MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker this evening is Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, on your agenda items, let's see, it's 7-G it's up for final passage. This is the

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first -- really the first sign of anybody doing much for the kids in Scranton other than the little I guess they have an artist up there for the kids and so forth, but this is something that could benefit all of Scranton, not just a child. I mean, a lot of grownups do go up and swim at Nay Aug. At one time they used to let the senior citizens go in for a buck, free, there was a whole bunch of different patterns, but now it's just a flat \$4. As you know, I'm cochairman of the Kids Swim Free Program and we spent over \$1,800 to have kids swim at Nay Aug and, you know, it gets quite expensive, but the people of Scranton want They support it. We are not out there with a gun saying, "Give us your money," we are just explaining that every bit of money that's given to us goes to them kids. one takes out anything, and I'm glad to be part of that program and I'm glad to see this on the agenda, no matter where it goes I'm glad to see that at least you took a step and that's all we can do in life is take one step at a time.

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I asked to see the plans for Nay

Aug, I mean, not Nay Aug, Novembrino complex

and I now I understand why you had no plans

to show, there was none and there none.

They was just sending out for I guess

looking for somebody to do it, to draw up

the plans, and then from what they say it's

ludicrous they want to fill in the big pool?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Could you imagine the money we made to put that pool, plus the fact that it has -- it's a 13-foot deep pool which means it was made for high dive and that's what it's for. This mayor is only going to be here God knows how long, he has been here quite long and, of course, we saw where we are today because of it. The damage we have done to the city is probably non-repairable. I don't think we could ever repair the damage that's done to the city under this man's -- what does he have, 12 years in there?

MS. EVANS: Not yet.

MR. SBARAGLIA: But close to it, and the damage you saw it. We started it off

with a Connors with a slight -- I guess we had a slight surplus and now we are so deep in the hole we can never get out. We don't have a big enough shovel to get out, but still the point is, why would he want to destroy that pool? That's what it amounts to. If he wanted to do what he wants to do why don't he use the little pool? I'm sure that could be done a lot cheaper but then they wouldn't have those contracts, would he?

I told you before, you find -- if you ever read where the money comes from the mayor when he runs you would find out a lot of them is with contracts. A lot of people that have contracts support the mayor whole-heartedly, and we have the information home.

Now, that is probably one of the reasons why we have so many contracts because that's where the money flows in, to contributions, to this party or the individual. It's just too bad that the damage is being done to the city for the sake of looking for campaign money, it's

ridiculous. I'm just sorry that people don't see that. I really am. I don't know where they have their eyes. All they have to do is see what's happening and know it that next year they are going to get tax increases, and I don't care what you say, we are going to have to have a tax increase because there is no way out of it, and the question is even with this 1.5 million they are not going to collect that no matter what we do. We are going to have to pay that to the bank and that in turn was with the mayor again. Everything leaks back to the mayor.

He sold them and gave them to the SRA, the SRA sold it and so forth, and when it came back it's like it was a house of cards really, that's the only way to explain it. I mean, the DPW I still don't know who owns it. It transferred so many times. I mean, everybody had a piece of that action and yet that added to the debt to the city because every time they borrow they don't give the things for free. That means they got interest tacked onto the borrowing, so it just keeps going and going and going. I

mean, you don't even need to be a brain surgeon to figure out what's happening here.

I just hope -- my son is a professor on economics and he does say that. I mean-- okay, there is no point haggling on it.

Okay. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you,

Mr. Sbaraglia.

MR. JOYCE: Mr. Sbaraglia, you are speaking a little bit about costs, I do have a copy of the application that was submitted by the Parks and Recreation Department to OECD for the splash pond project and just to give you an idea they estimate the cost of building a splash pond with replacing a pool somewhere in the range of \$100,000. The whole project itself they estimate it at \$250,000. If you would like to see the application, I would be happy to get you a copy.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Thank you, but the paper did print out the cost of it, thank God, in their little article that they did write.

MS. EVANS: Les Spindler.

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MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,

Council, Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. I read in the paper Saturday and I just get infuriated, about the city wants the trial of the new parking meters rebid again. This is ridiculous. Council puts something in a budget to bring in revenue for the city, a distressed city, Mayor Doherty and his puppets, Mr. McGoff included, want it bid out, it's bid out, we get two bids and now the city says the bids aren't good, we have to rebid. This is nothing about another stall tactic by this administration trying to make council look Isn't there anything that can be done, Attorney Hughes? Can't the administration be made to follow this budget?

MR. HUGHES: I have know idea what you mean be made to follow the budget.

MR. SPINDLER: Well, the StreetSmart Program, they don't want to implement that.

MR. HUGHES: I have my opinion that it does not have to be bid, the administration has taken a position to bid it.

MR. SPINDLER: I agree with you.

MR. HUGHES: But that's up to them.

MR. SPINDLER: This is a sole source and it shouldn't have been bid. It's just another way to stall, and I can almost guarantee we won't see any revenue from this all year. The mayor is going to blame council and it's not council it's the mayor and Mr. McGoff and Mr. McGowan and,
Mr. McGoff, I hope people remember that come election day because you don't want to see us get out of distressed city, distressed status, and it's a darn shame. You are doing anything to try to sabotage this budget. It's ridiculous.

Moving on, July 2 there was an article in the paper about a Sewer Authority worker fired, July 2. I knew about this on June 2. If you go to DohertyDeciet.com you will find a lot more information than if you read the Doherty newsletter, and there is no name in the paper either and the name of the person was on DohertyDeciet.com. The reason there is no name in the paper because it's another Doherty crony. If it was a

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firefighter or police officer the name would be the newspaper.

And the prime example is with this Patrolman Miller that was arrested for supposedly fighting at the V-Spot, he is not guilty because the video evidence I saw somebody that saw the videotape, there is video evidence that this patrolman is innocent. He was punched in the face, he was grabbed by the throat by the girl that he supposedly punched, this is all on videotape and this will come out and the people, they were in Court today, and all of these people lied, they should be arrested because Mr. Miller will be exonerated, Patrolman Miller, because there is videotape and I got that from very good sources.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Spindler, actually, if I could just add quickly, I believe in GO Lackawanna I read on-line very recently, in fact, just yesterday an article concerning the Sewer Authority in which the individual was identified and so kudos to GO Lackawanna.

MR. SPINDLER: Absolutely. They are

the only ones that tell the truth.

MS. EVANS: And I do know in addition, however, there are, unfortunately, other arrests of city employees that occur and they are not identified in the newspaper as a city employee, but, as you said, I do notice that if the city employee happens to be a member of the police or fire department that's immediately identified in the article.

MR. SPINDLER: Absolutely.

Ms. Evans: So it's a little -- the selectivity is a little questionable.

MR. SPINDLER: It's been like this for ten years and I guess it will never stop until Chris Doherty is out of office.

Somebody told me something today which I thought was very interesting, and it's an attorney that told me this, that if we pay off everyone who is out on Workmens' Comp from their reserve fund, which is fully funded, we could save \$2 million, and I don't know if council is aware of that.

MS. EVANS: Yes. Yes. That is an issue I have discussed with our Finance

Chair and we are going to be working on that in August.

MR. SPINDLER: Very good. Oh, here is something else that I got from website also, there was federal money available to help pay the health insurance or Medicare for retired cops and firemen. Supposedly the city, namely, Lisa Moran, was supposed to apply for this money. When the firemen found out this they confronted her and she said the city wouldn't get that much money. Well, that wasn't true. The city could have gotten a million dollars for this, and we are distressed city we really could have used a million dollars.

This is just another example of incompetence in this administration and it's a darn shame. I think everybody up there would agree we could use a million dollars and it's a good reason to apply for that and she can do it, so somebody should lose their job for this.

Moving on, I've said this in the past about how the Times-Tribune sensationalizes everything that Chief Duffy

does, and I have said the arrests he makes our police officers make these all the time and you don't see anything in the paper. Perfect example is I spoke to a police officer Saturday night, he said recently they walked into a restroom in Walgreens, saw someone shooting up heroine, they arrested them. Did anybody see anything about that in the newspaper? No. Because it wasn't in the newspaper.

If that was Chief Duffy it would be, Stop the presses, put this on the headlines, but our every day police officers are risking their lives out there, they don't get any credit in the Doherty newsletter and it's a darn shame, and I have said this for months now. Mrs. Evans, can I continue a little since you took some of my time?

MS. EVANS: Yes. Please finish up.

MR. SPINDLER: Thank you. Something else, I would suggest that members of the council go on DohertyDeceit.com. There are pictures of the Rockwell Avenue bridge falling into Legget's Creek. I have seen these pictures and that's a real safety

hazard.

MS. EVANS: Actually, yes, I was contacted by a resident of the area and just before this evening's meeting -- or I should say the public hearing, I discussed it with Councilman Loscombe because he has developed a very good working relationship with PennDOT, and I'll let him address more of it later, but we are aware of it and we are going to be taking care of it very soon.

We'll have PennDOT out there.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay. Great. And I want to reiterate what Andy said, to not have free swim is ridiculous. These fees are raised, you know, there is no wonder why people go down to the gorge and swim they don't want to pay the \$4 they are risk their lives down there and this again, this is the administration's fault. And there should be free swimming, they shouldn't close the Novembrino pool.

And one last thing, I have an announcement, on August 12 and 13 the Tripp Park Neighborhood Association is having their third annual picnic at the Dorothy --

at the Tripp Park Community Center on
Dorothy Street and there will be food and EJ
the DJ will be there. It's Friday and
Saturday, August 12 and 13, so hope to see
everyone there. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Bob Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.
Bob Bolus, Scranton.

MR. JOYCE: Good evening.

MR. BOLUS: First thing, has anybody heard from Paul Kelly on the 16 1/2 foot issue that I have raised?

MS. EVANS: No.

MR. BOLUS: What's it take to get this guy to do something? He is looking for \$20,000, he wants more money to do everything, but yet he hasn't done a darn thing to adhere to even council's requests and I think that's total arrogance and ignorance on what requests are about. I don't think he is above the law or scrutiny that goes on.

This issue has got to be drawn to a close one way or the other. Today we were in Court over my filing or taking the

sticker off my home, the condemnation that was illegally filed. It was continued for at least 90 days, probably longer, until the underlying lawsuit now that's been filed and responded to my Mr. Kelly questioning whether or not I have a residence there. It's now going to start costing the city thousands of dollars. I have invested over \$25,000 already and now that the city is involved and the litigation is going to proceed and I'm going to take it right to the end.

The money that council so graciously gave Mr. Kelly last week is going to evaporate and God knows what more is going to happen after that and if we are successful in our litigation I don't know what the dollar sign will be for the damage it's created. That's not where I wanted to be. It's the last place I wanted to be. I just wanted peace and quiet and it's not going to happen that way now. We are going to continue to push it.

I'm living in my residence. A couple of witnesses that he had there today

one, Mary Dunleavy, from up there, I find it interesting they said I don't live there, I don't stay there. I can't remember the last time she slept over my house to see whether or not I was living there or not. escapes my memory how these people spy and think they know everything about me, and we are look for the litigation to commence now, the depositions and the issues. Just so you get the idea that I may spend another \$25,000 and so will the city, and if there is damages it's going to be a lot more and this could have all been avoided if somebody wasn't so arrogant and cocky and acting like a dictator as Mr. Kelly has.

I find it interesting that he works for all of these authorities yet nobody knows what he makes. I really wonder how much time he spent during this campaign actually doing city business while he was out campaigning for magistrate. I think there is definitely got to be a question of accountability on his part. You know, we offer \$50,000 that's staying on the table right now for that 16 1/2 foot piece of

land. It's owned by the city.

Tonight you are approving all kind of tax delinquent properties that are be sold yet this individual sits there on property owned by the city. Kelly ignores it, but isn't a shame to go by Novembrino park and see it empty? Nothing in the pool. And this classy mayor who could have resolved this issue between us ignores it, yet, the kids have no where to go now, 90 some degree weather, Novembrino park is closed for a splash park?

Maybe we should have the kids take canteens up, a couple of cups and throw water on each other. Maybe we could get a fire hydrant opened up. Jack, I'm sure you have influence, have the fire department open a hydrant like they do in New York City or Philadelphia. Let the kids run around near the hydrant. It's a hell of thing to see in the City of Scranton when we spent millions of dollars on Nay Aug Park and absolutely the people of this city to pay the taxes, to verify they live here, and let me tell you there is ways to find out

whether you are a resident or not and they're just too darn lazy to do it because it cuts into his cash cow, it's squandered elsewhere. We should swim, the kids deserve it, the residents deserve it. That's what we pay taxes for.

The misspending in this city is out of control and the arrogance that just goes with it. During the last week I have merchandise stolen from around my house. My illustrious neighbor, Mr. Hartman, stood there, watched the thieves steal the stuff and then had dialogue with them as they drove away and yet never reported a crime going on at my home.

Two different incidents have happened up there where they have driven in and so fortunately we are able to secure the license number and Scranton PD is taking care of that issue. Isn't it great to have such credible and great neighbors and then they wonder why I'm like I am?

You know, we sit here and we go over things and we go over things, there should only be one solicitor in the city, there has

got to be accountability, and the issue is 1 there is \$50,000, and again, I'm asking 2 3 council to insist, better yet demand accountability from Paul Kelly to answer 4 5 their requests why he is sitting on \$50,000 and will not address that issue after he has 6 7 the deeds in his hands. Maybe he is too 8 embarrassed to come forward and know that he 9 screwed up again, but that's what I would 10 ask from council, if you could please do 11 that. 12 And, Boyd, all I could do is say 13 good luck, I'll be glad to see you there, it 14 will be a hell of a show. MR. HUGHES: Okay. 15 Thanks, Bob. 16 MR. BOLUS: Thank you. 17 MR. ROGAN: Mr. Bolus, before you 18 leave you mentioned the \$20,000 for the law 19 department. I'm sorry? 20 MR. BOLUS: 21 MR. ROGAN: You mentioned the 22 \$20,000 for the law department. 23 MR. BOLUS: Yes. 24 MR. ROGAN: That's in Seventh Order, 25 that wasn't passed yet, and we did request

additional information. I don't know if my colleagues received anything, but I haven't.

MS. EVANS: No, we did not receive information, but I believe that I gave them a deadline of July 22, and so if council does not receive a breakdown of the names of the attorneys, the dollar amount paid and the service provided it will -- what I'm hoping to do this evening actually is to table that legislation in Seventh Order, remove it from the table on the 26th, should we not receive the information then on the 26th I know I will be voting against it.

MR. BOLUS: Well, I'm glad to hear that, that finally somebody is making him accountable. You know, we have seen how many hundreds of thousands for Carl Greco and other people out in the city, I mean, like, where are we going here? We got to draw it to a close, and here is litigation now that's going to go on for absolutely no reason. A guy condemns a home that he says is unlivable, uninhabitable. Get realistic. Just come up and take a look, they were offered that opportunity. Paul Kelly

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stopped them from coming to look and we opened the door and said, "Here it is," and he would not allow it because of the litigation he created.

So, yeah, I'm glad you're holding the \$20,000, remember, even if he got the 50 and it may be considerably more because the people who occupy that piece of land are going to bid to try and retain their homes on it. You may see it as high as \$100,000 or more for this. So it's a golden opportunity because somebody screwed up and now they can take advantage of the people in this city. It's time now to do something. It's money, and it may fill It's income. Novembrino pool, put lifeguards there and forget the stupidity of a splash park and some kind of childish fantasies. Give the kids what they need. They need a place to swim. Get them off the streets.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Doug Miller.

MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.

Doug Miller, Scranton.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. MILLER: I'd just like to comment on the recent decision by the mayor to veto your legislation that provided funding for the Novembrino pool complex, UDAG money that would have covered the cost to open the pool as well as pay for the lifeguards and if I can recall correctly from the newspaper article the mayor cited that his reasoning for vetoing the legislation because you didn't talk to him about it and, you know, I just kind of find that kind of comical that the mayor would veto this because council didn't speak with him.

I think the mayor understands that your office is right up the steps here, if he had any questions regarding anything that you are doing he knows very well he could come up here into the office right outside here and ask you anything he wants. He didn't do that and now he wants to use this as a reason to veto when he knows you will override the veto this evening, but he knows that he pretty much has no other choice but

to veto it, it's the only power he really has now, and I just think he is playing too many games here with this and I can't comprehend why he would want to deprive the children of West Side the opportunity to swim, as I have said before. Just totally baffled by it.

And I think it's truly ashame that he has to continue to play these kind of petty politics and just watch the children in West Side continue to suffer, and it's no secret it's been pretty hot the last couple of days and I just don't understand how a mayor, what he can -- what he excepts these children to do. I don't know how you can possibly look in the mirror and be proud of yourself as a leader. I know I wouldn't. I think he should be ashamed of himself.

And it's truly -- it's unfortunate and, you know, in the future if he ask questions for council he knows the door is always open here, but maybe if he feels comfortable, Mr. McGoff, I know you seem to have a good relationship with him, maybe you can get him to come up here. You know,

something has got to happen. We need some dialogue here. We can't keep playing games.

And on a related matter, Agenda Item 7-G, I'd like to personally commend you for eliminating the \$4 fee for Nay Aug Park. I think you've once again shown your commitment to watching out for the taxpayers and I really applaud you for that. I don't understand how the Recreation Authority found it realist to think that a mom and dad with, I don't know, four kids can afford to go up to Nay Aug and swim ever day. It's just not realistic today with the economy.

I understand there is still some questions regarding why the fee was raised and I am curious as well to know why the Recreation Authority raised the fee and I think they have some explaining to do. And you know, I really want to thank

Mr. Sbaraglia and Mr. Jackowitz, they talked about the Kids Swim Free Program and for many years giving children the opportunity to go up there and swim. It certainly was a great thing and now that council stepped in and stepped up to the plate, you know, I

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thank you for doing that and hopefully the children take advantage of this and hopefully we won't have any whining and crying from the mayor downstairs threatening to veto different things, hopefully we can move forward with this, and again, put the best interest of the residents first.

Regarding StreetSmart, a few days ago I learned in the newspaper that the bids submitted by IPS and StreetSmart were rejected and I just -- I can't honestly understand this knowing full well that StreetSmart was sole source. We could have implemented this months ago and the administration failed to do and I'm just really concerned moving forward with the long-term plan and long-term solution and when we get to the end of the year here and we realize that we missed out on all of this revenue, I don't know what they are going to do.

I don't know at this point if you have thoughts on it or what you think is going to happen, Mr. Loscombe, you have been dealing with it mostly, so I don't know if

you have any comments on it or if you want to share that later, just it's like beating your head against the wall, I guess, and iust the same nonsense week after week. Ιt gets frustrating after awhile and, you know, I have my opinions as to why all of this us taking place, and I'm not afraid to share those opinions. I truly believe that the administration wants to do anything they possibly can to make you look bad and at the end of the year when we have a deficit they all want to run up here pointing their fingers at the four of you and say that you are responsible for it when the only ones that are responsible are themselves.

They need to take a good look in the mirror and realize that they caused all of this themselves, the mayor, the fiscal mismanagement for the last 12 years, we are not \$13 million in long-term debt for no reason. The mayor can thank himself, thank Mr. McGoff, thank all of the other rubber stampers that sat on council, you know, it's really it's ashame. It really is, and I'm concerned for the future, and just really

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hope that the administration would stop playing the games here because we are just continuing to suffer here and it's causing us a lot of problems and they just don't seem to really care.

But on a positive note, I'd just like to recognize all of those involved with the West Side Skate Park. I think it's going to be great for the kids over there to have a place to recreate and stay out of trouble. I know a lot has been taking place over there recently with the community garden, the West Side Precinct, and a lot of other different things, and I think they really need to be commended for that because it's bringing something positive to that part of town that really needs it right now and I just hope that he would continue to keep of the great work and I appreciate your time. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Mr. Miller,
I will be addressing the parking meter
program in great detail under my motions
tonight.

MR. MILLER: Very good. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Karen Foster.

MS. FOSTER: Hello again. I want to thank you for again for your ongoing support to amend Chapter 332, the Code, City of Scranton titled Parks and Recreation and entitled "Article III, West Scranton Skate Park Facilities Rules and Regulations."

Many great things have been happening and I'm glad that others have taken notice. More families are now at the park. The past two weeks with the onset of the skateboard competition there has been 60, 70 children up there practicing, all excited. They come up to us with their new tricks and they just want to show us what they are doing and it's very exciting.

The groups that are co-sponsoring the skateboard events, Zoomies and Underwood, have been a tremendous source. Also, just recently, the Northeastern Skate Park Alliance also is supporting us in this effort with the goal that this facility becomes a focal point for ongoing competitions. There has been some interest with helping to donate additional equipment

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so that we can handle a larger venue and hopefully it could be a revenue maker for the City of Scranton.

Now, some details regarding our I have a poster here, I'm not sure if the camera can see everything, but the theme is Lords of Drawtown, and it's based on a skateboard movie called Lords of Dogtown, and the individual that you are seeing in the picture here is Jason Smeltzer, he is a classically trained musician and he plays Theremin. A Theremin was the first electronic instrument, and it was a device that had two antennas on other side, and then you could waive your hands between them and it would make sound. you probably all heard of them if you have seen sci-fi movies because they make interesting sound effects in the background.

He is going to be performing on Sunday and he actually can play classical or rock, he can actually play music with it, so it's quite exciting.

Yesterday, also want to extend another thank you to Engine 7, they had come

out to help power wash the wall so it was prepared for the mural that will be started tomorrow, and anyone who would like to come and spectate, they need to stay away from the actual drawing, but they can come and see how it's evolving throughout the week.

There will be several musicians playing live throughout the whole day from 2 to 8. The skateboard competitions will be setup for the first day for skaters as young as four to seven to have their own beginner group, and then the second beginner group for eight to 12, and then the second day will be the more advanced skaters.

There are three-on-three basketball scrimmages, 30-minute half courts. If you want to get a team, we still have openings for city council.

In addition to this, we have also been working on re-instituting the movie nights. We had one in June, it was very successful. I have been doing some research and we have a couple of plans underway that very soon there could be some more movies. They may be in an indoor facility as well as

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outside, so I will keep you up to date on that.

MS. EVANS: Wonderful.

MS. FOSTER: Any questions?

MS. EVANS: No, I think we are very good, although, I am going to encourage these young men, especially toward a three-on three-contest.

MR. JOYCE: And you know,

Mrs. Foster, you came up here to thank us tonight, but I wanted to thank you and also everyone in the Crime Watch Group which, as you know, I joined recently, for taking such a big task and for making the efforts to try to take back our neighborhood in West Side and make our neighborhood safe, and I know one of the reasons that I was prompted internally to join the Crime Watch Group is because there was a stabbing six houses up from where I reside and, you know, I take a walk around some of the neighborhoods in Scranton and I think it's about time that communities as a whole organize together and fight the crime that's going on in our city because through a joint effort like the one

that you are putting together a lot can be accomplished. That's all.

MS. FOSTER: Thank you, and it's from the whole -- cooperation from the entire City of Scranton, all entities for the success of what we have been able to do so far and we greatly appreciate it, and we also learned that we need to be a little creative sometimes in finding solutions to the problems that are in our neighborhood. For example, now that we are doing bicycle patrols as well as walking patrols and there is some of other ways to do so, but people are seeing that there is a difference. If they see something they can report it and in a safe way and know that they are making a difference.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening,

Council. Bill Jackowitz, South Scranton resident and member of the Taxpayers'
Association. I see you haven't heard from the Parks and Recreation and the Sewer Authority, of course, they both use the Scranton Times-Tribune to speak to the public. No Authority members will appear in public and speak, they follow the leader of the Honorable Doherty.

Thursday, 17 July 2011, edition of

the Times-Tribune, page three, local news, pool fee accusations stir the water with the Authority. Mr. Kelly told the Times-Tribune that in 2003 he was asked by Mayor Chris Doherty to do pro bono legal work for the Recreation Authority, fondly recalling family memories at the park. Mr. Kelly agreed and an arrangement he said continues.

Mr. Kelly, it is very admirable that you represents the Authority for free. Now, if you would also represent the kids and the citizens of Scranton and convince the Authority to allow Scranton residents and all kids between the ages of 1 through 15 the right to swim free at Nay Aug Park pool.

Mr. Dileo added that the pool fools were increased from \$3 to \$4 because of an increase in costs. Why were the citizens of Scranton not notified of the increase in the admission fees until after it was brought up at city council by me? This raise in admission kind of reminds me of the state legislators raising their salary at 2 a.m. behind closed doors.

Mr. Dileo, have you ever heard of

the word transparency? I was standing in line on Father's Day at Nay Aug Pool when the new admission sign was placed on the wall of the bathhouse alerting swimmers that the rates had gone up from \$3 to \$4. What a way for appointed board members to inform the public. Four children were also in line and only had \$3. On behalf of the Taxpayers' Association I gave each kid \$1 so they could swim that day. About two minutes later there was another child who only had \$2, so the Taxpayers' Association gave that kid \$2 so that kid could swim that day, also.

Mark Dougher, Department of Public Works, Deputy Director, cited fuel costs as a key factor. He also said money collected by the Recreation Authority, including the pool fees, is used for the upkeep of the entire park.

The 2011 budget contains \$245,000 for lifeguards for all of the city pools, including Nay Aug as well as four public work foremen. The state requires one lifeguard for very 4,000 square feet of

water surface. My question, does the City of Scranton adhere to this requirement or do they have more lifeguards hired than the state requires? This could be a way to reduce costs by only hiring and assigning the minimum number of lifeguards required by the state. Remember, Honorable Mayor Doherty has closed two swimming pools and the four foremen were removed from the budget only to be added back by the Honorable Mayor Doherty. Can we get the fuel bill for Nay Aug swimming pool? I really would like to examine that bill.

The past president of the Parks and Recreation Authority was quoted in the Times-Tribune stating that the 40,000 plus collected from the light show at Nay Aug would ensure that the swimming rates would not be raised. Maybe that is why he is the past president of the Authority.

Friday, 8 July 2011, Mayor vetoes council move to fund pools. Mayor, did you pay \$4 to use the slide on opening day at Nay Aug Park? Your picture was in the newspaper? I received a response to my

.

Right-to-Know letter from Mr. McGowan concerning my Right-to-Know request that I submitted. Answer, "Your request for the above is denied as the City of Scranton does not have any documents responsive to this request."

The mayor would not answer the question did he or did he not pay. He should have known whether he paid or he didn't pay, so my request should never have been denied. Although, he will continue to charge six years old \$4 a day for the sliding pool, possibly our own mayor did not pay \$4 to go down that slide. If he had paid, Mr. McGowan would have said so in his response to my Right-to-Know letter.

The same day the Scranton Sewer

Authority preparing media policy, page four,

"Scranton Sewer Authority Board on Wednesday
said it is developing a policy for staff and
board members that will guide communication
with media communications with members of
the media. Ray Hayes said development of
the policy stems from questions asked last
week by the Times-Tribune reporter about an

incident involving Authority employees and use of the Scranton Sewer Authority equipment on personal time."

Mr. Hayes, are you trying to limit public knowledge about corruption within the Sewer Authority? Mr. Hayes, it took the Scranton Times three weeks to make this incident public. The Scranton Sewer Authority never it made it public until, again, it was brought up at a City Scranton by me.

Furthermore, Mr. Hayes, the fact that the Sewer Authority accepted the fourth lowest bid of over \$17 million to have work down which will cost the taxpayers over \$2 million extra, leaves me to believe that the Authority has no regard for the taxpayers or ratepayers at all. We are not Doherty real people and capable of getting the job -- I'm almost finished or appointed from the Honorable Doherty.

Again, this information was brought to council by me and the Times-Tribune was late again in their reporting of this gross misconduct by the Sewer Authority. Again,

where was Mr. Barrett on this issue?

Reminds me again of the 2 a.m. pay raise by the state legislators or maybe the deals that Mr. Cordaro and Mr. Munchak made.

Maybe if the authorities such as the Sewer Authority and Parks and Recreation meet more in public and have them televised the citizens would be become more aware of exactly what takes place during these

backdoor meetings.

And, also, I would like to commend the West Side Neighborhood Association and Crime Watch Association for what they are doing with the skate park. Isn't it ashame that people have to sponsor Kids Swim Free and get donations from citizens and business people? Isn't it ashame that the Neighborhood Association and the Crime Watch Association has to get the skate park and everything else going for the children of Scranton? Isn't that ashame?

Where is Mayor Doherty? Mr. McGoff, bring him to a meeting, he is your buddy.

Bring him to a meeting and let him explain where he has been for the last 9 1/2 years

and why he is against the kids and the children of Scranton, Pennsylvania. You asked for cooperation, now is your time to extend that olive branch and bring the mayor to cooperate with citizens who are doing everything that the administration should be doing. Bring him to a meeting.

MS. EVANS: Thank you,

Mr. Jackowitz. Is there anyone else who

cares to address city council?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton,
taxpayer. I'd also like more information on
the Sewer Authority brought up. For
whatever reason they want to -- there is a
lot that needs to be explained and if they
don't explain it then that's their fault.

Let us make our decisions from there.

And I'd like to thank John for clearing up that trash situation. It looks pretty good now and that person is pretty grateful. Hopefully in the future we could -- I was wondering, one of those foremen, weren't they supposed to be running around to courts and so forth and looking

for improperly disposed of trash and enforcing recycling and stuff like, these four jobs that were eliminated? Well, there is no difference from when they had the job if that be the case and right now they are -- because they never performed the job. If that was what their job was.

And on this Novembrino pool, I would love to see the whole project cancelled. We could add the \$200,000 to build a splash park added to the cost of the original pool and that's what it's going to cost us for the splash park.

I have here an article on -unrelated, but it is related. A few days
ago down in Elysburg, Pennsylvania, a young
boy drown in the pool at Knoebels, and first
of all, if people from Knoebels are probably
the nicest people in Pennsylvania, if not
close to the top, but I often wonder, now,
this boy drowned in four feet of water and
we're eliminating the a deep pool, which
somebody that is old enough to swim in that
either loves water and swims well or they're
afraid of water and would never bother

jumping into a swimming pool anyway, but I would venture that, I'd even put a wager on it, that most of the accidents happen in shallow pools, so I have the article here.

Can I --

MS. EVANS: Certainly.

(Mr. Dobrzyn approaches the dais.)

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: The point being, like, that's what bugs me is when we are getting money just for the sake of spending it or creating some kind of project and we are actually destroying what we already have and that's unconscionable, and the Novembrino Pool should be open this year and every year after that and these kids when they grow up they will think, "What did this town ever do for me? I'll just go where I can make a better life for myself."

Now, on the golden parrot, this
Rupert Murdock was tapping into phone lines
and even 9/11 victims his world news, it's
unconscionable. I mean, we have a lot of
undocumented and illegal alines what about
lawful ones. And then Michelle Bachman she

signed a pledge from the Family Leader
Association stating that African-Americans
were better off as slaves, African-American
children. Shame on her. That is incredibly
stupid, and her husband, by the way, accepts
about 150 grand every year in federal money
for his quack counseling, so if we want to
cut some of the spending we could start
right there.

And, Mr. Obama, you better start playing a little more hardball because the golden parrots, I ran out of them this week, but you are next in line. Thank you and have a good night.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Bawk-bawk.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher.

First, I would like to commend the Crime

Watch women and Mrs. Foster on what they are
doing in West side.

Several issues on 7-D. First and foremost, I attended the February 4, 2010, hearing held to educate legislators on the

need to make changes in Scranton's tax bill. A representative of the Single Tax Office testified they had the resources to collect the delinquent taxes, so I must question why we want to pay anyone 15 percent to perform a job that could be performed by experienced employees already on the payroll. Since Act 32, collection of wage taxes, will be performed by Burkheimer and not the Single Tax Office, allowing the Single Tax Office to collect the city's delinquent property taxes could, again, save these experienced employees' jobs that might otherwise lose them.

HB1942 last year resulted from the aforementioned hearing provides for installment payments, so the Northeast Revenue Service proposal would only be compliant with law, nothing really special on their part.

But with respect to the 15 percent

fee and the \$75 minimum charge, I am unclear
how the fee and the minimum charge are
applied despite having sat through last
week's caucus with representatives Northeast

Revenue Service. So perhaps the chair or solicitor, since the chair has left the chamber, could clarify these charges for me. Specifically, is the 15 percent fee added to the delinquent tax owed or is it taken out of the delinquent tax owed?

MR. HUGHES: It's not added to the delinquent tax owed.

MS. SCHUMACHER: One representative spoke of eating part of the \$75 minimum charge in some instances. Does this mean that if the 15 percent fee does not amount to 75 percent Northeast will not bill for the difference between the applied 15 percent and the 15 percent? If not, explain.

MR. HUGHES: I have no idea. I know he said that they would not charge more fees than the taxes that they collect, that they would waive their fees if the taxes collected are minimal.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. And finally, they spoke of having at least two offices, one would be located on the first floor in the Treasurer's Office, and the other would

be someplace within the city. Is this a proper understanding?

MR. HUGHES: The contract calls for them to have an office in the Treasurer's Office. I think he said they would have other places where -- with banks where people could drive through and pay their taxes.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Thank you.

As I have reported on this before, I know you all are aware that there is and has been \$300,000 in the neighborhood police patrol account at OECD. Not a penny was drawn from that account in 2010. Back to school sales have already begun and I'm wondering how many neighborhood police patrol officers have been employed. Can you tell me, Mr. Loscombe?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I'm sorry, I missed that?

MS. SCHUMACHER: How many -- how many of the neighborhood police patrol officers have been deployed so far this year?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I'll have to get that

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information for you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Yeah, I would like that because that \$300,000 has been sitting there and not a penny touched Now, with respect to 5-B, C, D last year. and E, I have been doing some research on what other states do for someone, and I noticed that other areas hold auctions on these properties and I'm wondering whether the City of Scranton might want to consider that which would bring in more revenue if auctions were held. I don't know if the Pittsburgh Plan disallows auctions or --Mrs. Krake may know, but I think it would certainly bring in more revenue if they were auctioned off.

MR. ROGAN: I'm sorry to interrupt,
I would generally agree with that, also,
that I would like to see them auctioned, but
I would like to see first priority given to
the neighbors.

MS. SCHUMACHER: If they're adjacent, I think, but I think that could be accommodated in any kind of legislation.

Now, on the audit delinquencies, I

see Mr. Joyce has left, also, but maybe when he comes back if you could ask him whether he has had an opportunity to compare the current 2011 audit delinquencies with those of 2010 at the same point in time and how of an overlap there is, so if we can find out maybe if there is a -- if there is some cause or some similarity that we might be able to do better next year.

And then awhile back Mrs. Evans asked to have a letter sent to the PUC regarding the Scranton Sewer Authority rate hike and I wonder if there has been a response to that?

MR. ROGAN: I haven't seen one.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I haven't seen a response.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And then on 7-F, I know back in 2006 I remember Mrs. Fanucci commenting that the UDAG funds could not be used for salaries with the exception, of course, of the salaries to administrate those accounts. However, as Mrs. Fanucci proclaimed that the first thing businesses look for in a city are parks, I guess you

1 would extrapolate that keeping the 2 Novembrino Park open is economic 3 development, a positive force there, and that will conclude my comments. See you 4 5 next week, good Lord willing. Thank you. MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. 6 7 MR. SLEDENZSKI: Jack, you handsome 8 devil you. 9 MR. LOSCOMBE: Chrissy. MR. SLEDENZSKI: Pat, July 27 is the 10 11 big game this year. MS. SCHUMACHER: So there is no meeting next week?

MR. MCGOFF: One game of three-on-three, but please do that. I am serious about that. I would like to do that anyhow.

Secondly, a number of weeks ago I was asked to help with questions concerning the rates at Nay Aug Park and the one question that was asked was are there reduced rates offered, and the response I received was, yes, there is a reduced rate of \$1 per person for groups of 200 -- identified groups of 250 or more.

MR. JACKOWITZ: That's not true. That's not true.

MR. MCGOFF: I'm --

1 MR. JACKOWITZ: We had 464. MR. MCGOFF: I said identified 2 3 groups. If someone --MR. LOSCOMBE: You missed the fine 4 5 print. MR. MCGOFF: -- calls Park and 6 7 Recreation and has a group that are entering 8 the pool of 250 or more they are given a 9 reduced rate. That's all I'm telling you. 10 That's all I know. I'm giving you the 11 response that was given to me. 12 As far as somebody mentioned about 13 lifeguards, and I'm reading the article from 14 Knoebles, I am told that virtually every applicant for a lifeguard position in the 15 16 City of Scranton was hired. That they had a 17 very difficult time with applicants, 18 primarily because many of the outlying areas 19 are hiring lifeguards at a much greater 20 What's the one on Montage, I don't 21 even know the name of it? 22 MR. ROGAN: Sno Mountain. 23 MR. MCGOFF: Sno Mountain or 24 whatever the -- Sno Cove or whatever it is 25 and other places offer rates that are

greater and so the City of Scranton was having difficulty and they did hire as many applicants as -- or as they, you know, as they received.

And as far as the suggestion to reduce the number of the people -- number of lifeguards at the pools, I think that the city pools have a pretty good track record, safety record over the number of years and I would hate to see that jeopardized. I think one of the -- one of the things that we can do to ensure safety at the pools is to have as many lifeguards as possible. Any suggestion of reducing that number would -- to me would be unacceptable.

And so I don't know that whether we are employing more than we need to or we are, you know, the shifts are have more than they need according to state regulations, but, as I said, I think we have a pretty good track record and I would hope to see it maintained, you know, under the current system.

Also, since the parking meter thing came up and the bids on it, the only thing I

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have ever said about the parking meter program was that I thought it should have been bid from the beginning. I thought it should have been bid back in December of 2010. I have never voted against anything, I have never spoken against the program, I think that it had great -- it still has great possibilities. All I wanted to do is see it bid and implemented. What has happened with the administration in terms of bidding process I don't know. I am not privy to any of those decisions, but I still would I would like to see it, you know, properly bid, I thought it was. I would like to see it implemented as soon as possible.

And lastly, I've spoken for a number of weeks about the Perry Street playground and the legislation for the grant, I was hoping that everyone was here, I would like at this point in time to make a motion to place legislation for the Perry Street playground on the council agenda for the July 19, 2011, meeting.

MS. EVANS: We have a motion on the

floor, do we have a second?

MS. EVANS: On the question?.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. McGoff, I think we may be able to reach a compromise here since I seconded your motion. I will do this publically so it's not a backroom deal, I would like to meet in August and you would like to have the Perry Street playground legislation put on the agenda, so let's meet in the middle and if everyone agreed to both of them, if you would be willing.

MR. MCGOFF: Well, you are asking me about the August meetings? Well, first of all, as far as the August meetings are concerned there are already three Tuesdays in August that I'm going to be out of town. For two of them I will out of the country, so I could easily vote and say "yes", you know, but the truth of the matter is that I wouldn't be here anyhow. And to be honest it has come up before about the August meetings and I have always been in favor of taking a summer recess, so I wouldn't

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mislead you by saying, yes, I would agree to it.

I put this motion forward simply because I think this is something that we should consider. This is \$50,000 that would be, you know, used to enhance the neighborhood by putting a playground where this is now a vacant lot. I know the objections have had to do with insurance. believe that any of those have been answered, and as I said, I think it was two weeks ago, if we are really concerned that this there is inadequate insurance for, you know, putting a playground in, we shouldn't be talking about opening -- you know, if we follow the logic we shouldn't be talking about opening a pool or a, you know, or a playground, we should be talking about closing them if they are not adequately insured, so I don't think that that argument holds water, and I would just like to see this go forward. It's \$50,000 that can be used for a useful project.

MR. ROGAN: I would just say I do -the reason I seconded the motion, the real

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reason why is, not only to make another plug for the August meetings, but secondly, I'm not sure exactly where I stand on this issue yet, but I would like to see it put up for a vote, we have three readings, so residents could come and comment about it and talk to the neighbors in the area and hopefully work with the administration to get the insurance settled out and maybe that's where you could come in since you have a better relationship with the mayor than the rest of us, so I would vote "yes" on the motion as well.

MS. EVANS: I do believe that the insurance remains an issue. Novembrino Pool Complex, that's city property, it's already I think since Mr. McGoff though insured. has raised this issue weekly it's caused me further ponderance on it, and it occurred to me, for example, that a park was promised as a replacement for the sale of the South Side Complex. The mayor promised to provide a park that was equal in facilities to the South Side Complex I believe by April 2005. Today is July 12, 2011, no park was ever built to substitute for the South Side

Complex for the people of the City of Scranton.

I also know that, yes, it's very nice to have a grant, but parks require constant maintenance, and as I look at various parks throughout the city, I can see that they require maintenance that currently they are not receiving, so I will be voting "no" to this motion. Is there anyone else on the question?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. Mrs. Krake, I know that there has been a lot of talk about insurance, so if you could kindly contact Mr. McGowan and ask him what the additional costs would be to insure a park at this location. If he could possibly contact the insurance broker and get those figures for us. Until we get that information, I will vote "no" as well.

MR. ROGAN: I would just like to reiterate even though it wasn't my motion, we are not voting on the park, we are voting on putting it on agenda so we can get the up or down vote. Like I said, I don't know which way I would vote on it if it came up

for a vote, but I would like to hear from the residents and, you know, give the legislation due process. If it winds of getting a "no" vote in the end it's a "no" vote, but I think we should vote it up or down.

MS. EVANS: Well, I know, I have been over to the North Scranton area, I'm sure my colleagues have as well, and I have to say, frankly, that no residents of North Scranton approached me regarding the Perry Street Park or lobbied me for this particular endeavor, rather, what I have been hearing from North Scranton is cries about the Rockwell Avenue Bridge and it's deterioration from May, a photo that was taken in late May following a rain event, to further deterioration after a photo taken on July 3.

They are also concerned about the streets being paved in that area that lead to and from the CTC, and those are their priorities. So again, enough said, I think we can just call now for a vote.

MR. MCGOFF: No, I would like to

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respond to what you said. We are bringing up a -- we are bringing up issues that have 2 3 absolutely nothing to do with Perry Street playground. The legislation that should be 4 5 before us has to do with accepting a grant of \$50,000. It has nothing to with the 6 7 Rockwell bridge. It has nothing to do -- it 8 has nothing to do with street paving. 9 has nothing to do with any of the issues 10 that we are bringing forward. We are 11 turning down \$50,000 that could be used to 12 enhance a neighborhood and I cannot -- I 13 have not heard one legitimate reason for not 14 accepting this grant. MS. EVANS: And your objection is 15 16 All those in favor signify by saying noted. 17 aye? 18 MR. MCGOFF: Aye. 19 MR. ROGAN: Aye. 20 MS. EVANS: Opposed? 21 MR. LOSCOMBE: No. 22 MR. JOYCE: No. 23 MS. EVANS: No. The noes have it. 24 Mr. McGoff?

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25 MR. MCGOFF: That's all. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Councilman Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. I would just like to give everyone an update on the Right-to-Know request that I sent in regarding the Scranton Sewer Authority, the numerous Right to Knows, and each one of them they did state the law and they requested the 30-day extension, so within 30 days we will be getting a response from the Sewer Authority on those.

Next, I have a letter that was -actually a letter to the editor in the
newspaper, Mr. Jackowitz asked me to read
this for him, and it says, "I'm writing this
letter to suggest a way in which a Scranton
citizen's ID can be verified to allow
Scranton residents to swim for free at Nay
Aug Park. All Scranton residents over the
age of 16 would be required to have their
Pennsylvania driver's license or a
Pennsylvania ID upon entering the swim
complex at Nay Aug Park. If the swimmers do
not have an ID card or are not Scranton
residents, then they would be required to
pay the \$4 admission. All children from

ages 1 to 15 would be allowed to enter the pool complex and swim for free.

Remember that the swimming pool at Nay Aug Park was built with taxpayer money and, therefore, the taxpayers and the residents fun and use. They are not there as a money making project. The City of Scranton Parks and Recreation Authority needs to give back the pool complex at Nay Aug to the citizens for their enjoyment. William Jackowitz."

And I agree with you, Mr. Jackowitz.

MS. EVANS: If I might, if I could just add as well, I know that at Scranton High School students receive photo ID's and, you know, they are required to use those for various activities, etcetera, and certainly those even 14 through 18 should have student ID photos from both West Scranton and Scranton High School if that's of any assistance.

MR. ROGAN: Next, I have the OECD report from the month of the June, and I'll read some of the highlights. Applications for Community Development Block Grant

Program, HOME Program and Emergency Shelter Grant Programs will being available beginning Monday, June 13, 2011, and can be obtained by logging onto www.ScrantonPa.gov/department/OECD or by calling 570-348-4216, extension 110.

OECD will be happy to send an application on request. If anyone has any questions concerning these applications they should contact OECD. If anyone is requesting funding for more than one activity or program, a separate application for each activity must be submitted to OECD. Please make sure that the correct application is used to provide all requested documentation. All applications must be submitted with one original and one copy no later than 4:30 p.m. on Friday, August 4, 2011.

In the month of the June the
Homebuyer's program they received three
additional applications, two were approved
and two were closed. The Housing
Rehabilitation Program for June of 2011,
there was one bid opening, 17 were contacted

for verification, two were approved, and there are now five total projects under contract.

The next few properties will be part of the Lackawanna County Neighborhood Stabilization Program, and I'll give you an update on each one of these. 550 Hickory Street, the sales agreement with the woman who was adopting the two children through Catholic Social Services was amended to change the closing date to July 22, 2011.

213 Steven Avenue, this home was sold on June 24 to a young man who is marrying a woman with two children.

is complete, however, final inspection of the City of Scranton is scheduled and the contractor will be paid his final payment of approximately \$4,600 after we receive this certificate of completion. We entered into assaults agreement for \$106,500 with the young couple who are getting married in July. The closing is scheduled for July 13, 2011.

205 Pittston Avenue, a bid opening

was held on June 7 and the contract was awarded to the lowest bidder, Marion Construction in the amount of \$127,525. The contractor has been doing the interior demolition of the property and the roof removal and replacement.

219 Pittston Avenue, the contractor has completed interior demolition, reframed the walls, completed the siding on the garage, the electrical and the plumbing has been completed and approved, and after inspection they will be installing the new windows.

The Lackawanna Neighbors Homebuyer
Council. They counseled six potential

The Scranton Lace Affiliates, if everyone recalls we did have a caucus in city council chambers a few months ago, as of July 6 OECD has not received the executed contract from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The Madison School, which we also had a caucus here, as of July 6, OECD has not received the executed contract from the Commonwealth regarding that property either.

And it's my hope, and I'm sure it's all my colleagues hope since these passed 5-0, that these projects will be completed to help out the neighborhoods and especially with the Scranton Lace building. That building has been vacant for nearly ten years, it's an eyesore for the community,

and it will be good to see some jobs created down there.

I have a few citizens' requests. A concerned resident called the office today saying that weeds near the stop sign on the corner of the 500 block of Marion Street and the 14 and 1500 blocks of Von Storch Avenue are over four feet. Weeds are blocking the intersection and motorists have to pull onto Von Storch Avenue in order to see oncoming traffic. She is very concerned there might be a serious accident as a result of this.

She stated that she also called the DPW on numerous occasions to report this problem to no avail. She decided to call the DPW one more time today and spoke with an unidentified worker who told her to cut the weeds herself. Mrs. Krake, would you please forward this to the DPW asking them to cut the weeds themself.

Could we please send a letter to

LIPS asking if anything has been done

regarding the Washburn Street Cemetery? I

continue to receive phone calls regarding

the cemetery and the terrible state it's in.

It has -- they have done some improvements, but no where near the type of care that should be done in respect for the dead that are at that cemetery. I don't know who the owner of this building knows, it seems that he is untouchable. Week after week many of us have brought it up, Newswatch 16 have done articles, both of our papers have done stories on this and it seems he just continues to get away with this.

Next, a letter to the DPW asking that Fawnwood Road is repaired near the entrance off the driving range. This is the second request.

And finally, last week I made a motion that council would meet through the month of August for the full five weeks. In an effort to compromise with my colleagues, I make a motion that Scranton City Council shall meet August 2, 16 and 30, which would be three weeks instead of five, which would still provide two weeks of non-meeting.

MS. EVANS: We have a motion on the floor, do we have a second? The motion dies for lack of a second.

MR. ROGAN: And, Mrs. Krake, one more request to add, can you send a letter to Mayor Doherty asking if he would allow council chambers to be open so I can hold public comment on Tuesdays at 6:30 for the month of August, and that is it.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.
Mr. Loscombe, do you have any comments?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, I have a couple.

I have several citizens' concerns, I'm not going to read them off, but I'll pass them onto the City Clerk's Office after the meeting.

Last week, I don't recall if it was
Thursday or Friday, I'm losing track here, I
was coming back from West Side and
apparently the large tree on the 100 block
of North Main Avenue fell across the road.
For those of you who are familiar with the
area, it's that big green house next to the
old American Auto and it's been there for
many, many years and it actually grew into
that metal fence there. The fortunate thing
was that it fell around 6 a.m. before
traffic and the cars back up at that red

light there, and I do want to commend all of the emergency services for their response and the utility services for their responses, PPL, Verizon made it, police and fire because there was some wires, and a special thanks to our city forester Tony Santoli who was there overseeing the issue most of the day. He apparently had been trying to get the owners of that property to remove the tree for quite some time, and we are working together on removing a large branch from the tree in the back, which is pretty similar, and it's encroaching the bank parking lot and the neighbor's fence,

And the DPW crew, the tree crew, they did a fantastic job. That was quiet a sizeable tree. You will still see some of it laying in the front yard if you go by there, so they got a lot of firewood cut up there, but they did clean everybody's sidewalks and the street and everything and by late afternoon the street was reopened.

so Mr. Santoli and I discussed that while we

were there, and we're just trying to

establish total ownership there.

But again, it was very fortunate that it did fall at the time it did because, you know, it's close to the red light there and traffic backs up there all the time.

Next, in speaking of that area while I was there, Washburn and Main, I had, again, several weeks ago I requested some information on a building that was demolished by the Department of Public Works and their response was due by July 5, but we haven't received any response as far as I could see, and I have had several requests for information, so I'm wondering if I pass the information to you, Mrs. Krake, if could request under a Right-to-Know some information on that?

Just to touch on the Perry Street park, again, I'd love to see a park in every neighborhood and, you know, maybe you are right, Mr. McGoff, we are comparing apples to oranges to a certain degree, but by putting the park there doesn't mean it's going to be maintained and, I mean, it's going to cost money down the road when we have several issues with infrastructure,

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roads, bridges, a whole slew of items and a lot of these have come to me just this week.

And one of the things that played in my mind, this Fourth of July, unfortunately, I wasn't able to make it to the function at Nay Aug Park, but I did speak to someone who was there and it was someone that had a kidney transplant and when he went to use the restrooms I guess the restrooms were locked, but they had one Port-a-lav and there was 30 people lined up for Port-a-lav and this poor person did not have the opportunity to wait in line. I mean. there is a park that we are dumping all our money into and we can't seem to have functioning I don't know what the problem facilities. is, I want to see if maybe we could request information for parks and DPW as to what the problem is with the bathrooms there when there was a function, but that's sort of played on my mind and my decision, too.

I'm not trying to penalize anybody
in any section of the town, but I do think
that the money could be well spent elsewhere
even though it could only be spent for a

park as was stated, it just smacks to the rest of the people in North Scranton that they can't cross a bridge without sweating and, you know, we have a park there that may not be maintained in the next few years.

I'd love to see it happen, but reality is reality. We are dealing with budgets that are constrained. We can't put lifeguards at swimming pools, you know, that's where I stand on that.

As far as our recess for the summer, again, you know -- you know, I have a different feeling, a lot of people are saying, well, give back our pay for the month we are not there or whatever, you know, I stated it last week, city council office is open every day, it will continue to be open every day, anyone can call city hall office and e-mail any of us council people and contact me, just about everyone has my cell phone number, I get called continuously and I respond on a daily basis. I was out today all day looking at responses.

I'm not going away on vacation

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vacation. As we know, my pension was taken off me, but I can still stay in town and do the people business and it gives me the opportunity to continue to get around and get things done. There is a lot of functions in town during the summer, festivals and stuff like that, I could get around and speak to the people and hear what their concerns are and that's what I tell them. Some people come up and they say, "Oh, I hate to bother you here," and that's what I'm around for, that's where I find out about concerns, and I will continue to do that, but I don't think we have to be here when no legislation really comes down from the administration anyway.

because I can't afford to go away on

And I know a lot of people enjoy their own vacations. It's not a vacation, it's work, and we will continue to do our job and we'll continuing to be accessible and that's all I have to say on that.

Also, I discussed last week that I think it was last week or the week before my concerns with the West Lackawanna Avenue

Bridge. I did meet with the engineer from PennDOT at a very big meeting and I met with him this morning at 8:00. He called me late yesterday and asked if I could meet him at 8:00 this morning on the bridge, so I met him at 8:00 and his name is Dave Elmer, he is with PennDOT, he is their bridge engineer, and we walked over the West Lackawanna Avenue bridge to show him the issues that were there, and fortunately for everyone he assured me there is no structural deficiency. There are a lot of problems, a lot of it is, you know, the facade and stuff like that, but nothing structurally.

The only concern he has there is a part of the parapet on the northeast side that's ready to collapse. In fact, when I was there today versus two weeks ago and how it already moved six inches more and the only thing holding it right now from collapsing, it's probably a ten ton slab, is the electrical wires that were going through the metal conduit that has broken since I was there last week or two weeks ago, those

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wires are the only thing holding it right now and that's the reason why there is no lighting on the Lackawanna Avenue bridge because that wiring has been pinched off by the movement of the bridge.

However, the structural deck of the bridge itself is perfect we went up and down. It's a lot of cosmetic stuff that's You will see spalling and stuff like bad. that, settled sidewalks, but his main concern was to close off those sidewalks because where that section is ready to fall out the sidewalks may give out in that area, at least there would be an opening, and he also asked that the area down below, which is actually the field, fortunately, it's not over railroad tracks or anything like that, it's not traveled, but should anybody happen to come by that he wants that roped off a certain distance in case that comes down but he does wants it repaired.

And while I was there I had called our City Clerk's office because I didn't have the numbers with me, I had asked for DPW Director Brazil to respond over there so

the engineer could go other the situation with him and we were told Mr. Brazil was on vacation. So then I said, "Well, who would be next in commend?"

able to respond, and apparently Mr. Dougher had a couple of appointments already prescheduled, which was understandable, I mean, it was last minute situation, so he said he would call the city council office as soon as he is done with his other inspection and I said that would be fine I would meet with him personally and go over the issues baring that the engineer had to go back to his PennDOT, back to his office, but he gave me sufficient information as to what to pass on.

And I had also contacted, I got the phone number from the City Clerk's office, and I contacted our engineer, John Pocius, made him aware of it. He felt confident it wasn't structural, it was more cosmetic and stuff. He realized there was issues with it, so we had a conversation all along, but I felt much better having the engineer look

at it and state that it wasn't really a structural problem.

However, it is a safety issue at this point for other reasons, and we are also going to be looking at the directional arrow at the bottom, that's a city light, so we are going to have to request that through the city to see if we can set up a directional arrow for left turns because of all of the excess weight sitting on that bridge, which is a concern down the road.

So, fortunately, it doesn't have to be closed off. I figured West Side would be really bottled neck with Linden Street closed off and he told me that the Linden Street project should be commencing in September and I believe it would be done within 90 days. All that stuff was pretty well covered.

And I didn't get a chance to check on the Crisp Avenue Bridge, but while I was on the road after I was on the bridge inspection I received a call on my cell phone from Mayor Doherty and he wanted to know from me what the emergency was. And I

said, "Emergency?"

He said, "I received a call from the City Clerk's office that you had an emergency on the bridge."

I said, "Well," I said, "It's not really an emergency," and I said, "It's a safety issue," and I explained the whole scenario to him and he asked me if I contacted the DPW. I said, "Certainly," I said, "Mr. Brazil is on vacation, I'm awaiting a call from Mr. Dougher and stated I would go over it with him."

So, you know, I explained everything to the mayor and he said he would pass it onto DPW and I passed on the information for the engineer to him, his phone number, his contact information, so I would hope they would expedite closing those sidewalks off and barricade them down below because it is a safety issue, but you can feel confident driving over it, nothing to worry about with the vehicular traffic we just have to get the traffic moving a little quicker.

And we discussed some other issues, PennDOT, on several other items, the light

at St. Ann's Street and Main Avenue and a couple of other things, and I will be able to touch base on those in the future, but I want to thank Dave for taking the time to come over and respond to our request and as a Chairman of the Committee on Public Safety I felt there was an issue that had to be attended to.

In fact, I think it was last week's paper after we mentioned it, it seemed like there was no concern about some of the issues there and when I noticed that that abutment had moved even further in the last two weeks I was concerned, but my fears have been allieved, and there is still some issues, but just be careful. And that's all I have to say.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Loscombe, I
apologize, I forget to mention about the
update on the Crisp Avenue bridge. I spoke
to Mr. Paisley today from Pike's Creek
Construction --

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, that's who I had spoken to previously.

MR. ROGAN: And he was very helpful

1 and as he said as of I believe it was a few 2 days ago the prefabricated portion of the 3 bridge is being built and they are -- and don't take this for, you know, gospel 4 5 because we have run into road blocks since before I have been on council with this 6 7 project, they are supposed to be starting 8 the project somewhere in the beginning of 9 the next month which --10 MR. LOSCOMBE: Pretty much what I 11 said a couple of months, would be an August, September start. 12 MR. ROGAN: 13 Yeah. Like I said, I 14 won't believe it until I see it. MR. LOSCOMBE: 15 Exactly. 16 MR. ROGAN: But hopefully it will be 17 done. 18 MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, Mr. Rogan. 19 MS. EVANS: Thank you, Councilman 20 Loscombe. Councilman Joyce, any comments or 21 motions this evening? 22 MR. JOYCE: Yes. Tonight I wanted 23 to discuss a few revenue items, the first 24 being rental registration. As you know 25 from-- as you may know from the past budgets

in 2009 and 2010 \$120,000 in revenue was budgeted as the amount that was projected to be collected from rental registration fees and both of these years the administration's projections fell short.

In 2011, originally in the administration's budget, the amount of money projected to be collected for rental registration fees was actually lower than the summation of the rental registration coordinator's salary and benefits.

When Scranton City Council amended the 2011 operating budget, council added two housing inspectors back to the LIPS

Department to assist in fighting blight as well as to assist with the rental registration program. Since 2011 has began, the rental registration coordinator has left the city. Since the administration has not hired anyone to replace this position, the program is lacking. Therefore, until the administration replaces the employee who is no longer with the city, that was primarily in charge of rental registration, and makes a consorted effort to collect the fees that

are owed, the program will fail and, unfortunately, the revenue will not be realized.

If the administration fails to collect the amount of revenue that was projected in the 2011 operating budget, if they do fail to collect that in rental registration fees, it's their own doing. Mayor Doherty has exercised his right in hiring employees that are were not even budgeted for while refusing to replace employees that are budgeted for.

Thus, if the rental registration collection fee falls short this year, it will be in great part because of the administration's failure to replace the budgeted employee responsible for the program's oversight.

Secondly, there was an article in the Scranton Times the other -- I believe it was yesterday, regarding CMC meter revenue or what the city will realize from that and some possible conflicts with that, and I just wanted to address that very shortly. Regarding the revenue from the lease of

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parking meters to the CMC Hospital while they construct a garage, as you may know Scranton City Council voted to pass legislation to lease 72 double-metered parking spaces and four single-metered parking spaces to the CMC at a rate of \$2,000 per parking space or per spot. Now, since there is a total of 148 parking spots that would normally been subjected to the parking meters, the amount of money that's Scranton will realize from this transaction will be \$296,000.

In the legislation, it called for the \$296,000 to be placed in a special account to fund public safety initiatives.

Normally, in the current meter monitoring agreement with the Scranton Parking

Authority, 90 percent of the revenue collected from the parking meters that's realized basically goes to the city, while 10 percent goes to the Authority as a fee for their services in collecting the coins and also for enforcement efforts.

Though the Parking Authority appears to take issue with the facts that when the

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legislation was passed, being that 100 percent of the revenue collected from the lease of the parking spaces would go to the city, the argument in my opinion is pretty much unwarranted. The parking meters that are bagged are owned by the City of Scranton, not the Scranton Parking Authority. Therefore, it was the agreement of council, well, at least the majority of council, that the revenue should go to the city. As one knows, the CMC will be paying the city. There is no management fee of 10 percent that should be applied to this as there is no requirement for the Parking Authority to monitoring these meters or maintain them since during the term of the lease agreement this pretty much wouldn't be needed.

In addition to this, these parking meters were bagged prior to the transaction, therefore, revenue was not being realized by the city or the Parking Authority.

Executive Director Bob Scopelliti
was quoted in the Times as stating that,
"Every time someone takes revenue away from

the Parking Authority, it hurts."

What he did fail to mention, however, is that virtually no revenue was being generated by these meters that are being leased out to the CMC. Prior to the passage of the ordinance, the meters were bagged already and they were bagged for at least a great portion of 20101, therefore, if no one was putting coins into the meters I don't see how anyone would be realizing any revenue from it in the first place.

With that being said, I have a few citizens' requests. First, a resident living on the 1300 block of East Elm Street in East Mountain reports that the condition of the road is very poor. There are many cracks and many potholes on this block making travel conditions difficult. I reported this concern over a month ago and this response -- or this request was sent to Mr. Brazil and at this point have we received a response on this, Mrs. Krake?

MS. KRAKE: No.

MR. JOYCE: Well, with this in mind if you could please reforward this to

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Director Brazil and ask him to address this.

Also, this seems to be a popular area, about four times a year this comes up, North Scranton residents have reported that the condition of both Greenbush and Reese Street is subpar making travel conditions very difficult. Though they did state, and I will give the DPW credit, they have traveled to these streets and filled in some of the potholes in the street. The road is still in very poor condition and a lot of those holes have opened up, and they are also requesting that the road gets paved as it's a gateway and one road is a gateway and one road is an exit to the Career Technology Mrs. Krake, if you could please add Center. this to the letter to Mr. Brazil.

Residents residing on the 200 block of North Everett Avenue in West Scranton report that the condition of the road in this block is subpar and has very various cracks in the road along with potholes are making travel conditions difficult. If you could also add this to the letter to Mr. Brazil.

Various West Scranton residents informed me that there is suspicious and drug-related activity occurring in the 300 block of North Evans Court. Residents of this area request that something be done to address the situation as there are life-long residents of North Evans Court that have very serious concerns about the health, safety and welfare of their neighborhood. So, Mrs. Krake, if you could please forward this note onto Chief Duffy. I would also say forward it to the West Scranton Hyde Park Crime Watch Association, but we have a representative here so if --

MS. FOSTER: We have actually had three different patrols on that street in the last two weeks.

MR. JOYCE: Wonderful. So I'm glad that action is being taken to hopefully rectify this situation. Also, various individuals involved in the charity bike run for Flash Gavin I read earlier taking place in North Scranton request for a temporary "No Parking" signs to be placed in front of the establishment and on the block from

10:30 to 12:00, during the time of the bike ride registration.

In addition, members involved also request a police escort to lead the bike riders who to the highway for the charity run. Mrs. Krake, if you could please contact Chief Duffy and ask him if he could accommodate this request.

Residents residing on the 600 block of North Hyde Park Avenue report that a condemned home located at 612 North Hyde Park is in poor shape as grass has grown to over two feet high and the property is in poor condition and becoming an eyesore for residents. Mrs. Krake, if you can please add this to the letter to Mr. Seitzinger.

And also, I received a typed letter in my mailbox here in city hall about a property in an area on the 1000 block of River Street, I will be visiting that site over the next week in case the resident who sent in the letter is listening, so I just want to notify them that I did receive their letter and I didn't forget about them, I would just like to go out and see the site

myself before actually making some type of request.

Also, tonight I wasn't really planning on speaking about an August recess, however, I know that Councilman Rogan once again has expressed his views about meeting in August, so I kind of feel that maybe I should. First, let me discuss my own intentions. Sporadically, throughout the year, I walked various neighborhoods and areas of Scranton and knocking on residents doors to so what questions or concerns they may have or ask them what can city council do for them, how could we help you.

As one knows, many people running for office knocking on people doors asking them to vote for them around election time I was one of those people, I did it in 2009, in fact, I know Mr. Rogan accompanied me for many of these those door-to-door visits and, you know, since I'm in office now I feel that I owe it to people to seek out there questions and their concerns in the capacity in which I'm able to as time permits.

Over the recess period, I will be

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knocking on more doors, gathering more resident's viewpoints, and listening to the concerns that people have. I feel as though the recess period is a good time to increase this activity as not many people address their concerns in front of city council. There is a lot of people that may be a little bit shy or may not want to come up in front of the camera to address their concerns, they may be a little bit timid about calling the office and, you know, what I -- the main thing I realized from, you know, walking the streets of the city and just talking to various residents is there is a lot of issues in the city that most people wouldn't even be aware of about if they didn't visit that street or if they didn't knock on a certain resident's door.

When I was sworn into office as a councilman, I was not intending on partaking in a three-hour per week job and by no means do I. I devote a great deal of time outside these meetings researching city issues and speaking to residents as well as other officials for their input on ideas and

solutions which can potentially be beneficial for the city.

Personally, over the month of August I'll still be working as I do every month. I don't feel that I need to be in a public forum to work as some others may. My door is always open, I am accessible by e-mail or if anyone wishes to speak with me they could e-mail me, they could call the office and leave their number and I would be happy call them back.

Also, being the Finance Chair I do want to remind that at no point in the budget crafting process did any of my colleagues seek to increase funding for overtime for any of our office workers, there is one here attending the meeting, or seek to increase funding for our court stenographer, who is sitting right in front of me typing up the minutes which are roughly between 100 and 150 pages every single meeting.

Just to give you an idea of how much this expense would cost if we were to hold these meetings in August, it would be about

\$3,000, not to mention potential costs for advertisements as well as utilities and other bills. I know that for some it may not seem like a great deal of money, but I know that \$3,000 is a good deal of money in my eyes and I know that Councilman Rogan would agree with that because I remember that was one of the primary reasons, and correct me if I'm wrong, that you didn't support voting for Rossi & Rossi as the independent auditor.

MR. ROGAN: I will respond when you are done.

MR. JOYCE: And I just want to remind that just about every branch of the government has some sort of recess in place. I know that the state Senate does, the State House does, and even Congress and Senate on a national level are doing it. I know that Congressman Lou Barletta and Congressman Tom Marino will be on recess from August 8 to September 5 as well, which is roughly about the same period as council will be on recess.

So I just wanted to say while it's

technically a recess, I do plan on working through the entire period though it may not be in these chambers, and that's all.

MR. ROGAN: I will just respond very briefly. First on the cost of the \$3,000, I agree with you \$3,000 is a lot of money, but the function of the legislative body is to hold meetings and help the people. I'm not saying that because we are not going to be meeting, and I'm sure it's safe to say for all of us, we not going to be working. If the meetings are that small a part of the job then why not just agree to have them. It's not that much of a burden compared to the whole grand scheme of the job to meet here for three hours one day a week.

You talked about Congress and the
Senate and the State house having to recess
when it's completely different. Congress
members are in a Washington, D C, the
majority of the year and for somebody in
Pennsylvania or this area it's not too much
of a burden, but, for instance, if you are a
Congress person in California you need that
recess time to go out and talk to the voters

and talk to the people in the district. We all do that on a daily basis when we go to the grocery store, when we pump gas, and when we do anything because we live in the city where we legislate.

And for the state Senate and the State House, Congress and the Senate, they don't. They live here when they can, but when they're in session they are not working in the district. We do.

The \$3,000 that I voted against on for Rossi & Rossi, when you have two options one is cheaper and they'll do the same job and one is more expensive and they do the same job, I'm going to take the cheaper one every time, but I think \$3,000 is a small price to pay to have us here every Tuesday throughout the month of the August listening to the people of this city. And hopefully that's the last time we are going to have to say about this recess.

MR. JOYCE: And I know that we have discussed the recess and I know that we have different opinions, and I know that Mr.

McGoff said that he is already not going to

be here three of the weeks in August; correct?

On that note, if the administration isn't sending down legislation and if some council members are not able to attend, I would be in full favor of meeting with the people. I'm in full favor of listening to the people's concerns and I have every intention of doing that, however, if some other council members aren't, I know that there was a recess that was planned, I think -- I don't think there has ever not been a recess, so --

MR. ROGAN: 2005.

MR. JOYCE: Right, and also, I remember in 2005 when there wasn't a recess some of the council members didn't show up and there were a lot of accusations made that the only recess -- the only reason why there wasn't a recess was because it was an election year and it was for purely political reasons, and I certainly want to -- I certainly wouldn't want to see Mr. McGoff or Mr. Loscombe attend the meetings and get accused of being here for

purely political reasons. However, I know that we both have differing view of the opinions on this, as well as the auditor. I felt like \$3,000 was a better deal. I felt that Rossi & Rossi was the more responsible bidder, but we are all entitled to our opinion and that's all I'll say about it for now.

MR. ROGAN: I'll make one final comment, Mrs. Evans, I apologize for taking your time to speak. The first point, if you would like, if the mayor does give approval to open up council chambers I would invite my colleagues to join me. It wouldn't be a formal meeting, it would just be a meet and greet with the residents, and if the mayor gives approval I will be sending out press releases to that affect to all the media, so they can publicize it.

And secondly, and I don't want to talk about politics at the meeting, I hate to do it, but when the previous majority was in charge myself and some of my colleagues constantly went after them on this issue and it seems that now we are the majority some

people want to do the same thing. I wrote letters to the editor, to the Scranton Times, going after Mr. McGoff, Mrs. Fanucci and Ms. Gatelli about the August recess. It was wrong when they did it, it's wrong when we do it, and I'm not voting for it, so --

MR. MCGOFF: Could I add one thing?

Since we are -- if we are looking to save

money and we are concerned perhaps we could

make an agreement that we all talk less and

that way we wouldn't make -- just a thought.

MR. JOYCE: It's always good to have an -- maybe I shouldn't have said that. We probably are increasing our stenographer's earnings.

MR. ROGAN: You're welcome, Cathene.

MS. EVANS: I don't know -- I really -- you know, don't want to belabor this because I prefer that we move onto more important council issues than, you know, to continue to be sidetracked by this phantom issue, but I would remind my colleague that it isn't the mayor's decision to use council chambers for the month of the August, it's the decision of council.

Good evening, everyone. I will begin with one business item. Mrs. Krake, please notify Ms. Aebi that city council requests complete copies of all 2012 CDBG applications on or before August 10, 2011, and the proposed OECD 2012 allocations at such time as they are prepared.

Unfortunately, Mayor Doherty vetoed city council's legislation to fund and open Novembrino pools this summer and justified his action with inaccuracies. He cites only Section 504, ordinances and resolutions of the Home Rule Charter to address the requirements for a veto or a signature.

Notably, he fails to provide any citations to support his reasons for the veto, therefore, I will address his inaccuracies.

First, neither the Home Rule Charter nor the Administrative Code contain any language either direct or indirect that City Council must discuss it's legislation with the mayor.

Second, File of Council No. 14, 2011, was signed by Mayor Doherty and

immediately thereafter a special account was, indeed, established as evidenced by vouchers submitted to council by the city controller.

Third, the solicitor for OECD is neither required nor authorized by the Home Rule Charter and the Administrative Code to opine on the legislative actions of city council.

Fourth, although the mayor states that the use of UDAG repayments falls completely to the discretion of the mayor, no documentation has been located or provided by the administration to verify Mr. Doherty's personal belief.

Finally, the mayor states that salaries of lifeguards for the Novembrino Swim Complex and the purchase of chemicals are not permitted uses for UDAG repayment or RE-RE funds per HUD rules, regulations and/or guidelines. Having researched the uses of first and second UDAG repayment funds, I am aware that UDAG second payment funds can be used for any city purpose.

However, as I previously noted, the

mayor believes that only he has the authority to spend these monies. And let me refresh your memories, ladies and gentlemen, regarding Mayor Doherty sole discretionary use of these funds. Program ads in booklets distributed during local luncheons and dinners. Hotel rooms at the Beacon Hotel for an out-of-state conference. Tables of the ten at luncheons and galas. Generous donations to local special interest groups supportive of the mayor's political career, and dues and subscriptions for the mayor totaling tens of thousands of dollars, among numerous others.

MR. JOYCE: And, you know, I apologize for interrupting, but I remember when you were reading off some of the uses of the RE-RE account and what that money was spent on a few months ago, you mentioned a stunt mayor video, and I had a chance to view this, this is located on the city's website under media between a great place to raise kids and a keep the pride alive video.

And I remember that you were stating that \$1,700 of RE-RE funds were used to fund

this video and it's basically a video produced by Dan Simrell and a four a half minute spot featuring some local community leaders and some ex-politicians, including now convicted felon Bob Cordaro, so if this is what we are spending \$1,700 on or some of this RE-RE money on, I don't see any reason why that if we are going to use money on things like this, we can't use this type of funding to help keep the Novembrino Pool open.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Joyce.

The mayor states that these funds cannot be used for the disadvantaged children and adults of the city in a low to moderate income area. Although, Mayor Doherty's wasteful and personal spending of these funds is not illegal, the people of Scranton tell me that they prefer to have such funds spent on free swimming, road paving, blight cleanup and other issues that directly effect their quality of life.

The people of West Side and other city neighborhoods need to know that the mayor isn't acting in your best interest.

Rather, he is acting in his own interest.

Countries Doherty stopped free swimming at

Novembrino pools this summer and the Capouse

Avenue pool in the summers of 2010 and 2011,

but he spent \$1,250 for a table of ten at a

charity gala, something he should be taking

from his own money to attend, and \$29,955

for his dues to the Pennsylvania League of

Cities.

Further, I'll wager that Chris

Doherty will vote owe council legislation to allow free swimming for city residents at the Nay Aug Swim Complex. He doesn't care that families of two or more children can't afford to pay \$4 per child to swim. He doesn't consider that these are the families who cannot afford swimming pools and country club memberships. These are the children and families public pools are built to serve and yet they are denied access by the mayor and an authority appointed by him who profess to serve the people.

Further, the Recreation and Parking

Authorities and previously the Civil Service

Commission as well are advised by an

attorney who is hired by and works for the mayor. So, ladies and gentlemen, you tell me who seems to run these municipal authorities?

The mayor should be ashamed of this contrived and inaccurate veto, and more so, the low regard in which he holds the poor and the little guy in our city.

Consequently, I have placed Mayor

Doherty's veto on tonight's council agenda

for an override vote.

At last week's council meeting, I announced that the bids for the parking meter program had been rejected. As a result, the newspaper obtained statements from the administration that the program would be rebid, thereby, delaying it's implementation until at least September. The administration has caused this new revenue generator to fall significantly short because of it's nine months of postponements that serve a distinct purpose.

The administration does not wish to implement this program because it proposes instead to sell the parking meters to the

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Scranton Parking Authority which will in turn take a \$10 million loan to purchase the meters. This is the same municipal authority that is fighting for 10 percent of the CMC permit parking fees although it's services are unused and unnecessary, and that has finished the last few years in the red. It's expenditures and debt exceeded revenue and the Parking Authority -- again, the Parking Authority's over \$50 million in debt is guaranteed by the city. When the city pledged it's full faith and credit for these bonds it guaranteed that any unpaid debt will fall to the city's taxing power by translates into higher taxes for the people.

The proposed 10 million in borrowing for the purchase of the parking meters will very likely also require the city's guarantee. This is yet another example of an asset owned by the people which is sold or leased to an Authority and then paid for a second time by the people.

I have a record of voting against these Parking Authority agreements. I was the only council member to vote down the

last \$35 million bond issue for the Parking Authority and I do not intend to approve a sale of the parking meters to the Parking Authority.

Further, the mayor was made aware several weeks ago following a meeting between administrators and council members that any further discussions of the 2011 deficit must be held publically in council chambers and he must attend those meetings. Council is most willing to discuss the mayor's proposals and it's own during public meetings. To date, however, Mayor Doherty has failed to respond. The mayor should also consider speaking to city council before the business administrator drafts the mayor's 2012 proposed budget. City council welcomes dialogue, but it does not require a mayor's permission to legislate.

Next, tonight's agenda includes Item 7-D, an ordinance authorizing the city to enter into a contract with Northeast Revenue Service, LLC, for the collection of delinquent real estate taxes for the years 2004, five, six, seven, eight, and for the

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years 2009 and '10 after 2010 delinquent taxes are returned to the city by the Collector of Taxes on January 1, 2012.

Council Solicitor Hughes, City Clerk Nancy Krake, Councilman Loscombe and I worked tirelessly on this crucial issue throughout the last several weeks and together with Attorney Rogers and Mr. Shaniny, developed a contract that will provide payments to Pennstar Bank for the city's recent \$1.5 million default on it's previous sale of delinquent taxes. contract will also provided a more favor and legal collection process for delinquent taxpayers by means of a 90-day grace period, payment plans, monthly notifications, reasonable and minimal interest and fees permitted under state law, on-line payments as well as local bank branch offices. Headquarters in city hall, on-line accessibility to tax delinquencies and Treasurer sales, among other provisions.

We hammered out the contract that helps the city with it's debt and current deficit and makes payments of tax

delinquencies more fair, affordable, efficient and accountable. I wish to thank Attorney Hughes, Mrs. Krake and Mr. Loscombe for helping me to right this wrong that began in 2007 and to provide a strong solution to a current financial crisis.

Next, I'd like to remind council members that motions are to be presented in writing to each council member prior to the voicing of motions during council meetings.

I finally have citizens' requests for the week: Number one, four lots adjacent to 350 North Garfield Avenue are an overgrown breeding ground and habitat for snakes, insects, and groundhogs. Also, a pool deck on one of these properties is infested with spider nests. Each property is owned by separate individuals. A city inspector has attempted to locate property owners without successes yet. Please pursue this nuisance property for the residents of North Garfield Avenue and this West Scranton neighborhood.

105 Little Spike Way, a light pole was knocked down in December 2007. As a

result, there remains a huge hole in the sidewalk which is covered by rock. Please determine who is responsible for the sidewalk repair and pole replacement and notify city council on or before July 22, 2011.

Homeowners request the paving of the 200 to 400 blocks of Theodore Street. They also report that the train overpass on Theodore Street needs to be inspected and is deteriorating.

Corner of Wyoming Avenue and
Greenridge Street, three catch basins are
covered with debris and need cleaning to
prevent additional flooding during rain
events. Please address as soon as possible.

Residents report that winter cinders remain on the sidewalk on Moosic Street over Route 81. Please address this problem.

South side residents continue to complain about the overgrowth and mess at the intersection of River Street and Meadow Avenue. They ask how many times they have to report this eyesore before the city will finally take appropriate action.

Residents of North Scranton report
that the deterioration of the Rockwell
Avenue bridge, damage to the undercarriage
and missing and shifting stones. Further,
they state that portions of the wall and
sidewalk collapsed into the Legget's Creek
following the rainstorms on June 26 and July
3, 2011. Please report these hazardous
conditions to the city engineer and
Mr. Brazil, and request a written update and
proposed corrective measures on or before
July 25, 2011. And, Mr. Loscombe, if you
could please contact the PennDOT engineer.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. I will.

MS. EVANS: And if you could arrange to meet with him at the Rockwell Avenue Bridge so that he can see for himself what deterioration has occurred in the last, well, I'd say four to six weeks.

436 Birch Street, I think someone else had that, parents of school children request that the sidewalks on Olive Street approaching Scranton High School are cleared prior to the opening of the new school year so that students are no longer forced to

walk on the this extremely busy street.

And finally, a Right-to-Know request for the fuel bill for Nay Aug Park swim complex for June, July and August, 2010 and 2011, and that's it.

MR. JOYCE: Before we go any further, I know that Mrs. Evans and I, we met with Ryan McGowan as well as Mr. Gervasi from the firefighters' union and also Chief Duffy was there representing the police and I know that they want us to keep the contents of their plans or some of the issues that were brought forth during this meeting confidential.

However, after five requests for the mayor and the business administrator to come in and speak in council chambers about financial issue without even the courtesy of an answer, yet alone a "no", I can understand why one would be frustrated, but since you mentioned the meters, to provide some background on the revenue side, the city earns roughly \$1.4 million in parking meter revenue on an annual basis. In addition, there is also another \$1.1 million

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in revenue for various violations that occur through the years -- or throughout the year, rather, from police fines, ticket fees, yellow and white, etcetera, so that's a total of \$2.5 million in revenue that would be lost in 2012 operating budget and every budget going forward if this was adopted.

Now, on the expenditure side, we do reimburse the Parking Authority \$562,000, so if you subtract this from the \$2.5 million it's roughly around \$2 million or \$1.9 million that would be absent as far as money that the city would have if this type of a transaction were to occur. Therefore, by doing this, if this were to happen, it appears as if the administration could possibly be setting up the residents of the city for a tax increase, because there would be \$2 million or \$1.92 million that would have to be made up somewhere and really the only way, unless other created revenue source generators were presented, would be for the administration to propose a tax increase or to make massive cuts somewhere that would take away \$2 million worth of

JOYCE: And just to provide some background, I'm sure most people are probably listening to us, unless they know the towing industry probably don't know, you know, why there is three lists, and I think to make it clear to the public, depending on the type of the tow that the company could do that is the determinant of what lists they are on.

For instance, if a towing company can only tow say compact cars and, you know, your usual vehicles that people drive like cars, SUV's, they may only be on one list. However, if they can tow heavy machinery or heavy rigs than they may be on two or three.

MR. MCGOFF: I would just like to say that I spoke with one of the towers who was involved in this and they did -- he felt that it was the -- that the changes in the

fee schedule were legitimate and acceptable by the towers that were involved and I'm glad to see that we added the amendment in Section IV, that was the one concern that they had, that companies could be added and therefore without regard to companies being dropped and that they would therefore lose business in that way, and so that amendment, that change, was thankful -- or thankful for that change being made.

MS. EVANS: Anyone else? All those in favor of amending Item 7-E, as amended, signify by saying aye.

Until that time, I'm sure money would remain in the account.

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MR. MCGOFF: Yes.

MR. ROGAN: I would agree with what Mrs. Evans said. I would also like to add if the money isn't spent, I would like to see the money spent in West Side. West Side has been getting the short end of the stick for all of the years Mayor Doherty has been in office.

MS. EVANS: And I might add that because the federal funding of the CDBG program has been cut for financial year 2011, OECD and city council are faced with a task of decreasing allocations that were previously made by ordinance and so it is quite possible that city council will revisit the funding for the Novembrino Pool Complex and the creation of the splash park in that area, and so it actually may have a better ending hopefully where the pools that we have that a great deal of money were invested into will actually continue to provide free swimming for the children of that area. Is there anyone else on the question? Roll call, please.

MR. MCGOFF: I would like to -- I wasn't here last week when was this introduced I believe that the city does provide free swimming right now. There are three pools at which children in the city or anyone in the city can swim for free. I have always seen Nay Aug Pool as a separate entity that would charge for swimming there, perhaps necessary to maintain the pool and to maintain the park, and while I'm not sure that it's -- that raise in the fees to \$4 is justified, I still believe that a fee for swimming there is justified.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else on the question? I think it's important once again to note that children from families that are financially let's say on better, sounder ground perhaps can afford to pay \$4

per child to swim daily. I do think though, you know, even if, for example, you have a family of four, as I did, I know that if you took me back in time and my children actually did swim at that very pool and almost every day of the week and I took them there and I stayed there until the end of the swim day each day, if I were faced with paying \$4 per child that would have been \$16 plus myself, and in addition to that we also took neighborhood children with us, my children's friends.

And, you know, you are looking at quite a tally there for a day's worth of swimming and for a lot of families that would mean saving up for something like that. This pool is no different than any of the other pools in the City of Scranton.

They have all been constructed with taxpayers' dollars and, you know, for those who have or are fortunate enough to have their own above-ground or in ground pools or country club memberships or YMCA memberships certainly they are not in the need of these public facilities, they are there to serve

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1	the needs of those who have less and they
2	shouldn't be turned away because they can't
3	afford to enter that park. Anyone else on
4	the question? Roll call, please.
5	MS. CARRERA: Mr. McGoff.
