21	MS. KRAKE: I do have some clerk's
22	notes tonight, Mrs. Evans.
23	MS. EVANS: Yes.
24	MS. KRAKE: First of all responses,
25	we have a response from Chief Elliott about

a request concerning illegal parking at 914
West Lackawanna Avenue. He tells us that he
will have patrol officers pay special
attention to this illegal parking.

The next is also from Chief Elliott concerning Highlander Laundry Service.

Council, this has been an ongoing problem for years. Our officers monitor the location and issue tickets when necessary. He says he will send another reminder for them to look at the area again and enforce for violations if noted.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We received a response from our Right-to-Know request concerning the documentation and vouchers of payments for all equipment and purchases made by the Department of Refuse, Recycling and Traffic Maintenance. However, the only part of this that was answered was what the fleet manager had, which was Mr. Lynady, and he answered in full as far as his department was concerned, so I notified the controller's office and the business administration that we wanted much more than just what pertained

to the fleet manager, so they agreed they will continue to delve into this and get us the rest of the information.

MS. EVANS: Very good.

MS. KRAKE: We also have an answer from Municipal Energy Managers. This is concerning the light that was out. They tell us that the first step was to determine if the outage was reported, and it was not, so they went to the website and using the number that we gave them they report that they will be repairing it and using the automated process. Hopefully, it can be -- was completed by the weekend since we did receive this the day after our meeting last week, and they said if they received it earlier in the day it would have definitely been done.

The same system, if anyone would like to use it, is on the website and that address is www.slout.com, and that's from Mr. Kearns, President of Municipal Energy Managers.

We also have several letters that have in not been answered. The first is

from Mr. Brazil concerning 920 West
Lackawanna Avenue where we are requested a
"No Parking" driveway sign. We have not
received a response.

Also, a request to Mr. Brazil to replace the stop sign at Luzerne and 13th Avenue. There has been no response.

Also, again, Mr. Brazil, our request concerning repairing the road in the 900 block of Meadow Avenue. We have made requests to Mr. Dougher per Councilman Rogan about any city pools that will be closed this year for repairs or any pools that had new liners installed. This has also gone unanswered.

We had made a request to Goodwill Industries concerning the update on North Scranton Junior High School, this has gone unanswered.

And the next two are letters that went to Mr. Seitzinger. The first was Third Avenue complaining that the dumpsters in South Side Shopping Center are being emptied at 3:00 in the morning and the noise was awakening them from their sleep and we have

received no answer. And also they request to have an inspector check the property at the corner of Luzerne and 14th Avenue that garbage is left out at all times. This is also gone unanswered.

MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake, were any of those letters of request sent to the mayor as well?

MS. KRAKE: Yes.

MS. EVANS: Then let's send one more memo and let's make that deadline for Monday.

MS. KRAKE: Thank you. That's all we have.

MS. EVANS: Oh, also with regard to North Scranton Intermediate, I know that in the past they have been very open, very willing to respond to requests, particularly Mr. Langan, I believe, so let's send a reminder that, you know, council would like this information so that it can present it to the public who is questioning the project or the process of that -- progress of that project. Thank you. Do any council members have announcements?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I have a couple of announcements, some of them are repeats, but Lent is still ongoing, so I just wanted you to remember that Dante Club has their chowder sale every Friday through Lent at 1916 Prospect Avenue, their clubhouse from 11 until 2.

St. Lucy's at 949 Scranton Street in West Scranton is continuing with their annual Lenten food sale on Fridays from 3:00 to 6:30.

And also there is upcoming benefit dinner for pancreatic cancer. In loving memory of Angela Price held by Angie's Angels. It will be held on Saturday, April 17, from 5 to 10 p.m. at the Fraternal Order of Eagle's Hall at 493 Meridian Avenue in Scranton. Dinner will be from 5 to 7, entertainment by DJ Daddy. Tickets are \$10 and can be purchased at the door. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Anyone else?

MR. MCGOFF: I would just like to

offer congratulations to the Scranton High

School boys' basketball team and also the

Holy Cross boys' basketball team for reaching the quarter finals of the state playoffs. I was able to attend the last two games of both teams, since they played double headers together, and both schools were the representatives of the community and the players and coaches worthy representatives not only the school, but also the community in which they live. So again, congratulations to them.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. McGoff, and I think all of council echoes your sentiments and your pride in both schools. Is there anyone else?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. I was approached by some members of the Tripp Park
Neighborhood Association and they wanted me to pass along that on Saturday, March 27, a large concrete mat will be poured at the school construction site on Dorothy Street.
The pour will begin at 5 a.m. and will take at least 14 hours to complete. Twenty-eight cement trucks will be used. The trucks will enter Tripp Park via Doherty Street and exit Tripp Park via Farr Street. This means a

steady flow of truck traffic for the duration of the pour.

During this period parking will only be permitted on one side of Dorothy and Farr, which that will be marked off and signs will be posted. MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

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MS. EVANS: Our first speaker is Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonians. Ι come to speak as a member of the Taxpayers' Association and member of the Free Swim I have brought this up maybe last week or the maybe before, that you consider trying to lease back Nay Aug Pool from the Scranton Recreation Authority since they seem to be willing to lease a lot of things. You know, I think CMC leases a portion of Nay Aug where they have their helipad and the parking back in there, and now we found out Lackawanna College leased I guess the old zoo out and some parking lots.

I consider now is a good time to maybe lease back our pool and open it up to that whole section of Scranton that's been denied and the kids have been denied that pool. They have to go all the way down and the closest pool they would go to if they don't -- if thy want to swim for free would probably be down there, I think down there in Capouse, the Capouse Pool, and that's

where they would have to go and that's unfair. I mean, we may get a hot summer this year.

I know that Scranton Recreation

Authority has no intention of ever offering free swim even on certain days or certain temperatures to the kids of Scranton. They just don't. For some reason or other they deny that as public service. They shouldn't really deny them kids on very hot days and should open the pool up for free swim, but they are not inclined to do so.

You know, we do pay a lot of the things that go on at that pool, namely, the insurance just recently, the 24, 25,000 we did. I mean, if we are putting out money for that pool in any way, any form, then all of the kids in the city or especially the kids at that live in that section of the city should have access to that pool. As you know, we will run the free swim no matter what happens, but I ask that you consider asking the mayor to lease back our pool so that children of the city could use that pool and especially I guess that

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neighborhood is called upper Greenridge or whatever you want to call that section, but it's a big section and a lot of kids used to use that pool and I don't see any reason why they should have been denied it. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you,

Mr. Sbaraglia. Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Bill Jackowitz. South Scranton resident, member of the Taxpayers' Association, master sergeant United States Air Force retired. like council to make -- pass an amendment tonight or something to ban the scrappy kid from Scranton, Joe Biden, from Scranton after that remark that he made tonight to the President of the United States for the whole world to hear when he used the "F" word, the complete "F" word while speaking to the President of the United States for the whole world to hear. I think he is an embarrassment to the City of Scranton and he should be banned and I would like to see legislation passed to do such a thing because he is nothing but an embarrassment. MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Council. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. First of all, I want to talk about the parking garages down here at the corner of Washington and Linden. They are putting a new surface on the Has anybody taking a look at that outside. garage lately? If you haven't, it would pay to go take a look at that garage because whatever the city is paying to have that job done is too much. We should ask for our money back. It's the most unprofessional job I have ever seen. They are putting brick on the outside, if you look at it, it looks like there is about three different

shades of brick and the concrete that's in-between the brick there is like three different shades of concrete. There is like a white, there's a gray and then there is a darker gray. It looks a mess. It's a disgrace that this building probably cost hundreds of thousands of dollars to fix up, and it looks like it was done 20 years ago. I mean, the place is a mess and I think there should be an investigation into this.

MR. ROGAN: We actually when we were in Court last week when we are standing outside we are discussing that, you know, from a far it does look like they used a few different kinds of bricks and few different kinds of mortar. It doesn't blend.

MR. SPINDLER: Totally unprofessional. It looks ridiculous. I just think it's a waste of taxpayer dollars and something should be done. We should be getting our money back. They talk about the commissioners taking kickbacks, I think somebody is taking a kickback on that job, and it should be investigated.

Saturday's paper there was a story

about a House committee approving a bill that would give stays bigger say on smoking bans, I would hope if that bill does get passed that the City of Scranton would make the smoking ban stiffer in this city because there is establishments in this city that are breaking the rules. The one that I spoke about before is on Franklin Avenue, and you can laugh all of you want,

Mr. McGoff, but you have to have --

MR. MCGOFF: No, I'm not laughing at that, Mr. Spindler. I agree with you.

MR. SPINDLER: You have to have 20 percent of your food sales or more to be able to smoke and this place I'm talking about sells way more than 20 percent of the food sales and even Mrs. Fanucci agreed with me on that one. And I even said to a complaint to Harrisburg on that and I never heard about it. And this is the same place that had DPW workers cleaning outside of it the day after the parade and it wasn't even on the parade route. I think that's wrong. That's another waste of taxpayers' dollars.

Moving on I was approached by a

neighbor of mine yesterday and asked if I could say something that the Dorothy Street playground, said there is graffiti all over and some of it looks like gangland graffiti he said and if I could get some of this stuff from DPW to go clean it I would be more than happy to go clean it myself. I don't see that happening. I mean, that playground was built not that long ago and it's a beautiful playground, and as a member of the Tripp Park Crime Watch we do patrol but we can't be there 24/7. So I hope something can be done about that.

Oh another thing, Mrs. Evans, there are cameras, there is two cameras right outside of that playground. Can we find out if they are working, please?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. SPINDLER: It's been brought up in our neighborhood meetings and nobody seems to think they are working.

MS. EVANS: The cameras that --

MR. SPINDLER: They are on poles.

One is outside of the basketball courts and there is one I think outside of the

playground.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. SPINDLER: You are welcome.

Lastly, I spoke about this with the last council when it was about banning cell phone use in our city while driving and I stated Carbondale has already done that, and the answer I got from last council was, well, the state has a ban so let's go with the state. And my answer was can't we be proactive instead of reactive? And I see where Wilkes-Barre is planning to do the same thing and I think it's very dangerous because you see it all of the time. I mean, not just kids but grownups, too, talking on phones, texting, and I think Scranton should look into banning this, also.

That's all I have tonight except for one more thing. This person wasn't a city resident, but Sunday tragically a 16-year-old girl was killed in a car accident in Forest City, Tisha Harhut was her name. My daughter knew her and I would hope everybody's thoughts and prayers will go out to that family. It was a terrible,

terrible tragedy for a 16-year-old to lose her life. As a matter of fact, my daughter has a screen saver, one of the screen savers has this girl's picture on it. It's very sad, so my thoughts and prayers are with that family. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Spindler.
Bob Neveroski.

MR. NEVEROSKI: Robert Neverosky,

304 Prescott Avenue. Overburdened taxpayer,
every time I reach in my wallet I have to
push other hands away. There are too many
people in there. What brings me down here
today is the Scranton Housing Authority owns
two houses at 326 and 328 Prescott Avenue.
The landfill is cleaner. They put their
garbage out in front, the back is worse than
the front, the people have been calling the
Housing Authority they blow them off so they
are knocking on my door. I.

Stopped at the Housing Authority today. I went in and said, "Is

Mr. Pelicacci in?"

"No."

I said, "Is there anybody of -- in

like a position of -- " 1 MS. EVANS: Authority. 2 MR. NEVEROSKI: "-- authority here?" 3 "No." 4 I said, "You mean in this whole 5 building there is nobody with any authority 6 here?" 7 "No." 8 I said, "Okay, why I'm here," I 9 said, "I'm president of the Hill 10 11 Neighborhood Association. People are knocking on my door, two house at 326 and 12 13 328 Prescott are garbage strewn, " I said, 14 "It's really a disgrace on the block." 15 The girl said, "What do you want from me?" 16 I said, "Well, I came here to try to 17 18 work something out to clean the place up so 19 I don't have to go to council and complain 20 to the city." She said, "Council has no authority 21 22 over the Scranton Housing Authority." 23 I said, "You are in the city, aren't you?" I said, "I'm going to have to 24 25 go to council and complain that you running

two crummy houses on the block, it's tearing this whole down because of the slobiness of this block."

She said, "Hey, Pal, do what you got to do."

So I got blown off. I have been blown off before, but that was a top shelf blow off. Hit the bricks. So, you know, and another thing when I was here before when Mr. Loscombe got sworn in I had the pleasure to address council about the 1003 Bunker Hill Street. Now, nothing has been done. I was brought up, my father always told me to do a day's work for a day's pay.

MS. EVANS: Right.

MR. NEVEROSKI: Now, on the fourth floor up there it seems like people are coming to get paid backwards because they are certainly not doing their job. Now, if the guy can't do his job up there, he should move on. People in this city and a lot of the workers for this city are under the impression that you don't have to do a day's work for a day's pay. Well, as taxpayers all you got to do a day's work for a day's

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pay because none of you would have a job anymore. You would be gone. But on the fourth floor it seems like not too many people are putting a day's work for a day's pay, and as a taxpayer I demand that that house at 1003 Bunker Hill Street, it's a dump, the roof is burned out, every window of the house is broke, that's the last house -- there is another house in Scranton then Dunmore begins, that's a blight on the city. I mean, it looks terrible. People are asking to do something and you say, oh, the Hill don't do nothing. You can't do nothing because nobody in that administration wants to go out in work. They are all getting paid backhanded. You have to do a day's work for a day's pay.

You guys are the legislative body of the government. If they don't want to do the work on the third floor make them, and you can do it. You pass the laws, they brought them down here, you guys pass them, make them work. If you don't want to work, don't pay, and let's see how they work then when you don't get a day's pay. But your

job, ladies and gentlemen, as the legislative body make them work. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Neveroski.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mr. Neveroski, the Housing Authority may not think we have authority, but there are ordinances in this city that they have to abide by, so we are going to check on that.

MR. NEVEROSKI: Mr. Loscombe, council and the city has authority over everybody and you are 100 percent right, but this house up here at 326-328 Prescott, send the housing inspector up, arrest them. You know, Darryl Yarborough, a good friend of mine, he was remodeling a house up in the 900 block of Prescott Avenue. The fourth floor went after him with a vengeance. They got the district attorney on him, they took him to Court, they fined him \$11,000. He was remodeling the house. That place didn't look a tenth as bad as 326-238 Prescott.

Now, did they go after him because

Mr. Yarborough is a man of color. I

wouldn't want to say that, but they don't go after anybody else, but they went after Darryl with a vengeance, so something is wrong here. Darryl is not connected, maybe other people are, but something is wrong that they went after Darryl Yarborough and fined him and got the district attorney involved and took him to Court and fined him \$11,000, but who else did you ever hear of that got taken to Court and got fined \$11,0000 except me for building a deck.

Right? But I won. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. HUGHES: Bob?

MR. NEVEROSKI: Yes.

MR. HUGHES: If I could, I think
that what you should do instead of -- I
mean, council, of course, is interested in
what you are saying, but I think the Hill
neighbors is what you should document all of
this, send it to Mr. Seitzinger and
constantly, you know, in writing as to what
these issues are and have direct
communication with him instead of council
writing a letter then when he responds to

us, you know, but to you as the Hill neighbors I think if you do that directly and keep documenting it and if you don't get a response then just send him another letter and keep covering your toosh with paper, you know what I mean?

MR. NEVEROSKI: You are 100 percent right, Mr. Hughes.

MR. HUGHES: Okay? Do that because instead of us coming here and writing, you know, it's a circuititous route. I think if you do it directly and then you could come back to council and say, "In the last month we have written three letters, haven't had a response," then we can see what we can do. I mean, I could tell council, not that I can do it, I'm not elected, but anyway --

MR. NEVEROSKI: You are 100 percent, I'll take your advice any day, but as I said before, Ozzie Quinn and I met with Ray Hayes, Seitzinger and that Oleski down in Ray Hayes' office about eight months ago, and we were promised that that 1003 would be addressed. Now, that's eight months ago, so I think we got blown off down there, too,

you know? Not only did I get blown off at the Housing Authority, but I got blown off down Ray Hayes' office, too. Nothing against Ray. I love the guy. He's a great guy, but it wasn't Ray, it was the guy on the fourth floor, that Oleski who was supposed to be doing the job but are coming in backhanded to get their pay because they are not doing their job. And like I said, you guys are the legislative body of this city, make them do it. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Yes. Thank you. Doug Miller.

MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.

Dough Miller, Scranton.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. MILLER: I'd just like to again address the issues of the budget as I stated a few weeks back, and will reiterate what I said, my opinions haven't changed. I believe council is playing a game here to control the city. I just feel you are trying to run this city from these chambers and I just see this as somewhat as just not going to get too far.

You know, we try to make this seem like it's about playing sides and what side you are on and what people don't understand is this isn't about sides it's about law, and if you don't echo some of the statements that are made here it seems like you are deemed no good and that's the mentality that we have here and part of the reason we have the problems that we have and we don't seem to accomplish much. You know, these chambers don't belong to one group, these are the people's chambers.

Today I read a few letters to the editor in the newspaper from people here that live in the city and also from people outside of the city who are just totally appalled with the actions that this council has taken. And, you know, they feel that council is embarrassing us and making us look foolish and, you know, people here see it, but more importantly people on the outside looking in, you know, you can make the argument they don't pay taxes, they don't live here, but the impression that people get here is not a good one and we

just look foolish and that's the bottom line here. And people may not agree with me here and that's fine, I really don't care because to be quite honest I don't expect to.

You know, council is trying to make us feel sorry for this whole issue and I believe it was Mr. Loscombe who read a statement last week that council wasn't responsible for this issue, but if you didn't take the action you took we wouldn't have to be worried about this to begin with and that's the problem. And as this battle continues to drag out, it continues it cost the taxpayers thousands of dollars for something we had no business getting involved in because you should have known that and you should have just waited for the 2010 budget and then did what you needed to do.

As I have stated before, I support opening the budget, but doing it the right way, and again, do it in the 2011 budget instead of causing a lot of problems. You know, and now just basically leads into the appointments and I know last week it went

through seventh order on the authorities and I'm sure council can expect another challenge in the near future. Again, an action you shouldn't have taken. It's clearly a violation of the Administrative Code and a few weeks ago a speaker had a copy of the code and pointed it out to you, and I'm hopeful that between then you had a chance to look at it and see that for yourself.

You know, it's just time to cut the nonsense here and stop playing politics because it's quite clear that this council has no clue what's it's doing and it's time to put politics aside and let's move this city forward. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Miller, just one thing, the current court case isn't costing thousands of dollars. The city is -- or I should say the mayor is were represented by the entire law department of Scranton and City Council is represented by it's solicitor.

MR. MILLER: Thank you.

MR. HUGHES: Madam President, if I

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could just comment on one thing, at the last meeting what was commented on was about the Administrative Code was the original Administrative Code is adopted in 1974, became effective on January 5 of 1976.

There has been very various amendments to that so the quote that was stated was correct in 1976, but not correct in 2010.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening. I have a request, I would like council to furnish I guess the residents of the city with a copy of the transcripts of this hearing that's taking place before the Court in regard to the actions of the council. That way we can really have a good idea what's taken place and what accusations and what testimonies were given and, you know, I guess I could spend a couple of hours down the law library and do some more research in regards to that, but the only one that can interpret law is a judge, okay? I do respect Mr. Hughes' positions here, but he is not a judge, and I went through that with Mr.

Minora in regards to the smoking ban and I told him he was wrong and I turned out to be correct, and I have been correct before and I just hope that this time I am wrong, but I really hope the council goes in a different direction.

I do have to say that in my opinion I do hold this council responsible for what's taking place here. I think it is counterproductive over -- under \$700,000 to take the actions you have taken and I think our time would have been much better spent if, as I have asked you before, Mrs. Evans, if council itself in general has broken the budget itself up in sections and gave every council member a section to begin to work through.

You know, I don't like to go off on things that the Times Leader has said or the Scranton Times because to be honest with you, you know, you could be missing an awful lot and I don't want to mislead anybody, but I just think that with all of the problems the city has I think we could be spending our time in a more productive manner that

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would be more -- more directed at the problems this city faces.

I mean. Mr. Jackowitz talked about Cedar Avenue, that's not a new problem. The blight in the Hill is not a new problem. It's poverty here, okay? People have taken a lot of shots at the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber of Commerce does not represent people, it represents business. represent people. Now, I can't possibly understand why this council wouldn't say to Mr. Austin Burke, "Let's come in here and have a discussion. Let's create a partnership and try to create jobs. you think we can accomplish this, Mr. Burke? I mean, with your vast knowledge that you have how can we create jobs here?"

It could happen. It takes teamwork. I mean, I could see by the agenda tonight, I can't second guess why nothing came up on the agenda, but you know what, two sections of government fighting with themselves is counterproductive because now we have no dialogue, nothing is moving forward. This isn't about you and it's not about the

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mayor, it's about us. I think the city is blighted enough. I think we have enough problems. I think it's time for really the council to start looking for solutions and I think it should start today.

I don't necessarily agree with people who attack Mr. Rogan and Mr. Joyce for being misinformed and incapable of doing their job. I think that you are going to grow into this job, but I think you are going to do that by learning the mechanics of government and trying to represent us because that's what we are relying on. We are relying on that happening. The whole city is relying on that. We all know what position we are in. We all know the blight that we have and the debt and now we are beginning to see a lot of towns across the country are filing bankruptcy. They are losing their whole police force.

I just think that maybe we should collapse this thing and start over. There is nothing wrong with walking away from a fight. There is nothing wrong with beginning the process of breaking the next

year's budget up and trying to find seven million dollars there, but I think that in the long -- I think and what I'd immediately try to do is since we are going to make another contract with Comcast I think what we should try to do is move that money out of the budget, all right, and split it between senior citizens centers in the city or remedial education programs geared at the youth of this city to fight influences of gangs and vandalism and a lot of other things that young people do, a year-round program, and I think that the other third we should use to fund Channel 19.

I think we should start doing things that are positive for this city. Everybody is entitled to make a mistake, even this council, even the mayor, but you know what it comes time to put it all behind you and decide what you really do and that's to help the people here, and we all need help, so what I'm saying is maybe we should be refocus and try to move forward together. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Morgan.

And just one point I would like to clarify, 1 this is my seventh year on city council, but 2 3 it is not the first time that council has convened without an agenda, so the --4 MR. MORGAN: I'm aware of that. 5 6 MS. EVANS: Without legislation on 7 the agenda and so --8 MR. MORGAN: But it rarely happens. 9 MS. EVANS: Well, it's not --10 correct. It's not a weekly occurrence, but 11 it has happened on more than one occasion 12 and it certainly is not a reflection of 13 anything that is occurring outside these 14 council chambers. 15 MR. MORGAN: I can't say that 16 because I'm not in control of the agenda, 17 the mayor is, but I find it troubling that 18 with all of the problems we have in the city 19 that we can't put something on the agenda to move this city forward, and that's all I'm 20 21 saying. 22 Well, there were items MS. EVANS: 23 sent down already for next week. 24 MR. MORGAN: Thank you. 25 MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Morgan.

MR. JOYCE: Also, in regard to Mr. Burke I know that we did have a public caucus setup with him and it did get cancelled. Mrs. Krake, has there been a reschedule date?

MS. KRAKE: It was cancelled because that was the evening he we had invited the mayor to speak or address council concerning the budget, so we asked Mr. Burke if he could kindly reschedule and short term his calendar didn't have any openings, but we can readdress that the upcoming month in April.

MR. JOYCE: Okay.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Ronnie Ellman, member of the taxpayers. I was glad to see Mr. Miller here whether I agree with him on all things are not. I wish some of the boys that were with him, you know, would come back. It's good. When I go to that big council meeting in the sky I'm going to give him my five minutes if it's all right.

I was at the Dollar Store. I go in there to buy some milk duds to hide in my

car so Rosie doesn't know about them and a lady came over to me and she said how pleased she was with the new council, but she said she didn't like me and my mouth and my criticism and so forth, but, you know, what are you going to do, you can't win them all.

I guess council is doing a good job when you start getting hate mail in the letters to the editor there. I think there was one today and one last week from someone in Clarks Summit that's so worried about Scranton.

Last week, the Community

Intervention Center of Lackawanna County,
which I don't know what they do, bought a
house on I think the thousand hundred block
on Capouse. That house was appraised at
\$16,000 which means it's about \$3,000 a
year, \$2,800 a year in taxes. You know,
they are gone. This is what you got to stop
somehow. I don't want a bunch of drunks and
druggies sitting there watching television
on all day on my tax dollar, you know? It's
not right. All of these bleeding heart

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agencies they just -- let them pay taxes and buy what they want.

Right there the new medical school is going to get \$500 million the next five years so you can see they are going to start getting their 20 acres of land as fast as they can and throw out the 750 people probably, you know, Mr. Doherty won't help He never done nothing across the street about helping people. How can we afford 20 acres of houses for them? They get -- they got \$500 million to build with, let them start, you know, let them start paying taxes on it. Buy whatever they want. Let them pay taxes like I do and these people back here do. It's impossible to go on. You know, enough is enough. It's just -- they have no business putting that medical school there. They didn't have to.

It's just like the federal building downtown taking that beautiful motel, there wasn't a reason in the world the federal building had to be next to the post office. You know, I don't know what kind of money a motel paid, but I bet it was a big loss, you

know, to the taxpayers.

And last -- two months ago this article about the education, the eight colleges having a meeting, the last paragraph here it says, "If this group stays together I think we can do anything."

I guess that means tax wise they can do anything. That was by I think his name Boheman from Keystone College, but I don't know. You know, I talk to all of these people and everybody is just -- just at a financial loss. House insurance, everything is going up so much. I just don't know how some people are going to make it anymore. I give up.

I wish Stu Renda would show up and tell me why I can't have a building permit for my garage like one one-hundred thousandths of the money that Austin Burke is charging across the street for his medical building over there. I don't know what they are building, some kind of office building or something, but if they don't have to pay for a building permit I don't think I should have to pay for one or

anybody else. You know, what's right for them it should be right for me.

I got a question, does a condemned piece of property get a tax sheet, you know, are they taxed?

MS. EVANS: I would believe. Even though the property is condemned, it's still owned by an individual.

MR. ELLMAN: Well, I know people walk away from them, but --

MS. EVANS: Well, it's a difficult task I have been told to locate many of the owners who are not city residents and who do not respond to registered certified mail, etcetera. They are leaving their problems behind them, simply put, for the city to handle.

MR. ELLMAN: Well, I'm about ready to do that myself. You know, when we were coming in talking, have you tried to get a little geisha girl to walk on your back or in your case you need a geisha boy or a set of wrestlers or something? They have to be something to help you like that.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: It's just a suggestion.

MS. EVANS: Okay.

MR. ELLMAN: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Dave Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: I moved this up to the front. On your dealings with the mayor, I don't care what you do just as long as be flexible if you have to be and just conduct your business in the best way you can.

Now, I'd like to get onto last week I mentioned about some dumps and so forth getting started behind the Salvation Army. Well, part of the reason that they got back there was because Salvation Army was leaving their gates open, which they are not doing anymore because of the dumping, and I did check and they closed their gates at night now, but that pipeline that went in that runs from Empire Landfill and it connects up with the DeNaples' landfill's pipeline and they are generating the natural gas and burning it out at a power plant up in Archbald, that's created a big access route for illegal dumpers.

So what I would like to suggest is

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that they put gates across or be required to contact to put gates across some of these so that, you know, if somebody wants to go back there with an ATV and ride around that's no big deal, but if they are going back with a full-size dump truck I would say that I underestimated that pile behind Salvation Army. It's probably 12 to 16 small dump trucks like our DPW uses, and because it's mostly building material I'm wondering if with home building permits if we ever check to see if they have a legitimate bill for waste disposal after the building permit because that would, also if they had to show up and show a waste disposal bill to get that building permit closed out then if they paid the money, you know, we won't have to put up with our landscape being dumped all over and because it goes on in both directions there. I do a lot of walking through South Side, the old Erie line and it goes on all of the way up to Dunmore and it goes on all of the way down to -- almost down to Moosic you can walk down there along that line and there is constantly people

dumping illegal stuff going on there.

And, also, I would like to recommended possible looking into a light goods disposal through the DPW even if customer pay it required like with our old computer televisions, old stoves, refrigerators and so forth that way they won't wind up on our landscape where it will cost hundreds of times more to pick them up than it would have to dispose of them originally.

And on the pool, I have often said this before and I'm going to repeat it, if we could possibly find some way for the kids from the Hill section to get a reduced rate or whatever that might be a big help. Have a certain territory that somebody that lives in the Hill section wouldn't have to pay the full fee as if they came down from Archbald to use the sliding boards.

And with these microphones if you keep them about six inches from you and try to talk clearly, I noticed people go up like, see what I mean? You're getting a lot of distortion and that's probably why ECTV

is constantly playing with the dials in 1 there to reduce the volume if you are 2 starting to sound, you know? 3 Okav. thank you, and have a good night. 4 MS. EVANS: 5 Thank you. anyone else that cares to address council? 6 7 MR. TALIMINI: Good evening, 8 Council. Joe Talimini. I'm sorry I'm not 9 as astute as some of the people who come up 10 here and know all about the legal aspects of 11 everything that's going on. They also seem 12 to have information that nobody else has, 13 but I would just like to ask council, did 14 you sue the mayor? MS. EVANS: Pardon me? 15 16 MR. TALIMINI: Did you sue the mayor 17 or did the mayor sue you? 18 MS. EVANS: The mayor is suing us. 19 MR. TALIMINI: Oh, okay. 20 wanted to get that straight. I didn't know 21 if that was a fact or not because I know you 22 are getting blamed for this lawsuit. 23 But there is a couple of other items 24 that have come up, but you are familiar with 25 the SWAB organization which we have formed

and I had a chance to meet with some people from the Afro-American community and also some of the lower income community, and I am not familiar with the fact that Scranton at one time had a drum and bugle corp and apparently was very good drum and bugle corp, but one of the suggestions that was made was that if we can get a drum and bugle corp in this town again a lot of kids would be off the streets.

So I don't know anything about it. I'm asking anybody who is out there who has information about it to contact me, and if there is anybody who would be interested in helping us put together a drum and bugle corp I would be glad to go along with that. It's not a problem. We will bring it to council and just mention this information, and if there are any music teachers out there, anybody who has any band equipment, anybody who has any ideas we would be open to them.

And we haven't had a meeting, we had postpone a meeting last week because of a death of one of our members, but we will

much.

have a meeting, we will be discussing it and I'd like as much information as I can.

Anybody who was a member at one time or who thinks it would be a good idea or any member of the black community or the low income community, we are open for it. So, you know, anything that we can do to help the city we'll be glad to do it. Thank you very

Association. I'm sure you are all
interested, I just came from the Sewer
Authority meeting and they have put off
making the final decision until next month
because they didn't get the -- the board
members didn't get the full copy of the
Ganet-Flemming report until last Thursday
and they hadn't had a chance to read it. I
was also told they will be putting copies of
that report for citizens if they want to go.
There's going to be one at the Albright
library and I'm not sure where else, but

that will be available and, of course, at the Sewer Authority itself, at the headquarters on Adams Avenue, anybody who wants to review it.

A presentation was made and what was recommended was a combined -- a fixed charge with a consumption base rate which is similar to precedents in other combined sewer systems and matches the Scranton Sewer Authority cost of service studies, so that decision should be made at the April meeting.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Now, back to my favorite long-term project, the Ice Box. I did, as I mentioned I believe last week, get the actual agreement that was filed with the Recorder of Deeds, and then I went back even though I couldn't find things on the agenda, I did find that in the minutes that back in 2006 the other copy of the ordinance I have which would have -- they have the council agreed to the \$600,000 payment in I can't remember now if it was \$30,000 over 20 years or \$20,000 over 30 years, but I think it was

30 over 20, but that actual ordinance was tabled on April 27th of '06 and then it was brought back on the 6th of July of '06 and it was unanimously voted down and then the following month the agreement was filed with the Recorder of Deeds and I have sent a Right-to-Know to the city asking for the signed copy of the ordinance that approved the lease agreement that was filed with the Recorder of the Deeds because, as I have said before, it doesn't match the one that was approved and that was attached to the ordinance that was approved in 2002, so I will report back when I hear something more.

And then I would like also to know because there was an article again in today's paper about the mayor of Dunmore saying they've got problems that needs to be fixed immediately and referred again to the mutual aid agreement with Scranton for fire protection, and I want to know if we been impacted at all by anything that's going on in Dunmore either shifting manpower or --

MR. LOSCOMBE: You want me to answer now?

MS. SCHUMACHER: If you would, please.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I still have to get together with them, I did stop up there. We haven't been impacted at this point. They have just started their cutbacks now. We have always provided mutual aid for them from Engine 15. Fortunately, there haven't been many major incidents lately up that way. I'm sure until we get this resolved or they get it resolved we may get called out a little more often, but we are still in the process of --

MS. SCHUMACHER: If may and if you know the answer, what is the protocol if 15 is on service in Dunmore and something in their own area, there is an incident in their own area of coverage?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Then the next company would respond being Rescue 1 or Engine 4, Engine 10 from the East Mountain.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Well, I certainly hope that we keep an eye on that because.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Sure. I noticed the

article again and I have had a couple of 1 meetings this week, I have one Thursday and 2 3 I'll discuss that. MS. SCHUMACHER: During motions? 4 MR. LOSCOMBE: I've been staying 5 6 busy. 7 MS. SCHUMACHER: I guess I will make 8 one more request and that is if you can find 9 out how many drug buyers have been 10 prosecuted in the last three years, if any. 11 I know that quite a few sellers, but there 12 are no sellers without buyers and I would 13 like to know how many of the buyers we are 14 also prosecuting. That's it for tonight. 15 Thank you. 16 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 17 MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. 18 MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else? 19 MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council. 20 Bob Bolus, Scranton. 21 MR. JOYCE: Good evening. 22 MR. BOLUS: You know, I was at home 23 tonight, I haven't been here in awhile, and 24 I was watching this meeting. You know, I'm 25 appalled at people, the ones that are

criticizing a council that the first time I can remember has taken the mayor on. You're to be applauded not criticized. And why are we in Court? Well, the mayor didn't like somebody jumping in the sandbox. No matter what the end result is the people should support a council that's interested in not politics, but turning a distressed literally bankrupt city with a moral that's so deep in the hole to try and turn it around.

And I came here tonight to tell you this and to tell people out there, support a council or support anybody, whether it's a mayor or any other elected official that wants to make to a difference. We have been so stagnant in the leadership in this city for years and politics as usual is why we are where we are today, and if you save us \$1 your efforts are to be applauded because you are moving in a direction Scranton needs to go. We have been the laughing stock for many, many years.

I have criticized councils, some members on this council. I leave my personal feelings outside when I come in

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here. We lost \$3 million that the council has gave the mayor. I'm still ticked off about it, but I know in the hearts of people at this council if there is any way to put that money back into the hands of the people for future generations where it was earmarked for I believe sincerely you will do that.

What I want to see now, and I know Boyd is up against a stacked deck, but I think he can handle it. I have known Boyd for many, many years and I think he likes a good fight and he goes prepared. I believe stay the course. Don't be intimidated. Forget about those on the other side that are criticizing you. Remember you are here for the people, and this is the first time I can honestly say I have seen a council for the people. Did I think you were going to do it in the beginning? No. I wanted you to show me what you could and you have done it. Yeah, the budget is sued up. Was it the appropriate time? Maybe, maybe not, but at the time you came into office to do what you had to do and you are doing that.

be swayed by the Scranton Times or news medias or personal attacks, stand up for the reason why you are council people today and that's for the people.

I have issues on East Mountain and we are fighting the city. The city gave a building permit for somebody to build on a piece of property because of politics that the city owns and knew about it that they allowed them to go there and said, "Well, since we gave them a permit it's okay now."

Well, it's not okay because when you use a city asset and you give it away and,
Boyd, you correct me, you need to come to
this council, especially if it's a deeded
piece of property to get permission, am I
correct in that, Boyd?

MR. HUGHES: I didn't hear the full question, Bob.

MR. BOLUS: I said if you allow someone to build upon a city piece of property that's deeded to the city without being compensated in any way, shape or form don't they have to come to the council first to get approval to give away an asset?

says that before any city property can be leased or sold it must be approved by council. If there is a piece of city property that's being built on I don't see how anybody could get a building permit unless it's been approved by council and signed by the mayor. There has to be legislation.

MR. HUGHES: The Home Rule Charter

MR. BOLUS: That's never been done and that's the issue I'm dealing with on East Mountain.

MR. HUGHES: That would apply for easements, also. I mean, if there is an easement across a city property somebody can't just, you know, put a sewer line in or anything like that because that's taking away part of the fee. That would have to come here. It should be drafted by legislation in the solicitor's office to come before the city.

MR. BOLUS: Correct. That's what we are in court over. There is no easement, there is no right, it's a city-owned property. We raised the issue with the law

department and their issue was they didn't own it, the city didn't own. Well, now they know they owned it and they gave a permit in a subdivision knowing full-well what they were doing was wrong, but it was Scranton politics and that's going to change and that's why I'm fighting the fight on East Mountain because it infringed on my rights. Where other people think politics are the reason you can do something wrong and they get the city to fight your battle and that's what's going on in the city and it's been going on for years. You have made that change.

You have taken a mayor, first he wanted to be a governor, a senator and God knows what else, but don't you think he should have worried about clearing up the city first then move forward and left the city in the black, police that are proud to say "We are Scranton policemen." Fire department that are proud to say, "We are Scranton firemen." Not be criticized and not given a raise and give people money that have left the city now that were getting

pensions like Ray Hayes and all. What have they contributed to this city other than to drive us deeper in debt?

You are making that change and your voices are being heard. Don't give up the fight. Don't compromise your integrity because of political pressure. You will see the people here and the people out there support you because you are about the people. Don't change that and you will be successful, and I'll be glad to come here before you again and defend you. If you don't do things for the people, I'll be the first one to criticize you, but keep up the fight and I'll support you. I'm sure everybody else will. Thank you.

Council. Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

Rights.

MR. ANCHERANI: Tonight I have some questions, comments and trivia. Comment: Council is now in a court battle with the mayor over the amended budget. From what I

read in the slimes, our law department is earning their salaries. The whole law department is in the court battle against Council's Solicitor Hughes. How does it feel to be surrounded, Counselor?

Trivia: In 2000 our mayor was a councilman who served as Finance Chair. On December 22, 2000, the city council amended File of Council No. 77 2000, the City of Scranton 2001 operating budget, which had been legally and lawfully adopted by the then city council members. Finance Chair, Chris Doherty, and council members Pocius, Hazzouri, Reap and Murphy.

It's amendment to that budget was
File of Council No. 97 2000, which was
legally and lawfully adopted and signed by
then Finance Chairman Chris Doherty and the
four others that I mentioned.

Question: How can the mayor sue council over amending a budget when he was Finance Chair and amended Mayor Connors' 2001 budget? Can you call that a horse of a different color? He did back then what he is suing council for now. I guess what he

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is thinking now is what's good for the goose is not good for the gander.

Comment: From what I have here, it's a list of employees of the City of Scranton from 2001 through 2010. This list is taken from the budget and lists the positions, not the names of any individuals. In 2001, the last year of the Connors' administration, there were 584 employees on those budgets. In 2010, there are 531 employees. A net loss of 53 employees. have to question where was the outcry and the lawsuits and the claims of irreparable harm and safety of the citizens? There was none because they were the mayor's and his administration's cuts.

More trivia: In 2001, Doherty was elected mayor and took office in January of 2002. In 2003, 27 positions were eliminated. I'm sorry, 2002 27 positions were eliminated. Approximately 19 of them were clerical. Eight federally funded police officers were also eliminated. It was also the year when approximately 100 city employees were forced out of their jobs

with the city because of the threat of losing their health insurance if they didn't leave by January 1, 2003. 100 left with full benefits and 100 were hired to replace them with full benefits.

Question: Did the mayor meet with the clerical union or department heads to discuss the elimination of those jobs over those ten years, nine, ten years. Mrs. Krake, and I believe there was Ms. Garvey and they were union officials at the time and the clerical union got hit the hardest with the eliminated positions. Did the mayor meet with union officials to discuss the elimination of 19 jobs and the impact the eliminations would have?

If I remember correctly, he didn't meet with anyone and what is remembered is something like the city was distressed and they were going to have to do more with less. If eliminating position means that irreparable harm and the safety of the citizens is at risk as the mayor alleges in his lawsuit suing council, then the last nine budgets of this mayor has done what he

has claiming council is doing. Irreparable harm in putting citizens at risk since he eliminated positions in his last nine budgets. That's his doing.

Question: Did you or any council persons meet or attempt to meet with anyone whose jobs are going to be eliminated in your amendment? Another question before, did you or anyone else meet or attempt to meet with PEL over your amendments? And if yes, the results if you could let us know later.

From what I was observing, the mayor doesn't like that someone is playing the game the way he plays and he wants to change the rules because he doesn't like the outcome. This hang tough, stay the course, this is not counterproductive and we the people. We thank you for helping us. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to address council?

MS. KRAKE: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

MS. EVANS: Mr. McGoff?

MR. MCGOFF: Please. Thank you.
Two things that I'd like to ask of council:
One, and I know we have done this ad Nasse,
I would like to ask council if we would once
again contact PennDOT over the installation
of a traffic light at the corner of Meadow
Avenue and River Street?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MCGOFF: This has been an ongoing problem. It's an intersection which is extremely dangerous and the last when we asked to have a light placed there they placed it a block further --

MS. EVANS: That's right.

MR. MCGOFF: -- from where it should have been done, but I would like to reinstitute this and pursue it until something is done to adequately take care of the problem at this intersection.

MS. EVANS: I think we are all in agreement with that.

MR. JOYCE: Yes. Absolutely.

MR. ROGAN: Yes.

MR. MCGOFF: I guess if we can to that in some form of a letter to PennDOT or

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some type of contact with PennDOT.

MS. EVANS: Certainly.

MR. MCGOFF: The second thing that I would like to speak on is the rental registration ordinance. We have talked about that and I believe it's time that we kind of stop talking and get to implementation.

I gave to each member of council two sheets, one with a proposed motion to advise for the position of the rental registration coordinator. On that one I would ask that members of the council take a look at it, perhaps anything that they would like to input into a motion and then what happens at some point in time we can turn that to -- we should probably also contact Mark Seitzinger at LIPS and have input from there and then at some point in time in the very near put a notice to advertise for that position. think it's something that we need to do and without a coordinator it's something that will not begin to be implemented.

I also put some things that I think should be contained in that notice, the

duties, some qualifications. One thing that I did leave out and that we probably should discuss is the length of the contract for that service. It's certainly something that will take a bit of time to coordinate especially the compilation of a rental property database that can be used in the near future.

In talking with Mrs. Krake prior to the meeting we were just discussing how this could come about and the possibility that when this -- when the professional services contract does run out that it's probably something that could be turned over to the city and to the -- you know, as union positions to be implemented, but it certainly needs a lot of work to get started, so that was the first thing.

The second sheet was some ideas for amendments to the actual rental registration and ordinance. As it's now constituted, there are some things that need to be changed. It probably needs to have some teeth put into it, so that the collection of those fees and permit fees can be more

readily obtained, so I put in some ideas and again I'd ask council that we kind of take a look over that if there is anything that council would like to see changed and also I'd ask Attorney Hughes if, you know, if you would peruse it and see if there is anything that I may have overstepped bounds anywhere in either wording or, you know, things that aren't proper so that we can amend that ordinance and make it something that will produce the intended goals, so please take a look at those.

And I'd also ask that next week perhaps, I don't know what's scheduled as far as caucus is concerned if there is anyone, but perhaps we could meet that we can schedule a caucus for just council to discuss this and perhaps if not next week have motions on the table for the following week --

MS. EVANS: Certainly.

MR. MCGOFF: -- so we can begin this process and that is all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. Since

we have been sworn into council one of the 1 2 biggest issues has been the authorities and 3 particularly the Sewer Authority, and if it would agreeable to the other members I would 4 5 like to send a letter to the Sewer Authority asking them to review a usage base rate or 6 7 combined rate. I think that a flat fee 8 would be unfair to senior citizens and it 9 had be unfair to those who actively conserve to try to contain their costs and I would 10 11 make that in the form of the motion. 12 MS. EVANS: Before I think someone 13 seconds it, the issue at stake though, 14 Mr. Rogan, is according to council rules we 15 have to have a motion in written form. 16 MR. ROGAN: I apologize. 17 MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Rogan. 9 Mr. Loscombe, any comments at this time? 10 MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. Thank you, Mrs. 11 Evans. First, Chris, how come you didn't 12 speak tonight? MR. 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that the warm weather is upon us I received a lot of concern regarding loud music, most noticeably car radios booming at all hours The problem does appear to have of the day. gotten worse in the past few years. an annoyance to those homeowners who would like to leave their windows open during the warmer summer weather or enjoy sitting on This is also a safety issue their porches. as sometimes someone driving with their car zero booming are unable to hear emergency vehicles such as police cars, fire trucks and ambulances.

The City of Scranton does have a noise ordinance and it will be strictly enforced, so if you are bothered by inconsiderate motorists or neighbors in your neighborhood please contact the police department and let them know. We would like to nip it in the bud before we get into full blown summer.

Next item, I do have a meeting scheduled with Chief Elliott for this Thursday afternoon, so I have a list of questions compiled and information, I'll

find out about those cameras, also. There is whole list of items.

Secondly, I did have a meeting with Jeff Brazil today. It was scheduled last Friday, but I had to postpone it and he was kind enough to see me today. At the meeting it was also Paul O'Hora on the flood control. My main focus of the meeting was on the flood control programs to educate the people in the flood zone.

Also, in attendance was Mr. McGoff as Chairman of the Committee on Public works and I had numerous questions that I presented regarding the flood mitigation programs, which are too lengthy right here to go over in detail. I mean, this is just some of the questions, but I will touch on some of them.

We had a lot of people complaining about the sirens going off inadvertently at different times. Apparently, those sirens are older sirens. They were there before they even started the flood mitigation program which I didn't realize, but the problem is the batteries in them. They are

batteries now, they are shorting out at different times because those sirens are actually activated from the 911 center. I did want to know when the project completion date was expected, and I believe the contract runs until January of 2011.

Mr. O'Hora said they are pretty far ahead of schedule, so by the end of the year it should be accomplished.

in process of having someone change the

Another thing we are working on is coordinating with the various public safety departments from 91 through the fire and the police, EMS, DPW. Right now there really is no coordination so this is going to be an ongoing process.

Also, I had some ideas for siren testing and stuff so people know when it's being tested. Some municipalities do it on a monthly basis, and I have given them some, you know, some evidence of that and they are looking at possibly doing that on a monthly basis, a certain day of the week the same time, and it would also -- I asked for it to be put on the main Scranton's website on the

main page so you could go on there and see what the date is. They assure me that we won't even need those sirens after this project is complete because we will be completed to a 100-year flood plan which is a very rare occurrence, however, you know they still have to be tested, we still have to know. This is the information that I had received.

Pump, I was asked by a gentleman that lives in the flood area about pumps from the Sewer Authority. Sometimes it's just backups of sewers and stuff from the rain runoff, the storm sewers, and the Scranton Sewer Authority has some heavy duty pumps that they can make available on a moment's notice if need be, but I was also told by Mr. Brazil that they had a grant and they were in the process of purchasing a pump, a heavy duty pump right now, so that will definitely be a help and it will be right there with the DPW.

And it was also agreed to plan a community meeting for those in the flood plain for some time near the project

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completion to inform the public of the process and the coordination when a flood threat occurs so everybody is on the same page, and I will help coordinate that and I don't know if Mr. McGoff wanted to add anything on that meeting. Well, there is a couple of other things I did touch on, so if I could finish.

MR. MCGOFF: That's fine.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Beyond the flood questions I did have some questions on DPW in general, one of them being the downtown clean up. The photo on the page showed them in front of Whistle's and that and Mr. Brazil assured me that it wasn't -- and even though it was on the parade route they said they took care of the whole downtown not just the parade route. The reason for it was if they didn't do the sidewalks, they did the streets, the wind would blow the debris in the streets and then the next day citizens would be complaining that there is debris on the streets and it wasn't cleaned. So they said they did the general cleanup of the whole downtown corridor, street to

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street, sidewalk to street so there wouldn't be any of those problems.

Let's see here. The other question I had was on the rocks that are used in the -- yeah, for the roads, I'm sorry. larger rocks that were used on the streets during the snow storm I'm told were specked by PennDOT and that they are actually better for the spreading equipment in that they don't get clogged up in the machinery as the stuff with the dust does. When it gets wet is starts clogging it up, that was their answer for that and also my concern about it washing into the sewers and blocking the sewers, they said it's actually heavier and doesn't run in the sewers like the finer material and that they are in the process now of doing neighborhood to neighborhood street cleaning process to clean up that gravel.

I mean, it made sense to me after they described that to me. I told them I get hit in the windshield twice, I thought somebody shot at me, but I guess we will have to put up with that.

And finally, the budget negotiations have been ongoing since last week and I would like to commend our solicitor, Boyd Hughes, for his perseverance during these lengthy negotiations, and also city solicitor Mary Theresa Paterson and her staff for their professional dedication throughout the negotiations with us. I do believe that we can arrive at an amicable agreement that should benefit all of the taxpayers.

I do have some comments to the statements that were before. I mean, if you don't realize what's coming down the pike were are in for some major arbitration awards that have been appealed through the courts continuously and now it's coming time to pay the piper. We have to have our budget in place and we have to be able to come up with that when it comes down to it because I don't know if we are going to be able to borrow any more money for this city.

And you can see throughout the state with the different things. Bond ratings are going down throughout the state because of

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the economy so we may be in a no borrow situation.

But I have to say there was a comment said that we are trying to take control of this building, of this city, all I have to say is someone has to take control. We are riding on a runaway freight train and we have to stop it, and that's all I have to say. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Loscombe, thank you for that information, but with the request I've been getting or mostly from the neighborhoods and it's good to hear that they are going to be moving into the neighborhoods as well, but I did some research on some other cities what they do if they have -- they have a plan where the residents know when the street sweeper is coming because, for instance, say the streets sweeper is going to come down your block, but half the cars are still there, so they would just be weaving in and out.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Exactly.

MR. ROGAN: And I was hoping to meet with Mr. Brazil to talk about that and,

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Mr. McGoff, since it's your committee if you would like to come as well.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Sure. Just one more thing, Mr. Rogan. I did mention that about -- and he said, you know, today with the way, you know, everyone has two vehicles in the house it's hard to even for the old snow emergency situation maybe 40 years ago that worked, but the problem is if they post the street that they are going to be sweeping today and for some reason they don't get to that block and then the people park there the next day so it's created a little bit of a mess, but I do think there could be some system like that, but that was the response that I did that if they post it like they have done several times when they are paving and didn't show up for a week or so and the citizens were annoyed and rightfully so, but sometimes it's a scheduling glitch, but that was the explanation.

MS. EVANS: In fact, I know there are other municipalities in Pennsylvania, some who are, in fact, relative close neighbors of Scranton that conduct almost a

distribution comparisons and just to give

everyone a little bit of an overview as far

as real estate tax collections as of this

point last year we collected 3.9 million in

comparison to 6.2 million this year.

The wage tax last year at this time we would have collected \$4 million, this year we have collected about \$8 million.

The EMS tax, last year at this time we collected \$375,000, this year we have collected \$380,000.

And the business privilege and mercantile taxes at this point last year we collected \$34,000 and at this point this year we've collected \$218,000.

So overall at this point last year we collected \$8.3 million in comparison to

this year where we have collected \$11.9 million for an increase of \$3.6 million more collected this year up to this point, so I would like to thank the staff at the tax office as well as the residents of Scranton for submitting their taxes in such a timely manner.

Secondly, in response to the Scranton Times' article regarding my testimony about the budget amendments, I would just like to state that the article does not exactly tell the whole story.

During my testimony I was asked a question during cross-examination as to whether or not I spoke with the mayor or any department heads during a certain time frame regarding the budget. The question that was asked was not whether or not I spoke to or attempted to speak to any department heads before these amendments were passed. In fact, before the budget was passed into law both myself and Mrs. Evans met with business administrator to discuss some of the amendments, and in addition to that I did try to reach out and contact several

department heads. And actually the only department head that returned any of my multiple calls was Mr. Renda whom both myself and Mrs. Evans spoke to.

Also, for those that may be concerned about taxpayer money being spent on the Court case, I would just like to reaffirm what Mrs. Evans stated before that the attorneys involved in this case are already employed with the city as well as our council solicitor. Therefore, no outside resources are being used and there is no waste of taxpayer dollars on outside attorneys or any type of fees regarding that matter.

And with that being said, since this matter is in litigation and negotiations are underway I will refrain from saying anything more about the budget amendments at this time.

Also, Mrs. Krake, in regard to what Mr. McGoff said, do have we have any caucuses set for next week at this time? .

MS. KRAKE: No, we did not.

looking for from the LIPS Department in terms of the legislation that council is going to be considering for rental registration. If Mr. Seitzinger is not permitted to attend a caucus provide for the reason for such action and please send a copy of the correspondence to Mr. Seitzinger.

And, Mrs. Krake, I also ask you to locate the ordinance which sets the fees for police reports. Several council members have expressed their concern for charging crime victims for police reports and their agreement for amending this ordinance if we do have one. So if you are able to locate that, please provide Attorney Hughes and each member of the council with a copy of the ordinance for next week's council meeting so that we may begin discussing possible alterations.

I just wanted to also respond to a question I believe Mr. Ancherani posed regarding council meeting with department heads or employees. Yes, there have been many meetings involving the budget. I think

Mr. Joyce mentioned some. In addition to that, I know that Mr. Loscombe and Mr. Rogan met with representatives of PEL. Mr. Rogan met with the OECD director as well as contacting her by e-mail. I believe Mr. Loscombe also met with Mark Dougher, Director of Parks and Recreation, Mrs. Opsins, who I believe is the recreation specialist. He did talk with Mr. Brazil. He met with quite a number of DPW employees. One that comes to mind immediately I know because you had told me I think you may have gone on the road with him, Mr. Reed, Mr. Gene Reed.

The property has been filled with weeds, tall grass and litter for the past two summers. addition, Mr. Brazil stated that the DPW cannot perform the clean up since the property is privately owned. Provide council with a written update on or about April 16, 2010. Send a copy to the mayor requesting his authorization for Mr. Seitzinger to perform the duties and responsibilities of his position.

A letter to Mr. Brazil, DPW director: The homeowner at 109 Peguest Drive reports that her driveway and four feet of curb were destroyed by a snow plow during the last snow storm. Please investigate the damage and repair it as soon as possible.

Next, city residents report that traffic lanes were never painted on Linden Street between Jefferson and Madison Avenue creating a potential for accidents particularly when entering a University of Scranton parking lot near O'Hara Hall.

Also, there are no traffic lanes
painted at the intersection of Vine and Penn
Avenue to indicate a right line from which
right turns are made. When will the traffic
