8	going to read from the letter: "To whom it
9	may concern: I'm writing to request your
10	support for a memorial on the square. The
11	community of North Scranton is gathering
12	together this year to erect a monument in
13	honor of Jerry Moran. Jerry grew up in
14	North Scranton and graduated from Scranton
15	Technical High School. After high school,
16	Jerry studied photo journalism at Oklahoma
17	University and joined the US Navy. He
18	traveled the world as a combat photographer
19	for the navy between 1979 and 1984.
20	When American Airlines Flight 77
21	crashed into the Pentagon on Tuesday,
22	September 11, 2011, Jerry was working there
23	as an engineering contractor for the Navy
24	doing video teleconferencing. Sadly,
25	Jerry's body was never recovered nor

1	returned to his family.

7	very Happy Mother's Day. And that's it.
8	MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
9	PARTICIPATION.
10	MS. EVANS: Our first speaker
11	tonight is Frank Galdieri.
12	MR. GALDIERI: Good evening, ladies
13	and gentlemen. Most of you know me, I'm a
14	retired police officer with the City of
15	Scranton. I have been contacting council,
16	DPW and the city for many, many years, and I
17	have come to the conclusion that I need to
18	ask council one question, what is the scope
19	and purpose of Scranton City Council? What
20	is your meaning here?
21	MS. EVANS: We are the legislative
22	body of the City of Scranton and we serve as
23	the system of checks and balances on the
24	executive branch of the government.
25	MR. GALDIERI: That's the answer I

was looking for, thank you. Checks and balances. When I walked in here this evening, Mr. Jim Lockwood from the Scranton Times saw me and he said, "Mr. Galdieri, I can't believe you are here again."

It's been a year that he was here when I came to council over a year ago begging to get my road paved. However, it's not the first request, many of you know that. I have been requesting this for over 18 years. The road hasn't been resurfaced in 26 years. I have documentation that I have sent to the city numerous times. My next question is what do the dates March 8, 2012, and March 21, 2013, have in common with the city council?

Regarding your minutes on March 8, 2012: "Mr. Rogan: Next I wanted to update a few items that were brought up last week. Last week the conditions of Pike Street were brought up by a resident and I spoke to Mr. Galdieri on the phone, I actually missed a call from him yesterday. I have to get back to him if the DPW has gone down there to patch the holes. Never mind put it on a

paving list or move forward with a permanent solution, it's very frustrating as a council person when people come to you, and I know Mr. Loscombe as well spoke to Mr. Galdieri, and you relayed this to the department head and nothing gets done. And I thought, you know, for once -- even the Scranton Times did an article on this that it would light a fire under the DPW, the next day the trucks should be up there and at least patch the holes."

To this day, still nothing.

March 21, 2013. "Also, one that myself and Mr. Loscombe addressed numerous times, which is Pike Street. Potholes still haven't been filled, the road still hasn't been paved, we haven't heard anything whether it will be placed on a paving list for this year. Could we also request once again that the road is repaired. In the meantime, it hopefully will be placed on the paving list for 2013. This is one of the worst roads in the city."

It is one of the worst roads in the city. It's deplorable. We are actually

driving on dirt in many areas. Mr. Rogan,

Mr. Loscombe have both been up there, they

have seen it, the Times has documented it,

WNEP has been up there. What does it take

to get this road resurfaced? That's my next

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MS. EVANS: City council does not have the authority to direct the DPW director or the Mayor of Scranton. The mayor basically -- well, I'm sure you are aware, the mayor has the power to hire and to fire alone. The mayor oversees all of his cabinet members, so it's either a matter of the mayor giving that order or the DPW director deciding independently that that particular street would be placed on the paving list. City council does not compile a paving list, whether it is the streets that are paved through OECD funds or through other funds, meaning citywide, whether it's low to moderate income areas or moderate to high income areas.

The most city council can do, and I know because I remember you, too, you e-mailed me many times and it's long before

1	2012.
2	MR. GALDIERI: Yes, ma'am.
3	MS. EVANS: And I made request after
4	request after request to have that road
5	paved as well as a number of the others,
6	some of which haven't been done in 50 years
7	and this is citywide. We can only make the
8	request. We cannot give the orders because
9	we have no authority to do so nor will they
10	respond to an order coming from city
11	council.
12	We have made every request on your
13	behalf, but my recommendation to you would
14	be to call the mayor's office and ask for an
15	immediate meeting with him and with
16	Mr. Dougher, the head of the DPW.
17	MR. GALDIERI: I have done that.
18	MS. EVANS: And?
19	MR. GALDIERI: I was there this
20	morning again, never got a phone call back.
21	MS. EVANS: You were in the mayor's
22	office this morning?
23	MR. GALDIERI: I was in the DPW's
24	Office again. My level of frustration is
25	just absurd at this point. Mr. Rogan and I

1	have been in close contact many numerous
2	times and one of his last responses to me
3	was, "I have sent over a dozen letters to
4	Mr. Dougher with no response."
5	So my question, which I first asked
6	is, what is the purpose of city council? If
7	it's a checks and balances shouldn't
8	somebody intercede and say, "We've got a
9	problem here. This is a serious problem,
10	you are not even paying attention to it.
11	You are not responding to."
12	It's apathy and ignorance and I
13	don't care, it's not right. Something needs
14	to be done. Thank you.
15	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Our next
16	speaker is Les Spindler.
17	MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,
18	Council. Les Spindler, city resident and
19	homeowner and taxpayer.
20	MS. EVANS: Good evening.
21	MR. SPINDLER: It was very
22	disturbing for me to hear last week that the
23	AEDs that were donated to the city by Senofi
24	Pasteur have been sitting in Fire Chief
25	Davis' Office and not being used.

1	MR. MCGOFF: Excuse me, just a
2	clarification, I'm sorry, they are not in
3	Chief Davis' Office, he doesn't have them.
4	I was there.
5	MR. SPINDLER: Well, correct me if
6	I'm wrong, but Councilman Rogan stated that
7	last week and so did Councilman Loscombe.
8	I'm just going by what I heard.
9	MR. LOSCOMBE: We were reading from
10	a letter last week, Les, but I'm still
11	working on getting to the bottom of it and
12	to be honest with you I was going to address
13	it later, but I did speak to the chief, he
14	assured me they are not in his office.
15	MR. SPINDLER: Are they on the fire
16	trucks?
17	MR. LOSCOMBE: I believe there are
18	two trucks that have them at this point.
19	Rescue and once of the truck companies.
20	MR. SPINDLER: But they are not the
21	ones that were donated; correct?
22	MR. LOSCOMBE: No.
23	MR. SPINDLER: I'll be interested to
24	find out where they are if they're not in
25	the chief's office because they should be on

1	the fire trucks.
2	MR. LOSCOMBE: I agree.
3	MR. SPINDLER: We are talking about
4	saving lives here.
5	MR. LOSCOMBE: I still don't have a
6	full report to give, but it won't be tonight
7	because there is still information I'm
8	waiting on.
9	MR. SPINDLER: Well, we are talking
10	about saving lives here, whoever has them
11	should be getting them ready to go, put
12	batteries in, whatever, and get them on
13	those trucks. We are talking about lives.
14	MR. LOSCOMBE: But as Mr. McGoff
15	said, the chief doesn't have them in his
16	office, but they are somewhere in city hall
17	MR. SPINDLER: Okay, I'm just going
18	by what I heard last week.
19	The next thing, ATVs, I have talked
20	about them here and saying how dangerous
21	they are. If anybody read the paper this
22	week a young man from Tunkhannock High
23	School just got killed this week on an ATV.
24	There was also a story about two weeks ago
25	about an ATV hitting a young child and

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killing that child. I have come here many times saying how dangerous they are. I live in Tripp Park they are all over the place. I was walking my dog down Dorothy Street about two weeks ago in the dark, two ATVs came flying up Dorothy Street, had to be going 50 miles an hour. No lights, it was pitch dark, could have easily killed somebody. So maybe a letter could be sent to the chief and see if they get extra patrols on Dorothy Street maybe. I thought when the new school was built it might solve that problem because that's where they used to go, now they go all the way to the end of Dorothy Street and there is railroad tracks there, and that's where they are going.

But I was really upset that they came flying up Dorothy Street with no lights. It was pitch dark. No regard for anybody's safety, even their own.

MS. EVANS: Mrs. Krake will send that that to Chief Graziano for his attention to the situation, and I just want to add to that, I know I have personally have seen them on Parker Street, which is

particularly dangerous, because it's down to

one lane over that bridge for over two years

now and they will come flying through

regardless of the color of the light.

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MR. SPINDLER: Here's another pet peeve of mine, pit bulls. If anybody watched the news yesterday there was a pit bull attack in Hazelton. This gentleman was walking his dog, I forget what kind if was, but a pit bull attacked the dog. Thank God the dog lived, but it took \$2,000 worth of work to get that dog a hundred stitches. Thank God they found the owner, the owner is responsible to pay that \$2,000, but something has got to be done. And you know what, I think pit bull owners have should have to register that pit bull just like a sex offender has to register so we know where they are because when I walk my dog I'm always looking around. As you know, my dog was attached quite a few years ago by two pit bulls. Thank God she survived. I think these people should have to report them so we know where they are. I think it's a dangerous situation. These dogs are

1 very, very violent dogs.

Next, last week two candidates came 2 3 up to this podium and spoke and criticized 4 the way the tax office is being run, and one was a mayoral candidate. And with all due 5 respect, Mrs. Evans, I don't think you 6 should let that continue because we all know 7 8 the tax office is run by another mayoral 9 candidate and to me that's just up here 10 campaigning and I don't think it should be 11 done and I think the only person qualified 12 to run the city is the tax collector and 13 these people are just getting up here and 14 looking for their moment of fame, and I 15 don't think it should be allowed. Thev can 16 come up here and speak, but they shouldn't 17 be able to speak about another candidate. 18 The last thing, the food trucks, I 19 guess it's on the agenda tonight. 20 MS. EVANS: For the second reading. 21 MR. SPINDLER: I hope council 22 doesn't okay the way it's written right now. 23 I hope they leave it at 100 feet for the 24 food trucks because, as I said last week, we 25 can't put them out of business. Like I

1	said, if we chase them out of the city their
2	business what are we telling other
3	businesses coming into the city so I would
4	hope council keeps it at 100 feet, and
5	that's all I have to say right now. Thank
6	you.
7	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Bill
8	Jackowitz.
9	MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening,
10	Scranton City Council. Bill Jackowitz,
11	South Scranton resident.
12	MS. EVANS: Good evening.
13	MR. JACKOWITZ: It's nice to see all
14	these students here, I hope they will
15	participate in the election in May and I
16	hope they are not just here for credit.
17	And also to the students that are
18	here, there will be a Veterans Day Armed
19	Forces Day parade on May 18 at 11:00 in
20	Scranton, so I hope you can get all of your
21	students to come down and honor all of your
22	military personnel who will be marching in
23	that parade on May 18 because it would be
24	nice to get some young people out there for
25	the Armed Forces Day parade, maybe we can

1 match the St. Patrick's Day crowd. I doubt 2 it though.

Okay, lowest most responsible bidder, not necessarily the lowest bidder. Could this statement by Attorney Paul Kelly and be interpreted that the choice has already been made? Possibly pay to play back in Scranton? How has the taxpayers benefited with the new policies in effect for the parking garages and meters? Personally, I don't see any benefit yet. It's coming up on a year and now we got -- three people applying for and -- well, anyway, I hope there is no shenanigans in play here.

I also have the same question about city council. I mean, we pay \$130,000 a year approximately for city council, five city council members, three secretaries, and an attorney, but yet it seems like every time we are told that you can't do anything and all we do is send letters. We are making the post office rich if we are using stamps. I mean, seriously. I mean, somebody needs to do something. This city

has been distressed for 21 years. Somebody
has to do something and it has to be done
now. Every day wasted is another day people
are beholding, so sooner or later somebody
has to answer to these problems that the

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city has, whether it be the mayor or whether it be the department heads or whether it be city council.

I'm sorry to say that you guys are the only ones that are open because you hold a meeting every week. You know, the mayor, I don't even know if the mayor still lives in the city. You know, maybe he does, maybe he doesn't. I don't if Mark Dougher lives in the city. Maybe he does, maybe he doesn't. Nobody ever sees him around, and you try to call his office and he doesn't respond to your calls. You send him letters, he doesn't respond to his letters, so I don't know if they still live in the city or not. I mean, they may be living at who knows where, you know? But somebody has to do something. This has been going on for like 270 months now, the city has been distressed like 270 months, going on 21

1 years, and nobody ever has any answers.

2 I'm tired of hearing that, and a lot 3 of other people in this city are tired of 4 hearing that, tired of hearing that. need to start getting answers and somebody, 5 whether it be the mayor or whether it be 6 7 city council or whether it be the city 8 controller, you guys are the seven elected 9 people in this city. We elected you to help us and make our lives better, all seven of 10 11 Now, get together and start working 12 together. And I don't mean next year when 13 we get a new mayor and city council, I mean 14 right now, May 9, 2013, let's start working 15 together and working on these problems that 16 we have. It's ridiculous now and that's why 17 people don't even want to come to the city

anymore, seriously.

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I heard a candidate for mayor speak about negotiations with the city unions to try and reduce the payroll. We need to start that right now, May 9, 2013, we need to start those negotiations right now. We don't need to wait until we have a new mayor and a new city council and a new city

council president, we need to start those
negotiations and talks right now and get
something in place because the city is dying
and it's dying quick.

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After speaking with numerous Scranton residents we are weary of Scranton government as is. We need to get real in Scranton. Nobody has the stomach to do just that other than perhaps those who advocate bankruptcy. This city needs to behave as if it already is bankrupt because the city is bankrupt. It needs to make the tough decisions and make cuts. I do not see this happening, especially when the mayor elect is receiving a \$25,000 pay raise and appointed attorneys receive bonuses for doing their job, that is, helping the city out of the financial mess which was created by the seven Scranton elected officials and Pennsylvania Economy League. The taxpayers did not create this mess, but they will pay for it.

I see some fairly weak attempts at cutting costs, but nothing approaching the type of cuts and enforcement of current laws

that need to be put in place. Deb Neihaus
has proposed a noise ordinance. Ronny

Ellman has proposed citing people for
parking violations, nothing has ever been
done. Are we serious about raising revenue
or are we not? Let's get serious May 9,

2013.

MS. EVANS: Greg Evans.

MR. EVANS: Good evening. Greg
Evans, Scranton resident and homeowner and small business owner here in Scranton. I'r here today to address you regarding the upcoming food truck legislation. I'm not here to speak to you as a brick and mortar restaurant owner, which I am, nor am I representing anybody by speaking here, but it's great to see that, you know, some of our competitors are here, "What the Fork."

Instead, I'm here to speak to you purely as an advocate of what's best for Scranton. By that I mean, we must be mindful and think long-term that the legislation today has a positive impact on years to come. Let me state that I'm also a patron of the food trucks, believe it or

not, and I have enjoyed their menus and I appreciate their entrepreneurial efforts. One of my business is a restaurant and it relocated from it's original location in order to reduce expenses, rent, utilities, That was a smart business taxes, etcetera. decision that put us from losing money every month to profiting monthly. A smart decision right? Of course.

So what would happen if small restaurants see the advantages, especially of no property tax, and they decide they are going to downside to a food truck and leave their brick and mortar location. This concern lies on more vacant storefronts and I'm sure we can all agree vacancies aren't inviting for other businesses or residences. The downtown revitalization would be taking two steps back.

Again, this is not attacking the industry or taking a side right now, this is me being purely in the middle looking out what's best for the taxpayer. I'm solely speaking from the perspective of economic impact. There is good news, however, there

are simple solutions to encourage brick and
mortar restaurants to stay put in their
retail location and for food trucks to
operate on a level playing field.

I have three solutions I would like to suggest to you. One, allow the food trucks to operate, but limit the parking spaces they may occupy. This will prevent saturation of food trucks with food truck industry and allow for an acceptable amount of competition between the mobile vendors and the retail brick and mortars. This will also accord brick and mortar to stay where they are.

Two, increase the annual food truck fee. Yes, they have costs in doing business, too, I understand that completely, but this shows they are truly invested in Scranton just like the brick and mortars. Perhaps you might want to consider something of a PILOT.

Three, once the limited spaces are decided upon, bid them out. This would be a creative revenue source that would gain top dollar for "space fee for prime locations."

1 With these three solutions you are 2 controlling the economic impact off the 3 exciting new food truck industry and with 4 this control you are insuring a positive economic impact. You may also satisfy both 5 sides by creating a level playing field. 6 7 With these considerations and the open 8 dialogue between the brick and mortar and 9 the food trucks -- food truck vendors, I'm 10 confident they will find a way to co-exist 11 and collaborate to make downtown Scranton 12 even more inviting. These dialogues are a 13 great example of democracy. Moreover, they 14 are a brilliant example of cooperation. 15 Thank you. 16 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Doug Miller. 17 MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council. 18 Doug Miller, Scranton. I heard I was criticized earlier in the evening for 19 20 politicking from the podium again. I guess 21 that's what's happens when you've been 22 coming here for 12 years. You know, I don't come here as a candidate, I come here as a 23 24 concerned citizen of this city and, you

know, maybe if some of the other candidates

who are so-called concern only come out of 2 the woodwork every four years and they've 3 never attended a public meeting in their 4 life, you know, let them come down here. This podium and this chamber is open to everyone, so I have dealt with that issue in 7 the past, I'm not here to politic, I'm here to discuss issues, that's the difference.

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Moving onto business, I'd like to touch on the food trucks once again and reiterate my statement in support of the I don't see why we need to food trucks. make an issue out of this. These are individuals, as I stated last week, who are only try to make a living just like anyone else in this community and rather than causing harm and trying to force them out of the city as the administration is trying to do here, we should be supporting them. should be working cooperatively with them to ensure that they can be successful here and work with the brick and mortar establishments in the city.

This is about, you know, getting everyone involved and trying to move the

city forward and what we seem to want to do
here is push people out of the city that are
only trying to, you know, benefit not only
themselves but the community, and I'm
hopeful that, as I said last week, we can
come to a resolution on this and make sure
it's in the best interest of all parties.

You know, last week some statements were made in regards to the, you know, cooperation and the mayor and the council working together and, you know, it kind of brought me back to a lot of the arguments I made in the last year and a half, particularly going back to the summer when we dealt with the recovery plan and, you know, as I have said before, I sound like a broken record, I truly do wish it was as easy as, you know, a lot of the speakers think it is as well as a lot of the candidates out there running for office.

You know, we hear about, you know, how we need cooperation and we need to do this and we need to do that, and I don't think a lot of these individuals would last five minutes in your shoes if they really

knew what you went through last summer and how difficult the decisions were you had to make. You know, it's all sounds nice to say we need to work together, we need to do this, we need to make cuts. As we talked about last summer, there is only so much you can cut, you know, we hear we need to slash salaries and we need to cut public safety. There comes a point in time where it's not realistic anymore, there is only so much fat you can cut. You know, the only way you can move forward is by coming together and put your minds together and come up with a solutions and that's exactly what you did, that's why we had the recovery plan put in place.

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Yes, we know the reality at this point in time and we haven't realized a lot of those revenue sources, but as we talked about many times we could have very easily given up on all of those revenue enhancements and said, "You know what, we are going to take the easy way out and we're just going to throw in the towel and we're going to file for bankruptcy like so many

people want us to do."

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Well, that's not the solution. 2 3 Let's go down and see what's going on in 4 Harrisburg, and if you watch the news recently you see they have gotten themselves 5 in even more trouble by misleading investors 6 7 as to what their financial situation actually is. Is that what we want to have 8 9 yourselves in? Is that the situation we 10 want to put ourselves in at this time? I don't think it is.

> So for a lot of people out there who in my opinion think really don't have all of their facts together, I think you need to sit back and take a look at the whole picture that, yeah, this is a tough time, but we could sit and we can fingerprint point and we can go back and forth until we turn blue, the reality is we have difficult decisions to make and they are not easy, and it's been proven that when two sides of government come together things can happen.

So when we want to talk about cooperation, well, yeah, let's go back to the summertime because we had cooperation. You know, we had a council and mayor that we never thought would come together but it happened because this council put politics aside and realized one thing, the people in this community and the future is what matters, and we know the onces that contributed. We know the ones that sat and grandstanded week after week and contributed nothing. We know who those individuals are and we know who made the tough decision.

And I am confident in this recovery plan and I'm confident in the work that you put into it and that we will realize these revenue sources and it's going to take time. Things don't happen overnight, but we don't give up. We need to stay the course and I commend you for everything you have done, and that's all for tonight. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. I might add to this quickly, this council truly has worked hand in hand with the administration for over a year half now and everyone on this council, with the exception of one member, has worked with the mayor and his administrators regularly, almost weekly,

from Mr. Loscombe and his negotiations with the mayor on union contracts. Mr. Joyce, who has handled the finances admirably and been to all of the meetings with PEL with financial firms. Myself. I know that Councilman McGoff, for example, handled the rental registration program and attends 7 weekly PEL meetings.

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So I think it's really a disservice to say that, you know, there is -- actually there two issues at stake here, that cooperation is going to solve everything. Cooperation is wonderful and we have been cooperating fully now since December of 2011, but the problems are so great that it requires much, much more than that.

And, you know, unfortunately, as well-intentioned as people are they don't understand all of the good, the bad and the ugly of what's gone on and the facts. would say, you know, I just wanted to correct that mistaken impression that's been circulating for far too long that there is never been any cooperation and there is a toxic relationship. That is not true.

1	And number two, I think, you know,
2	to say that cooperation is going to solve
3	all of the problems, all the financial
4	problems of the city is terribly naive
5	because yes, certainly it's needed, but
6	there is so, so much to be done to makeup
7	for what has occurred since 2002 and it's
8	going to, as I said last week, it's going to
9	take years to undo the damage. It's not
10	going to have happen overnight and it's not
11	going to happen magically because everyone,
12	you know, holds hands. It certainly comes
13	though from cooperation, that's a great
14	help. Discussion and diversity of ideas,
15	listening to one another and being open to
16	trying everything and anything that did keep
17	this city alive, keep public services being
18	offered to the taxpayers and keep their
19	taxes manageable. And our next speaker is
20	Lee Morgan.
21	MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.
22	MS. EVANS: Good evening.
23	MR. MORGAN: I think the first thing
24	I have here is that I didn't mention
25	anyone's name last week. I merely agreed

with what the Scranton Times said and gave
my opinion on who the solicitor should be
and why.

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But, you know, what I'd like to say here tonight is that I think people come here and ask, like the first gentleman he asked why we are not paving the roads. mean, it's previous obvious why we are not paving the roads, and this isn't a shot at council, but in my opinion the city has been living on government welfare for decades and we have come to the point where everything is done with grants and sometimes we make unwise choices and borrow money and that's what's come, but at the end of every long day there is only one person responsible and that's the individual voters who go out and vote for the candidates of their choice, and in my opinion that's their prerogative. They are free to vote for whoever they care to vote for, and I think as damage continues to move in a forward cycle it reaches a point where it's decades long and then how do you turn around at the end of the cycle and say that the last people sitting in the

seats are the ones responsible for cycle

after cycle damage and just no intervention?

Just you just keep passing it down the line,

you know?

I just find that the people in this city have to start making wise and conscious choices and I kind of agree with what Mrs.

Evans said today, I don't think the tooth fairy is coming tonight to solve all of the problems the city has financially, and I'm somewhat of an opinion that we are going to see exactly where we stand in the next budget because I think it's going to be unbelievable and I don't know where all the money is going to come from, but maybe people will be hoping the tooth fairy is coming so we will see where that goes.

But, you know, the things that has me is I didn't get a chance to see it, I have only heard about it, but I did read some of it in the Scranton Times when they did interviews with the council candidates and I just -- and this isn't a shot at the Scranton Times, this is just my opinion, I don't see how we can allow candidates to

how we are going to go back into Court and ask the Court to grant us one, and that's not a criticism of the recovery plan, but Mr. Serafini's amendments were quite plain that we had to prove that the recovery plan actually worked and raise the revenue it was designed to raise, and it hasn't happened so my only curiosity is how can we have candidates for office discussing a commuter tax that can't be enacted because the law doesn't allow it?

I mean, maybe if the solicitor was here he could give his opinion, but I just think that when we start listening to political campaigns, whoever they are, they should be based in fact and I think the last person that should be driving misinformation to the public is either the radio or the television or the newspaper because all of the voters come to a conclusion of where we should go and most get no information from government itself, they go to outside sources.

And the first gentlemen when he

1 talked today about the roads, I did a 2 Right-to-Know on the money that the city has 3 spent over the decades and the amount of 4 money that the city has invested in itself is zero. I mean, I have gone back 50 years. 5 Everything has been done with grant money. 6 7 There is only one or two projects that the 8 city solely funded, because I asked the question.

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So when you look at that and you have people come up and they ask, "What's the role of council," I think that every citizen in this city should read the Home Rule Charter and know what the branches of government do or what they should do and that's only good citizenship, and I think that more people should be at these council meetings and be more bated in government understand what we can accept from our government. It's great to just stand there and expect unrealistic things, but then when you expect unrealistic things you stop participating because nothing happens.

So, you know, I just hope you guys have a good day and thank you.

1 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Our next 2 speaker is Dave Dobrzyn. 3 MR. DOBRZYN: I have something to 4 give to the council here and I'll comment on it as we go. Okay, on 7-A, city business, 5 we have a request for the Assessor's Office 6 7 and the commissioners to start reviewing tax 8 exempts and some of them do great things and 9 some of them are just simply tax exempt and 10 they greatly benefit people throughout the 11 county and the region and nobody wants to 12 compensate us for over 30 percent tax exempt 13 properties in this town, so I would like it 14 see some PILOTS. I'd like to see safety 15 fees and paving fees so that some day 16 somebody that hasn't had their street paved 17 or plowed in 26 years can get their street 18 paved on plowed or whatever. 19 And I'd also like to once again 20 stress that they should be politically 21 neutral. As a tax exempt charitable 22 organization, you have no right to determine 23 how other people should live to your 24 religious doctrine.

Okay, food vendors. I'm torn on

1 that. I guess that is what, No. 6-C? 2 that what governs the food vendors tonight? 3 MS. EVANS: It's in Sixth Order. 4 MR. DOBRZYN: Okav. Now. at this point I think we need to really look at this 5 because there is nice people on both sides 6 7 of it. If you put the food vendors out of 8 town, first I seen something about them not 9 being allowed to operate at night after many of these institutions are closed. 10 11 purchased -- when the Scranton Times had 12 their fireworks at Thanksgiving and the lighting of the tower I had a nice gyro at 13 14 the street festival and there was a band 15 there and the restaurant on the corner was 16 closed, so I couldn't buy anything there, 17 right? So I think it should be just let be 18 or tabled and let's see when the smoke 19 clears and debate this a little further. 20 Now, council candidates please start 21 attending. I read about the debate, I'll try and catch it hopefully, I can see it on 22 23 ECTV, but there is a lot of debt in the city 24 and we need to know how it's going to be

paid and the test of a true fiscal

conservative is somebody that pays the bills. My philosophy on life, and I'm not broke, is that accept the worst and you will always been pleasantly surprised because if everything can go wrong it will and if everything goes wrong you will still have the bills paid and your head above water. And expect the worst and it's like I said, it's all downhill from there, it's a breeze, so I'd like them to start attending, and they don't have to comment on political situations or campaign from the podium, but they certainly do need to get up the speed with what's going on in the city. 

And I have a question with General Dynamics, and it's not the parking situation, and it's a warning to them, it's my understanding what the work of General Dynamics can be bid by Canada or Mexico under NAFTA and I'm wondering, very seriously wondering if the lack of work down there is because somebody in the government is getting cheaper merchandise from another country. We had that with the tanks. We had the A1 Abrahams tank that Canada bought

1	the German one and we are supposed to be in
2	a trade agreement and they bought the German
3	one manufactured in Germany and now if there
4	was a situation where it was needed they
5	would have to go to Europe for parts. It
6	sounds silly to me.
7	And 5-A and B does that involve
8	Dewey Park that is selling a certain tracks
9	of land to the highway department PennDOT?
10	MS. EVANS: On Harrison Avenue?
11	MR. DOBRZYN: Yes. It kinds of
12	sounds like it.
13	MS. EVANS: I think a certain
14	portion of the land there that I believe the
15	PennDOT needs to purchase in order to
16	MR. DOBRZYN: Build the bridge.
17	MS. EVANS: Fulfill it's bridge
18	project.
19	MR. DOBRZYN: I think they are going
20	to try and keep the bridge open. Well,
21	whatever has to be has to be, hopefully they
22	can renovate or replace or, you know, do
23	something decent after the fact because up
24	on Meadow Avenue, the last three blocks of
25	Meadow Avenue were beaten to hell to put

that bridge in over the gorge by the
cemetery back there and they didn't fix
anything. The construction vehicles were
over that day and it's all beaten up and
torn up and been left that way.

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Okay, and what I gave you, what I'm asking is that that's an article on the Taliban taking over in Afghanistan. the war drums are beating in Washington once again to get involved with Syria and all we see to do in this country is setup a theological dictatorship where people are given the death penalty for not even -- just a silly church doctrine, Islamic doctrine, and I would like for you to consider sending a letter to our representatives to stay the heck out of Syria, including the president, because we spend \$3 trillion, we have wounded troops that aren't being cared for and everything else and here we go again. Now, what's it's going to be, we are going to have a \$5 trillion deficit piled onto the deficit over Syria I don't see that as right.

25 And I'll make it quick, Eric Cantor

1 is trying to sell comp time as compensation for overtime. Whatever about the taxes? 2 3 What about if you become employed? Can they 4 hold that over to a quarter where you laid off early and you have a low quarter? It's 5 all just take the money when I work for it. 6 7 Forget about it, Eric Cantor. Don't forget 8 to bawk, bawk, bawk everybody. Have a good 9 night. 10 MS. EVANS: Thank you. That 11 concludes our sign-in sheet, is there anyone 12 else who cares to address council? 13 MR. MARTIN: Good evening, Council. 14 My name is Ken Martin, I'm a city taxpayer 15 and homeowner. I'm also the president of 16 the West Side Falcon Youth Organization in 17 West Side. I came here tonight mainly 18 because I don't like anybody saying anything 19 false about the West Side Falcons or me 20 myself. It is what it is, that's the way I 21 believe in my life, which I'm not going 22 through a good time in my life right now and anybody that knows me knows my wife Cathy is 23

going through a tough time.

1 and the rest of them from OECD I just want everybody to know, and I want people to know 2 3 out there, first of all, do I believe the 4 bridge should be fixed in any way, anyhow? Yeah. Even if it was Falcon money or 5 anybody else's money, yeah. 6

> I have lost kids down at my fields, all right? I have lost two players recently in the last couple of years in a fire. I certainly don't want any kid falling or anything like that or anybody getting hurt, but I believe the truth needs to be said at times and not to lie or fabricate.

> I'm not going to say too much, I will say one thing back in '07 when we did get the grant for the lights, which again, all you know was for \$100,000 and the lights came in and they were for I believe 79, a truck came in from Mesko and dropped them -actually drove on the field and we were responsible for taking them off. And, again, I did talk 23 to Leo about it again and it was just a 24 quick -- so that's what happened and as far 25 as that 21 and that stayed there forever,

1 all right?

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As far as -- I know times are tough 2 3 all over, as far as the paving, I believe it 4 was originally -- and that's been done a couple of times. I know she said tonight, 5 "You've got to jump on things," well, this 6 7 isn't my only job. This is something I do 8 because I love it, you know? I go to work, I just got home, you know, usually during 9 10 the season I'm just getting home going to practice. I eat at 8:30.

> Yeah, that's all I can say. I forget where I left off to tell you the truth. I just wish people would tell the truth, you know? As far as, again, I think I'm starting to remember. Again, remind me, I'm sorry for the way I'm dressed, but I came right from work and, okay, back to the when they dropped it down to the ten. Again, I was told no and it stayed there forever and as far as the paving, and that's where I was as far as the paving, all right?

> The paving, it was done a couple of times, it was done by former player of mine Russo, all right, and all of the boys played

for me, so honestly the city was getting a great deal by him doing it. Anybody that's been by our field, all right, you know, on the back alley Dewey Avenue right by the steps it looks pretty bad right now, he was going to cut that out and pave. He was also going to repave as you go up the backside, the back hill.

MS. EVANS: Please finish.

MR. MARTIN: You want me to finish?

As far as the roofing, all right, and by the way, I believe the first time he ever gave me an estimate on it was like 18 and then I contacted him again when I thought it was going and I said, well, just say that things are dropped, I disagree with her there, all right?

As far as the surveys, you got to understand this not just -- I have a normal job, I have a normal family, all right?

Taking surveys, not everybody likes to give one. Not everybody wants to know and let the city know what they are making. Do I try my best? Absolutely. I will say this, I did go down to her office twice, not once,

twice to hand in surveys, all right? How
many? I don't know. I wish I counted them,
maybe if we ever got business with the city
again I guess I'll hire my own solicitor or
attorney.

As far as the roof, the roof was appraised at four grand, that was material only, I had a private contractor that was one of my coaches on my "C" team that was willing to do it, him and his brother, and certainly down at our field all the coaches would have pitched in as far as carrying the bundles up and all he would have to do was lay them. That's how it was.

All right, and I don't want take any more time up because I watch these meetings a lot, but I don't come much, unfortunately I work a lot, I work out of town. Jack, you did ask for something from Ms. Aebli, I don't have them all here because I did run, but I did find a couple ones just loose, I guarantee you, I know where you live, I believe, I will find more for you and this is something you asked for today.

MR. LOSCOMBE: They will have to

1 produce what they have, also. Thank you.

MR. MARTIN: Again, I think all of you do a great job, it's not easy. I'm just a little guy that has 200 kids. By the way, it's not 200 families, it's 200 kids about 240, it fluctuates sometimes, sometimes the cheerleaders are better than the boys, you know. That's all I really got to say.

Again, just the only reasonable why
I came down here is to tell the truth, okay?
Good night, Council.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. If I could just make a comment, I know Kenny very well, he is married to my sister, of course, and she is having her problems like Kenny said, but I've got to commend Ken. I'm telling you for years and years he has coached the football teams back there, coached many of the great players today, college and beyond on his own time and his own heart and he drives back and forth every day to Berwick. I don't know how he has the stamina and energy he has to be honest with you, but as you can see he is passionate. He is passionate about what he does. You

could hear it in him and I know he would
like to say a lot more, and that's what
upsets me and I think I'll save it for
motions because, you know, I have been quiet
for quite awhile and now and I think I'm
ready to blowup.

You know, sometimes fair is fair, sometimes it's not, but the way some things transpire it makes you wonder and I think hopefully come election there is enough people in this city that have their eyes open to what's going been on here. And again, I'm going to save that for motions, but just to touch on what Kenny said, there was \$20,000, \$21,000 I think left over from the light, and we were told by Mr. DeAngelo at that time that anything over \$10,000 had to be bid. Kenny went to the company that they got the previous lighting from and they dropped the price under \$10,000 at a cut rate price to do it.

Then we were told, no, we can't do it and at that point when we applied for the paving and the roof we were told we can't transfer that money over. Ironically,

that's what they did. So I don't know what

to believe over there to be honest with you.

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Now, as Mr. Martin stated they bought the lighting for the field it was dropped off, the Falcons took care of everything from that point off, from the time they dropped them off from the truck. However, the hassle just to get the material for this roof \$4,000 getting material for the roof, and he had a roofer that's on the lead that was going on put it on there, we were told you had to have an engineering plan and this and that, that's the same with the parking. I mean, some times this money, good money is thrown after bad. That's what's wrong with some of these government programs.

And she said it's got to be shovel ready, you got to be able to get right into it. That's okay for the people that are on this OECD list year after year getting these grants because they already have the lawyers, they already have the financing and they already have the know how, but when you are an average Joe and you are trying to get

1	something for the people you work for and
2	help and represent to say it has to be

11	fingers here. Believe me, if we could there
12	would be a lot more done. Cooperation,
13	that's a big word. Mrs. Evans alluded to it
14	before, we cooperate as much as we can with
15	everybody. It's tough when the cooperation
16	doesn't come back. When we ask information
17	from department heads and we are ignored or
18	given lip service, which is the most part,
19	not only us neighborhood groups and
20	everything, this has been the culture here
21	for several years. That's why we are deeper
22	and deeper.

My frustration has been building up and I'm letting it out, I apologize, but this is what's been going on and election day is coming up and you have to elect the people that you believe in and you think can help and work with us, not those that have been connected, not those that continually have connections, and don't believe in lip service. Look at their history, look at their eyes, believe what they have to say because that's what you are going to have.

We are going to have a new majority come January. I'm sad to see two of my colleagues leaving this board, and I would only hope the best for their future because they have been great to work with. And again, we all don't agree on everything here but we work together and we get things resolved, but it's easy to sit back as a candidate or whatever and say, "We need cooperation. That's the big problem.

That's what we didn't happen have."

Sometimes too much cooperation is the problem. Look back a few years ago when everything was being passed right through. We are checks and balances. We don't have to cooperate all of the time, we have to work for you and that's what we do, and it's been a long time since I had my blood pressure up like that. There is a lot more I could say, but, you know, be smart be, be wise, be careful, love your city like I do and, you know, I have taken personal hits, financial hits because of this political system that abounds in this area. This is somebody that has to stop. It's all over

1	this area, and I have had people lose their
2	jobs because of where I am, but I'm not
3	going to comprise my beliefs to cow-toe to
4	someone of a higher importance. I could
5	have quit a long time ago and made a lot
6	more money than I am sitting here right now,
7	but I believe that we can make a difference
8	and I belive that I have stuck it out. And
9	God bless my wife for sticking it out with
10	me through this, but I'll get off the
11	soapbox now, I'm sorry.
12	MS. EVANS: No, I think it needed to
13	be said. Thank you. Is there anyone else
14	who cares to address council?
15	MR. LOSCOMBE: I'm sorry, Andy, for

25	MR. MCGOFF: Yes, they are.

1	MR. SBARAGALIA: As far as the
2	bridges, I guess we can teach all the kids

4	bridges are falling down. You will fit
5	right in and we'll get by. Actually, it
6	might even get action out of Washington.
7	But I was reading in the paper about
8	the bids for the meters, is that \$60,000
9	figure right that was there, that they were
10	offering \$60,000 for the meter; is that
11	right?
12	MS. EVANS: To operate the meter
13	program, not purchase them.
14	MR. SBARAGLIA: Yes, to operate the
15	meters they are giving us \$60,000 to operate
16	the meters and then you said that we were
17	collecting, what was we collecting on the
18	meters, something like a half a million was
19	pouring from the meter collections into the
20	city coffers that we couldn't transfer them
21	meters over to the Parking Authority because
22	we needed the money? It just don't make
23	sense half the time.
24	MR. LOSCOMBE: Their contract is for
25	\$60,000 to operate them, to maintain them.

1	MR. SBARAGLIA: I understand that,
2	but who is getting the money from the
3	collection?
4	MS. EVANS: The city.
5	MR. SBARAGLIA: The city is going to
6	get it. Why would anybody give you \$60,000
7	to operate those meters or are we paying
8	them \$60,0000?
9	MR. LOSCOMBE: That's what I tried
10	to say, we are paying them 60,000. That's
11	far different from the 125,000 that we
12	originally did. If we didn't put it out for
13	bid where it would.
14	MR. SBARAGLIA: Oh, that's what it
15	is. You want to pay them 60,000 to operate
16	the meters. Who pays for the meter maids?
17	I didn't read the contract because it was a
18	closed deal that day. Who pays for the
19	meter maids to go out there and walk around
20	and check for citations?
21	MS. EVANS: The city pays an agreed
22	upon monthly payment to a parking meter
23	manager. Out of those funds, I'm assuming
24	the employees are paid. They are employees
25	of the parking meter management company.

They are not employees of the City of Scranton.

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3 MR. SBARAGLIA: Oh. I assumed that 4 because for 60,000 I don't think they would be hiring union people, that's obvious, so 5 apparently the meter maids are going to lose 6 7 their jobs or be transferred. Do we really 8 have to do it, that's the question. Do we 9 really have to do ti? Surely there must be 10 some person in the administration that can 11 actually operate meters, parking meters. I remember we did it. This wasn't something 12 13 that was there before life in Scranton. 14 used to do it. I remember people going out 15 and collecting the meters, checking the 16 meters, but all of a sudden now you feel 17 like we don't have the people really with 18 the brain power to do it, and I don't quite 19 understand that. It shouldn't be that complex and the police and the citation issuers can go out there and do what they always do. I got a ticket from the police up at the hospital. They did their job. was parked a little too far out, so they gave me a ticket. I went down and the paid the ticket, but why do you assume we can no longer do anything in the city very good anymore? Everything has to be let out to somebody else. We want to sell the Sewer Authority, the Department of Public Works, this, that and whatever. What has happened to the administration in this city that we can't hire people competent enough inside of the city to do the job that must be done.

1	I'll provide it to the Clerk's Office, a
2	copy of the letter that the tax exempt
3	review letter was sent to all of the tax
4	exempts out in Allegheny and can go online
5	and you can read it and if you want to spend
6	nine bucks you can even print it.
7	But if we put the onus back on the
8	nonprofits rather than us trying to do it
9	and then have somebody hire somebody perhaps
10	to go over those and do a spot check with
11	the 990's to make sure that everything was
12	accurate or make the 990's an attachment I
13	think that would at least get it moving
14	instead of playing ping pong with the
15	county, I don't think that's going to
16	happen.
17	Back to some old items, Mr. Joyce,
18	again, you provided figures last week
19	comparing real estate tax revenue through
20	April for 2012 and 2013?
21	MR. JOYCE: Yes.
22	MS. SCHUMACHER: Did 2013 include
23	the 22 percent tax hike again?
24	MR. JOYCE: Well, yes. Revenues
25	increased by 27 percent, but, of course, we

1	did have a 22 percent tax increase so
2	MS. SCHUMACHER: And that's not
3	usable for operating, general operating,
4	that's for the unfunded debt repayment;
5	correct? So it's not really going to do
6	operations a whole bunch more, so we don't
7	have a lot of money, extra money around to
8	do more than we thought; correct?
9	MR. JOYCE: Correct. Part of of
10	course, part of that is for the unfunded
11	debt.
12	MS. SCHUMACHER: Yes. Well, both
13	years, 2011 and 2012 and one was ten and one
14	was 12 so, yeah, that's 22 the way I add,
15	yeah, so that's too bad. I hope we find a
16	way to split that out so it more accurately
17	reflects what's usable for operating
18	expenses and what's going to prior debt
19	repayment.
20	Then, Mr. McGoff, back to you on the
21	rental registrations or do I have to did a
22	Right-to-Know to get the number of
23	properties that are registered and of those
24	how many have been inspected by our city
25	inspectors

1	MR. MCGOFF: I do not have that
2	number.
3	MS. SCHUMACHER: Can you get it
4	reasonably you think?
5	MR. MCGOFF: I could try.
6	MS. SCHUMACHER: I would appreciate
7	it. If you don't get it by next week and
8	I'm here next week I'll do a Right-to-Know.
9	The other thing, do you know if they have
10	provided the list of those who are
11	registered to the Single Tax Office so that
12	they can also check to see if they are
13	paying mercantile on the rentals?
14	MR. MCGOFF: I do not know offhand
15	if they have done that.
16	MS. SCHUMACHER: Could you check on
17	that as well?
18	MR. MCGOFF: Okay.
19	MS. SCHUMACHER: Because that's
20	another okay, now, oh, the parking meters
21	they were just talking about, is there a
22	copy of the RFP available in the Clerk's
23	Office? I'll try to come in and Monday and
24	review that because the way I'm looking at
25	it and looking at the quotes this is only

1	for the management portions, so I guess
2	there is going to be a second RFP for buying
3	new meters and etcetera? Is that the
4	upstanding? That we'll go back to zero and
5	when a car pulls out? I mean, the last one
6	had new heads on polls, is that still a
7	plan?
8	MR. LOSCOMBE: My intention was for
9	them to be rebid, for the company to the
10	successful company to bid the technology.
11	MS. SCHUMACHER: That's the way
12	MR. LOSCOMBE: Or for us to bid the
13	technology for the, you know vice versa.
14	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, because I
15	really didn't like the way
16	MR. LOSCOMBE: However, that doesn't
17	mean it's going to happen that way.
18	MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, the way it
19	sounds, and I hope it's not true, that's why
20	I want to look at them, is that it's
21	it's just going to be a fallback. We just
22	wasted a bunch of time and it was going to
23	be
24	MR. LOSCOMBE: There is
25	quote/unquote a sentence in this newspaper.

1	MS. SCHUMACHER: And that's very
2	troubling. I have a lot more, but please
3	pass 6-A and B tonight in Sixth and Seventh
4	Orders. Thank you.
5	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
6	MR. JOYCE: Thank you. Is there
7	anyone else who would like to address
8	council?
9	MS. DANIEL: Hello, my name is
10	Simone Daniel and I'm a city taxpayer and
11	homeowner.
12	MR. JOYCE: Pardon me, would you be
13	able to repeat your name?
14	MS. DANIEL: Simone Daniel.
15	MR. JOYCE: Pardon?
16	MS. DANIEL: Simone Daniel.
17	MR. MCGOFF: Move the microphone a
18	little closer.
19	MS. DANIEL: Is that better? I
20	wanted to address the food trucks. I would
21	hope that you would vote to keep the ruling
22	at 100 feet and keep I think at night
23	when businesses are closed that the distance
24	should be dropped. The trucks have been a
25	nice addition to the city. It's new

1	business and provides the city with a good
2	service, particularly at night. What I love
3	about Scranton is that it's never felt like
4	a small town. We have never thought
5	ourselves as small and I think we should be
6	embracing this growth and entrepreneurship.
7	The new regulations will drive out these
8	businesses. There will be a lot of loss of
9	investment for these people and they base
10	this investment on the standing regulations.
11	So I think to encourager continued
12	growth and not to see anymore people without
13	any income and without the loss of jobs. If
14	we keep things the way they are, I think
15	it's worked fairly well. There are
16	glitches, but I think there is room for
17	improvement, but we need to be keeping them
18	where they belong. Thank you.
19	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
20	MR. JOYCE: Is there anyone else who
21	would like to address council?
22	MR. SLEDZENSKI: Frank. Hi, how are
23	you? Didn't say hi tonight, Frank.
24	MR. JOYCE: I didn't see you,
25	Chrissy.

1	MR. SLEDZENSKI: Hi, Jackie.
2	Frankie, this is for you, Frank. The street
3	down by my house, frank, the potholes are a
4	mess down there. They are a mess.
5	MR. JOYCE: Okay.
6	MR. SLEDZENSKI: Thank you.
7	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thanks, Chrissy.
8	MR. JOYCE: Is there anyone else who
9	would like to address council?
10	MS. KRAKE: 5-A. MOTIONS.
11	MR. JOYCE: Mr. McGoff, do you have
12	any comments or motions?
13	MR. MCGOFF: Yes, first of all on
14	the food truck/restaurant situation, I spoke
15	to Ms. Leslie Collins, the director of
16	Scranton Tomorrow today following the
17	meeting that was held with both the food
18	truck vendors and the restaurant owners.
19	I'm told that there were approximately 20
20	individuals that attended the meeting and
21	that it was kind of an issue oriented
22	meeting with open and productive dialogue.
23	And, as she said or it was in her e-mail to
24	me that it was amicable and that the issues
25	were discussed openly and that many of the

issues were discussed were a few that were

still open that needed to be addressed and

that they were going to reconvene early next

week and that they would hopefully have some

time after that meeting have any proposed

changes that they had that they would agree

to, that they had agreed to.

I know that that probably moves beyond the deadline that you had originally set, but I would hope that we can see the progress that has been made and that we can wait until their proposals are presented to us before we advance the legislation or before we vote on it in Seventh Order. I'm assuming that they will vote on this this evening to move to --

MS. EVANS: In Sixth.

MR. MCGOFF: And move it to Seventh Order and then wait to see what changes are proposed and what they have -- what agreement they have reached. I think that is the way in which we can resolve this to everybody's pleasure or at least somewhat at their pleasure. I think by moving forward with legislation that doesn't include their

proposals would be fool hearty and really
would defeat the purpose that we originally
set out to accomplish.

And with that, I would like to thank Leslie Collins from Scranton Tomorrow for conducting these meetings and I think it's an example of what cooperation and working together can do to resolve issues and hopefully by the end of next week or the following week we have some resolutions to the situation and we can move forward with the proposals and with the legislation that would be acceptable to all.

As far as the caucus that was held this evening and the funding for the West Lackawanna bridge, I thought Ms. Aebli presented the proposals from OECD very I'll say properly. She told us exactly why these things were chosen and we have questioned in the past OECD for not being diligent and doing the things and now when Ms. Aebli comes here and explains that she is trying to follow the requirements, the HUD requirements for funding of these programs, now we are questioning why she is doing

1 that.

I think that, you know, if we don't want the funding for that to come from these sources then we should provide some other alternatives, but from what she presented these -- some of these activities are not eligible, others still have money remaining that would be sufficient for doing these projects into the end 2013, and as far as I was concerned I was content with what she had to say and proof of what she had to say.

The third thing, somebody mentioned, you know, someone mentioned about street repairs and street paving, DPW started doing street repairs and paving in April and have continued to do so on a daily basis. Maybe it wasn't in front your house or in some areas that you have driven, but they have been out on a daily basis doing repairs when possible, weather permitting, they have been doing the repairs and actually have milled and started to pave a number of streets throughout the city.

And lastly, on the rental registration, although I didn't ask specific

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numbers I did speak to Mr. Seitzinger and also to Lori Reed, who is now in the Rental Registration Office, I don't know if that's the right term, but they are now conducting a second mailing to landlords who have not responded and telling them or explaining to them the late fees and other things that would be incumbent upon them should they not meet the -- now that they have not met the They are increasingly the deadlines. database daily. Housing inspectors are out every day looking at properties and adding to the database and she explains to me that a lot of the work that they have been doing has been sort of the office work working towards getting the database set and doing the mailings and so on and that they have now started to increase the time that they are spending doing the inspections so that the number of inspections should be increasing through the summer months.

And the last thing I think that should be noted that revenue from rental registration has already exceeded the budgeted amount and if it continues, and

1	especially if they get to some of the
2	delinquent landlords, that it probably
3	should exceed the budgeted amount by quite a
4	bit. And that's all I have. Thank you.
5	MS. EVANS: Thank you. And,
6	Councilman Rogan, any motions or comments?
7	MR. ROGAN: Yes. Quite a few issues
8	tonight actually. I guess I'll start on the
9	West Lackawanna bridge caucus that we had
10	and, you know, I echo a lot of what
11	Mr. Loscombe said and, you know, I
12	understand his frustration and first I'd
13	like to thank Ms. Aebli for coming in, which
14	is something that we don't get from any
15	other department heads, so at least that's,
16	you know, something positive to take from
17	the evening.
18	My concern is obviously all of these
19	projects are worthy. Myself and others on
20	council have made certain things priorities
21	in the funding with these allocations, one
22	of them being demolition of hazardous
23	structures, and I think we need to there

is so many properties in this city that need

to be torn down, there is so many of them,

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and I am worried that taking the funding

away now even though it may not be used this

year will leave us short when it comes to

removing those structures in the future.

Now, Ms. Aebli mentioned that, you know, and she is right that there can't be over a certain amount of money in the whole portfolio and we addressed that issue last year when it did occur, I believe it was by a unanimous vote, to transfer funding from an area that I believe everyone was on board supports which are the neighborhood police patrols that we couldn't legally use at the time into neighborhood paving.

I don't think there is one elected official in this city that believes simply let the funding go and return the funding back to HUD. If we got to where we had to use the funds we would move them into a program where we could use it. This program or this project, the West Lackawanna bridge, I disagree with the assessment that it's shovel ready. Shovel ready to me means if we funded it today the work would begin within the next month. There is still

1 months of reports that have to be done 2 before anything constructive is done.

Now, obviously, that's part of the process, but shovel ready to me means the engineering is done, everything is ready with a crew ready, they just need the phone call to say the money has been appropriated. We are not in that scenario. I don't see what the urgency in approving this transfer is. There is also \$113,000 appropriated for the West Lackawanna Avenue bridge and Ms. Aebli stated tonight that would be more than enough to get the ball rolling on this studies and the various other things that need to happen before we get to the actual building, the actual repairs.

Two other issues, one that I'm glad Mr. Loscombe brought up because I know we talked about it previously and I forget to mention it during the caucus, is that travel in West Side is already very -- it's already very difficult to get from West Scranton to other parts of the town because of the bridges that are out. I believe PennDOT I think maybe a month ago informed us that the

Linden Street bridge would be repaired by
the end of the year. Now, if Linden was
back up and running and Lackawanna had to go
down to two lanes it wouldn't be as much of
a burden because drivers would have an

7 neighborhoods in West Scranton.

That being said, at this time I personally believe it should remain on the table, I don't know how my colleagues feel about that. I wouldn't be comfortable voting on it right now and I think we should have a firm dollar amount of what the actual cost is. The money was transferred, the \$113,000 that's in there now was transferred from the Rockwell Avenue bridge because too much was put in so we may not even need this total, it might be even less. It may be more. I would rather have the exact amount of what it's going to cost before we put the funding in.

And I'm glad Mr. Martin came as well to give their side of the story. They do great work down there and we, at least myself, I would certainly rather give them \$4,000 for material materials and have volunteer labor than give out a grant to another organization for \$20,000 that's doing the materials and the labor and everything all bundled together.

But it's just frustrating that it played out this way, you know, that I know Mr. Loscombe for over a year has talked about this bridge and if the engineers are correct and the bridge is structurally sound and there is no danger to motorists, you know, I don't see the urgency in transferring the money right now and it's

1	going to be it's going to a few months
2	anyways.
3	And next, another important issue is
4	Pike Street. Mr. Galdieri was here once
5	again and this is a very frustrating issue.
6	Now, obviously funds are limited, not every
7	street that needs to be paved can be paved.
8	Anyone who tells you that will be foolish,
9	but when a resident calls council members or
10	e-mails for years even before I was on the
11	board, current council members, the mayor,
12	current director of DPW, former directors of
13	DPW and can't even get an answer, that
14	speaks to a problem in city hall, a complete
15	lack of cooperation in city hall and anyone
16	who tells you there is cooperation in this
17	building is delusional.
18	MR. MCGOFF: I'm not delusional.
19	MR. ROGAN: Well, you wouldn't agree
20	that council needs to cooperate better and
21	have caucuses before the meetings and
22	everything else?
23	MR. MCGOFF: I just said I was in
24	city hall this week, went to basically every

department and spoke to everybody.

1	MR. ROGAN: You believe right now in
2	the city everyone is cooperating as well as
3	we can?
4	MR. MCGOFF: Not as well as we can
5	perhaps, but it's not total absence of the
6	cooperation either
7	MR. ROGAN: And not only
8	MR. MCGOFF: like you are
9	indicating.
10	MR. ROGAN: Not only with
11	intergovernmental, but the residents as
12	well. If a resident calls a department, you
13	know, you don't expect to speak to the
14	director of the department or obviously you
15	can't phone the mayor at any time of day, he
16	keeps a very busy schedule as well, and I'm
17	not certainly not, you know, defending the
18	mayor, but you would expect a call back at
19	some point in time or a letter or something
20	even if it's saying, you know, in this
21	issue, "Mr. Galdieri, we don't have the
22	funding right now to fix your road, we will
23	try to fix the potholes. You know, please
24	try to wait it out another year."
25	Some kind of answer. Not just, you

1	know, no response. I know Mrs. Evans
2	mentioned it was how many years ago did this
3	begin when you were before I was on the
4	board?
5	MS. EVANS: And actually before
6	Mr. Galdieri turned to me, I know he had
7	been e-mailing Mr. Courtright about it for
8	quite awhile, so he kind of goes from
9	council member to council member hoping that
10	something is going to change based on to
11	whom he is making the request.
12	But I remember hearing, I'm not 100
13	percent sure if it was Mr. Galdieri, but
14	something tells me it is because this is an
15	area of road where there is few homes;
16	correct?
17	MR. ROGAN: Yes.
18	MS. EVANS: That the answer, I
19	believe he told me that Mr. Courtright gave
20	him was, "There aren't enough houses on this
21	street. You know, you are not worth enough
22	votes to be paved."
23	MR. ROGAN: Well, I doubt that
24	Mr. Courtright said that.
25	MS. EVANS: Well, no, Mr. Courtright

1	was he was not saying, because
2	Mr. Courtright is not in charge just like we
3	are not in charge.
4	MR. ROGAN: And that's frustrating
5	part.
6	MS. EVANS: Mr. Courtright was only
7	a councilman at the time, so that was the
8	answer that he provided, and I'm assuming he
9	was basing on that on what he had been told.
10	MR. ROGAN: And this is what is so
11	frustrating about the way the city works
12	right now that and I know Mr. Galdieri is
13	frustrated because of the condition of his
14	road, but I think he would be a little more
15	pleased if his call, you know, from the DPW
16	was returned or even if they said, like, we
17	can't pave it right now, but we are going to
18	try, you know, to make it right in the
19	future.
20	And it's just so frustrating. It's
21	not just this one issue, it's so many
22	issues. Some departments heads have been
23	very responsive to city council. You know,
24	and I don't agree with Ms. Aebli on this

issue, but I thank her for coming in. There

1 are other department heads that we have asked to come in numerous times to discuss 2 3 different issues and they haven't. And it's 4 difficult for some of us, you know, that work during the day to make it down to the 5 department heads during the day and a lot of 6 7 times it's -- these are important issues 8 that's need to be fixed and people just want 9 it answer. 10 Some of the people that have 11 contacted me with issues were so happy just 12 to get a phone call back even though their 13 issue wasn't resolved because they see a 14 government at every level so unresponsive to 15 the residents. It's something I hope will 16 change in the future, and that's all I'll 17 say on those issues. 18 Two other items, one, has council 19 received legislation from the administration 20 regarding the towing contracts? 21 MS. EVANS: No. 22 MR. ROGAN:

MR. ROGAN: Because I did speak to a few tow truck operators that said there was a deal that was made between the tow truck operators and the administration and, you

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know, they asked me if it would be on the 1 2 agenda tonight and I didn't know if it was 3 so it wasn't even sent down yet? 4 MS. EVANS: No, it wasn't sent down, but I think there is going to be an issue 5 with that because I think part of the 6 7 agreement, and if you talked to them you should be aware of the agreement, that it's 8 9 giving them ten years of a guarantee to do 10 the work to the exclusion of everyone else 11 at a rate of \$20,000 per year for a total of 12 200,000, you know, after ten years, which is 13 basically what they have been paying all 14 along so it's no nothing different. 15 But because \$200.000 well exceeds 16 the \$10,000 limit for bidding, you know, if 17 they want a contract then I think this is 18 going to have to go out to bid. 19 MR. ROGAN: And this is, you know, 20 just so the residents out there know, this 21 is an agreement that's trying to be worked 22 out between the tow truck drivers and the 23 administration to fill the line item in the 24 budget for the city tow yard that never

materialized, so hopefully I would like to

see a draft of whatever was agreed upon. I
know maybe the administration will send that
down.

Mrs. Krake, could we request to

Mrs. Krake, could we request to receive a copy of that, any sort of draft agreement? Now, from what I was told I was told there was an agreement and it should be up for a vote.

MS. EVANS: No, there has been no legislation sent and I am thinking that our solicitor is going to want to take a look at it, but, you know, what had occurred is that when you are dealing with a contract like that then you are dealing -- and you want to make this into legislation then you have to abide by other legislation which then means this is going to be opened up to all towing companies to bid to on it.

MR. ROGAN: And that's why this is, you know, in the past they have always operated year to year and this would basically they would be paying us ahead of time because of what was budgeted and then the next, you know, so many years they wouldn't be paying. It can be broken down

1	to two payments this year instead of
2	normally as they pay every year.
3	MS. EVANS: But it comes out to the
4	same amount of money.
5	MR. ROGAN: Yeah.
6	MS. EVANS: Actually, the city, you
7	know, if the city had taken the route of the
8	towing yard behind the police station it's
9	very likely the city could have realized
10	more money but, you know, this was the
11	mayor's decision, he wanted to handle this
12	himself, and we'll see what happens from
13	there.
14	MR. ROGAN: I certainly disagreed
15	with some members on the yard and we don't
16	have to rehash that issue again, but I think
17	the problem was it was put into the budget,
18	now that money has to be realized somehow.
19	If the yard didn't materialize we are
20	looking for another way to bring in that
21	amount of money for the budget.
22	And finally one issue, this would be
23	a request for Mr. Seitzinger, regarding the

food trucks, if any legislation is passed

from city council who would be enforcing

24

1	that legislation? Which is a question that
2	was brought up.
3	MR. MCGOFF: That was a question
4	that was addressed at the meeting today,
5	they were concerned about
6	MS. EVANS: I think it's in the
7	legislation now.
8	MR. ROGAN: Okay.
9	MS. EVANS: And the city health
10	inspectors
11	MR. ROGAN: Which health inspectors
12	was the question?
13	MS. KRAKE: This is has come up
14	before and I know from union that this is
15	the question.
16	MR. ROGAN: That's exactly right.
17	MS. KRAKE: As you can see there is
18	several different pieces of legislation
19	where it says that the health inspector you
20	are adding duties only because they are
21	memorializing them for lack of a better
22	word, in fact, that they will have to
23	inspect a food truck where before it didn't
24	actually say that in the code, so those
25	would be the additional duties to the health

1	officer.
2	As far as distances, that has
3	nothing to do with anything in License and
4	Inspections or a health officer, would it be
5	the police or License and Inspections, I
6	think they would have to decide that among
7	themselves.
8	MR. ROGAN: Could we send it to the
9	police department as well then to see if
10	they would be enforcing it and I guess it's
11	a little premature because nothing has been
12	passed yet.
13	MS. KRAKE: Well, I think the
14	question is who is enforcing it now.
15	MR. ROGAN: Yeah. If it is being
16	enforced.
17	MS. EVANS: It's never been
18	enforced.
19	MR. ROGAN: If we are going to pass
20	some sort of legislation that's not going to
21	enforced, you know, we maybe wasting our
22	time. You know, I'd like to know who would
23	be enforcing it and I don't know if that
24	there would be agreements over this or
25	what's going to happen regarding the extra

1 duties with the inspectors with the police 2 department, but it's definitely something, 3 you know, just something that was brought up 4 to me that I would like to get out there. That's all I have for tonight and 5 thank you. And I'd like to wish my mother 6 7 and my grandmother and all of the mothers 8 out there a very Happy Mother's Day this 9 Sunday. Thank you. 10 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman 11 Loscombe. 12 MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. I think I 13 said it all before, but I just have a few 14 items I have to touch base on. With the 15 approval of my colleagues, I would like city 16 council to send a letter to the city 17 solicitor requesting the 800, 1000 and 1100 18 blocks of Mulberry Street be posted as "No Parking" and the parking areas that are 19 there removed for safety reasons. Okay? 20 21 Meter management agreement, I have 22 noticed in the paper that several times it's 23 stated it would be between the 24 administration and city council would get

together on it. Has anyone heard from the

1	administration on the bids or are they going
2	to sit down with us or
3	MS. EVANS: I haven't heard
4	anything. I know that we had received
5	copies of the bids that I asked to be
6	forwarded to you since you had been the
7	point person on this and I think
8	MR. LOSCOMBE: I was just curious if
9	it was going to come to us as legislation as
10	usual without any
11	MS. EVANS: Well, I would suggest
12	that you contact the mayor and maybe
13	schedule a time to sit down with either him
14	or Ryan McGowan to review the bids and
15	provide input in terms of who will be
16	selected. But again, it's not city council
17	who makes the selection, ultimately it's the
18	mayor that makes the selection then I
19	imagine the legislation would be sent to us
20	for approval.
21	So, you know, I think probably the
22	best direction you can take at this point is
23	to schedule that, bring the proposals with
24	you
25	MR. LOSCOMBE: Sure.

1	MS. EVANS: and review them with
2	one of those administrators and let them
3	know what your thoughts are on that because
4	I know you have followed this more carefully
5	than anyone else on council for four years,
6	nearly four years now.
7	MR. LOSCOMBE: Okay. Thank you. I
8	was just curious if anybody had heard
9	anything other than that.
10	MS. EVANS: No, just that the bids
11	were received, that, you know, I requested
12	copies of them and received that and I
13	wanted you to take a look at it.
14	MR. LOSCOMBE: Sure.
15	MS. EVANS: And that's as far as we
16	have progressed.
17	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. And, you
18	know, my colleagues have spoken, I know I
19	haven't really said anything about the food
20	trucks, I was just hoping they would bring
21	me some samples, but they come in empty
22	handed tonight. No, I do, I believe in free
23	enterprise. I think it's great, you know, a
24	city like this can have a variety like that
25	and I think most people, even the business

owners do appreciate it, and I would hope
and I hope that there was progress made
today that come next week we will have, you
know, something that's amicable to everyone
because I think we need that variety.

I mean, with competition, you know, there is price wars and everything, maybe they will have half price sales one day or whatever, just what happened with our meter bids, you know, our meter management bid, you know? There was no bids before and it was \$125,000 and now it's cut in half so that's what free enterprise and competition is all about, but you see McDonald's setup next to Burger King and next to Wendy's and they all thrive and that's what I like to see here and I do appreciate it, but that's where I'm coming from.

And just lastly, we were talking, I forgot to ask Ms. Aebli, maybe it doesn't even effect her, but we passed legislation probably over a year ago for funding for blight tracking software for our city planner, and I haven't heard anything about that. I was just wondering what the status

1	is, what progress we have and what it's for.
2	If it's part of their you know, I mean,
3	we should all work together on it, we should
4	know where the blighted problems are, so if
5	we could send a letter to Mr. King and just
6	ask him what the status is on the blight
7	tracking software that we financed back
8	awhile ago.
9	And to my wife and my mother and all
10	of the mothers out there, I would like to
11	wish you all a Happy Mother's Day. And
12	that's all I have. Thank you.
13	MS. EVANS: Councilman Joyce, do you
14	have any comments or motions?
15	MR. JOYCE: Yes. Very briefly
16	tonight, just to give everyone a snapshot of
17	where the city is right now, the cash
18	balance of the city as of May 6 is \$11.7
19	million and we have \$23,000 in accounts
20	payable.
21	Secondly, I'm very glad that Mr
22	oh, I thought you had a comment.
23	MS. EVANS: It's a sidebar.
24	MR. JOYCE: I'm very glad that
25	Mr. McGoff spoke to Leslie Collins about the

meeting with the food trucks. In fact, I
wanted to speak with her and to get more
information of how that went and I'm very
qlad that the meeting was amicable.

Like Mr. McGoff, I believe it would be fool hearty to vote on the legislation as it is in Seventh Order, so I'll vote on the legislation tonight, but I think we should wait until there is a compromise set in stone before we move further with the legislation in Seventh Order.

I did have a conversation with the mayor regarding an issue that several speakers have brought up being that the weather is starting to get warmer and that's swimming pools. As you know, last year the only pool that was open in the city was Nay Aug and that's ashame. A lot of underprivileged children, a lot of residents who would like to use the pools suffered as a result, and this year after speaking with Mayor Doherty he has agreed and is confident that we are going to receive a \$31,000 grant to open two of the swimming pools. He specified that Weston Park and Weston field

1	would be two that were open, and I said that
2	we should open more and we should open up
3	the pools that aren't in need of serious
4	repairs, and two of the major pools in the
5	city are the pools at Connell Park, which
6	serves South Side, and Novembrino Pool,
7	which serves West Side.
8	And I spoke to the mayor more about
9	the issue and we came to an agreement that
10	we could use money from the UDAG repayment
11	account to open up these pools. It's about
12	\$15,500 a pool to maintain and pay for
13	lifeguards and what not and the pool
14	chemicals to last throughout the summer
15	months. So with my colleagues' agreement,
16	and the mayor said that he would be
17	agreeable to this as well, if we could send
18	a letter to the law department to have them
19	draft legislation to use money from the
20	RE-RE account to open up Novembrino Pool and
21	also the pool at Connell Park.
22	MS. EVANS: Yes.
23	MR. ROGAN: Certainly.
24	MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes.

MR. ROGAN: Could we also ask the

1	administration what the status of that
2	splash park, the proposed splash park at
3	Novembrino is?
4	MR. JOYCE: We could, and I didn't
5	specifically speak with the mayor on this
6	issue, but I think it's a dead issue right
7	now being that the pool is going to be
8	something that will be open this year so
9	MS. EVANS: And we removed the
10	funding for that through the CDBG program.
11	MR. ROGAN: And I know part of the
12	reason part of the reason why they said
13	it was closed last year was because he still
14	wanted to move forward with a splash park
15	and it seemed like the residents in the
16	city, and I think most of us on council,
17	were against that as well.
18	MR. JOYCE: Yes.
19	MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. Joyce,
20	for bringing that to the mayor.
21	MR. JOYCE: No problem, and I'm very
22	glad that that's something that the mayor is
23	willing to do and then I'm glad to see that
24	there will be swimming in the city this

year. And that's all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Good evening. I have several items to address. First, the Scranton Treasurer's tax sale is scheduled for Monday, June 3, 2013. The sale will be advertised in two newspapers of general circulation and the legal newspaper published and printed in Scranton on May 13, May 20, and May 27, 2013. The deadline for posting on premises is Friday, May 24, 2013.

Second, city council received a letter and supporting documents from a city resident regarding a number of properties in the 400 block of Clay Avenue on which delinquent taxes dating back several years appear to be owed as of April 26, 2013, and significant renovations are occurring despite the stop work orders issued by the city zoning officer.

Scranton City Council asks

Mr. Seitzinger, LIPS director, to provide

copies of any and all permits that have been

issued in the last seven months and any and

all applications filed in the last seven

months for the properties listed on the

documents council received.

Mrs. Krake, please forward that 1 letter to Mr. Seitzinger ASAP. In addition, 2 3 please forward a copy of all information 4 provided by the resident to the members of the Scranton Zoning Board and it's solicitor 5 for their review and recommendations. 6 7 Request replies on or before May 28, 2013. 8 Third, I recently received e-mails from owners of the ice cream trucks and from 9 10 Jill Murrin, who oversees the South Scranton 11 Farmer's Market, requesting special 12 provisions in the proposed ordinances 13 relating to both. 14 For example, will ice cream trucks 15 be allowed to stop for children on a city 16 street or standing less than the designated 17 footage from a brick and mortar 18 establishment? 19 Also, Mrs. Murrin stated that the 20 farmers participating in the South Side and 21 West Side and Courthouse square farmers 22 markets can ill afford the annual fees and 23 they sell their goods only once weekly. At 24 the same time, however, we have a very large

and quite successful farmers market located

off Albright Avenue which operates far more frequently.

Therefore, Mrs. Krake, I'd ask you to contact the legal department regarding these issues in relation to the proposed ordinances. Please inquire if such businesses are included in the ordinances, and if so, does the administration recommend adjustments to the legislation?

Fourth, despite the opinion of Attorney Frederickson, the resolution requesting the Lackawanna County

Commissioners to establish a policy for the Assessor's Office to commence reviewing the status of all properties qualifying for exemptions from property taxation under the Institution of Purely Public Charity Act is included in Seventh Order on tonight's agenda for final approval. City Council Solicitor Boyd Hughes strongly disagrees with the opinion of Attorney Frederickson and has advised council to approve the legislation.

Further, Solicitor Hughes intends to send a letter to the appropriate county

1 offices and Mayor Doherty in conjunction 2 with this legislation requesting an 3 investigation of specific tax exempt 4 Solicitor Hughes will comment properties. further on this matter during next week's 5 city council meeting. 6 7 At the same time, the County 8 Assessor's Office continues it's 9 longstanding hearing process of lowering taxes assessments for businesses and 10 11 residents countywide while it has failed to 12 conduct a complete countywide property tax 13 reassessment since 1967. 14 The Office of Tax Assessment in Allegheny County conducts a countywide tax 15 16 exempt review every three years and is in 17 the process of performing one at this time, 18 but Lackawanna County Attorney Frederickson 19 states: "To review the status of the every 20 nonprofit in the city, not just in the city, 21 not the county, would probably take three 22 vears."

If a review of the tax exempts city property would require three years should we assume that countywide tax reassessment

1 would take over ten years since nonprofits alone own 33 percent of the Scranton 2 3 properties? 4 Such excuses are extremely disappointing to the taxpayers of Scranton. 5 City council is seeking a fair review 6 7 process for all tax exempt properties to 8 ensure that all properties continue to 9 comply with the law governing exemptions. 10 Same may own properties that are no longer used or may be newly utilized for commercial 11 12 purposes. The city cannot conduct property 13 tax assessments. The county has the 14 responsibility to get the ball rolling to 15 review the status of the tax exempts, 16 particularly since it refuses to conduct 17 countywide tax reassessments. 18 Failure to act hurts the taxpayers 19 by allowing incorrect tax exemptions and 20 antiquated tax assessments in the community 21 to become the burden of the taxpayers. 22 Finally, I have one citizens' 23 request for the week, according to Mr. 24 Zaworksi, the Scranton DPW damaged his 25 property on Parallel Drive, please send a
