The Scranton City Council will

1	conduct a public hearing on Thursday,
2	September 19, 2013, at 5:30 p.m. in order to
3	gather citizens' input regarding the
4	proposed City of Scranton 2014 Action Plan,
5	which includes the CDBG program, Home
6	Investment Partnership Program and the
7	Emergency Solutions Grant or ESG program.
8	The public is invited to attend. And that's
9	it.
10	Mrs. Krake?
11	MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
12	PARTICIPATION.
13	MS. EVANS: Our first speaker
14	tonight is Ron Ellman.
15	MR. ELLMAN: That was in the nick of
16	time, wasn't it? I'm sorry I was late.
17	Well, I don't know with the thousands of
18	adversities going on in this city why
19	council has chosen to get involved in Joe
20	Burke's vendetta with DeNaples. It's just
21	senseless. He spent \$10,000 on a study.
22	Why? What's your definition of a study?
23	MS. EVANS: A study was conducted by
24	an engineering firm after inspection and
25	observation of Lake Scranton Road, and it

contained very useful information such as what is needed on that road that should be provided by the City of Scranton, the reasons for the deterioration of the road. and the fact that there is another access route that can be taken by the trucks that are traveling Lake Scranton Road daily. MR. ELLMAN: Okay. I understand that. This study, let's just take it apart real quick. This study says use an alternate road on Elmhurst Boulevard; right? Pardon? 

MS. EVANS: Could you repeat that?

MR. MCGOFF: Yes. They said use

Elmhurst, I imagine whoever conceived this study was looking at the GPS, there is a bridge with a 12,000 pound weight limit on Elmhurst Boulevard. DeNaples has been prohibited 35 or 40 years from crossing that bridge. This is no one -- evidently nobody ever drove down the street. They cannot use Ash. They cannot go up and down Ash Street because there a bridge is 11 feet high. The trucks are 11 feet 6. The only thing is Lake Scranton Road which has uninterrupted

1	truck traffic for 75 or 80 years. It used
2	to be a rendering plant down there that the
3	buildings are still there. They used to go
4	up to the Moosic Street to New York City to
5	Goldsboro and all before the expressways.
6	And if you go find out there is a law about
7	uninterrupted use of property.
8	This is just such a waste. People
9	need money to pay taxes and it's throwing
10	down the toilet for a study like this. Like
11	I said, all that gentleman that did the
12	study had it do was drive down that road he
13	would have seen the bridge with 12,000
14	pounds. It's been there probably 100 years,
15	80 years. You have no other alternative,
16	but just let this slide. What else are you
17	going to do?
18	MS. EVANS: I don't know.
19	MR. ELMHURST: You cannot land lock
20	that business.
21	MS. EVANS: I believe the city
22	should be
23	MR. ELLMAN: You know, you got the
24	hardship you got the hardship law of
25	people being laid off temporarily for Joe

1	Burke. Here you are taking on people that
2	got plans all over town. The library, the
3	medical school, every place you look he has
4	been a benefactor to this city. I had
5	coffee with him.
6	MS. EVANS: To the nonprofits of the
7	city.
8	MR. ELLMAN: Pardon?
9	MS. EVANS: A benefactor to the
10	nonprofits of the city.
11	MR. ELLMAN: Well, that's my
12	feelings about it. I feel that way about
13	Mr. Bolus. He has done so much for this
14	city. I just find is it heartbreaking the
15	attitude against him, but I had coffee
16	yesterday morning before 6:00 with the
17	DeNaples and I promise you, you do not want
18	to take this city, the city does not want to
19	take them on over this issue. We'll lose.
20	We are already facing 117 percent interest.
21	You never talked to people over on Luzerne
22	Street and Washington and Capouse, they are
23	hanging onto their houses by their
24	fingertips. I talk to them almost every day
25	someplace around here. There is great

1	suffering in this city. Half the people are
2	senior citizens and retired people and low
3	income. We are certainly not in any
4	position to handle a 117 percent increase
5	and now you are talking about a lawsuit. If
6	it just costs a couple of hundred thousand
7	we don't have the money. They could close
8	that yard for a year and not hurt them. It
9	would hurt the little people and I'm not
10	talking as a former associate and a family
11	friend.
12	I'm talking as a taxpayer right now
13	and somebody asked me today my taxes are
14	paid. I told you I wasn't going to pay
15	them, but I paid my taxes. Without threat
16	from Mr. Courtright, I might say. And I'm
17	not mad at council, I'm not mad at anybody,
18	I'm trying to avoid a situation that they
19	can't understand it's going on and on like
20	this. Thank you very much for allowing me
21	to speak, Mrs. Evans.
22	MS. EVANS: Absolutely. And our
23	next speaker is a Les Spindler.
24	MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,

Council. Les Spindler, city resident and

homeowner and taxpayer.

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2 MS. EVANS: Good evening.

MR. SPINDLER: Good to be back. Ι missed most of the summer meetings because of my job with PNC Field for the summer. I was disappointed I couldn't come and speak on the Leahy Hall project. I'm sure people are sick of hearing about it, but I want to put my two cents in. I was never a fan of the University of Scranton, but I think that was the right thing to do passing that legislation. We have to start getting along with the "U". With all due respect, the way this council went about trying to get the nonprofits to contribute more hasn't worked so I think we have to try and get along with them. If this deal wasn't passed whoever our next mayor is going to be wouldn't have a chance to go sit down with them and try to get them to contribute more.

Now, this is like extending an olive branch, now, maybe whoever the mayor is can sit down with them face to face and possibly try to get more money. Without this deal, that never would have happened.

1 And, also, if this deal wasn't 2 passed we would -- the city would have lost 3 in Court anyway as was proven with the 4 zoning board and we can't afford anymore losses in the Courts. I had to write 5 everything down so I didn't forget it, and 6 7 as that building something now, it didn't 8 benefit the city in any way, so I think a 9 new building with jobs and whatever I think in the long run I think it would help the 10 11 city. 12 And as far as being historic, if 13 that was so historic where was the Scranton 14 Historical Society? Going back to the 15 baseball games, at every baseball game there 16 was a community organization of the night, 17 and the one night during the end of the year 18 was the Historical Society and they were asked, "What is the mission of the Scranton 19 20 Historical Society?" And the president said, "To protect 21

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and preserve the history of the Scranton."

Obviously, they didn't think that was part of the history of Scranton because they did nothing to save it.

Oh, another thing, I talked to 1 2 someone over the summer and asked them why 3 they thought it was so historic and they 4 said, "I learned to swim there." I said, "Really? You want to save 5 that building because you learned how to 6 swim there?" 7 8 That's unbelievable. MS. EVANS: Mr. Spindler, actually 9 10 there was an article in the newspaper that 11 was authored by a University of Scranton 12 professor who is researching women's history 13 in the City of Scranton and after the 14 decision was made by city council and all 15 was said and done, her article was published 16 in the newspaper and it indicated that 17 building, indeed, was highly significantly 18 historical in terms of the women's movement 19 at the turn of the century, the suffrages, 20 etcetera. 21 MR. SPINDLER: That's just one 22 person's opinion, but the Historical Society doesn't think it was historical. And as far 23

as being architecturally historical, as

somebody said, nothing more been a brick

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building. Lackawanna College, the old

Scranton Central building, the Albright

Library, the Cultural Center, those are

beautiful buildings. This building was just

a plain brick building.

Mr. McGoff, somebody asked if you called Frank Joyce to see if the way he is going to vote and I don't blame you for doing that because I wouldn't have driven 11 hours if I knew my vote wasn't going to count so for you to get criticized for that I thought that was wrong and I think it was very admirable of you to drive 11 hours and give up your vacation time.

Lastly, a speaker was up here asking Councilman Joyce if he voted for a project because he was offered a job at the University or to get votes from the unions, I thought that speaker was totally out of line and those comments bordered on being slanderous and I don't think you should come to this podium and say things without proof. You know, freedom of speech only goes so far. You can only say certain things. You

can't say stuff that isn't true and open
yourself up to lawsuits. Okay, enough on
that.

About two weeks in the paper there was an article, "The West Scranton Youth Center Seeks Casino Cash." I have been told that Mr. Lewis wants \$179,000 for that building. I have been told by the people in real estate that that building isn't worth nearly that much and I think the city should ask for an independent appraisal of that building and whatever money they get from the casino they could use the rest to pay for the taxes because Mr. Lewis owes \$75,000 approximately back taxes on that building.

And I speak of people who were at the public hearing for that. And the city is going to be on the hook for the utilities for that and I don't think we can afford that. I don't know if that will come up before council or not, but I could speak about that later on, also.

In the Sunday paper this week there was an article about the Republican candidate for mayor saying about how he has

1	got financial troubles, he lost a building
2	to foreclosure, he had a car repossessed, he
3	owed back taxes, he was late on his garbage
4	fees, I don't think we need somebody trying
5	to get the city out of a mess that can't
6	keep his own house clean. I don't think
7	that's right.
8	One last thing on the question, why
9	was the meeting moved to 6:00 now? It used
10	to be the 6:30.
11	MS. EVANS: I had asked that that
12	occur because Mr. Loscombe obtained
13	employment and he often began his work in
14	the evening hours so I wanted to be sure
15	that he would be able to be present for the
16	entire length of council meetings.
17	MR. SPINDLER: Okay, that's a good
18	reason, but I think for the lot of citizens
19	that come here it's a little inconvenient,
20	people that work until five or 5:30 it's a
21	big rush to get here. That's all I have.
22	Thank you.
23	MS. EVANS: Thank you. And is there
24	anyone else who cares to address council?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton, taxes paid, uncompensated by the IRS, by the way. I didn't fit the description. And I'd like to approach you with a little thing here that I printed out. One is a present for Pat, I have a little housewarming present for you. So don't wind it too tight and it will continue to work. Take care of the little boy.

As you can see there, that's a printout of the fine print and I did encircle an area where I'll read out of the book, "What began as an effort by Kentucky to help a single company in Appalachia raise capital by keeping state income taxes withheld from the worker's paycheck has grown to more than 2,700 some companies in 19 states when this book was first published. The big bang car markers and insurers, a host of Canadians, Chinese, Europeans, Japanese companies all get the profit by pocketing the taxes withheld from their American worker's paychecks.

Since "The Fine Print" came out in hardback two more states have joined this

trend, Oregon and Pennsylvania."

Now, in other words, they are going to deduct your PA state income and keep it in their pocket as a sort of subsidy or something like that. No wonder you poor people get asked if you expect manna from heaven by our state officials. It's no wonder. And the name of the book is "The Fine Print", it's the latest out, I don't know if this one is available for loan at the library, I paid \$17 for it at the book store.

There is also another one, it's the oldest one, "Perfectly Legal," if you register your company in the Cay men Islands you can -- if one executive even put the tax savings into his pocket with the whole company. And, by the way, if you are registered in the Cay men Islands be leery of investing there because the small stockholders have to go to the Cay men Islands if they plan to sue, and then there is "Free Lunch" which a lot of freebies handed out to very wealth people at taxpayers' expense, like our stadium over

1 \$40 million handed out and what do 2

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we have to show for? We tore the old one down, we hardly had a crack in it.

And last week I mentioned about the water bill, please keep that in mind. And there is an issue raised about signage, well, it's all over the city. Our signs are terrible. There are some faded on in the 900 block of Crown and I think it's Beech Street, there is a faded stop sign. It's already silver, showing silver, and a lady just went right through it, it didn't hit her or register, and she upset another car and there was a big hoopla about it in an accident. So our signs are terrible. You can't -- some streets you can't tell what street you are on or you have to stop and really practically take a look or it's not safe or you are going to cause accidents and stuff.

And I really appreciated your little story, Mrs. Evans, about economic activity and the colleges and how austere a college -- a middle class college person's life has They don't have money to go to the to be.

steakhouse. They don't have money to go to
the lobster house. They don't have money
for very much of anything, and it's entirely
ridiculous the way this is portrayed, like,

6 activity.

And, by the way, I was downtown I think Tuesday and somebody was touring the town with a bunch of the backpacks and they were I don't know if they were from the college or where I thought they might be, but they just walked out in front of the cars and did what they wanted and against traffic signals and everything else liked they owned the place. So if that's the kind of the economic activity we are encouraging I don't know need to pay more car insurance and I certainly don't want to hit somebody crossing against the signals.

we are going to have so much economic

So one final thing with Mulberry

Street, when they narrowed that if there is anything we could do to get rid of that parking up there. Anything whatsoever.

It's entirely ridiculous. It's like you are driving drunk down the road. Maybe if you

had a half bottle of whiskey you could make all of the swerves, and keep in mind that there is going to be college students and everybody parking or crossing in front of there and we are going to have bad weather where the street is covered with ice or snow and it's just a recipe for disaster, so those parking spaces shouldn't be there. Absolutely not.

Well, thank you for listening and don't forget, if you don't try to acquire these books and read them you are somebody else's fool and you will get the golden parrot. Bawk, bawk and have a good night.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Mrs. Krake, if we could be maybe send a memo to DPW concerning that stop sign on Crown Avenue. Hopefully, you know, I recognize that we were discussing this prior to the meeting that budget appears to have been frozen, but I think in some instances the mayor is going to be able to speak with the controller for necessary items that would involve public safety, I'm not sure.

Is there anyone else who cares to

1	address council?
2	MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.
3	Doug Miller, Scranton. First off this
4	evening just on the agenda momentarily, 5-D,
5	repealing Resolution No. 50, 2012,
6	appointing John Moore to the Architectural
7	Review Board for another five-year term, it
8	came to my attention earlier that I believe
9	this individual was originally appointed 16
10	years ago in 1997. Would I be correct in
11	that?
12	MS. EVANS: Yes.
13	MR. MILLER: I mean, from what I
14	understand in relation to the city code
15	individuals who are appointed to such boards
16	I believe, and correct me if I'm wrong, are
17	only allowed two consecutive five-year
18	terms; is that correct?
19	MS. EVANS: Well, actually, I'm
20	going to address this under motions, and I'm
21	going to ask our solicitor to do so as well.
22	He has done a great deal of research on this
23	matter and the ordinance that will be
24	referencing is specific to the HARB.
25	MR. MILLER: Okay. I look forward

to hearing that later on. I'll move onto some other business. Tuesday, I had the opportunity to meet with the West Scranton Hyde Park Neighborhood Watch. Tuesday evening they had a walkthrough of the LA Lewis building that was addressed earlier this evening, and I do appreciate the opportunity to have been able to walk through that building. It's a nice building inside if anybody hasn't had a chance to get in there. They did have another walkthrough this evening, but it certainly is a structure that can be utilized for the intended purpose by the group.

Looking over the plans, they do intend on doing a lot of good things over there. It's an investment that I think is sorely needed in that neighborhood. You know, they look to provide educational resources, whether it's tutoring or learning-type center, they look to enter a partnership in the Scranton School District to allow that to take place. They also talk about putting in basketball courts, boxing rings, bringing in professional box coaches

and Olympic boxing trainers, so I do think 1 it's a good project for that part of town. 2 3 I commend them for all of their work, and 4 they do state in their letter here they have a lot of support from local leaders in the 5 community, State Senator Blake, 6 7 Representative Flynn, our county 8 commissioners, Mayor Doherty, Scranton City 9 Council and the school district, and many 10 other political organizations, local 11 churches and civic organizations so I'm 12 grateful for the opportunity to go through 13 there and I commend them for their ongoing 14 work in that part of town. They have done a 15 lot of good things through the year and this 16 is certainly another prime example of what 17 they are trying to do over there and I do 18 look forward to the project coming to 19 fruition and seeing those things take place 20 in the future. 21 Finally this evening, I noticed in 22 the paper I believe it was yesterday that a 23 motion for reconsideration was filed in

Court in regard to the University project

with Leahy Hall and the demolition and the

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reconsideration was asking the Court to reconsider allowing for the University to provide a traffic study that was never provided to the zoning board or council or to HARB and, you know, looking back at this today I do think that that would have been an important aspect to this project. That was never done.

You know, as you drive through downtown daily going on Jefferson Avenue and Linden Street as it stands now there is a lot of pedestrian traffic and when you are looking to add to the structures and develop it you are only going to make it more chaotic and you are only going to add more pedestrian traffic, that's just common sense, you really don't have to do a lot of homework on that, and that should be a cause for concern.

And I do believe that the Court should allow this motion for reconsideration to be approved and I do think the University should provide a traffic study. There are some serious concerns. Not to disrespect the students in the school, but many of whom

have a lack of regard for, you know, cars 2 transporting back and forth. I think a lot 3 of them don't pay attention, they cut in 4 front of you. They have no regard for any cars going through intersections and I think 5 that needs to be addressed, especially when we are looking to add and expand the 7 University and add and expand.

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I think a suggestion to them would be to look into constructing skywalks on Mulberry Street, Jefferson Avenue, Linden Street, all of the main arteries where there is heavy pedestrian traffic with the students. When you take a look, the hospital has one. I know of other colleges and institutions that have one. Bloomsburg has one, Penn State has it. You know, with the millions and millions that the University brings in I don't think it would certainly go over their budget to construct some skywalks. I think they should seriously take a look at that with this project.

But I do hope that the motion for reconsideration is granted. And it's my

1 understanding if it's not, there will be an injunction filed preventing the demolition 2 3 of that building on Monday because the study 4 should be done. It's a serious concern of safety and regard. 5 Thank you. MS. EVANS: 6 Thank you. 7 MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus, Scranton. 8 I just want to speak because of what Les 9 Spindler said. He would be referring to was 10 Ms. Schumacher said about Frank Joyce. 11 Marie Schumacher and myself, these are our opinions, and we have every right to say it, 12 13 you are public officials. And Mr. McGoff 14 said last week there is no place for someone 15 at the podium to say things about people on 16 council. Yes, it is. You are public 17 officials and we have every right to express 18 our opinions. Just because Les Spindler we 19 don't have proof, he doesn't know that. 20 has no idea what kind of proof we have. 21 Just because you, Mr. Joyce, sit there and 22 say it isn't true doesn't mean it's not 23 true. So it's a question of what you people

want to believe. Absolutely. That's their

choice, but we have every right to say how

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we feel. Every right, and we will continue to do so.

3 You can sit here and say all you 4 want contradictory to what we say, it doesn't mean it's true. What's that 5 expression, thus does protest too much. 6 7 That's all. I just want this council to 8 know that we, as citizens, have every right 9 to come here and voice our opinions whether 10 you like it or whether you don't. We have 11 that right. It's called freedom of speech 12 and just because a councilman says we have 13 no right, yes, we do. And I hope Mr. McGoff 14 doesn't become president of the next council 15 because he will try to stop people from 16 talking and most people will probably listen 17 to him but they think what he's saying is 18 true, but it's not. They have a right to 19 say how they feel. You are public officials. 20

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And you don't know what kind of proof w we have. We don't say things lightly. We didn't say things we don't feel are true. We just don't make stuff up. We really strongly believe what we say and

1 Marie Schumacher deserves that respect. 2 MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else who 3 cares to address council? 4 MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I 5 wasn't really going to speak, but you don't 6 7 have the right to criticize decisions of the 8 board. Their decisions. Not their family, 9 not anything else. And if anyone believes 10 that somebody did something dishonest, he can file charges and bring it up before the 11 12 board if they believe they did something 13 that bad. Then the Court's will decide 14 whether this or that. But. like I said 15 before, you have no right to criticize 16 anybody's family or anything like that, only 17 their decisions. Even their personal action 18 I wouldn't care of any of you got divorced or got married or had a girl on the side, 19 20 that doesn't effect me. What effects me is 21 your decisions up at that board. What you 22 do effects me, and it effects every citizen 23 in Scranton. 24 So if you don't like the decisions 25 of the council then come before the council

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and voice your dissatisfaction with their vote, but don't impune anything on their honesty or this or that or whatever, that's not your prerogative to do it. If you believe they did something wrong, then file charges, that's all, and let the Courts decide or a hearing board or so and so decide.

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I'm getting tired of people getting up here and complaining that this person is dishonest or that person is dishonest. Nobody is dishonest unless it's proven that they are dishonest. Innuendo does not count and that's small of people to have that. Like I said before, only your decisions that effect you is important. Whatever you do up there like you are going to raise the taxes that effects me, so I got a right to come up there and criticize about the taxes. my right. Whether you cannot say though that you are raising your taxes because you are getting a cut in your taxes or you want to get a get raise because of this, that's not there to do. You have no right to do that. I know people get up and say a lot of

1	things they shouldn't be saying. I
2	understand that, but you should only say
3	things, like I said before, that effect you
4	personally or your neighbor or whatever
5	effects you, and don't criticize anybody for
6	their actions unless you can prove that they
7	did something dishonest or were biased or
8	anything like that. You have to be able to
9	prove it and if you are not willing to prove
10	it, keep your mouth shout. Thank you.
11	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Is there
12	anyone else?
13	MR. SLEDZENSKI: Janet, forgot about
14	me, didn't you?
15	MS. EVANS: Hi.
16	MR. SLEDZENSKI: Hi, Frankie.
17	MR. JOYCE: Hey, Chrissy.
18	MR. SLEDZENSKI: No none was here
19	last week. Nobody called me. Well, Frank,
20	our kids did good last week. I'll tell
21	right now, I hope they win tomorrow night.
22	Abington, good luck tomorrow, too. Thank
23	you.
24	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. KRAKE: 5-A. Motions.

1 MS. EVANS: Councilman McGoff, do 2 you have any comments or motions tonight? 3 MR. MCGOFF: Yes, very quickly. 4 First of all, we received a letter from someone involved with the petition we had 5 from the 900 block of permit parking and 6 that it did was gave us some clarification 7 8 to the request that it's -- they were not 9 looking for -- they are not looking for permit parking for the entire block that 10 11 would hinder some of the commercial 12 establishments there, but it just gave some 13 clarification, which I thought it was very 14 nice, and it does present a reasonable 15 argument for permit parking and I hope that, 16 you know, it's seriously looked into. 17 Next, the PEL meeting on Monday, 18 very short, but somewhat informative and I

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very short, but somewhat informative and I provided Mr. Joyce with some of the information that was provided at the PEL meeting, but suffice to say that through those meetings there is some optimism for stability I guess moving forward through the end of the year, and I'm sure Mr. Joyce will have more to say on it, but just that the

meetings do continue and that some veryuseful information was being provided.

And the last thing, I had a citizen request just that I have it written, as far as the streetlight on Ferdinand Street was concerned, I just want to let the person that sent the question request to me that I did pass it on and asked Mrs. Krake if she would please contact Joyce Electric on their behalf. And that's all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. And,
Councilman Rogan, do you have any comments
or motions?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you very much. A couple of items tonight, I guess I'll start off with some of the comments that were made from the podium regarding Mr. Joyce. And, Frank, I apologize for bringing this up again, I just want to say everyone has the right to come and criticize our votes, criticize where somebody stands on an issue, support where they stands on an issue, and I think the comments made last week were out of line. I don't believe somebody could come up here and accuse a

council person of voting a certain way to take a job or get votes unless they could prove it. And if that's the case, they should bring that forward, but I have known Mr. Joyce for quite a few years, we don't always agree on everything, but I do know that he is an honorable person and I take

him at his word.

A couple of more items, one we did receive yesterday in the mail, the public notice regarding the Action Plan for January 2014 through the December 2014, and I'd like to thank Mrs. Evans for scheduling a caucus as well so we can hear from the public.

Just looking through there are, as always, many more applicants then there are funds available, so following hearing from the public, council members, you know, we can all discuss as we have in the past to put together a plan that tries to represent the city and help as many people as we can.

As I have stated many times, I think many of agree two of the top priorities on this list or paving and police officers because some of the cuts that were made in

1 the policy ago that ago that 3 fund CC 4 Luckily 5 have out 6 areas with 7 definit 8 support 9 colleage 10 forward

the police department going back a few years ago that the mayor made we were unable to fund COM-D officers for our neighborhoods.

Luckily now we can once again fund them and have our patrols and have them monitoring areas where they are needed most, so that's definitely something that I am going to support and hopefully the public and my colleagues do as well, but certainly look forward to working on that.

I spoke to a resident over the week, during the course of the week, regarding the condition of the firehouse on East Mountain. The resident reported many problems regarding the roof of the house, so before speaking about it I reached out to some members of the fire department and Mr. Judge, the president of the fire union, and he confirmed that, in fact, the roof at the firehouse is leaking, and that the leak has gotten so bad I believe part of the carpeting had to be taken out.

I know that Mrs. Novembrino has stated we are trying to not spend as much money the rest of the year and when it comes

to cutting costs I'm all for that, but in an instant like this where if this leak continues it's only going to cost more to fix it down the line, and we certainly need to make sure that firehouse is in good shape for our firemen.

Additionally, while speaking to firefighters and Mr. Judge, they are gravely concerned about the condition of the apparatus that they are using. Some of them are older than me, 1985 some of the trucks that our men are using were first made. I did reach out to Mr. Loscombe, I understand he isn't feeling well, so I will discuss these issues with him as well.

But, Mrs. Krake, could we please send a letter to the mayor and the fire chief asking that the issue of the East Mountain Firehouse regarding the roof is addressed as quickly as possible. Also, regarding the condition of the inside and any water damage from the rain and with the storms we have had the last two days, I can't emergency that that leaky roof faired too well because those were two big storms.

So these are things that, you know, a stitch in time saves nine type of thing where if we are spending a little bit of money now to fix these items, maintenance on our police vehicles, maintenance on our fire trucks, fixing the leaky roof before it ruins the carpets, these are the things that anyone would do even in lean times to save money in the long run. So whatever needs to be done to fund these item we need to do it. We certainly can't have these problems with one of the most important departments in the city.

Two other items, I did read the report regarding Lake Scranton Road, and I did take the time to go up and I did see what Mr. Ellman mentioned, I forget the name of the street with the weight restrictions, I certainly see that, and also by reading the report it seems that water damage is probably the number one reason why the road is deteriorating.

I think the solution is to fix the road instead of pursuing truck bans and all of those other items the read needs to be

fixed. This scenario does seem a little bit different in other areas, especially in West Side, where there are many routes around it does seem that there really is only the one route, and by reading through the study it did cite drainage issues and the condition, the age of the road, for being two of the top reasons why the road is in the shape it is.

Finally, over the August recess I had the chance to attend an event up in Susquehanna County actually, it was a compressed natural gas station where they have vehicles running off natural gas, and from speaking to representatives from the gas industry there is a push and there are grants available for municipalities to convert their vehicles from running on diesel fuel to natural gas.

I know from reading this is very popular out in California, a lot of buses have been converted. It's cleaner for the environment, it's locally produced, it's not foreign, and it's very cost effective. The cost of a gallon of equivalent of compressed

1 natural gas is around \$2 a gallon compared to the cost of diesel which is running close 2 3 to \$4 a gallon, so this is something that I 4 think the city needs to look into doing in the future, especially when grants could be 5 obtained to convert the vehicles to run on 6 7 natural gas, and I know there are a great 8 strides being made having the infrastructure 9 brought into our area. 10 Like I said, just two counties up 11 they are already mini-marts that have 12 compressed natural gas stations open for the 13 public and I would like to see the day when 14 instead of our DPW fueling up a the city 15 diesel pump, they will be fueling up at the 16 city natural gas pump if we could do it, 17 especially through grants and cost savings. 18 I do have a couple of comments on 19 agenda items, but I will wait until they 20 come up, so this is all for now. Thank you. 21 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman 22 Joyce, do you have any comments or motions? 23 MR. JOYCE: Yes, very briefly, I'm 24 not going to be too long. Mr. McGoff did

give me some information that he obtained

from the PEL meeting, just to give everyone an update where we are at. Cash balance in the city general fund is \$6.8 million. We have \$300,000 in accounts payable and we did receive \$300,000 from Geisinger for fees and

permits related to their development.

Over the past week, I had the opportunity to speak with Ms. McAndrew, our business administrator, I met with her later on Monday afternoon. Our city clerk, Mrs. Krake, also attended and she took some very copious notes. In the position -- from the position that we are in right now as far as payroll is concerned, as far as paying the critical expenses that are important to our employees such as paying for their health care costs and keeping the city afloat, she believes that we are in a fine position to make it through the end the year, that we are not going to have any problems.

As typical to other years, the city is holding up some bills, and this was a practice that was done in the past, I know each year we bring in prior year expenses that's in just about every budget that I

have seen, some years it's more, some years

it's less and I also mentioned to her and

now what the administration was planning on

sending down as far as the budget was

concerned.

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Obviously, we know have a real problem. PEL is taking about 117 percent tax increase which will cripple the residents in the city in my opinion. Basically at this point the administration was just getting under development as far as the budget is concerned. There is some ideas that were discussed such as the possible scoop out refinancing of the debt, the commuter tax, trying to lessening costs with our workers' compensation insurance and also the possibility of a health care consortium, which I know was brought up in the past and didn't quite go through because of the county not wanting to be involved.

But at this point, you know, I'm not quite satisfied because I don't know a figure or a percentage of or even a goal that the administration has at this point, so I did take a liberty to call the mayor's

office and request a meeting with him and
I'm going to meet with him in the next week
at 4:30 on Wednesday and discuss my ideas on
how to get the tax increase lowered and
hopefully get some of these things in the

action because we don't have lot of time at

this point.

The deadline to submit the budget obviously is November 15, that's the administration's deadline, and I think the sooner that we act -- or the sooner that action is taken the better off we will be and hopefully we will all be able to get lessened quite a bit, and that's all.

MS. EVANS: Thank you. Good evening. I wish to begin with a brief update regarding the Scranton Parking Authority's appearance at a county tax assessment hearing yesterday. Mr. Michael Washo, who represented the SPA, contested the appraised dollar amount per square footage of the commercial properties the SPA leases to businesses based on the dollar amount per square footage paid by three neighboring properties.

In addition, Mr. Washo referred to the approximate annual \$3.5 million bond payment and operation costs related to the parking garages. We must remember, however, that the City of Scranton funds the difference between the actual bond payment due and the payment made by Mr. Washo in his capacity as a receiver. Thus, the city would receive less tax revenue from the commercial garage spaces, while it continues to make SPA bond payments. The hearing decision is due within the next few weeks. In a related matter, tax assessment hearings will be conducted on October 17,

In a related matter, tax assessment hearings will be conducted on October 17, 2013, for 27 Scranton businesses and on October 24 for LIPI, an arm of the Greater Scranton of Chamber of Commerce and for Pennsylvania American Water Company.

Mrs. Krake, please send a letter to the mayor and city solicitor urging the mayor to direct Attorney Kelly to attend these hearings and contest lower tax appraisals in light of our distressed city's financial status.

In addition, some of these entities

who sought loans, KOZs, and financial agreements from the City of Scranton, now look to pay decreased taxes and are looking toward the tax assessment hearing to provide that for them. Scranton homeowners cannot afford to pay increasing tax burdens for city businesses as well as the local tax exempt nonprofits.

Next, during city council's August recess, some city residents brought to my attention an error made by the administration and city council.

Apparently, the law department drafted legislation which council adopted in violation of a city ordinance regarding the Commission for Architectural and Urban Design and reappointment of board members.

In response to residents' requests,
I asked Council Solicitor Hughes to research
the ordinance and advise council as to how
it should proceed to make corrections, if
necessary. And I now defer to Solicitor
Hughes for his comments and we also have a
written memo that was supplied by Solicitor
Hughes to council members which I'll now

1	distribute.
2	Attorney Hughes?
3	MR. HUGHES: Yes, thank you, madam
4	president. Before I get to that, it's
5	interesting on what Councilman Rogan stated,
6	you know, with the natural gas. Just so
7	everybody is aware and they could go look at
8	it, Pennsylvania American Water Company is
9	building a compressed natural gas filling
10	station for all of their vehicles over on
11	Stafford Avenue. It's under construction
12	now and they are going to convert all of
13	their vehicles to natural gas. From what I
14	understand, it's not going to be open to the
15	public.
16	I also think that Verrastro
17	Beverage, they have application in to

I also think that Verrastro
Beverage, they have application in to
convert their trucks and they are building a
refueling station down where they are in Old
Forge and I think that that's going to be
open to the public to by natural gas and
natural gas cars.

So there are two exciting developments that are going forward and you can save substantial amounts of the money,

you know, converting to natural gas and also I understand there is a lot less maintenance. As long as it's compressed natural gas. I have clients in the Interstate trucking industry and there is a real problem converting those right now because they don't have the type of engines, but that's another issue for another time.

But regarding this with HARB and with Mr. Moore's comments, I did at the request of the president research this issue. I wrote a memo I believe that everyone has right now, and to be very succinct on this, and it's a very simple issue. There is really two issues involved in this because when Mr. Moore and other people who were appointed their terms were to start in October of the years, October 14, that is incorrect.

There is a case, Volpe v.

Strickland, it goes back to 1975, I cited it in my memo, that the real appointments on the HARB Commission all commence on April 1 and terminate on April 1. How this got extended to Mr. Moore being reappointed when

1	he was reappointed to his third consecutive
2	office I believe it starts on October 11
3	October 11 was the original one 2007 to
4	October 11, 2012, that was an error. It
5	should have been from April 1, 2007, to
6	April 1, 2012, and then reappointed to his
7	fourth term that again stated that it would
8	run from October 11, 2012, to October 11,
9	2017, that is incorrect.
10	No matter when you're reappointed o

No matter when you're reappointed or the term starts from where it is established in the ordinance and not to when the successor is appointed, so that's the first incorrect issue.

It's not in the city code, as the president stated, as to the applicability of the HARB, as to the appointments it is right in the ordinance itself, which is File of Council No. 45 of 1996, which amended File of Council No. 38 of 1976. I did not go through to see what the amendments were. To me, it almost looks like File of Council No. 45, 1996, really replaced the Ordinance 38 of 1976.

What it states for the members under

Article IV, which is on page 9 of the ordinance, for membership there would be 2 3 nine members appointed to the HARB board, 4 and it sets forth what the requirements are 5 for each of them. A registered architect, a registered engineer, a licensed contractor, 6 7 a licensed real estate broker, a member from 8 the Architectural Heritage Association, one 9 property owner, who lives within the 10 historical district, one member whose 11 professional training is an urban planner, 12 architectural historian, etcetera, one property owner at large, and one other 13 14 person who by training, experience or is 15 interest is qualified to carry out the 16 duties as a member of the commission. 17 that's the requirements for the nine members 18 of the commission. 19 They are appointed for the five-year 20 term by the mayor with the advice and 21 consent of council, and it was to be

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23 would be appointed for two-year -- for two 24 terms and then one was to be appointed for 25 just one term in staggered terms.

staggered terms for nine members so that two

1 So that the original appointments 2 were made by Mayor Connors. There were two 3 four-year appointments, two five-year 4 appointments, one third year appointment and then the other appointments were after that 5 for two -- two for three years, two for two 6 7 years and one for one year. So that's the 8 way that the commission was set up. 9 The first appointments and all the 10 appointments should start on April 1 for a 11 five-year term. Somehow it got out of sync

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when Mr. Moore was reappointed for his third consecutive term.

What it sates is that members shall not serve -- this is under Article IV (b), appointment and terms of membership, on page 11 of the ordinance, "Members shall not serve more than two consecutive five-year No member shall be reappointed until five years after the completion of their previous two-year consecutive terms of service to the commission."

As is set forth in my memo, Mr. Moore has been appointed to his fourth consecutive term. He sat on the commission

for a period of 13 years. It's in violation 1 of the ordinance. He never should have been 2 3 reappointed previously to his third 4 consecutive term, which I believe started in 2007, I believe -- or 2006 to 2011. 5 was improper. He should have stayed off for 6 five years and then he could have been 7 8 reappointed.

> He is serving improperly on the He not qualified to serve on the commission. As such, it's my opinion that any vote that he casts from now on should not count. He shouldn't attend meetings. He should resign. However, in anticipation of that, what I did and I looked at it and decided that his appointment pursuant to the previous resolution, that resolution should be rescinded, which would rescind his appointment to take that out so that he could not be able to serve, you know, on the HARB board -- or on the commission. Right now, I think that any time that he would vote it could be challenged and that he is sitting there improperly.

> > I think council could take two

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1	actions. One, write to him and ask him to
2	resign, and if he didn't then remove him,
3	but tonight we have on their a resolution
4	which would rescind his appointment.
5	If you want me to comment on Ms.
6	Rayburn, also that's in my memo, she has
7	been she was appointed to fill a vacancy,
8	and again, her terms were commencing in
9	November, that's improper. It should have
10	been in April. She was appointed to fill a
11	vacancy for two years and then reappointed
12	for a five-year term and recently
13	reappointed for another five-year term. In
14	my opinion, since she served in an interim
15	to complete the previous vacancy that does
16	not count from the standpoint of what the
17	ordinance requires. It would be two
18	successive five-year terms. So that it's my
19	opinion that Mr. Moore is serving improperly
20	on the board, he never should have been
21	appointed. Mrs. Rayburn can continue in her
22	position on the HARB Commission.
23	MS. EVANS: Well, thank you.
24	MR. HUGHES: Any other questions,

I'll try to answer them.

1	MS. EVANS: Anyone?
2	MR. ROGAN: I have one question, if
3	this was approved would this negate any
4	votes casts previously by Mr. Moore?
5	MR. HUGHES: No, I don't believe so.
6	I think he has been serving there under
7	color of office. Even though the
8	appointment was improper, because, of course
9	you know, the mayor made the appointment an
10	on the advice and consent of council,
11	council approved it so I think that he does
12	have at least color of title in his
13	position.
14	You know, it almost, you know, you
15	couldn't go back and say that all of the
16	votes that he had were improper, I'm saying
17	from this day on that if he if there is a
18	meeting and let's say next week before
19	council would vote, assuming that it's going
20	to be the resolution will be introduced
21	tonight and it wouldn't be passed until next
22	week and there is a HARB meeting in the
23	meantime and if he voted and his vote was a
24	deciding vote, I think that that vote, in

fact, I know that that vote could legally be

challenged because it's improper because
right now council has taken the position to
remove him or at least in the ordinance if
the resolution, you know, would be
introduced.

But to make it retroactive, no, I don't believe that can be done especially since I think his vote was a deciding vote on the YWCA and they have already started demolition. I know they have taken the columns down and everything else up there now. So, no, it would be my opinion that cannot be retroactive.

MS. EVANS: Well, thank you,
Attorney Hughes, and it certainly seems that
the city administration proposed a HARB
member for reappointment and city council
approved the reappointment without knowledge
of the provisions of the 1996 ordinance.

Since the HARB has stated that it intends to develop bylaws and as such any change to File of Council No. 45 of 1996 requires council approval, council should act now to remedy the legislation that was drafted and approved contrary to the law by

1 repealing of Resolution 30 of 2012.

In addition, I would ask Attorney

Hughes to draft a letter to the mayor asking

him to request the resignation of Mr. Moore

and to appoint a qualified member to replace

him.

Further, I have asked Mrs. Krake and our staff to research reappointments to all boards and commissions, including the reappointment to the Scranton Housing Authority that is included in Fifth Order for introduction on tonight's agenda. I have been advised that this resolution is correct.

MR. HUGHES: Madam President, I
would state when it comes to authorities
that's all by state statute, such as the
Redevelopment Authority, the Parking
Authority, and the Housing Authority, any
authority that's granted according to the
Municipalities Authority Act. To my
knowledge, there is no requirement in there
that they only serve for so many terms. I
think this is a unique situation, you know,
with the HARB board, but I believe that, you

1	know, to have it researched to see about the
2	other boards and commissions if there is
3	anything like that, and certainly if there
4	isn't and it's council's decision that maybe
5	some of those ordinances should be amended
6	to provide that so that you don't have
7	somebody appointed for a period of, you
8	know, decades.
9	MS. EVANS: Yes. Thank you. Next,
10	since Northeast Revenue Service is handling
11	the tax and garbage delinquencies for the
12	city, perhaps it might be able to look into
13	wage tax delinquencies as well.
14	Therefore, Mrs. Krake, please send a
15	letter to Mayor Doherty requesting that he
16	contact Berkheimer, the earned income tax
17	collector, and NRS regarding the feasibility
18	of having NRS collect wage tax
19	delinquencies.
20	And just two final thought
21	MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Evans?
22	MS. EVANS: Yes.
23	MR MCGOFF: Could I just
24	something that came up the other day, would
25	they also be capable of collecting the

1	delinquent rental registration?
2	MS. EVANS: I don't see why not.
3	MR. MCGOFF: I don't know if we are
4	adding so much to one they have done such
5	a great job of collecting delinquencies,
6	whether we are extending this too far, but I
7	think that that's something that we could
8	all look into for 2014.
9	MS. EVANS: We can certainly ask and
10	if you could include that in the letter as
11	well, please, Mrs. Krake.
12	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.
13	MS. EVANS: You're welcome. I know
14	there has been much discussion about the
15	natural gas industry and its cost savings
16	well, the cost saving effectiveness, and
17	certainly that cannot be disputed, but I
18	think we also have to think about human
19	health and what is happening within the
20	State of Pennsylvania as the natural gas
21	drilling is occurring and there are many,
22	many serious issues in Susquehanna County
23	alone, and I believe our priority should be
24	to protect our air, our water and our soil
25	so that we as human beings and future

1 generations are protected.

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And I think, you know, sometimes you have to ask yourself is it more important to save the money or is more important to save your health and your health is something you can't buy.

Secondly, I just wanted to comment again briefly on the issue of the speakers that has been raised by council members. We have council members have here since 2010 who were not privy to what occurred prior to However, many of you in that time. attendance tonight and many of you at home I'm sure remember what transpired in council chambers prior to 2010. Cameras were removed for a period of time. Speakers were searched before they could enter the building. There was great animosity between speakers and council members. provocation on both sides and very, very ugly comments made by both, by council speakers about council members, candidates for office, and by council members about those of you who came to the podium.

As a result, for many, many, many

years, it even precedes my seating in 2004
on this council, these council chambers were
a circus, and I'm sure you remember that.

And what changed was a reciprocity of
respect and concern between city council and

the people.

Now, that includes the right of free speech, and there were times, I remember this very well, too, prior to 2010, that representatives of the ACLU sat in that audience checking for violations of such when council members would stop a speakers right to express himself or herself, and the fact of the matter is inappropriate foul, by that I mean foul, obscene language cannot be used. It's not permitted on the airways, so again, that is to the permitted. Any threat of violence toward anyone in the audience or any council member, that is not permitted, and the ACLU recognizes those instances.

But it's also important to recognize the rights of the people who take the time to come here and speak and that's what's been going on since 2010 and result the atmosphere, the climate of these noble

1 chambers changed dramatically.

And I remember, you know, I listen to everything everyone says and I remember the times when, you know, some of the same people came here and, you know, have a little of disparaging, voiced a litany of disparaging remarks against Mayor Doherty. Others, disparaged, for example, political candidates such as Mr. DiBileo, who was council president at the time, when he was seeking the office of the mayor.

So I think what's important here is to remember to respect one another and not to violated civil liberties, and I fear, you know, at any point in the future when that starts to occur, when limitations begin to be placed once again there could be a deterioration back into the atmosphere that we worked so very hard to eliminate in these chambers, and that's it.

MR. MCGOFF: I would like to respond to that because I -- people have a right to express their opinion. People do not have a right to make acquisitions of wrongdoing, and that's what took place and that is out

of order by our own rules of council and by any legal precedent that you can find.

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Personal attacks and personal accusations are not permissible, they are not legal and that's what I was responded to and I believe that that's what was done last week, also.

MS. EVANS: Well, we didn't have those responses years ago, did we? so, I think you might be overstepping by saying that's illegal. I don't know that that would stand up against the First Amendment so certainly, you know, you enter other realms of maybe possible lawsuits against individuals, but by and large, as I said, there has been a significant change in the demeanor of these chambers and the behavior of both speakers and the council members for the better and I just hope you are not going to return to the days of pre-2010 when you are going to be gaveled out of order and told "You can't say that, you shouldn't say this," and then ultimately you are removed. And more so, I hope you are not going to see a return to the days

1	when a police officer stood in the back to
2	enforce your removal because that police
3	officer is needed on the city streets not in
4	this not in this chamber.
5	So, as I said, I hope the decorum
6	stays as it is and that there is not that
7	return to the terrible mistakes of the past.
8	And that's it.
