You know, you are talking about people -his name is on the library. It's every place you look in this city, the medical school, the soup kitchen and the colleges. They have helped scores and scores of young people get started in businesses. have alienated this man with all of this going on over this Scranton Road. It needs to stop. You sure don't need young work for anything. This city needs the DeNaples and, like I said, the Boluses and the Weinbergs, we need people like that. We sure don't need no troublemakers like this man is.

You know, to change the subject I have sat there and watched you all treat Mr. Washo like he was Jesus Christ or something last week. Right under his nose with the meter maids telling him meters

aren't working he didn't do nothing. He is a \$200,000 a year waste of money babysitting a failed business. What do we need him for?

MS. EVANS: Mr. Ellman, Mr. Washo has nothing to do with the parking meters. He is managing the garages only. Parking meters fall under the on-street parking program, so Mr. Washo has absolutely no authority or any involvement with that side of the issue.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

held on a Thursday evenings and we all
conducted the meetings during Easter week.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Well, okay, then
I'll be able to wish you happy Easter then.
I don't know, Scranton is the only city I
know of where a man could take a nap and
make \$175,000. I'm not going to get into it
more, it's outrageous and ludicrous there to
say that and we all know it, and there isn't
much we can laugh at the situation. It's
just tragic.

Let's get back to the Parking

Authority because that's going to be really
hurting us. That study that they made on
the parking in Scranton, what was that
study, if you remember? When was with

actually put out? Where I guess they did it, they made a request for a study, how old was that study, do you know offhand? I remember you saying it once in awhile, but you never said how old it was.

MS. EVANS: I don't know.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Well, anyway, obviously there was a flawed study. What you should do is ask Billy really to get a handle on this, ask Billy, you know, everybody pays \$52 that works in the city. According to some years there was what, 26,000 people that work from out of town inside of the city? With a figure like that, I know it was a huge.

MR. JOYCE: Yes.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Ask Billy to sort of zero down how many of these people actually live within central city and then you can take the state workers, because they have their own parking, and some of these other places have their own parking, too. And when you finally get how many people actually need that parking you get a picture of that parking. 30 percent is ridiculous,

but the City of Scranton taxpayers have to pay for it and what did we get for it? get nothing for it. So if we are going to -- Billy makes the study and we find out that thing could never get more than 40 percent or something like that occupancy maybe we can offer the City of Scranton, some of the people out there good deals to get that parking, actually people in that parking garage maybe up to 70 or 80 percent. We are stuck anyway or we are going to be stuck until I die and probably my son, well, he don't live here, thank God, so it won't be him, but I know I will. I'll die long before that parking garage is ever straightened out.

So let's get a good study and Billy could do most of it because he knows where the money is coming from. He knows how many people this the state is paying us \$52 bucks, how many people -- well, Sampters probably uses the state parking lot and some of these other places, like, I can see only three major things, the post office, federal building, the courthouse, and actually city

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hall that would be the people that could use this parking. People coming into the city are happy with the meters here because they are coming to the doctor's office, if they could find a spot, but if we make the rates at that parking garage a little cheaper than the meter rate maybe more people would use the parking. I know he addressed it, but he said we couldn't do it, but we are stuck for the money any way. I don't care, whatever he does we are stuck for it and we are going to be stuck for it.

So let's take a little loss on the revenue and that, of course, we don't have nothing to do with it. Now it is in the hands of somebody else, but anyway, ask Billy maybe to do a little study on that so we get a true picture of how many people actually would want to use the garage and then that effort could be made trying to get them people to use the garage and at what rate they would be happy to use the garage at because, like I said before, we are going to pay and pay and pay and the more they try to raise the rates the less people are going

to use the garage or raise the parking meters people ain't going to want to come into the city.

Somewhere along the line we have to go off on that tangent and actually get a realistic idea of how many people really want to use the parking garages. Nobody in their right mind would buy them, and to close them all it does is add to the burden anyway. We close the garage down it's still going to deteriorate, maybe even faster. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. And I'd just add that I think the great problem there is there are garages that should not have been built and they were a mistake at the time, they proved now to be a mistake, but it's what the Parking Authority wanted, what the mayor wanted and what everyone on council at the time wanted, with the exception of me.

But, Mrs. Krake, if you could send a letter to Tax Collector Courtright regarding the LST as a follow-up on Mr. Sbaraglia's request, if we can try to determine the number of people working downtown and from

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that we are looking for a determination of those who can possibly utilize the garages on a daily basis for parking. Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

SCHUMACHER: Back to last week's caucus, given the content of the condition of parking garages section of the Rich Report wouldn't it have been appropriate, perhaps even of the utmost importance, to inquire whether the required maintenance will be performed? If a structural engineering firm such a DRC Associates states the, "Electric City and Linden Street parking garages are in need of immediate repairs to maintain the integrity of the building, vehicles, and occupant does that not leave the city incredibly vulnerable should something happen if these repairs are not made?"

And now one single question, did any of you actually read the Rich Report?

Anyone? If I get time at the end I'll read

a couple of paragraphs from that section then. These two parking garages contributed 51 percent of the operating revenues for the year 2011. If one or both of these facilities has to be closed or the use restricted it would have a great impact on the revenue and require that much more support from the operating budget.

Now onto Agenda Item C. What will be the product of the engineering study of Civil Crossroads Consulting Engineers and how will what they produce impact the use of Lake Scranton? You can answer that in Fifth Order. If I don't get an answer I'll submit it tomorrow in writing.

Agenda Item 6-B, what will be the source of payment to Abstract Enterprises? Is this an unbudgeted operating expense or will HUD funds be used to pay abstract? Anybody know?

Now, in August 2011 a deal was reached to grant President Obama -- to grant President Obama's request to raise the debt ceiling by \$2.1 million. In the exchange for the debt ceiling increase, Republicans

The Democrat Senate has been missing in action yet tonight you are scheduled to vote on a resolution, Item 7-D, to which I am strongly opposed. The views expressed by the chair last week and incorporated into each of the three whereas clauses put blame on Republicans only for sequestration and the presumption of economic equality are

both divisive and about as accurate as the first whereas in the tabled legislation to enter into a management agreement with Standard Parking. This resolution will have little to no influence on the outcome of federal legislation, but I would grade it an A-plus for grandstanding.

However, in the interest of accuracy we certainly should not, not be putting all of the blame on Republicans. I think this resolution should be defeated.

And now I'll read a couple of the paragraphs from the condition of parking garage section of the Rich Report. "A service life cycle cost assessment for the Scranton Parking garages was completed in the Spring of 2012. The assessment completed by DRC Associates looked at the condition of the parking garages and then projected repairs that were necessary to maintain the structural integrity and usability of the parking garages. The report found the Electric City and Linden Parking garages are in need of immediate repairs to maintain the integrity of the

building, the vehicles and the occupants.

The report identified projected costs to repair the parking garages. The total cost projected from 2013 to 2017 was \$10,353,400. The report identified that there is an immediate need for work on the Linden, Casey and the Electric City garages in 2012 to 2013 and that was estimated at \$2,636,235."

In addition, the report identified additional work that would be completed in 2014 at projected costs of \$2,807,732 and I would suggest you would also all read that section of the report.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. And whatever questions that you had you can submit to Ms. Carrera and we will forward them to the appropriate departments for their answers.

24	I'm glad to see that the amendment to the
25	rental registration is on the agenda for

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this evening. It's something that we talked about and needed to be done and hopefully it will pass through sixth. It seemed to pass with everyone, council agreed to the change.

Second, the resolution that we have on, I'm not even sure how to pronounce the word, the sequestration; is that correct?

MS. EVANS: Sequestration.

MR. MCGOFF: Sequestration. It's a pretty complex issue granted, and it's not something that a resolution from -- or a letter from Scranton City Council will have a dramatic effect upon anybody's beliefs, but it is an issue that does directly effect the City of Scranton and I do believe that we should at least voice our opinion on how we feel as a city about what is going on in Washington. Is the total blame to the Republican party? No, not by a long shot, and I would probably be more than happy to approve the resolution to send a letter to the Democratic administration and voice our opinion on what they have done or not done to bring about some resolution to the problems that are occurring in Washington,

but I think it's something that we should do as a city, as a council, at least to voice or opinion on those -- on that issue.

MS. EVANS: Mr. McGoff, this will be sent to Democrats and Republicans in Congress and the Senate.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. And, you know, hopefully within the coming weeks something will be done in the federal government to bring about a change in policy hopefully, and that's all I have for this evening.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman Rogan, do you have any comments or motions tonight on your birthday?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. I'll try to be brief as well. I agree with Mr. McGoff on both points actually. I am glad to see the change in the rental registration, it's more of a legality, just a legal change, but it is something that everyone had agree on; and also on the sequester, and I stated this in the paper, you know, I think some of the language, in the backup and the back of the legislation

was far too harsh placing blame, but I think everyone agreed that the sequester needs to be replaced with more responsible cuts that don't weigh as heavily on the one for an area that I was feel as strong as national defense, so that's why I supported the motion.

Moving onto two responses, this first one is from Chief Davis, and I thank him for getting back to us so quick, last week I inquired on behalf of a resident who wanted to know become cars parking in the fire lane of the Keyser Oak Shopping Center and the chief replied it's actually the property owner would have to make that request, so I will forward this to the resident that contacted me.

And, Mrs. Schumaker, on your question regarding the Caper, I did speak to Ms. Aebli and she is going to be sending a copy down to city council's next week for us to review, so after I review it and I will address your concerns.

Finally, well, not finally, onto some non-responses, which has been very

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frustrating, these are some citizens'
requests, but I want to elaborate on it a
little bit more, I would like to send a
second request to LIPS asking when the 2013
rooming inspections will be conducted, and
if the deadline of March 31 is not met for
the renewal of these yearly inspections what
recourse would neighbors have if the city
does not complete these inspections on time?

And I have been contacted by numerous residents who live near or next to a rooming house and they are very concerned, unlike having a neighbor like most of us have or where you have a single family home or a duplex or a triplex, a rooming house is a whole another ball game. Basically you have a communal living area and multiple individual rooms that people rent whether, you know, what the price point is that doesn't matter, but you have a large amount of people living in a very small space, so safety is always something that, you know, comes to mind not only for the neighbors but for the residents in the rooming house as well. There have been reports on some of

these properties that, you know, things haven't been up to code, there has been infestations that have been reported and these issues need to be checked out.

Now, I know council sent a letter to Mr. Seitzinger on this issue, we haven't received a response.

MS. EVANS: We sent more than one.

MR. ROGAN: Multiple, and I know neighborhood leaders have called and e-mailed and haven't received a response.

Also, another issue which involves
LIPS that there hasn't been a response on
this is regarding the 1300 block of
Sanderson Avenue. A resident contacted me
and Mr. Joyce, we were talking about it
earlier in the week that they have, you
know, basically a junk yard and they have
contacted LIPS numerous times, haven't had
phone calls back, haven't had any action,
and that's not right. Any citizen who calls
their government, whether it be council,
whether it be a department head or whether
it be an employee should have some
satisfaction at least to say, you know, this

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is the process or we can do something to help you or we can't do something to help you. These people deserve answers.

And I'm hopeful that the department head aren't checking out because their term is coming likely coming to an end with the new administration taking over next year. Myself and many members of council have it seems like we say this every week there has been a lack of response from some department heads, not all, some have been great at getting back to us. Chief Graziano is one of them, Linda Aebli usually gets back to us, a few others, Chief Davis has been pretty good at getting back to us, but certain department heads it just seems week after week we have a stack of concerns and we don't get anything back and now with some of them seeing the writing on the wall they may be out of a job next year with the new administration it seems it's gotten even worst.

So hopefully something will be done.

I know Mr. Joyce maybe speaking on this issue as well requesting a caucus with

Mr. Seitzinger on some of these issues so that's something I would fully support as well.

Finally, a few requests to the DPW, some of them are first requests, some of them second requests. Could we also request that the potholes at the end of North Washington Avenue near D & S Auto and the railroad tracks are repaired. The road down there is actually in very good condition except for one little area right around the railroad tracks and a couple of residents actually told me that they're worried there is going to be an accident. One car or a group of cars traveling in one direction swerve one way, the others swerve the other to avoid the potholes, so can we please send that request in again.

Also, one that myself and Mr. Loscombe addressed numerous times which is Pike Street. Potholes still haven't been filled and the road we still haven't heard anything whether it will be placed on a paving list for this year. Could we also request once again that the road is repaired

in the mean time and hopefully placed on a paving list for 2013. This is one of the worst roads in the city.

Also, on East Mountain please repair potholes in the 1400 block of Fig Street.

Also, the streetlight on the corner of Fig Street and Froud Avenue has been out for two months. I don't have the number, but I am going to up there and try to get that number, and also the Fig Street sign on the corner of Fig and Froud needs to be replaced, so there is quite a few issues up on just that one block, and that is all I have for tonight. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Could I interject one, when you were talking of LIPS it reminded me, could we also inquire about the operation of the food trucks downtown?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. MCGOFF: I know we probably all have received an e-mail from one of the property owners, one of the business owners downtown questioning how food trucks could park for extended periods of time,

especially around the courthouse, and under what do they operate under the same rules and regulations as would an established business. I think that's a legitimate concern for businesses owners.

MS. EVANS: I agree very much so.

MR. MCGOFF: And restaurant owners downtown.

MS. EVANS: The only other thing I would like to add is I believe our last letter to LIPS would have gone out quite recently, in the last week, and that was a request for a meeting in our office among Mr. Seitzinger, officers of the Pinebrook Neighborhood Association, our city clerk and anyone on council who would wish to attend. To date, we haven't received a response, but I don't know that the deadline for a response was yet reached. I know that --

MR. ROGAN: Well, I did meet with

Mr. Seitzinger and members of the

neighborhood association, this is maybe six

months ago, sounds about right? About six

months ago and I don't want to bash the guy,

I like Mr. Seitzinger, he is a nice man,

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but, you know, he told he was going to do these things and they haven't been corrected.

MS. EVANS: Oh, I agree. I talked to him on February 14 after the council meeting. I had made some statements during the meeting and it caused him to want to speak to me immediately and it was during that conversation that he assured me the following day, Friday, February 15, this would be taken care of and he would be in touch with the president of the neighborhood association and have everything taken care Nothing has happened other than a few apologetic e-mails, so it's still my hope, I think to have everyone into council's office, could work all of this out amicably and get those rooming houses inspected, and it's like you said, it's not just the matter of Pinebrook, it's citywide, but Pinebrook has been most vocal about it, so that's probably where they should start and then they can pursue everything else.

And I think if that doesn't occur we can certainly ask for a public caucus with

Mr. Seitzinger, but I know that we have many times in the past and here we are in 2013 still waiting for those caucuses with him from years ago, so that's why I'm hoping that perhaps he might be more agreeable to having this meeting in our office.

MR. ROGAN: Absolutely, and whether he meets with us or not if he gets the job done that's all that the neighbors care about and there is only ten days left.

Today is the 21st, the deadline is the 31st for these inspections, so we are running out of time here and I imagine that it's not something that's done overnight, you know, it is a process and it's something that takes time, so hopefully we will get a response.

MS. EVANS: I agree.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Councilman Loscombe, do you have any comments or motions tonight?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, just briefly.

First of all, Mr. Rogan, since it's your

birthday did you take the day off and steal

my notes, because what you stated was pretty

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much what I was going to say so we are on the same wave length. So not to elaborate any longer, but that is the high priority, the rooming house inspections and stuff like that. And another opportunity it provides the firefighters in those locations to go on those inspections with them and familiarize themselves with the high risk properties should there be any situations there.

And, you know, it's just ashame that we are down to ten days and nothing has been done and I would hope, as Mr. Rogan stated, that, you know, they are not just dropping the ball because it might be their last year in service. If that's the case, if they don't want to do the job, you know, get out now and let somebody take over that will do it. I mean, like you said, I have nothing against Mr. Seitzinger, I think he is a very nice gentleman, but a job has to be done. If you are being paid to do the job it has to be accomplished and I would just hope that the case isn't -- that they are just dropping the ball.

But, you know, again, everything was

stated by Mrs. Evans and Mr. Rogan just now and right on the money, so I would just hope some people are listening. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. And,
Councilman Joyce, do you have any comments
or motions tonight?

MR. JOYCE: Yes. I'm going to be very brief I'm a little bit under the weather and my voice is kind of hoarse, so I'm going to keep it short tonight. First off, I just wanted to thank the DPW for some of the work they have been doing around the city, especially on the 100 and 200 block of North Everett Avenue and I noticed I mentioned that there were potholes that needed to be patched along these streets and I'm very pleased to say I did notice that they were patched and I noticed some patching of road around the cities, so I'm glad that the DPW is working hard out there.

Second, we had a speaker tonight asking a question about Item 6-B and whether this was a budgeted expense or not, the \$10,000 for the study on Lake Scranton Road where the money would be coming from, and as

it does state in the agenda item, the money will come from the RE-RE account.

And I do have a few citizens' requests. As Councilman Rogan stated, one of the problematic properties in the city is 1346 Sanderson Avenue. It's in deplorable condition and basically the yard is a junk yard. We have voiced our concerns on numerous times about this and I believe our office has sent at least two requests in the past regarding this property, so if we could resubmit that request to Mr. Seitzinger and ask him to respond by next week and if we don't hear a response by next week maybe it is time to have a public caucus.

And my last request is another one that's been repetitive, and it has to do with 1406 West Gibson Street. It's a property that's in the Tripp Park section of West Side. It's been condemned twice, there are over 100 signatures from neighboring residents that I have in front of me to have the property torn down, and a resident contacted me and told me that they heard the property was going to be torn down in the

spring, but a week later there was a "For Sale" sign on the property, so I'm wondering, Attorney Hughes, if you know how this could be possible?

MR. HUGHES: I'm sorry, what could be possible?

MR. JOYCE: I was basically told by a resident that a property was being placed on the demolition list, however, a week later there was a "For Sale" sign on the condemned property and I was wondering how this could be possible in your legal opinion.

MR. HUGHES: Without knowing all of the facts as it how it's been put on the demolition list, there is a procedure that has to go through, assuming that that procedure was followed even thought it could be on the demolition list the person could still sell the house and the buyer, of course, would be buying it with notice that it is condemned and then come in with a petition to rehab it. They could make the sale's contract contingent on them getting approval from the city to take out building

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permits in order to rehabilitate the structure according to code. I mean, that's about the only way that I could explain it. I mean, could the city come in, list it and condemn the property unfit for human habitation because of the code violation, I'm aware of one situation I heard of this week where it's a -- it's a duplex. The first floor is condemned, which was an apartment, but the owner of the property is living in the second floor. So, I mean, I don't quite -- I could see where the city comes in and says, here, the first floor is condemned, that has to be brought up to code from the standpoint that no one could live there, but the second floor could be up to code or at least not be condemned.

Just based on those facts I would think that the fact that the city has condemned it the owner could try to sell it. If they have somebody that's knowledgeable as to how to write the sale's agreement and make it contingent on them getting permits from the city to rehabilitate the structure and take it out of the sale, that's the way

it could be done.

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MR. JOYCE: Okay.

MR. HUGHES: Until the property is finally demolished and on the demolition list. I mean, it could be put on the demolition list and the city might not have the money to demolish it. Actually, when you look around there should be more of this. You know, if there is buyers that could buy a house, you know, the handyman special and get it back on the tax rolls instead of knocking all these properties down. I mean, I think that should be something that's my opinion that should be encouraged.

MR. JOYCE: Okay. Thanks for your comments. Mrs. Krake, what I want to do is research this situation a little bit more and find out if this property is on the demolition list or not so can we please send a request to Mr. Seitzinger inquiring whether the property at 1406 West Gibson Street is on the demolition list or not. This has been a very problematic property. There have been over 25 police calls to the

property in the past few years and the residents would very much like to see this property torn down and it's a constant eyesore in the neighborhood, so the neighbors are really against reopening the property at this point.

And finally, just to give everyone a brief update where we are, we don't have a full cash flow report yet, however, the cash balance of the city as of 3-20 is \$12.1 million and we have \$89,945.98 in accounts payable. And that's all I have for tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mrs. Evans?

MS. EVANS: Yes.

MR. LOSCOMBE: There is one thing I forgot to mention if it's okay.

MS. EVANS: Sure.

MR. LOSCOMBE: It's something that
may effect our residents down the road, but
I was made aware yesterday by a family
member that they were traveling Keyser
Avenue where the construction is starting,
right now it's actually across the Scranton
line by the bottom of Snake Road there and

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it's going to continue through Scranton, but they sat at a dead stop for 22 minutes headed west on Keyser Avenue yesterday, the eastbound traffic came in dribs and drabs but it came several times. It seems like they have the whole road closed at times. don't understand, I thought when they worked on a main artery like they can only do one half at a time, but God forbid if an ambulance or a fire truck had to respond at that amount of the time, but I'm just -maybe we could send Mr. Talutto a letter asking if this is going to be more of a habit than what happened there, but basically if it's going to continue that a way through the city it's going to cause --I know we are in for some major traffic problems on the Keyser Avenue with this project and it's all for the better, however, the main artery is supposed to continuously be opened at least one lane from what I understand, and that wasn't the case and I think the contractor there was Kreiger, so I don't know if, you know, they are not following the recommendations or

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what, but I would like to see -- I wouldn't want to see that happen to our residents down the road. But 22 minutes was clocked sitting at a dead stop that's, you know, beyond what it should be. So.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. evening. I wish to begin by reading a response city council received from Marie Elkins, Chief of Staff for the county commissioners regarding their decision against participation in a health care consortium among the city, school district and county, and I believe the question was raised by Mr. Dobrzyn, a city council speaker. According to Ms. Elkins, the County of Lackawanna has decided not to participate in the health care consortium at this time. This decision is based on the strategy that we have developed in conjunction with our health care consultant and plan to implement in 2014. This may be a consideration in the future.

Again, it must be emphasized that the county commissioners' decision not to participate in a potential consortium may

well jeopardize it's success and, thus, any and all health care savings that could being realized by the taxpayers of Scranton and Lackawanna County as a result.

In addition, city council received a response to a request from a citizen for an update on the former North Scranton Junior High School building. Mr. Gerald Langan, president and CEO of Goodwill Industries of Northeastern Pennsylvania states, "In answer to council's request, please be advised we are on a path to a closing in April with a construction start in May."

Next, it has come to my attention that revenue generators whose success or failure will impact the 2013 budget as well as future budgets have been neglected by the administration, particularly payments in lieu of taxes from tax exempts, the amusement tax and the on-street parking program. It doesn't appear that the mayor made any requests for PILOT payments. As a result, I believe that all city nonprofits should provide documentation to the County Tax Assessor's Office that they deserve the

tax breaks they receive. A review to examine whether all Scranton nonprofits meet the criteria for property tax exempts must be performed to ensure that all properties off the tax rolls deserve to remain so.

In addition, a review of tax exempt properties should be conducted every three years as is the procedure in Allegheny County where 2,800 letters were mailed by the Office of Property Assessment in March to nonprofits asking each to complete a three-page application and explain why the property meets a 2012 State Supreme Court decision that qualifies them for tax exempts as a public charity.

Therefore, Mrs. Krake, please send a letter to the Lackawanna County
Commissioners on behalf of Scranton City
Council respectfully requesting them to have the Tax Assessor's Office review the status of all nonprofits with particular emphasis on any and all located in the City of Scranton. Such a measure is equally fair to all tax exempts and will benefit not only the taxpayers of Scranton but also those of

Lackawanna County. Request a response on or before April 9, 2013.

Next, please forward letters to
Mr. Gerald Cross of the PEL, Mayor Doherty,
and Business Administrator McGowan regarding
the amusement tax. Although legislation
enacting this tax was legally and lawfully
adopted by Scranton City Council, the
administration is not collecting this
revenue. What is the reason for this delay?
On what date will the administration enforce
the tax? Will the amusements be billed
retroactively to receive full payment that
the administration has overlooked for the
months of January, February and March 2013?
Request a response on or about April 2,
2013.

And despite the pleadings of the receiver for the Scranton Parking Authority voiced during a March 14, 2013, public caucus and my continuous request to Mayor Doherty, the bids for an on-street parking manager and for a parking enhancement program still have not been advertised in the newspaper.

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Now, when speaking with our solicitor late this afternoon, during the time we were on the phone he received information I believe from Solicitor Kelly that the bid specs were going to be sent to him for his review, so at least there has been movement, but, of course, this still requires the examination of our solicitor to make sure that the specs are correct and what they need to be. And then, of course, the time period of advertising, then another time period required for the selection, so, you know, again, we have been waiting since February 7 and the clock continues to tick while on-street parking revenues decrease, so if the administration continues to drag its feet on these and other revenue generators then it may be difficult for council to support any additional borrowing, any borrowing that was to occur simultaneously with enforcement of all new and traditional revenue generators and, unfortunately, I do not see that occurring to date. Revenue sources such as those I

have discussed support payment of the city's

financial obligations and lessen the burden and taxpayers. Borrowing will not work without aggressive implementation of the revenue generators.

Simply stated, borrowing alone will not solve the city's financial problems and it shouldn't occur absent aggressive and immediate enforcement of all revenue generators included in the budget with, of course, the temporary exception of the commuter tax.

Now, I've also heard, I haven't spoken with either the BA or the mayor about this directly, but I have heard that some of our revenues are up currently, I don't know specifically which ones they are, but it's my hope that if, indeed, that's the case the administration is not looking at that and saying, well, that's up, so that means we don't really need to pursue an amusement tax. We don't really need to be aggressive about a parking tax, we don't have to hurry about the on-street parking program, etcetera. Every single revenue generator is crucial and they all deserve immediate

attention.

Next, Mrs. Krake, please forward a copy of the proposed amendment titled Item 6-A on tonight's agenda to the County Planning Commission and the City Planning Commission for their review and recommendation in compliance with the requirements of the zoning ordinance amendment procedures.

And finally, I have several requests from East Mountain residents regarding paving, lane painting and traffic signage which I'll submit to Mrs. Krake following our meeting and letters will be sent to all appropriate department heads and parties, and that's it.
