by Robinson's Apartment, on the other 16

lake side back into the woods is an 17

SUV with a trailer loaded with iron 18

and different products. So I 19

confronted him. I blocked them in so 20

they couldn't move. I called Scranton 21

PD and told them that we had a

situation up here, and I will commend 23

the Scranton Police Department, they 24

arrived without hesitation. One of 25

the individuals was taken into custody

with warrants for his arrest that were

outstanding and the other two were

charged with trespassing. And I find

it amusing. I'm home at my home and I

see what is going on but I'm not in my

home, remember, I'm supposed to be a

ghost. Mary Dunleavy, Joe Wexchler,

the Mustis, Slotterback and, of

course, Mr. Hartman who testifies that 10

he hasn't seen anybody in my house in

over two years. The other incidents 12

that the East Mountain Residents 13

Association to challenge my residency.

They put us through all this 15

aggravation we're going on. I would 16

like to know where the heck they were 17

today. All these people that condemn

me of not being around, where the heck 19

were they. When people walking around 20

into containers. Now, if they want to 12

challenge me which I hope to God they 13

because, remember, a container gets 16

there on a chaise with wheels; and 17

when it's separated from the chaise, 18

it's no different than what we have. 19

They can continue to play their games, 20

they can completely ignore the law. 21

Hartman built on city owned property, 22

16 and a half acres, he doesn't belong 23

there. Yeah, wasn't he in the paper who shot his big mouth off that it's

action to dissolve the authority.

They were with the authority, the

authority then recorded an affiant of dissolution. We filed articles of

dissolution with the Commonwealth of

the delinquent taxes were sold to the

city, the Redevelopment Authority paid

the city in a prior year for the 8

accounts. Subsequently, the

Redevelopment Authority took out a 10

loan from Pennstar Bank for nearly the

entire amount of the tax claims. 12

Since the Redevelopment Authority 13

wasn't able to collect all the

delinquent tax claims, the 15

Redevelopment Authority defaulted on

the loan. Since the city backs the 17

Redevelopment Authority as well other 18

municipal authorities, it is now 19

responsible for paying back Pennstar 20

Bank. And I'll briefly read some of 21

the correspondence that was received 22
