MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker is Andy Sbaraglia.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonians. There is some bad news coming out of these authorities and it's terrible news coming out of these authorities. When the Courts have to come in and tell what contract to pay, something is definitely wrong at the Sewer Authority. That smell that comes from there isn't from what they handle, it's from what this are doing down there.

The Parking Authority borrowed 2.8, I think, million to pay off debt, they are on the verge of the bankruptcy. There is no question about it. They can't just keep borrowing to pay off borrowing, it just doesn't work that way in America.

The Redevelopment Authority is already bankrupt. Where do we stand there? They are bankrupt and there is no question about it, they can't pay it off. Probably the letter of credit most likely that they got in trouble with.

The Rec Authority is strangling the kids of the city placing fees and raising fees while the mayor is closing pools.

There is what he said.

Now, the Library Authority, I say it's an authority because it didn't get disbanded, you pointed it out very good, and you also said that the deed from the library sits with this Authority. If they wish to sell our library they can. We have to thank Mr. McGoff for that. It was his group that voted in that Authority.

Something has got to be done about

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these authorities. You can't disband them, but I suggest you write to the Attorney General and ask for a thorough investigation of these authorities. Mr. Pilchesky isn't supposed to our protectant, our elected officials are supposed to protect the people of Scranton, not private citizens. disappointed that more work wasn't done on behalf of any city official to stop what's happening down there. With all of the authorities what are we going to do? We are going to wait until the sword falls because it's hanging over our head and that debt is enormous that we would have to assume for the Parking Authority. The Redevelopment Authority I have no idea because they are, as you notice, this are a close click, but you do know what comes out of it eventually a lot of debt.

And the Rec Authority, like I said,
I don't know exactly why that was even put
in. The pool was always available to the
people of Scranton, even if they had a
nominal feel for that pool, but it was never
meant to be a cash cow for the Authority.

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In fact, if you look at the original people who gave it they said the only thing you were supposed to charge for up there is the amenities, but apparently everything that is up there is an amenity.

And the Library Authority frightens me. Those beautiful stain glassed windows if they decide to sell them they can and there is nothing you can do about it or You can't have all of these anyone. separate governments. It's what we got. The best thing for us all to do is to get down to Harrisburg and get them politicians down there to abolish the authorities, that's the only thing you can do. We don't needs private governments everywhere there is, all they are is cash cows and that's not what it was designed for. These people will supposedly caretakers, instead, they became looters. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Sbaraglia. Our next speaker is Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Les Spindler, city resident and Council.

homeowner and taxpayer.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MS. SPINDLER: This was going to be number two on my list, but since Andy brought up Mr. Pilchesky I'm also going to talk about him. You know, some people dislike the man, the man does a great job. Council is aware of the Scranton Sewer Authority accepting a higher bid for work that's going to be done.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. SPINDLER: And Mr. Pilchesky took the Sewer Authority to Court, I don't know if council is aware of that, and he had it overthrown. I'll read part of this. It says, "Judge Peter O'Brien has ruled in favor of the granting a petition for injunctive relief to stop the award of the highest bid to Ronca for \$17,163,000.00, almost \$2.6 million higher than the bid submitted by Falter at \$14,569,101.00 relating to a project of the Scranton Sewer Authority."

So, it's great that we have somebody like this that steps up to the plate for the

citizens of this city, and as I said last week, he took Judge Thomson to Harrisburg five times and has his cases overthrown five times. This guy is amazing on what he does and I don't think it's a bad job for a carpenter, and he really gave it Carl Greco, who represented the Sewer Authority in this case, and again, it's a great job for a carpenter. Thank you, Joe Pilchesky.

Moving on, in last Wednesday's

Doherty's newsletter they talked about me

talking about that deadly fire last week and

it said I put the response -- the

responsibility of the loss of life on the

mayor's shoulders. Well, that's exactly

right because the mayor said when he laid

off firefighters and shut down engine

companies he said the response times will

not be affected. As I said last week, it's

an out and out lie and I will prove it.

In that same article, it said,

Engine 4 from Mulberry Street made it to

that fire in two minutes and 36 seconds.

Now, I have decided to do a test. I drove

to the site of the fire from where Engine 9

used to be, stopping at two stop signs completely, doing the speed limit, I made it in two minutes. That's 36 seconds less than Engine 4 made it. Now, I mean, they did a great job, I'm not blaming them, when the mayor says response times won't be affected, he's a liar.

Engine 9 wouldn't have had to make full stops of two stop signs and wouldn't go the speed limit. I don't know how much faster they would gotten there than I did, but they would have gotten there faster than I did so it's a darn shame that firefighters are being laid off and firehouses are being closed, engines being put out of service, I hope all of this is overturned in Court.

And then we have the editorial staff of the Times-Tribune criticizing the supermajority for not okaying a park in North Scranton, which Mr. McGoff okayed also, and not once have I heard Mr. McGoff talk the public safety people getting laid off. We have firefighters laid off, police officers laid off, all Mr. McGoff talks about is parks. People are dying and all

you are talking about is parks, Mr. McGoff. Give me a break, will you? Get your priorities in order and I hope the people remember this on election day because you do not belong up there. Parks? Come on. We have people dying and all you care about is parks.

Lastly, Mr. Loscombe, I know you probably can't do anything about this, but they were supposed to start work on the Linden Street bridge this month, do you know if that's still on schedule because today is the 13th already?

MR. LOSCOMBE: As a matter of fact, it's on my list to make a call tomorrow, I think they may have gotten a little behind this last week because of the flooding issues, all their engineers for the bridges have been on bridge inspections, I don't know if that's the excuse, but I will find out tomorrow.

MR. SPINDLER: I mean, that backs up traffic on Seventh Avenue by Redner's there terrible.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Exactly.

MR. SPINDLER: And it backs it up all over the place and I hope they gets fixed soon because pretty soon they will have an excuse that the weather is too cold. Thank you for your time.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Our next speaker is a Michael Passaro.

MR. PASSARO: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. PASSARO: Mike Passaro, city taxpayer, life-long West Scranton resident and the reason I'm here tonight is an article appeared in the Scranton Times for the Thursday, September 8, announcing a public announcement for the CDBG, the list of what's proposed and where the money is going to go?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MS. PASSARO: It seems that some sort of, I don't know, on the mayor's part overt activity that occurred that none of the neighbors from Academy Street, Division Street, South Sumner and Hyde Park Avenue, South Hyde Park Avenue, had any input whatsoever concerning the demolition of the

Lincoln Jackson Elementary School and a proposed park and green space.

The neighbors were completely left out of it and all of a sudden we see it -- we have heard rumors through different channels and now it's, you know, black and white in the newspaper. There is also listed a hearing and, Mrs. Evans, I couldn't kind of make heads or tails of what the deadlines were, there was a September 8 deadline and an October 14 and a November something, will all of that be announced like later so people can come and make their objections or --

MS. EVANS: Absolutely. We will conduct a public hearing on the city's proposed CDBG allocations and I believe that public hearing is next Tuesday, September 20, at perhaps 6:00, 6:00, and so certainly you and all of your neighbors should come to the public hearing and express your concerns.

MR. PASSARO: Absolutely. Thank you. It breaks our heart being neighbors that we were completely left out of the

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equation that Mayor Doherty could just

decide that some funds are going here, there

and everywhere and the four -- I'm sorry,

approximately five block radius around

Lincoln Jackson Elementary School there are

already three existing parks in addition to

the Novembrino Pool Complex. The skate

park, which is also the police precinct

where the West Side Hospital used to be,

Fellows Park, which has a pavilion and is

within five blocks, and I'm not exactly sure

what the name of the park is, I've always

called it the Reverend Bishop Park on Main

and Price Street where the little gazebo is.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Allen Park.

MR. PASSARO: And by Royal's

Hardware, and that park has had -- there is

still some old Christmas lights hanging on

there on the gazebo, and the fence is

completely destroyed, beautiful PVC fence

destroyed. Fellows Park had a stabbing

recently and there is less, you know, to

be as diplomatic as possible, less than

quality individuals that hang out at that

park. The neighborhood crime watch seems to

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think that park is all goodness and light and, unfortunately, it's not.

The skate park, our skate park, was vandalized. We never showed up in the paper, it was unreported in the newspaper, but e-mails went out to everyone in the crime watch that the skate park was going to be closed on a certain weekend due to vandalism and graffiti and the crime watch members were going to be there to clean up the park.

We don't need any more parks. Like I said, in the that five block radius four parks, including the Novembrino swim complex. He wants to put another park there with pavilions and green space and a That's fine if we all lived on playground. Wisteria Lane or in Mayberry. We don't. area, my block, Academy Street, the pictures that I gave Mr. Loscombe before, my house is in such proximity to the Lincoln Jackson I'm directly across the street. I've put up with -- my entire neighbors, the entire neighborhood has put up with crime and drug deals and public urinations, public sex

acts. I have picked up needles off of the porch of the school over the years. That's with the school actually functioning before it closed last June. It's gotten worse over the past summer.

The police officers that I have spoke with that have made -- that have responded to my calls in the middle off the night, 3:00, 4:00 in the morning, these roving gangs said, "Don't worry, Mike, things are going to get better, school is going to get back."

Things have gotten better.

Unfortunately, they haven't gotten better

Friday, Saturday and Sunday night. These
kids are still roaming the streets, they end
up at Fidelity -- the gangs at the Fidelity

Bank, Walgreen's, Dibileo Insurance and the

A-Plus, and the police will show up with a

call, they will get a call for a fight or a

drug deal or whatever, and instead of the

police saying, "Go home, if I catch you out

again you are going to jail or you are going

back to your parents," they don't. They

just move to another location.

And the last location on the little -- on the little route is Lincoln Jackson Elementary School. It's completely, unsecured. There is no fence around the entire property. There is half fences here there, broken fences. The school district when they were moving out they took down a fence that was our only little bit of a salvation between Bob Galderi's house and he is putting up with complete nonsense right now.

MS. EVANS: Please finish. You can continue.

MR. PASSARO: I have quite a bit to go, but I will definitely come back. We just think that it's unfair that the mayor can just willy-nilly decide to do what he, you know, wants to do on a whim. I invite the mayor personally, he can bring armed Pinkerton guard for all I care to come to stay at my house. Stay at my house and I'll open up a bed and breakfast for him to stay at my house Friday, Saturday and Sunday night and see just exactly how much sleep he gets. He is not going to get any sleep. We

sleep like vampires in that neighborhood, four blocks around there, around the school. Drug dealers, gangs, 2:00, 3:00, 4:00.

We have also gotten calls from -- I have called dispatch and have been yelled at by dispatch, I have the dispatcher's numbers, I'm not going to reveal those number, but two of -- a male and female, the male told me I was very excited in the middle of the night and I called up and he said, "Calm down or I'm going to hang up the phone on you," which completely boggled my mind.

The lady that I spoke with, the lady dispatcher, she said, "You just called here five minutes ago."

I said, "Well, nothing is done. You know, somebody needs to get here immediately."

And at that point I said -- now, I don't own a baseball bat, I'm obviously handicapped and I'm not going to go out after a bunch of kids, and I said, "You know what --" she didn't know me from anyone, I said, "I'm going to go out after them with a

baseball bat."

There were three police cars at my home within three minutes looking for me. Why couldn't those cars have gone there? It didn't go out over the dispatch, one of the calls, one of the 2:00 phone calls didn't go out over the dispatch for 26 minutes. When the officer finally got there everything was done and quelled, everything was fine.

The officer called into dispatch and questioned what time did the call come in, what time did the call go out, and did the math and it was 26 minutes. He apologize profusely to me. That same evening at 4:00 I made another call and that's when the mail dispatcher told me that he was going to hang up on me and I said, "You have a problem here," I said, "That calls aren't even go out over the radio for 26 minutes."

That made him backtrack so quick he had no words for me. He said, "Sir, I'll send out a car."

They did. By the time they sent out

1 a car the kids have already gone. I have 2 witnessed kids running over cars coming up 3 Academy Street and saying, "Watch this, watch this, we did it last night on some 4 5 other street," and they will gallop up on cars, walk the entire street up and over 6 7 everybody's cars doing damage. 8 I have taken up enough time, but 9 thank you so much very much. 10 MS. EVANS: Thank you very much. 11 MR. MCGOFF: Could I interject? 12 There is a proposed \$350,000 -- or an 13 application for \$350,000 for the project in 14 2012 CDBG for a park. MS. EVANS: For a park. 15 16 MR. MCGOFF: And the second thing I 17 had, do we -- in order for that to take 18 place the school district would have to 19 transfer that property to the city, would it 20 not? 21 MS. EVANS: I believe so. 22 MR. JOYCE: I believe so. 23 MR. MCGOFF: I believe so, too, and 24 I don't recall seeing that in anywhere, 25 perhaps we could find out if that has

occurred or if it's --

MS. EVANS: If you can direct Mrs. Krake on our behalf.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I believe there was a comment in the newspaper a few weeks ago where Mr. Lesh offered it for a dollar to the mayor to make a park there.

MR. MCGOFF: I don't know if there is anything officially done.

 $\label{eq:mr.loscombe} \text{MR. Loscombe: That was the last I}$ heard of it.

MS. EVANS: And I do think in light of what Mr. Passaro brought to our attention tonight that we should be speaking with the neighbors in this area to gain their input on the construction of a park. I think Mr. Passaro made a number of very valid points this evening and certainly that is something that has to be seriously considered when council is making it's amendments to the proposed CDBG allocations sent to us by OECD and the mayor.

MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.

Doug Miller, Scranton.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. JOYCE: Good evening.

MR. MILLER: Last night I was informed of some very quite frightening news, and I understand that this will be expanded on later on in the meeting, I was briefly informed that yesterday and today there were only five police officers, including a supervisor, assigned to cover 27 square miles of the city. My reaction to this news was a deep concern and frustration. Once again, the administration has showed it's lack of respect for our public safety officers as well as the residents of this city.

You know, we heard from the speaker moments ago from West Side who talked about what he has to deal with, criminal activity and all of the nonsense and, you know, I really feel sorry for him and, you know, it just goes to show the frustration here and I share it with him and, you know, we might as well go and cut another 21 then. I mean, it's ridiculous. It really is.

It's just -- it really upsets me I

take this serious and, you know, it's going to take citizens to come up to the podium and express their frustration, well, then that's what's got to happen and hopefully this mayor will once and for all get it through his head that can't keep playing games with the health and safety of the residents in this city, it's gone on too long.

You know, we just witnessed the tenth anniversary of 9/11, a day where we reflected on our public safety and since that day public safety officials all across this country have received instant respect. Unfortunately, we can't say the same about this mayor. He puts parks and cronies ahead of our safety, and I believe the voters of this city were informed of this, but unfortunately, they ignored it.

Moving onto another issue here, I'd like to go back to the Perry Avenue Park.

It's unfortunate that I have to address this because as I stated last week I feel we are wasting our time with this in recent days it's become a big issue in the newspaper and

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talks with the administration, and as I stated last week I don't feel at this time we should be considering another park in the city. You know, we don't live in Disney World, and I like to use that phrase that Councilman Loscombe brought forth a few weeks ago because, you know, for whatever reason this mayor thinks this is Disney World or Six Flags or Hershey Park, I mean, we might as well just get it over with and build an amusement park downtown. I mean, that's all that's on this guy's mind. Let's cut police and firemen, let's build parks.

You know, we heard Lincoln Jackson.

I mean, enough is enough. This is just
getting ridiculous, it really is. You know,
again, priorities.

I expressed my concern on this. I expressed concern on the cost of up keeping this proposed park and I know that most of the council shares the same concern as I do. You know, we heard statements from Mr. McGoff who said he doesn't understand why we would throw away free money. Well, let's make this real simple by using a

little common sense. The city is facing an alleged \$8 million deficit at the end of the year, and from Mrs. Evans last week we heard that can it could be as much as 15. We have failed to maintain our current parks that we have, we couldn't even operate swimming pools this summer depriving children the opportunity to swim during the summer months. And having said that, how can anyone possibly consider another park?

One valid point made by Mr. Evans
last week is that if you read the
legislation it states that this \$50,000 is
part of, again, part of the ongoing
development at Perry Avenue. So again,
common sense tells you that by reading this
legislation there is more costs involved.
Where is that money coming from? Where are
we pulling that out of? I'd like to see
what hat we're going to get that money out
of it? The mayor must have some magicians
helping him out because he seems to be able
to find this money somewhere.

Another argument we have heard by Mr. McGoff and Mr. Rogan is that we should

be letting residents of North Scranton come forward and give their opinions on this matter. Well, how long have we been discussing this? Months now. The residents of North Scranton have had ample time to come forward. This chamber is open to all residents to come down here every Tuesday and discuss city business. Nobody is preventing them from coming, so to me that is not a valid argument. I find that to be unacceptable.

And finally to conclude this whole park's issue here once and for all, you know, Councilman Loscombe read a letter last week from a resident who was concerned about the lack of maintenance of our city parks, and I would hope that this letter would send a message that we must perform at a higher level had we maintain our parks. I know Mr. McGoff didn't want anything to do with that letter, but it's the truth. I have had hundreds of people share similar frustrations to me over the past several years. Our park's system is a mess and, you know, Mr. McGoff, I don't know what parks

you travel to, but they're obviously not in Scranton. I think it's time to stop protecting your master and see things for what they really are.

Last week, you know, you, Mrs. Evans, had raised some very informative news when revealing that CMC has been making payments to the Parking Authority for quite sometime and they haven't informed the city that this has been going, and I'm certainly hopeful council will take action on this and hold not only the Authority accountable, but it's solicitor, Paul Kelly, who also represents the city, and as I have said before, I find that to be a complete conflict of interest.

You know, the politics and the coverups in this town are pretty disgusting and, you know, I really want to thank you, Mrs. Evans, for exposing this because, you know, the Scranton Times you knew they

weren't going to reveal this. And as I stated last week, you are all we have when it comes to standing up for the residents of this city and exposing all of the dirty politics of the city government.

And finally to conclude, on Sunday I had the privilege of attending the 9/11 memorial up at Nay Aug -- or excuse me, McDade, and many local dignitaries were present, including US Senator Bob Casey, and it was a solemn day of reflection on the great men and women who lost their lives as well as the innocent who woke up that day living it as any other day, and I really would like to thank the 9/11 committee for all their hard work in making that day possible. That's all for tonight. Thank you.

comments regarding the proposed Perry Avenue

particularly fine idea in that these properties could be sold and houses could be built or a house built on the property and then that property is returned to the tax rolls, and that beautifies the neighborhood and will not require the maintenance of the city, whether it be through DPW, the Scranton police force, additional insurances, etcetera. So I do support what you said last week, Councilman Loscombe.

Mr. Ellman?

MR. ELLMAN: Council. Last week when I was chastising everybody I forgot to mention that you can't imagine the outrage people expressed at losing our police and firemen. I bet I had 15 different people, you know, bring it up. Yesterday I went to Price Rite to get some peanuts for my squirrels, well, I'll explain the whole thing, this deaf and dumb lady attacked me verbally and she is writing on these little stick on pads and I had them all over me and my peanuts and everything, and she -- you can't imagine how frustrated she was must have been, she is writing as fast as she

could and she couldn't argue with me, and I got all of these things stuck together and they were in the wrong order and it was terrible and she -- anyway, she was mad about me being adverse about everybody I talk to from what I gathered.

But I was wondering, is this program -- do they have a -- for deaf people or --

MR. LOSCOMBE: This broadcast, you mean? Is that what you are talking about?

MR. ELLMAN: You know, the writing on the TV set.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Closed caption.

MR. ELLMAN: I had no idea. I don't know how she watched the program, I know that much.

MR. ELLMAN: Anyway, she was rather perturbed at me. I was wondering how she --how she got her information. You know, a couple of months ago I noticed the paper said that the 5,000 students at the University spent \$300 a week, you know, the University cited \$100, but let me just take

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the \$300 figure for 5,000 or 6,000 people, all of that money that they are talking about won't make a dent in the tens of millions of dollars that they have taken off and will take off on the tax base. know, that money is gone forever and I just don't know why -- what you can do about it. You know, last week I said our taxes are a third more mostly because of them, you know, a lot of these other tax exempt people have come up and all we hear continuously everybody runs for office they are going to solve something. You know, the school board is one of the worst ones, they just do anything to get on the school board then they turn their back right on the people.

You know, we got -- I was reading about that \$28 million dollar school, but that's mostly for the 150 tax exempt houses up off Keyser Avenue that got three or four children to a house. They can go through a whole -- from first grade or kindergarten to a kid graduates and not pay taxes.

I don't know, you know, why can't you people investigate that plan like

Wyoming County has that we -- that, you know, I gave me a letter that we don't have it, but it didn't say we couldn't have it. This city can't survive with the tax base, you know, like I said last week the University took another \$90,000 house off of the tax rolls and they will keep it up. You know, you got the medical school wanting five acres of houses.

And people, you know, people aren't dumb. I don't know why I -- people can find some things in me, I don't why they won't phone you guys.

MS. EVANS: They do.

there is an answering machine or something
here they can phone. I had people just you
would think that their voices would get
recognized by Mr. Doherty's staff or

It's bad and now school will be starting again and all around Parker Street and Main Avenue there is people completely parked with all four wheels on the sidewalk where the kids got to go out on North Main Avenue to get to the corner of Parker where the school bus is and these are preschoolers, little tiny guys. Then the bigger ones are up on Wells where they have the telephone polls knocked a couple of

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times and they've had some terrible 1 2 accidents because there is a curve right 3 there. I don't know why Mr. Murphy or somebody won't do something for North 4 5 Scranton and put up some stop signs because Mr. Seitzinger said that's a state road and 6 7 the city can't do it, but they need some 8 stop signs along there to impede, you know, 9 the speeding. The people at home are the ultimate problem that voted for Mayor Doherty in my opinion because I, for one, stood at this podium for years and told you what was going to happen. Mrs. Evans, when you were on council you turned green telling people what was going to know happen, the unions came here and told people what were going to happen and they voted this man in two times anyway.

Let's do some simple things here for the average person to get it at home.

a daily basis, I only know what I hear. Everybody has a scanner, what you hear and what you are have been told. I personally heard on August 30 Mr. Duffy, Chief Duffy call COM Center on their radio because the dispatcher told the command car that there was there no available cars to cover calls within the city there was a domestic at the time. I heard Mr. Duffy call into COM Center and say that you were sent a letter to not say that over the radio, please call me on the phone.

There was a letter that was sent to COM Center that specifically tells these dispatchers not to go over the air and give this information so the public can hear it when they listen. That is a disgrace. It's being hidden. Instead, the supervisors have to call on the phone and decide where the officers have to go.

I also have been told that when you look at all of the police officers now everybody is dressed in the same attire.

Previous to this from the implementation of the police department in the early 1900's

and every other city in the world when you see somebody in a white shirt they are considered a captain or a lieutenant.

That's not happening anymore in the Scranton Police Department because the supercop that's in charge decides he wants everybody

There is a brand new school that my two children go to that is blocks away from that fire station that 692 kids from the age of three up into the age of ten attend that school and there is no fire protection for that area and the people in Tripp's Park should be outraged that stuff like this is happening.

Mountain is being browned out, so just think if something was to happen on East Mountain the closest fire station that would get there is from here. Those people on East Mountain should be scared half to death, and I'm not telling you this to be scared because it's the guy's downstairs fault.

I'm just an average guy. I'm not a firemen or a cop, I don't know, I'm just thinking as a general area how scary it is.

And unfortunately, there was a tragedy last week because somebody didn't have a fire smoke alarm in your house.

Please go get one. If you can't afford one I'll bring one to your house, but it's not your fault but the average person at home needs to know how bad it truly is going to get. We have been lucky so far that nothing major has happened, but there is calls that are going unanswered and being closed out by sergeants because there is no police officers to take the call. It's completely unacceptable.

There is a minimum manning clause that I remember from coming to those council meetings that the first thing this mayor wanted to do when he took over was to get rid of 12 officers on the street and he tried to include the COM-D officers as part of that 12 and was taking to Court for it and I believe he lost. Why you would want to decreased the amount of police officers on the street and then go put money into parks is insane to me. Yeah, it's OECD money, but you have to pay DPW to fix those parks.

I have a car that has less than 7,500 miles on it and I had to get it

aligned twice and you are telling me that you are going to put -- instead of going out and fixing potholes you are going to want people to maintain parks that we can't even take care of now? Look at Connell Park and you tell me if that park is being taken care.

On a final note, I've come to this podium before about the Washburn Street

Cemetery, the citations were revoked. I want to thank GO Lackawanna for pushing the issue in the article that they did a few weeks ago. On 10-12-2001 Mr. Radar donated \$200 to the Friends of Christopher Doherty.

On 5-1-2009, another 500 bucks, and on 6-1-2009, 500 bucks. Not a lot of money, but it seems to me like it's enough to get a citation pulled.

If you look at the county records, Mr. Radar lives directly next door to the mayor's brother and directly across the street from Mr. Greco. I'm just making an assumption, but you put the pieces of the puzzle together and you tell me what's happening.

And finally, is there any note on the problem in Keyser Valley in general with the water, I know we had a caucus here, I think it was almost a year ago and Mr. Brazil said all he needed was \$50,000 to fix the problem and I talked to Representative Murphy's office and Mr. Tell, he can't get anywhere with this city. I don't know what's happening. DPW hasn't been cut.

MR. LOSCOMBE: If I could answer that for you, Charlie, actually last week I met with Mr. Tell and a couple of neighbors from South Side who were having the same problems that we were working on, we are supposedly, and it's not confirmed yet, but through Kevin Murphy's office, Representative Murphy's office, they are

requesting Mr. Brazil, possibly the mayor, if he will attend.

MR. NEWCOMB: Good luck with that.

MR. LOSCOMBE: And PennDOT to attend the meeting in their office next week because it's beyond the point where nothing has been done, nothing has been responded

to, even the minor stuff that we have looked at for DPW to respond to. I'm not faulting the employees, I mean, they are directed to do what they have to do.

MR. NEWCOMB: Right.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I'll discuss that a little bit later, but for some odd reason, and you have seen it here, I mean, Mrs. Krake used to read the responses, that is the one department head that is the most unresponsive to this body I think of anybody, which is upsetting. I mean, it affects a lot of people.

MR. NEWCOMB: I sat right next to the gentleman at this table during a caucus and he said right to us that this problem will be taken care of within a matter of six weeks, and that's almost a year ago. Its beyond unacceptable by now.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Exactly, and we have a minor situation on Wall Street where the fatal fire was that that's been there since Mr. Parker was the city engineer, gave the directives on what to do, it's just a minor fix, and we can't even get that done at this

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point, so all of these projects, we have a volume like this, are going to be addressed at that meeting and we are either going to get an answer, something is going to be done or we are going to have to pursue other avenues.

MR. NEWCOMB: And I apologize if anybody gets offended, but it's more important to me for DPW to be out in the neighborhoods fixing the problem than cleaning up a park and another park and another park. It's insane already and it has to stop. I mean, and I feel bad for this council, and I'll step down, but I feel bad for this council because I really don't even know why you are here because if you make a budget that seems to work and nobody follows it, I hate it. It upsets me you are wasting your time. You could be home with your families and just let the city go where it's going to go, because if you do a budget that keeps cops and firemen on the street and reduces taxes and nobody follows it what's your purpose?

MR. LOSCOMBE: They don't follow it

and then turn around blame us. 1 MR. I have some -- because I don't want to hold up the other speakers, additional information for you about the flooding situation --

MR. LOSCOMBE: You want to request the officers that are on regular patrol.

MR. NEWCOMB: I want to know every day of the week how many officers are out there, I don't want to drag out the desk officer, I don't want the sergeants, I don't want the detectives, I want to know how many cars are on the street that are going to respond to calls. That's what I'd like to know. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: I'll just make one comment before the next speaker comes up, I know that Mr. Newcomb made a lot of parallels to Wilkes-Barre and you believe it's rumored that it may be the mayor's intention to cut the police force to the size of Wilkes-Barre by next year, now, I

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don't know if that's true or not, I'll blatantly admit that, but cutting the police force to the size of Wilkes-Barre would be a purely illogical decision because the square area of the City of Wilkes-Barre is just a fraction of Scranton, as well as the population, it's just a fraction of Scranton. I'm not even sure if Wilkes-Barre has half of the residents that Scranton does, so I would hope that those are rumors that you may be hearing are incorrect.

That's all.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Bill Jackowitz. South Scranton resident and member of the Taxpayers' Association. I would like to update the citizens of Scranton on some very important Court cases that have occurred recently effecting the Scranton taxpayers. Also, I would lick to acknowledge the efforts that Mr. Joe Pilchesky hs put into keeping the administration, past council members, authority members, from ripping off the taxpayers of Scranton more than they already have. I know other people have spoken about this prior to me, but he kind

of stole my thunder tonight.

As we know, Judge Peter O'Brien from Monroe County ruled in favor of Mr. Pilchesky and the citizens of Scranton with his Scranton Sewer Authority. I find it good, but I also find it bad that a carpenter by trade is in there fighting for us and in the Court battles on a daily basis. I applaud Mr. Pilchesky, I know he has a lot of enemies, I do not go on DohertyDeceit.com because I don't own a computer. But anyway, I applaud him because he is fighting out there.

A couple of other things that have happened, the church on Prospect Avenue, the Latino Church on Prospect Avenue, the plumbing inspector issued a citation to the pastor's father amounting to a \$1,000 fine and a 90-day jail sentence for doing plumbing work without a license. Mr. Havrilko, the inspector, never entered the residence or investigated the situation, he just issued the citation without cause.

Mr. Havrilko, plumbing inspector, and Gina McAndrew, solicitor, were reprimanded by the

judge. The case was dismissed.

Mr. Pilchesky just happened to be in Court and helped the pastor's father out. Again, we need to applaud Mr. Pilchesky.

Judy Gatelli's lawsuit against

Mr. Joe Pilchesky for liable is officially,
dead in Court. Gatelli lost on every issue
by way of using \$30,000 of Scranton
taxpayers' money which was wrongfully used
to sue Mr. Pilchesky. Hopefully, a local
judge, our friend, Judge Mazzoni, will do
his job correctly this time and direct

Mrs. Gatelli to repay the \$30,000 back to
the taxpayers. Gatelli will finally be
required to testify under oath in Court.

I've been waiting a long time for that one,
too.

Residents, "Give kids a park." I see where Josh wrote a story about Perry Park. According to Josh, the residents are angry and want the park. My question to Josh and Councilman McGoff, where are all the residents? I have not seen one person come to a council meeting, step up to the podium and speak about how important Perry

Park to the City of Scranton. I have seen and heard several residents come forward and speak against the park and now we have other residents here coming forward to speak against the park in West Scranton.

By the way, when Connell Park was built, if I remember correctly Mr. McGoff said that the neighbors were interviewed and surveyed on whether they wanted the park. Why aren't the West Scranton residents being given the same opportunity? Mr. McGoff, you can ask your friend, the Honorable Mayor Doherty, when you are having coffee with him.

Remember, the Times-Tribune is not a reliable source of the news. They have on occasion misquoted or just plain lied. How can we support another park in the city when we cannot maintain the current parks in the City of Scranton? Don't believe me, go up Connell Park. Look around Connell park, look at the dog park. Go out and look at what they did to Novembrino, the swimming pools closing them down and we are going to build more parks? Let's be for real for a

change.

I understand Ms. Fanucci, when she was on McGoff's council, stated that parks was the number one reason why businesses locate to the city, I think she was a little bit off base on that one and along with the people who go along with that statement.

We are closing parks and swimming pools now for lack of money, currently the trash is only picked up once a week in Scranton parks. Until residents come before city council and plead their case, no more money for parks in Scranton. Grant, money is taxpayers' money, also. It might be federal tax money, but guess what? federal taxes every year. I don't want the money spent on parks in the City of Scranton and neither it sounds like the residents in West Scranton may not, I hope they come out in numbers on next Tuesday at 6:00 for the caucus and speak their mind. Either for the park or against the park. Let's hope the residents come out and speak.

Attorney Finnerty from Minooka

Neighborhood Association met with the mayor.

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He seemed surprised that the mayor and the attorney seemed not to know what he was talking about. Attorney Finnerty, read the Honorable Mayor Doherty's sworn deposition, 14 September 2010, that will explain everything for you. He did not know anything about the fact that he was being sued and that the city was being sued or for that matter any of the qualifications of his appointed cabinet members.

Most importantly, he was not aware that Scranton had a sexual discrimination policy in effect that he, the Honorable Mayor Doherty, signed into law before the legal suit was filed. So, Mr. Finnerty, don't be surprised because the mayor is not aware of anything that goes in this city except for parks.

The SAPA program, let's look long and hard at this program, and I'm not convinced that it will solve Scranton's problems, it may just cause more problems. Scranton is not a very business friendly community, plus anybody who moves into Scranton seems to wants freebies, which the

taxpayers can no longer afford. The authorities must go, otherwise, the city will be gone for real just like Harrisburg and some cities in Florida.

Mayor Doherty has not mismanaged the city

finances like you stated last week, he has

manipulated the money, and I must say, he

has managed the manipulation very well. So

again, it's all by design and plan and so

far he is winning. We've got to stop him.

As far as the audit goes, here we go again, what's this, ten years in a row now the audit hasn't been turned in on time?

It's supposed to be in when, by the end of May I believe? Here we are the middle of September, there is still fighting,

Doherty's real people and cabinet members and the department heads and Councilman McGoff, obviously, do not want the audit to be turned in on time because Mr. McGoff has been a council member for five or six years, he has never pushed the mayor to get the audit in on time, he has never pushed his buddies, the department heads, the cabinet

members, to get their responses in on time and their numbers in on time so that tells me that he is basically on their side and he wants the audits to be late, he wants the unbalanced budgets, he wants more police officers and firemen taken off the street, but, by all means, let's build another park in the City of Scranton.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I guess I'd like to ask tonight, and maybe during motions somebody will speak on this anyway, is there a date available that PEL will be transmitting the Recovery -- the new Recovery Plan to the council and to the citizens?

I don't know if anybody else did this, but recently in the legal section there was a notice of I believe it's an October 4 sheriff's sale, and I counted that, well, there are 40 parcels, 36 of

those properties are in Scranton out of the whole county. That tells you the direction that our city is going. More boarded up homes, more -- you know, more people who just can't afford to be residents of this city and we really need to start looking forward and giving people some hope if we expect people to stay here.

And right now this taking it a year at a time, I really would be in favor of a multi-year budget so people can get some confidence that we are going in the right direction and not ending the year with a big \$8 million surprise.

Charlie Newcomb said that East

Mountain residents should be scared half to
death. Well, I'm a city East Mountain

resident and I'm not scared half to death
because I do -- I take my own precautions

and I do trust my Lord to protect me, but I

am concerned. The fire department response

time, I believe it was in the newspaper,

that the fire chief said that the most

vulnerable would be the East Mountain if

anything happened to 10 or if 10 was out. I

understand that the backup for Engine 10 is the South Side back on Gibbons Street.

Now, Mapquest gives that -- of course, people commute with obeying all of the traffic signals and all of that good stuff, but still it's ten minutes, and ten minutes in case of a fire just doesn't cut it, I'm sorry. East Mountain should be -- the people from East Mountain should be here complaining. We have been browned out several days sequentially and it's not a very comfortable feeling to know people are vulnerable, so I just wanted to put that oar in the water.

Next, I'd like to go back to the subject of OECD projects for just a little bit. I would like to request council make their amendments to the 2011 allocations for both the CDBG HOME program public in a council meeting at least a week before voting if there are going to be amendments made to what has been suggested to accommodate the cutbacks in federal funding. I would also extend this request to any amendments that council may make to the 2012

allocations of funding for CDBG, HOME and ESG programs.

As I recall last year, though council amended 18 of the 35 CDBG projects or roughly 50 percent the amendments were revealed and voted on at the same meeting. I would like to see more transparency and allow citizens an opportunity to comment not just on what is sent over from OECD, but what council plans to -- how council plans to amend those.

And then again, the report that was spoken of last week, the monitor's report, OECD, it contained this as well as what was exposed last week. "The Architectural Heritage Association acted as a subrecipient to the city and subgranted this funding to the following projects: Scranton Liederkranz, Incorporated, received \$49,500 for facade renovations. Documentation was presented that indicated that four part-time employees were hired. Family income certificates were provided as source documentation."

Now, Posh Life, LLC, ironic that

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they were -- gentlemen from there were here tonight, but they received \$150,000 to create five -- I'm sorry, they received \$150,000 that was washed through the Architectural Heritage Group and I believe that was probably three-quarters of the total funding they received under the CDBG program and Posh Light, LLC, in 2007 had already received \$250,000 in easy grant money, so I would like to recommend that council come up with an ordinance to be apprised of or to seek approval for CDBG recipients subgranting money so that we're all involved and have a chance to comment. I'll save the rest for next week, as I did last. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you very much.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. MORGAN: I'm running a little late from work today, but I just wanted to come back here today because I assume, Mrs. Evans, that you thought that what I said last week was deceptive in regard to the

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authorities, and in my opinion I don't think there was any deception there at all.

I think that the authorities are a major problem and I, myself, believe they can be abolished and I think that the way to abolish them is that it's time for the residents, and it just didn't have to do with this city, it has to do across the whole country, okay, the residents need to petition whoever the chief executive is of whatever community they live in. If they can't get the response from the person that's running their community, well, then they need to do a grassroots campaign and replace that person. Upon replacing that person, what you do is you change the number of people on the Authority and you only appoint people to the Authority that you know are going to vote to abolish it, and then you have a vote and ask them to abolish the Authority, and what do they do? They vote to abolish the Authority, okay? It's the way around politics, okay?

And then when they vote to abolish the Authority then you proceed to abolish it

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because I think that we can all stand here over 20 years and listen to all of the money the authorities have borrowed and the situation that the city itself finds itself Well, we can talk for another 20 years and in that time they will just borrow more money and then all that will happen is, as everybody here is probably well aware of, the city itself is ultimately responsible for that debt, so as that debt continues to grow and grow and grow, we can all point fingers and determine we can't do anything, when in all reality I think it's on the residents of this city or any other city that finds itself in this position to elect people that are willing to abolish these authorities and then to take control of these authorities by appointing people that will guarantee that when they are appointed they will vote to abolish it, because sooner or later you have to have the ability to control these authorities and if it doesn't happen then, of course, you have to play politics and politics is a very, very filthy, disgusting business in my opinion.

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And I just think that after all of this time in taking about authorities and talking about how this one can't make it's payments and that one can't and we can't control how they are going to borrow the money and we have no oversight or we can't use the power of subpoena to find out anything then maybe it's just time to play the game that politicians play, because to be bluntly honest with you, you know, I have talked to so many people that are only moving a very far distance from Scranton, only to Taylor, hitting a lot of doors, talking to a lot of the residents in this city. They are absolutely besides themselves and maybe they are paying a lot more attention now because a lot of them are unemployed.

And, Mr. Loscombe, about I guess

Verrastro or whoever that is thinking about moving out of the city they should go to McKinney or they could go across to -- right across the street from the new Maine's market where Ocean Logistics is, where SUCCO used to be, I think they're going. That's

right off the interstate, you know?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I believe he has already made a purchase in Old Forge.

MR. MORGAN: No, no, that's fine, I'm just saying in my opinion, look it, I respect every single person and every single person's opinion, but the truth of the matter is that this city is in big trouble, and it's not just here so I don't want to give the people in the City of Scranton the idea that's it's only happening here, it's happening everywhere. We've got public servants losing their jobs across this nation and we've got communities that just have borrowed so much money they will never pay it back.

But I just wanted to revisit that issue and say that those authorities can be abolished and the people that I think I hold responsible for where we are isn't necessarily this council, it's the voters, because they have kept voting the same way over a period of time and a person's vote is their power and the people who don't come out to vote I don't know what to say for

them, and the people who vote strictly party
lines I don't know want to say for them
either, I just think we have a lot of
problems, but I really appreciate your time.
MS. EVANS: Thank you.

be the overriding situation that we are facing and that is the financial situation that we have in the city at this time. It must be election time because I seem to be taking a few shots from everyone, so -- and that's fine.

If people would like to blame me for the problems that exist, fine. If you want to blame the mayor, fine. If you want to blame PEL, fine. If you want to blame Governor Rendell, Obama, I don't care who you blame. We still have a problem and I don't care who accepts the blame we still have a problem. We are looking at some scenarios that really are not good.

Yes, we heard rumors of more
layoffs. No one wants to see that.

Possibility of payless paydays, nobody wants that. There is a distinction the possibility of default on the TANS-B, it can't happen. There is the distinct possibility that we will fail to get TANS fore 2012 which means payless -- months of payless paydays and ultimately there is probably a possibility of out and out

bankruptcy that exists if we can't solve those problems, and bankruptcy is not the answer, it's not a solution, not one that anyone wants.

You know, there are no secret funds out there, there is no magic money that's going to make this go away, there is no magic bullet that's going to take care of our problem. We need to somehow arrive at not only some short term solutions, but also some long-term solutions.

I attended a PEL meeting yesterday and while I realize that some people are upset with PEL and find them to be -- and I have actually criticized them at times, but looking back last October their projections for what has occurred were probably the most accurate, and at that meeting yesterday what they were doing was they were looking for answers, they were looking for some solutions. They have already been dealing with the banking communities to try and deal with some of the short-term problems we have and it was suggested during that meeting that perhaps it's time for council and the

administration to work together on a budget rather than what's been done in the past.

The one thing that was said was that the bank or it was said later by a member of the banking community that if we go through the process that we did last year there is -- there is not a bank in this area that's going to be, you know, looking to provide, you know, any funding for 2012.

The suggestion was that we form a joint committee of some sort to work on a budget so that when the final -- when the budget is presented to council that there are few changes, that it's a budget that the banking community and others can look at and see that it's a reasonable plan for short-term and long-term success.

I know that a letter was sent to all council members, but specifically to Councilman Joyce, and hopefully he and the business administrator can find time to get together, and whoever else is involved in this -- can be involved in this process that we can arrive at something that's more -- something that is more acceptable, something

that can be -- can work into the future.

As I said, there was a representative from the banking community that came after the PEL meeting and was primarily discussing the Parking Authority, but we did talk about the budget and some other concerns and the banking community said their concern is that they don't -- they are not assured that council and the mayor can work together.

And I know that, you know, we'll go back and forth on this as to, again, whose fault it is, and as I have said before, I don't think this is the point in time to start assessing the blame. This is the time to take a step forward and to try and find a solution to this problem. They are not concerned with who is to blame. They just want to see answers. They want a plan. They want a plan not only for the end of this year, but they want to see something for 2012, 2013, 2014. They are looking for something that will assure them that they can invest in this city.

I know that we also have received a

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are being made. We are not going to get out of this on our own. Council is not going to solve it on their own, the mayor is not going to solve it on his own, and PEL isn't going to solve it. Last week there was something mentioned about school -- or paving being done at some of these schools or one of the schools by the city, and that was done. understanding is that the materials for the

paving were provided by the district and the work was done by the city. The initial bid for that paving that the school district received was somewhere around \$180,000. The actual cost of the cooperative work done by the school district and the city has somewhere around \$15,000. This saved taxpayers \$165,000. I think this is the type of thing that the city and the school district can do for one another. I think it was something good. It's something that benefited -- it may not show up in our budget, but it certainly shows up in the long run for the taxpayers of Scranton.

We also received, since Mr. Rogan isn't here, maybe I'll steal some of his --we received something from OECD on paving bids for the following streets: 400 block of Pine Street, five, six, seven-hundred block of Foster Street, 900 block of Martha Avenue, 300 block of North 9th Avenue, 200 block of Railroad Avenue, so once these bids are out and are received paving will continue in the city and hopefully there is more of it. There is still a lot of areas

that do need to, you know, taken care of and hopefully that can continue.

I though that the park's issue was complete or was finished last week and while I wasn't happy with the decision, it was a decision that was made by council and I wasn't going to, you know, it wasn't -- I realize it wasn't a personal -- you know, it wasn't something personal, it was just a disagreement between, you know, members of council, we voted and it unfortunately didn't go my way, but that's fine.

I believe that parks can benefit a community. I believe that they do benefit certain communities, and I thought that the Perry Street park was a good idea and I expressed that opinion. Others disagree, and so be it. That's what democracy is for. And the parks that I, you know, that I have visited, I have been to Connor's Park on numerous occasions, drive by it every day, always people there, Saturdays they have a nice little farmer's market where things are sold, well-maintained, you know, and well thought of by the people in that community.

I have been past Barrett Park, been there a number of times, always seems to be kids playing in the park, always seems to be well kept.

West Scranton Skate park, I don't know there was some, you know, there may have been some problems during the summer when I was there and the people were having a block party there it was nice, a lot of people there, and the park was maintained.

Nay Aug Park I have taken my granddaughters to swimming, I was very pleased and Robinson Park down to play basketball with my grandson, and if I'm not mistaken all of the ones that I mentioned are in the city, so they are not in some alien world.

And finally, the CDBG, I was going to save it for later, but maybe since it was mentioned by one of the speakers, we are looking at the amendments to the 2011 allocations. I saw these for the first time at 5:00 today and I didn't have an opportunity to go through them and look at them, but I think these are things that

should be discussed and available to everyone prior to a final vote. I agree with the speaker, you know, that this is something that, you know, they are community grants and it would nice to at least have an opportunity to have input before the amendments are actually placed for final vote.

And with the 2012 grants that we are looking at this evening, also, I think that these should be discussed in caucus by all council members prior to a public hearing and then have a public hearing and following the public hearing make amendments that are appropriate to the discussions that have been held. I think that there should be more input into these not only by council, but also by, you know, the community. And that's all I have. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Before I call on Mr. Loscombe, just two quick things I wanted to mention with regard to the statements Councilman McGoff made regarding a budget and the banks, and actually, that is a situation that I will be addressing

under my motions tonight, I think he has overlooked something that's very, very important in this process which is the audit, the independent audit, of the City of Scranton. The bank wants the audit. Well, as we all know, there is no audit because the department heads refuse to provide the information to the auditors.

Now, we can conjecture as to why that is and why that has been occurring each year, frankly, I feel it's done purposely and it's arriving later and later and later each year so that banks will not see the city's audits before they agree to provide TANS, before they sign on the dotted lines for loans.

I recall during one the last borrowing issues of the city, a bank official, he may have been from PNC, sat right at that table and when I asked him if he had seen the audit of the previous year for the City of Scranton he admitted that, no, he had not. And I asked him on what he was basing that his decision to loan the city additional money and his answer was to

me, and we can -- well, I don't know that we had the stenographer for that night during a public caucus, but I'll never forget the answer, it was, "I'm basing it on the mayor's vision."

Now, I think it is very important that these audits are done, they are done in a timely fashion, but right now they need to be done yesterday before any bank talks to anybody about anything. Let them take a look at the circumstances of the city at least as much as we can ascertain according to audits.

And as for the CDBG's, you know, I have sat here probably longer than anyone else on this council, during all of that time there was really never any concern by previous council presidents to put out amendments made by council weeks in advance or to work on anything publically, and I am not saying that I'm opposed to that, I just find it to be an unusual suggestion at this point in time since we went for all of these years without doing so under the presidencies of other people.

I know that Mr. Joyce worked very hard on the amendments that came into -well, actually, they came into our office I believe yesterday and they were completed this afternoon, and city council members were notified immediately at that time that they could come in and take a look, and this is not even Mr. Joyce's committee, but he is the Finance Chair and there are a good deal of regulations that are mandated by the federal government and must be abided by that Mr. Joyce is aware of that, I am aware of and Mr. Joyce, as we all know, was absent from last week's meeting, he had been ill, and I'm very grateful for him that he was able to produce this in this amount of time.

And in all actuality, you know, the administration's amendments had been available to everybody since at least July, and short of that or keeping that in consideration, I don't know, you know, because unless Mr. Joyce can, but really I didn't receive any recommendations from council members about what they want to do about anything, so it's always left on this

man's shoulders and on my shoulders and we are trying to get this work done to the benefit of the people of the City of Scranton based on your priorities.

So we will do our very best to provide this information to you in a more timely fashion if that's what you are seeking, but please understand that, you know, a good deal of work goes into this and it isn't something that can be done quickly and that everyone has the opportunity, the public has the opportunity to comment at public hearings, council members have the opportunity to work on this independently and submit their work to Mr. Joyce or to myself.

And with the upcoming CDBG allocations for 2012, actually last week I asked Councilman Rogan if he would take charge of that, so that any suggestions anyone on council may have should be submitted to him, but he should be, you know, as the chair of that committee drawing up I think this year's council allocations with any suggestions that are provided and

then it can be reviewed by council members before the final product is produced and presented to the public.

And I'm sorry to have taken all of that time, but I thought that it was important to respond to a few of the comments that were made.

MR. MCGOFF: May I just --

MS. EVANS: Um-hum.

MR. MCGOFF: I would like to -- I agree with you about the audit that they should be more timely, I always thought that, but at the same time I don't believe that an absence of it should prevent us from at least trying to taking a step toward some type of solution.

MS. EVANS: No, there has to be a solution, I agree with you, but I think part of that solution, step one of the solution is, hand the information over, get that audit done and let the banks have at it.

MR. MCGOFF: I'm not disagreeing with you. The second thing on the CDBG, I would say that in the past, at least the two years that I was president, I remember that

we did have caucus meetings to discuss the changes that were going to be made and input was taken from all council members. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. And,
Mr. Loscombe, do you have any comments?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, a couple of comments. Thank you. First of all, I would like to say hello to my grandson Sam James, two and a half year old whiz, he makes sure his mother and father puts me on every week, so last week I was waving to somebody in the audience and he thought it was him, so I've got to make sure I do it from now on.

But first I'm going give a couple of hats off, I forget to mention this last week, but a couple of weeks ago I was driving through town and I saw all of these young people with the red vests cleaning up in the downtown and I happened to stop by and ask one of them, you know, what was going on, and he told me it was students from the Commonwealth Medical College, they were doing a downtown cleanup. I guess they try and stay busy with a lot of different

projects.

And my memory was jogged when I watched the news, I believe it was yesterday or the day before, when a bunch of them actually bicycled down to the flood zone, I believe it was in West Pittston, to help out some of the people who were flooded there, so I do want to thank the students from the Commonwealth Medical College for setting that example and to keep up the good work, and I just wanted to acknowledge that.

Last week I had discussed the fire on Wall Street, I don't know if I touched on this, but I do want to also give a hats off to Darrell Franmico, he was a firefighter that was laid off just a few days before that fire and a neighbor of the home that was involved, and also the neighbors that assisted him, unfortunately I didn't get their names, they assisted -- they broke in the doors, they actually set up a ladder to try and get up on the porch roof and got some garden hoses there before the fire department responded. However, you know, the flames were too intense for them at that

time without the fire there or anything to make entrance, but I applaud the efforts of anybody that puts themself in harm's way like that.

And on the same vein, last week I believe it was, there was a rescue up at the Nay Aug gorge and what made unique is it was an evening rescue. It's bad enough up there in the daytime with the logistics and everything, but this was in the dark. Everything was wet, there were two people in the gorge, and I would like to commend the rescue personnel, from the fire, the EMS, the police, for their involvement in that rescue, and in getting them -- two persons out of the river safely, it could have had tragic consequences, but, did want to give my kudos out to those.

Mrs. Schumacher, I just received your e-mail yesterday afternoon, I will have that information for you this week and I appreciate that because it delineates what I have to get for you, but I will get that together for you this week, I had some appointments today so I wasn't able to get

them.

Doug Miller and Mr. Newcomb both mentioned before about the amount of police on duty on a daily basis, and it is pretty scary and I have been told that myself the numbers and we are still looking into some stuff, but, you know, those of who listen to your scanners and all of that you know, you have to know, because I heard just a few times I have listened the amounts of calls that get backed up. I have heard COM Center call the on-duty -- whoever is in charge on duty, the on-duty sergeant or whoever it be, and say, you know, we have five or six calls hanging, you know, do you have anybody available, blah, blah, blah.

Again, you know, that was the first I heard this evening that the chief had put out the word to not say anything over the air. I mean, you know, from what I understand he has put out the word not to have officers come to this podium and speak about the job or anything like that. I do believe that's a violation of your right to free speech. The chief is doing is good

job, however, as I stated before, both chiefs are appointed by the mayor, they serve the mayor, but they also serve you. They have a moral and ethical duty to tell the mayor when things are not safe. Unfortunately, that isn't happening and, you know, I know them both personally, I love them both personally. I just think that they have to step back, look at themselves in the mirror and say, "Am I doing what's best for the people I serve or am I doing what's best for my ego?" That's all I have to say at that point.

But I received a letter, a
handwritten letter this week, and it was
unsigned, regarding the West Lackawanna
Avenue bridge and the person, unfortunately,
I don't have it in front of me, but the
person that wrote me the letter stated that,
you know, I talked about closing the north
sidewalks on the bridge, not I, but the
engineer from PennDOT requested that, why
don't we close the other sidewalks on the
other side because they are just as bad?

I realize both sides are treacherous

to walk on, there is a major problem there, but the fact is the north side has a big section of the wall that is ready to fall out and that's going to take that section of sidewalk with it. I made this apparent three months ago, I believe it would be three months tomorrow or the next day at a meeting here. We have sent follow-up letters to the mayor, to our city engineer, Mr. Pocius, and to Mr. Brazil, DPW director. He stated in the newspaper days later he knew nothing about it, but if he was aware of it that he would close those sidewalks and barricade that area off immediately.

Channel 16 two weeks later came into the story, they interviewed Mr. Brazil, he said he would take care of it. Their way of taking care of it they are going to pave the sidewalks to level them, no statement about that section of wall that's ready to fall out.

Well, ladies and gentlemen, it's three months since that was brought to their attention, if someone gets seriously hurt there who is going to pay? Nothing has been

touched. They haven't even weed whacked the grass that's growing on there. This is unfortunate and now, I mean, they are looking at borrowing money for Lincoln Jackson school to purchase Lincoln Jackson, well, actually, if the purchase is only a dollar we are looking at the \$350,000 to tear the building down and build another park there.

Again, I have said it before, I'd love to see a park in every neighborhood, but parks have to be maintained, they have to be protected, and they have to be well lit in the evening and they can't be hangouts. The newspaper last week did a major story after our meeting stating that the neighbors up there were upset. You know what amazed me was the fact they only had two neighbors in that news article. I had more people than that come to me and tell me they didn't want it.

So, you know, I didn't want to go there, but it just seems, again, it's park, park, park. The unfortunate thing is if we do take over Lincoln Jackson school and we

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do get into the demolition there we may be the fools. Suppose they find a lot of hazardous materials in there, asbestos and stuff. That \$350,000 is a pittance. I think we are the ones that are going to be duped and the school district is going to be smiling, and it's unfortunate.

I mean, I don't want to say this, but I have heard rumors that a certain director here has a good opportunity with the school district and it seems they are doing a lot of project for the school district lately coming the beginning of next I don't know if that's a rumor or you will find out next year if it's true, but even paving the school parking lot, these sidewalks on the Lackawanna Avenue bridge were supposed to be done three months ago, but they take the DPW crews, again, the manpower will do whatever they are told to do and they work hard. I have seen them tearing down trees and everything, but why, why is our DPW being utilized to fill in private properties on Wyoming Avenue, tear down private dwellings to make parking lots,

take care of school parking lots when our whole streets and infrastructure are falling apart?

And we have a bid prospect here for five streets, we need a lot more than five streets, and I don't think these are the worst ones on the list. I just think we have to get a direction and we have to get a leader in that department that's going to focus on you, not his benefits or not the benefit of somebody else. It has to be about the people in this city. That's what your taxes are for.

But I'm totally disappointed nothing has been done on that West Lackawanna Avenue bridge. They want to thumb their nose at me because I found out about it, that's fine, but they are also thumbing their nose at every one of you. It has nothing to do with me. I found a safety issue and they may think it's a joke, but I had an engineer from PennDOT there with me and he will tell you it was no joke, but this is where their priorities are, ladies and gentlemen.

OECD projects, I have inquired about

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a certain project, and I found out to our dismay that we received a contract, this money is dolled out continuously. received a contract, but no scope of work, and I have some questions on a project, we requested it, they sent me the same contract, which is just a generic contract, signed, sealed and delivered, doesn't explain the scope of the work. Mrs. Krake has sent another request and also requested that any of these OECD projects that are given out through grants or whatever we must receive the RFP showing the scope of work that's involved, because ironically I found a few things today, not today, over the past couple of weeks, that may cause a problem down the road, so I want to see in black and white what's there.

And just to finish off my comments, I agree a thousand percent with Mr. Morgan when it comes to the authorities and I think our majority feels the same way here. Our hands are tied with the authorities. We have no say what they do. They are autonomous bodies. Mr. Morgan says, elect

there that is going to put someone in there that's going to put someone in there that's going to -- well, it's the mayor who appoints those people. You think he is going to appoint people that are going to abolish the authority? His piggybank? His job bank? I don't think so. It's not as easy as that. And even if you got someone in that position that would agree to that it would take about 15 years by the time they rotated the board to the point where they would abolish their own board. Trust me, that isn't going to happen.

Mr. Morgan, you know, he comes up here with a lot good ideas and stuff like that, however, most of them are unfeasible. I mean, he thinks we can get the budget by seven million by just crossing out a few lines, he thinks we can subpoena everybody we want, there are legalities to that, too. I mean, if that was the case I think we would have people subpoenaed here every week. I'm sure of that. But, you know, I mean, I appreciate his thoughts, but there is lot of things that he is saying that

can't be done at the level that he thinks it could be done.

And again, back on the authorities, it's going to be the public like you in a situation like Mr. Pilchesky did to bring all of these things to light. If you see anyone working for these authorities or anything like that that isn't doing what they are supposed to be doing, that's doing work for other people, that are -- you know, anything that you believe is not in their scope of work, the best thing you can do is be our eyes and ears out there. Report it to us. Call city council office, we will keep a log, we will be able to investigate it, and then we'll have the ammunition to bring it the proper authorities.

Until that time, we do have our hands tied. And trust me, I don't think any of us like it up here having our hands tied. It gets very frustrating, but for those of you who really care about this city, who really see what's going on, that realize the facts, that see in reality what goes on here and not what you read about in the daily

paper, I think you could all help us. Be our eyes and ears out there with any problems and that will only help us down the road, and I thank you for that. That's all I have to say.

MS. EVANS: And thank you,

Councilman Loscombe. Councilman Joyce, do
you have any comments or motions?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. First, I do apologize that I was not here last week, I was ill and I'm not feeling well, but one thing I did want to state, and I know it's past, is I wanted to talk briefly about the anniversary of the September 11 and what happened, and one thing I want to do right now is just give a big thank you to all of the servicemen and women that fight continuously for our country and that defend us and that defend our freedom and our way of life because without them we wouldn't have a city council, we wouldn't have government as we know it.

And, also, to all of the firefighters and the police officers and families who lost their brothers and

sisters, family members and friends, my thoughts and my prayers with are with you and always will be with you. I'll never forget the moment I heard about what happened that, day being that I went to college in upstate New York a large part of our student body was from the New York City metropolitan area, and I remember the fear in people's eyes, especially knowing that I would say about a fifth to a quarter of my classmates had relatives that worked in the New York City area, and my thoughts and prayers will always be with those people who were victimized by such horrible events.

Secondly, before I forget to do
this, I would like to make a motion -- I
would like to move to appoint Jack Loscombe
as temporary chairperson for the Committee
for Economic and Community Development.

MS. EVANS: We have a motion on the floor, do we have a second?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Can I second myself?

MS. EVANS: On the question? Mr. McGoff just returned --

MR. JOYCE; Mr. McGoff, just to reiterate, this is to appoint Jack Loscombe as the temporary chair for the Committee on Economic and Community Development for Mr. Rogan's absence.

MR. MCGOFF: Do I need to second?

MR. JOYCE: No, someone already did.

I just didn't want us to vote and not have
you knowing what it was.

MR. MCGOFF: Okay.

MS. EVANS: Anyone on the question?
All those in favor signify by saying aye.

MR. MCGOFF: Aye.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Aye.

MR. JOYCE: Aye.

MS. EVANS: Aye. Opposed? The ayes have it and so moved.

MR. JOYCE: Okay. Following this, I do have a few citizens' requests and the first is on Luzerne Street and it concerns the Cosmo Iacavazzi Way Sign. As you know, Cosmo Iacavazzi was a standout athlete at West Scranton High School and I have been contacted by a family member of the former Cosmo Iacavazzi reported that one of the

Cosmo Iacavazzi Way signs was down and,
Mrs. Krake, if you could contact Mr. Brazil
and make him aware of this, this happened
before and I know that they restored the
sign in a very brief period of time, so
hopefully that could happen again.

Also, a resident of Geraldine Court has informed me that there is numerous potholes and cracks in various locations in the court, Mrs. Krake, if you could also list this to the issues to address with Mr. Brazil.

Various residents of Dickson Avenue have informed me that there are various sheets of glass in front of the empty parking lot across from the former site of Daron Northeast. Mrs. Krake, please contact Mr. Seitzinger to determine who currently owns this property and ask if the property owner can be contacted to remove the sheets of glass as residents fear that this is becoming a safety hazard.

Also, I have received reports that various streetlights are out on the 800 and 900 blocks of North Webster Avenue,

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apparently from resident's reports these lights were damaged in some recent storms. Mrs. Krake, if you could please contact Joyce Electrical and ask them to address the situation as quickly as possible as quickly as can be done.

And finally, I'd just like to say based on some of Mr. McGoff's comments earlier tonight, one thing I want to say is that I do realize as well as I think everybody realizes at this point that the city does have issues that need to be tackled. We must make our TAN-B payment before the end of the year and at this point you could lay off the entire City of Scranton and we would not be able to make that payment with the deficit that we are currently facing unless we follow a past procedure of using the next year's TAN to pay the previous TAN, which we do not want to do.

And I agree that there needs to be
-- looking forward at 2012 there needs to be
discussions about the budget between council
and the administration, and I did receive a

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letter from Mr. McGowan, and I was actually speaking with him briefly yesterday, and I would personally like to know what exactly is going to be in that budget and I would like to see PEL's input before a budget is dropped in council's lap laying off 27 firefighters and 20 or so police officers.

And also, I do agree that working together could possibly come up with effective solutions. Mrs. Evans and I attended a confidential meeting with Mr. McGowan as well as some union -- as well as a union head and Chief Duffy. At that meeting there were various suggestions both by council and by the administration and there was something that the administration I was in agreement with about has proposed. half of it, half of it I was not, but one thing about working together that needs to be done and that hasn't been done is something very simple called honesty.

I was at a confidential meeting and I'm not really obliged to discuss exactly what was said, but I would say what was not said. Nowhere or at no time during that

meeting were there mentions of "X" amount of firefighters being laid off and "X" amount of police officers being laid off, and never in the past has it been brought to council's attention of money being taken out of a Workers' Compensation Fund without our asking, so I do agree that there needs to be a level of cooperation between the administration and council and that means that the administration must listen to council's suggestions and ideas, and also that the administration is honest with us. And that's all I have to say for tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Councilman

Joyce. Good evening. The time has come for
Scranton taxpayers to focus their attention
on the financial status of our city. We
face a significant and immediate
multi-million dollar deficit and a decade,
at least, of financial recovery from the
mismanagement of the last ten years.

Some, like the newspaper, will work hard to distract you from this crisis with parks and downtown economic development projects. However, facts are stubborn.

Regardless of how they are stretched,
twisted, and concealed, they remain the
facts. Parks cost money to build, maintain
and ensure.

While the city is struggling at present to repay the \$9.5 million 2011 TAN-B and fill it's deficit, it cannot afford to shoulder any additional costs or enter into any new contract that are not absolutely essential. The last ten years witnessed millions of dollars spent on the creation and renovation of parks, and the capital budget reflects greater funding for parks than of bridges, roads, and curbs.

While the Rockwell Avenue Bridge remains in dire need of repair and many of the streets in North Scranton remain in poor condition, the mayor chooses to build another park. However, when the roof is leaking, the foundation is caving in, the siding is crumbling, and the bank is preparing to foreclose on your house, you don't add a koi pond and a jungle gym in your backyard.

In 2011, the mayor closed three

pools and cut short the summer swim season on August 14, apparently due to lack of funding. He must focus on financial urgencies and prioritize in light of the deficit and recent layoffs of public safety personnel.

Now, as you all know, our city has remained distressed for 19 years and 14 of those 19 years passed under the leadership of Christopher Doherty. He served as Finance Chair of a five member city council supermajority for four years and during that time asked the Pennsylvania Economy League to sanction Mayor Connors for his financial actions.

Following his four years of battling and overriding the legislation of Mayor Connors, he became mayor and has served as such for ten years during which he enjoyed eight years of strong council support for his financial and political agendas.

Christopher Doherty's leadership and financial mismanagement is the common denominator in 14 of 19 years of Scranton's distressed status and the cause of

Scranton's unbridled spending, historical debt and deficit.

In comparison, I have served on council for eight years, most of which was as a minority member. Our current council majority has served less than two years, has exposed the concealed finances of the Doherty administration, cut wasteful spending, and lowered taxes. These are facts.

As Mayor Doherty faces this multi-million dollar deficit, he should acknowledge that continued public safety layoffs will not generate sufficient monies to pay the 2011 TAN-B. In addition, the sale of the city-owned parking meters to the Scranton Parking Authority will not succeed since the Authority is in poor position to borrow \$10 million for such a purchase.

The Parking Authority cannot balance it's annual budget without additional annual borrowing and city council would be exceedingly unwise to guarantee additional Parking Authority debt on the backs of the Scranton taxpayers under those

circumstances.

Consequently, the mayor needs to present city council with an honest, workable plan to pay the 2011 TAN-B and to address the deficit as he is a charged to do by Article 9, Section 909, of the Home Rule Charter, which states: "Should a deficit develop, the mayor shall make recommendations to minimize the deficit and for that purpose council may reduce other appropriations."

Should the City of Scranton fail to repay TAN-B, it could jeopardize it's ability to secure 2012 tax anticipation notes or TANS leaving city government with no revenue to conduct business and provide essential services in at least the first financial quarter of 2012.

Ladies and gentlemen of the jury,
the chickens have come home to roost and the
mayor's financial house of cards is falling
down around us all. Although, he had hoped
to exit to any state office before this day
arrived, Christopher Doherty remains the
mayor of Scranton and must clean up his

mess. He can't hand the broom to council since the charter authorizes the mayor to make recommendations to minimize that deficit and the council to deliberate on the reduction of the budget appropriations, and equally notable since he willfully and blatantly ignores the input and legally adopted legislation of this city council.

Had he worked with, rather than against, this council, implemented rather than prevented revenue generators, and come clean rather than concealing financial shell games, the city may not have reached this financial point of no return.

As council awaits the legally required financial recommendations of the mayor to address the immediate deficit, as council president I am seeking long-term financial solutions in order for our city to regain and maintain financial stability in the future. Scranton has one of the highest wage taxes in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and it's additional taxes are higher than most of it's neighbors.

Unlike it's neighboring communities,

Scranton is also a host to three universities and colleges, the Commonwealth Medical School, two nonprofit hospitals, as well as large county, state and federal buildings. It has no anonymous donors, unlike Dunmore, no landfill business to supplement it's revenues, unlike Taylor, and no thriving business and shopping centers unlike Dickson City and Moosic.

Scranton suffers from the highest statewide unemployment figures and a quarter of it's steadily decreasing population lives at or below the poverty level.

While the population of many
Pennsylvania municipalities have reached a
level where they can and should be
classified as Class 2-A cities, not one, not
even one, has sought to do so. Although,
Scranton remains the only Class 2-A city, it
no longer has a population to retain this
classification. As it continues to support
Lackawanna County residents through it's
colleges, universities, hospitals, parks,
courthouses, post offices, etcetera, all of
which have drained the city's tax base.

Therefore, with the agreement of my colleagues, I ask Mrs. Krake, with the assistance of Council Solicitor Hughes, to draft and send a letter to the Honorable Thomas Corbett, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, requesting official certification of the 2010 census for the City of Scranton, and do I have your agreement.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes.

MR. MCGOFF: Sure.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. This certification is the first step in the process of changing the classification of Scranton which would ultimately enable our city to levy a commuter tax and a payroll tax. Currently, local banking institutions and the Scranton Times, for example, do not pay business taxes to Scranton, but they would be subject to a payroll tax.

As experienced in Pittsburgh, a payroll tax abolishes mercantile and business privilege taxes and lessens the burden on small business while it forces big business to pay it's fair share. Scranton

cannot survive by increasing it's current taxes. In order to rebound financially, it needs the ability to institute new taxes on those who use city's properties and services as is done in many Pennsylvania third class cities.

Now, we received a written recommendation today from the Pennsylvania Economy League to address the \$8.2 million Doherty deficit, but we have not received the recommendation of the mayor as required by law. We continue to await his recommendations, and I believe that such a critical recommendation should be presented by the mayor to the taxpayers and Scranton City Council in public rather than solely by written correspondence.

And I just wanted to -- I don't want to read the entire letter from PEL, I think one paragraph should suffice. "We believe it is imperative that the city make provisions at this time to ensure sufficient cash resources are available in December 2011 to satisfy the \$9.5 million TAN obligation due no later than December 31,

it's two regular December payroll
obligations, and also to meet other December
financial obligations.

Therefore, we recommend that the city's governing bodies begin immediately the process of an unfunded borrowing in the amount of \$8.2 million in order to meet it's remaining 2011 financial obligations. The legal standards for an unfunded borrowing is contained in the Local Government Unit Debt Act and will require a hearing before and the approval of the Lackawanna County Court of Common Pleas."

Now, as I stated, that is the recommendation of the Pennsylvania Economy League. We await the recommendation of the mayor, and once again, that recommendation should be provided in public to all the residents of the City of Scranton.

And finally, I have just a few citizens requests for the week. Residents of the 200 block of North Garfield Avenue report that the traffic is going the wrong way on their street as well as on other blocks of North Garfield. They request the

installation of street signs on North Garfield Avenue.

Residents wish to know the cost of the city's paving of the 300 block of Hamm Court. Now, I realize Hamm Court has not been paved. Several potholes I believe were filled, not all but several, and these residents are hoping that the costs are not to exorbitant, they may be willing to pitch in towards the cost of the DPW doing this.

Many residents of Hamm Court placed topsoil in a dirt lot located on this court. Residents will continue to maintain the lot, and also is this dirt lot for sale by the city, and that's it.

MR. HUGHES: Madam President, if I could?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. HUGHES: It was discussed before about the borrowing of the Scranton Parking Authority, I know I saw in the paper, I don't know if was this week or last week, \$8.2 million, council has no information regarding this borrowing, I have gone through the prospectuses of the authority's

borrowing for the garages 2004, 2006, 2007. I reviewed them, I believe that council should request from the Scranton Parking Authority all information and copies of all documentation regarding that loan, and I have also reviewed the prospectuses. In the prospectuses there is stated to be a fifth supplemental trust indenture dated October 1, 2007, between the Authority and the Bank

of the New York Trust Company and it amends

all of the other trust agreements that

the other bond issues.

previously existed and currently exist on

I tried to obtain a copy of that today and was told that it could not be released by the trustee without authorization from council, so I would request the motion from council authorizing me to take all action and write all correspondence to the trustee, which is Bank of New York, the Philadelphia Office, to obtain a copy of the fifth supplemental trust agreement.

I believe that there would have be something in there that would allow the

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Parking Authority to borrow and how are they going to pay it because all of the revenues of the Authority are pledged to pay the existing bonds and, of course, as you know, this is what is known in the trade as a double barrel bond. Legally, the Parking Authority can never default on the bond because the City of Scranton's full faith and credit and it's taxing power is pledged to those bonds so that in the event there ever was a default the bank could make demand on the city to make payment and the city would have to pay those obligations both in interest and principal as they are due and payable.

I think that we should have all of the information as to it's borrowing, obviously, it never came to council, never came to us and the City of Scranton at least is not -- could not have guaranteed that indebtedness or to make any of those I believe it was to Landmark Bank.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. HUGHES: But I think we should

have those documents for our review and also a motion to authorize me to obtain -- authorizing me to send any correspondence to all of the appropriate persons or entities to obtain the fifth supplemental trust indenture.

MS. EVANS: Yes, and with the agreement of all of my colleagues,
Mrs. Krake, please send a Right-to-Know request on behalf of Scranton City Council to the Scranton Parking Authority for copies of any and all documentation and agreements regarding the \$2.9 million borrowing between the Scranton Parking Authority and Landmark Bank.

Now, as our solicitor spoke I jotted down I believe what the appropriate motion would be concerning the supplemental trust agreement.

MR. HUGHES: The fifth.

MS. EVANS: The fifth supplemental.

MR. HUGHES: I take the fifth.

MS. EVANS: And if someone would like to make the motion.

She is with Bank of New York office in Philadelphia and I did request it from her and she said that she would have to have authorization before she could release it to me, so that and I also, you know, will go to bond counsel and see if I can get it. If I don't get it there I'll eventually get it.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much for raising those issues. They are very, very crucial at this time. Mrs. Krake?

Number two, after the third whereas insert, "Whereas, the Community Development Block Grant Programs have been decreased by more than 10 percent, the City of Scranton Office of Economic and Community Development, (OECD), has submitted an amended 2011 CDBG HOME Program and ESG Program of the proposed activities attached hereto as Exhibit A."

MR. LOSCOMBE: Second.

1 MS. EVANS: Are there any questions on the amendment? 2 3 MR. MCGOFF: Yes. I'm assuming that Exhibit A were the original -- or was the 4 5 original action plan or part of the original allocations? 6 MS. EVANS: I believe --7 8 MR. MCGOFF: As amended? 9 MS. EVANS: Right. The original allocations as amended by the OECD Office. 10 They had not been previously attached so we 11 12 are amending to attach those. 13 MR. MCGOFF: Okay. 14 MS. EVANS: All those in favor of the motion to amend Item 7-A signify by 15 16 saying aye. 17 MR. MCGOFF: Aye. 18 MR. LOSCOMBE: Aye. 19 MR. JOYCE: Aye. MS. EVANS: Aye. Opposed? 20 The ayes 21 have it and so moved. 22 MR. JOYCE: I make a motion to amend 23 Exhibit A attached to File of Council No. 24 49, 2011, as amended, per the following 25 amendments:

Reduction: Reduce Novembrino splash pool by \$150,000. Reduce United
Neighborhood Center Project Hope by \$21,850.
Reduce United Neighborhood Center
Condemnation Assistance by \$9,200. Reduce
Cloverfield playground by \$150,000. Reduce
Boys and Girls Club Park-It program by
\$15,600. Reduce Deutsch Institute by \$300.
Total reductions \$346,950.

Additions: Increase police vehicles by \$141,000. Increase Pinebrook
Neighborhood Association by \$35,000.
Increase blighted property removal by \$170,950. Total additions, \$346,950.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Second.

MS. EVANS: Are there any questions on the amendments?

MR. MCGOFF: Yes. Actually, since I just saw these a couple of questions, on the police vehicles, we are increasing that by \$141,000, that would make the total if I'm reading it correctly \$291,000?

MR. JOYCE: No. We are increasing it from what it was at zero out as per Linda Aebli's most recent worksheet.

MR. JOYCE: It was cut out by OECD and we are restoring that in the amendment to \$141,000.

MR. MCGOFF: Oh, okay. Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: No problem.

MR. MCGOFF: There was -- the one on the United Neighborhood Centers Condemnation Assistance Program, we are reducing it by \$9,200 and I know that Ms. Aebli asked that not be decreased primarily because the city -- that's to provide housing for people who are put out of condemned structures and my understanding that the city would have to absorb that cost anyhow, if we are to exceed this amount that we are responsible for that anyhow, so that reducing it would then, in fact, it would go beyond as \$40,000 --

MR. JOYCE: 40,800 rather than 50,000.

MR. MCGOFF: That we would be responsible for that amount of money anyhow.

MS. EVANS: Well, you have to -- if you want to replace that money you have to be able to take from other public services.

1 I think, you know, what possibly could be done there, for example, just off the top of 2 3 my head, because I don't have it all in front of me tonight, you know, it's the 4 5 public services must be kept to a certain percentage and there are limited number of 6 7 those that qualify under the public service, 8 but I know it could be taken, for example, 9 out of the EOTC. MR. JOYCE: I'll read off some of 10 11 the public services. 12 MR. MCGOFF: No, that's all right, I 13 was just wondering if we -- that we were 14 aware that that was going to be a -- could be a cost to the city anyhow. 15 16 MS. EVANS: The 9,000 plus anything 17 above what is provided. 18 MR. MCGOFF: The \$50,000. 19 MS. EVANS: And I'm assuming that 20 the city will provide proper allocations in 21 the 2012 proposal. 22 MR. MCGOFF: I'm trying to remember 23 if it was in there. 24 MS. EVANS: I don't know. 25 MR. MCGOFF: I don't either.

MS. EVANS: But I think in addition to that there is a good deal of funding that may be available through CDBG allocations from previous years and all that would be required would be legislation from the administration to council asking for the transfer of unused funds into a category where the funds could be used and are needed.

MR. MCGOFF: Like I said, I am just pointing it out, that was something that I saw that was not increased.

And the last one, I don't mean to belabor this, the one for the Pinebrook Neighborhood Association, I know that Ms.

Aebli said that some of these items were not eligible, did we contact Ms. Aebli to determine if that, you know, was --

MS. EVANS: Well, I haven't.

MR. MCGOFF: -- this amount was eligible?

MR. JOYCE: I did not speak to her personally. I read over all of the documentation that was sent over and the amount that we're restoring back in that

account isn't quite as high as it was previously. I know that there were some questions about I believe it may have been a tree trimming and things ever of nature as being noneligible items.

MR. MCGOFF: Okay.

MR. JOYCE: Since we are on the question, I'm sorry, I don't want to interrupt you there.

MR. MCGOFF: That's fine.

Interrupt. Whatever.

MR. JOYCE: Okay. First, I just want to say that making this amendment it involved tough decisions. Personally, I wish no cuts had to be made. Over the past year I, as well as many of my colleagues, had the opportunity to hear many of the concerns of residents and from hearing the concerns of such residents it's evident that people are primarily concerned about public safety in their neighborhoods. This is the primary reason why this amendment is being proposed tonight.

Originally funding was in place to purchase five police vehicles to be used in

the low to moderate income neighborhoods.

In this amendment, 94 percent of that
funding was restored.

Funding for the Pinebrook

Neighborhood Association which overseas a

neighborhood in great need of revitalization

was restored to a pretty sizable portion of

what it was originally funded at.

And finally, residents throughout the entire city have expressed blight concerns, especially in West Scranton and South Scranton. In this amendment, over \$170,000 has been restored to the demolish blighted properties. In fact, that actually exceeds the amount that was in the original proposal.

I know that the funding for the splash pond and the Novembrino Complex has been cut in this amendment, however, taking care of blight, funding police vehicles and restoring much needed funds to help a struggling neighborhood are all higher priorities than creating a splash pond in a location where there is a pool that can be repaired, if needed. I think this amendment

addresses what the people's priorities are 1 in Scranton and blight, public safety, they 2 3 are two primary issues and they need to be addressed in greater depth. That's all. 4 Anyone else? All those 5 MS. EVANS: in favor of the motion to amend Item 7-A, as 6 amended, signify by saying aye. 7 8 MR. MCGOFF: Aye. 9 MR. LOSCOMBE: Aye. 10 MR. JOYCE: Aye. 11 MS. EVANS: Aye. Opposed?
