LOSCOMBE: Here. 9 MS. CARRERA: Mr. Joyce. MR. JOYCE: Here. 10 11 MS. CARRERA: Mrs. Evans. 12 MS. EVANS: Here. We have a 13 wonderful proclamation to present this 14 evening to a lovely group of ladies and Father Ferretti here from Sts. Peter and 15 Paul Church. 16 WHEREAS, the COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF 17 18 SCRANTON is desirous of honoring "STS. PETER AND PAUL CHURCH" located on the corner 19 20 of West Locust Street and 12th Avenue in 21 Scranton on the 100th anniversary of its 22 parish; and 23 WHEREAS, "STS. PETER AND PAUL 24 CHURCH" was founded on May 3, 1909 by Polish 25 Catholic immigrants of West Scranton who

walked through wooded fields to attend Mass at Sacred Hearts Church in South Scranton; and

WHEREAS, "STS. PETER AND PAUL
CHURCH" was organized by a group of about
thirty men who pioneered the formation of
the new parish and were granted permission
by the late Bishop Michael J. Hoban, D.D.
to begin construction. A contract was
signed on December 9, 2909 to build a
basement church at a cost of \$12,050.00; and

WHEREAS, "STS. PETER AND PAUL
CHURCH" appointed Reverend Jacob J.
Kowalewski, as the first pastor, and under
the director of the pastor, began building
an eight room parish school on November 6,
1913, and the Bernardine Sisters were
invited to teach the parish children.
Reverend Kowalewski also built the rectory
in 1910 at a cost of \$6,200.00; and

WHEREAS, "STS. PETER AND PAUL CHURCH" was built on the foundation of the original church at a cost of \$76,000.00.

The solemn dedication ceremonies were performed on June 29, 1941 by the late

Bishop William J. Hafey, D.D.; and

WHEREAS, "STS. PETER AND PAUL
CHURCH" has performed 5,980 Baptisms, 3,645
First Holey Communions, 2,000 Confirmations,
2,400 Matrimonies over the past century; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that on Sunday, October 17, 2010, "STS. PETER AND PAUL CHURCH" will celebrate it's 100th Anniversary. The anniversary celebration is a time of remembering and a time of joyous thanksgiving to Almighty God for His many blessings throughout the past ten decades. May He grant eternal light and peace to the clergy and faithful who have fallen asleep and many years to those who continue to labor in His Vineyard.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this
Proclamation dated Tuesday, October 12,
2010, be made a permanent part of the
Minutes of this Council, as lasting tribute
to "STS. PETER AND PAUL CHURCH", and it's
current pastor Reverend Samuel J. Ferretti,
parishioners, staff, and the Diocese of
Scranton.

FATHER FERRETTI: I would just like to say this is a great Honor for our parish. The City of Scranton was built by the immigrants that came here and they made the coal industry what it is and was which gave the City of Scranton a tremendous boost and saw it through it's early years, and so this is a great tribute to all of the men and women of that parish that have lived and worked in the City of Scranton, that have served in it's departments throughout the decades, so we thank you very much. a wonderful tribute and a thank you to those who are there today and those who are there yesteryear. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Dispense with the reading of the minutes, please.

3 - A . MS. KRAKE: MINUTES OF THE SCRANTON POLICE PENSION COMMISSION MEETING HELD ON AUGUST 25, 2010.

MS. EVANS: Are there any comments? If not, received and filed. Clerk's notes, please.

> MS. KRAKE: We have several clerk's

notes this evening. We have a response from Stu Renda from the Business Administration Office. We requested a copy of any and all permits issued to the University of Scranton that would comprise the \$2 million in revenue that was received by the city as per the administration. Stu Renda tells us due to the extensive nature of our request it will take him 30 days and that he will charging us 25 cents per page.

MR. JOYCE: Mrs. Krake, I was wondering would you be able to contact the BA's Office and ask if they could have an electronic copy provided to us so we don't incur that 25 cent per page expense.

MS. EVANS: Or perhaps the documents could be scanned.

MR. JOYCE: Yes.

MS. EVANS: In order to save that money.

MR. ROGAN: I don't see the point of the 25 cent per page fee. It's intercity, first floor to second floor.

MS. EVANS: Interdepartmental.

MR. ROGAN: I don't understand the

point of it. It's the taxpayers money any ways.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. ROGAN: We should get all of the information we request.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs. Krake.

MS. KRAKE: You are welcome. Next, we received a response which we sent to several departments, but the city controller's office did answer the response and they did it quite well actually. We had requested a list of all accounts that Attorney Carl Greco is being paid from and they copied all of the vouchers, except for the one year which was from OECD, so we pretty know the value of that anyway, the records from difficult to reach. A quick breakdown of that was there is approximately \$2 million better that we have paid out to Carl Greco since 2002.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs. Krake.

MS. KRAKE: And they are available in our office if anyone would like to review them.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MS. KRAKE: Also, we received a response today from Don King, city planner, concerning a cost for the stand alone comprehensive plan and revised zoning ordinance. His opinion is that it would be range from 100 to \$150,000.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: Next, we had a call late this afternoon from Linda Aebli, Director of OECD, we were surprised actually in our office that there were several requests from her that have gone unanswered, and so told us that she would be answering them tomorrow.

MS. EVANS: Very good.

MS. KRAKE: We have unanswered from the mayor's office concerning suspicious activities in the Nativity Church parking lot.

Also, we have unanswered from

Attorney Kelly the request I believe was

Mrs. Schumacher concerning the lease period

for the Ice Box.

MS. EVANS: Can we send a Right-to-Know on that, please?

1 MS. KRAKE: Yes. MS. EVANS: I think it's important 2 3 that we get to the bottom of this so that the city hopefully sooner than later can 4 5 receive it's \$600,000 that it was due. MS. KRAKE: 6 Thank you. We received 7 one response from License and Inspections. 8 Actually, last week's meeting the director 9 was listening and they apparently went right 10 out and replaced the condemned property sign 11 on 403 North Decker Court. 12 MS. EVANS: Very good. 13 MS. KRAKE: But we also have six 14 letters that have gone unanswered from that 15 department. 16 MS. EVANS: We'll put those in the 17 file. MS. KRAKE: I'm sorry? 18 19 MS. EVANS: Make sure these go into the file. 20 MS. KRAKE: Yes. 21 From Director 22 Brazil we have seven requests, some are 23 second and third and fourth requests that 24 have gone unanswered. 25 We have a second request to Gene

Barrett concerning the catch basins and asking them to be cleared of debris to prevent additional flooding during the fall that has gone unanswered, and another second request concerning the intersection of Spruce and Adams Avenue that has gone unanswered.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mrs. Krake, just this afternoon I received an e-mail from Mr. Skeleton from the Sewer Authority and he does have a list of catch basins here that they had taken care of prior to the last rain. September 30 and October 1 there have been crews out from 5:30 a.m to 6:30 p.m., and there is quite a list here, so we will check it out and make sure the ones that you had on the list were taken care of, so I just wanted to let you know. Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: Thank you. And I believe Councilman Joyce will be reporting on the 888 money?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. I will.

MS. KRAKE: And that's all we have for this meaning.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Do any

council members have announcements at this time?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I have a couple quick ones. There will be a "Make a Difference Day Breakfast" pancake and sausage, which is donated by Friendly's in Dunmore, benefits the St. Francis of Asissi Kitchen. MR. SPINDLER: After hearing that presentation from PEL, Mrs. Evans, I feel a little ill myself. I didn't hear the whole presentation, but I saw most of it, and according to what I saw it's just going to hurt a lot of the taxpayers in this city, the elderly, people such as myself that live paycheck to paycheck. I don't know how we are going to make it. They want to raise taxes, they want to cut public services unions, we can't afford it, as you said. Violent crime is going up in this city, you know, our firefighters are doing the best they can. We can't afford to lose anymore of them, and then they want to raise the refuse from \$178 to \$215. They want to raise the parking fees. As someone who works in town I see from last year's budget the fees that were raised, not as many people park in town. If they raise it anymore nobody is going to come to this city

It's safe to say these two people that were here tonight don't live in the city because I don't think they care about

the residents of this city.

Moving on, I'm happy to report that after the last meeting I attended two weeks ago Brian Swanson called me the next day and after work we met at the Lackawanna Avenue Bridge and he also brought an engineer from PennDOT.

MS. EVANS: Oh.

MR. SPINDLER: And they explained everything to me they said the cracks in the bridge are called expansion cracks and he says that happens in concrete, so I was glad they explained that to me, and he said so that doesn't happen sometimes they will actually put -- cut cracks in the concrete themselves, so I thought that was great that he met me the next day.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. SPINDLER: And too bad not all of the department heads in this city weren't at cooperative as Mr. Swanson was.

Moving on, three articles in last
week's Dougherty newsletter caught my
interest. The one was firefighters' safety
focus of city move. It's about buying these

things that they can detect high voltage lines, but it says, "The National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health conducted a study and recommended in March of 2009 that these devices be purchased."

That's approximately a year and a half ago and now we are just looking into purchasing these things? What took so long? And they said they probably won't have them until the end of in year. I can't believe it took that long and it was recommended in March of 2009 and now they are just getting to do this.

MS. EVANS: I agree.

MR. SPINDLER: They said they didn't have the money, maybe if they took the money they are throwing out on putting the visitors center up out zoo they could have bought these a long time ago.

Next thing, "Arbitrator rulings upheld with the city police unions," and as I heard before that the city is going to appeal that again and as you took the words right out of my mouth, Mrs. Evans, what I was going to say that the only people

getting rich are the high priced attorneys and the taxpayers of this city are suffering.

Lastly, I think that was in Sunday's paper, "Blocks sitting empty. The 500 block of Lackawanna."

I don't know how many millions of dollars they put into that and it's sitting empty and the only two businesses that are thriving in that block they are two of the longest standing businesses in the city and they were excluded from this project, Buona Pizza and --

MS. EVANS: Coney Island.

MR. SPINDLER: Coney Island, thank you. I had a memory lapse that for a minute. It's very sad for all of the money that went into that block and it's sitting empty, and I commented about this before, what they did to that street is ridiculous. Taking away a lane and putting whatever they call that in the middle to put light posts there and I said if it comes rush hour and an emergency vehicle has to get up that street they won't be able to.

Lastly, Mr. Loscombe mentioned about the catch basins, historically when we get heavy rain where Luzerne Street meets

Meridian Avenue where Burger King is that floods all of the time and, unfortunately, last time my daughter fell victim to that.

She was driving out in a storm and she didn't see the water there and her car got stuck and I think it's totaled, had to get towed away.

MR. JOYCE: That's ashame.

MR. SPINDLER: So maybe -- I don't know what can be done, but it seems that nothing has been done about that area there. As I said, it floods all of the time. Maybe something could be tried to get done about that. That's all I have tonight. Thank you for your time.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Spindler.

Dave Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton and member of the Taxpayers'.

I'd also like to comment, I didn't see the whole thing, I'll have to record it, it's very interesting what some of these people

think, PEL thinks people are going to pay.

I put my money where my mouth is. This shirt was bought at the mall. These jeans were bought at Tuck's. Sneakers were bought at the mall. The jacket I wore, it's out in the hall, that was bought at Tuck's. So, you know, ten cents or 25 cents per ten minutes, I'm surprised that the local merchants weren't down here with a lynching party for them. I mean, that's just crazy considering that you can drive anywhere else and just park for free and spend whatever time you wanted down there.

And I saw something in the Times that's of some concern, this charter school issue, if anybody read the article or if you have the ability to look it up on the computer you should because it's atrocious. I, myself, I don't support private school and I think that the citizens and parents should start to make public school work and if somebody wants to teach something else they -- they could go to religion classes or whatever, we used to go for two hours a day or whatever or two hours a week to a class

with our parents' approval, but these charter schools are going to cost way more than the public school system and the study was out last week 37 percent of them or something like that are worse and 15 percent are better, so where is the beat?

I mean, it's just -- I don't -- I absolutely do not support any further deviation from the public school system. I think it's time that we make the public school system work and get parents involved and call them in on it and they should start to -- because it's their kid's future, but what will happen is, you know, that some of these schools are tracking \$20,000 a year for students. That's a lot of money.

That's double what the average is. It's \$670 billion dollars annually our spent on grades kindergarten through 12th grade.

This week in the paper, I'd like to thank Wal-Mart for the \$100,000 contribution, but I'd also like to note, this is older information, but Bill Jackowitz and I discussed it, he used to work for them and they actually used to

counsel their employees as to how much public welfare they could receive, free medical coverage for their kids and so forth, and how many programs if they went to work for Wal-Mart because their wages were so low they would -- they could apply for certain state subsidies and receive them. That to me is shameful.

So once again, it's like I said, they donated \$100,000 for improvements at Nay Aug Park, and that's wonderful, but the bottom line is people have to be able to learn a living and they shouldn't have to be supported by the taxpayer if they are working a 40 or 50 hour work week.

And once again, at the risk of boring, the US Chamber of Commerce it's out now, they are accepting foreign funds and paying their bills with that and donating lots of money to attack ads and so forth. I would like to give the three bawk, bawk, bawk this week for their activities. It's ashame why should somebody even be potentially accepting money from the Republic of China to influence American

elections.

And finally, I mentioned last week I got involved with the radio station that is trying to be constructed WFTE and I have tickets available for October 22, 9 p.m., it's Stone Elephant, and 415 Lackawanna Avenue, and the tickets are \$10. It's going to be five band concert, so hopefully we will be able to raise enough money to get an antenna up some day and we only have a few months, so if it works, great. If it don't, well that's the way it is, but they only have a few months left on the license to get enacted and get on the air, so thank you and have a good night.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.
Fay Franus.

MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus, Scranton.

I'd like to ask who has the responsibility

of keeping PEL here? Is that the state?

MS. EVANS: I'm not quite sure. I'm sure the state has some involvement in it and the city as well.

MS. FRANUS: Does somebody in the city? Do they have the right to get rid of

these people because I think they should be gone. They were here to get rid of the distressed status, I believe. I'd like to know what they have done for the city other than taking money from taxpayers to pay them. I don't get it.

And if you noticed up on that screen how they said quickly how to get rid of the deficit, real estate tax 22 percent increase, a garbage fee, that's preposterous because why should we take care of the mayor's hiring of all of his friends, big pay raises for jobs that were created. I mean, we have to pay all of the things that he did wrong. This makes no sense at all.

MS. EVANS: Well, I think, if I may--

MS. FRANUS: Sure.

MS. EVANS: -- just interrupt. One point among several with which I do not agree with PEL on is the fact that the past 18 years do have a bearing on this situation. The last eight years they do have a bearing on this situation. As you know, PEL was insisting that we focus on

where we are today, but an 18-year history of distressed status bespeaks failed leadership, failed leadership that is well-paid to enable the city to remove a distressed status, yet after 18 years here we are and from what I have heard this evening, I think we could say we are probably looking at another 18 years.

So I don't know that I can say that the Pennsylvania Economy League has accomplished anything in the City of Scranton other than, you know, the obvious which is a continued structural deficit and their blessings on the amassing of monumental debt.

MS. FRANUS: Well, you notice where they were approving of the police and firemen board, how they sided with the city, go figure? I mean, I think these people should be absolutely gone and I hope to gosh that you don't oppose any of these fees.

You know, years ago, and not that many years ago, our taxes paid for the garbage. Now, my garbage men and the garbage they are wonderful, they are the

best guys in the world and I love them and they do a great job, but our taxes used to pay for that. So then all of a sudden I think it was that we got a firemen arbitration or policemen arbitration from years back that the city couldn't afford to pay, so they decided to create this fee, garbage fee. I think we should get rid of the garbage fee because what are we paying our taxes for?

I mean, we could sit here all day long and talk about this but nothing ever happens for the taxpayers and we have to swallow all of this stuff. Like you said, Mrs. Evans, senior citizens aren't getting a tax increase with their social security this year, myself being one much them. I'm not struggling like many people are, but I know many people will be. They can't do this.

I just hope that you can do something for us now with this PEL Recovery Plan and, if you can, not approve it, absolutely do not give them what they ask for. And, like you said, where were they all of these years? They were shaking Mayor

Doherty's hand saying, "Great job. Let's keep it this way. Keep us here as long as we can because we are getting paid to do this. We are getting paid to keep you distressed. We won't have a job if you don't."

So please, please do not reward these people or do anything they want you to do. I don't even know why they are asking you to do. They are asking you to put the burden on the taxpayers and not holding the mayor responsible for anything that he has done to cause this deficit. All of the borrowing, all of the raises in his friend's pockets, yet he wants the taxpayers to pay for that with real estate tax and the garbage fee.

Please put your foot down and say no to these people and please if you can't get rid of them?

MS. EVANS: Well --

MS. FRANUS: They are not doing anything for us. They didn't speak up when they should have.

MS. EVANS: What I can tell you

right now is that council will not be introducing, considering or adopting a revised Recovery Plan in this current fiscal year because there are too many circumstances that are unsettled that would have a tremendous financial impact on the plan, and so council prefers to wait until such time as we have a far more accurate financial picture of the city, but even at this time you can be sure that this council is going to do it's level best to protect and to help the taxpayers of the Scranton.

What was said tonight is PEL's proposal, it is not city council's proposal and it does not mean in any way city council agrees with everything that was proposed this evening. I know that I, myself, certainly do not.

MS. FRANUS: Considering that they have never done one thing for the city in all of these years I don't know why you even have them here. Why would you even entertain their words?

I read in the paper that if you didn't go along with this there would be

sanctions, so I hope you are not pushed into the position that you don't have a choice but to approve this Recovery Plan because as far as I'm concerned this last Recovery Plan it wasn't good. Why do we need one? What kind of sanctions were they speaking of when they said sanctions, do you know?

MS. EVANS: It would be -- I believe sanctions would involver withholding of some state grants, perhaps state monies. I don't know in what amount or in what category, but, you know, the sad fact of life is the city went distressed 18 years ago, I don't believe that ever should have occurred, and as a result we, among numerous other municipalities throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, are weighed down by an albatross called the Pennsylvania Economy League, and my advice to any other city entertaining or Borough or Township entertaining entry into Act 47 would be to think very long and very carefully because you are going to take a step that can effect decades --

MS. FRANUS: Here we are.

MS. EVANS: -- into the future the population of your city and the future populations of your city and, you know, the point of that is once you get in it's nearly impossible to get out. Very few cities have been released by DCED and Pennsylvania Economy league or an organization that is similar to them, very few have been released and have got their distressed status lifted.

MS. FRANUS: Do you see any hope for the citizens, I mean, considering that we are so far in debt? Do you see the light at the end of the tunnel?

MS. EVANS: I do, frankly, it's not going to come swiftly, but I do see a light.

MS. FRANUS: Would I be alive?

MS. EVANS: I do see it though in actions that are different from what is being proposed by the Pennsylvania Economy League.

MR. JOYCE: And I just want to comment, too, I agree with the comment that Councilwoman Evans made, you do have to focus on the past in some regards in order to know where you want to go in the future

which is to eventually -- to have Scranton 1 2 not become a distressed city you have look 3 at the past, you have to look at what we have done that wasn't right and to me 4 personally I -- personally, I don't see 5 raising the garbage fee, raising the parking 6 7 meter fees and raising taxes as the end all 8 be all answer and it's certainly not a very 9 friendly act on the taxpayers and the 10 taxpayers of this city simply cannot afford 11 those types of increases, just to share my 12 opinion on that. 13 MS. FRANUS: Thank you very much. Ι 14 appreciate your help. 15 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Anyone else? 16 Hi, Chrissy. 17 MR. JOYCE: Hi, Chrissy. I bet 18 you're excited about West Side. 19 MR. never hear anyone saying about the 25 million that they spent in raises and new hires. That's 25 million in nine years. Police and fire got nothing, but yet they want to cut the police and fire.

The business administrator not too long ago said that it's \$87,000 per fire employee a year. Mr. Cross is saying \$67,000. Who is right? And when they cut the firemen whose fire houses are going to be closed? I can hear everyone saying "Not mine."

Talking about the tip fee from \$178 to \$215 a year, we paid twice for garbage, we are already paying twice. We are paying our real estate taxes.

The Parking Authority or the parking meters to 25 cents for ten minutes instead of 15. 2007 there was a \$35 million loan or bond and the payback on that 35 million is 94 million. 59 million in interest, 59 million interest.

The institutions, the PILOTS, enrich the city. Yes, they do in a way, but what about when they take tax rolls off the -- or

properties off the tax roles. Taxpayers have to make it up. We are the ones making it up.

The real estate tax increase, 21
percent. 21 percent. They never recalled
that 25 percent that we had a few years ago.
They never brought that back, so that's
going to be 21 percent on top of that 25
percent. Nine, almost ten and a nine.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Ancherani, if you remember a few years back when PEL was before council in a public caucus they proposed a 75 percent tax increase, 25 percent basically over a three-year period, now, we have already had a 25.6 percent tax increase and Mr. Rogan said to me during the break tonight that the percentages proposed for 2011, 12, 13 and 14, approximate 50 percent. There is your 75 percent, so it's exactly the story that we heard several years ago. You know, we have already handed over the first third and now we are looking at the remaining two-thirds.

MR. ANCHERANI: And it seems like they keep bringing up that it's tax increase

that's needed. What about cutting costs and spending in the expenditures? What about how much money we paid professional services for attorneys with Right-to-Know letters we would know and there has been a lot of money spent on outside attorneys. I believe one of them that was fighting us, fighting the police or fire, got over a million already. That's a lot of money. That's a lot of money.

Mr. McGoff left, but he was wondering last week if we were going to have our annual coffee bet. There were three things that I would predict, tax increase, loans or borrowing, they also brought that up, PEL, and a record budget. I'd love to lose, I'd love to have to buy him three coffees, that would be nice, that would be good for us taxpayers.

Mr. Cross answered the question to me after -- at the end of the caucus where in the 2002 Recovery Plan did it authorize the Office of the Director of Public Safety in the plan, what particular page? There is no particular page. What it is, is that it

was put in the budget in 2002 or '03, and that's what brought it in, so whatever you want to put in the budget, evidently, the budget makes it right, so you can think about that.

MS. EVANS: And as you just said though, by placing it in the budget at that time that was done in violation of the plan.

MR. ANCHERANI: Right. Right.

MS. EVANS: And it stood.

MR. ANCHERANI: Right.

MS. EVANS: For many years up until 2010.

MR. ANCHERANI: And on page 64 there is also more violations of the plan, that Recovery Plan. There was only supposed to so much spent for raises for all of the departments and they spent over. And each of the next two years they spent over, so there was three violations right there of that plan.

Everybody keeps saying 18 years that we have had a Recover Plan. This is the 19th year, so -- and two other fast things.

Just a reminder with the leaves falling

neighbors living around the storm drains if you can please clear them away and any news on the audit yet?

MS. EVANS: Well, we did receive an update in the last week I believe that there is still some -- some final paperwork that has to be done and then an exit conference that has to be conducted before it will come to city council, but again, here we are October, and it will probably be November once again, and I just want to make clear as I have so much times in the past, this is not fault of the auditor, rather, it is the fault of the city authorities and the city administration.

MR. ANCHERANI: Thank you.

MS. HUMPHRIES: Is beyond these doors heaven? I have a question to ask everyone, Mr. McGoff I should have sat in his place up there. I think he was leaving it there for me. I was told by her that there is complaints that I shouldn't talk because I'm not being a City of Scranton. I have PO box number. I was ran out of the

City of Scranton and I have questions to ask every one of yous.

One question first, I'll ask you altogether and you can say yes or no. When you were running for the political reason to help us and protecting us and making the betterment of the city and all cities, all of the little towns do come here and I'm sure every one of yous spoke in a podium in Eynon, in Jermyn, in Mayfield, in Carbondale and in Olyphant, all of the way up the line. Tell me, when you were speaking did they run you off the podium, I would like to know or did you have your freedom of speech?

MS. EVANS: I can answer that, Phyllis.

MS. HUMPHRIES: Yes.

MS. EVANS: When I was seeking office I spoke at events, for example, like a debate or an interview that were prearranged and I was invited to, but I never -- I never spoke at a council meeting or a school board meeting, you know --

MS. HUMPHRIES: Yes. I do. PO Box 465 Scranton. I cover everything, God covered everything. I'm going to come back and bring you something up, and I want to bring it to the City of Scranton, it's a gift. We are all gifts. I promised visual arts would be shown and the people that says they don't like religion, well, guess what, this is religion here, honey. Damaged Don't tread on me. This is here. flags. it represents something. The flowers are for the unborn. I hope we do become -- this child, this is lit up, this lights up, this lights up in the dark, but there something I do want to show you.

This little child, I got my diabetic things in here, oh, my God. This little child came to my house and then I can see him, I wanted to be, and I didn't see him yet, two weeks ago. He is mentally challenged so there was a scale and I was reading religious articles and this was in front of his house. You can run your hands across it, and what I pointed and what you are seeing it's in here.

It lights up. We are to be the light of Jesus Christ in the City of Scranton and every place. I want you to look at this, contemplate. To some it will be a statute, some it will be an idol, but more it's the symbol of the word of God because there is things in the inside of here, and I want you to examine it, and I ask you, Mr. Joyce, if you hold the rosary up would you please see that it's taken to

the Bishop to be seen in obedience. If you don't want to, I will do it myself.

I haven't abandoned the City of Scranton nor will I ever, ever ever. God bless yas and I'll see you next

week.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else that would like to address council?

MR. ELLMAN: My pants are falling down, boy, that would be -- Council, last week a friend of mine told me that I was out of order talking about the Steve Corbett and so forth. I think what was out of order was the way his show spews forth all of this filth on those that oppose him and certainly Mr. DeNaples and Mr. Marino don't need anyone to defend them, certainly not Ronnie Ellman, but these two men probably do more the first couple of minutes after they wake up every morning than Steve Corbett has ever done for this city and this county and this state the rest of his life, and there won't be no more said about that.

Now, I guess I'll get back to these greedy deadbeat parasites that are eating up our tax base. The Scranton Club sold for \$700,000, they owned it 30 or 35 years why can't we go after them for some money? If they -- if they was a bunch of phoneys that's a good example.

You know, I think you five people need Mr. Hughes to really go into the qualifications to be tax exempt. There must be hundreds of them and between the city and the county and they are supposed to be investigated every four years and reviewed and they are supposed to -- supposed to have a product.

Last week this Paul Mansour bought two more pieces of property for \$220,000 that were on the tax rolls condemned for this Lackawanna Institute. The Lackawanna Institute has I think 13 or 14 pieces of property right now that nothing is being done with it. They don't do nothing. don't -- they're just not on the tax rolls The Woolworth site he has 13 or 14 anymore. years and not a thing is being done with it. You know, if that's not a tax cheat I don't know what it is. If that's not a phony company that is taking the money away from the people of this city I just don't understand why can't he be challenged?

Why can't you council challenge this man or any of these phoneys, and the place

is full of them? You've got some kind of authority to do something. All he does is plant a couple of trees, we could have a tree service out there cheaper than having 16 pieces of property off the tax rolls. He ought to be investigated, you know, but you people -- I know when I am mad about the University, you have been dealing with a priest that lies and that must be an obstacle to start with.

I noticed last week I said that the mayor was bragging we got \$2 million out of a \$20 million project, the paper a couple of weeks, I think it was in May, said it was \$33 billion project. You see, they brag one way but when they pay it goes the other way.

I know my time is up, but I've had a very knowledgeable businessman tell me that the Recovery Plan is just a complete waste, it's a failure, and I think somebody as knowledgeable and successful tells you that somebody needs to pay some attention and maybe there is a Plan B out there, you know, because all of these years this plan has failed. It's failed us miserably. Instead

of going after these multi-million dollar businesses like the University of Scranton I sat there and listened raise this, raise that, raise something else.

If they did away with the parking meters and all but six or eight people and the truck and the office and the pensions and the benefits and the salaries, not the parking lots, but that part of it, it would save more money than the parking meters bring in. I was told this by someone from the city. It was ten years ago, eight, ten years ago. There is all kinds of ways, you know, things that aren't being done.

You want to save some money get rid of Austin Burke for crying out loud. I have looked at it with my son on his computer you go back 30 or 35 years there isn't a thing in the world positive that they have done for this city. Go look you yourself on a computer. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MS. KRAKE: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

MOTIONS.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Rogan, do you have any comments or motions?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you. Just a few brief comments about PEL's presentation. I would like to express my opposition to much of what was included in the revised Recovery Plan. Just to sum it up, what's included in the packet they gave us is just cut police, cut fire protection, increase the garbage fee and increase taxes.

Now, last time when PEL was here they told us that the revised Recovery Plan would mirror the 2011 budget, but council has not received the mayor's budget, we have not comprised our amendments yet, so how do they know -- how can they mirror the 2011 budget when it hasn't even been put together yet?

Again, a 50 percent property tax increase over four years and the people of Scranton cannot afford it. You know, the people who do have jobs are strapped for cash and unemployment in the 11th congressional district is the highest in the

state, Scranton being part of that district.

Secondly, I would just like to make a comment about health care costs and about Mercy Hospital. I try not to talk about national issues so much at the meetings, but Mr. Cross said that the health care expenditures will be going up 10 percent year over year, and I don't dispute his numbers at all, and also the other part of it, and his numbers are correct, he is a number's guy, we are people persons up here. We have to look out for the people. know, it's easy to say, "We are going to raise taxes, we are going raise the garbage fee, we're going to cut police and cut fire," on paper that sounds real easy to do. When you go out and talk to the people in the neighborhoods who are worried about crime, who are worried about keeping their homes, that's where it becomes difficult and, you know, we have to look out for the people. We are not just looking at numbers on a sheet of paper we are looking at people.

But getting back to health care,

when the Health Care Reform Bill passed we were told that, you know, employers would see reductions in costs. That's not happening and, you know, one of my concerns is that now Mercy Hospital is being put up for sale and for over 100 years the City of Scranton has had a Catholic hospital within it's city limits. Now because of the -- the hospital officials say because of the Health Care Reform Bill it's being put up for sale. Well, that's all I'm going to say about that.

And next I have a two citizen's requests: One was for a specific citizen, but I think it applies to a lot of other people with the big rainstorm yesterday, and I have received multiple calls and e-mails from people all over the city that have had problems with, you know, storm water in their neighborhoods, different roads being blocked off because of the storm water and on Cameron Avenue, which we have been talking about for quite some time now, I had received some pictures on my phone last night and that road was so flooded the

person had pictures of their yard, the backyard, and nobody should have to live like that in this city, and his request was that we would ask Mr. Brazil to come in for a caucus, and not only specific to his issue, about if anybody else has a issue with flooding in other parts of the city, so if that's agreeable with other members?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. ROGAN: If we can work it into our schedule and get Mr. Brazil in here.

MS. EVANS: Absolutely.

MR. ROGAN: I have one other request, a residents report a deplorable condition of the 900 and 1400 block of South Webster Avenue. They state that even though the road is being repaired temporary pave cuts should remain so the road is passable while under construction. Apparently they are not being monitored and residents report they fear damage to their vehicles or loss of control of their vehicles while traveling over the street.

And I have a few comments on the Crisp Avenue Bridge, but I'll hold that

until we get to that point. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

Mr. Loscombe, do you have any comments or motions at this time?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you,

Mrs. Evans. I apologize for not being here last week because I was little bit under the weather, feeling much better now, but I do -- I have a list of people I still have to return some calls to. Believe it or not, as Mr. Rogan said, we are called on a daily basis, e-ailed and everything and I just got a bit behind since I wasn't feeling good so those of you who didn't hear back me by the end of this weekend you will all have heard from me so stand tight.

And Mr. Rogan just mentioned about a meeting with Mr. Brazil, I was just wondering if we can also include our city engineers since he's a big part of our structural drainage program, so if we could do that. Also.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Also, I want to talk on PEL. It's no big surprise to me their

remedies. I think we could have all just filled in the blanks. Raise the taxes, raise the fees, parking, garbage, and cut services. You know, they sold the last Recovery Plan to the voters on the basis of a tax increase that didn't go through, and what happened after it was in? It went through 25 percent tax increase and now looking at one of the resolutions they are looking at another 50 percent, as Mrs. Evans said.

When this plan came in initially they went after public safety. The fire department was reduced by 50 at that time and that was supposed to be the big savings, that was supposed to bring our city back. Here it is 18 years later not only 50 men, but I believe there is at least eight to ten men short right now that he hasn't put in, he wants to cut some more -- or they want to cut some more, which impacts or public safety, increase our taxes, and in the mean time, I think Mr. Ancherani had the figures, is the amount of money invested in administrative salaries and positions.

You know, I come from the other side, but I believe, yes, we need administrators, but we need the people to arrest the crooks that are out there on the streets. We need the people to pick up the garbage. We need the people to man our offices in the city hall here. We need the people to put the fires out. That's what we are paying our taxes for.

And that's something, again, there is so many items we could have made this a four-hour meeting here with a questions, Mrs. Evans hit on quite a few important points, but they have stood idly by at least the last nine years while violations were continued under this plan, but yet the prior mayor got spanked because he violated the plan and, you know, their answer is if we don't approve of it or whatever we are going to hit with sanctions.

Well, I don't know what more sanctions we can get hit with right now. I don't think they are giving any more grants or money out. I think 18 years of distressed cities DCED, PEL, they should

have been working harder rather than fighting arbitrations and appeals, and again, Mrs. Evans touched on this, to find more creative innovative ways to bring revenue into the city. They mentioned a couple of items there, but those are studies they did or reports. They should have enough influence themselves and they could get all of the other distressed cities together to work on some of these issues.

It appears that they are missing the ball on that. Their answer is continuously raise fees, raise taxes. You know, we can't and I don't want to see anybody's services cut by one person, whether it be garbage, fire, police or clerical. They are the ones that are in the -- in these buildings and on the streets 24 hours a day protecting you, the taxpayers. It's time we have to look at creative revenues and we have to -- another big thing, and it was mentioned again here tonight, we have to real in the authorities to some degree. We are on the hook for a lot of money. The Parking Authority, I mean, down the road and it's starting

already, you are going to see Sewer

Authority bills coming in. A lot of loans.

A lot of big money out there. And there is not a lot of government grants available.

A lot of this stuff should have been looked at in the past 18 years not today. They haven't even looked at what's going to happen when these arbitration awards come through. That's not even in their proposed budget here.

All I'm saying is we have a hefty job ahead of us here and I believe all of us here are going to do it. We are going to work on it and we are going to present the plan that's going to be beneficial to everyone in this city with the people in this city in mind, not people that we owe or we want to take care of, the people we are going to take care of here is you, the citizens of this city, and that's all I have to say on PEL. Just stay tune for future meetings with PEL.

It was mentioned again, and again, we have had some heavy rains again. We have had some situations where there has been

flooding incidents, some of them seem to appear in the same areas all of the time.

As I mentioned two weeks ago, I have been in meetings with Representative Murphy's Office, Tom Tell, the staff director there has been holding meetings, and I spoke to him today, as a matter of fact on the phone, and he is a little disappointed. Some things haven't been done and that's why we are going to meet with Mr. Brazil and the city engineer because some of it falls back on the city. We have also worked through the state and the Sewer Authority on different issues.

But again, some of these are recurring problems and one of them, apparently the parts were ordered several weeks ago, so I will have to contact the Sewer Authority and see what the status is because that was another problem last night. There is other areas such as Laurel Street where there is standing water. I mean, this problem has been there for years and it was -- when George Parker was the engineer he recommended something to the city at that

time, it still hasn't been done so I'm going to bringing that up with the engineer and Mr. Brazil when I speak to them on that.

These people have been living with these problems for years.

Let's see, Bulwer Street the project was completed. 32 of Oak Avenue, the city contacted the constituent, but no resolution has been mentioned, No solution has been mentioned. This is an e-mail I received from Representative Murphy's Office from Tom Tell, who we have been working with on these issues.

The 32 of Birney Avenue we all went out there and we met on the situation. I went out there after the -- the last several rains and apparently it appears that the problem is resolved at this point. I'm not saying it can't come back, it was a matter of cleaning some situations out there, some drains and that.

15 of Luzerne, that's the one I mentioned that they are waiting for a part for the Sewer Authority for 15th Street.

They plan on putting a cross grade across

15th street to stop the water from flowing across into the residents. The fire trucks were there pumping last night a couple of residents on Luzerne Street at the end of 15th Street.

Kosek Avenue, real bad, real rough conditions, we are going to see about -- getting the potholes filled and some blacktop there. The residents have put up with that for quite awhile.

Let's see here, again, North Cameron Avenue. There's a hole big section of Keyser Valley there and it appears that there is no storm drains on the upper side of Keyser Avenue on any of the side streets so everything is rolling right across Keyser Avenue, down into Cameron Avenue, Merrifield Avenue into Dewey Avenue. They had the Linde Creek flood project done several years ago, they just -- the DPW had just completed I believe it was the 4 and 500 blocks of North Cameron Avenue, they ran some underground drainage, but this is lower and everything is still coming in here and, you know, a frequent speaker here, I know there

is a retired police officer, his basement is flooded every time we have a heavy rain like we did last night and it's just getting -- these people are getting frustrated.

We have to come up with a resolution for that the state is working on something on Keyser Avenue and they are going to widen it and everything, but that might be a year or two away. We have to come up with some immediate solutions, and that's also going to be discussed.

Watson and Smith Place in West Side, another area, again, lack of manholes. And Luzerne and Meridian which is notorious down at the bottom there, bottom of the hill by Burger King, that place. That's another perennial problem and it actually goes down lower on Luzerne Street a lot of people their yards get flooded down below.

I mean, these are situations that I think with the meeting of the minds, the engineer and our Department of Public Works and the Sewer Authority, whatever, we could all work together and resolve these, at least give the people that live in these

areas some peace of mind after all of these years, and that's all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Loscombe, could I add to that list?

MS. EVANS: A report that I received

MR. LOSCOMBE: Sure.

today it's the intersection of Fisk Street and North Washington Avenue, a property on the corner was flooded last night during the rainstorm and a number of the homes on Fisk Street have had not only property flooding but basement flooding as well. I believe in the past, within the last year very likely, the Sewer Authority was up there and they did a little bit of work, you know, maybe cleaned out the storm drains and etcetera and it helped for awhile, but we were told at the time that one of the root causes of this is coming from Marywood University, and something was supposed to have -- I can't recall right now, something was supposed to have occurred eventually in terms of the University to try to alleviate that flooding problem. So when you are -- when you together with Mr. Swanson and Mr. Brazil and

Mr. Tell, you know, if that can once again be looked into and if maybe you could remind Mr. Swanson about that. He may actually recall what the situation was with Marywood University and that particular area that's getting all of this flooding and runoff.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Okay. I'll take care of that. Also, I just cut off a little too quick, I did want to say, you know, the prior rain storms I had been out there, DPW had their crews, I saw them hand digging some of the manholes and moving the stuff away, trying to clear the leaves, they were spread pretty thin, they were doing the best they could, and I applaud them for their effort.

And also as I related, Gene Skeleton from the Sewer Authority had sent me this list of basins that they had cleaned prior to that rain storm, the week before last, but again, these might be temporary solutions. We have to come up with a permanent solution and eliminate all of this extra work, eliminate a lot of problems for people because a lot of these people their

insurance doesn't cover the damage, so it's devastating. So I just hope we can come up with, you know, we work together and we can come up with some resolutions for the benefit of our residents, and that's it. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Loscombe.

Councilman Joyce, do you have any comments
or motions at this time?

MR. JOYCE: Just a few. As

Mrs. Krake explained earlier, I would be
commenting on the 888 funds tonight. As you
may know, two meetings ago I sent a request
to the tax office for a breakdown of the
\$557,000 that was sent from the tax office
to the city that was allocated -- or that
was entitled 888 funds.

In case you may not have caught that meeting, basically 888 funds they consist of a 1 percent tax collected from residents that work in the City of Scranton that do not live here and do not have a municipal wage tax. From that \$557,000, approximately \$519,000 of that 557 are 888 funds from 2009. Approximately \$38,000 of the \$557,000

consist of funds between the years of 2004 and 2008.

Just to give you an idea of the breakdown by year typically how much Scranton receives from this type of funding-- or this type of tax rather: 2004, the city received roughly \$550,000; in 2005, it was roughly \$481,000; and 2006 it was roughly \$494,000; in 2007 it was roughly \$512,000; in 2008 it was roughly \$570,000; and in 2009 the amount is approximately \$518,000, so that's just an update from the tax office.

And also as you know tonight we will be voting to amend the Home Rule Charter to allow for the bidding of professional services and, once again, I would like to state that I am very pleased that we are taking that step and I truly believe that this is the right thing that we are doing here.

Secondly, also as you may know, we are directed by the Home Rule Charter to have an independent audit by May 31. Our independent auditor being Rossi & Rossi sent

numerous updates regarding information that was to be completed by the BA Office. Some of these have been completed, some have not and, in fact, it's possible that all are complete by now.

However, subsequently, when updates were sent from Rossi & Rossi Council also requested information as to why information was being provided late and also for projected dates of when various items that the auditor needed to complete the audit would be provided.

Unfortunately, it's now -- well, I wouldn't say unfortunately it's October 12, but unfortunately it's October 12 and we do not have a completed audit and this is at this point from a quick calculation four and a third months past the date that the Home Rule Charter provides.

In addition to this, I just want to state for the record that the business administrator has not responded to even one of the various requests that we had sent as a council for information regarding the late items and just to give you a brief

background, I would say on a monthly basis
Rossi & Rossi provides us with a list of
things that are outstanding that the BA's
Office needs to provide and I believe the
most recent update, if I could refer to
Mrs. Krake, I believe it was sometime in
early September or late August when we sent
out our last request and we requested that a
response was provided at some point in
September.

However, the fact that it's October 12 and we don't have a completed audit it's not following the Home Rule Charter, and I think it's about time that this -- that we get this done. So with this in mind, Mrs. Krake, can you please send a letter to Mr. Renda again asking if all of the outstanding items that Rossi & Rossi had previously informed us of have been resolved.

In addition, if you could also add to that request if he would provide us with a date or a time frame by when council can expect to receive a completed audit.

In addition, Mrs. Krake, can you

also please send another request to NCC asking for a breakdown of all delinquent real estate taxes collected in 2007, 2008, and 2009. In this breakdown, can you please request that they provide the information broken down into three categories: The face value of the delinquent tax that's owed; the interest that was collected; and also the penalty that NCC imposes. I believe that we sent out requests similar to this nature before, however, I don't believe that we received any responses, and correct me if I'm wrong.

MS. KRAKE: No.

MR. JOYCE: But being that budget season is right around the corner, I think this is something that would be very, very useful to council and that I believe is sorely needed in order to generate accurate figures.

And I just wanted to make a few comments regarding PEL's presentation tonight. I think, you know, I don't agree with many of the aspects of the presentation as echoed by some of my colleagues,

Mr. Rogan, Councilman Loscombe, the whole presentation is basically raising fees, raises taxes and cutting services, and I don't think that that's the solution that we should be looking at. I think we should be looking at many different alternative revenue streams and I think that we need to look into the past to see, you know, everything that we have done and learn from the mistakes that we may have made in the past and look to the future in order to put together some tactical solutions that don't cause such a great burden to the taxpayer. And that's all I have for tonight.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mrs. Evans, can I just add one thing?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. LOSCOMBE: One other impact from not having the audit complete yet is something that we had questioned a couple of weeks ago, the fire truck that we had approved several months according to go our response when we had inquired what was of the status on the fire truck, Fire Chief Tom Davis stated that they had to wait until the

audit was done because it was based on our audit report, so they haven't even ordered the truck yet. We've already lost a half a year protecting our citizens with a piece of equipment that we have already approved because we don't have a complete audit yet. So, I mean, that's just one thing that's impacted. I'm just curious as to what else has been impacted by the lack of our audit at this point. That's all I have to say. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Maybe I'll just add one more impact to what you were saying, I think it's also very difficult to design budgets and to design revised Recovery Plans in the absence of the most recent audit, that being for the fiscal year 2009.

Good evening. Since early 2010 this council has worked aggressively to save taxpayers' dollars, apply accountability and transparency to city government, solve the homeowner's problems, restore respect and decorum to council chambers and research the paper trails of the finances of Scranton.

While fulfilling it's obligation to work cooperatively with the mayor and his administration, council asks questions, examines information, and demands answers before it approves legislation that impacts you, the taxpayers, and sometimes holds legislation until pertinent information and answers are located.

The power of city council is limited to legislation, and legislation can control the purse strings, as you will continue to see throughout the remainder of 2010 and even more significantly in 2011. City council is one member of a strong and talented team consisting of Council Solicitor Boyd Hughes, City Clerk Nancy Krake, Assistant City Clerk Cathy Carrera, and staff member Jamie Marciano.

Research, planning and development of legislation for the benefit of the taxpayers are daily practices and among numerous ongoing projects. I'd like to present one example of our efforts tonight, and I did allude to this earlier this evening during the PEL caucus. City council

recognized that a sizable and questionable sum of money is provided to the Scranton Parking Authority annually while simultaneously hundreds of free garage parking spaces have been given to the Connell building, the Commonwealth Medical College and the Hilton Hotel, thereby, negatively impacting parking revenue.

At the same time, the Parking
Authority was unable to balance it's 2009
and 2010 budgets without scurrying for
additional borrowing during the third and
fourth quarters of those fiscal years
despite it's \$35 million bond issue in 2007.
This bond issues includes an agreement by
the city to pledge full faith and credit of
taxation to provide payment if the Parking
Authority is unable to meet it's financial
obligations. A pledge of full faith and
credit can translate to tax increases for
you.

As a result, city council wanted a closer look into the finances and operations of the Parking Authority. Since representatives and officials of the Parking

Authority would not attend a public caucus meeting, council requested and received a prospectus from the Scranton Parking Authority. Council Solicitor Boyd Hughes determined from that prospectus that the annual budget of the Scranton Parking Authority must be approved by Scranton City Council.

This interesting fact was never revealed to any council to my knowledge and Scranton Parking Authority budgets are not approved by city council in the past. As a result, council notified the Scranton Parking Authority and the city legal department that legislation must be submitted to city council for it's consideration and approval of the 2011 Parking Authority budget.

Council anticipates that there will be forthcoming changes to that budget in order to better ensure that the financial debt of the parking authority will not fall on the backs of Scranton taxpayers.

Next, earlier in 2010 my council colleagues and I met with the mayor to

discuss health care arbitration awards against the administration that stated the city had acted in bad faith. We asked the mayor not to appeal the awards and to save tax dollars that would be wasted on attorneys and appeals. Council's advice fell on deaf ears and the mayor chose to appeal to the Court of Common Pleas.

Recently, Judge O'Brien of the Common Pleas Court denied the city's petition to vacate both the elite and the health insurance co-pay arbitration awards and ruled in favor of the police and fire unions in these two cases. The interest on the health insurance co-pay is mounting from the date of the first violation and the city is also responsible for attorney fees.

Since the State Department of
Community and Economic Development
intervened on behalf of the city in at least
one of those two cases, it seems likely that
the city will once again appeal and, in
fact, tonight during the PEL caucus we
learned from DCED that the city has decided
to appeal both cases further flushing

taxpayer dollars down the toilet.

While the clock ticks, the costs grow for all of us. And let the record show by correspondence to the mayor, I know we already put DCED and PEL on notice during the caucus, but by correspondence to the mayor that city council does not support an appeal of Judge O'Brien's decision.

Union health care is granted by contract, whereas, nonunion health care is not. If the administration is looking for health care savings it can certainly work through the Health Care Committee and it can certainly look to cut where it currently and lawfully is able to do so.

Next, I was pleased to learn that vital firefighting equipment, three aerial proximity warning devices which detect electrical current in power lines will soon be purchased. However, it's been nearly three years since the death of a Scranton firefighter, and for those years the city was aware of the need. The equipment should are been purchased immediately and paid for by cutting frivolous items within the

budget. The mayor stated that the city is always trying improve safety for firefighters. If that is true, then why did he wait three years? The need was apparent long before the results of the study were issued? Why didn't he fund and purchase this equipment long ago and why is the mayor failing to allocate 2011 CDBG funding for a much needed fire engine?

The mayor has made no secret of the fact that he has long desired to cut manpower within the fire department and to close the fire station or engine companies within the City of Scranton and perhaps his declining a purchase of a fire engine in 2011 is just that much more foreshadowing of the enactment of this plan to cut fire services in this city.

Finally, I have citizens' request for the week: 403 Stafford Avenue, this is the third request, I asked Mr. McGoff to look into this, but I haven't heard anything back from him yet. There is a resident within the house. Neighbors complain of garbage on the porch and tremendous

jungle-like overgrowth surrounding the house and encroaching onto residential properties on River Street. Address this as soon as possible before winter weather conditions occur. Neighbors have been patient and awaited update from the city on this eyesore.

South Side residents want to know why they have reported the eyesore at the intersection of Meadow Avenue and River Street for three years and it's not been addressed. Numerous letters were sent, photos were taken, the owner's name was sent to LIPS, etcetera, and the posters and overgrowth still remain. Residents now want to know whom this man knows that he is allowed to ignore his property at an entrance to the city.

A resident requests action at a condemned property located at 521 Maple Street as in the past, copper tubing was stolen from the basement and the property overgrown and overrun with skunks. Two people ran from the house when you utility crews arrived to shutoff utilities. The

property is on the demolition list, but neighbors ask for a date of demolition and assistance from the city if the demolition will not occur until 2011.

Residents of East Mountain report
that catch basins in the East Mountain area
are full. They request that these basins
are cleared.

Neighbors are very concerned that a condemned house next to the empty lot at the intersection of Meadow Avenue and River Street may now have residents. Just yesterday, Monday, October 11, a moving van was observed removing items from the house and another was observed moving items in. Also, neighbors reported a police presence at the scene. Please provide an update on this property as soon as possible.

City residents report clogged storm drains on Mulberry Street.

And the final request I have already spoken with Councilman Loscombe about previously under motions, and that is it.
