APPLICATIONS ALONG WITH DECISIONS RENDERED BY THE ZONING 15 16 HEARING BOARD ON WEDNESDAY, MARCH 9, 2011. 17 MS. EVANS: Are there any comments? 18 If not, received and filed. Clerk's notes? MS. KRAKE: We have several 19 20 responses this evening. The first is from 21 Ryan McGowan, open records officer and BA of 22 the City of Scranton. He tells us he needs 23 an additional 30 days in order to respond to 24 our request for concerning the moving of the 25 \$2.9 million from the Worker's Compensation

Trust Fund.

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Our next response is from Jody Cordaro, this is concerning the Lace Building Affiliates. We had several questions concerning Mr. Casey. He tells us that Mr. Casey has taken a job in the new Marcellus gas industry and is committed full-time to that role. He was involved with the Lace Building Affiliates from April 2010 to November 26, 2010. Mr. Casey's departure from his partnership in the Scranton Lace Complex project was effective by resignation on November 26, and he also tells us that Delta Development was retained, which is who he works for, was retained by the Lace Building Affiliates for the coordination of public funding and historic tax credit execution, and they continue to be a consultant for the Lace Building Affiliates.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs. Krake, and I think it is very important that council continues to keep vigilant watch on each of the companies who have received our RACP grants.

Our next response is

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from the Scranton Redevelopment Authority. We had asked for an itemized specific and complete list of all costs and coinciding dates of fees for Attorney Carl Greco through the eminent domain cases against Buona Pizza and a Mr. Stadolni. They tell us that copies of all invoices for legal services and fees paid to Carl Greco from August 1, 2006, through the present are available for our inspection and review at the office of the Redevelopment Authority, Suite 81, the Scranton Life building, Spruce Street. They are also tell us that certain information has been redacted from the records made available for our inspection in accordance with applicable law. Specifically, billing records which reveal the nature of the services performed are not public records subject to access and, therefore, such information asked for will be redacted.

MS. KRAKE:

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs. Krake. We will have someone then visit the office and go through all of the those legal

services and fees and make copies of what is appropriate and when counsel has gathered all of that information we will report that to you publically.

MS. KRAKE: Our next response is from PennDOT, from Keith Williams, in regards to our letter February 10 and pending the arrival of final plans, special revisions and estimate with the city consultants, their name is Traffic Planning and Design. The schedule flood date for the above-mentioned project is the Spring of 2011. The estimated completion for the project is claimed to be in the Fall of 2011.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: And we have two responses from Charles Jefferson. These are concerning the Connell Loft's building. We had requested a copy of the plan review for the grocery store tenant, and he tells us a planned review is not available at this time as plans have not been finalized for the project and as such have not been submitted for review. And that also for Mulberry

1 Loft's, a plan review is not available at this time as plans have not been finalized 2 3 for the property and have not been submitted for review. 4 5 MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs. Krake. If we could follow-up with an additional 6 7 correspondence to Mr. Jefferson requesting a 8 copy of the plan reviews when they are 9 produced. MS. KRAKE: Yes, and that's all I 10 11 have. MS. EVANS: 12 Thank you very much. 13 Mr. Rogan is unable to attend tonight's 14 meeting due to illness. Do any council 15 members have announcements at this time? 16 MR. MCGOFF: First, I'd like to make 17 a motion to make Mr. Loscombe acting chair 18 for community development for this evening. 19 MS. EVANS: We have a motion on the 20 floor, do we have a second? 21 MR. JOYCE: Second. On the question? 22 MS. EVANS: A11 23 those in favor signify by saying aye. 24 MR. MCGOFF: Aye. 25 MR. MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker tonight is Matt MacDonald.

MR. MACDONALD: Hi. Good evening,
Council. My name is Matt MacDonald. I'm a
city resident and vice president of the
Scranton Firefighters Local 60. The reason
I'm here tonight is our membership wanted me
to come and tell you about a concern we
have. We all know that the mayor has
decided to permanently and temporarily close
apparatus, fire apparatus in the city. Our
concern comes when a firehouse itself is
closed down.

Over the past -- since the beginning of the year we've had Engine 15, which is in the Petersburg section off the city, the firehouse has been closed down numerous times. We are concerned with this because, well, obviously, we are concerned because of

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the fire safety. We have another concern because the citizens of Scranton don't realize that the firehouse is closed. firefighter will tell you that citizens come to the firehouse for medical emergencies, just I think two shifts ago we had a gentleman -- I work on Wyoming Avenue at Rescue 1, and a gentleman stopped, his friend was having seizure, stopped and we, you know, rendered aid until the ambulance So people come all the time for came. medical emergencies, to report fires. all know that parents teach their children that a firehouse is a safe haven that they can come there if they are lost or in danger.

So with that said, our membership started when the firehouse was closed to put a sign on the door up there that "In case of emergency please dial 911, this firehouse is closed."

Unfortunately, the city, I'm not exactly sure, I think the fire chief ordered the deputy chief to have that sign removed. So again, we are concerned and I'm bringing

to you that hopefully you could have something done that when the firehouse is closed, and we have the -- that's an issue in itself, but please just notify the public that that neighborhood firehouse is closed. Like I said, it's a safety issue, but I just explained so hopefully there is something that council could do about this.

MS. EVANS: Yes. And the sign can be just removed daily; correct?

MR. MACDONALD: Yes.

MS. EVANS: In other words, according to the circumstances.

MR. MACDONALD: Sure.

MS. EVANS: When a station is browned-out a sign can go up and then, of course, when it's in operation the sign is removed.

MR. MACDONALD: Yes. What was happening is the off-going shift in the mornings was putting the sign up when the firehouse was being browned out for that next 24 hours, and then when the shift came in, whether it be the next day or two days later, would take the sign down. If you

drive by and it's closed the fire engine is still in there. It looks like it's open, but it's not, there is no one at home. We would hate for some -- you know, somebody to have an emergency go there, be knocking on the door and, you know, wasting valuable minutes so --

MS. EVANS: Yes. Yes.

MR. LOSCOMBE: The other situation, a lot of people may think it's open, too, in the evenings, when the alarm goes off it goes off through all of the stations in the city, activating all of the lights, and the lights have to be reset and shut off by someone in that station, so they could be on all evening so someone would think that there is firefighters in there. I mean, I know how many times people go for emergencies or to verbally report a fire.

MR. MACDONALD: Yeah.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I mean, it's a public service that they should be notified that their station is closed at that time.

MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake, please send a letter on behalf of Scranton City Council

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to the mayor urging him to reverse the order that prohibits public awareness of which fire stations are closed on a given day or night, and in addition, if we could please send letters to each of the city's neighborhood associations and to probably the Scranton School District as well. think you mentioned children.

MR. MACDONALD: Yeah. I know when I was in school my parents taught me if I was lost or if there was, you know -- if I was in danger to go to your, you know, your local fire station if you could.

> MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MACDONALD: Even adults. Ι mean, even when, you know, someone is being followed, you know, they tell them to go to the police station and fire station. like I said, the membership just wanted us to come here and let you know that because they are concerned that, you know, people thought they were open, especially like Mr. Loscombe said, that when the lights go on at night it appears people are there.

> MS. EVANS: You would assume, yes.

MR. MCGOFF: That's all I have.

Thank you very much, Council.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you. Just out of curiosity, did anyone provide you with reason why the sign was taken down or --

MR. MCGOFF: No. The only thing I heard was our deputy chief was ordered to remove the sign and they did. I'm not sure why.

MR. JOYCE: Fair enough.

MS. EVANS: Well, we do hope that the mayor will take note and reverse this order and I do think it is very important for each of the neighborhoods to disseminate that information among their areas, and I do think as well it's equally important for the school district to be able to notify students that stations may not be opened in the event of any type of emergency that a child may be having. In such cases every second, every minute can count, so it's certainly a safety issue I think that people should be made aware of when a station has been closed for a day or two. Thank you so

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much, Mr. MacDonald.

MR. MACDONALD: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: And Giovanni Piccolino.

MR. PICCOLINO: Good evening, city council, and fellow Scrantonians, may God bless us all.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. PICCOLINO: My name is Giovanni Piccolino, I live, work and own a business in the City of Scranton. In the last couple of weeks I have been going around to all of my fellow small business owners in the city, just to get their input on why they think that it's kind of tough to do business in the City of Scranton, so I kind of came up with a David Letterman Top Ten list of why businesses choose to stay in the surrounding areas like Dickson City, Taylor, Old Forge, and whatnot and not come into the City of Scranton.

Starting with number ten, most businesses move into the outskirts of Scranton like Dickson City because the business climate is healthier there. Like an example again, we have no franchises in

the City of Scranton whatsoever, they actually take the time to do the surveys and the logistics and when it boils down to it the bottom line is the lack of services in the overwhelming tax bracket just keeps them away from this city.

Number nine, the parking, obviously, is more readily available in these other little towns and customers find safe and secure parking with no extra fees.

There is little or no support
businesses, such as my own, Coney Island.
Everything here seems to be geared towards
crony developers and big businesses, and the
example of this, I just had a conversation
with Tom Moran, the owner of Coney Island,
and he had to pay a private I guess plowing
company to plow his parking spots, and a
city policeman came up to him and said if
they -- because he was pushing the snow down
Cedar Avenue with this private plower, they
told this plowing company if they put their
blade on the ground again that they would be
arrested. All this gentleman was trying to
do was clear out the spaces in front of his

business. The city had the audacity to tell him that he cannot push the snow down Cedar. Where else is the snow supposed to go? He is just trying to clear those five, six, seven spots by his business.

I also had a discussion with Miss Kelly Haam, owners of Kelly's Pub and Eatery. She has to pay, again, a private plowing company to plow Genet Street which runs right alongside of her. This is not friendly. Coney Island has been there since 1921, and obviously, we all know Kelly's has been there a good 15 to 20 years, they are a thriving business. These are things that, you know, and not to mention our situation, everybody already knows that, I don't even have to mention it.

The condition of the roads and the streets in the city is deplorable. The other day one of my delivery drivers his car broke down so I was bringing some deliveries and if you guys have a chance to get up to the 400 to around the 600 block of Beach Street, I have never in my entire life seen road conditions like that. I feel bad for

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the people on Beach Street. I would never take that route again. I have never seen so much potholes and it's just disastrous. again, not even to mention Lackawanna and North Washington Avenue, you are going in and out and in and out. It's like a pothole slalom.

There is a lack of unity in the City of Scranton. There is no real business association geared to small businesses, and the decided lack of cooperation between the city and small businesses. The city does not encourage small business expansion, they would rather choose to subsidize places like Molly Brannigan's, \$800,000, closed in less than two years. Poochie on Spruce Street, hundreds of thousands of dollars, closed in less than two years. Michael's Eyeglasses, \$80,000, Spruce Street, closed less than two years. Martini Bar and Grill, not really quite sure what they received, closed in less than two years. That was the previous city council with you, Mr. McGoff, voting to give, that's roughly \$1 million dollars that you could have gave some of the local

businesses like Buona Pizza, Coney Island, Kelly's. You know, we can expand and help out the mercantile tax and all of the other taxes that we pay.

There is absolutely no incentive to stay in the city or do any improvements.

There is no communication between the city and small businesses. We must subject ourselves to political considerations in order to get anything done. I was not a Christopher Doherty crony, so I was targeted.

There is no consideration for the needs and wants of the people. In order to have reasonable dining, leisure or entertainment the people have to leave the city. Even our political leaders and their organizations don't patronize Scranton.

Look at the parade day committee, they don't even stay in the city.

And last, but not least, we all know it, the city makes it extremely difficulty for us small businesses to survive. Just the permits, I have to thank Mrs. Krake, because the city -- our health permit, our

inspection was due February 28. They purposely didn't even come, they didn't do an inspection, they didn't come for the payment or anything, just so that we could be a week behind, so it went from \$200 to \$400, but luckily she informed me to go down there and pay it that day, and I did, and they kind of looked shocked when I was down there. I'm like, "Oh, you don't come and do inspections anymore?"

And we got our health inspection in the mail. There no was inspection done whatsoever.

I'll just finish up real quickly. I also have the owner of Nickie's Hogies up on Davis Street, right up there, he has four banners that says, "Meatball subs, cheese steak sub and Italian sub," to help out his business. Again, the city as the audacity, not his landlord, the city has the audacity to bother this gentleman for a little banner that lays across his business just so he can, you know, get more business because you really can't tell that it's there unless he has this banner laid across there. And

these are all just small little things, this gentleman owns three businesses in the city. He owns one on Swetland and he has something to do with Pajama's Pizzeria down here. I mean, these people are in this city, us, Coney Island, you know, it goes back to Tony Harding and even Preno's kind of getting pushed out of the city. You got to understand, that the core of this city starts with small businesses, then the franchise and everybody else will come into town, because they see that you are successful and that you are thriving, not being pushed out of town. That's all I have to say. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you,

Mr. Piccolino. Just for your edification and that of the public, the loan for Martini's Bar and Grill, that loan was voted down by city council and so that business did not receive any type of loan through OECD, and I believe that if it hasn't already it will very shortly be open once again in it's same location. Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. MCGOFF: Could I make one comment?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MCGOFF: Actually two. The St.

Patrick's Day Parade Committee does meet in
the City of Scranton. They meet at

Lackawanna College. You may be referring to
the Friendly Sons dinner, the friendly sons
of Lackawanna County, have their dinner at
Genetti's.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

And our next speaker is Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I'm glad you're looking into Mr. Greco's -- Attorney Greco's salaries and so forth or what you want to call, but I think you should go a bit further. You should do it to every entity in the city, the authorities. How many lawsuits are currently with the authorities? How many lawsuits are currently with city hall? People either suing city hall or city hall suing somebody else or even appealing, whatever you want to call it? You got to

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get a total picture of actually what is happening, what all the legalities in this city. I have nothing against the lawyer making a buck, that's what they are there for, but when you're pushing it and pushing it pushing it and some lawyers making enormous salaries, well, then it's time to look. I don't see why they couldn't have an in-house situation within the city, they handle all of the authorities and everything to it. Otherwise, you have a whole legal department within the city, they handle all of the city departments and authorities instead of everyone having their own. wonder why you can't keep track. authority has it's own solicitor and that adds the cost.

And I don't even know where the Recreational Authority is getting the money to pay for all of their legal fees. That is it something I'm sort of interested in because certainly they can't be thinking that they can just live off the poor kids that swim in the pool. That's a poor solution. I know they rent a few pavilions

out, but something really to be done to look at the total picture of the city.

I know you are going to do some eminent domain in there, is a house involved in that for the --

MS. EVANS: No, it's not. It's a vacant lot, yes.

MR. SBARAGLIA: There is no big problem there. I was afraid there was some old woman up there that is going to lose her home.

MS. EVANS: No.

MR. SBARAGLIA: That's unwilling to leave like me.

 $$\operatorname{MS}.$$ EVANS: No, no, we wouldn't allow that to happen.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Okay, so where do we stand on some of the lawsuits that the city -- I know they had to come up -- I didn't talk to about it last week, I know the firemen, the policemen won that sort of salary increase because they didn't go back far enough. I guess that's one of the things that you would appeal, but he has been appealing so many things I can hardly

keep track of them. I'm still down there with the clerks for the police department. I don't know if that ever got straightened out.

Somewhere along the line we got to get the city in order financially and legality wise. You can't go this way. The way we're going is not the way to be going. I mean, we made lot of bad decisions, I understand that, putting the meters down there at the old General Dynamics or Chamberlain was not a great idea. I don't know why it was done, but it wasn't the best, and it's sorry to say we had to take a huge loss on it. I mean, they are sitting down there. I don't know if we can reuse them, I don't know where we can put them really. How many neighborhoods you want to stick them into.

But somewhere the total picture of the city is really, really in a fog. I don't think anybody really knows what's told them what's going on in the city and it's really sad. I'm one of the people that believe in open, honest and efficient

government. I believe even though if it was my best friend and he was in trouble and it got into legality I would still report it.

You report everything that happens that touches the citizens in the city whether you like to or not, and it's the only way you can actually move forward. Too many mistakes were made in the past and really they were big mistakes.

You saw them down there even with the Medallion garage that fiasco of people going in there going to repair it and then rip it down, and then the grouped that went in took a look at the Casey building and shook their heads and said no. You can't do anything with it. It's sad, you know, I mean, Casey was a nice hotel and it was a allowed to get to where it was where it had to be ripped down.

I don't -- I worked in there. I worked on the elevators, so I know exactly what the conditions were and even towards the end I worked on the elevators in that building, and you're right. It had fallen apart. I mean, really, really had fallen

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apart and I think it was even a lot of the things that were in there were taken out. I thank you.

This is what I was

MS. EVANS: Thank you,
Mr. Sbaraglia. Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN:

going to talk about tonight. Well, was it the Diogenes that was looking for a honest man? Well, he would have a hard time around this place, wouldn't he? I just -- I just have people just telling me right to my face some kind of ridiculous story. As you can see, this paper I gave you is called the Purely Public Charity Act. Now, it lists five obligations for any tax exemption, and there is one in hundreds in this city that could fulfill all five. Now, it's time -it's time to just turn terminate all of these tax cheats. My pet one is Paul Mansour. He doesn't qualify for a one. 15 years he has bought and sold property and not paid taxes. He doesn't qualify for any of these obligations that are on the sheet. It's time to terminate him and get our money back, you know. There is probably a million

dollars or more that these people are beaten out of the taxpayers of this city. The money is just gone, but there is not a -- we don't need to let them keep going on for another day.

This is -- right there is the tool you people just are going to have to learn to use it because it's in black and white in front of you. There is hundreds and hundreds of people out there that say they are nonprofits and church-related businesses and they are not. It takes a good business to qualify for all five of those and there is only one, like I said, in hundreds in this city right now if you get out on your computer that fill that obligation.

And next I'd like to say a word about all of the bleeding hearts that feel so sorry for Mr. Jefferson. He sat right here in this very room saying he spent \$27 million on that building, all you have to do is go right upstairs. He paid a little over \$40,000 building permit. Do you realize how much money is gone right there. He has just beat the city out of a couple of hundred

thousands dollars in building permit money and now he wants to do the same over there. This man just -- he can't do business with people like that. Nobody should have to do business with a person like that. He has no credibility whatsoever.

I got to go to the hospital, so I won't know what's going on with the rest of the meeting, but I know you five people care about this city like I do or you wouldn't be up there. You know, there is no doubt in my mind, but you just got to -- you got to remember all of these poor people out there that put you in those seats, you have got to start terminating -- you know, somebody told me one of the Paul Mansour's-- he brags that he's friends with the mayor. I don't think care who he's friends with, the man is no good, he's stolen from the hardworking people of this city by not paying his share like everybody else is.

I just hope you can get our taxable properties back on the payroll because that sheets shows right there how many are just beating us left and right out of everything.

It's got to end, and I know you people just want to do everything you can. Right there is the tool to do something with. That article four says at that that they have to contribute -- I'll read it to you, article four says they have to relieve the government of some of it's burden. Taking taxable properties off by the hundreds isn't relieving this area of any burden.

Please you all -- take some time and talk about that and do something and get these properties away from all of these deadbeats that, you know, that are out there. It's just got to end. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MR. HUGHES: Madam President, if I could?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. HUGHES: I believe that what should happen with this is that this should be sent to John Foley at the Assessor's Office. The City of Scranton does not assess properties. We have no control over a property that's tax exempt or that is a

taxable and then goes tax exempt for what
the assessment figures are. However, John
Foley is now the chief assessor and I would
recommend that maybe a quick letter be sent,
you know, with this along with the comments
and see what Lackawanna County is doing in
order to be comparable with Wyoming County.
I mean, that's what we can do. We don't
have any control over the assessment
process, but John Foley is the chief
assessor and maybe we can get an answer on
that, you know, for you and also Ron and
also for the benefit of the --

MR. ELLMAN: That's a good start.

 $$\operatorname{MR}$.$ HUGHES: That's where we have to start. Thank you for bringing it in and I think that would be the way to go.

MS. EVANS: And thank you, Attorney Hughes. Mrs. Krake, if you can please send that letter according to our solicitor's specifications.

MR. JOYCE: Also, Mrs. Krake, if you could please ask Mr. Foley if there is a form that's comparable that's used in Lackawanna County and if you can, if you can

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please send us a copy of the forms, so, you know, we are comparing apples to apples here in looking at these things.

MS. EVANS: Our next speaker is Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,
Council. Les Spindler, city resident and
homeowner and taxpayer.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. SPINDLER: You know, I just can't believe what I heard tonight. city administration has just reached an all time low. For the fire department to put up a sign on a firehouse warning people that it's closed and for the fire chief to have it taken down, that's just an all time low in my eyes and it's just more proof, which I've said in the past, this city doesn't give a darn about the safety of people in this city and it's really ashame and I can't believe-- I'm one of the few people that comes here and complains. People should be revolting in this city against this mayor. I have called him, you know, I'm only one person. Everybody should be calling this

mayor's office and, you know, complaining about the public safety as being hurt in this city. It's just despicable what's going on.

I was angry enough when I came here now that just made me more angry because what I heard last week the mayor is going to appeal his latest arbitration loss and as a taxpayer in the city it just angers the heck out of me. How long is this going to be going on? I don't know how this man gets away with it, but I do know how it's going to go on, he is going to appeal, appeal, appeal until he is out of office and then it will be the next mayor's headache and he has disregarded Court orders. Can I ask Attorney Hughes a question, Mrs. Evans?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. SPINDLER: Attorney Hughes, is there nothing that can be done? I mean, he has violated Court orders. Can't he be held in contempt of Court?

MR. HUGHES: I have no idea what

Court orders you are talking about, however,

whenever there is any kind of judgment

that's rendered an opinion it's an automatic -- it's within the discretion of the mayor to take an appeal and he is exercising the rights as the mayor to appeal these decisions, but by virtue of the fact that he is -- these are Court orders because they are decisions and they make a monetary award where they are an arbitration award, you know, does mean that he is violating the order. He is exercising the rights that any citizens has or any municipal government has to take an appeal to a higher court.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay, thank you. I just think it's a darn shame that the taxpayers are the ones suffering and Chris Doherty's lawyers are the ones making the money.

Now, more about the mayor. Last week I brought up about StreetSmart,

Mrs. Evans, in your comments in answer to my question, that I guess it's up the mayor to implement the StreetSmart program?

MS. EVANS: Yes, it is.

MR. SPINDLER: And he is not doing

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MS. EVANS: He has not done so to date.

MR. SPINDLER: Well, then I have another question for Attorney Hughes, that's in the budget; correct?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. SPINDLER: Doesn't he have to abide by the budget, Attorney Hughes?

MR. HUGHES: It must be 100 questions tonight. The fact that the revenue is in the budget, the question with StreetSmart does it have to be bid or is it a sole source contract. That's what it comes down to before the contract can be It's taken them about two and a awarded. half months. I know the City of Easton has awarded the contract for StreetSmart on the basis it is a sole source contract. I have written letters regarding that and also most recently I have written another letter to Attorney Brazil and Attorney Kelly regarding the issue that Attorney Brazil raised that whether under the city's administrative code StreetSmart could be a sole source. I gave them some information on that where it's

possible and they are reviewing that it can be a sole source, but that's not our decision.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay, thank you. I just think that he is so bitter that his budget didn't get passed and he is trying to make council's budget look bad by not implementing this program and holding some funds back that would have been raised.

MS. EVANS: Exactly.

MR. SPINDLER: He's just a bitter, angry man and it's unbelievable.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Spindler, actually I'm going to be commenting under motions on the situation involving StreetSmart and city government.

MR. SPINDLER: Thank you. Now I have some requests. Well, some questions I made in the past. Oh, I brought this up quite awhile ago and I handed in a request, the streetlights on the McDade Expressway and the Linden Street Bridge, has anything been heard about that?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I was going to touch that on motions, also.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay. Oh, something else I brought up quite a few months ago, the West Lackawanna County Bridge coming into downtown, I told a story about having to wait for four traffic light changes and asking for a left-turn arrow, anything on that?

MS. EVANS: No, we haven't heard anything.

MR. LOSCOMBE: That's supposed to be part of the signalization program that they were working on.

MR. SPINDLER: And now with Linden Street being closed there is going to be more traffic there, it's going to be twice as bad.

MS. EVANS: Yes, it will.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay, here is something I got to mention or I won't be able to go home tonight, my wife travels this one way every day to go to work where Amity Court meets Keyser Avenue there is a stop sign there on Amity Court, my wife said it's so faded you can barely see it and it's a safety hazard, and on that block of Amity

Court, also, it's filled with real deep potholes and she has to take a detour now to go to visit because they are so bad, and I had that typed up and I made a few additions here, I will give them to Ms. Carrera.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. SPINDLER: Potholes in the 1700 block of West Gibson and someone told me that at 1720 West Gibson a sinkhole opened up at the rear of that property, so it could be from all of the snow and rain we have had lately.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. SPINDLER: Again, I'll give this to Ms. Carrera.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. We appreciate that.

MR. SPINDLER: One more comment, the West Scranton boys play at 8:00 tonight in Bethlehem. I want to wish them best of luck.

MS. EVANS: Absolutely.

MR. SPINDLER: And I don't know when the girls play, the girls won Saturday and they play I guess later on this week.

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MR. MCGOFF: Tomorrow.

MR. SPINDLER: I want to wish both teams best of luck and to piggyback on what Mrs. Evans said, I know you asked to have the Scranton boys team in and the West Scranton girls' team come in, I think it would be a good idea, also, to bring in the West Scranton boys' team, they are having a very fine season and they have already won one state playoff game, so I think they should be brought in, also.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much.

MR. SPINDLER: And best of luck to them.

MS. EVANS: And we agree with you, go West. And our next speaker is Marie Schumacher. Ms. Carrera, if we can also provide proclamations for the West Scranton boys' team.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MS. SCHUMACHER: First I would like to call attention to those people who may not get the newspaper that there was an ad in about a week or so ago that the OECD

draft caper is available for review during the standard business hours this week and next, so if anybody wants to do that.

And since our backup to the agenda items is still not available on-line, if we can't get in here during business hours we don't have access and I would like to know if 7-D is a pure loan or if it's a loan to grant program. You can answer that during motions.

I was also looking through the 2009 audit, and some things are rather vague, which is disappointing after we waited so long for it to find things that were vague, so I do -- will give Ms. Carrera a note tonight, but in the questions on note 13, on commitments and contingencies with respect to litigation it says, "Various suits resulting mainly from injuries sustained in accidents on city property."

I would like to know how many suits are outstanding and if there is any commonality that could be corrected by changes in procedures that cause these accidents. It says there are two cases with

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open contracts these contractors have with the city. Then there is another, lawsuits over development of phase three of the section of the city. I'd like to know if this is Providence Square, if not what section of the city does this lawsuit regard and what is the potential exposure of that lawsuit.

construction contractors, I would like to

know who the contractors are and how many

lawsuit. Next, there has been some talk over the weeks about the money that was no longer needed and still available in the account for -- that the Lackawanna County had received for the Lace Company project before they sold the property and it's roughly in the \$200,000, and I have a suggestion, I think there may not be a legal obligation, but I think there is certainly a moral obligation for the city to help over there with the runoff from Tripp Park. As you're aware, the Medallis family, and I don't know them, I wouldn't know them if I tripped over them, but they sued over the years, they are going back to the early 80's, they won their

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lawsuit and then the developer declared bankruptcy and so what is the recourse for someone when this happens to them? Obviously, the Tripp Park development went through all of the proper procedures, I'm assuming, to get their plans approved, so the runoff must have -- either they -either they didn't comply or the city engineer, whomever had to approve it, approved it in error which would make the city morally responsible and I think that after all of this time the Medallis family certainly deserves something and I would --I don't know what -- how much it would take to fix that problem there, but I think that certainly should be a priority. They lived there for a long time without a problem until that development went in so, and they have the Court case behind them.

Next, during motions I would ask, since it seems to be a Solicitor Hughes evening, if he could explain how the worker's comp fund is administered and whether -- what guides borrowings from that fund, if the fund has to remain at a certain

level and if there are borrowings allowed if council does have to approve those borrowings.

And then I would like to address condemnations. Under a Right-to-Know I requested -- I requested the letter that is given to persons whose properties are condemned and advising them what they have to do, and I will take just a minute to read it: It says, "The above to --" dear so and so, "The above-mentioned property has been condemned since they condemned --" next week.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much, Mrs. Schumacher.

MR. JOYCE: If you don't mind me asking, would you be able to repeat the question that you had on 7-D?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Yes. Is that a pure loan or is it a loan that changes to a guarantee if some specific condition is met?

MR. JOYCE: Okay. I'm under the assumption after reading through legislation that this is a pure loan. I'm not sure if there is any stipulations that apply to it,

but there were none indicated, so it is a pure loan.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay.

MS. EVANS: And it did include, and I don't remember off the top of my head specifically what it was, but I do recall having read that there was a loan term and an interest rate for each one of those years, so it certainly does appear that it's a loan not a grant.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I certainly hope, so since the parents who utilize that facility get tax credits for paying those people, so we, the federal taxpayers, are paying twice. So thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Doug Miller.

MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council, Doug Miller, Scranton.

MR. JOYCE: Good evening.

MR. MILLER: I'd like to go back to the chamber building, it's an issue that he have been discussing here for several weeks now and, you know, I'd just like to take the time to respond to Mrs. Franus' statements that she made I think it was two weeks ago

if I'm correct regarding the payment of taxes which is in the amount of \$75,000. I just have to total agree with her statements. I think that when you look at this issue, we are looking at someone who bought a building, knew there was taxes owed, and now came before you and wanted a \$3 million grant, but yet doesn't want to pay the taxes. And I think Mrs. Franus hit it right of the head, she basically echoed a lot of the statements I had made I believe two weeks before that.

You know, I think that we can't forgive someone for paying taxes when everyone else in the city pays their fair share, and they know that they can't come before you, as they said, and ask for a break from you. They know they have to meet their obligations and I think what Mrs. Franus was trying to say, what I was trying to say and a lot other people were trying to say is that you can't exclude someone even though they are willing to invest in our city.

And, you know, I really appreciate

Mr. Jefferson and what he is trying to do here. I'm not against development, like I said, and I know you are not, but we can't continue to keep giving free rides. It's gone on too long in this city and it's lead us to the financial disaster that we are in because we've let this go. Past councils would let this go. You know, prior councils would say, "Okay, you don't have to pay the taxes, here's your \$3 million grant, go about your project, exclude the fees and penalties and everything else and do what you have to do."

And you know, they would have gotten an uproar from the residents of this city, but at the end of the day you can't go back on what you did and the taxpayers would have suffered as usual, but I know that we have a council that's not going to do that. You've taken the bull by the horn on several different occasions, not just with this issue, but many other ones in the past, and I know you will stay the course, as I hope you would, and you won't be pressured into voting to approve a grant before the taxes

are paid. You won't be bullied and threatened by threats that have been made about selling the building to a nonprofit, don't buy any of you that. We've heard all of that for years and councils and administrations have given into it, and I know you won't do that. The residents of this city work too hard to meet their obligations and it's not fair to them to have someone walk in here and get a free ride, so I just ask you to stay the course, stay bold, and don't let someone get a free ride.

I'd like to talk about the fire department, it's been a big issue here, and I just have to address this matter after hearing what I heard tonight. It prompted me to discuss this. You know this an issue that I take very serious and I believe it deserves our complete attention. I truly can't understand why the administration continually plays games with the health and safety of the residents in this city, and now we hear it's affecting schools, as we know it would have, and the safety of the

children, and I'm totally appalled to hear that schools aren't being notified when engines are shut down and I just find that completely unacceptable and disrespectful.

I think the administration better wise up, and I am not trying to be disrespectful here myself, but I think they need to wise up because there will be a serious price to pay if and when something tragic does occur, and I just hope council will stay the course with this as well and not allow the administration to continue to play games with the health and safety of the residents of this city.

You know, this is a very serious issue, and as I said last week, we had an issue at our house that happened to be a false alarm, but it could have been serious and, you know, the people in Tripps Park who have to deal with the closing Engine 9, think of what they're going to go through if and when something happens. We cannot play games with people's lives, and I take it very serious and I'm passionate about it and I would hope you would be the same as well.

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You know, I listened to comments earlier regarding potholes and lack of jobs and businesses and so on, you know, I kind of sat back and I'm listening to that and, you know, it's as if, you know, we are just announcing for the first time that we don't know that we have a potholes and we have a lack of jobs and we have no businesses. This is something we have known for years. You know, I think what we should be focusing on is how we are going to find solutions to address the problem. It's easy to come up to this podium and condemn everything and complain about this and complain about that, but it's time to start electing people and it's time to start having citizens come up here and offer something. And again, I don't mean that in disrespectful manner, but I just think that we go back and forth in circles that leads us nowhere. We need to

You know, a lot of people say, "Where do you start?"

start finding solutions to our problems.

That's a good question. Where do you start because the list goes on and on?

But there is -- we have to start somewhere and the only way we could do that is by having full cooperation from council and the administration. You know, we have to stop treating the cause and we have to start treating the symptom. You know, it would be like going to a doctor's office and saying you had a headache and he gives you an aspirin, well, three days later you come back, "Doctor, I have a headache again."

"Well, instead of continuing to give you aspirin why don't we find out what's causing that headache."

That's the approach we have take in this city. We can certainly turn the city around, there is no doubt about that, but we need ideas, vision and cooperation, and if I may just one more thought --

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MILLER: -- regarding the city pools, I would just like to know if we anticipate on hearing any time soon which pools will be in operation as opposed to which ones won't this summer?

MS. EVANS: I reported on this I

believe within the last several weeks. We have received no response from the mayor or Parks and Recreation regarding that matter.

MR. MILLER: Okay. And I, too, would just like to wish the West Scranton boys the best of luck tonight. They have obviously made us very proud to this point, and I just wish them the best tonight, and with that said I'd like to wish everyone a happy St. Patrick's Day. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MR. TALIMINI: Joe Talimini, City of Scranton. Mr. Piccolino didn't have an opportunity to mention this so he asked me if I would speak on his behalf, he wanted to announce that the Scranton small business association is recruiting new members, they already have 11 people signed up. These are small business owners in this community who are sick and tired of being ignored by the administration and being treated as second-class citizens.

The formation of this group was designed to unify the people of this community. Hopefully the same thing will happen with the taxpayers in this community, but these small businesses are getting together and they will be meeting, I believe they are in the process of getting incorporated, I don't know how soon that's going to happen, but I know that that is in the works, but there are 11 people already signed up and it's only been this week, so obviously there is a need for it.

Secondly, with regards to the pools, I understand the Novembrino pool is going to be closed, that should be received very happily by the people in this community, the Capouse and Novembrino Pool being closed, I'm not sure of it, but I have heard about it.

I'd also like to ask Mr. Brazil and his eminent group, the DPW, why they spent that overtime over the weekend cleaning up for the St. Patrick's Day parade? I think if anybody should pay for the clean up of the St. Patrick's Day parade it should be

the bars downtown because they are the ones that benefit. The rest of the taxpayers have to pay and now I understand he is going to be coming in asking for more money because he has exceeded his overtime fund. Well, if he can exceed his overtime fund for one day of celebration to benefit the bars in a four-block area, I think the bars should be the ones who pay for the clean up, and if it takes DPW's overtime money, well, let the bars do it. There's got to be some way to do that.

Now, the one thing that's really on my mind is this mayor is bankrupting this city, he is hellbent on running us into the ground and he is doing a very good job of it. Several of us have been researching and, unfortunately, there is no provision in the Pennsylvania State Constitution for a recall that we know of. It's being researched, and he cannot be impeached, according to what they say, but there is a movement underway and anybody who wants to join it can contact me if they would like, but we are going to get this guy out of

office one way or the other if we have to run him out of town on a rail because people are fed up with his nonsense, and he can go ahead and make all of his lawyers friends and all of his developers friends as wealthy as he wants to at the taxpayers' expense, but it's that time and it's happening, and that's just a fair warning that the time is coming and if we don't get him before the feds do, I'm sure somebody will. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MR. SLEDENZSKI: Hi, Jackie.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Chrissy.

MR. SLEDENZSKI: Jackie.

MR. LOSCOMBE: How come you didn't get on the bus, Chris, to go to the game?

MR. SLEDENZSKI: I forgot. You know something, Jack, this team, west side is going to be a great team in basketball. You know, I hope they just don't blow this one tonight. I can tell you right now, Saturday's play, Jack, was sensational. Our friends downstairs, our friends down there,

resident of Scranton and so forth. I'd like to thank you for the endorsement last week of the radio station. Everybody from council endorsed it and I appreciate that. I was by Elm Street again near the end of the trolley tunnel, and that hole is getting a little bigger, it's filling up with dirt, so they should possibly talk to somebody with the Rail Authority about that, also, because it looks like it may be a subsidence issue and it's -- it could be pretty serious with the rail service and so forth.

I'd like to talk tonight about some library issues, I have had the privilege of attending some computer courses down the library, they are throw in the basement of the children's library, and currently there are bathrooms shut down because of holes or leaks in the roof and so forth, and there is quite a few problems over there, so if you people could possibly approach the commissioners to get some kind of repairs over there, that's getting fairly serious and, I mean, water leaking into a library that's self-explanatory the seriousness of

it, so I see in the paper that we are planning construction in other cities and so forth, well, maybe we better take care of what we have it and first.

And the fire department, I'd also
like to make sure all of the people in
Scranton have their smoke detectors
up-to-date because of these brownouts and so
forth, that's your last defense there.
Don't wait until somebody sees smoke pouring
out of your windows to get out of the house,
and hopefully things will straighten out
with that. It's shameful.

And now for our beloved golden parrot awards. Our governor has -- our new governor has given all statutory authority to override any regulatory agency to a man named Walker, I don't know his first name, but he is the owner of 13 coal companies and a member of the PA Coal Association, and then there is an organization called Alic, I don't know what it stands for but it's financed by the Coke brothers, third richest people in the country, and they're advancing a 31 states to make it tougher to vote, and

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since '03 instead of \$35 billion operating capital in the commodities market with Goldman Sachs and Morgan Stanley we now have \$350 billion and their too bad patterns here tonight because they are Obama contributors, also, so everybody was wondering on the more liberal oriented television stations, news stations while Obama wasn't speaking out against the gas tax and further -- the gas prices increasing and -- well, keep in mind that some of these revolutions in other countries like Egypt are because people's food prices went to 80 percent of their income, so if we think we have it bad in Scranton just be glad you are not in Egypt. Have a good night. Thank you.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Bill Jackowitz,
South Scranton resident and member of the
Taxpayers' Association. Boyd, I got about
seven questions for you. Psyche.

MR. HUGHES: I have learned.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, just some figures for you, after the parade on Saturday we had 37 people arrested. We had 31 people arrested for public drunkenness

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and then the state police arrested another 48 underage drivers and they were arrested by the state police underaged and DUI.

That's 48 more than the state police arrested. That was for the St. Patrick's Day parade. Obviously, the bars and restaurants did pretty well or the distributors, somebody did.

I agree with what someone else said, I think the sponsors of the parade and the bar owners and the restaurants who make the money I think they should pay for the DPW clean up, and I also believe that they should pay for the overtime for the police officers and the fire department and anyone else, any other city employees who are on overtime, because I don't believe the taxpayers should have to pay for that because not all of the taxpayers attend the St. Patrick's Day parade.

Also, I would like to know, and I'm going to submit this letter before I leave here, and I would like for someone to find out how much money the city contributed to the Armed Forces Day parade every year and

how much money to the St. Patrick's Day parade every year. I would like to see a comparison between the Armed Forces Day parade and the St. Patrick's Day parade on the contribution of money from the city, naturally taxpayers' money, because I think the Armed Forces Day parade should get more because these are the people who went out there and defended this country and sacrificed their life, so I think they should actually get more than what the St. Patrick's Day parade gets.

Also, the crime statistics and the overtime will be considerably down for the Armed Forces Day parade compared to the St. Patrick's Day parade, so I would like to see a comparison, also, on that, how much overtime is paid for the St. Patrick's Day parade and how much overtime is paid for the Armed Forces Day parade, okay? Because again, I feel that the soldiers and the military personnel and veterans deserve a lot more because they are the ones who allow all of this to happen.

Okay, the Democratic -- the city

Democratic Committee it's a joke. Did you read today's paper? It's a total joke.

The pools, how many pools are going to be -- how many pools are going to be closed? Somebody already brought that up this year. I hope there is no pools closed this year. They made \$47,000 on the Christmas tree light show, that should all go and pay the pools. Every penny of that because those are donations. Every penny of that should to go for the pools for lifeguards, there should be no lifeguards losing their jobs this year.

As far as the potholes go, there is potholes on every street in every avenue in the City of Scranton. Simple as that. I don't know why we waste all of this time reporting potholes every week. You could drive on any avenue, any street in the City of Scranton from the beginning of that avenue to the end of the avenue and I guarantee you, you are going to find a pothole somewhere, and the same thing with the streets. So I don't know why all of this time is wasted on that.

I actually seen some people putting up new lights on Moosic Street today in front of Krispe Kreme, I don't know if that was state people or if that was city people or if it was a private contractor, I was unable to get the name off the truck. I don't know if that was state doing it or the city or contractors were doing it, but it was nice to see from lights being replaced on Moosic Street in front of Krispe Kreme.

As far as building permits, I brought it up weeks ago, months ago, did we ever get an answer on that? About the \$19 and that were paid for building permits for the site up there off the interstate. You guys submitted a letter about two months did we ever get an answer on that?

MS. EVANS: I don't believe so.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Nonprofits. You are never going to get any money out of nonprofits because they don't have to pay, they don't want to, simple as that, we are wasting our time.

As far as jobs and stuff like that being created, I have been talking about

that for eight years. You know how jobs are created, the Chamber of Commerce creates jobs, okay? That's their job, okay? Now, what we need to do is we need to lower the taxes. You want jobs in this city, you need to lower the mercantile tax, and you guys did do that in 2011, okay, but it needs to be lower. The wage tax needs to be lowered. The street needs to be repaired. I have talked about these issues many times that's what needs to be done to create jobs and bring good paying jobs into this area.

Now, okay, one last thing, the demographics in this city are changing compared to the 2010 census, and I talked about this seven or eight years ago at the South Side Neighborhood Association and I told people then, get used to it because it's going to keep changing, and I think if the City of Scranton was smart they would start testing minorities right now for fire department positions and police department positions. I saw where 30 police officers went to a course to learn how to deal with Latinos, well, if you have Latinos dealing

with Latinos maybe you don't have to send people to courses, so we need the city -- we really need to start looking at hiring minorities because the city is turning into a minority city and five years from now there will be more minorities in the City of Scranton than there are non-minorities, so we really need to wake up and start changing our attitude because the days of what has been in the past are far over with now, and people need to accept that.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MR. PILCHESKY: Joe Pilchesky, 819
Sunset Street, activist and advocate for
free speech. Also, good evening, how are
you?

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. PILCHESKY: I appeared here three weeks ago and shared with you that the pool house at Nay Aug Park is 1/4 the size required by state and health safety laws at the same time for what's built there, I also explained to you that it cost four times more than what it should have cost. We have

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an unfinished \$70,000 pool house that costs us about \$280,000.

It takes the complicity of a lot of people to make that happen which is why the pool house is appropriately symbolic of the vast corruption of the Doherty administration in terms of greed and the unethical and the criminal mindset to rape the taxpayers.

So who are these people? those who had to be on board with this level of taxpayer rape are two very prominent watchdogs, the first is the Department of Health located in Wilkes-Barre, which had the duty at law, mandatory duty at law, by the way, to approve the plans and final construction of this building. It may or it may not have issued a permit for the proper plans, but if it did one inspection, just one inspection on what was actually being built, it would have known that the pool house was severely below health and safety standards. Chris Doherty somehow got the Department of Health to turn it's head, which is a very hard thing to accomplish at

the state without Senator Mellow's approval.

The second watchdog is the Office of the City Controller, which is run by Mrs. Novembrino. It's Mrs. Novembrino's obligation and duty to the public was to assure and receive the building had paid for. Since the taxpayers didn't get the building they paid for, I'm publically requesting of Mrs. Novembrino to appear here at this council and answer the following questions:

One, how did we get a pool house less than 1,500 square feet in size when the contracts submitted by our architect Hemler and Canay called for a 2,500 foot square foot pool house?

Two, why did the contractor provide for a payout schedule that paid Hemler and Canay \$230,000 of the \$280,000 charged to build the pool house before any construction had begun? It's very rare to find a \$200,000 upfront payment on a \$280,000 project, but that happened here.

What measures did Mrs. Novembrino take to ensure that the pool house was being

built according to all health and safety codes, laws or regulations, that is, to protect the public, more specifically, the children who used the facility.

And finally, most important,

Mrs. Novembrino, how did Chris Doherty get
you to also turn your head on a project
involving the health and safety of tens of
thousands of kids per swimming season.

Did Mrs. Novembrino fall asleep at the wheel or did Chris Doherty instruct her not to get behind the wheel? Whether it's the former or the latter, we are out about \$210,000 in overcharges on this pathetic under built pool house with no way to recover one red cent of it.

That being said, I look forward to Mrs. Novembrino, our city controller, appearing here in the very near future to explain to the public how this was allowed to happen. Thank you very much.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else who cares to address council? Mrs. Krake?

MS. KRAKE: FIFTH ORDER. NO BUSINESS-- 5-A. MOTIONS.

MS. EVANS: Councilman McGoff, do you have any comments or motions?

MR. MCGOFF: First of all, I, too, would like to wish luck to the West Scranton boys' basketball team. They are playing Marie Ferretti, who is the defending state champion and also ranked number one in the state in AAA. It will be a yoman effort to come out victorious, I'm sure, but hopefully they are capable.

Just a quick response to a couple of things. While I realize that the clean up from the parade is costly because of the volumes of people that are in the downtown area, that the bars and businesses that do exist there, they pay taxes as well. It's not as if they are given a free ride on this, so it's not completely -- they are not completely not paying for the clean up. They are part of the taxpayers.

And very quickly, the last thing, we did receive something from PennDOT on the traffic signalization, it says: "Pending the arrival of the final plans, special provisions, an estimate from the city's

consultant, the scheduled let date for the above-mentioned project is the Spring of 2011, the estimated completion for the project is planned to be in the Fall of 2012."

Hopefully that is on time and completed within that time period, and that's all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. McGoff.
Mr. Loscombe, do you have any comments or
motions?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, thank you, Mrs. Evans, just a couple of quick items.

Mr. Spindler mentioned and it was on my notes, about the streetlight problem that we have at this time. I believe a contract was just awarded, so it may be a matter of just trying to get it coordinated. I would hope to see by next week some of these major light issues taken care of. And also,

Mrs. Krake, if you could see if they have a website set up yet that the residents can report over the website any lights that are out with a pole number, but there are a significant number. I went down Lackawanna

Avenue the other night and probably 60 percent of the lights on Lackawanna Avenue from the 200 block to the 500 block are out and totally out on the West Lackawanna Avenue bridge, West Linden Street bridge, and the lights heading out of town on the Scranton expressway. We had submitted this, this letter before, but I don't know if it was submitted to this company or the prior company, so if we could follow-up with them, and I would appreciate that.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Loscombe, could I just interrupt a second, I know that that -- that the bids were in and that I believe it was approved, but doesn't that have to come before us for final approval the contract?

MS. EVANS: I would think so?

MR. MCGOFF: Because, as I mentioned before, I think there are -- there are some questions that need to be answered about the way the RFP was prepared and whether it will provide the necessary -- what do I want to say, whether the company will be able to do the maintenance on all of the lights, all of the streetlights in the City of Scranton,

all of them. There were some questions about that, so before or when it does come to us I think there will be some questions that need to be answered.

MS. EVANS: I can tell you to date we have not received any legislation regarding that contract.

MR. MCGOFF: I know.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Perhaps we can send a letter to the solicitor's officer and request information on that, too, if you have legislation there.

MS. KRAKE: We actually did receive the contract and it was just for the clerk's signature which verifies the signature from the mayor, and we did speak to Joyce Electrical on that day because it was immediately following the council meeting where we had the requests, and it seemed to me that everyone was under the impression that we would be starting immediately as soon as they received a copy of that contract. So, therefore, I did not get any instructions or any information that we would be getting any legislation. I just

think the contract went through per the RFP and the bidding process. If you have any questions concerning that though we can send a letter.

MS. EVANS: Yes, let's send the letter so we can clarify this.

MS. KRAKE: Okay.

MS. EVANS: If there should, indeed, be legislation and if it isn't required why not.

MS. KRAKE: Okay.

MR. LOSCOMBE: And just finally, we had some discussion again here at the meeting this evening regarding the Mulberry Lofts. Last Wednesday, Mrs. Evans and myself were invited to a meeting by Mr. Jefferson, and we met him at the Connell Lofts. We were given a tour of the Connell building. I'll tell you, if anyone is familiar with the old Connell building they have kept the integrity, the architectural integrity, the lobbies, the brass mail boxes, the existing marble, existing doorways, door frames, the historic windows and stuff like that and built their units

around that. I was impressed. I think it was a first class job when I was there and we so stated that in our meeting with Mr. Jefferson.

Also, at the meeting was Miss
Kalinowski, I believe it's his marketing
director, I'm not sure if I have the title
correct, but we did spend several hours
discussing different options. We told him
where we stood as we have stated here prior,
that we were happy to approve the grant for
the Mulberry Lofts' building, however, we
still wanted the taxes paid, and this is
something come forward everyone is going to
have to do the same thing. We are not an
open checkbook anymore.

Again, he is a professional developer, he has completed the work he said he was going to do and, I mean, we do have developments that were given money in this city that are still sitting vacant and whatever, but we represent the 70,000 plus taxpayers in this city, not certain developers, and again, as I stated, it's nothing personal, Mr. Jefferson did a first

class job there.

It was a very cordial meeting.

Mrs. Evans and myself had a chance to discuss all of the options with him and we left the meeting that day with him knowing the options. He did make a statement, as he stated here prior that the developer has to make money not lose money, and we stated that the city cannot lose anymore money.

He did state he was going to meet with the county officials that Friday, this past Friday, and was supposed to get ahold of Mrs. Evans later on Friday from what I understand, I don't believe he has made contact at this point.

MS. EVANS: No, to date he hasn't.

MR. LOSCOMBE: And we also offered on behalf the city, city council -- on behalf of the city council, excuse me, to speak with the county officials and the school district officials and let them know, you know, what our offer was, what we were going to do. But again, we have haven't heard anything. We left the meeting with, you know, great pride in what he has done

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with that building and hopefully he will continue to do with the Mulberry Lofts, and hopefully the resolution is to everybody's satisfaction, but at this point the ball is in Mr. Jefferson's court.

I know he loves this city. addressed that to us on several occasions as we love the city and we have to look out for what's best for all of the taxpayers here, but I'm just hoping that he would come to a decision soon so that the project can move forward and hopefully, you know, he would look at more development in the downtown and we would be more than cooperative, but we do have to watch the purse strings for our taxpayers, also, and that's where we are coming from, and perhaps Mrs. Evans will address some more when she has her comments, but I think it was a very good, amicable productive meeting and I was happy to have been invited there. And that's all I have to say. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: And thank
you, Councilman Loscombe. Councilman Joyce,
any comments or motions?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. It was brought to my attention that we may have an emergent situation in the Treasurer's Office, in fact, in the collection of the back taxes. I was informed in December of 2010 when the staff in the Treasury performed the tax search, that the delinquent tax information provided by NCC on a designated terminal in the Treasurer's Office was reading close by agencies request and showed a zero balance.

Two to three weeks later, the tax clerk found upon performing research there were delinquent taxes owed for some of the properties that previously had a zero balance due. Unfortunately, NCC never instructed the office that all accounts were zeroed out on the opening screen and that further research was needed.

Well, obviously, this creates quiet an issue. Once the office became aware of the problem future searches were correctly performed, therefore, prior to this, if anyone purchasing a property requested a search they did not get the current information provided to them as to how much

delinquent taxes they owed to the city upon purchase of the property.

In the 2011 budget, Mayor Doherty eliminated the tax clerk position in the Treasurer's Office. It was council's assumption that when this position was eliminated that there would be ample manpower available to perform searches. However, as I have been informed, a backlog of dozens of searches have been piling up. Many of these searches are for real estate closings and the payment of delinquent taxes owed obviously brings much needed revenue into the city.

With this situation occurring,

Mrs. Krake, if you could please a send a

letter to Mr. Boland and also contact him

inquiring if he has the adequate staff to

handle the pileup of searches that are

currently existing. In addition, if

Mr. Boland does not have the adequate

staffing due to the administration's

elimination of the tax clerk in the office,

I would like to remind that the Unemployment

Compensation Fund should be approximately

\$78,400 over what we should actually use due to the fact that four DPW foremen were reinstated back into the 2011 operating budget by Mayor Chris Doherty.

Just to give you a snapshot of how I arrived at that figure, as per former business administrator Stu Renda, the way that unemployment was calculated for positions being eliminated in the budget was to simply allocate half of what the annual base salary was for that position per year. Each of those foremen earned \$39,200, so if you take 50 percent of that and multiply it by four you come up with \$78,400.

Okay, that's the first issue.

And finally, I have some citizens' requests. First I'd like to address the 300 block of Merrifield Avenue. Various residents on the 300 block of Merrifield Avenue have informed me that there are numerous potholes and cracks in the road making for a very bumpy ride. Mrs. Krake, if you could please inform Mr. Brazil of this situation and ask him to repair the road once weather permits.

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Also, a few residents in the Keyser Valley section of West Scranton have informed me that there is a large pothole at the stop sign connecting Lafayette Street and Cameron Avenue. Mrs. Krake, if you could please also add this to that letter.

In addition, various residents of North Scranton as well as a couple of workers at the Career Technology Center informed me that there are numerous potholes and cracks in the road making travel conditions rough for both residents and travelers on Greenbush and Reese Street. This is a recurring issue and I know some of the residents did state that the DPW last year did come up and fill some of the holes but, obviously, as you know, with the plowing and the snow and the ice build up I'm sure that has dissipated and some of those cracks are reopened, so if you could please also add this to the letter to Mr. Brazil.

In addition, a few residents in the Bellevue section have informed me that the 300 block of Railroad Avenue contains

numerous potholes, so if we would please inform Mr. Brazil of this and ask him if he repair this as soon as possible, as this is a very heavily traveled connector between West Side and South Scranton and also into the downtown area.

Minooka residents have informed me that since snow and ice is cleared off on Kane Street travel conditions are quite subpar, various cracks in the roads are making very difficult to travel conditions, so if we can add that to the letter as well.

A few comments that were made in tonight's meeting, as Mr. Piccolino stated, if you could please add to the letter to Mr. Brazil informing him of the various potholes in the four to 600 block of Beach Street, and also Mr. Spindler reported that the stop sign is heavily faded on the corner of Amity Court and Keyser Avenue, if you could please ask Mr. Brazil to have this repaired as soon as possibly can be done, and also if some of the potholes in the block of Amity Court before the stop sign can be taken care of.

In addition, if you could add to this letter as well the 1700 block of West Gibson Street where large potholes are in existence and causing very rough travel conditions.

And also, last but not least, with citizens' requests we received a request into the office that on March 4 it was requested that large potholes on Curtis Lane be filled, just if the resident is watching I would just ask that you could be somewhat be patient. I have seen DPW crews out patching up streets and doing various roadwork. I saw them actually on South Sherman Avenue on my way to work today. Usually, they do respond within a few weeks, so I would just ask you be patient with them and as there is a lot of work to be done.

Finally, Mrs. Schumacher mentioned in the 2009 audit report under amendments and contingencies that we have some outstanding lawsuits against the city. Mrs. Krake, if you could please send a letter to Mr. Kelly and copy Mr. Renda -- or, I'm sorry, Mr. Renda, Mr. McGowan, and ask him

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how many suits are currently still pending against the city and also Mrs. Schumacher mentioned that two of the cases were from contractors, if you could please inquire who they are as well as how many contracts they currently have with the city.

And last, but not least, I know I said that before, but I wrote one last thing down, Mr. Jackowitz asked about the funding for the Armed Forces parade and the St. Patrick's Day parade, personally I know from budget amendments I did not see a specific line item that allocated any funding towards either one of these events. I could be wrong, but I believe I am not, but I do know that from examining some of the RE-RE fund vouchers from previous years that funding was allocated to various events such as First Night. So, Mrs. Krake, if you could please contact Mrs. Aebli and ask her if any of funding was provided to the Armed Forces parade out of the RE-RE account or any other account in that office, and that is all for tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Councilman

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And thank you for bearing with me. Joyce. Good evening. Tonight's agenda includes legislation in Sixth Order restricting the spending of the second UDAG repayment On March 1, 2011, city account monies. council requested copies of vouchers for this UDAG RE-RE account from February 2011. While the administration was fully aware of the legislation on council's weekly agenda, it continued to spend these monies, a total of \$17,550 was spent for a \$300 program ad, a table for ten guests at a charitable gala for \$1,250, and a \$5,000 donation to Scranton Tomorrow, among others.

As a result, I suggest that city council suspend it's rules this evening to move the UDAG RE-RE second payment legislation into Seventh Order for a final vote this evening before an additional \$20,000 or more is spent in March.

The administration faces large budget deficits, Court awards and significant paving needs this year and cannot afford to spend these repayment funds in it's usual fashion.

Also, Mrs. Krake, please send a letter to Mrs. Novembrino requesting monthly vouchers from the UDAG RE-RE account effective March 1, 2011.

Two weeks ago city council tabled legislation for a \$250,000 grant for the sidewalk installation at the Connell building. Council requested an explanation for the change of a prior loan to the Connell building to a grant and itemized bills for the installation of the sidewalks. We received a response from Mrs. Aebli on March 11, which states that the \$500,000 to Scranton Connell, LP, is a loan, not a grant.

In addition, council asked it's solicitor, Attorney Hughes, to review the legislation, and I ask Attorney Hughes to report on his findings at this time regarding the sidewalks located in front of the Connell building.

MR. HUGHES: Yes. Madam President.

The one thing I believe why this was tabled was Ms. Aebli's letter, I quote the last paragraph, second sentence of the last

paragraph on page one, it says, "The sidewalks are a public right-of-way. This should be a grant instead of a loan from the city to Connell, LP as was the \$500,000."

It's my understanding, and I have gotten from the Assessor's Office an assessment map of the Connell building, actually it's the 100 block of North Washington Avenue, and this is the computer printout, this is the printout of the aerial photograph of the Connell building, the Connell building is 135 feet, four inches wide, 150 wide deep from Washington Avenue to the alley, and on here there is a green line which shows the public right-of-way for North Washington Avenue.

It appears that ten feet,
approximately ten feet of the sidewalk is
built within the right-of-way of North
Washington Avenue so that would be,
according to Ms. Aebli's letter, that would
be within the public right-of-way. However,
let's say about ten feet of the sidewalk
area is built within what's known as
privilege area, which is the right of the

Connell building in this area, which would be private property, so I think that with that, the entire sidewalk is not built within the public right-of-way.

I know that when the mall was built on Lackawanna Avenue this privilege area, this ten-foot privilege area we obtained a deed from the PNC Bank which was the successor of Lackawanna and the trustee of Northeastern Bank as the trustee of the Lackawanna Iron and Coal Company, and that ten-foot area was outright conveyed to the mall, so that the mall is built within that area. You couldn't build anything in there, which is the vaults, so that the sidewalks at the mall are totally within the right-of-way of Lackawanna Avenue.

Here it appears -- here it's evident from the Assessor's map that this ten feet is located within the privilege area which really belongs, I believe, to the Connell building, and only half of the sidewalk is within the right-of-way, so I think the issue to get this legislation back onto the table for a discussion would be to write a

letter to Ms. Aebli and ask her to clarify this. I'll give this map to Nancy, Mrs, Krake, so that whether this would qualify for a grant due to the fact that only ten of the 25 feet of sidewalk, now I'm just using an estimate, is within the public right-of-way. Does the fact that the other ten feet is not within the public right-of-way but is used for a sidewalk, does this still qualify as being in the public right-of-way so it can be a grant instead of a loan. I hope I made myself clear on that.

MS. EVANS: Yes, you did. Thank you very much, Solicitor Hughes, and in that letter, Mrs. Krake, if you could ask as well what are the requirements of the HRA grant and must all sidewalks be located within the public right-of-way to receive this HRA grant for \$255,000. And if she could also provide a complete copy of the grant requirements with particular emphasis on the sidewalk's eligibility, and I think if I heard our attorney correctly what he is saying is the sidewalks installed at the

Connell building are partially privately owned by Scranton Connell, LP, and are partially a public right-of-way, and so they certainly need to examine the grant requirements more closely and if necessary draft new legislation.

Next, city council received a response on March 9, 2011, from Attorney Paul Kelly, acting in his capacity as the Scranton Parking Authority solicitor, not in his full-time position of City solicitor, regarding the implementation of the StreetSmart program. Attorney Kelly received and enclosed the opinions of Boyd Hughes, council solicitor, and John Brazil, controller's solicitor.

Attorney Kelly states in part: "The decision to implement the system is the city's decision, as the meters are owned by the city. It is my opinion that StreetSmart will have a very difficult burden in proving that is a sole source and it would be prudent and responsible for the city to bid this service out via RFP."

Attorney Kelly also includes copies

of e-mails between himself and Mr. Chad Randall, COO of IPS Group, Incorporated, and between Ryan McGowan, business administrator, and Mr. Peter Selgato, senior vice president and head of sales from Street Line, Incorporated, in which Mr. Selgato states, "Appreciate the response and receipt of the RFP materials. Hopefully you still need it."

While the administration and Attorney Kelly, who is acting as the Parking Authority solicitor and city solicitor, presenting a clear conflict of interest, are contacting competitive companies and circulating RFP materials among themselves, they are preventing the implementation of a test or a trial period, and more troubling they are postponing the implementation of a new source of revenue.

Rather than the City of Scranton realizing approximately \$300,000 in new revenue this year, the city will realize far less if any revenue at all because the administration is dragging it's feet.

At this time, I ask Attorney Hughes

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to read or comment on the second letter he forwarded to Attorney Kelly regarding the sole source designation and the increased costs attached to implementation of competitor's companies.

MR. HUGHES: Council has a copy of my letter to Attorney Kelly dated March 11, 2011.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. HUGHES: And I forwarded that down, everybody has a copy of that. was written basically in response to what Attorney Brazil wrote and in his letter to Attorney Kelly regarding the sole source He referred to the Administrative biddina. Code Article VI-14 E-2 for sole source He said it had very limited bidding. application and he further stated, and I quote, "But I do not see anything indicating that there is no other company that provides an equally satisfactory alternative. Would you please advise as to whether or not any such information existing/exists."

What I did and from my knowledge and quoting my letter back in March 8, from my

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investigation the City of Easton has implemented the StreetSmart program on a sole source basis. They are very satisfied with it, it was a test of 50 meters, they are expanding it now to an additional 105. Based on my knowledge of the StreetSmart program I put in the letter that, and I'll quote it, "It is my understanding that StreetSmart Technology, LLC, ("StreetSmart") has submitted documentation in it's proposal to the Scranton Parking Authority, SPA, to verify that there is no other company that provides an equally satisfactory alternative which supports it's being a sole source provider. It is my understanding that the StreetSmart is the only company that can integrate vehicle space monitoring with the coin operated parking meter which is what The other companies, Street Scranton uses. Line, MetWorks and IPS Group must integrate their systems either with a multiple space credit card kiosk o with an IPS credit card Multi-kiosks and credit card readers incur additional costs above the cost for vehicle detection such as a percentage for

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each transaction plus financial institution fees."

But, I'm just looking at it, is that it's my understanding, and I don't believe that StreetSmart has what's known as a process patent, but they have integrated the meters with other technical capability to create the StreetSmart system with coin operated meters. The other two people that -- or the other two companies, Street Lines Networks and the IPS group, they basically have another system where it must be a credit card type operation. What I have learned from some other cities that have had some of these other systems is that they actually lose money because of the transactions that were incurred and that the Authority would be charged for the use of the credit card.

Whereas, with the StreetSmart
system, you can either use the coins or you
use the tokens that you buy here at the
Treasurer's Office and nothing has to be
added to the system. There is no
transaction fees on that whereas when you

use a credit card that there is the -- there is a processing fee so if somebody puts 50 cents on it or let's say a dollar there may be a 14 cent fee, 14 cents deducted from the dollar, plus there might be up to another 25 cents from the credit card company deducted from the revenue, so on one dollar that comes in you would be losing approximately 40 cents, you would only be getting 60 cents revenue, you wouldn't have that with the StreetSmart.

So while there might be competing systems, that when you look at what the specifications are, then the other things that you would have to obtain and the deductions for the processing on the credit card basis, the amount of revenue would be produced, you know, would be much less. I believe the City of Reading had the IPS system in and they because they lost money on it because of the credit card transaction they have removed that system from Reading.

I also stated there is two other things, although, I don't believe it goes to the sole source item, that it certainly go

would go the qualifications of the bidder in the overall cost to determine which program would produce more revenue for the city, and I put that in my letter, that StreetSmart is the only company that will install their complete system and make it fully operational without any upfront cost to the city, and will also provide a no risk contract here in the city will increase it's revenues above the revenues prior to the installation of the system.

I have written many specifications, but the bidding contracts and requests for proposals, while this would not be a sole source item, it would certainly go to the quality and the qualifications of the bidders to the amount of money which be produced by the city on those two items so that's not, as I stated not sole source, but it would certainly aid in determining what the amount of the revenues would be produced for the city.

It would appear, I mean, I just want to get this out to Jack Brazil because he did raise that issue and I also referred him

to my letter of March 8, which he has a copy of. I haven't heard back from either Jack or Paul since this letter went out, as of today I haven't.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Can I just make a comment, Mrs. Evans?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Again, it's another delay tactic. The city and the Parking Authority desperately need money, yet they are delaying these incentives. I don't care if it's Street Line, Street Light or StreetSmart, all I want is the best product and when you specify granite countertops and you are going to end up with formica, it's going to backfire, and that's what we are looking, the specifications and the provisions that this company can provide us.

I have looked at all of these companies, and the one thing that really impressed me is the transparency and accountability that we would have with this company. Maybe that's what they are against. That's just a guess on my part. Thank you.

Loscombe and Attorney Hughes. And,
Mrs. Krake, please send a letter on behalf
of city council to the appropriate
department requesting any and all sole
source designations and contracts awarded by
sole source designations from January 1,
2002, through March 15, 2011.

To my knowledge, no RFP's have been issued by the administration for implementation of a new parking program to increase city revenue. It is March 15, over 11 weeks into the new year, and close to the closing of the first financial quarter, and still the administration continues to put off a parking program. When the 2011 revenue falls short in this account, the administration will be responsible.

I know that Councilman Joyce
discussed the issues apparent in the
Treasurer's Office. He was discussing a
backlog of I believe the approximately 100
tax searches, and I don't know if you
announced this or not, Mr. Joyce, so forgive
me if you did, but if any Scranton taxpayer

had requested a tax search he or she did not receive the correct information regarding tax delinquencies. So please contact the Scranton Treasurer's Office as soon as possible for a new tax search.

Next, city council received responses from Ms. Aebli, OECD director, to questions posed by Mr. Tom Ungvarsky.

Mr. Ungvarsky, I can provide you with a copy of the responses following tonight's meeting.

Also, with regard to an issue raised by Mrs. Schumacher earlier this evening, I double checked the backup for the loan that is included in agenda Item 7-D. The terms of the loan are ten years at a fixed rate of 5 percent. They do have a requirement to create two new positions, however, what I found particularly interesting and noticeably different from backups I've read over the last seven years, for this particular loan should this business fail to create those two positions within a three-year period then the loan repayment in full is due back to the city almost

immediately. I could not detect anywhere throughout the backup, once again, that this loan would every revert -- or not revert, but let's say transform into a grant.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: You're welcome.

Finally, I have a few citizens' requests for the week. Residents of Mt. Vernon Avenue request that the 2011 paving of the 900 block of Martha Avenue as well as Curtis Court. The city promised to pave Martha Avenue 11 years ago but it has only patched holes during the intervening years. The patching doesn't hold and residents of the Mt. Vernon Avenue, which is a one-way street, state that they have themselves patch the holes with dirt and rocks so that they are able to exit Mt. Vernon Avenue by way of Martha Avenue.

In addition, residents report that the garbage trucks no longer pick up trash from Martha Avenue due to the impassable road conditions. Please add the 900 block of Martha Avenue and Curtis Lane to the 2011 paving list and help these residents who

have waited 11 years by paving these alleys.

Also, I have been asked to announce that residents report that two street cleaners were working today on East Mountain Road and that's satisfies their request.

Also, a resident of the 2200 block of Prospect Avenue reported that the streetlight in front of 2210 Prospect Avenue has been out since December, and I have the pole number, Mrs. Krake, which I will give you after the meeting.
