18	are the three pieces of legislation dealing
19	with the food vendors and the restaurants,
20	after a series of meetings held this week
21	and last, we were presented with a number
22	recommendations agreed upon
23	recommendations from those meetings and we
24	are tabling these so that we can take a week
25	to review the recommendations from the group

1	that meant and implement them into the
2	legislation.
3	MS. EVANS: All those in favor
4	signify by saying aye.
5	MR. MCGOFF: Aye.
6	MR. ROGAN: Aye.
7	MR. JOYCE: Aye.
8	MS. EVANS: Aye. Opposed? The ayes
9	have it and so moved.
10	Is there anyone else with
11	announcements?
12	Please remember to turn off all cell
13	phones and refrain from speaking during the
14	council meeting.
15	The annual Armed Forces Day parade
16	will be held this Saturday, May 18, 2013, in
17	downtown Scranton beginning at 11 a.m.
18	Several municipal groups, the Pennsylvania
19	National Guards Scranton based 55th brigade
20	and other of dozens of other military and
21	veterans units will participate. Bring your
22	families and friends out to honor our great,
23	selfless servicemen and women and their
24	families who have sacrificed for our
25	freedom.

1	A new edition to parade day is the
2	Gino J. Merli Veteran's Center and Matthew's
3	Mission 5K run and walk. The run will start
4	at 9 a.m. on Franklin Avenue and benefits
5	the Veteran's Center. Registration is \$20
6	on the day of the race.
7	Finally, this Tuesday, May 21, is
8	primary election day and you are not, are
9	not required to show ID to vote. Make every
10	effort to exercise your voting privileges in
11	this important city and county election.
12	Good luck to all the candidates and to the
13	people of Scranton. That's it.
14	MR. MCGOFF: Could I add something
15	to that, Mrs Evans?
16	MS. EVANS: Certainly.
17	MR. MCGOFF: Just a note for the
18	primary election, because of the ballot
19	questions that there were on there this is
20	not a closed primary. If you are not a
21	registered Republican or Democrat normally
22	you could not vote in the primary election,
23	but for this election because of the ballot
24	questions anybody who is a registered voter
25	may vote on those ballot questions so,

1	please, please go out and cast your ballot
2	even if you are not registered for the
3	Democrat or Republican party.
4	MR. ROGAN: And both sides of the
5	ballot, also.
6	MR. MCGOFF: Yes, it's rather
7	lengthy and a two-sided ballot, so, please.
8	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Mrs. Krake.
9	MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS
10	PARTICIPATION.
11	MS. EVANS: Our first speaker
12	tonight is Bernie McGurl.
13	MR. MCGURL: Good evening, Council.
14	I'm this evening to invite you and the
15	community to join us along the Lackawanna
16	River for Riverfest on Saturday, June 1, and
17	I have invitation flyers for you. Boyd,
18	I'll have to get you one.
19	MR. HUGHES: Okay. Thanks.
20	MR. MCGURL: And I just want to
21	spend a moment to talk about Riverfest.
22	It's our annual celebration of the
23	Lackawanna River and we are going to be
24	holding it down at the Scranton Riverfront
25	along Olive Street by the heritage trail by

the Ice Box complex near Memorial Stadium.

1

It's a day long event. It starts in 2 3 the morning with a canoe and kayak run from 4 two launch points, one in Archbald and one in Blakely and it originally started out as 5 the Lackawanna River Canoe-a-Thon in 1973 so 6 7 this is actually the 40th running of the 8 Lackawanna River Canoe-a-Thon and the race 9 concludes by the Olive Street finish line sometime between 12 and 1 o'clock as the 10 11 stragglers come in.

12 Later in the afternoon, all afternoon actually at the finish line we 13 14 have the show mobile, the city show mobile 15 is set up and we have a variety of musical 16 entertainment for young and old and at 3:00 17 we are inviting everyone to get creative, 18 come on down, get a boat, get something that 19 floats, we are going to be launching the 20 regatta from Sweeney's Beach, a little beach 21 up in the Pinebrook neighborhood and you will float down with your costumes and silly 22 23 hats and whatever and we have whole variety 24 of prizes for the regatta. The regatta is 25 absolutely free. The only thing you need is

1 a sense of humor and imagination, so we went 2 to encourage everyone. You can come out and 3 visit the LRCA website at www.lrca.org an 4 click on Riverfest and you'll get information on the regatta or give us a call 5 at the LRCA Office at 347-6311 and we'll 6 7 fill you in on any questions and details 8 that you'd like to get.

A little bit later in the afternoon 9 10 to wrap up the days festivities we have the 11 famous Lackawanna River Duck-a-Thon. It's a 12 real duck race, not with little rubber 13 ducks, actually we have ten specially 14 trained Lackawanna River racing ducks. They 15 are painted up rather colorfully by students 16 in local schools and actually they're decoy 17 ducks if you want to get down to it, but 18 they are trained to race and they do move 19 down river with the current and if you 20 happen to get a ticket with the winning duck 21 that could win you \$500.

22 So we would like to invite everyone 23 to come out and spend the day on the 24 Lackawanna River with the LRCA and celebrate 25 the river on Saturday, June 1. Thank you

1 all. MS. EVANS: Thank you very much. 2 3 Our next speaker is Labray, and I'm unable 4 to ready the last name. UNKNOWN AUDIENCE MEMBER: You can 5 cross that out. 6 7 MS. EVANS: Okay. Bill Jackowitz. 8 MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, 9 Scranton City Council. Bill Jackowitz. I've been spending a lot of time lately 10 11 walking, and I'm not even running for 12 office, but I've been going around and 13 talking to people within the City of 14 Scranton, and quiet honestly, we have a lot 15 of upset people within the City of Scranton. 16 Basically, you know, because they are not happy with what's been happening with the 17 18 city. 19 Actually, this city needs to start 20 behaving as if it already is bankrupt 21 because people realize that we just don't 22 have the money. The money is just not there 23 and there is really no way way of generating

24the machine to pay what's going to be coming25our way in the next few years. We need to

start working on that now, not when the new
 mayor and the new council takes over, we
 need to start working on these areas right
 now.

Now. like the comments have been 5 6 made that things don't happen overnight, but 7 I would just like to remind people that for 8 7,797 days and 255 months this is how long 9 the taxpayers of Scranton have been waiting for the elected officials of Scranton to do 10 11 something positive about the financial 12 situation in City of Scranton. That's a 13 along time. Nothing has been done to solve 14 the problem.

15 As time goes on the situation 16 Unemployment rate, highest in the worsens. 17 state. 36 consecutive months. The 500 18 block of Lackawanna Avenue still vacant. 19 Potholes. Scranton streets, bridges and 20 sidewalks are unsafe. I personally have 21 lived in three third world countries that 22 look better than Scranton Central City and 23 neighborhoods.

24Vacant store fronts.Vacant space25Steamtown Mall.Housing projects dirty

garbage everywhere in the housing projects.
 Overgrown properties in every neighborhood.
 Soon we are going to look like Detroit,
 Michigan, if we continue on the road we are
 on now.

I do not want to hear anymore about cooperation, a budget that is not balanced, a recovery plan that would not work, is not cooperation it is wasted time at taxpayers' expense. Sideshows and false numbers and hope will not resolve the financial mess I call Scranton's same government.

13 When four witnesses testify for the 14 city and give contradicting testimony, 15 something is wrong. Scranton's recovery 16 plan was all about borrowing \$14 million, 17 creating a deeper hole for the taxpayers to crawl out of it. Scranton's credit rating 18 19 below junk bond rating, loans made defaulted 20 on, why? Interest rates high, why? Because 21 the credit rating of Scranton is nothing but 22 junk.

Again, let's get real. Stop playing politics. The only elected who is up front is Pat Rogan and the voters of Scranton

1 realized that. Gatelli and McGoff's councils set the city back 50 years, 2 3 virtually bankrupting this city. Evans 4 council continued with the borrowing, raised taxes enabling the administration to 5 continue down the path of financial 6 7 destruction, resolved with higher taxes and 8 larger debt for the taxpayers.

9 Why would anybody trust a mayor and 10 business administrator or for that matter 11 any member of the Doherty administration? 12 They have been proven to be wrong on just 13 about every issue, that is why Scranton 14 remains bankrupt for 21 years and counting.

No one expected change overnight. On the other hand, it's been 7,798 nights that we've been waiting for change. That should be long enough to wait for real cooperation from our elected Scranton officials.

I'm disgusted with Scranton
politics, actually, I'm disgusted with
politics in general because look at what's
going in Washington DC and Harrisburg and
everywhere else, and politicians who have

caused this financial mess in Scranton. 1 2 This mess was caused by our politicians, our 3 elected mayor and our elected city councils 4 and the controller. It wasn't caused by the We are the ones who have to pay 5 citizens. the bills, but it was caused by our elected 6 officials. I don't understand why our 7 8 elected officials can't understand that. 9 They are the ones who passed the budgets, 10 they are the ones who passed the recovery 11 plan, they are the ones who wrote the 12 budgets, they are the ones who went out and got the borrowing, they are the ones that 13 14 took the fire and police to court, the politicians did it, not the citizens. 15

16 Yet, the citizens continue to get 17 railroaded. Again, we need to do something 18 about this now. We don't need to wait until 19 January of 2014. We have a council seated 20 right now, an elected council. We have an 21 elected mayor seated right now and you 22 people need to start working on it now and 23 not wait until January of 2014. It will be 24 too late.

25 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Our next

1 speaker is Les Spindler. MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, 2 3 Council. Les Spindler, city resident, 4 homeowner, taxpayer. 5 MR. JOYCE: Good evening. MR. SPINDLER: I don't know what the 6 recommendations are with the food trucks 7 8 that you tabled tonight, but I just want to 9 add that I hope that one of those 10 recommendations is keeping the distance from 11 restaurants at 100 feet. If it's not, I 12 think you should amend the ordinances to say 13 that because 250 feet is just too much and 14 it's going to put these people out of 15 business and that's just going to hurt the 16 city. 17 Moving on, guite a few weeks ago I 18 was here asking about a stop sign near the 19 Issac Tripp school, I was wondering if any 20 action has been taken on that yet? I know 21 there is still no stop sign there. Has anybody gotten back to council on that? 22 MS. EVANS: I don't believe so. MR. 23 24 Spindler. 25 MR. SPINDLER: Well, it figures. Ι

1 just hope, you know, the next mayor, whoever it is, appoints people that know what they 2 3 are doing and will cooperate with council 4 other than what these department heads are doing now. I guess the only one that does 5 cooperate is acting Chief Graziano, but I 6 7 hope in the future they will cooperate with 8 city council.

Lastly, I read the Doherty 9 10 newsletter yesterday about the debate the 11 other night, the mayoral debate, which I was 12 unable to watch and, you know, I'm tired of 13 some of these candidates slinging mud. Whv 14 don't they just run on their qualifications 15 and stop slinging mud. Oh, I know why they 16 are slinging mud because they don't have any 17 qualifications because the tax collector 18 they're talking against is the only one that 19 is gualified and he comes out on the 20 commercial saying what his qualifications 21 are.

Liz Randol can't even make a commercial on her on, she has an 81-year-old woman talking saying, "Oh, she's educated and I like her." 1Those are great qualifications to be2mayor. Then we have another person coming3out saying, "I've been coming to council for425 years."

Again, are those gualifications to 5 be mayor? I don't think so. This is the 6 7 most important election I think in this 8 city's history and if we don't elect the 9 right person we are going to be in 10 bankruptcy and you can write that down 11 today's date, May 16, 2013, that we will be 12 in bankruptcy if we don't elected the right 13 person and there is only one person for the 14 job and I think all know who I mean.

And at that debate I hear that Liz
Randol brought up Attorney Walsh's name,
which is a darn shame.

18 MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Evans, this isn't19 appropriate for the podium.

20 MS. EVANS: I agree that I'm not in 21 favor of campaign speeches at the podium, 22 however, every individual has first 23 amendment rights to speak and unless an 24 individual is effecting the safety of others 25 or is using obscene language, they have the

1 right to speak. MR. SPINDLER: Thank you, 2 3 Mrs. Evans. Mark Walsh, as everyone has 4 heard from me in the past is a along time 5 friend of mine, and to bring his name up when he can't defend himself was terrible. 6 7 MR. MCGOFF: You're incorrect. 8 MR. SPINDLER: This is my time. 9 MR. MCGOFF: If you're going to 10 say--11 MR. SPINDLER: She didn't name him 12 by name, but she brought up the solicitor of 13 the tax office. 14 MR. MCGOFF: She did not make --15 MR. SPINDLER: Mrs. Evans, can you 16 ask him to stop? MR. MCGOFF: -- any comments --17 18 MR. SPINDLER: That's the most 19 unclassy move I have ever heard of. Mark 20 Walsh had more class in his little finger 21 than Liz Randol has in her own body and she 22 is not qualifications. When it was brought 23 up about her gun she went, "Uh, uh --" and 24 she couldn't even answer a question. It was 25 asked if she was out drinking that night and

1	she refused to answer the questions, which I
2	think in itself answered the question and
3	she is not a person that is qualified to by
4	our mayor. And that's all I have. Thank
5	you.
6	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Next speaker
7	is Ron Ellman.
8	MR. ELLMAN: Hello, council.
9	MS. EVANS: Hello.
10	MR. JOYCE: Hello.
11	MR. ELLMAN: A few short weeks ago
12	this pathetic excuse for a newspaper printed
13	a lengthy article crucifying young Miller
14	over a past traffic offense. A traffic
15	offense, for crying out loud, and it hadn't
16	happened recently, it was in the past. I
17	feel that this feeble attempt by them was
18	just an offense to just take away any future
19	political interest that young Miller has and
20	I think the city needs Mr. Miller more than
21	he needs the City of Scranton. We need all
22	these young people.
23	In the same hand, it is hard to say
24	they were working to bring forth this

article, at the other end of the spectrum

25

they are working as hard as they can to keep
quiet and sweep under the rug the error in
judgment that Ms. Randol made. This isn't
right. This is a deliberate action by this
paper.

You know, people say put things 6 7 aside, but they don't forget. Both of these 8 things are an error in judgment to me. You 9 know, if I had known a few short weeks ago 10 that you can run for mayor and be devoid of 11 any experience, any character, trust, 12 values, integrity and so on I would have 13 run, belive me, and probably would have been 14 endorsed by the Democratic party around 15 here.

If this gun scenario had happened to me or Mr. Miller or to most of the people in the city there would be no end to it. It would been investigated, it would carried on and on and on in the newspaper for weeks and weeks, but I guess we are all responsible for our own actions, except Ms. Randol.

Again, I cannot in god conscious why any of these people are even running for the office. It's such a thankless job. It's an

1 impossible job to be successful at in my opinion. You know, all council's additional 2 3 revenue plans have failed for one reason or 4 another, and I'm not putting the blame on council, I just said that they have failed 5 on everything -- and everything have come up 6 7 with has just been put a side. This new 8 taxes going up 78 percent is not going to achieve a good end, it's just going to cost 9 10 us more and more empty houses and 11 foreclosures. You can ask the banks, it's 12 just not going to work, something else has 13 to be done.

14 You know, I read a couple of weeks 15 ago King Henry VIII taxed the people of 16 England so bad he owned a third of the 17 country. It's the same thing with our city, 18 we have lost a third of the city to these 19 tax exempt businesses. It's impossibly to 20 carry on. He failed and we can't carry on 21 with a third of our taxable properties gone.

You know, we've had ten years of
total mismanagement. Ten years of a mayor
completely devoid of any financial ability.
That's 3,650 Jackowitz days. Ten years.

1 The last thing we need is someone that's 2 going to support his policies and his 3 programs and want them to continue. There 4 is just going to be brutal consequences for all of us if we choose the wrong person, but 5 I've heard a dozen people saying they are 6 not going to vote. They don't like this guy 7 8 and that guy, that's not going to solve 9 anything. You people out there have got to 10 vote for some good government. Thank you. 11 MS. EVANS: Gerard Hetman. 12 MR. HETMAN: Good evening, Council. 13 MS. EVANS: Good evening. 14 MR. HETMAN: Gerard Hetman. Lack 15 wanna County's Community Relations 16 Department. Good to see you, as always. Тο 17 begin this evening, we would like to 18 announce that the Lackawanna County 19 Department of Community Relations is 20 currently working to organize the first 21 annual Lackawanna County job fair. The job 22 fair will take place Thursday, June 13, from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. at PNC Field in Moosic. 23 24 The event will be held on the street level 25 concourse, so you walk up to the stadium,

1take the first glass door on the right under2the ticket office and the exhibitors will be3on the street level concourse area. The job4fair is free and open to the community.5Candidates of all ages, backgrounds and6experience levels are encouraged to attend.

There will be companies offering 7 8 full-time, part-time, seasonal and internship positions, so this is an event 9 10 that is acceptable for all working ages, 11 skilled abilities and sectors. Something 12 for people who looking for family sustaining 13 full-time employment, possibly a additional 14 part-time, and again, seasonal internship 15 jobs so possibly college students, high 16 school students are welcome to attend.

17 We're working to get every major 18 private sector employer in and around 19 Lackawanna County to be an exhibitor at the 20 job fair. If you know of anybody, council 21 members, who may be hiring an employee -excuse me, an employer that's looking to 22 23 hire, odds are we may have spoken to them 24 already, but if not feel free to contact me 25 or stop me after the meeting, I'd be happy

1 to get in touch with them. This is 2 something that the commissioners are 3 committed to working at so that the 4 employment rate that some of the speakers have referenced, kinds of hangs over our 5 heads in this area, and all us, I know, in a 6 mini-capacity are trying to chip away at 7 8 that and we see this as the initiative that 9 hopefully will hope to combat the persistent 10 high employment rate.

11 So, please, tell your friends, 12 neighbors, anyone who is searching for any 13 type of employment. This will hopefully be 14 a good opportunity for them to match up with 15 that. Again, it's Thursday, June 13, 1 p.m. 16 to 6 p.m. at PNC Field. Again, completely 17 free, no parking charge, and also for 18 exhibitors there is no vendor fee so anyone 19 who comes to offer employment looking for 20 employees we are not charging for that. So it's particularly attractive for everyone 21 looking to get involved. 22

Secondly, actually, Mrs. Evans,
thank you for mentioning the parade and also
the 5-K run/walk. Our office is working

1 with Matthew's Mission really organizing the 2 Gino Merli 5K and they are very excited 3 about that. They have a pretty good turnout 4 already with some race day registrations, but we invite to come down to the parade. 5 The parade steps off at 11 a.m. and I saw 6 most of the council members there last year 7 8 so we would hope for everyone to come out 9 and salute our veterans and our military 10 personnel.

11 And then lastly, just one other 12 event that we like to mark especially in the city is the upcoming "Arts on Fire" festival 13 14 and fire furnace fundraiser, and that's June 15 7. 8 and 9 downtown at the historic iron 16 furnaces and that event kicks off Friday 17 night during First Friday with the "Arts on 18 Fire" fundraiser which is a \$15 admission or 19 \$20 right at the event at the iron furnaces. 20 It raises funds for the Anthracite Museum up 21 in McDade Park, which administers the iron 22 furnaces. That's an event where you pay at 23 the door. There will be a live iron pour 24 and food and drink are free with that event 25 with admission. There will also be basket

1 raffles and things of that nature.

And Saturday and Sunday of that 2 3 weekend, June 8 and 9 is the actual "Art on 4 Fire" festival. No charge to attend that. It starts at 11 a.m. both days, wraps up 7 5 p.m. on Saturday, and then 4 p.m. on Sunday. 6 7 All three nights there will be musical entertainment, performers and then Saturday 8 9 and Sunday there is food vendors and also 10 exhibitors such as sculptors, artists who 11 are looking to sell in a market-place type 12 setting.

13 This is the fourth year that this 14 has taken place and it's grown every year. 15 Again, it brings in a lot of folks, bring 16 out a lot of people in the city and in the 17 surrounding community and also brings in 18 visitors both to attend the festival and to 19 vend the business her really from all over 20 the country, so we are looking forward to 21 hopefully a good turnout and invite to come 22 out to that event.

So that's all we have for this
evening. Thank you, ladies and gentlemen.
MS. EVANS: Thank you. Greg Evans.

1	MR. EVANS: Good evening, Council.
2	Greg Evans.
3	MR. JOYCE: Good evening.
4	MR. EVANS: Resident, homeowner and
5	small business owner. Two things I wanted
6	to discuss or just talk about, the first
7	thing is, again, this is probably not a
8	council issue it's probably an
9	administration issue and it's unfortunate
10	that no one is here to answer this, but
11	regarding the recent paving project on
12	Jackson Street, do any of you know were it
13	came from? Is that DCED money or OECD
14	money?
15	MR. ROGAN: It was OECD money. I
16	actually have some notes. I'll be speaking
17	about this issue during motions. I assume
18	you are referring to the blocks that were
19	paved and now they are going to be torn up
20	again.
21	MR. EVANS: Yes.
22	MR. ROGAN: Yeah, I wasn't happy
23	either when I learned that, you know, our
24	road that was just paved using federal
25	dollars, two blocks, three blocks from my

house in West Side was paved and know it's
going to be cut up. You know, obviously the
utility will repair it when they are done,
but the issue to me is could have used that
money to pave another road.

MR. EVANS: Absolutely, and that's 6 7 my same concern and so are some other 8 people. Thank you. And I want to talk 9 about the food trucks. I know it's tabled 10 and thank you for doing that. I want to 11 speak about the economic impact just one 12 more time. I want to bring us back to 13 months ago when we were fighting about the 14 -- not fighting, just the packing meter 15 agreement came up with the increases of the 16 days, times and costs, and I brought up here 17 nearly 1,000 signatures in protest of that 18 agreement and that was from businesses, not 19 just the businesses, but also employees and 20 visitors, and it's a bigger picture than 21 just one special interest over another 22 special interest, it wasn't that this is 23 simply just light changes that came from 24 more than just the businesses, but it was 25 the negative economic impact of those

1 proposed changes, so thank you for tabling Item 7-C, D and E and giving serious 2 3 consideration to what Scranton Tomorrow has 4 offered you with the negotiations and I just want to implore that when you make your 5 decision ask yourselves two questions: 6 One, 7 what is the economic impact of the new 8 legislation; and two, will it affect Scranton positively in long-term, not just 9 10 the short-term. Thank you. 11 MS. EVANS: Thank you. And our next 12 speaker is Danea L. Gozell. Dasie Iella. 13 Mary Ann Pachesko. 14 MS. PACHESKO: Hello. 15 MR. JOYCE: Good evening. 16 MS. PACHESKO: Nice to see you 17 I have a food truck called the again. 18 "Picnic Stand" and I'm brand new, I've only 19 been doing it a couple of months. I didn't 20 realize, I signed the paper, I didn't 21 realize I was going to be speaking, but 22 that's okay. 23 What I would like to say is I am 24 The Health Department, Mary Foley and new. 25 Mark have been excellent. The people at the

meters have been great because I had them
check my truck out and advise me and
everything and they have been wonderful, so
if you want to make a note of that they are
great.

As far as I go, I went to two of the 6 meetings and I totally agree with the 7 8 restaurants, a food truck does not belong in 9 front of a restaurant ever. I considered opening up a restaurant, I didn't for 10 11 financial reasons so my husband and I 12 discussed and we opened up a food truck and I love doing it, I really do. 13

14 So I agree no food truck should be 15 allowed in front of a business and serving 16 food, but I don't agree with the limitation. 17 I believe it should be 100 feet because it's 18 reasonable, it's fair. When I was speaking 19 at one of the meetings I did tell them, you 20 know, we do live in America. It is a land 21 of opportunity. I don't believe in 22 restriction of fair trade. And I think 100 23 feet, and we did agree on 100 feet at the 24 last meeting, which was great, I was happy. 25 Let's see, the 100 feet was a big deal for

me.

1

I agreed that the feet should be 250 2 3 because the restaurants are paying that. 4 Should it be 500? I don't think we should be penalized, it's not fair, but the 250 was 5 agreed upon which was also a good positive. 6 7 I do think the food trucks are a 8 positive influence, it caters to a totally different clientele. If I'm with friends 9 going out for lunch, I want to be in a 10 11 restaurant I want to sit down and I want to 12 have a leisurely lunch and talk. But at 13 lunch time in Scranton you have a lot of 14 people who are limited with a half hour. 15 What I do is I give my phone to them and 16 they can call me and I'll have the food 17 ready for them and they get their food and 18 they are back in their office. There is a 19 lot of positive things to be said for that. It is a different clientele. So as far as 20 21 the restaurants not wanting us, totally different setup. 22 23 They were talking about find and,

you know, if a truck is going to do
something that is not right with the Health

Department they should be, you know, have a fine, it's only right. That's why I've had Mary Foley and them coming in my truck and make sure it's all right.

I'm trying to think about what else 5 they were talking about. I'm a little 6 7 nervous, but basically it's just nobody 8 should park in front of a restaurant. I 9 wouldn't want to hurt anyone. In fact, as 10 far as I'm concerned today and, yes, this 11 was the first I was at courthouse square and 12 I was far, far away from everyone and I made 13 sure of that. I've been staying down at the 14 state building. Unfortunately, there is no 15 foot traffic so one day I sold like five 16 sandwiches. Yesterday and today it's good 17 for business. I did much better, but I am 18 staying far away from everyone, but if you 19 would increase it more than 100 feet there 20 really is place to go because you are going 21 to find Subway or a mini-mart or somebody is 22 going to be selling food and I think it's 23 too limiting, but 100 feet is totally 24 reasonable because then you're not near that 25 restaurant and 100 feet is a good distance,

you know, because I'm making sure that I'm
 beyond that.

3 So I hope and pray that you will 4 keep it at the 100 feet and if you want to 5 raise our permit price to 250, like, I'm 6 speaking for me, that's fine, too. I don't 7 know if you have any questions for me, I 8 don't know how this works.

9 MS. EVANS: No, I have no questions. 10 Is there anyone?

11MS. PACHESKO: Like I said, I'm12brand new at this. I just wanted to do13everything right to the law, make sure I'm14doing everything right and I appreciate you15listening to me.

16 MS. EVANS: Absolutely. Just so you 17 understand, this legislation was not 18 initiated by city council. It was sent down 19 to us by the mayor and his administration so 20 these were their proposals and because 21 council members had many concerns about the 22 legislation that was submitted to us and 23 because so many members of the public and 24 owners of the food trucks came before 25 council to discuss that potential

legislation, I asked for these meetings 1 between --2 3 MS. PACHESKO: Oh, that was 4 wonderful. MS. EVANS: -- the brick-and-mortar 5 establishments and the food vendors because 6 7 none of us own restaurants or food trucks 8 and we are certainly not experts in that 9 area and we wanted exactly has happened, that both sides would discuss all of these 10 11 issues and come to a consensus that was 12 satisfactory to everyone so that all 13 businesses are welcome in the city and 14 basically operate on a level playing field 15 so we very much appreciate having these 16 recommendations and, unfortunately, we only 17 received them about 3:00 this afternoon, so 18 we weren't able to draft an amendment to the 19 legislation that will make the corrections 20 to it. 21 However we are hoping that we can 22 get the work done for next Thursday's 23 meeting and put the three pieces of 24 legislation back on the table for a final

25 vote.

1 MS. PACHESKO: And the mediator, she was wonderful and she listened to both sides 2 3 and it was really nice and Greg was copying 4 everything down and it went really well, so that was a good idea. But anyway, thank you 5 very much for listening to me. I appreciate 6 7 it. 8 MS. EVANS: Thank you. The next 9 speaker is Reginald Clark. 10 MR. CLARK: Good evening, council. 11 MS. EVANS: Good evening. 12 MR. CLARK: I'd like to first say I 13 would like to thank everyone in advance for 14 all your time and consideration in regards 15 to the food truck issue, I'm a food truck 16 owner, putting the meetings together for 17 both sides it was a good idea, you know, 18 good communication came out of that on both 19 ways, also a lot of information and

knowledge that people didn't know including, you know, elected officials and the ones that's supposed to enforce this ordinance.

23 Wording is always, you know, one 24 word can change a whole sentence, a whole 25 paragraph and I th ink that's what's really

20

1 going on within the existing ordinance, not that we hear a whole lot about the ordinance 2 3 because it's kind of contradictory, you know, from something that was from 1910, you 4 know, not too many people out there sharping 5 knifes, you know, and like somebody said 6 7 before, you know, free trade is different 8 things come about, you know, and it is good 9 economic development for the city as a 10 whole. You know, it does bring in revenue.

11 One of the thing that was part of 12 the proposals that we talked about on both 13 sides was in regards to the mercantile tax. 14 You know, I've been a mercantile taxpayer 15 for five years, but that doesn't, you know, 16 make me the same ass brick and mortar 17 because I'm entitled a peddler or a vendor, 18 so those are very good issues that we talked 19 about in regards to paying a tax that's due 20 so I put that in councils hands that 21 everything will come out good for this 22 ordinance, it can be changed one way or the other that can benefit both sides and I'll 23 24 leave that at that.

25 But there is another issue that I

1 would like to address council about, and if I'm out of order please stop me. I just --2 3 I'm at a brick wall and I don't know which 4 way to go because I heard you say now something was passed down from the mayor's 5 administration. There was something that I 6 7 brought to the administration last year in 8 regards to the whole Gerard School on West 9 Parker Street in North Scranton. I brought 10 it to the administration in regards to the 11 administration it was a blighted area. As 12 you know the Gerard School burned down 50 13 years ago, that lot there was very blighted. 14 We took volunteers and cleaned it up and 15 then I went to the mayor's office and asked 16 the may or could the city donate that land 17 to make a community park out of it. At 18 first it was in regards to a grandson that 19 had died up on Beecher Road, the mayor 20 agreed to do it, but then he said that I had 21 to had talk to Paul Walker, Mr. Walker, the city attorney, but I haven't been able to 22 23 meet with him in a year now. I don't know 24 if Mr. Hughes works with them or if he is a 25 city attorney because I'm asking because I

1 don't know if you all can get help me in regard to this project because it is a 2 3 blighted area. 4 MS. EVANS: Do you mean Paul Kelly? MR. CLARK: Yes. 5 MS. EVANS: The city solicitor? 6 7 MR. CLARK: Yes. 8 MS. EVANS: Well, you can give all of your information to our assistant city 9 10 clerk, Ms. Carrera, you name, phone number, 11 can send a message to Attorney Kelly that 12 you are very anxious to meet with him and, 13 you know, you can give --14 MR. CLARK: I'm just saying because 15 I know it was taxpayer's money that cleaned 16 the property up. The City of Scranton 17 maintenance department came out with dozers 18 and knocked down the trees and everything 19 and I understand that money needs to be used 20 in and fiscal year, that money was used for 21 that purpose but now it's beginning to be 22 blighted again. I have volunteers and stuff 23 that want to clean it up, but I mean I asked 24 them, it's a city property so I don't want

to engage on something that -- I don't want

25

2	MS. EVANS: Right. Well, we can
3	certainly give a summary of the situation
4	that you've enumerated for us and send that
5	to the city solicitor asking him to contact
6	you and schedule a meeting with you.
7	MR. CLARK: That would be wonderful.
8	Thank you so much.
9	MS. EVANS: Certainly. You're
10	welcome.
11	MR. CLARK: And that's all I have.
12	MS. EVANS: Our next speaker is Joan
13	Marie Yamin.
14	MS. YAMIN: Hello, Council. Thank
15	you for giving me a chance to speak. My
16	name is Joan Marie Yamin, I'm the owner of
17	"Eats" food truck. I have a couple of
18	concerns that I would like to bring up on
19	the ordinance. First, thank you for tabling
20	it and, you know, not just rationally making
21	a decision before having a chance to look at
22	it and come up with a conclusion.
23	My food truck is a little different
24	than day business because I work in the
25	nights. I cater to the bar crowd. I

1 started my business six years ago and have built it into something I'm very proud of. 2 3 When I started there was no other vendors on the street. I offered a service that was --4 I offered a service that was not offered 5 during that time span and, as I said, I have 6 7 been there for six years and I have never 8 encountered any problems. I know and love 9 my customers, I know their orders before 10 they stepped up. I hug crying girls, called 11 taxis and tucked drunk kids and sent them safely home. I add to the excitement of the 12 13 evening and enhance the businesses of the 14 bars across the street.

15 Countless people tell me they come 16 to the bars to come to the truck after they 17 get out. It's part of their evening. They 18 bring family, friends and I've been 19 introduced to parents who thank me for 20 looking out for their kids. People whom 21 come from out of the area have commented and 22 are impressed with the friendly, vibrant 23 urban atmosphere in Scranton that my 24 business implies.

25 I would like to bring up these needs

1 to your attention in hopes you take them into consideration when you vote on the 2 3 ordinance. In addition to the 100 feet 4 ruling we need to have -- operating hours need to be extended to 24 hours a day and 5 for the evening if a business is closed 6 7 there should be no footage limitation, like, 8 you know somehow from a time span from a 9 certain time span that when there aren't any 10 businesses open that the food vendors should 11 have the rights to be able to sell their 12 wares, you know.

13 Again, I love this city, I love 14 working in the downtown Scranton. I've had 15 two brick-and-mortar businesses in the city 16 before and I worked hard to build my 17 business. I buy supplies locally. My truck 18 is even a National Bakery truck. It was 19 built by Joe Azati, Bobby in North Scranton, 20 Scranton Restaurant Supplies, so like people 21 who are saying that theses businesses are 22 fruitful for the city they are fruitful 23 because not only are people coming in and 24 enjoying themselves and adding to the beauty 25 of this city, you know, we are also

1 extending our paychecks to other business and it just -- I just really believe that 2 3 the food trucks add a tone to the city and 4 I'm just asking you guys to help me safeguard my livelihood and to keep the food 5 trucks so that we can have a chance to --6 7 MS. EVANS: May I ask you one quick 8 question? 9 MS. YAMIN: Yes. 10 MS. EVANS: You say you operate only 11 during the evening hours, is that only in 12 the downtown area or are you traveling 13 throughout the --14 MS. YAMIN: Just downtown. 15 MS. EVANS: Just downtown. 16 MS. YAMIN: And actually I didn't 17 know it when I first got any license, I 18 don't even remember who was the person who 19 was in office at that point, but they told 20 us you just had to say 100 feet from a 21 business. I was surprised when I found out 22 about the 24-hour ruling after the last 23 meeting I was like, oh, my God, and they 24 said it was an ordinance. So, I mean, that 25 was a surprise, like, it wasn't brought to

1 our attention, you know, but that's been my business for six years has been on that 2 3 street in that spot, like, I've not moved 4 so--MS. EVANS: 5 Thank you. MS. YAMIN: 6 Thank you, guys. 7 MS. HUGHES: Madam Chairman, if I 8 could comment on that, please? 9 MS. EVANS: Yes, please. MR. HUGHES: The ordinance since it 10 11 was adopted in Scranton really only applied 12 to vendors that would come out during parade 13 time, when there were parades. That was the 14 ordinance that was on the books. When you 15 got your license there was nothing that 16 covered food carts or food wagons or food 17 trucks. So that what the original ordinance 18 as it would apply to people that came 19 downtown during the parade time they had to 20 be 100 feet from an existing business and 21 that's why it says any mercantile business, 22 anybody that pays a mercantile tax. 23 That's when the hours were 24 established because there weren't any

parades at night. Now, now maybe during the

25

1 Italian festival they wouldn't be out 2 because the courthouse square that would be 3 at night, but these are -- that's what the 4 ordinance was originally intended for. When the ordinance came down from 5 the solicitor's office I reviewed it, it 6 7 didn't have the specific section to the 8 ordinance. I looked up the ordinance and it said that the amendments that were to be 9 10 made should be made to those specific 11 sections and I raised the issue where they 12 said for the food trucks to be within no 13 more than 500 feet of any mercantile -- any 14 business that pays a mercantile tax in the 15 city. What that would have done, there 16 wouldn't have been any food trucks in 17 downtown Scranton because it wasn't just 18 wasn't restaurants. It stated that any business that pay a mercantile tax. 19

That was one of my comments that it should be limited just to any restaurant. The 500 feet was excessive because that would have in effect outlawed or prohibit, not outlaw, but would outlaw, any food trucks within downtown Scranton, and I gave

this memo to council to review when I sent
it up to Mr. Kelly.

3 So that they just put in the same 4 hours, you know, one half hour before sunset, sunset in the morning, because that 5 would be a typical, most of your parades so 6 7 we could still leave, I say "we", I could 8 recommend that that could still be there for 9 those type of vendors, but when it comes to 10 the food trucks, food carts, that should be 11 a separate area. It has nothing to do with 12 those type of vendors that only come during 13 the time when there is parades.

14 So I just wanted to comment on that 15 because, as you said, you got your permit 16 six years ago, there really was no ordinance 17 covering that, you know, covering the food 18 trucks. This is just a recent development 19 and I think council should be aware of that, 20 also. I do have that in my memo, that's 21 where the one hour or the half hour before 22 sunset, you know, sunset in the morning 23 until half hour before sunset that's where 24 that came in, okay?

25 MS. EVANS: Okay, thank you.

1	MS. YAMIN: Thank you.
2	MS. EVANS: You're welcome. Our
3	next speaker is David Dobrzyn.
4	MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave
5	Dobrzyn.
6	MS. EVANS: Good evening.
7	MR. DOBRZYN: I had a question on
8	7-C, D and E would that potentially come
9	with an ex post facto where somebody decides
10	whether it's logical to foreign business and
11	they put time and effort into it and then
12	somehow something comes along that changes
13	that and makes it unprofitable. I also
14	expressed with evening festivals and so
15	forth I had concerns about that or having
16	purchased food off the trucks. I could have
17	walked two or three blocks to a restaurant
18	but the truck was right there and what they
19	did have was pretty decent and a attractive.
20	And I have a little complaint about
21	the current campaign, signs were taken off
22	my curb of two people sitting on that panel
23	right there their signs are missing, at
24	least one of them, and it disgusts me and if
25	I ever catch somebody, well, they might want

to know karate. It won't do them any good
with me. Thank you. It's really disgusting
and it throws suspicion on people that are
probably innocent, also.

And I'd like to note on 6-A if that 5 Duffy monument is affected, Sergeant Duffy 6 7 at Duffy Park, if that involves Duffy Park 8 we should get compensation to move that 9 monument because \$20,000 doesn't sound like 10 much if we have to move that monument out of 11 there, find another home for it or 12 something, so that the guy, the Word War I 13 doughboy throwing the hand grenade. My dog 14 always used to growl at that. He thought 15 somebody was throwing a rock at him or 16 something. It was hilarious.

17 And I also like to note my fourth 18 comment is the Parking authority. Now, a 19 lot of this has blamed our bond rating has 20 gone with you people. You know, now here we 21 were borrowing without authority, we had an 22 attorney here advising the Parking Authority 23 principal not to answer your questions like 24 it was some kind of court of law and I think 25 it's time that some people lighten up on you

1 people. Yeah, we have a lot of crises but I know where they came from and I have a good 2 3 memory and I'm patient and maybe that's --4 And also on No. 5 on potholes, now, just a few months ago this block was not 5 paved here on Mulberry Street. I don't know 6 7 what number is, but they were holding up for 8 utility work. Well, it seemed like it 9 wasn't a month and I went by the fire 10 situation, there is a big divot in the 11 street and whatever slop they threw in the 12 hole was supposed to do, but none of our 13 potholes are suitable, and I don't even care 14 if they waste money paving the street if 15 they are just going to come and tear it up 16 again. We have to start getting after all 17 of the utilities to make them repair 18 correctly and seal afterwards because if 19 they leave the cut and the water gets down 20 in there it's a waste of money, waste of 21 money, and I'm tired of seeing it. It's just totally disgusting. 22

A couple of weeks there must be a half a dozen places where Mulberry Street was repaired, and they are very poor

1 repairs, and it's right up and down the street all the way up the street towards CMC 2 3 so check it out for yourself some time. 4 Now, we have a situation and it's part national and part local, 501-C-4's, 5 exempt on public welfare, so if I want to 6 7 set up a library or I want to set up a 8 homeless shelter or a shelter for battered 9 women I'm supposed to be tax exempt. Well. 10 now these political organizations moved in 11 because in 1959 they changed it to primarily 12 instead of exclusively public welfare, and I 13 have this to give you and they get the bawk, 14 bawk, bawk, this week because personally I 15 don't think that they should have any tax 16 exemptions for any political activity. 17 Thank you. I have to give 20 percent of the 18 money before I come to your rally to the 19 government. 20 MS. EVANS: Thank you.

21 MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

22 MR. DOBRZYN: I hope I didn't spill 23 nothing on you there, Frank. Thank you and 24 have a good night.

25 MR. SCRANTON: You, also. John

1	Robinson.
2	MR. ROBINSON: Good evening,
3	everyone.
4	MS. EVANS: Good evening.
5	MR. ROBINSON: Glad to meet you all
6	in person, I'm always watching you guys on
7	TV, I appreciate you alls hard work. My
8	name is John Robinson, I'm a property owner
9	and I'm food vendor for over eight and I pay
10	mercantile tax as well.
11	Today is May 16, 2013, the City of
12	Scranton had a very good opportunity to step
13	outside the box, to be open minded to some
14	changes. The diversity of the residents in
15	the city as well as the added food vendors
16	in the city is an example of the changes
17	that are needed and wanted and will benefit
18	all of Scranton.
19	Food vendors, like restaurants, buys
20	goods and supplies from other businesses in
21	the city, and sometimes we even need to hire
22	help. Restaurants on some blocks are right
23	next to each other. One business do not
24	effect the other. Vendors are not in front
25	of restaurants and so being even 25 feet

1away would not effect any restaurants.2People need to have choices and the people3will choose to go where they want to go4regardless of what you guys decide to do.

5

We need to give people more choices to eat. That's one of the -- brings in business for the city. The more businesses, whether it be a food truck, restaurant or what have you will increase business and less choices there will be less business.

11 You mentioned early about leveling 12 the playing field and I agree with that. It 13 is time to level the playing field. Some 14 restaurants get city funding to open their 15 businesses, so I understand the city may 16 have a vested interest in the restaurants. 17 I didn't receive any funding, I didn't 18 receive any loan, I didn't borrow no money 19 from my parents, I was just vigilant in what 20 I wanted to do and I worked very hard to do 21 it.

A little over eight years ago I had a vision to start my business, and I did, and I also had a vision to do it at night when the clubs closed. There were no

restaurants open at that time, there was no other vendors at that time. Eight years later there are many vendors and there are lots of people who appreciate us being out there. Lots of people. And it's at the courthouse so, I mean, it's in a safe environment and people do appreciate us.

8 Like I said, there were no 9 restaurants open after 10 p.m., now 10 restaurants want to have a part of that 11 business and that's their choice, but I have 12 a problem with them having that choice and 13 us not having the choice to stay. When is 14 enough going to be enough? I believe that 15 city down need to really take a look at 16 looking out for us little guys, the people 17 who are not part of the establishment, 18 people who work hard, obey the law and 19 basically just want a fair share. We just 20 want a fair share of the American dream and 21 the possibility of even opening up a 22 restaurant.

In closing, there are a lot of special events at the courthouse. I don't know really the ins and outs of how they get

1 their passes or vendor license or whatever, 2 but the courthouse it is county property as 3 I understand, right? It's county property 4 and so I think to say that the courthouse should be off limit for city vendors would 5 be a discredit to the vendors and the city. 6 The courthouse should be open to the vendors 7 8 because it's been done for years. It's 9 always done for special events and if it can be done for them, it should be done for us. 10 11 So basically that's all I have, you 12 know, and I appreciate your time. 13 MS. EVANS: Thank you very much. 14 That concludes our sign-in sheet, is there 15 anyone else would like to address council? 16 MR. O'MAST: Josh O'Mast, local 17 business owner. Thank you for tabling the 18 food truck tonight. I am reading this 19 actually on behalf of Scranton Tomorrow and 20 what was sent over. So on behalf of 21 Scranton Tomorrow I thank you for the 22 opportunity to speak to you this evening. 23 Over the past month Scranton Tomorrow 24 Scranton Tomorrow has met and facilitated 25 numerous meetings with the members of the

restaurant and food vendor. Scranton
Tomorrow began by reviewing and educating
the group and the current ordinance with the
assistance of Mr. Mark Seitzinger, Director
or Licensing, Inspection and Permits.

We then reviewed and openly 6 7 discussed the recent proposed ordinance. 8 The meetings were a great example of the power of open dialogue. 9 We found that both 10 groups had valid issues, concerns and 11 Scranton Tomorrow documented suggestions. 12 the issues raised by both groups and 13 systematically facilitated a respectful and 14 in-depth conversation.

15 Yesterday, Scranton Tomorrow 16 facilitated the final meeting of both 17 groups. Approximately 20 individuals were 18 in attendance. The meeting focused on 19 finalizing a piece of proposal for the 20 review and approval of Scranton's mayor and 21 city council. This meeting was viewed as a 22 successful outcome by those present. The 23 process is to have both the brick-and-mortar 24 businesses and the food vendor operators to 25 work collectively. This newly formed

respect has already developed into a
 meaningful and economically positive
 partnerships.

The following items are proposed and we respectfully ask that you approve on behalf of the restaurant owners and food vendor operators:

8 Distance. Vendors must be at least 100 feet from the restaurant service area 9 10 and public ingress and egress. The service 11 area shall extend outdoors, as permitted, 12 through the encroachment ordinance which would have been passed by council. 13 This 14 rule will apply 24 hours a day, seven days 15 week. For the description and 16 clarifications needed, should rule apply to 17 the facilities with health licenses. 18 Currently Rite Aid applies because they sell 19 food and beverage, but not prepared food. 20 This is a question.

Penalties for not abiding by the
ordinance. Health violation. A food truck
should incur the same fine structures as
restaurants. Both operates with retail food
facilities licenses.

Distance violation. First time 1 should be a warning, written and documented; 2 3 second time a 500 feet will be imposed o 4 those who are cited for noncompliance of this ordinance. 5 Private property. If a food truck 6 7 vendor is operating on a privately owned 8 parking lot the 100 foot rule will not 9 The property owner or vendor must apply. notify the Department of LIPS in writing 10 11 approving the operation of the vendor and 12 the property owner to avoid compliance 13 issues. 14 License and fee. All food vendors 15 will pay \$250 annually. If parking at 16 public meters, they must abide by the 17 Scranton Parking Authority meter rules and 18 regulations. 19 Hours of operation. We would like 20 to rewrite the entire section, remove the 21 half hour after sundown to 8 a.m. clause and 22 replace with the following:

23 Vendors may operate 24 hours a day,
24 seven days a week. The vendor must vacate
25 the space upon conclusion of the business

1	day or evening. Therefore, they may not
2	vehicles, carts, etcetera on the streets
3	overnight. Define conclusion of business in
4	the space.
5	Additional items not within the
6	scope of this ordinance were discussed and
7	brought to the attention of the city
8	solicitor for future discussion and
9	clarification.
10	On behalf of Scranton Tomorrow and
11	the businesses that participated in this
12	process, I thank for your attention to this
13	matter. Thank you.
14	MR. JOYCE: Thank you. Is there
15	anyone else who cares to address council.
16	MR. MCGOFF: I just want to add one
17	thing, where they had under hours of
18	operation, may it be better, the concern for
19	the 24/7 or a concern for the 8 a.m. or
20	whatever clause was overnight parking, and I
21	think one way that we can avoid that is just
22	put in a clause that says that the truck can
23	only be there can only be in metered
24	space at the meters during their hours of
25	operation.

1 So as soon as -- as long as you are open and serving food you can be at a meter. 2 3 Once you stop serving food, it has to be 4 removed. I think that would be easier to understand than putting in certain hours, 5 but it's something that we will consider. 6 That was all. 7 Thank you. 8 MR. JOYCE: Thank you, Mr. McGoff. 9 Is there anyone else who cares to address 10 council? 11 MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, 12 citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians. MR. JOYCE: Good evening. 13 14 MR. SBARAGLIA: Last week I 15 mentioned this parking meter contract and 16 they mentioned 60,000, but no one up there 17 said that 60,000 is only for one year. 18 Otherwise, they are not planning to pay for the meters. I teach in -- in other words, 19 20 remember that piece of legislation that came 21 down where we pay for cars, the people doing 22 the -- writing the citations and the meters 23 and this and that and whatever, this is 24 coming again. This contract is useless and 25 there is no reason why we couldn't do this

1 in-house, no way in heck we couldn't do it in-house. Surely there must be someone in 2 3 the administration that has enough brands to 4 handle 50 -- what was it, 11 or 12 citations issuers, something like that. It ain't that 5 many -- or eight, something in that 6 neighborhood. And there is a guy who runs 7 8 the whole police department, there is a guy 9 who runs the whole fire department, but we 10 don't have a person qualified to oversee 11 eight meter maids or whoever the citation 12 issuers are, male or female. His thing is --13 you know what it's going to be. It's going 14 to cost us thousands and thousands of 15 dollars more than we have to pay. There is 16 nothing wrong with a dollar a meter. That 17 to me is already high enough and a lot of 18 you, you talk about people being pushed away 19 from meters, when the lady was here she said 20 she fed the meters at the stores. Many of 21 them meters that is being utilized are being 22 utilized by employees of different stores, 23 not by the public. And the reason why, you 24 know why, the Parking Authority is too darn 25 high.

1 But I don't see why we should be get into another contract. We don't need 2 3 contracts, we need people with brains. 4 That's what we need. We need an open, 5 honest and efficient government, and these things are lacking to say that we were going 6 7 to vote on that RFP for \$60,000 for one man 8 or one nothing, you don't even know what you 9 are going to be cover because the meter that 10 is not there, remember the lady that said, "Where's the meat?" 11

12 Well, where's the meat in this 13 legislation that's going to come down here? 14 You should get on the ball, get a look and 15 find out what all the little things are. 16 Ask up there, order up there, request up 17 there or like their -- some of the people 18 would say subpoena them. But you got to get 19 answers before it comes before you because 20 they are always coming in with these stupid 21 emergency certificates. We are in dire 22 trouble with money so we are going to pass 23 this thing and lose hundreds and hundreds 24 and thousands of dollars that we don't need 25 to lose. The Parking Authorities is a lost

1 cause. As soon as it gets through your mind 2 it's a lost cause we can move on. We are 3 stuck with it. I would ask the people to 4 resign long ago but you sat up there and said they're fellow Democrats, why should we 5 ask them to resign? Rogan was the only one 6 7 that made sense to ask our business manager 8 to resign. He should have because he didn't 9 present a good case. True he is not a 10 lawyer, but he has all these lawyers behind.

11 But look at what's happening \$60,000 12 to run these parking meters when you know 13 there is a lot of additional costs that's 14 going to be borne by the taxpayers of 15 Scranton. It doesn't make sense. Look 16 around, find somebody that can do it -- we 17 used to do it. We did to for many, may 18 years, but for some reason or other the 19 Parking Authority got into trouble and you 20 know why and that's why went through all 21 this other garbage.

Look around amongst the people that you have in-house, surely there must be a person there that can do it. It's not too complicated to oversee eight people or ten

1 people. I remember some of my friends used 2 to go out and collect the money, you see 3 them collecting the money with the little 4 cart where you'd dump it in, like, something like a transit company where you couldn't 5 open, nobody could steal it, but that was 6 7 done years and years ago. Why we got away 8 from it probably for the Parking Authority 9 they needed money and they needed another 10 source of money and we gave them that 11 source. Why do you want to back to that 12 deal? 13 The parking meters are ours, they 14 are independent of the parking garages for 15 anybody that tries to combine them is the 16 wrong way to go. All it is a giveaway. 17 Okay, I won't talk no more on it. Thank ou. 18 MR. EVANS: Thank you. 19 MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, 20 council. Marie Schumacher. Resident and 21 taxpayer. 22 MR. JOYCE: Good evening. 23 MS. EVANS: Good evening. 24 MS. SCHUMACHER: I was late coming 25 tonight but I understand that you have

1	tabled 7-C through E.
2	MS. EVANS: Yes.
3	MS. SCHUMACHER: And I wonder if
4	that is the proper procedure prior to Fifth
5	Order to table a motion?
6	MS. EVANS: Mr. McGoff made the
7	request of me to make the motion early on in
8	the meeting in order that the public would
9	be aware because we had so many food vendors
10	that were present this evening and to
11	alleviate their fears I agreed with him that
12	it would be done at the beginning of the
13	meeting. I don't think it's going to make
14	any type of difference in the action.
15	MS. SCHUMACHER: It is precedent
16	setting however. Now, I'll move onto
17	several weeks ago legislation passed to
18	remove parking meters from the corner of
19	Penn and Vine or Linden, and I came by
20	there the other day and all of those parking
21	spaces were occupied by cars except the only
22	difference is now they are parking without
23	paying a parking fee. I think that part of
24	our problem is we are pennywise and pound
25	foolish. In the old days, I remember the

1 "No Parking" curbs, when we still had curbs, 2 used to be painted another color so it was 3 clear there was no parking and I must admit 4 if I hadn't been at the meeting here and I saw a pole without a head it was a parking 5 space to me, I would park there as well. So 6 7 I think when we totally decide that it is 8 "No Parking" that some means has to be done 9 to mark those as "No Parking" and then we have to start enforcing some of our rules. 10

11 I used to laugh, when I lived in 12 Virginia and I came home and would stop at 13 this one stop sign it would say "STOP" and 14 then underneath somebody had written, "And 15 Pray" and I thought it was sort of funny. 16 The parking is so bad people park sometimes 17 out into the street and that's exactly what 18 you have to do. If you don't -- your field 19 of view is totally obliterated and you sort 20 of just have to inch out and if you get 21 creamed I guess you get creamed.

Several months ago now I brought an idea to council and I don't think anything has been done with it. I think it was the mayor of Carbondale, but I'm not sure,

1 deputized some people to -- they were at -in this instance they were firefighters who 2 3 were not working to go out and do traffic 4 citations of the police nature, parking in front of fire hydrants and all of the 5 things. We are missing not only -- not only 6 are we doing a disservice to our people by 7 8 making them when they are in this town think 9 that that's normal for any other city and 10 then they go out of town and they get 11 clobbered with a traffic violation because 12 Scranton is unique and I think it's time we start ticketing people, and I don't think it 13 14 would take too long for people to get smart 15 and stop doing some of these things that are 16 really terrible, and I think that needs to 17 be investigated further.

18 The next item I have is sort of what 19 the same thing Mr. Dobrzyn spoke of which is 20 the statute on the property I believe you 21 are selling to PennDOT. I know the price is 22 higher than the CRL times the assessment of 23 that property, but I wonder since the old 24 bridge is going to be maintained until the 25 new one is up and then I assume that road,

1 once the road is straight can become a park, 2 that we should get some land back, and I 3 would like to suggest that Duffy Park remain 4 and a place be found to store that Duffy memorial until the Harrison Avenue bridge is 5 complete and it can be placed on the other 6 side of the street and Duffy Park should 7 8 remain. 9 Do you know at the present time what the plan is for that statute? 10 11 MS. EVANS: No, I do not. 12 MS. SCHUMACHER: Did you not last 13 week vote to take that money that we are 14 getting for that and place it someplace else? 15 16 MS. EVANS: A suggestion was made by 17 Councilman Rogan that that money be 18 allocated towards paving with his colleagues' agreement. As far as I know, we 19 20 were in agreement and amendment would have 21 to be written to that piece of legislation 22 for next week's meeting and when it reaches Seventh Order that it will be allocated 23 24 toward the paving program. 25 MS. SCHUMACHER: I would strongly

1 urge you to table that until we find out 2 what becomes of that monument so that it 3 can, and maybe the money has to go towards 4 that and it's a big heavy thing and I think the first priority should be to find a place 5 to store it until the project is completed 6 7 and bring it back or if there is a place to 8 store it to where PennDOT is not going to use it on the other size of Harrison Avenue 9 to move it now. But I dont' think that's 10 11 going to be cheap, and I think that should 12 be the first priority.

13 And now moving onto another sort of 14 miss, I don't know if it's -- well, I guess 15 it's wasted manpower. I heard one, and I 16 would give attribution if I remembered which 17 one it was, but I've been to too many 18 debates now, if I may complete this thought 19 I'll bring the rest back next week, and that 20 is 10 percent of the people who are eligible 21 or should pay the trash fee do not pay so we 22 are only collecting 90 percent and this -- a 23 woman when I was done at Boscov's trying to 24 help the economy and the city along stopped 25 me and talked and she spoke again, I don't

1 recall the city or the Borough, but they actually have placards that you get and you 2 3 put a new, like, your license so you get a 4 new one for every year that you put over and it shows that your tax is paid, and I don't 5 think we should be collecting trash from 6 7 people who aren't paying their trash fee. 8 It's that simple. And they could get done a 9 lot faster and maybe the collections would go up a lot more if we didn't service people 10 11 without them paying so I'll be back next 12 week with the rest of them. Thank you. 13 MS. EVANS: Thank you. 14 MR. JOYCE: Thank you. 15 MS. SCHUMACHER: And please remind 16 people to vote next Tuesday. Thank you. 17 MS. EVANS: Ms. Carrera, if we can 18 send a letter regarding I believe it's Penn 19 and Linden where the parking meters were 20 removed for the installation of the 21 privately owned parking lot that "No 22 Parking" signs need to be erected in that 23 area. 24 And, also, if we can please send a

24 And, also, if we can please send a 25 letter to the mayor the DPW head regarding

1 the Duffy monument, what the plans are for the monument, if it can be stored if so 2 3 where and we would like a response to that 4 prior to next week's meeting, please. Is there anyone else? 5 MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council. 6 7 Doug Miller, Scranton. I'd just like to 8 begin this evening by going back and 9 discussing the pools. I'm pleased to learn 10 last week we were all informed by Councilman 11 Joyce that, in fact, this summer we can look 12 forward to Novembrino Pool being opened over 13 in West Side as well as Connell Park. Weston 14 Park, Weston Field and Nay Aug Park. 15 Obviously it's been a long time coming and 16 obviously we're hopeful that some of the 17 funding still goes through, but as 18 Councilman Joyce alluded to last week it does look like that will come into fruition 19 20 and thankfully the children won't suffer 21 another summer. I don't think anybody has 22 been as passionate as I have from this 23 podium about that year after year, so I give 24 a lot of credit to Councilman Joyce for 25 spearheading those efforts and reaching out

1	to the mayor and finally getting that done,
2	so I do want to commend the councilman.
3	MR. JOYCE: Thank you.
4	MR. MILLER: I'd like to just
5	briefly discuss, I normally don't get into
6	things I see in the paper, and I have a lot
7	of respect for this individual, a letter to
8	the editor that I did come across yesterday
9	from Mr. Jackowitz, and I do have a lot of
10	respect for Mr. Jackowitz, he has been
11	coming here for many years as myself and he
12	has expressed his opinions on a wide variety
13	of issues, but, you know, I just have to
14	take issue with his editorial because I find
15	a lot of it to be very misleading and
16	unfactual.
17	I don't think it's fair to make a
18	statement that, you know, the residents, and
19	particularly the candidates who are running
20	for office in the city don't realize how bad
21	the mayor and the council are going to leave
22	the city financially. I think those are
23	very misleading statements to make and,
24	quite frankly, unfair statement to make.
25	I think anyone who was paid

1 attention. close attention to what's been 2 going on in the city recently would know 3 quite well that this council didn't cause 4 the problem, anybody that's been coming here for years, as I have, anybody that's been 5 paying attention and listening would know 6 7 that for the last year you have been fighting vigorously to prevent a lot of 8 these massive tax increases and the massive 9 10 layoffs from possibly coming into play and, 11 you know, when we take a trip back to the 12 summer, because that's pretty much where we 13 always go back to and fall back to last 14 August, throughout that whole recovery plan 15 process if we paid attention we would know 16 that this council's opinion has been ignored 17 on several occasions by the Pennsylvania 18 Economy League and this administration, and 19 you were pretty much held hostage in certain 20 instances in terms of we all remember when 21 PEL offered us that grant and that loan and 22 basically it was if you put our recovery 23 plan and pass it we will give you what you 24 want, and you weren't going to fall for 25 that, you weren't going to be bullied

because that was the step, that was the
action and the philosophy you took when you
came into office. You weren't going to be
bullied and you weren't going to allow PEL
and the administration to push you around.
You very easily could have given in.

I'm sure the last council majority 7 8 would have given in because they are the 9 council that has caused the mess we are in, 10 and I think when we talk about whether or 11 not the candidates not understanding where 12 we are if they are going to realize that 13 council left us in a bad spot, my fear is 14 that it's the complete opposite. Μv 15 question is do some of these candidates that 16 are seeking office, no particular 17 candidates, but do some of the candidates 18 even have an idea of where we stand because 19 we hear an awful lot about cooperation and a 20 lot of other things that they seem to just 21 battle about, but do they really have an 22 understanding of what's going on because you 23 never see any of them down here so it's hard 24 for me to imagine that they have a clear 25 understanding of where the city truly stands

at this point in time.

1

And when we want to talk about 2 3 criticizing the council, as I said, we can 4 easily give in and pass PEL's plan, the mayor's plan, raise taxes 80, 90, 100 5 percent and really and really stuff it to 6 7 the taxpayers, so when we come up to this 8 podium and we make those comments I think we 9 need to really sit back and think how lucky 10 we are to have this council because you were 11 the only ones that stood in-between a 12 massive tax increase and massive layoffs and 13 we could snicker and talk in the audience 14 all we want, but I think we'll all be 15 laughing next year at this time when we have 16 a new council majority who, unfortunately, I 17 don't feel, you know, I truly believe that 18 we are going to be really sorry next year at 19 this time because I think we might have 20 taken for granted what we have here. This 21 is history here and we are not going to see 22 this again because for the last year and 23 half we have had three people working 24 tirelessly on behalf of the residents of 25 this city, and yeah, ou took criticism.

1 You know, one thing I know from coming here is you're never going to please 2 3 everyone, no matter what decision is it you 4 make, you are never going to please anyone, and that's when it comes the time -- when 5 it's time for people to step up, but we want 6 7 to be critical, we want to say no to 8 everything and you don't have any plans 9 ourself and we think everything is so easy. 10 And that's what really gets me, too, 11 is throughout this whole process for the 12 last year and a half particularly everything is so easy. There is so many people. And I 13

14 really wish it was. We all think we can 15 just snap our finger and we're going to turn 16 everything around. We think, oh, we need to 17 make cuts, we need to do this, we need to 18 cut salaries. It's so easy, isn't it? If 19 it was that easy then I think we would have 20 done that.

But as we said, there is only so much we can cut. We did everything we could to avoid bankruptcy and I want to make it quite clear, and another misleading comment, yeah, you will lose your services if a

receiver comes in. You will have massive 1 tax increases, you will have less police and 2 3 firemen on the street and your garbage will 4 not be collected and I think the residents need to realize that, so when we take a look 5 back in time you made tough decision, 6 7 difficult decisions, but we are better off 8 than we were four years ago and I think it's 9 something I think we are all going to be 10 sorry because I do have a scary feeling that 11 we are, unfortunately going to go back in 12 time with the old politics and I just hope 13 the voters in this town come out Tuesday and 14 make some hard choices because we can't afford to go back in time, we need to move 15 16 forward and there is only more difficult 17 decisions to make down the road, so thank 18 you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

19

20 MS. CHILIPKO: Good evening, 21 Council. Mary Chilipko, resident of the 22 City of Scranton and it's a shame that it's 23 all come to this. I know you tried to 24 intervene, Mr. McGoff, thank you, as far as 25 political rhetoric.

1 I just want to come here on behalf of the Pinebrook Neighborhood Association 2 3 because I don't see any mention of the 4 Capouse Avenue or Pennridge Complex in the 5 plans for opening the pools this summer. I don't know if this mayor forgot about them 6 or abandoned it. 7 8 MR. JOYCE: No, it hasn't been 9 forgotten about or abandoned, I did ask the 10 mayor about opening all pools in the city 11 and, unfortunately, this a pool that needs 12 serious repairs. 13 MS. CHILIPKO: And? 14 MR. JOYCE: Pardon. MS. CHILIPKO: 15 And? 16 MR. JOYCE: And, unfortunately, we 17 don't have the funds right now to use out of 18 the RE-RE account to repair the pool and 19 open it is what I was told. 20 MS. CHILIPKO: Okay, well, since you 21 speak to the mayor now frequently if you 22 could please just go back to him and just 23 let him know that the residents of the area 24 will work hard to get that pool reopened. Ι

think that at this point there probably

25

repairs that need to be made at the
Novembrino Pool and I'd just hate to see our
neighborhood -- I'm glad for any
neighborhood or any pool that is being
opened this summer. I would hate to see our
Capouse Avenue pool be left out and we will
work hard.

8 I hear people talking about the 9 little guy tonight. I know legislation has 10 been tabled, but I actually stopped down and 11 I did see, I believe her name is Joan her 12 ran food truck, Mr. Hughes -- Attorney Hughes explained the part about the sunset 13 14 rule and she was just setting up around 8:00 15 and she was setting up in front of 16 Mulligan's and the Back Yard Ale House so I 17 don't -- I did not see any kind of problem. I wish I could work that hard, I really do. 18

19The little guy has a history of20getting knocked around in Scranton and it's21nice to see that they are starting to stand22up for themselves, become educated. I heard23a gentleman mentioned something to him that24some of the restaurants may have city money,25as we call it, involved with them. I'm glad

1	residents and small business people are
2	becoming educated. It's time for the little
3	guy to rise.
4	I do only have one more question
5	tonight, is Mr. Miller a counsel for school
6	director or city council?
7	MS. EVANS: He is here, you can ask
8	him after you're seated.
9	MS. CHILIPKO: Okay. Thank you,
10	Council.
11	MS. EVANS: You're welcome.
12	MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus, Scranton.
13	MR. JOYCE: Good evening.
14	MS. FRANUS: Good evening. About
15	two weeks ago I attended a Court hearing
16	that Joe Pilchesky filed a lawsuit against
17	Bill Courtright, the tax collector. It was
18	in front if Judge Mazzoni at the courthouse.
19	I was really stunned at this hearing, I was
20	rather shocked. Billy Courtright, the tax
21	collector, he ran for office 3 1/2 years
22	ago. He ran on the platform, one of this
23	biggest claims to get elected, was he would
24	stop commingling the monies. It's 3 1/2
25	years and he is still commingling funds. He

1	said he doesn't have enough time, it takes a
2	lot of time. I think 3 1/3 years is
3	sufficient. We liked the voters back then.
4	Now, he had all these employees
5	intact from January 2010 through January 30,
6	2012, the only reason he lost the employees
7	halfway thru 2012 was the state law changed
8	and he was no longer allowed to collect the
9	wage tax. Those employees were in charge of
10	wage tax collection. What I can't
11	understand it's a state law and Judge
12	Mazzoni was asking him, "Is this something
13	that always took place?"
14	And they said, "Yes, it always has."
15	But that doesn't make it right.
16	Just because the District Attorney and
17	Lackawanna County and law enforcement people
18	or judges didn't enforce this law doesn't
19	mean it's not a law and it wasn't enforced
20	probably because of politics and it may not
21	be again.
22	So it's a two-year prison sentence
23	and a \$5,000 fine and/or a \$5,000 fine and
24	he is just not even considering it. Joe
25	Pilchesky offered him the chance right there

1 and then in front of Judge Mazzoni if he 2 would say that day at the hearing if he 3 would stop commingling the funds from that 4 day forward, if he would start to do it the right way and also to use the city lawyer 5 like he is supposed to instead of hiring his 6 7 own lawyer he would just drop this lawsuit 8 and it would all go away and through his 9 lawyer, Attorney Abrahamsen, he said no, he would not do that. He said no, he would not 10 11 stop commingling funds and he would not use 12 the city lawyer.

13 He had a chance to say, yes, I will 14 do that much. He said it would take too 15 long. Well, I think 3 1/2 years is long 16 enough. I find it amazing that he complies 17 with the state law regarding notifying Ms. 18 Randol about starting negative campaigns 19 against her, but yet he won't comply with 20 the state law saying he can't commingle 21 funds? I think it's outrageous. This is 22 the man someone wants to vote for mayor, I 23 don't think so nor do some of the people 24 because I looked at some of my tapes of the 25 previous council meetings and just some of

the votes that he -- just a couple of the
votes that he voted for --

3 MR. MCGOFF: Ms. Evans, I'm going to 4 reiterate that I think this is inappropriate 5 from the podium because I know you said you 6 wouldn't allow it and I just wanted to state 7 that.

8 MS. EVANS: And I thank you. But 9 again, everyone has a First Amendment Right 10 to free speech.

11 MR. MCGOFF: Understood.

MS. EVANS: And whether we agree with them, whether we like what they are saying or not they have that right and I granted that right to many other speakers tonight and every other night and so I can't selectively enforce.

18 MS. FRANUS: Bill Courtright voted 19 yes to the mayor's borrowing and budget in 20 2005. He voted yes to the Parking Authority 21 borrowing, \$35 million. He voted to bail 22 out the Hilton Hotel and lost \$3 million for 23 the city on the deal. He sat there on the 24 fence and waffled on every issue except the 25 ones for change in the police unions, which

1 is another thing he is doing now, he is 2 still not publically endorsing the police or 3 firemen because he knows the people in 4 Scranton, most of the people in the city are not union people. They don't like the pays 5 that the unions get, so he would lose votes 6 if he pubically supported them or said he 7 8 was for them, but make no mistakes, he is 9 behind them all the way.

10 So that's about it. I just wanted 11 to say about the food trucks. I think they 12 are wonderful. I think they give a lot to 13 the people that don't have time to go to 14 restaurants or don't want to get dressed up 15 or just going by. I think 400 feet is 16 sufficient. I don't think it should be any 17 further away. That would hurt them and it's 18 not right and competition is great and their 19 food is wonderful and I think you should 20 really consider this for the betterment of 21 the people in this city. The more 22 businesses the better for everybody. Thank 23 you very much.

24 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there 25 anyone else? Mrs. Krake?

1 MS. KRAKE: 5-A. MOTIONS. 2 MS. EVANS: Councilman McGoff, do 3 you have any comments or motions tonight? 4 MR. MCGOFF: Yes. I do. I failed to 5 mention one announcement early. This weekend will be the second annual Scranton 6 7 Celtic Festival to be held at Montage 8 Mountain Saturday and Sunday. Entertainment, food, vendors and all things 9 10 Celtic. Last year was the first year, it 11 was a great success. Hopefully more people 12 will attend this year. It can be a great 13 event. 14 On Monday, I contacted Mark Dougher and asked him about the situation at Pike Street that Mr. Galdieri had spoke about last week. He did say that he feels that this is a legitimate concern. The reason it

15 16 17 18 19 has not been paid is a matter, and I'll give you his answer, I'm not asking that anybody 20 necessarily like it, that it was a matter of 21 22 priority and money for not paving it, but 23 that he said that he would go out to Pike 24 Street, take a look at it again and see if 25 there is anything that can be done to help

alleviate the problem. Hopefully he will
 do, hopefully something can be done in the
 near future.

4 As far as the food truck and 5 restaurant meetings, I think that it is a great example of what open, honest dialogue 6 7 can done to resolve a situation. I would 8 extend my thanks to Leslie Collins and 9 Scranton Tomorrow for facilitating the 10 meetings that were held and preparing the 11 recommendations that where presented to us 12 for our perusal.

I think that is the way in which you 13 14 go about resolving problems. Get the 15 parties together, sit down and have an open 16 dialogue about it and I'm glad that this 17 worked out and I think we have a number of 18 things to look at and good suggestions that 19 are workable and hopefully we can implement into the situation so we can move forward 20 21 with that.

22 Rental registration, that was not 23 asked tonight and I actually had some 24 answers. To date there have been 1,220 25 rental registrations. There are less than

1 50 inspections done. They have had 2 difficulty, now, these are the safety 3 inspections done on the rental properties. 4 Two things have occurred, number one, they have been working to increase the database. 5 They felt that was their first obligation 6 7 which I think when we passed the legislation 8 said that was the initial phase was to get 9 as many properties listed as possible and 10 they also spoke of the difficulty of 11 arranging for the inspections so that they 12 can get into the properties to have them 13 inspected.

14I was told that they were hopefully15moving to do more inspections during the16summer months as they have compiled -- as17they are finishing compiling the database or18getting close to it.

And I believe the last question that was asked has this information been sent to the Single Tax Office and I was told that they were not aware that they should turn this over to the Single Tax Office and they have not done that and I will contact Attorney Kelly to see if that is their

responsibility and if he feels that is their
responsibility.

I'm also going to hopefully contact the Single Tax Office after next week's election when perhaps things will be settled down a little bit more to determine, you know, what needs to be done as far as that is concerned.

9 And one last thing, if we have any 10 lists of paving requests for the night I 11 would just like to, if you would, put one 12 request on for me, Mrs. Krake, the 9 and ten 13 hundred blocks of Clay Avenue. I was asked 14 if I would mention that.

And again, as was said before, 15 16 hopefully people will -- this is an 17 important election. Even though it is a 18 primary election there are a number of 19 issues that are very significant to the City 20 of Scranton and to Lackawanna County and I 21 would encourage everyone, all registered 22 voters to go out and to make your opinions 23 known through the electoral process so that 24 we can have a reasonable idea of what the 25 people of Lackawanna County and the people

1	of Scranton truly want. And that's all.
2	MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr. McGoff.
3	And, Councilman Rogan, do you have any
4	comments or motions?
5	MR. ROGAN: Yes, very briefly. Just
6	one matter of business first, I see Mr.
7	Loscombe is not here tonight and Item 7-F is
8	under the Public Safety and so I would like
9	to make a motion to appoint Mr. Joyce as the
10	temporary Chair for the Committee on Public
11	Safety.
12	MR. MCGOFF: Second.
13	MS. EVANS: On the question? All
14	those in favor signify by saying aye.
15	MR. MCGOFF: Aye.
16	MR. ROGAN: Aye.
17	MR. JOYCE: Aye.
18	MS. EVANS: Aye. Opposed? The ayes
19	have it and so moved.
20	MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Just one
21	item to speak on tonight and a few requests,
22	and this is an idea that one of the speakers
23	brought up tonight, it was brought to my
24	attention that Jackson Street in West
25	Scranton has been recently paved using the

1 funding that council allocated from the CDBG funding from paving. The road was paved, 2 3 nice and smooth, it looks great. About a 4 week later it was marked up. There was spray paint on the roads, looked like 5 somebody was about to do road work and then 6 7 we see the article in the paper I believe 8 two days ago about the water company 9 replacing hundred year old lines; and 10 certainly we like to see the lines replaced, 11 but I don't know who dropped the ball on the 12 communication between the water company and 13 the city or if this is something that PPL 14 decided to do after the road was paved 15 which. I don't think this is the case. these 16 things seem to be planned out years ahead of 17 time.

You know, with resources so scarce
the way they are today and so many roads in
the city that need to be paved it is
frustrating that we paved the road that is
going to be torn up in a few months.

23 Mrs. Krake, could we please send a 24 letter to few department head actually, to 25 the mayor, Mr. Dougher, asking who is in

charge of checking with utilities to see if 1 2 they are going to do the road before a 3 street is placed on the city paving list and 4 this is something that is upsetting this time, but it can't happen again. 5 With the very small amount of money we have for 6 7 paving we need to make sure we are paving 8 the roads that aren't going to be touched by utilities. 9

10 For instance, on Bromley Avenue, 11 there are three or four blocks on Bromley 12 that new gas lines were installed a few 13 years ago and the road was so torn up 14 afterwards the utility agreed to repave the 15 road, which is great. We don't want to pave 16 that road with city -- actually federal 17 dollars appropriated to the city and then 18 having a utility repave it when we could be 19 paving other roads.

Just a few citizens' requests. I ran into a resident from Cherry Street over the weekend who mentioned to me that there is a lot, it's located either at 533 or 535 Cherry Street that is overgrown with weeds, bushes, things of that nature. We contacted

1 the city to see who's responsible for 2 cleaning it up and he was told that it was 3 actually a county-owned property. 4 So, Mrs. Krake, can we please notify the county commissioners of this issue and 5 hopefully they can address for the residents 6 7 in that area. 8 Finally, two more issues. We received a very long list of potholes to be 9 sent to Mr. Dougher. The majority of these 10 11 are in South Scranton and East Mountain, I 12 won't read them all off, but there are a 13 half a dozen or a dozen here. 14 And also two requests from two 15 separate residents that had issues, they are 16 working on with Licensing and Inspections 17 and they haven't been able to get ahold of 18 somebody by phone. Now, I have been told by 19 from people in the department that there has 20 been a problem with the phones in Licensing and Inspections so could we please send the 21 22 two requests here to Mr. Dougher -- or, I'm 23 sorry, to Mr. Seitzinger and also ask if 24 phones in LIPS are working correctly for 25 outside calls so residents can get in touch

with city inspectors and the directors as
 well.

3 And finally, I would just like to 4 encourage everyone to come out and vote on Tuesday, May 21. The polls are open from 7 5 a.m. to 8 p.m. and please be sure to vote 6 both sides of the ballot. The front side 7 8 will be candidates for county -- actually state, county and city office. The back 9 side will be the referendum questions 10 11 regarding the proposed change in county government. And that's all for tonight. 12 13 Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. And,
Councilman Joyce, do you have any comments
or motions tonight?

17 MR. JOYCE: Yes. Very briefly 18 tonight, last week I mentioned that I was 19 speaking with Mayor Doherty regarding pools 20 and using some of the UDAG repayment money or RE-RE money to open additional pools this 21 22 summer and we received a letter back from 23 Paul Kelly, the city solicitor, and he is 24 stating that we need some more information 25 before he drafts the legislation that I

1 requested. And, one, he asked how much money is required by Parks and Rec to open 2 3 these pools and after speaking to Mayor 4 Doherty about this issue he indicated at \$15,500 would be needed to open each pool 5 for the upcoming summer swimming season in 6 7 order to cover costs for lifeguards, pool 8 chemicals, etcetera.

9 And the second question that 10 Mr. Kelly asked if there were enough RE-RE 11 funds to meet that figure and does OECD need 12 to remove funds from one account to another 13 and just to give everyone an update Ms. 14 Aebli kindly responded to many -- or to 15 basically all of the questions that 16 Mr. Kelly had and she stated there is 17 approximately \$66,000 left in the RE-RE 18 account and they are also -- and OECD is 19 also anticipating payment of \$63,360.89, and 20 that's anticipated money from PA Emergency 21 Management Agency for reimbursement of the Crisp Avenue Bridge project. 22

Also, one has to consider that we are also taking \$20,000 out of the RE-RE account or ECTV and \$10,000 for Elmurst

Boulevard, but when all is said and done there will be enough money in the RE-RE account to open up additional pools this summer.

And Mr. Kelly also asked whether or 5 not this was legal to use OECD funds, being 6 7 the RE-RE funds for the swimming complexes 8 and Ms. Aebli did reply back that the Urban 9 Development Action Grant expired 10 approximately 30 years ago and there are no 11 federal regulations attached to them and, 12 therefore, the funds are eligible to be used 13 for swimming pool purposes and Mayor Doherty 14 is in full agreement that funds should be 15 used to open up two additional swimming 16 pools this summer in addition to the grant 17 money they he anticipates we will receive 18 for Weston Park and Weston Field, so that's 19 just a quick update on that.

Also, in other matters, we received a letter from Rossi & Rossi, our independent auditor, stating that there are a number of issues that need to be settled before the audit can be completed.

25

Mrs. Krake, if we can please contact

1Ryan McGowan and ask him for and updated2status report just so we know where we are3at on all issues.

4 And that's all for tonight. MS. EVANS: 5 Thank you. Good evening. I wish to begin by offering my 6 deepest gratitude to the Scranton Police 7 8 Officers, Firefighters and EMTs who responded to the motor vehicle accident in 9 10 which my husband and daughter were involved 11 last weekend. Their quick response, 12 professionalism and compassion where 13 superlative and my family has nothing but 14 the upmost admiration and appreciation for 15 these very special men and the difficult 16 work they perform.

Special thanks go out to our dear
friends Dave, Fay, Danny and Wayne without
whose constant help we couldn't have managed
through that day.

And now we turn to council business.
I have only a few brief comments to address.
Scranton City Council received a written
response yesterday from Attorney Dan
Penetar, Scranton Zoning Board solicitor,

regarding the properties located in the 400
block of Clay Avenue and reported to city
council by a Hill section homeowner. I'd
like to read Attorney Penetar's response at
this time.

"Per your letter of May 10, 2013, it 6 7 appears from what you have provided to me 8 that 1021 Mulberry, LLC, represent by Joseph Ferdinand, Esquire, has filed and appeal of 9 the zoning officer's decision to issue 10 11 permits regarding the above properties. Ι 12 believe the case will be on the Zoning 13 Board's agenda for June 2013. Therefore, it 14 would be premature for me to comment on a 15 case pending before our board as no evidence 16 has yet to be presented and no decision has 17 yet to be made."

I thank Attorney Penetar, Mrs. Carrie Newcomb and Mr. Steve Bartnicki, zoning board members, for their prompt attention and recommend that all interested neighbors of the 667 Clay Avenue properties and those surrounding it should attend the June 12, 2013, zoning board meeting.

25 Also, requests for qualifications

for the west Lackawanna bridge project were
 opened yesterday and the bidders included
 Riley Associates, CHA or Clow-Harbor
 Association, Shaner Environmental and CECO
 Associates, Incorporated.

Since CECO is under contract with 6 7 the City of Scranton and serves as the city engineer it would appear to have a conflict 8 of interest in bidding on this project. For 9 10 example, CECO, as the city engineer, would 11 have to inspect and sign off on various 12 aspects of this project. If awarded the 13 contract for the bridge repair project, CECO 14 would then, in fact, be inspecting and sign 15 off on its own work, thus eliminating the 16 objectivity required for such inspection and 17 approval.

18 I would prefer to see the 19 administration select one of the remaining 20 three bidders, and with my colleagues' 21 agreement I ask Mrs. Krake to send a letter 22 on behalf of city council to the mayor, 23 business administrator and city solicitor 24 notifying them of our concern and 25 recommendation.

1 Next, the legislation relating to 2 the funding of the West Lackawanna Avenue 3 bridge project that was tabled during the 4 May 2, 2013, council meeting should be amended to add the blighted project tracking 5 system in the amount of \$20,000 and to 6 delete some of the transferred funds of the 7 8 accounts of the West Side Falcons and North 9 Scranton Little League projects. 10 City planner, Don King, stated that 11 the funding for the blighted property

12tracking system couldn't be used since the13system cannot operate within the city's14current financial computer program.15Consequently, these CDBG funds should be16utilized for the bridge project in place of17the grants that were allocated to the West18Side Falcons and North Side Little League.

Finally, as has been discussed by several individuals throughout the meeting, the Office of City Council didn't receive the recommendations of restaurant owners and food truck vendor owners from Ms. Collins in adequate time for council's review and the drafting of the amendment. Consequently,
