EVANS: Are there any comments? 7 8 If not, received and filed. Are there any 9 clerk's notes tonight, Mrs. Krake? 10 MS. KRAKE: No, Mrs. Evans. 11 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Do any 12 council members have announcements at this 13 time? 14 MR. ROGAN: Just one. I received 15 this just a few minutes -- or a few hours 16 ago from Linda Aebli. OECD will be 17 participating in the Home Show in South 18 Scranton. It will take place Monday, April 19 29, from noon to six at 638 Hemlock Street. 20 The Office of Community Development will participate and you can learn more about the 21 22 city's homebuyer's program and how you could 23 become a homeowner in the city if you meet 24 certain guidelines. There are programs 25 available so the city will be there and it's

1	called the South Scranton Homeownership
2	fair, but it's for the entire city. It's
3	for all Scrantonians, not just those in
4	South Scranton, so I just wanted to announce
5	that.
6	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Anyone else?
7	MR. JOYCE: Yes. The Pinebrook
8	Neighborhood Association will be having a
9	meeting Tuesday, April 9, at 6:30 p.m. at
10	Antonio's Pizza at 930 Capouse Avenue.
11	MS. EVANS: Nothing further? Mrs.
12	Krake?
13	MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
14	PARTICIPATION.
15	MS. EVANS: Our first speaker
16	tonight is Ozzie Quinn.
17	MR. QUINN: Good evening.
18	MS. EVANS: Good evening.
19	MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn, Taxpayers'
20	Association. I want to thank Mrs. Evans and
21	this council for bringing forth the
22	legislators tonight. Hopefully it will be
23	the first of many, many meetings like
24	Mr. Rowing said. My only problem they are
25	talking sale's tax and talking about the

personnel tax, and you know what, there 1 2 is approximately taxpayers groups across the 3 state we formed, okay, and I'm well aware of 4 House Bill 76 and Senate Bill 76. None of them have signed it, so they are telling 5 you, yeah, we'll go 1 percent sales tax, 6 7 we'll go along, and yet they have failed to 8 sign it.

9 So in the future if they are giving 10 you lip service just tell them, okay, no 11 more lip service, you know? They must think 12 we fell off a banana truck down there in 13 Lackawanna Avenue or something. God, that 14 burns me up. The other thing is this here, 15 you know, that Sandy Hook that really it did 16 a lot of people in the United States, you 17 know, and Colorado and everything like that 18 there and the guns and magazines over ten 19 bullets and so on. Well, you know what, I'm 20 asking the city council to look into this 21 matter here locally, okay, and see if they 22 can't get some legislation together, all 23 right?

MS. EVANS: Actually, Mr. Quinn, I
have been working on that. My first order

of business was addressing sequestration and
the next legislation that we'll put forth
will be regarding the gun control.

4 MR. QUINN: Good. Good. The reason I say that is because of the fact that I get 5 up here and you people get used by the 6 7 Scranton Times, there is no doubt about it, 8 okay, I picked up the paper today on one of 9 the inserts eight pages. I'm not going to 10 mention the stores name of guns and gun paraphernalia, 25 round clips up in the 11 12 Viewmont Mall, okay? They are advertising. 13 They are making money on this and they don't 14 care what the circumstances may be. It may 15 be dire circumstances and, you know, you 16 just don't like hypocritical things like 17 that and I hope you look at that, Mrs. 18 Evans, when you to start to get involved 19 with, you know what we are dealing with. We 20 are getting people with give you a lot of 21 editorial, a lot of saying yes, but when it 22 comes to really doing it they care for the 23 buck and that's all they care about. Thank 24 you very much.

25 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

1 MR. ELLMAN: I would like to 2 compliment council on their words before, 3 but you're years and years too late, you 4 I think they have fell on deaf ears know? like I sit here all the time complaining 5 6 that you are don't listen to me. 7 And I'd like to ask your leisure 8 with me tonight, I had a spinal tap and I 9 think my mouth goes off about ten minutes 10 before my brain gets engaged. You know, as I look at council once more I can just 11 12 imagine all of you thinking and saying, 13 "Here we go again." You are partially right 14 and partially wrong. Last Friday morning 15 before 6:00 I was having coffee with 16 Mr. DeNaples, and you probably don't believe 17 that, but I get up that early. Sometimes he 18 especially when you get the calling like 19 that, you know. And as I have said when you 20 mess with someone's pocketbook it makes it 21 most irritable and so he was. I don't know 22 if the mayor is going to sign this into law 23 or not, but our city is like humpty-dumpty. 24 There is no way tax wise of putting it back 25 together again and this would just be, I

1don't know, just one more burden on the2taxpayers if you guys lose in Court, which3there is no doubt. If this goes to Court4it's going to be a disaster for the5taxpayers.

You know, you are going against all 6 7 odds, but maybe you got some support from Les Spindler, but the one man who knows 8 9 about lawsuits that's Attorney Kelly, has 10 advised against this to drop it. I just 11 don't know why you are pursuing this avenue 12 about this road, this hundred-year-old road 13 you know where it used to lead to? It used 14 to be a meat processing plant down there 70, 80 years ago. It had truck traffic before 15 16 90 percent of these houses were built. It's 17 oppressive as it is set. It's in stone.

18 I don't know. I'm trying to be 19 diplomatic with people and not get somebody 20 mad. We, the taxpayers, put you guys in 21 those seats to help us and to lead. I'm 22 talking about the little people in this city 23 and the big people, everybody. The people 24 that sent the man to the moon and brought 25 him back, those people, and now you are

1 expecting -- you are expecting a tax increase, if you lose this it will be 2 3 monumental. I know who the -- who you are 4 going to go against in Court if it goes that far. It's a losing proposition for the 5 taxpayers, and I'm one of them. That's why 6 7 I'm standing here crying about it. I don't 8 think this is very good way to win voters 9 and influence bankers myself and sooner or 10 later we are going to run out of bankers to 11 borrow from so then you fall back on the 12 tax -- you know, just we have to raise taxes 13 again people, I'm sorry. Last Sunday in the 14 letters to the editor Mr. Tara I believe 15 wrote in three years it will be 78 percent 16 tax increase and if you lose a lawsuit like 17 this 78 percent people will be wishing it 18 was just 78 percent. It would be -- it 19 would just be -- it's just an unneeded 20 unnecessary occurrence to push this so much.

You know, we have these problems with the schools and the colleges and nothing is done. We got these unscrupulous bunch of developers that everybody just bends backwards to help them and they beat

1	us out of millions and millions of dollars
2	left and right, we got the charlatan like
3	the school and here you are worrying about a
4	road. It's just got to stop.
5	MS. EVANS: Thank you.
6	MR. ELLMAN: I thank you for letting
7	me speak.
8	MS. EVANS: Our next speaker is Doug
9	Miller.
10	MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.
11	Doug Miller, Scranton.
12	MS. EVANS: Good evening.
13	MR. MILLER: Before I get into the
14	main issue tonight I just would like to
15	address an issue that was a concern brought
16	up by a taxpayer that I happen to come
17	across a few days ago over in West Scranton
18	on St. Ann's Street. In the 1300 block a
19	resident expressed much concern over large
20	cracks and potholes that have caused many
21	problems for vehicles commuting through that
22	part of that lot daily. This resident did
23	express to me the fact that the biggest
24	problem they have is in the late evening
25	hours or, you know, when they finally do go

to sleep for the night they have noticed that many vehicles that do travel over that road it does cause a disturbance and wakes up a few of the neighbors during the night.

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I was told that numerous requests 5 were sent to Mr. Dougher at DPW, obviously 6 fallen on deaf ears. I did promise her that 7 8 I would raise this issue tonight at council 9 and hopefully we can have it resolved once and for all. I won't announce the address 10 11 over the air just out of respect of this 12 individual, I will leave it in the office 13 tonight after the meeting and hopefully 14 somebody from -- a representative from DPW 15 can travel over and take a look at it and 16 try to clarify this issue once and for all.

17 Onto the main issue tonight in 18 regards to the caucus we had to here tonight 19 with a few of our elected legislative 20 leaders, Mr. Blake, Mr. Haggerty, Mr. Welby 21 who represented Mr. Flynn tonight, certainly 22 a productive caucus, I think we are able to 23 discuss a lot of the issues and concerns we 24 have had that certainly a distressed city 25 for nearly 20 years has had to face, but as

1 I sat back and listened to these individual 2 speak tonight I was somewhat concerned by a 3 few of the answers and certainly the 4 direction that we are headed in. I personally don't feel that the Pennsylvania 5 Economy League or DCED, the Department of 6 Community and Economic Development of 7 Pennsylvania has served a positive purpose. 8 9 I think they have done nothing more than 10 cause more burdens, particularly on the 11 residents of this city through massive tax 12 increases through the years, and I don't 13 think they have lead us down the right path. 14 I think they have caused more headaches than 15 anything else. That's my belief, and I know 16 that's the belief of many residents of this 17 city because they felt it when they get 18 their tax bills each year.

19I think that PEL has made a lot of20unrealistic expectations of us through the21recommendations of, as I have said, tax22increases and a lot of the public safety23cuts they proposed and that certainly have24even gone into effect by this administration25and their actions. I think a lot of the

1 problems we currently faced could have been avoided had PEL and DCED had our interests 2 3 truly in mind and perhaps if they advised 4 the administration properly they would have been willing to sit down with the unions ten 5 years ago and we wouldn't be looking at this 6 \$17 million Supreme Court ruling that was 7 8 cut in half, let's not forget that, by the 9 unions because they knew that it was going 10 to place quite a burden on the residents of 11 this city.

Another point was brought up, we 12 13 discussed, can the state come in and somehow 14 bail out the city, so to speak, and we 15 couldn't get a direct assurance that was the 16 case. We seem to want to discuss what other 17 communities are going through and a good 18 point was brought up that Scranton's 19 problems are quite unique compared to 20 similar cities such as Harrisburg and 21 Philadelphia and Pittsburgh and other 22 municipalities, Reading and the 23 Commonwealth. We face challenges that many 24 of these other municipalities haven't faced 25 in the last 20 years. You know, you would

1 think when you are in distressed status for over 20 years and you have these overseers 2 3 advising you that you would think you would 4 be able to turn this around and move 5 forward. We seem to continue to just go backwards and we haven't solved any of our 6 problems. We have placed many Band-Aids and 7 8 just one-time fixes on our yearly problems and it doesn't address the long-term 9 10 solution and that is how do we get out of 11 debt? Where is the money going to come 12 from? I mean, how much more are we going to 13 take on the taxpayers, and that's why it's 14 important to have our elected leaders and 15 state -- and coming in and asking questions 16 and trying to figure out on their end what 17 they can do in the legislature to try and 18 bring money into the city.

You know, many people may say, well,
you caused the problems, it's your
obligation to fix them, well, these are
three individuals that represent a lot
broader base of people in the community and
they have an obligation to look out for the
taxpayers of this city and they have an

1 obligation to ensure that this city turns 2 around, and it's my hope that by having this 3 discussion tonight these individuals will 4 leave here, go back to Harrisburg and start having discussions with their fellow 5 6 colleagues and the governor and the 7 Republicans and putting politics aside 8 because it's been proven that when you do 9 that good things can happen. You know, if 10 we take a trip back to last summer many 11 people didn't think that we could get this 12 council and the administration to come 13 together, but it was council who took the 14 initiative to put politics aside and egos 15 aside and work and cooperate with the mayor 16 and that's why we were able to come up with 17 a recovery plan and we were able to help 18 alleviate the burden on the taxpayers. 19 Remember, that recovery plan wanted to see 20 nearly an 80 percent tax increase, and I 21 remember that and I'm sure the residents do, 22 but this council cut that down to 22 percent 23 tax increase because they knew the residents 24 couldn't afford it and that we needed other 25 alternative revenue sources and hopefully it

will all come into fruition, a few of them
we discussed tonight, the sales tax and a
few of the others.

4 You know, Mr. Blake brought up a point that the state didn't give the city \$3 5 million. Well, if we are going to come up 6 7 and we're going to gloat about \$3 million, 8 which most of it was loans that we have to 9 pay back, that's not something we should be 10 bragging about within 20 years. We need 11 answers and we needed solutions and we need 12 our state officials to step up. They have 13 an obligation to help turn the city around. 14 Thank you.

15MS. EVANS: Thank you. Dave16Dobrzyn.

MS. KRAKE: Mrs. Evans, if I mayinterrupt for one moment?

19 MS. EVANS: Yes.

20 MS. KRAKE: Thank you kindly. 21 Earlier before the meeting started someone 22 had pointed out to me that one of the 23 participants -- or one of the people in the 24 audience had a pin on and asked them to 25 remove it and they were gracious enough to

1	remove it, so I just wanted you to alert
2	that to you. They were very kind and didn't
3	question that I asked them to and I'm hoping
4	it was okay with council.
5	MS. EVANS: Yes.
6	MS. KRAKE: And that I assured him
7	that if anybody else was seen with a pin or
8	any type of button I would ask them also to
9	do it, also.
10	MS. EVANS: Yes.
11	MS. KRAKE: Thank you.
12	MS. EVANS: Absolutely and you
13	informed me of that. Thank you.
14	MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council,
15	Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton. Okay,
16	now I have been railing for weeks and months
17	and years about trade packs and one of the
18	things that I feel a lot of candidates and
19	people currently serving are guilty of is
20	eternal optimism. The reason our country is
21	in the trash bag and our city is in the
22	trash bag we are a microcosm of that is
23	trade packs. For instance, we have a NAFTA
24	trade pack. Well, in Canada, they bought
25	the German leper tanks instead of the A1

Abrahams tank even though they have a trade 2 agreement, and they put their military with 3 that, so where is the reciprocation, and 4 that's a big reason why we are in the tank is because of the trade packs that have no 5 obligation to each other or the next person.

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7 And last week St. Peter's Square was 8 a parking lot, I would please, please plead 9 with you people to nix that. We don't need 10 another parking lot in this town. That man 11 came up with a big story as a developer, even a developer just pay taxes on an empty 12 13 lot and please plant some grass before we 14 arrest you for blight.

15 The lamps in the chamber, I had 16 problems when I did the taxpayers with both 17 of these side lights creating a nasty buzz, 18 so you seem to have solved that so I'll move 19 on. Don't turn those lights on, but we have 20 enough light in here now.

21 And I gave a few articles to Frank 22 Joyce from the Times so you might want to look at them, they are different things that 23 24 are aforementioned, there is lot of things 25 going back and forth about taxes in the

1 legislature and in reality from the common plan working class point they are really not 2 3 a lot of our better interests, so you might 4 even want to make copies of it. For instance, they have to get the state tax, 5 wage tax, up to four and a quarter percent, 6 7 Well, now I have been hearing on a left wing 8 radio station that there is also some kind 9 of plan on the back burner to allow 10 employers to keep 95 percent of that tax 11 deduction. Why are you raising my taxes to 12 allow an employer to turn around and pocket 13 95 percent under the guise of creating jobs? 14 Why would you do that other than it's just a 15 ploy to take care of your friends, and there 16 is a lot of different things. A lot of 17 these taxes that I'm hearing about, sales 18 taxes and property taxes, they're all 19 regressive, none of them are progressive. 20 You owe them irregardless of whether or not 21 you are even homeless with a sales tax. You 22 could be buying something that you need and 23 you don't even own property in the town, so, 24 I mean, that's something we just want to 25 consider before we have them slip the same

1 ole', same ole' in the back door. And I'd like to mention to our Times 2 3 reporter that the real tax rate in Scranton 4 is 3.4 percent; am I correct? MS. EVANS: Um-hum. 5 MR. DOBRZYN: Wage tax, I think I 6 7 read in the article that he used 2.4, it's 8 probably --MR. JOYCE: 2.4 percent goes to the 9 10 city, 1.0 goes to us. 11 MS. EVANS: So I think he was 12 probably just referring to the city's 13 portion. 14 MR. DOBRZYN: Yeah. Yeah. So it's 15 something we want to correct if it needs to 16 be corrected. Now, under golden parrot 17 North Carolina the state is establishing a 18 state religion. Now, that's in opposition to the 1st and 14th Amendment and the 19 20 supremacy clause of the constitution and 21 it's a damn good reason for taxing the 22 churches that are pushing it. 23 And there is a Shapiro in the FC --24 federal SEC and security and exchange - SEC, 25 security and exchange, and she has taken a

1 job now with the law firm that's specialized in helping people like Bernie Madoff avoid 2 3 the radar, so thanks a lot, Mrs. Shapiro, 4 and good riddance, I hope you don't ever run for government again or get appointed to 5 government. We need a law that states that 6 7 people need five years off if they want to 8 go into government outside of -- or into a 9 private institution outside of government. 10 Thank you and have a good night. 11 MS. EVANS: Thank you. That 12 concludes the sign-in sheet, is there anyone 13 else who cares to address council. 14 MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council. 15 I'd like to ask Mr. Joyce a question, if I 16 May I please? could. MR. JOYCE: Sure. 17 18 MR. MORGAN: I'd just like to ask 19 since you are the Finance Chair, what is the 20 shortfall in the budget going to be by the 21 end of the year, do you have any idea? 22 MR. JOYCE: I actually wanted to 23 address this during motions, we haven't 24 received a cash flow report from our 25 Business Administrator's Office with all of

the latest projections, so I will request
that this week and hopefully report on it
next week.

MR. MORGAN: I appreciate that.
MR. JOYCE: Of what's currently over
performing and under performing as far as
revenues and expenditures.

8 MR. MORGAN: Okay. The first thing 9 I have is I got here a little late, I had a flat tire, but I listened to what our state 10 11 representatives had to stay and our state 12 senator. I really don't plan on any help 13 coming from the state to the city. I think 14 that the legislature is just a mess. Ι 15 think the city has some very, very hard 16 times ahead of it. I think the worst is 17 still in front of us. I don't know what the 18 tax increases will be, but I think that 19 council needs to realize a couple of facts 20 that are really starting to come forward, 21 not citywide because, I mean, they hit on the 9.8 percent unemployment here and the 22 23 high poverty levels, I guess they were kind 24 of leading us to that, but nationally this 25 country has the highest poverty level since

1 Johnson's great society and I think that's a very troubling thing, and I believe that 2 3 today is the anniversary of Martin Luther 4 King's assassination, I believe, I could be wrong on that, but I thought it happened in 5 Memphis today but in the 60's and, you know, 6 7 I think that that man had it absolutely 8 right because empowerment has to do with 9 wages and the ability to earn money and to take money home. 10

11 And I'm really troubled by the shift 12 that our state legislators have come here 13 and talked about because the real problem in 14 America, Mr. Dobrzyn hit some of it, are the 15 trade agreements that this country signed 16 and the lack of employment that is in this 17 There has ban massive drain of country. 18 revenue from this country because employers have outsourced their work. 19

Now, there needs to be some
decisions made elsewhere, but in the
short-term this city needs to enact some
legislation which is going to make it
possible for this city to turn around, and I
have a different opinion probably than most

1 people all the time have, but I have studied government all my life, well, not all my 2 3 life, since I was about 16 when I was in 4 Mr. Festus' class and he was a really, really gifted history teacher, to be quite 5 honest, and really a credit to educators, 6 7 and I just think our answers are right here. 8 When you can use the city's Class 2A status 9 and ask the legislature to allow us to 10 become an enterprise zone, the whole city, 11 we need to enact SAPA even though no one 12 wants to hear that word because we need to 13 fill Scranton's industrial parks with jobs 14 and we need to tie that and hold so the 15 people can get the work.

16 Look it, this isn't about Democrats 17 and Republicans, this is about people and I 18 have to say that I doubt the legislature is 19 going to come here and help us because the 20 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has no money. 21 We are in very serious trouble here. 0ur solutions are simple, we need jobs, we need 22 23 cooperation and we need leadership. That's 24 what we need, but when you listen to what 25 our legislators say to us about what's

happening somewhere else. Look it, we need
to discuss what's happening here and we need
solutions here and we don't need them
tomorrow, we need them today.

In my opinion, with all due respect 5 to this council and you, Mr. Joyce, our 6 budget hole is huge. It's just unbelievable 7 8 and in my own personal opinion if I could 9 have a say I would tell the legislature to 10 come here since they created Act 47 and they 11 allowed the PEL to run this city, yes, there 12 have been problems with leadership by councils and mayors in this city for a long 13 14 time, but our major problems are in my 15 humble opinion the people outside of the 16 city have used the city to try to 17 manipulate, smashing of municipal unions 18 under Act 47 and I think that when you 19 really take a good hard look at what's 20 happened here it's only come to hurt 21 Scrantonians and then when the governor 22 says, "Don't look it us for help," we fought 23 their battle and we lost and now what we 24 need the legislature to do is to pick up 25 something and fight some of our battle.

1 We need to turn Scranton into an 2 enterprise zone so we can create jobs so 3 that we can guite possibly as the only Class 4 2A city I can't see why it can't come through the legislature, because if Scranton 5 becomes an enterprise zone it has no effect 6 7 anywhere else in the Commonwealth. Thank 8 you. MS. EVANS: 9 Thank you. 10 MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, 11 citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians. MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening. 12 13 MR. SBARAGLIA: Good evening, 14 Council. I usually associate Scrantonians 15 and don't go any further. I listened to our 16 dear legislatures and, Mr. Rogan, you talked 17 about the 1 percent sales tax of Lackawanna 18 County, when that came up one time I said 19 it's like taking a soup bone and throwing it 20 out to a pack of animals and they are going 21 to jump for it. That's how we described 22 that 1 percent, but now the other thing, why 23 isn't he on board with tax removal, the real 24 estate tax? Well, the school board portion 25 of it from our tax base? That would do a

1 heck of a lot more than that 1 percent and 2 the governor is on board to do it, but yet I 3 don't think he is on board with it, your 4 legislature, your senator. I hear him say he has reservations. That's another word 5 for saying I don't like it, okay? That 6 7 would help out more people throughout the Commonwealth than anything else. You have 8 said he was on the DEC, was he on that? 9 MS. EVANS: Um-hum. 10 11 MR. SBARAGLIA: Do you remember when 12 he pushed this Act 11, it was to prevent the 13 firemen and the policemen from striking. 14 MS. EVANS: Right. 15 MR. SBARAGLIA: Now, why would you 16 assume that Act 47 would overturn that 17 right? If they wanted Act 47 overturned 111 18 they should have negatived 111 and let the 19 police and firemen strike again, but they 20 didn't do it. And I heard him say he 21 disagreed with the Supreme Court decision on 22 True, he has a right to disagree, but that. 23 it makes me worried about his thinking 24 because anybody with common sense would 25 realize you gave people a right to so you

wouldn't strike and then you tried to take
away with another act and the Supreme Court
said, no, you gave them that right, and you
have to abide by it. So I thought about a
lot of things he said and I'm sorry to say
he is our senator.

7 There is lot of things he may be 8 able to do, the governor is on board with 9 the taxes for the schools. Now. the governor said, "I'd like it because it helps 10 11 business. And by doing that, you would need 12 all of these other acts to help business 13 because they wouldn't be paying the real 14 estate tax in the school district and all of us are, of course, would have to but they 15 16 would not do it and maybe they would come 17 out lot better, they probably would, because 18 we still have to pay increase in our taxes 19 when we buy stuff or in our wage tax or 20 whatever it is, we would take the burden, 21 but overturning it would help more people than it would harm because we don't all --22 23 unless they put a big bite on the food that, 24 of course, would be hurt everybody in 25 business, but we have to look at that, but

he didn't look at it. He just says, "I
don't like it."

3 And that's not right, too, from the 4 senator. He should really look at it in-depth. I don't look at it because it's 5 in the progress of being changed in that and 6 everybody everywhere, but somewhere along 7 8 the line it seemed to have ironed out some 9 problems with it. Now, whether or not they 10 jump on board with it I don't know.

11 Now, you know they are doing 12 nonprofits down there, now, why should not 13 nonprofits be immune from service tax and 14 just like I pay for firemen and policemen, 15 they use the firemen and policemen, too, if 16 they are exempt they should only be from 17 real estate tax and not from city services 18 tax.

19Now, when they may correct it down20there or not, I don't know. Maybe you21should all write a letter to all of the22legislators like the mayor did when he23wanted to sell his South Side Complex. He24went out there and they lobbied, of course,25I don't expect you to go lobby.

1	MS. EVANS: Actually, they hired a
2	lobbying firm, was it Wolblock or something
3	like that?
4	MR. SBARAGLIA: No, I remember that.
5	MS. EVANS: But the city hired an
6	actual lobbyist to work on the state
7	legislators so that they would be able to
8	sell the South Side Complex and that's what
9	actually happened, our money was used
10	against us.
11	MR. SBARAGLIA: I know that. Like I
12	said, maybe you should lobby it and not by
13	letter writing rather than hiring and be
14	lobbying like he did. But these are things
15	that you should do regardless of what they
16	do, because really you ain't going to e
17	expect too much else from them. Thank you.
18	MS. EVANS: I agree with you,
19	Mr. Sbaraglia. I did appreciate the
20	participation of Senator Blake and
21	Representative Haggerty and Mr. Welby, but
22	and I did learn much from tonight's
23	discussion, but I didn't receive answers
24	to direct answers to questions that I
25	posed, and I noted that none of the three

1	provided a commitment to any legislation.
2	None agreed, "Yes, I will do this."
3	MR. SBARAGLIA: Thank you.
4	MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,
5	Council. Marie Schumacher, city resident
6	and taxpayer.
7	MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.
8	MS. SCHUMACHER: First I'd like to
9	thank Mrs. Krake for the answers she
10	provided from two weeks ago on what Civil
11	Crossroad Consulting and Engineering is
12	going to do for us with the \$10,000, will be
13	up to \$10,000 we'll be paying for them.
14	Next, I'd like to read two
15	paragraphs from Scranton Times-Tribune
16	papers within the last week, the first is
17	from last Saturday. "A search of the halfway
18	home Mr. Gonzalez was staying in at 1512
19	Olive Street, Scranton, revealed 555 bags of
20	heroine and nearly 36 grams of the cocaine
21	police said."
22	The next one is from this past
23	Monday, it says, "Shawn Bouldin, 37, 537-539
24	Linden Street was selling heroine as J-Rock
25	while living at a halfway house in Scranton

until two controlled purchases at two locations Monday around noon police said."

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3 You know, you can't hardly pick up 4 the paper these days without drug dealers being busted, and I'll get back to that in a 5 minute, but I know there is no ordinance 6 7 specifically addressing halfway houses and I 8 wonder, Mr. Rogan, and I believe you work closely with Mr. McGoff will that be 9 10 reviewed -- will the halfway houses be reviewed by the rental registration program? 11

12 Sure, I'll speak with MR. ROGAN: 13 Mr. McGoff on that and I definitely think it 14 should be. One exemption that I know was in 15 there that I brought up was a concern that I 16 had was hotels were exempt and my concern 17 was that, quite frankly, a building like 18 that and there is lot of them amendments 19 that need to be made, the first one has been 20 made and we need to keep working to make 21 that all better.

22 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. I really 23 think that it needs to be addressed. That 24 these halfway houses should have some adult 25 supervision.

1 MR. ROGAN: Absolutely. Something needs to 2 MS. SCHUMACHER: 3 be done, but the other component is while I 4 continue to read about these large dealers being shut down the thing that I don't ever 5 see in the paper is a drug customer, a drug 6 7 dealer's customer being arrested. 8 Mr. Loscombe, do you know anything about how 9 many drug users have been arrested over the 10 past even just 12 months? 11 MR. LOSCOMBE: I'd have to get that 12 information for you, but I don't have a 13 specific. 14 MS. SCHUMACHER: It seems to me that 15 the drug dealers wouldn't be here at all if 16 we didn't have a market and it's about as 17 scary wondering who are all of these users 18 that we are interfacing with on a regular 19 basis, and I was wondering who that police 20 officer that was busted for doing something 21 and demoted. You just can't have any 22 confidence in any transactions when you don't know who is outside of the fence. 23 24 The next issue -- so I would 25 appreciate that.

1	MR. LOSCOMBE: Sure.
2	MS. SCHUMACHER: The next issue is
3	why is File of Council 100 2009 still on the
4	table? As I recall that just deals with
5	where the parking meters are placed within
6	the city and I don't know why that is
7	dependent on any other piece of legislation?
8	Is that will that why is it still on
9	the table and whether will it be brought
10	back?
11	MR. ROGAN: I don't know. I think
12	everything should receive an up or down vote
13	at some point.
14	MS. SCHUMACHER: And I think,
15	Mr. Joyce, you are going to investigate on
16	that too, to see if there is some kind of
17	study that was done that says where these
18	should be placed or is it just haphazard and
19	taking it and plopping and exempting block C
20	and tax them.
21	MR. JOYCE: I'll see looking to the
22	answer for that.
23	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, but, I mean,
24	I think that's of interest to a lot of
25	people and I hope you will follow through

and have a public hearing on that when it
does -- when you do decide what's going to
be in that revised file of council.

4 I did notice that last Saturday the legal notices contained an RFP for the new 5 parking meter management, but did anybody 6 read the RFP? Okay. My concern is that the 7 8 meters that were to be purchased by Standard 9 Parking were meters that you all didn't want. You wanted ones that went back to 10 11 zero and I would assume those orders haven't 12 been placed because they don't have the 13 five-year contract and maybe won't, maybe 14 somebody else will underbid them when the 15 bids are open on April 12, but will that --16 I would like to know if that will be a 17 separate RFP that's yet to come.

MR. HUGHES: Yes, it will be a study
for 90 days after the contract is awarded to
determine what type of upgrades will be done
that's taken out of this contract. This is
only the management.

23 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay.

24 MR. HUGHES: Then there is going to
25 be a separate -- and it states specifically.

MS. SCHUMACHER:You have seen it,thank you.

3 MR. HUGHES: Totally different than 4 the original one. It was all preselected as to what kind of meter it was going to be. I 5 reviewed that, I had 13 comments that ended 6 up being all incorporated into the RFP, one 7 8 of which was that and what was to be 9 included. There is even technology now 10 instead of using a credit card but there is 11 an app for a cell phone --

12 MS. SCHUMACHER: I know.

MR. HUGHES: -- you can use and it
can do that. There is so much technology
it's that beyond what was going to be
previously bid. That's all going to be
looked into.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. With that, I
would just caution though that people can,
again, lift your charge card when you do it
on the cell phone.

22 MR. HUGHES: I wouldn't know how to 23 do it. I'm a quarter guy.

24 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, the bell has 25 rung, but next week I will be back to talk

1 about the delinquent OECD loans, and maybe if you can indulge me for just a minute I'll 2 3 read the status of the loan portfolio right 4 Commercial/industrial, there are 24 now. active loans, 13 of which are default, which 5 is over half. UDAG there are five active, 6 7 three of them are in default. CDBG. there 8 are ten and six are in default. Enterprise 9 Home Loans, five active, and three in 10 default. Economic Development EDA Program 11 there are three in the population and two of 12 the three are in default. So I will have 13 some figures on that next week unless 14 something else motivates me more than that. 15 Thank you. MS. EVANS: 16 Is there anyone else? 17 MR. SLEDZENSKI: Hello, Janet. 18 MS. EVANS: Hi, Chris. 19 MR. SLEDZENSKI: Jack, you handsome 20 devil you. 21 MR. LOSCOMBE: Chris is back to the 22 podium. 23 MR. SLEDZENSKI: Hello. Jack. This 24 is a new team this year, the railroad guys, 25 good luck tonight, you guys. Win tonight.

1	Good luck.
2	MR. LOSCOMBE: Good luck you are
3	right.
4	MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else?
5	Mrs. Krake?
6	MS. KRAKE: 5-A. MOTIONS.
7	MS. EVANS: Councilman Rogan, do you
8	haven any comments or motions tonight?
9	MR. ROGAN: Yes. I'll be very brief
10	tonight, I just want to talk a little bit
11	more about the caucus with the state
12	representatives and state senator and to
13	reiterate my position against Senator
14	Blake's additional sales tax. I did speak
15	on this issue during the recovery plan
16	process and previous my concern with the
17	Senator's proposal is that what it would be
18	the additional tax instead of a change of
19	the tax structure a tax reform. I know the
20	Senator's proposals compared revenue to the
21	city coffers, but it would be an additional
22	tax on the voters in the county and the
23	city. By switching to a sale's tax system
24	or a hybrid between sales tax and other
25	taxes to fund education that would reduce or

1 preferably completely eliminate school property taxes, and if the school -- if the 2 3 school district portion of the property 4 taxes were eliminated throughout the state when the cities and boroughs fall on tough 5 times if their taxes go up it wouldn't hurt 6 7 people as much as when you have three taxing bodies raising property taxes within a 8 couple of year period. 9

10 As Mrs. Evans mentioned, the county 11 tax increases have crippled the people of 12 the county. The city taxes are hurting 13 people. The school taxes are hurting people 14 and there needs to be a change in how the taxes are paid. The senior citizens and 15 16 working people can't keep footing all of the 17 of bills and, you know, they keep the city 18 and school district and counties afloat.

19By switching to a sale's tax system20most of your basic purchases are tax exempt21so the person who is living on a smaller22income who is buying food, medicine,23shelter, those items you don't pay sales tax24on when you go to the Rite Aid to purchase25your prescriptions you don't pay a sale's

1tax. If you go to the grocery store unless2you buy prepared food you won't be paying a3sale's tax and these items I firmly believe4must remain tax exempt. That's one of the5advantages that Pennsylvania does have over6other states.

7 I know the Crossings Outlets are 8 very popular with people from New York 9 because they come because New York clothes 10 are taxed so those clothes they will come 11 into Pennsylvania to buy their clothes tax 12 free and that's part of my fear with if 13 Lackawanna County imposed a 1 percent taxes 14 and, for instance, Luzerne and Wyoming and 15 the surrounding counties didn't, for big 16 ticket purchases people would certainly 17 cross the county boundaries to make those 18 purchases and I know, and I mentioned it to 19 the Senator, that they do put a provision in 20 there that you would still have to pay, but 21 that would be just like the when you buy 22 something on Amazon.com before the tax was 23 at the point of sale you are technically 24 required to pay that tax at the end of the 25 year, but people didn't know about it and it

wasn't enforced for the most part.

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2 So I hope we will continue meeting 3 with our legislatures, hopefully the mayor, 4 the current mayor and the new mayor will get involved or we could sit down on at least a 5 monthly or a quarterly basis and, like I 6 7 said, we could rotate and obviously if council is involved only two of us can get 8 together at a time, but there is two 9 10 representatives and a senator, so if two of 11 us met with Representative Flynn and two 12 with Representative Haggerty and one with 13 Senator Blake and mixed it up we could 14 accomplish a lot by having those meetings on 15 a very regular basis.

16 Just a couple of things that were 17 mentioned, Mrs. Schumacher brought up the 18 halfway houses and this is a very good 19 point. That is a problem that needs to be 20 addressed throughout the city. Halfway 21 houses and rooming houses are a problem in 22 the city. They need inspections, they need 23 to be checked up on more than the average 24 single family home or duplex throughout the 25 city when you have people live in many cases

1 have a history of committing crimes these 2 people need a lot more supervision than law 3 abiding citizens throughout the community. 4 And the drug problem in the community I agree that it needs to be addressed on both 5 6 the supply and the demand end and I will 7 bring that up next time I see Chief 8 Graziano. I actually have to call him on a 9 couple of other issues, so I will bring that up with him tomorrow, and that is all I have 10 11 for tonight.

12 Oh, actually two citizens' requests, 13 Mrs. Krake, I will e-mail these in, one is 14 actually a school district issue, residents 15 from the Tripp Park area brought to my 16 attention that there are two retention ponds 17 near the school and last year this was a 18 large problem with frogs around Scranton where there were hundreds and hundreds of 19 20 frogs. First I've heard of it, but a lot of 21 frogs in these ponds that were going into 22 the neighborhood and running across the 23 street and they were a nuisance so if we 24 could let Mr. King and the directors at the 25 school district know about that issue and

also --

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MS. EVANS: I hope they aren't going 2 3 to call animal control office to take them 4 to Griffin Pond, we are going to owe about \$100,000 for the frogs. 5 MR. ROGAN: Well, I figure right 6 now, because it is strange, although it is 7 8 the spring, and maybe a chemical can be 9 placed in the water to deter the tad polls 10 from, you know, from procreating in the 11 pool. 12 And also, Mr. Joyce brought up the issue of a blighted property that was on the 13 14 list to be demolished and there was an issue 15 of sale. I spoke to probably the same 16 resident that you did on that issue and I 17 did speak to Mr. Seitzinger and Mrs. Aebli 18 about it, Mark Seitzinger did get back to me 19 very quick and he said he is still looking 20 into it so hopefully we will have a firm 21 answer on that and there were one or two 22 others I actually left in my car, but that's 23 all I have for tonight. Thank you. 24 MS. EVANS: Thank you. And,

Councilman Loscombe, do you have any

1 comments or motions this evening? MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. Thank vou. 2 3 Just briefly, I would like to again 4 reiterate my thanks to our representatives and I'm looking forward to continued 5 dialogue between us and those bodies. 6 It's 7 definitely, definitely needed and we have to 8 stay on them. They say a squeaky wheel gets 9 the grease, well, I understand as Mrs. Evans 10 kept implicating that we are concerned with 11 our area right now. We do realize that 12 there are situations across the state and 13 perhaps some of those other areas, you know, 14 we could work with too. with our 15 representatives to get, you know, more 16 combined effort to get some of these 17 problems resolved, but we are on the right 18 step and we just have to stay each our pedal to the metal. 19 20 MS. EVANS: And I'm sorry to jump

in, but just very quickly, I know that Senator Blake holds legislative breakfast every few months to which everyone is invited so, you know, there has been access to him in that manner, but beyond that I

1 know I have met with him and a state 2 representative many times in the last four 3 years at times I know Councilman Joyce has 4 met with them. met with him before. and I know that you were frequently in 5 communication with former Representative 6 Murphy's office over, you know, a myriad of 7 8 problems in the city and I think Councilman 9 Rogan was as well.

10 So, you know, I don't want the 11 public to misunderstand that tonight was the 12 first time there was any meeting of this 13 sort, that's not accurate. There have been 14 public meetings, public caucuses previously, 15 but in addition to that there have been 16 regular meetings held with state legislators 17 in council's office and, you know, although 18 we learn a great deal, and I'd like to 19 consider them productive, I have to say that 20 not once, and I'll include tonight's 21 discussion in this, not once did I ever 22 receive a commitment from them that they 23 were going to absolutely draft any 24 legislation, absolutely pursue, you know, 25 this, whatever the topic might be in order

to fight for the people, in order to fight 1 for the city. I can't seem to be able to 2 3 pin them down on any commitments whatsoever. 4 They do share our concerns I'm sure for the people, but again, as you said, our 5 interest lies here within the City of 6 7 Scranton and Scranton is a child in critical 8 condition and everyone needs to be 9 addressing that child, everyone who 10 represents that child and, you know, I think we have many, many discussions but not 11 12 nearly enough action. I'm sorry. 13 MR. LOSCOMBE: No, that's fine, I 14 agree with that totally and I think possibly 15 due to the fact that our two representatives 16 were freshmen, you know, they may be a 17 little bit leary on committing to something 18 at this point and hopefully they will, you 19 know, heed our word and our advice and take 20 the bull by the horns and, you know, they do 21 seem interested like you said so I hope it's 22 just, you know, the freshman in them that 23 kept them from making a commitment at this 24 point because, you know, politicians have 25 made commitments before and weren't able to

follow-up on them and it came back and bit
them, so I would just hope that, you know, a
few months we are sitting here and they
already have legislation that's going to
benefit us and so that's the way I take it
at this point, so hopefully it will work out
that way.

And just the last thing, I just want 8 9 to read, it's more of a public service 10 announcement. As you are aware, in regard 11 to the fire department smoke detector 12 program, as you are aware we are continuing our very successful smoke alarm installation 13 14 program. We have recently received a new 15 shipment of alarms and would like to make 16 the public aware that they are available. 17 There is no charge for the smoke alarms and 18 city firefighters will install them for 19 free. The alarms were made available by 20 WNEP TV's save a life program and a 21 successful grant written by the fire 22 department.

The only restrictions to this grant are as follows: The alarms must be installed by fire department personnel. I

1 know there have been people requesting, you know, drop off three alarms and stuff they 2 3 have to be done by the fire department for 4 liability purposes and they are experienced into where the best locations are to put the 5 smoke detectors because there are dead 6 spaces where if you stuck a detector it 7 8 would be ineffective anyway, so it is very -9 and they have put up -- I did have a list, 10 and forgive me I'll try to get it for next 11 meeting, the hundreds of alarms they have 12 already installed so far so. It is a great 13 public service and they are out there every 14 day putting them in the house for you, so 15 take advantage of it if you need it.

16 The secondary restriction is that 17 landlords or commercial building owners do 18 not qualify to receive the alarms. However, 19 the tenants do qualify, so if you are living 20 in the apartment building, apartment house, 21 and you feel you are inadequately served by fire protection don't hesitate at this time 22 23 to call and request a smoke detector and to 24 receive the alarms. The city residents 25 simply need to call the fire prevention

officer, Sean Flynn, at 348-4164 and hit
option one to setup an appointment for the
installation, and this letter was written
"Respectfully," by Dave Gervasi,
administrative captain on behalf of Al
Lucas, our deputy chief on the fire
department.

8 So, please, folks take advantage of this program, you know, it only takes a 9 short while for the firefighters to install 10 11 these in your property, but you will be able 12 to sleep safe at night and the last thing they want to do is have a tragedy or someone 13 14 didn't make it out and it's not costing you 15 anything. So again, call Sean Flynn's 16 number at 348-4164, and press option one and 17 then you can leave your information and they 18 will setup an appointment when it is 19 convenient for you to have them stop by. 20 Thank you very much.

21 MS. EVANS: Thank you. And, 22 Councilman Joyce, do you have any comments 23 or motions tonight?

24 MR. JOYCE: Yes. As we all know 25 it's very important that the audit this year

1 is completed in a timely fashion. We have 2 received correspondence from Rossi & Rossi 3 that the city is to complete 32 different 4 tasks before the audit can be issued and then exit conference can be held. I won't 5 name off each task that needs to be 6 7 completed at this task, however, in Rossi & 8 Rossi's initial correspondence to the business administrator there was a timeline 9 10 that was specified that must be adhered to 11 in order to complete the audit in the timely 12 Some of these tasks were due to be manner. 13 completed on March 31.

14 With this in mind, Mrs. Krake, 15 please contact our BA Ryan McGowan asking 16 him to specify what tasks were completed by 17 Typically the Business March 31. 18 Administrator's Office also submits a cash 19 flow report to the state and city council's 20 office on a periodic basis outlining revenue 21 and expenditure categories each month. То 22 this date, we have not received any such 23 reports for the Year of 2013. I'm 24 interested in seeing what revenue categories 25 were underperforming and over performing as

well as how the city is performing in regard
 to expenditures.

Also, with this in mind, Mrs. Krake,
please add this the list of items to contact
Ryan McGowan about.

And I do have some requests. 6 7 Several West Scranton residents have voiced 8 their concern about speeding on Sloan Street 9 as well as altering vehicle traffic. 10 Residents, especially those with small 11 children, fear that the reckless driving on 12 the street will result in an accident. 13 Residents also have concerns that ATV 14 traffic is illegal and should be stopped.

Mrs. Krake, please forward this
information to Chief Graziano and ask that
he sent a patrolman to this area to monitor
the situation.

19Several West Scranton residents20living on Rundell Street have voiced their21concerns about Albert Place, which is22currently -- which is currently the court23directly behind Rundell Street. There are24various potholes located in the court in the251100, 1200 and 1300 and 1400 blocks. The

potholes that are contained throughout the
 court are making travel conditions very
 difficult for residents.

4 Mrs. Krake, please forward this to Director Dougher and ask him to handle the 5 best way that he sees fit. A portion of 6 this court may be in Taylor since it's close 7 8 in proximity to the Taylor/Scranton border. If it is part of Taylor, please instruct 9 Director Dougher to contact the Taylor DPW 10 11 for action.

West Scranton residents have voiced their concerns about potholes located in the lower portion of West Elm Street where West Elm and Meridian Avenue meet. Potholes are making travel conditions difficult and residents are becoming very frustrated.

18 Mrs. Krake, please add that to the
19 list of the issues to contact Director
20 Dougher about.

Also, various South Scranton
residents have voiced their concerns to me
about a possibly suspicious activity taking
place on the 1500 block of Prospect Avenue.
Residents have concerns that have witnessed

- possible drug deals and that the block is
 becoming a haven for crime.
- 3 Mrs. Krake, please add this to the
 4 list of issues to contact Chief Graziano
 5 about and that's all for tonight.

MS. EVANS: 6 Thank you. Good 7 evening. Recently, I received inquiries 8 from city residents regarding the 2013 The bills should be mailed out 9 garbage fee. next week and the deadline for the first 10 11 payment will be extended to May 31, 2013. 12 While the deadline for the second and final 13 payment will remain the same as in previous 14 years, July 31.

I discussed the need for increased 15 16 revenue sources during the March 2013 17 council meeting and one of the solutions 18 offered by the Doherty administration and included in the 2013 budget was increased 19 20 fees for false alarms. Between January and 21 mid-March of this year four false alarms were documented by the fire department at 22 the University of the Scranton, however, 23 24 during that same time period it seems that 25 the Scranton Fire Department was called to

respond to fire alarms at the University on 15 occasions for the following reasons:

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3 In the month of January, seven 4 calls, including activation of the automatic fire alarm system caused by making toast, 5 students set off alarm by cooking, alarm 6 7 accidently tripped by cooking. Report of 8 burned foot. Full station activation by persons unknown, several individuals stuck 9 in elevator which was stalled between 10 floors. Firefighters gained access to the 11 12 car from the floor above and removed one is 13 students via the emergency hatch located on 14 top of car. No injuries or damage. And two 15 days later again 12 people stuck in 16 elevator.

In February three alarms, including
cooking set off alarm, alarm accidently
tripped and five students extricated from
elevator through the ceiling hatch of the
elevator.

22 March 1 to 17 -- or excuse me, to 23 the 9th, five alarms including a call 24 cancelled on route, activation of fire alarm 25 system hallway detector for unknown reasons,

burned popcorn, cooking set off fire alarm,
 and finally then on March 9 parade day there
 were additional nuisance calls.

4 Certainly, like most of my colleagues and all of you, I'm not qualified 5 to determine which calls constitute a false 6 7 alarm and require a payment of fees and 8 which do not. However, fuel costs and wear 9 and tear on vehicles and equipment incurred 10 when responding to nuisance calls such as 11 burned popcorn, a beeping smoke alarm and 12 charred toast merit consideration even as 13 the city continues to be a good and faithful 14 More importantly, some must count neiahbor. 15 themselves fortunate that true fire 16 emergencies have not occurred at the same 17 time firefighters responded to nuisance 18 calls.

19We are grateful to the Scranton Fire20Department for keeping the University21students safe during any and all22circumstances for which they are called out23to duty and we hope that the good fortune of24other areas of our city will continue as our25fire department responds to the needs of our

1 colleges and universities.

Next. Chief Graziano contacted Mrs. 2 3 Krake in council's office this week to 4 respond to our concerns regarding handicap The chief indicated that all 5 parking. 6 locations on North Hyde Park Avenue was 7 that --8 MR. ROGAN: Yes, the 300 of North 9 Hyde Park. That all locations on 10 MS. EVANS: 11 that block were checked and only one among 12 them had unnecessary signage. The handicapped sign was removed and returned to 13 14 the DPW. Also, Chief Graziano stated that 15 he is in process of developing a possible 16 handicap parking program which would require 17 annual registration with the Scranton Police 18 Department and that way they would be able 19 to recycle signs as suggested. 20 Further, we learned recently that 21 there is a very long waiting list for 22 handicapped signs which should not occur.

Since the elimination of the traffic
maintenance department the DPW no longer
produces signs as once it did. At the same

time, it appears the DPW has not ordered
handicapped sign to address the needs of
those individuals who have been waiting for
quite awhile on that list.

Therefore, Mrs. Krake, please send 5 letters to the mayor and DPW Director 6 7 requesting the purchase of handicapped signs should the DPW budget not allow for this 8 purchase. City council will provide funding 9 from the UDAG RE-RE account. Provide a 10 11 response on or about before April 15 in 12 order that council may take action promptly 13 if necessarv.

14 And then finally, I have citizens' 15 requests for the week: Please include the 16 1500 block of Von Storch Avenue on the 2013 17 paving list. If for any reason the block 18 cannot be paved this year, please fill all 19 potholes. Residents report that this street 20 hasn't been paved in decades. Also, repair 21 holes in the 1300 block of St. Ann's Street, 22 and that's it.
