12	MS. EVANS: Are there any comments?
13	If not, received and filed.
14	Do we have any clerk's notes
15	tonight?
16	MS. KRAKE: No, Mrs. Evans.
17	MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mrs. Krake.
18	Do any council members have announcements at
19	this time?
20	MR. ROGAN: Yes, just one. The
21	Dante Literary Society will be having their
22	spring pasta dinner on Saturday, May 11,
23	from 4:30 to 7:00 p.m. The menu will
24	include pasta and meatballs, salad, bread
25	and cake, coffee and tea. The cost is \$11

1	for adults and \$7 for children. Takeouts
2	are available.
3	And I do know that this is one of
4	the tastiest pasta dinners in the city and
5	I'm looking forward to attending. Thank
6	you.
7	MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else?
8	MR. MCGOFF: I need to leave for a
9	moment, I left my glasses in the car. I
10	will be back.
11	MS. EVANS: Certainly. The
12	Lackawanna County Astronomical Society will
13	celebrate Astronomy Day on Saturday, May 11,
14	2013, at 7:00 p.m. at the Thomas G.
15	Cupillary Observatory. The planets Jupiter
16	and Saturn and its rings as well as star
17	clusters and galaxies will be able to seen
18	through telescopes. The program is free,
19	admission is free, and the public is invited
20	to attend.
21	Before we begin the citizens'
22	participation portion of our meeting, I wish
23	to make it clear that city council did not
24	produce any legislation regarding food
25	trucks and eating and drinking

1 establishments. Rather, all legislation was drafted by the law office and submitted to 2 3 the Office of City Council by the Doherty 4 administration. At council's request owners of restaurants, food trucks and food carts 5 are meeting with Mrs. Collins of Scranton 6 7 Tomorrow to develop a consensus and joint 8 recommendation that is fair to all. 9 Prior to the Seventh Order reading 10 and final vote on the ordinances, 11 Mrs. Collins will submit the joint 12 recommendations to city council for it's 13 consideration and possible amendments. 14 Again, the legislation that will be 15 introduced tonight in Fifth Order was 16 written by the administration and it can 17 very well be amended in the forthcoming 18 weeks. 19 Finally, we thank Mr. Charlie Newcomb, Jr., for volunteering to broadcast 20 21 tonight's meeting. And that's it. FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' 22 MS. KRAKE: PARTICIPATION. 23 24 MS. EVANS: Our first speaker

25 tonight is Les Spindler.

1	MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,
2	Council. Les Spindler, city resident and
3	homeowner and taxpayer.
4	MS. EVANS: Good evening.
5	MR. SPINDLER: I couldn't make it
6	last week, I just want to start out by
7	saying my thoughts and prayers go out to the
8	family of Mark Walsh. I know Mark most of
9	my life. He lived about a half a block away
10	from me, a block and a half away from me
11	growing up. He and his brothers and sister
12	used to come and shop in my family's grocery
13	store and it was a tragic loss. They didn't
14	make them any nicer than Mark Walsh and he
15	is going to be sorely missed. That's all I
16	have to say on that.
17	Last week in the Doherty newsletter
18	another terrible cartoon with John Coal
19	trying to embarrass Mr. Courtright. That's
20	all this guy ever does is embarrass people
21	and try to degrade them. No matter what way
22	Mr. Courtright is running the Tax Office you
23	can't argue the job he is doing. He has
24	done a fantastic job. He has brought money
25	into the city, and none of his predecessors

ever did. We've probably seen millions of
dollars coming through the city since he
took over and we don't even want to talk
about the way Ken McDowell ran it, so it's
just a joke and why don't they put something
in there about Liz Randol, like, "Oops,
where is my gun?"

8 And that's another story. The story 9 that ran about that in the newspaper was 10 totally false. She lost her gun. She 11 didn't give it to somebody to get it 12 cleaned, I know this for a fact. I heard it from a very good source, so it's more lies 13 14 by the Doherty newsletter just to spin it 15 any way they want to for somebody that they 16 support. And Mr. Courtright is doing a heck 17 of a job in the tax office. There is no 18 denying that.

19Moving on, what's the status on the20Lake Scranton road situation? Is there any21update on that?

22 MS. EVANS: Last I heard a contract 23 of sorts ws being developed between Civil 24 Crossroads, the fallback engineer, where 25 CECO rejected the project because they felt

1	they had a conflict of interest.
2	MR. SPINDLER: Right.
3	MS. EVANS: And so Civil Crossroads
4	will actually be doing various observations
5	we shall say up there. They outlined it in
6	a letter to council and then they will
7	provide the final recommendations.
8	MR. SPINDLER: In the mean time, the
9	people are still suffering with trucks going
10	back and forth; is that correct?
11	MS. EVANS: It would seem so until
12	we received the results of the engineering
13	study.
14	MR. SPINDLER: Okay. That's too
15	bad. Lastly, the food trucks. I have
16	stated here before I'm totally in favor of
17	the food trucks. I think making a limit of
18	500 feet is way too much. I think it's I
19	don't know what it should be, but it should
20	be much less than that.
21	MS. EVANS: I believe, Mr. Spindler,
22	and I'll sorry to interrupt you, the
23	legislation that I was originally given last
24	week did contain I believe a statement with
25	language for 500 feet. It's my

understanding now, and we can check it
 through tonight's legislation that that's
 been changed to 250 feet? Now, again,
 that's not set in stone.

MR. SPINDLER: I understand that. 5 6 MS. EVANS: That was, again, 7 presented to us by the administration. Ιn 8 other words, they have changed much of what 9 was in the original legislation, corrections 10 that needed to be made that were brought to 11 the attention by our solicitor and in so 12 doing they downgraded the amount of footage 13 from 500 to 250, so that's what's currently 14 before us, but it does not necessarily mean 15 that that is what will be the final product.

16 MR. SPINDLER: Okay. As I stated 17 before, I don't think there is much 18 competition for the restaurants. As I said, 19 a lot of people have half-hour lunches and 20 they go to these food trucks. They can't 21 sit in a restaurant for an hour or so, I 22 don't think they are hurting the businesses 23 and they are businesses themselves. If we 24 try to chase them out of the city what 25 message does that send to other businesses

1 looking to move into the city. I think it 2 sheds a bad light on what we are trying to 3 do here and I'm totally in favor of them. 4 And that's all I have to say tonight. Thank 5 you. MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Spindler. 6 7 Karin Foster. 8 MS. FOSTER: Good evening, Council. Karin Foster, West Scranton resident and 9 10 president of the West Scranton Hyde Park 11 Neighborhood Watch. I'm just here this 12 evening to thank you for your continued 13 support in our efforts to obtain an Elm

14Street designation and as our cooperation15agreement is before you we hope for your16continued support to pass it. Thank you.

17MS. EVANS: Absolutely. Our next18speaker is Greg Evans.

19MR. EVANS: Good evening, Council.20Greg Evans. Scranton resident and homeowner21and business owner. I'm going to be a22little more wordy than Ms. Karin Foster23because I'm very proud of our group and I24have a written statement, please.

25 Today I'm here to address you as a

1 founding board member of the West Scranton 2 Hyde Park Neighborhood Watch and I co-chair 3 the West Scranton Elm Street project. These 4 passionate volunteers, some of who are in the front row right here, of which I'm proud 5 to be part of, is unified and empowered by 6 7 one common goal, the revitalization of the 8 our neighborhood.

9 Our committed group of volunteers 10 hosts cleanups, bike patrols, community events and fundraisers. We are passionate, 11 12 we are selfless and we are part of the 13 solution. The efforts of West Scranton Hyde 14 Park Neighborhood Watch are noticeable. Ιn 15 fact, our neighbors in South Side, who are 16 also here today, some, have been doing their 17 own neighborhood watch and we cooperate 18 fully with one another. We are dedicated to 19 the safety and quality of life in our 20 neighborhoods, which brings us to Item 7-C.

21 We are in the preparation phase of 22 the West Scranton Elm Street project. We 23 have witnessed the transition of the South 24 Side through the United Neighborhood Centers 25 Elm Street project there. We wish to, mimic the efforts and success of South Side.
 Kudos to Michael Hanley, Julie Moran, Kevin
 Martinez and everybody who has been
 instrumental in their planning and
 execution.

We have met multiple challenges with 6 7 the Pennsylvania Department of Economic and 8 Community Development and we have been 9 embraced and they are prepared for us to become another one of their success stories. 10 11 We have the passion and we have the manpower 12 and we have the best interest of our 13 neighborhood at heart. With the passing of 14 Resolution 18, 2013, you are giving us 15 something we don't have, the ability to 16 financially revitalize West Scranton. You 17 are giving us the opportunity to bring 18 hundreds of thousands of dollars in state 19 grant money to improve Scranton.

20 We look forward to you supporting 21 the West Scranton Hyde Park Neighborhood 22 Watch further and excited to have the 23 financial means to continue our 24 revitalization efforts. Thank you. 25 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Our next

speaker is Doug Miller.

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2 MR. MILLER: Good evening. Doua 3 Miller, Scranton. I'd like to begin tonight 4 just with a brief follow-up to an issue I raised last week regarding the operation of 5 swimming pools throughout the city this 6 7 summer, and I had suggested that we send a letter to Mr. Dougher to try to determine 8 9 which pools will be in operation this summer and I was just wondering at this time if we 10 11 did receive any response back from 12 Mr. Dougher? 13 MS. EVANS: No, we haven't. Ι 14 didn't check my mail this evening, but 15 throughout the week that intervened no, we 16 hadn't, but I don't know if you saw the 17 article in the newspaper --18 MR. MILLER: I did. 19 MS. EVANS: -- regarding the mayor's 20 statements concerning the neighborhood pools Obviously there is a great 21 this summer. 22 hope to open them, the city has applied for 23 grants to do so, but they are not at this 24 time specifically naming which pools they 25 will be outside, of course, the Nay Aug Pool

Complex.

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MR. MILLER: Absolutely, and I, did 2 3 you know, read that article and I did take a 4 look at the mayor's comments and I'm of the understanding that we did apply for some 5 grants, but, you know, this just goes back 6 7 to the simplicity of the fact that when 8 council sends a letter to someone, you 9 shouldn't have to read about it in the paper. You know, correspondence should be 10 11 sent back to you one way or another, this 12 isn't something that should be read in the 13 paper so that's my only issue. And it's not 14 the first time we have had the problem with 15 getting responses from the department heads 16 so going forward I would hope there would be 17 more cooperation and that we are not reading 18 these things in the paper. You are on 19 council and the administration and the 20 department heads have an obligation to 21 respond back to you, not read it in the 22 paper.

I guess the main issue tonight is agendas Items D through F dealing with the legislation on the restaurants and food

1 trucks in the downtown. You know, my opinion on this is that I think that we seem 2 3 to want to make at big issues out of this. 4 I think you are dealing with two totally different venues is my belief. You are 5 dealing with brick and mortar restaurants, 6 7 and you are dealing with food trucks that both serve totally different purposes. 8

9 I've, you know, obviously had the 10 opportunity to utilize both our restaurants 11 throughout downtown and I have certainly 12 utilized the food trucks and my belief is 13 that these are only individuals who are just 14 trying to make a living just like anyone 15 else in this community, and I don't think 16 either side should be punished. I don't 17 think we should be looking at legislation 18 that does anything to harm both sides. I do 19 have a lot of respect for Scranton Tomorrow 20 and it's leader, Mrs. Collins, who stepped 21 up to the plate and was willing to sit down 22 with both sides and try to work out an 23 agreement, and as you did allude to earlier, 24 Mrs. Evans, she will be presenting council 25 with some sort of cooperative agreement that

1 hopefully we can resolve this issue.

As you did say, I think we do need 2 3 to make it clear once again that this wasn't 4 council that initiated this legislation or drafted it for that matter, this did come 5 down from the administration. I am kind of 6 7 puzzled as to why at this time we want to particularly make an issue out of this, but 8 9 just moving forward it's my hope that 10 resolution will be met cooperatively and 11 that both sides benefit.

12 You know, if both sides are 13 following the regulations that they are, you 14 know, obligated to follow I don't see why at 15 this time we should change anything or try 16 to step on anybody's toes. As I said, they 17 are just individuals trying to, you know, make a living for themselves like each and 18 19 every one of us do every day, and I do 20 appreciate those that came out tonight and 21 are going to voice their opinions on it. I 22 don't have any issue with either side.

Another issue tonight dealing with the tax office, in the paper I believe this morning there was an issue regarding the

1 solicitor and the mayor made it known that 2 he had no plans on funding the solicitor at 3 the tax office at this time as it is looking 4 to fill the vacant position. I understand the city pays half of the salary as well as 5 the Scranton School District. Well, common 6 7 sense tells you that knowing the city's current fiscal situation if it's in our -- I 8 9 do believe it's in our interest at this time 10 if we have the ability to save that money 11 then that may be a wise thing to do. Maybe 12 it's not wise to pay two solicitors if we 13 have a city solicitor who can fulfill those 14 obligations at the tax office. I don't 15 think it's, you know, I don't think the 16 additional task of handling the tax office 17 is going to be guite too burdensome on our 18 solicitor.

19That's, you know, the precedent that20has been set that the city solicitor is to21handle the tax office. I don't see why we22need to go away from that, but that leads me23to the commingling of the funds, it still24seems to be an issue down there and I know25there has been some excuses as to, you know,

lack of manpower so to speak. But, you
 know, this is certainly what's caused a lot
 of problems in the past with, you know,
 money that's gone missing and it's certainly
 causing headaches for us here.

6 You know, the appropriate thing at 7 this time would be to set up separate 8 accounts so that we can account for every 9 dime coming into the city so that we can 10 avoid the confusion and the chaos and, you 11 know, I don't think at this time we need 12 excuses, I think we should just do it. We 13 know the current situation we face and now 14 is the time to take action and make sure 15 that the money coming in is going to the 16 right places. I don't think we can just 17 assume that money going into one account we 18 could necessarily say it is going to the 19 appropriate bodies, whether it's the county, 20 the school district or the city, so we need to take action on that once and for all. 21

And back to the pools real quick, if it is an issue with opening them, as I said last week, perhaps we should get the school district involved. You know, they have an

1obligation as well to make sure the kids in2this city have a place to recreate and swim3and rather than worrying about, you know,4squandering money on building new schools5and playing politics, why don't we focus on6the kids for a change. Thank you.

7 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Our next
8 speaker is Jo Marie Yamin.

9 MS. YAMIN: Hi, Council. Thank you 10 for giving me a chance to speak. My name is 11 Jo Marie Yamin, I'm a local food vendor from 12 the City of Scranton. I have had a food 13 truck for five and a half years. I see lots 14 of familiar faces actually, and I just 15 wanted to get -- give the chance, you know, 16 to give me point of view that being able to 17 have a food truck in the city to me it made 18 we feel very proud. You know, it's given me 19 an opportunity to have my own business in 20 the city that I follow all regulations for. 21 I have always been in ordinance.

I generate -- you know, I buy all local foods so my, you know, I'm spreading my wealth. You know, I go to the farmers market, I buy my food from there. I go to Rosenstein's. I go to -- you know, it's
like I'm spreading my wealth in the city and
I think if, you know -- if basically if this
passes it's really going to be a detriment
to all of the vendors because we are really
are going to have no place to park in the
city.

8 I mean, even if goes to 250 it really limits us a lot and it just seems 9 10 ashame because, you know, we were given the 11 opportunity and it was something that was 12 offered to us and now for some reason, you 13 know, they want to take it back and, you 14 know, it just -- it doesn't seem fair and, 15 you know, it's just -- I'm so nervous, 16 sorry.

17MS. EVANS: If you don't mind me18asking, did you ever encounter any issues19with the previous ordinance, meaning that20which set the footage at 100?

21 MS. YAMIN: No.

22 MS. EVANS: That was never a 23 problem?

24 MS. YAMIN: No. Like I said, I have 25 been doing it for almost six years and I

1 have never had a problem. You know, I don't know why, you know -- they are, like, the 2 3 brick and mortar and vending carts are two 4 different businesses. They are two different businesses and both offer a lot. 5 I mean, a restaurant offers -- we all know 6 what a restaurant offers, but a food truck 7 8 also offers excitement to the city and it 9 brings life and you don't believe the things 10 I see, like, people enjoy coming. They enjoy it and it's fun and, you know, it's 11 12 part of the culture of Scranton now. 13 MS. EVANS: Now, how many months per 14 year are you operational? 15 MS. YAMIN: Oh, 24 -- I'm out all 16 Winter, summer -year long. 17 MS. EVANS: So even during the 18 winter months you brave it. 19 MS. YAMIN: I earn my living from 20 this and, you know, I would be out of a job 21 basically if, you know, if -- I will have to 22 be -- you know, find a new place to put it, 23 but I have -- I have worked hard. I started 24 and I had, you know, it was dismal at the 25 beginning, you know, but you work and you

1	build your business and it's just ashame
2	that they would want to stifle something in
3	the city and you know what I mean?
4	Scranton is a great, great city and
5	it's, you know, it has so much potential and
6	it seems like every time that a step forward
7	there is like ten steps back, you know, and
8	I'd hate to see for that to happen because I
9	think the trucks benefit the city hugely and
10	it's just you know, I enjoy my
11	profession. I love it. I love the people I
12	deal with, you know, it's a nice profession.
13	MS. EVANS: Yes.
14	MS. YAMIN: And I just wanted to
15	have a say
16	MS. EVANS: Have you yet been
17	contacted by Mrs. Collins?
18	MS. YAMIN: No, but I'm going I'm
19	going to get in contact with her.
20	MS. EVANS: Because it's very
21	important to council that the food trucks
22	and carts are represented and that the
23	discussion is not held solely with the brick
24	and mortar establishments. You know,
25	basically we want to hear from all. We like

1 all of you to discuss perhaps a compromise 2 and come to a consensus so that you are all 3 working to compliment one another rather 4 than, you know, one side trying to cancel out of the other. 5 MR. ROGAN: I would just add, I 6 7 received this from one of the other food 8 trucks. It says, "What does 500 feet really look like? 9 And it has the 100 feet and it 10 11 shows, you know, where are the areas they 12 would be banned from and then it shows five, 13 and I understand maybe right now it's at 14 250, but even if you took these circles and 15 half of them you would still almost 16 eliminate the downtown, and I think an 17 ordinance like this, as it currently stands, 18 would go against everything that's great 19 about this country in competition and free 20 markets and entrepreneurs going out like 21 yourself and coming up with a good idea and 22 having a good product and bringing it to the 23 market. 24 And I know from over the last week I

25 have had so many calls and e-mails and

1 messages on Facebook and Twitter especially 2 regarding support -- people who are 3 supporting the food trucks and there are 4 absolutely has to be a compromise made that works for everyone, but for myself if the 5 final legislation expands the 100 feet at 6 7 all I'm voting no. I don't think we can go 8 any further than that. The 100 feet already restricts a lot of the downtown area. 9

10 MS. YAMIN: Yeah, it would.

11 MR. ROGAN: And, you know, as I 12 think somebody else mentioned it earlier, to 13 me the decision would never be to go to a 14 sit down restaurant and a food truck. It's 15 a completely different experience. You 16 know, if I had an hour and I wanted to 17 discuss something with somebody that's when 18 I go to the sit down restaurant. If I'm 19 just looking to get a quick bite to eat, you 20 know, grab and go, that's, you know, when I would go to a food truck, so I'll address it 21 22 more under motions, but I just wanted to 23 mention it, and I'll make a copy of this for 24 my colleagues because it really is -- it 25 really shows, you know, what the 500 feet

1	would do.
2	MS. YAMIN: I think I have seen the
3	picture, yeah.
4	MR. ROGAN: It really showed
5	MS. YAMIN: How it pushes
6	MR. ROGAN: The food trucks out of
7	downtown.
8	MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Evans, this is
9	from Leslie Collins from Scranton Tomorrow
10	that there is a meeting for food vendors, as
11	she refers to the mobile food, on Tuesday,
12	the 7th. She does not have a time or a
13	place listed on the e-mail.
14	MS. EVANS: If she needs it she can
15	certainly use council chambers.
16	MR. MCGOFF: I'm not sure where they
17	were looking at it. She was talking about,
18	in fact, talking about the possibility of
19	either Lackawanna College or Tripp House,
20	where the offices of Scranton Tomorrow are,
21	but I will pass that along to her, but I
22	would suggest that you contact Scranton
23	Tomorrow for the exact time and place, but
24	there is she does have a meeting set for
25	food vendors only and that's going to be

1 followed on the 9th by a meeting with both the brick and mortar and the food vendors 2 3 collectively so there are two meetings being 4 setup with Scranton Tomorrow so that this issue can be discussed. 5 MS. YAMIN: Well, thank you. 6 7 MS. EVANS: You are welcome. And 8 just to, you know, quickly address I think 9 what you touched on initially, again, the 10 legislation was produced by the 11 administration so I can only assume that the 12 administration may have been contacted by 13 brick and mortar establishments who have 14 complaints. But, you know, on the other 15 hand. I think it's also notable that we 16 remember that when the city badly needed 17 commuter tax, the business community opposed 18 it. When the city needs to raise revenue 19 through a parking meter system, again, the 20 business community opposes it and, you know, 21 then really just like yourself out of the 22 blue we get legislation involving the 23 business community and the food vendors, so 24 I certainly don't want to see a case where 25 someone, one side is favored over another to

1	the detriment of the other.
2	MS. YAMIN: Yes.
3	MS. EVANS: And hopefully we can
4	come to a resolution that's going to be
5	satisfactory and productive for everyone
6	because, you know, as I have said before and
7	my colleagues have voiced as well, we
8	welcome all business to the City of
9	Scranton. It is not our purpose to put up
10	obstacles for anyone to would like to come
11	here and do business.
12	MS. YAMIN: Thank you.
13	MS. EVANS: Thank you very much.
14	Our next speaker is Dave Dobrzyn.
15	MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.
16	Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton and taxes
17	paid. Dog license. Garbage fees paid. I'm
18	all paid. Okay, now in the news there has
19	been a lot of and some candidates have
20	mentioned it about Harrisburg straightening
21	out some of our tax problems and I would
22	warn you to be leery of that because I don't
23	really believe in them. I don't believe in
24	our governor, I don't believe in our state
25	legislature at this time, and I think that

they just turn around to be dumping on the
small guy and have them pay everyone else's
bills all the more.

4 And on 5-H, we have a request for a review and I would also press for 5 compensation principals in these 6 organizations. I have spoken to a few 7 8 people and certain nonprofits are not --9 they compensate their elites very highly. Ι have heard of now hundreds of thousands of 10 dollars worth of bonuses and so forth coming 11 12 out and it's really a profitable nonprofit.

13 A recent drug rehab that was 14 supposed to be a nonprofit not in our town, 15 by the way, \$2.4 million to the executive of 16 the CEO of the company so, I mean, that's a 17 lot of money, \$800,000 a year over three 18 years, and also I would like to mention that 19 it is an IRS requirement no political 20 involvement and I'm very tired of seeing 21 religious nonprofits coming out with their doctrines and trying to push the main 22 23 political arena. It's wrong. If you 24 believe in something and you abide by it 25 that's fine, but nobody is saying that

1	murder should be legalized so, you know,
2	like, if they are against hormonal
3	contraception or something too bad. That
4	type of involvement has to be stopped. It
5	really has to be stopped. We can't have it.
6	I have a question now, the tax
7	office when we had our \$12 million debacle,
8	and I'm asking the most senior member of
9	council, who was the solicitor?
10	MS. EVANS: The solicitor for the
11	tax office?
12	MR. DOBRZYN: Yes.
13	MS. EVANS: I believe Mr was it
14	when it was discovered you mean?
15	MR. DOBRZYN: Before it was
16	discovered when it went on?
17	MS. EVANS: That would have been
18	under Mrs. Vitale.
19	MR. DOBRZYN: Mr. McDowell.
20	MS. EVANS: Well, Mr. McDowell
21	the incident itself and the missing \$12
22	million occurred during his tenure as tax
23	collector and I believe his solicitor was
24	Attorney Rinaldi. It was not discovered
25	until Mrs. Vitale

1	MR. DOBRZYN: Right.
2	MS. EVANS: took office and her
3	solicitor was
4	MR. MCGOFF: John McGovern.
5	MS. EVANS: McGovern. I was going
6	to say MacGregor.
7	MR. DOBRZYN: But it was independent
8	of city hall.
9	MS. EVANS: Yes.
10	MR. DOBRZYN: That's what I'm
11	saying. That's all that I'd like to or
12	wanted to bring out. I really think there
13	could be a conflict of the interest there as
14	there was with the Parking Authority and so
15	forth with that's being pushed right now.
16	I'd rather see the tax office have their own
17	solicitor and hopefully somebody competent
18	will be hired.
19	Now, I'd like to, after the primary
20	especially, anybody that's a candidate for
21	office should attend these meetings,
22	especially for council, and try to get up to
23	speed. I do see some people do attend and
24	they should get in here and listen and
25	figure out what they want to do because it's

always easy to say you could do a better job
down the line, but if you don't know what
the job entails then, well, how do you do a
better job?

And okay, a few weeks ago I 5 mentioned, this is the golden parrot, dual 6 7 tracking by banks. People request the 8 modification on their loan and a lot of them 9 are military people, they were compensated 10 at \$125,000 if their home was unreasonably 11 foreclosed, and today on the news some of 12 these people are getting \$300, nonmilitary 13 people and what dual tracking is, I don't 14 feel I explained it at that time, it's when 15 you request a modification of your loan and 16 then the bank sidelines and starts 17 proceeding to confiscate your house and foreclose on it, and now these people have 18 19 considerable amount of money in their house 20 and so forth and they have gotten \$300 21 compensation under Mr. Demarco who has done 22 absolutely nothing in the Housing Authority, HUD, under HUD, to help these people. 23

And once again, our Congress is in the news, I have a suggestion, why don't we

1 put the air traffic controllers only for 2 incoming flights in DC and they can keep 3 their cute little dity boxes in Washington 4 and do their jobs for a change. Thanks a 5 lot and bawk, bawk, bawk. MS. EVANS: Thank you. 6 Is there anyone else who would like to address 7 8 council? 9 MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia. 10 Citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I 11 see we are back with the library again under 12 your "B" authorizing the mayor and other 13 appropriate officials to enter to a 14 subguarantee agreement. Who owns the 15 library? 16 MS. EVANS: Well, the title for the deed to the library is in possession of the 17 18 Library Authority. 19 MR. SBARAGLIA: Why aren't they 20 mentioning any kind of a subguarantee? Why 21 is the people of Scranton listed as a 22 subguarantee instead of the people who 23 actually own the library? 24 MS. EVANS: The people of the city 25 are not financially responsible for these

repairs. It's a grant that was applied for
in order to make very necessary repairs to
the Albright and basically the city is just
acting as a facilitator, if you will, so
there is no financial responsibility placed
on the Scranton taxpayers regarding this
grant.

8 MR. SBARAGLIA: There is a little 9 notation saying that the Commonwealth could 10 Now, should we be sued by the sue us. 11 Commonwealth even though there is some 12 jargon in there, does the Scranton 13 Authority -- Scranton Library Authority have 14 \$500 million to pay off that should it I don't want to see us in the same 15 happen? 16 deal with the county with their bus terminal 17 that they ended up paying a \$1 1/2 back. Ιn 18 other words, unless we have control over the 19 repairs and make sure they are done 20 according to the stipulations we are liable. 21 Somewhere along the line we could be sued 22 whether we have to pay or not it doesn't 23 really matter because we have to answer a 24 lawsuit and that costs money.

25 You find some of those notations in

1there. It's not too far in there where it2says that. It's not important just so you3look into it and get the right jargon even4though they say there is some legal5stipulations in there, but it said you could6be.

7 MS. EVANS: If I may, I can read you 8 a portion of the letter sent to council from 9 Mr. Jack Finnerty, the director of the 10 Scranton Public Library that was received 11 just today. "As you know, the grant was 12 approved and we have will receive the 13 highest award possible \$500,000. Thee funds 14 will assist with exterior masonry repairs 15 estimated to cost \$1.2 million and requiring 16 18 months to complete.

17 While the library has the necessary 18 funds to match the Keystone grant award, I 19 am concerned by the very tight time table 20 for completing the project. All work must 21 be done by the Fall of 2014, and though this 22 seems reasonably distant the work required 23 is significant labor intensive and weather 24 limited so time is of the essence.

It is in this vein that I

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respectfully request that city council do
whatever it can to expedite the process.
Specifically, I am requesting that the
necessary legislation be passed in two weeks
rather than the three weeks normally
required."

7 And that is certainly something that 8 council will take into consideration for its 9 meeting, but again, the letter stating that 10 the library has the necessary matching funds 11 and they want to begin the project ASAP so 12 that they will comply with the terms of the 13 grant and the completion date that's been 14 set.

15 MR. SBARAGLIA: How do we -- why are 16 we a subguarantee? Why do we need to be a 17 subguarantee? We are we the subguarantee at 18 all? We are guaranteeing that loan. In 19 there the stipulations that came from them 20 people. Read the actual ones in the 21 legislation.

22 MS. EVANS: Well, it was most likely 23 a requirement of the state government during 24 the application process.

25 MR. SBARAGLIA: Maybe it is, but we

do not own the library. The deed is not 1 with the city. I wish they would return the 2 3 deed and retire that Authority like you 4 requested because I don't know they say what they say, but you have no way of knowing. I 5 didn't see any of you go down there and say, 6 7 "Let me see the data on this. Let me see 8 the money that's there."

All you are doing is taking what 9 10 they said, and I don't believe anybody 11 anymore. I seen what the Parking Authority 12 did and you can't be really carefree about 13 anything. Nobody doesn't get the library 14 has to saved. I believe that's one of the 15 of best buildings in the whole city is that 16 library. If we had to pay \$1 million I 17 would say we would raise taxes to do it, but 18 it would be the City of Scranton doing it, not the Authority. I don't trust 19 20 authorities. I really don't. I have no faith in them and you shouldn't put any 21 22 faith in them either. You should make sure 23 that everything that is on dotted on the 24 line. If it is perfectly there and even 25 though the state said they couldn't sue us,

that they have an insurance to protect the
city in case they do sue us. That's how you
can ask with these things. And as far as
the mayor goes I don't trust anything he
does either. And we found out that many,
many times over.

7 I mean, that's a crime, selling food 8 to the people in the office buildings that 9 they have to stay away 300 or 500 feet which is over what is that a football and a half. 10 11 A stadium is over 100 some yards. I mean, however could you trust anything he sends 12 13 down. I wouldn't? I would check everything 14 and everything he does, everything he ever 15 says or everything he can do. You know I 16 didn't approve that authority in the very 17 beginning. That was passed in the closing 18 days so you couldn't get in there and stop 19 it and we all know who was on the board when 20 that was done. They gave away our library 21 forever, so I can't forgive them anything 22 that comes up and I'm very particular on it 23 because I believe of anything in the city 24 that is it probably one of the best things. 25 It's better than city hall. Actually, I

would rather see them city hall down than 1 2 tear the library down and I think a lot of 3 people in the city feel that way, too. 4 I'm not going to get into a lot of things on it anyway, people are here for 5 their jobs and so forth and all, but just 6 7 remember during the summer people in them 8 office buildings like to get a hot dog or 9 whatever, sit at the courthouse and listen 10 to the band concert and that's basically 11 where a lot of the activity goes to them 12 food vendors. Thank you. 13 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 14 MR. HUGHES: Madam president, if I 15 could? 16 MS. EVANS: Yes. 17 MR. HUGHES: On the comments on, I 18 don't know what item it is, it's the first 19 time I have seen it tonight, I think it's 20 5-A Mr. Sbaraglia was commenting on, this is 21 a typical subgrant agreement. The City of 22 Scranton gets the funds from the state and 23 then in turn makes that grant available to 24 another recipient either to an Authority or 25 in this case the Scranton Public Library.

1 What it says is that there is indemnification in here, I believe it's in 2 3 Article 5, that in the event there is an 4 audit and the funds aren't properly spent the state would come back against the city. 5 However, the library indemnifies the city, 6 it's up to the library to defend that action 7 8 with the state as to how the funds they 9 would say they were properly spent. That's what it is. It's not as 10

though the city is guaranteeing that. The
city as the grantee is responsible to see
that the funds are properly spent in
accordance with the grant agreement which is
then put onto the library.

16 However, in looking at this, I think 17 it should be clarified by the law department 18 why they have the Scranton Public Library. 19 There is no other mention of the who it is. 20 Is it a nonprofit corporation? It just says 21 Scranton Public Library. When the Albright 22 Trust -- when the Albrights created the 23 trust for the Scranton Public Library there 24 was I believe it was nine trustees that were 25 appointed by the -- some by the city and I

1 think some by the Court. It's been a long time since I saw that document, it's been 2 3 years, but I think it should be 4 definitely -- it should definitely be clarified as to who we are entering into of 5 the contract with, not just the Scranton 6 7 Public Library. I don't know if there is 8 such a thing. 9 There is the Scranton Public Library

10 Authority I believe that owns the building, 11 however, they just own the building and I 12 believe that this grant it's going to go 13 into the building, they should be the 14 guarantor, I mean, at least on the indemnification. and also there is still the 15 16 board of trustees, I believe, that has 17 fundraisers that gets monies and operates 18 the library independent the ownership of the 19 library.

20 So I believe that -- not I believe, 21 it's my recommendation that council should 22 have the solicitor's department clarify who 23 is going to execute this agreement. I 24 believe it should be both of them. Scranton 25 Public Library Authority, if that's the

1 proper name of it, since they own the 2 building and the improvements are going to 3 go into it and also if it's the Board of 4 Trustees or it's another nonprofit corporation that actually operates the 5 library, I'm not familiar with that, but 6 7 they should be the ones that should be 8 indemnifying the city. 9 MS. EVANS: Okay. 10 MR. HUGHES: And not just the 11 Scranton Public Library. Ordinarily, it 12 would say a nonprofit corporation, a 13 Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation, and I 14 didn't see who is going to sign this, but --15 MS. EVANS: And this is why, 16 Solicitor Hughes, you should be writing the 17 legislation. 18 MR. HUGHES: Well, it's just says 19 that the Public Library and John R. 20 Finnerty, library director, but I think 21 that, you know, that should be clarified. 22 Okay. And, Mrs. Krake, MS. EVANS: 23 if you could get that out in the morning, 24 please, to Mayor Doherty and the law office 25 so that we have these corrections made.

Thank you, Solicitor Hughes. 1 2 Is there anyone else who cares to 3 address council? 4 MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council. MS. EVANS: Good evening. 5 MR. MORGAN: Lee Morgan. In regards 6 7 to the city pools, awhile back the 8 Scranton/Lackawanna Taxpayers and Citizens' 9 Association wanted to get involved in, you 10 know, bringing the city and the school board 11 together and, of course, the mayor to try 12 and open these pools with some volunteers who might be willing to do the repairs to 13 14 the pools, but it's my understanding these 15 city pools need liners. I don't know if 16 that's correct. I mean, somebody would have 17 to really research that, but that's my 18 understanding that they leak an awful lot of 19 water, that's what I've been told. 20 The other thing is, you know, there 21 has been some discussion here today about 22 the tax office and in my own opinion, which 23 is probably separate from other people may 24 believe, I think that the city solicitor

should do it because I think he should

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1 protect the city's revenues and I think he 2 would be the most qualified attorney for 3 that office and I'm not interested in any 4 argument that the tax collector may have 5 because in a community that is distressed as 6 ours is, I mean, maybe it's time to start 7 following the law instead of going off on a 8 tangent and then wondering later on how we 9 are going to contain everything, because if I'm correct awhile back the FBI came in 10 11 there I think and investigated that office 12 if I'm not you know, and I think they said 13 incompetent wasn't prosecutable, but my 14 point is, you know, once they make mistakes 15 and the revenue is lost or commingled or 16 misplaced what do you say to a city that's 17 starved for revenue that can't wait until a 18 month from now to figure what they are owed and not owed? 19

And I always was under the understand that when you run for an office whether it be the magistrate or the tax collector or anything else that the Commonwealth will educate you on it and give you classes so that you can run those

1 departments and be, you know, knowledgeable. So I'm a little concerned, but the question 2 3 I have today, well, two of them. I would 4 ask if the city is going to move forward with anything for Mr. Walsh in recognition 5 of the him? I don't know where that stands 6 7 or if anything is even really been 8 accomplished in regards to that; and the 9 other thing I would like to ask Mr. Joyce, 10 if I could, is where is the city's recovery 11 plan at and what's been realized and what 12 hasn't and do you see a shortfall in revenue 13 this year?

14 MR. JOYCE: Well, right now because 15 of the commuter tax there should be a 16 shortfall, obviously, because we are not 17 going to receive that \$2.5 million in 18 revenue. I have spoke with the administration about the shortfall that's 19 20 projected and ways that that shortfall could 21 be made up. They have brought up some ideas forth, such as the advanced sale of 22 23 delinguent real estate taxes to cover the 24 shortfall for this year as a possible option 25 and they are also discussing other options

as well.

2	MR. MORGAN: Um-hum. Okay. Well, I
3	don't have a copy of that with me today, but
4	I thought we were relying on other things to
5	happen too because besides that, but, you
6	know, I just would like to say that, you
7	know, we definitely have to find some
8	solutions to our problems and I do hope that
9	the pools open this summer, you know.
10	Appreciate your time.
11	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there
12	anyone else?
13	MS. CHILIPKO: Good evening,
14	Council. Mary Chilipko, resident in the
15	City of Scranton.
16	MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.
17	MS. CHILIPKO: First of all in my
18	remarks I would like to commend the members,
19	all of the members of the crime watches, the
20	neighborhood groups, and all of their
21	efforts and how tirelessly they are all
22	working for the betterment of the city.
23	MS. EVAN: And that includes you as
24	well.
25	MS. CHILIPKO: Well, I have been

1 around awhile and it's the first time, maybe the first time that I haven't seen politics 2 3 as the first item on the agenda for the 4 neighborhood groups. It seems a lot of groups now have left egos at the door and 5 are truly working for the betterment of this 6 city. I wish I could say that for some of 7 8 the city officials. It's ashame.

9 Pinebrook will be having -- before I 10 get into that, Pinebook will be having a 11 cleanup this Saturday, May 4. We will meet 12 at 829 Capouse Avenue and any help would be 13 appreciated by anyone.

14And there again we go back to --15MR. LOSCOMBE: What time does that16start?

17 MS. CHILIPKO: Oh, 9:00, Jack, I'm 18 Going back to city officials, we sorry. 19 have all been slapped in the face by Mark 20 Seitzinger, I just want you to know that. 21 It was an insult to the neighborhood, it was an insult to city council and a farce by the 22 23 mayor and Mr. Seitzinger the inspection of 24 the rooming houses in my neighborhood. The 25 neighbors were out there, there was not a

1 health inspector, there was a gentleman who 2 spoke with the neighbors and expressed some 3 of the same concerns we did, and said the 4 smell of cat urine when you went in the building was -- you know, almost drove him 5 out, but that wasn't his -- and it was 6 understandable, you know, it wasn't his area 7 8 of expertise. I don't know, I think that 9 would be a health inspector, but if any of 10 you are were there or saw what transpired it 11 was disgusting.

12 So I don't know do we pursue it? Do 13 we ask for more complete inspections? There 14 have been, as I know of, there have not been 15 fire inspections, fire inspectors were not 16 at these buildings and you are talking about 17 in the two buildings next to my neighborhood 18 home 40 rooms. 24 in the Melba and 16 in 19 the building behind it, and that's 40 rooms 20 which can allow two tenants per room, that's 21 80 tenants, possibility for 80 tenants. Ι 22 think it's a disgrace.

23 MS. EVANS: Oh, it is. And since I 24 received a copy of your e-mail I again asked 25 Mr. Seitzinger, I tried to pin him down to

1	when it's going to be inspected by each
2	individual that is required, etcetera, all
3	of your concerns. I have still heard
4	nothing.
5	So, Mrs. Krake, I don't know if this
6	is actually going to work, but we have
7	nothing to lose by trying
8	MS. CHILIPKO: It won't.
9	MS. EVANS: If we could try to have
10	Mr. Seitzinger and maybe a fire inspector
11	come to a public caucus, and if you would
12	like to participate, also?
13	MS. CHILIPKO: I have been at
14	meeting with Mr. Seitzinger, we sat there,
15	Councilman Rogan was there as well, for two
16	and a half hours and it was pointless. It
17	was all nonsense and nothing was
18	accomplished as a result of that.
19	Councilman Rogan was there.
20	MS. EVANS: Maybe if we have the
21	we could arrange to have the stenographer
22	there and the television and we get it on
23	record the statements that are being made
24	MS. CHILIPKO: I would suggest
25	I'm sorry, Mrs. Evans, I would suggest a

1	health inspector as well.
2	MS. EVANS: Okay.
3	MS. CHILIPKO: I think it was a
4	building or mechanical was there. They used
5	to come in a group now everybody is too busy
6	or doing something else or I don't know
7	where they are.
8	MS. EVANS: Well, let's try to bring
9	them all to table publically and get to the
10	bottom of this.
11	MS. CHILIPKO: As far as the pools,
12	I did read the article, I would like to see
13	Capouse Avenue some day reopened, but it's
14	in such disrepair I don't know if that's
15	possible. Last time I spoke to the mayor a
16	year or so ago he said it would probably be
17	bulldozed and made into a park. There we
18	have it.
19	As far as the food trucks, I think
20	we should just leave them alone. I watch
21	this lady come up here tonight I don't I
22	never saw anybody so happy with their job in
23	Scranton. I think I'll be down there
24	tomorrow. I will. Some of it I think is
25	motivated by greed with the brick and mortar

1 and it's only my own opinion, I'm not that is a tune to other people in their issue, 2 3 and I believe that a lot of people in some 4 of those restaurants were given some free rides along the way by the administration, 5 and it's only my opinion, but I suggest to 6 that lady you still your ground. Stand your 7 8 ground and there are people that will stand 9 behind you. Look at the neighbors here, 10 look at your neighbors, and the people that 11 have finally -- and myself included, decided 12 to stand up for what we think is right. 13 Thank you, Council. 14 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there 15 anyone else? 16 MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, 17 Scranton City Council. Bill Jackowitz, 18 South Scranton resident. Last week after 19 listening to the explanation about the I 20 guess the meters being removed on Mulberry 21 Street and the University of Scranton being 22 allowed to park on the street basically for not using the -- you know, not using any 23 24 meters the people who asked the questions 25 were not satisfied with the answers. Ιt

1 sounded like some deals were made somewhere 2 along the line and we are always fighting 3 with the University, but it seems like we 4 are always giving the University breaks. So again, you know, there is a lot of people 5 that are upset over this and I'm just a 6 7 messenger and I'm just letting you know 8 that.

9 Now, as far as combining the Supreme
10 Court payout with the retirement and
11 healthcare loan payout, is that going to
12 save the taxpayers any money?

MR. JOYCE: Well, there was money
saved, the original Supreme Court payout was
to be --

16 MR. JACKOWITZ: Well, you know, with 17 the firefighters, right, but I'm just saying 18 combining them now would that save the 19 taxpayers money or would it still be \$22.5e 20 million that we have to borrow, that's my 21 question?

22 MR. JOYCE: It would still be \$22.5 23 million.

24 MR. JACKOWITZ: Now, there will 25 probably be another tax increase this year

and the five members of council right now
 will probably have to be approving that, I
 hope it's a small one and I hope it's the
 last one.

When is Scranton elected officials 5 proposed renegotiation of city contracts? 6 7 Because, like I said last week, we are 8 paying over a million dollars biweekly in payroll and we can't afford that. It's not 9 sustainable, it's not affordable so are we 10 11 going to do anything about this? I mean, 12 there is eight more months left in this year 13 before we have a new mayor and we have a new 14 Scranton City Council president, so are we 15 going to do something about this? We can't 16 afford it.

MS. EVANS: City council does not
have the authority to engage in
negotiations.

20 MR. JACKOWITZ: I didn't say --21 MS. EVANS: That's has to --22 MR. JACKOWITZ: I hope my time is 23 not being used.

24 MS. EVANS: That has to come from 25 the mayor.

1 MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, I hope my time 2 is not being used. I understand that, 3 Mrs. Evans, I understand that very clearly, 4 but I also understand that you are an elected official. City council are elected 5 officials and I understand you have an open 6 7 door policy with the mayor, so we should be 8 in negotiations on a daily basis if need be 9 working on these problems because the city 10 is in dire financial straights. Do we agree 11 on that or do we disagree? 12 MS. EVANS: I agree, but I believe 13 that your message needs to be sent to the 14 mayor. 15 MR. JACKOWITZ: It has been over and 16 over and over again, okay, but also, council 17 are elected officials. I understand you're 18 a legislative body, but you are elected 19 officials and we were told that if the 20 supermajority was elected things were going 21 to change. Things haven't changed for the 22 better, things have changed for the worse. 23 That's all I'm trying to say. 24 MS. EVANS: Well, actually, if you 25 didn't have this supermajority sitting here

1	right now you would have had 124 percent tax
2	increase instead of 22 percent, so believe
3	me, it's a very good thing that the
4	supermajority sat here.
5	MR. JACKOWITZ: Well, that's your
6	opinion, but there is a lot of there is a
7	lot of citizens and residents that don't
8	agree with that.
9	MS. EVANS: Well, that's probably
10	because
11	MR. JACKOWITZ: You know, I don't
12	come here to argue with you, Mrs. Evans. I
13	hope you are not using my time. Go right
14	ahead.
15	MS. EVANS: No, no, I'm not using
16	your time. You have always been given more
17	than ample time.
18	MR. JACKOWITZ: Go ahead. Take all
19	the time you need then.
20	MS. EVANS: No, but I think the
21	point is that most people misunderstand
22	completely what's going on here that and
23	you should know because you have been here
24	as well as I have been here, you know where
25	all of the trouble came from, just like I

know.

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MR. JACKOWITZ: I understand it came 2 from McGoff --3 4 MS. EVANS: It's not a matter of --MR. JACKOWITZ: -- Gatelli and 5 Fanucci, that's where it came from. 6 7 MS. EVANS: No, I'm not going to 8 point fingers, I'm just going to say that the administration borrowed and borrowed and 9 borrowed more money than has ever been done 10 11 in the history of the City of Scranton and 12 that was prior to 2012 and despite my best 13 efforts it did not stop. It never stopped 14 until these people came on board. 15 Now, the newspaper and even people

16 running for office like to attribute all of 17 these problems to a lack of communication or 18 animosity between council and the mayor and 19 nothing, believe me, nothing is further from 20 the truth. Oh, that it were that simplistic 21 then we could believe new people are going 22 to come in and save the day. That's not the 23 problem, and I think anyone running for 24 office needs to look at the history of the 25 Doherty administration, see what's really

happening, see what happened when there was
communication and, you know, working
together when a city was about to fall over
the fiscal cliff into bankruptcy. Everyone
worked together, everyone found a middle
ground.

7 So, you know, I think it's -- I 8 think, you know, everyone has a right to his 9 own opinion, certainly you do, I do, 10 everyone here does, but no one has a right 11 to their own version of the truth. The 12 truth is what it is.

13 MR. JACKOWITZ: Yeah, but the truth 14 of the matter is that the recovery plan was 15 a failure and did not work because nothing 16 there -- it was all vision and nothing was 17 set in stone there, it was all visions and 18 some commuter tax and so on and so forth. 19 The majority of the people realized that 20 that wasn't going to work, but it was 21 approved anyway. But the point that most 22 people are asking and what I'm asking is when is this going to be resolved? 23

You know, like I said, eventually we
are going to have a new city council next

1 year, we are going to have a new mayor next year. You know, nobody wants to hear the 2 3 word bankruptcy, but right now if we don't 4 solve our problems, if we don't get the loan and we don't get the money that we need 5 there are no other options available. All 6 7 the other options have been averted and 8 people are worried, okay?

9 People are losing their jobs. 10 People are -- their paychecks are getting 11 smaller, but yet taxes continue to go up, 12 and it's not only the city government that's raising taxes, it's the state government, 13 14 it's the federal government and it's 15 everybody else. Now, the water company is 16 getting ready to hit us with another raise. 17 The people cannot afford this. They are 18 looking for solutions, they are looking for 19 resolutions to our problems.

20 Words are nothing but words. They 21 are nothing but thoughts. They don't mean 22 anything until they are placed into action 23 and so far the action has not resolved 24 Scranton city problems. Now, my opinion is 25 the problem we have is our payroll is too

1 high. That's all I'm asking, are we going to do something about our payroll? 2 I 3 understand there is union contracts and 4 negotiations would have to be made, I'm saying we need to start those negotiations 5 now. Not waiting eight months from now when 6 7 we have a new mayor and we have a new city 8 council. We need to start working on these 9 problems now because the debt is going 10 higher and higher and higher.

11 Now, as far as I know, we still 12 haven't gotten a commitment for this loan, 13 okay? I'm not privy to all of the 14 information, but I am being told that we 15 still don't have the money coming to us. We 16 might not get this money, what's going to 17 happen then if that does happen? Come 30 18 June, come 30 October, if we don't have the 19 money what happens? How do we get out of 20 this problem? How do we get out of this 21 mess? We rely -- we have seven elected 22 officials in this city, we rely upon those 23 seven elected officials. They campaigned, 24 they took our campaign contributions and 25 they asked us to vote for them and they said 1they were going to get us out of this mess.2We are still in the mess. When are we going3to get out of this mess? It's been 21 years4and people are upset. I'm not the only one.5For some reason come to me because they know6I'll come here and I'll come and I'll7express their opinion for them.

8 But you know what, that's all I'm 9 asking. When are we going to get some help?

10 MS. EVANS: Just a quick response to 11 that, problems, as I said, didn't occur This is more than a decade of 12 overnight. 13 issues that became more and more and more 14 swollen until the financial house of cards collapsed and you are not going to see, as 15 16 much as you want and I want, you are not 17 going to see a full solution this year 18 because it's going to be take years to 19 address all of the damage that has been done 20 and get the city back on firm sound 21 financial footing. It's not going to happen 22 overnight and it's not going to be completed 23 this year. This will go on well through the 24 next four years and likely many beyond that.

So there are no quick, easy simple

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1 fixes here. It's been very difficult and 2 everyone has been working to do the best 3 thing for the people of this city and that 4 means protecting you from the massive, massive tax increases, doing everything we 5 can to make sure that you receive your 6 7 services and that you are not choked by tax 8 increases.

9 And on that note, I'll ask to hear 10 anymore speakers.

11 MR. JOYCE: Just a comment a little 12 bit further on that, PEL made it guite clear 13 to me the last time I spoke to them, Gerry 14 Cross, executive director for PEL said the 15 City of Scranton could get out of distressed 16 status right now if it wants to, just 17 increase taxes by 150 percent. We are 18 trying to offset that with alternative 19 revenue sources such as a commuter tax, such 20 as looking for increased payments in lieu of 21 taxes from our nonprofits, such as pushing 22 for legislation through the state that would 23 help us be able to go after some of the 24 nonprofits institutions for some form of the 25 payment.

1 What we really need and what this 2 city really needs is state assistance. The 3 Local Tax Enabling Act that was put together 4 in I believe it was 1960 or '64, I'm sure what year, basically dictates what we can do 5 and what we can't do. I believe that the 6 7 residents of Scranton are overtaxed and 8 that's a large problem because the outlying areas are taxed at a far less rate than the 9 residents in the City of Scranton are. 10 Now, and it's not like Scranton is 11 12 in a major hub like New York City or 13 Philadelphia where it provides a great 14 convenience if you work in the city to live 15 in the city. Most people that live in 16 Taylor and Dunmore, Dickson City, Old Forge 17 or Throop can commute to the city within ten 18 minutes to 15 minutes, but the problem lies 19 within the way that city government is set 20 up and the way the state government is 21 functioning. We need their help. We need 22 their assistance. We need our state 23 senators and state reps to fight for us in 24 Harrisburg and I believe that bringing them 25 in was one of the first steps towards that

fight, but without their help and without
changes to state laws it will be very
limited as far as what the City of Scranton
will be able to do outside of the property
tax increases.

Thank you, Mr. Joyce, 6 MS. EVANS: 7 and if I might just quickly add, besides the 8 more than one public caucus we had with our state elected officials, I had many meetings 9 with them in council's office and they are 10 11 well aware of our problems, they agree we have many problems, but no one is willing to 12 13 step up to the plate and help. No one has 14 done anything and no one has committed to 15 doing anything and the only reason I am 16 saying this is because people that are going 17 to be leading the city into the future they 18 have to be aware this. This is all their 19 responsibility. They have to make choices 20 and decision because I frankly don't see the 21 State of the Pennsylvania riding to the 22 rescue of Scranton any time soon.

23 So the responsibility, the good, the 24 bad and the ugly of it falls on those who 25 want to lead the city.

1	Is there anyone else?
2	MR. FINNERTY: How are you, Council?
3	My name is Pat Finnerty, I'm a Scrantonian,
4	believe it or not.
5	MS. EVANS: From Scranton High
6	School?
7	MS. FINNERTY: Indeed. I remember
8	you, Mrs. Evans.
9	MS. EVANS: And I remember you.
10	MR. FINNERTY: I'm still tall.
11	MS. EVANS: Yes, you are. Were you
12	in Chloe's class?
13	MR. FINNERTY: I was. And how is
14	she doing by the way?
15	MS. EVANS: I haven't seen you in a
16	long time.
17	MR. FINNERTY: It's been a long
18	time. This is my first time in the
19	chambers.
20	MS. EVANS: Welcome.
21	MR. FINNERTY: Yeah. I have been a
22	long time follower of the program, as I call
23	it watching. I mean no disrespect to you
24	guys. You have a tough gig and I'm going to
25	follow up with what was just said with

something a little lighter, but I was moved
 to come here tonight and by moved I mean not
 moved.

4 About six months ago I bought a stopwatch at Dick's Sporting Goods for like 5 \$17 bucks and I bought it to time the 6 streetlights of Scranton because I was 7 8 amazed at how long they were. And as you 9 just said, you were referring to Scranton 10 not being a hub such as New York or 11 Philadelphia, and me being a borderline 12 young adult as I am, borderline young adult 13 and choosing to live here as I do, and I'm 14 involved in the arts which isn't very easy, 15 we are not Nashville, we're not Austin, 16 we're not New York, but we are trying.

17 It is a struggle for me to see when 18 I'm on the corner of Wyoming and Greenridge 19 I'm waiting 58 seconds, so I timed that and 20 I started it as a kind of a joke, but then I 21 realized that is it something I kind of want 22 to get into. 58 seconds for Wyoming and 23 Greenridge. You guys with me on that one? 24 58 seconds, which doesn't seem like that 25 long, but it actually is.

1 So then I did this as joke and my 2 friends were laughing at me and everything 3 like that and then the week after I bought 4 this stopwatch the article came in that the new lights were coming in and they were 5 getting synced so I was like -- I was a 6 7 little upset by that because I was finally 8 going to do something and just have a little bit of a joke I guess, but even though 9 10 something I believe in, and now that the new 11 lights are here they are longer and they 12 don't run from green into green into green.

I timed the light that's at Adams
and Linden and it's a minute and 40 seconds
when you're on Adams. That's a long time a
minute and 40.

17 So here's my solution, I don't know 18 what you guys are going to do about 19 everything you were just talking about, you 20 guys will figure it out, and you going to hear about it, you guys are just going to 21 22 keeping talking about it, you're going to 23 hear about it, but you'll figure it out, but 24 what I'm here to say is that maybe what we 25 do here have it not the attraction that New

1 York City and Philadelphia, even Baltimore 2 has perhaps if we were sync these lights and 3 make this town easy to get around we can 4 have like a saying that's like "Come to Scranton, you can get around. It's easy to 5 move around. We'll get you there. 6 You can 7 actually, you know, move around instead of 8 waiting a minute a 40."

9 It's laughable almost, and I'm 10 saying this in a somewhat joking manner, but 11 I also believe it in my heart that is hard 12 sometimes to know that you are just going from Greenridge to South Side, how many 13 14 times have you gone from Greenridge to South 15 Side, so you're going from Greenridge --16 making it easier to go from Greenridge to 17 South Side, you know, they are new lights, 18 they have the sensors. So is there -- do 19 you guys have anything -- can I say this, so 20 are you guys going to do something about 21 that?

22 MR. LOSCOMBE: I believe it was a 23 meeting or two ago where we had discussed 24 this with PennDOT and they are still not 25 completed with their setup, so they are

1	supposed to try and have them synchronized
2	by the end of the April, but I believe it
3	was pushed back to the end of May, if I'm
4	not mistaken. I have the same problem.
5	MR. FINNERTY: We are out there, we
6	are all driving.
7	MR. LOSCOMBE: From I live I can get
8	to Geisinger Wyoming Valley quicker than I
9	can get to Geisinger Scranton so it's crazy.
10	But it is they are not synced yet so
11	hopefully that will relieve it a little bit.
12	MR. FINNERTY: Right, because I
13	MR. LOSCOMBE: And if they are still
14	as a bad I'll complain.
15	MR. FINNERTY: Right.
16	MR. LOSCOMBE: But I know I have sat
17	at a few myself.
18	MR. FINNERTY: Yeah, and when
19	they're running you're running red into red.
20	I have got other things going in my life, I
21	have got other things happening in my life,
22	I do, but this is something this a daily.
23	And what made me come here it was the one
24	light that I timed for a minute and 40
25	seconds I just have to come.

MS. EVANS: Mr. Finnerty, I would 1 suggest that you continue to time the 2 3 lights, particularly after PennDOT appears 4 to have concluded it's enormous project, and if these lights are still as problematic as 5 they currently are, or let's say the 6 problems that have been alleviated only 7 8 slightly, then I would like you to come back 9 and let us know. But in addition to that, I think, you know, the people of Scranton, 10 11 even the people traveling Scranton need to 12 flood PennDOT with complaints until they do 13 the job probably. Because again, we are 14 chasing more people out of the city. 15 So it seems to me in all of the

years that I have served as an elected 16 17 official the squeaky wheel against the 18 grease. The complaints, you know, people 19 when they join together for a united purpose 20 and they want change they can effect that 21 change through being vocal in numbers. So. 22 like I'm saying, let us know, we'll go after 23 them, but we also need your help to bombard 24 them with complaints so that we have our 25 lights properly set.

1 MR. FINNERTY: Well, I'm going to 2 need you guys to go ahead a make this a 3 priority, so let's forget about everything 4 else that was said. Don't worry about these problems, let's go down the list and let's 5 go ahead and make this a priority. 6 7 Like I said, I've been watching for 8 years, I was --I remember the deed for the 9 pool, Nay Aug, that was a great one. I know you guys hear a lot and, you know, so I 10 11 don't mean to come down at all. 12 MR. ROGAN: I would just like to add 13 it's funny I had the same conversation with 14 a few residents in the South Side over the 15 weekend, when you go to a big city, as 16 mentioned we are not a huge city, but it 17 seems like they understand how to make 18 traffic move efficiently. MR. FINNERTY: Yeah. it's 19 unbelievable. 20 21 MR. ROGAN: All the streets will 22 have the green at the same time --23 MR. FINNERTY: Broad Street in 24 Philly, it's doing it.

MS. EVANS: And going down the

25

1	avenues they will have greens, and I travel
2	from West Scranton to South Scranton all the
3	time and for work
4	MR. FINNERTY: Sure you do, you live
5	here.
6	MR. ROGAN: and I always seem to
7	be running into problems now with the
8	expressway.
9	MR. FINNERTY: The old expressway.
10	MR. ROGAN: The expressway issue
11	with the bridge being out and trust me
12	MR. FINNERTY: Oh, the bridge is
13	out?
14	MR. ROGAN: it's certainly
15	frustrating and we just need to use common
16	sense, and another issue that wasn't brought
17	up cars waste a lot of gas sitting at lights
18	I know
19	MR. FINNERTY: They do.
20	MR. ROGAN: you get zero miles to
21	the gallon when you are sitting at a light.
22	MR. FINNERTY: That would be a good
23	point me for to make, another thing, too,
24	you think gas is free? That was me doing my
25	stick.

1	MR. ROGAN: But a lot of European
2	countries actually it's illegal to idle, you
3	have to shut your car off.
4	MR. FINNERTY: Really.
5	MR. ROGAN: I'm not saying we have
6	to do that here, but it does waste a lot of
7	gas and if we get traffic to move more
8	efficiently not only will be people be
9	happier because it won't take as long to get
10	from place to place, but you will also have
11	a little more gas in your tank at the end of
12	the week.
13	MR. FINNERTY: Happier Scrantonians,
14	which is all we want to be. I won't eat up
15	any more of your time. I want to tell you
16	that you got to check out what's happening
17	on Mifflin and Linden. Linden Street bridge
18	and Mifflin, nobody is crossing that bridge
19	but you are waiting on that one for a good
20	minute and a half.
21	And the last thing I'll say is
22	recently I took Meade Street for the first
23	time off of the Dunmore exit and if you take
24	Meade when you get off the Dunmore exit,
25	Meade does unbelievable things. Meade, I

1 don't know if anyone has ever gone down Meade, but it's take you by the highway and 2 3 then it turns into an alley and it dumps you 4 out close to the tank in Dunmore. That has nothing to do with the whole thing, I just 5 said it. I thought I would share that with 6 7 Scranton and the viewers, so thank you very 8 much. MS. EVANS: 9 Thank you. 10 MS. SCHUMACHER: Oh, good evening, 11 Council. Marie Schumacher, city resident 12 and taxpayer. 13 MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening. 14 MS. SCHUMACHER: To start off with 15 5-B and C, I hope that you will be able to 16 stay on whoever is required to make the 17 changes that are required, if there are any 18 required, so that that can be expedited. 19 This has been a great year for the library. 20 Just a few short weeks on April 12 they 21 dedicated the elevator that goes up to the 22 second floor and the reference department 23 and that's the first time now that disabled 24 persons could use it and that was big, and 25 this getting the outside fixed which is in

dire straights is really required and
 whatever we can do to help.

3 And I did circulate a number of 4 petitions with other people in this room to keep the library here and I'll tell you now 5 I am glad that it's in the hands of the 6 7 Scranton Public Library Authority because if 8 anything happens to this city as far as 9 being -- going into bankruptcy if should happen that's an asset that's at the 10 11 Authority and we hopefully would not be 12 forced to sell it or do something dire. 13 Hopefully it's protected. So that's it on 14 5-B and C, I hope that it's passed finally 15 next week.

16 On 5-D does that include -- is that 17 restricted to food or does it include things 18 such as the flower tents that pop up around 19 flower giving holidays that obviously would 20 compete with brick and mortar florists.

21 MR. ROGAN: That's a good point.

22 MS. SCHUMACHER: Pardon? I don't 23 see a whole lot of difference and nobody has 24 a problem with them, so I don't have a 25 problem with the food trucks, so I would

like to know that though. I did go down
 today, but the backup wasn't ready so I'll
 try to check that out before next week
 myself.

Next is 6-A. I still have a serious 5 problem with taking the money away from the 6 7 Vacant Property Review Committee and from 8 the demolition of hazardous structures. 9 Blight is with us big time and I don't think we can afford to give up any money for the --10 11 or any funding that we could use for the 12 demolition.

13 And as far as the Vacant Property 14 Review Committee, I don't think we have used 15 -- there have been a number of enabling, not 16 nearly far enough yet, but enabling pieces 17 of legislation over the last five years and 18 I don't think this city has taken advantage 19 of any of them and they all involve going to 20 Court, so it's expensive and we need -- we 21 need to keep that money in the Vacant 22 Property Review Committee, so they can have 23 the legal aid that they need to start moving 24 some of these properties.

25 We have not -- to the best of my

1 knowledge we have not gone after any conservatorships and Act 90 of 2010 allowed 2 3 us to go after absentee landlords and 4 extradite them here and take personal property that's going beyond the property 5 that they own here to recover what we have 6 7 put into it or what needs to be done and we 8 haven't used any of those. That's three 9 years, five years, we need to start acting 10 on those things.

11 5-H, I'm a little confused as to why 12 that's on here tonight. It seems to me that this was done a couple of weeks ago or maybe 13 14 even a couple of months ago and it was 15 returned by the county because I believe the 16 municipality is supposed to do the five 17 point check and I know Greg Evans has talked 18 about using some of the University people or 19 the nonprofits to help us with services in 20 lieu of payments, not just payments in lieu 21 of services and I don't know why. I mean, 22 somebody could learn Guidestar really fast 23 and look up most of these things, go out on 24 their own, and I think it would have been a 25 great project for an intern to do and then

just turn that -- whatever the municipality finds over to the Country Assessor's Office and let them go from there. So I really think we should we reach out to the nonprofits and ask if anybody is willing to help do that review.

And then empty lots, the ones that 7 8 can't be maintained and they are already 9 starting to grow and could we take some 10 money maybe out of the contingency fund and 11 use herbicides on some of these lots so that 12 at least we keep the vegetation down where they can be maintained. I'll have the rest 13 14 next week. Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you very much. Is
there anyone else who wishes to address
council?

18 MR. HUGHES: Excuse me, I was going 19 to say madam president, I just realized she 20 is not there. In reviewing the ordinance of 21 the food trucks, there is the two 22 definitions of food truck and a food cart, 23 the old definition of pedlar, in my opinion, 24 does not cover the flower tents, so I think 25 that that would be up to council or you

1 could request the solicitor's office to take a look at this and draft language if it's 2 3 council's desire to cover the tents where 4 they sell the flowers. They are not peddlers. A peddler is someone who goes 5 door to door and, of course, they are in 6 7 spot, so, I mean, that's not covered in in 8 this ordinance. It might be covered somewhere else, but it's not covered in this 9 10 ordinance. 11 MR. JOYCE: Thank you, Mr. Hughes. 12 Does anyone else wish to address council? 13 MS. KRAKE: 5-A. MOTIONS. 14 MR. JOYCE: Mr. McGoff, do you have 15 any comments or motions? 16 MR. MCGOFF: Yes, thank you. First 17 of all, regarding the food trucks a little 18 bit of clarification I think is needed as far as council and the food trucks and that 19 20 whole thing is concerned. Number one, 21 nobody on council ever advocated for the 22 removal of food trucks from the downtown. 23 As a matter of fact, last week questions 24 were asked of each of us, I believe, as to 25 whether or not we believed that we should be

removed from the downtown and ever one of the members that was here said no, that they should remain. I think we are all in favor. You know, council as a whole is in favor of the competition that is provided and the services that is provided by those vendors.

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7 As a matter of fact, council has 8 advocated, as Mrs. Evans mentioned last 9 week, for dialogue between the brick and 10 mortar restaurants and the mobile vendors 11 and through Scranton Tomorrow I believe that 12 we have created a conduit for that dialogue. 13 What I didn't want to see happen with this 14 was to turn this into a media event where this argument was being played out through 15 16 the newspapers, the radio stations and 17 wherever else. This is something, I'll 18 speak for myself, I know nothing about the 19 restaurant business other than the fact that 20 I go there and eat once in awhile. I don't 21 know how it effects -- how they effect one 22 another and I'm not sure that any anybody on 23 council has, you know, that experience. Ιt 24 would be best that this situation be 25 resolved by the interested parties and that

is what Scranton Tomorrow is trying to do by
 setting up these discussions.

3 We, as a council, can amend the 4 legislation to meet the collective desires of all of those that are involved and I 5 think that we would all like to do that if 6 7 the vendors and the merchants can decide on 8 something that's workable for all of concerned I think we would be more than 9 10 happy to amend the legislation and to make 11 that happen. The media is not going to 12 solve this situation or resolve this 13 situation, only the interested parties are 14 and I encourage them, all of them to use the 15 mechanism that's been provided by council 16 and through Scranton Tomorrow to get this 17 resolved so that it's not a problem any 18 further and that we can all enjoy the services provided by all of the vendors that 19 20 exist in downtown Scranton.

Second thing, although it passed
last week there had been discussion about
the parking around I'll say General
Dynamics, I'm not sure if that's the correct
name anymore either, but in talking with

1 people after we started to talk about the 2 idea of permits parking with the number of 3 the layoffs that they have had there they 4 don't need off-street parking anymore. All of their employees can park comfortably 5 within the confines of the grounds and to 6 7 pursue -- I think to pursue permit parking 8 in this case would really just be not as 9 bad, but close to as bad as putting parking 10 meters there. There is no reason to do it.

11 I have kind of come to the same 12 conclusion that Mr. Rogan did and stated 13 that the best thing at this point in time I 14 believe is to simply take down the "No 15 Parking" signs and just, you know, it's open 16 parking and in an emergency if that 17 emergency should occur that we voted on should that occur then we can create some 18 19 type of an emergency signage, you know, at 20 that time, but as of now I don't think it's, 21 you know, in our best interest to pursue 22 permit parking there and probably it's in 23 the best interest just to go with open 24 parking as it was many years ago.

As far as the traffic signals, I

have had a number of people contact me about 1 2 all kinds of issues with the traffic signals 3 and driving through the downtown the other 4 day I agree it's a disaster trying to get from one end of the city to the other. 5 Bridges closed, you know, the traffic 6 7 signals with construction with -- it's a 8 nightmare trying to move around the city. 9 There is hopefully within the next month or 10 so PennDOT or whoever is doing the traffic 11 signalization will listen to what we have to say about, you know, various, you know, the 12 13 flow of traffic, but the biggest complaint I 14 have is about, as the gentleman said, the 15 length of some of the signals is incredible. 16 All kinds of complaints about sitting at 17 traffic lights forever and that's something 18 that they should be able to adjust quickly, 19 easily. It's within their power to do that.

And the last thing as it comes up, the Linden Street bridge, I look at that as a priority item. I use the analogy of, you know, was it West Linden Street or West, whatever it was -- Lackawanna, I'm sorry, too many bridges to worry about. I use the

1 analogy in my on home, you know, I need a new porch, I need sidewalks, I need a new 2 3 roof, I have got to make a decisions as to 4 which one is at this point in time the most important with the limited resources that I 5 have and we are looking at it I think in the 6 7 same way in the city, what is the priority? 8 What is our greatest priority and at this 9 point in time as I look at where this money 10 is coming from are those other -- are those 11 other sources of revenue important to the 12 citv? Yes. But I think that, again, going 13 with the movement of traffic and the 14 mobility through the city we need to get 15 some of these streets and bridges, whatever, 16 repaired as quickly as possible so that as 17 was written in the newspaper that Scranton 18 doesn't become an island and, you know, you 19 can't move at all.

20 So I am in favor, you know, of the 21 transfer of the funds as it exists. I think 22 that the bridge is the bigger priority.

And that's all for this evening.Thank you.

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MS. EVANS: Councilman Rogan, do you

have comments or motions?

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2 MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you. One 3 announcement that I forgot to mention, 4 tomorrow from 5 to 7 at Whisky Dick's in 5 downtown Scranton there will be a fundraiser 6 for police in the city and all proceeds will 7 go for community events, and that's tomorrow 8 night from 5 to 7.

I guess I'll start off also with the 9 10 food trucks since that seems to be the hot issue of the night and of the week and I'm 11 12 going to just start off by giving you a 13 little of my philosophy of these type of 14 issues. I believe in free markets. I 15 believe in competition, I believe in 16 capitalism, and that's what I like about 17 this country, our city and our state where 18 somebody can buy a truck and come up with 19 great food and go downtown and pay the city 20 a fee and be very successful and make a good 21 living doing it and provide a good product 22 to residents of the city and the workers of 23 the downtown.

24There is also other benefits of25having the food trucks in the downtown as

well, and this is just one story that 1 2 somebody mentioned to me and it was actually 3 someone outside of the city, somebody 4 mentioned to me over the week that they are a big fan of one of the food trucks and, you 5 6 know, they travel maybe once or twice a week 7 to wherever they are to get dinner or lunch 8 so they happened at at the Viewmont Mall 9 that day. So they went up, got his food, 10 you know, they ate it quick in the car and 11 they said, "Well, let's go to the mall."

12 They went up to the mall and spent 13 \$100 in the shops in the mall. And these 14 food trucks are being patronized not only by 15 Scranton residents but by residents out of 16 town as well, and if we can bring more foot 17 traffic into the downtown it could help 18 brick and mortar businesses as well in the 19 downtown.

I also have some other questions about these ordinances, a big one I have is who will enforce them? Will this be another burden put on our Licensing and Inspections Department? You know, if there is a call put in that, you know, a food truck is within, you know, whatever the footage is
whether it's 100 or 500 or 250 if they get
that call are they supposed to go down there
with that rolling tape measure and measure
it out? I think our inspectors have a lot
more important work to be doing, so that's a
big issue as well.

8 And finally, the one issue I do 9 think that does need to be addressed right 10 now with the food trucks is regarding the fees. I think that the fees or taxes that 11 12 the food trucks are paying should be 13 comparable to brick and mortar businesses. 14 I know it's little bit more difficult to 15 decide on what those rates should be 16 because, you know, property taxes are based 17 on a square footage, mercantile tax on the 18 sales. These trucks aren't always in the 19 city. And from talking to some of the 20 owners of the trucks they have agreed that 21 the fees are too low right now and they 22 agreed that, you know, paying an additional 23 fee isn't a problem for them in fairness to 24 be on an equal playing field with the brick 25 and mortar businesses, and for me that's

what I'm hoping to will come out of all ofthis.

3 As I stated before, I won't vote for 4 any legislation that will ban these type of food trucks from the downtown area where 5 they do most of their business. 6 I do 7 support making the playing field fair where 8 brick and mortar businesses and food trucks 9 will have the same playing field and whoever 10 has the best product will then be the best, 11 you know, the most successful business and 12 that's how free market should work and I'm 13 very hopeful that the talks between the 14 brick and mortar business owners and the 15 food truck owners will reach a settlement 16 that can pass this council by 5-0, be signed 17 by the mayor and everyone is happy. That's 18 my hope. I hope that that agreement can be made. 19

As I said, I oppose some of what's in this legislation but there are some issues that need to be addressed so I will move to introduce the legislation to see what comes out of those talks. I have spoken to a few of the food truck owners, I

haven't had any calls yet from the brick and
mortar businesses, I'm sure they will be
calling, I'm willing to listen to both sides
and I'm very hopeful that an agreement will
be reached in the short future that can work
for everyone and everyone can carry on with
their business.

8 Next, the West Lackawanna bridge, I 9 did have an e-mail conversation with Linda 10 Aebli, and I provided everyone with a copy, 11 I think the best course of action, and we'll 12 see if everyone agrees, how does everyone 13 else on the board feel about having Ms. 14 Aebli in for a caucus to discuss if these 15 are the best programs or the only programs 16 where these funds can be taken from? 17 MS. EVANS: I have no problem. 18 MR. JOYCE: I would agree to that as well. 19 Mr. McGoff? 20 MR. ROGAN: 21 MR. MCGOFF: That's fine. 22 MR. ROGAN: Okay. Mrs. Krake, could 23 we please set that up with Ms. Aebli? she 24 already agreed, but I did want to bring that

up to my colleagues as well and hopefully we

1 can have that and see if there are any other options. As I said last week, I also have 2 3 concerns about where the funding is coming 4 Specifically for the condemnation of from. the hazardous structures and some of the 5 neighborhood groups, the Falcons, they do 6 great work and I hate to have to take those 7 8 funds away if they can be used by those 9 organization. 10 And actually on the way to the 11 council meeting tonight I did see two police 12 officers looking at the area of the sidewalk 13 in question. 14 MS. FOSTER: Can I address? MR. ROGAN: 15 Sure. 16 MS. FOSTER: Karin Foster. This 17 afternoon approximately 3:30 we were 18 returning from downtown and noticed that 19 there was a four-foot span of the concrete 20 pylon right before the fencing at the crest 21 of the hill that had not been teetered over 22 to the side and only held by the rebar, so I 23 called that in and that's why they were 24 there. 25 Thank you, and I know MR. ROGAN:

1 that the residents probably couldn't hear, but Karin Foster from the West Side 2 3 Neighborhood Watch mentioned she called into 4 the police today, there is a four-foot section of the sidewalk and the rail. 5 MS. FOSTER: It's the retaining 6 7 wall. 8 MR. ROGAN: The retaining wall is about to fall off, and I know Mr. Loscombe 9 10 has mentioned it numerous times, and we all 11 have, it needs to be -- the sidewalk needs 12 to be closed in the meantime and I hope that 13 on my ride home from council tonight back to 14 West Side I see that it should be closed 15 off. It's a hazard. It needs to be dealt 16 with immediately and have the sidewalk 17 closed. 18 MR. LOSCOMBE: I mean, if they are 19 so interested in the emergency and this 20 situation, we have been after them for two 21 and a half years at least based on the 22 PennDOT engineers' recommendation to close

23 off those sidewalks and that's something
24 they haven't done yet.

25 And again, I predicted that wall was

1	going to fall out. It's held on basically
2	by wire in there.
3	MS. EVANS: Yes, you did.
4	MR. LOSCOMBE: And that's it. And
5	every day it's going farther and farther so
6	I don't know if it totally collapsed yet or
7	what?
8	MR. ROGAN: And just driving by the
9	in the car, and I didn't stop, I was on my
10	way here, just driving you could see it dip
11	down and it's already been
12	MR. LOSCOMBE: The area underneath
13	it is ready to go, too.
14	MR. ROGAN: So hopefully we will
15	have Ms. Aebli in here next week and we can
16	discuss that, and also a concern I do have
17	with the construction will there be any I
18	know PennDOT told Mr. Loscombe the road is
19	in fine condition for traffic, but I'm
20	worried that when the sidewalk repairs begin
21	that the road may be closed, and if that
22	were to happen at the same time as the
23	Linden Street bridge that would be a
24	disaster for West Side.
25	MR. LOSCOMBE: Hopefully they will

do one lane at a time.

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2 MR. ROGAN: That's definitely 3 something that needs to be looked at, also. 4 So hopefully Ms. Aebli will come in and we can discuss these issues before final vote 5 or tabling it possibly and making 6 7 amendments. 8 Next, two letters, and I'm sure 9 Mr. Loscombe will be addressing these since 10 he is the chair for public safety, one just 11 because it was brought up tonight about the 12 traffic signals, this was from Mr. Judge, 13 the president of the IAFF, to Chief Davis 14 regarding traffic signals that would give 15 when a fire truck is driving through and 16 giving them basically -- and I know 17 Mr. Loscombe can explain it a lot better 18 than I can, and it was through Chief Davis, 19 it was just requesting that the city, you 20 know, move on this to get this taken care of 21 to protect not only the firefighters but to 22 protect the motorists as well because it 23 says there is so many accidents that occur 24 at intersections, and this was addressed to 25 Chief Davis and we were copied on it.

Mrs. Krake, could we please send a letter to Chief Davis asking that council is informed of what steps have been taken on this matter so far?

And next, also from the fire 5 department, and this -- I spoke to Mr. Judge 6 7 earlier today, and this was very frustrating for me, a few -- and I'll just read this 8 9 summary, approximately three years ago the 10 local fire community was able to get a 11 business to donate four or five automatic 12 external defibrillators, AEDs to the city. 13 These are basically the shock pads for when 14 someone goes into cardiac arrest that are 15 used to bring them back and the letter goes 16 onto say that these costs about \$1,000 per 17 unit and they were donated to the city and 18 as far as the city's use they have been sitting in Chief Davis' office for three 19 20 They have never been used. years.

And I don't understand why these aren't out on our fire trucks. They could be used to safe somebody's life and the letter goes onto say that if the city isn't going to use them that they could be donated

1 to little leagues or different organizations 2 throughout the city that would use them, so 3 could we also ask Chief Davis where this 4 issue stands as well because I think that the people of the city are going to want an 5 answer. I'm sure Mr. Loscombe will 6 7 elaborate on this since this is his committee. 8

9 And finally, I have a couple of 10 citizens' requests. One, there is a huge 11 pothole on the corner Jackson Street and 12 Filmore. The resident has called the 13 mayor's office and the DPW and nothing has 14 been done.

15 Also, a few second requests: At the 16 end of North Washington Avenue in front of 17 D&S Auto, when you make the turn and you go 18 up I believe it's Cherry Street there is a 19 small section of roadway that is in 20 disrepair. It's a mess. The rest of the 21 road is fine it's just right around the 22 railroad tracks it's a mess. So can we 23 please send a letter to the DPW asking that 24 that is repaired as well?

And I know we have probably sent at

1 least five or six letters regarding Pike 2 Street. The residents up there are very 3 upset and all I'm asking for is an answer 4 from Mr. Dougher. The street isn't being repaired, he is not telling us if it's going 5 to be put on the paving list or not, and 6 7 it's not a busy street but the residents up 8 there pay taxes and there are nice homes on 9 that street so I'm sure they are paying a 10 very heavy tax bill and they deserve at the 11 very least to be able to ride on a road 12 that's not going to throw their car out of 13 alignment and for a couple of the residents 14 up there that ride motorcycles it really is 15 a dangerous issue, so could we also ask if 16 Pike Street is going to be paved and if not 17 it could be at least repaired in the 18 meantime. 19 And that is it all I have for

20 tonight. Thank you.

21 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman 22 Loscombe, do you have any comments or 23 motions tonight?

24 MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, just a 25 couple. As usual, Mr. Rogan stole my notes

again.

1

2 MS. EVANS: You've got to get to the 3 mail faster.

4 MR. LOSCOMBE: We are all on the 5 same page here definitely. I mean, what was 6 spoken previously needed is pretty much I 7 feel the same way and just to go over some 8 of these notes.

First of all, I would like to 9 10 commend our neighborhood watches and our neighborhood associations for the work that 11 12 they do tirelessly and, you know, out of the goodness of their heart and the love or 13 14 their city and I really mean that. I hope 15 you continue to keep the fire and I would 16 like to see a lot more citizens join you in 17 and helping you because as usual a lot of 18 these groups, a lot of organizations end up 19 with a handful of the people who end up 20 doing of 99 percent of the work, and I would 21 just hope that more individuals would get 22 involved and help you out.

I was able to attend most of the meetings previously, but our meeting is the same nights now, but, you know, I help with

1 the fence when you took that down, but I do 2 want to get more involved now that my work 3 schedule is little more finalized. But I do 4 commend all of the neighborhood associations and the crime watch organizations. You are 5 definitely making a difference in the city 6 and I believe we all feel the same way, so I 7 8 just wanted to applaud you for that.

9 And to go back to the parking 10 meters, as Mr. McGoff explained at Chamberlain, I have always believed that 11 12 they never should have been put there in the 13 first place. We have to get either, you 14 know, repeal the ordinance to put them there 15 or whatever the legitimate way is to get 16 them to pull those signs out of there and 17 the posts, and that is sad. I think we are 18 all in the consensus that it's time, the time is overdue. 19

A couple of meetings ago Mr. Neverosky appeared here regarding the meters or the parking spaces on Mulberry Street. Now, from what I remember when they did this street they took all of the meters out of these blocks. Now I see meter poles there

1 but there is no meter heads. However, when 2 we just approved a parking lot in the 3 downtown one of the reasons we had to remove 4 the meters was because of the site clearance. PennDOT required that. 5 I'11 tell you what, I don't know if anyone has 6 7 traveled Mulberry Street heading west at 8 nighttime, but there is going to be a 9 fatality there. It's just crazy. I mean, 10 it's worse than Snake Road at night. You 11 are driving along, all of sudden there is a 12 -- you are in this lane and there's a parking lane right in front of you, you are 13 14 zigging over here, then it zigs back here. 15 I don't know how they are able to do 16 that or who did it, that's a city street so 17 obviously it had to be the city. I don't 18 believe PennDot --19 MR. MCGOFF: It's the state. 20 MS. EVANS: It's the state. 21 MR. LOSCOMBE: I thought the state road cut off at Jefferson? 22 23 MR. MCGOFF: No. 24 MR. LOSCOMBE: It doesn't? Because 25 when we were asking how the width reduction

1 was approved they said PennDOT didn't have 2 to approve it, it was the city street, it 3 cut off there at Route 11. I'm pretty 4 certain. I checked on that. If it's a 5 state road they gave me the wrong information there. 6 7 MR. WALLIS: Are you talking about 8 the Merrill sign? 9 MR. LOSCOMBE: Pardon? 10 MR. WALLIS: The Merrill sign right 11 before it becomes the Abraham or Robbins Road? 12 13 MR. LOSCOMBE: No, no, I'm talking 14 about Mulberry Street. 15 MR. WALLIS: That is Mulberry. 16 MR. LOSCOMBE: I'm sorry, up by the 17 University. 18 MR. WALLIS: Oh, the top end. 19 MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, the top end from 20 Jefferson Avenue I was told was a city road. 21 Now, there may be an agreement for the state 22 to pave it or whatever or maintain it, but I 23 was told -- they showed me the maps there. 24 Route 11 comes over and goes over the 25 expressway because --

1	MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake?
2	MS. KRAKE: When we asked about this
3	a long time ago the information we got was
4	it was 307 or what brings 307
5	MR. LOSCOMBE: Or 3-7.
6	MS. KRAKE: Right back up to
7	anyway, that's what I was told and that we
8	actually had a friend of ours that was an
9	engineer take a look at several aspects of
10	it and apparently all of the aspects meet
11	the minimum requirement, not that this is to
12	say that the best, but the minimum
13	requirements are met throughout. I still do
14	agree with Councilman Loscombe though, that
15	it's very dangerous, and it's a road I
16	travel all the time and it's very, very
17	dangerous.
18	MR. LOSCOMBE: I have seen skid
19	marks coming by those parked vehicles. I
20	say we have to get rid of those. For the
21	nine or ten parking spots that they have

made out this zigging and zagging for I

think it's ridiculous. We remove what, five

downtown just on a corner just for a parking

lot. You know, again, and I argued about

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23

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1	that, I'm not for removing any, but this is
2	a situation where
3	MR. WALLIS: Mr. Loscombe
4	MR. LOSCOMBE: that produces a
5	danger.
6	MR. WALLIS: you are talking
7	about where Jefferson ends?
8	MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes.
9	MR. WALLIS: and the other side?
10	MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes.
11	MR. WALLIS: Jefferson actually has
12	the state road signage turn to go into
13	Moosic 307. It's right there.
14	MR. LOSCOMBE: Right.
15	MR. WALLIS: It shouldn't go to the
16	other side of that roadway.
17	MR. LOSCOMBE: That's what I was
18	told by the PennDOT.
19	MR. WALLIS: According to the map if
20	you look at the roadway it comes through the
21	intersection of Jefferson, you turn right to
22	go to the Moosic exchange at the end of
23	Jefferson which is closed right now, of
24	course, but that would be the map for the
25	state road.

1	MR. LOSCOMBE: And that's exactly
2	what I was told when I met with them on the
3	reduction by six feet of the upper part of
4	Mulberry Street.
5	MR. WALLIS: They have given us more
6	disinformation than anything else. At Cedar
7	at the light, one minute they say they can't
8	do it, the next minute they can do it, and
9	that was straight from the representative.
10	MR. LOSCOMBE: Well, I'll follow-up
11	for my information on this, but I know
12	MR. WALLIS: If you look at it, the
13	map for the city, it's actually on their
14	map, on the city map.
15	MS. EVANS: Thank you.
16	MR. LOSCOMBE: And, I mean, just we
17	have to do something about those meters on
18	Mulberry Street before something really
19	happens. I actually pull out of the court
20	there next to Granteed's and you had no
21	visibility whatsoever. Now, they have a
22	parking lot there for the one or two spots
23	that Granteed's may lose, you know, I fel
24	sorry for them but they do have a parking
25	lot. The rest of the spots are being parked

free right now because there are no meters,
 but I think it's a dangerous situation
 that's waiting to happen.

4 The West Lackawanna Avenue bridge, I agree with Mr. Rogan on that. I still have 5 a couple of question. This past week I 6 7 didn't have the ability due to my work 8 schedule to get to any meetings, but I will 9 be in touch with Mr. Rogan, too, because I 10 have a couple of things that we can discuss 11 together and perhaps work on something on 12 this.

And Mr. Rogan mentioned the fire department letters regarding the traffic signal, you know, a lot of people see the cameras on the traffic signals that's supposedly part of the process for the timing to keep the traffic flowing.

19There is another thing on there,20it's a little bit taller, it looks like a21reflector on that. That's put there for22emergency vehicles but they have to have the23proper equipment in the vehicle to allow24them as they are proceeding to have a green25light for the extent of the way so it would

eliminate a lot of accidents and, you know,
I mean, they have those around our area, we
are probably one of the last to get that.
So I will be setting up a meeting with the
chief on that to find out what the status of
that is.

7 And the other thing Mr. Rogan 8 mentioned was the AEDs, the automatic 9 external defibrillators, and they were 10 donated to us by Sanofi Pasteur a couple of 11 years ago because we had to approve them 12 there and we thought it was a great idea. 13 They were intended to go on all of the fire 14 trucks and the first response in their 15 neighborhoods if someone was having a heart 16 attack. Obviously, to my dismay and to all 17 our dismay that hasn't happened.

18 What Mr. Judge's letter explains is 19 that they have been sitting in the chief's 20 office and are not available for use. Ιt 21 will take several hundreds of dollars to 22 purchase batteries and pads for these 23 opinions. I'm sure that we could scratch up 24 a couple of hundred dollars to activate 25 these, but obviously I don't believe that's

1the holdup, because if the chief was2interested in pursuing them, I mean, he3knows he could ask us for the money to do4that. And so it's ashame that they have5been sitting collecting dust all this time6when they could be put to good use.

7 I would just hope that, you know, no 8 one in those neighborhoods needed them and 9 they weren't available, but the fact is that 10 the firefighters union has a large majority 11 They have of its members trained as EMTs. 12 paramedics, and it's one of the requirements 13 to be on the fire department now, you have 14 to have EMT certification. However, these 15 skills are rarely called upon.

16 You know, basically Rescue 1 17 utilizes their skills on all accidents and 18 stuff, but, you know, they are being 19 underused and they are asking to be used 20 more. We understand the requirements that 21 must be met to have our members utilize 22 these machine as part of our duties, 23 however, the city has not attempted to make 24 this happen. It's very simple.

25 In good conscience, and this is what

1 breaks my heart, "In good conscience I belive the city should donate these machines 2 3 to the little league organizations across 4 the city instead of having them collect dust in the city office. We always strive for 5 using what equipment we have in the city to 6 7 its fullest, I believe this to be a waste of 8 life-saving technology that could better 9 serve the residents of this city elsewhere 10 at this point. Council accepted this 11 donation for the business of the city and 12 with the understanding that they would be 13 used appropriately.

14 If you or any other council member 15 need any further clarification or 16 explanation of this matter, I would be more 17 than happy to provide what information I 18 can. I would defer the majority of the 19 questions regarding why they haven't been 20 placed in service to Chief Davis or Ryan McGowan." 21

And I will be reaching out to them and trying to get these activated. Again, it's a good idea to donate them, but we have emergency vehicles in place in all

1 neighborhoods of the city and that's where they're best utilized, and if it's a sake of 2 3 a couple of batteries and some pads make no 4 mistake about it I don't think any of us would turn something down. You know, they 5 have given thousands and thousands away for 6 7 different things, you know, parks and stuff 8 like that, we are talking about saving a life here and it's ashame. 9

10 But I know a awhile ago I had 11 checked on them, it was probably over a year 12 ago, and I was told at that time they were 13 waiting for a couple of guys to get their 14 certifications, but it's well beyond that 15 time and I believe now with the manpower and 16 the way it is and the shifting there is 17 someone capable of using utilizing this 18 equipment on every piece of equipment on 19 every shift.

20 And with that, I say we have to do 21 it and hopefully sooner than later. And I 22 appreciate you for bringing it to my 23 attention. Thank you very much.

24MS. EVANS: And thank you,25Councilman Loscombe. Councilman Joyce, do

1 you have any comments or motions tonight? MR. JOYCE: Yes. I do. First I'd 2 3 like to comment on the whole food truck 4 issue and state my position. The food trucks are a vital part of the downtown 5 business sector in my opinion. 6 They provide 7 a service to people on the go. They are 8 being utilized by a pretty good amount of 9 They pay permit fees, they pay a patrons. 10 parking fee, and they pay mercantile taxes 11 as well. 12 I will vote to introduce legislation 13 tonight to give the brick and mortar 14 restaurants as well as the food truck 15 vendors a chance to sit down and come to a 16 compromise, but if no compromise happens and 17 legislation stays in -- the legislation 18 stays the same way it is, I will be voting "no" in the following weeks. 19

20 Secondly, we have received some 21 information from the Single Tax office 22 regarding the city funds distributed in 23 comparison from this year to last year. As 24 you know, the Single Tax office collects 25 real estate taxes, prior year delinquent

1 real estate tax, the local service tax and 2 the business privilege and mercantile taxes. 3 So far this year we have collected 4 \$11.800.804.62 in real estate tax revenue through the first four months of the year. 5 6 During the same period last year we 7 collected \$9,291,001.87. This is an overall 8 increase of \$2, 590,802.75 which is a 27 9 percent tax increase -- or a 27 percent 10 increase in revenue collection. 11 However, we must remember that there 12 was a tax increase as well so we would 13 expect to see an increase in revenue, but so 14 far we are \$2 1/2 million ahead of where we 15 were last year. 16 As far as delinguent real estate taxes from the prior year, this year so far 17 18 we have collected \$390,308.69. During the 19 prior year we have collected -- during the 20 same period the prior year we collected 21 \$288,491.29 for an increase of \$20,817.40 or

7.22 percent increase.

22

The local services tax, this year so
far the city as collected \$390,984.70.
During the same period last year the city

1	collected \$391,380.11. This is an increase
2	of or a decrease of \$395.41 for a .1
3	percent decrease, so the LST collections are
4	basically comparable from this year to last
5	year.
6	And business privilege and
7	mercantile taxes, the summation of the two,
8	so far this year we have collected
9	\$1,427,448.62. During the same period last
10	year we collected \$287,912.02, and that's an
11	increase of 395.79 percent or 1.139 million
12	dollars.
13	Mrs. Krake, if we could please send
14	a letter to Tax Collector Bill Courtright
15	and ask him why there was such a slight
16	collection from this year to last year
17	because obviously we didn't increase the
18	business privilege or mercantile by 400
19	percent, so I'm very curious to see why
20	there is a spike in those revenues in
21	that revenue category.
22	In order of business tonight, we
23	have received a report from Northeast
24	Revenue regarding delinquent property tax
25	for all of the years prior to the previous

year of 2012 and so far for the period of
April 1 to April 30 Northeast Revenue
collected \$62,185.95 in delinquent real
estate taxes, and also \$5,905 in tax search
fees, which is a something new that was
approved by council this year, and that's a
total of \$68,090.95.

Also, they were given a distribution of delinquent refuse payments for the period of April 1 to April 30, and so far the city of Scranton has collected \$66,899.18 in delinquent refuse payments for the period from April 1 to April 30.

14 In other matters tonight, a woman, I 15 forget her name, but she came to Scranton 16 City Council few weeks ago and she lives on 17 Saginaw Street and voiced her concerns about 18 the trash debris that was blowing from the 19 Hilltop Manor property owned by the Scranton 20 Housing Authority to neighboring residents 21 of Saginaw Street.

And we did receive a response from Mr. Gary Peliccaci, the executive director of the Scranton Housing Authority and he states: "I'm in receipt of your April 19,

1 2013, letter regarding trash complaints at Hilltop manner. This issue was addressed in 2 3 2010 and it is continued to be addressed to 4 the present time. The problem is not ongoing and, in fact, this is the first 5 complaint since 2010. 6 The Scranton Housing Authority 7 8 continues to have its trash picked up twice 9 weekly and maintained and maintenance 10 continues to walk the site daily to pick up 11 all debris. 12 Maintenance has continued to pick up 13 all trash on both sides of Saginaw Street. 14 One additional step that that has been taken 15 since this issue arose in 2010, was the 16 distribution of trash cans to families that 17 reside in the buildings that are in close proximity to Saginaw Street." 18 And he further alludes to the fact 19 20 that has visited Hilltop Manor and does not 21 see a problem and also the manager checks 22 the development on a daily basis. 23 So if the resident who came here

will contact us that mentioned her issueabout trash on Saginaw Street blowing over

1 from Hilltop Manor doesn't find this 2 response satisfactory because, obviously, 3 Mr. Peliccaci is stating that he sees no 4 problem, I would urge her to contact Scranton City Council again and hopefully we 5 could address this issue if the case is not 6 7 being taken care of as Mr. Peliccaci states 8 that it is.

9 And finally, I did have one 10 citizens' request about the section of the 11 road by D & S Auto. However, Mr. Rogan also 12 stated that the resident must have told both 13 of us, but that's all I have for tonight.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Good evening. I'd like to begin with a few updates. First, the city will realize an additional unanticipated revenue from realty transfer taxes that will be paid for the purchase of Sno Mountain.

Second, the city and independent auditors hope to produce the 2012 audit by June 2013. The sole potential obstacle to this timeline is obtainment of an audit of the Scranton Parking Authority. It appears that the receiver for the parking garages

has refused to fund this audit. 1 Consequently, the city will need to 2 3 initiate and fund an audit as soon as 4 possible if it hopes to produce a completed a 2012 city audit in the near future. 5 Third, a city treasurer's sale has 6 7 been scheduled for June 3, 2013. I'11 8 provide additional information regarding this matter during next week's council 9 10 meeting. 11 Fourth, the tentative date for 12 implementation of the city's parking meter 13 program is June 15, 2013. On a related 14 note, and with my colleagues' agreement, I 15 ask Mrs. Krake to send a letter to Standard 16 parking requesting the following 17 information: 18 A breakdown of any and all revenue 19 received for parking garages and parking 20 meters for the month of March and April 2013. If excess revenue is realized, are 21 22 those funds forwarded to the city for 23 payment of SPA bonds? What is the total 24 number of employees, both full-time and 25 part-time. Standard has hired for the

1 parking meter program? Is that agreeable to my colleagues? 2 3 MR. MCGOFF: Yes. 4 (Other council members nod yes.) MS. EVANS: Thank you. 5 Next. 6 included in tonight's agenda for 7 introduction is Item 5-H, a resolution 8 requesting the Lackawanna County 9 Commissioners to establish a policy for the 10 Assessor's Office to immediately commence 11 renewing the status of all properties 12 qualifying for exemptions or property 13 taxation under the institutions of Purely 14 Public Charity Act. This legislation was 15 drafted by Solicitor Hughes and it 16 represents council's response to the 17 commissioners refusal to review tax exempt 18 city properties to determine whether they 19 qualify for exemptions for a property taxation. 20 21 According to the resolution, it is 22 the County of Lackawanna and not the City of 23 Scranton that is solely responsible to

an exemption from property taxation under

determine whether a property qualifies for

24

the afore named act.

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In addition, the county is 2 3 responsible for establishing the assessed 4 value of all real estate within the county in accordance with the Third Class county 5 Assessment Law. 6 7 Further, this legislation cites the 8 total assessed valuation of all real estate 9 within the City of Scranton as \$594,242,686 10 of which \$198,821,797 or 33.6 percent is tax 11 exempt. There are, in fact, 1,298 tax 12 exempt properties in our city, and one of 13 those, the University of Scranton, owns 56 14 parcels for a total of \$1 million -- 98 15 million -- no, no, I'm sorry, that's the 16 grand total, for a total of \$37,418,166 that 17 has been removed from the tax rolls. 18 We hope the county commissioners 19 would uphold their responsibilities, stop 20 passing the buck to the city, and help the 21 citizens who may have sworn to serve and 22 represent. This legislation marks the 23 fourth occasion that the governing body of 24 the City of Scranton has asked the 25 Lackawanna County Commissioners to engage in

intergovernmental cooperation for the
benefit of the people. Three times in less
than a year the city been rebuffed.

4 In an effort to again avoid this crucial issue, the county may state that 5 this cannot fund this procedure. To that I 6 7 say, the county can't afford not to do it. 8 33.6 percent of city property is tax exempt 9 and growing. A review of the nonprofits as 10 provided by the law can significantly benefit the county, city and school district 11 12 by producing increased tax revenue for each 13 and a alleviating the weighty tax burden of 14 homeowners and businesses.

15The commissioners should follow the16example set by Allegheny County in March172013, and implement this resolution18immediately particularly since it has failed19to conduct a tax reassessment since 1967.20It will represent a strong and long overdue21step on the road to fairness in taxation.

Finally, council will table Item 7-E on tonight's agenda. Since the legislation was submitted to city council, the police chief has been reviewing it for possible
