Brian Swanson was kind enough to send us the e-mails that have been going back and forth between himself, Linda Aebli, and the DEP.

Currently, DEP is reviewing an application for the replacement of the bridge. received a legislative interest in the project from Representative Wansack's office and Representative Murphy's office. City of Scranton is worried that they are going to lose their funding on the project if they don't receive a permit soon, i.e., immediately. We are reviewing the application, but are possibly two months away from making a permit decision. From the attached file it looks like \$150,000 of the funding is through FEMA and another \$150,000 from a

community development block grant.

The response then is from Kevin White to Linda Aebli. "Linda, thank you for talking at that me about this project earlier today. We understand the importance of this project to the city. The department received a permit application for the replacement of the bridge in November of We would do our best to finalize our 2009. review and reach a permit decision in a timely manner. However, because of other priority projects and the loss of one of our permit reviewers," and they have in parentheses the budget cuts, "we still might be two months away from reaching a permit decision. Again, I apologize for the delays.

From Brian Swanson to city council office, he attached e-mails on the schedule. He has also been in touch with Representative Murphy's office and they are continuing to push DEP to help move things

along. And finally Brian says, "It goes without saying that the one to two-month period indicated by the Pennsylvania DEP is not acceptable and we have been continually pushing with the assistance of Representative Murphy and FEMA to get the permit released."

And that's how he leaves it.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I thought I read in the legals are we looking for a new city engineer? Anybody hear anything about that?

ANDY SBARAGLIA.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. From what I

understand it's an annual contract, so it has to be bid out for the new renewal.

MR. SBARAGLIA: So we are not necessarily looking for a new engineer we are just rebidding.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Right.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Your 5-A with the grant, I looked at some of the figures on the grant and from what I can see the equipment is going to cost \$49,411 of that we are getting \$25,800 for a cost of \$23,611 to the city, but we are getting a lot of equipment for it. I hope -- I didn't read if there is any stipulations in that contract where it can only be used to mold the dikes or we can use it in some of the other things.

Every time they rip down a house, we ended up with a blight because it's overgrown with weeds and whatever blows in. You just can't beat nature except by constantly going at it time after time after time. I guess the best solution is try to get people to take care of these lots because they really -- if you are looking at

blighted neighborhoods nothing is blighted in neighborhood like a house that's torn down, believe me it does, because I live on Main Avenue, behind me we lost two homes. Behind there is a forest growing now. It's just there. The animals come from it and I don't blame them, they get thrown out of their home along the river, so they had to move somewhere so they moved sort of into my backyard, but that's the way life goes, but just I hope some of that equipment they are buying like the mower, the sprayer and so forth can be used other than the dikes. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Michael LaPolla.

MR. LAPOLLA: Mike LaPolla, resident of North Scranton. I'm here tonight to discuss the ordinance, City Ordinance 105 of 2007. I have been thinking about it and have come up with a process that the city can do itself instead of outsourcing it and I have a little bit of information here if I can come up and give it to you?

MR. ROGAN: Yes.

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(Mr. LaPolla approaches the dais.)

MR. LAPOLLA: You have to excuse me because I'm rushing through this, I have a meeting I have to go to and so I'm going to do this kind of briefly. I believe there are advantages and costs savings to perform due to data collections in-house, meaning with the city. Currently, we have around 1,200 rental units that pay the \$15 fee to the city in compliance with City Ordinance 105 of 2007. There an estimated 10,000 or so rental properties in the City of Scranton. To me, it is unfair that these small number of aware and honest rental property owners pay this fee while the majority of other rental properties do not.

I believe the city needs to have it's own data base of registered units in order to make it fair to everyone. My solution is to develop a database by buying a list of apartment occupants from the city vendor and then to work with the city, county -- or, I'm sorry, work in the county assessor's office to obtain the name and address of a corresponding property owner

from which many labels may be printed, then letters can be mailed along with a copy of the ordinance and rental registration form.

the city the fee you were going to pay someone else to do the work. To do this is simple, it's just sharing data between the county and the city. It is taking the information and manipulating into an Excel spreadsheet in which the city can keep track of who registered and who is not registered. Another advantage of doing this in-house, you have the information on whom the owners are, whom the point of contact is in case of emergencies as well as the point of contact to rid the blighted properties and addressing negligent properties because they are not rented out.

We are looking at close to 10,000 rental units at \$15. By staying on top of this each year the many city has a possibility to increase it's revenue by \$150,000 for a very short period of research. I am asking you tonight to look at my proposal before you consider any

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outsourcing process. I thank you for the time.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. LAPOLLA: My e-mail is on the bottom of that if you have any questions, but please do consider it before you do any outsourcing.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. LAPOLLA: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Marie Schumacher.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, I'm Tom Ungvarsky, not Marie Schumacher, he name was on the list there after mine. For the last two weeks I have been attending a trial, I have spent over 0 hours listening to testimony with the mayor filing a petition to overturn city council's amended budget. For the last eight years our mayor has had a council that has agreed with every budget proposal he has put up. This year he had a challenge to it with the new council. Instead of sitting down with council he chooses to go to his law department and file I believe over the eight years that a case. he has been mayor he has had numerous

trials. It seems as though our mayor cannot sit down at a table and reach an amicable decision with any petitioner. I want to congratulate city council for standing up, devoting all the time and taking the aggravation that it was.

I know there are several things still pending. Does anyone on city council know if the mayor will be challenging any of their passages and if so are we going to have to go through the same charade that we went through these last two weeks? Does anyone know?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Only time will tell.

That's all I can say.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Marie Schumacher.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Now the real Marie Schumacher is standing up. I'll be real brief. Marie Schumacher, city resident, member of the Taxpayers' Association. The first item, tomorrow is the 31st of March and several months ago when it was in the paper that claims had to be filed for money,

any monies owed by Murray in order for the bankruptcy to be considered for any kind of payment the bankruptcy I asked that we check out and find out whether or not the parking lot fees per parking space were up-to-date since he had a central city parking garage.

Does anybody know whether that was checked or whether we have filed it?

MS. KRAKE: We did answer that in a council meeting, Mrs. Schumacher. I hesitate to say exactly what it says, but the law department did seem to feel that it was satisfied what they owed the city, but please feel free to stop in the office and I will pull that response for you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I believe the part of the response was that the parking lot was used to store construction material and whatever, but my question is was he paid any fee for that which I haven't followed up on.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. The way it was written up in the paper it said how many parking spaces he had and it was fairly significant, so I just wondered if --

MR. LOSCOMBE: But the response that Mrs. Krake is referring to stated that it was utilized not for parking, they used it for construction material over the past year or whatever.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, probably while they were building the --

MR. LOSCOMBE: Right.

MS. SCHUMACHER: The newest garage.

But speaking of parking lots, does CMC pay a
fee for their employees to park at Nay Aug

Park, and if so do they pay it to the Rec

Authority or to the city treasury or is that
something that is supplied for free?

MR. ROGAN: That's something we can definitely look into. I remember reading somewhere about that. I don't remember exactly what was said, but I'll look through my notes and I'll find out for you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you, because I thought they were, but I haven't been able to find any track on whether they are still paying. In the hearings several of us have been sitting on on these last several days, I learned a number of things, one of which

is that we are down 11 firefighters and I

I'm wondering if we could get the

firefighter vacation schedule for 2010, not

by name, but just when people are taking it

and do some rough calculations and see if

they have the manning to fill those spots or

if it's going to be all overtime and if so

if the overtime is going to be cost us more

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yeah, I'll definitely check into it and, I mean, right now they are manning with overtime so I don't see how they are saving.

MR. LOSCOMBE: But, you know, there may be one or two short a shift from what they are doing. I still have to sit down and see what the total is now because we just lost three more. There was eight left out of the last year's budget and three more men just retired, so that makes it the 11.

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and what it looks like to cover I would imagine most of them have families and take the most of the vacations during the summer months, so --

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in the family, and I then I followed up again and he said he was sorry, he couldn't get the software to printout the report and he said -- but he did say he was working with the vendor, and the last time I talked to him I didn't get any kind of warm fuzzy feeling that we would able be able to get that, but the company had rather said that's-- that's not even possible, so I question the kind of advice that they may be They may be getting electronic getting. advice, but as far as when you have a department that might need to run reports and what you are doing on an annual basis and keep track, if they can only do, and this was my understanding you can check with Mark, but they can only do permits, grant permits on an individual basis. couldn't do what had been done for the whole entire year and that, you know, I would think they would -- the city administration would want to do.

Council. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. First off, I want to follow-up on some questions that I submitted about I think a little over a month ago. MS. KRAKE: I believe we answered that last week.

MR. SPINDLER: Oh, okay. I didn't hear.

MS. KRAKE: And the other two were also answered, by if you want us to I can e-mail you those responses again, Les. It was awhile back so --

MR. SPINDLER: I'll give you a call to the office. Thank you. Next thing, in recent weeks two speakers were coming here criticizing council saying they are wasting taxpayer dollars because they have to go to Court to defend their budget cuts. I wonder if those two speakers went to the mayor and asked him to stop all of his appeals of arbitration losses costing people \$1.4 million dollars and counting. I don't think they have done that. Can you say hypocrites. I talked about this last week, the parking garage on Linden and Washington, what a terrible job is on there, and I noticed something else if you go up Linden Street if you look at the right angle it

looks like the bricks aren't even even. It looks like it's buckling, so if I had that work done on my house I would be suing the contractor. How the city is letting this work go on is beyond me. First of all, I thought the building was fine before this work started, but I think council should ask Mr. Scopellitti to come in here and answer questions and if he refuses you should use your subpoena power because that job is just horrendous, it looks totally unprofessional. I mean, I have never put bricks up, I could probably go up there on that lift and done a better job.

Moving on, I saw a story last week on the news, which was good news, it was about the tax office moving in the Steamtown Mall. I think that's good for both parties. The tax office will be paying \$1,000 less a month rent I think, and could probably cause more foot traffic in the mall which is good. We all know we can always use more people in the mall. People might go pay their tax bill and say, "Maybe I need a pair of shoes or something," so I think it's a win-win

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situation. I was happy to see that.

Also, a story, last Friday in the news Reporter Dave Bowman from Channel 16 did a story about the our police department misusing stimulus funds. He was talking to Chief Elliott and the Feds accused the police department of misusing government funds, stimulus funds, and they were failing to account for how they were using it and when the -- when Chief Elliott was asked questions he was like a deer in the headlights, he didn't know what to say, and that's -- just goes to show the incompetence of Dave Elliott, who I have said here many times, the incompetence of all of the hires of the Chris Doherty, and I think council should also get Chief Elliott in here to answer those questions because it's \$264,000 that they being accused of misusing by the federal government, so I hope the FBI is looking into that, also.

And I've stated here many times I
think administration is the most corrupt
we've ever had in this city. Hopefully the
FBI almost move up the investigate city

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hall, and if Chief Elliott doesn't come, again like Mr. Scopellitti use your subpoena power and get him in here. I think these questions have to be answered. That's all I I just want to wish all my Jewish friends a happy Passover and everyone else a very nice Easter and thank you very much.

I would like to find out, Mr. Loscombe, I just have a thing here from a police officer, his name was Lawrence, I can't pronounce his name so I'm going to say Spathelf, let's put it that way, and he states here that he's currently assigned to the Scranton Police PACE Unit.

From what I understand there is no more PACE

unit, so can you check and see if that is the case?

And also I would like to find out

Sergeant -- or, I mean, Lieutenant -- no, he
is a sergeant now, Daniel Duffy and Officer

Herchak and Officer Spathelf, these officers
they conduct surveillance at convenient

marts, and I guess they look for people who
go into convenient marts, they said that
there this is drug activity in these
convenient marts and people purchase -people purchase cigars there, they say that
they use them for drug paraphernalia, I
don't know. I don't know how, but they do.

I want to find out does the ends justify the means with these surveillances? How much are we spending? What do we get if they catch people with this, do the ends justify the means, but I'm going to tell you something that happened Friday, and I'm only going to use a family member of mine and a passenger, that's what I'm going to say right now.

On Friday about 10:00 in the evening

this family member of mine was at work and was up where the person works, I'm not going to say where, but it was a socializing type of thing, so they left about quarter to ten from work, I left about 10:00. I get a call on the cell phone, somebody frantically crying, "Come down here," so I am trying to get through this, I just don't want to skip anything because it's a very serious thing.

This family member of mine was in one of those convenient food marts, stopped there after they got out of work, purchased something that the police thought had something to do with paraphernalia, which was legal, it was a cigars, and this person smokes them because believe me when I'm around him I can't stand the smell of him. So they were pulled out of there, an undercover vehicle with Officer Herchak and Officer Spathelf, I'm sorry how you pronounce it. Daniel Duffy I guess was parked in the parking lot seen them by legal cigars, pulled out, started following them, surveilling them for what I have no idea. Surveilling them and he says that he

observed them not making a right turn using a turn signal, so that was there excuse to pull them over. Pulled them over on Sanderson Avenue, and I arrived maybe right before they, you know, right when they had them out of the car and they asked them all kind of questions and, you know, "Where are you coming from?"

I want to everybody to know out there and I want you to know this, I'll save you a lot of trouble, next time you get pulled over by a police officer and they ask you where you're coming from, none of your business. Where are you going to? None of your business. You don't have to tell them and you don't have to admit to searches or anything, I just want yous to know that, a lot less grief.

So anyway to make a long story short they felt that the consistencies was inaccurate and they put my family member and the passenger in handcuffs and detained them. I was standing there watching this hysterical. They were -- the passenger who was a female was incredibly distraught.

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They were in handcuffs. I heard some of the language the police were using as far as I'm concerned these guys are bullies. Okay?

They were like -- they thought they had Al-Qaida pulled over there, so they felt that they had probable cause for a search warrant, I tried to tell them he just got out of work this person, but, you know, these guys were on a mission.

They took my family member and the passenger and detained them for over three hours, these three bullies, handcuffed them, took them to the Scranton Police Department.

They were -- the vehicle was searched because they -- I guess they got a search warrant for whatever, they refused. They said, "I don't feel comfortable with you searching us or the vehicle."

These two people they were searched and they were strip searched on the inside of their body and on the outside of their body because these guys assumed, assumed that because they bought cigars that they had something to do with drugs. So they

said they brought a dog came to the scene, a dog hit on something. So after a three-hour search of them, their body and the car, guess what was found? Absolutely nothing.

No drug paraphernalia.

MR. ROGAN: You can continue.

MR. NEWCOMB: They were released after three hours of being detained, never arrested, never charged with anything, so I'm going to tell you what, you have a police officer here, just let me finish this, please.

MR. ROGAN: Sure.

MR. NEWCOMB: You have a police officer here, Herchak, he is only on the force 18 months and on his first year he has his first DUI with Scranton, that was his own. He got arrested by someone in his own department. These are the kind of people that are running surveillance. All I'm going to say is that I feel there has been a-- these guys are out of control, just because they bought cigars that's no reason to have a surveillance and hope that they are going to have a traffic violation. So

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you know what they got out of it when they They are going to get a citation in the mail for failure to make a right turn with a blinker and they said the inspection sticker was -- now, I'm going to tell yo what, when I was younger I was the kind of guy that took care of the bullies and I never threatened anybody and I never will, but all I can say is I won't rest until these three guys, Duffy, Herchak and Spathelf, these guys should be working at the Dairy Queen with a red hat for security because the Scranton Police Department has to do something. If they are running these PACE units and they are staking out these convenients what are we getting out of it? What's the outcome?

So all I could say is these guys they were out of control. These two -- these -- the family member and -- they will never be the same after the way they got treated. They were strip searched, they were humiliated and they have nothing on them. These guys just assumed.

So I'm telling anybody out there

when a police officer pulls you over, believe me, you are better off to say, "None of your business," and if they find something they find something. If they don't, they don't. But this city, I'll tell you what, this is why you get sued because of the kind of unprofessionalism that you are having with these cops.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Charlie, are you going to be here at the end of the meeting?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Because I want to get some more information from you.

Yep.

MR. NEWCOMB: All right.

MR. NEWCOMB:

MR. ROGAN: Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Mr. Rogan, can you hold my time for a minute? Okay, in regards to the cigars, 18 years experience in law enforcement, the reason cigars is a drug paraphernalia and have been for many years, which most people don't know, is what people do is they buy cigars, they take the tobacco out of the cigars, they fill them with marijuana, heroine, whatever they can and they reroll them and they smoke them. They

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are called blunts. The cigar sales in the United States has probably gone up 100 times in the last ten years, so when you see people buying cigars at the convenient store or the supermarket, most of the time it's not because they are cigar smokers, it is because they are using them for their illegal drugs, either marijuana or whatever else they are putting into them. Plus, you have different flavors. Philly's has different flavors, cherry, strawberry, vanilla, orange, some of them prefer the different flavored ones because I saw some looks of amazement on council's faces when Mr. Newcomb was bringing this up and I just thought I would explain it to you because I have been involved for many years due to past experiences and my law enforcement Okay, you can start my time now, I hope that helped explain something.

MR. JOYCE: Yes, thank you.

MR. JACKOWITZ: First of all, I was at the hearing for the four days, it was very interesting, I learned a lot about the City of Scranton myself. I found out that

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nobody keeps records. There is no time records of anybody, where they at, what they did all day, whether they were in the office, whether they were out of the office, nobody could prove anything.

I also learned that a computer technician and IT technician who performs work on a computer in the police department or the fire department is more important than the policeman or the firemen. more important to have an IT guy working on the computer in the police department than it is to have a policeman walking a beat in the neighborhood solving crimes or a firefighter going to a fire. I mean, personally, I'm old, I'm 62 years old, but I would prefer if my house caught on fire I wouldn't want to see an IT guy coming, I would prefer to have a professional firefighter show up and put my fire out, so the argument about public safety to my opinion, and just my opinion only, it was a total loss. And I was at the hearing for all -- every day and there was just many more, but I'm not going to elaborate, those

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are some of the highlights.

As far as the new library, last week I spoke about Cedar Avenue being a very bad location for the library. I was talking to a letter carrier the other day, he stopped me on the street, as a matter of fact as I leaving the courthouse he stopped me on the street, and he mentioned the railroad station and Lackawanna Avenue right where they built the new bridge. I guess that has been in default now again and it's open, and he was saying that would be a perfect place to build a library because you've got West Side, South Side, Central City, everything, instead of down there in drug haven Cedar Avenue. Cedar Avenue is drug haven, we all know that. There is no one that can deny Crimes committed down there, again, read the third page of the Scranton Times Tribune every day of the week almost and you will see crimes committed down there on Cedar Avenue. Not a good place for a library, not a good place for families, but why doesn't somebody look into that station down there. Plus it would be a heck of a

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lot cheaper than \$16 million. We can rehab that, build a library if the mayor really wants a library that much.

Also. I would like to know who is running the city? Mayor Doherty was in Susquehanna campaigning all day for the State Senate; Stu Renda, who is the assistant mayor, was in court all day sitting around doing nothing, who is in charge of the city? Half of the law department and maybe three-thirds of the law department was in the courtroom, they weren't all needed there. What was going on? Are these people being paid? I was in the court and I took annual leave. my vacation time to go to court. Because I care about what's going on. I was just wondering are all of these city employees, Ms. Moran, she was in there all day today. Were these people being paid or did they take leave? Can somebody please find that out for me because I took leave because I was concerned. I don't think I should be paying city employees for sitting in the courtroom doing nothing all day.

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Okay, Doherty stated that Harrisburg is broken. I agree with him. Mr. Mayor, Scranton is also broken, but not only is Scranton broken it's broke. It's been distressed for 18 years. So thanks to your lack of leadership I must say, also. Mr. Doherty had a nine point proposal if elected to State Senate, you know, he would eliminate a lot of things, the flat per diem payments, elimination of walking around Wham money for state law makers, reducing lottery's influence and so on. Does the Senator realize that he is going to be a first-term Senator sitting in the back of the Senate that's run by the Republicans. He is not going to able to change anything.

Also, in Sunday's newspaper

Mr. Morgan spoke last week about Austin

Burke. I have been speaking about Austin

Burke for at least four years. Mr. McGoff,

how many times I have asked you to invite

Mr. Burke to a city council meeting?

MR. MCGOFF: I have no idea.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Have I asked you?

MR. MCGOFF: I believe you have

asked council, yes.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Have you ever invited Mr. Burke?

MR. MCGOFF: He has been invited any number of times. As a matter of fact, he was here.

MR. JACKOWITZ: No, he was here to promote the tax exempt nonprofits is what he was here for.

MR. MCGOFF: Right.

MR. JACKOWITZ: That's different. I mean, you know, that was -- he was trying to sell you a bill of goods is what he was trying to do.

MR. MCGOFF: No, he was here to present the Mt. Pleasant project.

MR. JACKOWITZ: He was here to sell you a bill of goods, that's what he was here, and luckily it was overruled by the school board, they helped the citizens out. So I agree with Mr. Morgan. We need Mr. Burke here, we need Mr. Doherty here. They need to be here. This is Mr. Doherty's city. He is the executive officer of this city. He doesn't need to be down at

Susquehanna County campaigning for State

Senate, he needs to be right here. He needs
to be clearing up this distressed city for
18 years. He needs to be clearing up these
contracts with the firemen and the police
department that haven't been signed. He
needs to start paving the roads. He needs
to start reducing the crime in this city.
He needs to do something with Chief Elliott
who continues to embarrass the city.

Again, we have a 93 percent no confidence vote in Chief Davis. He needs to be looking into all of these problems we have right here in this city. He does not need to be down in Susquehanna County, Monroe County, Wayne County and Luzerne County campaigning for higher office. He needs to clean up this city first before he goes anywhere else.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mr. Jackowitz, just a couple of quick things. I believe in our mail now, Nancy, you just sent out another letter for Mr. Burke giving him some optional dates. He was scheduled to come

here and we actually cancelled him because we were hoping the mayor would appear, that's when we were working on the budget, but he was going to come here, Mr. Burke, so I'm hoping he accepts one of the dates that Mrs. Krake has sent him.

And as far as the railroad station,

I believe that the taxes or whatever was due
on it, the mortgage has been satisfied
somehow, so it's off the market again, but
you are right, that would have been a good
place.

And I go down Pantry Quick quite a bit and I smoke cigars, so I hope they are not watching me.

MR. DOBRZYN: I would.

MR. JOYCE: Also, Mr. Jackowitz, I
do have the letter in front of me.
Mr. Burke has been invited to come before
council on either April 6, 13, 20 or the 27
and we are asking that he replies by April
6, so if we do not hear anything from them
or from him by that point in time we will be

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Dobrzyn.

following up with him.

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MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton, member of the taxpayers. Now, last week I spoke about garbage dumps or trash dumps, illegal trash dumps. Another thing I would love to see addressed some day is trash collection. A lot of people are taking bags tossing them at end of the property, and it weights four or five days to be removed. In the meantime the animals get to it, it gets torn up, blown around the neighborhood and so forth. I think that trash should ben in a barrel and not -- and put out at least in the morning or the night before, not several days before, and these people from the DPW shouldn't have to bend over 17 times to pick up the same bag. They are not clean up people, they are trash collectors, you know?

Okay, last week I heard a little bit about the snow skid and the only thing I would like to urge on that is keep in mind it takes two or three days for things to get back to normal after a snow storm, so if we clean it up right away from a snow storm people -- we get a little onion snow or

whatever people won't be able to get into work, they will have a layer of ice on the street and they can sit there and skid away and be late or whatever, so we do need the snow skids during the bad weather.

Once again on this Court hearing, as far as I am personally concerned, you people can modify it any way you want, if you see that something isn't working and you want it back up, that's okay, but keep up the good work because it's obviously somebody doesn't know how to deal with a supermajority or not used to it and they would prefer not to have to do it.

Now, the real reason I came up here tonight, the University just received a \$1 million grant to expand their Mulberry Street project, and from what I read they plan to expand the sidewalks out into the street, and I would like to point out, and I'm very adamant about this, that is an emergency vehicle route. It's a bus route, it's an ambulance route, it's the only route that's going to be available after the Harrison Bridge goes off-line. If you ever

walked under the Harrison Avenue bridge you would see a big crack and it looks like a keystone just sitting there against the arch. It's cracked right almost in half. There is nothing left to that bridge that's retrievable, so in whatever, 2011, 2012, you might know a little more about it, Jack, it's scheduled for replacement. Now, if we narrow Mulberry Street to a scenic little lane for the benefit of the University and ambulances and so forth cannot get up that street for the only trauma center between here and Geisinger and Danville, where are we going?

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Dobrzyn, the plans for that project do not decrease the amount of the drive lane.

MR. DOBRZYN: I certainly hope that it doesn't decrease because the --

MR. MCGOFF: As a matter of fact, I think in some areas it's actually increased.

MR. DOBRZYN: The plan I seen in the paper depicted -- depicted a lane that basically looked like reducing it to two lanes even though we gave up parking spaces

1 and all, and that I had to problem with, but 2 please stay within those parameters, and if 3 we need to go any further on that then please do so because we can't keep expanding 4 that and blocking off that lane. 5 MR. LOSCOMBE: I agree. I haven't 6 seen the plans --7 8 MR. DOBRZYN: Mulberry Street has to 9 stay --MR. LOSCOMBE: I haven't seen the 10 11 plans yet, but, Mr. McGoff, I did read what 12 he saw in the newspaper and they were 13 narrowing the road. 14 MR. DOBRZYN: It was serious. MR. LOSCOMBE: Let them widen the 15 16 sidewalks inward, even expand them if they 17 That was my first thoughts. can. 18 MR. DOBRZYN: Exactly. That's 19 grounds to have -- half of the people in 20 this town up there would protest. MR. LOSCOMBE: With the Lackawanna 21 22 Avenue, the four and five hundred blocks. Ι 23 don't know who engineered that? 24 MR. DOBRZYN: Initially we were told 25 that that was being done at their expense,

and here once again our representatives comes in with a million dollar grant to hand to that institution. Now, I don't know want to sound like a bumpkin or something that we don't need education and so forth, but I mean, there is even foreign exchange students up there, so why are we taking the hit for this? 31 percent of our town is nonprofits right now and it's too much and we can't give up anymore on public safety. That's also a fire route, right?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes.

MR. DOBRZYN: And so forth. So, I mean, it's as far as them staying within their parameters, what they are there now, they got the grant, spend the money, do whatever you want, but please do not narrow Mulberry Street. Do not trim it down because we need it. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I agree it's

definitely going to be a hazard if they

narrow it. It's definitely a main route for

emergencies, but I do agree that the

beautification plan will be nice, it will enhance that corridor, so hopefully we can work something out there that's satisfactory to everybody.

MR. DOBRZYN: You should try to beautify the homeless people's lives a little bit.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else that would like to address council?

MR. GONZALES: Greetings, Council.

My name is Pedro Gonzales, Scranton resident and taxpayer. How has everybody been? I know it's been quite a long time. I have not yet had the pleasure of -- please, pronounce your name for me?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Loscombe. Jack Loscombe.

MR. GONZALES: Loscombe. Please forgive, my Latin slang time is a little funny and I kind of mess up people's last names. Once again, my name is Pedro Gonzales, I do a lot of the community development, the Latino community development here in the City of Scranton.

I want to announce a couple of past

events and one that's coming, as I usually do, so why break tradition. I want to apologize for my absence in these chambers. It's simply because rather talking about it, as many of you know, we actually decided to do the work instead of talking about and that's what we have been doing since the beginning of the year.

We want to thank everyone that participated in our January event, our Three King's event, our Latino Christmas event.
Thank you so much for to the Scranton
University, they have helped out
tremendously, and all of the community
members, and thank you to all of the council
members that came and represented this city
there that day. It was tremendously
appreciated. Thank you so, so much.

We want to thank everybody that was involved with the Martin Luther King
Commission and the Martin Luther King
presentation at the end of the January, a four-day event, that was tremendous event countywide. We had hundreds and hundreds of people in attendance all week long, so we

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want to thank everybody for that.

And we want to announce or newest event. Mother's United States against Hunger, something to touch on base with the gentleman that was talking about helping the homeless. We have taken possession of an old church on the South Side 510 Prospect Avenue, the old Trinity Church, now it is called Mananita Ministries, one of our Latin churches there. Saturday, April 3, this Saturday, from 4 to 8 p.m. we will be having an open house, an open -- I want to say a soup kitchen, per se. We will be feeding all and anybody who comes through the doors who wants a warm meal. They will get desserts salad and plenty to eat for that It's a new project for us in our community and within our organizations. Something that is started with a cross-cultural enhancement, per se, and there is a coalition throughout the city of people of all nationalities, and I repeat all nationalities. There is not one nationality that's involved in this project. We have people of all nationalities that

will be helping out and working on this project and future projects to come, so we are excited to take on this new project.

Again, it's going to be this

Saturday. Everyone and everybody is

welcome. It will be totally free for the

community. It will from four to eight this

coming Saturday, April 3. I have a couple

of flyers here if I could approach?

MR. ROGAN: Sure. Yes.

MR. GONZALES: If I could approach council there one second. Thank you, gentlemen.

(Mr. Gonzales approaches the dais.)

MR. GONZALES: And as always I want to thank everybody for the fantastic work that they do. I want to thank all of the community members for what they do here, for their involvement for coming here and showing that they do care about this city regardless of what they say or speak about, they say it with care because they live in the city, we all do, and many of them have been here for many, many years. For many, many years. I have only been here ten years

and I have been working hard for those ten years, but many of them are born and raised here, so everyone that steps to be podium should be recognized and should be valued as a valuable member of this community and not dismissed any shape or form. So with that said, my name is Pedro Gonzales. Once again, thank you for letting me express myself. God bless you all.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council. Standing here tonight listening to people I do appreciate everybody's opinion. just -- I am a staunch constitutionalist and I totally believe in the separation of powers and I don't know how this trial is going to end, but I have been troubled by what's been said in the courtroom from what the Scranton Times has said. You know, I asked Mrs. Evans for -- and I know it can't probably happen until the hearings are over, but I would really appreciate the residents of this city having access to a copy of the transcripts of this hearing to see what the arguments were for both parties.

I just think that council's time

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could have been more constructively spent and I'm really troubled from what Mrs. Evans said about council itself not beginning the process of breaking down the budget line item by line item, and I don't know how you are going to be prepared for the next budget. I do know that I was watching the news the other day and a governor and the state with a budget problem cut that budget by four billion dollars and I just think that council can cut this budget by seven million dollars, but you can't do it if you are not breaking that budget down and starting now, all right? I'm not going to try to say that your heart isn't in what you are trying to do, I just think it's wrong, okay? I mean, from what I have read in the Scranton Times. And like I say, their opinion may be biased, but they are presenting the argument that council went off and had meetings with Mrs. Evans, some of the members of council had meetings with Mrs. Evans. Without the transcripts I can't say this for sure, but with no real factual information I think that's a troubling way

for a government to function. I respect everybody on this council, but I just disagree and I don't think that's the way to run a legitimate government.

And people have come up here and spoke about departments being mismanaged and my opinion is if these departments are mismanaged then why doesn't council doing something about it? You know, the council and the mayor can fight, but it's not going to bring change, it's going to be bring gridlock, and one branch of the government cannot condone what they do because the other branch did something because then we go no where because everybody is going to be trying settle a score and get even. We have been doing that here a long time, okay?

The other thing I have is, you know, I really -- I don't know where you stand on the franchise agreement with the Comcast, but I really, like I said last time I was here, it's time to take that money out of the budget and do constructive things for the people in this city like a youth and remedial education program, a third of that,

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and a third for seniors for their senior citizens centers, and a third that fund public access television. I mean. that would be really -- a thing that council could really do. It would take a lot of work, it would take a lot of convincing, but it's something that could really provide a lot of dividends. I mean, we have got a very serious drug problem. judges when they care in for retention agreed, and what I'm saying is this is one thing that I think council can do. I mean, you have just got to get your priorities straight.

The same thing with Mr. Austin
Burke. You know, if you bring him in here
and everything isn't adversarial, if we are
not fighting with each other and we can sit
down at a table and try to discuss how we
are going to move this community forward
maybe we can create some jobs. I mean, we
lost over 93,000 jobs last year to China.
You mean to tell me that we can't
manufacture something in an incubator here
by reaching a partnership between business

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and government for the benefit of us?

I mean, you know, Mr. Jackowitz and a couple of the other people come here and speak about the wage base. Well, all of the change has to start somewhere.

And in regards to the stopping of these individuals by the Scranton police, you know, Mr. Jackowitz spoke about taking the filing out of cigars and using them for drugs, but my question is did these officers see these individuals actually doing that? I mean, are we going to go off and assume that everybody is just rolling out the center of a cigar to fill it with drugs? mean, that's a terrible thing to say. just -- it's so un-American. I mean, do we have rights as citizens or don't we? can police or the judiciary steal all of our rights from us? There comes a time when some things are wrong or right and I just think in my own opinion I didn't hear anybody say that they watched these people load these cigars or blunts with drugs. mean, in America we are supposed to have freedom of movement at all times. Thank

you.

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MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to address council?

MR. PICCOLINO: Good evening, city council, Giovanni Piccolino, homeowner and business owner in the City of Scranton. was one here to come and complain really quick about the Parking Authority and everything, but now I have to compliment them. The last about month and a half they have enforced the parking out front of the pizza shop and the Scranton police officers, so my family and I would like to thank both of those entities and city council for putting those two entities in motion and helping out our business and generating a couple of extra hundred bucks for the city. I have seen numerous amount of tickets given out so it's a very good thing. Mr. Loscombe, I agree about the Lackawanna Avenue project. I don't know who did that at all. Terrible architecture or whatever you want to call it.

Another thing real quick. Kevin

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Murphy came in our pizza shop tonight and pointed out to me about maybe Leonard's Pharmacy in North Scranton I guess there is an abundance of senior citizens that have to buy prescriptions there and there is no like 15-minute parking available for over there. I don't know if you guys can possibly -- I guess they have to park at a bank adjacent across the street maybe. I don't if you guys can -- I'm not quite sure how long they have been in Scranton or whatever, but still --

MR. ROGAN: Yeah, we'll definitely look into it.

MR. PICCOLINO: It's more of a convenience factor. As our customers come in they're like, wow, it's really nice to pop in and pop out, so we just wanted to thank everybody and that's it. Have a Happy Easter.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Mrs. Krake, if you can, would you be able to construct a letter to DPW and Mr. Brazil and copy the mayor as well and ask if it's permissible to put a

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15-minute parking sign up in front of that location? Thank you.

MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening. Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment Rights. see the budget talks between council and the I wonder whose fault mayor has broken down. that was? I'm going to say that they went the same path that negotiations between the unions and the city went with the city sabotaging the talks. The police union and the city set down for three negotiating sessions and the city threw monkey wrenches The city wasn't interested in in each time. talking. They weren't serious about They were just delaying for time. settling.

When all of these court cases and arbitrations start coming to an end we will have to stop taking from Peter to pay Paul. Peter will be here. The taxpayers are going to feel the brunt -- feel the brunt of the opinions. This is so sad since all that could have been solved with serious negotiating on the city's part.

Anyway, Council, stay tough, stay the course. We, the people, thank you for

being diligent protecting the taxpayers'
money. The taxpayers of the city, the small
people, are counting on you to run
interference for them by saving them money.
Stop the senseless spending. Go through the
budgets and scrutinize the professional
services budgets in each department. I find
it very curious the words professional
services were used eight times in the Sunday
Times' article titled "Widespread use of
no-bid contracts enables corruption and
waste."

Since 2002, \$1,905,000 has been budgeted to the law department alone. Total of all city departments professional services budgets since 2002 is \$6,026,510. How much of that was spent on outside attorneys fighting the police and fire unions? How much of that was wasted?

Very recently, Council, you lowered the limit for competitive bidding. Good move. A lot of people agree with the need for competitive bidding in keeping costs down. It's another way to save taxpayers' money.

The Connell building, I guess the \$684,232 judgment that was slapped on the owners of the building was the reason for the halt of the work. A number of months ago that was halted. It's restarted since. What was Ms. Aebli's reason for the stoppage at that time?

I thought I would bring up to the question about the leaseback of the DPW. As I said a few weeks ago, the city has paid back to whoever, because it doesn't say in the budget who is getting the money, it paid back with this year \$8,750,000 for a \$4 million building. I have to ask if anyone knows how much more, how many more years we as taxpayers will be paying back for a \$4 million building when we all already paid back \$8,750,000. Is that total going to be almost 13 million or more?

In Scranton we waste money. We paid three million for the police building that was built too small for the entire department to be housed in it. That was the intent of it being built in the first place, to house all of the departments. On top of

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that, there were cracks in the walls, they have been patched over since, floor tiles are separating, the parking lot does not have the top layer of blacktop on it as of this time. The police building is also mentioned in that Sunday Times article.

Wasted, \$267,000 paid for the renovations of the Casey Parkway before it was torn down because it wasn't safe. wonder if the \$1.2 million green fish pond at Nay Aug Park will be green again this year or will it be black like it was one vear at least. I wonder if the \$300,000 tree house will have rooms added on for concerts to be held there since the amphitheater was torn down. How about the bridge to no where over the gorge? Anybody know where it's going to go? Maybe there are plans to build another Luna Park, but Route 81 is already there so that would have to be rerouted. And how about the undersized bathhouse at Nay Aug, and one big question, are the kids going to have to pay for swimming again this year? Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else?

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MR. SLEDENZSKI: You forget me, Pat, didn't you? Best for last, Pat. Best for last.

MR. ROGAN: Save the best for last.

MR. SLEDENZSKI: Hey, Jack, you what know something, those firemen downstairs, Jack, they are doing a good job down there.

I'm proud of all of them down there. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thanks, Chrissy.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else that would like to address council?

MR. NEWCOMB, JR.: Good evening,
Council. I just wanted to give you an
update of the Keyser Valley situation with
the flood that we have been having over
there since I have been there for five
years. I had a meeting at Representative
Murphy's office this past week with the
project manager of PennDOT that's going to
do the Keyser Avenue project that's going to
go from the intersection where McDade Park
is all the way up past Lafayette Street.
And I'm under the impression after the
meeting that the city is ready to go with

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the project on it's end, laying the pipe and the drains and so on, but they wanted input from the state and assistant from the state before they went through on the project because they want the state basically to meet them half-way with the drainage system and they don't want to do this project and then it not work out, I guess. Because of the state.

But I need to thank tremendously Representative Murphy for keeping us in the loop. He has called the neighbors, his office, at least once a month to advise us of the situation that is going on, so I don't know where it's going to go from here. They need to have some more meetings with PennDOT, but I know Mr. Brazil was at the meeting and he said that it will be hopefully rectified by the end of the summer, they just have to do some more legal ramifications on PennDOTS's end, BUT I need to thank Mr. Brazil and Mr. Murphy for this meeting that they had to keep us in the loop, so I just wanted to let's you know what happened at this meeting. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else? If not, fifth order.

Mr. McGoff, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. MCGOFF: Very brief. First of all, Mr. Gonzales, with your permission I will pass this along to ECTV.

MR. GONZALES: Please do.

MR. MCGOFF: And have them perhaps scroll it as part of their public announcements.

MR. GONZALES: That would be fantastic. Thank you very much.

MR. MCGOFF: You are welcome. And the only other thing is to wish members of the Judea community a very sacred Passover and members of the Christian community a happy and Holy Easter, and that's all.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. I just have two things tonight. The first one is a citizen's requests. At the intersection of Crown Avenue and Beach Street there is a small store, Crown Market. Outside of the store there is a one -- there are two telephone polls. One is a pole and the

other the bottom part was removed and it says it's being only held into place by two small steel straps and a piece of rope at the top. The resident reported that the pole -- since the pole has been anchored this way it has shifted and the resident is very concerned that the pole will break and that it may fall and hurt somebody or crush a car. So, Mrs. Krake, could we please send a letter to the proper authority regarding this.

And the second issue is regarding sex offenders in our neighborhoods, and I spoke with Mr. Loscombe about this the other day and he passed along some information. I received a phone call from a neighbor who lives by a local school and he was concerned that there was somebody on the Pennsylvania Sex Offender Registry that lived right across from the school, and Mr. Loscombe passed along this information, I believe he got it from Chief Elliott in a meeting, but there is an ordinance on the books that sex offenders cannot live within 2,500 feet of a school, child care facility, open space,

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community center, public park or recreation facility. But in Allegheny County they had a similar ordinance and it was challenged in Court by the -- I think it was by the ACLU and the ACLU won. So, unfortunately, right now there is nothing that is restricting where a sex offender could live within our neighborhoods, but I would urge concerned residents to go to: WWW.PAMeganslaw. State.pa. There on their website you could do a search to look up sex offenders in your neighborhood by zip code, municipality, and county. And just for instance, I live in the 18504 zip code and there were over -there was around 30 just in that zip code and some were near schools, churches and other areas, so unfortunately this ordinance, the Allegheny County version of this ordinance was struck down, so I don't think we would be able to enforce it, but I just wanted to let that information be out there so neighbors can watch out for their if neighbors and keep track of what's going in our neighborhoods. And that is all I have tonight. Mr. Loscombe?

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MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.

Just to follow-up on that a little bit, I

did have a meeting with the police chief the other day, it's been a crazy week so I

didn't get a chance to put all of my notes

together to review here, but, unfortunately,

it was before that newspaper article, so I

have a couple of things I would like to go

over and then next week I could report on

it, but the police chief and he had two

officers there with him and they did present

me with that information because they would

like to have an ordinance that has teeth in

so they can protect the citizenry from $\ensuremath{\mathsf{sex}}$

offenders. So we to -- council is going to

look into it a little bit more, look into

other areas where there is legislation. I

think the toughest thing was the distance on

there. It makes it unenforceable because

there is no actual area in the city where

they would be enable to inhabit, so there is

some items that have could be looked at in

there to make it enforceable and put some

teeth into it and have the protections. So

that's something Mr. Rogan is going to be

looking into and I'm sure we all help whatever we can.

MR. ROGAN: Absolutely, because like we said on Friday when -- it was perfect timing because I got the call from a resident and then you just got done with the meeting with the chief and had the information, but this is something that is critical in this city and we all see the stories on CNN and Fox news about, you know, repeat sex offenders and the problems that happen because of that and I think it was a good ordinance it's unfortunate that it was struck down, but hopefully council can work together to do something they could protect the children in our neighborhoods.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Definitely. And so next week I'll report on my meeting with the police chief because there are some issues I to have to go over since then. One thing I want to report on. Naturally, we have citizens' concerns we pass onto Mrs. Krake and all of that and about two weeks ago I received -- well, actually, I ran into a citizen in the store that told me about a

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building in South Side that was vacant, it was a hazard, it was hanging over the water, got washed out in the flood, it's been vacant for several years. So I went up there and usually I do my photographing and my visits on the weekends because I have my granddaughter with me, and we went up and I photographed this property, took front and back photos, you could see how it's hanging over the water, part of the foundation is washed out, and the home next door to it is actually vacant, also. It's a two-family. That one is in a little better shape, but ironically I was leaving my home on Sunday to pick up my wife at work and I live on the West Mountain and I saw a plume of smoke over on South Side and took a shot over, just followed the smoke and by the time I got over there the fire was out. firemen did a tremendous job stopping the fire, but it was a vacant dwelling. And you may have seen in the newspaper 618 East Elm Street, and it's ironic because I was just putting that together to complain about.

But doing some research I find out

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that the apparently this home is owned by the City of Scranton and it's probably owned for the last six years or so or at least five years and I was wondering, Mrs. Krake, if we can send a letter to LIPS or whoever is responsible to expedite the demolition of this property. It's a hazard to any one, the teenagers that hang out there or whatever, but specifically the firefighters, I mean, it would have been easy for them to fall right into the river from that building and the house that they stopped the fire from hitting was probably about four feet away, so that's something that should definitely be expedited and there should be no problem because apparently it is owned by the city.

Next item was just I noticed that there was a something in the newspaper regarding the police alarms that they are going to be charging for the police alarms and stuff. This is something definitely that the fire department has done over the years and ironically according to the newspaper last year they realized over

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\$40,000 from the fines and, you know, you can look at it a couple of ways. Some people say, "I'm going turn my alarm off, I don't want it going off and all that."

What happens is with the nuisance alarms is situations where you have an alarm system, it's malfunctioning and you just neglect to take care of it so they're responding all of the time. That's when they will come down on you. I mean, legitimate false alarms, like say a child pull an alarm or circumstances like that, all they are trying to do is reduce the amount of non necessary calls. I mean, you are not go to prevent them all, but, you know, do not --- do not jeopardize your safety by turning off your alarm and worrying about, you know, getting fined or whatever. There is always an explanation, but mostly it's commercial that there is a problem with.

But other than that, we have had a busy week in Court this week and we finally ended at the end of the day today and we'll have to wait for the judge's decision. We

all went there, we all worked for the people. I hope our duty there was justified. I know we would all do it again. It was definitely an education and that's all I have to say. Thank you.

(During Mr. Loscombe's comments Mrs. Evans takes arrives for the meeting.)

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Loscombe.

Mr. Joyce, any comments or motions?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. Mr. Gonzales, I know that you mentioned that the Mothers United Against Hunger was having a free dinner on April 3 and other Saturdays during the month; correct?

MR. GONZALES: That's correct. This will be our very first one that we are ever going to do. This will be our inaugural event, I should say, and we hope to do it once a month in the time to come, but this will be our first very first one giving out food for free for the community.

MR. JOYCE: Okay. If members of the community would like to donate any type of food product or monetary donation, is there a place where they could do so at?

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MR. GONZALES: Yes, they can. The specific flyer I gave Councilman Rogan has the e-mail and my phone number where they could reach us or send us an e-mail and we could provide that information for you.

MR. JOYCE: Okay. Thank you very much.

MR. GONZALES: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: I'm pleased to announce that the city's application for the Google's fiber -- or Fiber for Communities Program was submitted last week by Scranton's IT Department. Just to provide some background on this program that Google is currently looking into providing for a community, essentially Google has plans to deploy an ultra high speed broadband network in a community that is still yet to be determined. This ultraspeed broadband network would be up to 100 times faster than what is available in the area at the present time. If selected for this program, Google would install millions of dollars worth of free technology right in our own backyard.

With this being said, the ultra

speed high -- the high speed -- ultra high speed Internet service that Google would provide will be offered to residents a very low competitive cost as to well as to government institutions, private businesses and academia alike. I see this program as being a benefit for both the residents of the city as well as businesses if Scranton is fortunate enough to be selected. If Scranton is able to engage in the technology upgrades that Google would provide through this program, it could have the possibility of attracting more jobs, more businesses, more industry, especially in the IT sector.

I first became aware of this program through attending a presentation held by Miss Durkin of the Night Foundation over at the University of Scranton, actually it was both myself and Mr. Loscombe who attended that presentation that night and subsequently from there Mr. Tim Moran, who is currently a large advocate of the project contacted Mrs. Evans which she so gratefully setup a public caucus for him to come in here and explain this program to us.

Mr. Moran along with the assistance of others has established a website that the public can visit if they would like to know more about this program. It's called www.thefibercity.org. Also on the website under support one can find letters of various CEO's, president of corporations and elected officials that have written letters in support of it's initiative. I, myself, am one of those elected officials who did write a letter in support of the initiative.

In addition to this, Mr. Moran has also setup a Facebook group in support of the initiative for those of you who are listening that are a member of Facebook social network I would ask that you become a member of the support page for this group and you can do so by going to the FiberCity.org webpage and you will find the Facebook link for the site there.

As it stands, there are many communities that are applying for this.

Obviously, you know, you would be -- it would -- I don't know why no one would.

It's a free service. Google is planning on

going and installing a lot of free technology into the community it selects, so the more support that the city gets the better our chances and the more support that we have the better the chance that that program could come to Scranton.

one citizen's request. Good evening and I apologize for my

I'd like to begin with an announcement, in the next few weeks PPL Electric Utilities and it's contractor, Asplundh Construction Corporation, will begin the process of maintenance upgrades to

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aged power polls and lines in select areas The first section to be of Scranton. completed starts near the Pennsylvania Turnpike, runs across Keyser Avenue and ends at the Scranton Expressway. Throughout the years several other sections are slated for improvements and council will notify the public of that work at such time as we receive further information from PPL. project will involve replacing aging wooden polls with new wood polls and in some cases steel polls. Also, wires on old polls will be replaced with new wires. The voltage of the lines will remain the same, however, PPL will make every effort to keep disruptions for residents to a minimum. next, a few items of business. Mrs. Krake, in addition to the four proclamations for West Scranton High School students previously requested, I would like two other proclamations for Justin Ambrosia, a sophomore student who achieved all-state band for wind ensemble, and Gloria Dudek, a junior student who achieved all-state concert band for percussion. These six

proclamations can be presented by council on the same evening.

I would also ask for a proclamation to honor James Kennedy, as the longest serving district judge in Lackawanna County. Magistrate Kennedy has enjoyed 34 years on the bench providing the residents of his Scranton district with his unparalleled style of wit, wisdom and justice and compassion. And, Mrs. Krake, I'll provide you with a contact numbers for these three individuals following tonight's meeting.

Next, I would like to send a letter on behalf of Scranton City Council to the HUD inspector again requesting a meeting at his earliest convenience to discuss several issues including grants, employment and loans and other matters that arose in the Scranton Office of Economic and Community Development within the last few years. Only recently I learned that the inspector had visited the Scranton office in January 2010 and had I known of the inspection I would have requested a meeting at this time.

Also, with my colleagues agreement,

please send a letter to Mr. Frank Swietnicki requesting his attendance at a public caucus on April 6 or 13 at 6:00 to discuss city benefits of the Google pilot program and anticipated department needs in 2011. Also, request mayor's permission for Mr. Swietnicki's attendance and include a reminder that Mr. Seitzinger awaits the mayor's permission to attend a council caucus as soon as possible.

Now, one of the best news articles lately is that the once Pinebrook

Neighborhood Association is being revived by Mary Chilipko. Mary is a hard worker, a true public servant and an admirable community activist. She has never requested or sought anything for herself, not even a thank you. Rather, she works for solutions within her neighborhood. Mary's strength, resilience and commitment to helping others are inspirational and motivational to not only the residents of Pinebrook, but to all of us who reside in the City of Scranton, and city council is anxious to assist Pinebrook and Mary. Yes, you, Mary, in any

way possible.

Like many of you, I was also pleased to read in Sunday's paper that local government officials agree that contracts should be bid. When Mr. Doherty first became mayor he increased the bidding threshold from \$10,000 to \$20,000 thereby eliminating many contracts and services from the bidding process.

In 2004, when Mr. Courtright and I were first elected to city council, we drafted and passed legislation to lower the bidding threshold back to \$10,000 and that was done in conjunction with Mr. DiBileo. At the time, I also insisted that professional services should be bid, but was met with opposition from some of my council colleagues who argued that the mayor had a legal right to award no bid contracts particularly for professional services.

Thus, my professional services
proposal died and only the decreased bidding
threshold survived. However, Mayor Doherty
vetoed that legislation which then died
because there was no fourth vote or

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supermajority on council to override that On March 2, 2010, this council introduced it's only legislation to once again lower the bidding threshold from \$20,0000 to \$10,000 and this legislation passed unanimously on March 16, 2010.

Council developed and lowered the city bidding threshold prior to the indictments of county officials for alleged no bid contract improprieties. first time the mayor has not vetoed council's legislation and is finally ready to reconsider putting professional services out to bid. Therefore, with my colleagues agreement I would like to send a letter to the mayor and to city solicitor Patterson requesting the drafting of legislation which requires that all professional services shall be put out to bid. Council respectfully requests a written response on or about April 20, 2010, in the spirit of cooperation to benefit local businesses and the taxpayers of Scranton.

I also am aware that the Pennsylvania Economy League or

representatives thereof intend to schedule meetings with members of Scranton City
Council to discuss a revised Recovery Plan and, Mrs. Krake, I know that council has been invited to attend such meetings at the office I believe of PEL in downtown
Scranton. They are providing either evening hours or daytime hours, but in response on behalf of council I would like to send a letter to PEL requesting that those meetings be held in council chambers rather than in their headquarters, which I believe is located at the corner of Wyoming Avenue and Lackawanna Avenue.

In addition, I would like the meetings to be televised and I would like all of the stakeholders present at the meetings, those being, for example, the mayor of Scranton, all of city council, representatives of each municipal unions. I think we should be having these round table discussions publically since the Recovery Plan will have an impact on the citizens of Scranton or paying all of the bills and I also feel the time is certainly come for all

of the stakeholders to have a seat at the table and I think can only benefit the process and the people of Scranton to provide transparency for those meetings rather than conducting them in offices, minus all of the pertinent parties.

Finally, city council would like to wish everyone a very happy Easter and a blessed Passover, and that's it.

April 16. The judge limited it to 20 pages, so it sounds like a lot, but it's not when you write. There was quite a bit of testimony and I'm very confident that we will succeed.

On 7-A and 7-B, I believe it was

Mr. Morgan a few meetings ago commented on
the original Administrative Code as adopted
which gave the mayor the power to appoint to
various authorities, boards and commissions.

However, that was amended as a result of the
action of council of the mayor, Mayor

Connors vs. the council. Council adopted
legislation where the term governing body
was used that council would have the right
to make the appointments to authorities,
boards and commissions.

As a result of that, there was a stipulation entered into in the trial before Judge Corbett that then amended -- that stipulation was then adopted by ordinance amending the Administrative Code which gives council the power to appoint members to authorities when the mayor does not timely make the appointments. As a result, it was

my opinion that the appointment that the mayor made to the Scranton Redevelopment Authority was not in compliance with the ordinance and that as a result of that council had the right to appoint Andy Sbaraglia to the Scranton Redevelopment Authority.

The situation is a little bit different on "B" with Mr. Piccolino in that wherever there is a resignation and not a termination of an appointment that council has the right to fill the vacancy, and it always has. That's an opinion from Judge Nealon involving the Scranton Sewer Authority and at that time I believe there were seven different nominations to fill vacancies on the authority and the Scranton Sewer Authority.

As a result of that, some of the appointments were held invalid. The one appointment that was held valid by Judge Nealon was appointing council's appointment as the governing body to having that power to replace -- to make the appointment to replace someone who has resigned. That's

the distinction between A and B, and as such I believe the council has the right to make both of these appointments.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Attorney
Hughes. I just wanted to add that often
times in the past, and I think we can go
into not just the last decade, but we can
probably return to the 90's as well, some of
the appointments to boards and authorities
have been political appointments for one
reason or another and I just wanted to
assure the public and explain the
appointments that council is making very
quickly.

These individuals, Mr. Sbaraglia is a community activist. He has attended numerous SRA meetings. He is a retired individual. I believe him to be a man of integrity and honesty and that is not to cast dispersions toward anyone else, I'm making solely a statement regarding Mr. Sbaraglia and the intention of that appointment is to open the door to the authorities. The authorities have been less than cooperative with city council, with

providing information to city council, with attending public caucuses of city council.

These have been ongoing problems for many, many years now and I feel that the appointment of Mr. Sbaraglia to the Redevelopment Authority will serve to put a dedicated, honest, average individual who is abreast of all of the situations in the City of Scranton, the problems that we face, and by so doing he will be let's say drawing the curtains and letting some sunshine in and just not in terms of city council, but so that the people of the City of Scranton can at long last receive information from these authorities as well. Roll call, please.
