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MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Do any council members have announcements to make?

No announcements? Fourth order. Citizens' participation. And the first speaker on the list is Les Spindler.

(Mr. Joyce takes the dais and joins the meeting during the reading of agenda items.)

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,
Council, Les Spindler, city resident and
homeowner and taxpayer.

MR. JOYCE: Good evening.

MR. SPINDLER: First off, I would like to know if Highland Associates and/or Aker and Associates has done any business with the city in the past and do they very any contracts for the future with the city? And I know one thing for a fact, they did do the police station, so that's one. The reason I bring that up is because according to campaign finances reports in 2009 Highland Associates, including Don Kalina, who was a major witness in the Cordaro-Munchack case and Aker and Associates, including PJ McLaine, who was

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also a major witness, contributed to Chris
Doherty's campaign in 2009, and that's
according -- that's public information
according to campaign finances reports. Now
there is no law against that, but if they
contributed and got jobs because of that
there are laws against that, so I would like
to know if they have done any jobs in the
city.

Moving on, this was brought up last week about the Sewer Authority wanting to raise our rates 47 percent again, I think that's totally ridiculous and I knows Mrs. Evans is working on getting the PUC maybe come in here to have a meeting. I hope we can do that and get a lot of people here There is only so much you can interested. charge people, these people in this city are just taxed out and PPL, you know, their rates, everybody's rates are going up. You get a 1 percent or 2 percent raise on your job and you get a 47 percent raise in your sewer bill, something has got to be done here.

Also, last week there was talk about

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a Sewer Authority employee that used Sewer Authority equipment to do private work and he was eventually fired and he should have been arrested, and that's illegal. I won't mention names, but he was another Doherty crony, and that's why he wasn't arrested and that's why you don't see him in the Doherty newsletter. You don't see anything in the Doherty newsletter a/k/a Times-Tribune if somebody from Chris Doherty's administration is involved. But, yet, every time Super Cop Doherty -- or Super Cop Duffy makes a petty arrest it's in the newspaper, and I just want to clear the air, there was a person arrested the other day by him and the last name is Spindler, it's no relation of mine. I know people are probably thinking that, but, like I said, this guy, the people he arrests aren't menace to society. They are just petty criminals and it's ridiculous the publicity that he gets. When he arrests somebody from the FBI's top ten list then let me know about it, okay?

Moving on, last week Mr. McGoff said he wanted some money for a park, I think we

have enough parks in this city. There is nothing to do with building these parks, but when it comes to asking for money for pools Mr. McGoff is no where to be found. Kids want to swim, and all Mr. McGoff thinks about is building more parks. I think we are all parked out. Is something funny, Mr. McGoff?

MR. MCGOFF: Yeah. Yes.

MR. SPINDLER: You know, the last person that was up there that laughed all the time is no longer sitting up there.

MR. MCGOFF: Yeah, it is humorous because all I asked for is that we -- that we put a piece of -- something on the agenda for a grant that's already been approved.

I'm not asking for anybody to spend anymore money other than to approve and take funding for a grant.

MR. SPINDLER: Well, we don't need any more parks.

MR. MCGOFF: It can't go anywhere else. Apparently the people on Perry Street -- in that area would like that park, so they do -- maybe they do want a park, maybe

it is needed.

MR. SPINDLER: Well, let's use --

MR. MCGOFF: Have you been there?

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$  SPINDLER: Let's use the money for something else.

MR. MCGOFF: It can't be used for anything else. That's the whole idea. It's a grant for that specific park.

MR. SPINDLER: And there has been stuff like that, there has money like that before that was used for other things. That wasn't used for what it was supposed to and it used for other stuff.

Moving on, about a year or so ago, maybe even a little more, I came here and Frank Hartman, who is another member of the Tripp Park Neighborhood Association Crime Watch, came here asking for a stop sign somewhere in-between Dorothy Street and North Rebecca Avenue, and much to my delight last Friday one appeared on the corner of Hawthorne and North Rebecca, which I want to thank whoever was responsible for that.

It's been needed for a long time and I came here last year and saying, you know, once

you make the turn onto Rebecca from Dorothy
Street was a clear shot up to Dickens and
was like a racetrack, so I was thrilled to
see that stop sign. It's a block from my
house, and already I see the difference.
People are starting to slow down right at my
house a block away, so whoever was
responsible for that everybody in Tripp
Park, especially that area, really
appreciates it. So thanks again, and thank
you for your time.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Karen Foster.

MS. FOSTER: Good evening,
distinguished council members. Karen
Foster, West Scranton resident, President of
the West Scranton Hyde Park Neighborhood
Watch. I'm just here to thank you for
bringing the amendment that we proposed a
few months ago for Chapter 302, Code of the
City of Scranton titled, "Parks and
Recreation for adding Article III, "West
Scranton Skate park Facility Rules and
Regulations." Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: You're welcome. Francis

Tyson.

MR. TYSON: Francis Tyson, resident of Scranton. Thank you for having me here this evening to be able to announce our Fourth of July event, it will be on Monday, this coming Monday, the Fourth of July, it will be at 10:30 a.m. at Nay Aug Park in our usual place. We will be entertained by the stirring music of the Reinhold band under the direction of Ted Ricky.

We will also have the parade of flags, all the veterans flags. We are also having presentation of the national colors, the raising of the national colors, a salute to the colors, and a very short speech concerning why we are there for the Fourth of July just to remind everybody exactly what means to everybody in this country, and if council could make it we'd certainly have all members of council and all of the residents of Northeastern Pennsylvania. Is there any questions?

MR. ROGAN: Thank you for announcing this, Mr. Tyson? I know many of us have been there the last few years and it's

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always a very nice event and hopefully the weather will be nice again this year as it was last couple of years.

MR. TYSON: I appreciate it. We trv to make everybody happy with this event, you It's really the very first event of the day for the Fourth of July. We try to get that early in the morning, give everybody the opportunity to earn their hot dogs and all of that stuff in the afternoon and get some good sun. I'm assured, sort of assured, that we are going to have a good day, no rain this year as we have in the past a couple of times, so if everybody from Northeastern Pennsylvania can make it up to Nay Aug Park, we'd certainly like to have you. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else would like to address counsel?

MR. HUBBARD: Perfect timing. Good evening, Council. Dan Hubbard, lower Greenridge. A few issues tonight, one I'd like to address is you got to love the Scranton Times. Love it. The recent article on the flood still being a bad

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memory, if anybody knows two days ago was the anniversary of the 2006 flood in lower Greenridge. I'd like to point out a few things: One, lower Greenridge is not the plot. It's not part of the plot, it's not corrected to the plot, it's not a plot at all in any way.

So a couple of discrepancies in the article, you know, they went onto say that I understand sections of the plot were flooded, but the article claimed, you know, parts of lower Greenridge were protected while others were not along the area of Gardner Avenue and in the plot. Well, Gardner Avenue is not in the plot, it's in lower Greenridge. The plot was protected by a half-inch levy in this city and the county and the Army Corp of Engineers worked tirelessly to save what was built, which I understand completely. I mean, they have millions of dollars of construction into that levy and it would have been completely washed out if they didn't do what they did to protect it, but for Ray Hayes and the city to kind of say that they were there for

the residents of lower Greenridge in this article, it's kind of nauseating. Ray Hayes, in fact, told the fire department not to come into lower Greenridge for I think it was at least almost 24 to 36 hours after the water receded because the river levels might come up again. We didn't receive any help from the city other than the tireless DPW garbage men to worked three to four shifts a day making sure the garbage wouldn't pile up in our neighborhood and help mitigate the stink.

But, you know, Ray Hayes and Mr. Dubas, you know, they go onto say that, you know, how they really were there to protect and help the residents of the City of Scranton. I know Mrs. Sachetti was quoted in here saying Ray Hayes was in the neighborhood handing out paperwork for damaged residents and that's patently false. Mr. Hayes and Mayor Doherty drove by in a mini-van really quick with the FEMA representatives and just blew through the neighborhood.

We didn't get anything from anybody

until after the flood meeting that was held at the high school on the thing July 6 which was almost a week and a half after the actual flood, so I just wanted to point out that, you know, lower Greenridge never got any help during the flood, we didn't get any help before, we didn't get any help during, and we didn't get any help after.

The Army Corp did finally finish the levy project so we are now protected, but the inaccuracies in this article, I just wanted to make sure that anybody that read this they understand that in no way did the residents of lower Greenridge receive any assistance from the City of Scranton in any way, shape or form.

Secondly, some residents complaints, the 1500 block of Von Storch at the intersection of the 400 and 500 block of Marian Street in lower Greenridge, it's up on the hill there, that field on the 1500 block of Von Storch is pretty much becoming a dumping ground. The weeds are three to four feet high and the residents have called my house and did leave a few messages for me

to bring this issue up.

The 500 block of Marian is riddled with potholes and they just wanted to make sure that the city can get in there and maybe look at cleaning that up a little bit and maybe possibly fencing it. Did you receive something on it?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yeah, I was actually over there the other day, Dan. I took some photos and we are going to process this. I actually did get the debris in there and stuff like that.

MR. HUBBARD: You know, for a long time that field was sitting empty. There was some dirt piles in there that whoever owns that property came in and put up a fence and walked away from it and it's just become a dumping ground I know that the several messages that I received I was informed that there is rats in the area, back to the typical summer skunk problem again. They are living in that field there and it is really overgrown.

MR. LOSCOMBE: It looks almost like an encampment there.

It's kind of getting

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to be a jungle in there and it's kind of off the lower path of Greenridge, but the residents there still do deserve to have there neighborhood be clean and well-kept. Unfortunately, I have to look at this and from what I was told a lot of the dumping that's going on is not by people that live in that immediate vicinity, they are just people taking advantage of the fact that, you know, when we -- when the county sold the recycling center it became a private institution you can't take things to the recycling. You can't take lumber there, you can't take brush, you can't take weeds, you can't take grass cuttings without having to pay to dispose of it at the recycling center, so that's forcing a lot of people to find areas in the city to just dump whatever they have that they can't get rid of.

MR. HUBBARD:

I personally don't mind going -- I do mind paying, I shouldn't have to pay and then to buy mulch that they ground up my bushes and then resell me the mulch that I had paid to them to make I find it kind of

absurd, but I don't mind doing it if it means that it's not going to piled up somewhere and becoming an eye-hazard -- an eyesore and hazard and that area is getting to be fairly out of control this year.

So that was my main concern, but I did want to just make sure everybody was well aware of the anniversary of the flood that we are still down in lower Greenridge and lower Greenridge is lower Greenridge and not the plot, and we do have protection now and we are thankful for that. Have a good night.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, city council. Bill Jackowitz, South Scranton resident and member of the Scranton Taxpayers' Association. Well, today we had our first free swim at Nay Aug Park. The swim went very well. We had 464 children that we paid for kids between the age of six and 15 for a grand total of \$1,856 is what

it cost us today.

I received a phone call this morning about 8:30 from Mark Dougher from Parks and Recreation informing me that the Scranton Recreation Park and Recreation Authority denied our request for a reduced amount, so we paid the full \$4 amount.

Mr. McGoff, I would ask you, if you would, since you're in charge of -- I guess you're the civil engineering guy and I guess Parks and Recreation, is that your committee?

MR. MCGOFF: I guess so, yes.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay. I mean, so
Parks and Recreation is part of that, if
maybe you can intervene, if you would, and
ask if the Parks and Recreation Authority
would be kind enough to give the Taxpayers a
break instead of charging us full amount of
\$4 per child. We had 464 children up there
today who had a wonderful time.

And also you're an advocate for city parks, Nay Aug Park is a city park with the pool and we have two pools closed,

Novembrino and Capouse, and I'm asking you

if you can intervene for us and maybe sit down and talk with Parks and Recreation and/or the mayor, whoever you need to talk to, because I don't think it's right that the Taxpayers should have pay the full \$4.

I spoke with some groups of up there today and they told me that they were going to get a reduced rate, so if other groups can get a reduced rate I surely think that the taxpayers of the City of Scranton and Lackawanna County should get a reduced rate when it comes to swimming. That is a public pool, owned and operated and run by the taxpayers of the City of Scranton.

So I'm just asking as a request if you can look into that for us because we are planning on having another event and if we can get a reduced rate it would be greatly appreciated.

We had people -- 19 people from kids from the Friendship House up there swimming today. We had a group from Dickson City community group of 65 children today up there. We had a group from -- we even had a group from Tobyhanna, Monroe County, that we

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helped. If anybody watches the news broadcast today on WBRE and WNEP they did an excellent job of covering it, they interviewed a lot of children, and everybody had a blast, and that's what the summer is all about and that's what the pool is about. In my opinion, it's not about making money, okay? That pool is paid for by the taxpayers. Again, it was very successful.

There's a rumor circulating, and I have copies of this, supposedly about a bid agreement that the Sewer Authority made. I'm going to pass out copies of this after I'm finished speaking. If someone can look into this because it seems like they took the highest bid, again, I don't know if this is factual, I don't know if this is truthful, I just know that it's being circulated, that they took out a bid and the lowest bid was 14 million and the highest bid was 17 million and they went with the highest bid. Again, I don't know if this is true, the Scranton Sewer Authority, I'm going to give you copies each of you and if you could check into it.

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MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Jackowitz, we have something in our mail on that.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Pardon me?

MR. MCGOFF: We have something in our mail on that.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, can we check into that and see if that's accurate or not because the Sewer Authority is about ready to raise the rates. We just had an incident with a Sewer Authority employee who was using government property and government time to do personal work for a friend and himself. Again, if the Sewer Authority wants a rate I think they need to prove themselves as being worthy of that rate, that's just my personal opinion. If this is true, again, I don't know if it is, but if it's true we need to find out because we don't need to be paying \$2.7 million more for something.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Jackowitz, I have a series of a Right-to-Know letters that I will be mentioning in Fifth Order that will be going to the Sewer Authority as well to try find some more information on what's

going there over the last ten years.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, well, that's good because, as you know, we just had two county commissioners being convicted. I think there is a lot more going on in this city and in this county, again, just my personal observation and just my personal feelings. I hope one day it all comes to an end and people who are responsible for this are dealt whatever they have coming to them.

We can no longer, the taxpayers of Scranton and the taxpayers of Lackawanna County and Northeastern Pennsylvania can no longer tolerate this. It has to come to an end. Nepotism, cronyism, favors, people getting jobs because of who they know, who their family is, what their family last name needs to stop. That's why, again, I see we've got the highest unemployment rate in the state again. This is consecutive. Every single month our metropolitan area has the highest unemployment rate, it has to stop.

And again, it was a great day for the kids. It would be nice if we could get

some support because \$1,800 is a lot of money to spend for one day for kids to swim, but they enjoyed it so it was worth it and it was all donated money from Lackawanna County and Scranton residents and residents from outside of the city. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. HUGHES: Bill, there is a letter from Attorney Pisarcik of the law of Laws, Staruch and Pisarcik in Lamoyne, Pennsylvania, that was sent to the mayor and the city council regarding the bid. I don't know if the award of the bid or the recommended award of the bid was to the highest bidder, but there were three other local bidders, Attorney Pisarcik represents C.O. Falter Construction Corporation. Their bid was \$14,569,101. Ronca, who was the fourth bidder, was \$17,183,000, there was a difference of \$2.6 million.

I have never talked to Attorney Pisarcik, but there is a letter that was

sent to council, it is a public document, if you would like a copy of it you can have my copy and I have a copy at the office I received.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, I'll get a copy after the meeting, but as long as it's been looked into that's all I'm asking for was it to be looked into and it sounds like that's happening.

MR. HUGHES: Well, I don't know what council or the mayor could do about it, the Sewer Authority is an independent agency, however, the low bidder would have an action, could file an action if they are the lowest responsible bidder if their bid has been disregarded. That's a legal issue, but supposedly that Roney and Associates the engineering firm for the Sewer Authority recommended that it be awarded to Ronca as the lowest responsible bidder. Other than that, all I know is what's in the letter.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Jackowitz, I will add that to my request as well.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

Marie Schumacher.

MR. ROGAN: Good evening.

MS. SCHUMACHER: First, I'd like to make everyone aware since not everyone gets the paper that there is an OECD public hearing next Wednesday, July 6, at 4:30 p.m. It is an opportunity for city residents to participate in the development and implementation of the city's third year action plan, so if you want to you may either attend that meeting or according to public hearing notice you may submit comments by Thursday, August eight, to OECD.

On 7-B tonight I have somewhat mixed emotions. I'm not against this grant, but I do have a problem, as I stated before, with nonprofits who do not do essentially any fundraising of their own, they operate totally on government grants, so I look at them as being, you know, really city employees and over which we have no control of the personnel and what they do, but this organization has received money for the Harriet Beecher Stowe project, the Cedar

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Avenue project, the Elm Street project, two to three million dollars for the neighborhood stabilization program and that, of course, is all to be spent in South Scranton, and that's my biggest objection is according to their 990 they have only had two people or two projects that have not been in South Scranton, one was 16 units in the Cabrini apartments in West Scranton and another was or is coming up down in Luzerne County, and that is one thing I would like to make sure that not -- hopefully, unlike what OECD was doing in that one pot of money that everything got paid of is that none of this grant would see it's way going into another county. And again, we don't have a lot of control over it, but I do think they could spread themselves across the city a

little bit better.

And now I'll finish with a single

item and it's going back on BRT Ice. Back on March 8, Solicitor Hughes stated, "One of the things that I have always told council is that any legislation that is submitted the agreement must be attached so it can be reviewed and know exactly what they are reviewing."

Now, going back, I'm going to read from the minutes of the April 19 meeting of this year. At the May 18, 2006, council meeting, Mrs. Evans stated, "Good evening. First, I notice that we have held a legislation concerning redevelopers agreement with the Ice Box and the SRA for the interest free payments over 20 years. I believe we are going to have a caucus next week with those individuals to discuss in-depth."

That's the end of the quote. Now, presumably the legislation referred to here is a resolution that was forwarded in April, on April 26, 2006, to council by the city solicitor which would sell the property for \$600,000 to be paid in 20-year installments of \$30,000 with no interest. This

resolution was tabled and never reintroduced.

Midway through the 2006 city council's August recess, a lease was filed with the county Recorder of Deeds for 99 years with an option to renew for an additional term of another 99 years, I'll get back to that in a bit.

Now, on September 18, 2006, and remember, this following the fact that there was a resolution and filing of the deed begins with Mr. Evans saying, "Yes, Uno Fitness Center currently enjoys KOZ status. Their owners who currently owe our city \$600,000, and I would suggest that we table this loan until such time the owners of the Ice Box would provide the monies owed to the City of Scranton and then we can entertain such a loan to their tenant."

Now, remember the deed has already been filed giving them 200 years at a dollar a year. Now, the rest of the colloquy deals with procedural issues, but it ends with the unanimous, unanimous vote, so every member of the council felt that at point in time,

now, this is September, that the city was owed \$600,000. I request -- may I finish, Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes.

MS. SCHUMACHER: However, I requested under the open records statute many things and received them, I might add. One was a copy of Resolution 67 of 2002 which set forth the original lease agreement. A memorandum of the lease between BRT Ice and the City of Scranton that changes the terms and one of the ways this is the addendum to the realty tax statement of value on those parcels of the BRT Ice.

Number one, this is a transfer of the property subject to a ground lease for 198 years which is payable at a dollar a year and \$600,000 at the end of the term.

That's the end of a 198 years. According to the present value calculations of Thomas Rainey, CPA, attached hereto incorporated herein by reference the present value is \$23.89.

Now, Solicitor Hughes also talked

about that and compared it to the buying of Manhattan Island, but my bottom line question is, and hopefully Mr. Hughes is here tonight and he can answer, so my basic question is which agreement is valid, the one approved by city council or the memorandum attached to the lease which as recorded by Council Solicitor Hughes on September 10 results in a remuneration to the city of \$1 a year for 198 years.

So if you would allow Mr. Hughes to comment on that later and then I will also ask that you state if you know your intentions for the month of August as a council. Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn.

MR. ROGAN: Good evening.

MR. DOBRZYN: Resident of Scranton.

First I'd like to thank John for checking

And we really need to clamp down on the way people dispose of the trash in this What I'm recommending is if somebody wants to put bags out they should put them out before the morning before the trash is collected and only the morning before, not a day before or whatever because by that time the animals get to it and then the guys from the DPW are left with a half a bag or running around playing litter pick up and so forth, so that's all cash out of our pockets, too, because we are paying the bill for somebody to carelessly throw a bunch of the bags on the ground, so if they insist and doing that I think we should just maybe 4:00 in the morning say, like, in my neighborhood it's Friday morning, well, I'd have to between four and seven drop a bag outside and not contaminate my neighborhood with rats and skunks and garbage laying all over the place over my terraces.

And on the sewer business, there has been fines levied and so forth by the federal government, so I'd really be interested in hearing from them what's going on with that, possibly a caucus or something that everybody could either view or show up for, and I want to hear from them what their problems are and why they need a 4 to 6 percent increase, it's just getting to the point where the electric company is going crazy, the water company is going crazy, everybody is going crazy with their rate increases and it's leaving us in a lurch.

I mean, you could say, well, the poor people on a fixed income, well, there were times I wished somebody fixed my income, so I'd really be interested in hearing something about that some day soon.

Now, Bill mentioned to me that ECTV's server is down and there aren't going to be any reruns before Saturday or something like that, so if have you anymore information on that you might want to announce it or talk to the people involved with it.

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been hit in the paper an awful lot and I feel a lot of politicians put that school here and now they don't seem to want to support it, they may not have been the same politicians that put the school here, but at some point we can't afford to makeup the difference, so if you people could contact whoever to anybody involved, federal, state or Representatives Smith and Blake and whoever or even Casey and try and get funding for that school, because if they collapse it's just going to be a big calamity for the area, and it's ashame it gets put here and we wind up taking a hit on the taxes and so forth and then on top of it they pull the carpet after the school is nearly completed. This is a grant that was 23 approved by the state, it was applied for by 24 the city, it is money that is waiting for us 25 to accept. There is no cost to the city.

All it is is legislation to accept the funding for this park. Right now what the people on Perry Street are looking at -- or Perry Avenue is a vacant lot. This grant are transform a vacant lot into a playground that can be used by residents of that area.

There is absolutely no reason why this legislation should not be on our agenda. If we are really concerned, if there is an insurance concern as we has been stated, then why are we asking the pools be opened? If there is an insurance concern for the parks and pools, as stated about Perry Street, then we should be asking that all the playgrounds and pools be closed and not just hold up legislation on this playground.

I think it's a separate issue, we are fighting with the administration over an insurance issue and we are holding the people -- we are holding this project hostage. I think it should be put on the agenda, we should vote on it, we should accept the funding and we should get to work on building that playground, and that's all

I have for this evening. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

I guess first I'll address the few other issues that brought up. I want to congratulate Mr. Jackowitz and the Taxpayers' Association for the Kids Swim Free event that was held today. As he said before, 464 kids did swim for free and they are doing a great job and I'm sure they will continue to do so.

Next, Mrs. Schumacher mentioned an August recess. As in the past, I would oppose council taking any recess in August or at the end of the year as was done last year. I would hope that we would come to a vote, that would be done publically like we did when the two weeks are taken off at the end of last year.

Next, I believe it was Mr. Jackowtiz mentioned a few weeks ago and a few other constituents have sent e-mails about this, about people wearing, mostly men, who wear their pants very low and underwear hanging out while walking around, and this was sent to me by a constituent and it's from

Meridian, Mississippi. The Meridian Council voted 4-1 -- the trend seemed popular among young people, according to the council members, put it would apply to everyone.

While Meridian mayor Cherri Barry says she is in favor of the ordinance passed by council, she wishes the city wasn't too forceful in addressing this issue.

This is something I think we should looking into doing on city council. I have gotten a lot of complaints about this from residents through the city. I don't know if my colleagues have, and I know,

Mr. Loscombe, I know you are the Chair of Public Safety, I would be willing to meet with Chief Duffy, see what he thinks and talk to our attorney and it's just some food for thought moving forward that it's something that would make driving around and seeing people out a little more pleasurable when you don't have to see their underwear when you are driving by.

Next, a few citizens' request that I have. The first one is a letter to Chief

Duffy asking that bikes patrol the 900 a

1000 blocks of Main Avenue as well as Wolff Court. Residents report drug activity along with parking violations, and that it's very tough to pull off the road onto Main Avenue because of parked cars all of the way up to the edge of the road.

And the second one is a handicap resident that lives on Doherty Street requesting a handicapped parking sign, I have the address on here, and I just won't announce it on TV.

And now onto what's been my biggest pet peeve the last few weeks, the Scranton Sewer Authority. As we all know, two weeks ago I brought the whole issue that has been rumored about an employee being fired for using public property for private use and last week I reported, and so did various media outlets, that it has been confirmed.

And I do have some more to say about that, but I wanted to move onto another issue. It seems the more we dig into the Sewer Authority it's like an onion, the deeper you go in the more it smells, how fitting that it's the Sewer Authority. This

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was a letter that was sent to all of us on council from Laws, Staruch and Pisarcik, it's a law firm out of Lamoyne, Pennsylvania, and it says, "Dear Mayor Doherty and City Council members, we represent the Falter Construction Company, the lowest responsible bidder for the general mechanical contracts on the B & R upgrade projects at the Scranton Sewer Authority. On April 12, 2011, Falter submitted a bid for \$14,569,101 to the Authority for the general mechanical contract for work for the project. Despite the fact that Falter's bid was the lowest responsible bid, we have been advised the Sewer Authority solicitor, Jeffery Belanti that the Authority attends to award the contract to Michael F. Ronca and Sons whose bid was \$17,163,000. This is a difference of \$2.6 million between the two bids."

And it's no secret to all of us that have been following the Sewer Authority that rates are going up, and wasteful spending like this is a big part of the reason why these rates are going up. The letter goes

on if anyone would like a copy of it I'll be glad to provide that for them.

Authority, two weeks ago our office sent a letter asking for information about the employee that used public property for private use. We have not received a response, so I have a series of Right-to-Know requests that will be sent out to the Sewer Authority and they are as follows: One, a list of all employees and their salaries of the Scranton Sewer Authority on January 1, 2001.

Two, a list of the all of employees and their salaries at the Scranton Sewer Authority on today's date, June 28, 2011.

Number three, what is the justification for rate increases over the last ten years? Has increased hiring caused rates to increase?

Number four, has any public equipment been used for private work from January 1, 2001, to today's date, 6-28-11? F so, by whom and what disciplinary actions have been taken.

Number five, have there been any measures taken to ensure that Sewer Authority property is used only for public projects and not for full profit work? If "yes" please let all steps that were taken.

Number six, have any members of the Sewer Authority had knowledge of private work being done using public equipment? If so, what action was taken on the department?

And number seven, why wasn't the lowest responsible bidder accepted for the general mechanical contract on the B & R upgrade project. And we will attach this letter for that.

And when I ran for council in 2007 and Mr. Joyce and Mrs. Evans in 2009, one of the things we pledged to do was to cut government waste and this seems to me to be one of the worst examples of government waste. The people ought there are struggling every day just to pay their bills, sewer rates are going up, and then we see this garbage going on.

So, Mrs. Krake, I will give that to you and I have a copy for both of our

reporters that are here tonight, and that is all. Mr. Loscombe, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. Thank you,
Mr. Rogan. I have several issues, I'm not
going to pinpoint them exactly, I'll pass
them onto Mrs. Krake to forward you, but the
issue that Mr. Hubbard had reported before,
I was out there and took some photos and met
with the neighbors and I do have that packet
to go with a letter to the appropriate
departments.

Several areas where there is overgrown lots, typical this time of the year, and some hazardous sidewalks. Another issue is, and I'm just came across another one and there is probably more in the city, is swimming pools that have been left filled and unattended for several years creating a hazardous situation. So we'll have to pass those onto our LIPS inspectors, and I have an issue with some garbage that was not picked up and I will be passing that on, also, to get that taken care of. I do have several others, but it's mostly overgrown

lots, potholes, the usual typical stuff.

Next, I, too, would like to congratulate Mr. Jackowitz and the whole group on the free swim for the children. I thought that was excellent, 464 children able to swim. I just -- I don't understand, and I think maybe we could request from the Recreation Authority, something that Mr. Jackowitz mentioned that struck me that they do give reduced rates for certain groups. I would like to know if that is the case and why didn't the taxpayer group receive a discounted rate as other large groups do.

And let's see here, that just brings me on we will be -- we discussed this last week, we will be voting to appoint another person to the Recreation Authority and I think it was stated last week by Mrs. Evans and I actually agreed with her on the situation that the Recreation Authority does not seem to realize what they are there for, for the people and for the children they are working for, and it's disappointing. They won't come to a public caucus, they refuse

to be on TV here. Yes, they have meetings, but they are held at Weston Field and not everybody can see and view them. We request that they come here at least once or twice a year, which hasn't happened, but it just seems that they've made a lot of decisions that weren't in the best interest of the taxpayers and this also not getting a reduced rate when they do give group reduced rates for the swimmers was also another slap in the face to the taxpayers.

So I am also on -- I believe it is, pardon me, I was trying to see where it was here, on 7-A, I will be voting "no" again as I did last week on the appointment to the Recreation Authority. I think the Recreation Authority has to come around and be more amenable to the taxpayers.

And to top that off, speaking of groups helping the taxpayers and working for the city I, too, would like to congratulate the West Side West Scranton Hyde Park crime Watch, Karen and Mike Foster, and the whole organization. For what they have been doing, I mean, it's phenomenal just in the

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amount of time that they have been there it's blossomed into so many projects and so many different things and tonight on 5-B we will be amending Chapter 332 of the Code of the City of Scranton to have some rules and regulations for the skate park facility, and they have taken that over and they are policing it and cleaning it up, and it's just another project that the West Side residents should be proud of and I know we are proud of it, and I'd like to see this happen all over the city, but thanks to fine people like the group from the West Side Hyde Park Crime Watch, keep up the good work and this is a great idea. We do need rules and regulations to be followed and thank you for your persistence on it, and I would be voting in favor of that without a doubt.

And lastly, I also have a
Right-to-Know request as follows: I would
like a breakdown of the \$187,475 on the cost
of the Scranton Redevelopment Authority
related to the Redevelopment Authority of
the City of Scranton's line of credit loan
and security agreement between the SRA and

the Pennstar Bank which was dated December 20, 2007, on the sale of the delinquent taxes for the years 2004, 2005, 2006, in the amount of \$2,296,570 and the settlement sheet for the distribution of the \$187,475. This was the loan that was in default for over one and a half million that we are on the hook for, and I would just like the Right-to-Know to see what the breakdown of the costs were for this here, and I'll pass this on to you after the meeting, Mrs. Krake, and I believe that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. And before you go, Mr. Joyce, actually you mentioned the authorities, there was one thing I forget with my Right-to-Know, Mrs. Krake, I know that Mr. Barrett is the Right-to-Know officer for the Sewer Authority, could we also send it to all of the Sewer Authority members, I believe Liz Randall, Mr. Renda, and I don't know the other ones, but just so everyone -- they have a copy, and I'm sure they know what's going on and, you know, they are part of the problem as well.

MS. KRAKE: Right.

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MR. ROGAN: Mr. Joyce?

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MR. LOSCOMBE: If you pardon me, I I do have a letter from forgot one item. Bill Courtright, who formerly sat in my seat here, now he is the Collector of Taxes, regarding his concern on the Linden Street bridge and it was written to the mayor and says, "I'm writing in regard to the closed Linden Street Bridge between Ninth and Seventh Avenue. Being an elected official having received numerous phone calls about the closed bridge, I am compelled to write this letter. One of the two arteries pumping traffic from downtown into West Scranton, the most populated of our neighborhoods, is blocked. I hope we can agree that quick, correct repairs to reopen the Linden Street bridge traffic are an immediate concern.

I'm also uneasy with the safety issues developing at the intersections of the Seventh Avenue and Linden Street and Seventh Avenue and Lackawanna Avenue where extra traffic, sudden lane changes, and the

school crossing offers challenges to public safety.

The administration of Mayor James

Connors was the last to modernize the Linden

Street bridge. They used a co-mixture of

federal, state and local funds. Our local

share was 5 percent of the total costs.

Finally, Mayor Doherty, I ask a meeting be arranged with you and PennDOT, district engineer in Dunmore, Scranton City engineer, the appropriate rail officials, the contractor for the lastly repairs and any federal or state officials needed to effect positive results. I appreciate the cooperation of all individuals and agency in reopening the Linden Street Bridge.

And I do have to agree totally with Mr. Courtright on this. I had mentioned last week that I had sought a meting with PennDOT and due to unforeseen circumstances the meeting was not scheduled until the 6th of July, but this was one of my issues that the closing of the Linden Street bridge and

the apparent lack of any progress on it.

But what peaked my interest even more was the condition the West Lackawanna Avenue bridge. You know, I have taken photos of the sidewalks, I have taken photos of underneath the bridge, and I'll tell you, there was an inspection done by PennDOT last year and the city apparently has 24 months or two years to repair the issues, so we are gone by almost a year right now, but I'll tell you, what I saw, and we are going to have to presented to our engineer, he should have a copy of the engineering report from PennDOT, but it's a scary situation.

If we lose both of those arteries to West Side our closest is Luzerne Street or the expressway to get to this side of town and it's a scary situation.

And also, I mean, my concern with seeing the traffic back up over the West Lackawanna Avenue bridge adding excess weight to that bridge and the fact that there is no left turning lane causing traffic to back up even further, that's one of the issues I want to discuss with

PennDOT, but I could get to somebody prior to my meeting I will. I don't think it's something that should sit much longer because I am worried about that bridge, also, just from seeing the -- you see the sidewalks on that bridge, but there is a lot happening underneath, too, and one of the peers on that bridge is actually pushed out considerably, so we're in a bad position there.

Now, the west Lackawanna Avenue bridge from what I understand is a city bridge, the Linden Street bridge, I believe, belongs to the state, so we have to, you know, work with the state, all and all around anyways they do our bridge inspections, but I will be updating you more on this, as I, you know, meet with these individuals. I had hoped to meet with them by this meeting, tonight's meeting, but due to circumstances the earliest that they had available for me was July 6, which is the day after next week's meeting.

But if for some reason I'm able to get into the contact with anybody in the

mean time I will address these issues next week, but I will contact Mr. Courtright, too, because I share his concerns, and that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you, Mr. Loscombe and Mr. Courtright for writing that letter and as you were speaking, I travel that way a lot being a West Sider, and God forbid if a police car or fire truck has to get up there as well and especially if that bridge went down.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Exactly. I mean, we have discussed -- one of the things that started us on west Lackawanna Avenue Bridge was the lights being out. Well, apparently the reason the lights are out are not because they need bulbs changed or anything because of that shifting on the bridge and the twisting there's a conduit that goes through there and I have got photos that's actually pinched off the electrical conduit, and the only way to put lights back on there now is to run a temporary exterior conduit, so we have to get something done and something done pretty soon.

MR. ROGAN: That's for sure.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: And I just received a note that the ECTV server is down. There will the be replays until Friday or Saturday of this meeting, but live programming is still on the air. And, Mr. Joyce, thank you for patiently waiting for myself and Mr. Loscombe. You have any motions or comments?

MR. JOYCE: I do. First thing I'd like to do tonight is take the time to congratulate Mr. Jackowitz and the entire Scranton/Lackawanna County Taxpayers' Association for their efforts in putting together the Kids Swim Free project. I'm happy to say that I did make a donation to this project and I'm very glad that I was able to at least give some unfortunate children an opportunity to swim at Nay Aug.

Also, I'd like to recognize Mr. and Mr. Foster on their efforts with the West Side Hyde Park Crime Watch Group. I actually had the opportunity to attend one of their meetings this past month and it was

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very informative, it's very well-organized, they have done a tremendous job with gathering community support with outreach programs, with working with Chief Duffy as well as other officers and they are an asset to the West Side Neighborhood and they should be commended.

In other matters, the city did receive, and I know I announce this once a year, 888 money. And for those of you who don't know what 888 money is, the tax office distributes 888 money to the city every year. 888 dollars are -- it's basically a tax that's levied on individuals who work in the city that live in a community that do not pay municipal taxes. For instance, if you don't pay a wage tax and you live in "X" township and you work in the City of Scranton you would pay I believe it's 1 percent tax to the city. The city received \$409,882,09 in 888 money this year and that consists of \$362,508.04 from 2010 as well as \$47,374.05 from years 2004 to 2009, and I'd like to thank Mr. Courtright as well as his staff for providing such an elaborate

breakdown of those back due funds as well.

Mrs. Krake, I had a question for you, I put in a few requests regarding the status of our audit and has Mr. McGowan responded to any of those requests to date?

MS. KRAKE: We have not received a response.

MR. JOYCE: Okay. I just wanted to make note of this because it's getting to be quite troubling being that the Home Rule Charter dictates that we are supposed to have a completed audit by May 31 of every year and we have been receiving correspondence from Rossi & Rossi, our independent auditor, on a very consistent basis. And just to read some of the latest correspondence that they sent to us on June 21, and they sent this to our business administrator as well as to the mayor and to city council:

"Dear Ryan, our January 26, 2011,
letter to you we state that in order to
issue the December 31, 2010, audited
financial statements by May 31st of 2011 the
outline for the 2010 audit timetable

contained in the letter must be adhered to.

As of June 20, 2011, the following is a list of open items that were to be completed by March 15, 2011, that have not been completed. Obviously, the further you get behind in providing the required information to us, the longer it will take for us to complete the audit," which is very logical.

Here is stop of the open items:

Final adjusted general fund trial balances
as of December 31, 2010, and copies of the
supporting work papers. Copies of any state
audit reports issued in 2010 up to 2011.

Also, the Redevelopment Authority of the City of Scranton's December 31, 2010, audited financial statements and the Parking Authority of the City of Scranton December 31, 2010, audit financial statements.

Also, they mentioned that the following memos have been issued and responses have not been provided, and I'll read off the dates of some of these memos that were sent by Rossi & Rossi that responses have not yet been provided for:

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May 6, OECD loan questions. May 20, administrative compensated absences. May 20, clerical compensated absences. May 25, DPW compensated absences. June 7, Workers' Comp Fund Penn Security account. June 9, approved wages. June 10 FNCB, First National Community Bank, excalibur escrow. June 14, special city's traffic planning and design. June 16, Section 108 loans. 16, accounts payable, negative balances in OECD. June 16, OECD bank accounts. June 20, drawn down requests.

With this in mind, it's very vital that a completed audit is not only finished on time, but if it's going to be late it should be done as soon as possible and in order for the auditors to complete the job that they are to do it's obvious by their correspondence that I just read that there are many outstanding items, and I'm not up here to sit and belittle or demean the BA's Office or the administration by any means, all I'm asking for is a simple status report. If the information -- if there is workflow backup in the office and the

information isn't going to be provided for a month or a month and a half, we want to know.

So with that in mind, can you please resubmit administrator's office and a copy to Mayor Doherty as well.

Also, Mrs. Krake, last week I had sent a request for the mayor as well as business administrator, Ryan McGowan, to meet in city council chambers to discuss budget matters and fiscal issues both in the current year and for the 2011 or 2012 upcoming year and I haven't seen that in our mailboxes that they have responded to that letter; correct?

MS. KRAKE: They have not responded to your request on that either.

MR. JOYCE: And I also find that very unfortunate. One of my colleagues, Mr. McGoff, has stated in the past that the administration and council need to work together and I think that this is clear proof that we are reaching out to the administration. We met with the administration privately, at least myself

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and Councilwoman Evans did, and I think it's time that the administration meets with us in the public eye so that the public could know what is going on in the city as far as financial issues are concerned.

So, Mrs. Krake, please send that request one last time. If it's not answered, I will try in a different method of hopefully drawing the mayor as well as the BA into council to discuss those issues.

I have a few citizens' requests for the week. Saturday afternoon I had the opportunity to travel down to the Pinebrook softball field with some of the members of the league that play there on Sunday. you know, as you may know, I made a request last week on behalf of the softball players in the league to the Department of Public Works Bureau of Parks and Rec if they could assist the league with transporting dirt down to the field and also pull the field back every back. As one knows, the league pays a \$1,500 fee to the city every year for usage of the field and I requested a copy of that contract last week to determine who

exactly is responsible for doing what at the field.

Well, on Saturday I was prompted to come down by the field by some members due to their opinion that since I made a request for the field to be pulled back, basically raked so that the surface would be even, it only got worst. Apparently, someone from the city came down to the field and when they were working on the field they took a very large chunk of dirt off the third baseline so the only thing that was left showing were rocks and the liner of the field that's under the dirt which helps during the rainy weather as far as dealing with drainage issues.

Because of the condition of the third baseline, members of the softball league as well as myself raked dirt from the vicinity of the where the dug out area would be by the fence to replace the hole that was made in the field by the city.

Mrs. Krake, did Mr. Brazil respond to the request from our office last week regarding the assistance of the DPW to

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transport field surface to the Pine Brook field?

MS. KRAKE: No, he did not.

MR. JOYCE: Okay. With that in mind, if you could please contact him tomorrow and ask him the status of that because this is a city park and it's maintained by the city. If you were to -if you are a Scranton resident and you travel down to Pine Brook field they have a very nice playground, basketball court and a field that is in deplorable shape. I don't know when the last time actual surface or dirt surface was laid down on the softball portion, but if it's so rough that you could actually see the lining of the irrigation system, I think that's pretty bad.

Also, just to give you a snapshot of what the field looks like, there are trees hanging over parts of the outfield, so if you get a fly ball to deep center field it might hit a tree and you will probably get into an argument determining whether it's a home run or not, but anyhow, this is something that should be amended and taken

care of very swiftly as there is not too much time left in the softball season.

Secondly, several residents had reported to suspicious activity taking place at night and at other various points of the day at the 1400 block of Manilla Place, especially directly on the corner.

Residents fear that drug activity may be taking place in their neighborhood and they provided me with a license plate number of the vehicle that was often nearby when suspicious acts occur.

And, Mrs. Krake, I will provide that license plate number to you and if you could forward that to Chief Duffy it would be much appreciated, perhaps he can go over there and check on the situation.

Also, residents residing on West
Gibson Street have informed me of ongoing
problems with condemned house located at
1406 West Gibson. Residents residing around
the area have also circulated a petition
that the home be demolished. It is my
understanding that this home has been
condemned for over a year and has become

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quite an eyesore in the community. addition to this, this home was a haven for police complaints in the past and for condemnation as some of the residents in the area provided me a list of police records, visits to the house, for various disturbances over the past three-year period from 2007 to 2010. And just to give you an idea, there were over 20 police complaints in that short three-year span, so this is a nuisance property that was condemned and now it's become blight and it's become quite an eyesore, so if you could please contact Mr. Seitzinger and ask him for a status update on this property. Also, ask him if in the future this property will be scheduled for demolition.

Residents have also reported overgrown weeds and grass at the corner of Jackson Street and South Hyde Park Avenue.

Mrs. Krake, could you please forward this to Mr. Seitzinger as well.

Residents on Price Street have reported that there is overgrown grass in a vacant lot located adjacent to 1913 Price

Street. From speaking with residents, it's their understanding that the lot is owned by an out-of-town resident and needs attention as it's become a haven for various rodents and creature. Mrs. Krake, if you could please add this to the letter to Mr. Seitzinger.

And also residents of Luzerne Street have reported overgrown grass and weeds in the plot of land adjacent to the Luzerne Hotel as well as the corner of Luzerne and 15th Street. Mrs. Krake, please add this to the letter to Mr. Seitzinger.

Finally, our office received a request regarding a health concern located at a property in Scranton, which I will not mention at this time just because of privacy issues, however, I will also provide you with this and if you could send this over to Mr. Seitzinger for him to address as well and it would be greatly appreciated. That's all I have for tonight.
