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Citizens of Scranton, Fellow Scrantonians, when they say life is like a merry-go-round, it is. I spoke against when they did it the first time around. When they took the 10,000 and pushed it up to 20,000 and I never thought I would get the chance to speak it on it again, but here it is again.

If you follow the history way back when, when they did that, you found out that the indebtedness of the city climbed from that point and kept climbing to a numerous deals that we don't even now, all we know is that it was done and it kept going. glad to see you looking at this in the light like everyone else look at it. I think the school board is 10,000, too. Probably a lot of other places is 10,000, too. I guess that was an arbitrary amount where it wouldn't have to go through council, they wouldn't bother this or go for that. don't know how they figured the 10,000 but it was done that way and it was done for a long time until our mayor decided he wanted it upped and they did up it from ten to 20 and the reason why is obvious, they didn't

24 25 want it coming in before council because at competitive bidding at ten 10,000, council would had to look at it.

So, hence, it went from him, his bidding right over to I guess Roseanne Novembrino and that was it. Council was completely cut off of the deal, so I'm just glad to see we are coming back to where it should have been. It should never have been raised in the first place and I'm glad to see this council take the initiative to put it back to where it should be. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else to wishes to address council?

MR. JACKOWITZ: Bill Jackowitz,
South Scranton resident. I feel the same
way that Mr. Sbaraglia feels, I'm glad to
see it lowered back down to \$10,000 because
that will allow more businesses and local
businesses the opportunity to go ahead and
bid out on some of these contracts instead
of the contracts basically being awarded to
almost the same people over and over again.

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And I'm glad to see that we've got a proactive council right now. The last two or three councils have basically just sat on their hands and done nothing except everything that the mayor wanted and these are good changes that are being made and hopefully some of the local businesses and the smaller businesses, not only in Scranton but in the local area, Taylor, Moosic, Old Forge and so on, maybe they can, you know, take the opportunity and bid on some of these contracts and increase the economy for the local people and, you know, instead of the same people getting the contracts over and over and over again. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council? I now declare this public hearing --oh, we do? Mr. Ungvarsky, please.

MR. UNGVARKSY: That's all right.

Good evening. I'm Tom Ungvarsky. The only thing that I would like to see is that you make sure that they are not submitting two bids of \$10,000 or less for the same project and perhaps you could get a better

definition of what professional services Thank you. are. MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to address council? I now declare this public hearing closed.
