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MS. EVANS: Are there any comments?

MS. KRAKE: 3-C. MINUTES OF THE COMPOSITE PENSION BOARD MEETING HELD ON APRIL 28, 2010.

MS. EVANS: Are there any comments? If not, received and filed. Clerk's notes, please.

MS. KRAKE: The first thing we have is in doing some research in our office we came across an agreement that was made between the City and the Keystone Landfill and that agreement says that for the 30 years of the expected life of the landfill, which is also the length of our contract at Keystone, for every year starting in 2000 and continuing until the 2020, the city will receive a donation of equipment equivalent in value to \$100,000 per year. equipment will include motorcycles, Packmasters, police cars, section trucks and any other equipment necessary for the health and safety of city residents.

We did find that in the year 2000 the city received five police motorcycles.

In 2001, one Packmaster truck. In 2002, two police cars and one refuse section.

We then directed a request to Mike
Lynady, the fleet manager, to give us a list
of all our other equipment received from
this day up until -- that date up until now.
He replied that our request must go to his
director, Jeff Brazil. And I did hear also
hear in the mean time from Stu Renda that
for the past three years the city has
received nothing because the Director of
DPW, Jeff Brazil, was saving up for
something big.

(During Mrs. Krake speaking, Mr. McGoff takes the dais for the meeting.)

MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake, if you could please send a letter to Jeff Brazil and a copy to the mayor as well asking for what project -- or what equipment rather they envision becoming the purchase after three years of accumulated savings plus any additional years.

Further, it seems apparent from the research that was performed by our office, and I thank you very much for some excellent

research, the city obviously has the option to request equipment other than for the DPW. As you indicated, motorcycles have been purchased, perhaps police cars could be purchased, and so I'd like the information as soon as possible from Mr. Brazil or the mayor on the intended purchase so that council can determine if it, too, agrees that that is what it most necessary at this point in time.

I know we've had police officers purchasing their own police cars for several years now and I believe we they are the only municipality in the State of Pennsylvania to do that. Some people might call that creativity or thinking out of the box, I would call it humiliation and we should be purchasing police cars for our police department.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mrs. Evans, just to follow-up on that, I was thinking the same thing. Mr. Brazil is speaking for all of the departments or -- I mean, this should go through the police, the fire, all of the department heads if the equipment wasn't

1 specified specifically for DPW. I mean, I know the other departments sorely need 2 3 equipment, too, so if you could just maybe forward it to the other department heads. 4 Thank you. 5 MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Loscombe. 6 Mrs. Krake? 7 8 MS. KRAKE: Thank you. We have 9 several other responses. If I could, I might be 10 MR. HUGHES: 11 a glutton for punishment, but I think that 12 with that council should look into 13 legislation to maybe require before any 14 items are received from Keystone Landfill that has to come before council to be 15 16 authorized. And that way right now there is 17 a credit of over \$300,000 council would have 18 control over how that money is spent. 19 MS. EVANS: Thank you for that 20 suggests. 21 MR. HUGHES: I think we should have 22 the solicitor's office draft that 23 legislation and not me. 24 MS. EVANS: Well, then we shall make 25 that request, Mrs. Krake, of Solicitor

Patterson.

In addition, this has jogged my memory about I believe it's the tipping fee or the tonnage fee and we need legislation on that as well.

MS. KRAKE: Yes.

MS. EVANS: So if we can please remind the legal department that these are very important issues and council would like to see this in the spirit of cooperation coming before it as soon as possible.

MS. KRAKE: Yes. We received a phone call from John Darcy, board president of ECTV, and he wanted to let us know that the response we read last week from Tom Welby that he concurred with everything that Mr. Welby indicated in that letter.

We have a response from Officer

Herchik, the blight officer, and first he indicated he had received our letter concerning the property at 328 Prescott

Avenue. He then responded to investigate these issues and he attached an entire police report documenting the issues and the solutions and they are available to be

looked at in council's office if anyone in the public would like to review them.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: The fire inspectors answered our letter, and I must say within the same day that it was sent to them, very quick response, in response to our request regarding the fire which occurred at 1102 Moltke Avenue, October 22, 2009, the fire department released the property shortly after the fire. They say, "The fire department has no control over the current conditions which exist there and would suggest that we contact License and Inspections," which we did and we very have not received a response from them.

We also received a response from

Mrs. Moran, the Human Resources Director,

who is in response to our question, "Is

there a system in place to sort health care

claims by active and non-active employees?"

She tells us, "The active employees receive health insurance through Aetna.

Retired employees through Blue Cross and Blue Shield. By virtue of this fact, the

active retirees are not the same health care provider and they are detached from each other.

In addition, each plan is separate to isolate employees as dictated by their status. All monthly billing reflects claim charges by subgroup. Both Aetna and Blue Cross and Blue Shield provide the system with source claims by subgroup.

In closing, the accuracy is reviewed by the Human Resource Office, Office of Business Administrator, City Controller and the Health Care Costs Containment Committee."

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We received a response from Linda Aebli, Director of OECD, this is concerning the status of the Crisp Avenue Bridge. She tells us, "It's privately funded by the CDBG recovery in the amount of \$150,000. Since this funding is involved, the office will be required when all paperwork and plans are provided and approved and in place to prepare the spec book to include these requirements and place

a legal ad in the Times to bid this project.

Until that time, the Department of Public Works, Mr. Brian Swanson, the city engineer, have been overseeing it."

She then refers to her monthly report submitted to Councilman Rogan, that the permit was approved by the Department of Environmental Protection in April and submitted to the state. OECD placed signage at the sight stating the project is partly funded the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. If we have any further questions, feel free to contact her.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We also received a response from George Cornelius, Secretary of DCED. This is a concerning the grievance arbitration awards letter. He thanks us for our letter and appreciates council reaching out to inform them of our objections to appealing the grievance arbitration award.

"The city's elected leadership has an obligation to defend the interests of the city taxpayers against any arbitration award that is contrary to the provisions of the

plan. We trust that the city's elected leadership being mindful of the impact of the arbitration awards and council's fiduciary obligation to act responsibly to uphold fiscal principals of the plan.

Please extend to council DCED's appreciation for supporting the Act 47 Financial Recovery process, for taking the necessary steps to reestablish the city's fiscal health and improve it's long-term prospects. I appreciate how difficult the task is. I wish you the very best."

MS. EVANS: Well, evidently the gentleman doesn't understand that council was acting on behalf of the taxpayers and trying to save money, but by preventing such an additional appeal so the logic of the letter in my opinion is a bit out of line.

MS. KRAKE: Next we have letters
that have not been responded to in a timely
fashion, they missed their deadline. First
is from Attorney Kelly, second request
regarding "Do people pay a fee to park at
Nay Aug Park?"

We have no response to that.

MS. EVANS: Let's do a Right-to-Know on that then, Mrs. Krake, because we have been waiting now for months to get a simple answer yes or no and what they are charging if so.

MS. KRAKE: Yes. And this letter was sent to the Director of DPW, business administrator, and police chief and that was regarding the signalized intersections in downtown Scranton which need to be improved on none of them have answered or indicated any response to our request.

MS. EVANS: Let's send that a second and final time and we could indicate that if those administrators are not interested in the project then perhaps council would have to begin to move on the project singularly.

MS. KRAKE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We have not received a written response for Mr. O'Hora, the flood project coordinator, concerning the 200 block of North Cameron Avenue.

We have not -- a second request to

Mr. Dougher concerning at Nay Aug Park. No

written request on that, also -- or written reply on that, also.

Two letters addressed to the blight officer have gone unanswered.

MS. EVANS: Let's resubmit to the blight officer in that he has provided some responses, perhaps he is inundated at this point with blight issues since they are so widespread throughout the city.

The issue of Cameron Avenue, send a Right-to-Know on that, please.

MS. KRAKE: Yes. Thank you. We have three requests gone unanswered from the business administrator, one was a second request, one was a third, and the other one was a second.

MS. EVANS: Do a Right-to-Know, please. And let's closely observe the deadlines and should those deadlines be violated, as they have been in the past by the BA, then I would ask Attorney Hughes to take over the issue legally.

MS. KRAKE: We have ten requests to the DPW director, Jeff Brazil, that have gone unanswered, and 13 to the Director of

Licensing and Inspections, Mr. Seitzinger, that have gone unanswered.

MS. EVANS: Well, let's retain those in the files and certainly council is overseeing the work of the departments, we are not micromanaging, but we are observing what is being done, what fails to be done for the people of Scranton, and as a result let's say adjustments will be occurring in next year's budget.

MS. KRAKE: That's all we have.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs. Krake.

Do any council members have announcements?

Mr. Joyce?

MR. JOYCE: No.

MS. EVANS: I have a few. The weekly schedule for street cleaning is as follows: May 24 to 28, Oram Street to Washburn Street and May 31 to June 4 Spring Street to Oak Street.

MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker is Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, City
Council. Bill Jackowitz, South Scranton
resident, member of the Taxpayers'
Association, Master Sergeant United States
Air Force retired.

Memorial day, Monday, 31 May, 2010,

The Armed Forces Day parade was the largest number of participants than normal.

The crowd again smaller than it should be.

First of all, I would like to congratulate the winners of the primary

election and thank the other candidates for their time and effort that was put into the campaigns. Only one can win.

Secondly, I also would like to thank the police and Chief Elliott for starting the skateboard park and the clubhouse for the youths of Scranton, it is about time.

Lee Morgan has been speaking this for years, but then again, from what I understand this was mostly from donations, but again, it's a good start.

Serving in the United States Navy
you were responsible for your actions.
Serving in the United States Air Force,
United States Army, United States Marine
Corp and the United States Coast Guard you
were also responsible for your actions. The
time has come to hold the Mayor of Scranton,
Christopher A. Doherty, responsible for his
actions for the last eight and a half years
along with his rubber stampers council
members.

Mayor Doherty is not always correct, so anyone who votes "yes" for him all of the time is not voting for the residents, they

are voting for themselves and the mayor.

Also, the mayor is not always wrong either, so a "no" vote each and every time is just as bad the "yes" vote.

When Mayor Doherty took office the city was distressed, in debt and had no contact with the firefighters and police officers. Eight and a half years later nothing has changed except the debt has increased to \$89 million and the long-term debt, including the authorities' debt, has increased into the hundreds of millions of dollars. The taxpayers are responsible for the authorities' debt if they cannot pay it off.

Furthermore, Mayor Doherty paid \$1 million to get the bond rating raised only to have it lowered again to junk bond rating.

Mayor Doherty attempted to run and hide in Harrisburg, but was rejected.

Harrisburg politicians sent him back to Scranton and now the voters of the 22nd Senatorial district also sent him back to Scranton. Mayor, you have no where else to

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go except to the first floor office in city hall and work on the problems that you and your rubber stampers gave to the residents, taxpayers of Scranton. Get back to work for the citizens, not yourself, and please stop with the Business Weekly magazine article getting old and boring.

Scranton is a good place to raise your children. Juvenile crime is on the rise, violent crime is on the rise, mercantile taxes are too high and businesses are fleeing the city faster than the residents. Projects in the city are started, but very rarely are they completed. Mayor, you have no choice but to work for council and the citizens. You have three and a half more years left with this city council. I hope to see you in attendance at city council meetings, and I also hope to see you having your administrators also attend city council meetings so we can work these problems out. This is the best time. You got three and a half years to work together, let's start doing it right now.

Improve the neighborhoods. You have

tried to improve the downtown, you have had some minor successes. Scranton will never be New York City. No jobs and money available to draw people to the downtown. You are selling the city to the University of Scranton, Lackawanna College and now a medical college which, by the way, you had absolutely nothing to do with. Politicians in much higher positions were responsible.

I will be waiting patiently to see what type of jobs Scranton residents will be offered by the medical school, Lackawanna College and the University of Scranton.

As far as the 9,000 jobs that you so proudly stated that you created in Scranton, nobody bought that story in the 22nd

Senatorial District. Mayor Doherty, attend council meetings, work with council, but more importantly work with the citizens and taxpayers of Scranton, the city that you were elected to govern. You were not elected to governor, lieutenant governor, or state senator. Earn your pay and start turning the City of Scranton around. Find a way to negotiate the contracts, lower the

wage tax, bring in business other than bars and restaurants. Paint the streets, put more police officers on the street. May I finish?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. JACKOWITZ: And most importantly, have the distressed city status removed or file bankruptcy. Lee Morgan has also suggested that. You can run on your record, but no one has paid attention to your record and you were defeated by an overwhelming margin. Your accomplishments are very few. You have three and a half years to bring the city back by working with Scranton City Council, neighborhood associations, and the residents of Scranton. I hope you chose to do just that, not run.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner, taxpayer. Approximately a week and a half ago there was an article in the Doherty newsletter about the City is going to challenge the decision on the health care

arbitration, and the mayor read a quote -or he had a quote I'm going to read. "We
want to negotiate a settlement that will not
only be good for the bargaining members, but
also the taxpayers."

That's because all of a sudden Mayor Doherty wants to do something for the good of the taxpayers. If he really meant that they wouldn't appeal all of these arbitration losses which today to date has cost us over \$1.4 million as reported in the Times-Tribune last year, so it's probably more than that now, so he really doesn't care about the taxpayers, he only cares about himself.

Last year, again, the Times-Tribune reported about violent crime rising 19 percent in the city. Now, last week in the paper, "Violent juvenile crime is on the rise," and still we have beat cops. We still are not -- we are still not giving the test to put new beat cops on the street. I don't know what has to happen for the beat cops to be hired. I think Chief Elliott has to get on the ball here.

There was in the paper the other day, "Political landscape changing." Now all of a sudden the mayor he lost his bid to escape the city with the super majority against him, now he wants to work with council. "Mr. Doherty said last week he will respect council's wishes regarding the 2011 budget when next year's spending plan comes before lawmakers in the fall, meaning he won't take them to Court if they override his veto."

Well, Mayor, you can't override the veto. If there is a supermajority they have every right to override the veto and there is nothing that can be done.

Lastly, this is an old subject I brought up last year, I stated that there was a finished police report about the DiBileo signs given to Ray Hayes, Chief Elliott and Mayor Doherty and they were sitting on it, and it identified two city employees and council sent a letter to Chief Elliott. He sent a letter back stating that it's not a completed, there is still an ongoing investigation, I said that was a

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lie. A finished report was given to
Attorney Cullen, he gave one to Scott
Schaeffer for Channel 16 and Steve Corbett
from WILK, and I have documentation to that
effect right now. May I approach Council,
Mrs. Evans?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

(Mr. Spindler approaches the dais.)

MR. SPINDLER: As you can see on the bottom I have two names highlighted that were identified by two Scranton detectives and it says plainly on there, and in the back there are the reports from the people that filed the complaints. Now, it's there in black and white. Chief Elliott continues to say that he didn't have the report and he does, I think he has some questions to answer. I think he should be brought before council and if he doesn't show up he should be subpoenaed. And also maybe we can get the detectives in there -- in here to answer the questions if council would like to do that.

But, as I said, it's in black and white and there is -- I'm told by an

attorney there is a two-year statute of limitations on that, Attorney Hughes, is that true?

MR. HUGHES: I have no idea.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay, that's what I was told. One year is up now. I think they want to sit on it this report for two years and then nothing can be done, so we have one year to look into this now. So I would appreciate if council tried to do something. Thank you for your time.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Ronnie Ellman, member of the Taxpayers'. Those men that just left here are our enemy, they are not our friend. Just sitting here and listening to them they have are like thieves in the night and stolen millions of dollars of our tax money and property, and just sitting here with posters and their suits and soft spoken is not working. What we need is money. You don't want to hear them talk about money. You can't put close to 1,000 people in those 400 apartments and have 200 cars. That's nonsense.

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What's the normal for the Forum?

They got a whole parking garage. Lackawanna College had to buy that lot across of them, you know, for parking for that little one small building over there. They just give you people a snow job and think you are supposed to fall for it like the rest of us.

It just so exasperating. Thomas Dewey, when he was governor, I don't know, 50, 60 years ago of New York, he said that the honest subsidize the corrupt. There is not a better example than this school and the people of this city like me and you and the people out here in their care. you just got to put your foot down and right now is the time. You can't be naive enough to think thousands of students are going to cross Mulberry Street orderly. Right now they run all over the place regardless of a light, you know. It's a wonder there is a couple of them a day don't get hit.

Everything, you know, is just for them and against us, that's all. They will be taking over Mulberry next by the common -- you won't be able to get them off the

street.

You know, I know everybody is sick and tired of hearing the facts, they have over 150 properties and they are worth over 100 million. If you take these 400 apartments, let's just say they rent for \$500 a piece, right, which isn't very much, 500 to 400 would be \$200,000 a month times 12. I think that's \$2,400,000. If you charge them \$1,000 a bed just on the 400 apartments that's only \$400,000, it leaves them \$2 million and they are so greedy they are going to tell you to go to blazes, but you got to work out something like that.

Charge them for parking places. The Forum, I saw in the paper a couple of years ago, where they are charging so much a parking place. You got to get money out of these people. You know, the city just can't keep going on. I just don't think you five hear us. I really don't.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Ellman, we do hear you and as we pledged we are -- we are pursuing the nonprofits.

MR. ELLMAN: Yeah, but it's not what

you are going to do, it's what you are doing right now. You know, ten or 20 years is not going to help me. It's not going to help these people across the street because I talked to them, like I said, two weeks ago. It's just heartbreaking to hear these stories. I'm not even going to go into that.

If you don't do something right now it would be like taking a compass from this building and making a circle of a mile around here, it would all be nonprofits, because that's where it's going. The heart of our inner city is going to them with no taxes involved, you know?

Well, I'll get off of that. I'd like to thank all of the people that voted. It seemed like a good turnout in the city. Democracy only works when people participate in it and speak up like they do in here. That's why I like this place so much.

And I got a little question for you,
Miss Janet, and you don't have to answer.

I'm not saying it to embarrass you, but if
Mr. Doherty moved on and you were next for

mayor, would you have supported someone else like maybe Mr. McGoff or would you have run? Because I think you have so many benefits and things, I was always wondering about that. I don't want to put you on --

MS. EVANS: Um --

MR. ELLMAN: You can say you don't want to answer.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Ellman, I think I probably all I can say is if I had wanted to be the mayor I would have run to be mayor and I think I would have had very good chance of being the mayor, but instead I'm not here on city council and we have a new council that is working very hard for the people, and we are representing people and fighting for you every day in ways you see, in ways you don't see, but it's going on. It's going on.

MR. ELLMAN: I'm not belittling council because I'd say 99 percent of things I hear are just very favorable for the council.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. ELLMAN: But I think by your

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answer you are telling me you would have supported Brother McGoff running for mayor.

MS. EVANS: No comment.

MR. ELLMAN: Well, I thank you. Can I say something real quick? I have people asking me things because they don't want to get in trouble with their neighbors, you know, tell me things to say here. This will just take a second. I had a big list of things and one of them on School Street, now, I don't know where School Street -- I don't know where School Street is, I'm not familiar next to that Gardener School, there is a man that parks his car on the sidewalk I was told and painted -- he painted it for his car on the sidewalk and so the kids can't go on it. Now, I have never seen it. I don't know exactly what I'm talking about, and further down the street a block, half a block, somebody told me there is a junkie car been across the sidewalk for a couple of years, an old Camaro or something.

MS. EVANS: That's also on School Street?

MR. ELLMAN: No, right down from

Gardner and School Street. I think that's the one or 200 block along there. And across the street on the 2,000 block of North Main next to the old library there is an iron fence and a house and there is some people parked their car against the iron fence where pedestrians can't get by. I have seen that from a distance, you know, I don't know.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Ellman, if you could, this would be very helpful for us, if you were able to write that down for us, and then give it to Ms. Carrera before you leave this evening then we can get on it.

MR. ELLMAN: Yeah, I'd have a list -- I'd need a roll of toilet paper to write it down.

MS. EVANS: That's all right. Just keeping writing and keep giving it to us.

Thank you very much.

MR. ELLMAN: Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mr. Ellman, just one quick thing, I know you have been patient for many years as has everyone else, we are in office here, the majority, for less than

1 six months, and I assure you we are working on a lot of projects, so you will see things 2 3 come to fruition down the road, so don't be disappointed at this point. 4 5 MR. ELLMAN: I saw where you went. MR. LOSCOMBE: I also went to the 6 7 zoning meeting. 8 MR. ELLMAN: I saw that. 9 MR. LOSCOMBE: The zoning did 10 approve the University for their parking and everything, I asked them for a continuance 11 12 because some of the neighbors weren't 13 properly informed and there was a lot more 14 questions to be asked, but they approved it 15 that evening, so that's beyond our scope at 16 that level. 17 MR. ELLMAN: You were like attacking 18 a mount tan with a shovel, weren't you? 19 Thank you. 20 MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, 21 Mr. Ellman. 22 MR. ROGAN: Mark Phillips. 23 MR. PHILLIPS: I want to talk about 24 the Scranton Code, about parking in that 25 alleyway and parking between the building.

You know what I'm talking about. I got a thing about an article in the newspaper, I gave you guys a copy about the parking guy, they are talking about they enforce every ordinance, how come when I call they are not enforcing it? I found out last Thursday their laziness. They don't want to ticket the people in the alley. Now, we are paying taxes and we got lazy cops sitting down in Luzerne Street where the Price Chopper used to be sitting there hour and a half. I saw a lady in the Mobile gas station she was there over an hour. Well, I looked in and--I looked in and I couldn't see her no place and I thought where could she be? Sleeping?

And I want to complain about the house inspector. Now, you seen a picture in this alley there is no -- where the guy is parking there is no easement, and they citationed me. Now, between the house and the alley you need an easement or egress, whatever you want to call it, it's a right-of-way. How come they are not enforcing it?

Now, the other thing I want to talk

about is the house -- I mean, the zone. 1 have been in West Side, I bought a house at 2 3 1620 Luzerne Street. When I bought it 16 years ago the former owners were Sparacino. 4 They were the moving company. Now, that 5 house told me my property wasn't commercial. 6 When I bought it, I bought it off of --7 8 where did I put it -- off of these people 9 and I got the same thing as this. 10 my neighbor. It's a commercial property. 11 still got -- they say about grandfathered 12 in, I stool got the safe that Sparcinos used 13 on the property, so I should be 14 grandfathered in what everybody is telling 15 me. but I can't see no records or no 16 documents from this zoning or the house 17 authority. How come? 18 MR. ROGAN: What was that address 19 again? What was the address again? 20 MR. PHILLIPS: Which one? 21 MR. ROGAN: Was is Sloan Street you 22 said? 23 MR. PHILLIPS: Luzerne. 24 MR. ROGAN: Oh, Luzerne. 25 MR. JOYCE: 1620.

MR. ROGAN: 1620 Luzerne. 1 MR. PHILLIPS: The property next to 2 3 it is 1614 it's commercial right here. I had the same thing when my bought my house 4 sixteen years ago the same thing, but that 5 was a different house there. 6 Well, I think that would 7 MR. ROGAN: 8 be an issue for the zoning board. We could 9 ask them ---MR. PHILLIPS: Well. how come I 10 11 didn't change in 16 years and I didn't get no notice? 12 13 MR. ROGAN: I don't know. I've 14 always been on council for four months. MR. PHILLIPS: I know. 15 How come I 16 get fed lies every time I call for that 17 easement? They said it was the cop's 18 responsibility. MR. ROGAN: I'm familiar with the 19 20 situation, I drove by there. MR. PHILLIPS: Just lies. Another 21 22 thing the mayor lies and he lies right here, 23 he says that. Now, the going for the money. 24 Somebody better clean up their act. 25 Maybe you should take it MR. ROGAN:

up with the mayor.

MR. PHILLIPS: That's a jerk. These people know it.

MR. ROGAN: Cara Dancey.

MS. DANCEY: Cara Dancey, resident.

I'm here to support Mark and I, too, live at 1620 Luzerne Street. The parking is atrocious there. There is no way that I can get in and out of my driveway because the cars are parked there and also the children play hide and seek behind the cars so it's very difficult to go down that alleyway and I know there could be an accident, so I just

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Bob Bolus.

wanted to say that and thank you very much.

MR. JOYCE: Perhaps before Mr. Bolus comes up and speaks, Mrs. Krake, if you can send a letter to Chief Elliott notifying him of the situation in that 1,600 block of the court behind Luzerne Street and some of the problems that people are having maybe he could send over a patrol car to check it out.

MR. ROGAN: I spoke to Mr. Phillips on the phone I think it was about two or

three weeks ago and he said that the police were up there multiple times, but it's just a persistent problem, so I guess we could send him another request.

MR. JOYCE: Yeah.

MR. BOLUS: Okay, thank you. Bob Bolus, Scranton. A couple of issues bring me to council this evening, one was that I had raised several weeks ago about containers, you know, storage containers in the city and if there is an ordinance against them or whatever it was and council was going to look into that issue because we have had an issue over open containers, you know, you will see them like PODS are CVS they are parked in the yard and we are in that business as well and we have them.

And we were told originally by the city solicitor, Gene Hickey, that they were filing an injunction to have us remove them, but they weren't doing anything else in the city and I asked about the ordinance. If there isn't one to advise us one way or the other, and I brought that up to council and I was hoping council had an answer on it or

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could get me an answer as soon as possible because we are having an issue about it right now on East Mountain.

The other issue that brings me is the issue I raised about the Hartman family up there, Todd Hartman, built a home, encroached on an easement that we use. police were called twice today up there. We have a water main problem. The neighbor next door was trying to stop them then Hartman came home, he parked on the easement, prevented me from even using my own driveway, and he was being protected by the city. Again, the solicitor when we raised the fact that he had built his home over a 16 1/2 foot city-owned piece of property, a right-of-way, a waterway from the dam, and Gene Hickey had said, "Well, once they give him a permit that was permission."

Of course, Attorney Hughes corrected Mr. Hickey. We need something done now.

You know, we can't keep having the police having to come up. My life has been very disrupted by their actions, threatening, I

have been assaulted in the driveway by one of the neighbor's kids, and it's on and on and on it's got to come to an end and that's why I'm here before council.

If the city has given him permission in a subdivision or building permit without even a highway occupancy permit to go ahead and build on a city-owned piece of property I'd like to know how he could do that and get away it and I'm asking council to intervene at this point.

approving tonight from 7-A right on through a whole bunch of properties that are being sold for revenue. Why is it the political atmosphere in the city is allowing Hartman to be on a city-owned piece of property and not pay a dime for it yet causing the disruption of my life and my peace and enjoyment of my property, getting away with what he could do in the City of Scranton.

And this was done by the solicitor's office claiming first they didn't own it, when we showed them the deed to it they said they didn't own it. They allowed him to

build on it and it's created nothing but trouble and you can't build on city-owned property, it should either put up for sale or he has to remove his or not.

He was advised by a certified letter before he built that he was building on city-owned property and yet he continued to go along, there has been nothing but aggravation and trouble up there and it's got to come to an end. I mean, twice the police had to come up there today to tell him move off the easement and he is threatening to tow me off my property.

Now, the city allowed this to happen, Gene Hickey allowed this to happen. Gene Hickey supported him trying to get an injunction against us at taxpayers' expense to remove the containers we had there, and this is why I'm asking the city about the ordinance regarding these containers. There are storage containers that are used all over the city. Now, why am I being selective enforced and nobody else is? And that has got to come to a head.

I mean, you know, getting assaulted

in your driveway and harassed on a daily basis, you know, and the city supporting it from the law department. Now, I don't know what political favors he owed or somebody owes him, but I don't owe him anything. I just want the quiet enjoyment of my property and I need council to intervene at this juncture to get an answer for me if you would.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Bolus, I came in late during your presentation, are you asking for council to verify that the property of which are speaking is city-owned, and if so did the -- I think you say that the legal department had stated to either you or your attorney that it's not city-owned property?

MR. BOLUS: That's correct, Mrs.

Evans. We showed them the deed to it. It

was surveyed out, it's black and white, it's

owned by the City of Scranton. They just

turned a blind eye and issued a permit to

allow them to build a home through it and

that's something you can't do, and he built

knowing full well he was on city-owned

property and now the city is entitled to revenue from all of the properties just as you are giving the property tonight why should somebody that had a political influence on the school board or whatever be allowed to get something for nothing in the city. It's got to go out for bid and if he can bid it he can own it. If he doesn't bid it, he doesn't own it and he will have to move his house if someone outbids him. It's to the benefit of the City. The city ignored this in the law department, and that's why I'm asking for intervention from

We are spending thousands of dollars in legal fees fighting a battle that we shouldn't have to fight because of the city's negligence.

the city right now.

MS. EVANS: I understand what you are saying, but I'm also contemplating that if the legal department gave you the answer that it's not city-owned, it would seem that they are going to provide the same answer to city council.

MR. BOLUS: No, they have changed

that answer now. They have admitted the city owns it.

MS. EVANS: Oh, okay.

MR. BOLUS: There is no question now it's owned by the City of Scranton.

MS. EVANS: Then we will look into it and see if there is anything we can do.

MR. BOLUS: If I may, I know I took some time on this, but, you know, we see Dunmore is in trouble, we see Scranton is in trouble, but nobody is looking at Keystone Landfill. Now, there were agreements way before this 2000 agreement regarding the leachate line coming from Dunmore, and I have raised this many, many times. Dunmore knows it's a source of revenue to bail them out and Scranton has to join in with Scranton to charge a fee for using that leachate line for millions of dollars.

MS. EVANS: I agree, but I think
what the problem has been and I believe
council learned this by listening to
Mr. Barrett's presentation when he last
attended a public caucus, it's the Scranton
Sewer Authority who is receiving that money

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instead of Scranton and Dunmore.

MR. BOLUS: Well, I'm with you 100 percent on that, they could charge to treat the affluent going through the line. Μv issue is just like they are a host community in Dunmore and Throop for the garbage that's being dumped, I want us as a host community for the line to come through Scranton and charge so much per gallon to allow them to run the line through here. We don't care what the Sewer Authority gets. They haven't managed their assets either, so, you know, manage the rest of the people so by putting the leachate line as a host community as well as the gas line out of the Alliance Landfill, we could bring millions of dollars into the City and into Dunmore to pull them out of trouble, and just by buying a few pieces of equipment doesn't absolve Keystone Landfill for us to turn a blind eye like they did in Dunmore. "Buy us a garbage truck and we don't see anything else going on . "

In Scranton, "Buy us a motorcycle," and that's what I'm getting away from.

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Let's get away from this, let's put in legislation that puts in a fee as a host community for the leachate line per gallon or per cubic foot of gas going on the other line that goes right across Meadow Avenue and that's where our revenue is going to start coming from.

As far as the University of Scranton, the snow job that we heard here tonight is just taking from the people in the city time after time after time. They are a commercial business, they are putting in a commercial business, that if we can't tax them, then let's charge them a commercial fee for doing what they are doing, a hotel fee or whatever it may be, but they are getting away with murder, narrowing the street, they are destroying our infrastructure. They could bridges across there. If we could teach a money to peal a banana, we could teach educated students to cross a bridge and not impede our traffic flow. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Bolus.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Bolus, could I ask

one question? Are you currently in 1 litigation with Mr. Hartman? 2 3 MR. BOLUS: Yes. I am. MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. 4 MR. BOLUS: And Mr. Hartman is here. 5 I'm sure he could speak very well for 6 7 himself. He's had a big mouth all day. 8 MR. MCGOFF: Excuse me, that's 9 uncalled for. MR. BOLUS: Well, I think it was 10 11 because he can --12 MR. MCGOFF: I asked one question. 13 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 14 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. 15 MS. EVANS: Our next speaker is Jim 16 Jim Strisnecki. 17 MR. STRISNECKI: Good evening, 18 Council. My name is Jim Strisnecki, resident of Scranton, Weston Field area. 19 20 know I normally speak about city issues, but 21 I'm not here to talk about city issues and 22 at the same time I am, okay? I'm here as a 23 spokesperson for the Weston Field Friends of 24 James T. Reddington, I don't know if any of

yours ever heard of the name, James.

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Reddington. Bob, you may have heard of him, right? Do you know Jimmy? Okay, that's what I'm here to speak about, if I may?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. STRISNECKI: Okay? Okay. Jimmy was born and raised in Scranton, okay? He went to public schools. Jimmy was a 1965 graduate of Scranton Technical High School. Jimmy worked local in a few of the plants around here and in 1966 Jimmy joined the US Marines. He was shipped overseas to Vietnam, okay, and in 1967, March 23, Jimmy was killed in action over in Vietnam, okay?

And what we are doing is come this
Thursday at Cathedral Cemetery at 1:00 we
are going to Honor Jimmy. We did this last
year. What it is is Jimmy no longer has
family in this area except for a niece, but
we took it upon ourselves all of the friends
from the neighborhood and whoever else we
could gather, we meet up at the cemetery,
okay? And we are asking anybody that went
to school with Jimmy back in '65 that
graduated with him that's watching the TV
and friends of his if they can show up and

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at the cemetery it would really be appreciated.

MS. EVANS: Sir, are you -- at 1:00 are you meeting say at the entrance to the cemetery or --

MR. STRISNICKI: We will meet right at -- right at Jimmy's grave actually, okay?

MS. EVANS: But would people all know where that is?

MR. STRISNICKI: Yeah, I'm sure they will, Mrs. Evans. It's right to -- all the way in the back of the cemetery is where it is. I don't have the plot number, I should have, that's my fault, okay, I should have taken it down, but I don't know, but if I could read had this here, if I can go a little further with this. I don't have the plot number, I wish I did, but I don't, but I'm sure what we're going to do it's going to be on Thursday, May 27, at 1 p.m. at Cathedral Cemetery. We plan on honoring a true friend and hero and a marine that was killed in Vietnam 43 years ago on March 23, Excuse me. In attendance there 1967. will be a few of Jimmy's best friends and

fellow marines from the second battalion, fifth marine, Echo Company.

By the way, Mr. Joseph Sylvestri and Bob Warren, who was with Jimmy the day he got killed, also come and visit his grave site every year, which is very nice. Bob comes in -- actually comes from Florida, Jimmy comes from Wrigley Park, PA, and they visit his grave site every year, and like I said, Jimmy has no one. His mom has passed away and his sister has passed away, and we think that is very -- you know, and they will be there Thursday, also.

There is going to be some local media there and politicians and friends of the forgotten also will be there. And in closing, we are asking if you know of someone who knew Jimmy please give them a call and let them know about this honoring. It would appreciated, okay?

MS. EVANS: Thank you so much.

MR. STRISNICKI: Thank you so much.

Appreciate it.

MS. EVANS: Teri Suseck.

MS. SUSECK: Good evening, Council.

I live on the South Side of Scranton at 729
Saginaw Street directly across from Hilltop
Manor and I was here in March to complain
about their throwing the trash out in
plastic bags that be ripped and torn open
and homeowners all on the Saginaw Side and
also on South Webster are getting this trash
blown on their property, and we have been
trying to pick it up on a daily basis and
still nothing has been done about it, you
know, a couple months of have passed. The
same thing, putting your trash out in bags.

I don't understand why federally subsidized through HUD, they are being -- the City of Scranton is being subsidized through HUD why they don't have dumpsters and why this continues.

MS. EVANS: Well, we will again talk to or send notification to the Housing Authority.

MS. SUSTECK: No, we already tried that. I tried that.

MS. EVANS: I know. The Housing
Authority is an autonomous body. It does
not answer to Scranton City Council.

MS. SUSTECK: Oh, I spoke to a woman from HUD, the director of multi-family subsidized housing, she called subsidized housing and was told that, oh, yes, that lady is a complainer, we have a dumpster there. That's what she told HUD.

MS. EVANS: And there is no dumpster.

MS. SUSTECK: There is no dumpster.

Everybody knows. I sent pictures now to HUD
to prove my point.

MR. ROGAN: I was up there when were running, too, and there was garbage. There was garbage everywhere and I remember we sent a letter on behalf of her to the Housing Authority and nothing has been done.

MS. EVANS: Nothing has been done.
Well, the Housing Authority also would not
come to council to discuss any of these
issues as well. We are going to do our best
again this week to talk to the Director of
Housing Authority and request that a
dumpster is placed in that area.

MS. SUSTECK: And the other thing I also came about is we live next to -- we are

between 721 and we are 729, there is a lot between -- an empty lot between the two homes and we had complained one year ago lodging -- I lodged a written complaint with the Scranton Police Department on this lot because it has not been maintained, the grass has grown to be at least two feet high, the fence is delipidated and falling down and nothing has been done about that.

I went to the safety -- Public
Safety Department to complain after a
year -- I was told they were sending him a
letter out, the owner, and then after a year
nothing has been done. I went recently like
about a week and a half ago and the woman
told me, oh, well -- first, she tried to say
we couldn't locate him and then she said,
"Oh, we've got him, but we didn't send a
letter yet."

Now, you tell me why it's taken one year to this day why somebody from the Public Safety Department can't send a letter out for the owner to mow their property and why Scranton hasn't done it themselves.

MS. EVANS: Well, actually, when

it's not city-owned property it should be maintained by the owner, but I think an inspector, licensing inspections and permits should and handling this as opposed to the police department. So, Mrs. Krake, if we can please send that message to Officer Herchik tomorrow morning and you said again it's a lot, an empty lot located between 721--

MS. SUSTECK: And 729 Saginaw.

MS. EVANS: -- and 729 Saginaw?

MS. SUSTECK: Yes. And someone else also complained about that. There's a neighbor that -- actually, the neighbor at 721 she had told me the same day I came down here to the Public Safety Department she had called, too.

MS. EVANS: Okay.

MS. SUSTECK: And we haven't heard anything yet, and the grass has been like that for like two years, two years.

MS. EVANS: There are many, many, too many lots like that decoratively decorating our entire city.

MS. SUSTECK: And the other thing is

I don't understand why it's subsidized housing, federally subsidized housing, why this was allowed to go on for years and years and years, you know, with no dumpsters, you know, people putting out their trash like that?

MS. EVANS: Agreed.

MS. SUSTECK: I mean, what's happening to the federal money, the HUD money with this trash pick up? I mean, where are the dumpsters. All your other sites, all your other subsidized housing have dumpsters that are screened off, and yet nothing is being done. I mean, it's ludicrous that I have to go to the head of HUD and complain because nothing has been done.

MS. EVANS: I agree.

MR. JOYCE: Who is the person from HUD that you spoke to?

MS. SUSTECK: Okay, wait a minute.

Hang on. Her name Elaine Vargin. Would you
like her number?

MR. JOYCE: Yeah.

MS. SUSTECK: It's area code

215-861-7561 and I just recently sent her photographs to prove and she should have received them by now.

MS. EVANS: Very good.

MS. SUSTECK: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Dave Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn. First of all, somebody

brought a handful of rings out from the

lady's bathroom and asked me to --

MS. EVANS: They are mine. Oh, my goodness. Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: I could have went down to the Pawn Shop. Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton and so forth. First of all, I'd like to address the situation with Comcast that exists with their boxes, their digital boxes. I don't know if it can be seen here, I'll try and get a bigger poster maybe next week with the taxpayers, but there is four oval-shaped buttons on the left-hand front of your set, the digital box, and the one in-between the channel display, and it runs

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horizontal, if you press that your volume will increase by approximately 100 percent. Every time that box is disconnected or reset or reprogrammed it reverts back to a volume of 15 and with the maximum volume of 30, and on the bottom of your screen it will appear that a different set of bars than what your regular remote would have for your television and it will increase the volume by approximately 100 percent, so it's strictly with the box.

And, also, if you are missing
Channel 19 and you have plain old regular
cable, basic, you have to go into the seek
mode on your television and you will be able
to pick it up because I couldn't pick it up
for a couple of months and then somebody
mentioned that, yeah, I can't get it and I
put it in the seek mode, but it's this
button right here and in-between the display
channel, channel display, and it's a
horizontal button, these are channel up and
downs and that's the lower volume, but a lot
of the complaints probably evolve around
this not being maximized out, so it could

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really improve the audibility of the program you are watching.

Okay, on the lights, we mentioned we had some visually impaired people here and I have been walking around town and watching different things and part of the problem from what I can gather is our state law. There isn't any absolutely red light. You can turn -- you can turn on a red in some cases and unless it's -- so no matter what we ever did for people that were visually impaired or physically impaired we may have to change the state law back to the good old days and that's all there is to it because currently the green light flashes and you can make a right-hand turn and then the walk sign is illuminated at the same time. you know, it's like run for your life if you have a crazy driver coming up the street.

And on these blight issues, Marie addressed this the last time, but the only thing I would urge is that if a house is occupied and it's blighted to try and go easy and work with these people because the only worse than a blighted house next door

is a blighted condemned house next door that nothing is ever going to done with it, so when we adopt these ordinances please try and if it's old Aunt Millie I don't what we can do for her, but certainly closing her house down and having it sitting there for ten years until somebody breaks in or starts it on the fire isn't the answer either. I'm sure you people understand that, but there's no problem there.

And on some of these issues with people getting impatient with you, I get disturbed about how people expect everything in this country, and it's nationally, to change overnight and they don't. It doesn't happen overnight. It's never going to happen overnight. You are not going to turn an economy around overnight that's besieged by foreign trade packs or whatever have you and energy issues.

And finally that trash situation, we need barrels. We really need barrels.

Either that or an ordinance that people cannot put our garbage until the morning if they don't plan to have a barrel. Let them

get up at 6:00 in the morning and put it out before they go to work because otherwise the animals get into it and it's all over, and it looks like litter and it's not litter it's just plain trash hanging around.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Thank you and have a good night. Golden parrot once again goes to BP because they did it big time this time. All right.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Have a good week.

MS. EVANS: Marie Schumacher.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,

Council. Marie Schumacher, city resident and member of the taxpayers' group. Two things that came up tonight. First of all, those vehicles and capital items that are being procured should be on the capital budget. Those should be there and it should just show who is paying. That has always been the case. I don't think you need special legislation, you just need to enforce the capital budget preparation and tracking.

MS. EVANS: Well, actually, I think you have to have legislation though to accept any type of donation or contribution to the city. It's got to come before Scranton City Council, but what I think maybe Solicitor Hughes might have been intending here is that council can have a role in the decision making.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, that may be but, I mean, it should be part of -- the decision making you get to approve the capital budget and those items should be in the capital budget that's sent here and that's the time you approve it, not as a separate thing. If they can't plan to do in August what they are going to purchase the next year that would be pathetic, and I think they are capable of doing that.

The next thing, the signalization, I reported on that project I believe back in March, I'll double check it, but I have talked to PennDOT. They are now in charge of the signalization project, the city's portion is complete and I believe it was March of 2011 that they said it would be bid

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out so --

MR. LOSCOMBE: May, I believe the first.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Whatever. I'll double check it, but that's -- the other thing when you start talking about vehicles there were aborted budget meetings that Mrs. Gatelli was going to hold several years ago during the month of August, but one thing that came up at the one meeting that did occur was that there was a low and moderate income area where it was eligible for a fire truck, and I don't think that was ever pursued and, of course, a new fire truck for that would allow the rest to domino out so that the oldest one in the fleet, and they are all pretty old, could be either sold or junked or whatever, but I think that should be looked at as well.

And, now, I would also like to thank
Chief Davis for moving on the Dunmore
situation. I think it's tragic what's
happened, but at least he took some action
and I'm happy about that.

And now if I could I would like to

give you two handouts?

(Ms. Schumacher approaches the dais.)

MS. SCHUMACHER: The first. As you will note, is an article from the most current Forbes' magazine on Houston, the model city, and you can read it all, but I would just like to read two paragraphs.

"So what does Houston have that these other cities lack? Opportunity.

Between 2000 and 2009, Houston's employment grew my 260,000. Greater New York City, with nearly three times the population of Houston, has added only 96,0000 jobs. The Chicago area has lost 258,000 jobs; San Francisco has lost 217,000; Los Angeles, 168,000; and Boston 100,004.

Politicians in big cities talk about jobs, but by keeping taxes, fees and regulatory barriers high they discourage the creation of the jobs, at least in the private sector. A business in San Francisco and Los Angeles never know what bizarre new costs will be imposed by city hall. In New York or Boston you can thrive as a nonprofit

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executive, high-end consultant or financier, but if are the owner of the business that wants to grow you are out of luck."

And I think that should be taken -- should be heeded.

The other thing I provided to you tonight because I want to pick up -- I picked up on what Andy Sbaraglia said, those properties that you are planning to sell tonight. Now, I don't know -- I have given you a map, which is from the Assessor's Office, the map numbers that are boxed are the properties that are you going to be voting on tonight. The streets that are hatched are actually paper streets, they do not exist, and I have some real concerns about this whole project. I have a concern about the environmental impact. I don't know if you have to sell these, but if they have to be sold I have a concern in that I don't know, and if you can answer this tonight it will alleviate my question, but if the laws that currently exist are grandfathered in at the time of purchase, I think this whole project needs to be tabled

and has to be looked at better, and if you don't have to sell them, I would suggest that you might want to consider auctioning them, because I went over there this afternoon to double check on where the roads existed and a "For Sale" sign had appeared since the last time I was over there and I talked to the real estate agent when I got back to the house, there are two lots -- if may finish?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Two lots going down Birch Street, and one -- and then they were actually sold and it fell through because the individual could not get the financing, but there is a three-quarter acre lot that was -- that is on sale for \$24,000 and a 1/3 of an acre lots that's on sale for \$19,000, and if you look at what you are planning to accept for those, that's quite a difference and I think the taxpayers should be protected.

And I would suggest that if you haven't been up there to see it's totally -- it's right now it's totally wooded and I

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would assume you can see how contiguous these are that it's planned as a development and would have to go, of course, before the planning board, but the storm water situation on that side of the mountain is like pretty much nonexistent and I know when Froud Avenue was extended down to Birch Street there was a lot of -- a lot of dirt was moved and people who had lived in a home on Blucher Avenue and never had water in their basement suddenly got water in their basement, and if all of these trees are striped out of there there is going to be nothing to absorb the water and I just have a great fear and I think it behooves some more examination before you go ahead and approve this tonight.

And remember, also, that we had I believe the Medallises over in Tripp Park also had problems, so there is something lacking in our regulations that allow these developments to come in and not properly deal with the storm water and then the taxpayers probably in that Tripp Park area will get stuck paying for that fix, and I

don't want that to happen on my East 1 Mountain either, so I would ask that you 2 3 table them and do some more studying tonight. Thank you. 4 5 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to address 6 council? 7 8 MR. SLEDENZSKI: You didn't forget 9 me, did you, Janet? 10 MS. EVANS: Oh, Chrissy. 11 MR. SLEDENZSKI: Never forget me, do 12 Hey, Jack. Thanks, Chris. 22 MS. EVANS: 23 MR. HARTMAN: Good evening, Council. 24 Todd Hartman, 1621 Birch Street, East

Mountain section of town and I also own a

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home at 1207 Moltke Avenue that I'm selling, resident of East Mountain for just about 45 years. Some of you know me, some you have don't. I came to council prior to some of you guys sitting here. I have only been to council once, this is my second time, okay, and hopefully my last.

We do have an issue, I'm not going to discuss me and my neighbor's problems, what we do have is this thing with the spillway on the lake. Five years I purchased that land and my neighbor has a house there a little longer than that. This land was purchased probably six or seven years ago that my neighbor is insinuating that the city owns. It went through a subdivision, our taxes were paid, our permits were all paid, we were issued building permits for our property.

I sit here and I listen for weeks, every other week that my neighbor is here, I'm not here, he complains about Mr. Hartman. Mr. Hartman is not the only neighbor. It has to go through two other properties before it hits Mr. Hartman's

house.

Now, on the down side of me is another neighbor, he owns the property next to me where Mr. Bolus has this scene that it's an easement, but the land is owned by next door neighbor where the easement sets on.

had -- I had spoken to Gene Hickey many months ago that the city was going to remedy this thing with the spillway of the lake, okay? Over the 45 years that I have been up there, that spillway has always run down Birch Street, at the rear of Birch. If it ran down to where my neighbor assumes it's supposed to run you would have to take probably in the vicinity of 30 homes that are there, at least going back to the 1900's, okay, the early 19000's.

My problem is I get kicked around every two weeks here and I don't come, I'm not that type of person. I'm not, you know, I'm not politically there anymore, I sat on a school board, my neighbor thinks I'm a politician, I'm not. I did community

service. He talked about the PODS, they were 54-foot trailer that were set on the side of my house that I could not see my daughter and son get off the bus stop. They were over ten feet high.

Than there was a trailer at the end with three bull's eye on it because somebody had vandalized my neighbor's car, probably he thinks it was me, I don't know, you know, that was never said to me, but I assume because he put bull's eyes in front of my house that he assumed it was me.

Now, as far as the officers today coming up there, I was home -- I wasn't home, I was at work, I talked to my neighbor. He didn't call them so evidently my neighbor must have called them, the one that lives in the rear of Birch Street.

Now, my thing with council is this spillway thing with the lake for the 16 1/2 foot easement that spills out of Mountain Lake has to be addressed. I have owned this land for quite so many years, and so have my neighbors. It's been kicked around in this community and nothing has been done. Hickey

told me he was going to take care of it and it isn't done. The responsibility is probably going to come back to me, and I'm going to have pay my attorney to take care of this. If I do have to do this, this is not a threat, I am going to have to come after the city for taking their responsibility to take care of this spillway. If doesn't go there, like I said, I'm up there almost 45 years, it's always gone down the rear of Birch in behind the homes. If I have to get my neighbors, I'll bring my neighbors in.

The other thing is with these PODS that were on the side of my house for 9 1/2 months, you know, if they were in Greenridge or South Side or they were in, you know, somebody else's neighborhood it wouldn't have happened, okay, but it was in front of my house, okay, on the side of my house. I own two properties in East Mountain, one is \$2,000 a year in property taxes and the other one is just about \$5,000, so that's \$7,000 that I pay in property taxes.

My neighbor doesn't live there. He

just drives through and drives back. That's what he does. Right now he has a water problem up there with his water service that's been broken for well over a month, okay? I called the city's permits and licensing, I didn't get a return call, I want to know if he has a permit to do it like I had permits for my home, and I had to have my sewer and my water, my electric. I had to pay all my permits, I'm wondering if he has his.

Now, I left a voicemail for Mr. Seitzinger and I hope he would return my call tomorrow, but if he doesn't, you know, I'm going to have to call my attorney and react the same way, and I'm not trying to be a burden here, you guys know I don't come here, and I hope I never have to come again, but I need this remedied because if it isn't remedied I'm going to have take my and my family and my two children, the money out of their pockets and their education, to sit here and play games with attorneys. You know, it's an easement next door to my house, he is sitting here complaining that I

blocked the easement, I did not block the easement. That's someplace else. He blocked the easement for 9 1/2 months that I had to look at these trailers on the side of my house that I built in Scranton, the second one, and I have to deal with this.

You know, my family shouldn't have to deal with this, you know, I did my 9 1/2 months penance with it. I don't think he should be able to turn around and pull trailers back in. The easement thing will be straightened out my our attorneys, but the spillway for the lake if it isn't -- if isn't addressed in a timely fashion I'm going to have to address it, but I'm going to have come back after the City of Scranton and I don't want to do that. I like the City of Scranton School District for 12 years, I'm not a politician per se as he tells me.

I didn't call favors in. If I called favors in they you think they would have sat there for 9 1/2 months. I can't call favors like that, John, you know that.

MS. EVANS: I think I am beginning

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to understand how the magistrate might feel, we have been hearing two sides of one story, but I'm certainly not a magistrate, and again, though I understand what you are saying Mr. Hickey made it very clear to city council in an unrelated case that council cannot -- well, council has no authority over any department, council can't even speak with a department head unless it gains permission, and so I think the best advice I could give everyone is to contact, because I know there is difficulty reaching department heads, I have heard that many, many times. Sometimes, you know, they can't be reached then there are numerous complaints when calls have never been returned, but I think maybe the best avenue available to everyone right now is to seek a meeting with the mayor and the mayor can direct the law department to write any necessary legislation on that that will solve this problem for everyone involved hopefully and then it comes to city council, but city council really cannot order Mr. Hickey to take action on any of this.

MR. HARTMAN: I understand that,
Mrs. Evans. I'm here for the reason being
every two weeks I'm getting bashed here by
neighbor I want the City of Scranton and the
people that actually watch this and you five
people to understand what's going on there.
I'm raising two children. I have had to
notify the District Attorney's Office over

I'm just getting tired of it. I'm tired of my neighbor bashing me every two weeks here like I don't have the time to come here every week or every two weeks or once a month, I have other things and you guys have other issues to address. I don't need to be

other issues that have transpired there and

bashed by an individual who doesn't live here, just votes here, and sits there and chronically complains about me. I'm not the only one the issue here. I have two

MS. EVANS: Well, he could on property though --

neighbors.

MR. HARTMAN: I have three neighbors that are next door to me. It's always Hartman, Hartman, Hartman.

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MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. HARTMAN: I understand. They're nice people, they are great neighbors, but I'm not going to sit here and get bashed. Like I said, I will call Seitzinger again. If it does not occur I will file suit against this city for nonenforcement or not taken in a timely fashion. I don't want to do that. I'm not that type of person, but I have to do what I have to do, and I thank you for your time and good luck to each and every one of you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. MORGAN: I'd just like to address the city's I guess financial situation a little bit today. You know, you read the paper, you see that Dunmore is going through similar problems and from what I have read at this point they are seriously considering bankruptcy, and I have to say that I agree with them, and I have to say that I hope that council and the mayor sit

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down and talk out the problems that the city has, but it's been kicked around even before Mr. Murphy was on council that bankruptcy was probably the best avenue of approach for the city, and council itself said today that they have an obligation to the taxpayers and the residents of this city financially, and I just think that maybe we should really give that some serious consideration because I don't think it's possible to dig our way out of this debt to be honest with you. have no control over the authorities, we just have a rolling debt, and you watch the downturn in the world itself and the thing that happened in Greece isn't an isolated There is even talk that America issue. won't be able to make it's debt payment soon, so maybe it's time to really take a good hard look at bankruptcy.

I mean, if we are going to talk about, you know, making budget cuts there is, you know, some discussions that I have heard that residents have had about the amount of money that council may be considering cutting and they just don't

think it's enough, you know, it's just not enough. They are talking millions, I'm talking at least seven, and where would the seven million come from. I don't know because, you know, I have asked you before and council hasn't broke the budget down in sections and started going through it line item by line item.

And I agree with what some other people here have said --

MS. EVANS: Actually, Mr. Morgan, if I could just interrupt for a second, each council member is -- I don't know, I'm not getting any status reports from them, but they can be working on the budget, I know I have been working on the budget, I know Mr. Joyce has been working on the budget as Finance Chair. This isn't something we are allowing for the 11th hour. There is ongoing work.

MR. MORGAN: Well, I make my statements from the questions I asked this council and, Mrs. Evans, you had stated to me before you that had not broken the budget down and broke it up among the council

members, so I go by what you say.

MS. EVANS: No, I'm not assigning them portions of the budget, I'd like everyone to look at the budget in it's entirety and come up with all of their suggestions and then all of that will be combined.

MR. MORGAN: Okay, so you are all looking at different sections of the budget, would that be a true statement?

MS. EVANS: We are looking at the budget in it's entirety, each one of us. We are looking through every section of the budget line item by line item, but I have not delegated, for example, "Mr. Joyce, you are just going to handle the BA's Office," or "Mr. Loscombe, I'm just going to have you look into the police department."

I would like everyone looking at everything.

MR. MORGAN: So what you are stating is that you are collectively looking at the budget together, is that when you are saying or are you saying that you are just going rough shot, there is no focus on this look

at the budget, is that what you are saying? 1 I'm trying to understand what you are saying 2 3 to me because if it's not focused --MS. EVANS: It's focused. 4 MR. MORGAN: Okay. 5 Well, I certainly hope so. How much -- how much are 6 7 you considering cutting out of the budget at 8 this point? That I can't tell you 9 MS. EVANS: 10 because I think it's very unrealistic for 11 anyone to say, for example, as you have, 12 that I would do 10 percent cuts across the 13 board because you certainly do have to 14 examine line item by line item, department by department, services that are absolutely 15 16 essentially, those that can be done without. 17 MR. MORGAN: So you have no target? 18 MS. EVANS: Pardon? MR. MORGAN: You have no focus, no 19 20 target on what you are trying to cut? 21 MS. EVANS: Yes, I do. I have 22 explained that to you previously. 23 MR. MORGAN: No, you haven't. 24 MS. EVANS: And I have made budgets before and, Mr. Morgan, you are certainly 25

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welcome --

MR. MORGAN: Well, I have seen proposals you've made, but I haven't seen a budget you have made, I have seen proposals you have made.

MS. EVANS: What you can do, which would be very helpful I think for everyone, you can get a copy of the budget --

MR. MORGAN: I have a copy.

MS. EVANS: Oh, that's wonderful. Go through it and submit to council your \$7 million in cuts.

MR. MORGAN: I think that that's how you got in trouble when you got in Court last time because it was a discussion held at a kitchen table and there was no focus to it and I believe Judge Minora threw it out. Now, I could be wrong and you could furnish us with the transcripts of that hearing, but I think that that proved that there was no focus.

MS. EVANS: That there was no focus. You weren't in attendance at those hearings.

MS. EVANS: I don't know if the City has them or not.

MR. MORGAN: Can I make a request here tonight to have access to the transcripts if they exist because, you know, I would like to know what was actually said in that courtroom then because it's -- either the Scranton Times lied in their reporting or there is something going on because the Scranton Times' reporter that discussions were held by yourself, Mr. Rogan, Mr. Joyce in your home.

MS. EVANS: And I --

MR. MORGAN: And the other thing is who are the experts because evidently when the judge ruled I'd like to know what the testimony was so that I can be more informed when I try to speak to this council. I

mean, I just think it's important for all of the residents of this city to know how this council is functioning and what you are looking at and if -- to be bluntly honest, I mean, I just can't see this city continuing to carry the debt it carries and I just can't see how he we can keep talking about blight and overtaxation and then not have a structured plan to look at the budget and not have a target by how much we are going to cut because that's what communities do. I mean, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania finds itself in a budget fix that's beyond belief and as everybody in this -- well, hopefully in this Commonwealth can understand there is countries collapsing under their debt, okay? But this city has been distressed status for decades, okay, and we have all heard the singing and the dancing and all the chanting, but the reality is there has been no solutions.

And if there was a -- if your plan was legal and it had any basis to it the judge wouldn't have threw it out.

MS. EVANS: Well, I respect your

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1 opinion, but I intend to disagree. have been permanent solutions offered, they 2 3 have not been accepted --MR. MORGAN: The only --4 MS. They are there for so many years they're -- can't touch them and they know it, so we are at their mercy unfortunately. That's all. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. McGoff.
Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. Before I get into what I have here, Mr. Jackowitz brought up the armed service, I think it was Mr. Jackowitz, brought up the armed service parade. It was nice to see a much bigger crowd this year than last year and hopefully next year's parade will be even bigger.

Next, I have on the report from OECD for the last few months and I would like to report on some of the highlights of this report. The Homebuyer's Program in February there was six applications received, six approved and zero closed. In March there were six more received, two approved and two closed. And in April zero were received one was approved and one was closed.

The Home Housing Rehabilitation

Program, in March there were three bid

openings, 16 were contacted for

verification, one as approved and there were

eight total rehab projects under contract.

In April 2010, there was one bid opening, 15

contacted for verification, one approved and

nine total projects -- or there were nine

total rehab projects.

Next is Lackawanna Neighbors, the HOME Program, and they purchased at property on 208 Pittston Avenue in 2009, and during the last month the contractor has completed vinyl siding, stabilized the front porch and installed new railings. They installed a heating system and the electrical system and the home is now 80 percent completed and the renovations should be done in June of this year.

Moving on, the United Neighborhood
Community Development Corporation, our
subrecipient for the NSP funding, purchased
their first foreclosed property at 629 and
631 Cedar Avenue on April 23, and the
rehabilitation work on that property will
begin in the near future. The funding is in
place for Phase II of construction of the
Connell building and the rehab began in
April of 2010.

The South Scranton Little League handicap bathrooms were installed on May 1, 2010, just three days before the opening of the season. Te South Scranton Little League is hosting the Challenge Relief for disabled

children and the bathrooms are now handicapped accessible for those children.

And finally, the new tree planting project entitled "Tree Vitalist" will begin June 12, 2010. This project is made available through a grant through the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources along with an additional funding from the Community Development Block Grant. A sealed quote was received by the city controller and was awarded to the Mulberry Bush on March 1, 2010. And that is a summary of the report that I received.

I have a very long list of citizens' requests that I will read off from the last week: Nature Kennedy School a lot of the residents have been complaining that the teachers aren't parking in the parking lot because the parking lot is being used as a playground for the children, and the old playground is now an addition to the building, and residents report there are 38 to 40 employees and they are short on parking spaces on Saginaw and Windfield to Prospect Avenue during school hours. Can we

please send a letter to the school board asking them if they have any remedy for this problem, and the resident would also like the zoning board to be made aware of this situation.

Could we please send a follow-up letter to Mark Seitzinger? I know there was-- I went down on Mineral Avenue and they're all abandoned homes, the newspaper did an article on it, can you please ask him if there has been any progress made in that neighborhood?

Could we please send a letter to

Chief Elliott as well as Mr. Dougher asking
that the proper action be taken to prevent
people from parking on the grass at Nay Aug
Park.

This is a letter from a resident of West Elm Street in West Scranton. Can we please send another letter to Chief Elliott telling him that speeding cars continue to be a problem on the 700 block of West Elm Street, and I know we sent a letter in the past, but he reports that it continues to be a problem because people use West Elm as a

shortcut when school is getting out.

Also, on West Elm Street there is a vacant lot with overgrowth at 706 and 708, and traffic flow at Fifth Avenue in the 500 block of West Elm Street should be monitored to determine if an additional stop sign is needed.

And finally, I have a list of potholes to be sent to DPW. They are the 100 block of Meadow Avenue, the 300 block of Boland Court, the intersection of River Street and Cedar Avenue, Hemlock Street and Crown Avenue, Myrtle Street and Prescott Avenue, the 1600 and 1700 blocks of Olive Street, Lackawanna Avenue and Wyoming Avenue in front of Boscov's, the 500 block of Willow Street and in front of 705 West Elm Street, and that is all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.
Mr. Loscombe, any comments or motions?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. Thank you, Mrs. Evans, I have a few. First of all, I, too, would like to recognize Chief Elliott and the Police Athletic League on their skate park that they constructed in west side. I

happened to be on Jackson Street on another situation checking out a citizen's complaint and I noticed them working across the street and I took a walk over and Mr. Elliott, you know, showed me the ramps and the program that they have there, they have a game room and everything there, so I think it's pretty good for the kids. It would be nice if we could get more of these throughout the city, but so far it's a great start and it's going to be supervised, which is good, also.

Mr. Jackowitz, you looked good in the parade the other day. I had my granddaughters with me. I was asked a couple of questions last week by Josh Gryzinski from the Times and, you know, in the interest of editorialism I know they have to reduce what you say to save some paper space, but I did want to read my statement in whole on the questions I was asked. First I was asked, you know, what my response would be if we --if we would work together with the administration in the future now pending the outcome of the election, basically that was the gist of it,

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and my response, which I had put in writing because it was easy than discussing over the phone, was that "Mayor Doherty and his administration will have to learn to work with city council from this point on. council has often stated publically that we would be willing to meet with the mayor and/or his administration on any issue as long as the meetings were open and That is what this new council transparent. majority stands for and that's what the taxpayers deserve. We would sincerely like to work with the mayor for the betterment of our city. I know that we have many philosophical differences on where our efforts should be directed in our city, however, I do believe that we were always open to responsible discussion. Although the mayor's priorities continually seem to be focused on the parks and the downtown, I personally believe that we have to train our focus back to the neighborhoods, elimination of blight, negotiating fair contracts with the city labor force, comprehensive street paving, increasing PILOTS, payment in lieu

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of taxes, and removing our distressed city status.

We should also be providing a safe and healthy environment for all of our city residents and I am always willing, as long as my -- along with my colleagues, to work with the mayor and his administration in an effort to accomplish these goals for the residents."

Another comment I was asked on, but apparently it might have got it in too late, they didn't have anything in the newspaper regarding this, but my comment based on the latest arbitration appeals or action to vacate, and some of the wording in that article got me a little bit. For the administration to state it would be irresponsible for the city not to appeal the arbitration awards because it puts the city in a position of violating the Commonwealth Court order and a single arbitrator doesn't have the authority to order the city to violate the Commonwealth order. It's the typical thumb your nose at the taxpayer response that this administration has been

noted for.

On the contrary, this administration has followed a pattern of irresponsibility since it's beginning by appealing every decision that was not rendered in his favor. The amount of taxpayer dollars involved in these appeals to the legal fees, accumulating interest and penalties alone exhibits the bad faith by the city that was mentioned by the arbitrator in his latest decision, and it also serves to shed light on where I believe the irresponsibility -- the irresponsibility is really born.

The Commonwealth Court ruling that is referred to by the administration as their bases the appeal did not alter one word of the health care language in the existing contracts. In fact, the arbitrator's had pointed out in their decisions the health care provisions contained in the 1993 agreement through the most recent negotiated labor agreement remain unchanged and by failing to retain the services of a competent health care administrator acceptable to the unions the

city has violated the June 29, 2000 side agreement concerning the health care benefits available to the effected bargaining unit employees.

This quote was taken from the Charles D. Long decision of April 16, 2010, "under the union's guidance, the health care committee -- the health care committee's meaningful moves resulted in the savings of nearly \$5 million dollars in the first year alone before the Doherty administration terminated the health care consultant's and administrator's contract. This has resulted in disarray that you find with the current health care consultants and their refusal to perform an independent audit that has been previously authorized."

The arbitrator had strongly worded his decision and stated that the city has acted in bad faith, so I ask you, who is being irresponsible? As a result of these strongly worded recent arbitration awards, City Council President Janet Evans and myself had met with the mayor and it's solicitor, along with the business

administrator, in an effort to ask him to consider not appealing these decisions as we felt that the cost would continue to rise and resolve these decisions without appeal would send a good message to the unions and possibly open the impasse to towards some good faith negotiations by the city.

Apparently, this administration is still unable to face the reality of it's continuing irresponsibility. And that's all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Loscombe.

Mr. Joyce, any comments or motions?

MR. JOYCE: Yes, just a few. First and foremost, I would just like to take the opportunity to thank everyone that went out to vote in last Tuesday's primary election. Regardless of who you supported, it's honorable that you went out there and made your voice heard.

Secondly, according to some recent mail received from Rossi & Rossi, council has been informed that there is still a number of outstanding items that the business administration office as well as

the tax office and I believe the
Redevelopment Authority need to provide to
Rossi & Rossi in order to have our audit
completed and this audit was originally
scheduled to be completed on May 31.

So with this in mind, Mrs. Krake, could you please send a letter to Mr. Renda and the BA's Office and ask him if all of the outstanding -- all of the outstanding matters have been resolved with Rossi & Rossi.

Also, tonight, I have a few citizens' requests. One, I have been informed by a few residents who take their dogs up to the dog park up at Connell Park that the waste disposal dispensers were smashed apart, and in addition all of the bags that the city has supplied were also missing. And, you know, it's a real shame to see people go up there and destruct these things when they benefit a lot of the residents of the city.

Mrs. Krake, would you please send a letter to Mr. Dougher and notify him of that situation and also ask to have these boxes

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replaced along with the bags.

Secondly, I have been informed by a Minooka resident that the manhole in the 2700 block of Hamm Court is sticking up in the middle of the Court causing some problems for some folks that travel throughout the area. The resident informed me that originally the manhole was even with the road, however, part of the road appeared to sink in a little built, so that's causing the manhole to rise above the pavement, and I know from speaking to the resident he actually bent a rim on his tire. With this this mind, can you please send a letter to Mr. Brazil asking him to check into this area and get it fixed.

Also, I have been informed by a resident that lives on Pequest Drive that the road in front of 115 Pequest is torn apart making it difficult for the resident of that house to maneuver his wheelchair in and out when people are picking him up for various appointments and to go to the store and whatnot.

Mrs. Krake, can you also add this to

the letter to Mr. Brazil asking him to prepare this area of road for the resident?

And, finally, council has been contacted by an employee of the Career Technology Center regarding the road conditions on Greenbush and Reese Streets. These are the two streets that go into and out of the Career Technology Center up in the North Scranton area right on the border of Dickson City, and I have traveled up these roads and I was up there during the election and many of the residents also notified me that these roads haven't been paved in probably three decades.

With that in mind, can you also add that to the letter and ask if these streets are scheduled to be paved at any time in the near future. And that's all I have for tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Joyce.

Good evening. First, I ask all of you to remember in your prayers Mrs. Pica, mother of Richard Pica, a retired officer of the Scranton Fire Department. Mrs. Pica passed away today. She was 90 years old and we

will all keep her family and friends in our thoughts and prayers.

Like most of my honorable colleagues, I am very disappointed that the mayor chose to appeal two recent health care arbitration decisions rendered against the city administration. Legal action will only continue to waste taxpayer money.

Unfortunately, the mayor didn't listen or agree with council's advice, but hopefully now that he has lost the senatorial election he will be more focused and willing to work together with others on crucial financial issues facing our city and it's people.

Next, city council's action on two important issues continues to be held up by the administration. Since I raised the request for building of professional services on March 30, 2010, no legislation has been written and sent to council by the legal department.

Also, legislation to amend the 2010 budget to create the position for rental registration coordinator and to transfer money per the business administrator from

professional services to the salary account in Licensing, Inspections and Permits for the position has not been written or sent to council. The professional services legislation may save the taxpayers money and will open the process to many local businesses. The rental registration legislation would create a new source of revenue for the city and until it is received and approved the position of rental registration coordinator cannot be advertised and hired.

While the administration seems to be occupied with costly legal appeals, it's missing these opportunities to save and to create new revenue streams. The time for pledging cooperation and communication with city council through the newspaper is over. Talk is idle. It is time now for tangible examples of cooperation and it can begin this week with professional services and rental registration coordinator legislation.

City council did not receive monthly reports regarding OECD activities for February, March and April 2010 from Linda

Aebli until May 10, and Mr. Rogan provided you with an update of that information this evening. However, the May 10 report noticeably does not contain the monthly activities for all OECD loans. This complete information was provided to the previous council, but Mrs. Aebli appears to have difficulty sending the same information to this new council.

When Ms. Aebli needed the assistance of council in January and again in April for the Connell building project at the 11th hour. Council responded appropriately and provided what was required of it's office.

Council now expects that Ms. Aebli will reciprocate and provide council with complete monthly reports.

Mrs. Krake, please contact Miss Aebli tomorrow to request all loan activities from December 2009 up to and including April 2010 by May 28. Also, remind Miss Aebli that the complete May report will be due by June 4.

Next, the spike in youth crime demands the hiring of additional COM-D or

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beat patrol officers for Scranton's neighborhoods. Mrs. Krake, please send letters to Mayor Doherty, Chief Elliott and Ms. Aebli on behalf of city council requesting the hiring of the additional COM-D officers and inquiring when we can expect the hiring to occur.

In addition, Mrs. Krake, please send letters to Representative Ken Smith and Kevin Murphy requesting a meeting to discuss the legal stalemate of blight issues facing Scranton. Include the information regarding the Bunker Hill property and the Moltke Avenue properties examples. A Tuesday caucus would be preferable at 5:30 at their convenience. However, if state legislative duties prevent their attendance at a public caucus, please schedule a meeting on a Thursday or Friday when both gentleman are available in the very near future. Scranton needs their assistance on the state level to solve the blight problems that are beyond the state's control.

Also, please send to Senator Mellow a letter on behalf of Scranton City Council

urging his support in 2010 for House Bill 1946, the separation of city and school taxes in the City of Scranton.

And finally, I have a few citizens' requests: Residents report that sidewalks along bridges citywide are dirty and littered with trash and debris. Please address these sidewalks areas when possible.

South Side residents report that during holidays flowers and Christmas trees are sold at the overgrown previously reported area at the top of Meadow Avenue and River Street. As cars travel to Route or Interstate 81 and East Mountain, they pull off to make purchases thereby causing traffic problem. Residents fear the flower sales may occur again for Memorial Day. Please address this issue and forward a written report to council.

City residents state they have witnessed a police officer on duty at CMC during nighttime hours until 5 a.m. Please verify this information and provide an explanation for this police placement.

And, finally, a display trailer for

metal roofs is parked at the corner of the gas station located at the intersection of River Street and Meadow Avenue. Drivers can't see around the corner and visibility is blocked when checking for vehicles pulling out of the gas station. Several city residents report they have called 911 regarding the safety hazard, but nothing has been done. In fact, I was -- I got another message about it just today that there was a very -- pardon?

MR. MCGOFF: It's parked in the parking lot?

MS. EVANS: It's in the parking lot of the gas station, yes, and I believe there are concrete steps placed leading up into the inside of the trailer and, as I said, I received another message just this afternoon that someone again very nearly had a terrible accident because again they cannot see any of the vehicles pulling out of the that gas station.

So if we could contact the appropriate city departments tomorrow morning, Mrs. Krake, before we have an
