MS. KRAKE: We simply have two for this evening, the first is a response we received from Stu Renda, the business administrator, regarding the grant from the Harry and Jeannette Weinberg to the City of Scranton. In the body of the letter he explains the requests that council had as far as the time line and how this money can be applied to a project that is already in place.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: And the second was reported to us from Councilman McGoff that the Spruce Street bridge the fencing that we had asked to be repaired has been repaired.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: That's it.

MS. EVANS: Do any council members have announcements at this time?

MR. MCGOFF: I would just like to make mention that someone asked last week about why the Steamtown Marathon information was not on the website. I believe it is now on the website, that the IT Department had not received information from the marathon, but the Steamtown Marathon will be held Sunday, October 10, it starts at 8:00 at Forest City High School. The leaders should be hitting the City of Scranton around 10:00 with about 2,000 or so other runners arriving thereafter, many of them much thereafter, but a nice event.

They have a record number of applicants for the race. They set the limit at 2,500. They have never had more than 2,000 runners, so this will be a record year in terms of not only applicants but also probably runners and finishers, so if you have a chance get out and view part of the marathon and offer encouragement to those poor souls trying to finish 26.2 miles.

DAVIS: Thank you. 10 MS. EVANS: Our next speaker is Lee 11 Morgan. 12 MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council. 13 MR. JOYCE: Good evening. 14 MR. MORGAN: I have an editorial 15 from the Scranton Times here and I was just 16 wondering if anybody on council has read it? 17 It's the Historical Architectural Review 18 Board of Scranton. Have you read that? MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. 19 20 MS. EVANS: Yes. 21 MR. MORGAN: Do you agree with what 22 it says or disagree? I mean, the body of 23 the contentions made by this group -- well, 24 maybe I should start this way, has council 25 watched on the public access channel SAPA

1 present their plan? MR. LOSCOMBE: I don't have public 2 3 access. MR. MORGAN: Mr. Rogan? Mr. Joyce? 4 MR. ROGAN: I haven't seen it on. 5 MR. MORGAN: Have you, Mr. Rogan? 6 7 MR. JOYCE: I have not seen SAPA 8 formally present their plan, I have attended 9 a few SAPA meetings in the fast and I do 10 have the plan, a hard copy. Mrs. Evans? 11 MR. MORGAN: 12 MS. EVANS: Yes. 13 MR. MORGAN: Mr. McGoff? 14 MR. MCGOFF: I have not watched it on TV, no. 15 16 MR. MORGAN: Do you think, you know, 17 I think that these -- it's not only the 18 review -- the people, the Historical 19 Architecture Review Board that I'm talking 20 about, the Scranton Sewer Authority has come 21 forward and said that it's going to effect 22 their grants, but I'd like to know what it 23 ask this council think about Dunmore having 24 to live with the decisions that this council

has made concerning their economic

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1 condition? Does anybody want to say anything on that? 2 3 MR. ROGAN: I think we are looking out for the people of Scranton not the 4 5 people of Dunmore. MR. MORGAN: You honestly believe 6 that, sir. 7 8 MR. ROGAN: Yes. 9 MR. MORGAN: Do you think the people 10 in this community are worth investing to 11 create jobs? 12 MR. ROGAN: I absolutely do and I 13 don't believe the SAPA plan is the right way 14 to go about it. 15 MR. MORGAN: Why is that? 16 MR. ROGAN: Because the reason why 17 businesses won't move into the City of 18 Scranton is because of taxes, not because of 19 zoning. 20 MR. MORGAN: Do you think the taxes 21 are high because there is no economic engine 22 here for development? 23 MR. ROGAN: Yes. And because of 24 excessive spending over the last few 25 decades.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Morgan, I don't think you were here last week.

MR. MORGAN: I was here last week.

MS. EVANS: Okay, then you would be aware of the statements that I made regarding SAPA.

MR. MORGAN: Not really. No. Go ahead. I might have missed them. Feel free.

MS. EVANS: I stated that either
SAPA can provide us with the cost for the
20-year period and an annual breakdown or
SAPA could enter into an agreement with the
city whereby the City of Scranton is
permitted to maintain membership and
implement the plan at no cost to the City of
Scranton. In return for that, Mr. King,
whose services they have been utilizing for
free for many years, will continue his work
and that would be the city's contribution
toward the plan.

I have received no response from any SAPA representative to either proposal not now, not in the past.

MR. MORGAN: Well, I'd just like to

1 ask this question, hasn't city council on multiple occasions as this editorial states 2 3 voted to proceed forward with SAPA. MS. EVANS: I believe in the past. 4 MR. MORGAN: Weren't you on these --5 weren't you a part of this? 6 MS. EVANS: Yes, I was. 7 8 MR. MORGAN: Did you request for 9 SAPA to ask additional communities to join? 10 MS. EVANS: Yes, I did. 11 MR. MORGAN: And didn't they request 12 that they join? 13 MS. EVANS: No, they didn't. Only 14 Dunmore was invited. At the time they came before us, Mr. Morgan, in a public caucus. 15 16 I had asked them who had been invited and 17 why not Throop, why not Dickson City, why 18 not Taylor, Old Forge, Dunmore. Thereafter, 19 Dunmore was invited and their response to me 20 was that the group would become too large 21 and unmanageable, if you will, and they 22 wanted to keep it to lower numbers. 23 MR. MORGAN: Didn't Cindy Campbell 24 decide that from the state, that if they 25 were -- if they were allowed to join it

would be too large a group? Isn't that exactly what occurred?

MS. EVANS: Cindy Campbell, I don't believe, was present at that meeting.

MR. MORGAN: Well, I did attend a meeting where she made those statements that this group was as large as it could possibly be, and the real thing that I'm looking here at is that I'm getting then idea that this council doesn't want to invest in jobs and the people in this community because for a community to have a structural deficit this community has had for so long and not be willing to invest in the people in the community -- you know, it's one thing to run for election, it's another thing to be elected, okay?

But, you know, it just seems that
the voters are left out of the loop on
almost everything because even the backup to
the agenda isn't on the website yet and, you
know, we talked a lot, a lot about doing
things in the community, but it still
doesn't change anything that the city is
dying, okay? It's a mess, and then what

this council seems to say, from what I understand, is that you don't want to invest in the people that live in this city.

I mean, that's what I take from this because when the Scranton Sewer Authority says that they need this component to fund some of the Chesapeake Initiative that they are obligated to follow and then you have got, you know, this group writing an editorial saying that it's a great thing and you got Mr. King there who stated -- I went in his office and sat down with this man. I mean, and he is saying that, you know, that this thing is fundable with grants.

And my point is this, the city has proceeded this long for this plan and you know what, don't you think it's time to try something new? Don't you really think that it's, look at, I mean, we have been in distressed status so long, just entirely too long. There is plenty of grant money to tear houses down, all right, just take a look at it. The city's ability to provide services is continually diminishing okay, and in my opinion I think the people in this

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city deserve for somebody to make a decision and try to lead the city in a new way. It's not political with me.

There is just too many poor people, 60 percent of children in this community get free reduced lunch and people are asking about the cost of things. We took the proceeds from the sale of the golf course and we plugged them into the budget. of money is being wasted and then for this council to turn around and say, well, I'm not sure if we can invest because we don't know the outcome of the cost, well, you know something the residents and the taxpayers in this city know the outcome of their costs because they are losing their homes in foreclosures because we have had councils for too long that wanted to play politics instead of being leaders.

And I am really troubled that this council won't invest in the citizens of this city and coming with every excuse you can not to justify continuing forward, even though prior councils knew it was a good idea and people not -- people that are

writing editorials know it's a good idea. 1 just think it's political and it should end. 2 3 MR. LOSCOMBE: Mr. Morgan, I resent the fact that you're saying it's politics. 4 We are working for the City of Scranton, not 5 12, 13 other communities. If you don't see 6 7 what --8 MR. MORGAN: We're not talking --MR. LOSCOMBE: -- we are doing and 9 10 looking at the community that we are living 11 in right now, first of all, if they made 12 Scranton totally an industrial zone we still 13 wouldn't get guaranteed one business moving 14 into Scranton at today's rates with the 15 taxes as Mr. Rogan has stated. 16 MR. MORGAN: Sir, with all respect 17 to you, they are moving out of this 18 community. 19 MR. LOSCOMBE: They have been for 20 This plan is not going to bring them years. 21 in. 22 How do you know that? MR. MORGAN: 23 MR. LOSCOMBE: How do you know it 24 is? 25 Well, I think that when MR. MORGAN:

a lot of these --

MR. LOSCOMBE: A lot it is because our taxes are --

MR. MORGAN: I'd like to say this before I leave the podium, you know something, a lot of communities in the Commonwealth have joint plans like this and there is a reason for it, and also I think that when you bundle all of these communities together you are going to get lot of tax revenue because they are going to fund the largest footprint, and if you take enough time and this council takes enough time to study this plan you might learn something.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Would they consider regionalization and all make their own community rather than all of the other municipalities that's where the savings would be?

MS. EVANS: I just wanted to respond to a few comments made by Mr. Morgan. First of all, with regard to the Sewer Authority, I think the better question to the Sewer Authority is why did it fail to apply for

federal stimulus funds? We have been trying to learn that answer for a number of months and the Sewer Authority will not provide a response to that. It was a great concern to our Congressman, Mr. Kanjorski. They missed the boat which means now the ratepayers have missed the both. They are going to have to makeup for what was not applied for.

Also, I think Mr. Morgan stated it's time to try to something new and I couldn't agree more. It certainly is time to try something new and that's exactly what this council has been doing. What have we been doing new? We are pulling in the financial reigns. We are watching the spending. We are cutting the costs of the government. It is irresponsible to agree to pay for a program for a period of 20 years and not know the annual costs of that program.

And my final question is, since

North Abington has dropped it's membership
in this plan why has it not be replaced?

Obviously now there is room for a new
community. Let's invite -- let SAPA invite

Dickson City to join or Taylor or Throop,

but there has been no invitations extended nor has there been any pursuit of North Abington for it's apparent vote to decline implementation and further membership of this plan.

Now, if SAPA is truly sincere about having the participation of the City of Scranton it can respond to the offers that this council has made. Interestingly, it has not.

Is there anyone else who would like to address city council this evening?

Mr. Dobrzyn, you are closest.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, member of the Taxpayers',
resident of Scranton. Remember at the
beginning of the summer I mentioned about
trash accumulating in various places? Well,
I was by the center up there, the Salvation
Army, gates are left open again on several
occasions, I checked at night when I was
going through there on East Mountain and
that's how they get access into that whole
rail line and there is also a gas pipeline
there. And down behind McNichol's Plaza

it's getting bigger. I see some of the traffic --

MR. LOSCOMBE: Right behind McNichol's Plaza?

MR. DOBRZYN: Yeah. Directly across from where the trolley tunnel comes out, I don't know the name of the street because it's not marked, but I have to look at a map, but directly across from the power convertor to the trolley line it switches it from AC to DC, so it's quite a dump getting started there.

Okay, in past weeks I have mentioned with some of these contentious issues I trust you people to reconcile if possible, but don't give up or your principals.

That's -- you have every right in these issues to demand an accountability and if somebody doesn't want to account for spending a certain department or whoever then they are not trying either, so if they don't try there is no -- no sense in trying.

Now, on this SAPA, I'm going to take the other side of the story. I think that SAPA should join the county planning

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commission and just skip it. How many bureaucracies do we need? How many organizations do we need all telling us to do something different? And that creates a lack of coordination, so on the grander scale I think it should be the county and also when Bernie McGurel was here and he mentioned about SAPA, okay, North Abington has Marcellus going in and that's also a part of the beginning of the watershed for the Lackawanna Valley, and he also mentioned the Moscow Elmhurst area and that it is our water supply, and I happen to know, I know people that definitely have leased out to Marcellus Shale, so if you want benzine in your water some day or whatever because they grope through to the upper layers then -and it's not being properly released, well, maybe SAPA should take a look at some of that, also.

And as far the city is concerned, we are way bigger than anybody else. If we could get some businesses in here where people don't have to travel we are definitely more greener. There is no --

nobody that creates more pollution than someone driving 50 miles to work back and forth every day. You use more oxygen in that trip than two or three people use in their entire life time it's been scientifically researched.

There is a out "Lives Per Gallon" and if you live within a mile or half a mile of a freeway or something like that, a busy freeway, you will lose 1 percent of your lung capacity before you are 20 years old, so by the time you graduate high school you are almost like you are smoking a pack a day from cradle on up, so if people would be willing to live closer and invest in the city, and we seen it with the housing collapse, if they had settled for some of the nicer houses in this town they wouldn't be in the condition they are out in the Poconos or whatever and all of these defaults and foreclosures.

And also with that stimulus I understood that some of the highest billed communities with that sewer authorities actually got the stimulus and they are the

once that are all swelled up. They are the richer communities where people have two or three acre lawns and you have to run this gigantic sewer line for how many extra miles and it was actually setup that way so that somebody got that.

And on the golden parrot award,

I'll make this quick, there is a 60's

association mailing letters out and so forth

and putting political ads on, well, they get

the golden parrot award, they are financed

by the drug companies.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Have a good night.

MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus, Scranton.

On July 27 after I left the council meeting I had spoke about ECTV, I went out into the hallway I was harassed and on the elevator and down in the basement all of the way to my car, so that was about quarter to nine at night, so when I got home at 9:00 I had called the police and I filed a police report. The police officer advised me to come to city hall and get a copy of the tape that the city has out in the hallway and

down in the basement.

So the next morning, July 28, I come over to the IT Department who does the tapes and I was told by the man there that I would have to go to the Business Administration's Office to see Stu Renda to get a Right-to-Know letter for these tapes.

This man also told me that I only 30 days to do it because after 30 days they would rewrite the tapes, meaning, they would use the tape over again, so I had 30 days.

So I went, you know, it was on the day after.

So I put a Right-to-Know letter in and I requested the tape out in the hallway at city council here by the elevator and I requested the tape down in the basement and I put on that Right-to-Know letter July 28, 2010, that I wanted the tapes secured and made sure that they would not be erased since I had 30 days. They told me it would take a little while to get this tape to me because they had to go through all of the tapes. I requested the time frame of 8:40 to guarter after nine because I left here at

here quarter to nine so that was plenty of time to have myself out in the hallway taped.

So a week went by and I called and I said, "Is the tape ready yet?"

And they said, no, it was not ready yet they still needed more time. So this is one week, so at the end of the second week I called and it wasn't ready, but the next day I get a call on August 11 and they said this tape is ready for me to come and pick it up so I did. I went and I picked it up and I went home and i played it and it was the hallway up in the hall by city council and it was a hallway downstairs in the basement just like I requested, but there was nobody there. Not one person in the hallway.

So I came back August 12 and I said,
"It's impossible because I was there, and
I'm not in the film, so I am now requesting
a Right-to-Know letter for the whole meeting
that night of July 27 from 5:30 to 10:30."

This was a long meeting this way they can't say I wasn't there. The lady in Stu Renda's Office told me that -- she

called rather, she called IT Department, I believe she talked to Frank Sweitnicki and he came up to the office and he wanted to go over this with me because I explained to him that I wasn't in that tape and he didn't know what happened, so I told him here is my second Right-to-Know letter and it's a requesting all of the meeting and I want this tape secured and I do not want this written over. I stressed that with him, I put quotation marks around it. I put a circle around it and he understood completely.

Well, since that time and to the present I have been getting nothing but the run around from city hall and Stu Renda and his office and the IT Department. Jason from the IT Department has been very nice, but I've still been getting the run around.

So I would call and Stu Renda would not be there, so I would stop over, he would not be there, he would be in a meeting or something, so I asked to have him call me. Well, he wouldn't return my phone call, well, he never returned my phone call, so

this went on for days, I have him on speed dial. So I would come back, still no Stu Renda, still no phone calls, so now we are into September.

So one day I got Stu and he said something about, well, we are investigating this and he mentioned quickly, he said, "well, those tapes are erased after two days -- "two weeks, rather.

And I said, "Oh, no, Stu, I was told specifically 30 days and that tape had better not be erased."

So he said, "Well, we are investigating it and we'll get back to you."

So I called Frank in IT and asked for him to call me back, left messages numerous times saying make sure this tape is secure, no return phone calls.

Last week I called Stu Renda's

Office again he didn't call me back. I

called back in the afternoon, he went home
sick. The next day on Friday I called, he
said he would -- they said he would call me
back, I called back afternoon he went home
at lunch that day, he went home for the day

at noon. Just left.

I called Frank's office, the IT

Department and they told me that he wasn't there, but Jason told me that was on

Thursday that he would talk to him, so I called on Friday and Jason told me that he had talked to Frank that night and he was told from Frank that Stu Renda was handling this and he was not explain anything to me the Stu Renda was to explain it. He could not explain it, only Stu Renda could. May I finish?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MS. FRANUS: So, okay, so I called up Stu Renda's Office on Friday and asked for an appointment with him, they said he wasn't there and they asked him about it and set it up and get back to me. So Monday came, nobody called to setup the appointment so I let it go. Tuesday morning, today, I called the mayor's office and asked for an appointment with the mayor and Stu Renda.

The secretary was very nice and she called me back and said that Stu Renda had said that he had sent you a letter today

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with the information that you had requested, what I asked to be released. I didn't understand that, so I called Stu Renda's Office and, of course, he wasn't there. So I came over here, I said to the lady, I said, "I'm coming over here for this letter that he sent me that I'll get tomorrow because I want to see what it says."

So I come over. Stu left it there for me, part of it. It said that I was denied my request and that attached to this was a letter from Frank from the IT Department explaining why. Well, there was no letter attached so I called and asked him to e-mail it to me and I got it. And what it said was the first tape I got -- when I got tape home, like I said, there was a hall with nobody in it they said -- let me see, wait a second. He said they got new equipment this year and the DVR was displaying the correct time, but it was not recording the video with the correct time stamp, whatever that means, and they are sorry about this.

And here's the clincher, he said he

was not aware of my second request until the end of August and he was sorry about the tape was erased, after I specifically said to them from the IT Department on August 12, "Secure this tape."

They knew it. They saw it, they had it in writing, how could they say they weren't aware of it when I stressed this in a Right-to-Know letter? I stressed it right to their face in the IT Department.

So this is all a coverup. This is all a way of them not to have evidence from me of what happened in the hall. They could say whatever they want to say, they are out and out liars. I have been getting the runaround from this administration and they are doing their very best to cover this up. I can't do it think about it, I never expected to get it because I know exactly how they work, but I just wanted the people to know what lengths these people go to to cover stuff up and to take care of their own.

I know the truth, I know what happened, they could say whatever they want

to say. I mean, I may not even win in Court, it doesn't matter. I know what happened, but I think these departments should be looked into by the mayor. I think Stu Renda should be more accountable to the people instead of lying. He passes it over to IT, IT passes back to him, he passes it over to them, nobody is accountable for anything, but they want to make sure enough time has passed so they could say that this tape was used by never knowing of all the days that I called what was going on. They knew from day one this tape would never be available.

That's all. I just wanted the people to know what's going on around this city and how in my opinion how totally corrupt they are. This is just a little think and I'm sure you deal with many big things every day with what they do and I feel bad that you have to deal with this, that you have to wear this criticism,

Mrs. Evans. I think it's terrible you have to take and the rest of the council members.

And as far as SAPA is concerned I

remember years ago when Judy Gatelli, well, not years ago last week, the years they were on council, how you may have wanted something, Mrs. Evans, and they said no to it, and that was the end of it. It was never brought up again. There was never anything in the paper about what you wanted. But, brother, the mayor doesn't get what he wants and the city administration doesn't get what they want with SAPA so all of a sudden bring it up, bring it up, bring it up. It's over with. The vote said, no, it's done, and thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,
Council. Marie Schumacher, resident and
member of the Taxpayers' Association.

MR. JOYCE: Good evening.

MS. SCHUMACHER: First I'd like to thank I think it's DPW, I'm not really sure where Dunmore starts or ends and Scranton begins, but I frequently take the cut through to East Mountain from -- through Bunker Hill, you go down Ash Street and I'm very thankful, my dentist probably isn't

because my -- the fillings in my teeth won't be getting bounced out any longer, but it was really terrible and I have often thought over the last couple of years that I have used it and I see them patching in the summertime and I think as many times as they have patched those I wonder if they had just redone it if we wouldn't have saved money, but it has been paved, it's wonderful and if it was our DPW I thank them if that's really in Dunmore and it was Dunmore who did it I thank them, but it's wonderful.

Next, I'd like to move on to
Robinson Park, which is 7-C on the agenda
tonight. I did see an article in today's
Times-Tribune, I believe it may have been
yesterday, regarding the Weinberg Foundation
funding for Weston field. The article
admitted that the funds not received in the
time frame of about 2003 were replaced with
proceeds from the \$72 million bond that the
mayor took out in the first year of his
administration.

I previously noted that the mayor took funds that he promised for Robinson

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have never occurred and as you may recall or may not even know, Robinson Park is used Monday through Friday by the -- up by the ARC, so it is well-utilized and certainly would be an inappropriate investment in funds, and I think some language needs to be incorporated into this ordinance tonight to fund the so-called stolen Robinson Park funding.

Park upgrades. Those Robinson Park upgrades

I think that if that money was transferred to replace the money that was six years late that now that they are getting that money that money should be transferred back and Robinson -- the promised upgrades to Robinson Park should happen sooner rather than later.

Next, there have been comments from this podium over the last couple of weeks and many places as you go about traffic signals. Now, as we all know the signalization program throughout the city is now only six months away from being bid out and it's my understanding that this program will replace the controller equipment in the

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lights, the signal heads, install light emitting diode lights and a radio which is actually a wireless connection so that the traffic signals can talk to one another and a computer and software so that all of the lights may be monitored from the DPW headquarters.

So given that this program is only six months off I must question why we are in the process of replacing the current incandescent lights with LED lights. It's. again, my understanding because I heard it in conversation is that what's been happening is they are replacing the LED lights or replacing the incandescent with LED light, that's what happened at Mulberry, but the lights, the boxes themselves, the signals themselves are like 30 years old and whatever happens when they put the LED equipment in it burns out the controller and there are no spare controllers so they have to be rebuilt, and I guess my bottom line again is do we have that kind of money to burn that we can't stand incandescent lights before six months before the signalization

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program comes along? Personally I don't think so and I think it's a waste of our taxpayer funds whether it's local taxpayers who are paying or whether it's the federal government stimulus. A waste is a waste.

Okay, and on the capital budget, I wonder has anybody requested the controller's report on capital expenses?

MR. JOYCE: No.

MS. EVANS: Finish, please.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I think that might be a good start in knowing what projects are in that -- in the capital program. finally, just quickly, although maybe I should hold it, I'm back to my favorite subject, but since Attorney Hughes isn't here tonight and I think he will probably -maybe he will have some input, but the bottom line is back on the Ice Box, I have paperwork in here on all of the -- to fulfill everything except the ordinance that was required for that \$600,000 payment, and I'll go into the details next week, but I don't think that deed that was filed I think it had the wrong paperwork and I'll address

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that next week, if I may. Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Ms. Schumacher, I just wanted to say that I don't know that council would be able to amend the legislation for the Weinberg grant in that it is an agreement between that organization and the City of Scranton that funding is used to pay down the debt on the Weston Field project that was completed in 2004. I know that individuals who oversee that grant program did walkthroughs of Weston field, I'm going to read a letter under the vote that will explain Mr. Renda's response to the questions that I posed, and so it would seem that the agreement limits us to solely Weston Field, but that does not mean that Robinson Park should be ignored all of these years. I understand your concerns and I know how many years back they go and that's why I think it's very important that we have, for example, a proper capital budget presented to city council so that we can understand what happened to Robinson Park, for example, among other issues about which

we have questions.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I'm certainly in agreement with that, but, also, I -- again, I went to the Weinberg Foundation website and it distinctly says "funds are not to be used to pay down debt," so, you know, we are sort of going against the will of the Weinbergers if we are using that money pay down debt. Anybody can access it. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Next?

MR. TALIMINI: Joe Talimini, citizen of Scranton. I'd like that issue with the previous speaker who chastises counsel for not doing anything and I'd like to tell you that since I have been covering this council it's been almost six years now, this the first time under this present council that we have ever had answers for any of the questions we have asked, that's number one.

Number two, to imply that this council is a do nothing council I could have attest to the fact that Mr. Rogan and Mr. Joyce were both introduced to a businessman who was contemplating moving

into Scranton and exactly what Mr. Rogan said the man could not afford to move into Scranton because of the taxation.

Mr. Loscombe, we discussed a real estate issue at one time, a gentleman who wanted to buy a piece of property to redevelop that same piece of property into the present, with all the existing conditions it was, he was denied that because of something that happened three or four years ago by a previous owner, and that's what discourages people from moving into this city.

The very fact that they can get no answers and the answers they did get were very, very much slanted in favor of people who had nothing to do. That same piece of property, incidentally, was sold to a developer and will probably be going under the same routine it was alleged to have gone.

Now, I hear this issue constantly about, well, this is federal money, it's federal. Like hell it is. It's my money and it's your money. I don't care if came

from federal, the state, the county or the city. It's our money and I, quite frankly, am up to here with this administration. You have an authority here, you have an authority there, you have an authority here and nobody answers to the people, they answer to the administration and the administration only.

Now, a prime example of something that was really disgusting this year was the fact that in the poorest section of town a pool was not opened for the kids because there was not money in, but they sure in hell had a big fireworks display at Nay Aug Park and everything turned around is Nay Aug Park. Well, I suggest that you change the name of the City of Scranton to Nay Aug Parkville or change Mulberry Street to Universityway because that's the only damn thing in this town that gets any attention is Nay Aug Park and the University of Scranton.

I have right here something that's called a fourth branch of government. It's called "Is the people." The government

exists for the sole purpose of serving the people, not ruling the people. The Declaration of Independence establishes the supremacy to people and the right and duty to defend the rights of the people over the acts of government.

When the government violates the constitution, it is a duty of the people to rise up against the government to bring the government into compliance with the constitution.

Now, the entire constitution of the State of Pennsylvania and this Home Rule Charter is very, very flawed. They both need to be reexamined and reexamined soon or this state is going to go completely bankrupt and down the tubes, and it's well on the way to going there now.

I listened to a gentleman tonight talk about the cost of something, the cost of something and why the city is saying they can't do something about it. Well, there are a lot of people in this town who can't afford to pay and, of course, there are some people in this town

who won't pay their bills. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Talimini.

Is there anyone else who cares to address

council? Mrs. Krake?

MS. KRAKE: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

THE COURT: Mr. McGoff, do you have any comments or any motions at this time?

MR. MCGOFF: Please. I'd just like a couple of comments, actually some things that took place at the last meeting and maybe some responses to some things that have been said this evening.

As far as the traffic signals are concerned, I'll contact -- Mrs. Schumacher, I'll contact Mr. Brazil tomorrow and see if I can find out what the reasoning is for the changing of the lights and so on and if there is any reason for doing so or you know what the problems have been and also how it does align with the overall traffic signalization plan, hopefully I can get to that tomorrow.

As far as the questioning of

council's decisions on SAPA, I would like to point out that those questions that have come up lately have not been from the one critic on council of the decision and not been from the administration that those have come from the community and from outside sources or people outside of the administration, so it's -- to characterize it as being, you know, as the administration questioning that really has not taken place.

Last week and this evening there was some mention of the loan portfolio from OECD and I know Mr. Rogan read through the loans that were in litigation, I just wanted to point out that since 2002 the loan portfolio for economic development has had 61 total loans. Of those, 37 are open, currently open; 17 have been satisfied and the seven that Mr. Rogan read the other evening, last meeting, represents somewhere about 11 percent of the total loan portfolio, so I think just read the ones that were in litigation it does a disservice to the entire -- to the overall program conducted by OECD and the loan program.

Also, I would like to -- last week an offhanded comment was made about the people -- city workers not wishing to do their work or not having things -- city workers not responding, departments not responding to requests. I think that comment was somewhat demeaning and inaccurate. It's been my experience that every citizen request made to the departments for the city are acted upon.

members of the heads of the departments and others, the only requests that may not be acted upon are those that are received anonymously. Someone is calling and not giving the name or an address or any other type of identification.

The only ones that I -- in speaking with

The response by the city departments may not be immediate and sometimes the resolution may not be the desired resolution that you have, that people have, but they are acted upon, and I think that we need to stop relying on the send a letter idea and we need to develop a working relationship with the city departments. I think at the

current time what we are doing is we are developing somewhat of an adversarial relationship and that doesn't necessarily get things done. I think that a more personal relationship with city departments is going to be much more appropriate.

And lastly, Comcast. Again, comments made last week about the overall Comcast agreement. Council approved the Comcast contract, the renewal, and then when it was vetoed did nothing to override the veto and then last week we hear from council that there were things wrong with the contract and now we are going to probably start the entire negotiations over again. If there were problems with the contract, why was it voted -- why was it approved in the first place by council?

The second thing we heard criticisms of the RFP for the PEG channel. The RFP that I received or at least the model was signed by both Attorney Hughes and Attorney Kelly. It would have been my assumption that the RFP was done under the approval of the majority of council or constructed

anyhow. Why now are we criticizing it if is it, in fact, we were the ones that negotiated it or constructed it?

ECTV has been criticized by a number of people for lack of programming and then last week it gets criticized for adding programming or agreeing to add programing from the school district.

I think that council instead of providing a lot of rhetoric and revisionist history regarding had contract really needs to sit down and do something to settle the Comcast -- or I should say the cable franchise agreement. We seem to be vacillating on what we want to do with this and just stagnated the entire process. I think we need to sit down and decide what it is what we really want to do with this contract and move forward, and that's all I have for this evening. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: First, I would just like to respond to a couple of things Mr. McGoff said. It was me that made the comment last week about sometimes things not getting done, and I would disagree with Mr. McGoff's

statement that citizens' requests are always answered. I know if we go into the office Mrs. Krake has kept a file of nonresponses and often times during clerk's notes we would hear a very, very long list of nonresponses, and I wouldn't say it's the city employees as a whole, but there are certain city employees who have not been answering to council's requests.

MR. MCGOFF: That's the request of letters being sent. It's not necessarily the work being done. I think you should check on what -- is the work actually being done that's being requested.

MR. ROGAN: And I would also mention that often times we get letters in our mailboxes from residents that say they have been trying for years and calling department heads and they have been calling city council, and often times things aren't even checked up on.

And, you know, the comment wasn't meant to be demeaning towards any city employees. Like I said, the majority of them do a great job, but it was just out of

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frustration that every week we go to a different neighborhood with a different concern and often times nothing is done and it just becomes very frustrating and, you know, what I mentioned was having people who were doing community service for an organization, I know people need to do community service to graduate high school and have them do some of the work. For instance, some lots, a few lots that I got requests for that were overgrown a couple of people who needed community service hours I talked to them, you know, I talked to some neighborhood organizations and have them go and clean up the lots instead of, you know, trying to get in contact with multiple, you know, parts of government and have them do it, so if we could kill two birds with one stone.

Secondly, on the loans, I only read the loans that were in litigation because I was requested by a few residents to read off those loans, and next time I will read the whole list, I guess, and the 11 percent I didn't run the numbers, it may be accurate,

but I'm willing to bet that it's more than

11 percent of the total dollar amount of the
loans because some of them that are in
litigation are the bigger dollar amounts.

Next, onto SAPA. Once again, you know, Mr. Talimini made a really good point. This was probably about three or four months ago I went to met a business owner who owns multiple diners around the region, but none in Scranton, and I asked him why he didn't have any in the City of Scranton and he was very blunt about it. He basically said that by having a diner in Dickson City, Dunmore, right on of the outskirts of Scranton the residents from Scranton will travel to eat at his restaurant, but he won't have to pay the city taxes.

And, you know, Mr. Morgue was mentioning editorials and letters to the editor they were in support of SAPA and the majority of the letters to the editor in the paper that are in support of SAPA were from outside of Scranton. They were from the Abingtons, they were from the outsider regions because they receive the majority of

the benefit from SAPA.

And second of all of, the reason why an editorial is on the opinion page is because it's just an opinion, it's not fact. We only have one newspaper in this town, there is only one opinion. Many big cities that have two newspapers you will have an editorial in one saying one thing and an editorial in the other paper saying another thing, so you have will have two different points of view.

And finally, on the OECD money, I know not everybody was able to make it to the meeting, but if anybody has any comments or suggestions feel free to contact our office. We will be making amendments in the future and, you know, the bottom line is these are tax dollars. People think it's just money that we can play around with, a lot of people say, oh, we want to use it for this and use it for this.

Number one, Mr. McGoff mentioned before you have apply to receive the funds, so we can't just decide, well, you know, we want to use the money for this, if the

organization didn't apply we can't give it to them. And second of all, at the end of the day even though this money is HUD money from the federal government your tax dollars pay for that money. And that's all I have.

Mr. Loscombe?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.

I just have a couple quick items based on
what was discussed here this evening and a
couple of other things.

I agree with Mr. McGoff to a certain degree that these -- I mean, there is a good response from the departments, it hasn't always been that way. I have reached out personally to some of the departments heads and have found success that way, but you mentioned about the paperwork and have the jobs been done, have we checked it out, well, part of the reason for the paperwork is to continue a paper trail to make sure that the requests was put in that was followed up. If the work was done they should respond that it has been completed so we not sending duplicate letters. That's just one of the functionalities, I believe,

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of the departments. Even though they may complain about the paperwork it does, you know, show everyone what was completed.

You mentioned the Comcast agreement that was approved by city council. correct. It was approved, as amended, by city council and then it was vetoed by the mayor. You also mentioned, Mr. McGoff, about our RFP for the PEG channel that both lawyers had signed onto, our solicitor and the city solicitor. I only find the city solicitor's name on this RFP, and as I stated last week what was highlighted in there is a one-sided RFP. The reservation of rights by the city, this leaves us out of There is no checks and balances. the mix. The city expressly reserves the right at any time to reject any and all proposals submitted in response to this RFP, reissue a new RFP, procure any EG channel services specified in this RFP by any other means. Determine that no EG channel will be activated and/or continued in operation. Waive or correct any defect or error in any proposal or proposal procedure or prior to

the deadline for submission of proposals modify the selection procedures for an EG channel administrator including deadlines for accepting proposals, the specifications for any services to be provided to the city or the requirements for contents or format of the proposals.

This isn't a proposal this is a gift from the city. We have to oversee this and we have to be a part of this and that's why I don't like about this RFP, but to say that our council and our solicitor signed onto this that's incorrect. It was only Attorney Kelly's signature on here.

And I'm happy see that the lights are back in action at Harrison and Mulberry Street. As we mentioned last week, the problem we are having with our signalization. I believe we received a letter this week from Roseanne Novembrino, city controller, to have a meeting this Friday with all of the interested parties, public works, Urban Electric and the city controller's office to go over some of those problems and I hope it's resolved at that

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point and maybe we could ask some of these other questions about the changing the lights, the LED's and stuff like that, but that's all I have at this time. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Loscombe.
Mr. Joyce, any comments or motions?

MR. JOYCE: Just a few brief comments. First I want to talk a little bit about the nonprofits again. To provide everyone with a brief update on my progression with the nonprofits, I was speaking with President Cook from Mercy Hospital. During our conversation he did inform that though Mercy Hospital does pay some taxes on some of their properties such as parking garages, after being informed of that by a CFO he does understand Scranton's situation.

Mr. Cook also informed that he has started to reach out and place calls to President Murphy from Moses Taylor Hospital as well as President Stegmeir from CMC, and in effort to possibly put together a joint contribution from all three hospitals to the city.

In the mean time, I'm also in the process of setting up a meeting with President Murphy hopefully at some time in October right now to discuss one of these issues as well, and just to reiterate, President Murphy is the president of Moses Taylor Hospital.

As I continue my efforts, I will continue to update you on a weekly basis as well. I am very much hoping that by working together hopefully the city can receive a contribution financially from the three hospitals in our city, and I think that would be a really great plus.

Secondly, I wanted to talk about the status of our audit. From the last update sent by Rossi & Rossi, and this was sent last week to our office, it's apparent that there is still some open issues with our audit and completing it. And just to provide a brief background, this is something that is supposed to be to done by May 31 as dictated by the Home Rule Charter and as Rossi & Rossi informs in their correspondence with us, they are still

waiting for the details of the entries posted on OECD records to explain the due to the city's general fund balance is \$517,814.20 whereas the city's general fund balance due from OECD is only \$254,932.33.

In addition to this, they are also waiting for some details supporting the police department's submissions to the Department of Justice for federal reimbursement for various grants.

With that in mind and considering that it is past mid-September now, and that is far past the May 31 deadline if you could send a correspondence to Mr. Renda from Council's Office just asking him if this is completed yet, if this information is provided, and when does he expect that it will be provided to Rossi & Rossi.

And finally, I have a few citizens' requests. First, a South Scranton resident has reported that a streetlight is out in the alley directly behind 1216 Stafford Avenue. The resident informed that they accessed the site where residents can report lights that are out, and for anyone at home

in case you don't know it's www.slout.com.

However, this resident has informed that they reported the pole number out, oh, about two weeks ago or so and that usually when they have reported issues like this in the past it was taken care of in a few days. So if, Mrs. Krake, you can send a letter to Mr. Kearns I'd greatly appreciate it just asking him if this is on their list and, you know, any reason for their delay because I know from experience when I first came onto council that's one of the first things that I sent out and Mr. Kearns was very great in that they fixed that within I think it was a one or two-day time frame from the date of the request.

Also, one final request, I have been informed by a member of the Iacavazzi family, and in case you don't know that's referring to Cosmo Iacavazzi, who is a legend at West Scranton High School that the street sign reading "Cosmo Iacavazzi Way" in front of the West Scranton High School on the right-hand side is down and it's been missing for a period of time now. And the

family had contacted me, so with this could we also send a letter to Mr. Brazil and ask him if the sign can be replaced or if he knows of it's whereabouts. I do not know why it was taken down or if it was just damaged or replaced. And that's all I have for tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Joyce.

MR. JOYCE: You're welcome.

MS. EVANS: Good evening. Prior to it's regularly scheduled meeting tonight city council conducted a public hearing on 2011 CDBG, HOME and ESG programs. Having heard public testimony, council will consider changes to the allocations proposed by the mayor and the Office of Economic and Community Development. Council is not in agreement with a number of these administrative proposal.

While we do fully intend to fund local social service agencies that provide essential help to the poor, the homeless, the elderly, battered women and children and the veterans of our community, our major priorities are the people's priorities.

Public safety, which includes allocations for the Scranton police and fire department, blight removal and renovations and street paving. We pledged to provide these I am profits to Scranton taxpayers during our 2009 election campaign and we will once again uphold our pledge to you.

Because a 30-day waiting period following a public hearing is required by federal statutes, the third and final reading of this legislation will occur and will include council's changes to allocations on Tuesday, October 26, 2010.

In the interim, I would like to make an additional request of Ms. Aebli for information. Please request the following information on behalf of council tomorrow, Mrs. Krake, in the form of a Right-to-Know request: What is the total dollar amount for UDAG? What dollar amount for UDAG funds will OECD realize in 2011 and 2012? Council is aware that the program was eliminated decades ago, yet, UDAG monies have remained available annually for at least the past nine years.

Also, council requests a detailed breakdown of program delivery costs for each grant to include the CDBG program, HOME investment program, ESG program, UDAG, and any and all other grants administered by the Scranton Office of Economic and Community Development from January 1, 2004, through October 18, 2010. The breakdown must also include an accounting of the use of each cost of program delivery.

Council is aware of the internal accounting system utilized by OECD and requests copies of documents included in this system for the aforementioned years to verify the information requested.

Next, after numerous written requests and telephone calls, council awaits the following legislation from the city legal department.

Number one, the 2011 update of the capital budget improvement plan of 2008 and fulfillment of the Home Rule Charter Section 904, capital budget. The council shall adopt a capital budget with or without amendments after the public hearing, but no

later than December 15 of the current fiscal year according to Section 906 of the Home Rule Charter. Therefore, the capital budget must be submitted to council on or before November 1, 2010, to establish 2010 compliance with the Home Rule Charter.

Second, the legislation for bidding of professional services which was requested by council over five months ago. Neither the mayor, former City Solicitor Patterson, nor current Solicitor Kelly have yet provided this legislation which will offer transparency and possible savings to the taxpayers and a level playing field to professionals and businesses.

The mayor went on record in April of 2010 stating that all professional services should be put out to bid. Since that time, however, he has failed to produce any action on his empty words.

Number three, the legislation for a rental registration officer which was requested by council over six months ago.

To date, neither the mayor, former Solicitor Patterson nor Solicitor Kelly have provided

the legislation to council. At the same time, a hole remains in the 2010 budget for rental registration revenue. Equally important, this failure to submit the legislation seemingly indicates that the administration does not intend to aggressively pursue rental registrations during fiscal year 2011. Not only does our city lose much needed revenue, but also our taxpayers and homeowners are denied protection from absentee landlords.

For nine months city council has demonstrated it's respect and cooperation by placing all of the mayor's legislation on it's agenda for consideration and adoption, by meeting with the mayor and various department heads and by following the procedures required by the mayor for submission of various requests among other actions.

As city council president, I believe it is long past time that the mayor and his administration cooperate with this city council to save tax dollars, lift the curtain of secrecy, level the playing field

for businesses and professionals and solve the neighborhood problems created by absentee landlords.

And as I look out in the audience I see one of tonight's speakers who provided us with a detailed account of her inability to obtain tapes of this building, security tapes or surveillance tapes, whatever one appropriately should call them, I remember last week another citizen telling us that a tape requested by him of the very same evening due to additional harassment was also not available because outdoor surveillance cameras were not working.

Perhaps this is a coincidence, but if it is, you know, I think any one of us would question what has been going on and it isn't something that I approve of and, Mrs. Krake, if we can send a letter to Mr. Renda and the mayor, council would like to know why Ms. Franus' tape was not provided, and it is interesting to see that very much like members of this council, at least four members of this council, that the taxpayers of the city also receive no

responses from the administration. I think that is most telling, unfortunately.

Finally, I have a few citizens'
requests for the week: Minooka residents
request the paving Penman Street and O'Neill
Street.

Dickson Avenue residents report
seeing numerous syringes in front of the
parking lot owned by Daron Northeast.
Please contact the appropriate city
departments and Daron Northeast to address
this issue.

Structures at 10 and 13 Olive Street were damaged by fire and are boarded up.

City residents ask to know when these houses will be demolished.

And please send a letter on behalf of Scranton City Council to the Scranton Parking Authority and the legal department of the city requesting legislation to approve the 2011 Scranton Parking Authority budget as per the Scranton Parking Authority prospectus, and that's it.

MR. JOYCE: As Chairperson for the

MR. ROGAN. Second.

MR. MCGOFF: Yes. I would like to once again to say that I am not in favor of the amendments -- the amendment that was made to the contract. A number of reasons, I have spoke with Ms. Aebli concerning this. It costs -- it costs OECD over \$2,000 to put in ad in the newspaper in June. contract is now going to be for \$25,000. That's like a 12 percent cost for running the ad which is really not very cost efficient, and the fact is that they will have to run that ad again in December when this contract does run out costing them another \$2,000 for the very same ad. I just don't think it makes economic sense to do that.

There was some objection made last week to the amount of money that was being spent, and I would like to reiterate that the money spent for solicitor is for all of the programs from OECD, not just the CDBG programs. I was provided with a file of all

of the expenses from January of 2010 to the present, all of these are things that are -- programs that are carried on through OECD, all of them are legitimate expenses, and the balance of funds for the solicitor even including the \$25,000 that is in this legislation will not be enough to -- probably will not be enough to provide the services of the solicitor for the remainder of the year at which time OECD will continue to operate and will need to services of the solicitor.

In the past, when the solicitors were not paid or when the solicitor did not receive funds they go over to the courthouse, receive a judgment from the Court, the Court orders the controller to okay the expenditure and the solicitor is paid anyhow. I don't think this should be necessary, I think we are doing a disservice in making this amendment to the legislation.

I'd like to also to point out that while we are talking about costs the escalating costs may have to do with the fact that there have been -- there has an

escalation in the amount of work through

OECD especially through the stimulus funding

last year.

The hourly rate for the solicitor in 2002 started at \$105 an hour, it's now \$110 per billing hour. Just to put in into some perspective, last week the school district approved a solicitor at \$160 per billing hour, so the hourly rate of the solicitor for OECD has not increased significantly, but the workload has increased significantly and, therefore, the added cost and the necessity of rebidding or redoing that contract. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: If I may, just quickly, like Mr. McGoff I have great concerns regarding cost efficiency, and as I noted last week, Mr. Greco's contract began at \$100,000 per year, it then increased to \$110,000 per year because he had begun using his allocations within his contracts before a fiscal year had concluded and so it was increased to \$110,000, then it was increased to \$125,000 per year for a part-time position.

And now we have for the very first time in 2010, as Mr. McGoff said, an advertisement to hire for an additional contract six months into a fiscal year for yet another \$125,000. So, ladies and gentlemen, we are basically talking about here at the pattern in which we are proceeding paying Mr. Greco a quarter of a million dollars a year for a part-time job.

Now, I understand there was stimulus funding involved in the Office of OECD and that caused an increased workload, however, it's important to note that a job was created in 2010 within OECD. Someone was hired specifically to handle all of the stimulus funding paperwork and responsibilities, although, I'm sure some of it does require the oversight or the recommendations of an attorney.

Nevertheless, I don't believe that
we should be paying a quarter of a million
dollars a year for a part-time position, and
I found that since last week citizens who
have contacted me, primarily senior citizens
on meager pensions and social security

payments that have not increased and working middle class families mothers and fathers who are working two jobs each just to eek by and borrow from Peter to pay Paul every month, they are asking me how anyone in the City of Scranton earns that much money for a part-time position. And they have asked me to remember this isn't Wall Street and it's not Washington D.C., and so I believe that council has taken the responsible action by trying to get that's costs under control.

Anyone else on the question?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I just wanted to add that I believe a \$2,000 investment for a new contract in the beginning of the year may result in some savings after all if we get some additional bids on the position.

Perhaps, you know, the bids will come in lower and we will recoup that \$2,000 plus, but I think it's worth a gamble because this seems to be a -- you know, a blank check every year. It's getting higher and higher as Mrs. Evans stated. It's too bad we couldn't just make a flat annual contract for the year, but it's professional services

and that's how they operate. But, you know, even attorneys have to try and be a little more fiscally responsible as everyone in the city is.

And I have nothing against

Mr. Greco, I just think, you know, he has to respect the feelings of everyone in this city, too, and realize what's going on here. I mean, that is a part-time position. He does have other income.

MR. ROGAN: I would like to echo what Mr. Loscombe just said. Last week I voted for Councilman Loscombe's amendment because it reduced the size of the contract from one year to the end of the year and it reduced the dollar amount, but even that \$25,000 from now to the end of the year there is some people in the City of Scranton who are making less than that in a 12-month period and in good conscience I just can't vote for it.

MR. MCGOFF: I just have to reiterate that -- well, two things. First of all, the cost, the yearly cost would not be \$250,000 because the contract if it had

been approved at one year would extend into 2011, it would not be dealing with 2010. The total cost would probably be closer to \$135,000 for the current year. It would be to cover probably the months of November and December of this year.

And the thing that needs to be understood is that work is going to continue at OECD. They are still going to need a solicitor. They are still going to need an attorney to work on the programs that are taking place through OECD. It's not like this is going to stop the solicitor from working. They need a solicitor, someone is going to be paid for doing this work, so one of way or another it's going to have happen which is why I think the amendment was fruitless because it really accomplishes nothing.

MS. EVANS: Well --

MR. LOSCOMBE: Could I just add one thing? If you recall last week, I read the statement here, by the end of -- by February 24 of last year, not even a full second month into the new contract, already 38

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percent of that fund was used up, so, I mean, conceivably it could be used before the end of the year. You don't know what's going to come up.

Well, in addition I know MS. EVANS: Mr. McGoff mentioned the fact that in December we'll have to rebid at cost of \$2,000. Well, if we can look at the historical evidence here of the contract we'll be bidding in March regardless. were to give Mr. Greco another \$125,000 now for October, November, December, January, February, March, in March this will be rebid again at a cost of \$2,000 for yet another \$125,000, so I think the point here is -well, for example, I cannot even ascertain clearly how Mr. Greco is paid. It seems to be through grant programs funded by HUD, by a flood control program, by various sources that still remain unclear to me.

MR. MCGOFF: That's not true.

MS. EVANS: Well --

MR. MCGOFF: All of his payments come out of the budgeted salary.

MR. EVANS: And the budgeted salary

1 is coming from where? MR. MCGOFF: From this legislation. 2 3 MS. EVANS: From HUD, from OECD or the operating budget? 4 5 MR. MCGOFF: From the operating budget. 6 7 MS. EVANS: From the operating budget. That -- that --8 9 MR. MCGOFF: I asked the question on your behalf. At that time, the city was informed that the foundation would take the request under consideration. The renovations to Weston Field are completed with the proceeds from the 2003 bond. Per discussion with representatives of the foundation, this request was tabled and delayed due to economic conditions at the time of the consideration.

In 2010, representatives of the foundation met with the mayor and recommitted their intention to assist the City of Scranton for improvements made to Weston Field. Subsequent to this meeting, the foundation sent a letter and grant agreement dated July 28, 2010, to fund this completed project."
