9	from last week's council meeting on June 28
10	because of illness. I hope to catch up on
11	phone calls and e-mails very soon.
12	A resident of St. Ann's Street and
13	her neighbors wish to thank Mr. Dave
14	Medisee, animal control officer, for his
15	assistance in trapping five stray cats.
16	They state that he is always a true
17	gentleman and responds quickly to their
18	problems and so Scranton City Council and
19	St. Ann Street neighbors thank Dave for a
20	job well done. Keep up the great work. The
21	people do take notice. And that's it.
22	MS. KRAKE: Citizens' participation.
23	FOURTH ORDER.
24	MS. EVANS: Our first speaker this
25	is evening is Jim Floryshack.

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1	MR. FLORYSHACK: Good evening,
2	Council, and thank you for this opportunity
3	to speak here. My name is Jim Floryshack,
4	for the record it's James Floryshack, and I
5	live at 109 Emily Avenue with my family, my
6	wife and my son. We built our house back in
7	2002 and we happened to be the lucky people
8	whose property line borders the Scranton
9	School District's new elementary school, and
10	the school project started a year and a
11	half, two years ago, and things were fine
12	there for awhile with us and with the other
13	parties involved that the Scranton School
14	District, Quandel Construction Management,
15	Latona Trucking, and whoever else is
16	involved, but after awhile we noticed some
17	damage to our residence and we spoke to the
18	representative from Quandel about that
19	damage and after a period of time we were
20	told by him that there is nothing more he
21	can do for us and that he was instructed not
22	to say anything that would get them in
23	trouble.
24	Unfortunately, from that point when
25	he told me that the relationship that we had

with Quandel, who represents the Scranton School District and the other contractors, including Latona Trucking, pretty much went in the dumper, so to speak, so there was damage to the property and we just continued to live the best we could next to the construction site that went ongoing.

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There were issues throughout that whole time, probably one of the bigger issues not involving damage to the house was the dust, and the dust got really, really bad over a period of time, so much so that I had engaged the Pennsylvania Department of Environment Protection and finally approximately a month ago Pennsylvania DEP issued a violation for the dust to either Quandel or the school district or Latona Trucking, who was the site contractor, I believe, but someone got a violation and after that period of time the dust problem suddenly started to get taken care of. The water truck was run and things like that.

But because our relationship had deteriorated, they never followed through on a number of verbal agreements that we had

with the representative from Quandel and a representative from Latona Trucking, so now the project is pretty much in it's final stages and we have some serious issues and I'd like to thank Councilman Loscombe for coming up to our residence last Friday to see those serious issues.

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I was guite concerned about these issues being resolved, so on June 16 I typed up a letter and I mailed that letter to Mark Seitzinger, director of Licenses, Inspections and Permits, and I mailed a copy of the letter to Paul Kelly, the city solicitor. I had trouble getting ahold of Director Seitzinger, even though I know him on somewhat of a personal basis, and I have called him before, I have called the office number and I never seem to get a return phone call and, in fact, the dust violation that DEP issued was basically because of my efforts, not from anyone here in city hall. So I felt it was necessary to send a registered -- a certified letter, I should

> say, to Mr. Seitzinger and to Mr. Kelly stating, "Hey, we have issues here. Please

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1	do not issue a certificate of occupancy for
2	the building until our issues are
3	addressed."
4	And the letter is approximately
5	three pages long, I sent pictures along with
6	the letter. I did provide a copy of the
7	letter to Councilman Loscombe and I
8	basically listed four things, four issues on
9	the back page saying, "We really need to get
10	these addressed," and I closed by saying,
11	"Please contact me as soon as possible at,"
12	and I gave him my cell number and my home
13	number and I stated, "I anxiously await
14	hearing from you."
15	Now, I have the receipts for that
16	letter being signed for here in city hall,
17	and they were signed for on the 17th of
18	June, the day after I mailed them. It's now
19	July 5, no one has contacted me, so our
20	issues remain. I feel they are serious
21	issues and right now I'm at a loss for where
22	do I turn next?
23	The plans were approved by the
24	Planning Commission and went along the
25	process, the construction project has to be

built according to those plans. I have reason to doubt that they are not, we have serious issues that are affecting the property that my wife and I own. We have invested thousands and thousands of dollars into that property and now I send a certified letter to city hall to two individuals and nobody returns my call.

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I'm not sure if I was supposed to send that certified letter maybe before the primary election and maybe I should be from South Side and Mr. Kelly would have returned my call. I'm not so sure why Mr. Seitzinger hasn't returned my call, we have worked together in a number of capacities. Full disclosure, I've work for the city for 21 years, and I'm a loss for what we do next.

It's unfortunate that my family and I have to say to Quandel and the Scranton School District and Latona Trucking, "Listen, we need to resolve these issues and it they don't -- if we don't resolve these issues there is a chance this goes to litigation," and that's basically how I phrased it. The minute I said that nobody

11 wanted to talk to us. We were like off the 1 2 radar, so there we were on our own. So I 3 thought, well, the city administration will help me out. Two certified letters, well, 4 many phone calls and then two certified 5 letters later, nothing. 6 7 We have all kinds of slogans around here. We have "Restoring the pride." We 8 9 have, you know, "Be part of the solution." 10 All I'm asking is somebody call me up and 11 talk to me about my problems. I have worked 12 for the 21 years. I try to address problems 13 as they come up in my capacity and if I 14 don't somebody should call me on it. I'm at a loss for where to go now. 15 16 I thank Mr. Loscombe for coming to 17 my house the other day. I hope he can share 18 some insight on what we do next other than get a lawyer and sue. Thank you for your 19 20 time. 21 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 22 MR. LOSCOMBE: Can I just address 23 some of Mr. Floryshack's concerns now? 24 MS. EVANS: Yes. 25 MR. LOSCOMBE: Apparently, this was

a holiday weekend and I was unable to get in touch with the parties at this point, but tomorrow morning I do have a meeting with PennDOT so I'm looking at tomorrow afternoon to making the contacts and getting together with these individuals.

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I ran into Mr. Floryshack after last Tuesday's meeting outside and he expressed his -- you know, his concerns and asked me if I would be willing to come up and take a look at them and they are valid concerns. Ι made it up there Friday and Mr. Floryshack has made a major investment in this city and he is in an area where there are some drainage problems now there is lawsuits Ironically, they have created a over. water, standing water problem behind his house with the school district project, and it's probably about 20 feet from his nice in ground swimming pool, so it's tough to enjoy your property with the situation like that breeding mosquitos. I mean, there is a lot of erosion yet for new construction. The drainage ditch is full of sediment and the drains are just about, you know, totally

1blocked, need some reseeding again.2But one of the major problems that3saw, and Mr. Floryshack showed me the4photos, and I was beyond belief at the5amount of the dirt and dust that covered hi6property, I mean, the opposite side of his7home from the field the windows sills, the8dust in-between the wind and the screen and9the glass. It's tremendous. I think one o10the solutions, they have to put some kind o11a silt blocking fence or, you know, some12kind of a fence up that's going to block13that dust from continuing coming over from14the recreational fields there because they15are still going to have the baselines and16everything.17There was a lot of vibration when18they were doing the construction of the19school and I did notice cracks in the floor20in his floor tile which he didn't have prio21to that and there is several other issues.22But the inability for, you know, the23government entities to respond to their24constituents and work together is part of	
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25 the big problem here, and what they do in	

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1	essence is create bigger problems. We have
2	seen that at this podium many times.
3	You know, I hate to see any of this
4	come to a lawsuit for the school district or
5	the city, we are all of the same taxpaying
6	entity, and I will definitely be on the
7	phones tomorrow and within the next two days
8	I should have some meetings setup with some
9	responses and let them know how I feel about
10	it and find out what the resolutions will
11	be.
12	But, you know, stuff like this can't
13	go on because it does ultimately end up
14	costing the taxpayers more. We all have to
15	be good neighbors and I know you stated to
16	me several times Friday when I was there.
17	You love the fact that the school is there,
18	they are good neighbor and all of that, but
19	they have to be a good neighbor. They have
20	address the concerns up of their neighbors
21	before, you know, it gets compounded even
22	more and hopefully I'll be able to, you
23	know, meet with some understanding minds and
24	work this out and resolve it for you, but I
25	appreciate your bringing it to the public

15 1 and bringing it to me last week, but 2 anything I could do within this next week 3 I'll be responding right back to you, Mr. Floryshack. 4 5 MR. FLORYSHACK: Thank you so much for what you've already done, councilman, 6 coming over to my place, spending a lot of 7 8 time with me, and as I expressed to 9 Councilman Loscombe while he was there, I 10 was never a believer that someone has to 11 come here to this podium to resolve a 12 problem like this. I mean, for the amount 13 of money that he makes in a year to come and 14 spend that time he did with me, and he does that year round, you know, that's why we 15 16 have people working in the administration, 17 the executive branch of government, but when 18 you send two certified letters and no one 19 could even return a call, even if they could 20 have called and said, "Hey, listen, I read 21 your letter and there is nothing I could do 22 for you," but I didn't even get a call, so 23 this is my last resort and thank for 24 listening to me this evening, and once 25 again, thank you, Councilman, for the time

1you spent with me. It shouldn't have to2come to this.3You know, if I did this in my4capacity in the city somebody should call m5on it, and rightfully so, and I have to6answer questions quite often in my capacity7here, my job in the city, and there is8sometimes that I don't want to do it or I9feel your uncomfortable to do it, but still10that's part of my job, and I won't belabor11the point, but there is no reason it should12have came this far. There is a process13or there should be a process in place in14this building that would have addressed my15concerns before it came to you.16MR. LOSCOMBE: I would hope at this17point that the CO hasn't been approved, but18I will find that out tomorrow.19MR. FLORYSHACK: I appreciate it.	16
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18 I will find that out tomorrow.	
19 MR. FLORYSHACK: I appreciate it.	
20 Thank you very much for your time.	
21 MS. EVANS: Thank you.	
22 Mr. Loscombe, if you could keep me apprised	
23 of that	
24 MR. LOSCOMBE: Definitely.	
25 MS. EVANS: if that has been	

granted at this point in time. I think the Scranton School Board of Directors should certainly be apprised of this. Have you brought your problems before the school board publically? MR. FLORYSHACK: Yes. I haven't spoken to the school district in awhile because, obviously, our relationship between the school district and Quandel and Latona deteriorated. The last time I spoke to someone from the school district was between Christmas and New Year's, and we had a dust storm then that was unbelievable, I showed Councilman Loscombe the pictures, it was unbelievable the dust, what it did to the house, and I contacted somebody from the school district, and I'll give him credit, he listened to me rant and rave for about ten minutes and I thank him for that, but he

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never followed up with a phone call and said, "Here is what we are going to do for you."

Ironically at that time I contacted Bud Quandel from Quandel Construction Management. I spoke to Mr. Quandel. To his

credit he listened to me rant and rave for about ten minutes and I said, "I wish you would have gotten to me sooner, I'll have somebody look into it," and he never, ever called me back. He never had one of his representatives call me back.

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When we had more dust issues in the spring with all of the dry weather after the big rains and stuff I called Mr. Quandel, got his voicemail, left him a message, never got back to me, and I encourage you to look on Quandel's website. They have a great website, they list core values and mission statements and tell you that "We will do things right" or "We will get things right if we do them wrong" and all of this nice management stuff. None of it is true. None of it. Quandel is not a good neighbor. The Scranton school district hasn't been a good neighbor. Latona hasn't been a good neighbor.

I will say this, after the violation was issued to Quandel or whoever from DEP, ironically that afternoon the water truck was running for the first time ever and Quandel did come to us a few days later and offer to power wash our house. They did do that, but in answer to your original question did I speak to the Scranton School District, the last time was between Christmas and New Year's and I never got a phone call back stating, "Here is what we will do for you."

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And I also spoke to some of the project representatives from the school district, Mr. Greg Sunday, who from what I was told was running the project, I spoke to him last year out in our backyard and you would think that someone like him if, in fact, he is running the project would have looked after our interest a little bit more, but nothing. They just passed us aside because we said we had damage to our house and I said, "We need the damage resolved so it won't go to litigation," and from that point on they had nothing to do with us.

So the school district, Quandel, Latona, they are just weren't good neighbors and there we sit, you know, and if I could show you the map or the pictures you would

20 1 see where our property is like -- it's like 2 the barrel of the gun. I mean, if you look at this whole new elementary school, and I 3 think Councilman Loscombe would agree, you 4 5 probably could make the argument very easy that we were the most affected out of all of 6 7 the residents there, would you agree? 8 MR. LOSCOMBE: Definitely. 9 MR. FLORYSHACK: So you think there 10 would be something on the school district's end from Mr. Sunday if, in fact, he was 11 12 running the project and from Quandel, you 13 know, getting a little bit more involved and 14 saying, you know, "Well, what could we do here?" 15 16 You know, and I didn't even mention 17 the garbage issue. There is other issues, 18 and I don't want to hold this all up, but, 19 listen, we tried to be good neighbors and 20 Quandel and the Scranton School District and 21 Latona Trucking they weren't good neighbors 22 and now if that CO was issued I'm not sure 23 what recourse we have, and that's why I sent 24 the letter when I did certified saying, 25 "Please don't issue the CO. Please talk to

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1	me before you issue the CO," and then I
2	never got a phone call back. Thank you.
3	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Our next
4	speaker is Andy Sbaraglia.
5	MR. SBARAGLIA: I heard a lady come
6	month after month after month and that's
7	week after week into months after months
8	about that problem she had with the dust
9	from that cinder block company. What was
10	done? Nothing. What do you expect him to
11	do, I don't know because most likely you are
12	going to end with up with the same solution,
13	nothing. The school board should be held
14	responsible for Quandel, them are the people
15	that actually are causing the problem and do
16	it. If this man built on rock, which my
17	house is, every time a big truck comes by it
18	shakes and it does cause the plaster to
19	break. I don't know doubt he had the
20	problems because any time a heavy truck runs
21	over rock it sets off a vibration causes
22	that whole house to violate.
23	Well, I'm glad you finally tried to
24	do something up there in 5-B, amending that
25	so them kids can finally swim up at Nay Aug

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1	for free. I hope it goes through because
2	believe me, this West Side pool closing.
3	Pinebrook pool closing, they need a place
4	and the falls are closed. They can't even
5	use the falls. It's just too bad.
6	Now, I listened to that again on the
7	notes, okay, the delinquent taxes, why do
8	you want to stick your hands in the fire
9	again? You got burnt one for 1.5 million,
10	this isn't going to go. They are not going
11	to collect that money. If that other
12	collection agency couldn't collect four,
13	five and six there is no way they are going
14	to collect four, five and six, and we are
15	going to be in the bank for that and God
16	knows what else. I don't know how much they
17	are paying, it didn't say how much they are
18	paying to get these delinquent notes. Are
19	they paying anything or are they just being
20	contracted to collect it?
21	MS. EVANS: They are getting a
22	contract and they will get 15 percent.
23	MR. SBARAGLIA: But no money like
24	they paid the last time?
25	MS. EVANS: I don't

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1	MR. SBARAGLIA: When they sold the
2	notes to was it Northeast Collection Service
3	at that time?
4	MS. EVANS: Oh, the city received
5	money?
6	MR. SBARAGLIA: The SRA did.
7	MS. EVANS: Well, the city received
8	it.
9	MR. SBARAGLIA: Yeah, there was
10	money transferred to a whole bunch. Is that
11	being done now?
12	MS. EVANS: No.
13	MR. SBARAGLIA: Then it's strictly a
14	collection agency, collecting 15 percent of
15	it, but, of course, when we see all of the
16	penalties then we'll know exactly what it
17	is. It's just too bad the treasury
18	department can't do their job. Why have a
19	treasury department to collect this revenue
20	and not get collected? Either they could
21	have hired somebody for it in there, if they
22	needed more people to work that area they
23	should have.
24	It's just too bad we have this
25	problem in the city where people do get paid

but they are not actually doing their job. Maybe they can't even do it, who knows, but these people unless they have the powers that the other group had, they are not going to collect any more, but thank God that no money is transferring, so at least we don't have to worry about them paying a million bucks back, paying the city a million bucks and they expect to make two million back.

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Well, that's the way it goes. Ι just hope you look at the penalties very, very good. 15 percent isn't bad if that's the only thing. If there isn't penalties now to assess them and money to be assessed, money for this paper, money for that paper. Like that other list, you are right. That was criminal when we had to go to the state on it and bring all of them legislatures here and explain our problem. We don't want to get into that again. We definitely don't want to even get near that again. I mean, like I say, once burnt okay, you do get burnt, but you should never get burnt twice in the same deal. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

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1	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
2	MS. EVANS: Bob Bolus.
3	MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.
4	Bob Bolus, Scranton.
5	MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.
6	MR. BOLUS: On the agenda I like THE
7	idea under your motions "B" stopping the
8	Recreation Authority from using people in
9	this city, it's about time, and I would like
10	to see that passed and happen. We pay
11	enough in this city, enough has been
12	squandered, I think the people in the city
13	should be entitled to swim free.
14	Also, on 6-B, about transferring
15	money over to the law department, I think
16	before any money goes to the law department
17	an audit should be done to find out where
18	it's been squandered. Paul Kelly has wasted
19	city money, maybe the work he should be
20	doing that he isn't doing we're hiring
21	outside people. As you know, I have an
22	issue with him over what's been going in
23	this city and I think he needs held
24	accountable once and for all.
25	If we look at issue I'm dealing

with, if you go to 6-C where it says, "Reading by Title and Ordinance of the City", before the city can sell any real estate, whether it's tax delinquent or it's another property, well, I came here before council regarding the property up on East Mountain that Hartman has built a home on. As you know, I supplied deeds. Has anybody heard from Paul Kelly yet regarding his determination? MS. EVANS: No. MR. BOLUS: Could we kind of put a

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fire under him once and for all? I spent a lot of time and money and hired a very competent organization to research those I have done his work. I have done deeds. the work he should do, yet he wants more money to run his law department when he should be doing the job himself. This is an issue that cannot sit idly by and ignore it. There is \$50,000 that's on the table for me for that property. That 50 could have went to Novembrino Park, it could have went to a lot of other places. Guess what, it could have went to the law department. Paid

\$20,000 of their fees, so I think it's an issue that he needs to address. He has got to be held accountable or we are going to be in litigation and, of course, there goes money out of the \$20,000 that he is looking for.

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The 16 1/2 foot Hartman doesn't own, Judge Mazzoni gave the property the subdivision approval, but he can't give what has easements, what has right-of-ways or anything else, he can't sell that. It's not sold, just a subdivision that's being approved subject to. And it's got to be taken care of. The chain of title goes from now all the way back to the 1800's. There is no breaking a chain of title. There is nothing in there that said by ordinance or file of council that that land was ever sold. No where can you find it. So it needs to be resolved.

I also would like council to intervene once and for all on the condemnation of my home. That was done by Graziano who did not have the qualifications. He didn't have structural

qualifications, he didn't have electrical or other qualifications to file a condemnation. It's illegal, it's been illegal, we paid for the permit to the city, for the building permit there, and we have never got our money back, yet they won't issue the permit and they won't come forward to resolve this issue.

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It's getting to the point that I am going to go forward and I am going to repair my home with or without the permit of the city because as far as I'm concerned I paid for it and if Paul Kelly has an issue with that I guess he could run around and arrest who he thinks he could arrest and bully the rest of the people in the city.

I'm not going to be prohibited by an illegal action created by an inspector who is not qualified, and ironically, the same inspector no longer works for the city. He was involved in the permitting of Weissman back on Keyser Avenue adjacent to the Boots & Hanks property, which is one whole property, they are both running scrap yards, yet Graziano, it's my understanding,

approved the permits and now he works there. So, you know, you tell me what stinks in Scranton? And if that's the case I think the permit should be really re-evaluated and looked at as to what went on here.

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My home has become a target for vandals and thieves. Last Sunday people drove into my driveway and I have a piping sitting there and actually stole it, and they are on camera. They were videoed. We turned it over to the police department yet my abutting neighbor, Mr. Hartman, stood there and watched all of this go on and never said a word. I happened to arrive shortly afterwards and saw something wasn't right and took some pictures but nobody said a word about it, and this is the issue that Paul Kelly has created.

You know, I travel a lot, I'm not in the town on a daily basis, I'm here, there and everywhere, but, you know, it's sad that people like this that are in our administration and they protect people who are breaking the law. Hartman has had an illegal vehicle parked there, a commercial

vehicle, for a year. It's never turned a wheel, yet I'm being singled out? He had a pool he put in and never had a fence on yet Wallace never bothered to go up and issue a citation after we photographed it, sent him the pictures and spoke to him about it. Showed him the truck that's there and he could care less. When he was standing up there he could care less.

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This is the issues I'm dealing with in this city, and that's why I hate to even come before council. I would rather be here on more productive issues, more issues that concern making a better city and doing things than having to deal with the incompetence of some of the people in the administration and it starts with Chris Doherty because I did speak to him twice.

Now, he is the head of the ship, he could resolve this in two minutes. I think it's time he got off his butt and did something about it. I don't want to penalize the people in this city by taking on litigation and more embarrassment because of the incompetence or the arrogance of

certain people in this city. Now, if they want to fight they are going to get the fight but I am going to repair my home and if they want to come up and file citations I'm saying it publically go ahead and do it because it was illegal what you did, you didn't follow the codes issued by the state, I have had outside inspectors come in here and paid them and we are ready to go to work and it's ridiculous to have to do that, so I would ask counsel if we could do that.

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And also one more thing, there is no attorney representing me as far as the Hartman issue, I'm the land under this house. Attorneys are representing me regarding my easement and the issues we have going in and out of my property. There is representation there, but not on the other so Paul Kelly has got to get it straight and respond to it, and I believe that's it lastly.

I would like to take one moment to say one thing, a very close friend and individual in the business person in the city and a community leader passed away,

Sarkis Hazzouri, and I would like to make 1 2 mention and if anybody could take a second 3 to just remember what they have done and what he has done for this city I would 4 5 appreciate it, and thank you. MS. EVANS: 6 Thank you. Pedro Gonzalez. 7 8 MR. GONZALEZ: Greetings and 9 salutations to all. My name is Pedro 10 Gonzalez, city resident and taxpayer. As usual, I come once in a blue moon to 11 12 announce the community events and things to 13 that are up and coming. 14 As you well know, August is around the corner and we throw our annual Scranton 15 16 Latin Pride weekend. This year it will be 17 August 13 and 14 and we have been honored 18 with being allowed to have it at courthouse 19 square. No more Nay Aug Park. We are 20 trying to work more with the county on 21 events and specific things for obvious 22 reasons. 23 This year there is going to be tons 24 of entertainment just like we do every 25 single year, authentic food. We are working

with local businesses downtown which is a first in the footprint of Scranton trying to develop more business down there as many other organizations are doing. It's a tremendous honor to hopefully, hopefully one day many years from now be held up to the same esteems and the status of the Italian festival. You know, we know we have a long way to go. We are babies, it's only year six for us, many other groups and individuals have been doing it for 20 or 30 years now, you know, we are still young, but humble to the fact and we are going to have a trait time this year we hope.

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We have plenty of promotional parties setup, plenty of promotional events. This year we are going to have our very first Scranton Latina Princess pageant held at the Steamtown Mall July 23, center court. And basically all of the requirements, the requirements are \$5 registration fee, a report card with good grades, and any talent would be a plus and, of course, being Latina is a must.

Many of the individuals that watch

this station are Latinos so, you know, many of them have asked me to speak more Spanish I am bilingual and, of course, our time is coming in this city. Many individuals are fighting it now, they will fight it for many years to come, you know, and that's why I don't come as often as I used to because it's like beating a dead horse or banging my head against a wall. I just don't have the time for it, people. I have more productive things to do with my life.

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And many individuals out there in the community we have bounded together and instead of arguing more we are taking matters into our own hands, again, for obvious reasons and we seem to be doing okay. We are not here to point fingers, as I never do, we are not here to cause blame, we just trying to find a solution to a lot of the problems that are happening here. We are no different from past individuals that have come from other countries many years back and dealing with the issues that they were dealing with in regards to acceptance within this city, this specific city,

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1	Scranton. We are no different, so this is
2	how we are going to handle it.
3	Many elected officials wonder why
4	Latino people don't come out and vote. The
5	question is obvious. I mean, the answer is
6	obvious. They get no respect, so why vote
7	for you, and please don't shoot the
8	messenger, that's all I am, just a
9	messenger. Again, I'm not here pointing
10	fingers or causing blame just giving the
11	answer to the question that was asked why
12	don't more Latinos vote, why aren't there
13	more Latinos registered to vote in this
14	city.
15	According to the census we are about
16	to 18 percent Latinos in the city, but if
17	you look it the Voter's Registration Office
18	those numbers don't show and they will never
19	show, but Latin people have chosen not to go
20	to the polls despite all of the arguing and
21	the fighting of myself and others who keep
22	telling them, you know, not voting is not
23	the answer actually, it's adding to the
24	problem. We all need to vote regardless of
25	the fact. Many of our ancestors fought and

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1	died for that privilege to vote, but they
2	don't want to hear that, you know, from
3	whoever it is, so I have tried.
4	At this festival, at the Scranton
5	Latin Festival we have a couple of political
6	entities that have signed on, sponsored and
7	are participating in some shape or form,
8	they have gotten a table to promote
9	themselves in some shape or form. So,
10	please, all of those individuals who are out
11	there, political individuals who are trying
12	to run for some type of office, we ask
13	humbly and respectfully that you have some
14	kind of courtesy for those individuals that
15	did pay to be there, did pay to promote
16	themselves and did pay to have their banners
17	up and pass out their leaflets. I know last
18	year many individuals came out and just was,
19	you know, trying to get in front of the
20	people and trying to get on stage and it got
21	a little out of control, and this year we
22	are addressing that with a sterner hand.
23	So if anybody wishes to participate
24	please jump on our Scranton Latin Pride
25	Facebook page or you can e-mail us at

37 1 Scranton Latin Pride at gmail.com. We still 2 have time for many individuals to come and 3 sponsor and promote their business or whatever it is they might want to promote. 4 5 We welcome all nationalities, all individuals, no matter who you are in this 6 7 city or outside of the city. If you white, 8 purple, green, we welcome you. You are all 9 Latino on our weekend. May God continue to 10 bless you all, and as always, my name is 11 Pedro Gonzalez and thank you for allowing me 12 to express myself. 13 I'm going to leave these here for 14 you, some information. God bless you all. MR. JOYCE: 15 Thank you very much. 16 MS. EVANS: Bill Jackowitz. 17 MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, 18 Council. Bill Jackowitz, South Scranton 19 resident and member of the Taxpayers' Association. 20 21 MR. JOYCE: Good evening. 22 MR. JACKOWITZ: I was glad to hear 23 tonight that possibly the Doherty three fees 24 that were approved may be disappearing. I'm glad if that happens. Also, I was surprised 25

that the city treasurer and the city administrator were not here tonight. I would think that they would be part of this, but apparently I guess they felt they didn't need to be here. Would have been nice if they showed up, but what are you going to do.

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All authorities should be disbanded immediately. Mr. Eugene Barrett should resign and Mr. William Lazar should resign, Mr. Gary Pelicacci should resign, Mr. Robert Scopelliti should resign. The above mentioned are directors of the various authorities in Scranton. The entire Parks and Recreation Authority should resign and no appointments should be approved by council in the future for any authorities.

I understand that the Honorable Chris Doherty makes and approves the appointments, so let him hang out on a limb by himself. When the authorities collapse and cost the citizens and taxpayers of Scranton millions of dollars, let the Honorable Doherty do the explaining. Just my opinion, that is what I do if I ever

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I ask city council members in viewing audience and members both present and watching the broadcast, do you really believe that the Scranton politicians can really cooperate with each other for the good of the City of Scranton? The supermajority of council has extended an olive branch to the mayor of Scranton by attending a private meeting behind closed doors with the business administrator and is held to their word by not making what was discussed public knowledge.

Now, I must ask Mr. McGoff and, Mr. McGoff, even though you are not here, what was accomplished by holding a private meeting and keeping everything that was discussed from the citizens? My answer: Nothing expect to convince me that something

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1	is being hidden by the business
2	administrator and the administration.
3	Mr. McGoff, you advocate cooperation
4	so how about doing something about it?
5	Invite the administration to either a
6	council meeting or a town hall meeting open
7	to the public where questions and hopefully
8	answers will be provided by both the
9	citizens and the administration, otherwise,
10	let's just accept the fact that the
11	administration was not interested in
12	cooperating with anybody except themselves.
13	Cooperation, an act of working or
14	acting together for common purpose or
15	benefit. Joint action.
16	The swim free event is an example of
17	cooperation between the citizens, business
18	owners, who are the donors that make the
19	event happen. The kids are the
20	beneficiaries, they enjoy the day and the
21	pool and slide. The administration and the
22	recreation board are the politicians. The
23	fact that the Parks and Recreation Authority
24	would not give the Taxpayers' Association a
25	reduced rate, but instead raise the

admission rate to \$4 per person is an example of lack of cooperation between the appointed authority and the appointed department heads with the taxpayers, but my opinion a lack of the cooperation to the children and the kids.

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If we want to keep the children off the streets and involved in activities, the pool is a perfect place. Not only are they off the street, there are getting some healthy exercise. Instead, the administration chooses to close two swimming pools in the neighborhoods, taking away from the children. Why then claim lack of the funds to pay for lifeguards and chemicals. Also the fact that they would like to construct this splash pool at the Novembrino pool in West Scranton and that the work at the Pinebrook pool has not been completed.

Again, in my opinion a total lack of cooperation with the citizens and more importantly with the children in the area. If parks and recreation in the city are really facing a financial crisis, I must ask why have fireworks displays in downtown

Scranton? Although I understand some of that was made by private entities. That money -- there is fireworks displays throughout the region, Mohegan Sun had a fantastic one. Every community has a fireworks display, why did we need a fireworks display? We could have gone anywhere to seen one other than in the city.

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So as we all can just -- so as we all can just see from these few examples that the City of Scranton has a long road ahead to reach the final result and cooperation between elected officials, politicians and the citizens. Come on, Mayor Doherty, pass the olive branch and become a real leader and start cooperating and inform your cabinet members, who you chose, to also start cooperating and start attending public meetings such as city council or hold your own public meetings somewhere and invite the TV crews and the newspapers and let's talk about it.

Just like that first gentleman who spoke here today, lack of cooperation from the city and administration and it needs to

1stop, otherwise, the City of Scranton will2become nothing more than an exit off Route381 for people to find a hotel room, get4something to eat, get back on the 81 and go5somewhere where they cooperate.6MS. EVANS: Thank you. Ron Ellman.7MR. ELLMAN: Good evening, Council.8MS. EVANS: Good evening.9MR. JOYCE: Good evening10MR. ELLMAN: You know, it's nice to11be loved and missed. Rite a couple of weeks ago that I mentioned and this guy was just a pure bigot the way he talked about the -- he bragged that the pool was closed. You can't have a city -you try to bring people together in the city and there is a lot of things that all of us don't agree on, but you can't have people like this dictating, you know, policy and a dollar more with all of the waste that's gone on with Mr. Doherty and it's just uncalled for.

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There is no reason these pools aren't open. I don't care. I don't know how many children won't swim, but it's sad when you hear a mother just telling you, I mean, she told me -- in fact, she said, "I don't use it for a babysitter, I stay there with them a couple of hours," so I guess they're small children, I don't know.

But then I'd like to mention my pet peeve about the parking on the sidewalks. I walked down Saturday, Saturday I walked down to Market Street and back with my little Bassett hound and the 2100 and 2000 block there is houses that have driveways and they

are parked completely with all four wheels on the sidewalk, it's just senseless. It's uncalled for. I could see letting your car stop and putting groceries out or picking up somebody, but to park all day long, when you have a driveway, on the sidewalk, the police ought to just start ticketing every car. We need income, you'd get a lot of money that way.

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And I'd just like to say I went to that festival last year and it was a nice event because I love all of that kind of food. The only criticism I have about it they need a stand that sells Pepto Bismol or Alka Seltzer, something, but it was really enjoyable and I hope they -- I think this is the third one I went to -- it seemed like I have been there twice, but it's really a nice event. You get a little food and all you don't spend too much money and I hope that they find some support for it.

And again, I'd like to thank council for the privilege of letting me come up here. I had some people talking about these meetings and, you know, like I said a couple

of times, I couldn't believe when I first started years ago the people that watch them. I thought maybe there was a couple of hundred people or something, these meetings really are -- they are well watched. I don't know -- how about this. Isn't that good timing. It must be one of my fans telling me how much they appreciate my opinion on television right now, but I do appreciate coming up here.

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I can't make all of these meetings all of the time any more, I'd like to see some fresh blood come up here and I tell people all the time to come up here instead of talking to one of us, and I told one of the people that was running for office they should come up here to these meetings. Ι think it ought to be a prerequisite really if you want to run for any kind of office in here to come to a council meeting once in awhile. Maybe our esteemed mayor or the next person that takes his place will come to these meetings thankfully. What is that on top of your straw? I see what --MS. EVANS: Well, to end your

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1	comments this evening I shall tell you, it
2	is a little cap that is placed on the top of
3	the straw and that prevents it from spilling
4	out.
5	MR. ELLMAN: Every time you wriggle
6	it, it's doing like this.
7	MS. EVANS: I'm sorry I distracted
8	you.
9	MR. ELLMAN: I thank council.
10	MS. EVANS: Thank you.
11	MR. JOYCE: Thank you.
12	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
13	MS. EVANS: Lee Morgan.
14	MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.
15	MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.
16	MR. MORGAN: I also would like to
17	say that in motions 5-B I think it's really
18	a great idea and I just hope that council
19	can fast track it and move this legislation
20	through. I think it would be a benefit to
21	all of the residents of in city to just stop
22	the admission fees at Nay Aug Park. I think
23	it would be a great benefit to the
24	community.
25	The other thing is, you know, I have

been really busy for the last five or six weeks, I have been on delivery routes between New Hampshire and Virginia and I haven't had an opportunity to come here or to bring the tax group together, but we are going to meet relatively soon, but I just hope that the city -- I haven't seen a city like Scranton, you know, like you watch the news in other communities and they talk about the debt, I mean, they are talking about Harrisburg outside of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and there is lot of discussions going on, but look it, we've got to find a solution to the problems we have here in this city.

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Mr. Gonzalez, Pedro, got up and spoke previous to myself and, you know, I think that's part of the problem. Not him personally, but he stated what he believed to be a fact that 18 percent of the City of Scranton was Latino or Latina. I mean, you know, Spanish speakers and they refuse to vote, and from many of the people on this council, you have all run for elected office, and I'm sure you were at a lot of

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1	doors where people just don't vote, so how
2	can we find solutions to our problems if
3	people aren't willing to be involved?
4	I mean, evidently we can all have
5	disagreements, but there is really no excuse
6	for not coming out to vote. There is
7	absolutely no excuse. Now, my father was a
8	World War II veteran, you know, and then my
9	brothers were in Vietnam and now we have got
10	Desert Storm and we got all of these people
11	that are allegedly fighting to give us this
12	right to vote and to change our communities
13	and it's just not happening, and they just
14	don't want to participate and they are the
15	only people that can change where we are
16	because, you know, you have just got to see.
17	I mean, you know, you take a look at
18	the city itself, it's deteriorating and it
19	continues to deteriorate. I don't
20	necessarily agree with a lot of things that
21	happened here, I would like to see the
22	contract to chase delinquent taxes. I think
23	we need to find new solutions. I still
24	think SAPA was a good idea. I know the
25	majority of the council may disagree. I

think we have to create jobs. I think we have to find new avenues of approach and new ways to raise revenue, and I just think the fees and taxes aren't necessarily the way to go, and the greatest gift that any resident in this city can give back to this community is to get out and vote. Find out what you think the issues are, come meet the candidates, present the candidates with your opinions.

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I mean, maybe the people running for office don't know what the issues are. They may think they know what the issues are, but maybe they are not really being discussed and maybe it's time to start really starting to discuss some new ideas and bring up some new issues, and I agree with some other people said about Daron Block and the problem with the new school construction and the dust. Look it, nothing was done there. Those people by Daron Block suffered for a long time and we have had a lot of problems. What the solutions are, it's really

simple, register to vote, meet the candidates, and on election day vote because

52 1 you know what the person asking for your 2 bote is trying to sell you because that's 3 what you are doing when you vote. You are buying something and we can see what we 4 5 bought in this city, what \$313 million of long-term debt and no solutions and one time 6 7 fixes and just a city that's just mired in 8 -- use any word you want to determine what 9 we are mired in, but it's not success, and I 10 appreciate your time. 11 MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Dave 12 Dobrzyn. 13 MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening. 14 MR. DOBRZYN: Resident of Scranton. Okay, one of the -- a rumor I heard. 15 And 16 I'll state that it's strictly a rumor, it 17 would up to you to find out, is that with 18 these fees at Nay Aug, especially for 19 groups, some groups are given a rate of 20 maybe \$2, some pay \$3, some are forced to 21 pay the full amount, and that would very 22 disturbing and hopefully you people could 23 figure out a way to investigate it because 24 it's not right. That is blatant 25 discrimination and it's not only maybe

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1	racial, but it's political discrimination
2	and shame on our Authority, our Recreation
3	Authority, if that be the case.
4	Now, I have spoken a couple of weeks
5	on trash removal and one thing that popped
6	into my mind Mr. Joyce said about the fines,
7	I would say maybe we should reduce the fines
8	and expand the enforcement, where \$150 seems
9	a little steep, but if somebody gets whacked
10	with a \$25 fine or a \$30 fine and then they
11	get told the next time if you don't stop
12	this because my opinion is that every
13	every trash that's put out should be in a
14	can the day before and if you can't bother
15	to buy a can then you should get up in the
16	morning and put it out maybe at five or six
17	o'clock before they start to collect. I see
18	some improvements, but, you know, it's
19	really important and it breeds pests and so
20	forth and stench and so that other neighbors
21	have to put up with it.
22	On this Sewer Authority, I see
23	council is the subject of discussion in the
24	paper once again this morning, and I think
25	it's important that sometime in the near

future we put -- make them put the cards on the table as to what this is all about. I understand some of it because I did talk to somebody when I was with the Taxpayers' filming me they asked me about possibly coming in and to discuss it and so I'll hand this information over maybe to Lee sometime.

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But, also, understand that it's federal government requirement we are already fined \$2 million and down in the middle of Old Forge in the middle of the river there is a bore hole that deposits mine water to prevent basements in the lower valley from flooding and this bore hole basically poisons the river for any, almost nearly any type of aquatic life whatsoever. In fact, migratory fish do not come up with the Lackawanna River past -- because of that bore hole, so here we are being demanded to spend bucko cash and pay high rates and we have a bore hole that the federal government doesn't give a damn about that's contaminating the river anyway.

And a little thought popped into my head before when this first speaker was up

about mosquito control, a good tip is oil. If you get vegetable oil, if you could get like a half a gallon on a small pond and it's environmently friendly, it will kill off the mosquitos. I do this in anything I see with standing water around, a little shot glass or two of cheap vegetable oil and the mosquitoes die off, they can't get in or out of the surface of the water to breathe.

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So now we are down to the golden parrot, it goes to Hamid Karzai of Afghanistan. He calls or troops occupiers, we spent \$3.7 trillion in the last several years, a lot of it on Afghanistan, not all of it, certainly not all of it, we have lives lost and if he is not nuts and lost his head I'm sure that when the Taliban comes he might. Have a good night. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anything else who would like to address council?

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1	I did want to say that I did receive your

6	question. The question was a comparison of
7	delinquencies at this point in time this
8	year to last year in the audit.
9	MR. JOYCE: Yes, I will send that to
10	you.
11	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Thank you.
12	Marie Schumacher, city resident and property
13	owner. Today's Times-Tribune article on the
14	boroughs and township's police officers
15	working overtime, it made me wonder whether
16	the city's contract with the police
17	department, does it allow police officers to
18	work part-time other places, and if so is
19	there any limit on the hours and maybe
20	Mr. Loscombe can answer that during motions
21	or maybe next week if the answer isn't
22	available now.
23	I also was going to acknowledge the
24	fact that Mr. McGoff did show up yesterday
25	at the Honor our Flag ceremony on the Fourth

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1	of July, which was nice to see.
2	And then Mr. Joyce just left again,
3	I'll come back it him. The fire department
4	I learned today approves at least new
5	construction building permits and I would
6	like to ask Councilman Loscombe to find out
7	whether the new construction permits are
8	including the sprinkler systems requirement.
9	And then on the caucus tonight, it's
10	my recollection that city council provided
11	an additional employee for the Single Tax
12	Office as they were to collect the 2009-2010
13	delinquent taxes.
14	MS. EVANS: Just the 2010.
15	MS. SCHUMACHER: Just the 2010, and
16	now those are going to go to this other
17	entity, that Northeast so that person
18	will be
19	MS. EVANS: Because whatever they
20	were unable to address will go to Northeast
21	Revenue Services and they will follow-up on
22	it, and actually the information provided by
23	the city tax office is going to be very
24	useful to them and provide a clean year, if
25	you will, so that, you know, that at least

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1	is one very
2	MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, I understand
3	that.
4	MS. EVANS: productive endeavor.
5	MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, but that
6	person then will not be in next year's
7	budget because this new entity will be
8	collecting the taxes, is that
9	MS. EVANS: I think we have to I
10	wasn't even certain that they had an
11	additional employee for the collection of
12	the taxes, but certainly if they are not
13	going to be collecting delinquencies any
14	longer, and the wage tax beginning in 2012,
15	I believe, will no longer be collected
16	through the Single Tax Office
17	MS. SCHUMACHER: That's true, Act 32
18	has taken that out of their hands.
19	MS. EVANS: Yes. Then it would seem
20	that the Single Tax office may be downsized.
21	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Thank you.
22	Also, the Rockwell Avenue Bridge I talked
23	about a couple of weeks ago as not having
24	any of the OECD funds drawn down on that and
25	has anyone checked that to find out

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1	checked up on that to find out what the
2	holdup is?
3	MR. ROGAN: I haven't heard
4	anything.
5	MS. SCHUMACHER: I think perhaps
6	MR. ROGAN: We are still working
7	hard on the Crisp Avenue Bridge for like
8	seven or eight years.
9	MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, Rockwell has
10	been out there for awhile, too. Next, now,
11	speaking of city actions the first speaker
12	prompted me city actions or lack thereof on
13	issues such a drainage. I wondered if
14	council has yet determined how the Medallis
15	flooding issue from the Village of Tripp
16	Park how that issue is going to be resolved
17	or whether the former Daron Northeast
18	property in lower Greenridge will be rezoned
19	as recommended by the federal government
20	agency?
21	And regarding 5-B, I plead ignorance
22	here because I know it's a resolution and I
23	know an ordinance is a law, but I don't
24	understand the legal ramifications of what a
25	resolution does and what a power it carries

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1	or if it's just a recommendation or so
2	the solicitor has left, so I don't know, but
3	I would like to know what the distinction is
4	between a resolution and the ordinance as
5	far as follow through.
6	And then I would like to know what
7	your plans are for August, is council going
8	to meet or recess for August, and then
9	remind viewers that the OECD applications
10	for those who may want to seek funds next
11	year or grants for next year's funds I
12	believe are now available and due I believe
13	the 8th of August, but don't quote me on
14	that one.
15	And then on my Ice Box question
16	since I have tried here and I've tried the
17	administration I guess the only thing left
18	to do is to petitioning the Commonwealth
19	Attorney General to try to get an answer
20	from him and that concludes my comments
21	tonight. Thank you.

25	that the highest bid isn't the lowest

bidder isn't always the best bidder, which I would agree not always. And in the article they say, "Yet Mr. Rogan simply assumes that the low faced value bid is the most responsible bid. According to Scranton Sewer Authority Solicitor Jeff Belardi, the lower bids contained inaccuracies relative to the bid specifications."

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Now, they say that in the newspaper, but they don't back up it with one inaccuracy. Not one. Was it a security? Was it a typo? What were the inaccuracies? We are talking about millions of dollars here. For some reason the Scranton Times just seems like they are shielding the Sewer Authority. It took two weeks for an article to get into the paper about misuse of the equipment, and I apologize to Josh, I didn't get back to him in time regarding that, I missed the call, I didn't get back to him. Regarding that article, Mr. McGoff.

Who is not here, I won't beat him up too much because he is not here, he said that council wanted to make it a public issue, and absolutely it should be a public issue. When you have public property being used by a private person that's a public issue. That's why we have city council meetings for issues like that, and rates are going up, the flat rate is gone, rates have gone up, people demand accountability and it looks like money is just being squandered at the Sewer Authority.

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Also, another Scranton Times article talked about Sewer Authority member Liz Randol possibly running for mayor, but if she wants to mayor or not that's up to her, but she is responsible for what's going on at the Sewer Authority among others, and the whole board has to answer for it not just Mr. Barrett. They have all been overseeing what's been going on there all these years and I have a submitted those Right-to-Know requests last week so in 23 days, unfortunately, it looks like we won't be meeting in August, so we are going to have to wait a little bit longer than that, but I will make those available to anybody that likes them when they come in and make comment also to the media, and I would

meeting of June 28, 2011, and the transfer of the funds and work on the Novembrino Pools can be conducted as soon as the mayor signs the legislation. To date, the mayor has failed to respond and that there has been neither a signature provided nor a veto.

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Now, the mayor has ten days in which to provide his signature. However, if the mayor chooses to veto this legislation, it will be placed on council's agenda for an override vote at the next regularly scheduled meeting. I hope that the mayor will sign this legislation and join city council in providing free swimming in West Scranton within the next week. After all, the winners and losers are the children, and city council doesn't want these children to lose.

Next, the legislation titled "Amending Chapter 332 of the Code of the City of Scranton titled Parks and Recreation by adding Article III, "West Scranton Skate Park Facility Rules and Regulations" appears on the agenda in Sixth Order. The

amendment of the Code of the City of Scranton requires a public hearing prior to final approval of the legislation. Since the law department did not provide direction or cooperation for this public hearing, city council has scheduled it for Tuesday, July 12, 2011, at 6:00 p.m. because we wish to see the skate park move forward.

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Also on tonight's agenda, is Item 6-B amending File of Council No. 52, 2010, entitled "General City Operating Budget 2011" by transferring \$20,000 from the contingency account to the law department professional services account to provide funding to cover various attorney fees.

Approximately \$83,000 was included in the 2011 budget for professional services in the law department and in less than six months it appears that the entire allocation was spent. Therefore, with my honorable colleagues' agreement, council would like to send a letter to the business administrator and law department tomorrow morning requesting a complete breakdown of the \$20,000 in various attorney fees to include the name of each attorney, the dollar amount charged by each attorney, and the service performed by each attorney for each dollar amount. Council requests a response on or about before July 11, 2011. If the information is not timely provided, council will table the legislation in Seventh Order until such time as the information is produced by the administration and received in city council's office. Next, I would like to ask that

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Solicitor Hughes prepare an amendment to the towing legislation for placement in Fifth Order on the July 12, 2011, agenda. I would like to dispense with this legislation prior to council's August recess.

Now, perhaps this issue was addressed at last week's council meeting, and so I ask for your indulgence. According to a memo from City Solicitor Paul Kelly, he has recommended that the City of Scranton reject both bids for parking meter monitoring services. It is clear that the city administration does not wish to generate new revenue through this parking

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1	program unlike the many Pennsylvania
2	municipalities that are currently utilizing
3	it and others that have contacted
4	Mrs. Krake's office to obtain contact
5	information for StreetSmart and are
6	considering implementation.
7	At the same time, however, the city
8	rejected bids for a janitorial service for
9	city hall and police headquarters,
10	immediately rebid and is in the process of
11	selecting a bidder. Apparently, a cleaning
12	contract is more important than generating
13	new revenue in the face of the 2011
14	multi-million dollar deficit.
15	It may be time to take a long hard
16	look at the sale or lease of the city's
17	parking garages in order at a minimum to get
18	one financial albatross off the taxpayers'
19	next. A similar proposal is also included
20	in the Harrisburg Recovery Plan. It is
21	doable in Harrisburg, another distressed
22	municipality, it may be well be doable in
23	the City of Scranton.
24	Apparently, the Pennsylvania Economy
25	League enabled municipal authorities to bury

cities in debt when it should act to prevent use of the authorities as conduits for borrowing with recourse. PEL watched it occur time and again in Scranton without objection. It, too, bears the burden of responsibility for Scranton's debt and deficit and it needs to provide myriad solutions to the monster it helped this administration to create beyond it's time-born suggestion to raise taxes.

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Since school districts face serious cuts in the new state budget, the costs of education will be passed onto local taxpayers and families whose children attend our state universities. Does PEL believe Scranton taxpayers can survive a tax onslaught from two or two more governing bodies? The socioeconomic structure of Scranton cannot survive such an attack.

Finally, I have citizens' requests for the week: 934 Hemlock Street, this is a third request, neighbors report high grass and weeds, overgrown trees, and mosquitoes. The house is vacant and the property has not been maintained. An 82-year-old woman who

70 1 lives next door and she reports that tree 2 limbs from this property are growing onto 3 her house. She needs help and council asks for the third time that an inspector is sent 4 5 to this location and action is taken by the 6 homeowner. 1101 Cedar Avenue, neighbors report 7 8 there are tires and junk in the yard and 9 that sidewalks have been left unfinished for 10 many months. They request that either a 11 sign is posted or wooden horses are placed at the sidewalks since they present a safety 12 13 hazard to the pedestrians. 14 In addition, this structure has been an ongoing problem for a minimum of five 15 16 The owner has been given several years. 17 opportunities to repair and renovate the 18 building and each time an effort begins and 19 then ends abruptly leaving this a nuisance 20 property. Please provide council with a 21 written update on or before July 11. 22 Include the measures taken to address the 23 sidewalks. 24 Neighbors report a second floor 25 apartment on Harrison Avenue which a couple

and child moved into approximately four weeks ago. Since then, neighbors state that more individuals have joined them until there are currently between 14 and 16 adults and children residing in the two bedroom one bathroom unit. Please inspect and contact the building manager to enforce the city ordinance regarding number of occupants per apartment. I have the address of the apartment building and the name and phone number of the building manager, which is to be provided to Mr. Seitzinger or Mr. Oleski.

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895 Providence Road, this is the site of the old Atlas Glass business. The property is so overgrown that pedestrians can no longer use the sidewalks and are forced to walk on Providence Road creating a very dangerous safety issue. Each summer for the last three years the neighbors on Providence Road have asked that the property be cut and maintained.

I have requested this time and again on their behalf and here we are yet again because absent property owners are getting away with breaking city ordinances and are basically thumbing their noses at their neighbors and this city. I realize that there are procedures and laws in place, but for how many years is a property owner allowed to retain a nuisance property or a safety hazard? How many times will the city turn the other cheek? I have seen it happen all too often over these eight years and the city should take more aggressive action toward absentee property owners.

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City residents wish to know if the Paul Ross baseball field property located in Greenridge was sold to Lackawanna College. If so, please respond to the following questions: When did the sale occur and under whose authority? What was the sale price? Were plans submitted for athletic field approval? Were residents in the surrounding neighborhood made aware of the sale? Please provide a response on or before July 22, 2011.

Fill a large pothole at the entrance to Powell Court beginning at Warner Street, which is a cross street of Birney Avenue and Pittston Avenue. Neighbors report that

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1	their cars bottom out when driving through
2	this Court.
3	1606 Ash Street, this property is
4	highly overgrown with weeds and grass and
5	has been a haven for small creatures. This
6	is another ongoing problem. I recall having
7	addressed this last summer. In addition,
8	the gas meter was long ago removed from the
9	outside of the house. Please address this
10	property as soon as possible because a
11	four-year-old child who is battling very
12	rare pediatric cancers resides next door and
13	she very much wants to play outside in her
14	backyard which borders 1606 Ash Street, so I
15	am hoping that the city will do something
16	about this week.
17	I have also attached citizens'
18	requests that were called into our office
19	recently.
20	And, finally, with regard to the
21	August recess, it is the wish of the
22	majority of the current council members to
23	recess during the month of the August as has
24	been done basically at least since I believe
25	the year either 1904 or 1912. Should any

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1	situation arise that is of great importance
2	to the City of Scranton or it's people, city
3	council will convene meetings during the
4	month of August.
5	Setting that aside, however, there
6	will be the annual August recess and
7	citizens can continue during that time
8	period to contact council members with their
9	complaints and requests via e-mail, phone,
10	and by contacting the office of Scranton
11	City Council.
12	MR. ROGAN: Mrs. Evans, didn't
13	council meet in August in 2005?
14	MS. EVANS: And, yes, and that was
15	under the presidency of Mr. DiBileo and at
16	the time there was great issue at hand which
17	was the potential foreclosure of the Hilton
18	Hotel and Mr. DiBileo asked that council
19	remain in session throughout August so that
20	it could work on that issue and prevent the
21	hotel from going into foreclosure and,
22	therefore, closing.
23	Unfortunately, I think what occurred
24	at the tail end of that was that council,
25	myself not included, basically agreed with

the plan developed by the purchaser and the Mayor of Scranton which then caused the city to lose \$3 million and that was how the situation was resolved rather than following an alternate course of action I know I had at the time worked on this issue with the city solicitor and several attorneys to provide an alternate plan whereby the city would not lose those millions, but that plan was not considered by my colleagues, but that was the reason for that particular session.

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MR. ROGAN: I would just say regarding the August recess, whether we have, you know, something major like that comes up or not even if you were just to meet for an hour if there was no legislation just so the public could come and comment or, for instance, I know some of the legislation we would be getting will run into August unless it's pushed ahead, and I just think that, you know, we're the legislative, we're the face of the city, much more so than Mayor Doherty is. MS. EVANS: Well, the legislation

Final actually would not be forthcoming. legislation arrived today in order to receive final approval within the following three weeks, and having been one of those council members who actually did attend all of the August meetings that particular session, and there were some council members who did not, no legislation was sent to us by the administration during that month. In fact, they almost take a vacation from that end of it as well, so that there would be outside of any type of emergency situation, there would be no legislation before city council.

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MR. ROGAN: I still wish that -- I know obviously it's not going to go my way, we had a motion and it failed, but I still think that a month is an excessive amount of time to take off from any position and I criticized the former majority and, you know, even though many of us agree on a lot of issues, we disagree on this one, so I'll leave it at that.

MS. EVANS: And your comments are noted. And, Mr. Joyce?

5	and weeds which are becoming an eyesore in

7	The property at 468 South Main
8	Avenue in West Scranton. Residents report
9	grass and weeds that have grown over three
10	feet high.
11	The property at 524 North Main
12	Avenue in West Scranton, residents report
13	overgrown grass and weeds three feet high as
14	well.
15	The property located at the corner
16	of Price and South Grant Avenue in West
17	Scranton. Residents report overgrown grass
18	and weeds over four feet high.
19	The property located at 432 Rear
20	Cherry Street in South Scranton. Residents
21	report grass and weeds over three feet high
22	and also that the home is in poor condition.
23	The property located at 429 and 431
24	Cherry Street, this house is a double block.
25	Residents report that this property is in

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1	poor condition and also report overgrown
2	grass and weeds.
3	The property located at the corner
4	of East Elm Street and Prospect Avenue in
5	South Scranton, which is the former site of
6	Scarfo's Restaurant. Residents report this
7	property is in poor shape and is becoming an
8	eyesore for residents.
9	The first home at the property
10	located at the 1300 block of Crown Avenue in
11	South Scranton, residents report that this
12	home is boarded up, however, there is a
13	noticeable condemned sign and it's becoming
14	an eyesore people living on that block.
15	The property at the corner of Breck
16	Street and Herr's Court in South Scranton,
17	overgrown grass and weeds are over three
18	feet high and it's becoming an eyesore for
19	many of the residents that reside in that
20	area.
21	The property located at 424 Fig
22	Street in South Scranton, residents report
23	that this home is rundown and is also
24	becoming an eyesore.
25	And the lot adjacent to 1608 South

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1	Irving Avenue in South Scranton, again, this
2	is another property with overgrown grass and
3	weeds about four feet high.
4	And the property located at 833
5	Breck Street in South Scranton, residents
6	report that the property is in poor shape
7	and there is also overgrown grass and weeds
8	there as well.
9	In addition to that letter to
10	Mr. Seitzinger, Mrs. Krake, please construct
11	a letter to Mr. Brazil asking him to address
12	the following citizens' concerns:
13	Number one, the 600 block of
14	Jefferson Avenue in Scranton's Hill section.
15	Residents report various cracks and potholes
16	making driving conditions difficult.
17	Number two, the upper section of the
18	1500 and 1600 blocks of South Irving Avenue
19	in South Side. Residents report that this
20	part of the road is in rough shape and
21	requests that the road be repaired or if
22	possible paved.
23	The 200 block of the North Filmore
24	in West Scranton, residents report various
25	cracks and potholes making travel conditions

1 difficult. Meadow Avenue, in particular the 200 2 3 block in front of the Aramark building across from the Clarion Hotel which is also 4 located in front of the Nationwide Insurance 5 Office, residents report various cracks and 6 7 potholes making travel conditions difficult. 8 Linden Street in front of the 9 University of Scranton bookstore in 10 Scranton's Hill section. Residents report 11 various cracks in the road making travel 12 conditions difficult. And the corner of Meadow Avenue and 13 14 Moosic Street, residents report that traffic lines need to be painted in this location, 15 16 and that is all for now and I'll save my 17 comments for later on the agenda items. 18 MR. LOSCOMBE: Mrs. Evans, I just 19 have one quick comment. 20 MS. EVANS: Certainly. 21 MR. LOSCOMBE: I just wanted to 22 comment, I do appreciate Mr. Rogan's 23 ambition to continue our meetings through 24 August, but I do want to let the public know 25 city hall, city clerk's office is open every

day as usual, the same staff is there every day as usual. We are all accessible through our staff and through via our e-mail on a daily basis, and I know we will continue to go out on a daily basis and address the issues.

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The only time we won't be here is Tuesday evenings for this meeting for the month of August. Other than that, we are continuing to work. It's not like we are closing the door August 1 and not touching anything until August 30. We will continue our operations and we will be accessible. The only thing that will be lacking is the televised meeting every Tuesday evening through the month of August.

I just wanted to clarify that in case some people misunderstood and just figured we are shutting the doors. Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: And I'll comment, too. During that time in August when we won't be meeting, I plan on going out into the neighborhoods and doing some outreach in areas where I think it's really needed. I

had a day off from work last week, vacation day, so I decided to go door to door in an area of South Side, and I was a little involved in th at, and I received a lot of requests from residents and as a result just talking to the neighbors I just read off 19 different items that need fixing of some sort, whether it's a vacant lot, a condemned home, a road that's in poor condition.

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And I would just like to remind the public as well our office is always open and city council is not a three-hour per week This meeting is a forum where we come iob. to discuss issues related to city business, but all council members I'm sure, at least I know I am and I'm sure all of my colleagues are, out there constantly talking to residents, listening to concerns and trying to arrive at solutions. So during that time frame when we do have the recess I would be doing more of that as we will have more That's all. time. MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake?

MS. KRAKE: 5-B. AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 174 OF 2003 BY PROHIBITING THE

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1	RECREATIONAL AUTHORITY FROM CHARGING CITY
2	RESIDENTS AN ADMISSION FEE TO THE NAY AUG
3	SWIM COMPLEX.
4	MS. EVANS: On the question?
5	MR. JOYCE: Yes. I will speak on
6	this a little bit. I saw this item on the
7	agenda when it released and it caused me to
8	think quite a bit. Since I have been on
9	city council and from the time I have been
10	here, the Recreation Authority has overseen
11	activities at Nay Aug Park and the Authority
12	has pretty much been given the will and the
13	right to charge whatever they want as far as
14	pool fees with no one to report to besides
15	the administration. By exploring the city's
16	website, one can now see the admission fee
17	was raised for a day's pass to the Nay Aug
18	pools and water slides to \$4 for both city
19	residents and nonresidents, so even if you
20	residents in the city and you are paying
21	taxes here your kids still aren't getting a
22	break if they wish to go out and enjoy a
23	cool day a warm day by cooling off in the
24	pool.
25	Well, if you review page 121 of the

2011 operating budget, the Department of Public Works, one can see that it's stated, that the city parks system encompasses two water slides. The only pool locations where there are water slides are at Nay Aug Park leading one to believe that the Department of Parks and Recreation pays for the pool expenses such as chemicals and lifeguards which are both included in the 2011 operating budget. Over \$42,000 for pool chemicals and over \$245,000 in other salary which is used to fund lifeguards as well as other workers such as the four unbudgeted workers that Mayor Doherty hired bark to the city.

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So one must question, what is the majority of the fees collected at the pool being used to pay for? Due to the lack of transparency of the Recreation Authority, one would not know. Perhaps, they do pay for some pool chemicals, however, no one on council knows.

But let's see, if the city is paying for most of Nay Aug's expenses, why would the Authority need all of these fees? Let's

look at the facts here. The Recreation Authority has a solicitor who is also paid as the solicitor for the Parking Authority which is funded at \$22,000 per year and also serves as the full-time city solicitor in the process which is funded at \$52,000 per year in addition to being the Recreation Authority's solicitor at an undisclosed amount while maintaining a private practice. Gee, I bet people are out there thinking, "I really wants this guy's job."

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It's time for the Recreation Authority to come clean and report why, why do they need to raise these fees. When this in mind, Mrs. Krake, please file a Right-to-Know request on my behalf to the Recreation Authority asking the following:

One, how much money was paid to the Recreation Authority solicitor in 2009 and 2010 and how much money was budgeted for this in 2011?

22 Two, how much money, if any, was 23 paid out for pool chemicals by the 24 Recreation Authority in 2010? 25

Three, how much money was paid out

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1	for lifeguards in 2010?
2	If pool fees and other fees being
3	charged by the Recreation Authority,
4	especially when increases are being
5	collected to fund a solicitor who also
6	serves as the city solicitor and the Parking
7	Authority solicitor, I think it's about time
8	that this Authority needs to be disbanded.
9	And also, could it be possible that
10	the solicitor received a raise this year by
11	the Recreation Authority just like the pool
12	fees and could this be the reason why these
13	pool fees are going up? One must wonder is
14	there a way to get the solicitor more money,
15	because remember, in the 2011 operating
16	budget salaries were reduced, therefore, it
17	causes some suspicion to think, well, what's
18	a way that we could reimburse some of that
19	salary that was cut in the operating budget
20	without anyone knowing. Could it be that
21	maybe give a raise on the Authority side.
22	It could be. I'm not saying that it is,
23	however, I think we need to do some due
24	diligence-re search into that fact and into
25	that whole argument.

1 If the Recreation Authority can 2 substantiate justification for Nay Aug's 3 Pool fees I would be happy to propose an amendment to the legislation suggesting that 4 5 fees must be approved by council. It's about time that this Authority starts 6 7 reporting to someone besides the 8 administration, and that's all. 9 MS. EVANS: I have had the 10 opportunity to revisit some information that 11 I received 2002 by means of a Right-to-Know 12 request regarding the Recreation Authority, 13 and from the bank statements which reflect 14 debits, credits, deposits, etcetera, it's clear that the Recreation Authority receives 15 16 the swimming fees from the Nay Aug Pool Swim 17 Complex and I would say in addition it 18 appears to receive the donations made at 19 Christmas time for the lights display at the 20 park. When I also reviewed a Treasurer's 21 22 report for 2009 from the Recreation 23 Authority, no where on it listed -- I think 24 it may have been June 2009, which is a

swimming month, no where on there listed was

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expenditures for pool supplies or lifeguards, etcetera. Now, I do not know if the Recreation Authority keeps that money or perhaps it uses that money as our finance chair has suggested to pay it's solicitor or if that money is turned over to the City of Scranton, so there are a number of questions here that need answers.

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I might also suggest that a solicitor for the Recreation Authority might be better utilized as a voluntary position because I frankly do not know, you know, outside of the lease agreement that the Recreation Authority had drawn up with Lackawanna College for the sale or -- excuse me, the lease of the Genesis Wildlife Center to Lackawanna College for a dollar fr a period of 25 years with automatic renewal for 25-year period thereafter, setting that aside, I'm not quite sure what services are actually provided or essential from a solicitorship with regard to the Recreation Authority.

The officers and employees, I believe, of the Parks and Recreation

Department make the deposits into the bank. The Recreation Authority members sign the checks, they make deposits, they make withdrawals, etcetera, so I am not quite sure if, indeed, there is a salary of let us say 20 or it \$22,000 for that particular solicitor hip. I just -- I don't know that that's earned or appropriate. Is there anyone else on the question?

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MR. LOSCOMBE: I have a few, if I can. I agree, I do agree with both of my colleagues here on everything they stated and it does appear there are a lot of unanswered questions, a lot of things are, again, we wanted transparency, we want accountability, we have invited them to come here and explain some things, they haven't done it yet.

But what I find interesting is when they could have -- they did actually have a lease with the Lackawanna College for a dollar a year for 99 years and they are charging children to swim. If they did it right, they could have offset the swimming costs and charged the proper lease, but they

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1	went about that lease without even our
2	consent or our knowledge at this point.
3	MS. EVANS: Actually, if I can
4	interrupt
5	MR. LOSCOMBE: Sure.
6	MS. EVANS: At that time I did make
7	a request of Lackawanna College to make a
8	contribution to the swimming program in
9	return for this very generous lease
10	agreement so that the children and city
11	residents could swim free at Nay Aug and
12	their reply was no.
13	MR. LOSCOMBE: So, I mean, I'd just
14	like to know where the priorities are. It's
15	a Recreation Authority. It's supposed to
16	enable the recreation of our residents, you
17	know, not to enrich other organizations and
18	that has always smacked on me since it
19	happened. A dollar a year for 99 years with
20	unlimited renewal, and again, this year they
21	jacked the price up another dollar for
22	swimming. You know, it's just you know,
23	we are still waiting for a response, but I
24	have to touch on it, just around the corner
25	from the West Side Swim Complex that closed

down it appears that our own city has torn down a building for a private individual, so I'm sill waiting for answers on that, but this just -- I just don't understand it and we have to have some answers, but I am in total agreement of this, and that's where I stand. MR. ROGAN: I also agree with my colleagues, and I'm looking at it, even though I agree with everything they said I'm looking at it a little bit differently. It's not -- everyone knows I'm the most fiscally conservative person up here, but I'm a compassionate conservative, and when you look at it you think, "Oh, \$4 a day to go swimming, chump change." But when you break it down it adds up to a lot of money over the course of a month. For one child to swim three times a week over the course of a month that's \$48. That's a tank of gas. For two kids to swim it's even multiplies. If you have two children and they go three times a week

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that's \$96 for one month just to go swimming a few days. For two children to go swimming

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1	twice a month that's \$64. So the \$4 a day
2	really adds up during the course of a month.
3	And another reason why I support
4	this legislation is every year we see on the
5	news that there is kids swimming in the
6	gorge, and the firefighters are called and
7	luckily sometimes they are safe and other
8	times they aren't, but I could just think of
9	myself not too many years ago when I was
10	young, if I parents gave me money to go to
11	the swimming pool with say three or four
12	friends, taking the money and buying candy
13	and ice cream and whatever and swimming in
14	the gorge instead.
15	Now, if the swimming is free all of
16	the children can go to the pool and adults,
17	also, can also go to the pool and swim there
18	and not risk going out into the gorge and
19	swimming. You know, the children that are
20	going there their parents pay taxes, this is
21	a service that should be provided by the
22	city and that's why I support this
23	legislation 100 percent.
