18	MS. EVANS: Are there any
19	comments? If not, received and filed.
20	Clerk's notes, please.
21	MS. KRAKE: This evening we have
22	a couple responses. The first
23	response is from Linda Aebli, Director
24	of OECD. We had asked about the
25	contributions to the St. Patrick's Day

parade and the Armed Forces Day

luncheon. Mrs. Aebli responds that in

2010 the following was dispersed. The

St. Patrick's Day Parade RE-RE

account, \$5,000; Armed Forces Day

luncheon RE-RE account, \$120.

MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake, if we could contact Miss Aebli once again, please. I think perhaps the individual who posed the question might want to know what was spent currently in 2011. So we can resubmit that and than also for council's benefit what was spent in 2009.

MS. KRAKE: We will.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MS. KRAKE: We also received a response and actually Mr. Joyce from Joyce Electrical stopped into the Council Office with this response:

"Joyce Electrical is in receipt
of our letters dated March 3rd and
March 16th requesting streetlight
repairs. We absolutely understand
your concerns on streetlights that are

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out throughout the city. The contract between Joyce Electrical and the City of Scranton was signed by all parties on March 8th. 2011. On March 9th the City of Scranton's Purchasing Office directed us to contact the Department of Public Works for directions on how the contract and operations will work. We met with the Director of Public Works on March 16th. The contract clearly states that the contractor will be directed by the Director of Public Works. At our meeting we gave a web site address to report outages along with the telephone number for residences that do not have access to a computer to report streetlight outages. We also learned through the meeting that the city is going to be purchasing the material to repair the lights. The director will notify me when the material is in place and when we are to start working on the repairs. We are ready and willing to start working on the lights with

materials and equipment but cannot start because the city chose the option of purchasing the material and we do not have authorization to start any work at this time."

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs.

Krake. I think that is an important announcement for the public since so many streetlights are out that we understand that they will continue in that matter until the city purchases whatever equipment is necessary for Joyce Electrical and that was the decision of the city, not Joyce Electrical.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Excuse me. Did I understand that the web site is not going to be public either, it's specifically going to be accessible by DPW?

MS. KRAKE: Well, here's his last comment, "And then you can direct our offices as needed. The contract does not permit us to release the web site or any other contact information to

anybody else but the Director of
Public Works. We have, however,
entered any and all complaints
received as of March 8th to the web
site and the director is notified
every time there is an entry to the
web site."

MS. EVANS: I see. So that I believe what you are saying is all requests have to be submitted to Mr. Brazil.

MS. KRAKE: Yes, and I can tell you that we could see where Mr. Joyce came into our office that he was very eager to begin work, he is aware of many of these outages and perhaps our friends and neighbors are of his also. So they are ready to go.

MS. EVANS: Well, then I believe that council will have to submit its request for streetlight repairs to Mr. Brazil and then it will be up to Mr. Brazil when the streetlights will be repaired and which ones will be repaired. Hopefully he'll be taking

1 care of each and everyone. 2 (Councilman Joyce arrives and 3 presents himself at council table.) 4 MS. KRAKE: Our next response is 5 from Chief Davis, Superintendent of 6 Fire. He tells us that the Scranton 7 Fire Department spent zero amount of 8 overtime for the weekend of 9 March 12th, 2011. Now, we had asked 10 also the Police Department, DPW, Chief 11 Duffy; Ryan McGowan, Assistant 12 Administrator; and the City 13 Controller. However, we do also 14 notice that these responses aren't 15 technically due until April 1st. 16 And that's it. 17 MS. EVANS: Okay. Thank you. Do 18 any council members have announcements 19 at this time? 20 MR. McGOFF: Once again I would 21 just like to announce the Easter 22 Extravaganza being put on my Matthew's 23 Mission. It's basically an Easter egg 24 hunt and other activities for 25 families. It will be held on

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Saturday, April 9th, at Harmon Field in South Scranton beginning at 11 a.m. with the Easter egg hunt beginning at 11:30 and this is in honor of Matthew J. Knoll and all funds or profits will be given to benefit people with special needs. That's April 9th, 11 a.m. at Harmon, the Easter Extravaganza. I would like to say that there were a number -- they were filling Easter eggs, the plastic eggs at Kelly's the other day, Kelly's Restaurant on Sunday and there was a large crowd there to respond and fill eggs and this is going to be a very, very nice event and we encourage anyone, especially anyone with children to attend.

MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER.
CITIZENS PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker this evening is Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, South Scranton, Fellow Scrantonians. When I first started to come to these meetings at the end of Mayor Connors, the beginning of Mayor Doherty's meetings, why do we have trouble with the streetlights? Because Mayor Doherty bought them. He didn't have to buy them. The electric company was taking care of them. Now we're in the dark. He's spent a lot money all at Whatever his reasons were, they once. didn't pan out. All he did was actually sink us deeper and deeper in

debt. Many of the councilmen that
were up there during that time were
given pensions in violation of the
city charter. Why were they given
pensions? I have no idea. I have no
idea of any of the sequential
councilmen that came if they were
given promises. We don't do not know.
But where we are now started back then
and it has continued from up to the
present. When you get a majority
people that side with the mayor and
care little or nothing about the
community that they're in, something
is wrong.

I don't know if you remember back how many loans were given out with the provisions to forgive them. They were given, they were forgiven very little, they were forgiven the money, thousands and thousands of dollars went down that way. What the reasons were, I don't know. But there had to be reasons.

People got out, look at things as

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they are and then reason it out.

Sometimes you make a wrong conclusion

but you've got to make a conclusion.

And if you look at what was done in

the city the last -- well, just go

back almost 12 years, the path that

went down, where we stand today, take

a look at that Scranton Parking

Authority. I'm going to bring this up

and continue until we find out how

they're going to deal with that loan

and who okayed it. Who sat down there

and voted for these things. They

should be held responsible for their

votes. All of you should be held

accountable for what you do up there.

It's just too bad there's no recall

provisions in the state or we probably

could have a lot more actually than

earlier. Every four years is a poor

time to try to correct things that

were done in the past. It just can't

be done because you're stuck with

them. You can't get rid of them

wrongs and that's the problem. That's

the problem with the government as it is today. People should to be held accountable by their actions, maybe every year, every two years, but definitely not four years. There's too much damage being done. And what I am I going to say, what can anyone say, Scranton is sliding down into an abyss is the best way to put it. We can't let the Parking Authority, of course, go belly up. That would reflect on all of us and probably wouldn't change -- probably make the burden a lot heavier on us than it is I'm just sorry you have do these decisions that you don't like to deal with, because it's probably going to come before you in some form. then you have to look at the two evils. That's the bad thing about government.

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People used to be more responsible to the needs of people.

In fact, they used to really, really go out and do whatever they could for

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1 each and every individual taxpayer in 2 the city, you're a resident. Nowadays 3 they're more interested in themselves 4 than the people they represent. It's 5 a sad state of affairs. It's just 6 something that we have to live with 7 until either we change the system or, 8 I don't know, if you don't change the 9 system, then you're stuck with what we 10 have now. And although it is good, 11 you couldn't get a better government 12 the way you run a government than we 13 have but you've got to look at every 14 individual in that government and look 15 at what they did in the past and how 16 they're going to reflect on the 17 future. I thank you. 18 MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. 19 Sbaraglia. Marie Shumacher? Bob 20 Bolus? 21 MR. BOLUS: Good evening, 22 Council. Bob Bolus, resident. 23 MS. EVANS: Good evening. MR. BOLUS: Good evening, 24 25 Council. Bob Bolus, Scranton. Ιt

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seems it's been an interesting day in the city now that I'm homeless. a new experience. As I think most people are aware that a condemnation notice has been filed on my house by the City of Scranton and I took it very seriously and I'll show council. This is what was put on my door condemning my home based on a fallacy by Mary Dunleavy, Joe Weschler, June Wintermantel and other people at East Mountain Neighborhood Association that said I didn't live there, that my home was vacant. They've invaded my privacy, they've spied on me, and we're going to deal with them now. They've made a laughing stock out of everybody with their false accusations yet they were nowhere to be seen when Mr. Hartman did an illegal building of his home on city owned property which I believe I submitted to council maps showing where the city owns the property that Mr. Weschler built on --It's or not Weschler but Hartman.

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been ongoing, it's taken us in litigation. These people didn't come forward when Mr. Hartman violated the agreement. Yeah, I was held in contempt because we blocked it to stop the abuse that was going on and the issues that he was creating and the threats that people were coming on my property. Now we're going to continue with litigation and we'll suffice. But the compromise was when this subdivision was built you will see going from East Mountain Lake under his home and the other home next to him a 16 and a half foot deeded right-of-way owned by the City of Scranton. It's a waterway. meant to drain the lake in the event of a problem. Well, the dam now has been compromised by this subdivision. It was approved by Don King. We challenged it. Hartman was fully aware before he built his home, he was building on city owned property and he ignored it and went ahead and did it.

His actions, that and the actions of the City of Scranton by allowing this to happen have caused substantial damage to my home where a water line broke and created a problem which is now going to be a part of major litigation. It was well televised. It showed the cement mixer backing over the easement where it damaged our line. We have engineering reports on it we just got this week and now we're going to proceed, and the city is going to be involved in it.

We sent a letter to Mr. Kelly.

Naturally he wants to be the next magistrate. Well, to be a magistrate you have to sit there in the wisdom of Solomon, not be a political crony. We sent him a letter, I hand delivered him the map showing him what was going on. After repeated attempts to meet him, we had this hearing, he showed up at the hearing. He requested now that I submit this information to him but he said you're represented by counsel.

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Well, Attorney Grabowski told him flat out he did not represent us in the Salton matter which was the subdivision and he issued the 16 and a half foot. And Mr. Kelly tries to skirt the issue. Well, we sent a couple letters. He responded with a letter today and I've sent it back to him. And let me put it in plain words and I'll submit this to council. effective -- Paul Kelly, Esquire, City Council Solicitor. I put in here, "I received and reviewed your letter of March 22nd. Let me refresh your recollection on this matter. When you appeared at a hearing approximately one month ago before the Honorable Judge Thompson seeking to intervene in a case that you not that long ago sought to be released from, discussion was held regarding the map which was provided to you with the referenced letter. You requested that you be provided with the map on the record of that proceeding, and I agreed with

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that request. The document you received is in response to your stated of request. You may return it if you know as with the intervention of prior release have a change of mind and do not want it any longer, feel free to give it back. As communicated with me as represented parties study the letter more carefully and you will realize that this is not the Hartman easement, rather it is a different matter wherein I am negotiating to purchase the city asset and formerly objecting to the elicited authorized building of homes by Hartman and his neighbors on city owned property. Naturally that's placing the city and abandoned waterway in jeopardy. advised that you are expected to respond to my offer on March 21st, 2011, letter and demand action contained herein within the confines of your job description. solicited and approved subdivision is in violation of the city charter

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together with a multitude of laws and regulations. Your failure to do so will result in the institution of a mandamus action against you in which we will seek the Court issue an order requiring you to perform the job responsibilities of your position. As to your sarcasm regarding my entitlement to possess my conclusions, be advised that these conclusions will become legal conclusions of law in a court decision unless you fulfill your responsibilities and properly entertain the offer which was made to you to rectify this illegal and elicit subdivision and the flagrant abuse of authority by your predecessor. It can only be concluded that you wish to supercede that flagrance by inactively and nonfeasance. In conclusion, you may be assured that this letter and your action will be brought to the attention of city council this evening, for that matter of the voting public from whom you now seek the

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endorsement for judicial office, Robert Bolus."

What this letter does, it sets apart that Mr. Kelly has ignored our repeated requests. We put an offer of \$50,000 which council has before them to buy the waterway. We don't intend to build on it. We intend to preserve it. Mr. Hartman has ignored that and city people here, we came to prior councils that Mr. McGoff was on also and it's been ignored and it's been a big joke. Well, I can assure you, Mr. McGoff, the joking is over and the matter is going to be taken very seriously. This is a city owned asset. You've squandered assets when you were in command in the past, and it's not going to happen this time. We are going to seek the judicial issue on this and resolve this matter. It's before council. I am making it available to the press tonight, and we're going to move forward, and we're going to get it resolved. But right

1	now the City of Scranton has a \$50,000
2	cash bid or opening bid for that
3	property right now. And if you think
4	that's chicken feed, Mr. McGoff, think
5	twice, because I really don't
6	appreciate the smirk when I was
7	talking.
8	MS. EVANS: Mr. Bolus.
9	MR. BOLUS: Yes, ma'am.
10	MS. EVANS: Just two points of
11	clarification for the audience.
12	Attorney Paul Kelly is not the council
13	solicitor. He is the city solicitor
14	and council can't sell land, city
15	owned property.
16	MR. BOLUS: I'm aware of that.
17	It's got to be brought before council,
18	it's got to come by the Law Department
19	from the city for council's approval.
20	MS. EVANS: Exactly.
21	MR. BOLUS: And the issues I've
22	raised are very serious issues. Mr.
23	Weschler who stuck his nose into this
24	issue back in '07 hired a whole bunch
25	of illegal immigrants when he was

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there. He didn't hire any city employees. He hired illegal immigrants and now he wants to run -and run the City of Scranton and say, Geez, vote for me. I'm going to be your best councilman. He's just another political crony that this city doesn't need. I wish more people could face what this council has done than the cronyism we've had in the past and it won't be tolerated this time around. And I can assure I will publicly be challenging both of you people for your council seat. You've got my word on that. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Bolus. Lee Morgan.

MR. HUGHES: Chairman, if I could, or president, before city property is sold it must be sent out to bid so there has to be the public advertisement. Of course, if Mr. Bolus makes an offer for \$50,000 for that property, that would be the upset price. Anybody else would have to

1 come in with a higher bid. That would 2 be the procedure. You just can't sell 3 city property outright. It has to be 4 sold to the highest bidder. 5 MS. EVANS: Thank you. I just 6 wanted the public to understand --7 MR. HUGHES: That's my opinion 8 and council cannot -- Since I'm not 9 the city solicitor. 10 MS. EVANS: Council does not have 11 the power to sell city owned property. 12 It must go through -- I'm sure the 13 administration, Mayor's Office and 14 most specifically the Law Department 15 and legislation is then drafted and 16 sent to city council for its approval 17 or it's denial. And next, once again, Lee Morgan. 18 19 Doug Miller. 20 MR. MILLER: Good evening, 21 council. Doug Miller, Scranton. 22 I would just like to begin this 23 evening by addressing the rumored cuts 24 that we're hearing the administration 25 is supposedly looking into making in

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the Fire Department. As I continuously stated in the past, I am strongly against any additional cuts to the department as well as any additional closures of engine companies. I think if we all remember, if the administration had gotten its way in this year's budget, we would have seen numerous police and firemen cut. But thanks to council, they were all reinstated and we could all sit back now as residents and be thankful for that action. As I've stated before, we can't continue to jeopardize the health and safety of the residents of our city. I'm proud to stand by our public safety members as I have always been and I won't back away from this issue as long as it keeps being addressed and to see how this is affecting the brave men and women who put their lives on the line for us each day. The residents in this city that pay their fair share, they deserve to have this protection

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and they shouldn't have to live in fear should they face a tragic event that hopefully would never occur. But the engine company should remain open, the firemen should remain in their position and like I said, I will continue to express my support and praise for these brave individuals.

The next thing I have here is I just wanted to take this time to briefly recognize a Scranton Police officer. I don't know if anybody had a chance to see the clipping in the Sunday Times with Officer Nancy She happens to be a close Baumann. family friend for a long time and, you know, seeing that it was nice to see that so I just wanted to recognize her here this evening. There was an incident that occurred, I believe, last Sunday which involved a woman who was involved in an accident off the McDade Expressway due to a coffee cup rolling underneath the pedals. But a long story short, it goes on to

explain that the woman was allegedly wanted for a robbery at a nearby hotel in Dunmore and that a Dunmore officer that was on scene happened to here Officer Baumann's voice on the other end and asked that this woman be placed -- taken into custody and while searching this individual, numerous amounts of heroin and pills and other things were found. So I just want to commend Officer Baumann and Officer Cali from Dunmore for their teamwork and taking a drug dealer and certainly the harm off the street. So I just wanted to commend them on that.

I would like to ask council if we have received the response regarding the request I made that dealt with the list of the payments that were made to Attorney Greco, I believe. Mr. Joyce, you were going to try to look into that.

MR. JOYCE: Yes, I haven't received that yet.

MR. MILLER: Okay. Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Actually we received a notification from the Redevelopment Authority that they weren't -- essentially they're not going to send us over invoices and whatnot but we could go down there and look at everything that was submitted by Attorney Greco. So in the forthcoming weeks one of us will be going down there to review those.

MR. MILLER: You know, my opinion on that is I believe that as council people that information should be sent right over to you. I don't think you should have to go down and get it.

That's my stance on that issue but I think that you should be given any information that you request. You were elected, you're council people, you represent the citizens and you shouldn't have to go through that aggravation. I apologize you have to deal with that because it just goes back to once again not being critical but the lack of cooperation in getting

simple requests and you shouldn't have to go through that. But I do appreciate, you know, your efforts in trying to solve this matter.

And I guess lastly tonight while I'm on this, a request that I made four weeks ago. I'm still waiting for an answer dealing with DPW and I believe I put this in writing was we would like to find out who's responsible for clearing crosswalks over in front of Willard, and I thought it was fitting to ask this tonight due that we're expecting some snow tonight, it will obviously be an issue in the morning. And I believe I made that request to Mr. McGoff so I guess I'll refer to him. Did you hear anything?

MR. McGOFF: All crosswalks are the responsible of DPW as long as it's in the street. Everything else would be the responsible of the school district.

MR. MILLER: Okay. Well, I

appreciate getting that answer finally. Now that that's cleared, I'm sure that will satisfy a lot of the parents in that area who obviously were frustrated that it took this long to get an answer but now it's clear, it's on the record and we know the situation.

And with that said, I believe that's all for this evening. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: I've got to tell you something real quick. I was eating at that buffet that used to be Charlie Browns on Commerce Boulevard last week and this lady came over and she's looking, I said, What the hell. She's just looking at me in front and then she looked at me and said, "Your shirt is clean." I guess my reputation is following me. Of course, I hadn't left there yet.

Well, I thought

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I'd talk about this pathetic governor under the thumb of the oil people because when he finishes, I guess the school board is going have a heyday with us. I just can't understand -he just seems so adverse to the people in this state, you know. He's just out of tune with us or something. Like I said, this NEIU, they had salaries up to \$2,000 a week and \$4,000 a week benefits, and he's worried about 42,000 people taking away their benefits and all this big money, nothing is being done about it. It's such a sadness when people need their medical care so bad. I don't know. While I'm thinking of budget cuts. I think United Way is crying about budget cuts. If they quit giving our -- I like what they do, but if they quit giving our money to buy \$200,000 houses to take off the tax roll, they'll have more money. while I'm thinking \$200,000 house, I have some people wondered about that

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house at 1500 Court that was KOZ'd by Todd O'Malley and the mayor. They wanted -- that comes up frequently.

You know, I have all these things I always forget to talk about in here.

Again, like I said last week, Wyoming County states that according to the state law of tax forgiveness is a courtesy, not a law. Now, Ronald McDonald house bought the property next door last week for \$105,000. They're going to tear it down and put a parking lot there. And I strongly support them. You know, I've sent them a little check now and then, but our priorities are for the people of this city that you put there, not Ronald McDonald House. There's no reason for a parking lot to be, you know, now tax exempt. You've got a tool to start using it. I don't want anybody to think I don't like Ronald McDonald House because I do. know, I know they do a lot of good. And I've had some people ask me, talk

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about Al Boscov, nobody ever mentions him, you know. When is he going to give us the money back or has he given us any money back? He makes Paul Savino look like a real piper. Then comes along, you know, the Goodwill, they make both these guys look like amateurs. There's two and a half million dollars missing which is the state's problem, I guess. But why can't we get that property back and sell it to some legitimate company. It's sitting there and nothing is being done. The money that was supposed to be used is gone. But, you know, like I said, that's state problems, I guess.

I had some guy tell me last week that I'm destroying the city talking against Jefferson. You know, he's not helping us. You know, my taxes haven't gone down. Your taxes, your taxes. What's he done for the city? He's done for himself. He's greedy. Charlie Jefferson is destroying the

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city. Paul Mansour is destroying the city. You have to pay the taxes. just, you know, I don't know why people -- I used to walk around, everybody used to like me when I went to the grocery store and the flea markets. Now, I've got all kinds of political enemies. If I say something this way, they're mad. If I say somebody the other way, they're mad. But these people aren't contributing to the welfare of this city. You know, every week we all got our cross to bear, I guess, but every week I hear such problems and like I've said before, I had a lady the other day tell me how her husband worked, you know, for years and years and they paid for the house and she couldn't afford the insurance and so on like I've heard, like we've all heard. But it's such a great sadness to hear somebody that owned a house and couldn't afford it anymore. You know, she's living in a high-rise, that one

on Washington. I don't know the name of it. But it's just heartbreaking that that happens to this country.

Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much. And the one -- just one clarification I wanted to make for everyone. I know that Mr. Ellman stated that his taxes haven't been decreased. Well, actually, yes. Real estate taxes in Scranton were decreased effective 2011 as well as the business privilege and mercantile business taxes. That was as I said effective January, 2011, and instituted by this council. Is there anyone else who would like to address council? Good evening, Dave.

MR. DOBZYN: Good evening,
council. Dave Dobzyn, resident of
Scranton, member of the Taxpayer's.
Express some concern on the Fire
Department changes and cuts and
rolling brownouts and whatever.
Everybody out there in TV land make
sure you have your new batteries in

your fire alarms, maybe you'll survive. Okay. I don't have a lot to complain about this week seeing as my property taxes were lowered. So we'll go with the golden parrot. Rick Synder -- I think it's Michigan or Ohio, I forgot my -- he wants to replace and fire all municipal officials who exceed five percent deficit and appoint a manager with the capability of nullifying local contracts and elections so bawk, bawk.

And the State of Georgia wants to eliminate the tax deduction for the blind in the name of deficit reduction, bawk, bawk, bawk.

And than our own Governor Tom

Corbett, of course, he has no new

revenue and we are facing down a raise
in school taxes, and I noticed reading
the Sunday Times, the largest cuts are
up in the counties that vote for his
party. So he gets a triple bawk,
bawk, bawk.

1 for the school property elimination 2 tax act. I don't hear them chirping 3 about that anymore like they were and 4 it sounded like a good deal but we're 5 cutting school -- school 6 appropriations and some are up in 7 Susquehanna County they're as high as \$1,200 a student and they really don't 8 9 have a good way of collecting wage taxes up there so how those schools 10 11 are going to manage is beyond me. 12 They're already talking about high 13 school band. Maybe we'll get lucky 14 and you'll have to listen to rap music 15 more of it. That's what we get for 16 cutting high school band, rap music, 17 bawk, bawk. Have a good night. 18 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there 19 anyone else who cares to address council? 20 21 MS. KRAKE: 5A. MOTIONS. 22 Mr. McGoff, do you MS. EVANS: 23 have any comments or motions? 24 MR. McGOFF: Very briefly. First 25 last week we had council talking a bit

about the Street Smart Program and the Meter Program and some of the problems are having getting it initiated. would like to maybe suggest that we perhaps stop arguing or trying to seek the soul source provider and put this out to bid and at least get into the process of implementing a program. If, in fact, Street Smart is the best program, then that would be -- that would, you know, play out in the bidding process and at least we could then get into increasing revenue from the parking meters and at least have part of --

MS. EVANS: I agree with what you're saying, Mr. McGoff, and frankly I wish that that had occurred back in January. I know that it's been the administration who's been questioning the sole source and postponing this over that issue. Our solicitor has had to respond a number of times. He did not initiate the postponement for the correspondences and I do fully

1 agree that this has languished for far 2 too long and I would like to see it 3 then put out for bid and as I said, 4 oh, I wish that was done months ago 5 because right now we would have 6 someone in there who is bringing in 7 new revenues to the city. 8 MR. McGOFF: Well, then perhaps 9 maybe as a council we can make a 10 request at this time to send someone 11 to the administration or legal office 12 and ask for an RFP to be developed and 13 to be bid as soon as possible. 14 MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake, can we send that letter, please, on behalf 15 16 of --17 MR. McGOFF: As long as we are 18 all in agreement with it. 19 MR. LOSCOMBE: Would it be 20 possible to have these other companies 21 come in to a caucus like the previous 22 provider and answer questions, too? 23 MS. EVANS: I would think as soon 24 as the proposals are submitted, 25 certainly we can have every company

come in. I think it's probably a good idea for the public to be advised of the advantages and disadvantages presented by each one of the proposals so as that process, if we can get the process kick started and as it's moving along, we can certainly bring in all of the companies who respond to the RFP.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I agree. Let's get it on.

MR. ROGAN: I agree as well.

There's nothing to lose by putting it out for bid. We already lost like three months, four months now in revenue that we should have been bringing in. I'm confident that from the research I've done, the Street Smart will be the most reasonable bidder but at least if we can get the ball moving again.

MR. McGOFF: Thank you. The second thing that I would like to ask is for I'd like to see a representative of Joyce Electric to

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appear at caucus to perhaps address some of the concerns that may exist about the streetlight maintenance. know in the past they said that I had heard from a number of people that there some concerns with the way the RFP was worded and the possibility that there were a large number of traffic lights -- streetlights throughout the city that Joyce Electric would not be able to maintain and that PP&L would need to do that which would be a very expensive situation.

MS. EVANS: We can certainly do that, and I think, in addition, we should probably request that Mr. Brazil attend the caucus as well have selected the bidder. I know when bids or proposals are submitted, they

19 because I would believe that he would 20 21 22 are then given to the appropriate 23 department head for their review and 24 then their recommendation as to the 25 lowest responsible bidder. So I'm

1 sure Mr. Brazil can help shed some 2 light on that. But in addition I 3 think it's also advantageous to have 4 Mr. Brazil present so that we can 5 establish publicly the chain of 6 command for the repair of the 7 streetlights and get a timeline on 8 them as well. 9 So, Mrs. Krake, maybe if we could 10 schedule that for possibly the next 11 Tuesday if both parties could be available. Would 6 o'clock be 12 sufficient, Mr. McGoff? 13 14 MR. McGOFF: I would believe so. MS. EVANS: At 6 o'clock and that 15 16 would be March 29th and if by any 17 possibility it's a conflict, a 18 scheduling conflict for either of the 19 individuals, then request the 20 following Tuesday, please. 21 MR. McGOFF: We may still be 22 getting snow next Tuesday. 23 And finally just one last thing, 24 I'm not going to engage in a war of words with Mr. Bolus here. I believe 25

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that the issues that he brings to us are issues that are being handled in the courts and that that is the proper venue for them. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: And thank you, Councilman McGoff.

Councilman Rogan, do you have any comments or motions?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. First, I would just like to apologize for missing last week's meeting. I was very sick for the last week and a half. Over the last couple weeks I received many e-mails and phone calls from people around the city talking about possible cuts coming down in the next few months. And one thing I want to make clear is that council cannot initiate those cuts in the middle of the year. We attempted to make cuts in the budget in the middle of the year last year and we were sued by the mayor and the courts ruled against us. Any cuts that are made mid year are not going to be done by council.

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will be done by the mayor. Council doesn't have the authority to cut police, fire, DPW in the middle of the year. We do our budget at the end of the year, and after the budget is passed, there's not much council could do as far as the cuts are concerned. So, you know, I've been hearing those cuts around about 30, 40 firemen being cut. Obviously I stand against that. What our budget did was we put those jobs back in. If it is done, it will not be done by council. I know the majority of us on here don't want to see that happen, and we hope that Mayor Doherty would listen to the people and do what's right. Keep our many firehouses open as we can and keep our cops on the streets.

Next I have a couple comments.

Mrs. Krake, I know there's an ordinance in the city banning shops from selling BB guns and things like that. I talked to a couple residents who actually own sports stores, owners

of sporting stores in the last week, and they were saying that with the new Walmart right over the border in Taylor, they're selling BB guns and things like that there and he was saying there are a lot of people they bring in, they want to introduce their kids, getting them into hunting and things like that, the smallest -- the only thing they can sell them is a They can legally sell that shotgun. but not the BB gun. Although I think we should be selling guns in the city, people have a right to carry them for their protection. But if you can just pull out the ordinance. I don't know when it was passed. I know it was probably 10, 20 years ago.

Next, I see we received a response from OECD regarding the \$250,000 for the sidewalks. Will that be the put on the agenda for a vote for next week?

MS. EVANS: That is a matter that I haven't actually read through Miss

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Aebli's response. I just got the mail that came in yesterday and today prior to council meeting. And it is a matter that I want Solicitor Hughes to look into carefully. Last week during your absence Attorney Hughes announced that the sidewalks are not completely a public right-of-way.

MR. ROGAN: I saw the meeting on TV. And as I stated, the first three votes I'm completely against. I don't want it to be voted forward but I want it to be voted down.

MS. EVANS: So what we're looking for, I believe, is our attorney's review of Miss Aebli's response and his direction on how we proceed and as soon as we have that, we'll get that on the agenda.

MR. ROGAN: Okay. So looking forward to a final vote and hopefully it will be shot down.

And finally I just have a couple citizen's requests. A resident called today saying the asphalt washed away

4	resurface. And second, I know this is
5	one that's been laboring, is the
6	potholes on Kane Street continuing to
7	be a problem and they're so bad the
8	vehicles are being damaged. So that

10	MR. JOYCE: Actually I mentioned
11	that last week in your absence.
12	MR. ROGAN: I saw that. And I
13	know it's been one since we've been
14	campaigning, it's been a mess. So
15	it's almost two years now.
16	MS. EVANS: And years before.
17	MR. ROGAN: No. I know it's been
18	sent to DPW multiple times but I'm not
19	going to let it die.
20	Mrs. Krake, would you please send
21	those to DPW.
22	And that's all I have for today.
23	Thank you.
24	MS. EVANS: Thank you. And
25	Councilman Loscombe any comments or

motions?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. Thank you.

Pardon my voice. I'm just getting

over a cold. But I just want to touch

base on two things and I'm glad Mr.

McGoff brought it up regarding the

street meter program and that.

I had the opportunity prior to this meeting to speak to one of the gentlemen in the gallery here who is a regular speaker, and he made me aware of something that I should have thought about but, you know, he speaks to the people on the street just like I do and I'm glad he bought this subject up to me. But a few people had approached him regarding the fact that I had known the gentleman from Street Smart previously, and I just wanted to give a little bit of a history of how this came about. I was contacted by Mr. Mansour -- actually I haven't seen him in about 30 years. I don't want to say how old -- how many years I graduated but it's been over

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30 years, and my mother had contacted me and said she received a voicemail, and she didn't know who it was from. She didn't know if it was for me or whatever. So the next day when I stopped down, I listened to the message. I said, "Well, here's a blast from the past. Yeah, I do know this guy." And I happened to give Mr. Mansour a call who is living in Reading and he said, "You remember me?" I said, "Of course, I remember you." You know, how could I forget a guy that big, you know, especially when I was a shrimp. But, you know, as old times, we started discussing on the phone but gave me a little bit of a history of what he was doing and how this came about, that he had approached the city a year prior to his contacting me, several meetings, I think we discussed that here and explained had several meetings with the mayor, Mr. Scopelliti, Mr. Renda at that time explaining the program,

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they were all in favor of it but, you know, all of a sudden they just drop the ball. Him being a native Scrantonian thought it would be a great idea to help the city out. And he happened to come across my name on-line reading the newspaper, whatever, and saw that I was on city council. So that's basically how he contacted me. After he had contacted me, I said, "Yeah. If you're up this way, stop by. I'll be happy to sit down with you and talk over old times and see what you have to offer us here." And trust me when he laid out the program, you know, I said, "This is exactly something that we need in the city." It's exactly something that, you know, I've been touting since I got on council looking for innovative ways to generate revenue in this city without coming out of the taxpayers' pockets and, you know, that's as innocent as it was. Other than that, I have no connection with

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Mr. Mansour. But after that, I did my homework, I went on-line, I made calls, I researched, I contacted these other cities and trust me and, again, I don't care if it's streetlight, Street Smart, Street Top, whatever it is, whoever gives us the best deal and it benefits the city, that's what I'm all about. The problem is we've been dragging our feet, you know. I mean, the other cities have used the sole source designation. I don't know why the city administration has been dragging on this other than to embarrass us in trying to reduce our income at a time when this income is But I appreciate, so sorely needed. you know, the opportunity to explain that and that's exactly how it came about. I don't see him, I don't speak to him on a regular basis. It was that couple times and he being a native Scrantonian thought it would be a benefit to the city also. But personally after looking at all the

programs out there, these other companies are trying to play catch up with Street Smart. So I would just hope when these RFPs are put out and whoever makes the selection looks at the whole picture. The only benefit I'm going to get out of it is the benefit to help the taxpayers and that's the truth, and I appreciate the gentleman for bringing that up to me so I could clarify that.

And just lastly, Mr. Rogan had touched on it as far as threats of massive layoffs this summer and all the city departments and stuff like that. I mean, look at it, our endless appeals, the lawyers are getting rich. The interest is compounding on a regular basis. These arbitrations, the language in these arbitrations are so strong, I don't know where they think they can appeal it. It's just as the paper stated today a way to get out of paying it right now but eventually we're going to have to pay

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the piper. It would have been a lot easier to sit down and pay the piper years ago, we would only owed half of what we owe now. It's unfortunate that the purse strings weren't taken over ten years ago. That finally we're starting to tighten it up a little bit and it may be too little too late. Trust me, we're all working here hard to keep this city afloat and we just wish the administration would work with us and keep in contact with It's about you. Apparently they forget about you out there. We don't. And that's what we're here for. And I can assure you on my end and I know I speak for the rest of my colleagues here that we're going to do everything we can to keep this city going, keep all your services that your tax dollars are paying for intact and, you know, we'll have to cross that bridge when we get to it. But I cannot understand how they can continually spend, spend, spend as we showed the

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RE-RE accounts and stuff like that, yet they're going to cut all your services, their threats of massive layoffs. It's time to cut their purse strings which we have pretty much, and it should have been done ten years ago, we never would have been in this condition. And that's all I have to say. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Loscombe. I just wanted to add, though, these postponements that are known as the appeals will cost the city additional money. The interest due on these decisions is only growing in the meantime. Now, I tried to understand the prospective of the administration in this situation. Ιt does buy them some time. It very likely postpones payment of these decisions from 2011 into 2012, and I know that that consideration has to weigh heavily on them since they have created a five million dollar deficit currently in the 2011 budget by

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raiding the Workers' Comp fund in 2010. So they have that situation to address and very likely they're looking at what else has occurred since than and they're scrambling to find the solutions to these situations and in so doing they've decided once again and I couldn't tell you how many times -- I frankly have no idea how many times every decision has been appealed since 2003. But what we do have to understand is the bottom line, it's not beneficial to continue to postpone because you're driving up the bill. And the only person that's benefitting or the only persons who are benefitting are the attorneys for both sides. But the taxpayers are the losers in this situation. As bad as that amount is today, Mr. Loscombe was correct, had this been settled long ago as it should have been in good faith negotiations, it would have cost this city, I'm sure, half, maybe less than half of what it's costing today.

And, again, by postponing it, you're driving those costs upward. So it really isn't the prudent answer to look at this situation and say, well, we're safe for this year, I'll deal with it next year when it comes along.

Anyway, I apologize for taking your time, Councilman Joyce. Do you have comments or motions?

MR. JOYCE: Yes, I do. During
Fifth Order on our March 8th meeting I
placed a request to City Controller
Roseanne Novembrino regarding the
money that was borrowed from the
Workers' Compensation Trust Fund to
pay salaries amongst other bills in
2009 and 2010. Gratefully and I
appreciate this, Mrs. Roseanne
Novembrino responded to the questions
that were posed to her in a timely
fashion, and I would like to thank her
for that.

Regarding the questions that were posed to her, the first question pertained to whether or not she knew

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that 2.9 million dollars was borrowed from the Workers' Compensation Trust Fund in 2009 and subsequently five million dollars in 2010. In response to this question, Mrs. Novembrino explained that any transfers from the trust fund to a cash fund were inter-funds transfers and that these transfers did not affect the revenue account and that, furthermore, no paperwork for such transfers are processed through her office. Well, when researching through all of the controller's reports that I have received since being a member of council as well as previous budgets, I'd just like to state that inter-fund transfers are accounted for in both operating budgets and controller's reports. The majority of funding in the inter-fund transfers category in the 2011 operating budget deals with proceeds or contributions from liquid fuels as well as a \$300,000 revenue item from the special city account

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which originated from the Weinberg Foundation that will be used to pay debt due to a capital project at Weston Field. Therefore, it appears that some inter-fund transfers are indicated in the controller's reports In addition to while others are not. the first two questions, city council also asked Mrs. Novembrino if she was aware of the balance and transactions in the fund throughout 2009, '10 and '11 as well as the transfer of funds from revenue accounts in the 2009, '10 and '11 operating budget. To these questions Mrs. Novembrino explained that the only involvement of her office for the Workers' Compensation Trust Fund is to review vouchers, reflecting payments to the Workers' Compensation administrator and that she is also not aware of any transfers from revenue coming into the city from any accounts in general in the general operating budget being transferred back into this fund. With this being

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said, I would just to like to say I'm curious that this money was even paid back to the Workers' Compensation Trust Fund since Mrs. Novembrino indicates that she's not aware of any transfers from the revenue accounts in the general operating budget to this fund. Now, I will state that in the 2009 audit it did state clearly that 2.9 million dollars was owed from the general fund to other funds. So while the administration is saying that this money is paid back, Mrs. Novembrino is indicating that she's unaware of this money being paid back. So now I question was the money even paid back at all. Well, finally city council asked whether or not Mrs. Novembrino was aware in the final quarters of 2009 and 2010 the lack of necessary funds to pay payroll and if she noticed an influx of funds to pay for salaries in final quarters of 2009 and 2010. To this question Mrs. Novembrino directly responded in

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quotes, "Yes, I am aware of the lack of necessary funds for payroll and the need and requirements of the city to pay its payroll. There was not an influx of fund, rather the excess funding above the 75 percent reserve level that is required to be in the Workers' Compensation funds that was used. As you know without using these excess funds which are the city's monies, it would have affected the city's public health and safety which I truly care about." And I appreciate that Mrs. Novembrino cares about the public health, welfare and safety of our residents. And I'd like to thank her for responding to these questions in a timely manner, however, the responses to her questions leave me a little bit questioned.

And with that in mind, Mrs.

Krake, I would like to send a Right to

Know Request to Mr. McGowan and ask

was the 2.9 million borrowed in 2009

and the five million dollars borrowed

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in 2010 from the Workers' Compensation Trust Fund ever paid back and from what fund was it paid back including the account numbers and the dates of the transfer. Mrs. Novembrino as I stated before indicated that she's not aware of any money in the general fund revenue accounts being transferred back to the Workers' Compensation Trust Fund, therefore, what's one to do. You have to question was the money even paid back. I know that the administration has stated in the past that it has been paid back and if it hasn't been paid out of revenue coming into the city, especially 2011, revenue from TANS, TAN Series A, TAN Series B, any licenses and permits that are -- any money we received from that as well as taxes, where is the money coming from? It has to come from somewhere if you say it's being paid back. So with that in mind, I would also like you to add to that request to specify the amount of money

that is currently in the Workers' Compensation Trust Fund as well as what the 75 percent reserve level is required by the city to maintain. So, therefore, in the event that the administration tries to pull off massive layoffs of firefighters, police officers, DPW workers and say that it's council's budget that's causing them to do this, I'd like to know, are we constantly taking from Peter to pay Paul year after year after year and if this money was paid back in 2011 creating a five million dollar hole as Mrs. Evans said, are we starting out with this five million hole and is the administration going to blame council come June or July when they try to layoff the public safety manpower and say, well, there's a five million hole. Well, guess what, I wonder if that five million dollar hole is because you're paying back a debt from last year with money being brought in from this year, not

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because of the projections that council made when they amended the budget.

In conclusion, I'd just like to say this five million dollars, it's being paid by the general fund in 2011, this is the real back breaker, this is what will cause the massive layoff, not council's revenue projections, not the extra \$517,000 that we projected would be received from wage tax collections or not the extra \$100,000 that we believed we would receive in delinquent real estate tax collections. This is five million dollars. The amounts that we increased revenue by were miniscule compared to this. Well, enough about that.

Let's get onto some citizens'
requests. A Green Ridge resident has
informed me that on the corner of
Poplar Street and Wyoming Avenue there
are various potholes and cracks in the
road making travel conditions very

difficult.

Mrs. Krake, would you please send a letter to Mr. Brazil, inform him of the situation and ask him to repair once weather permits. I have spoke to some folks that work for the DPW and they have explained to me that in the colder weather the coal patch is very tough to apply and it breaks apart very easily so for those sending in requests, I would ask that you are patient with some of the DPW workers as I know a laundry list of requests are starting to pile up.

Secondly, several residents living in

the Keyser Valley section have informed me that the traffic light sign on Jackson Street near Keyser Avenue has been defaced with profane language. Obviously this is very unfortunate and neighbors are very upset as they feel this is degrading their neighborhood and this has been there for sometime. If you can also add this to the letter to Mr. Brazil

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and ask if he could have the profane language removed from the sign as residents feel that it's very degrading to the neighborhood.

Various residents in the Bulls Head region of North Scranton have requested that a left turn arrow be placed on the northbound lane of Providence Road where Providence Road and Main Avenue intersect which would allow residents to make a left-hand turn onto Wood Street. I know that a traffic study may have to be done in order to do this. However, if you could please add this to the notes to Mr. Brazil and ask him if this can be done and if it's feasible and if one of these signals could be placed there for those residents.

Another North Scranton resident
has informed me that the end of the
300 block of Cayuga Court is in
extremely poor condition. In fact,
this resident has informed me that she
brings her trash and recyclables up to

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the main road every week due to the struggles that they have in this court getting the refuse trucks down and back because the road is so torn up.

Mrs. Krake, if you could please add this to the letter to Mr. Brazil and ask him if this block can be paved and possibly if they can put this on the paving list for this year.

Resident on the 300 block of North Bromley Avenue in West Scranton has informed me that there is a blighted property which has been vacated for sometime. The address is 360 North Bromley Avenue. resident has also informed that this property is attracting rodents as well as possums and other creatures into the neighborhood. So they would like to see some action taken. If you could send a request over to Mr. Seitzinger regarding this property informing him of this situation and asking if there's anything that can be done to rectify this.

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MR. ROGAN: Mr. Joyce, sorry to interrupt. That's my block actually. That one was actually sent in probably the first week I was sworn in to council. We had -- I know animal control was up there because there's another problem also on the same block with a person feeding stray animals. So hopefully they will be willing to come up again because they did do a pretty good job when they came up.

MR. JOYCE: Yeah. And I know the workers in the city, throughout the city many of them do a very good job but unfortunately I did receive this call from a resident this past week and I guess the animals are out of control again. So hopefully they could be put back into control.

And last but not least a resident living on the 500 block of Alder Street has informed that the streetlight on this block has been out for six months now and despite attempts to contact other offices,

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they've seen little to no help.

Mrs. Krake, if we could contact Joyce Electrical or if we can get in touch with them by next week perhaps they'll be in the caucus and I can just do it myself and notify them of this situation. I'm not sure if there's a web site like Municipal Energy Managers used to have where pole numbers could be typed in and its request to be submitted. However, if you could also add to instruct Joyce Electrical to put this on the high priority list. I understand that we've heard many residents complaining that streetlights have been out for a month or two but this has been out for half a year so I think that the people living on the street are entitled to have their streetlight back so they could feel safe at night.

And a few pieces of mail that we received in today, a note from Rossi and Rossi notifying us that there are 15 open items in which the

administration has failed to make good with on time. I guess they're stating that a number of items and I'm not going to go through them and read them all were to be submitted by March 15th in order to complete the 2010 audit to be in a timely manner as directed by the Home Rule Charter, however, were late on it.

So, Mrs. Krake, if you could please send a request over to Mr.

McGowan and notify -- or ask him when these items will be submitted to Rossi and Rossi.

And last but not least I will say there was a man who I remember was recently appointed by council to the city planning commission. His name is Thomas Preambo and he is resigning from that commission and we received a letter from him, and I know with boards and commissions, many times in the past people that have been selected by the mayor to be placed on these boards have failed to submit

resumes, cover letters or even letters of interest to council regarding their desire to be on these boards. I will say that Mr. Preambo did submit a resume and I am very glad that he did. As a newer council member, I think it was simply an opportunity to get to know more about the people that are going to be on some of these boards, and I would just like to wish him well in his next venture which does not allow him to be on this board. And that's all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Joyce.
Good evening.

On Friday, March 18th, the city clerk attended the opening of request for proposals for the collection of delinquent real estate taxes issued by the Scranton Redevelopment Authority at its office located at 538 Spruce Street, Scranton, Suite 812, which also serves as the Scranton Office of Economic and Community Development. The legal advertisement of this RFP

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stated that separate sealed submissions would be received at this office until Friday, March 18th, 12 o'clock p.m. at which time they will be read out loud at the SRA Office for collection of delinquent real estate taxes. After waiting in the board room where she had been directed to be seated, Mrs. Krake reported that no persons were in attendance. She then asked the receptionist if any proposals had been submitted and was directed to Miss Venia Blackwell, Secretary for the Scranton Redevelopment Authority who stated that she had received two proposals but was waiting the arrival of Ryan McGowan, City Business Administrator. Thereafter. Ms. Blackwell showed the two sealed proposals to Mrs. Krake which were submitted by Northeast Revenue Services of Wilkes-Barre and received on March 17th, 2011, and Portonov Law Association of Norristown and received

on March 18th. Ms. Blackwell then verified Mrs. Krake's notes and made copy. The RFPs for the collection of delinquent taxes were never publicly opened and read out loud as advertised.

Mrs. Krake, please send a letter on behalf of Scranton City Council to the Scranton Redevelopment Authority requesting complete copies of both proposals.

Next, city council received a copy of OECD's correspondence to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development or HUD regarding the office of the inspector general's audit report findings. After reading Miss Aebli's responds to HUD, I noted that several items were missing.

Mrs. Krake, please send a Right to Know letter to Miss Aebli, OECD Director requesting the following information: A copy of the letter or e-mail sent to OECD by HUD on January 26th, 2011, requesting that

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Scranton OECD to provide HUD with additional information by February 25th, 2011, concerning the audit findings, a copy of Exhibit A, Exhibit B, Exhibit C, Exhibit D1 and D2, Exhibit E, Exhibit F, Exhibit G, Exhibit H; Exhibit I, Exhibit J, Exhibit K, Exhibit L, Exhibit M, Exhibit N, Exhibit O, Exhibit P and Exhibit Q. And I specify those in that manner because oftentimes when requesting information if it is not very clearly and very concisely specifically stated, council does not receive the response it's been looking for. Also the chart of accounts transaction detailed by account for the income expenditures for each year audited by the OIG, copies of nine policies and procedures that have been updated with the assistance of Dennisen and Associates and that will be provided to the HUD. It was also interesting to note while reading Miss Aebli's responses that the over

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eleven million dollars in findings discovered by the Office of the Investigator General occurred under Attorney Carl Greco's watch. While receiving annual payments from 2002 through 2010 that well exceeded one million dollars, Attorney Greco appeared to allow policies, practices and procedures to continue which the OIG found objectionable. Ms. Aebli states as part of her response to HUD that effective February 28th, 2011, the Scranton Office of Economic and Community Development will be hiring a new solicitor and has forwarded the new solicitor the guidebook for CDBG, grantees on sub recipient oversight which include sub recipient agreements. Since one audit finding states that the city couldn't demonstrate the exact amount of CDBG funds dispersed to its sub recipients among other findings. Further noteworthy is the fact that 11.7 million dollar audit monies also

occurred during the years in which Mr.
Ryan McGowan served as OECD Director
of Finance and Compliance. Ms. Aebli
also states in her responses that Mr.
McGowan was replaced by a former
employee of the Business
Administrator's Office who is a CPA.
At the same time, however, Ryan
McGowan was rewarded and promoted to
city business administrator.

Next, I'd like to discuss briefly the legality of the removal of monies from the Workers' Comp Trust Fund. know that Mr. Joyce talked about the issue at length during his motions tonight but I do have something that I wish to add. The former Business Administrator Stu Renda in 2010 stated that the city borrowed -- borrowed 2.9 million in 2009 from the Workers' Comp Trust Fund and paid it back in 2010. According to the Home Rule Charter, Article 5, Section 502, actions requiring an ordinance and I quote, "Those acts of the city council

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shall -- shall be by ordinance which No. 7 authorized the borrowing of money." Now, the controller states that the five million dollars taken from the Workers' Comp Trust Fund in 2010 is a transfer so the language is now changing from borrowing to transfer, and I think we've already established that you cannot borrow without the consent, without an ordinance that is approved by city Well, back to the transfer, council. the administrative code states the following in Article 6, Section 6-13, Appropriation, letter A, and I quote, "Council may make supplemental appropriations for any lawful purpose from funds on hand or estimated to be received within a fiscal year and not prorated to any other purpose." You will notice that the administration states council may make, not a business administrator, not a mayor. Whether these financial transactions of 2009 and 2010 are termed borrowing

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or transfers, the Home Rule Charter and the administrative code state that city council's knowledge and approval are required by ordinance. Citv council fully expects the Doherty administration to abide by the Home Rule Charter and the Administrative Code. It's called checks and balances. And the Doherty administration has circumvented these checks and balances in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and in the 2010 and 2011 budgets. Common sense dictates that if the administration raids the Workers' Comp Fund and injects that money into a 2010 budget to balance it and meet payroll, the Doherty administration must then take 2011 revenue appropriations to pay off that five million dollars thereby creating a five million dollar deficit in the 2011 budget.

And finally I have just one citizen's request, I believe, for the week because Mr. Joyce you have my

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other one covered on Alder Street.

MR. JOYCE: Well, he must have sent it me and mailed to both of us then.

MS. EVANS: Yes, I think he's trying to cover all his basis which is very wise with regard to streetlights and the history that we've seen developed throughout the years and repair of streetlights. Provide and update to city council on the condemned property at 837-839 Prescott Avenue, residents of the block are very concerned by Mr. Orleski and Mr. Seitzinger's broken promise to raise the structure. They state that they have lived with continuous deterioration of the property for years. And while the issue languishes at the same time under legal maneuvers and the owner fails to comply with city ordinances and magisterial orders. And that's it.
