11	tonight is Ozzie Quinn.
12	MR. QUINN: Good evening.
13	MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.
14	MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn of the
15	Scranton taxpayers. I got a call last week
16	from a woman in South Abington who was
17	formerly from South Scranton who was really
18	upset about the state of the city in regards
19	to the debt and the way that the
20	neighborhoods are being torn apart and she
21	asked me to refer back to a story that was
22	written by Robert Swift of the Harrisburg
23	Bureau Chief at the Scranton Times on August
24	7, 2012, and Mr. Swift, I did e-mail him and
25	he said he would e-mail back, and basically

what the story is about is the fact that Robert Freeman, he is a Democratic representative from Easton and he was former chairman of the local government committee and a high ranking Democrat, and he is trying to address the nonprofits in the State of Pennsylvania in regards to them-from beginning -- not all being tax exempt, only a certain percentage of them.

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Now, he had it in the committee, it was spoke about in the fall, and after the election, he is up for reelection, if he is elected I spoke to him today in his office, that he will reintroduce it, and basically he says that he is convinced that it would be a way of saving our municipality slipping into Act 47 status or currently in Act 47.

We all know that commuter taxes and bond issues and raises taxing and whatnot is not going to able to erase this debt and it's like a knee jerk. Every time we have to pay something and it's a tough thing to do and I know we are coming on board with some new state legislators and I think, Mrs. Evans, I think you ought to sit down with

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1	Mr. Blake, or Senator Blake. I think
2	Mr. Freeman is very much interested in the
3	fact and he wanted to distribute the wine
4	and liquor sales to the cities who are
5	distressed, okay, the taxes. However, DCED
6	felt that would be better if they looked at
7	the payroll tax or a tax on public utility
8	in place of the local property law.
9	But what I'm here for is the fact
10	that there is a lot of interest going on
11	across the state as we all know with so many
12	cities that are in distress and I'm hoping
13	that you will stay on top of this after the
14	first of the year and so because there is
15	this money has to be paid back by the state.
16	The award to the firefighters union,
17	rightfully so, is one of the problems that
18	was caused by PEL because they said they
19	arbitrated nonarbitrated, okay, so I
20	can't see any way of getting out of this
21	here mess, financial mess. If it was just a
22	million or two, but we are really, really in
23	debt and our population and our unemployment
24	and whatnot it's going to be tough, so I
25	think we appreciate it and anything the

Taxpayers' Association can do to meet with you and a group of representatives we would be glad to do that to see if he we can't move along something, to move Act 47 along so there won't be just talk, will be there to get talking and won't be going anywhere but really move is along next year.

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Hopefully, also, next year will be the last year of Mayor Doherty's term and I'm sure that he will be putting together again, Mr. Rogan, an OECD plan and I think that actually since he is a lame duck I think the fact is that maybe you should look at this very carefully and sit down with HUD and then talk about that housing rehabilitation I was talking, if you can try to arrange a meeting with HUD and you will see it's not Ozzie Quinn this to you, HUD will probably repeat the same thing, but they will tell you that it's up to the mayor of the city who is in charge of the CDBG program. So I ask you to stand stay on top of those two issues. Thank you very much. MR. ROGAN: Thank you, Mr. Quinn,

and I just remember last week you mentioned

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1	about having the mayor come, those letters
2	were sent out last week per your request.
3	MR. QUINN: Thank you.

19	Moving on to a few other issues
20	tonight, we are made away today that we were
21	giving approval for additional unfunded debt
22	borrowing in the amount of \$9.75 million,
23	which will be paid back over 10 years
24	through a tax increase, certainly the
25	funding that's necessary to get us through

1the remainder part of this year and moving2forward.3Secondly, we were also made aware4that a hearing date has finally been set in5regard to a commuter tax and that is6December 10. It's a 1 percent commuter tax7that's been proposed and, obviously, it's a8an integral part of the revised recovery9plan as we are relying on that much needed10revenue, \$2.5 million next year, and I11believe \$4 million in 2014 to 2015.12Certainly it's necessary moving forward,13without it we are looking at substantial tax14increases in amounts that the taxpayers of15this city simply can't take on right now.16And as I have stated week after17week, those city residents who do oppose the18commuter tax, in other words, are asking for19an additional tax increase and I certainly20don't think that's something we want. We21are asking for everyone to pay their fair22share and that's what this is all about and23nothing more, and I don't think it should be24a political issue of those outside of the25city who certainly through letters to the	-	
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25 city who certainly through letters to the	24	a political issue of those outside of the
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editor and other outlets have made a big issues out of it and I certainly find this to be an issue that shouldn't be political, we are simply asking for the fair share.

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We have been talking about, we discussed that tonight with the Scranton Lace project, obviously, there is questions on the alleged art studio I believe and there is questions as to whether or not that would be a nonprofit and if they will be I think that's something we need to exempt. look because if that is the case I certainly am opposed to that. When we are talking about paying our fair share I don't think we should allow that to take place. Certainly an investment that's being made in the neighborhood I support, but at the same time I don't feel we should be giving a free ride to a select few. What's good for one is good for all.

You know, if we are going to build a bright future, as I've said, we need to be innovative and we need to come up with the unique solutions to move you us forward. They are not easy decisions. We need the

revenue generators and simply making editorials in the paper in the Scranton Times drawing their political cartoons and mocking city government isn't going to move up forward and I have many things to say recently with the recovery plan and the commuter tax and opposition and I just feel that being in opposition and making comments in the paper and through their cartoons instead of for the last ten years covering up the fiscal mismanagement of this administration maybe they should have exposed it and came up with some ideas and solutions to help lead the city government forward, but they took the approach to cover it up to protect the administration and mislead the public on what's really going on in the city.

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On the agenda tonight, 7-A dealing with the legislation on the liquor license for the Big House Tobacco Outlet located at 200 Greenridge Street, it would be approving the transfer of a restaurant liquor license currently owned by Little Nikki's Pasta House on Fallbrook Street in Carbondale,

14 1 obviously there was some concerns about 2 this. I, myself, had some of those concerns 3 as to why the tobacco outlet would be requesting a restaurant liquor license and I 4 5 know we tabled this a few to try and get a response to that and I don't know at this 6 point in time if we do. I see it's in 7 8 Seventh Order, if we are aware as to why 9 they would be even requesting a restaurant 10 license. 11 MS. EVANS: I'm going to address 12 that under motions, Mr. Miller. 13 MR. 22	that would like to address council.
23	MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia,
24	citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians,
25	since I have been up to Mt. Airy and lost my

share of money, I'm very particular on this
thing. I assume you all went down there and
examined the project before you vote on it?
You are not going to vote on something you
didn't actually go down and see. I hope not
anyway. I hope you have more common sense
than that. Just look at what happened up
there with the 33 million we poured into
that half a block of Lackawanna Avenue.
When are you going to go down -- if it's a
viable project and looks like a good project
examine it.

If somebody tells me, "I spent \$2 million on that project," I want to see where that \$2 million went into that project. We know they are going to tear some of it down, we know that, the question is have they at least done something that exempt the \$2 million that we spent.

I don't take any words on anybody, that's the first thing you should learn. Somebody comes up to you, you want to see the books. If it looks good on paper and you examined the project then go whole hog on it, but for words forget it. My brother

once told me something how do you tell a politician is lying? He opens his mouth. When somebody comes before you for a half a million dollars what do you think they are going to tell you? This is a bad project in this is this, this is that? No. They are going to put -- they are going to butter everything up. It's ashame, but where we are in Scranton because people listen to words and not look at facts, and the facts are prudent. I would like to see that project done, I worked in that lace, mill and I worked on the elevators there. It's a nice building. I believe it was a building. I never forgave them for tearing down the Holiday Inn annex that turned into a nursing That was a well-constructed building home. and we paid for it. We paid for the demolition of that building. I don't know if you ever got it back from the bank or not, but this is things that go on in Scranton.

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We are great out there with our hearts, except for the poor peons that are suffering. People can't pay their rent, people can't pay their heating bills. For every dollar that is spent no matter what it comes from you got to make sure it's spent 100 percent in the best way possible. То sit their for rhetoric, forget it. I have been around a long time, rhetoric don't mean nothing. Anybody can use words and say something. You got to use your head when you go out and pull that lever, like you all said to vote, you got to vote with your head, not with your name or party. Unless you do that we are going to sink into an abyss deeper than the one we are in.

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Now, I have been around here a long time. Like I said before, Scranton was a beautiful place. Your grandmother could live and be safe, your mother could be safe, it's the longer that, and who do we have to blame? Our elected officials. And who do you have to blame that put them elected officials in there? The voters. The voters in Scranton have not used their head for a long, long time. I don't know why. It's very funny. Even when you get into them high taxes that are going to come, I don't

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1	know if they would use their head there.
2	But, I'm sorry. I'm sorry that
3	people don't spend more time finding out
4	what's happening. I told you once before I
5	was always more afraid of Washington than I
6	am of Moscow because Washington can do more
7	damage than you than anywhere else. They
8	can look what they did to the garment
9	industry? That was Washington who damaged
10	us. When you go to the polls you look and
11	say who voted for that free trade agreement?
12	Who put all of these women out of work? No,
13	they got short memories. That's what's
14	wrong actually with the city. We got too
15	short of a memory. I wish we wake up one of
16	these days and see the light, probably not
17	in my lifetime, but I hope in somebody's.
18	Thank you.
19	MS. EVANS: Thank you.
20	MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

24	Okay, I'd like to compliment council and
25	their revisions of the capital improvement

list last week. I was glad to see we weren't going to tear down a million dollars worth of facilities and spend all the more, and I was curious many months ago, a few months ago we had a man in here preaching bankruptcy and his name was Mr. Lewis, and I was wondering if anybody knew whether he was actually connected with the University somehow? Just for personal information and maybe somebody could disclose the website to me sometimes.

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Now, on the nonprofit business, once again, I'd like to say how much township tax exemption is too much. I'm sure you follow the paper, now we have Geisinger moving into our Mt. Pleasant Industrial Park there, they are not going to pay any taxes either, so there's nothing you can do about it right now, but I really feel that once again we need to start so many institutional areas and say that is it and if somebody wants to come in from the state and compensate us for it, that's just great, but you can't go on the way it is or we are going to wake up some day and find 45 or 50 percent tax

exempt for the good of the whole region and all we are going to get is funny caricatures in the newspaper and, you know, they might seem funny some people, but if I was the subject of some of I might be a little insulted. You know who I'm talking about, right?

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Okay, and also it's been pushed into the newspaper about many of our homes are \$500 or less for city support tax, well, I don't want my home compared to Clarks Summit and I don't want my home compared to a cul-de-sac in Moscow, I want my home compared to Olyphant, Dickson City, Carbondale, Old Forge, Moosic, Taylor has a landfill there and they negotiate it so if we can hold that. We can't cite that as an example, but that's the bottom line as how many tax exempts are too much. What percentage of the tax exempts are too much?

And as far as the tax increases, and many times I don't mean to insult anybody that relies on social security or whatever, but two-thirds, and this is a fact I learned in the last week, two-thirds of the people

that lost their employment since 2008 have
started back for 30 percent less, so just
imagine taking that kind of shot. Maybe
have a car where your boss walks out and
tells you it's your last day. I worked in a
plant like that, they walked out at 2:00 in
the afternoon and they said, "That's it.
Go."

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So we went to the bar and drank our sorrows away, but it wasn't fun for quite a few years after that even though it was a crummy job to begin with.

And on these fees, I also sat down there and got a brain storm about nonprofits. Now, if our tax collections are supporting trash removal then why is it that a nonprofit pays the same as everybody else that might be paying a considerable property tax. Some people do pay high taxes. I really wouldn't want the tax bill from Fawnwood, that might exceed my mortgage and my taxes put together really if they were close to 5,000, 6,000 dollars a year tax for a more fashionable section of Scranton, and I have a nice neighborhood. I don't get --

have any problems with any of my neighbors.
You know, if they don't like each other they
just leave each alone and if they are
sociable they are sociable. That's great.

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And the golden parrot update, and I'm going to make this fast, I might not be able to stay the whole night I'm involved with elections and working with the elections, but 4,500 percent profit in outsourcing in Delfi, formerly AC/Delco Division. If they hadn't received the bailout money and stuff and stuck the government with the pension benefits they actually turned a 4,500 percent profit and they held the government hostage. So, you know what, it always seem to amaze me is how for years we fought communism and these so-called capitalist job creators just get along with communists and red China. Bawk, bawk, bawk, have a good night. They get a super bawk, bawk.

13	MS. EVANS: The mayor's office is
14	taking the messages.
15	MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I did try
16	calling the mayor's office today, too, and
17	didn't get an answer so, I mean, that was
18	I was going to try that and something else,
19	but okay, I'll do it. Thank you.
20	MR. LOSCOMBE: That was an issue. I
21	was going to bring that up, too, tonight
22	because, you know, I had spoken to a few of
23	the inspectors who weren't receiving their
24	messages. People are trying to call them
25	and it's the same problem, so we are going

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1	to have to get this issue checked out
2	somehow.

22	MR. MORGAN: I think the mayor's
23	office is directing calls back up because
24	they had a problem with their server on
25	their telephone. The first thing I want to

say is, you know, I'm really disappointed that council is all on board for this project. I agree with a lot of what Andy said tonight, but, you know, the greatest thing that I think this council could do is go take a walk around North Scranton Junior High School and really take a look at the other three sides of that building, and all of the money that's been dumped in there waiting for one phase to go after another, you know, I have done -- I went to school there as a child and I think the greatest benefit we could give the city at this time with that building is probably to tear it down because it's been so neglected over so many years and so many millions of dollars have been pumped into and everyone is waiting for one more dollar from the government in one form or another. You know, a council member said that

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they were glad that something good was going to happen for the neighborhood there, that development is going to be a neighborhood all in its own self. We don't even know, I mean, from what I listened to them say I

4	MR. MORGAN: Because when you asked
5	that gentlemen about taxes he really didn't
6	give a very good direct answer, he started
7	talking about all of the money they were

9	MS. EVANS: At this time there is no
10	abatement for their taxes are paid
11	up-to-date. I think they were saying that
12	the situation involving the art space, for
13	example, that has to be looked into, but
14	again, you know, if they are living in
15	apartments within that, you know,
16	development I can't see why they would be
17	exempt as a nonprofit, they are individuals
18	living there.
19	MR. MORGAN: What I have read in the
20	newspaper it says that certain aspects of
21	that project are going to be I guess tax
22	exempt, and I have a real problem with that.
23	The other thing I have a problem
24	with is when the gentleman spoke he talked
25	about phases and we have phases going on at

North Scranton. I mean, they are not even telling us if they are prepared to move onto phase two. I mean, he spoke a lot, but he didn't say much and, you know, the troubling thing is that everybody seems to come to Scranton with their hand out and when you look at state of the city really we have pumped money into downtown for too many decades and we haven't pumped any money in the neighborhoods and this is just another, in my opinion, another one ever these projects. Somebody came forward and saw a chance to make big, big money and have other people give the money for free and invest a little bit of their own, so win-win. I mean, why don't we go to every

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house that's condemned in the City of Scranton, find out who the owner is, let them put up ten thousand, let the city put up 60 or 100 and let's redo every condemned home in the city and bring them all up to code because all we are really doing in this city is we are allowing people to move in to industrial or commercial properties as apartments, but what we are really doing is

14	one clarification regarding Mr. Morgan's
15	comments, the city is not providing grant
16	money to Scranton Lace Affiliates or to the
17	former North Scranton Junior High School or
18	to any of the rental projects in the
19	downtown like the Connell building and the
20	Chamber of Commerce, these are all
21	Pennsylvania state grants, I believe through
22	the Department of Community and Economic
23	Development. So the city itself in terms of
24	the city's tax dollars they are not being
25	expended toward any of these projects nor

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1	have they been. Mrs. Krake?
2	MS. KRAKE: 5-A. MOTIONS.
3	MS. EVANS: Councilman McGoff, do
4	you have any comments or motions tonight?
5	MR. MCGOFF: No. Actually, I'll
6	wait until the time of the legislation.
7	Thank you.
8	MS. EVANS: Councilman Rogan, do you
9	have any comments or motions tonight?
10	MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you, a few
11	items. The first one is I'm very
12	disappointed by a letter that we received
13	from the county commissioners addressed to
14	Tax Collector Courtright. As Mrs. Evans
15	mentioned I believe it was a few months ago,
16	the city and Tax Collector Courtright asked
17	the county to agree with extending the
18	discount period to pay real estate taxes by
19	one month from February 28 to March 28. It
20	is my understanding that when the county
21	commissioners walloped the tax payers of
22	Lackawanna County with I believe was a 30
23	percent tax increase
24	MS. EVANS: 38 percent.
25	MR. ROGAN: 38 percent tax increase

the city, the school district, everyone went along with extending the discount period and try to take some of the burden off the taxpayers. As most of you know, I have opposed most of the tax increases, but I do agree that extending the discount period was a way to at least soften the blow a little bit, and the letter, and I'll read it out It says, "Dear Bill, the county loud. understands and appreciates that a real estate tax increase can be a potential hardship for taxpayers. That being said, we do not feel that extending the first discount period to March 28, 2013, is affordable for the county at this time. While the county annually seeks a tax revenue anticipation note to provide

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tax revenue anticipation note to provide funding until we begin receiving real estate tax receipts, extending the first discount period has the potential to create a problem with our cash flow. It is our hope the taxpayers are able to take advantage of the first discount period by it's scheduled end date of February 28, 2013."

Not only do I disagree with the

county commissioners, and it wasn't just for the record it wasn't signed by the county commissioners, it was signed by the director of administrative services, the chief financial officer for the county, but I would assume multiple decisions would be made by our elected officials, not by somebody under them.

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When, again, as I said, when the county was walloping everyone with a tax increase the city helped out and did it costs the city money? Yes, it did. But was it the right thing to do? Yes, it was. It was the right thing to do for the taxpayers. Now when the shoe is on the other foot, and it's not even completely on the other foot because the county is continuing to raise the taxes again, they are not willing to help out the taxpayers of Scranton.

I'm very frustrated. I wasn't happy when I read that letter. I was hoping they would have extended the courtesy to the city that the city extended to them. It's not the right thing to do, hope that they will reconsider the decision and I would urge the

residents of Scranton to contact the county commissioners and ask them to reconsider extending the discount period. That would give taxpayers another month to get together the funds to pay these taxes.

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Now, for working people who have a mortgage many times it's included with your -- it's usually included with your mortgage, so you are spending the same amount every month, that may go up a little month, but this is mainly for senior citizens and those were lucky enough to pay off their mortgage before they become senior citizens, which are very few these days, who have their home paid off so they don't have their mortgage payment every month where their taxes are, so these residents that this would help are the people that have their home paid off and at the beginning of the year they have to scrape together that money to pay their real estate taxes, and it's very difficult to do especially with the price of home heating oil, the price of the gasoline, the price of the food, everything has gone up. The economy is

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1	terrible. And giving a month more time
2	would have helped a lot of people.
3	As I said, I hope the county
4	commissioners reconsider and I would urge
5	everyone to contact them.
6	MS. EVANS: Mr. Rogan, I might, I'm
7	going to be contacting Mr. Courtright
8	tomorrow about this issue, I'd like to know
9	what his decision is on it and if, indeed,
10	it's essential to have the agreement of the
11	county commissioners I'm hoping that
12	Mr. Courtright is going to be able to assist
13	the city and provide that extension that
14	council asked for.
15	MR. ROGAN: And that's great and,
16	you know, judging by I didn't see the
17	first letter that went out, but judging by
18	this one it seems that Mr. Courtright sent a
19	request in on council's behalf and from his
20	office asking for the discount. Like I
21	said, I hope there is something that can be
22	done, but it's very disappointing that the
23	county commissioners won't go along.
24	MS. EVANS: Oh, I agree.
25	MR. ROGAN: So hopefully the council

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1	will ratchet up the pressure on the
2	commissioners and help them out because
3	Scranton is by far the biggest municipality
4	within Lackawanna County.
5	Next, moving on, as I spoke about a
6	little bit last week when council approved
7	the CDBG funding for the next year we
8	increased road paving in low to moderate
9	income areas by over 100 percent, and I had
10	a few people that contacted me, you know,
11	just in passing and run into people and
12	through e-mails and said, "Oh, there is a
13	lot of roads being paved in the community
14	this year as well."
15	And they said, "Oh, well, the mayor
16	must be paving them because next year is an
17	election year."
18	And a few two or three people
19	that mentioned this me I said, I told all of
20	them the same thing just so the public
21	knows, this funding for the paving was not
22	from the mayor, it was not from the city, it
23	was the money that this council, five people
24	on this council pushed for and had
25	reallocated for paving for low to moderate

income areas, and it's frustrating and especially with, you know, in the media a lot of times when things are going bad in the city council gets all the blame but the things that are going well the mayor gets all of the credit. So when it comes to the allocations for the paving in the low to moderate income areas, the mayor had absolutely nothing to do with increasing those allocations, believe me. And correct me if I'm wrong, I think he may have even vetoed two years ago our changes which included increased funding for paving and it was council that asked the Director of DPW to increase what they applied for because if you only apply for \$300,000 they can only give you \$300. Now

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\$300,000 they can only give you \$300. Now that they upped the applications and we are able to get more and I know all of us, every person made suggestions and the priority was to pave roads. The roads in this city are atrocious and, you know, we are making progress slowly and surely on that and there is much more work to be done and as I know as long I have a say in things I'm going

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1	keep fighting for that money to be used the
2	right way instead of squandered on projects
3	that we don't really need and
4	Next, I do have a question about
5	items 5-B, C, D, E and F and I guess I'll
6	just bring this up now, it was my
7	understanding in the past that these items
8	were always passed after the budget, is
9	there a reason why this is being changed?
10	MR. JOYCE: Yeah, and actually I'll
11	elaborate more during motions, and I believe
12	Mrs. McGoff brought in up a few weeks ago
13	that we want to have certain taxes on the
14	agenda before the Court date for the
15	commuter tax so we could show to the Court
16	and demonstrate to them that we are, in
17	fact, increasing other taxes which is part
18	of the justification for the commuter tax in
19	itself.
20	MR. ROGAN: Will these items be
21	tabled for vote on the budget or will these
22	be passed before the budget?
23	MS. EVANS: I believe these would be
24	passed before the budget. They are all
25	contained in the revised recovery plan, so

45 they were set back in August and what we are 1 2 doing is precisely what Councilman Joyce 3 said, we are passing them earlier in order to facilitate the city's position in Court 4 5 regarding the commuter tax, but, in addition, we need everything in place so 6 7 that the beginning of 2013 the city is up 8 and ready to go and return to financial 9 sound footing. 10 Okay, and that's why I MR. ROGAN: 11 always thought they were always File of 12 Council No. 1 of 2000 --13 MS. EVANS: Right, in the past, 14 that's how it has been conducted. 15 MR. ROGAN: And my only concern is 16 once these are passed that part of the 17 budget is set in stone. There is nothing 18 that can be amended or changed in/PH that 19 part of the budget. 20 MS. EVANS: Well, there is still 21 taxes though that are not --22 MR. ROGAN: Yeah, I see the property 23 tax which is obviously one of the biggest 24 generators of revenue to the city, but there wouldn't -- but these ones once they are 25

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1	passed they wouldn't be set in stone and
2	placed in the budget.
3	MS. EVANS: Yes.
4	MR. ROGAN: And the final two items,
5	and I know, Mrs. Evans, you said you were
6	going to address this, but the Big House
7	Tobacco issue, anyone from them agree to
8	come in front of council?
9	MS. EVANS: Yes. Actually,
10	Mrs. Krake was in touch with the owner of
11	the establishment and, unfortunately, he has
12	been out of country, but he is very anxious
13	to attend public caucus and has agreed to do
14	so next Thursday, November 8, at 6:00, with
15	his attorney
16	MR. ROGAN: Okay.
17	MS. EVANS: And they would be very
18	pleased to respond to any of our questions.
19	MR. ROGAN: Thank you. And finally,
20	I just want to respond, and I know
21	Mrs. Evans mentioned this as well regarding
22	some of the things Mr. Morgan said, you
23	know, I think we would love to be able to
24	use gaming money to rehab homes in the city.
25	I don't think there is any person up here

that would vote against that to be able to do matching grants to homeowner to rehab their homes, but that's not how the program is setup. These gaming funds are, as Mr. McGoff said and Attorney Jones, they are highly competitive and used for large projects that create a good amount of jobs for the community.

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You know, half a million dollars is certainly a large sum of money, but of that money none of it is a taxpayer money unless, of course, like Mr. Sbaraglia you want to the casino and you did lose, but it's -- and I don't want to say it's an optional tax, you don't have to go to the casino, so not everybody is being forced to pay. It's, you know, I think they used to call them sin taxes, taxes on cigarettes, alcohol and tobacco.

So I do think it is a good project. I haven't been in the building physically, but I did do a tour around the building and I do think that if fully implemented it will be a very nice project and it's going to take time. As was mentioned, this building

is huge. Just taking the time to walk around it, it's a city block. You know, it's not like rehabbing a home. It's a multi-year project and Mr. Morgan also didn't seem happy about, you know, the phases, but that's how these big projects are done. You can't just take a city block and say, "Well, we are just going to build a building and let people move in."

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There has to be a process and I know many people may be frustrated with how slowly it goes, but especially when you are a dealing with a building that I would say is probably 100 years old there are lots of elements that need to be removed from that building, lead paint, possibly asbestos, things of that nature that have to be removed to meet current safety standards. I'm sure that takes up a lot of time and a lot of money, and I don't see -- I understand some have criticized that, "Well, what if the project doesn't come to fruition," it's in our best interests and more importantly in the developer's interest than us it's his money on the line. It's

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1	not our money. You know, he wants to see it
2	and all of the partners they want to see it
3	completed and council does as well for the
4	fact that it will help revitalize the
5	neighborhoods, create jobs, restore a
6	beautiful building in the city, and it will
7	get the city moving in the right direction.
8	So hopefully everything will go
9	smoothy with this project and hopefully in a
10	few years some of us will be going down
11	there and taking a tour of a newly renovated
12	building.
13	And as mentioned before, next
14	Tuesday is election day and I hope everybody
15	goes out and votes. As Mrs. Evans
16	mentioned, you are not required to show your
17	ID this November, but you will be asked to
18	show your ID at the voting poll. Next May
19	for the municipal election the voter ID will
20	become law and at that point everyone will
21	be required to show photo ID at the polls,
22	so I hope to see everyone out on election
23	day, and that is all I have for now. Thank
24	you.
25	MS. EVANS: Thank you. And,
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1	Councilman Loscombe, do you have comments or
2	motions?
3	MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, just a couple of
4	things quickly. In regards to the phone
5	system, I don't know if we completed it, ut,
6	I'd like to make a request that we send a
7	letter to the property authority to get this
8	system corrected because I did have a few
9	questions today myself.
10	Just to touch on the Lace Works and
11	the Goodwill building, not to belabor the
12	point, but like Mr. Rogan said and I believe
13	all of us here, it's in everybody's best
14	interest for these projects and for the
15	neighborhoods. The money is not coming from
16	the city itself, but we have to stay on top
17	of them to make sure these projects come to
18	fruition and our completed.
19	I know that the Goodwill project has
20	languished for a long time, but I have seen
21	a lot of activity recently and I think the
22	final piece of the puzzle, it was in our
23	mail last week, was something from the
24	planning commission had to be approved
25	before they could go ahead with it, so I

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1	think we will see some action on that very
2	shortly.
3	And as far as looking at the
4	development and looking at the plans, last
5	time we are here they gave us a significant
6	amounts of information, they provided us
7	with a layouts and what they plan on doing
8	with the building at that time, what they,
9	you know, the whole scheme of things and how
10	the phases are going. This is just another
11	piece of the puzzle tonight, but we are all
12	and I know I have gone by there and I
13	know Mr. Rogan has, we are all going to do
14	our diligence against and keep us with these
15	projects to see them going because, you
16	know, things like this in the neighborhoods
17	I believe are great and they, you know, they
18	are an offshoot to further development in
19	those areas and it's something we need
20	especially during these economic times.
21	And I think if my memory reserves me
22	correct I thought Mr. Morgan said he was in
23	favor of that project last time and said it
24	would provide an economic engine for that
25	area. I thought that was his opinion

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1	previously on the Lace Works project, but I
2	may be mistaken.
3	And lastly, I just want to say we
4	are very fortunate this area dodged a bullet
5	with hurricane Sandy. I know, I mean, I'm
6	not saying we were free of any problems or
7	damage, but it was far less severe than was
8	anticipated and let's pray to God for all of
9	these areas around us that were devastated
10	and for the fatalities, but I do want to
11	commend all our city services for being
12	prepared and going that extra step to do
13	what they could do from our clerical workers
14	in city hall, who fielded many phone calls
15	and answered a lot of questions, to our
16	public works employees who had to deal with
17	downed trees and leaves blocking sewers and
18	stuff like that, to our police and
19	firefighters who were handling the same
20	situations. The police officers, numerous
21	burglar alarms, tree down calls, barricades,
22	firefighters with power lines down, tree
23	fires, trees down. Fortunately, there
24	wasn't a lot of flooding, but I do believe
25	that the departments were prepared.

I had a long conversation with Fire Chief Davis on Monday to inquire and make sure that the fire department was prepared in the event of the impending problems they were anticipating with the hurricane and during our discussions we discussed the manning and opening stations and stuff like that, and my good friend Chrissy here mentioned Engine 7 and Engine 9 being closed yet and that was one of my questions.

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After I had brought out the problems two weeks ago and Channel 28 went and did an actual videotaping of Engine 7 and Engine 9, the city has done some repairs to the buildings at this point and they have also had professional cleaners go into Engine 7 and Engine 9. Now, I haven't seen the final result at this point, but I was assured by the chief that was done, however, they were waiting -- the reason they didn't open the stations at this point is they are waiting for air quality tests for both buildings, so I'm not sure what the hold up is on that, I hope that wasn't the reason why we couldn't open the stations for the hurricane, you

1 know, I mean, if there was -- if we had the 2 report and they sitting on it I'm going to 3 check tomorrow to just see what the status on those buildings are, but I know that when 4 5 I spoke to the chief he was waiting for the air quality reports before he let anybody go 6 back in. 7 8 And on top of all of the stuff here 9 I would like to commend our police 10 department, too, for that arrest they made 11 in the break-in where they took advantage of 12 the hurricane up the Staples and Best Buy, I 13 believe it is, but I just wanted to thank 14 all of our city employees for doing a good job in our time of need and, fortunately, we 15 16 dodged a bullet. I think that's all I have 17 tonight. Thank you. 18 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman 19 Joyce? 20 MR. JOYCE: Yes. Before I begin 21 speaking about agenda items tonight, I would 22 just like to send a special thank you to all 23 of the city workers for the efforts during 24 the hurricane or super Sandy, call it what 25 you will. I believe that a special thanks

is warranted for the city DPW workers who continue to collect refuse during such a furious storm and executed their other daily duties throughout the city with the trees being down. Special thanks is also warranted to the city fire and police departments for protecting our city and keeping our city safe throughout the storm. Also, a special thank you is warranted to all management and clerical employees who continued to work through the storm and perform their daily duties to serve the residents of Scranton. For this, I would just like to say thank you. Secondly tonight, on tonight's agenda there are a number of taxes and fees. The legislation for these taxes and fees which was sent down by the administration

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represent Agenda Items 5-B through 5-F. The legislation for the taxes and fees that was sent down by the administration was sent down earlier than in previous years. Generally, legislation for all taxes and fees are sent down by the administration in

January of the year for which they are being levied, however, this year they are being sent down by the administration early so the city could prove to the Courts that the city is, in fact, raising other taxes with the hope of obtaining a commuter tax.

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To provide a brief explanation, in order to obtain a commuter tax, one of the requirements under the Serafini bill is that the city must demonstrate that it is raising other taxes before a commuter tax can be granted by the Courts. To remind, the commuter tax is projected by the Pennsylvania Economy League, PEL, to generate \$2.5 million in revenue for Scranton in 2013. The first piece of the legislation sent down by the administration is for the real estate transfer tax, which is Item 5-B. In this piece of legislation, it is the intent for the city to raise the real estate transfer tax from 2.8 to 2.9 percent for the calendar year of 2013. The increase in the real estate transfer tax is a part of the revised recovery plan that was drafted by the administration and city

council. The increase of this tax is projected to generate an additional \$185,000 in revenue for the city on an annual basis starting in 2013 if passed and \$555,000 in revenue for the city over the course of the three-year recovery plan.

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The second piece of legislation sent down by the administration is for the mercantile, which is Item 5-C. The intent of this legislation is to raise the mercantile to one mill for calendar year 2013 from it's previous rate of .875 mills in 2012. This is the same rate that the mercantile tax was in 2010. The combination of the increase in the business privilege and mercantile is projected to generate \$500,000 in additional revenue for the city in 2013 and a total of \$1.5 million over the course of the three-year recovery plan.

The third piece of legislation sent down by the administration is for the business privilege tax, which is Item 5-D. In this piece of legislation, the intent is for the city to raise the business privilege tax to one mill for the calendar year of

2013 from it's previous rate of .875 mills in 2012. This is the same rate that the business privilege tax was in 2010, and as I just stated, the combination of the increase in the BP tax and the mercantile is projected to generate \$500,000 in additional revenue for the city in 2013 and the grand total of \$1.5 million over the course of the three-year recovery plan.

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The fourth piece of legislation sent down by the administration was for the waste disposal fee, commonly referred to as the The garbage fee and the garbage fee. legislation that was sent down by the administration was set at \$178 for the calendar year of 2013. Originally in the recovery plan that was sent down by the administration back in May the administration had intended to raise the garbage fee to \$189 in 2013 and \$200 in This would have constituted increases 2014. of 6.2 and 5.8 percent which compounded would have lead to an overall garbage fee increase of 12.4 percent. In the drafting of the joint recovery plan, Councilwoman

Evans and I fought hard against this increase and the end results in the joint recovery plan was that it was decided not to raise the garbage fee on city residents.

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The fifth piece of legislation sent down by the administration was for the local services tax commonly, referred to as the LST. This tax was formerly named the emergency municipal services tax. To inform, this is a \$52 per year tax that is deducted from one's paycheck usually in \$2 per week increments. There will be no increases in the LST as they are prohibited by law.

And lastly tonight, as one may or may not know the City of Scranton does not have a completed audit for the year of 2011 as other matters have taken priority over turning information over to Rossi & Rossi, our independent auditor by the Business Administrator's Office throughout the year.

We have received an update from Rossi & Rossi regarding the audit. According to Rossi & Rossi in their January 26 letter they had stated that in order to

issue the audit and financial statements by May 31 of this year, the outline of the 2011 audit timetable must have been adhered to. Because Rossi & Rossi has not received the information on a timely basis, the completion of the audit and financial statements has been delayed. As of October 24, the actuarial calculations on the GASBE 45 post-employment benefits had not been provided, which was holding up the audit. In addition, the Special Cities Fund demolition memo was still open. Rossi & Rossi had the understanding that this information was to be completed by the end of October. After this information is received by Rossi & Rossi and the audit testing is completed, Rossi & Rossi will present a draft of the full financial statements for the city to review and complete the management discussion analysis section of the report. Mrs. Krake, given the following information, please contact Mr. McGowan and

inquire whether or not information that was

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This legislation was drafted and appears before Scranton City Council in order to respond to the demonstrated concerns of homeowners in the aforementioned area related to increase truck traffic which damages roads and negatively impacts the safety and quality of life of residents. Because homeowners have been so patient as they awaited relief from city government, I ask that council would suspend it's rules next week to place the legislation into a final reading for adoption and immediate enforcement purposes.

In addition, city council continues to work with the administration to amend the rental registration program as soon as possible to provide a partial credit into

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1	2013 for owners of rental properties who
2	recently and voluntarily paid 2012 fees in
3	full without having been billed.
4	Also, the city solicitor is in the
5	process of drafting amusement tax
6	legislation in conjunction with the
7	Pennsylvania Economy League and council

11	At the same time council continues
12	its review of the city's noise ordinance to
13	prohibit boom cars from disturbing the

15	Next, I was informed that the
16	Berkheimer Office in the Steamtown Mall has
17	been closed all week. A note on the office
18	door indicates that they are closed due to
19	hurricane Sandy. Also, the Berkheimer
20	website is down. These circumstances may
21	create a potential problem since October 31
22	was the deadline for payment of third
23	quarter earned income taxes.
24	Mrs. Krake, please contact Ryan
25	McGowan in the morning and follow-up with

memos to the mayor and him. City council urges Berkheimer to inform taxpayers of their third quarter status and how to proceed with payments as soon as possible. The City of Scranton can ill afford to fall behind in EIT revenues at this time and taxpayers should not be penalized for circumstances which are beyond their control.

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Finally, City Clerk, Mrs. Krake, was in contact with the owner of Big House Tobacco outlet following last week's council meeting, because he is currently out of town, Mr. Fadden was unable to attend the public caucus this evening. However, he indicated that he and Attorney O'Brien, his counsel, are very anxious to attend a caucus on Thursday November 8, at 6:00 p.m.

Therefore, council will consider tabling this legislation during tonight's meeting until such time as questions and concerns will be addressed publically, and that's it.

MS. EVANS: What is the 15 recommendation of the Chair for the 16 17 Committee on Community Development? 18 MR. ROGAN: As Chairperson for the 19 Committee on Community Development, I 20 strongly recommend final passage of Item 21 7-B. 22 MR. JOYCE: Second. 23 MS. EVANS: On the question? 24 MR. MCGOFF: Yes, just a few brief 25 comments. First of all, this is legislation

not for us to grant the Lace Works money, it is merely legislation to allow them and the city to apply for the grant and there is no guarantee that they receive the grant, but I think the consent of the council, and I'm hoping the unanimous consent of council, would probably go a long way in their application process that we are strongly behind this project.

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And also to answer come concerns, we have all -- I think we have all been to the Lace Works numerous times and we have been at the last caucus that we had with the Lace Works Affiliates were provided with detailed plans for the project. I think we are all reasonably familiar with the project and what will occur and from what I can see it is something that is well worth our support, the entire project, and certainly this grant application is a step toward the completion of that project.
