1 (Pledge of Allegiance recited and 2 moment of reflection observed.) 3 MS. EVANS: Roll call, please. MS. CARRERA: Mr. McGoff. Mr. 4 5 Rogan. MR. ROGAN: Here. 6 7 MS. CARRERA: Mr. Loscombe. 8 MR. LOSCOMBE: Here. 9 MS. CARRERA: Mr. Joyce. Mrs. Evans. 10 11 MS. EVANS: Here. Dispense with the 12 reading of the minutes, please. 13 MS. KRAKE: THIRD ORDER. Go right 14 to clerk's notes if that's your pleasure, Mrs. Evans? 15 16 MS. EVANS: Yes, please. 17 MS. KRAKE: Under clerk's notes 18 tonight council has asked me to speak a 19 little bit about the Pittsburgh Plan. 20 have eight properties on the agenda that 21 their total bid price is \$49,000, the total 22 acreage is 9.23 acres, and they are all 23 being purchased by Robert Kolankoski of 24 Dupont, Pennsylvania.

The Pittsburgh Plan itself is a very

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fair way that the city can use for someone to buy the property that has gone through a city tax sale. We have highlighted some of the parts of that. The first part is an individual needs to go to the Assessor's Office to obtain the map number of the property that they are interested in purchasing. After that, they need to go to the City Treasurer's Office to determine if the property is tax delinquent. The third step is to go to the Clerk of Judicial Records in the Lackawanna County Courthouse to confirm that the property was taken in at the tax sale, the date of the tax sale, and if it is available for purchase.

After they gather this information they take it all through the law department here in city hall. There they will obtain a bid proposal offer. They then contact Nasser Realty and they assume the appraisal cost of \$175 for the land, \$220 for property of the structure. They determine the completed bid proposal offer which now contains the appraisal to the law department. There they must bring forth

\$100 deposit to the law department. This is not refundable. The bid proposal must then be approved and accepted by the city treasurer, city solicitor, city planner, and the city engineer. The city reserves the right to reject any bid and if a bid is rejected the deposit will be refunded. The proposal then gets presented to city council where it is now in the form of an ordinance.

If the ordinance passes favorably and is approved by council and the mayor, the purchaser will be instructed to retain the services of a lawyer in order to search the title to the property and make preparations for Court approval of the sale and validation of tax title. The next step is the petition for tax sale -- excuse me, for tax title. Those steps are outlined in the form, but truly this is where a lawyer is needed and there is no substitute for sound legal advice as it's stated right on the form.

After all of these steps have been completed, then if all creditors are either compromised or paid, they get the deed from

through the city free and clear which is
then filed at the courthouse and they send a
copy of the filed deed to the law department
so it can then close it's file.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: You are welcome. We do have some responses tonight, Council. Our first is from Tom Welby from ECTV. He has answered five questions that were brought forth by a resident of Scranton. He has answered them in their entirety. I don't know if you needed them to be read, Mrs. Evans?

MS. EVANS: Yes, I think it's an important enough issue for the viewership of ECTV.

MS. KRAKE: Okay. First answer -the first question actually is, "Why doesn't
ECTV broadcast the Scranton Redevelopment
Authority meetings?"

Their answer is: "It seems that the Redevelopment Authority meetings are often reschedule or held at a time that makes it difficult to tape. I am told that an effort is being made to record and playback those

meetings. It would helpful if council could encourage them to hold their meetings in chambers. While they air city council, commissioner, school board, zoning meeting, ECTV also airs an extensive mix of locally produced programs including many that were previously produced by Scranton Today."

Their next question is: "How much are the people paid?"

Their response is, "One of the persons does work at ECTV. John Darcy does not take a salary, and the other employees' salaries are confidential at this time."

The next question is about who owns 114 Wyoming Avenue. "The space is occupied through the Mall at Steamtown. The terms were not available. The space is available for public use, although at this time the staff is it not have available time to conduct tours. ECTV is producing local programs for local residents and groups and organizations. Interested parties can contact ECTV with their program outlines."

The fourth question: "Did the money they spent on the church renovations get

paid back or did Mansour and Darcy keep these dollars?"

"The renovations were done as a reciprocal agreement for rent. The actual rent payments would have been more than the value of the renovations. It is unfortunate that the challenging made to the zoning board forced the wasting of that investment, particularly when a church and business were allowed there previously."

Four -- or, excuse me, Five, "Please find out why there is no ECTV website. They promised video so we can see this on the website two years ago."

The response is: "The grant funding that would have provided for the equipment was challenged and delayed. The cost of the piece of equipment needed to stream video is forthcoming."

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We also received a response from Bill Courtright from the Single Tax Office. Our first question to him was whether we could include our rental notices to landlords along with real estate

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bills. He tells us that he is not sure if-their solicitor isn't sure if it's legal to
put anything in with the tax bills since the
outside company does this for them, so he
suggests that perhaps in the future our
solicitors could discuss this issue.

Next, they are answering the question about a breakdown of the property taxes paid on the noneducational facilities, the University, Marywood, Lackawanna College, Johnsons College and the Commonwealth Medical College. He tells that he truly needs that information from the Assessor's Office, so we did send a letter to John Foley, and he called our office. is the head of the Assessor's Office for Lackawanna County. Currently, they are in the process of compiling this list of properties that are assessed to these five different nonprofits and as soon as they get them we will then forward it to Mr. Courtright and continue this process.

We next have a response from Brian Swanson, the city engineer, concerning 1541 Bulwer Street. Per our request, he has

investigated the drainage complaint related to water entering the sidewalks via handicapped curb cuts on the south side of Bulwer and Northern Rebecca. He tells us as there are two existing drains on Bulwer and the opposite side of Rebecca, and a drain on North Rebecca just before the intersection, it appears a low bituminous curb with short ramps to transition to sidewalk grade would be sufficient to address the problem.

MS. EVANS: I'm not quite certain that I fully understand that response. If he is recommending any remedy or if he is basically saying as it exists there should be no problem when, in fact, there is a great problem. The property is flooding during every rain event.

MS. KRAKE: I believe he is saying if this low bituminous curb with short ramps were added then that would address the problem, if I'm reading it correctly.

MS. EVANS: Okay, then I would think that we should a letter to the DPW requesting that this work be done. I know that they often times install curbing for

residents in various sections of the city and if for any reason their response should indicate that they aren't able to remedy the situation, then I would like to know the name of the company that made the curb cuts and the current curbing if, indeed, there is any to speak of. I'd like to know who did that work because I believe that, you know, any company working within the city is responsible to return property to it's original condition following completion of the work.

MS. KRAKE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We received a response from the Sewer Authority concerning the same property and they indicated that it was not their responsibility. They felt it may be the responsibility of the homeowner and that's a little different than what we received from our city engineer.

We have several responses from Chief Elliott. This is concerning speeding on Cedar Avenue: He has contacted the patrol division and they plan to conduct speed

enforcement details at this location in the near future.

The next from the chief is concerning the used tires that block the sidewalk on the 400 block of Willow Street. He said he will have officers look in this situation and also advise Mr. Seitzinger to have inspectors look at any violations in this block, also.

The next from the chief are answers to several requests regarding traffic in the area of East Mountain. We have officers monitor the area, requested and enforce violations when noticed.

He has forwarded the complaint of drug activity to the special investigation unit to look into 207-209 Fifth Avenue.

The area of West Elm and the 25 mile per hour speed limit is difficult to enforce due to the area that it's in, however, he has instructed officers to monitor and do what whatever is necessary.

Four: The area of 16th and Division

Street has been a long-standing complaint.

He says, "We have monitored the area for

years after receiving these complaints," and they will continue to do so.

We also received a rather lengthy response from the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation from Mr. Tom Picarelli. If it's council's pleasure I will read it, it is concerning the signalized intersections to improve the safety for pedestrians, particularly the disabled and the elderly.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MS. KRAKE: Based on a cursory inspection, several items are in need of repair and maintenance to ensure the traffic signals operate according to the permitted plan. We would like to remind the city that repairs and maintenance of the traffic signals is the responsibility of the city. If the city would like a department to do the detailed inspection listing these items, please let us know and we will write a detailed report. Please note that current ADA standards would require some modifications to these intersections.

He makes the following suggestions:
Repaint the slightly worn pavement markings.

Provide handicapped push buttons and countdown pedestrians signals to replace the existing equipment. Reprogram the controller with a leading three seconds to the pedestrian phase. This will give the pedestrians a few seconds lead time to step off the curb into the intersection so that parallel traffic can better visually see the pedestrians thus the vehicles are more likely to yield. Police enforcement will help encourage vehicles to yield to pedestrians in the cross walk.

Currently, audible pedestrians signals are being used at the Lackawanna and Wyoming. However, some of the audible indications are missing. As with the other intersections, the visually impaired pedestrians are using them, Lackawanna and Penn and Lackawanna and Washington, audible pedestrians signals should be permitted and installed since they currently do not exist.

If the city would like to proceed with these improvements other than maintaining the signals according to the current permit, please provide the

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department with the original resolution and application to modify the existing signal permit and provide the department with a letter of financial commitment.

MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake, I think copies of that should be sent to the DPW, to Chief Elliott, to the business administrator. I know that the administration was purported to hire a private company who would now be addressing all of the traffic lights throughout the city. That work and the painting of crosswalks had previously been performed by the traffic maintenance department of the City of Scranton which no longer exists by means of the mayor's latest budget, so I think this report also should be forwarded to whatever firm the administration has chosen to perform those services at this time.

And we would like an answer back from each department as soon as possible because I believe the council is very interested in pursuing this, in making the proper alterations at each one of these

intersections to provide for the disabled population of the community.

MS. KRAKE: Yes.

MS. EVANS: And so if we can ask for a response on or before May 20 or 21 and if we can also ascertain if PennDOT will charge the city to perform that assessment or if it's a free service if there is a charge what is the dollar amount of the charge so that that can also be provided to the business administrator.

MS. KRAKE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: And we have some that we have not received responses to. The first is from Mr. Barrett, which is unusual, they normally answer on time, concerning the debris and the drains on Essex Drive.

The next is we have not received an answer to those five questions that were also posed to Mr. Darcy, board president of ECTV.

We have not received a response from the mayor, but his letter was also the same when the one we sent to PennDOT that we did

receive a response from.

MS. EVANS: Okay.

MS. KRAKE: We have not received a response from Mr. Renda, business administrator, about the information council regarding the annual cash contributions from the city to the Lackawanna County Heritage Valley Authority.

We haven't received an answer in writing from Mr. Dougher, Director of the Parks concerning when the movies are scheduled to be shown. He did call our office to tell us that is on the website, but that was all that he would say.

We did not receive a response from Mrs. Moran, Director of Human Resources, concerning our question, "Is there a system in place to store health care claims by active and nonactive employees?"

And we have seven letters that have no response from Mark Seitzinger, Director of License and Inspections, and the nine letters to the director letters to the director of DPW, Jeff Brazil, they have gone unanswered.

MS. EVANS: As for the DPW, I think we'll ask Mr. McGoff if he can continue to oversee that situation, perhaps he could if he is available meet weekly or biweekly with Mr. Brazil to discuss these issues and then report back to council as to Mr. Brazil's response and the resolution of each of the problems of the people of the city.

MS. KRAKE: Thank you. That's all.

MS. EVANS: As for the others, we will submit them one more time, but again, I'm asking that we maintain all of this paperwork within department files so that council can better keep track of what work is being performed by department heads and within each department and what they are failing to address.

MS. KRAKE: That's all we have.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs. Krake.

Do any council members have any
announcements at this time?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. West Scranton

MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER, CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker is Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, 7-A for consideration by the Committee of Finance for the adoption of Resolution No. 15. Wasn't an energy audit done when we changed our heating system in all the buildings? We went from steam heat when they went bankrupt to gas heat? They must have did an audit then?

MS. EVANS: I would assume some type of review would have occurred.

MR. SBARAGLIA: You better believe because I remember even Honeywell got the contract for the controls for all of these things, but the thing is, is this a company that's going to say buy the gas from this person or this place or the electricity from this or that or is this somebody that's going to say you need this or you need that?

What kind of a -- what kind of a performance are they going to perform in this energy audit?

MS. EVANS: Well, from what I understand they will do the analysis and make recommendations, but they are not involved in any manner in the selection of any companies to be hired thereafter. I believe that this company that is conducting the analysis will be paid through a grant and much of the work that would be performed thereafter will also be funded through a grant.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Okay. So it's mainly to get information that we probably have tons and tons on, but it's redundant.

Okay. The University of Scranton, they have many some grandiose plans on that road from Mulberry Street. How many ramps are they planning to build to go across Mulberry Street? I didn't see a ramp at all in their design. And you can't put that many -- I don't know if you really familiar with what happens down there when the University kids get out and they go down

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there even when they got cross down on where the old, I guess the old -- you know, it's a Woman's center that they had down there and the other building they built and then the other building, it's a mess. Unless you put ramps across we are going to make a heck of a problem with the students crossing there and not only that, we all know what happened on Linden Street, that's gone. We can't afford to lose Mulberry because that's a direct link to the hospitals and the outlying for that matter, so I don't know when it's going to come up, but it will come up before you and we are just wondering how many ramps they plan to build there to take care of the kids and get them cross safely above the traffic.

Okay, now, on your lots, how do you
-- several. How did you interpret several,
the word several. How do you interpret
that?

MS. EVANS: Several?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Yes, there is a broad meaning. How do you interpret it because you are --

MS. EVANS: Well, it's --

MR. SBARAGLIA: -- under the
Pittsburgh Plan it requires several. And
several, you know, could be almost anything.

MS. EVANS: Well, I would say several has to be three or more, but I would say that it's certainly not a countless number. In other words, I think if you are getting up to let's say 15, 20 from that point on you are listing it, so several I think, yes, it's nebulous, but I think it's leaning towards smaller numbers.

MR. SBARAGLIA: The main thing is when these lots come up you require several readings, I just wondered how many readings you plan to have.

MS. EVANS: Three.

MR. SBARAGLIA: So you are just doing like it was an original. Now, I looked at your thing, the insurance company doesn't give an appraisal, they just tell you what lots are adjacent to it or around it. Well, and since they are all the same, I mean, they list them as 20,000 to 30,000, the lots around them, we know this is 1-A.

Now, I don't know where he got it, but that's the buildings around there, the surrounding lots, are going from 20 to 30,000. And we got bidding for eight, six and so on and so forth and so on. Did somebody actually go up and check them lots out? I hope you would before you vote on it.

MR. LOSCOMBE: You mean us or the appraiser?

MR. SBARAGLIA: No, you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Oh, okay.

MR. SBARAGLIA: When they were going away Short Avenue we went up and checked.

MS. EVANS: Yes, I remember.

MR. SBARAGLIA: We walked that whole area there and I think before you vote on this you should actually go up and see what you are voting on. Now, like I say, I'm not against selling lots, it would be stupid to be against selling lots, I'm just saying let's try to get the most we can for the lots we are selling. That's all. That's all I would ask and that's probably a reasonable request that we look at the lots

1 and see actually, like I said, the appraisal calls for Nasser said 20 to 30,000 for lots 2 3 around them. I don't know, I didn't walk up I don't know how close they are no 4 there. 5 Lake Scranton up in that area or to Mountain 6 Lake or whatever there is up there because I 7 don't live there, and I haven't -- the 8 closest I ever went up there was above the 9 That's the closest I ever got up on that mountain. Oh, no, I shouldn't say 10 11 that. Ozzie Quinn. 22 MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn, Taxpayers' 23 Association. Good evening. 24 MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. QUINN:

I was going to speak

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tonight on ECTV. We had a forum with the state legislators from District 112 approximately two weeks ago and it hasn't been shown, however, after much wrangling, and I mean wrangling, which Dave Dobrzyn, our camera operator, will explain later on it was finally broadcast today. Now, this is pathetic, you know. I get e-mails and here's one I got: "How can I find when ECTV shows your meetings. I have had this problem in the past and it continues. Please help as an I cannot come to the meetings. Thanks so much."

This is getting ridiculous. Now, we have a illusionary public access TV. It is obviously set in place by Mayor Doherty because of his large debt and the Taxpayers' Association along with Mrs. Evans continually for the last year or two years arguing about how he is just spending and spending and spending and spending without any kind of conscience for those people who cannot afford their properties, you know, and as I see right now he wants float throughout bonds on his platform to try to

be state senator, the same as he is doing -what he did for the City of Scranton. When
he came into office we were \$30 million in
debt and now we are \$182 million in debt
principal only. If the people like that,
vote him in. I can't see it.

What I want to do, okay, I would like council, and I'm requesting you to try to open up these bids for a new public access TV bids, okay? The Scranton Taxpayers' Association is interested in putting in a bid and we will put a bid in and we will actually -- we would cover mostly what we could throughout the county, okay? This is -- this is what they want to do or when they want to do it and the only people if you stay up, if you're in a hospital or you're an if insomniac you'll get to watch our meetings. That's the only time you will get to watch them, all right?

So it's gotten beyond control and the problem lies because of the fact that Mr. Doherty is against the Taxpayers'
Association because we are without a doubt against what he has done to this city. He

has ruined the city financially, and he has ruined the neighborhoods physically and I hope that you can open these bids because I don't know if this is going to go on forever and ever just on his say-so. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Just to piggy back on the comments made by Mr. Quinn, council did receive in our mail today contact information from ECTV for public input. The telephone number is 570-558-3322. And then we go up North Scranton

Junior High. They haven't cut the grass all

year. We got a big holiday coming, they

will have memorial services up there and

there is a hay field. Gerry Langan will

love me for saying this, you know?

The other day there was traffic on Greenridge Street so I made a detour up Von Storch Avenue and I come down and they paved the 400 block of Marion Street. You know how bad are streets are in this city and they paved the 400 block of Marion Street? Has anybody drove up Greenbush Street

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lately?

MS. EVANS: No, but I know what you are saying.

MS. SUETTA: And coming down Reese Street, by friend lives up there she has a paraplegic and she can't get in and out with the poor boy and they are not doing nothing about it. And I --

MS. EVANS: What street was that?

MS. SUETTA: Greenbush and Reese.

MS. EVANS: Reese, R-E-E-S-E?

MS. SUETTA: Yeah. And I want everybody to get out and come down and support our troops because you know I am.

MS. EVANS: I do every year.

MS. SUETTA: I mean, I hope all the -- well, they will all be there now, the politicians, and really up on the 400 block of Marion Street there is Doherty signs up and down both sides, but why just that street when all of the other streets -- there was nothing wrong with the street, but he paved that one. And Greenbush and Reese, oh, my God, they are terrible.

MS. EVANS: Okay.

1	MS. SUETTA: And let's get after
2	Cordora for the Lace Works for that jungle
3	there. And, Janet, how come they didn't do
4	nothing about that hole across the street
5	from the Cathedral?
6	MS. EVANS: Well, your guess is as
7	good as mine.
8	MS. SUETTA: Because now the forest
9	is getting bigger.
10	MS. EVANS: They were told about
11	that.
12	MS. SUETTA: They didn't do nothing.
13	That was ashame that he wouldn't do nothing
14	for the ordination.
15	MS. EVANS: It is ashame. It's a
16	disgrace in downtown Scranton.
17	MS. SUETTA: Yes, it is. And just
18	get out and support our troops on Saturday.
19	See you down there, Jack.
20	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
21	MS. SUETTA: Have a good day.
22	MS. EVANS: You, too. Mark
23	Phillips.
24	MR. PHILLIPS: Could I give you
25	these, Janet, about the problem I was

talking to you about a year ago.

(Mr. Phillips approaches the dais.)

MR. PHILLIPS: Now, this problem is going back 16 years I had this problem, and the city put all kinds of problems on me.

There's the laws right here, how come they are not enforced? I'm a citizen. You pray to that flag. My father died in World War II in Korea. What kind of laws do we have? I go to school, I read the same books.

Here, read this. No wonder we have Oklahoma, Waco.

The Scranton cops saw that and I call them 16 times I got out of my cell phone. I got 50 pictures on this camera.

Now, they give me excuses. Ignorance of the law is no excuse if you ask me. You make the laws and we pay \$60,000 for a chief of police, and ask Janet she was there when I had this problem several years ago. No action was taken. What kind of city do we live in? I got a handicap, I never used it.

Now, I'm using it. If I had to get an injunction there was no parking in that alley. I will pay the \$1,000.

MS. EVANS: Now, can you provide us though, we have the pictures, but can you put the address on these?

MR. PHILLIPS: 331 Preston Place in back of my house.

MR. ROGAN: It's right off the corner of Luzerne Street, I spoke to him on the phone the other day and I drove by to check it out as well.

MS. EVANS: Okay.

MR. PHILLIPS: Now, he called the cops -- he called the city for 16 years on me. I had a car taken and a boat taken.

Now, the last one on there is my citation.

If you get called too many times you get citations for overgrown grass, abandoned vehicles, so I don't call. At the bottom of the page there is a telephone number that says Scranton cops. They lied to me. It says "Private Property". Anybody who owns a house knows there's no property on the roadside. How stupid.

And there was a nursing home right by there. There was an accident there last week. You talk about safety every week, the

health and welfare of the people. I live in that school zone by there, there is the middle school and West Side High School.

There was three accidents almost last year.

It look me 16 years to get that piece of paper. What kind of city we live in? Common sense tells me something. I'm not stupid.

MS. EVANS: No, you have a copy of the Scranton code here.

MR. PHILLIPS: How come it's not enforced? I called 16 times in the past three weeks. You want to see my cell phone?

MS. EVANS: Oh, I believe you. I think if we have Mr. Loscombe --

MR. PHILLIPS: How about the DPW won't even come down. Are you going to do anything about these city employees? I went down there to get a "No Parking" sign and them cheered me when I said that and they sent me down to get the sign put up. They come for 16 years, oh, you need a sign there. I paid \$110,000 for a driveway, that guy got a free driveway. Why should he have a free driveway?

1 I was out there shoveling snow with 2 that big snow storm, he was throwing right 3 where I shoved. Eight hours. And on the last three my citations they had a meeting, 4 I got citations. The sidewalks on that 331 5 17th Avenue you can't even walk on them and 6 7 they gave me citations for safety. What a 8 city. There is a person right there. 9 want to walk up and down the sidewalks and I 10 called that safety after he got there. Now the 16 calls that 11 MS. EVANS: you made were to all of the same individual 12 13 or to various departments? 14 MR. PHILLIPS: 911. 911. You had to call for patrol car 911 or he else you 15 16 don't get one. Ask that cop here. 17 MS. EVANS: Well, actually, we don't 18 have a police officer in council any longer. 19 MR. PHILLIPS: There is one right 20 here, ain't he? 21 MS. EVANS: Well, he is an off-duty 22 police officers who attends meetings as a 23 private citizen. 24 MR. PHILLIPS: I think that, you 25 know, for overgrown weeds that's a serious

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thing with a vehicle, motor vehicle. I
think the motor vehicle overrides everything
else.
MS. EVANS: Were you
MR. PHILLIPS: This is going 16
years now.
MS. EVANS: Were you warned before
you received
MR. PHILLIPS: No.
MS. EVANS: No?
MR. PHILLIPS: No. That's after I
took pictures.
MS. EVANS: Okay. Well, we are
going to look into this, Mr. Phillips. Do
you need these back now?
MR. PHILLIPS: Yes. And the
pictures if you want copies.
MS. EVANS: That would be helpful.
Because I know
(Mr. Phillips approaches the dais
and some of the conversation was inaudible.)
MR. PHILLIPS: This is the cars I
have here. That's the house inspectors.
The new one for the one the other two of
them they inspected and the sidewalks that

are on here -- I'm going to make copies. 1 2 You owe me \$5. 3 MS. EVANS: I think I can handle that. 4 MR. PHILLIPS: Here you can have 5 that. 6 Oh, thank you. 7 MS. EVANS: MR. PHILLIPS: Thank you for your 8 9 attention. 10 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 11 (During the time Mr. Phillips was 12 speaking, Mr. McGoff enters council 13 chambers.) 14 MS. EVANS: Les Spindler. 15 MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, 16 Council. Les Spindler, city resident and 17 homeowner and taxpayer. I want to start off 18 with the story last week about the 19 University of Scranton putting \$33 million 20 into a project on Mulberry Street. If they 21 can spend \$33 million on a project and all 22 they give our city is \$100,000 a year, to me 23 that's a darn shame. They buy up property 24 after property, don't pay taxes on it, and 25 here they are putting \$33 million bucks into

one project and they only give us \$100,000. I think council should make an ordinance, any time a nonprofit buys a property now they have to keep paying taxes on it whether they build something on it or not or else we are going-- the city is really going to fall apart, but we won't be known as Scranton, Pennsylvania, we will be known as the University of Scranton, Pennsylvania.

Last week there was an article in the Doherty newsletter about Detective Pat Tobin having charges dropped against him. Chris Doherty said that he fired Detective Tobin. That's one of many lies of Chris Doherty. Detective Tobin retired, he was not fired, but that's the shoddy reporting in the Times-Tribune.

I want to read a quote from the

Doherty newsletter from last week about

having to do with your Court hearing, "Chris

Doherty said that it distracted the

administration from doing our daily tasks."

Well, what does traveling the state campaigning for state senator do? That doesn't distract him from doing his daily

tasks? I think if you looked up the word hypocrite in the dictionary Chris Doherty's picture is there.

I don't know if council saw the story also week about the political signs being picked up by DPW and Jeff Brazil went onto say that they were being taken from the right-of-way and they are not supposed to be there. Well, that's not totally true. People made posts on the Doherty Newsletter website saying their signs are stolen from the front yard. Sounds familiar, doesn't it, like the DiBileo signs being stolen? And Jeff Brazil went onto say, "Show me pictures and I'll fire them."

I don't think they with ever to that, because there is two city workers on videotape stealing DiBileo signs and they are still employed to this day, so this administration they are not going to fire any of their employees no matter what they do. They just get away with everything they want.

Let's see. Okay. I have spoken before about the Linden Street and

1 Washington Avenue, the garage down there, and it's still in terrible shape. The job 2 3 they did is terrible. It looks like they are almost done. Was anything ever sent to 4 Director Scopelliti? 5 MS. EVANS: I don't know. 6 MS. KRAKE: I can check into that. 7 8 MR. SPINDLER: Okay, if not could we 9 get --10 MS. EVANS: Absolutely. 11 MR. SPINDLER: Because if you look at if from Linden Street and it looks like 12 13 something of the bricks are buckled, they 14 are not even, and still they're different colors, different color concrete in-between 15 16 there. 17 MS. EVANS: Well, they are not 18 really bricks. 19 MR. SPINDLER: Well, whatever, it 20 needs to be --MS. EVANS: It's like a facade 21 22 that's applied to the building. 23 MR. SPINDLER: Next thing, a 24 neighbor of Daron Northeast approached me 25 today and said this happened today, there

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was a steam shovel at Daron Northeast, they put the shovel -- the operator put the shovel on the ground and just rubbed it back and forth making a loud annoying noise just to bother the neighbors there, they said this went on for four, four and a half hours, and I asked if they called the police, they didn't. I would have done that But to me this is harassment. right away. I think it might be a violation of our noise ordinance and this is just it's uncalled The operator is doing nothing, nothing constructive, just rubbing the shovel back and forth on the street across from these people's house and they said when they leave their house they stop doing it.

So it's just meant to harass these people and I think something has to be done. These people have gone through heck for years now and they can't keep putting up with this. To me this is definitely harassment and these people have to be cited and, I mean, fined really heavily I think. I think that's all I have. Thank you for your time.

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MS. EVANS: Thank you. Mrs. Krake, I had actually spoken with the neighbors who were directly effected by the shovel action today. If we could please send another letter to Daron and to Mr. Seitzinger and attach that -- or attach the noise ordinance to that again, you know, we have been through this at council before. It's not simply a matter of excessive noise is prohibited prior to 7 a.m. and after 10 p.m., it's also prohibited during daytime hours if it's effecting any resident. anyone, let's say, is within 40 feet or of hearing distance of this. So if we can please send that along to both Daron and to Mr. Seitzinger so that this matter can be addressed and that we don't have this type of situation occurring every day throughout the summer until the month of the August

MR. MORGAN: I'm sorry, Mr. Morgan.

I'm sorry. I jumped ahead. My apologies.

It's actually Ron Ellman's turn.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Ronnie Ellman. I have an announcement. When somebody sees me at the Chines buffet eating please leave me be. I had a man last week on Wednesday night I went to the that new Royal, which was excellent by the way, and he wouldn't leave me alone and he was mad that I talked about Brenda Williams. He said, "What does Brenda Williams have to do with the council?"

It's people and Brenda Williams as far as I know was a member of the community and good standing, you know, I wasn't taking sides on the issue, but I just don't know how people get such bad attitudes about everything. I shouldn't say that, should I?

Next, it's about this greedy, shameless bunch at the University. When I read they are going to have 400 apartments up there, they are going rent them out and we are supposed to subsidize them. When is something going to be done about this? You know, gee-whiz, that's a rental unit. Let them pay taxes like the rest of us, you know, these priests from that administration

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they have never talked to someone that lost their house like I have on those 200 houses in the paper last Friday. I bet they have never sat across the street at Mulberry Towers like I have talking to a widow that's lost her house.

All they want to do is take, you know, it's not right. They don't pay taxes, so they don't know what it's like for someone that lays bricks or pumps gas, they just don't -- they just don't associate with They are just -- I have talked to one of them. One of them give me the dickens about me getting up here talking which didn't shut me up, you know, but there is a solution to this. And if you listen to me for a minute North Little Rock there is a little river runs through it between -through Little Rock like the Susquehanna, just a little tiny river. About 25 or 30 years ago North Little Rock put up a hydroelectric dam, and I guarantee you they didn't have no money, they must have got it from the government, and that brought the electric prices down so cheap all they did

was advertise all electric trailers and houses over there and then sell the electricity. Now is the time to investigate this with all of the energy crisis and all of the money that's going to be available for things like that. You got dams all around you here that could be used. And I'm sure that this could be investigated and found out that a city can do it where an individual can't. The only reason I know a little bit about the one down there is I knew a welder on it that I used to talk to that he was over the project. And I just don't see why it wouldn't be feasible for this city.

You know, the administration I think they gave them like 700 million for wind, they are made in China. They don't even make them over here. I saw it on the news program. All that money that Obama got for those windmills we are not getting it, but they make hydroelectric equipment in this country and the people and the engineers and everybody wants to put people to work and put people to work in this country and not

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worry about China, but I don't know.

You people, I think the honeymoon is off with me and the council. You've just got to do something about this administration. You know, every time I go out I talk to people and it's just reached a point they just -- there is not -- tax wise there is just no more money left with the way things are around here. I saw in the paper they said the median is 41,000, it's not 41,000 in this town, it's probably -everybody I talked to makes, you know, they tell me they make 15, 20,000. You know, there is no -- I've never talked to people that -- working people that are making big sums of money. That's why there is 200 foreclosures in the paper last week and that didn't even make a dent in it when you get that big sheet from the sheriff's office, you know.

Well, I wish council would -- there is good laws on the books. It looks like there is something could be done about these three universities. They are killing the city, they are killing the tax base. After

the meeting you and me can go to the Diamond Club and we'll talk about this. We'll take Boyd with us. He looks like he is interesting. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Ron, don't lose faith in us. You see we are fighting continuously, but there is a lot of things that are being done that takes some time. I mean, from the beginning we have actively looked into, you know, our nonprofit status and stuff like that, it's not something we can just pass an ordinance, there is state laws, but we are not alone in this. The nice thing is there is other areas in the state, other cities that are fighting the same fight which gives us the little bit more clout, so you will be seeing something coming down the road.

MR. ELLMAN: What if 1/4 of Chicago was nonprofit? They couldn't operate 1/4 of anything. It's a impossible ratio, you know, and there is a bunch of phonies out there getting nonprofit status. Look at Friendship House. They had 241,000 to give the mayor to pave streets, people that

donated their money take it off their income tax to Friendship House and not to give to the city to pave streets. That was nothing about a crooked deal. There is no other way to explain it, it wasn't a straight deal. That goes on with this administration every time you investigate. Nobody will tell you nothing. You are trying to get Mr. Renda under that Sunshine Act to tell you something he refuses. Maybe the FBI can squeeze it out of him because I can't. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.

MR. MORGAN: 7-A, Andy spoke about it I believe before, about these energy audits and I agree with Andy, I have seen this on the agenda before and my position is maybe we should just table it. I mean, if we don't -- if the grant is going to be spent in a productive manner why spend it because then all we are doing is wasting money. Let's take a look a what all of the other audits said and let's see what we have

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done as far as they city is concerned to comply with those audits because if people are going to send us grant money and we are just to keep wasting it and then we are going to complain about our taxes and about mismanagement of government maybe it's time to make a change in direction and just end it.

The other thing is ECTV. Now, Ozzie got up and spoke about ECTV. Now, I believe under the contract we are allowed to have more than one public access channel. think we are allowed to have two. I don't know what the new contract is going to say, but I think it's important for the council to understand that there was another slot and I really do believe that the Scranton Lackawanna County Taxpayers' and Citizens' Association should really be given an opportunity to take the other channel like we asked for when we -- we did ask for access to that channel and I'm not saying that ECTV isn't doing a good job because, you know, I'm not going to come here and just try to just pound on people. It's just

they are -- I don't think the city has given them any money this year, I'm not absolutely positive on that, I think they are operating on a shoestring. I think that that's why it's so vital that we take the franchise fee like I suggested and break it into three so it goes to the public access channel, now, if there is two public access channels, maybe we should divide the money. But, you know, we ought to do something, like I said once before with youth programs or remedial education and the senior citizens' centers in this city, but I think there is definitely a need for two public access channels without a doubt and it would be a great benefit to the citizens of this city.

I know that the Citizens'

Association could get the job done. I think there is awful lot of people that have an interest to come forward and help and I just think it would be a win-win situation and I think that we should -- the tax group should be given that opportunity because that's what we function as a Citizens' Association.

We are non biased, we are open-minded on all

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issues and I just think that really that's the way to go.

And the other thing I have is, you know, we have two real problems in this One, in my opinion, and there is many, but just two that I'd like to bring up tonight is that we need to do something in regards to youth programs in the city and we also need to do something with the budget so that hopefully my contention here is that maybe we can, if the council agrees, form an advisory group to council that it's only function would be to help with the budget or to help to create youth programs in the city because I don't think that council can do everything and I don't think that we should necessarily say that council is guilty for all of the problems we have, but I think it would be productive to reach out to the residents of the city and ask them to form a committee under the control of council so that they could advise council on what their opinions are and then let council make it's decisions on what they find because I think the budget is a vast document with a lot of

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information inside of it and I think that we if could get some accountants and people knowledgeable in those areas and bring them forward they could give a lot of good knowledge and information to council and the same thing with youth programs.

Maybe there is, you know, there was a lady to that came to council and asked me to be appointed to the seat you now hold, Mr. Loscombe, and she volunteered all her life, she asked what would a council person do. Janet, Mrs. Evans, you answered her question, but here is somebody who has volunteered over and over and over and again and there is lot of people in this city that are willing to do that, but I think we should -- I think council should offer to let them come forward and help them with our problems. That's all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Joseph Kokowicz.

MR. KOKOWICZ: Could I give you a copy of these?

MS. EVANS: If it's -- is that your

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information?

MR. KOKOWICZ: Yes.

MS. EVANS: Okay.

(Mr. Kokowicz approaches the dais.)

MS. EVANS: Thank you, sir.

MR. KOKOWICZ: On the first page that you look you see they have about the taxes. Seven, ten, and it's on both sides. It's added into the sale price of a house. They were never paid out-of-pocket in advance, so then you go to the second page on the left-hand column, county taxes were paid for three months and the city and school taxes were paid for three months. Then you go down to the bottom right-hand corner, and you will see taxes were paid for the whole year \$999.00, \$283.00 and \$170.00. That's all in one property in one year. gave you the second page which showed the taxes were paid on April 17 where this was sold on April 13. I paid taxes on one property two and three-quarter times, and I'd like to know where my money is, if you could ask Mr. Courtright to look into it?

MS. EVANS: Yes. I can keep these

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then?

MR. KOKOWICZ: Yes.

MS. EVANS: Yes, I'll certainly take this to him.

MR. KOKOWICZ: And the agreement was that I was only supposed to pay a quarter of the taxes, so that means there is two and a half times the amount of the taxes and money missing, and then if you still look on the second page you will see for a transfer of the mortgage \$1,696. If you go back to the first page it says the mortgage was paid off \$48,000 so how can I transfer a mortgage when there is no mortgage to transfer and they charged me \$1, 696. Where did that money go to? So that brings a grand total of \$4,800 and some dollars missing.

I can't get no answers. I went to everybody. I went to the realtors, I went to the lawyers, I went to the DA's Office, I went to the Attorney General's Office, I can't get a answer. That's all I can get down at the tax office is a copy of the taxes were paid and no back taxes due on it. It was the taxes were paid on April 17.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. KOKOWICZ: The house was sold on April 13. April 19 I go down the deed's office I find a deed in my name for \$68,000 plus interest, three notes on it, plus collateral is taken out on April 19. I can't find out who put that in my name and I put the house that I sold on April 13 up for collateral. Without my permission someone did this. I have the paperwork on me.

MS. EVANS: Can you also leave your number with Ms. Carrera and maybe she can even make copies of the other information.

MR. KOKOWICZ: Oh, I have a ton of it. More than that. That's all I have. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much and we'll be in touch with you.

MR. KOKOWICZ: All right. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else who would like to address council tonight?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave

Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton, member of the

Taxpayers'. I may need a little extra time here because I have an accounting of the issues with ECTV and they're somewhat lengthy. I would just like to read them off and finish it. Hopefully we will have time for my golden parrot, but okay.

On 4-29-10 we had a meeting on a Thursday, John Keeler, Kevin Haggerty, Ken Smith, and Bob Lesh did not respond to registered mail. The time was about one hour and 42 minutes and some seconds. On that date I purchased a VHS tape. My camera uses mini-DVC which is at best the best compatible medium for ECTV and it's been spoiling the tapes a little bit so I just have to -- I had a cleaner bought and it didn't work and so forth. Okay.

Well, late that evening I recorded it the DVD to the VHS. I make both a tape and the DVD. The VHS was submitted at 2:30 p.m. 4-30-10. I did include a note on Friday with the phone number asking me to be notified of any problems. I didn't have any expectations of hearing on that day, you know, it was pretty late already and I

expected Monday.

About 4:30 on 5-3-10, Monday, Mark called and said the sound levels were too low, suggested replacement. That evening I recorded a DVD to VHS using a graphic equalizer in-between on seven to boost it and on 5-4-10 at 5:45 a.m. in the interest of getting it down there I dropped it off in the slot and asked for proper notification of suitability.

On 5-5-10 I guess it was then, I asked Anthony what was up and he said that Mark wished to speak to me after the council meeting. Well, I did go down, but Mark wasn't there and I went home and left a message or whatever to call, a verbal message, and on 5-6-10 approximately 4 p.m. Mark finally called to notify me the second recording was also insufficient on sound and asked for a DVD, which was submitted that evening in a case for protection, and I visited there about 5:00 p.m. and no one was there and I knocked and dropped the DVD off.

On 5-7 I called at 1:30 p.m., that was I guess last Friday, and reached John.

He said Mark would be there -- be back at about 2:30 p.m., so I rode the bus to town, I don't have a car during the day, arrived about 2:30, stopped at the Wyoming studio, knocked and no answer, returned at 3:30 knocked, still no answer. I went home. I just gave up.

Over the weekend 5-9-10 I was called by Ozzie Quinn, Kevin Haggerty, and I told them only what I knew that I could not answer suitably especially to Mr. Haggerty on when it would be broadcast.

On 5-10-10 approximately 3:30 p.m.

Mark called and asked for the master DVD,
so, okay, I went down to the studio at 4:30
p.m. and was told the DVD was incompatible.

Mark did show me on the computer screen,
however, I'm not a trained videographer and,
you know, whether it was something I didn't
know or he didn't know or whatever, the
software program was incompatible possibly,
whatever. But at that time I was offered
to -- I offered to resubmit another VHS with
maximum volume on the EQ which I did about
9:15.

I felt that Mark was defensive at an earlier meeting and somewhat condescending. He also stated that VHS in his opinion had deficiencies any further it would not be used, the broadcast would not be used. I did not accuse or argue, I went home and recorded a new tape. I also was told at that time that tape number two was incomplete, which was inaccurate. I reviewed all submissions at least briefly using fast forward and at 9:15 on that date, yesterday.

I resubmitted the third tape with a somewhat firm note without any foul language or any accusations of my feelings and my time approximately already I had 10 to 15 hours on producing the taxpayers and the 10:30 p.m. Mark called back to my house yelling about the note and asked if I was kidding about the note and the content of the note and proceeded to say I can take my crappy tape and at that time I shut him down and said, "This is the end of the conversation," and hung up the phone.

I didn't care at this point. I

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really didn't care. My only sense of loyalty is the taxpayers. I promised them I would do it and I did it. The phone rang again and awoke my wife so I pulled the cord out. At 5-11 at 11 p.m. I turned onto Channel 19 and the taxpayers was on recorded on 4-27-10.

Finally, I received comments and content of other meetings like my God were mad on bad content and bad activities and so forth. I reviewed the contents and established that I was busy at the camera. I was blamed that I didn't rush over to defend the situation. That's when I feel the relationship started to decay, but I had no control over what Mike Osborne's opinion was and I did review that because I keep the back issues and I watched what I was doing and I had just refocused the camera, so I was busy, you know, and I bought that camera because I just couldn't catch onto a piece of equipment that I was using every three It wasn't practical.

I viewed several ECTV products over the last night to this morning with the

various sound levels from very low to okay, i.e., Scranton "U", no mics in the audience for questions and Dave Decosmo, who I do like, I really like David Decosmo, I like his broadcasts and I do watch them, he had a low sound level. It was lower than what I had.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Dobrzyn, I'd appreciate it if you could commit this log and these problems to writing in and give

MR. DOBRZYN: Yeah, I have them in writing right here.

MS. EVANS: And give it to Scranton City Council.

 $$\operatorname{MR}$.$  DOBRZYN: Okay, I'll met you after the meeting.

MS. EVANS: Yes, it's an issue I think that we do want to look into. It's one of the numerous issues on the plate --

MR. DOBRZYN: I want to point out to you, also, when we taped you people for the election you were played twice at 3:00 in the morning.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

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MR. DOBRZYN: Now, the thing that makes me sick, the most sick about television, regular television, is when I got a candidate that has 50,000 ads on I know it's costing millions of dollars that's the guy I vote against. I follow the money. They get the golden parrot award of the week when I see too many ads on making the other guy look like, you know, sinister and whatever.

But, you know, I've had mishaps, I have a little bit more here. interjecting commentary, with the one time a plug popped out and we lost audio and we had crackling audio, I was very embarrassed by it, but I took it on myself and hooked up a microphone into the system and rerecorded it and, you know, so it wasn't on ECTV's -wasn't getting blamed for it and I'm an amateur, you know? I don't know much about this. I started filming the taxpayers two years ago and also I have recorded Steamtown events except -- and expect for Christmas train, which was there, I was told they weren't interested. I have six hours of

tapes, cost several hundred dollars to go on those trips, and I have to take Miss Riley with me, of course, but it's not about me.

Those tapes -- I don't even care on those tapes.

MS. EVANS: No, I understand. You volunteer, you have given very generously of yourself and --

MR. DOBRZYN: Yes.

MS. EVAN: And time and your own financial efforts and, as I said, if you can just give us all of this in writing.

MR. DOBRZYN: Certainly. Certainly.

MS. EVANS: This is something we want to document and we want to take a look at and --

MR. DOBRZYN: I did also view that twice. I'd appreciate if they would spread it out a little more and you have to turn the television up, sorry that I'm an amateur, but that's the way it goes, you know?

MS. EVANS: Well, you know, the ideal solution here in my opinion would be that ECTV would be filming these government

programs whether it's something, you know, involving government itself like the Redevelopment Authority, the Recreation Authority, etcetera.

MR. DOBRZYN: Yes.

MS. EVANS: And that they broadcast all government meetings in terms of the elected officials who conduct meetings, but these authority meetings are just as important, many times more so, and the Lackawanna County Taxpayers' Association is certainly another meeting that is worthy, and particularly at election time it is very important that the voters are able to see at regular programming hours the results of public forums and debates, etcetera, so that they can make an educated vote.

And so we are going to take all of this into consideration and we need that documentation, and if you can provide that that would be great, and I'm going to ask though that you would hold your parrot award and perhaps do a double parrot next time.

MR. DOBRZYN: Okay.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.

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MR. DOBRZYN: Well, at any rate I'm going to cheat a little, it's for (unintelligible) I mean, Blair Petroleum, I mean. British Petroleum for their callous disregard for life and limb and the environment. Thank you. Have a good night.

Is there anyone else who MS. EVANS: would like to address council?

MR. TALIMINI: Joe Talimini, Scranton I haven't been here in the last three or four weeks, but I haven't been neglecting you people. I have been doing a lot of time with some of the black community, some of the elderly community and an awful lot of the young community and it appears that the election of Mr. Rogan and Mr. Joyce has had a great impact on the young community because they very, very interested in learning more about the city and that's remarkable.

MR. ROGAN: That's good to hear, Mr. Talimini.

MR. TALIMINI: And one of my favorite subjects, of course, is that temple up on the hill, the University of Scranton.

We have given away Linden Street. I know this is not going to be very popular, but I'm not about to give away Mulberry Street. I'm sorry. I mean, you people can do what you want, but I'm going to fight this tooth and nail and I hope I can get a lot of other people behind me to fight this tooth and nail. As I mentioned a few weeks ago, this University takes in over \$184 million a year. That's just in tuition. They also take in a considerable amount of grant money, gifts, donations and everything. They would like to take credit for the DeNaple's Center, which they did build, but with whose money? You know, I mean, enough is enough.

Now, they want to take in that kind of business, which is understandable, they are going to take over another whole block directly across from the street from the DeNaple's Center. Now, I don't know if the people in this town are aware of the fact but Mulberry Street is main thoroughfare. There are ambulances and fire trucks and police cars running up and down there all of

the time. The police cars mostly at night because of the University of Scranton. I mean, I think they teach stupidity 101 to this kids and they are passing with flying kids because they don't cross at intersections, they cross in the middle of the street wearing dark clothing, usually half-loaded after they walk out of the bar and/ARPB I said in a newsletter just recently, you know, if it wasn't illegal I would like to make claim on road kill and I'm not the only one who feels that way. There are an awful lot of people who are disgusted.

Now, I hope you will recognize the impact that this is going to have on Mulberry Street. You are going to put up a high-rise building there. You are going to have 400 additional students. It's bad enough in the daytime when you can see these kids. At night, they will run back and forth across the street.

They have a security force up there and I think that security force does an admirable job. I have driven by there on

many occasions and seen two or three of them standing on the corner talking to the girls while a fight is taking place a half a block away, but you call the Scranton Police Department because that's what they are for. Now, I don't know how much they pay these guys, but if they are paying them over a dollar and a quarter an hour they are being robbed because that security force up there is useless. And the Scranton Police Department is providing protection for them. The Scranton Fire Department is providing protection for them.

And our mayor has the nerve to tell us that they gave us \$100,000 last year. My math isn't that good, but \$100,000 on \$184 million that they took in just from tuitions doesn't seem like a very reasonable donation to me, but I'll tell you what if I could get that kind of money I would like to buy Mulberry Street, I would like to buy Lackawanna Avenue and maybe you can even sell me Washington Avenue. For a 100 grand I think that's a pretty damn good investment and I hope this council has the backbone to

stand up to these people and fight them tooth and nail because if you don't I will be fighting you tooth and nail. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Talimini.

MR. JONES: Okay, I'll say hi. Good

evening, Council. My name is Bob Jones,
Scranton resident and member of the
Taxpayers'.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. JONES: I'd like to start off with a little bit of humor. Last Sunday a good friend wished me a Happy Mother's Day. I won't get into why.

I wrote down for ECTV again, why aren't the Taxpayers' meetings even shown live? Why do we -- Ozzie Quinn works all month to organize these and to get people together to come to them and, well, like he said, he is just being snubbed and I see everything on there from Betty Boop cartoons to Doherty's home movies and, well, ECTV should just give up the ghost. Give it back to Scranton Today, that's my opinion.

And I'd like to thank Mr. Loscombe

for bringing up the noise ordinance and they really are enforcing it, so on Parker and Main, here's a warning for you, if you want to shake, rattle and roll, nobody is going to get in your car because there is nothing but old people that live there, so nobody is going to jump in your car and think you are cool over it. So thanks, Mr. Loscombe, and just a warning there, if you want to shake, rattle and roll all night you will find a cop there and thanks for cops, too. Sit in my driveway if you want.

Also, yeah, I was hearing a story about Daron Northeast. I'm not going to say any fancy words, you were told to get out of town two years ago, move it. You shouldn't even be there and you are harassing that lady and, well, without fancy words get out of town before the whole city gets involved and you don't want these guys on you, either.

And again, ECTV's number in case you want to call it, all it is is an answering machine, almost guaranteed nobody will answer it, but if you want to fill it up

their number again is 558-3322. If you want to call them again the number is 558-3322. Fill up the answering machine for them, will you? Ozzie Quinn will thank you for it. All right, thanks. That's all I got to say.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,
Council, Marie Schumacher. First, I'd like
to ask Mr. Loscombe if you ever got the
statistics on the number of individuals who
have been arrested in the city for buying
drugs?

MR. LOSCOMBE: No, I haven't received that yet. I still have a couple of things I have to get together, too, but I'll check on that again.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I certainly would appreciate it, because if it's illegal to sell, it's also illegal to buy and I know they have to -- the police have to witness a number of trades before they move in and arrest somebody, so they obviously know who the buyers are, and I think it's patently unfair. If we didn't have buyers the seller would go elsewhere, so I think it's time

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that we start enforcing both sides of that illegal transaction.

MR. LOSCOMBE: If I could see you after the meeting. I just want to get some more information from you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Sure. Thank you. And quick on ECTV, I don't know why it is that the county is able to have streaming video, I can go on there and review any of the tapes of any of the county meetings, why that is not possible for the city. believe that ECTV gets \$1,000 a month from the county, but it was this city that gave them the \$100,000 to buy all of the equipment and it would seem to me that you shouldn't have to be a Comcast customer to be able to view them, you should be able to sit down at your computer and view the meetings.

Also, their proposal, they were supposed to have workshops so you could borrow this equipment and use it to make productions after you attended these workshops so they could help you, and again, you can't even get them to answer a phone

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let alone the workshop so I would like to show what the status of these workshops are and if they are ever going to comply with what they promised in their proposal which I understand was accepted as written.

And now I'd like to move to what I really -- what really is on my heart today. I still think, and I don't know some of you weren't here back a couple of years ago, it was February when a man by the name of I believe it was Paul Mealy, I may have that wrong, but came to this podium and spoke and it was really quite tragic because his house had been done condemned, he lived on Dickson His house had been condemned for I Avenue. believe it was something like fleas on his animals or something like that that had gotten into the house and his house was condemned. And when the house was condemned according to the BOCA Code the entire house has to be brought up to spec and the city had one of the utilities cut off and they left the water on so there was no heat in his home, that was an extremely cold February, the pipes burst, his basement got

flooded causing him a whole lot more damage than he originally needed and then he had all of these other things, of course, to bring the house up to code. He couldn't afford to do it apparently at that point in time and then there was a fire at his home and I don't know if it's even happen

habitable now.

But I just tell you that because that was a tragic set of circumstances, but I understand that the BOCA Code is amendable be by the municipalities and I would like to ask that you take a look at that and have the solicitor see, now, I know there are some things that are absolutely safety related. I can see if you go in and if something is a matter with your house and it's condemned for one reason, it may be something outside and then they come in and they look through your house and then you have to come up to the current code, you have to have all of your outlets in a certain place. If your wiring is right and you if have been living there and you're happy with it, I mean, I could sell a house

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to somebody and they could move -- buy the house, move in and the house may not be totally up to code, but one infraction that results in a condemnation what it's actually doing I think is why we have a lot of abandoned structures in this city.

People are not allowed to live if their house is condemned for something they have this huge expense in bringing everything in the house up to current code, you all voted recently to probably increase the cost even more with the current code and so what happens? People can't afford to do it, they abandon the home and I think you really need to look at it, I think only, and I'll just take one more second here, is change that section of the code so that an area like Scranton where most of the houses were built a long time ago, safety items, yes, but not everything up to every single code. All you are doing are forcing people out of their homes, so I would appreciate if you would like into that. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: We will. Thank you.

MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening,

Council, Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment Rights. Last week, Council, you suffered the loss of your battle to save the taxpayers \$700,000. You didn't get a chance to cut the budgetary fat from the budget, you know, like the mayor is going to do when he goes to work for the state. Your loss was disappointing, but it wasn't a surprise. It would have been a surprise if you won it. It wasn't in vein. You showed us, we, the people, the taxpayers, that money could be saved. We know who is looking out for the taxpayers and who isn't.

Also, for your critics, the ones saying amending the budgets, saving the taxpayers \$700,000 and then getting sued by the mayor of the city, stopping the taxpayers \$700,000 savings cost the city legal fees. This is what we have a law department for to fight the city's battles and not pay \$600 an hour for outside of attorneys to fight the city's battles like the ones who will be getting paid for the new violation by the city of the SIT clerk agreement with the city police union.

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Last week, Council, you also won one for transparency. Four out of five of you voted to conduct your meetings with PEL in This is great. I hate to be public forum. the one to tell you, but they will never meet in public. They don't want the public to know what they are doing since in my opinion they don't do anything. They don't do anything but collect paychecks. the 19th year the city has been in distressed status. Ten years of the Connors' administration and nine years of the Doherty administration. For 19 years PEL has been the coordinator of the Recovery What have they done to get the city out of distressed status? Funny, but I can't think of anything of merit, but tons of money they made over the years. forget, if the city still wasn't distressed they would be out of a job.

In my opinion they have done nothing while the mayor violated a Recovery Plan PEL implemented. They did nothing to reign the mayor in from his 25 million in raises and new hires since 2002. They did nothing

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while the mayor borrowed and spent us into a 360 million long-term debt that our grandchildren will be paying for the next 35 years. Our children and grand kids don't deserve this.

Of course, Mr. McGoff voted yes and no for public meetings. What does that mean? Yes, and no.

Now, onto the budgetary fat. million to 400 million in long-term debt. 35 million Scranton Parking Authority loan, when that's paid back 59 million will be paid back in interest. 267,000 wasted on repairs to the Casey Parkway that was torn down because it was declared unsafe. million in raises, okay. 5.5 million that was an American Anglican arbitration loss. Third highest wage tax in the state. \$4,200 a month rent for OECD office in the Life building. That's \$50,400 a year and for seven years translates into \$352,000. 300,000 for Christmas lights. 72 million bond secured in July of 2003. A million paid for AAA rating. 50,000 a year to Genesis Wildlife. 48,000 a year for hand

scanners, that translates into at least 300,000 for the last six years. 7.5 million bonds for PPL lights. Millions for outside attorneys. Forced Channel 61 out of city hall in favor of higher priced ECTV. Forced out a hundred employees, white or gray-haired employees in 2002, paying them full benefits and hiring 100 new employees to replace them paying full benefits.

They cut the SIT clerk grants writer out of the budget violating the SIT agreement in the police contract only to add 20,000 more to the police department budget in the professional services. They forced the police union to go to arbitration because the police contract was violated.

And a question I have is I bet you can answer without counting your fingers or your toes how many times did the city file grievances against the police or fire unions, and remember you can't use your fingers or toes. Eliminated the traffic division and they give out the work for a private contractor. I believe there is more lights out now than I have ever seen.

And that's only a small amount of the budgetary fat. There is more, but no time to give them. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council? Fifth order. Mr. McGoff, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. MCGOFF: Please. Last week I was asked if I would contact Mr. Brazil at the Department of Public Works with requests that had been made to him and which had not -- to which he had not responded. I did that. I received the list of requests and I met with Mr. Brazil. Just to briefly say he said that any of the -- all requests would be looked at, we went through them one by one. Things went on and he put them onto a list and that all of the requests would be addressed in some way.

He also mentioned that it's not necessary to call council with citizens' requests. If a citizen has a request for something that DPW can do please call DPW. All calls will be answered, all requests will be considered and looked at. There is

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no need for letters from council in order to get these requests listened to.

And just to again briefly, some of the more specific ones that we talked about and I'm kind of doing these in the order that -- by date that they were on here. of the requests that we talked about was: "No Parking" driveway signs. There were a couple of requests that people wanted for Mr. Brazil's response was that they receive numerous requests for their signs, for those types of signs, and that the signs are expensive to make and to install and that they cannot install a sign at every private driveway in the city. It would just be far too costly, so their policy is that they are not putting any new "No parking" driveway signs. If there is a problem, the proper thing to do would be to call the police and whoever is blocking the driveway would be cited.

The second thing that had been brought up was the collection of garbage and recyclables at commercial establishments in the city. Garbage is not collected at

commercial establishments, however, the DPW does collect recyclables and the reason they do that is that this goes towards credits with the state that grants for public works are some are based on the weight of recyclables collected, and so it's beneficial to the city to actually collect recyclables from commercial establishments that, in fact, do recycle.

As far as the paving list,

Mr. Brazil said that that is being

addressed, they are trying to put together a

list. He is somewhat reluctant, I don't

want to say -- I shouldn't say reluctant.

As far as putting a list together and saying

that certain streets will be paved at a

certain time, he doesn't really feel that he

wants to do that because people would

then -- if, in fact, something happened that

they didn't get to the paving at that

particular time then people would become

more irate.

MS. EVANS: Could he at least provide a list of the streets to be paved?

MR. MCGOFF: Yes, and he said that

they are in the process of doing that and they would try and as streets are paved that he will try and get a specific list of, you know, streets for the next segment of paving with the dates and/or probably dates for completion.

Also, the other thing that they have to be aware of is the funds that are being expended with the paving and so they can't project too far into the future.

As far as there was a something about 500 block of Rebecca Avenue, a two-way street when the other lots of Rebecca are one-way only, he said he does not know what council would need to do or what people -- what someone would need to do would be to check the ordinance as to why that exists. It must have been -- it must have been done by ordinance and when and why he is unaware.

Speed bumps. Speed bumps, the DPW will not put speed bumps on city streets.

He said the basic reason is that it's a liability to the city. Any damage that they might inflict upon a car while they may -- while it may be a safety procedure, any

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damage that may be inflicted on a car going over a speed bump would -- the city would then be liable and it's -- even though it might be posted and, you know, whatever, that it's just -- it's not a practical thing to do because of the liability.

And anything with the -- there was one on traffic lights at Lackawanna Avenue and Penn and Wyoming and North Washington, and he said that all of these are part of the overall signalization program which we have dealt with before, that seems to be in I don't -- I don't know where the overall program is at. That might be something to -- what, in fact, is going to be -- maybe a more pervasive answer -- or question not only dealing with these streets but the entire program and what, you know, is there a -- is there something that -- is there some plan that is in place and, you know, that we can have a timetable for all of these, so that might be a better thing to look into and I can ask him about that. didn't think to do that at the time that we are going through these.

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The handicap curb at Duffy Park and the corners of the Harrison and Crown and paving the Unit block of Crown Avenue, they are weighting on this because the design for the Harrison Avenue bridge has not been done and there is thought that the depending on what design they come back with, where they put the bridge and where it starts and ends and how it's going to be done would effect all of the -- it would effect part -- it would effect the 100 block of Crown Avenue and I guess what they're basically saying is that until they get something from people doing the bridge, the design for it, they would like to wait on doing anything, especially the paving of the unit block of Crown Avenue. They said there may be some real substantial changes because of what they

Let me see. Oh, two or three more.

Moosic Street "No Parking" signs on Moosic Street. Again, Mr. Brazil is unaware of any ordinance and in order to put up signs he would need the ordinance for "No Parking" in order to place the signs. The

want to do with that bridge.

other -- and also this was responded to back in October when we -- a response was sent to -- this same response was sent to the Clerk's Office in October and --

MS. EVANS: But the signs originally were there and DPW removed those signs and so we are just asking for them to put the signs back up there.

MR. MCGOFF: Well, like I said, that part I'm not unaware of. He said that he would like -- if he sees the ordinance, you know, if he is provided with the ordinance then, you know, they will look into doing that.

The other issue there, and whether it's real or not, but very many residents along Moosic Street park on the street.

Again, many of the them park on the sidewalk in that area, so I don't -- I'm not saying that we shouldn't look into this and they shouldn't be there, but I know many of the residents would be extremely inconvenienced by "No Parking" signs up and down Moosic Street.

MS. EVANS: I don't think they meant

the length, the entire length of Moosic Street.

MR. MCGOFF: Well, it was from
Prospect to Meadow which is pretty much
the-- it only leaves out the 100 block,
that's from the 100 to the ten hundred
block, so that would be pretty extensive.

And the last one dealt with the 200 block of North Cameron Avenue and the flooding problems. Mr. Brazil said that they are not working at all in 200 block of North Cameron, that that was a separate project that was being done by someone else, that the work they were doing was in the 500 block of North Cameron that they were doing something with the flooding problems.

MS. EVANS: So the DPW was addressing the flooding problems in one block of North Cameron, but not another, someone else is addressing it?

MR. MCGOFF: Well, as far as he knew that there was some other -- whoever was doing some work in the 200 block of North Cameron. Again --

MS. EVANS: We'll have to try to

determine who that is.

MR. MCGOFF: Right. And anyway, I guess we can do that. I'm just relaying the response.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MCGOFF: And that was all. And again, just to reiterate that if people have requests for DPW please call during the hours that they are there and he said that all calls will be received and all calls would be -- all requests would be considered. Anything on that before we move on?

MS. EVANS: No. Only that earlier on under clerk's notes when Mrs. Krake had mentioned that there were additional problems that Mr. Brazil had not responded to, I had suggested that in your absence, this is a suggestion, that if you were able to talk to Mr. Brazil even biweekly to let him know about the problems of the residents of the city that have come to us and in that way just receive his responses directly and then you can report them back to the people. We appreciate that very much so since it

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doesn't seem to work well otherwise, so thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Okay.

MR. ROGAN: And while we are speaking about this, I received a call from Mr. Brazil a few weeks ago, we have been playing phone tag back and forth, we have been having a hard time getting in touch with each other, he gave me his cell phone number so I will be meeting with him in the next week as well about some other issues.

MR. MCGOFF: Okay. All right. second thing just to respond about, last week we didn't take a vote on meeting with I believe it was our feelings towards PEL. the meetings, and I never did vote against meeting in council chambers. I believe my response was that I thought we could meet both with PEL at their office and here. know we become somewhat incensed when people refuse to meet with us. I thought it was appropriate that since an invitation was extended to meet with them at their office that in the nature of gaining information that we could meet with them there and they

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could meet with us here, so I never did say I didn't want to meet with PEL to discuss it, I just thought that it would, again, in gaining information that we could do both, and that's all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman Rogan, any motions or comments?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. A lot of residents brought up a problems with ECTV today and the last few months I don't know, I'm sure everybody else in here has received complaints from residents about the volume, about the infrequency of the council meetings being run and, you know, I remember when I first ran for council we had the debate, we had candidates interviews for the Taxpayers' Association as well as the League of Women Voters and they were running almost on an hourly basis, and I thought that was great to get, you know, to give each candidate their time, to have their platform out on TV and people could listen to them and I would hope that ECTV over the next week would run these interviews and debates as frequently as they can because, you know,

forming the electorate is one of the most important aspects of having a public access channel.

Having the other programs, you know, they are nice, but the most important thing is for people to be informed. City council meetings, school board, Taxpayers'
Association, the Lackawanna County
Commissioner's meetings, different things with candidates, that's why we have this channel and that's why it's a great service to our community.

So I would hope that they would run these interviews extensively over the next week to inform everyone about who the candidates are for all of the elections for state senator and state representative.

I also have some citizens' requests for the week. I have received multiple calls from residents about the Crisp Avenue bridge and a few weeks ago we finally got approval from the DEP about it for the project and now residents are asking when would the project be put out to bid. So, Mrs. Krake, could we please send a letter to

Linda Aebli as well as Stu Renda regarding that?

And this is probably about a month or two ago, this would be a second request to Mr. Renda, asking for figures on how much money the city has spent each year for the last 15 years on paving not including federal dollars.

I have received a request that a resident wants a "No Parking" sign from here to the corner restored, it was a few months ago. The sign fell down and they said had they made several calls to the DPW and the mayor's office and it still hasn't been put up. That is on the corner of the Maple Street and Slocum Avenue.

A resident reports a branch falling down in the 600 block of Fig Street and it was stated that children are playing near and around the garage and it may be a dangerous situation. Can we please send a letter to Chief Elliott as well as Mr. Seitzinger regarding that?

And finally, I received another one about a blighted property on Moltke Avenue

1102. This property was on fire in October and now the property is in deplorable condition and the siding is blowing off the house onto the neighboring properties, so could we please send a letter to

Mr. Seitzinger as well as Chief Elliott making him aware of that situation as well.

And that is all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.
Mr. Loscombe, any comments or motions?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, I have a few. The first thing Mr. McGoff mentioned the recyclables for the commercial establishments, I don't know if that's -- if that's what we are supposed to be doing, but I recall from our hearing Mr. Brazil testifying to the fact that the commercial disposal companies have to turn in receipts to the city for any recyclables they pick at the commercial structures, so I don't know if this is selective if certain -- or all of the commercial areas are recycling through the city or how that's working. I think we should get some more information on that.

The other thing is I had mentioned

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before but we never pursued it, maybe Mrs. Krake can add this to the requests for information on the streetlights and stuff like that, the four and 500 block of Lackawanna Avenue since it was redone I think there is going to be some road rage problems especially coming from the four to 500 block. If you are in one lane there is a faded arrow for a right turn here but people are going straight. I don't know if they require overhead markings and I have also heard some complaints from tuck and bus drivers that are coming into the city that there is a sign that sticking out that they are clipping their mirrors on or something. I haven't had a chance to look at that, but if they can look at the traffic patterns there because it's a -- I don't know, it's a nightmare to me.

But, let's see, to go on. I did have a situation on Friday, I was able to get ahold of Mark Seitzinger so I wanted to thank him for his quick response. It was something that needed to be done right away and he did respond and did get back to me

and told me he had taken care of it, so I did want to thank Mark for that.

Also, our city forester, Tony
Santolli, who I believe volunteers his time,
he has answered several of our issues and
has responded even in letter form to us and
looks like Tony is still using the old
typewriter, too. We'll have to get him a
computer, Tony, but I did want to thank him
for that because he has taken a lot of his
time to help out with the tree problems and
stuff.

Last night I attended a meeting over in Weston Field. It was more of an impromptu meeting for the people who are affected by the flooding in the East Parker Street, Boulevard, Olyphant Avenue areas. They are in the process of having their properties bought out because they are below the floodplain there because of the levy on the other side. There was a lot of valid concerns and I think probably what prompted the main concerns was a letter that was sent out stating if they didn't accept the offer they were going to go through the process

of - -

MR. LOSCOMBE: Eminent domain. It slipped my mind. Thank you. And just the way, I think that's what upset a lot of people and the meeting I think was pretty productive, Mr. O'Hora was there and Steve, I forget ---

Eminent domain.

MS. EVANS: Garbarino.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Steve Garbarino, also, and I think that between the two of them they did answer a lot of questions. The meeting lasted about an hour and a half. There was a lot of good questions, maybe everyone wasn't satisfied with the answers, but I did want them to know that we were there to help them with any questions and anything we can do to help move it along, but it's in the early process for them right now so they have a few stages to go through yet and they were told what to do and hopefully they started doing their homework today and it will pursue along, but I told them we were available if they have questions or any help.

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And also for those of who e-mailed me or called me and I didn't get back to you in the last couple of days I apologize. I got a little bit behind. Usually I'm a little bit quicker.

And the last thing, don't forget next Tuesday is election day. Get out, get out your vote, and I would like wish all of the candidates good luck. Thank you.
