4	MS. EVANS: Are there any comments?
5	If not, received and filed.
6	MS. KRAKE: 3-D. MINUTES OF THE
7	NON-UNIFORM MUNICIPAL PENSION MEETING HELD
8	ON MAY 26, 2010.
9	MS. EVANS: Are there any comments?
10	If not, received and filed.
11	MS. KRAKE: 3-E. MINUTES OF THE
12	SCRANTON POLICE PENSION COMMISSION MEETING
13	HELD ON MAY 26, 2010.
14	MS. EVANS: Are there any comments?
15	If not, received and filed. Clerk's notes.
16	MS. KRAKE: Yes. We have a few
17	non-responses. We did not hear on our
18	Right-to-Know from the business
19	administrator concerning the flood control
20	projects.
21	MS. EVANS: I'd ask you to then turn
22	that over to Attorney Hughes, please.
23	MS. KRAKE: Yes. Also, we did not
24	hear on a Right-to-Know concerning the
25	Community Medical Center paying a fee for

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1	their employees to park at Nay Aug.
2	MS. EVANS: To Attorney Hughes.
3	MS. KRAKE: And we have some
4	responses. First is from Chief Elliott
5	regarding our testing for their our
6	question regarding the testing for patrol
7	officers. He tells us he has already made
8	that request through the Civil Service
9	Commission and he is awaiting a date for the
10	test.
11	We also received a response from Bob
12	Martin, President of the Fraternal Order of
13	Police. He tells us he is in receipt of our
14	letter and that OECD funds can be expended
15	for overtime for neighborhood patrols for
16	the Summer of 2010.
17	The FOP has a stark realization just
18	how vital those assignments are not only to
19	the safety and security of our
20	neighborhoods, but to the overall
21	relationship between the police department
22	and the community. The FOP has agreed in
23	the past and is still willing to cooperate
24	to ensure these important patrols can be
25	staffed. The FOP also agrees and is willing

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1	to cooperate to administer a Civil Service
2	Test for hiring of new police officers.
3	Even though the FOP does not play
4	much of a role in the hiring of new
5	officers, the city, council, and taxpayers
6	can count on the FOP's full cooperation to
7	get these important initiatives moving.
8	MS. EVANS: I had the opportunity
9	over the last week to speak with several
10	police officers who voiced their concern
11	that, indeed, the summer months are a time
12	of increased crime and I'm very glad that we
13	received Mr. Martin's response indicating
14	that the police department would be
15	agreeable to negotiating with the city for
16	those summer months the use of overtime, I
17	believe it's \$300,000, from OECD.
18	I would ask now that a copy of that
19	letter be sent to the mayor tomorrow morning
20	asking for his decision since it is going to
21	take him until January I believe 2011 to
22	very likely increase the number of beat
23	officers on our street that are paid through
24	COM-D. The very least we can be doing now
25	is using the funds that are sitting and are

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1	available to get more police on the street
2	this summer.
3	MS. KRAKE: Our next response is
4	from Bill Courtright, collector of taxes.
5	This was in regards to the KOZ information.
6	He tells us that a list has never been
7	generated by the Commonwealth of
8	Pennsylvania showing all KOZ properties in a
9	taxing district. To date, the Single Tax
10	Office has abated over 221,000 in 2010
11	property taxes in the City of Scranton. Our
12	office receives KOZ abatement letters on a
13	daily basis, therefore, the stock amount
14	briefly changes. And then he says we can
15	contact him if we have any further
16	questions.
17	MS. EVANS: Thank you.
18	MS. KRAKE: The next is a letter
19	from the Scranton School District
20	Superintendent, William King. This is
21	concerning the overgrowth of grass and weeds
22	at the former East Scranton Intermediate
23	School located at 528 Quincy Avenue. He
24	tells us that the Scranton School District
25	has not owned that property for more than

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1	three years. He believes the owner of the
2	property is Mr. Cliff Melberger, CEO and
3	president of Diversified Information
4	Technologies.
5	And he tells us also that it is
6	important to note that the school district
7	takes great pride in maintaining all their
8	properties and would never knowingly allow
9	situations like this to occur.
10	MS. EVANS: If we can then forward
11	that information to LIPS that Mr. Melberger
12	owns that property and that he is expected
13	to maintain it as does any other property
14	owner in the City of Scranton.
15	MS. KRAKE: Yes. Our next response
16	is from Attorney Haggerty, who is the
17	attorney for the Lackawanna County Heritage
18	Valley Authority. This is regarding
19	obtaining meeting minutes from that
20	authority. We had asked, city council had
21	asked, if they would give us a copy of all
22	of their meeting minutes, so at first they
23	called us, they weren't sure which
24	particular meeting we meant and we told them
25	it was for all of their meetings so that we

could make it public in our office and also to the library as council requested, so it's not that they weren't open to that, but here is their response. They tell us they area public agency governed by the Pennsylvania Municipal Authorities Act. All of the meetings of the LHVA are open to the public. Likewise, the minutes from each meeting are public documents available for inspection and review by any citizen. However, there is no, per se, distribution list of these minutes to any requester.

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Then they wrote further to tell us: Any meeting minutes of the LHVA which Scranton City Council desires to obtain will be granted upon request. Please direct your request to the LHVA upon the conclusion of the particular meeting in question and once the meetings are ready for dissemination the same will be sent in furtherance of the request.

MS. EVANS: I know that I spoke with you very recently about our contacting the Lackawanna County Valley Heritage Association regarding the trail and as we

10 1 are doing so I think we can once again 2 mention the importance of council receiving 3 those monthly meeting minutes, particularly, since it appears that the portion that will 4 be charged to the City of Scranton is going 5 to be much more significant than originally 6 7 anticipated. So, you know, in the spirit of 8 transparency, accountability and 9 cooperation, we would hope that they would 10 approve our request. MS. KRAKE: Yes. And we have 11 another response from Chief Elliott 12 13 concerning the operation of the quads on 14 city streets. He tells us they are illegal 15 to operate in the city as they are not 16 registered vehicles. MS. EVANS: Thank you. 17 18 MS. KRAKE: And, finally, from 19 Bernice Sparacino from the Scranton Sewer 20 Authority, Gene Skeleton has informed them 21 that the following basins have been cleaned and the lines checked. 22 They would be Watson 23 Street, Smith Place, Railroad Avenue, and 24 Meridian Avenue. 25 MS. EVANS: That's very good news.

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1	Thank you.
2	MS. KRAKE: And that's it.
3	MS. EVANS: And if you would,
4	please, send a letter thanking Mr. Barrett
5	and the Sewer Authority employees and the
6	Board of the Scranton Sewer Authority for
7	their prompt action in this matter.
8	Do any council members have an
9	announcements at this time?
10	MR. MCGOFF: Just one. I was asked
11	to remind the people that DPW will not be
12	working on Monday and please adjust the
13	refuse collection schedule accordingly.
14	Thank you.
15	MS. EVANS: Good to know.
16	MR. ROGAN: The Lackawanna County
17	Taxpayers' Association will be holding their
18	first "Kids Swim Free" event this year. It
19	will be Saturday, July 3, at Nay Aug Park
20	and children age 6 though 15 get in for
21	free. It will be from 12 noon to 6:00 p.m.
22	(Mr. Joyce enters council chambers
23	and takes the dais.)
24	MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.
25	Mr. Loscombe, did you have any

announcements?

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MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. Thank you, Mrs. Evans. I was in a restaurant today and I happened to come across this flyer and I thought it would of interest. On July 4 at the Nay Aug Park swim complex there will be an annual Independence Day celebration which is sponsored by the American Flag Committee. There will be a color detail, firing detail, flag pageant, and honorary American flag escort by members of several organizations and a band concert by the ring hold band under the direction of Kevin Riggy.

Everyone is invited to observe this annual Independence Day celebration presented by military veterans of all wars and conflicts. Enjoy the band concert, arrive early, find a comfortable spot along the east wall of the swim complex or bring a comfortable chair. Particularly, bring your children or grandchildren to observe this early grand event. Miniature American flags along with a cool refreshing drinking will be given free to all youngsters. There is ample free parking, later follow the Davis

4	That is all I have. Thank you.
5	Thank you. And, in fact, we have
6	one of the annual organizers of that
7	wonderful event with us this evening,
8	Mr. Frank Tyson, and I'm sure he is here to
9	tell us even more about it, and it is well
10	worth attending.
11	MR. LOSCOMBE: I didn't mean to take
12	your thunder, I just happen to come across
13	this today.
14	MS. EVANS: No, we have very glad.
15	People, I think, may need to hear it twice.
16	If they miss it the first time they'll catch
17	it the second time.
18	The weekly schedule for street
19	cleaning is as follows: June 28 to July 2,
20	Moosic Street to East Mountain Road; and
21	July 5 to July 9, Jackson Street to
22	Pettibone Street, including North/South
23	Road.
24	The Sixth Annual Festival of Unity
25	will be conducted on Saturday, July 10,

2010, at Nay Aug Park in Scranton. This enjoyable event celebrates the many cultures within our community and provides family entertainment by local and featured performers, step teams and cultural dance troops as well as games, arts and crafts by local artisans and delicious ethnic floods. Mark your calendars and take the entire family to the Unity Festival at Nay Aug Park.

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An important reminder for Scranton residents, the second half of the 2010 garbage disposal fee is due buy July 1 for those who did not previously pay in full. 10	Council, I'd like to wish everyone a very
11	safe and happy Fourth of July weekend, and
12	that's it.
13	MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
14	PARTICIPATION.
15	MS. EVANS: Our first speaker this
16	evening is Lee Morgan.
17	MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.
18	Last week council had to vote on the
19	Scranton Abington Planning Association's
20	ideas to redo I assume zoning and control
21	sprawl, and I would like to ask that council
22	invites them to come here and does let's
23	them, allows them to give a presentation and
24	then council revotes that issue. Two
25	council members weren't present. I think

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1	I think it would be a positive thing.
2	I sat through the presentation, I
3	asked them some questions, I won't say that
4	they were very happy about the questions I
5	asked because it got a little heated, but I
6	really think that that might be a good idea
7	for this city. I really honestly believe
8	that. I believe that we have a lot of
9	industrial areas that we could enhance by
10	becoming a part of that. Some people are
11	concerned about the cost of making it
12	happen, but I think that we have to be
13	honest with ourselves and realize that not
14	only is the State of Pennsylvania short on
15	money, I think there is 46 states that
16	really would like to file bankruptcy in this
17	nation. There is much a lot of
18	municipalities that are filing bankruptcy.
19	I think that from watching the PEL
20	tonight that I think that would should
21	really happen with council in regards to
22	them is that we should not continue our
23	partnership with them. I think that's one
24	thing that we should vote out.
25	But as far as as far as this

Scranton Abington Planning, you know, when you sat through it they had maps, it was at Scranton High School, and I just think that it would benefit us because we could have a lot of people move into this city if we can get control of many things and I think this council is well aware of that. If we could cut our wage tax, if we could find ways to redevelop our industrial areas. Last Friday I was in Harrisburg talking to a representative about that, I think his last name is Saylor. I have been trying to let the state become aware that, you know, Scranton can move forward, but we need some help in economic development. We need some someone in Harrisburg to recognize that we need funding to redevelop our industrial areas that are zoned industrial.

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All of the problems in front of the city aren't easy ones and, you know, I didn't come here to hammer council tonight I just think that maybe we should revisit that. I mean, if we can get people to move back into the city by cutting our wage tax and enhancing our city through employment, I mean, you know, you got to realize that when Colts operates their buses if they come outside of the city and there is lot of jobs here people are going to come into this city and work and when we find solutions to our tax problems then residents -- well, residents of our communities will move here.

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Most of the people who have left this city have left this city because they don't want to pay the high tax. They don't want -- they just don't want to and I think that if we can create an engine for economic development that's what was so important about bringing Austin Burke here because I think there has to be a partnership between council, the mayor, and various other organizations, and this is only one part of it, okay? You bring Austin Burke on board, you bring this group on board and then you get Council on board and then you start to empower the most important people in our community which are citizens.

And to be honest with you, the outlying communities they don't want all of their farmland turned into developments, and to be honest with you we have a lot of properties here that we could sell, readily sell and increase our tax base and increase the amount of residents here that earn a living wage and instead of having minimum wage employees in the city, which is probably generally quite a few, we can bring people that are earning 50 and 60 thousand dollars here in private industry in these industrial zones we already possess.

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And I just hope that with five members of the council watching the Pennsylvania presentation, the same thing that we did with the PEL today, maybe it may sway some people's minds here and it may be positive, and it doesn't hurt to listen to what people have to say because we may all learn something. Thank you.

19 MR. JOYCE: Thank you. 20 MS. EVANS: Ozzie Quinn. 21 MR. QUINN: Thank you. First of all, I want to thank Mrs. Evans and the 22 23 majority of the city council for inviting 24 the Taxpayers' Association to the PEL 25 revision -- revised plan that's proposed and

20 1 it's the first time I think in the history 2 of the City of Scranton that the taxpayers 3 of the City of Scranton have been asked to sit down at the table and actually get 4 involved in what they're doing -- in what 5 this government is doing with our money and 6 7 we appreciate that very much. 8 MS. EVANS: Well, I think it's vital 9 because this plan is going to impact the 10 taxpayers daily lives and so there should be 11 a voice. The taxpayers are the major stakeholders. 12 13 MR. QUINN: Thank you. And I don't 14 want to polish the apple, but what you did tonight is indicative of the last six months 15 16 of what the majority of city council has 17 been doing to try to address this problem of 18 overspending in the City of Scranton, okay, 19 and this was -- tonight showed that. 20 It appears to me that Mr. Doherty's 21 house of cards is falling apart and 22 according to the white paper that was 23 presented tonight by the PEL, and naturally, 24 that's what it was, a PR thing, and the 25 thing was that it was a -- it shows that our

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1	debt services is 11.4 percent and shows that
2	we are \$92.5 million in debt and you asked
3	if that was the principal and he said, yes,
4	and he didn't say he said he would tell
5	you what the interest would be, but that
6	doesn't include the interest; am I right?
7	MS. EVANS: Actually, it didn't
8	include all of the debt.
9	MR. QUINN: Oh, okay.
10	MS. EVANS: I believe that was his
11	statement because some of it they felt they
12	couldn't determine, they couldn't bring it
13	down or pull it out from the manor in which
14	it's listed, and so they did the best that
15	they could with it, but admittedly they
16	stated all of the debt was not included in
17	that figure.
18	MR. QUINN: Well, you know, in the
19	debt, they project the debt for 2011, 12 and
20	13 to be \$5,274,000, I mean, a deficit in
21	the operating budget, okay? And that
22	actually is what the debt service is, \$6
23	million, okay, and that didn't come about
24	until 2000 it started in 2003, so it's
25	obvious, you know, where we are. We are

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1	left, the taxpayers are left, because of
2	Mr. Doherty's free spending, we are left
3	holding the bag here.
4	And I want to thank the city council
5	and I hope and look forward to future
6	meetings and getting us back on the right
7	road here. We are talking about getting the
8	city going. Who is going to move back into
9	the city if there is such a debt. They say,
10	"Oh, I'm not going to move back in there,"
11	they are saying that the only way you are
12	going to be able to pay that debt off is by
13	an assessment and there is not going to be
14	any reassessment. That's dead. That's dead
15	in the water. No doubt about that, so the
16	only way you are going to do it is to tax.
17	Now, if I hear that I'm not going to move in
18	the City of Scranton. Thank you very much.
19	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Andy
20	Sbaraglia.
21	MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia,
22	citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I
23	will be up at Nay Aug on July 3. As you
24	know, I'm one of the committee chairmen for
25	that, for the free swim program, and

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1	basically what it is, is all kids up to the
2	age of 15 swim free. Some is allowed free
3	by the pool itself and others will be paying
4	for it. I just hope everybody it's a
5	beautiful day and everybody gets some real
6	good use out of the pool being that I think
7	they said two of them are closed?
8	MS. EVANS: Yes. Connell Park and
9	the Capouse Avenue pool in Pinebrook.
10	MR. SBARAGLIA: This "B", this piece
11	of land, is that somewhere at Mt. Pleasant
12	where this is located?
13	MS. EVANS: No. Actually, this is I
14	believe in East Mountain and if I could,
15	Attorney Hughes, if you might elaborate on
16	tonight's legislation, please, regarding the
17	easement agreement in East Mountain.
18	MR. HUGHES: Surely, Madam
19	President. What happened here is that the
20	city needed to construct the storm sewer.
21	They began constructing it over the lands
22	that were the Mountain Rest Nursing Home and
23	they were told that they didn't have any
24	authorization to come onto the property.
25	They agreed that they would give the city an

easement to come over and to put the storm water across their property to where it drains I really don't know, but they ended up agreeing on the easement and they said you can put the easement in to drain the storm water from the water that's coming down East Mountain onto the Mountain Rest property, and I think there were property owners that complained because of the storm water, and as a result this is the easement agreement.

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The owner of the property is Pennsylvania LTC, Inc. The Horsham Industrial and Commercial Development Authority has a mortgage on the property that's why they have agreed to be part of the grantor, to sign the easement agreement to the city, so the city will now have a storm sewer pipe underneath the easement area to convey the storm water coming off the East Mountain higher elevations, down, it will be distributed, I guess ultimately into the Lackawanna River, but that's what's on here is to confirm that easement agreement.

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1	MR. SBARAGLIA: It sounds like a
2	very expensive project to lay all of that
3	pipe in there.
4	MR. HUGHES: Well, that was a
5	decision the city made and it could probably
6	have gone down the streets and it would have
7	been much more expensive, and I don't know
8	how it came across to do the storm sewer,
9	but that was a decision that was made by the
10	city years ago, and as they were coming
11	across the property they were trespassing.
12	They said, "We'll give it to you free, but
13	you put the storm pipe in and you maintain
14	it," and that's what it was.
15	MR. SBARAGLIA: Yeah, but I hope
16	it's basically for the majority of the
17	residents that live up that way and not for
18	a particular resident that don't like water
19	coming down his property.
20	MR. HUGHES: I have no idea how that
21	started or how many years ago it started,
22	but this is the result of what the easement
23	was and it's not for the Mountain Rest
24	property, it's for other properties to drain
25	the water that is pooling and coming in that

area.

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2	MR. SBARAGLIA: Yeah, I would assume
3	so, but it's also if you understand what
4	they have do to lay these pipes it's not
5	exactly a piece of cake. They've got to dig
6	up, lay down and so forth and so on, and it
7	just cost money, but you are right. It has
8	to benefit the majority of Scranton
9	taxpayers and now a few individuals.
10	Well, we went through our
11	presentation with PEL, but they left out a
12	lot of things. They didn't account for all
13	of these taxes at the properties, that would
14	sort of push our tax up a little more. They
15	didn't bring in the fact that a lot of
16	properties in downtown had their assessment
17	lowered because why? We don't know, but
18	they did have it lowered, and there is lot
19	of other factors in there. We may get a
20	positive when the KOZ's expire. Right now
21	they are draining two and they didn't
22	account for the KOZ's, how much the KOZ has
23	cost the City of Scranton. All them factors
24	should have been brought up with the other
25	factors.

You got positive and negative on anything you do in taxation. Before you can really get a true picture of the city, we got to look at what we can do with the taxation of the nonprofits or even change the way the tax code is in the city. There is no -- we are charged now for sewage, okay, separately? We are charged for water separately. We are charged for our dumping of the waste separately. Maybe it's time to charge for every building in Scranton separately for police protection and for fire protection, but separately and that would then be -- our nonprofits would then have to pay because they are supplying a service like everything else. You got to look at things that are

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off the wall really because we are in a situation now where you know and I know there is very little wiggle room. We knew there was a \$5 million deficit how many years ago, eight, ten? We knew way back that we got this \$5 million deficit because that's what we have all of these lease deals, lease deals, at least for the last --

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1	well, I would say at least seven years or
2	eight years we knew we had that deficit. We
3	never really tried to get rid of that
4	deficit other than using these what he
5	called one-time revenue sources and selling
6	this and that poor I don't know who owns
7	the DPW site anymore. It changed hands so
8	many times, for all I know maybe even the
9	state owns it.
10	Well, I know you got a lot to do
11	with it, but you have certain with the
12	budget you got it look at fixed costs.
13	There are certain things that you cannot
14	change no matter what, and the worst part
15	about it someone of the fixed costs are tied
16	to a variable like you are right. When they
17	got the medical it is huge and it is a
18	variable and I don't know how other than
19	cost containment is the only solution to
20	that, but we are stuck with it. Whatever it
21	is, like I said before.
22	If only they listened to Brian Reap
23	when he made a suggestion that could have
24	saved the city millions of dollars today.
25	They just wouldn't listen to him. He said

29 1 we know we got a problem with it, let them 2 go on social security. When it hits social 3 security they lose this, okay, and they go on social security. That was just the 4 5 solution instead, of course, the way they Now we are paying double medical 6 did it. 7 costs and there is nothing you can do about 8 it. Thank you. 9 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Donna Dominick. 10 11 MS. DOMINICK: Good evening. Donna Dominick. Scranton resident. 12 13 MS. EVANS: Good evening. 14 MS. DOMINICK: I'm here for two things: First thing I think you can help me 15 16 with, the second one probably just need to 17 get it off of my chest. I think it maybe 18 might have been two years, Mrs. Evans, I 19 didn't bring it to your attention, but 20 someone else must have, I live at South Side Park Avenue between Jackson Street and 21 22 Washburn Street. There is vacant lot on the 23 corner of Jackson and South Hyde Park. 24 Every time we get heavy rain all of the 25 gravel, mud, rock, everything washes down in

front of my home. I remember at the time you said about hearing about the guy that was cleaning it up and wheeling it back up and dumping in the lot, that was my son, and we really got to the point we just stopped doing it.

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Now, the last three times I called DPW, and they did come out and they cleaned it up for us and I thanked them. I have checked, my understanding is that is a city-owned lot and if that is true I'm wondering isn't there some type of barrier that -- don't even have to be high, just something to keep that from -- it washes down and it just sits right in front of our home, you know, that's where it stops and it really is disgusting, you know, and I don't know if you had checked at the time about that, I don't know what or anything you found out about --

MS. EVANS: No, I think it was just a matter of trying to get a cleanup underway so that you wouldn't have to continually clean that mess up yourself, which you shouldn't have to do.

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1	MS. DOMINICK: Right, that's why we
2	stopped. It was awfully heavy.
3	MS. EVANS: Sure.
4	MS. DOMINICK: I mean, this was like
5	backbreaking stuff, it weighs a ton, you
6	know, and then keep wheeling it up the block
7	and empty it out in the lot, it's just if
8	it could just be sealed off.
9	MS. EVANS: We'll look into that.
10	MS. DOMINICK: Or a fence along the
11	side if the city could put some kind of
12	barrier there, I don't know. Okay.
13	And the second thing is you probably
14	heard enough about flooding, in fact, I wish
15	I was Mr. Spindler, I would be happy with
16	just my sidewalks flooding out because I get
17	it up to the second step, but that Sunday
18	when we had those heavy rains, you know, my
19	basement was flooded, took out the furnace,
20	the water heater, had to replace that, we
21	get flooded repeatedly, there is four of us
22	where we sit on Hyde Park Avenue, it slopes
23	down, evens out here and then it kind of
24	goes up a little. Now, we have been pumping
25	out our own basements for years, myself and

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1	the guy next door.
2	Now, that particular day was an
3	unusual rain event so the fire department
4	did pump out several houses around us, but
5	generally that's not the case, but every
6	time we do get heavy rain, myself and my
7	neighbor next door we pump ourselves, that's
8	just how it's always been.
9	Now, after that occurred I called
10	the Sewer Authority up because it
11	literally if you are familiar with the
12	street behind PNC Bank there, this is his
13	house, my house, right to the end of the PNC
14	lot where it becomes a lake like Meridian
15	Avenue does, and they were really nice guys
16	that came out from there, and I had
17	conversation with the one man and he
18	because I said, "I don't understand"
19	well, they checked the sewers first, and he
20	said they were clean. And I said, "Geez,
21	I'm surprised that, you know, it got that
22	bad," and I said, "Especially with the one
23	like there is a sewer across from me, there
24	is another one right here, and right here,
25	like surrounded by three sewers."

33 1 And he said back then when they put 2 them in he said they knew then that that was a flood area, so my question is why can't 3 you get flood insurance? To me, I don't 4 mind not being a designated flood area, but 5 then I shouldn't get flooded, but every time 6 7 it rains heavy and you get flooded that 8 small area some way should be designated a 9 flood area. I mean --MS. EVANS: We can --10 11 MS. DOMINIC: I don't know where you go or what you do with this, but --12 13 MS. EVANS: Let us look into it in 14 our office and if you could leave your telephone number and then we'll get back in 15 16 touch with you. 17 MS. DOMINIC: Okay. Thanks, Mrs. 18 Evans. Good night, Council. MS. EVANS: You are welcome. 19 Ron 20 Ellman. 21 MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Ronnie 22 Ellman, member of the Taxpayers' 23 Association. I was certainly glad to see 24 somebody oppose the university's building. 25 It doesn't look like too many people want to

tackle them. You know, this zoning board has just stabbed the people of this city right in the back. You know what's going to happen next, they are going to take a block of houses for parking because there is no parking for up to 1,000 people that they plan to have in this building that, you know, there is no stopping them. Then they are going to tell you we can't get an orderly -- people to cross Mulberry orderly so we need to close Mulberry. This is never going to stop with them unless you put your food down, and nobody seems to do it.

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You know, here is some more propaganda, just a bunch of dismal figures that don't make sense in here. There is no way in the world the University of Scranton generates \$411 million in this city. There is just no way, and I asked somebody what they thought about that that's very successful and he just laughed. You know, this is like World War II Goebbel feeding the German people a bunch of propaganda, that's all this is, you know, they don't stop. You people, we elected you to put,

35 you know, put your foot down and try to do 1 2 something to end it and it's not being done. 3 I have people just mention this all of the time. 4 5 Over here it says that they are 6 bragging about what's his name, 7 Mr. Pallichak brags about the University 8 giving \$100,000 in lieu of taxes. The last 9 house they took off was \$6,500 or so, but if 10 you took the 150 houses they are taken off 11 over the years and figure them just in 12 \$1,000 a piece for crying out loud, just a 13 \$1,000 instead of four or five thousand 14 that's 150,000 and here that Mr. McKenna 15 protege is bragging about them giving us 16 \$100,000 gift, and I asked Stu Renda for 17 proof of the permits and he refuses to give 18 them to me, so I could take it -- I just 19 take it for -- that they didn't pay all of 20 the -- you know, the permit fees. 21 MS. EVANS: You could file a 22 Right-to-Know request and it has to be 23 answered. 24 MR. ELLMAN: I did that. 25 Oh, and he refused? MS. EVANS:

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1	MR. ELLMAN: I got everything. He
2	is not going to give it up. He'll wait
3	until the FBI comes and they will get him,
4	but he won't give them to me. That's
5	another one that I don't have no use for,
6	and I have had a whole bunch of people ask
7	me, probably ten or one people, ask about
8	that house that I have found out, a \$200,000
9	house that is taken off the tax rolls on
10	Court Street. Did anybody check into it?
11	MS. EVANS: Actually, yes, we did.
12	Mrs. Krake, do you want to explain to
13	Mr. Ellman, please?
14	MR. ELLMAN: People want to know how
15	and why and who did it. It paid taxes and
16	was taken off. Now, if that's not something
17	crooked I just don't know what it is, and
18	how do you know how many other houses in
19	that neighborhood, and then I have to listen
20	to the United Way pleading for money they
21	gave 200 they gave money, not \$200,000,
22	to Arc to buy a house that's going to
23	it's not going to help a neighborhood put a
24	group home in the middle of \$200,000 houses.
25	There is that big building on the corner of

37 Mulberry and Sanderson, used to be the 1 2 nursing home, why didn't they go over there 3 and buy that building? It wouldn't even cost \$200.000. 4 See, they are buying houses all over 5 town, taking them off the tax roles and 6 7 nobody is doing nothing. There is no kind 8 of codes or something where you can put a --9 that's a business going in the middle of a 10 residential neighborhood. You know, it's 11 just not right. I know I could buy a 12 building next door to me and they wouldn't 13 want me for a neighbor, I promise you. Ι 14 just don't know what in the world I would do 15 if they had a group home open up next door 16 to me and ruin my property values. 17 And real quick, this little girl, I 18 ran into her Sunday, she pushes a stroller 19 with a baby in it and has a little I guess 20 he is three years old, a little tiny kid she 21 holds by the hand, she asked me again if 22 they could remove that car, two cars on the 23 2000 block because that's where she lives 24 evidently, someplace on North Main, and I 25 went by there, they got 150-foot driveway

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1	with parking in the back and they park
2	against a iron fence next to the old
3	library, you know, where you cannot use it.
4	And this isn't for me because I don't walk
5	down there, it's too far, my dog would have
6	a heart attack trying to walk that far.
7	MS. EVANS: This is right on North
8	Main?
9	MR. ELLMAN: Is what?
10	MS. EVANS: There is right on North
11	Main?
12	MR. ELLMAN: Yeah, the 2000 block.
13	MS. EVANS: Okay.
14	MR. ELLMAN: Next to that old
15	children's library and what it used to be,
16	and I don't know where she lived because I
17	didn't ask her, but she has to go out and
18	she told me she crosses the street, so I
19	guess she crossed down the street somewhere.
20	And one other thing, Sunday night
21	Miss Rosie and me were riding around and we
22	stopped in a little place called Cosmo's
23	over on Moosic Street for some ice cream and
24	here is a very apparent successful business
25	that's not KOZ and they got building permits

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1	and that shows that we don't need to KOZ
2	this whole city. He has people he has hired
3	and, you know, delicious
4	MS. EVANS: Thank you.
5	MR. ELLMAN: ice cream. He's from
6	Montdale and I asked him, you know, somebody
7	needs to just get a wheel barrow and push it
8	through the front window and tell the boss
9	to fill it up with ice cream. Very, very
10	nice people over there, and thank you.
11	MS. EVANS: Thank you. And, Ms.
12	Carrera, if we could get a letter sent about
13	that situation on North Main Avenue
14	tomorrow, please.
15	MS. KRAKE: Yes.
16	MS. EVANS: And also about that
17	vacant lot at the corner of South Hyde Park
18	and Jackson Street. Thank you. Francis
19	Tyson.
20	MR. TYSON: Francis Tyson, resident
21	of Scranton. Thank you, Mr. Loscombe, for
22	your vote, we appreciate all of the
23	information we can get around the city no
24	matter what corners it may have came from.
25	Yes, we're having our Independence Day event

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1	at Nay Aug Park as we do every year and we
2	start that off at 10:30 in the morning.
3	Some people ask why we start so early in the
4	morning, it's because what we like to do is
5	give everybody an opportunity to have the
6	rest of the day to observe Independence Day
7	with your families in our community.
8	We start our program off with a
9	concert band concert, Ted Riggy and his
10	band, and that goes on until 11:00 and we
11	call for the presentation of flags at 11:00
12	to start our ceremony.
13	On the program it's directed on
14	Independence Day for patriotism and we try
15	to make this towards all of the youngsters.
16	That's why during our program what we do is
17	we pass out American flags to all of the
18	youngsters that are there. We also at the
19	conclusion pass out a free beverage to all
20	the youngsters through the benefit of the
21	lady's auxiliary Marine Corp League, so we
22	try to make it as most pleasurable day as we
23	possibly can.
24	We actually have 17 veterans groups
25	that's going to participate in this

particular program, and it's not easy to get that many different groups at one time, but they are all very dedicated, they are all veterans. We also have assistance from our Boy Scouts, they are going to help us again this year, so if all of you can make it we certainly would like to have you attend, Madam President of council and your group.

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We would like to indicate regrettably this year or unfortunately this year is that Independence Day falls on a Sunday. This may interfere with some people that has their religious obligations, but I'm sure they can get together and come up with some sort of compromise where you can probably enjoy both, so if anybody has the time and inclination please join us on the Fourth of July up at Nay Aug Park. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much. Is there anyone else that cares to address council?

23 MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus. First, I'd 24 like to I address something up on River 25 Street up by the light there. I'm sure Mr.

McGoff must be aware of this, the light at River Street and the Scranton Expressway, well, now there is construction and there has been and there is a bridge and so it's two lanes -- it used to be two lanes going and two lanes going back. Now it's two lanes going up and one is for coming down and one is for going up, but when you are at that light and you even back up from the light there is a line to stay behind, the tractor trailers get off of the expressway to make at that turn, somebody is going to get killed because they do not move -- they don't stop, and I had to go right off the road into the dirt because you can't back up because there is cars behind you. You can't back up to give them more room, and they just don't care because I blew my horn, they just keep coming. I mean, I could have got the whole front of my car smashed.

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Well, the same thing happened with my sister. She lives up there on Moltke, so it's not just me. Somebody is going to get killed. I don't know what you can do there or a whole car is going to get demolished.

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1	I mean, it's sometimes impossible. I mean,
2	it's unbelievable.
3	MR. MCGOFF: What they need to do is
4	move the stop line back.
5	MS. FRANUS: Not even that, the stop
6	line
7	MR. MCGOFF: Well, they need to move
8	it back pretty far.
9	MS. FRANUS: They need to move that
10	barrier over to the left. They need to give
11	them room.
12	MR. MCGOFF: That might help as
13	well, yes.
14	MS. FRANUS: I mean, well, the stop
15	line is going to have to go way back. A
16	move is fine, but I don't think many people
17	even go by that stop line. You know, the
18	stop sign is way up here, they are not going
19	to back way down. It's going to be too late
20	one of these days.
21	I just wanted to come here to
22	express my views on that SAPA, whatever it
23	is. The Scranton Times has been writing
24	many editorials encouraging council to pass
25	this. I just hope you are not swayed by the

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constant barrage of letters, you know, and opinions from the Scranton Times and saying how it's basically your fault if all of these other cities and townships fail. No it's not. You stand by your guns. When asked last week Mr. McGoff couldn't get the cost of a minimal cost and it's I think wonderful, Mr. Rogan and Mr. Loscombe, that you really asked the good questions and you stuck to your guns. I mean, you really did what the people elected to you do to, and I appreciate that as well as many other people It was nice to hear. It was so do. refreshing.

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I just hope that you stand by what you think, stay the course, because if a business wants to come to Scranton they don't need that to pass to come. I mean, why should we pay money for something we don't even know how much it's going cost and then, like you said, if somebody is going to want to come, they are going to come. That's not going to make any difference whatsoever. What's to stop them. You want them to come. They are going to come. I

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1	don't get it. So it makes no sense
2	whatsoever.
3	I read these articles and I think,
4	boy, talk about propaganda. Typical
5	propaganda and then nothing against you,
6	Mr. McGoff, in a way, but when you are
7	pushing something so hard I have to wonder
8	or right off the bat I am thinking something
9	must be fishy here, something must
10	something is not right here, so that's one
11	thing right off the bat. Red flags go way
12	up. I.
13	Don't know what else to say except
14	the University of Scranton I don't think, my
15	own personal view, I don't know when it's
16	going to come in front of you, I see the
17	planning commission passed that and I see
18	where the zoning board passed that, I can't
19	even comprehend how you could pass that. I
20	think these dorms, I've said it before, they
21	are not academic buildings. I think each
22	person, I mean, they are getting tuition
23	from 400 people, that's just one building
24	that they are building. How about all of
25	the other ones that are there? Unless you

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1	get money in lieu of taxes from the
2	University of Scranton I do not think you
3	should give them what they want ever. Ever.
4	Ever, ever. Ever.
5	Their money for their permits, big
6	deal. When you people get permits you pay
7	your taxes, don't you? Well, they are
8	getting permits without paying taxes. If I
9	were the people on the hill I would be
10	outraged. I mean, starting a revolution up
11	there. That's all. Thank you very much.
12	MS. EVANS: Thank you.
13	MS. FRANUS: And thank you again,
14	Mr. Rogan and Mr. Loscombe.
15	MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else?
16	MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.
17	Marie Schumacher. I guess since they end it
18	with a Scranton-Abington planning I'd like
19	to start with it. I'd like to read the
20	forward to that plan, I don't know, it's
21	available in the Scranton Public Library at
22	Albright if anybody has taken the time to
23	look at it, but it reads: "While the
24	benefits of multi-municipal planning are
25	numerous, prudence dictates that all aspects

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1	of this plan include: This SAPA plan should
2	not infringe on any lawful rights granted to
3	any member municipal that said member
4	retained prior to it's participation in it's
5	association.
6	All decisions relative to
7	participating in this plan now and in the
8	future are the sole dominion of the elected
9	leadership of each member municipality.
10	Each member community will continue to
11	maintain it's own zoning hearing board.
12	Each member community reserves the right to
13	withdrawal from this SAPA plan at any time.
14	Autonomy of each and every member community
15	shall be permanently protected and
16	maintained.
17	We have made a considerable
18	financial investment, one of our city
19	employees has made a considerable investment
20	of his time over these past many years and I
21	believe for a number of reasons that we
22	should be allowed to hear what that person's
23	recommendation is in person, and I would
24	also since the figures weren't available I
25	would like to know if the value of the grant

value lost because DCED if you participate 2 in these does give you preference, if that will exceed the cost of participation. Ι think that's important and I do think regionalization is the way to go, but I would at least think we should hear from 6 7 Mr. King and maybe other members of the association before -- one more time or at least one time. MS. EVANS: Well, actually, we have in the past, two of us anyway. The three 12 new members did not to my knowledge, but we 13 have had the SAPA plan since 2009. Ι 14 believe or I would hope anyway that everyone has read it, and we do have, at least I do, 15 16 many e-mails from SAPA, so I am 17 well-apprised of the agreement and the 18 situation, but I might ask what do you 19 believe are the specific benefits of SAPA 20 for the City of Scranton that Scranton does not or cannot provide itself? 22 MS. SCHUMACHER: I think 23 regionalization, and I think we have made this, what was it, \$25,000 investment and, 25 as I say, Mr. King has given up a lot of

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1	evenings, I don't know if he gets paid, but
2	I think, you know, in all fairness if he has
3	made that investment of time and we have
4	made that investment of money, we deserve to
5	hear from them and in an open forum and as
6	we heard from PEL tonight.
7	MS. EVANS: Yes. We have made a
8	significant contribution greater than any of
9	the other communities involved and they are,
10	I believe, Newton, Dalton
11	MS. SCHUMACHER: Oh, I know what
12	they all are.
13	MS. EVANS: south Abington, West
14	Abington, etc., and I believe that probably
15	Mr. King's services are in-kind services
16	that have been provided, you know, by the
17	city, but do you realize this is a 20-year
18	plan?
19	MS. SCHUMACHER: And we can opt out
20	any time we want.
21	MS. EVANS: It's a 20-year plan with
22	no price tag attached to it, so
23	MS. SCHUMACHER: I understand.
24	Well, maybe
25	MS. EVANS: I believe it would be

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1	irresponsible to enter into any agreement
2	and not know what costs is involved.
3	MS. SCHUMACHER: I believe DCED has
4	costs. I think we have heard some discussed
5	at some of the meetings that I attended held
6	up in Newton, but again, I think it should
7	at least be publically, I'm not saying you
8	people obviously have made up your minds,
9	but I think the taxpayers have already made
10	that investment and deserve to hear the
11	other side.
12	MS. EVANS: Yes, but it's a little
13	bit well, actually, SAPA has held, as you
14	know, because you have been present at them,
15	quite a number of public meetings over the
16	last two years minimum, so public
17	presentations have been made, but the
18	concern about DCED and other state
19	departments funding this is significantly
20	risky right now. In fact
21	MS. SCHUMACHER: I understand what
22	you're saying that it will save money
23	MS. EVANS: the individual from
24	DCED who has been working closely with SAPA
25	just learned in November that her job was

going to be saved for 2010. You know, we don't even know if it's going to be saved beyond that. It's on a year-to-year basis, so we don't even know if the people involved from these agencies are going to continue to be employed by the state. That's how shaky and risky this is right now.

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MS. SCHUMACHER: So it's only one year, but anyway, I don't want to spend my whole time. I didn't mean to go on that long. I would like to know if the city -if you all have passed an ordinance that -on not charging victims for police reports and if so when that is effective. I know it's been discussed but --

MR. ROGAN: I met with the chief about that last week and I discussed it with some of my colleagues on council and it's something we are working on right now.

MS. SCHUMACHER: But you have the ability to pass an ordinance to actually affect that; correct?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. It would be an amendment to, actually I have it right in front of me, File of Council No. 30, 1999.

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1	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Well, I
2	would hope that would come soon. I thought
3	tonight's presentation was interesting. I
4	wish we had been able to see the conclusion,
5	but I guess that will keep us coming back,
6	and I thought it was interesting that our
7	debt service exceeds, but not by much, our
8	structural deficit.
9	And I noticed that there has been an
10	announcement for bids for the pavilion at
11	Nay Aug Park again, I don't believe that was
12	in the capital budget. Are you is
13	anybody
14	MS. EVANS: I have already put in a
15	request for that information. I don't know
16	either where what the budgetary line item
17	is coming from, I don't know if it's the
18	operating budget or the capital budget, and
19	our office is trying to get that information
20	I. Believe Mr. Renda is the one with the
21	knowledge in this area, but he is on
22	vacation now for the week. We have been
23	trying since last week to obtain the answers
24	to that line item.
25	MS. SCHUMACHER: Because the

greenhouse still isn't started and those bids were approved quite awhile ago and it seems to me that the residents and users of the old South Side Complex should be coming up on the list for their replacement pretty soon.

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And now, if I may, that flood control project that came up, the sale of that house on Parker Street, whether it's east or west, I don't know. The Tax Assessor's records and the flood office records are all -- but, I'm concerned about it from, I mean, not that we have any -much latitude because the government has told us what we have to do to mitigate that 100-year flood plan and even though there are only 18 properties involved totally, just from the rough calculations I have made based on the sale of the property, that one property that was in the paper last week, based on the percentage that is of the assessed value, the city is going to -- it's 12 1/2 percent, remember, this is a federal project so it's going to be 75 percent by the federal government and then 12 1/2 by

state and 12 1/2 by us, if I may finish this thought. It's going to be over a quarter of a million dollars to buy those houses. There are another 11 houses on those 18 properties have demolition, homes that are going to be have to demolished, which is additional costs, and then I would hope somebody is working with Advanced Textile Composites in their relocations since they are one of the buildings that are scheduled to be bought out for that flood control plan and I would hate to see a thriving business move out of the city, especially when there are lots of places, so I hope somebody is talking to them. MS. EVANS: Actually, yes. Those are part of the responsibilities of Mr. O'Hora, the flood control manager for the city, to relocate all of those individuals whether homeowners or

businesses.

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MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Well, I do -- and who budgets for those? Where is that quarter -- well, it's going to be more than a quarter of a million dollars probably when

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1	you consider the demolition costs. How does
2	that get funded?
3	MS. EVANS: That I don't know and we
4	would have to find out from Mr. Renda, and
5	hopefully Mr. Renda will respond.
6	MS. SCHUMACHER: When does Mr. Renda
7	get back from vacation?
8	MS. EVANS: I would suppose next
9	week, but I'm not sure. I haven't spoken to
10	him about it.
11	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Thank you
12	very much.
13	MR. LOSCOMBE: Mrs. Schumacher, I
14	did have those answers for you, I spoke to
15	Mr. O'Hora, basically the same information
16	that you provided on those properties. Some
17	of them are garages and sheds.
18	MS. SCHUMACHER: But I only counted
19	the ones that have homes on them.
20	MR. LOSCOMBE: But that's basically
21	what it is because I had some questions that
22	the people didn't believe it was part of the
23	flood project, but it is to get them out of
24	the 100-year floodplain.
25	And you asked me a couple of things

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1	last week, I'm still waiting for a response.
2	I did speak to Deputy Chief Lucas on the
3	fire department response to Dunmore, we are
4	compiling that. Chief Davis was out so he
5	was going to get together with him and
6	proceed with the information on that, and I
7	believe you asked about the grant for fire
8	trucks or whatever, the last vehicle, the
9	Rescue I, which is over on Wyoming Avenue
10	that was done through grants through OECD.
11	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay.
12	MR. LOSCOMBE: And I get more
13	information I'll pass it along.
14	MS. SCHUMACHER: I didn't get to
15	my I do have a fire department thing, but
16	I'll get to that next week, so thank you.
17	MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else?
18	MR. SLEDENZSKI: This is for Janet.
19	That's for you.
20	MS. EVANS: Thank you.
21	MR. LOSCOMBE: Chrissy, they're
22	rolling.
23	MR. SLEDENZSKI: Jack, what did you
24	say?
25	MR. LOSCOMBE: Did you hear them?

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1	They are rolling.
2	MR. SLEDENZSKI: I know I heard
3	them. I heard them. They roll quick, don't
4	they? I want to say one thing, Jack, these
5	guys are doing a good job downstairs, aren't
6	they? They all are, even the chief, too.
7	Wish him luck. Get back to work, Chief, I
8	miss you. Thank you.
9	MS. EVANS: Thanks, Chris.
10	MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening.
11	Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment Rights.
12	Two weeks ago I said police officers will be
13	getting paid for doing nothing when the city
14	has to pay out the award from the PA Labor
15	Relations Board regarding the SIT clerks.
16	It's not for nothing. It is for the work
17	the officers are doing, doing the work of
18	the not hired SIT clerks by the city.
19	Article I, Section II, of the
20	1993-96 CBA provides for the creation of an
21	SI Committee, SIT, comprised of duly
22	authorized representatives of the city, PEL,
23	and the FOP, so the city and PEL had a hand
24	in development of the SIT, but the city is
25	not living up to the agreement.

Following is from the March 18, '08 council minutes of Ann Marie Stulgis and thanks, Jerome, for the reminder. It's also condensed for time restraints: The SIT history since 2003. The city eliminated in violation of the police contract several clerk positions in January of 2003. Ιn February of that year, the union filed a grievance because those positions were created as part of the Recovery Plan. The SIT clerks were created in 1993 by the city and the Pennsylvania Economy League who overseas the distressed status of the city.

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In return for the creation of those clerk positions, 17 police jobs were eliminated. The understanding being that while police jobs were eliminated, lower paying clerks would be hired to do all of the paperwork for the police officers because police officers are mandated to write reports and all written reports have to be typed. Since most police officers aren't typists and tend to hunt a peck, a lot of time was spent doing paperwork. With SIT clerks working, that time would no

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1	longer be spent at headquarters, police
2	officers would be on the road ensuring the
3	citizens and public safety.
4	Because the city chose to
5	arbitrarily eliminate those positions, the
6	FOP went to arbitration. February 13, '03
7	is when the grievance was filed. That was
8	for a binding arbitrator and on September
9	13, '04, 19 months later, the arbitrator
10	ruled that the city blatantly and willfully
11	violated the union contact, thus, ordering
12	the city to make cash payments to the police
13	officers pay union legal fees and to pay
14	interest from the date the grievance was
15	filed which was, of course, February of
16	2003.
17	Did the city comply? No. It
18	appealed to Common Pleas Court and lost.
19	Did they then comply? No. They appealed to
20	Commonwealth Court. There were two hearings
21	held in Commonwealth Court, the first
22	hearing was before three judges. Because
23	this was a serious issue with the
24	possibility of a huge monetary payout and
25	the city being an Act 47 city, the

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1	Commonwealth Court demanded an en banc
2	hearing, simply meaning that the case was
3	heard by the full Commonwealth of seven
4	judges. Their decision was unanimous with
5	the city losing again. Did they comply this
6	time around? No.
7	At this point the FOP went to the PA
8	Labor Relations Board alleging that the city
9	violated the PA Labor Relations Act by
10	failing to comply with the Common Pleas
11	Court decision. The PLRB ruled in fact the
12	city did fail to comply. Did the city then
13	comply? No. The city then filed with the
14	PA Supreme Court to have the case heard.
15	Pennsylvania Supreme Court denied hearing
16	that case saying the Commonwealth Court
17	decision stands. Did the city then comply?
18	No, they did no.
19	And may I remind you, as Ann Marie
20	did in '08 that the dollar figure all of
21	those years continues to grow, as did the
22	interest. Around the beginning of March
23	2008 police officers were paid \$1 million of
24	that arbitration award. They had hired five
25	of the eight clerks. That one million was

about half of what the city owed. That money figure of \$800,000 is now what the city owes -- is not now what the city owes, it is more like \$1.7 million and growing daily. Keeping in mind that that dollar figure is mounting every day, that that interest is growing every day, they still have three more clerks to hire, which supposedly they now are doing.

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Since the city did not comply with hiring the three clerks and not complying with monetary value of the award another PLRB hearing was held in February of '09 to force the compliance. That PA Labor Relation's opinion came -- can I just finish this?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. ANCHERANI: That opinion just came out on June 7, 2010. The city is filing an exception, more delay. And might I also mention that more than one million was spent on legal fees to fight this ridiculous case. And just remember, it never had to happen. All it took was compliance in 2003 and we would not be here

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1	worrying about whether or not we will have
2	the money to pay this award. This all could
3	have been avoided. Thank you.
4	MS. EVANS: Thank you,
5	Mr. Ancherani. Is there anyone else that
6	cares to address council?
7	MS. KRAKE: 5-A. MOTIONS.
8	MS. EVANS: Mr. McGoff, do you have
9	any arguments or motions at this time?
10	MR. MCGOFF: Please. Just to
11	reiterate some of the things that were said
12	from the podium. As you know, I feel that
13	last week's vote on the SAPA plan was
14	somewhat ill-advised. We have received a
15	letter from the members or from the Board of
16	the Scranton and Abington's Planning
17	Association asking for a meeting. I would
18	hope that that becomes a priority, that we
19	can meet with them, and at some point in
20	time receive the information that I believe
21	we need to vote on that again, and hopefully
22	after that meeting that one of the members
23	who voted against the plan, against the
24	legislation, would ask for a reintroduction
25	of the legislation. I believe that it's

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1	something that can be beneficial and has
2	been said I think that the more information
3	we receive the more it will be found that it
4	is a beneficial and cost effective item for
5	the City of Scranton.
6	Secondly, I would also like I
7	don't know, do we have an update on the
8	current status of Comcast of the Comcast
9	franchise?
10	MS. EVANS: We are still in
11	negotiations.
12	MR. MCGOFF: That again is something
13	that I think we need to really move forward
14	with hopefully before we break for the
15	summer in August. I think that the longer
16	we put this off the again, there are some
17	things that I believe I believe there is
18	some things beneficial to the city in that
19	renewal agreement. I also think that the
20	longer we put it off there would become some
21	detriments to the to it, so I would hope
22	to see it on the agenda in the near future.
23	Also, I noticed that we received in
24	the mail or in our mail bids for demolition
25	of hazardous structures, the bids for seven

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1	structures in the South Side. I do not I
2	don't know if anyone has gotten I know we
3	asked at one point in time for a list
4	MS. EVANS: A list, we never
5	received.
6	MR. MCGOFF: of structures. I'll
7	see if I can see if there is a kind of
8	priority list, but I know that these seven
9	were bid out and hopefully maybe by next
10	week we can see if they're again, when
11	these will take when the demolition of
12	these properties will begin and if there any
13	other others that are scheduled for the near
14	future, and that's it. Thank you.
15	MS. EVANS: Mr. Rogan, any comments
16	or motions at this time?
17	MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. Just a
18	quick comment on SAPA again. I don't want
19	to beat a dead horse, but
20	MR. MCGOFF: It's already dead.
21	MR. ROGAN: You know, as was put in
22	the paper I said that I would be willing to
23	meet with the organizers from the group, and
24	what I said was I would be willing to meet
25	with anybody who has ideas for this city.

If they want to meet I would be glad to meet with them. I do not see how this plan would benefit the city. Again, the cost we don't know what it is, it's a 20-year agreement. Somebody else, a resident told me today, it's like buying a car from a used car salesmen, but you don't know what the actual price is.

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And again, it concerns me that Dickson City and Taylor are not involved. If you look for the past ten years much of the development in this area has been in Dickson City. It started off with the mall and now we look at all of the growth that's been up there. And again, the big thing I think that I'm concerned with is coming into Scranton is the taxes and that leads very well into the presentation with PEL and there is just a couple of things I wanted to point out that I noticed. The real estate tax revenues. In 1999 the millage increased by 12 percent, the following year there were a small increase in revenue because of the tax increase and then we saw a drop off immediately after.

Again, the same thing in 2007 when taxes were raised. For one year we would see an increase and again a drop off. The real estate tax, the real estate transfer In 2007 they were increased, there was tax. a one-year increase in revenue followed by steep drops the following two years, and actually 2007 we received \$4,715,000. The next -- that was the first year the new tax rates went into effect, so we did receive about a million more dollars from the tax increase one year. The next year it dropped down to \$3,334,000, and the following year dropped to only \$2,207,000 which is less than we were bringing in before taxes were increased. On the opposite side, the mercantile business privilege tax, which was reduced in 1997, we saw one year of a drop off when the taxes were reduced, then four straight years

of growth in that category because of the

tax increase, and seven of the eight years

following the tax decrease we received more

So I think the facts will speak for

in revenue.

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67 1 themselves that increasing taxes may be a good solution for one year, but in the 2 3 long-term it's only going to hurt us. And I would look forward to the 4 Recovery Plan when it comes up, but I 5 sincerely hope it does not include tax 6 7 increases or increases in the fees for the 8 residents of Scranton. 9 I have two responses from the OECD 10 office. The first one was regarding the 500 11 block of Lackawanna Avenue project and the 12 question was, "Have any of the companies 13 that worked for the above-referenced project 14 not been paid for the work? If so, please 15 list each of them and the amounts owed." 16 The response was that, "We are 17 currently in litigation with Sardoni 18 Construction Services against the City of 19 Scranton," and they said, "As the litigation 20 proceeds, further information may become 21 available." 22 The second question was, "Have there 23 been federal and state funds committed to 24 this project, and if so, how much from each source?" 25

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1	And the Lackawanna Avenue project
2	has three stages: Phase I, which was the
3	street scape project, was funded through
4	PennDOT in the amount of \$1,230,3256.10.
5	Phase II of the project, the Park Plaza and
6	pedestrian court, was funded in the amount
7	of \$2,088,000. That funding was made
8	available through PennDOT once again, and
9	additional funding was made available from a
10	grant to complete the park from the
11	Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Department of
12	Conservation and Natural Resources.
13	Question three, "Are there any
14	tenants who have committed to leasing space
15	in the above-referenced project? If so,
16	please list them."
17	And the response we received was,
18	"The information must be provided by the 500
19	block of Lackawanna County Development
20	Company."
21	And, "Do you have a target date for
22	full occupancy?"
23	We received the same answers, "The
24	information must be provided by the 500
25	Lackawanna Development Company."

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1	So at this time, Mrs. Krake, I would
2	ask that we forward those last two questions
3	to that company so we can see where we stand
4	with that.
5	And secondly, also from OECD, and I
6	think we touched on this last week, it was
7	about the loans that are considered open, I
8	think we talked about it for a few weeks
9	actually, and they list seven that are in
10	arrears right now, and they are in
11	litigation and the others are listed as
12	open, but it doesn't say whether they are
13	paid up-to-date, so could we please send
14	that request again asking for clarification?
15	And finally, I have two citizens'
16	requests for the week, and one is the court
17	between the 1200 block of Euclid
18	Avenue and the 1200 block of North Rebecca
19	Avenue needs to be paved as soon as
20	possible. Residents complain that ruts from
21	garbage trucks over the years is making it
22	almost impossible to use the alley. It
23	hasn't been paved in nearly 40 years, and
24	traffic it's very difficult to drive
25	around there in the wintertime because the

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1	snow can't be collected because of the ruts
2	in the road. Could we please send that to
3	the DPW?
4	And also to the DPW, the one-way
5	sign on the corner of the 300 block of North
6	Bromley Avenue and Lafayette Street is down,
7	and that is all.
8	MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.
9	Mr. Loscombe, do you have motions or
10	comments at this time?
11	MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. Thank you,
12	Mrs. Evans. First of all, I would like to
13	welcome my daughter Tara and my son-in-law
14	Bill James in here from West Lafayette,
15	Indiana for their third anniversary. She
16	wanted to see her dad in action here. Happy
17	anniversary, and the little guy, their
18	15-month old son is at home with my wife.
19	MS. EVANS: She is a lucky lady.
20	MR. LOSCOMBE: She is babysitting
21	for them tonight. I, too, I have several
22	citizens' concerns I'll be getting to our
23	city clerk, no sense reading them all off,
24	but there are two that I just wanted to
25	mention. Mulberry Street, a lot of the

signs for the side streets are missing, and that's a main drag. A lot of people coming in from out of town looking for the hospitals or whatever, it's causing a problem. I was just wondering if there is a reason the signs are down, if it's because of the project going on or if they could put something up there in the mean time until they get to that point. If you can forward that, Mrs. Krake?

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Another one I have been asked a few times is the Molly Brannigan's restaurant. I know they opened up back on St. Patrick's Day and according to the newspaper at that time they were supposed to be opening up as a full-fledged restaurant sometime in April. I was just wondering if we could find out some information on the status of that. Is there a restaurant coming in there, who collected the rent or whatever that day and how it was dispersed or whatever.

And now my next discussion is what we have already been discussing tonight is SAPA. Now, let me preface it by saying I have a lot of friends in the Abington area,

I know a lot of the officials up there, I'm
looking at the list of SAPA representatives,
I know quite a few of them, and I'm just
trying to explain my comprehension of the
SAPA plan in plain English to those of you
out there who really don't understand it.
This is my interpretation, I'll show you.

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Look at this as a fruit pie. There is a bunch of fruit mixed throughout it. Right now the way it's setup is each piece of the pie has to have all of the pieces of fruit in it. By the SAPA plan they could slide the raisins down into Scranton and keep the apples up here. That's what this plan does. It eliminates the zoning that each individual municipality has to have and it pushes it towards us. Now, the way it's been portrayed in the newspapers and editorials and whatever is that we're going to greatly benefit from that.

Well, here's the other pie. This is an exact same fruit pie, however, this is the Mid-valley, the down valley, the up valley. Their pie cost half the price. So you think someone is going to buy a piece of

Scranton pie when they could put their industrial business next door to us? We have to get our taxes, our regressive taxes in order before anything benefits us. They can say all we want. We have invested 25, \$28,000 to this point. I didn't invest it, I wasn't on council, it was passed by council at this time, but I don't think I would have at this point.

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Don King is a great man. I know Don for over 20 years, he has done a lot of hard work on this and I'm sure he believes in it. I have never spoken to him personally about it or anything like that. This has nothing against -- I'm representing our community not the 11 or 12 other communities. I'm looking at our best interests. We cannot look at a blank check for the next 20 years when we don't know what the consequences are going to be and funding is drying from the state, the federal government and all them. We can't look forward to that being a benefit down the road either.

Our best case scenario, and if you think about, we might have been in a more

competitive situation, but several years ago a commuter tax was wiped out by those same communities that want to benefit right now. We might have been a little bit more competitive, you know, but we are not, and that is why I'm against it.

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Maybe down the road regionalization will work, but we have to be on the same playing field. We have to be on the same plain. Again, as I stated with these pies, there is no guarantee if someone wants to build an industrial park in South Abington is going to be steered to Scranton. Sure they will be steered to Scranton, but when they find out they can get that same piece of pie for half the price next door, just like Wal-Mart, just like Dickson City, where are they going to go?

So the newspaper can put all their editorials in, they could put all their articles in, but the newspaper if they want to put their money where their mouth is let them build a new production plant in Scranton if they believe in it so much, and that's all I have to say. Thank you.

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1	MS. EVANS: If I could just add one
2	thing to that because I believe I was
3	probably the only council member here this
4	evening that met with SAPA back in 2005, and
5	my question to the them was, why only
6	Scranton? What about Scranton neighbors?
7	And I specifically named Dickson City,
8	Throop, Old Forge, Taylor, Dunmore. And
9	happily thereafter Dunmore received an
10	invitation to join, but I was told by the
11	SAPA representatives, no, we will not allow
12	other boroughs and townships into this
13	organization because it would make it
14	would make the organization too large and
15	unmanageable, and that has the adverse
16	effect then of making us, as Mr. Loscombe
17	said, in competition then with all of our
18	neighbors who have much lower tax rates than
19	we do.
20	And so I don't believe that this
21	plan can force or can guarantee that anybody
22	business, industry or even homeowners are
23	going to locate into Scranton. That's
24	something that's already available to us and
25	any zoning changes that need to be made, the

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1	city can make. Mr. Joyce, do you have any
2	motions or comments this evening?
3	MR. JOYCE: Just a few brief
4	comments. A few weeks ago I believe it was
5	Mrs. Schumacher who asked what exactly was
6	the amount of revenue that the city will be
7	generating when KOZ's expire and we did I
8	did some research and with the help of our
9	office and Mr. Courtright we received
10	notification back that in 2010 \$221,000 was
11	the amount of abatement. To date, that's
12	what the Single Tax Office has abated in
13	2010. I know that 2010 is still current, so
14	I'm not sure if that will be if there
15	will be additions onto that. But,
16	Mrs. Krake, can we please send a letter back
17	over to Mr. Courtright and ask him if he
18	could gather the amount that the tax office
19	abated in 2009.
20	Just to further inform, a list has
21	never been generated by the Commonwealth of
22	Pennsylvania showing all of the KOZ
23	properties in a taxing district as they have
24	informed, so we are just going by what they
25	have provided us in their records, and

that's all for tonight.

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MS. EVANS: Thank you. Good evening. Prior to this evening's regularly scheduled council meeting the Pennsylvania Economy League presented it's plan -- or it's planning I should say for a revised Recovery Plan for the City of Scranton during the public caucus. Because PEL was unable to complete it's presentation, an additional public caucus will be scheduled at 5:30 next Tuesday, July 5, in council chambers. Following completion of PEL's public presentation, city council will read and review the planning portion of this and formulate it's responses and suggestions during the forthcoming weeks. I urge you, the taxpayers, to carefully consider this plan which will directly impact your daily

lives, your money and your services. All comments and suggestions can be he mailed to council members and our office may be contacted at 348-4113.

It's important to remember that historically Scranton has been a distressed

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city for 18 years and during this time more
than one Recovery Plan has been written in
the past, but all have been failures since
Scranton remains distressed and has amassed
more debt in the past eight years than
during any time in it's history.
In addition, the previous Recovery
Plan expired effective December 31, 2005,
and as was noted earlier this evening, five
years have transpired since the presentation
of a new plan. Consequently, it's
imperative for the survival of Scranton and
the success of the potential Recovery Plan
that we take our time in considering it. We
can't afford to rush to judgment, to ignore
impending financial crises or to turn a deaf
ear to the cries of our already overburdened
taxpayers. In short, we can't afford to
fail this time.
As a result, as much time is
necessary will be allotted and attention
will be focused on every aspect of the plan,
and equally important, council fully
recognized the weighty financial problems of
the majority of Scranton residents and as a

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result intends to examine and propose alternatives to some of PEL's suggestions in a determined effort to protect you and to ensure the economic recovery of Scranton.

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Next, approximately five years ago a three-way stop sign was installed at the corner of Providence Road a state-owned street and Diamond Avenue and that occurred after a resident was struck and killed by a motor vehicle. With increased property development and traffic on Providence Road serious accidents are on the rise. As recently as election day, a serious accident occurred when one driver failed to stop and both vehicles were towed on flatbeds. The Weston Field playground is adjacent to the intersection and hundreds of Scranton High School and Bancroft Elementary students cross there dangerous intersection daily. As a result, residents of the area request the installation of a traffic light at the corner of Providence Road and Diamond Avenue.

I have learned from PennDOT District Office 4-0, that a municipality can approach

it's planning organization to request such intersection improvements to be considered for the Transportation Improvement Program or TIP where it would compete with other worthy projects for prioritization. With the option, the municipality would be required to sign a maintenance agreement. So, Mrs. Krake, please send letters to the planning commission, the mayor, the city engineer, and the DPW director requesting the installation of a traffic light at the this location and providing the information received from PennDOT.

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Two brief updates, the 2009 independent audit remains unfinished. Numerous items requested by the auditor from the administration, NCC and the Redevelopment Authority still have not been submitted despite numerous reports and requests from the auditor.

Second, the administration has not drafted rental registration legislation as requested numerous times by council through correspondence and by phone, and at the same time \$120,000 was plugged into the 2010

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1	budget for rental registration.
2	So, Mr. McGoff, I was wondering if
3	you would please find out why the
4	administration is holding up the legislation
5	and when council can expect to receive it in
6	order that the position of rental
7	registration coordinator can be advertised
8	and hired.
9	MR. MCGOFF: I will do that. I will
10	ask. I have spoken to some people in the
11	law department and one of the problems they
12	have with the legislation is the reluctance
13	to amend the budget in light of the Court
14	hearings on amending the budget.
15	MS. EVANS: I spoke with them, also,
16	and that was one of the responses they gave
17	me in addition to the fact that they don't
18	work for city council, but, you know, and
19	that's true. But, on the other hand, they
20	don't work for the mayor either, they work
21	for the city, they work for the people of
22	the city, the taxpayers are paying their
23	salaries, so they should be working on
24	legislation.
25	But beyond that, this is coming from

the legal department on the advice of the business administrator, so it is -- it is generated by the administration and the mayor, therefore, the mayor did request opening the budget to do this. It's been done countless times in every year of the seven years I have sat on council, I probably spent half an hour reading off the many times the budget has been opened and amended, year after year after year, and so I think what they are going to find though is a big budget hole if they don't do something.

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And, you know, council has put a lot of work into it thus far, had an ad developed and ready to go, gave it to the Human Resources Department so that they could advertise, receive the applications and qualifications and the mayor could make his choice, but, you know, this is going on now week after week, month after month, and I guess it will be up to the administration then to fill the hole.

As I was saying, revenues are the most crucial part of a city budget and once

revenues are determined for a fiscal year expenditures should be designed to meet, not exceed, these revenues. In a lingering recession, particularly budgetary expenditures must be decreased, but in Scranton's case revenues must also be increased in order to meet our historical debt. I am concerned by the preliminary census reports I have been reading which demonstrate a population decline in Scranton despite the downtown economic development projects, and the reputation for attracting young families that the mayor and the Scranton Times endlessly touted in an effort to change our perceptions of reality.

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Regardless of the PR, the city has lost approximately 6 percent of it's population since Mr. Doherty became mayor of Scranton. That trend can only be reversed through decreased taxes and strong public safety departments. The exodus occurred primarily as a result of oppressive taxes and the frustration of living in neighborhoods that are no longer safe and clean. Scranton's task to is heal itself financially and focus on neighborhood and infrastructure improvements such as increased police patrols and beat officers, road paving and blight elimination.

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Next, I spoke with County Commissioner O'Brien last week regarding the county traffic signalization project that will begin in 2011. Commissioner O'Brien stated that federal dollars are in place from the Department of Transportation for the upgrade of 50 traffic signals in In particular, I asked if the Scranton. upgrades will include modifications for the disabled. As you may recall, a group of visually impaired citizens brought this oppressing problem to city council's attention this past Spring and this issue has remained one of council's great concerns. I'm very pleased to announce that the traffic signal upgrades will, indeed, include much needed modifications for the disabled in our community.

And finally, I have a some citizens requests for the week: There is the three-way stop sign at the corner of the Jackson Street and Cameron Avenue and despite this there was an accident at the this location in July of 2009, and residents report there are frequent near misses. Like many other intersections city-wide that have a four-way stop sign installment, this intersection seems to require a fourth stop sign. Residents of the neighborhood have requested this for several months. If the DPW chooses not to install the sign, please provide city council with an explanation on or before July 8, and this is I believe our second or third request on this matter.

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The corner of Olive Street and Wheeler Avenue, there is a vacant apartment house with overgrown grass which has become a haven for skunks and snakes. On Saturday evening, June 26, a family was forced to cross the street to avoid a snake at the this location while walking to the concert and fireworks display at Nay Aug Park. This is an ongoing problem and last summer the property was maintained by a neighbor and by my husband. Please contact or cite the owner of this property for it's blighted

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1	condition and the health and safety problems
2	it presents to Scranton residents.
3	The corner of McDonough Avenue and
4	Oak Street, trees and brushes are highly
5	overgrown and obstruct the vision of
6	motorists at this intersection. Please cut
7	the overgrowth this week for the safety of
8	the public.
9	Residents continue to report that
10	numerous catch basins citywide remain
11	clogged with debris. Residents are
12	requesting a cleaning schedule for each
13	section of city neighborhoods similar to the
14	street sweeper schedule. It was suggested
15	if a DPW employee accompanies the driver of
16	the sweeper, he can compile an inventory of
17	clogged storm drains and the problems could
18	be addressed in an organized manner. Street
19	and property flooding has escalated this
20	summer, as we all know, and cleaning catch
21	basins may help to prevent or alleviate
22	future flooding.
23	Let me see now. City residents
24	report that the Washburn Street Cemetery is
25	once again overgrown. Please contact the

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1	owner and ask him to maintain his property
2	as soon as possible in the manner that other
3	local cemeteries are properly maintained.
4	Also, a dumpster in the 10 block of
5	Hitchcock Court is overflowing and the
6	stench of the garbage permeates neighbor's
7	properties. The yard is also littered with
8	garbage. Please send an inspector as soon
9	as possible.
10	And we have potholes in the 1100
11	block of Roth Street that are in need of
12	repair by the DPW.
13	And I also received today an e-mail
14	from citizens in the area of Bancroft
15	School. This is at the corner of Cooper and
16	Ward Place. As the DPW this morning was
17	collecting the trash, they entered a "Do Not
18	Enter" block and in so doing they took out,
19	not the workers, but obviously the truck,
20	took out a piece of brand new curb and
21	neighbors witnessed this and were very upset
22	by it and naturally because they waited
23	decades to have their street paved and when
24	at long last, you know, there is an
25	improvement it's unfortunately being

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1	destroyed, and so if we can notify the DPW
2	we need someone to get a back there and
3	repair that curb.
4	Also, in response to Mr. Ellman,
5	United Way contributes \$90,100 to Arc or the
6	Association of Retarded Citizens each year.
7	\$70,000 is for advocacy for autism. The
8	remaining \$20,000 is for different projects
9	such as Robinson Park, and the home on Court
10	Street that you had inquired about was
11	designated a KOZ, you are correct, since at
12	least 2006.
13	And I believe the car that you had
14	mentioned awhile back on School Street, an
15	inspector went out about that and there is a
16	carport that's over it and at the time he
17	visited the location, the car was half-way
18	out of the carport. No one was home at the
19	time so the inspector left a note for the
20	owner of the car to pull the car into the
21	carport and cover it up and keep it out of
