayers. Amend the budget and trim the fat even if it hurts. Take the consultants out of the budget along with the outside attorneys that are not part of the law department. We have a legal department

that should be handling the city's legal affairs. Never before has the mayor utilized outside attorneys as this mayor has done.

I put in Right-to-Know requests for the amount paid by the city for all of the attorneys not on the law department's list of employees and the total is in the millions. Utilize the city law department attorneys.

Just remember, it's easy to spend someone's else's money. Stop the bleeding by this administration if it isn't too late already. We, the people, demand it.

And just to expand on what Mrs.

Beck said about the 1.8 million left over from the sale of the golf course that was supposed to be put into trust fund to be used for parks, it's now in this 2010 budget as a revenue item. Into the black hole it goes. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. It there anyone else? Mr. McGoff, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Just a

couple of clarifications maybe. I believe that each authority through it's charter specifies what the qualifications are for membership on this board. Would that be correct?

MS. EVANS: I don't know.

MR. MCGOFF: I don't think that there is any standard qualifications for membership but that each authority determines for itself what those qualifications are. I believe that's what they do anyhow.

Also, I would like to, you know, somebody had commented that outside at Nay Aug there aren't any viable parks in Scranton. Just in South Scranton alone Robinson Park, Barrett Park, Connor's Park are all viable. Other places like Weston Field, Weston Park are certainly, you know, viable and used by citizens, so I think that the parks and recreation people and the parks and recreation -- or parks in the city are quite useful, quite viable.

And the last comment, there has been criticism of the Chamber of Commerce and

what they have failed to do in the eyes of some, but I would remind people that when the chamber came to council and asked for help with the Mt. Pleasant project, they were rebuked by speakers, council members and ultimately the school board and the potential of three businesses with over 100 above minimum wage jobs may have been lost not to count -- not to mention the construction jobs that may have gone along with that, so there have been attempts by the chamber to do things, but ultimately they failed, and that's all. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Mrs. Schumacher mentioned about the police cameras and I believe, Mrs. Krake, we sent a letter to the chief about that; am I correct?

MS. KRAKE: Yes, we did, and we are not due for a reply yet.

MR. ROGAN: Okay, so hopefully we can have a reply very soon on that.

Mr. Ancherani mentioned about the Library

Authority meeting regardless and, you know,

a couple of residents actually approached me

and asked about the petitions that were ongoing, and as Attorney Hughes said when we passed that it's good to believe in belts and suspenders, so if those who are still circulating if they would continue to circulate, you know, it would go further to backup our plans of dissolving the Library Authority.

Many residents have approached me over the last week about the Crisp Avenue Bridge, and I spoke to Linda Aebli and a few other people in the administration this week about it and currently the money is there for the bridge, we have federal fundings for it and right now it's tied up with the DEP. We are waiting on the DEP for that and I'm going to put a call in to them next week and see what the status is, and as a backup, Mrs. Krake, would you please also send them a letter as well?

This week a resident approached me who lives on the 600 block of Pittston

Avenue and he reports that at 622 Pittston

Avenue there is a vacant lot that is owned by the city. He reported that garbage and

tree branches have been filing up for months. Residents would also like a "No Trespassing" sign on the property due to pet owners allowing their pets to go to the bathroom on the property and ATV riders in the summer. Nancy, can we send a letter to the DPW on that?

Also, I spoke to Mr. Piccolino, the owner of Bueno Pizza, who has a 15 minute parking spot in front of his business. He had told me that people have been parking in that spot for hours upon hours and they haven't been ticketed. Mrs. Krake, could we also send a letter regarding that to the Scranton Parking Authority? And that is it for tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

Mr. Loscombe?

I have a few items. I have several

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, Mrs.

citizens concerns which I will provide to

Mrs. Krake for follow-up.

I try to attend as many charitable functions as possible without gaining too much weight, so I get to meet the people out

there and hear their concerns. Recently, I attended a chili cook off at the Fraternal Order of Eagles on Meridian Avenue. I believe I told them they should have a fire truck on standby for some of the chili it was so hot.

I attended a fundraiser at Keyser

Valley Community Center for the Donachi
family from the Hill Section who experienced
a fire in their home during the holidays and
this benefit from sponsored by the Joe

Flannery division of the Ancient Order of
Hibernians. They had a great ham dinner
there and entertainment.

I also attended a breakfast sponsored by the Dante Club in South Scranton. I got to speak with some very nice people and listen to all of their concerns and I do have to say that was the best frittata that I ever had.

Next item, regarding the Keyser

Valley playground, I'd like to thank

Mr. Martin and Mr. Gordon, it appears they

have left already, for appearing before city

council this evening and providing us with a

firsthand account of the playground situation at the little league field. I had received several inquiries regarding removal of playground equipment and I contacted Mr. Martin who was gracious enough to come here tonight and appear before council along with Mr. Gordon to provide us with their explanation.

I believe that the playground was erected with the best of intentions for all of the children, however, the secluded location of the playground has proven to be a nightmare for the police, the coaches and the volunteers from the field who have made extensive attempts to keep the playground clean and safe.

I have personally witnessed the vandalism and illicit activities that went on in this playground as I would escort my granddaughter to the park after her cheerleading practices. To say that I was embarrassed at what could be found there is an understatement. I think Mr. Martin made it perfectly clear who was there.

Unfortunately, the park had been

taken over by hoods and gangs for their illicit activities and due to it's location they were able to elude the police by running into the woods or along the railroad tracks that border the park. I believe that the coaches and volunteers acted in the best interest of the very children that this park was meant to benefit by removing what had become a very dangerous situation and liability to the city and the organization.

Another item, as was mentioned before, Mr. Joyce and myself had attended the meeting of the Recreation Authority last evening and we were welcomed by all of the authority members. My main purpose there last evening was to request the authority to hold their meetings at city council chambers to be televised in order to extend our philosophy of transparency for all government bodies. After some discussion and some valid reasons, the authority has elected to continue with their monthly meetings on the first Monday of the month at 7 p.m. at Weston Field. They did agree though that upon council's request they

would entertain one or two meetings to be televised from council chambers this year.

The authority members also agreed to cooperate with council to answer any questions and to provide us with any information that was requested. And to add to that, their solicitor last evening was directed to gather a list of information that was requested by a letter from council and forwarded to Mrs. Krake as soon as all of the documents requested were compiled.

Mr. Joyce and myself were also provided with a tour of the Weston Field facilities by Director Dougher, which appeared to be well-cared for. The authority members each expressed their appreciation that members of council would attend their meeting, stated that they don't remember the last time that council persons was present at a recreation authority meeting. Mr. Joyce took a lot of notes at the meeting and I would leave it up to him to add more information if he so pleases.

And finally, there are a lot of rumors abounding that I plan on resigning my

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position on city council this evening. It didn't take 12 hours after my swearing in for the dark underbelly of local politics to rear it's ugly head. The fact is I am not a politician and I refuse to lower myself to the standards of those who live by the old school political policies that have been brought this area to the forefront of the recent political corruption investigations. I have been raised differently.

I did not accept this appointment on city council to see what personal benefits I could reap from it, rather I accepted this appointment with the intention of helping I have managed to be resourceful others. and succeed throughout many difficulties of my life with the help of my family, friends and my faith. I have no doubt that I can overcome any obstacle that is thrown my way and I can assure all of you that I have never bailed out a window no matter how hot the fire got and I'm not about to bail out my colleagues or those of you who have asked me to remain here, although, I may have to apply for one of the 6,000 newly created

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jobs in this city to help me get by, however, I'm not sure how good of a bartender I might be. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Joyce?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. To begin, I have a few citizens' requests. Number one, I was contacted late last week from a new residents who live on Birney Avenue in They reported that over the past Minooka. three months they have had to replace their driver's side window on their automobiles several times due to careless drivers primarily on Friday and Saturday nights. With this in mind, Mrs. Krake, can you please send a letter on behalf of council to Chief Elliott making him aware of the situation and requesting him to notify the patrolman to be on the lookout for careless driving especially between the 2400 and 3000 block of Birney Avenue?

In addition to this, I was contacted by a resident of Theodore Street regarding a traffic issue at the corner of Theodore Street and Serene Avenue. The resident explained that cars making the turn off

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Serene Avenue, do not have a stop sign and when taking the turn in inclement weather often end up in residents' front yards. informed that requests were previously made to have a stop sign inserted at the corner to prevent this. When I drove up to view the situation, I noticed that a stop sign was, in fact, placed at the corner, however, the positioning of the stop sign does not require traffic coming from Serene Avenue to actually stop and rather requires the traffic from the upper block of Theodore Street to stop which is a dead end street and it contains two houses.

I understand that a traffic study is conducted before stop signs are placed, however, residents are concerned that the stop sign may have been placed the wrong With this in mind, Mrs. Krake, can you please send a letter to Mr. Brazil asking him to confirm that the stop sign on the corner was correctly placed. Also, if it was not correctly placed, please ask them to provide a date by which the sign will be placed in the correct direction.

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Number three. Along with this matter, I have been contacted by a resident regarding Meadow Brook Creek Project. A Greenridge resident contacted me last week informing me that this underground waterway was causing deep holes to form in his backyard along with neighbors' yard during rainy weather. Though the city did address the resident's issue by placing two slabs of steel over the eight-foot deep craters in his backyard, this resident explained that there were originally two phases to the Meadow Brook Creek project and understands that Phase I of the project was completed, however, Phase II was not never implemented. His backyard, as he stated, would be effected by Phase II repairs. With this in mind, can you please send a letter to Mr. O'Hora asking him how much funding would be needed to complete Phase II of this project along with how much of this funding would be required to be provided by the City of Scranton.

Finally, last week I was contacted by a city resident who informed me that on a

continuous basis refuse from a city housing project was ending up in her front yard due to wind blowing loose refuse which is picked out of bags by stray dogs and other animals. When bags are not placed in cans, I could see how this happens. With this in mind, can you please send a letter to the Scranton Housing Authority asking them if they would consider passing a requirement for all residents to place garbage cans outside on trash days in order to alleviate this problem. Also, in this letter, can you please ask whether or not there are any plans to initiate a recycling program throughout Scranton Housing Authority properties?

To report, last night, as Jack said, both Mr. Loscombe and myself, we both attended the Recreation Authority meeting at Weston Field. During the meeting, the first topic of discussion was the former Genesis Wildlife Center at Nay Aug Park. As you know, the Genesis Wildlife Center along with the accompanying parking lots were leased to Lackawanna College for a dollar per year for

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the next 25 years with the option for renewal. Members of the authority informed that Lackawanna College will renovate the center for it's use and maintain the structure for the duration of the lease which according to their eyes they see is a benefit.

Though I can understand that there is a benefit and that Lackawanna College will be maintaining the center, and I'm very pleased that the center will be open to Scranton residents as they informed, there is a drawback. The drawback is that an agreement was made to lease this facility for one dollar per year in an amount of time that could be extended longer in duration than most of us may even live. This is an example of nonprofit obtaining the use of a city-owned facility free of charge.

Are there benefits of Lackawanna

College obtaining the facility? Yes, there
are some. However, one must not forget that
the benefit of being able to relocate their
environmental center from the Moscow area to
Scranton in close proximity to their actual

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campus is also a great benefit for them.

A smarter decision could have been made and I firmly believe that the city lost out on an opportunity to generate some Just because a structure is not revenue. presently occupied does not offer sound justification to simply give it away or to simply lease it away to be politically If there is a home in Scranton correct. that needs work and would be a benefit to a neighborhood, if it were fixed up does that simply give a person the privilege to say, "Lease it to me for \$1 a year and I'll repair it?" Though it would be benefit for the neighborhood it would also be benefit for the potential occupant, and I think that's what's being forgotten here.

I was informed at the meeting that
Lackawanna College approached the city about
this facility. Therefore, the city did not
approach them. If Lackawanna College was
that interested in the facility wouldn't it
be logical that they would be willing to
reimburse the city some type of funding to
acquire it?

On other matters, I was informed during the meeting that trees will be replanted to replace the trees that were vandalized a few weeks ago. In addition, to that, Mr. Dougher, Director of Parks and Recreation, informed that he would be looking into purchasing a ten camera security system for the park in an effort to prevent vandalism from occurring in the future in addition to purchasing call boxes to place in specified areas of the park. He estimates that the cost of such systems will be between 15 on \$25,000 and that he would be seeking grants to assist in covering a portion of those costs.

On new orders of business, I was also informed that the rates for use of the Nay Aug pool/waterslide facilities as well as the pavilion rates would remain the same for 2010.

Last, but not least, it was a suggestion of both myself and Mr. Loscombe to the authority to consider conducting their meetings in a televised forum as to city council members as well as other

governing bodies. When it came time for the board to discuss moving to council chambers to conduct their meetings, all members voted to keep the meetings at Weston Field where it is currently inaccessible for ECTV crews.

Unfortunately, one of the members that voted in opposition to holding the monthly meetings at council chambers was Mrs. Gleason who from my understanding informed Mrs. Evans that she would support conducting televised meetings just over a week and a half ago when council was voting on her appointment.

Some of the reasons that members provided as to why they objected to holding monthly meetings in council chambers were they are seven members and we have five, as some other speakers reiterated, making it a concern for seating. However, there are also other organizations that some speakers noted, like the Taxpayers' Association and the zoning board, that have more than five members that meet in these chambers regularly as well.

Also, some people, some of the

members discussed that people showed little interest in their meetings in the past and if they are really interested they could simply attend meetings since they are open to the public. Though it is understandable that meetings were open to the public, however, I must ask what about those that are unable attend the meetings? What about the senior citizens who have trouble getting out? What about the people that have busy work schedules and the only way they could possibly see these meetings would be on the TV camera?

Those members informed they have nothing to hide and that they would agree to meet in council chambers if there were a large scale issue, I must again ask how does one know what they will be voting on and when a large scale issue will emerge?

Personally, I was not informed by this authority of the lease agreement that they were voting on until it was already passed regarding Nay Aug Park, that is the lease of the building to Lackawanna College along with the adjacent lots. By avoiding the

camera, it is not offering a chance to see what happens at these meetings. Though I appreciate that they are open to the public, there is some people that just simply cannot attend for various reasons.

In closing, it is my recommendation that all of authorities consider holding their meetings in public forum.

Unfortunately, the Recreation Authority didn't share that same opinion.

In addition, I would just like to add that the primary reason that I voted affirmative to appoint Ms. Gleason was based on the fact that she stated that she would be in favor of holding meetings in a televised public forum. I did not know much about Ms. Gleason so that was pretty much the only basis that I really had. Since this did not happen, I now feel that Ms. Gleason may have simply been telling us, telling some of us simply what she thought we may want to hear.

With this in mind, I feel as though greater explanation needs to be obtained.

Therefore, if a new person who is not

already on a board is seeking to be appointed to an authority board personally I will now require of them a statement in writing as to why they wish to be appointed to the board and what they hope to accomplish along with contact information if myself or any council members seek to ask any questions.

Without this, if they do not supply a statement and show that they have that much respect for city council, they will not be worthy enough in my eyes of my affirmative vote, and that's all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Joyce.

Democratic policy hearing regarding House

Bill 1942 authored by Representative Kevin

Murphy will be held this Thursday, February

4, at 1:00 in the University of Scranton's

DeNaple's Center, Room 407-A, McIllhenny

ballroom. This hearing is crucial to

Scranton taxpayers and their property tax

bills. House Bill 1942 is designed to

provide relief for Scranton taxpayers in the

following way:

First, it would amend Act 39 of 1935 to require that a separate statement or bill be utilized for the collection of property taxes levied by a city of the Second Class-A, specifically, Scranton, from that which is used for tax collections by the school district and county.

Currently, our city and school district taxes are combined into one bill. The city's portion is significantly smaller than that of the school district, yet, the city alone is empowered to take your home through sheriff's sale for nonpayment of delinquent taxes since 2007. By separating the city bill from the school district bill, taxpayers are able to pay their smaller city tax bill and hopefully eliminate the possibility of becoming delinquent in city property taxes which could result in sheriff's sales of homes.

Second: House Bill 942, would also enable a taxpayer to make installment payments for any fees imposed as a result of the delinquent payment of city property taxes. Presently, the Act only provides for

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installment payment of actual taxes owed and not any fees imposed as result of the delinquency. Simply, this means that taxpayers whose delinquent property tax bills have more than doubled due to the ordinance of 2007 which imposed 23 additional fees to the face value of the actual tax owed, would now receive the right to pay off their debt in installments.

In 2007 and 2008, I spoke to former representative Shimkus about these problems and implored him to author a house bill to help the people of Scranton. For whatever reasons, sadly nothing was done. Not one to give up easily I approached Mr. Murphy with this idea during the 2008 state rep campaign and true to his word he sat down with me at my home soon after he was sworn into office and thereafter the House Bill was drafted. He has pursued this problem at my request because he recognizes the importance and urgency of helping our senior citizens, working families, the sick and the poor of Scranton. In the struggling economy where social security increases were cut and

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joblessness has escalated, Representative
Murphy's bill can have a tremendous impact
in helping our Scranton taxpayers.

I encourage those who are able to attend this very, very important hearing and to let the democratic state representatives know that you need this bill to come to a house vote and to pass. Representative Murphy needs your help on Thursday so he can make this tax relief happen for you. Whether you are current on your city property taxes or delinquent, this bill helps everyone. If you cannot attend this meeting, please call Representatives Smith and Murphy's offices to voice your support for House Bill 1942.

Next, council has not yet received the mayor's signature or veto of it's legislation repealing the Library Authority. On more than one occasion Mayor Doherty has acknowledged that all members of this new council love the city and want to see it move forward. In addition, he has recognized the need to work together in a partnership to move the city forward. The

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new majority has done it's part. We have lived up to our end of the bargain. We have passed every piece of legislation that he has submitted to us. Now it is his time to live up to his end of the bargain by accepting the will of this new majority and the taxpayers of Scranton by moving ahead with dissolving the Library Authority and not wasting taxpayers' precious dollars by fighting or ignoring a legally adopted ordinance.

Should the mayor choose to veto this legislation it will be placed on council's agenda for an override vote. Thereafter. council will face any potential opposition or failure to abide by this law as it develops one step at a time. administration quickly and secretly transferred the deeds to city libraries on January 26 just hours before the final vote to repeal the Library Authority ordinance occurred. While the Library Authority or Board of Trustees of the Scranton Public Library, as they shall be called henceforth, moved with record speed toward it's goal of

increased insurance protection for the libraries and the members of the authority and is also reviewing it's finances and legal developments.

I find it odd that since it's request in 1993 to from an authority for increased insurance purposes, and during the mayor's eight years in office action was only taken during the last weeks of a lame duck council. Surely the need was always there, but it was never addressed until the mayor decided he would like a new library in South Scranton.

The 1993 decision against transferring the deeds to our libraries to a nonelected authority was wise in my opinion and seemingly in keeping with the stipulations of the deed to the Albright Memorial Library. It also appears to have reflected a consideration of the finances of Scranton which was then a newly distressed city.

In 2009 and 2010, what has changed?

Only the fact that our city is more deeply
in debt than ever before while

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simultaneously there is a large appetite for new buildings and projects the city and the county tax base cannot support. Even if the state which has cut library funding were to step in with economic development grants as it has done so often in the last six years, the city cannot afford to pay it's end and cannot afford to support the day-to-day operations of a new library.

This is not a political matter as some will assert, rather, it is a purely financial decision. Any board or authority officer who thinks otherwise should look homeward before voicing baseless comments. I have said it before and I will say it again, I am not opposed to libraries, the expansion of the library system or to construction of a new library. I fully appreciate the role our libraries play in our city, our future and our society. However, I am opposed to the creation of municipal authorities as well as tax and spend policies. The bottom line is that the city cannot afford a library at this time. When the city eliminates it's ongoing

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structural deficit, lifts it's distressed status and pays down it's debt, I will be the first to support and propose a new Scranton library.

Finally, I have a few citizens; requests for the week. A letter to DPW: Please send a street sweeper to Grove Street and Albright Avenue. Residents complain of dirt and debris from a nearby construction site. Continue to clean these streets regularly until construction is complete.

A letter to the Sewer Authority: Residents report that a road cut made by the Authority in the 2500 block of Boulevard Avenue has no cold patch. Please repair as soon as possible.

Also, a storm drain is blocked at the corner of Conway Avenue and Arial Street in East Mountain causing water to pond and The homeowner contacted Mr. Brazil freeze. and the mayor, but nothing has been done to solve this problem. It appears to require an open back storm drain. Please address this complaint as soon as possible.

Also, a storm drain at Donny Drive,

Lake Scranton Road and Elmhurst Boulevard, they are overflowing.

MR. MCGOFF: It's iced over.

MS. EVANS: They are iced over and they are blocked and we would like those cleaned as well, please. Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

A letter to the police chief: There is a 30-minute parking sign in front of businesses in the 900 block of Prescott Avenue. Residents report that a few vehicles park in up to three spots all day despite the sign, thereby preventing customers from parking who wish to access the Prescott Avenue businesses. When possible, please have an officer address this illegal parking problem.

And I would like to thank the traffic maintenance department for promptly addressing the "walk/don't walk" signs in downtown Scranton after last week's meeting and for changing the handicapped sign to a pickup and discharge sign for a resident of West Scranton. This is the type of work that can be performed quickly and cost

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effectively by this department of the DPW, and that's it.
