MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MS. EVANS: Our first speaker this evening is Dennis Burke.

MR. BURKE: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. BURKE: I have some material here, if anyone is not aware of the situation that I am dealing with on Lake Scranton Road. If you would like to see the photos I would be happy to share it with you.

MS. EVANS: Certainly.

MR. BURKE: May I approach?

MS. EVANS: Absolutely.

MR. BURKE: This first photo will show you the path along Lake Scranton Road, and this is the road that has been created and you see on the road in that photo and the truck continues down. This one I would say is -- (inaudible.) But these are the sample photos taken from my driveway on my front porch, number one, and there is a few more. They were all taken on the same day. Thank you. May I address counsel?

MR. MCGOFF: Yes.

MS. EVANS: Yes, please.

MR. BURKE: I'd like to begin with a somewhat twisted version of one of Shakespeare's more famous lines, "I have come tonight to praise Caesar, not to bury

him."

Last month after my wife and I had finally reached the end of our patience and tolerance we decided to publically protest the overwhelming amount of truck traffic on Lake Scranton road. We feared would encounter all types of the bureaucratic road blocks along the process. We could not have been more incorrect. I am here to say thank you, not to the owners of the businesses that have chosen to send their trucks across Lake Scranton Road for the past two years, violating basic rules of common sense and common decency to your neighbors, but to the following city departments and their staff. First, thank you to the Scranton

First, thank you to the Scranton

Police Department, especially Patrolman

Thomas Lee, Corporal Richard Bachman, and
acting chief Captain Graziano. Officer Lee
and Corporal Bachman responded on September

20 after I was threatened by one truck
driver and harassed by another. I was
taking pictures for my tax assessment appeal
in my driveway.

They witnessed truck after truck

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past by as they handled my situation and included their observations in their reports. Their concentrated efforts at the directing of acting Chief Graziano have resulted in some relief of the truck traffic.

Thank you to the city, especially

Mrs. Evans and Mr. McGoff and their clerical
staff, Nancy Krake, Kathy Carrera and Jamie
Marciano.

In 2010, city council had become aware of the trucks traffic problem and did everything in their power to rectify this situation. The problem was not resolved at that time, but it was not because of lack of effort on the part of city council. Council staff supplied me with all of the information I needed to present my complaints clearly with a paper trail of council's efforts in 2010 to Mayor Doherty.

Mrs. Evans sent me an e-mail expressing her concern and Mr. McGoff, who was well aware of the situation and the condition of Lake Scranton Road, listened to my complaints and assured me he would speak

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with the other council members.

Thank you to Stephanie in the mayor's office. She assured me that the mayor would review my complaints and contact me as soon as possible, which he did.

Last, but hot least, thank you Mayor Doherty. You took the time to call me and explain what needed to be done by your department heads to post Lake Scranton road with traffic signs restricting truck traffic.

As of today, my wife and I and other residents of Lake Scranton Road have to, and I must take another play line, rely on the kindness of strangers for our peace and quiet. These strangers are the business owners Mayor Doherty recently contacted and requested to minimize the truck traffic on Lake Scranton Road until the road signs are installed. These same business owners reside at Elmhurst Boulevard or in and around Mt. Margaret. I see them travel Lake Scranton Road, the road their trucks have destroyed, almost every day on their way to and from their places of business,

apparently unconcerned about the inconveniences and stress their trucks create.

Ironically, at 12:10 this afternoon, when I sat down at my computer to compose my thoughts for this evening's meeting, I was interrupted by the all too familiar roar of a diesel tractor and the incredible noise that a triaxial truck makes as it bounces down the city street riddled with potholes and temporary patches. 20 minutes later, I heard the same litany of noises as the same truck made it's way back to Moosic Street. Today the strangers not to be so kind.

I look forward to the council meeting I will attend to announce that the traffic signs were installed and that our problem has finally been resolved. A final thank you to everyone concerned. If I can answer any questions from the council I would be happy to.

MR. MCGOFF: May I just comment to Mr. Burke what he said?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MCGOFF: A lot of people

probably are not aware of the situation on Lake Scranton Road, probably many people not even aware of -- maybe even aware of where it is, but from personal experience I do know that the residents of that area have been disturbed by the frequency of the traffic on that road and hopefully we can do something to alleviate that.

Second thing that, Lake Scranton

Road all of the properties along there have
no sidewalks and yet it does get a lot of
pedestrian traffic for people walking out to
the bus stop or out to the lake. Personally
we run that road on a pretty frequent basis
and it is dangerous with the amount of truck
traffic that is on there to pedestrians as
well.

And the last thing the road itself is very narrow and pretty much has been destroyed over the years by the traffic that is on it, you are right. It's hazardous just driving a car along it at time with the potholes and the shoulders being destroyed, so hopefully we can take care of those problems and, you know, rectify this

situation for you.

MS. EVANS: And I just wanted to add that I know that you are aware, Mr. Burke, but I had spoken with the mayor about this situation and we agreed that legislation should be drafted and passed by council that would stop truck traffic of this nature on Lake Scranton Road entirely and at this time I am awaiting the legislation to be submitted to city council from our city legal department and I think we can say safely say that council members will pass that legislation.

MR. BURKE: I could not be more appreciative because it's been a long two years.

MS. EVANS: Oh, I know and I remember -- I remember the situation all too well from 2010 and it really was ashame that somehow the ball was dropped and for some reason the proper procedures were not applied at that time, but we certainly intend that it's taken care of now.

MR. BURKE: Thank you. I realize all your efforts back in 2010 and I

1 appreciate your current efforts, too. MS. EVANS: You are very welcome. 2 3 It's our job. MR. BURKE: Anything else I could 4 5 provide for you? I will take my materials and leave the podium to somebody else. 6 7 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 8 MR. BURKE: Thank you very much. 9 MS. EVANS: Ron Ellman. 10 MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Glad to see everybody feeling better. Maybe you 11 12 will feel better if I apologize for saying 13 that you never hear me when I talk, and 14 everybody eats their words once in awhile. Last week there was a viscous attack 15 16 on council in the editorial page by a 17 Dr. Albert Belardi, Jr. Now, I'm going to 18 take this step by step. He lives in Moosic. 19 He just badmouths the city from end to end, 20 this is where his patients come from. He is 21 an office on the 1,800 block of Mulberry. 22 You following me? 23 MS. EVANS: Um-hum. 24 MR. ELLMAN: Now, there is an Albert 25 Belardi, Sr., that's a doctor that's got an

office at Mercy at 745 or whatever it is,
Jefferson. There is another doctor there
with him, Dr. Brandton or something in the
same office. Now, guess what these people
using the hospitals have in common sense?
Three doctors under the nonprofit list, the
office is in the hospital is listed as a
nonprofit. Now, who allowed this? This
is -- this is just senseless. That's why
you can't make payroll.

I know you must have looked under the nonprofits of Scranton on the computers. I go to the New Penny Lounge, it's listed as a nonprofit. It's not a private club, you walk in and out of there. How can a bar be a nonprofit? There is bunches of them. That's what's wrong with this, who allowed all of this to happen? A hundred nonprofits that are just nothing but pure phonies.

You know, Sister Adrian, like I've said, that's a nonprofit. She doesn't do nothing but help people and the Progressive Center, and I like the McDonald House where you can go. They are nonprofits. 99 percent of these nonprofits are just hiding

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behind the -- well, here I go again. They are just not nonprofits. They have not fulfilled the five obligations that under the Pure Nonprofit Charity Act. I'd like to see how those doctors offices can fulfill that. I don't know. I know you heard that from me, you know.

I think it was Wednesday's paper or Friday's paper or something, there were three articles from -- in the letters to the editors attacking the people and for the University. The first one the guy said he has had enough, you know, I don't know where he has been. He didn't -- he doesn't know what goes on at these meetings. The second one was some lady up in Olyphant, she says all of the good that the University has done up in the Hill Section and cleaned it up. She doesn't know what she is talking about. They were the biggest at one time and they still might be slumlord, they own half the slum houses up in there that are rented to students. They still might be the biggest slum lord.

And the other one, this Francis that

writes every week, he wrote such a ridiculous letter about council it's not worth anything. The achilles heel, again, of the University is bad publicity. They have recruiters going to parents' houses talking, trying to get future students. They do not want to have any adversities. That is where you get them. That is their weak spot. They need to be bombarded with the truth what they have done.

If anybody had talked to some of these people that have lost their homes, you know, that's everybody's dream is having a home and I have talked to several of them over the years, probably 15 people, 20 people that have lost their houses and it's a heartbreak. There is probably 3,000 or more houses and people that haven't paid for their houses lost because of the tax base.

And if then we go to the school board. I talked to Mr. King on the phone the other day for a couple of minutes, he very kindly phoned me back about a matter. That school board is hurting because this University has deprived them of millions and

millions and millions of dollars and I think everybody in the city is so sick and tired of hearing about their good they do they are nothing but a phony business hiding behind a guise of nonprofit.

You know, I'm glad you finally drew the line in the sand about this because it was about to come sooner or later, somebody had to go against them.

MS. EVANS: Well, thank you, Mr. Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: I mean, you know, it's coming, and it's just so irritating to me to have the biased letters in the newspaper. I have written them, they don't print my letters. He told me, Pat McKenna told me not to, but when he won't print a letter of mine because it's opposite his beliefs then he is censoring me and censoring is one of the worst things a newspaper can do and that's what Pat McKenna done to me.

You know, I'm not supposed to be censored because he doesn't agree with me.

He won't print a single letter I have. If I wrote a letter saying how good he was he

1 wouldn't print it. 2 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 3 MR. ELLMAN: Please, I hope that people out there would give you guys some 4 5 more support. I mean, you are going to need it because you are going to have a battle on 6 7 your hands. I hear things from the -- tough 8 road ahead, isn't it? 9 MS. EVANS: Yeah. Well, we have to 10 move on. 11 MR. ELLMAN: Thank you. 12 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Bob Bolus. 13 MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council. 14 Bob Bolus, Scranton, MR. JOYCE: Good evening. 15 16 MR. BOLUS: One thing I'd like to 17 ask on the agenda on 7-A, where is Mountain 18 Lake Estates, is that up on East Mountain? 19 I mean, I'm just curious where it's at. 20 MS. EVANS: I don't have the backup 21 in front of me, we can get it though. 22 MS. KRAKE: You want it, Mrs. Evans? 23 MS. EVANS: Yes. It says it is the 24 desire of the Council of the City of 25 Scranton that Kimberly Drive, Tracy Lane and

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a portion of Mountain Lake Road along two open space parcels on Mountain Lake and a storm water detention pond serving the Mountain Lake Estates subdivision be accepted as a public improvement to be maintained as such and subdivision plans are recorded in the Lackawanna County Recorder of Deeds Records and Map Book 6 a.m. at pages 4508 and 7052.

MR. BOLUS: All right, well, that is the portion, Mrs. Evans, on East Mountain, the top of East Mountain then. Okay, one of the issues that, you know, the city took over streets there years ago, they plow them and everything else, but when people, especially the elderly, used to park there and walk down to Lake Scranton it got all posted. They put up rocks up there and they stopped everybody from using it, but if we are taking it over and it's a private development really up there, it's almost like a gated community, people should a right to park there, not have "No Parking" signs all up and down the roads where people have to about park in the firehouse. Ιn

inclement weather they're walking out there, it's slippery and everything else. I mean, if we are going to take it and our tax dollars are going to take over and maintain their facility then the people should have a right to use it. Park up there, and walk down to the lake or whatever it may be.

But they basically, even though it was okayed, they made it a private community and we are paying for it, so it's something I think council sudden look at before they pass this ordinance that if we are paying for it we should have a right to park up there and walk down, especially our elderly.

East Mountain a couple of weeks ago I asked if anybody would contact Paul Kelly and get a response from him regarding the 16 1/2 foot deeded waterway up there that we put a \$50,000 offer on and I haven't heard anything on that. Has council heard anything from Paul Kelly as to the real ownership of this property or if something has been done under the table with the deed to it because I have submitted the deeds and

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everything that show that the city owned it?

MS. EVANS: I know we haven't heard anything.

MR. BOLUS: Okay, well, I think it's time to get Paul Kelly to be held accountable.

You know, we have to look at if you increase the tax base you decrease the tax rate. You know, we are becoming the laughing stock literally in the country, and the nonprofits, the city here, and the papers saying that Scranton Council shouldn't review the zoning board or variances? I think it's ludicrous for anybody out there to think that we have a council that should bury their head in the sand and let rubber stamping go on as it did traditionally in this city, and especially with the University. As we know, it's a bully with money. They have a tremendous influence. They buy and they control whoever they want. They have been controlling the people in this city.

They put sidewalks in. How times have any of us walked on the sidewalk up

there? Very likely none of us, but it is for their students and their own personal investment that they put there. Millions of dollars in a new center, it's empty, but they are going to fill it and they do that because they are a business, yet they want us to continue to pay for restaurants that they make a profit on, they pay sales tax, I'm sure, on the products that they sell. So I think council because you are standing up is getting a bad wrap from newspapers, from organizations outside of the Scranton.

Let them come here and really see what was going on in city this before you guys took over as the majority. Things are a lot different. If you knew somebody, you played a game, you got something done here and you got away with a heck of a lot, and are continuing. A million eight, a million nine for a building the other day, don't tell me it's a business not making money. They are throwing millions around like it's going out of style and we the ones paying the price. We send fire trucks there and we get a token amount of money.

Well, it's time to go back, put legislation into the mayor, let him renew it or reject it. You need to start charging for your police and fire department what the fair rate out there is, not the token of 50 here or 100 there, you need to know what your police department cost you, your fire department cost you, look at the overtime rate.

Just outsourcing, so to speak, our police cars going out on an accident or to a fire or fire truck there and what they're entitled to be charged, minimum two hours. You would have made more money than you would know what to do with to cover the overtime costs and handle and upgrade the equipment that we need to do there.

So, you know, these are things that we need to look at. You are letting this leachate line go unattended. Tons and tons of mud are coming into that landfill. They are processing and treating. It's coming through the leachate line. The Sewer Authority gets the opportunity to charge them. That's what they do. They are an

Authority they can do that, but that line runs through Dunmore and Scranton, through our property, not the Sewer Authorities' property. You need to charge for this leachate line running through here as a host community. You can bring in millions of dollars. 1 percent fee and you can create a fee on generalized fee that covers just about anything you want to throw in it and pass it across to everybody in the city so you are no singling out the bullies, you are taking everybody on.

You take 1 percent and you are bringing in millions of dollars, and it's right in front of you us. We have been talking it for eight, ten years. It's time. You are the majority. You can make things happen. Time to put politics to the side and worry about the people in the city because we are heading down the slippery slope and you want to look at the "U", look at the hospitals. They were nonprofits for years, now they are paying. We are getting something for our money. Big difference when you get income brought into this city

and you start looking at it.

What makes the city broke? What makes it prosperous are the people in this city with the things that happen and you got to create an atmosphere, you got to create an environment that people want to come here and do business. People don't want to build here, they want to run as far from here as they can with the tax base and everything else. You can turn that around tomorrow and make a major difference that people will want to come here and build.

Make your money. Don't utilize everybody else's assets and that's the taxpayers given up what they are giving up ready to pay \$4 a gallon for gas. Use the assets that the city can control. The police, the fire, the DPW, the leachate line, the gas line, the nonprofits, generalize it and you are bringing millions of dollars in here and you are showing progress, you are showing prosperity, and you are showing what it takes. Put politics to the side and Scranton will grow again. Thank you.

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MS. EVANS: Thank you. Doug Miller.

MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.

Doug Miller, Scranton.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. MILLER: I'd like to begin with a recent comments that have been made over the last few weeks dealing with the University of Scranton in relation to their lawsuit and a few other issues that were addressed at our last meeting. Obviously, at this point in time we may be well aware that the University filed a lawsuit over the parking tax as they feel they should be exempt from it as a nonprofit institution, but we are well aware of the fact that they are a business that generates millions of dollars each year, and certainly as we have talked about for quite some time now have the ability to pay their fair share, and yet they refuse to do so.

You know, the last few days, weeks I should say, Attorney Hughes has come into some criticism for his recommendations to council at our last meeting in terms of the dealing with the University related to the

lawsuit and other matters. His suggestion with the council was to suggest to the zoning board to deny any variances that they may seek in the future.

Today in the paper we were made aware of an article that the Pennsylvania Association of Nonprofits had quite a few objections to Attorney Hughes' recommendations. In fact, they went onto actually mislead and make deceptive statements to the newspaper in their response in which they made a statement that council adopted a proposal to deny zoning applications. In fact, that's totally false. Attorney Hughes never recommended that council adopt any sort of proposal to reject variances.

If this Association actually paid attention and took their blinders off and turned their hearing aids up they would actually hear that Attorney Hughes simply made a recommendation to council, didn't ask to put any legislation together or any sort of proposals. So if we are going to make an objection I think we need to have our facts

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straight, and evidently this association has a difficult time grasping the fact.

Council at no time ever made a proposal, any adoptions, you were simply asked to have Attorney Hughes come forward at any future zoning meeting and object to any variance.

As we now, the University for decades now has, quite frankly, gone beyond the boundaries and we have ourselves to blame for that because we allowed it to happen, not the council but elected officials in the past, Redevelopment Authorities and other who let it happen and now they have become bullies. They have spewed a lot of arrogance and are trying to dictate what goes on in this city, and I'm sure if they really wanted to, knowing the millions they take in, they could probably buy us if they wanted to, and that's really what frustrates me is knowing the millions and millions they take in each other knowing full well the fiscal situation we are in today that we face and they come forward each year and give us a measly \$175,000 a

year, and I can't tell you how much that bothers me, that this is a multi-million dollar institution. They are not a nonprofit, they are business, they are a for profit, and they have gotten away with a lot and it's unacceptable.

We saw, I believe it was yesterday's paper, the purchase of the Adlin building on the corner of Linden and Adams for \$2 million. They could spend money like it's growing on trees, they have no problem doing that, and they continue to suck up properties left and right and continue to take these properties off the tax rolls, and we are consistently told by University officials, we are told by the mayor, that they are such an asset to city and we should be so supportive.

Well, my question is what exactly have they done for the city in all actuality? Let's be realistic. What has the University done for the city besides take millions and millions of dollars of property after the tax rolls. They are buying properties that are assessed at

\$30,000 they are buying them for half a million, so they have no problem just sucking up properties left and right. I mean, at some point in time that Hill Section is going to be the University, and it's my opinion at this point maybe they should just fence themselves in and become their own little village up there and let them deal with their own problems.

You know what, let them get their own fire department. They already have a police department, let them get a fire department, let them get an ambulance service and you know what, if they have an issue up there we're not going to respond to it, let them deal with it. Pay your fair share. Why should I or any other taxpayer who works hard every day carry their load. Let them pay for their own students.

A lot of the residents should be fed up with it because they have gotten a free ride and we have sat back and done nothing about it.

Now, one of the things I have done is I've looked into other nonprofits around

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the country and we have discussed Providence, Rhode Island, well, I took it a step further and did research on them and I found out that they did pay -- they put a commission together in Rhode Island of elected officials, business leaders and other concerned individuals and they discussed ways of how they could get nonprofits to contribute to their fiscally mismanaged cities, and for several months they sat down and they put a team together and they came up with a commission report, and we could say, as we have said before, that now the University in that town give them \$2 million a year. There is no reason why this University can't do the same thing.

I also feel that due to the fact the University has gotten a free ride for so long and they claim to do so much for the city, well, perhaps at this point we can look into discussions with the University and having all city residents that attend the University attend at a discounted rate. It's been brought up before. Maybe even taking it a step further and offering a full

scholarship as an incentive to city
students. We are trying to build future
leaders in the city and why not reach out
and make that a recommendation. I think
it's the least they can do. They have
gotten a free ride and we have done nothing.

But that's what I suggest we do, we look into all avenues, but to continue to allow them to bully us and just sit back and do nothing isn't right, and I know we have a council committee to reaching out to all nonprofits, not just the University, because were are constantly criticized that we finger point at the University, but they are the best example we can use because they have taken so much from us and given little in return and we need to put our foot down and stop it now. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening. Les Spindler, city resident, homeowner and taxpayer.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. SPINDLER: Doug mentioned

already, and was really disturbed the other day to wake up and read the paper and see the University bought the Adlin building. I guess they ran out of buildings in the Hill Section to buy, now they are moving downtown. Well, what's going to be next, the Farley's building across the street? Are they going to move down to Mulberry Street and maybe buy city hall?

It's ridiculous. There is going to be -- the sign coming into the city saying, "Welcome to Scranton" it's going to be "Welcome to the University of Scranton."
When is this going to stop?

It's unbelievable, and the mayor makes a comment, "I'm a big supporter of the University of Scranton, Mr. Doherty said, all of the investments they have made have benefited the city."

They bought a tax paying property on Mulberry and Jefferson, tore it down, now it's a green space. How is that benefiting the city? You know what, this man -- this new election next May, this man has got to go. He is raising everybody's taxes, lets

the University by everything, buys up all the tax paying properties, this Adlin building, there is businesses in there, there is attorney's offices, the building brings in and I don't know how much money every year and they got it for \$2 million, and that's a steal.

And with all due respect to city council, I don't agree with that idea to plan to fight all of the zoning variances because what if a new council is up there and they don't go along with that. I said a few weeks ago that you should draw up an ordinance where if a nonprofit buys a tax paying property that they have to keep paying the taxes on that property. That way whoever is sitting up there has to go by that ordinance. I think that's a better idea, but that's just my opinion.

Two weeks ago, Councilman Loscombe read a letter from Charlie Newcomb, Jr. about his flooding problem getting fixed, well, I have been coming here maybe longer than Charlie complaining about my property getting flooded, and about two years ago it

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was fixed, but I did come here and say that winter it was all washed away, it wasn't done properly. And I had come here time after time and Mr. Loscombe was supposed to look into it and I don't know what happened, but I wish I could get that thing there because every time it rains I can't go out my front door and I can't walk in front the house, it's just inches of the water, and I think I did ask council awhile back to send a letter to Mr. Dougher, I don't know if you did or not, but maybe you can send another one see if something could be done because pretty soon the bad weather is going to come in and that will be his excuse that he can't do anything now.

MS. EVANS: Is this -- because I remember when we had this taken care of, this is a catch basin?

MR. SPINDLER: No, there is no catch basin there.

MR. ROGAN: It's a curbing.

MR. SPINDLER: They put the handicap sidewalks in at and the corner the water comes in right off the street and they did

fix it. They left the handicap ramp there so it was still handicap accessible, but the little curb they put in washed right away and Representative Murphy he looked into that and it seemed like when he looked into it that's when it got done, so I'd appreciate any help from council again. Thank you for your time.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Gerard Hetman.

MR. HETMAN: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. HETMAN: Gerard Hetman from the Lackawanna County Department of Community Relations. I would like to begin this evening by reminding council, as well as members of the general public, that the Lackawanna County audit for 2011 has been completed not just on time, but ahead of schedule this year, which is a first for many years in the past where the audit has been behind it's scheduled date.

For residents and council members who may wish to access a PDF copy of the audit, they can visit our home page at

LackawannaCounty.org and scroll down two-thirds down the page and under the news and events section there is a link to an electronic PDF copy of the completed audit document or any council member or taxpayer who make wish to review the documents and figures for themselves.

Second, at their last regular scheduled public meeting, the county commissioners announced the launch of the new Lackawanna County carrier grade wireless network. This is an initiative that has been on the commissioner's list of objectives and they are very excited about the launch of this service. There will be further announcements as the wireless network gets launched, how it can benefit visits, emergency service providers and also municipal governments in Lackawanna County.

We have a list of the ways, the four stages that the service will be implemented in, but if will be implemented using existing infrastructure, county communication towers and the Lackawanna County 911 center. It's been in the budget

in a neutral fashion which will eliminate payments for services currently offered through the -- currently provided through those networks and it will also utilize grants and other means of financing so it we will not be an increase to county budget.

And again, we will deliver more details on this as the service is implemented and made available to the various constituents in Lackawanna County and we will be happy to take any questions on that, we will relay them to our IT Department and provide answers to anyone that may wish to know about the service as it continues to develop over the course of this year and next year.

Third, relating to some of the community events and announcements that we talk about to you to pass along to the general public. The Lackawanna County of Department of Community Relation in conjunction with Lackawanna County IT Department has launched a community calendar section on the Lackawanna County home page at LackawannaCounty.org. You can just

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scroll down on the right of the home page as online now, you will see a community calendar icon, click on that, we have the calendar is broken down according to different parts of the county, Tri-borough, Upper Valley, and we have one for Scranton and Dunmore in the same calendar, so any announcements, such as the items you mentioned, Mrs. Evans, by the way, continue to mention them and we will be happy to put those onto the community calendar section under the appropriate area of where they are located in the county and, of course, I'll take notes on those at these meetings and if you have any particular thing that you'd like to let us know about before the meetings or that you would like to provide some additional details on, please feel free to contact me or speak to me before or after the meeting, we will make sure those items are added, and can put them for on wherever they may be around the county and get all of these things you talk about, picnics, benefits for residents that maybe need some assistance due to a medical condition or an

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unfortunate circumstance, anyone having a neighborhood block party, anything of that nature we will be happy to put it on there and members of the public can access it and learn about it as it comes up.

MR. MCGOFF: Not this yea.

MR. HETMAN: Ever since the second year it's come right by house and we enjoy it throughout the county. It connects many of our communities, brings out the best in our local residents and also visitors from other areas around the area and around the world. Thank you and have a great week.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. MORGAN: Tonight I'd just like to make a couple of comments, if I could. You know, everyone has their opinions on nonprofits, but that's what I'd just like to say a lot of nonprofits have had money willed to them in trusts from people who have passed away, and a lot of times they are the only people with any money left

their own tax basis to the point where nonprofits were the only ones that were sheltered, and I don't disagree that some nonprofits should pay, but I think our country has reached a point where it's so financially strapped for money that whoever has the money they are coming for it.

And wealthy people, if you read the paper they are renouncing their citizenship and they are taking their money out of the country or they are putting it in trust for their children outside of the ability of the country to reach it and former President Clinton talked about that about two years ago and asked people to bring some of their money back home because it was outside of the reach of the US government.

But tonight I have done two
Right-to-Knows and I think they are
important. I have asked a Right-to-Know on
how many investigations has city council
done under Section 312 of the Home Rule
Charter for any reason, all right, and I
asked if any subpoenas were ever issued, not

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just by this council, but by any council.

And I have also done a request on under Section 313, and I have asked how many and when were any special audits done or frequent audits done by city council under Section 313 of the Home Rule Charter because I think that we are talking become commuter taxes and sales tax increases and this city has been in trouble since the early 70's and I just think that after all of these decades something should have been done a long time ago and, you know, when you talk to as many people as I have talked to in this city who have reverse mortgaged their homes to pay more taxes they just -- they question the whole process and I really have to say that throwing money at the city isn't the answer because how does a city assume this much debt?

And, you know, we are all going to throw shots at Mr. Doherty and, you know, well, politics is politics, but the privatization of the Scranton Sewer Authority didn't take place under his watch and the city wasn't sanctioned under his

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watch, okay, that was a previous administration.

And, you know, when you really start taking a look at where the city it's like a freight train without an engineer because -someone should have stepped in and found out where all of the city's money was going long Now, there has been a lot of special ago. interest here. You know, people talk about people outside of the city giving money and campaigns and that does happen because they have a vested interest and for a long time the city's work force were used as tools in my opinion by political people to get elected and, you know things were going fairly well because everybody was getting what they wanted except the people who lived in the city.

And when you look at the amount of taxation coming I think it's really time to ask the Commonwealth how when we entered into a recovery plan that nobody made sure we were recovering. And now, you know, when you sit there and you watch TV and you watch everybody talk about what they are going to

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do for us and well, come get a reverse mortgage and stay in your house, my question is when all of the residents in this city went to work every day and sacrificed throughout their working life to pay their mortgage and meet their obligations, and now they are seniors, some of them are lucky, they get into the high rises, some of them can't escape from their property and they can't sell it because people won't come near it, and I think that we have limited the scope of our discussion here to nonprofits and I really what I think we need to do is take a good hard look at city government over an extended period of time, find out where the mistakes were made and who made them.

And I find it very interesting, you know, to read the Scranton Times newspaper, and we talk about who our next field of candidates are. You know, I'd like to see a little old man or a little old lady living on a fixed income in city run for a public office. Well, and maybe it would be -- Mr. McGoff, but I remember going to a school

board meeting over 25 years ago when there was a lady with her stockings rolled over her tennis shoes saying she couldn't pay anymore and was crying there, and I just think maybe we need to really investigate our government and find our where we done short. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Elizabeth Davis.

MS. DAVIS: Good evening.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MS. DAVIS: My name is Elizabeth
Davis and I'm here on behalf of Scranton
Reads. Scranton Reads is a community
reading organization -- reading event,
organized by the City of Scranton and the

Scranton get together to read a great book
of literature. They participate in book
discussions and special events related to
the chosen book.

Scranton Reads has two main goals.

Scranton Reads, one city, one book enhances, a the feeling of the community by bringing people from all different backgrounds and uniting them through literacy, art and culture and this year we have selected Rudolfo Anaya's "Bless Me Ultima." It's a coming of age story of a young boy in New Mexico of Mexican heritage and his realization of what he is to be become when he becomes older.

We hope everyone can join in to help celebrate or fifth year by participating in this year's activities. You can find more information about our book discussions and different events at our website at ScrantonReads.org, and this year we are going to culminate all of the activities in an immigration panel discussion at the Everhart on October 24 at 7:00 p.m.

And, if I may, I have copies for everyone on council.

MS. EVANS: Please.

DOBRZYN: Last meeting, and I understand Mr. Williams passed away, but there was a mention of -- he was probably very sick before he did, the mention of attendance and with the tasks we have in front of us with the zoning hopefully we can find somebody that will stand their ground, and I felt that Attorney Hughes' idea was a pretty good one.

I think at this time, just like

Mr. Spindler, that it's time to just say

we've have enough nonprofits in the area and

that's the way it is. We can't support

anymore and we can't keep surrendering these

taxable buildings over to nonprofits,

irregardless of what the mayor is working

on, some is better than others, and I'll

speak a little bit more on that.

But now we have in the Times, of course, council gets abused and bullied

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constantly here, stop abusing assets and, of course, this person here is from Dickson City and he ashamed of the comments of council and council should give the University any blighted properties on Mulberry Street corridor and in the entire historic Hill Section, but, now, wait a minute, he is from Dickson City and I would like to know what the tax rates are for standard working class housing in Dickson City and Archbald, and especially Mayfield where the mayor is raveling about our concerns and our commuter tax. It would be just lovely, I would doubt that it's over \$500 a year like everyone stated up in Clarks Summit and maybe at Fawnwood or somewhere like that where it's reasonably new housing and it kind of fell through the cracks with the prices.

And on zoning, I'd love to see some day, Mr. Morgan has a huge house there, and as far as I know two people live in it because somebody from the zoning forbad him from renting it out, although, it was an extended family-type thing where there was

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three and a lot of times maybe that's the source of hostility, too, so I would love to see where eventually when we have one old person living in a four-bedroom house where we could expand that and maybe let them open up a small rental, \$750 a month for one-room apartment with these developers and so forth, that's pouring money into their pockets.

Now, I'd also like to remind the Pennsylvania Association of Nonprofit Organizations, they mentioned today that they are supposed to be nonpartisan. I would suggest they stay there because if you follow national politics many of these church organizations and so forth are up to their eyeballs in politics. They want to tell you how to plan your family, they want to tell you what you should drink, they want to tell you what you should watch on television, they want to tell you what kind of books to read and they know everything there is about love and God and war politically, but then they want nonprofit status, and that is not a nonprofit.

I am a strict secularist as far as government is concerned. If you oppose the death penalty where somebody kills their wife or their husband or something like that in a furious situation that's one thing, but don't stand there and tell me how many kids I have to have or whether or not I can have a drink or we had the prohibition years back, well, the mafia finally got routed from New York City in 1995 from 1920. They took over the organized crime and, you know, they never got them out of there and the criminal organizations and so forth.

So this is the Achille's heel of the nonprofits is I expect secular performance and nondiscrimination and I'm not interested in the fact that their religion doesn't believe in a blood transfusion so, therefore, my boss should be able to refuse me a blood transfusion because he doesn't believe in that.

The golden parrot quick, if anybody watched the debates last night they go to Obama advisors because, I mean, it was really shameful how much he let Governor

Romney get away with or get away with saying and just they didn't want him to look like an angry black man.

And the Strategic Allied Consultants they have been signing people up hired by a certain party, I won't get into that, in various states to sign people up to vote, they were actually shredding some, which is blatantly illegal.

And our Scranton School Board, when are you going to get it through your heads that we need peaked roofs in this area.

Please, peaked roof on all of the schools.

South Scranton Intermediate looks like a swimming pool from my porch whenever it rains. That water lays there and we no have peaks on the roofs and every new school they design is a black roof. MR. JOYCE: At this point I'm not sure of the exact figures, how away from the ceiling we are, but I could get that information for you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, I would like that because I don't know what happens when we hit the ceiling? Do we just go into bankruptcy then or what option do we have once we have reached our ceiling? I think that audit that's -- it's just -- I mean, he know people have been busy on other things, but this is not the first year, but I hope it's certainly the last.

How many years are left in Rossi & Rossi's contract?

It's crazy and there is no parking at the base of East Mountain Road, but I'm assuming that that applies to the truck traffic that is prohibited for -- except for deliveries, applies to the entire mountain because otherwise if you come in Seymour Avenue you sort of have no place else to go, but maybe you could find that out, and if they have any luck I would love to know what it is because the truck traffic is crazy. I

mean, we have big heavy trucks ruining what was our new roads. So, as I say, I wish him luck.

And I will give one more, I just have to do this one since everybody spoke over tonight, the Community Medical Center, our wonderful regional. It's regional when it comes to spending the money they received, but it's not so much when the taxes have to be -- that they are not paying have to be borne by Scranton taxpayers. You may have noticed this ad in the paper that shows their gala fundraiser is being held down at the Woodlands in Wilkes-Barre. I certainly would think one of our local hotels and conference centers would have been far more appropriate and they could do something to support our city. Thank you.

I see them as, you know, they are -I believe if they are not the largest
nongovernmental employer in the city, I
think they are the second largest, and I
believe that's an important thing. They
are -- yes, they are a successful business.
They employ a large number of people and I
think that's of great benefit to the city,
but I think that the biggest thing that the

University of Scranton has done for this city is in neighborhood improvement, and I know somebody -- one of the speakers said, "Well, what they have done?"

I remember what that Mulberry Street corridor looked like from Scott's Market up to Turkey Hill 25 years ago, that it was -- it was prostitution, drugs, crime of all sorts. At one point in time the city even put a police substation there because there was such an incident of crime. Over the past 25 years that has been cleaned up, sidewalks, lights, new buildings, it's now a corridor into the city and out of the city, so I think that that's an important aspect of what the University of Scranton does for the community.

I think they have helped, I think they have bettered the community, and that's not for argument's sake, I'm not looking to create an argument, I just -- like I said, I think I have a different -- maybe a different perspective than some people.

As far as their challenging the parking tax, I think that's something that

we should have expected and, in fact, when I saw that they were doing it, it was almost, like, thank you. I think we should welcome the opportunity to see what the Courts are going to say about our ability to set fees for tax exempt institutions. I think that by taking something like this to the Court we start to define some of the parameters for I'll say taxing these institutions and as we -- I think throughout the state this has been happening and I think perhaps it just brings it -- it brings the issue to the forefront and at least allows us to see where we can go and where we can't go.

As far as the purchase of the is it the Adlin building?

MS. EVANS: Um-hum.

MR. MCGOFF: All right, one of the things I'd like to find out, and we talked about this on numerous occasions, is what portion of that now that has been purchased will be used for educational purposes. If it's not being used for educational purposes, if they are renting out space to lawyers or accountants or, you know,

whatever else is in there now then I believe that should be, you know, taxable property. That not all of that building necessarily goes off the tax rolls. And if, again, we talked about this on numerous occasions, I think we really need to do a little bit more work on trying to determine exactly what is taxable within these tax exempt institutions. Is the cafeteria taxable since they do provide food for nonstudents and nonworkers? You and I can, you know, anybody can walk in there and buy lunch, actually it's a great lunch for the price if anyone is interested I guess.

But, does Aramark, who provides the food service, do they pay taxes on that?

Does the Starbucks pay taxes? And again, this isn't anything new, but I think these are the things that we really have to investigate and determine exactly what is, you know, taxable within these places and what is not.

And the last thing, obviously, t the payments in lieu of taxes, we attack the University of Scranton over it, and perhaps

maybe we should negotiate with them for what many people see as a more equitable amount of payment in lieu of taxes, but the fact still remains that they are one of the few institutions that pay anything in lieu of taxes. I think that we should start moving towards some of these other tax exempt institutions and maybe a little more aggressive negotiation with them as well as the University of Scranton.

We were going to -- part of the recovery plan is a reliance on an increase in PILOTS and I guess I'm not sure that going to war with them is the way in which to get that increase done and I'm hoping that perhaps we can reach a more equitable settlement in a more equitable way and that's all. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. And, Councilman Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you. I'll be very brief tonight. I'd first like to apologize in advance, next week I will not be able to attend the meeting. I am undergoing a medical procedure, I should

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only be out one week hopefully as long as everything goes well.

And just some comments, I received a letter and I spoke to various members of the zoning board following some of the comments that were made by residents and by

Mr. McGoff and I'd like to read the letter that I received and speak about it a little bit.

It says, and this is from Carrie Newcomb, a member of the zoning board. says, "Dear Honorable City Council: I am writing you this letter in regards to comments by Mr. McGoff at a previous council meeting and in the Scranton Times on September 25, 2012, "and this is the quote from Mr. McGoff and the newspaper. It said, "Very often some of these votes are being made based simply on the influence of the outside, being the neighbors or other businesses, in opposition to what the zoning codes are Mr. McGoff said, rather than making that difficult decision and saying to neighbors, what are being proposed is within the law or codes and, therefore, we are

going to approve it. They are really voting in opposition to what is legal and what should be done. I think that perhaps we should really take a look at the nature of the zoning board, Mr. McGoff said."

Mrs. Newcomb goes onto say, "I was appointed to the zoning board in July of 2011. I take offense to some of Mr. McGoff's statements. I speak for myself when I say that I take great pride in my position and consider it to be an honor to serve my community and its residence. Since I have been on the board, we have had a number of the applicants that have been denied and the issues were never in the headlines or resulted in such obnoxious and inaccurate statements by a councilman.

I personally have no influence of outside, neighbors or other business, and take great offense to that statement. I assure you, I take all of the testimony at the hearing into consideration and visit each property prior to my vote. To say that I am voting against what is legal and should be done is inexcusable.

I assure I will continue to vote the same way regardless of comments by any council member. There is an appeal process if an applicant is denied and Mr. Lewis or any other applicant that is denied has a right to follow that process. Sincerely, Carrie Newcomb."

And I did speak to many zoning board members that were upset with what transpired not only by what Mr. McGoff said but what some of the speakers have said at meetings and what's been going on at the zoning board and a lot of people, you know, the zoning is luckily it's broadcast live for everyone to see and zoning members are appointed by city council, but after that appointment is made city council doesn't have any influence over the decisions that are made.

I think most of us when we appoint somebody to the zoning board you think of somebody that shares your values and your beliefs and you appoint them and then once they are appointed they are basically, you know, their own body. It's almost I would say like a judge. If you watch a meeting

you will see people will get sworn in, they will testify, the neighbors will testify, the applicant will say they are seeking a variance in the neighborhood, and then it's up to the body to basically decide what is legal.

And often times, and I know for a fact because I'm an avid watcher of many municipal government meetings, that often times the board does go against the neighbors. Often times they go in favor of the neighbors, and even as a council member there are times when people I have appointed to the board have voted in a way I disagreed with, but that's not the system is setup. It's setup to appoint --you set somebody with like ideas and then vote based on their judgments of the law. So I just wanted to read that because I did receive it.

And finally, I do have one question request, I believe we all received this letter from a resident of the city who owns numerous properties and he is concerned about the Zone Nightclub, and I haven't heard of this new name, it's at the location

where the Castle Restaurant used to be in

North Scranton and that has been a problem

for years. Stabbings, shootings, there are
a lot of problems there.

So, Mrs. Krake, could we please -I'll give you the letter, could we please
send this to the Chief of Police and maybe
forward it to the Liquor Control Board as
well. I think they night be interested in
know what's going on there. I know it is an
after hours club and there are different
rules and regulations for after hours versus
a traditional bar, but this has been an
ongoing issue for at least five years,
probably longer, and that is all I have for
tonight. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman

Joyce, do you have any comments or motions?

MR. JOYCE: Yes, I'll be brief
tonight as well. To begin tonight, I'm
going to address the Scranton Single Tax
Office. The city has received a number of
checks from the Scranton Single Tax Office.
As one knows, the Scranton Single Tax Office
collects current real estate, tax,

delinquent real estate tax for 2011, and the local service tax as well as the business privilege and mercantile taxes.

The Scranton Single Tax Office also collects earned income tax from 2011, which at this point is primarily proceeds from the fourth quarter of 2011.

The checks that the city has received from the Scranton Single Tax Office are as follows: A check for \$241,269,07 which consists of \$235,683.48 in current real estate taxes collections, and \$5,484.59 in delinquent real estate tax collections.

A check for \$27,784.62 which consists of collections from the Earned Income Tax proceeds from the fourth quarter of the 2011 that still weren't collected.

A check for \$163,338.53 which consists of \$120,203.78 in Local Service Tax revenue, and \$43,134.75 in business privilege a mercantile tax revenue.

The summation of these checks is \$432,392.22.

We have also received correspondence from Tax Collector Bill Courtright regarding

the Scranton Single Tax Office's collections and distributions for the period ending on September 18, 2012.

First, in regard to real estate tax collections so far for this year the tax office has collected and distributed \$11,852,412.28 in current real estate taxes.

In the same period last year, the tax office collected \$10,965,343.96. With this in mind, there has been an overall increase in real estate tax collections of \$887,068.32. This is an increase of approximately 8.1 percent from the same period last year.

Secondly, in regard to the delinquent real estate tax collections for this year, so far the tax office has collected \$476,031.45. In the same period last year, tax office collected \$550,938.74.

With this in mind, there has been an overall decrease in delinquent real estate tax collection of \$74,907.29 thus far. This is a decrease in collections of approximately 13.6 percent in the same period last year.

Third, in regard to the local service tax for this year, so far the tax office has collected \$1,143,385.82. In the same period last year, the tax office collected \$1,299,619.34.

With this in mind, there has been an overall decrease in local service tax collections of \$156,233.52 thus far. This is a decrease in collections of approximately 12 percent from the same period last year.

Fourth, in regard to the business privilege and mercantile taxes, for this year so far the tax office has collected \$1,746,933.69. In the same period last year, the tax office collected \$1,381,051.54.

With this in mind, there has been an overall increase of \$365,882.15 in business privilege and mercantile tax collections thus far.

This is an increase in tax collection of approximately 2.65 percent in the same period last year.

Also to report, the Scranton Single

Tax Office has collected \$6,134,771.71 this year in earned income taxes. As far as offering a comparison to the amount collected last year, it wouldn't be comparing apples to apples since Berkheimer took over the collection of 2012 earned income taxes. \$6,134,771.71 collected by the Scranton Single Tax Office is primarily fourth quarter earned income tax receipts from 2011 that were paid this year, as I stated previously.

With that in mind, Mrs. Krake, if we could please send a request to Berkheimer to find out how much earned income tax revenue was distributed to the city by them this year.

Overall, the Scranton Single Tax

Office in regard to the real estate tax,

delinquent real estate tax from 2011, local
service tax and business privilege and
mercantile taxes collections, the Scranton

Single Tax Office has collected a total of

\$15,218,763.24.

In the same period last year for these taxes, the Scranton Single Tax Office

had collected \$14,196.953.58 for these taxes. This is an approximate increase in overall tax collections of 7.64 percent.

While we are on the subject of revenue, the City of Scranton has received a check from the State of Pennsylvania in the amount of \$2,921,681.70 in the General Municipal Pension System state aid and proceeds. The budgeted amount for this revenue item is \$2.71 million.

The amount of money that the city received was calculated an issued in accordance with the Municipal Pension Plan Funding and Recovery Act, which is Act 205 of 1984. State law prohibits these funds for any other purpose than to defray Scranton's police, fire, and non-uniformed pension costs.

Act 205 required that this check is deposited in pension plans by the Treasurer of Scranton within 30 days of receipt. The allocation of the state aid that we received had been computed using data from actuarial

studies that were submitted by the city to the Public Employees Retirement Commission and from the pension certification forum that was submitted to the State of Pennsylvania.

To continue on the subject of revenue, the city has received a payment in lieu of taxes, known as a PILOT. The city has received a check in the amount of \$6 million from Lutherwood. To provide a brief background -- oh, \$6,000, sorry. Six million dollars?

To provide a brief background,
Lutherwood is a senior living facility
located in the East Mountain area in close
proximity to Lake Scranton. With this in
mind, I'd like to express my appreciation to
Lutherwood for being a good neighbor and
contributing their fair share.

In addition to some of the revenue items that I previously discussed, I'm going to transition to an expenditure that Scranton City Council has been notified of that really hasn't been brought up much at council meetings over this year.

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As one may or may not know, the City of Scranton is required to pay \$50 for every stray animal that our animal control officer brings to the Griffin Pond Animal Shelter. Scranton city council has received receipts for animals brought to the shelter to July and August. For the month of the July 43 animals were brought to the shelter. resulted in a cost of \$2,150. For the month of August, 39 animals were brought to the shelter. This resulted in a cost of \$1,950. So far this year to provide an update to everyone, the total number of animals brought to the Griffin Pond Animal Shelter is 314. This has resulted in a cost of \$15,700 to the City of Scranton, and that's all I have for tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Good evening. I have only a few items of business to address. First, city council had requested a weekly report identifying police vehicles that have been serviced, are awaiting repair, the reason for such, and the expected date of completion for Mr. Dougher, DPW Director, on September 7.

To date, no reports have been submitted.

Mrs. Krake, please contact

Mr. Dougher regarding the reports and send a second correspondence as a follow up and record, please.

Because there have been numerous vehicles out of service for a prolonged period, city council wants to remain on top of this issue.

Second, we received a response on September 24, 2012, from Mr. Jeff Furrer, assistant district traffic manager for PennDOT, regarding the issue with traffic lights at the intersection of Spruce Street and Franklin Avenue. He states that he would like to get better flashers on stop signs or new batteries for them. Pull the stop signs off the sidewalks and put them in a parking lane for better visibility, and put an additional stop sign on each of the remaining three mast arms.

Also, he suggests that if the signals can be put in a red flash on the approaches that still have them, it would be a benefit to drivers. I hope PennDOT is

examining and addressing these traffic hazards throughout the downtown as the traffic light replacement program continues.

Third, on behalf of Scranton City
Council, I wish to thank Lutherwood Senior
Living for it's payment in lieu of taxes in
the amount of \$6,000 to the City of
Scranton. We hope that more Scranton
nonprofits will follow Lutherwood's example
and provide a fair share contribution to
their host city in light it's serious
financial problems.

On a related note, we have all read this week of the most recent purchase of a taxable property by the University of Scranton, owner of the greatest number of tax exempt properties in our city. While page one of the October 3, 2012, edition of the newspaper included the headline, "City Police Overtime \$313,000 over budget already," page two's/AES headline read, "University buys Adlin building. Courthouse square property purchased for \$1.95 million."

How coincidental that the city sinks

farther into debt while a large nonprofit pays nearly \$2 million for a building in the downtown commercial district, that according to the newspaper article was a natural to look at since it is adjacent to their campus.

According to the University
vice-president for external affairs, the
University has needed extra space for a few
years now. Yet, he also states that
long-term plans for the building have not
been determined adding, "We don't have a
firm plan for every square foot of this
building."

While a nonprofit refuses to pay a parking tax for its garages and parking lots for which it charges fees, it appears to have \$2 million in available funds to purchase a property for which it has not fully determined a use.

Further, it is interesting that the mayor, who has committed to obtain increased payments in lieu of taxes in a revised recovery plan views the property purchase as a positive development for our struggling

city.

Although, many Scrantonians, myself included, appreciate the beauty of the campus and high quality of education offered by the University, they cannot help but notice the universities apparent intent on expanding well beyond it's institutional district not only in the Hill Section of the Scranton, but also the commercial downtown area. They mire the institution, but fear the financial burden frequent expansion creates.

At the same time, however,

Scranton's largest tax exempt entities

appear to have questionable regard for the

poor people of Scranton who pay taxes for

not only their own properties and public

services, but also those of Scranton

nonprofits who refuse to make fair share

contributions for the properties they remove

from the tax rolls and 24/7 services they

receive from our city.

Many taxpayers are elderly, unemployed or working two and three jobs to make ends meet feel the status quo is

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inequitable and want nonprofits to contribute their fair share.

Finally, I have citizens' request for the week:

A letter to the Sewer Authority,
Scranton residents request that the cleaning
of catch basins at the intersection of
Prescott Avenue and Mulberry Street and
Harrison Avenue between Vine Street and
Linden Street and two on Yesu Lane in East
Mountain.

A letter to License, Inspections and Permits: A delipidated property at 4217
Avenue was condemned three years ago and has remained vacant for many years. Although numerous calls were made to city inspectors by neighbors, nothing has been done. These neighbors have invested in restoring their property and feel they shouldn't have to live next to an eyesore. They question what they pay taxes for when garbage collections are missed and a condemned property was never further addressed by the city.

Provide an update to city council from Mr. Seitzinger on or before October 15,

2012.

And a letter to the city engineer regarding a street light at Lafayette Street and Boyland Lane. Council received a streetlight petition which has been properly completed by city residents and we would like to attach this to the letter, forward it to the city engineer, and please request that his recommendation would be returned to city council as soon as it's available, and that's it.
