got to get your -- no matter whose name it

- is you have to surrender your liquor permit 4
- so you have to get that back out. There
- 6 is weeks and weeks of involvement here.
- Now, I'm not complaining. You can't use
- your stock, you have to get new stock unless 8
- if you do it's not supposed to be used when
- 10 it's a month old. All of costs and the
- 11 license and insurance, they wouldn't have
- 12 made enough money opening in one day to pay
- for everything, so I come to the conclusion 13
- that the city has prorated everything for

17 I don't know if anybody saw it, it was a big

- of the people that move in and fill up 20
- downtown, it's a bunch of daydreams. 21

You know, on the other end of the 22

- 23 state there is a city called Pittsburgh and
- 24 they have Carnegie-Mellon Institute there.
- I know you have -- for year after year for a

- 1 generation Pittsburgh has been the high tech
- capital of probably the whole world. There
- is nobody going to come to Scranton. That's
- like a couple of years ago they said they
- are going to run the train track from here
- to New York City and people will come here
- to shop. You know, things just aren't
- realistic no more when you talk to people in
- 9 this administration and this city. There is
- 10 just asinine ridiculous statements, you
- 11 know. Again, I don't know what council can
- 12 do it about this pollution into the
- Lackawanna River, but I only live a couple 13
- of blocks from there. I go down there every 14
- 15 single morning, and this is ashame that
- there is ducks there now and people are 16
- 17 fishing there now. There is still a sign
- that you can't eat the fish, but this cannot 18
- be allowed. This dumping polluted salt 19
- water in there. 20

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MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

22 MR. ELLMAN: My time? I didn't hear

23 my bell. Thank you, Mrs. Evans.

MS. EVANS: Our next speaker is Dawn

25 Petroziello.

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MS. PETROZIELLO: Hi, council. 1

MS. EVANS: Good evening. 2

3 MS. PETROZIELLO: Good evening. I

recently became homeless and I'm a single

parent or I was a single parent until

yesterday, and I read this article in the 6

paper that says, "Homeless program shares

\$2.3 million" and shares it with whom?

Doesn't share it with -- I don't know who it

shares it with because it's not sharing to 10

help me because I went to these agencies and 11

12 they told me they can't help me. They will

13 not help me.

14 And United Neighborhood Centers gets largest share amount of \$800,000? Well, 15

they are the ones that said, "No, no, we are 16

17 not helping you," so I don't know who they

are sharing with. I don't know if they are 18

sharing with themselves, to share to get a 19

new car or to get an addition onto their 20

house, but they are not sharing with the 21 homeless, especially the single mothers. 22

Now, I know that I am not the only

homeless single mother in this county. I 24 25

know that. Now, Children and Youth came to

me and said, "Well, here's what we are going 1 to do, if you don't find one of your family members to take your son then we are putting him in foster care." 4

5 When I know other homeless mothers 6 who get to cope their children so why am I 7 being singled out? I had a residence until yesterday, okay, and I was staying with a 8 friend and it was an indefinite situation. 10 I was able to stay there indefinitely. Now, 11 probation officer Alfredo Pizza apparently does not -- because I'm distraction, that's what he said, that's in my file that I'm a 13 14 distraction said that I could not live with 15 my friend and said that I had one hour to get all of my stuff out of my friend's home 16 17 knowing that I'm a single parent, also knowing that I would have nowhere to go with 18 19 my son.

Now, I receive public assistance, 20 21 I'm disabled. I can't work. I'm trying to 22 get disability and I haven't gotten it yet. 23 I can't -- I don't know what they are doing, but they are not helping me either. I 24 25 receive public assistance. I don't know,

but can any of you, can I just have somebody raise a hand and let me know being a single

3 parent can you raise your hand and tell me

if you can live on \$200 a month? Can anybody? I didn't think so. No. No. But 5

that's what I'm supposed to live on and 6

7 provide a home, provide shelter, clothing,

miscellaneous things, what have you, for a

child and this is what the state expects of me as a single parent without getting any

help from these agencies. 11

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I thought CYS, I thought the Children and Youth Services were supposed to bring families together, keep the home united. I didn't mow they were to supposed to pull them apart.

Now, I don't know if guys could do anything to help me, but, you know, I'm scraping the bottom of a pudding cup. You know what, scratch that. I don't even have a pudding cup to scrape. I don't have a pudding cup to scrape. It blew away last night when I had to sleep outside in 22 degree weather.

And I know most people have, you

know, worse than I do and I'm a grateful,

grateful that my niece was able to take my

son and my son had a safe and warm place to

lay his head at night, and there are other,

you know, children and other, you know,

humans that have it worse than I do, but

like I don't see like how this homeless

program is helping the homeless because I'm

9 not getting help and I'm getting turned

10 airway.

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11 And the only other thing I can say is I'm the prettiest homeless girl that I 12 know. That's about it. So if you guys can 13 14 help I'd greatly appreciate it.

15 MS. EVANS: Mrs. Petroziello, would there be any way of contacting you? 16 17 MS. PETROZIELLO: Yes, there is.

MS. EVANS: Can you leave that 18

19 information with --

20 MS. PETROZIELLO: Yes, I can.

MS. EVANS: -- with our clerk and I

22 think what I'd like to do is speak with

23 United Neighborhood Centers and see what the

problem is. The city itself, obviously, 24

25 doesn't have anything to do with any of the

programs that you are mentioning, some of

them fall under the county government.

However, you know, as elected officials I

think we can at least make some contacts, ask some questions on your behalf and find

out what can be done to help you and to help

7 you to a point where you are able to be

8 reunited with your child.

MS. PETROZIELLO: And, like, I'm 9 trying to get my disability because I am 10

disabled, okay? I do have -- I'm bipolar, 11

12 depression, anxiety, fibromyalgia and spinal

13 stenosis. I have a five, not one, but I

14 have five reasons why my doctors don't want

me to work and it's not just, like, they are 15

specialists, okay, and I'm trying to get 16

17 disability and they are denying me. Then I

would apply again and they are telling me 18

19 that they are sending me forms that they are

not sending me, so I don't know if anybody 20

21 can help me with that because if I had that

I would be able to provide a home for my son 22 23 and I wouldn't have to give my son up.

24 MS. EVANS: Are you referencing social security disability? 25

MS. PETROZIELLO: Yes.

MS. EVANS: Then I think the best 2 avenue and I can suggest to you is to get i 3

contact personally with the office of your 4 5

congressman. They have the ability I know

6 to hasten the process many times with the

regard to social security payments, so if 7

you were able to do that I think, you know, 8

that would be one way in which you can help

10 yourself. 11

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MS. PETROZIELLO: Well, I sure hope so because I had to listen to my son cry, called me on the phone and cry, "Mommy, I just want you with me."

MS. EVANS: I understand.

MS. PETROZIELLO: "Mommy, please can 16 17 you meet me at school, so I can give you a kiss in the morning." 18

I don't know how many of you have children, but how hard -- how would any of you feel if you had to listen to your son who has mental problems, my son has severe ADHD, mind you, and he suffers from separation anxiety, and had to listen to

25 your son on the phone crying, "Please,

mommy, I just want to be with you. Can you

please just come to the school in the 2

morning just to give me a kiss." 3

Imagine that. Imagine living on \$200 a month to support that child. I don't think any of you guys -- and nobody, nobody

7 can do that. I don't think anybody can. 8 MS. EVANS: No one can. Thank you.

MS. PETROZIELLO: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Our next speaker is Doug

Miller. 11

12 MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.

13 Doug Miller, Scranton. I think it's safe to

say we have the lights back after all of 14

these years. You know, I just want to start 15

off by just saying that, you know, I am 16

17 appreciative of Mr. Washo coming in tonight.

I was a little late so I missed most of the 18

caucus tonight, but, you know, I do

appreciate him coming forward and answering 20

questions. Certainly this is very serious 21

issue right now and it has a lot to do with 22

23 the financial challenges that the city

currently faces, but the bits and pieces 24

that I did hear, you know, I am happy that

we will be able to make that bond payment

tomorrow, however, I am very concerned about

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moving forward. 3

When we look, I believe it was 4

stated \$1.5 million would be due in June,

and there will also be a payment to follow

after that in September and December and

those are payments that those times that we

are still not quite clear on where that 9

10 money may be coming from, and that certainly

11 is a cause of concern for me personally, and

I know it is for you as well as well as the 12

receiver. 13

14 This is certainly, I think needs to open our eyes and make us want to pursue

15 some sort of avenue to implement a program 16

as soon as possible. I know this has been 17

on the table for a few weeks now, there has 18

been some question in the legislation. I 19

know the bidding was a major part of that, 20

but I just really think we need to move 21

22 forward here and put a plan in place. I

know there were many questions from 23

businesses in the community, residents in 24

terms of meter rate increases and the 25

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Saturday operations. My questions were

transparency as well as the rates. I did

have some concern with Saturday operations,

but overall my whole focus is that when we

do finally put a plan in place my hope is

that the operator will be open and 6

transparent and that, you know, budgets will

be provided and we know where every nickle

and dime is going. That certainly has

caused a lot of problems that we face today 10

because in the past we didn't have any of 11

12 that, and we certainly just didn't know what

13 was going on and that authority was being

ran recklessly and there was no transparency 14

and all of this mess was just unraveled and 15

now we face these difficult situations at 16

17 this time.

18 So I just hope that we can get a

don't want to see this burden put on the 20

taxpayers because ultimately that's where 21

plan in place that generates revenue. We

this will go and how that will happen is tax 22

24 or not, and that's not an avenue that we

want to approach, so we need to put a plan 25

increases, whether we want to believe that

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in place that's realistic with its numbers
and will generate revenue so that we avoid
the burden on the residents in this city.

I know it was discussed the idea of maybe closing a garage so that we can save some revenue and have the ability to make

7 our bond payments. Attorney Hughes brought

8 up a good point, maybe even selling a

garage, but then at the same time we face

10 the potential of having somebody come in and

11 maybe having, you know, less rates and

12 competing against us and it certainly hurts

us, but it's still something we should

14 consider. At this point no idea is a bad

15 idea. We face challenges and we need

16 something now and we need transparency and

17 accountability and we have to have the

ability to make our bond payments so weavoid putting the burden and the taxpayers.

20 And with that said, that will be all

21 for tonight. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Dave

23 Dobrzyn.

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MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

25 Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton.

MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. DOBRZYN: And I see you're

3 dropping the council, I'm sorry to hear

that, but I understand.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.

6 MR. DOBRZYN: And I'm going to miss

7 you though after the first of the year.

MS. EVANS: And I you.

9 MR. DOBRZYN: I missed the beginning

of that, was anything asked about the dead

meter issue?

MS. EVANS: No, it was not because

13 Mr. Washo actually has nothing to do with

14 the on-street parking program. He oversees

15 solely the parking garages, so those issues

16 have to be raised with Standard Parking.

MR. DOBRZYN: And hopefully you

18 people will get a rather stern letter out to

19 them that that practice -- because it was

20 close to -- it was when you were sick, I

21 don't know if you seen the article, I have

22 been trying to dig for it, and I can't find

23 it and I'm going to have to go down to the

24 Times and try and get a reissue of it or

25 whatever or go on-line, but there was 30

1 percent, 40 percent of the meters had dead

batteries in them and --

3 MS. EVANS: Yes.

4 MR. DOBRZYN: -- and we are losing 5 tons of money.

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. DOBRZYN: The one week I parked

3 in front of the Guild Studios down here and

9 all three meters were dead. It was after

10 5:00, but they are dead, so obviously people

11 have been parking there for who knows how

12 long and not paying a dime.

Okay, now last week we had a little

14 discussion on tax exempts, and I hope to

15 bring the taxpayers in on that because I

16 feel that irregardless of who is lined up

17 against us in this county and this area,

18 now, granted that the University or

19 Lackawanna College or any of these other

20 institutions they don't really take up a

21 geographic area that would warrant against

22 the cost of your buildings. I mean, their

23 buildings are very high value, they are very

24 fancy and so forth, but I do feel that it is

25 time for the state to compensate us because

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the constitution of the state is

2 unreasonable on tax exempts. It's totally

3 unreasonable. We have to support them

4 irregardless of how many and how many there

5 are. So, I mean, the happy medium would be

6 somewhere in-between, but with the current

7 situation we could wake up to find 50

8 percent, 75 percent some day so it's an

9 investment in the future and I'd like to

10 look into it and I'll be back to encourage

11 council, current and future with what I

12 find.

13

And be careful on management firms,

14 please, with Sewer Authority or meters or

15 whatever because that's what a lot of these

16 books I read are all about, like, "Free

17 Lunch" with David K. Johnston. People come

18 in, they offer -- you know, like Ford Motor

19 Company, they create a car, they put it on

20 the lot, they give 90 days credit to the

21 dealership and it sits there and then after

22 90 days the dealer/owner, franchise owner

23 has to start paying for the interest on it

24 at the very least. And, I mean, they

25 create-- that's a corporation that creates

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something as opposed to coming in and offering to take care of your money for you.

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I was down the bank a couple of weeks ago and my -- we have some retirement money that we have to shift and the teller is there, "Well, I'd want to get rid of that

right away. I wouldn't want it around." You know? And it's, like, wait a minute, you are talking about the wrong way with my money -- or our money, but, you know, you want to get rid of it and put it into some annuity that might lose money on top of it. I don't think so, but that's a lot of these management firms come in and as we see now with the dead meters they are not delivering what they promised and I'm glad that things were tabled and we are going to take a step back and hopefully it will come up with a better deal or maybe just decide that it's not working.

Okay, 5-E, I support you entirely on that. I'm just going to say that. It's ridiculous.

24 And once again, the golden parrot 25 last week is the same, 20 cents left over a

week after this person in my neighborhood

had her social security raise after her

3 insurance is paid, and that's entirely way

out there. And HBSC, Liz Warren, kudos from

Massachusetts, HBSC banking was laundering 5

drug money to the tune of a billion dollars 6

and nobody has seen a day in jail. Now, if 7

you shared a little tiny baggie of something

in this town you'd probably wind up with

10 your house condemned and everything else,

you know. 11

One final thing, I wouldn't say take the job and shove it to this person if he makes it for mayor, but take his ideas and stuff it.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Here you go. He

thinks that council should work for free. 18

We should put our school board, give them a 19

little commission on how much money they can 20

save and I think we would do better there, 21

too. Thank you. Have a good night. Thank 22

23 vou.

24 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Joan

25 Intoccia. 1 MS. INTOCCIA: Good evening.

MR. JOYCE: Good evening.

MS. INTOCCIA: Joan Intoccia, 3

Scranton. The other day I was coming home, 4

and I'm a resident of the East Mountain area

and I was coming up 307 to make a right to

go into the -- to get to the East Mountain,

and smash, I hit a hole that's very big and

actually took a picture of it. And I'm 9

10 thinking, I have to pay my taxes, I have to

11 keep my car good, I just spent over \$1,000

last month so I could get to work and I just 12

keep thinking, like, if they are going to 13

keep raising the taxes why don't we at least 14

not get -- like, worry about things at our 15

park and extras when we don't even have 16

roads to drive on. 17

18 So what I did today is I took some pictures going across Seymour Avenue, and I 19

live on Elm, and on the corner of Elm, 20 whether I like it or not is the Friendship 21

22 House on the corner of Derby and Elm, and I

did take some pictures up there and you 23

could see where the two roads -- and I'm 24

going to give you guys these pictures, if 25

26

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you'd like. 1

> 2 MS. EVANS: Good.

MS. INTOCCIA: Where the two roads 3

don't even meet any more. You can barely

make a turn there, and after that when you

come up Elm in front of the school area, 6

this is the 15 -- probably like 1534-1536

Elm there is all -- the holes are just so

big and we don't even have, like, there is

no sidewalks, so if somebody is walking they 10

are walking in the road. The road isn't 11

12 really wide enough for two vehicles at the

13 same time so whatever everybody is doing is

coming into the middle of the road and it's 14

getting really -- it's not even an 15

inconvenience anymore it's actually, like, 16

17 very dangerous, so I have a whole bunch of

pictures here of that. 18

This is right in front of the 19

school, also, and it is like where the roads 20

21 just end they right into the gutter and it's

just pretty much washed off. When you come 22

23 down to the bottom of Elm there is

barricades that are there and it's actually 24

thankful because if you do keep going at 25

least it's something to try to stop youbecause there is a home way, way do

because there is a home way, way down on the

cliff down below, okay?

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21 22 You make that right and you go into what's called the dangerous intersection, and all of this is a small area and you go

7 down Elm and then it goes Beech, Blucher and8 then down to Wintermantle. This is that "S"

y turn. I saw a lady the other day not

10 intoxicated, not nighttime, not inclement

11 weather or any own you she just drove right

off of that and drove straight into the

13 thing. Her car was a Honda, it was like

4 bent, like a "V". She did have to get towed

15 out. Here is the section, I took a picture

16 of that section where you could see that the

road washes right away and then it's into

18 the bank by the Irish Cultural Society.

On the opposite side of the street is also where it just the macadam is just gone and there is no curbing or anything like that. This is the corner that does

23 actually wash off by the Irish Cultural

24 Society and what happens is the Friendship

25 House is considered like a school so anybody

that is transporting those children, now,

2 Friendship House will come down another way

3 to not congest that area, but all of the

4 other schools that have children that come

5 up for their day program are not required to

6 do that because they are considered an

7 actual vehicle, so when they are trying to

get up and negotiate that and you have the

9 people coming down it's just very, very

10 dangerous. You come to a stop sign at the

11 bottom of that hill and there is a big hole

12 there so everybody is trying to go around.

Okay, come to the bottom of the hill where River Street where the project was all

15 done and it's beautiful there and the

16 traffic is all monitored, you make a right

and you are heading over to the hospital now

18 on Meadow Avenue --

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MS. SCHUMACHER: Meadow Avenue.

MS. INTOCCIA: Thank you, on Meadow

21 Avenue, well, that's like, just as

22 treacherous, too, and guess where it leads?

23 To go over to the hospital to the bridge

24 project that's a mess, too, and basically

25 I'm not trying to complain, I'm trying to

1 just say we have a major concern here and

when it involves schools and children I grew

3 up on East Mountain, there wasn't many

4 people up there, now there is, and there is

5 a real lot of kids and the 1500 block I bet

6 you there is between the 13 and 1500 block

7 of Elm I bet you there -- is lowballing the

8 figure seven to eight children that just

9 live on that one street.

MS. EVANS: Okay.

11 MS. INTOCCIA: Plus the school and

12 I'm just hoping that something could be done

13 to make it safer so we don't have to keep

14 crossing the road.

MS. EVANS: Yes, we absolutely agree. We absolutely agree. I can tell you

agree. We absolutely agree. I can tell youthat throughout the last four years it was

18 actually the action of this council to

19 increase significantly paving allocations

20 within the CDBG program, but the issue with

21 that is that CDBG paving occurs in low to

22 moderate income areas, so I am thinking that

23 perhaps some of the areas that you have

24 described are not going to fit those income

25 guidelines, however, that does not mean in

1 my opinion anyway that this situation should

2 not be addressed.

3 MS. INTOCCIA: Right, it's a safety

4 concern.

5 MS. EVANS: And I'm very grateful

6 that have you all of the photos, if you

7 leave those, please, with Mrs. Marciano and

8 we will make sure that the DPW and the mayor

9 are both contacted and that these pictures

10 are seen by both and council will request on

11 behalf of the neighbors of East Mountain

12 that these roads, these gaping holes, are

taken care of because this is a public

14 safety issue.

MS. INTOCCIA: Thank you, that's

16 what I was thinking. You know, everybody

17 says, you know, East Mountain is like the

18 la-de-da section. I said, "This is our

19 la-de-da section? This is what we are

20 paying additional taxes for?"

21 And it's not -- to me at this point

22 it's not even that -- you know, I'm lucky

23 that I can pay the taxes and the garbage

24 fee, and I now we all have to pull our part,

25 but, like, when we do that we pay our taxes

and our schools get low grades and we can't make it down the road to even get to work if

we have a job. 3

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MR. ROGAN: I would just add East

Mountain and West Mountain, as you 5 6

mentioned, are two of the areas, extra areas

7 of the city that you are paying more taxes

than some other people are and those two

neighborhoods have some of the worst roads

10 because of the drainage issues specifically

11 and the freezing and thawing in the winter,

12 so they are definitely issues that need to

be addressed and luckily the city, I did 13

speak to Linda Aebli the other day regarding

grant money from the state that can be used 15

in other areas. There is also up on Pike 16

17 Street was one that I was also trying to

work on and I'll make sure this all gets 18

passed along to her as well and the DPW. 19

MS. INTOCCIA: Thank you very much. 20 I appreciate it. Have a night nice. 21

MS. EVANS: You, too. Is there

anyone else who cares to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia,

25 citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonian.

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MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I listened to

Mr. Washo's presentation and you and I know

it's all a dream. The garages are not going

to pay for themselves ever. In fact, even 5

if you could pay the bonds off and the 6

revenue from the garages the repairs are 7

8 massive. They are not going to do it, so

you in the beginning said our board over

there was bad. They weren't running it 10

right. Well, the trouble was that council 11

12 that voted for us to take over the payment

13 if they could pay there is where the error

was made. They did what the mayor probably

told them to do. There is no way to tell 15

them to say that we needed all of the

17 garages, we didn't need them then, we didn't

need them now and you know the Hilton got 18

19 that garage because they give 120 spaces,

okay? And originally they were supposed to 20

build their own garage where the Casey was. 21

Okay, that's gone. Them garages are 22

not going to pay. Now, the solution we have

24 to turn to a different way. By telling

people they have to pay more to park isn't

going to work either. You are just going to

attack businesses in Scranton. There is no

question about that either. I wish these

people were old enough to remember when we

had free parking down there in Scranton and

like Mr. McGoff said we had four way

stopping on the lights, too, that was tried,

too, but for some reason or other somebody

comes to another study and that went off the

10 board. You used to be able to cross all 11

different ways.

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Okay, that was there, but the thing is we need revenue. Now, the state may help

us when they take over the schools, let's 14

hope they do it soon, but the other thing 15

you got to go in different directions. We 16

17 have actually private business in Scranton

run by government through these authorities. 18

The Sewer Authority is a private business 19

and there is no question about that. What's 20

your solution there? Okay, they are there, 21

22 there is nothing you can do about it, but

23 why not try to get some kind of a deal or

hire somebody. We buy our electricity 24

25 through probably somebody that arranges

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that, why not go with the whole city to do

that and then the extra money that we are making on selling electricity to residents

in this city you can apply toward your

debts, in which cases the taxes may not go

up as much anyway. We are ahead for 40 6

7 percent and there is no way out of that.

You know it, I know it, everyone knows it

and the city knows it, but you got to look

to different directions for income. You 10

can't keep oppressing people. Politicians 11

12 seem to know that. You just oppress people.

13 You want to do something you do it and let

the poor taxpayer pay for it. That isn't 14

working in Scranton. You got to go get --15

if you want to go to that approach you got 16

17 to get jobs in Scranton. Many, many jobs.

They are not here, they are not coming, 18

19 maybe they will never come, so you got to

look different approaches. 20

21 I told you one way, maybe you should spin off the fire department. Everybody has 22

23 to pay for fire protection. You know that

24 all of these nonprofits have to pay for

their electricity, they have to pay for 25

- have to pay for that, but we ain't charging
- them for the services we are providing. You
- got to look to that direction and see if it 4
- can you done. All of these approaches you
- 6 got to try because Scranton is a problem.
- The parking garages will never pay for
- themselves, so you might as well just forget 8
- about that. Your hope is that you don't
- 10 have to give more than you have to. That's
- 11 the only solution you got there.

So different approaches where income can come in without oppressing the people is

- the best way to go, and I think you should
- 15 look at any of them solutions and see if
- they can be applicable, especially to be 16
- 17 able to charge the nonprofits or the fire
- and police protection. Thank you. 18
- MS. EVANS: Thank you. 19
- MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, 20
- Council. Marie Schumacher, resident and 21
- 22 taxpayer. I can attest to the fact that the
- pothole going off 307 West on Seymour is a 23
- killer. There are others, but that one is 24
- really atrocious. 25

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- And then as to revenue sources I was
- thinking of, the other day I went to the
- 3 Mulberry Bush to do some business and I went off Mulberry Street and made the right-hand
- turn and almost got clobbered because there 5
- was a New Jersey plated car whose rear 6
- bumper was aligned with corner on Mulberry 7
- Street and I think we can make a bundle. I 8
- will bring the article next week because
- somebody -- some local municipality 10
- deputized in their case the firemen who were 11
- 12 off-duty to go around and do -- they said
- 13 the state allows this, to go around and give
- ticketing for vehicles that are parked
- illegally and I think not only would it make 15
- Scranton a whole lot safer, but it would 16
- 17 also bring in a lot of revenue, so I think
- that's a consideration and I will bring that 18
- article next week. 19

I was somewhat disappointed that 20

- nobody asked about the capital requirements, 21
- which I believe were like estimated at \$10 22
- 23 million in the Rich report, for the parking
- 24 garages and I hope maybe you can bring that
- up with Mr. Washo. I know it's not a this

- year kind of problem, but going forward it is and especially if one is closed, which
- one gets closed.

4 Onto some former other questions,

- which if they don't get answered tonight I
- will submit in writing in the morning.
- Mr. Joyce, I appreciated the revenue figures
- that you provided last week, but I'd like to 8
- 9 make two requests.

- MR. JOYCE: Okay.
- 11 MS. SCHUMACHER: First that you
- normalize the comparisons where the rate has 12
- 13 changed. I assume last -- the figures you

- admit that I did fail to mention that there 20

- 22 MS. SCHUMACHER: So if you can
- 23 normalize them as you provide them going
- forward and to this year. 24
- 25 MR. JOYCE: Okay.

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- MS. SCHUMACHER: I then, also, I

- because they ran into delays obtaining city 19
- 20 permits?
- MR. ROGAN: I believe I did read 21
- that and I spoke about it last week. 22
- 23 Farley's did open, which was one that was in
- 24 question, and the Banshee did not.
 - MS. SCHUMACHER: But the Banshee --

- 2 aware that it was due to a permit problem.
- 3 They had been planning to open in late
- 4 February and I would like to suggest that

- 11 MS. EVANS: I believe we are talking
- 12 about a matter of free speech that's
- 13 guaranteed by the constitution. On the
- 14 other hand, I don't believe that you are

- 17 paraphernalia during a city council meeting.
- 18 At the very least, I think it's most
- 19 inappropriate, and I'll take it a step

- 23 respect for and give credit to those
- 24 candidates who do not use that podium or
- 25 these meetings for self-promotion during a
- 40
 - 1 campaign season.
 - 2 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I agree with
 - that, but I don't see what the difference is
 - 4 between a candidate doing it themselves and
 - 5 a supporter doing it, but thank you.
 - 6 MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else?
 - 7 MS. KRAKE: FIFTH ORDER, 5-A.
 - 8 MOTIONS.
 - **9** MS. EVANS: Councilman McGoff, do
 - 10 you have any comments or motions this
 - 11 evening?
 - MR. MCGOFF: Just very quickly. As
 - 13 I said, I have been out of town for over a
 - 14 week and I'm trying to get caught up with
 - 15 some things. Just a couple of brief
 - 16 comments about the streets, I think we all
 - 17 agree that the city streets are in pretty
 - 18 bad condition and I know that the DPW has

the necessary repairs.

Hopefully we can get around some of this because there is a great need. The areas that were mentioned I drive on a lot of those streets in South Side and am well aware of how bad they are. We have spoken before the very poor conditions of Lake Scranton Road, which probably hasn't been repaved in decades, but is in very bad need of it so hopefully we can find some ways when the spring and summer comes to make these repairs and in all areas that and certainly in the areas that are of greatest

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman 16 17 Rogan, do you have any comments or motions?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. Just

to start off regarding the caucus with 19

Mr. Washo, the receiver of the Parking 20

Authority, one of the big issues that is 21

bothering a lot of people and that I asked 22

was Mr. Washo's salary of \$100 an hour and

24 that's been the talk of the town. People

would say, you know, we have Mr. Washo 25

making a \$100 an hour and he does seem -- to

his credit he does seem to have the facts

and the figures and everything, you know,

that council asked for and I'm glad he said

he is going to keep in touch with us, but

it's very frustrating that you have somebody

making more money an hour than most people

in the city are making in a day, the tax

base and the city can't support that type of

10 wage, and I am disappointed that when I

11 asked Mr. Washo he wouldn't take a pay cut.

You know, I'm glad to hear that his hours he 12

says are going down, but \$100 an hour is not 13

acceptable. 14

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Also, on the parking garages, and I'll reiterate my position, I believe we need to at least close or possibly sell a

17 couple of garages. There is too much 18

parking for not enough parkers, and the 19

garages, as Attorney Hughes, and others 20

21 mentioned, they have to be maintained and

22 they have to be staffed, and when you have

23 occupancy rates 27 percent, 30, 37 percent,

56 percent, which isn't to bad in the 24

25 Connell garage, 24 and 27, we obviously have

mentioned of trying to lower the rates and

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more parking than parkers. 1

2 I also agree with what Mr. Joyce

extend -- having more customers. A top

floor discount was one of the items that 5

have been mentioned. Also, there can be, 6

you know, the same way when you sign up for

a cable TV or satellite dish where you get

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quarter of 2012, and \$32,702.08 was from the first quarter of 2012.

of 2012, \$15,596.69 was from the second

As far as non-resident collections, which we refer to on council as 888 money, which is earned income tax on people that work in the city that don't have the earned income tax in their community. In the period ending on January of 2013, the city collected \$26,994.21. \$7,170.11 was from the fourth quarter of 2012, \$19, 611.53 was from the third quarter of 2012. \$3.95 was from the second quarter of 2012, and \$208.62

As far as delinquent taxes are concerned, in regard to delinquent EIT revenue in the period ending January of 2013, Berkheimer collected \$446,881.77, \$343,650.26 was from the third quarter of 2012, \$102,583.80 was from the second quarter of 2012, and \$647.71 was from the first quarter of the 2012.

was from the first quarter of 2012.

In regard to non-resident collection or 888 money, delinquent 888 money, the total for the month of January of 2012 was \$12,374.88. This constitutes collections of \$8,383.60 from the third quarter of 2012,\$4,092.45 from the second quarter of 2012.

So for the month of the January the
total amount of delinquent taxes and current
taxes in regard to the wage tax that were

6 collected amounted to \$1,522,833.24.

7 Berkheimer's fee for collecting these taxes

was \$15,201.79. So the net distribution was\$1,503,288.40.

10 Also, we received a report regarding the collection of wage taxes from the month 11 of February. The total current resident 12 collections from the month of February 13 amounted to \$2,803,785.14. The majority of 14 15 this \$2,712,905.84 was from the fourth quarter of 2012, and \$81,191.14 was from the 16 third quarter of 2012. \$4,682.79 was from 17 the second quarter of 2012, and \$5,005.37 18

As far as non-resident collections, or 888 money, we have received a total of \$62.044.44. \$61,301.29 was from the fourth quarter of 2012, \$640.37 was from the third quarter of 2012, so the total current amount of resident and non-resident earned income

was from the first quarter of 2012.

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tax that we have received in the month ofFebruary was \$2,875,514.96.

As far the delinquent collections
are concerned, we received a total of
\$41,039.98 in resident earned income tax,
and a total of \$1,755.98 in non-resident
earned income tax. The total delinquent
collections were \$42,795.96, and the total
taxes collected for the month of the
February in regard to income tax was
\$2,918,310.92.

For the fees associated for Berkheimer for collecting these taxes was \$40,837.35. Therefore, the net distribution was \$2,877,422.58, so for the year we are up to \$4,441,144.14 in earned incompetent income tax collections.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Good evening. I'd like to begin by thanking those who circulated city council nomination petitions for me and every single resident who signed them. I deeply appreciate your continued support and loyalty.

Also, I thank everyone who called

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and e-mailed me to wish me well and offered 1 their thanks and understanding. It's my 2 honor to work for you and, indeed, their 3 remains a great deal of work to accomplish. 4

One of my goals during the current fiscal year is to cut health care costs by entering into contracts for prescription and dental services with bidders that can demonstrate savings for our city and a continuation of the good services to city employees.

In order to generate additional costs savings in future years, I hope to establish a health care consortium among the city, school district and the county. As was announced previously, the county commissioners do not wish to explore potential savings in health care costs by participating in the consortium.

Nevertheless, the city and the 20 school district will cooperate in the 21 22 initial stage to determine if savings to both be can realized. However, the refusal 23 to participate by the county commissioners 24 at this time could jeopardize the viability 25

of the consortium and, thus, any and all

savings that could occur to benefit the

taxpayers not only of Scranton but of 3

Lackawanna County as well. In this vein,

city council wishes to review the current

contract between the City of Scranton and 6

Blue Cross. 7

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Therefore, Mrs. Krake, please send letters to the mayor and the business administrator requesting a copy of the current Blue Cross contract on or before March 22, 2013.

13 Next, the office of the City Council received a response on March 13, 2013, to 14 the question raised by Mr. Sbaraglia during 15 the March 7 council meeting. Mary Ellen 16 17 Clark, assistant administrator of the Scranton/Lackawanna County Health and 18

Welfare Authority states that only the

borrower is responsible for payment of 20

obligations issued by the authority. The 21

lender would have to seek any remedies 22

23 directly against the borrower. The lender
