MS. KRAKE: Fourth Order, citizens participation.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker tonight is Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, a Scrantonian. Today I speak as a cochairman of our Kids Swim Free Program which we held on July the 3rd. We had 440 kids we pay for out of that affair. But that wasn't the point. Then I went down there to the Rec Authority. As you know, two pools were closed, okay, during the hottest, maybe during the hottest part of the summer and I posed a question, you knew the pools were closed. Why didn't you at least offer reduced rates that the kids can use at Nay Aug

because that's what it's there for. Nay Aug is not a cash cow. But the Rec Authority is using it as a cash cow and that's not right. As you know, they planned to build a pavilion. And the reason why they're building that pavilion is because we will pay for it and then will get the money that it generates. Is that right? How much are we actually losing at Nay Aug with this authority? That money that is being generated out there could all be placed in the general fund. I'll give you a copy of their audit. I don't know if you got it but I had the girl prepare a report for the month and you can see it's marginal. I don't see how anything could be so marginal as that report. I mean, they're working on something that like some bucks a month over what they're spending. That authority had -- well, you know, we've been talking about it for years. That should have never been started just

like the library. There are certain things that should have stood where they were. The Parks Department could have very well deal with what that authority does. And there's no reason for it other than the fact that it's a separate government. Another government within the government and that's not good for the city. even we're going to be under such a mounting debt that our grandchildren still won't be able to pay and I don't think I can pay now. I just feel sorry for the people that want to live in Scranton and have children in Scranton, to let them stay in Scranton because the debt is being so great that there's no way that they can surmount it without having to heavily penalize the citizens, the Scranton taxation. And we all know taxation is regressive. As you know, when people make it good in Scranton, they get out, for some reason they get out. Ι was one of the chief construction

workers that stood because I love the city and I loved it all my life so I was willing to take the penalty because I understood why we had to do what why were doing. To keep elderly people in their home, we took on the burden of wage tax and it's a heck of a burden. But it keeps your grandmother in her house. But now it's becoming so great that that won't work anymore and we're going to be taxed somewhere along the line and when all the money with -- well, take the South Side Complex, we're going to end up paying that back to the university eventually because I don't know that the federal government will ever let it go. As you know, that happened up there at the -- there's federal money in there and they're not really anxious to have things that were set up -- used forever being sold So henceforth that's why we're still covering the South Side Complex because of the federal money. But

these things are there. But to turn Nay Aug Park into a cash cow is a slap to all the people that gave to that They gave it up for a reason. place. They gave up good primary land for a reason, and they wanted it to be free. As you know, the original lease called for only amenities to be up there. That's it, amenities, not what they turn it into. They consider everything an amenity now, I guess. And then the people -- even with the improvement of that bath house, it's a joke. The one they torn down is way better than the one they put up. But yet we're stuck with these things. Bad decisions all along. And they're continuing bad decisions. I just hope that you can correct some of them before the sky falls like Chicken Little said. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, council. The thing I have -- I really agree with almost everything that Andy

said tonight at the podium and I hope the people would really consider his statements here tonight. I think they were on point and very relevant. city council decided to meet with the Scranton/Abington Planning Association?

MS. EVANS: At this time council will not be meeting with them but any council member is free to contact them independently.

Okay. I thought it MR. MORGAN: would be a good thing for them to come in here and give a presentation, allow 61 to film, take relevant questions from council. I still think that has a lot of merit for the city. I just hope that more of the people on council would feel the same way. definitely need a change in direction here.

You know, it was in the newspaper today that there's going to be grant money used to demolish homes in the city. The federal government gave a

grant for \$292,000 to demolish homes, and I just think that maybe a long time ago and maybe now we should really consider trying to find an avenue to sell those properties if they could be renovated and the same thing with all the empty properties in the city. I mean, this is just a small number. There's an awful lot of homes in the city that have curtains on the windows and so forth and so on but nobody lives there. There's a lot of abandoned properties in the city. I commend that the City of Scranton can keep tearing properties considering the situation we're in. We have a lot of vacant lots in the city that aren't maintained. name them. As a matter of fact, I have one right next to my property that is not maintained by the city and just that it's counterproductive to tear properties down because if they can be salvaged, people can live in You know, there was a them.

presentation tonight, I just think we need an awfully large amount of economic development in this city. Ι think we need to change our focus. You know, if you see all the condemned homes everywhere, and I just think that maybe we should consider off setting these properties, do something with them. I mean, all these condemned homes. They're just a breeding ground for trouble. And I just think that the council should really try to do something about it. What you can do? I really don't have an answer for you at this point other than sit down and try to discuss it, come up with a solution, but sooner or later all we have in the city is parking lots. I mean, you know, we keep trying to redevelop the downtown. Everybody talks about the downtown, look at the neighborhoods. I mean, there's even more properties for sale now in the neighborhoods that I ever remember. And, I mean, the

neighborhoods, we need a major infusion of cash to bring all these structures up to code, to create a better quality of life for the residents here. That's why I think it's so important for the city's Chamber of Commerce and the council and the mayor to work together to create economic development. There's answers up there. It's going to take all five council members, the mayor and all these knowledgeable individuals that we have in this city to make it happen. But I just think that we need to try to find a solution. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mr. Morgan, you remember our meeting with the -- with our state representatives, as far as blighted properties, there was and discussed -- we're still in the process of working out a program to save some of those dwellings that are indeed structurally sound. It would take a city engineer to go through

them indefinitely. I mean, that's an idea, I believe, we all have and I don't think we should go in and bulldoze everything down. So we are working on that, but it's not something that's being done overnight because there's certain stipulations that have to be applied and --

MR. MORGAN: No, I'm not up here to say that I didn't think council is doing anything, you know, but when you come to council as long as I have, it's been a long time, there's been a lot of discussions but we still keep turning properties down and we still keep getting gaps in the neighborhoods where there's weeds and overgrown properties and people are dumping their tires there. You know, I would like to say that in places people are growing gardens in some of them. Ι think that it's an excellent idea because the lots are maintained and people are growing vegetables that live in the neighborhoods, and I guess

whatever is left is donated to St. 1 2 Assisi's Kitchen or other places and 3 there are answers there, and I didn't 4 come here to day to say that I don't 5 council is not --MR. LOSCOMBE: No, no. I just 6 7 want to remind those that didn't know 8 about it or whatever but we are 9 working on -- we're not looking to 10 just go in and bulldoze everything 11 down. 12 MR. MORGAN: No. I appreciate 13 all you're doing --14 MR. LOSCOMBE: I just want to say 15 is we want to save the property as 16 much as possible. MR. MORGAN: Thank you. 17 18 MR. LOSCOMBE: I just have one 19 more quick question. On the SAPA plan 20 what do you see as a benefit to us, 21 the SAPA? 22 MR. MORGAN: Because I think it's 23 going to bring economic development 24 into the industrial areas of Scranton 25 because it's going to stop sprawl of

industrial parks on farmland. It's going to be a really major economic boost to this city. When you sit there and you went to the presentation -- I think some people in this room went there and whether they agree with me or not, you know, I think it would be a very positive thing. And I think that the climate in Harrisburg, now we all have a state story -- so we'll going to do some things ourselves and all answers aren't simple but, you know, you go down to North Scranton Lace, off Davis Street or you go over by where Kentucky Fried Chicken, down there where Capital Records was, we have a lot of land to rebuild. And that's why I thought to bring Mr. Austin Burke here was so important because when you get business and government to work together, we can really move something. And we're not competing with the outlying areas for development money because it's all

been rezoned in a fashion that makes it positive to bring development into the city, and once you create an economic engine where you create jobs, you bring people into the neighborhoods because they invest in these condemned homes and they bring them up to the code and they move in and then everything starts moving together. It's not going to happen tomorrow, it's not going to happen a week from now. It's going to be a long range thing, but I think it's very positive, and I just hope that you can appreciate my viewpoint and that's why I think it's so important to sit down with these people that put this together, you know. I mean, like I said before, when I went there and asked some tough questions, they got kind of angry, but you know what, they have a plan and I think it has merit and I think it's important to the city to listen to other people's ideas and I just hope that you would invite them

here and maybe change their mind and really give the city a shot in the arm. Everybody can't have their way.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Well, the reality is, I don't have anything against the plan per say but based on the conditions that we're under right now, there's no benefit to us to pay for a plan that's not going to benefit us. There's no guarantee what they send down to us like I explained last week that's coming to us when we have neighborhoods on both sides of that and have a lot of better tax rates. Look at all the KOZs, KOEZs and grants that we've given out over the last ten years, what do we have to show for it --

MR. MORGAN: You know, Mr.

Loscombe, you know, that's why the

Scranton School District shot down the

KOZs the last time. The city now, I

believe, in my own mind is beginning

to make change in direction. It's

going to take time. Things aren't

going to be done overnight but, you know, we have to address the situations we find in the neighborhoods. And as long as people continue to flee the city with no economic hope of major development in these industrial zones, you have to understand that if this was going to happen, we have mass transit right here in the city. People can get on a bus and go to any developed industrial area in this city and work. And once you create an economic engine which creates jobs and wealth, then you will turn the city around. And that's the problem here. All the young people are leaving, and we need to create an opportunity for them to stay. And I'm 50-years-old so you can't create it for me. You know, but look at all the children that are being born here and --

MR. LOSCOMBE: The KOZs and KOEZs --

MR. MORGAN: Well, they took the

1 free money and ran. 2 MR. LOSCOMBE: That's why we have 3 to look at this a little bit closer. 4 MR. MORGAN: And that's why I think we should have a discussion with 5 6 them and maybe we'd all open our eyes. 7 But I think it's a positive thing and I agree with you that we can't give 8 9 anymore away and I think the Scranton 10 School District made that point 11 extremely clear to everyone involved 12 and there's a change in direction and 13 I think that this council can take a 14 change in direction and make positive 15 things happen for this city, and I 16 think you're in the driver seat and 17 you can do it, but it can only happen 18 through dialogue, and I just hope you 19 would reconsider it. Thank you. 20 MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, Mr. 21 Moran. 22 MS. EVAN: Marie Shumacher. 23 MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, 24 Marie Schumacher, city resident, 25 member of the Taxpayers Group.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. And then before I forget, I guess it is safe to assume, I did look at the drawings for the 6-8 project and that drainage pipe, does that go into another drainage pipe or does it go into that retention pond, and if it does, has it been checked with the PennDOT to make sure that the water that gets carried under 307 in Roaring Brook is sufficient to handle additional load?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I believe when that was designed, it had to get the Pettinato approvals from their engineer that -- I don't have that here tonight with me. I did have it last week but --

MS. SCHUMACHER: So it has been -- we can assume that's been done okay. Thank you.

Next, I want to apologize. Last week after I left, I had a call from Mrs. Tice whose home is the first of those homes that I spoke of last week there in the flood mitigation area and she was very upset and the minutes aren't available yet. I don't think I said that their home was -- their compensation for their home was overpriced. I really believe what I said was that it was a factor of eight over the assessment which is usually fives and that's what I based the rest So I do apologize. I know it must be -- I mean, I feel bad for those people that have lived in their homes and built their homes and lived in them for a number of years and put a lot into it and now they're being forced to sell or accept the consequences and I know that's not easy and I certainly didn't mean to

hurt anybody's feelings on it. I wish it could be avoided.

From there, where do we go? guess perhaps with the biggie. is the decades of overdue property reassessment. To their credit former majority Commissioners Cordaro and Munchak boldly stepped up to the plate and began the process. Unfortunately, Commissioners Washo and O'Brien have put this project on hold. Last week PEL presented a chart comparing the total assessed valuation to purchasing power that shows a 32 percent lost in purchasing power in the current year. Not only is this wrong, but I also recall reading a letter to the editor of a property owner wondering whether they could have saved their home if their taxes had been lowered because of reassessment. Now, that's sad and it's impossible to address with certainty without the completion of reassessment but I'm hopeful that council will decide to send a letter

to the commissioners asking them to complete the reassessment as rapidly as possible and get that back on track. Nobody likes it. I know it's considered a third rail, but two commissioners at least took that first step, and I think it's time that we take that next step. It's going to have to happen sometime, and I think it should be done and completed as soon as possible, but it should be in a correct manner and not follow the Luzerne county pattern.

Next, I would ask that another communication be sent, this time to our esteemed state representatives and senators. I believe it's time to request a change to the State Capital Fund. When Ken Smith appeared before the taxpayers group and he was questioned on giving -- make a million dollars to the university for their Mulberry Street fiasco -- that's my choice of words, not those of the questioner. But his answer was that

the University of Scranton was the only entity prepared to accept the funding. By that, he was referring to 50 percent matching funds that are required. Now, I ask you, what municipality or authority would have three and a quarter million dollars sitting around so they could accept a seven and a half million dollar gift from the state taxpayers. Now, I ask you which is more important, that the university beautify a city street on their -- close to their properties or whether one of our many streets that haven't been paid for 40-plus gets This is an abuse of state paved. taxes in my estimation. The U gets multi-million of the taxpayers of which they aren't one and they, in turn, give the city a paltry \$110,000 in lieu of taxes a year. This nonsense has got to stop.

Another capital project that could use some help is -- may I finish -- is the Sewer Authority where

expenses have been mandated to comply with the Chesapeake Bay project but they have not been paid for by the federal government. If the state insists on giving away money for capital projects, they should accept municipalities and certainly some of the authorities from the 50 percent match, and I hope you so inform our state representatives.

Now, before I have a stroke, I'll switch topics. Awhile back the Scranton Tomorrow executive director appeared before you to request approval of a main street grant application. Council approved that application. The grant was received and now I believe it's time that you invite the executive director back to tell us how this main street grant will be spent and I'll hold the rest for next week. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, council.

Yesterday I was at Harbor Freight and a fellow asked me how I could go on week after week after week attacking everybody and get away with it. I have a formula. I told him I had a Don't say nothing up here formula. you can't back up. That's very important because that's why no one ever confronts me, I guess, and know your enemy which is not hard around here and you pick your time and place. That's my formula. He wonders why I haven't got punched in the head or something probably, you know. That's another thing.

In the paper -- I forget what day this was, the kid on the motor bike, I happen to know who that was. I didn't know him but I knew. This boy had this big bike that goes 60-70 miles an hour for three days. He had no experience, and the father didn't supervise him. This one just -- this is what I've been telling you it's going to happen. If you hit a child

Thev're running all over up and down the streets and I don't know if people know it, a four-wheeler can be licensed but they have, you know, they have titles that they're licensed and inspected and insured. The ones that you see running all over the place can't be licensed. They don't have --I don't care where they ride. Let the people that sold it to them find them a place to ride. But, you know, they just don't belong in the street. Thev ought to make an example of this father, take his license away and throw the book at him and let the other kids out here with these bikes know what's going on. Last Monday one of them deliberately hit my dog with his bike and kept going, and I'll find I know who he is but I just don't know where he lives. But he rides all the time over by my house

and he runs up there by Deacon Street or Depot, someplace down there. You know, to hit my dog, it's like a kid. I don't have any kids to speak of.

But in today's paper I was reading somebody -- a young kid wrote a letter of how fortunate we are to have the University of Scranton here. To me they're nothing but like a big maggot, eating up our tax base and here she's 19-years-old, I think, but she's not even going to stay here. She's going to Boston. She doesn't live in town. You know, these people are just -- they're just immature or something. They write these letters and they don't have any idea what it's like for the people here that is supporting these institutions that are just sucking the life blood out of the city. I was waiting for you to come back.

MS. EVANS: I'm here.

MR. ELLMAN: Last week I understood your defense of the United

Way. But to me they're funding and arguing and these institutions like that that are just block busting and ruining neighborhoods in group homes. They don't have a zone or they ought to be some kind of requirements where they can't go all over the place. And I've had a home -- I've had six or eight people ask me what they can do to it, if it's possible to buy a KOZ from the mayor. I don't know what the deal is but I had several people wanting to buy them. You know, people that buy that 1500-block of Court can have one, why can't the rest of us? You find out anything?

MS. EVANS: Actually, no, I haven't found out anything more than I was able to tell you last week, and I just wanted to add, though, I wasn't given that information in defense of any entity. It was just providing the facts for you. That's all.

MR. ELLMAN: Well, to me when I asked Stu Renda for some information,

it's like him being honest is like being pregnant. You are or you're not. And he's not being honest with He refuses to give me an answer me. so I think I can assume that there was something shady going on with these transactions if he won't tell you the truth. And there's another one I can add to my list. I got a list, there must be 15 people on there. there's something not kosher when that house was taken off the rolls and how do we know there's not other houses like that all over the city. You don't know if my house had been take off, I might have been able to buy one of those KOZs from the mayor.

like you say very often, I don't
receive answers either as you can see
when Mrs. Krake provides her clerk
notes every week, many, many, many
requests for information or requests
to help citizens go unanswered. So I

1 think we're starting a little bit of a 2 line here for certain department 3 heads, not all, but certain ones. 4 MR. ELLMAN: Well, to me this is 5 important because this is like theft 6 of money from the taxpayers making 7 that house a KOZ. There's no reason, 8 you know, and there is a reason when 9 nobody will tell me because it was 10 illegal. 11 MS. EVANS: Well, as I said, I'll 12 do my best to try to find exactly what 13 happened there and I'll let you know 14 when I do. So thank you very much. 15 MR. ELLMAN: There's some people 16 that -- some business people, you 17 know, really wondering what happened 18 because this doesn't -- it wasn't 19 right. 20 MS. EVANS: Well, thank you, Mr. 21 Ellman. 22 MR. ELLMAN: Thank you. 23 MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else 24 who would like to address counsel? 25 MS. CHILIPKO: Good evening.

Mary Chiplipka, Scranton resident. I came here with a few neighbor problems but then I heard Mrs. Evans mention Emily Donovan, the benefit for the sick little girl and I remember that the family is originally form Pinebrook and her grandmother still lives in Pinebrook so you put in prospective, we need to help a very little precious sick little girl.

MS. EVANS: Elliott.

MS. CHILIPKO: Elliott, okay. Officers in the vacated positions respond in motor vehicles, beat, motor vehicles. I don't get it. But still work as deterrents of interacting with residents, no. With officers in cars -- he also says officers in a car, they can go anywhere as needed, also from our experience in the neighborhood except where an officer on foot or bicycle can go. It's pretty tough to squeeze these cars in some of these little alleys and the park, wooded areas of the city. while neighborhoods are deteriorating

everyday. They're talking about testing and hiring and they should have some beats back on the street by next year according to their plan.

I'm going to drop a little article that says -- I found on the internet that matches the effectiveness of bicycles and beat patrols along with parole cars. So I'm asking with council's help and we're going to start a petition in the neighborhood to try to get the beat cops returned immediately to the neighborhoods.

And lastly I also read the article about money earmarked once again for South Side, and I think that's actually how it said in the paper once again. I think part of the problem, I have a resident on the 400-block of New Street who was crying when we saw this property. He owns two beautiful properties. The other three properties on his side of the block are condemned. He has the only properties on the block that are not

1 His family comes and it's condemned. 2 disgusting. I think what we need to 3 do are reign in some of the 4 inspections and make sure that the 5 proper procedure is followed before we 6 inspect and condemn or we condemn some 7 of these properties. I'm not sure that they are in all cases before we 8 9 get to the rehab or the blighted and 10 abandoned properties. My brother -- I 11 say that -- my brother is coming in 12 from Maryland next week to visit and I 13 cringe every time he comes into the 14 city to see how much worse it gets 15 each time. I think this time I'm 16 going to tell him that all of those 17 orange -- bright orange and the faded 18 papers, the faded orange condemned 19 signs are actually awards for 20 excellence. Thank you. 21 MS. EVAN: Thank you, Mrs. 22 Chilipko. And next? 23 MR. JACKOWITZ: Bill Jackowitz, 24 South Side resident, member of the 25 Taxpayer Association.

As Andy said earlier we have our first swim on the 30th of July. have 440 kids, total \$1,320, we paid \$3 per kids. Now, if SAPA guaranteed us -- guaranteed us ex number of jobs -- paying -- good paying jobs and ex number of businesses move into the city, they have a new figure, but if we're going to have -- a prayer -- we've been like 31 years, we've been waiting for a miracle to come or the train takes off from Hoboken to Scranton, I say no.

MR. McGOFF: I wasn't here for that meeting but I did read some of the literature that is provided and it seems like a good idea. Anything where somebody is given control and allowed to maintain and use the property, I think would be a very good idea rather than just letting them go vacant.

There's been a number of things mentioned and on SAPA, I was -- as you know, I was disappointed with the vote on the SAPA. I was also somewhat disappointed with council's response to a letter that we received from SAPA requesting a meeting where they gave us a number of dates and simply refused to accommodate them in any I still believe that we need to gather more information concerning this plan. This was a plan that was five years in the making. Does it have any guarantees? No. I don't think any plan can guarantee things. But it's a plan that has minimal costs

that has been mentioned. The cost that would occur can be funded through OECD. It's a plan. It's a possibility. We don't know -- no, we're not getting a guarantee, but we don't know what will happen unless we give it an opportunity to take place. And yet we don't -- we're saying we don't have any questions answered, but yet we're not giving anybody an opportunity to give us the answers. Ι don't know if we're afraid of the answers because they may be ones that we don't want to hear. But I think that we should set up some meeting with these people and I still believe we should do it through council. are constantly inviting people to come here and speak and when they don't want to, we're upset and yet we have a group that wants to come and present information about something that I think would be very relevant, very important to the city and yet we refuse to listen to them and to hear

from them. We constantly complain about the lack of economic development, that week after week after week I hear, you know, speakers and people talk about, you know, what is lacking. Yet here we have a possibility of a plan that might work at minimal costs and yet we refuse to even get information about it. I think that that is wrong. I think that that's -- we're not doing our job properly by not allowing these people to present to us.

The last thing I -- last week I asked about the Comcast contract, and Mrs. Evans responded that we were negotiating but I meant to ask you at that time of exactly who that we're negotiating with the contract.

And I received another letter, there's a property 403 South Ave and the residents states that all the properties on this block are in great shape, they mow their lawns but the lawn at 403 is a problem. The

backyard is a jungle, the properties bordered it are concerned about having their children out because there are mice, rats and snakes in the high grass. And the second concerns that they have at 1000 River Street and the intersection of Meadow Avenue, between the high grass, litter and a host of signs and other animals, it's an eyesore. And the residents want to know who owns the property, why nothing has been done about the blight there.

And my final request is I received an e-mail from a resident who is looking for information about a group home that will opening up in the middle of the Tripp Park Development and they said the group home is owned by ARC of Northeastern Pennsylvania, and there's a list of questions here. I'm not going to read them off but I'll give these to you after the meeting.

But that particular item right now has been, I think, a little bit overplayed at this point.

As far as blighted properties, I did notice the bid in the paper when we had paperwork on it and it appears that it's targeting South Scranton again. I believe the blurb in the paper mentioned that they're going to be looking at others. I know that we have a lot of problem properties here as we've mentioned just about every meeting. And, Mrs. Krake, I was just

wondering, DPW had a crew that was in the process of demolishing properties and I wonder if that crew was still active and if they will continue to work with this program and help get us a bigger bang for the buck on some of these things and maybe if Mr. Brazil can provide us with a list of properties with the DPW themselves demolish this year, I would appreciate that, and what intentions are for the remainder of the year.

And the last thing is it is grilling season at this time of the year and I know we already have fires started by open grills. Today there's a lot of homes built with vinyl siding and vinyl railings and stuff like that and people forget and they set their grills against the house. I've noticed that on many homes where people realize that after the siding started melting and buckling and it was a little too close. All I want to say is to be careful, enjoy your

grills, your decks, your backyards, but there's ways to play it safe and avoid any major disasters. Even if it's taking a cement board, they sell them at Lowe's and Home Depot and placing it under the grill and behind it. The days of the asbestos is gone. They used to sell asbestos sheets. But these are pretty much illegal now. So the next best protection is that cement board but still try to keep it away from anything that's flammable. Just come common sense. Keep a fire extinguisher handy or a large box of baking soda and that's all I have to say. Have a safe summer. Thank you. MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr.

Development or DCED faced cuts, one which is SAPA. According to Rick Jamison, a representative of SAPA, "Without the state's help, projects such as this one will increasingly difficult to implement." Referring to Scranton/Abington Planned Association comprehensive plan. We mean municipalities rely very heavily on DCED. Unfortunately the state cannot afford its previous level of financial support as I often stated publicly and the saying is equally true for the City of Scranton. Neighboring boroughs and cities were forced to make painful budgetary cuts recently. Dunmore could not fund its summer youth program this year and Hazleton has recently cut numerous city employees. Likewise, Scranton faces hard choices and budgetary cuts as well. More importantly it would be utterly and irresponsible to participate in SAPA without a definite annual and long term costs having been

provided to city council particularly in light of the new state budget cuts and the numerous financial burdens that only the City of Scranton faces.

- 1) How does the city intend to pay the salaries, health benefits and pensions of the SIT positions that are posted.

Today's newspaper reported very bad news for city residents as one of our speakers tonight at council There are no beat patrol reported. officers in the City of Scranton. However, Chief Elliott intends to use \$490,000 in OECD monies from 2009 and 2010 to hire new ComD or beat patrol officers. This appears to be good news particularly since I've been requesting for weeks that the police tests be given in September in order that new officers will be hired. However, the newspaper fails to mention that it takes approximately six months from the time the test is administered to the time that officers hit the street since Act 120 training and additional police training requirements must first be met. Ιn addition, Miss Ably states that \$190,000 in 2009 funding must be spent before \$300,000 in 2010 funding can be expended. Further, additional CBEG funding can be allocated for 2011. Ιt

would seem that 190,000 in 2009 funding should be used for overtime for July and August to cover the streets. An additional CBEG funding may then be allocated for 2011 for the new hires who won't be on the street until 2011 due to training requirements. As recently as 2008, the administration can and at least have agreements to use funding for overtime. I question why funds have accumulated for ComD officers in 2009-2010, why officers were not hired in 2009 and 2010 using these funds. And if the list of candidates had dwindled, why wasn't the police test administered. Also I asked for beat officers in June at the request of city residents, not at the request of the police union. I then asked the mayor and the president of the FOP if they would consent to an agreement modeled on past agreements to get police back in the neighborhoods using overtime. The union responded and

agreed promptly. The mayor has not Bottom line is as follows: responded. Administer the test and prepare candidates to hit the neighborhood streets in January and equally important, use a portion of CBEG money this summer to put current officers on the streets. I don't know that any city resident is pleased that Scranton has no beat officers. People of Scranton want police officers in their neighborhoods now, not some day. Public safety has hit an all time low in 2010. And it should be addressed immediately. And I do understand the problems that Miss Chilipko enumerated for us this evening in Pinebrook. I'm sure that all of council remembers that recently we received a report from the Hill Neighborhood Association asking for beat patrol officers, wondering why there are no longer any on the streets of East Scranton and the cries are heard from West Scranton, South Scranton, the Plot,

anywhere you travel throughout the City of Scranton, the residents want officer on the street. That means walking officers and officers on bicycles. The money is there, the money should be used.

Court and Birney Avenue in Minooka have severely flooded during rain events. Homeowners gardens, lawns, garages and basements are often submerged into several feet of rapidly flowing water. Neighborhood children are unable to play in their yards because of the sewage overflow. Ιn 2009, for example, this area flooded three times in one week and it floods so significantly in 2010 the Scranton Fire Department had to respond to the many problems. Thank goodness for our firefighters. But this is not the proper solution. Please send letters to Mr. Gene Barrett, the Executive Director of the Scranton Sewer Authority and Mr. Brian Swanson, city engineer, determine the problems and address solutions because no one should have to wait 42 years for relief from the constant hardship.

Next, Kearney Court and Warner
Street and Corey Street between
Pittston Avenue and Greenwood Avenue

need to be paved. Over the past seven years I've requested paving for these courts and streets and nothing has ever been done. As a result, the residence of this Minooka area feel like second class citizens who pay their taxes only to be ignored or forgotten.

1016 Monroe Avenue, a tree requires trimming in this location.

Dead branches continuously fall on vehicles and on the street. Residents contacted the DPW and were directed to the Forestry Department. Please contact Mr. Santoli to examine this tree and provide a solution.

209 Colfax Avenue, another tree requires trimming. Branches are growing onto the house and dead branches are falling onto neighbors' properties and into the street.

Contact Mr. Santoli. Letters were sent to DPW and to LIPS on April 15th, 2010, requesting the clean up of an overgrown lot containing over a dozen

barrels at the corner of Wyoming

Avenue and Linden Street. Send a

second request for immediate cleanup.

there's a combination pave cut and pothole at the intersection of Hickory Street and Arthur Court which is behind the 500-block of Molke Avenue. There are six homes and 16 neighbors in this area who requested help from Mr. Brazil and Mr. Hazzouri but nothing has ever been done to fill the pothole and correct the problem. Please repair this as soon as possible, and I hope I don't have to continue to request this week after week.

And, Mrs. Chilipko, you could correct if this is wrong, this is the 400-block of New Street?

MS. CHILIPKO: Yes.

MS. EVANS: There are three condemned properties. Council would like to know when they would be demolished or what their ranking is on

1 the demolition list and that's it. 2 MR. LOSCOMBE: Mrs. Evans? 3 MS. EVAN: Yes. 4 MR. LOSCOMBE: If I can just go back to the beat officers. 5 According 6 to the newspaper, they said they're going to hire beat officers for the 7 8 summer? 9 MS. EVANS: No. They're hiring 10 them for next year. 11 MR. LOSCOMBE: Oh, for next year, 12 okay. I misunderstood. I was 13 wondering where they were going to get 14 them because they have an exhaustive 15 list right now. 16 MS. EVANS: They have none on the 17 street. Another police test needs to 18 be administered, and as I've 19 mentioned, it's a six-month process 20 before you're able to have the police 21 on the streets. So in the meantime 22 Chief Elliott does not want to put any 23 beat officers on the street by using 24 OECD monies for overtime for our 25 current police officers so we have no

officers on foot or on bicycles anywhere in the City of Scranton and this is something that at least during my time on council I can't remember happening. I mean, there have been periods where the number were down but, you know, at this point this is unacceptable. And the citizens of Scranton have, you know, have long wanted this service. They're paying their taxes for it and the money should be used during the summer months particularly when crime excalates.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I agree with you. That's the only option since there's no list to appoint from. Now is time that we need them. So I hope they're listening to us.

MS. EVANS: And as I said, it's not a new idea. It's been agreed upon in years past. Why suddenly there's a stalemate. I don't know. And I frankly don't care. I just want police on the street.
