Clerk's notes, 19 please. 20 MS. KRAKE: We have a few responses 21 this week. First is from OECD concerning 22 the Crisp Avenue bridge. This is from Linda Aebli Aebli, the director. She writes, 23 24 "This office is in receipt of your second 25 request dated June 11 concerning the status

of the Crisp Avenue bridge. Please be advised I did respond to your May 12 correspondence on May 17 updating council and the public on the Crisp Avenue bridge.

As I stated in my May 17 letter, the Crisp avenue bridge is partly funded by the community development block grant in the amount of \$150,000. In order to receive other financing information, council will need to get this information from the appropriate department.

On Friday, June 11, 2010, OECD received from the engineering firm Reeman and Peterson plans and spec for this project. This enabled this office to prepare the spec book for distribution.

OECD also arranged with council and the city controller on Monday, June 14, and the bid opening will be held in council chambers on Wednesday, July 21, 2010, at 10 a.m. The prebid conference will be held at the site on Wednesday, July 7, 2010, at 10 a.m.

If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me."

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

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MS. KRAKE: We also received a response from Scranton Housing Authority and this is from Gary Pelicacci. He says he is in receipt of our May 28 letter regarding the trash situation at Hilltop Manor. Scranton Housing Authority has the trash picked up twice a week, Tuesday and Friday, at Hilltop Manor. Also, our maintenance department walks the site daily to pick up anv debris. Maintenance has been instructed to pick up all trash on both sides of street. The Housing Authority is currently exploring various options to help this situation. Until we come up with a more viable solution, the Housing Authority will continue to monitor the situation and increase the pickups by our department."

And it says, "It is always our intention to be a good neighbor."

MS. EVANS: Are they going to provide the trash receptacles?

MS. KRAKE: I did speak on the phone to Mr. Pelicacci, and they are looking into them, but in that one particular area where there is -- where the resident has come and

spoken at council, he says the parking there is so small and limited that to put a dumpster there will Otake up a parking spaces, so for right now even though this are still looking at the receptacles they are trying to maintain zero garbage anywhere.

MS. EVANS: Very good.

MS. KRAKE: That's the best they can tell us right now.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We also have a response from the Recreation Authority from their solicitor, Paul Kelly. At the Recreation Authority's meeting, the board voted to direct him to respond to our letter. The Rec Authority does not receive any parking fees from CMC and the authority is not aware of any fees being paid by CMC for their employees to park at Nay Aug Park."

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: And finally, we received a Right-to-Know request from Stu Renda, our Right-to-Know officer. He answered all of our requests for ECTV and the peg channel,

and he did provide 49 pages and we did let council know that we have them in our office.

MS. EVANS: Very good.

MS. KRAKE: And we have a few no responses. The first is Mark Dougher, Director of Parks. He did not respond to our letter concerning the fireworks display and when they will be held.

The next letter we sent to Stu Renda and Mr. Dougher. This was -- our question was concerning the cutting of 31 percent which is equal to \$130,000 in the parks budget for 2010, traditionally this line item is used to pay for lifeguards and other seasonal employees. We had asked with the pools set to open, which we know they are open, how will this effect the staffing or will it cause any closing of any pools and they have not responded.

Also, we received no response from Director Seitzinger concerning the Washburn Street cemetery and the 100 block of North Merrifield avenue. We also did not receive a response to our second request concerning

Atlas Glass on Providence Road.

And we did not receive a response from Pat McMullen concerning the stop sign in the 200 block of South Decker Court, and that's all we have.

MS. EVANS: Let's send another request to Mr. McMullen about South Decker Court. I know that Representative Murphy's office is working on this as well and we provided Mr. McMullen with all of the necessary documentation and we would like a response.

As for the others, they will be included in their files in council's office.

MS. KRAKE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Do any council members have announcements at this time?

MR. MCGOFF: Yes, I do. This coming Sunday, Father's Day, there is the second annual, hopefully, Father's Day five-mile race. It's sponsored by the Prostate Cancer Awareness Association of Northeastern Pennsylvania. Last year was our initial event. We are looking for an increased number for this year.

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The race, as I said, is five miles, it's a \$35 registration and registration is--you can register starting at 7:00 Sunday morning at Scranton High School at the parking lot in Scranton High School. T-shirts for all who register, medals for all finishes. It's a really good race and it's for a very good cause. All of the money goes to the Prostate Cancer Awareness Association which then turns it over to research and awareness programs. So if anyone would like to participate please register Sunday morning and if anyone would like to volunteer, if they are not up to running the five miles, if they would like to come and volunteer certainly the race can use as many volunteers as possible that day. So, thank you.

MS. EVANS: Are there any other announcements?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Applications for the two scholarships generously donated by businessman Giovanni Piccolino can be dropped off by graduating students from the Scranton School District until July 1. The

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applications can be dropped off at Buona Pizza located on 540 Lackawanna Avenue.

Secondly, the City of Scranton Parks and Recreation will be hosting it's "Learn to Swim Program" again year. It will be from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. The schedule is as follows: Monday, June 28 to July 2 at Weston Field; Monday, July 5 through July 9, at Weston Park; Monday, July 12 to the 16 at Novembrino Pool; Monday, July 19 through the 23, at Connell Park; July 26 through the 30 at Nay Aug Park; and again in August, 2 to the 6 at Nay Aug Park. And class sizes are limited and will be on a first come first serve basis. For more information you can contact Weston Field at 3480-4186.

MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker this evening is Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I see we're in the process, I guess the process is complete to give a grant for \$472,317. One of the projects I guess is the old Pub Charles where the hole in the ground is because that's the 246 address is

Pub Charles, which is a hole in the ground which means a complete building, but this 324 that's Grass Grossinger, I believe, their old building. Somebody is already in there developing because they got a liquor license application on the window, so exactly what is the deal on that other than he wants us to help pay for his apartments up there.

This is an another deal where they want to put in more loft apartments for -- I don't know, if the University should ever build a dormitory for the kids that go to that medical school there is going to be a lot of crying people in Scranton for all of this money we poured into their buildings because it's ridiculous. Every time you turn around they want to build open more loft apartments for these kids. Well, that's the way life goes in this city.

I believe these grants are ridiculous. I don't mind them borrowing money and we take a piece of the action, just like Rinaldi when he wanted the 500 block of Lackawanna Avenue he wanted a piece of the action, so if a piece of the action is good for him why isn't it good for the city or the state? If we lose the money, we lose the money, but that grant is

lost anyway. You give a grant away, it's forget it. Kiss the money goodbye, but if we take at least a piece of the action -- speaking of a piece of the action, let's go back to the Hilton being it's going to be up for sale. Did any of yous inquire of the mayor what kind of perks goes with that hotel besides not paying taxes and them free parking spaces, is a person going to buy that?

I don't even want to get into it, it's disgusting what they did. They conned the city into telling that they would go bankrupt if you didn't buy our fixtures, so we gave in and bought the fixtures, all the fixtures, beds and everything were on their mortgage to the city and then they went bankrupt anyway and we lost the money. I told -- Mr. DiBileo was sitting up there, I told him, "Let them go bankrupt. Let them go. They will buy it, we can start over again."

They should have, but they didn't, hence, we lost all that money. Now it's coming up again, but I wish you would

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inquire of the mayor what kind of perks you plan to give the new owners if they should come through. Somebody should actually come through with that because we don't want too many slaps in the face which we have got with that hotel. Okay.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Sbaraglia, regarding 5-B, I'm going to make a motion to table 5-B until we can schedule public caucus.

MR. SBARAGLIA: That's okay. not that I got anything against it because if he is going to build a building there on the Pub Charles side he is going to make a considerable investment. I don't think he can build a building there for the \$472,000, probably cost a little more if he is going to build any kind of substantial building, but the other part of that, down at the Grass Grossinger where they are in there making the development now they are planning to put a bar in the lower level because why else would they put application for a liquor license? That's a whole separate deal. they are going to build because that hole is disgusting. You walk by there and it

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doesn't make the city look too great, so I can see that development going through.

This other one though, I think we have to look at that a little more. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Les Spindler.

MS. HUGHES: Madam President, if I could, just one comment on the hotel, that was a program approved by the county, the city and the school district. The taxes are paid on the land. There was a forgiveness on the real estate taxes for a period of ten years from the completion of the project for every million dollars invested with a cap up to ten million dollars for ten years. don't know, that would be in the assessor's office as to when the Lita Program would come off and when it started. Once that comes off there will be real estate taxes paid on the hotel, but right now they are paying pursuant to the Lita program tax on the land that's not a KOZ zone.

MS. EVANS: It's not.

MR. HUGHES: It's not.

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time I did not vote for that particular agreement concerning the Hilton Hotel because I knew that the city was going to lose it's \$3 million, and actually a great deal of work was done behind the scenes. Attorney Hughes actually worked tirelessly on that and kept in contact with me. He had an alternative whereby the city would not lose the \$3 million, but that was not the -that was not acceptable to city council at the time and that council, rather, I believe Mr. DiBileo was the president, they rather agreed with what the mayor had worked out with the Hilton Hotel. And, you know, again, as Mr. Sbaraglia noted that was very unfortunate and I'm not sure the city is never going to recoup it's money and particularly not on this sale because I

MS. EVANS: And I do recall at the

MR. HUGHES: If I could, at that time the Algonquin Hotel in New York City, which is 180 rooms, a historic hotel on 45th Street, I believe, sold for \$32 million. I

think that if the Hilton Hotel sells for over 35 million there is something in there where the city would get some of it's money back, but that's just a comparison for the Algonquin Hotel in New York City, I think it's between Fifth and Madison, sold for \$32, and that was back in 2005 at the time that was going through. I kind of laughed when they said if it sells for more than \$35 million and here's a historic hotel with the Oak Room and everything else, the Algonquin in New York that went for \$32 million.

MS. EVANS: Yes, I recall our having that conversation which was why the agreement worked out between the mayor and the Hilton and council was so ludicrous because Attorney Hughes is correct the city would only recoup it's 3 million if the hotel would be sold the purchase price of 35 million and again, that's something that I'm sure we all recognize is not a reality.

Well, water under the bridge now. When the proper things aren't done at the proper time, this is what happens. Mr. Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,

Council. Les Spindler, city resident, taxpayer and homeowner. First off, I want to commend council for keeping these summertime meetings at 6:30. It's more convenient for most people to get to, most people work during the day. I know the previous majority wanted them at noontime because they knew most people couldn't go and they could get out of here, so thank you again.

MS. EVANS: You're welcome.

Authority, this Recreation Authority is the reason there is no free swimming at Nay Aug
Park and I think they should all be replaced. You replaced a good woman on the zoning board in Mrs. Cook and I don't think
Mr. Marinucci should be put on this
Recreation Authority. As I said, I think they should all be replaced. Because of them there is no free swimming.

A few weeks ago I gave you a report about the stolen DiBileo signs. I spoke to Detective Martin last week and he said

absolutely, positively the two city employees mentioned in that report are the ones on the videotape that stole the signs.

Again, I'll say it's being sat on by the chief and the mayor and a crime was committed and that in itself, them not going forward with this, I think that's a crime, so I think something has got to be done with that.

I come across some information that the mayor has lost 25 union related disputes so far, and I guess that number is going up all of the time, and I guess what Detective Martin said last week I guess we lost another arbitration. He is probably going to appeal that and cost the taxpayers more money. I hope I'm wrong, but I don't know when it's going to stop.

Oh, okay, a different note here.

For 51 years my family has had a family reunion and it was at the Radisson this year and we had relatives that stayed there from out of town and we got together Sunday and they said they went to the mall on Saturday evening, walked around town and they just

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reinforced what myself and many other people have said over the years, they said there was absolutely nothing to do in downtown. I guess that's so much for Chris Doherty's 24-hour city. These are people from out of town, they wanted to do something, they couldn't find anything to do and I think it's a darn shame.

This morning in the Doherty newsletter there was a report about a female police officer filing an age discrimination lawsuit. I don't know why it took so long to report it in the newspaper, I knew about this a year ago. The original suit was filed in May of 2009 and it was just in the paper today. It's just goes to show the incompetence of this administration, I said it in the past Chief Elliott is totally incompetent. He should have resigned a long time ago. Again, this is costing the taxpayers more money with these lawsuits and I know they female police officer, she is a very wonderful woman, as are the two other police officers who the chief degraded by calling them a terrible name. I hope these

people win their lawsuits, but it's just too bad that the taxpayers are going to have to pay for that. That's all I have tonight.

MR. BOLUS: Bob Bolus. Good evening, Council. Bob Bolus, Scranton.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. BOLUS: Definitely on "C", the appointment of Marinucci, I would ask that you table this. We have had many, many issues and confrontations with Mr. Marinucci. He has an arrogance about him. In fact, there was one day when we are up there talking about the zoo and trying to keep it there for the people when he actually got to the point he wanted to step outside a have a fistfight with me, which I'm more than gladly would have had provided if I would have won the zoo would have stayed and that would have been it. Well, he refused to get up and come outside.

But the problem we have with him he is he part of the problem at Nay Aug Park.

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He allowed a lot of money to be spent up there. They are their only little clan over there and it's going to broken up.

Remember, they are the ones who want to give Lackawanna College where the zoo was the land for a dollar perpetually, and that's what got to stop. There is no mentality here. There is no consideration for the people and our part, not giving it away to a college for free. Let them buy something in the city and pay some taxes, and that was the problem we had with Marinucci. He has a real bad attitude, he has been on there a long time, and if we are going to move forward in this city we need to put new blood in, new ideas, and get rid of the stagnant political cronyism attitude and it's definitely in the Recreation Authority at Nay Aug. I would ask that you table it and maybe let somebody else come forward for a change.

On the University of Scranton coming down Mulberry Street, we are entitled to an impact fee, no matter what. If it's road blockage or how it's an inconvenience to us,

it may be temporary, but we are entitled to money. We had it on Lackawanna Avenue, the mayor didn't go after any money there. We need to move forward and collect every dime we can. And the University is literally taking over this city they are tearing everything down, they only have one attitude and that's their attitude. Look at the South Side complex. Take a walk over there and look at the grass, look at the mud, look at the dirt over there. They don't care about people in the City of Scranton, they only care about the University of Scranton.

Mr. McGoff, I know you keep making faces about it, and I'm sorry if it offends you, but quite frankly --

MR. MCGOFF: You're not offending me.

MR. BOLUS: Okay, good, because I have an issue as a taxpayer in this city with the University of Scranton not paying their fair share and getting a free ride, and the day I'll be the happiest is when I see them paying a fee and paying their fair share to the taxpayers of this city that

have been supportive.

MR. MCGOFF: I just find a few of your comments ironic.

MR. BOLUS: Pardon?

MR. MCGOFF: I just find a few of your comments ironic.

MR. BOLUS: Well, a lot of the things we found ironic when you were the council president here and let a lot of things slide through the door and under the cracks, we weren't happy with that, so maybe they are ironic, but maybe we are moving in a different direction with the council that is wanting to get somewhere.

The other night I was watching one of our police officers up at Meadow Avenue directing traffic. I would make a recommendation that our police officers start getting florescent gloves. It was getting dark and you couldn't actually see him waiving his hands at traffic coming forward. And get them different lights that they could carry out there, some like we see in an airport when they are directing planes in, the red lights, give our guys some

safety that are I think they are entitled to have out there. The vests don't cut it when you can't see what they are directing.

I was at Dunmore council meeting last night and I brought up fees for the sewer line and the leachate line coming through here, and they are going to explore it, as well as the gas line coming from Alliance to see if we can get a host community fee, and the reason I'm bringing it up tonight is that maybe now that it's been approached up there maybe council and their council could kind of sit down and throw some ideas up there that may work for the benefit of both communities, helping Dunmore get out of debt and helping Scranton get out of debt and start paying some of our bills.

We need an emergency plan on that gas line and it's got to be an accurate one, meaning, that it's running through our city and we are all worried about Marcellus shale and everything and we got a potential hazard coming right through a community that we have people living in.

The issue I have here is one I had last week was the land on East Mountain where the house is that I am having a problem with that city owns that they allow people to build over, is to have the law department put something together and put it up for sale. It's Scranton real estate, the city is entitled to be paid for it, and they are entitled to get their fair share by auction.

Take some of these blighted properties that are all over the city and start putting them up for sale and generating revenue. They look like heck all over this city, burned out shells, and it's time to the mayor put things on the fast track rather than giving us agenda that with are wasting everybody's time by not putting nothing on it. It's time to come to the plate, you lost your election, be the mayor for the next time -- or the time that's left and start representing the people and let's start cleaning up the city. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Bolus.

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MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Ellman again. You know, people always tell me that you are just beating your head on a They have lost faith in you. wall. Three or four weeks ago, I forgot what it was, I mentioned a half a dozen illegally parked cars that three or four people had told me, not a one was addressed. That's why people don't want to -- they just don't care about this council meeting no more. And someone asked me what the fire truck cost and I said, "Hell, I don't know what the fire truck cost," nobody could find out what they are paying for the fire truck. That doesn't make sense. You people voted for, you ought to know what it cost, and it cost probably twice as much as if we paid for it instead of going this lease to buy.

And I can't understand you with praising the zoning board, maybe Mrs. Cook, the rest of them could careless about what they do. They defer their own policies, like, the parking for the college, just to, you know, they are no good. Every one of them should be replaced.

I have saved the kicker for This past week on the 1,500 block of Court Street where all of these pretty houses are, I don't know who is familiar with it, a lady sold a house for \$200,000 to ARC. You know, they are supported by The United Way, now, why couldn't they buy a 40 or \$50,000 house. Why was money spent on a \$200,000 house in a residential neighborhood? It's senseless. worst part is three or four people around that house their houses are depreciating, whether you like me to say it or not, their houses are going to depreciate like the dickens and that's because they don't participate, they don't read the papers, they don't know what's going on.

That house in 2006 and '7 that house paid I think -- I got it written down here in my notes, it paid \$4,300 between the school and the city taxes. We lost \$6,500 on that house on Monroe, that's money you guy's salaries in two houses in a week. That's one of your salaries. That's a fraction less than \$12,000 for those two

houses.

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But this house on the 1500 block of Court, guess what? Is anybody familiar with that neighborhood? Beautiful houses. want to know why in 2007 that house was made It was occupied? Yeah. That was like stealing money from the taxpayers to make that house a KOZ. There is not a reason in the world. That's under Todd O'Malley's watch. Todd never saw a KOZ he didn't like evidently. A beautiful house is occupied in the middle of residential neighborhood, it was made KOZ and it's still KOZ. Before that, they paid taxes. senseless. This goes on right under everybody's nose day in and day out.

Just like Baker, they wait until the last minute and they blink. Why couldn't they wait another week for a trial, it wouldn't have hurt. They would have saved money. Gene Barrett and the Scranton Sewer Authority just got a large rate increase. With their rate increase I don't see where they can't clean up these storm drains.

KUPCHUNAS: And don't forget the 21 water works. You could actually launch 22 water balloons at your friends or enemies. 23 MS. EVANS: Oh. how about that. 24 That's right. Water balloons. Thank you. 25 Lee Morgan.

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MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. MORGAN: Lee Morgan. I would just like to start by saying that the City of Carbondale has started a playground program. It's really an amazing thing that the mayor of that small town to do something that the residents in this city have been waiting a long time for, and I hope that council will keep in it's mind, you know, spending the cable TV franchise fee, a portion of that, for a playground program. I would like to see the City of Scranton do something like the City of Carbondale has done.

It shows a real vision for his small town because he is trying to combat a lot of things that we should be trying to do the same thing about, whether it's drugs or vandalism or a multitude of many other problems. I mean, this is a mayor of a small town and I guess their council has determined that it's important to do this.

And, you know, in regards to

Mr. Marinucci's reappointment to the Rec

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Authority, I think that if the Rec Authority isn't moving in the best interest of the city then maybe we should abolish it. mean, we keep talking about the problems about the fees being charged at Nay Aug Park for the pool, you know, some people consider Mr. Marinucci to be argumentative, that's not my point, but, I mean, you know, all of the problems we've had, all of the deals allegedly with the zoo, and if that's the situation then I just think that maybe it's time to consider just abolishing the authority. I mean if it's not going to do a constructive job for the residents then we have to reorganize it, but -- or just out and out abolish it.

And as far as, you know, I watched -- well, I read the paper and I watched some of these meetings in regard to the blight in the city and the meeting, but has anybody on council ever looked at the condemnation book in the city? The city has a condemnation book and when they condemn a property they put it in the book. I think it would be a great benefit of this city or

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this council to look at this book because, you know, we have all of these condemned properties in the city, and I just think that if we are trying to find out what happened here maybe we should be really trying to look at it. I mean, we talking about -- I mean, from the newspaper said about trying to do something with all of these blighted properties. Well, how did we get that many and why did it happen? And if there is a problem with the process of condemnation then we should change the law and do something to protect the residents of this city. And I just think that if somebody's house got condemned for a reason that wasn't justified we should have stopped it.

I don't think many people understand their right to challenge a condemnation, so what we have is possibly when you look through the book is maybe we have is a department that went forward and condemned houses by whatever statutes they ran by and then the people who were served the condemnation didn't know they could appeal

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it, so maybe what happens is we forced people into the street that didn't have to be there.

And, you know, we can all talk about what we are going to do now, but maybe it's something we should have did then and maybe it's time to control or past so we have some command of our future because, you know other speakers get up and talk about a 24-hour city here. Well, in order to have a 24-hour a day city where there activities going on you need population here, but when you have all of these condemned properties and people trying to flee, I mean, you have walked the city in your election process and look at all of the the properties for sale. Let's not even look at the vacant lots and the condemned properties. Well, all of these things have be addressed, and I just think that maybe it would be a good thing to look at that condemnation book. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else that wishes to address council?

MR. MEY: Good evening, Council.

Milton Mey, Scranton, Pennsylvania. I liv

in the 500 of Quincy across from East
Scranton High School and that place is going to be another North Scranton. The grass is this high over there, so something should be done about it. And next door to me a fellow from the Ukraine bought the house and then there is a piece of metal sticking up this high where there was a sign there for permit parking only and they took the sign and way and they never brought it back.

MS. EVANS: What's the address there?

MR. MEY: 533 Quincy.

MS. EVANS: 533?

MR. MEY: 533 Quincy.

MS. EVANS: And the first property that you mentioned that's overgrown, where is that again?

MR. MEY: East Scranton High School.

That's in the -- in the 500 block. You know, you people have been here complaining about River Street and Meadow Avenue, when they gave them the permit to build that gas station there in the zoning office they were supposed to put a red light there. If you

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look back in the zoning thing you will probably find it there, and I think you should go after the people and have them pay for it and put it up because that's ridiculous up there. That's bad, bad, bad.

Another thing, I have a solution for you for the downtown for walking across the street. At the corner of Linden and Jefferson on every pole there is a button where you press the button and all the lights turn red so people have a chance to cross the street. If you put them downtown you would save yourself a lot of aggravation and a lot of money, because that box shouldn't cost that much money because the "Walk" and "Don't Walk" signs are there already. It's something you ought to look into. Where you would need them, you would probably need the on Wyoming Avenue, Washington Avenue, Adams Avenue from Mulberry Street to Lackawanna, that's the only place you would need them.

And, Mr. McGoff, I don't want to yell at you, but the University, too, I am in the five of Quincy and since they moved

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there, I'm there since '64, they've actually ruined our neighborhood, and I'm being very honest with you. The city gave them -- they gave them the four of Monroe, they gave them the four of Quincy, and they have the four of Clay, plus the three blocks of Linden Street, how much more can we give them? They want to give them Mulberry Street, too, now? It's ridiculous. I mean, they are going, going, going, but it's ridiculous.

Come up on a Friday night or Saturday near my house and you will see what I'm talking about. It's bedlam there. Thev go down the street yelling "F" this and "F" that, they don't care because they are from These kids, these pupils just out of town. don't care. And at the corner of Linden and Jefferson, as Marie Schumacher brought up last week, they have the signs there, but you know what, they don't pay attention to I think it's upon the University that them. when they are in class they should have one of their security people there to see that they obey the law. If not, have a cop there and charge them for jaywalking. I'm being

serious. It's ridiculous. One day I was going by and this girl she told me, "Go "F" yourself," because she cut right in front of me. It's ridiculous. I wanted to get out and slap her, but I figured if I did I would be in jail, so I just left it alone. That's all I have for you tonight. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank, Mr. Mey.

MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus. I want to address a couple of different issues tonight. I took my boy for a walk today and I noticed 339 Railroad Avenue, that's a vacant house that's very overgrown, if you could write that down, and the corner of Fifth Avenue and Broadway there is two sewers there, but the one sewer facing Fifth Avenue facing the church is completely filled up with dirt. I mean, I think you couldn't get anything open.

And I agree that the Sewer Authority should be responsible for every sewer in this city. I mean, those poor people don't have flood insurance so who is going to pay for will the damage they got? The Sewer Authority should be getting the bill. I

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think they should look into that.

Another thing, the University of Scranton, I don't understand how they get away with not paying taxes on dormitories, like these ones they are going to build, and the ones that they have already. They are not academic buildings, they are apartment buildings, so the person next door to them that rents, like if I had an apartment building over in the Hill Section and I rented it to people I would have to pay taxes. How come they don't have to pay taxes on apartment buildings and the dormitories? They are not academic buildings. I wish somebody would look into the law about that. I mean, the Catholic Church, the University of Scranton, is running the City of Scranton.

Another thing, and I hope you are paying close attention tonight, I saw each and every one of you council members vote on this Marinucci issue for the Recreation Authority. If by chance you vote for this man I'm going to take a long hard look because you are not going to be for the

people, you are going to be for him.

Mr. Marinucci, he is not for the people. So if any one of you vote for him I think people better start wondering about it, but pay close attention to this vote. And I'd also like to know, even if you vote for him or don't vote for him what authority do you have? I thought even if you vote either way does it make a difference if you vote no or yes?

MS. EVANS: According to the Home Rule Charter, the mayor appoints to those authorities with the advice and consent of Scranton City Council, which is why legislation is forwarded to council by the administration for the appointment or reappointment of any authority members using this particular instance. I know that in the past, during the terms of prior councils, when an appointee has not received the consent of city council, the individual takes his seat on that authority.

MS. FRANUS: How is that possible?

MS. EVANS: I don't know how that's possible.

MS. FRANUS: Mr. Hughes? Attorney
Hughes, is that legal or is that -- why is
coming in front of council it doesn't make a
difference?

MS. EVANS: It doesn't seem to make any sense, I agree with you, why send anything to council if you intend to seat the person regardless of council's approval.

MS. FRANUS: Could that be looked into as a legality of that because Mr. Marinucci should not be serving there anymore. He is there many years too many. He is the most arrogant man, he doesn't want to have any meetings for the people to find out anything, he doesn't want to come this front of council to answer questions, I never met a man so arrogant and for this man to have another appointment is a kick in the teeth of the taxpayers. I'd love to know where the money goes for the Nay Aug Park swimming. Does he answer that? No.

Anyway, like I said, when this vote comes I hope you vote the right way for the people and if you vote for him you are not for the people. Thank you.

SCHUMACHER: Good evening. 14 Marie Schumacher, citizen and member of the Taxpayers' Association. 15 16 MS. EVANS: Good evening. 17 MS. SCHUMACHER: First off, I'd like 18 to know if Mr. Rogan obtained the 19 information that I requested last week on 20 how much our property taxes revenues will 21 increase because of the ending of KOZ's this December? 22 23 MR. ROGAN: Did I send that request? 24 MS. EVANS: I saw that letter was

sent out I think to Mr. Courtright's office,

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however, we haven't received a response yet.

MR. ROGAN: I believe it was

Mr. Joyce that sent that request. I sent
the one about the Crisp Avenue Bridge that

Mrs. Krake reported on.

Oh, okay. MS. SCHUMACHER: other thing tonight sort of, I guess, OECD night, I noticed they had a couple of solicitations in the paper recently, and I don't know if anybody ever bothered to go down, but I did notice they were asking for the bids on the pavement around the refurbished Parking Authority building, the original one, and I guess that's North Washington and Linden Street, and I just --I know you approved it, that council approved it last year, but when you walk particularly down on Wyoming Avenue and there is bricks out and you could break your ankle, I don't think there is single sidewalk around that Parking Authority building that's really bad. Some of them don't really need anything and we are going to spend a lot of money replacing them.

But then the one that caught my eye

is the invitation for the demolition of hazardous structures, Project NSP-1099.

Now, do you know -- have a list of which projects are on the list for demolition?

MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake, do we have that in our office? I know that we received the cover page to that indicating that these hazardous structures were being put out to bid for demolition, but does the office have the backup on which properties they are?

MS. KRAKE: I believe we do and, Mrs. Schumacher, you know we are always available.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I will check, and I believe, if I'm not mistaken, the NSP is Neighborhood Stabilization Program, and I think that was totally devoted to South Side, but -- and this is not a -- this is for the future. A woman wrote in, and I wish I remembered her name or clipped the letter to the editor because I thought it was a good idea, you know, I have complained in the past about we cleaned up the Hill Section and moved the problems to South Side, now we are going to clean up South

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Side and move the problem to West Side, and this woman said maybe if we just had smaller projects in each of the section of the city simultaneously that couldn't happen, and I think that's worth considering for the future, but I would like to see what it is.

The other thing, I was at the library doing some other things and I looked at OECD's paper, and there were -- the list of the CDBG funded economic development activities and loans as of the end of last year, there were four that were approved by council and they didn't appear on the list and I just wonder why or if they went away or what's happened. They were approved on the same night as at least one other that is on the list, so I don't know, but one was Martini Grill for \$50,000, and I think they are already out of business if I'm not mistaken; Carl Von Lugar, \$57,000; Michael Angelino's, \$48,000; and Diversified Disaster Recovery Services, Inc., \$50,000.

And then, and I would like to commend OECD, they did add a section to the loan section where they gave the dates that

payments were made or were not made and I just wondered if -- I can't remember is that you, Pat?

MR. ROGAN: Yeah, but that was the letter they we sent out, but I don't think we received a response yet because the monthly reports that council gets it's just for the status. It says, "Open, closed or litigation," but open could mean the payments are back and they just didn't make it to litigation yet and they could be back on their payments.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Oh, well, I just wondered because of those that were listed in that section of the Caper this year, Pizano Partnership missed payment number 34. And Salon Bergine missed payments number 41 and 42, and I wonder if they been -- if they have been caught up now.

MS. EVANS: We'll find that out, but can we have, if you don't mind, that information to copy in our office so that we can now pursue this week?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Sure.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And then the final item I have for this week is the CMC employee garage that has been in the paper of late, and maybe I will show my ignorance, but I know when I was building my home in Virginia I paid a fee and at regular intervals the house was inspected, and I actually have the sign offs of the people who inspected it, and is that not the purpose? I mean, I don't understand why this building is having these problems if it was properly inspected throughout the process.

And then I'd like to know what is the -- if CMC employees are now using Nay Aug for parking, what impact does that have on, for instance, the major events this week, that car show, I know you always have to walk there many blocks.

MS. EVANS: Yeah, I noticed all of the parking lots are there.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I wonder if we know what kind of arrangements have been made, are they just informal or are they formal and if they are formal are we going to at

least get any money and are they restricted to a certain number so that the people who want to use Nay Aug --

MS. EVANS: What we have heard thus far, and I believe this was probably -- our source would have been the newspaper, that CMC is giving the City of Scranton \$48,000 monthly during the time period in which their employees parking garage is being repaired and as a result all of the meters surrounding CMC, and even farther down I have noticed, are all bagged with orange bags so that no one may park there with the exception of CMC employees.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I do remember that, but that's the metered parking, but does that satisfy all of the requirements or are they -- did they very more people parking actually up in the lots at Nay Aug, and if so do they have a certain amount allocated and a way to determine whether it's them or not so --

MS. EVANS: We are still trying to determine if CMC pays the City of Scranton for any parking in Nay Aug by their

employees. Now, as Mrs. Krake reported earlier we did receive a response from the Recreation Authority stating that no money is paid to the Recreation Authority for parking with Nay Aug Park by CMC, so now we have to find out even if necessary by a Right-to-Know request if the -- if CMC is paying -- is paying the city directly for parking in that area across from the CMC.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: If I remember correctly, several years ago when they built the helipad there that parking lot adjacent to the helipad the far lot, that was specifically for the CMC employees and that's where their buses pick them up. I don't financial arrangements were made, but I don't know are you saying they are parking anywhere else in the --

MS. SCHUMACHER: I don't know, that's what I'm saying. Are they identified somewhere?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yeah, that was originally set aside specifically for CMC employees and that's why they had the

shuttle bus run from the hospital up to there.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I have never seen the shuttle bus but, okay. Yeah. Oh, okay. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Okay. Thanks.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else that wishes to address council?

MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening.

Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment Rights.

In the last nine years police and fire, we have been taking the brunt of the blame for the city being in the financial straights, and I just want to keep reminding council and the people it's not our fault. It's not the fire and police unions. We didn't put the city 300 million to 400 million dollars in debt, long-term debt. Our budgets, our salaries, have been remaining static since 2002. The administration has not given out one raise to the police or fire personnel, so when you think about it the city did follow the Recovery Plan outlined on Page 64 when it came to the police and fire unions,

no raises for them, but if you read Page 64

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of the Recovery Plan and check the budgets, you will see where the city violated the Recovery Plan when it came to giving out 25 million in raises and new hires.

You heard last week from the President of the FOP when he spoke about the State Supreme Courts decision to hear the police and fire cases. For nine years now numerous arbitrations brought about by the unions because the city violated, and I emphasize the word violated, the contracts and they were won by the unions and they have been appealed by the city. Now there is a light at the end of the tunnel.

The unions know there are no guarantees as to which way the Courts will decide, but at this point it's my feeling, and that's my feeling, to just sit it out and wait. The time for negotiating would be over, and again, that's my feeling.

The city missed the train in my opinion, it's only a matter of time. If the Courts take anything away from us at this point at least we won't be giving it away to this administration. I can live with that.

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Martin also spoke about the SIT clerk award that came out from the PRLB. The city had 20 days from the date to file an exception to the order or for lack of a better word appeal. They are going to do that. PEL got the word or will be getting the word from them. The city has posted three positions for SIT clerks. Because of this I was told today that clerical are blaming the FOP because some positions are going to be moved around. This is not the FOP's fault. The FOP has followed the contract and the SIT agreement. It is not the FOP who has violated the SIT agreement three times and the city had to pay police officers twice and they are going to pay the third.

This current violation of the SIT agreement is the third time it was violated by te city, and they are going to end up paying for people that didn't work, so the vindictiveness and retaliation starts and it is the clerical who has to suffer. They are ones who are getting manured on. The SIT clerk agreement spells out what positions

are SIT clerks, and they are starting to get moved around and it isn't fair to them.

Again, the FOP did not violate the contract. If the city followed the contract for the last nine years, we wouldn't have this mess that we have now. Nine years there has been labor unrest in this city and it's absolutely uncalled for.

And, Mr. Loscombe, stay the course.

Experts say you should have filed your
lawsuit in county court. They can say what
they want, but you can see where we are,
appeal after appeal after appeal, nine years
now, county courts. Federal Court will
never be that long, so stay the course.

Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else that wishes to a address council?

MS. KRAKE: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MS. EVANS: Mr. McGoff, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. MCGOFF: Please. First, I know Mrs. Krake said we haven't received anything

back from Mr. Dougher on the fireworks, the only thing, and I mentioned it before, that the bids that went out on these fireworks for -- there were two bids, one for June 26 and one for September 5, so I'm assuming that those are the fireworks.

MS. EVANS: Those are the dates, yeah, according to hat I have read as well.

MR. MCGOFF: Why on the 26th, I'm not quite sure, it's a week prior to the Fourth of July weekend, but that seems to be when the bids were put out, maybe they were the only available dates that they had for it, but apparently we are having fireworks on the 26th of June and September 5.

I don't know, I'm sorry I was late last week, I don't know if anybody had mentioned the public meetings that are being held on the Monroe County Local Share Accounts?

MS. EVANS: I don't believe so.

MR. MCGOFF: And I believe 5-B is asking for a grant through that. If I'm reading it correctly, I think the two are at least somehow related, but we did receive

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something from the Department of Community and Economic Development saying that there be a meeting to provide information on the Monroe Local County Share Account Funding that's available to eligible applicants in Lackawanna County, and this meeting -- there are two meetings actually, one is at East Stroudsburg University, which I don't assume anybody would go to, but on June 28th at 1:00 at the University of Scranton there is a meeting and at which time the information will be provided. That is, again, if I'm not mistaken, that's money that is to be shared among the counties from the gambling revenues in the state, so if anybody is interested that's 1:00 on -- June 28, 1:00 p.m., at the University of Scranton, Brennan Hall.

And I know Mr. Rogan has said that he was -- I believe you said you were going to ask to table that --

MR. ROGAN: Yes.

MR. MCGOFF: -- legislation, and I may be preempting, but I don't know necessarily if it's a good idea to table,

but I think maybe it's a good idea to at least hold whatever would be a final vote on that particular piece of legislation until maybe after this meeting is held when maybe some people can get information about it and determine whether perhaps this grant that's being applied for is, you know, within -- you know, something that we do want and would be viable for the city.

MS. EVANS: And I think in addition to that, though, we would also like to have Miss Aebli and Mr. Joyce come in for a caucus and describe it --

MR. MCGOFF: I wasn't saying that --

MS. EVANS: -- that project.

MR. MCGOFF: -- I was trying to --

 ${\tt MS. EVANS:} \quad {\tt No, I understand.}$

MR. MCGOFF: The way it works out if it were to go through the three votes the final vote would be on the 29th, which would only be one day after this meeting, so just the timing of things.

MS. EVANS: Yeah, but in the mean time I think our intention, I agree with what you are saying, our intention is to

table so that we can also obtain that public caucus in order to pose questions of our own regarding the project and the funding source itself.

MR. MCGOFF: The other two things that just wanted to maybe touch and ask questions, one was the SAPA Plan legislation, I know we had talked about that and we received a letter from Mr. King about putting it on the agenda, but I think maybe it's something that perhaps before August that we at least look into it and --

MS. EVANS: Yes, I know we had -MR. MCGOFF: -- make some decision
on it.

MS. EVANS: -- we had discussed this, I had not placed that legislation on the agenda because at this point in time were council to actually vote on the city's portion and the city's involvement in the SAPA Plan, I could not, you know, speaking only for myself, I could not approve of such participation. The city pays by far the largest financial portion of all of the communities involved in this plan, yet, it

appears that most of the actions or remedies that are provided by this plan are for the benefit of outlying areas such as North Abington, South Abington, Clarks Summit, Clarks Green, etcetera. And, as I said, at the same time, while these localities are paying a very small portion of the costs involved, which is proportionate to their population, the City of Scranton would have to pay the greatest amount.

Now, in the past I know that the state has provided the funding for these types of activities and organizations in an effort to encourage regionalization and coordinated efforts by various communities and in this case, for example, in terms of zoning, planning, and etcetera, but the state government has also sharply cut the budget for these types of activities, that was done last year, and since the current budget faces over a one billion dollar deficit, I do not foresee that funding is going to be returned to this particular program.

Nevertheless, I felt that because

the program itself has merits rather than voting down Scranton's participation,
Scranton would be wiser to wait and see what the verdict on the state budget will be. In other words, specifically, what the funding by the state would be for this particular program and if again it remains the same or it further decreased then Scranton I feel really can't afford participation in this and I know I would be voting against it.

So, basically, the bottom line here is it was kept off the agenda in an effort to provide time for council to learn the decisions of the state before casting a vote, but if our city planner is, you know, this concerned and this anxious to move this along then we can certainly discuss as a council placement on the agenda, but I don't feel that it's going to be to the benefit of the program very likely.

MR. MCGOFF: And again, I wasn't asking, you know, to ask -- I just think it's something that we should at least start to discuss and if need be, you know, table it at some point in time and, you know,

revisit it again, but I think we need to 1 2 start addressing it since it has been 3 awhile. MS. EVANS: Well, that's fine. 4 MR. MCGOFF: Yes. 5 MS. EVANS: We can put it on--6 7 MR. MCGOFF: And, like I said, I 8 wholeheartedly agree with you. 9 MS. EVANS: We can put it on next 10 week's agenda if council members are in 11 agreement. 12 MR. MCGOFF: And perhaps ask if 13 Mr. King and any other people from SAPA --14 MS. EVANS: Well, actually, we are 15 going to be tied up for the next few weeks 16 in predetermined caucus sessions, so I don't 17 see that, you know, we are going to have 18 availability for them until sometime later 19 in July. 20 MR. MCGOFF: Very good. Also, I 21 know we discussed in prior weeks the Comcast 22 That, too, I think we should legislation. 23 perhaps, you know, at least try and address 24 prior to our recessing for August. 25 MS. EVANS: And I agree. We have

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been actually actively working on that. In fact, just today Attorney Hughes and myself and Attorney Cohen had a very lengthy conference call, you know, many issues were posed about the contract, more information will be forthcoming from Attorney Cohen, and I know that he intended to return to Comcast with some of our concerns and then he will be getting back to Attorney Hughes.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. And last thing, I know I'm told Mr. Rogan mentioned last week the letter that OECD received from HUD concerning the program and it was brought up again tonight about some of their programs, but I think it should be mentioned that HUD did send us, you know, in their yearly review, did commend both Scranton OECD, the quote, "We congratulate the City of Scranton on it's many accomplishments during this program year, and based on those review we have a concluded that Scranton has the capacity to carry out it's programs and has met it's reporting requirements."

And so I think that's important that we understand that OECD does a great deal of

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work in promoting the many programs in the city and it's nice to see that, you know, HUD recognizes the work they have done, and that's all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Mr. Rogan, any comments or motions?

Yes. A few weeks ago a MR. ROGAN: resident came in who was victim of a credit card fraud, and he mentioned that he had to go to get a police report and he was charged \$15 for it, and we talked about it then and we had conversations about it going forward, and I think it's something we need to look into amending, and Chief Elliott actually sent me an e-mail last week mentioning that attorneys have come in to get pictures a lot of time they are attached and they will receive the pictures on a disc for free with no charge. Meanwhile, a victim of a crime has to pay for the report, and I think it's completely wrong. I think we need to amend this, and I will be meeting with Chief Elliott this Friday to discuss it and I will report back to my colleagues as well as Attorney Hughes to hopefully amend this

ordinance.

And finally, I have citizens' request for the week. The shopping center on Luzerne Street in West Scranton, there is a dumpster on the side of the building that residents report isn't cleaned in a timely manner and they say that in the summer months they can't even open the windows in their home because the smell from the dumpster is carrying into their yards and it's pretty disgusting. Could we please send a letter to Licensing and Inspection so an officer may be made aware of that situation.

And finally, I received a request from a business that's located on Wyoming Avenue, and in October they say the Mulberry Bush won a contract to put bushes in front of some of the downtown businesses, and I remember receiving that letter in our mail, and the owner states that the grate where the shrubs are going to be planted is missing for nearly two years and that people are falling and tripping on it and they are wondering when the bushes will be delivered,

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so could we please send a letter to the proper department and ask that -- I have more details here, I just didn't want to read them all on the air, and that is all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.

Mr. Loscombe, any comments or motions at
this time?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. Thank you, Ladies and gentlemen, tonight I Mrs. Evans. present you a tail of two cities. Two city newspapers, that is. In one hand I hold a copy of the Scranton Times, and in the other I present a copy of the Wilkes-Barre Times Leader, which currently only prints a Sunday edition for the Scranton readership, the Scranton Times is our one and only daily The problem is the Scranton newspaper. Times only prints sound bites that detract from the full scope of the story and allows the bloggers who read the paper over the Internet to form opinions and provide comments, thereby acting as dime store lawyers without having the facts on hand.

Now, don't get my wrong, I appreciate the bloggers and their comments,

both critical and favorable, however, in order to deliver informed comments the readers should have the full story and not just the sound bites that diminish the facts.

This brings us to the Times Leader.

The same article regarding the last council meeting and my explanations for the legal complaints are in print almost verbatim allowing anyone wanting to comment a more concise and factual account.

I realize that I have been the subject of many articles by the Scranton Times, perhaps this helps them to sell more newspapers. I would hope not. I have always promised to be open and transparent are you and I assure you that will not change. Josh Brazinski, the Scranton Times City Hall writer, has had my cell phone number and has called me numerous times requesting my feedback on many issues, and I have always responded honestly and truthfully as I did with his predecessor, Roger DuPugh.

This past week I have been the

subject of several articles, and I know that I have made it the top of their hit list, I missed a letter there, when Joe Cole dedicates a cartoon to me. However, it was a cartoon that I considered degrading to my brother firefighters and all of the hardworking men and woman who have earned their pensions.

This week, the Times also decided to do a little investigative work and contacted the Director of the Public Employee Retirement System and a Philadelphia municipal law attorney in what I can only surmise to be an attempt to sway public opinion or to provide me with unsolicited legal advice. No thank you. I have an attorney and a damn good one at that.

On the advice of my attorney, I will no longer be responding to the Scranton

Times queries, so if you, the public, want the full, unabashed story, watch these council meetings or visit me in person before or after any of these meetings and I will be happy to provide you with any information or answers that I can within the

legal boundaries. I realize as a public official that I'm open to criticism and I can appreciate that, however, let's level the playing field.

I do have a comment though. I do believe that the Scranton Times has their pens so far up the administration's backside that they don't realize that they are just as responsible for the resultant mess that we find ourselves in. Picture that in cartoon form, Mr. Cole. That's all I have.

MS. EVANS: And just in time, Mr. Joyce. Any comments or motions?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. Sorry about that. Council has received the Single Tax Office city funds distributed comparisons from 2009 to 2010, and I just wanted to report some numbers to everyone so that everyone can be informed how the city is doing collecting taxes. Now, might I add the year-to-date comparisons are from -- the 2009 figures are as of May 7th of 2009 and the 2010 figures are from May 31st of 2009, so we are not exact in comparing apples to apples, however, it is very close.

Real estate tax 2009, as of 5-7 we collected \$10 million; as of 5-31-2010 we collected \$10.4 million for a \$400,000 increase.

Earned income tax as of 2009 we collected \$7 million as of 5-7. As of 5-31-2010 we collected \$11.2 million for a \$4.2 million increase.

LST/EMS taxes of a 5-7-09 \$450,000; 5-31-2010 \$820,000 for a \$370,000 increase.

Business privilege and mercantile tax \$800,000 for 2009 compared to \$1.6 million as of 5-31-2010. So overall -- and that's a \$800,000 increase.

So overall we are bringing in more revenue through the tax office in 2010 than we are in 2009.

And I have a few citizens' requests:
I know that a resident mentioned 339
Railroad Avenue and the property having
overgrown grass, if you could please send a
letter to Mr. Seitzinger and to inform him
of this and ask him to please contact the
property owner.

Also, I have been informed by a city

resident, and it's ironic that we actually were discussing the Lackawanna River -- the Heritage Authority before because an uprooted tree has actually fallen onto the trail as has been reported by residents.

So, Mrs. Krake, if you could please send a letter to the Authority informing them of this and asking them to have the tree removed so the walkers could easily access the trail that's blocking the path. It's blocking the walking path from one side to the other and some regulars who walk there are a little bit of upset.

Also, a letter to Mr. Seitzinger if we could also add the old Scranton school location that another resident has brought up as far as the overgrown grass.

Also, I have been in contact with a Minooka resident who has informed me that the upper part of Birney Avenue in Minooka cars are traveling relatively fast at dangerous speeds and, in fact, this person had their car sideswiped and it was a hit and run type of deal, so if you could please send a letter to Mr. Elliott, Chief Elliott,

and if inform him of this, and ask if he could possibly send a patrol car to monitor that.

Also, I have been informed by another resident that the same situation exists on Emmett Street over in West Scranton near the United Neighborhood Center. Another resident has complained that there is -- informed me, rather, that cars are traveling awfully fast and fears that it's dangerous for the children at that location as well.

In addition, a North Scranton resident has informed me that the 3100 block of Rockwell Avenue between Greenbush and Reese Street has many large potholes making very difficult travel conditions. If we could please send a letter to Mr. Brazil asking him to investigate the situation.

And I just have a couple more: A resident of South Scranton living on Fig Street has contacted me regarding several rental properties that he feels are not being kept up to code. The addresses for these properties are as follows: 620 Fig,

621, 622, 624 and 626 Fig. If we could send a letter to Mr. Seitzinger informing him of this and perhaps we could also copy Chief Elliott and the blight control officer and inform them of these locations.

I have also been informed that by a North Scranton resident that on the 200 block of Reese Street recently during garbage collection -- or refuse collections would be a more formal term, some of the collectors when bringing or putting one of the bags in the truck actually let the bag bust and they did not clean up the refuse causing it to blow all over some of the resident's lawns. If we can send a letter to Mr. Brazil and inform of this and ask him to handle this situation accordingly.

Also, a resident of Pen-bryn Drive has informed me that a stop sign at the corner of Pen-Bryn Drive and Leslie Drive has been defaced and spray painted with graffiti, if we could send a letter to Mr Brazil -- actually, just send one letter, but inform him of all of these situations.

And while I'm speaking of stop

signs, I would like to thank Mr. Brazil and, well, the traffic maintenance whoever it is being outsourced now for their work in fixing the stop sign on Dewey and Jackson Street, I'm happy to report that that is now fixed.

Also, a resident of Academy Street in West Scranton has informed me that there are overgrown hedges and weeds on the property to the rear of 1435 Academy Street which are attracting various rodents, snakes and skunks. Also, the resident fears that the situation is creating a safety issue since the sign at the top of 15th Street is completely covered, that's a one-way sign and it's causing drivers to travel the wrong way on the street. If we could please add this to the letter to Mr. Seitzinger.

And finally, a South Scranton resident contacted me earlier in the week regarding the Suds and Duds Laundry Mat on the 600 block of Cedar Avenue. The resident informed me that the laundry mat is not being kept up to par as lint traps are rarely cleaned, there is gum stuck in some

of the washers and dryers, and overall that the establishment is not being kept up to code, so if we could please inform

Mr. Seitzinger and add this to the letter and ask him to please check into this situation, and that is all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Joyce.

Good evening. On Tuesday, June 22, the Pennsylvania Economy League will present it's revised Recovery Plan for the City of Scranton during a public caucus in Scranton City Council chambers at 5:30 p.m. Council encourages your attendance at this important meeting. If you are unable to attend, we urge you to watch the broadcast in order that you, the taxpayers, will be informed about PEL's Recovery Plan and how it will impact you.

Also, council will be anxious to accept your comments, concerns, and suggestions by e-mail or by contacting Council's Office by phone prior to placement of the revised Recovery Plan on it's agenda at a future date.

At last week's meeting I addressed

the problem of increased crime and the need for increased police protection throughout Scranton. I also noted that Miss Aebli, OECD director, stated that 300,000 was available for community development officers. According to Paul Kelly, solicitor of the Civil Service Commission, the hiring list of police officers will expire in July 2010 and has possibly two names remaining on it.

In order to administer a police test and to create a new list, the Civil Service Commission must receive the direction of the mayor. If the mayor acts promptly, the police test may be administered no sooner than September 2010 following meetings of the Civil Service Commission, two weeks of advertisements, and two weeks of a sign-up period. Thereafter, candidates who pass the test must receive Act 120 and additional police training.

This time line means that knew officers would not be placed on our streets until January 2011. While I do understand the requirements and agree that the process

must be followed, the fact remains that more officers are needed in Scranton, particularly now during the summer months when local intermediate and high schools are no longer in session. Unfortunately, ten weeks of free time may well add to the already documented spike in juvenile crime.

Consequently, I would like the mayor, the police chief, and the police union to reach an agreement to use the \$300,000 available through OECD to fund overtime for police officers at least throughout the summer months so that we can provide an increased police presence and protection throughout our city neighborhoods.

And with my honorable colleagues'
agreement, council wishes to send letters to
Mayor Doherty, Chief Elliott, FOP President
Martin and Miss Aebli to request that the
civil service test for the hiring of new
police officers be administered in September
2010 and that \$300,000 in available OECD
funds be expended for overtime for
assignment of Scranton police for

neighborhood patrols throughout the 2010 summer months and any time thereafter during which funds remain available. Is that agreeable to my colleagues?

MR. LOSCOMBE: That's agreeable.

MR. JOYCE: Yes.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Next, after five years of delays the Crisp Avenue Bridge Replacement Project will finally begin within a month according to a television news report broadcast last week. It's important at this time to give credit where it is due.

In truth, there were unforeseen obstacles along the way that prevented the completion of this project in 2008.

Additional requirements were raised by FEMA and DEP, for example, but there simply is no acceptable excuse for the languishing of this problem in West Mountain for five years.

According to written records, the project was to be completed in October of 2009, yet, the city did not even submit it's permit application for the replacement of

the bridge until November of 2009. The city dropped the ball and appears to have failed to act with urgency in this matter. Rather, it was the immediate action of Mr. Tom Tell, chief of staff, and State Representative Kevin Murphy, that made this project happen.

In prior years, both Councilman Bill Courtright and I tried to push the process along and only received time lines for completion. In 2010, our new council continued to pursue this project and remained in close contact with Mr. Tell who provided us with more information and documented facts regarding had project than had any previous source from whom I have requested information.

Thus, our recognition and gratitude are given to Mr. Tom Tell, chief of staff for Kevin Murphy, State Representative Kevin Murphy, and the good people of the area of the Crisp Avenue Bridge who never gave up their fight to fix a major problem and to demand what is right. If not for their efforts, the administration likely would continue to sit on this project and we would

be looking at another year wasted.

In addition, I also understand that on May 24, Greenman Peterson requested a supplemental agreement form between the city and the contractor, payment procedures, submittal procedures and execution and closeout forms as of last week. Although the project will be put out to bid on June 24 and bids will be opened on July 21, in order to prevent any possible further delays in this project, OECD needs to address any additional matters immediately. The legislation for the supplemental agreement with Greenman Peterson needs to come before council.

Council continues to await final legislation for bidding of the professional services and rental registration issues from the mayor and his legal staff. In addition, Mrs. Krake noted to me that information for the Administrative Code Book requested in February 2010 from City Solicitor Patterson was not received until the second week of June; and, as I mentioned a moment ago, OECD submitted a permit application in November

of 2009 to execute work on a bridge with documents dating stating the project completion date was October 2009.

On the other hand, the administration demands immediate cooperation from council and council's office and now council is demanding the immediate cooperation of the administration and the mayor on this legislation that benefits the people of the city in an effort to save the taxpayers money.

Also, Mrs. Krake, please call and send a letter to Mr. Renda, BA, and inquire if the city receives parking fees from the CMC for it's employees who park at Nay Aug Park, and the inquiry doesn't pertain to the \$48,000 monthly payment for metered parking during the time period of repairs to the CMC employee parking garage.

And, Mrs. Krake, please send a letter on behalf of council to Mr. Gene Barrett, executive director of the Scranton Sewer Authority, regarding flooding that occurred on June 13, 2010, on Watson Street and Smith Place. Homeowners' basements

incurred over two feet of storm water damaging furnaces, hot waters heaters, washers, dryers, and various other items.

The Scranton Fire Department was called to pump storm water out of several homes despite the presence of sump pumps in these basements.

Further, residents were informed that their homeowners' insurance will not cover replacement costs without a special rider and UGI does not cover replacement costs during due to rain events under their protection plans.

As a result, council requests that sewer pipes on Watson Street, Smith Place, Railroad Avenue, Albright Avenue near the bridge and Meridian Avenue are checked and cleaned and that catch basins in these blocks are cleared of debris in order to prevent further damage during future rainy events.

And finally, I have citizens'
requests for the week: East Mountain and
Mountain Lake Road were trimmed last week
and the residents of East Mountain thank the

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DPW for this great job.

A homeowner reports that the DPW street sweeper destroyed eight feet of curb in front of his home, I do have the address included in the request, but I'm not going to broadcast it. Council requests that the DPW repair this curb since the homeowner's property becomes flooded during rain events as a result of the curbs destructions.

A resident reports that trash was left in Mahem Court from Mulberry Street to the next block by University students when they vacated their apartments. The trash wasn't bagged and, consequently, the DPW wouldn't collect it. The resident then contacted the Office of Licensing, Inspections and Permits to address the problem and received no assistance. The property owners should be contacted to take care of this problem and to ensure that their tenants dispose of trash properly. Please address this problem as soon as portion since the temperatures have been on the upswing, and this block -- this block-long trash rather, attracts stray

animals and creates a health issue.

412 Mahem Court, this vacant residence has an unsecured door and neighbors report vermin entering the home.

Downtown residents report the hazardous conditions of sidewalks in front of Whiskey Dicks, which remain without repair. When will the repairs occur? They also request the repair of potholes on North Washington Avenue in front of the Scranton Cultural Center.

The gutter lane of East Mountain

Road where catch basins are located is

littered with debris. Also, catch basins on

Yesu Lane located a few feet off of East

Mountain Road is almost totally blocked by

debris.

Next, during Sunday's rainy events water was shooting over the top of catch basins on Cherry Street, River Street,

Moosic street, and Spruce Street since most were covered by debris. For example, a resident told me the catch basin at the bottom of the Moosic Street by the Cheese Stake restaurant was in deplorable

condition. When time permits, please clear the debris from catch basins on these street.

City residents request the clearing of liter, overgrown weeds, etcetera, on Olive Street between Capouse Avenue and Seventh Avenue Providence Road. We need to make our school children safe and stop the blight from increasing in that are, and so I'm hoping that action will be taken prior to the opening of the new school year in August.

533 Quincy Avenue, remove the bottom portion of a traffic sign that is posing a safety hazard to pedestrians.

Fifth Avenue and Broadway, a catch basin is clogged with debris, please clear, and that's it.

MS. EVANS: At this time, I'll entertain a motion that Item 5-C be introduced into it's proper committee.

MR. ROGAN: So moved.

MR. MCGOFF: Second.

MS. EVANS: On the question?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, on the question.

I don't know Mr. Marinucci personally, but I did meet him when I attended the February meeting of the Recreation Authority with Councilman Joyce. We are treated by all members of the Recreation Authority with respect, but I must base my decision for reappointment on the Recreation Authority for Mr. Marinucci on my records of Mr. Marinucci's actions during his prior and present service to this authority.

Several items come to mind: During his term over \$700,000 in no bid contracts were doled out for landscaping at Nay Aug Park.

The charge of swimming at Nay Aug

Park was instituted and continued under his term.

He has voted along with the other
Recreation Authority members in opposition
to moving the meetings to Scranton City Hall
chambers in order for the meetings to be
televised on a monthly basis for those who
are unable to attend their meetings.

And perhaps the deciding factor for me is a lease provided Lackawanna College with the exclusive use of Nay Aug Zoo and parking area at the rate of a \$1 a year for 50 years with multiple renewals. This lease could have been structured properly to generate sufficient revenue to maintain the swimming pool at Nay Aug Park and to provide free swimming for everyone. That's something that should have been looked into.

I believe it is time for the mayor to submit the name of a candidate for this position that is a bit more progressive and will serve the best interest of all of the city residents, and it is for this reason that I will be voting "no."

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else on

the question?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. I firmly believe that we need new people. We need new blood in all of our authorities. Just look at the last council election, the people want changes in this city and we can't keep reappointing the same people over and over who have the same ideas, and we have seen the results. People aren't happy. The "Kids Swim Free" program is one that the Taxpayers' Association is pushing for and children should be able to swim at our pools for free and the tax dollars supporting it, and I will also be voting "no."

MS. EVANS: For all of the reasons that have been previously stated by my colleagues, I, too, will be voting "no."

Of all of the current council, I have been seated for the longest time period, seven years, and during those years it's always been my belief and my fight that free swimming would be available to all children at Nay Aug Park. We, in previous councils, were successful in obtaining free swimming at neighborhood pools, but because

the Recreation Authority appears to have control over the Nay Aug Park pool, council has no ability to remove those swimming fees.

In addition, as was also indicated,

I felt very strongly that the municipal
authorities should meet in city council
chambers and their meetings should be open
to the public and develop advertised.

Now, of course, all meetings are open to the public, but they're held in such limited facilities many of them are never broadcast on television. Meanwhile, significant decisions are made by these authorities as was noted a moment ago by my council colleagues that the Nay Aug Park zoo apparently was leased to Lackawanna College, and I'm not quite sure that the Recreation Authority has the ability to do that. I believe they very well could be in violation of the Home Rule Charter since it is city council who has the sole power to convey property within the City of Scranton.

So there are a number of issues that have been ongoing and growing with the
