MS. KRAKE: We have a lot of clerk's notes since we were absent when we weren't in session during August, but I'm going to try and make them brief. When we give the descriptions of the letters that were sent I would like everyone to know that the details are fully included in the letters, just that we are doing it briefly tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: Thank you. The Civil
Service Commission we request -- council
requests when the Civil Service Test will be
administered, particularly, when it's going
to be administered in September. We had
three no responses from the board. We did
have a response from one member of the board

Anthony Trozzolillo. He tells us that the Civil Service Commission maintains an office in city hall and a solicitor. Please direct all future correspondence to either or both, but not his home address. He said, "I'm sure you would not like business mail sent to your home."

I would like to apologize to Mr.

Trozzolillo, but that was the date that was in the files as of November of 2007, it was his home address. We certainly will not send it to his home any longer if he doesn't care for that.

He also tells us -- us and myself or any member of council is welcome to attend the monthly meeting and pose our questions during the public participation portion of the meeting, and please do not make time sensitive demands on me or the commission. We are all volunteers with full private workloads, and that was his response.

MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake, if you could please contact their solicitor and follow-up with a memo requesting that information.

MS. KRAKE: I will.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We also have no response from Mayor Doherty concerning when the Civil Service Test will be held.

We have a response from the Controller Roseanne Novembrino concerning the traffic signal on Route 307 and Lake Scranton. It has now been repaired. She tells us that when she researched our question that she was told mice destroyed the control box and a new box had to be ordered. That was her response.

This is a response from Stu Renda, business administrator. "Due to the settlement agreement of January 31, 1996, and entered into between the University and the City of Scranton, no parking space fee for the university's parking garages and service parking lots have been assessed for fiscal years 2001 through 2010," and then we have attached settlement agreement now in our office if anyone would like to review that.

On our questions to the city treasurer, Christopher Boland, we did

receive a letter from NCC and also spoke to the treasurer. They are preparing the report concerning our question for the trended unpaid taxes during 2007, eight, nine and ten, and a schedule of NCC's payments to the state for these years.

These are all to department of DPW where the director is Jeff Brazil. The first no response was a letter that was sent concerning the 500 block of Earth Court where the blacktop is in very poor condition.

The next letter that receiving no response is concerning Albright Avenue and Grove Street and the tractor trailer traffic that is going on there.

The next is a 600 block of Ruth

Avenue and they request that their street be cleaned.

1202 Bromley Avenue request that the potholes be filled.

4302 Winfield Avenue. There is a runoff problem since there was paving there.

A large tree that needs to be removed in the 800 block of Quincy Avenue.

Patch and seal the center of Grove and Parallel Drive at West Mountain Road.

Residents request the 1100 block of Curtis Lane be paved, the 400 block of Rosen Court there is 12 -- excuse me, the corner of Breck Street and 400 block of Rosen Court. There is 12-inch deep by four-inch length hole which needs to be filled.

Fill the following potholes: 100 block of Meadow Avenue, 200 block of Penn, 1600 of Olive, 1800 block of Olive.

Linden Street, there needs to be directional arrows pointed on the street to inform motorists of turn lanes.

Pike Street located off Morgan
Highway report their street has not been
paved since 1987.

900 block of Greenridge Street pave cuts need to be repaired. Overgrown lots at the corner of Orchard and Prospect Avenue.

We have responses from the department, also. A "No truck traffic" sign at Woodlawn Street has been installed and the stop sign at the 14th Street in West Scranton has been replaced.

This is a detailed response from

Jeff Brazil concerning 307 Lake Scranton

Road. He would like to inform us that, "We are fully aware of the situation and have ordered the necessary material to resolve the issue. We are awaiting the delivery of the parts and hope to have them sometime next week."

He says, "He would also like to point out that the contract section, which we highlighted in our letters, refers to repairable material. In this instance the equipment was damaged beyond repair and all new equipment had to be ordered. It was at my direction that the contractor placed the signals on flash until the proper repairs were made because this is the best possible temporary solution. Should you have any other questions, please feel free to contact me."

Also, this is from Don Davis. The garbage truck that went the wrong way in one-way was a driver that was unfamiliar with the street and it has been rectified. Charlie Magnus has been informed the damage

that occurred and will be taking care of that issue, that was on Cooper Avenue.

Tom Oleski informs us that at 1101 Cedar Avenue the work has been started.

The tires have been removed per Tom Oleski at the former -- the parking lot of the former Scranton Ford at the corner of Franklin and Linden Street.

And these are nonresponses from the Department of License and Inspections quickly. 459 Phelps Street, it's an eyesore and a safety hazard.

Nothing has been done on the Prospect and Orchard once again.

Eight 842-45 and 1038 Capouse Avenue the homes desperately need to be torn down.

The 800 block of Ash Street there is a dumpster on the sidewalk rather on the street.

Vacant lot at the corner of Wheeler Avenue and Vine, the property is neglected and overgrown.

918 Maple and rear Maple is neglected and overgrown. 400 block of Moltke Avenue and Earth Court, overgrown

brush from neighboring property is extended in the roadway and making it difficult for motorists to drive through.

344-46 North Hyde Park, they need an update on the condition of the property.

Vacant help the 638 North Hyde Park the lawn is overgrown and the porch is collapsing.

Hazardous sidewalk situation in the 1800 block of Washburn. 1400 block of Slader Street complained about an abandoned house in the neighborhood.

A problem on Parallel Drive at West Mountain Road, need spray paint on the road.

A problem at 1435 Academy Street, overgrown trees covering the one-way.

Overgrown weeds and grass in the rear of the vacant home at 317 17th Avenue.

909 Greenridge Avenue there is an abandoned property overgrown.

Atlas Glass, 895 Providence Road requesting them to maintain the property.

And as I said earlier, we did have all of the detailed in the letters so the residents know.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MS. KRAKE: For the Department of Parks, the bids are rejected, original bids for the pavilion. They have since been received and we received a letter today that the pavilion has been awarded, the contract, to Galga Construction.

We have received a response from

Dave Besiack of PennDOT concerning the 900

block of Greenridge Street. They were holes
in each traffic lane caused by the utility

company. Per a phone call from Dave, the

cuts were made by a contractor for the

utility company and will be repaired by the

contractor when PennDOT contacts them.

Chief Duffy advised us that the problem at 1406 West Gibson Street has been addressed.

And we have several no responses

from Chief Elliott, I'll try to do those
quickly, also. No response on when the

Civil Service Test for the police officers
will be administered. No response

concerning the vandalism at Connell Park.

No response on the one-way 200 block of 14th

Avenue. The blight officer was requested to go to 909 Ridge Avenue. We will also requested them to monitor speeding and litter on Birney Avenue in Minooka and for them to check their cars parked on the sidewalk in the 2000 block of North Main Avenue.

I do have a couple of responses from Chief. 403 Stafford, the question was referred to Officer Herchick to investigate.

I have also informed them as to the issue that's been addressed and also forwarded the information regarding Wheeler Avenue and Vine so we can address that issue as well.

Your letter regarding the vacant homes at Capouse and your questions written down have been sent to License and Inspections.

Your final request regarding officers off on injury or long-term sickness, there are a total of 50 officers off long-term, 12 long-term and three -- excuse me, 12 long-term injury and three long-term sickness.

From the Scranton -- from the Zoning Solicitor, Attorney Penetar. He is responding to our request concerning 317 Linden and Commonwealth Medical College.
317 Linden Street this property has not come to the zoning hearing board for parking to my knowledge and they do not need a variance. He then cites the particular code under the zoning ordinance and basically that says they don't need that because they are within a CD District, which is the downtown.

The Commonwealth Medical College, he tells us under our zoning ordinance the college must provide off-street parking space for every two students who attend at peek times which such spaces to be located within 400 feet of the principal use. In October of 2008, the Commonwealth Medical College applied for and was granted a variance from the 400 feet requirement of the ordinance. It presented to the Board a parking agreement that would provide the sufficient spaces. I will be reading that in after this.

His final response is concerning our question about weight restriction on Lake Scranton Road. We originally had been informed that it was a state road and found out that it is not. According to Attorney Penetar, he feels that council has the power to designate Lake Scranton Road as a weight restricted road. He says he knows the zoning board cannot.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: And finally, the parking agreement, we did a follow-up on what that agreement was and Attorney Penetar referred to with the Parking Authority and basically the response was this, but we do have the entire agreement though if the public would like to review that in our office. "A 777 space parking garage is located at the corner of Linden and North Washington and within this agreement they granted the Commonwealth Medical College the following For 2009, 80 spaces; 2010, 140; spaces: 2011, 260, and by August of 2012 300 spaces. And it is expressly agreed the Commonwealth shall pay to the Authority a \$10 deposit

which shall be refundable upon return of the card to the Authority.

And also the Parking Authority responded to our Right-to-Know with a copy of the lease agreement between Molly Brannigan's and the Scranton Parking Authority which does have many pages to it so that is also for review in council's office.

And that's finally it on Clerk's notes. Thank you.

(During Clerk's notes Mr. Joyce joins the meeting.)

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Do any council members have announcements at this time?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I have a couple. Go ahead.

MR. MCGOFF: All right. First, I was given some information that the CMC auxiliary is sponsoring a reading and tea this coming Sunday at 1 p.m. at the Hilton Hotel. In the information that I received it does not say a reading of what, so I do not know, but if you are interested in a

And last, just kind of a follow-up to some of the things that Mrs. Krake had mentioned. During the month of August a couple of things came up that I met with people on, one was the request from people on Stafford Avenue dealing with the intersection at River Street and Meadow

Avenue that was overgrown and a number of signs, political signs and various things that were on that property. I went there with Mr. Brazil from DPW and Mr. Oleski and took a look at the situation and we kind of took at look at the properties and the one property on which there is a residence is taken care of.

The grass is mowed and, you know, things are taken care of. The adjacent property to it is -- they are not sure who owned part of it and they are looking to see if they could find who owned a small parcel of property, a very small, and then there is another small parcel of property that's owned by this Harmony Hill Little League, South Scranton Little League that extends from River Street all the way down to the little league field and then the rest of it is part of I guess owned or maintained by PennDOT because it's adjacent to the entrance to 81, and then there is a large parcel behind -- it's basically land locked there is no access to it from River Street, but it extends down almost to the little

league field. That lot, it's rather large and that's -- that lot is unimproved, it's unbuildable and I use to use that area for access when I was playing at South Scranton Little League. That has never been, you know, there has been anything done to improve that. It's been overgrown and all for as long as I can remember, so what the decision was, was that they were trying to contact -- or they would contact the owners, that the city would cut back as far as the fence line on the street to try and take some of that away and maybe make it look better. They were also going to try to take down some like small billboard on which people had posted things and weren't sure who owned that or how it got there, but they were going to try and remove that so that it wouldn't inhibit people from putting any types of signs there, so that was one of the issues.

The same people had talked about 403
Stafford Avenue or residents there. I did
talk to Mr. Oleski about that. Someone from
his office was going to 403 Stafford. The

back of the house is greatly overgrown, it's growing over onto neighbor's other properties. They were going to look into, I think they were going to put a 48-hour notice on it to do something and then possibly cite people -- the owner if it was not taken care of.

Now, my understanding is that the owner is like a 93-year-old lady who son lives there and maintains the property and they have been cited in the past so it's been an ongoing issue going back a number of years, but they were going to try and see if that could be addressed and some relief given to the people living on Stafford Avenue.

And then the last thing, I know

Mrs. Krake mentioned the traffic signal at

Lake Scranton Road and Route 307 and since

I'm up there almost every day that has been

repaired and it is operational, and that's

all I have.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: I just have two announcements. There will be a benefit for

Marie Connelly Sequera to be held on September 18 from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. at the Keyser Valley Community Center.

Mrs. Sequera is currently battling a stage four brain tumor and her medical bills are piling up quickly. Tickets are \$15 and can be purchased at the door. about Mayor Doherty going to the Red Cross
and Marywood University and requesting more
funds from them. Marywood University, fine,
but when I heard the story I said, "Why
would anybody go to the Red Cross and ask
them for more money?"

Here is an organization that helps people in time of emergency and disaster, they have no source of income, and to prove my point a few weeks after that article on the news, Channel 16 news, they told a story of radio station that was on the top of Wendy's at Davis Street raising money for

the Red Cross along with the Scranton firefighters having 5-K walk and run to raise money. Just the other day I saw on TV that upcoming this month is a golf tournament to raise money for the Red Cross, so why would anybody in their right mind go to the Red Cross and ask them to give more to the city.

Mayor Doherty would be better off going to the University of Scranton and asking them for more money. They take parking meters off of Mulberry Street, which was a source of income, and then he goes and puts meters down on Mattes Avenue and he says, "We can bring in \$390,000 a year: "

Well, mayor we are not going to bring in 39 cents a year because nobody is parking there at those meters as I'm sure everybody has seen on the news. They are parking in other people's property, which I think is very sad. So, like I said, to go to the Red Cross is unbelievable. I don't know why anybody would go to them. Mayor Doherty should go to the University and ask them for the \$390,000, not the Red Cross.

the Scranton/Abington Planning Association and the needs that we have for updated planning, zoning, land use and subdivision ordinances in the city and amongst our neighboring municipalities. I know that council has some reservations, has expressed reservations about the plan, some of which I think were related to a number of municipalities that participated in it.

I, myself, had a preference to include a couple of more of the valley municipalities and some of the North Pocono municipalities particularly because that's where a lot of our water supply comes from, and I'm hopeful that the plan can be amended would and extended in the future to include some of those other municipalities, however, I believe the plan and the accomplishments of bringing together 11 municipalities to date, including Scranton and Dunmore, which are right here in the heart of the metropolitan part of the valley with some of the suburb and municipalities, is a landmark plan statewide.

I had the privilege of about a dozen

or so years ago to serve with former
Lieutenant Governor Bill Scranton, III, on
the Pennsylvania 21st Century Departmental
Commission under former Governor Ridge, and
we looked at environment issues, planning
issues all across Pennsylvania. A lot of
the ideas of economic growth which just
sprawls over the landscape were addressed by
the commission, and the outcome of that was
the updating of the municipalities planning
code in 2001 and 2002.

This new plan that we are developed here is a direct outcome of all of that work that was to done by folks across

Pennsylvania, but directly in the application of it here in our local situation a large group of people from Scranton, from Dunmore, from the Abington communities worked on that project for the last four or five years, I think. A lot of work was put into it, a lot of volunteer work on the part of a lot of those folks.

Our organization, I represent the Lackawanna River Corridor Association, we were -- we were involved in it, I wasn't a

member of the committee, but I attended a number of their meetings and we provided them information and feedback on some of the things that they talked about relating to the river and relating to conservation and environmental protection as well as economic development.

We are looking at a tremendous amount of opportunity here in the City of Scranton for what's known as in-fill type of development. We have any number of sites where we had the coal mines were located and that forms a patchwork quilt where we have our historic neighborhoods and then we have 20 or 30 acre of mine craters or odd lots like that lot up by Harmon Field that nobody can do anything with because of the destruction and the manipulation of the properties by the coal companies over the last 150 years, so those residual properties are out there. They present opportunities for economic development.

I know the KOZ program has been active in Scranton. I am not a great fan of how it was implemented or managed, but I

back into the planning commission to renew the subdivision plan for that property. There is a potential to put 78 single family middle income houses on that property, so there is number of sites like that I think that would benefit by the city's involvement with the SAPA plan. We don't want to see more subdivisions like that sprawling over the countryside out into the Abingtons or up into Moosic mountain or out into Roaring Brook Township. I think some of those environmental areas really need to be protected, so I think that's one of the

economic ways that that plan can help us.

direction to make incredibly large improvements to our sanitary system. Some of the outcomes of that are going to be a need to look at our zoning and subdivision land use regulations, so I think that having a comprehensive plan that all that zoning work can be done in context with is really going to be important, so I would encourage all of you to continue the dialogue with the folks from SAPA. I would be very interested in speaking with you all collectively or individually to further the discussion on the importance of the inclusion of the city in that plan. Thank you very much.

Melvin. I am the transportation chair of
the local Sierra Club and I sent you all a
letter about six weeks ago concerning the
SAPA plan and I was asked to follow-up with
some comments to you because I read some of

your comments, Mr. Loscombe, in the newspaper and your concerns about the -- I think you have concerns about taxing being more of your enemy than your ability to deal with regional planning, and I think that you can deal with your tax situation as a city and you have, you know, you have your ways to deal with all of that. That is a problem or a benefit that's going to go on forever here and you have to deal with that whether you join the SAPA plan or not, but you have to also deal with sprawl.

Your number one enemy is not your tax structure, your number one enemy is sprawl. People moving out of your area by definition is sprawl. They are building these industrial parks, commercial opportunities are out there, and housing developments. That's sprawl. And the only way to combat sprawl is to get the money to come here so that people will want to live here, so your neighborhoods can give them something more than the Abingtons give them, so that your business districts can give them something more than cheap taxes outside

of Scranton, so when you look at a plan like a SAPA plan your neighbors are all saying we are willing to not have that development for Scranton's benefit. They recognize for their own good Scranton needs to be strong and vital, so you just disregard this plan because you feel as though your problem is more based upon your ability to compete with them with taxes. That's going to continue They are going to tax to be your problem. the way they need to accommodate what their zoning is required of them and you all know that the State, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, requires them to provide all of the zoning opportunities unless they can be an original plan. So they will continue to accommodate industrial development, commercial development and housing projects if you don't join.

And I think that it's pretty common knowledge, and I hope you all know that is the State of Pennsylvania, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, has declared that their funding emphasis is going to be on municipalities that participate in this

So you are going to be on the bottom of the heap instead of the top of the grant applications. You are going to lose out on opportunities that you want to give to your city. Your legacy is going to depend on how you enact what you foresee the future should be for your town and unless you have something else to offer them besides SAPA you are just going to continue to enable this draining effect of sprawl and you are not doing your citizens and voters any favors. You need to grasp at something new, you need to go into the future with your eyes open and just say, "All right, I don't really have an alternative here, I've got to do something. I've got to find a new revenue source," is what I believe the men that were at the meeting that caucus that you had before the August meeting they said, "If you are not going to raise taxes you need to find a new revenue source or increase your revenues sources."

You can't increase taxes, so what do you do? You have to find a way to get more money out of other government tax parcels,

for example, Bernie mentioned the sewer problem. If you are in a multi-municipal plan your grant application for sewer aid goes to the top of the PACE grants instead of in the bottom because you get more points and you get more recognition and the number one concept is going to be right now and the federal government is the same way, is that if you are in a multi-municipal plan.

So, yes, if you think you have a problem with taxes you need to do something about that, but unless you adopt a regional plan you are going to be missing out on a lot of tax revenues or other revenue source.

And aside from all of that, this is an opportunity for you to help your local environment. You miss that opportunity when you think in terms of, well, all I can do is fight about taxes or I'm losing people to the outside because they want to go live in Clarks Summit. Well, they don't want to live there because they have cheap taxes, they are moving out there because they have this concept that there is more of an environmentally friendly neighborhood.

They'd stay in Scranton if they have what they are looking for besides just cheap taxes. I think taxes isn't the only reason why people move out of town. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much.

Just a few things though I think I might add to that, but I'll preface with this because I neglected to do so a few minutes earlier, if anyone does have a cell phone working this evening please turn off that cell phone during the council meeting until it's conclusion.

I can say that unlike any of the other members of SAPA, I believe there might be ten now because North Abington did not approve or it's implementation of the SAPA plan, the City of Scranton is distressed and has been for 18 years. Currently we don't see any light at the end of the tunnel so a tax structure is, indeed -- an oppressive tax structure is, indeed, a priority to the City of Scranton.

As for the Sewer Authority, I certainly understand your point of view, it's well-taken. On the other hand,

however, I don't know that you are aware that the Sewer Authority failed to apply for federal stimulus funding and council is in the process of receiving a response from the Scranton Sewer Authority. I know that Mr. Loscombe, for example, could elaborate on that point. He had had a discussion with Congressman Kanjorski who raised that issue to him and asked him to bring it to council. He was very concerned by the Sewer Authority's lack of application for significant funds.

In terms of the state, as you know the state has consistently cut funding to such endeavors. They are highly supportive in theory, nevertheless, appear to be less supportive in application, financial application shall we say. In fact, I had a discussion about the SAPA plan just yesterday with Representative Murphy. I also had a discussion with Commissioner O'Brien and Commissioner O'Brien, incidentally, called me following the last commissioner's meeting at which the issue of SAPA was raised and the commissioner offered

his apology and his agreement that he would not vote in favor of any agreement or contract in which the costs are unknown, are undefined, and I made him aware it's a 20-year plan, we don't know the cost overall of the 20 years nor do we know the individual annual cost and he was in complete agreement and said, you know, pretty much any elected official who would vote without knowing a defined cost is irresponsible. And that has been probably the greatest consideration for this council, a lack of a defined cost because of the position the city finds itself in which is unlike any of the other participants and without that cost I think the only alternative perhaps that council can suggest for reconsideration of this matter would be, and this would, of course, be with the approval of my honorable council colleagues, that the city could consider implementation, continued participation in the plan at no If there were no costs attached for the City of Scranton throughout the duration of the plan and in return the city would

1 continue to provide the services of our city 2 planner, Don King, who has been working on 3 this endeavor for many years now at no cost to SAPA, we would be happy to provide those 4 continued services, but short of having a 5 defined cost or being offered an agreement 6 7 whereby the city can participate at no cost, 8 council cannot reconsider the issue. 9 Our next speaker is Larry Spegar. MR. SPEGAR: I don't believe I have 10 11 ever had the opportunity to address council in it's entirety. I know, President Evans, 12 13 it's been awhile. 14 MS. EVANS: Yes. MS. Sunday all government meeting from the past week would be played in consecutive order.

Well, I taped it from 10 a.m. to Not one government meeting was midnight. The scroll all day. Sunday night at 8:00 there was a zoning meeting. I believe that was the last time it was on since it was taped. A friend of mine here said that she had purchased a zoning meeting from ECTV for \$20 because she wanted it. That's okay. If you want to buy it, that's fine, but I think every meeting that's taped from ECTV should be given to the Scranton Public Library. I called their today and they said the only meeting they get from ECTV, government meetings, are city council. don't have school board meetings, they don't have county commissioner meetings. don't have zoning meetings presented to them from ECTV. I have to wonder why are they not giving any meeting that they tape to the Scranton Public Library for people to take out like they do books to view at their own discretion, not forcing them if they don't have a choice to pay for them because you

cannot see them on television. You could look for days and days and days. You might find a wrestling match, you will not find government meetings, the city council on a regular schedule, but that's it.

On their website, it says on their television screen on their scroll, "Check our website." I went to the website. It said, "Government meetings schedule." I clicked on it. It says, "Coming soon, the schedule."

there, no answer. You go there, no one there. You don't get calls returned. A friend of mine called they never got a return call as to when the zoning meeting was going to be on again. So this is a lot of hogwash about ECTV. I personally think they are deliberately keeping things away from the viewers so they won't see what's actually going on and what happened at that zoning meetings was a disaster. God forbid that should be seen on television again.

So Doherty Deceit, by the way just recently is putting on any tapes that

anybody can give to them they will put it on the website so maybe possibly people can go there and see these government meetings, so if anybody has any tapes check that out.

But as far as ECTV, when Scranton
Tomorrow or Scranton Today, whatever that
was that had this, there was always a
schedule, it was always there, you could
always find a meeting. ECTV, you find
nothing. You don't know when it's going to
be on and you will never know. You have to
hit your remote control, you have to keep on
checking three or four o'clock in the
morning, I don't know what you could do.

But I think it's a disgrace that not every meeting, every meeting that they tape should be at that Scranton Public Library, and I don't know if they have been taping the school board meetings because I haven't seen one, I don't know -- and if they bought all of these cameras they should have enough people to go to the Scranton School Board meetings to tape them. There certainly should be every government meeting filmed. They have enough cameras, God knows how

many. We don't know, they won't get the bills. Mrs. Evans, did you ever ask about any bills from them?

MS. EVANS: Yes. I have. We did receive finally after more than two years we received some bills, but they were -- they were less than specific. For example, it would list what would be owed, a total owed for salaries from one date to another, but no great breakdown of how many employees there are, what each employee is paid, and that's just one example of a number of situations, but since their inception they had not provided financial information to city council or the oversight committee of the PEG channel until -- during some discussions involving the Comcast cable franchise.

Now, in the mean time because those invoices were so questionable and so general city council sent a Right-to-know request on July 28. I believe part of our request included a detailed inventory of what had happened purchased with the \$100,000 worth of government funding the station had

received. To date, there has been no reply from ECTV to that Right-to-know request and I believe that our solicitor, Attorney Hughes, has sent a follow-up to that very recently because the organization had ignored that Right-to-Know request.

MS. FRANUS: Well, I don't know what happens legally by not responding to a Right-to-Know, but you should take this into consideration, and I understand that the mayor is the only which that can pick the channel to run these shows, so I don't know, it's sort of like blackmail. I say go black before you give them what they want because it's like you give them the money when they can't even account for the money they spent it's foolish. You are here to do business for the city not to be on television, so if it means doing that, going black versus giving into blackmail, I say stand your ground, get your bills and get all of the equipment, every piece of equipment, bill, everything, and just get somebody that's reputable and the people can count on.

This is our money and they refuse to

tell us how it's been spent. 300 hours of carpentry work? We never got an answer on that one either, so please consider, I don't Hopefully, you can do know what to do. something and maybe you can make an amendment or something to say that the mayor doesn't have the right, the only person that that can pick the PEG channel. Is there any way you can amend something to say he doesn't have that power? I don't know, but I hope Mr. Hughes checks into that because it's outrageous. They are holding us hostage and it's not right, and they are not showing things because they don't want us to see them and it's just a form of blackmail and it shouldn't be. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else who cares to address Scranton City Council?

MR. ANCHERANI: Good evening,

Council. Nelson Ancherani, First Amendment
Rights. You heard Bob Martin, president of
the FOP, tell you that we are getting closer
to the Courts rendering a decision on the
numerous court cases and appeals that have
been initiated because the city violated

numerous, no, more than numerous contract violations. These court cases and arbitrations if one by the city are going to cost the city millions. In fact, if you believe what was in the August 27 edition of the slimes, city officials said, "With the Court's rejection of the union's April petition for review, the city can avoid more than 6 million in pay raises."

Spin put on by the slimes. The case is still in the courts. Six million is at least two million more than I thought the city owed the unions, although, it could be a lot higher. The city is saying they don't have the money to pay these awards. Evidently, the slimes in the city forget to mention the city gave out more than 25 million dollars in raises cumulatively to favorites in new hires in the last nine The city has been blaming the unions for years saying that the city needs the union concessions to be able to get out of the distressed status. The city has not put any of the money in escrow, as if they were giving out normal raises over the years and

as a result will say they cannot afford to pay the unions when the awards come due.

In fact, just think of this scenario as I believe -- as I believe the administration has already thought of. The city can't pay the bills so the city will have to go bankrupt. Before the city can go bankrupt taxes will have to be raised and all of the city's assets will have to be sold. Who losses? The taxpayers. Who gets the blame? The unions. Nice plan. The unions become the bad guys because the city is in a situation that it's in now and didn't plan for the impending awards or did they?

One thing that comes out of it, Lee Morgan gets his wish for the city going into bankruptcy. So, council, we are a little over two months away from a 2010 budget being presented to you by the administration by November 15. I hope you have the fortitude to make the hard decisions and correct the inequities that have gone on over the last nine years. Connors 2001 budget was \$55,790,343. Make your 2011

budget 60 million and cut the fat. The economy isn't the best, so let's tighten our belts. Let's stop the pork spending. Let's stop giving lien-free demolitions to select businesses.

Millions was spent on Nay Aug while public servants were ignored. Three million was spent on a police building that wasn't built big enough to fit the entire department. The parking lot is not finished. Floor tiles are separated and cracks developed over the doors. The basement was omitted. Police and fire budgets have remained static over the last nine years and total approximately 28 million per year.

Start off by instituting the pay decreases that you proposed in your attempt to amend the 2010 budget. All of the raises that were given out since 2002, cut them back to the 7.5 percent that was awarded to the unions by the Courts. Cut the new positions if they are not needed. Do this in the authorities, also. Budget 60 million and fit the spending into it.

Professional services in the amount of \$600,000 is not needed. Eliminate all of the outside attorneys and let our law department handle the legal cases. that's what they are for? Let the kids swim Examine the budget to see what positions were created for favorites and eliminate them. Cut the budget by 20 percent and stick to it. Don't renew the NCC contract, they aren't even in the city Don't raise taxes 25 percent like anymore. Councilman McGoff and former council persons Gatelli and Fanucci. Don't borrow any more money. Most importantly, fire PEL. the only way you are going to get us out of debt, although, \$316 million plus in long-term debt is going to be around for a long time, and I know you people -- well, most of you got into this horrendous amount of debt will do the right thing. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, member of the taxpayers, also
a resident of Scranton. Just barely paying

my taxes. Okay, first I want to start out with I trust the current council to make the call on contentious issues and if you feel that a turn around in opinion or whatever, a compromise is necessary that's okay by me right now. I mean, years or three years from now we'll be judging you for what you have done or what you haven't done or stop from being done, so that's my opinion.

I want to free you people up. don't know if you got my e-mail message or not, I'm a little in experienced at that stuff, but I sent one to John and you, also, but you may have not had the time because I had a big party all weekend. I was down the Italian festival, I was at private parties, I was at Steamtown Railfest and I have always been interested in rails, so a busy weekend, but on SAPA, what I felt with that the SAPA committee, the whole committee should have been down here to meet with you people and discuss things, not just throw something, business as usual, it's just going to get blown through and, you know, they should be here to talk to you people

On 5-E, the foundation website specifies that funds are to be provided -- are not to be provided for debt reduction,

yet, if the paper was accurate the mayor plans to use the -- this grant from the foundation for debt reduction.

Now, back in the beginning like years ago when this project was done and this grant did not come through at the proper time, and I asked during a candidate forum back in I believe it was prior to the mayor's second term what happened to the almost quarter of a billion dollars -- or quarter of a billion, I have been following the federal news too much, the quarter of a million dollar improvements that the mayor had promised to make at Robinson Park, and he said that this grant had not come through and, therefore, the money was being used at Weston Park -- or Weston Field, so I think that when this money comes the improvements at Robinson Park that were promised back in I believe 2003 when that 72 million dollar bond was received, I think that's what this money should go for.

And 5-H, I hope somebody during motions can tell -- whether all these demolitions will occur in South Scranton or

if they go across the entire city because there are certainly lots of property.

And now when I get down again, as you all know, I am in favor of the SAPA I have, you are aware, talked to many legislators, I have talked to the county commissioners, and I have talked to Representative Murphy yesterday and I will talk to Mr. Smith, and the problem I have when you talk just dollars is several fold. Number one, is that if we do not go with the comprehensive plan then we are going to have to do our own plan. The state requires that a comprehensive plan be done every ten Our last one was done in 1993 and vears. the last -- what would have been the 2003 was sort of waived because we were participating in the multi-municipal endeavor, so those are monies that are going to have be found to be expended anyway, but beyond that, the last time some of the OECD/CDBG money was used I think that's really appropriate. The whole county only gets, I wrote it down on here someplace. Anyway, the entire county gets like 1.9, and

that's rounding up, million dollars for the kind of CDBG related funding, but we get this year, the total that was in today's paper is \$4.8 million for just for the City of Scranton, so I certainly think that whatever monies are required for the plan should come out of the monies that we have in the CDBG budget. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MS. KRAKE: 5-A. Motions.

MS. EVANS: Mr. McGoff?

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. I just have one thing I would like to ask on behalf of OECD. We did receive a letter requesting an update on the status of the resolution for legal services for OECD and I was wondering if and when that was going to be placed on our agenda?

MS. EVANS: It's going to be on next Tuesday, September 14th's agenda.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you very much, and that's all I have.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. The

first thing I just wanted to clear up was a few residents contacted me over the break regarding the new parking meters that were installed and I just want to make everyone aware that I was not part of that decision. It happened before I took office in January.

I have a list of the proposed action plan for 2011 for the OECD office and I was going to read it off today, but I think I'm going to hold off until next week so I could have a little more time to consult with my colleagues about some changes that I want to make to the plan if that's okay with everyone?

MR. JOYCE: Sure.

MR. ROGAN: And I just have a few citizens' request. I received a request that a building located on the 1100 block of Prospect Avenue that is known as Scarfo's has been condemned for a long period of time. The windows are smashed out and boarded up and the grass around the building is very high and it's an eyesore for the neighborhood. Could we please forward that to the blight officer as well as licensing

and inspections?

Number two, the stop sign at the corner of Hemlock Street and Stafford Avenue has been painted and needs to be replaced.

This is an older one, but I don't know if it was completed yet.

The next one was what Mr. Spindler was talking about, I had it on the list, but I think you got them with the graffiti around Main Avenue and West Side on the Railroad Bridge.

And the fifth request is regarding 5-H, I believe it's 5-H. Yes. Could we please send a letter over to the OECD Office, Ms. Aebli, asking how they determined which properties are demolished. I would hate to see all of this money used in one section of the city. I would hope it would be based on need, which properties are the most dangerous to the neighborhoods and I hope that's the way they are going to go about it. I would think it would be, but just to make sure.

MR. MCGOFF: The proposal does say citywide, although, it doesn't list any

particular areas.

MS. EVANS: I was hoping perhaps OECD could provide us with a list of the properties prior to next Tuesday and we could disseminate that among council members.

MR. ROGAN: And hopefully it is citywide, but just to make sure that we are covering all of the basis because over the recess I talked to a lot of different organizations and people in different sections of the city and people are become upset that it seems a lot of, you know, the rehabbing of properties and tearing down of condemned homes are happening in one section of the city and it really does need to be based on need. If there is a house that's condemned, but isn't, you know, a hazard to the neighborhood, obviously, it needs to be taken care of, but the first thing we have to take care of is a property that collapsed, you know, and could hurt people in the neighborhood. And that's is all I have.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Rogan, I just wanted

to add though with regard to the CDBG allocations and ESG HOME Program, etcetera, I was asking each of the council members to compile a list of your changes and we'll submit them to Mrs. Krake and then I'm hoping that all changes can be submitted to Ms. Aebli for consideration and inclusion into the legislation for it's final vote, and if everyone could please do that, each member of council, as soon as possible to facilitate the process that would be most helpful.

MR. ROGAN: Yeah, that would be great and we talked on the phone about it and there are definitely some changes that need to be made.

MS. EVANS: Yes, there are. Yes, there are. And, Mr. Loscombe, do have you any comments or motions at this time?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, I do, Mrs.

Evans. First of all, I'd like to welcome everyone back to our weekly meetings in the studio and on screen and I hope that you all enjoyed your summer. Although we have not had a meeting in a few weeks, we have all

been actively working on numerous issues that continue to come before us.

I have enjoyed attending the many church festivals and picnics in Scranton ending with La Festa Italiana this weekend as you can attest by my expanding waistline.

This was mentioned previously, but I would like to express my sincere condolences, also, to those of you who have lost loved once during our summer break and especially Mayor Doherty and his family, the family of Joe Cummings, the family of Dan Donahue, the family of Rich Owens. Rich was one of the original paramedics up at CMC. The family of Bill Eisley. Bill was the retired Dunmore firefighter who is a good friend of mine. The family of John Lorenzo, a well-known contractor from West Side whose son runs the business now and I will keep you all of in my prayers.

I would also like to wish my daughter, Katie Klimmer, a happy birthday for Thursday. She won't like that.

As I stated previously though, we have been actively working on a number of

issues this past several weeks. I had a meeting with several residents of the Tripp Park section regarding some of their neighborhood concerns and then I spent a few hours walking through their neighborhood with a large group of them. Les was there actually, too.

I met with our new police chief, Dan Duffy, and voiced many of the concerns that are facing the residents of this city and he has appeared to be on the same page and also aware of several of the issues that I had pointed out to him. Chief Duffy and the director of Licensing and Inspections, Mark Seitzinger, reacted without hesitation to the concerns of Tripp Park and have hopefully helped eliminate a problem before it escalated. I am looking forward to working with these men in the future to resolve some of the outstanding issues facing our residents.

I would like to wish current police
Chief Dave Elliott all the best on his
retirement, and I would like to comment that
he was always accessible to me and usually

responded to me without delay.

I have had a meeting with the mayor and several residents of West Side in the Anthracite Auto area where we did a walk around of the neighborhood and listened to their concerns. I spoke with one of the owners and I will be meeting with both owners in the near future to discuss the situation in that area and they have both been willing to discuss this with me and the neighbors in an effort to maintain a better relationship with their neighbors and to continue their family business that has been part of this neighborhood of Scranton for three generations.

Mrs. Evans and myself also had a meeting with the neighborhood housing representatives in the South Side seniors building with Mike Hanley as the director and we listened to a lot of their concerns and learned a lot of what they had to do and that was also a very good meeting.

I have met with several neighbors in the Barring and Kosek Avenue areas regarding a business in their neighborhood. There are

several issues that were pointed out to me that need to be addressed and I am attempting to setup a personal meeting with a business owner to voice the neighbors' concerns. I will provide you with additional reports as the dialogue progresses.

My colleagues and I have been attempting to continue our meetings with the nonprofits in an effort to reach agreements for payments in lieu of taxes. Some of the organizations that we have visited have not yet responded and we will continue our efforts and report back with the results, but I had spoken to representatives at Marywood and still awaiting to hear back from representative of Johnson's College. I'm not interested at this time in going after places like the Red Cross and the food pantries or any of that stuff.

I am pleased to say that we are making a dent in the blighted property issues with the city taking an active part in the bidding out, and I just noticed that the demolition of some of the properties

that are deemed structurally unsound. In my meeting with the new police chief, Chief Duffy, it is apparent that he is interested in being aggressive with the blight issues along with his utilization of the blight officer, Nick Herchick, and the Department of Licensing and Inspections to clean up the neighborhoods and to work with city council when we make him aware of these issues as they arise. He is aware that neighborhood decline stimulates other illegal activities through the negligent of blight.

I have been actively working on amendments to our blight ordinances that will work in concert with the existing State Act of November 26, 2008, entitled, "The Abandoned and Blighted Property Conservation Act," and a Bill which was passed by the Senate in June and is to be considered by the house in the very near future. This is Senate Bill 900 and sponsored by Senator David Argo. This Bill is known as the "Neighborhood Blight Reclamation and Revitalization Act."

Once our amendments are reviewed by

our solicitor, who also has been very busy, and incorporated into our blight ordinance, it will give us more ammunition to act legally and more hastily towards a resolution of our goal of getting a handle on and eliminating the blight conditions that have become prevalent throughout our city.

I would also like to thank

Representative Kevin Murphy and his staff
for convening a meeting with a number of
interested parties in relations to some of
the continuing problems with storm water
flooding in various sections of the city.

Although, this meeting was in regards to two particular situations at this point, Representative Murphy extended an invitation for all parties to continue with monthly meetings in his office to address all of the storm water flooding problems throughout the city one by one.

Attending the meeting were

Representative Kevin Murphy, Tom Tell, Kevin

Murphy's chief of staff; Justin MacGregor,

Representative Murphy's staff member; Dave

Basiack, county maintenance manager for PennDOT; Gene Skelton, deputy director of operations at the Scranton Sewer Authority; Jeff Brazil, the Director of Public Works; Brian Swanson, city engineer; and myself representing city council.

The first two problem areas addressed were the 1500 block of Luzerne Street and the rear of the 3200 block of Birney Avenue. We spent quite some time walking around with the different officials involved and spoke to several neighbors in an effort to resolve these flooding problems. I believe that we have formed a good working relationship with all of the parties involved and I will continually report back to you with any updates and resolutions along with future problem solving projects, and that is all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Loscombe.

Mr. Joyce, do you have any comments or

motions?

MR. JOYCE: Yes, just a few. First, I wanted to start off by speaking about the

nonprofits very briefly. I wanted to inform everyone that over the recess I have been in contact with the three local hospitals being the CMC, Mercy, Moses Taylor and I have been in contact with the president's office of each of those three hospitals and at this time I am yet to engage in a formal meeting with the president of any of the hospitals, so I will not provide any further comment until any type of meeting occurs.

Secondly, the capital budget, which is Item 5-B on the agenda tonight where city council is being asked to approve and accept the capital budget improvement updates or the updates for 2011.

First of all, just to provide everyone with a brief background, in 2008 a five-year plan was proposed and accepted by -- well, in 2007 a five-year plan started in 2008 was proposed and accepted by city council, a capital improvement program or budget, and this plan is required to be updated every year.

The first matter that I want to discuss when speaking about this is Section

904 of the Home Rule Charter which basically lays out the framework of how this budget along with it's subsequent updates are to be provided to council, and in Section 904 it explicitly states that the capital budget along with subsequent updates are to: include a summary of it's contents; two, a list of all capital improvements to be undertaken and supporting information for such improvements; three, the cost as estimated, method of financing and recommended time schedule for such improvements; four, the cost of operating and maintaining facilities to be acquired; and five, an inventory replacement schedule for the purchase and replacement of major equipment.

So looking over what was submitted to council, I'll briefly go over it. Page one, page one indicates that nearly \$2 million in revenue budgeted from -- or basically that there is \$2 million in revenue budgeted for interfund transfers which on page two it explains that this \$2 million will be allocated towards flood

protection projects.

Page three indicates that \$222,000 that -- that there exists \$222,000 in budgeted revenue from operating transfers from other funds. Subsequently, on page four, it shows that the \$222,000 will be used towards -- to float a bond on operating expenses.

On page five it indicates that there is nearly \$29,000 in budgeted revenue from long-term debt.

On page six, it shows that this \$29,000 is allocated to fund city hall for repairs and renovations.

On page seven, it's displayed that
-- and displays a list of the accounts to be
used to fund additional projects and some of
that consists of \$15 million.

And on page eight it's a short
breakdown of what this 15 million dollars on
page seven will be used for. Basically they
include fire station and equipment, bridges,
roads, curbs and sidewalks, building
improvements, parks systems improvements and
fund allocated towards the Scranton Public

Library.

2 As the letter from the mayor's 3 office that was presented to us states: The update is not a new capital budget and it 4 5 does not propose any new capital spending. However, from my perspective before passing 6 this piece of legislation, the update needs 7 to be revised to be a lot more thorough than 8 9 what was provided to council. For instance, 10 in accordance with Section 904 the update 11 does not include a summary of the contents 12 of the update, it does not include an 13 updated list of capital projects to be 14 undertaken with supporting information. 15 There is no indication as to the status of 16 the projects that have been completed and 17 there is no updated time schedule as to, you 18 know, are we on track or what's been going on since 2008. 19 20

You know, I understand that this was voted down last year by a vote of three to two with Councilwoman Evans and former Councilwoman Judy Gatelli and former Councilman Bill Courtright voting in the negative. They did this, in my opinion, due

to a lack of information in the update that was provided to council.

And, unfortunately, as I understand when this was voted down last year there were no updates provided by the administration. Tonight I'll be voting no for introduction since I do not feel the update provides sufficient information. Ιf my honorable colleagues agree with me I would hope that the administration would revise the capital budget update and send it to council, hopefully be placed back on the Hopefully in any capital budget update that may be provided, we can see an updated list of capital projects and an updated time schedule. Hopefully we could see an updated summary of any operating costs that may have changed or any projections that may be different.

For instance, the cost of
maintaining structures acquired, the
maintenance of those structures. For
instance, energy rates are changing. We
have a new energy supplier. Did anything
change there? I think these are things that

And also, it would be appreciated if in accordance with Section 904 if an update can be provided regarding the schedule and replacement purchases of Simply approving updated new equipment. monetary figures without any status updates of current projects and any updates in regards to time schedules, future projects that such funds are being allocated for is nothing but fiscally irresponsible and that's why tonight I will be voting "no" on 5-B and I encourage everyone else on council to consider what I just had to say and vote accordingly as I suggest.

To conclude, I have a few citizens' requests. Mrs. Krake, if you could please send a letter to Mr. Brazil concerning the following two matters:

it's August recess, council vigorously

continued it's work. All problems and complaints submitted to council were addressed and several council members personally observed and photographed problem areas and met with city residents as was indicated throughout tonight's announcements and motions.

For example, the nuisance property at 1406 West Gibson Street was closed down.

"No truck traffic" signs were installed on Woodlawn Street. Flooding problems on Luzerne and Birney Avenue and Powell Court were inspected and are in the process of being solved. The flooding problems in the Tripp Park and curbing problem as well were resolved. 1102 Moltke Avenue was finally cleaned up as well as numerous others.

Further, council continues to pursue your reported complaints that remain to be satisfied.

During our recess, Councilman

Loscombe, Joyce, and I were also actively

contacting city nonprofits for payment in

lieu of taxes. We were pleased to learn

that similarly the mayor was in contact with

the same nonprofit agencies for the first time during his tenure and we sincerely hope that our combined efforts to lessen the heavy burden of our taxpayers will meet with some degree of success.

In conjunction with the efforts of my two honorable colleagues Mr. Loscombe and Mr. Joyce, I contacted Lackawanna College, the Commonwealth Medical College, and General Dynamics to discuss PILOTS and in-kind contributions to our city.

Acting president of Lackawanna
College, Mark Volk, indicated that
Lackawanna will not be making a monetary
contribution. However, at it's meeting in
October, Lackawanna's board of directors
will consider providing services through a
variety of projects which will be submitted
by Scranton City Council. Two examples of
potential projects are the upgrade of
Internet technology services within city
government offices and a neighborhood
cleanup program of vacant lots.

To date, I have not received a return call from Mr. Robert Delasandry of

the Commonwealth Medical College, but I will report to you following our discussion.

Finally, I had the pleasure of speaking with Mr. Jack Bronozi, an official of General Dynamics with Scranton. apprised him of the financial state of the city and indicated that Scranton is very pleased to serve as a host city for such an impressive global company. Mr. Bronozi stated that the mayor was visiting with him today to discuss this very same issue. Thereafter, he will be in contact with national headquarters and will notify us in the near future of General Dynamics' decision. We concluded with a brief discussion of the parking meters and newly created parking problems on surrounding neighborhood streets. The matter was also to be discussed with the mayor earlier today.

Also, in August, following the mayor's veto of the Comcast contract.

Discussions resumed in an effort to develop a contract that will best serve our community. During this process, Attorney

Hughes informed me that ECTV demanded \$100,000 by September 30, 2010, or it will pull the plug on Channels 19 and 21 and the screen will go black. This surprising statement was in direct contradiction to previous statements made by an ECTV representative which declared that ECTV would not pull the plug on the viewers it serves.

More importantly, council will not respond to threats made by ECTV, particularly, since it has no contract with the city or Comcast and has ignored a Right-to-Know request filed July 28, 2010, for inventory and detailed financial information.

On Friday, September 3, at 4:10

p.m., a Comcast contract was delivered to council's office from the city's solicitor,

Paul Kelly, three days after the deadline for submission of the legislation and after the Friday posting of the agenda for tonight's meeting. As a result, council and Solicitor Hughes will carefully examine the document this week and determine if it

requires further revision.

As we look forward to the remaining months of 2010, council will deliberate on several highly significant issues, CDBG, ESG and HOME program grants, the cable TV and an education government channel contract, a revised Recovery Plan and the 2011 operating budget. Of course, there will be additional legislative issues as well such as contract for the OECD and Scranton Redevelopment Authority solicitor and for an auditing firm to produce the independent audits of city council for the years 2010 through 2013 among others.

For each issue that arises you can be confident that city council is working diligently only for you, the taxpayers of our city.

And finally, Mrs. Krake, please send a letter tomorrow morning to Attorney Kelly from city council requesting legislation for the bidding of professional services.

Council's first request occurred six months ago with continuing requests thereafter from both city council and council solicitor

Hughes, and that's it.

Just as the annual operating budget contains specific financial information necessary to the operations of the city, so must the capital budget and what we have received once again this year is nothing more than a cursory skeletal document that lacks accountability and transparency.
