5	MR. LOSCOMBE: Just briefly, I would
6	like to follow-up on something I had asked

9	wishes she has received so far from so many
10	kind and thoughtful people. She will
11	remember you all, and she is doing very
12	well, maybe another week she will be dancing
13	hopefully.

18	and I thank you all.
19	MR. JOYCE: Thank you. I would just
20	like to reiterate, as Mr. Rogan stated
21	before, Councilman McGoff will not be in
22	attendance at tonight's meeting as he is
23	having a medical procedure. I hope that he
24	does well and I hope that he has a speedy
25	recovery. And in addition, Councilwoman

1	Evans is ill and will not be at tonight's
2	meeting as well, so I hope that she is doing
3	better soon as well. And Attorney Hughes
4	will also not be in attendance at tonight's
5	council meeting as he is ill as well, so I
6	hope they all get better soon.
7	MS. KRAKE: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
8	PARTICIPATION.
9	MR. JOYCE: Our first speaker
10	tonight is Fay Franus.
11	MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus, Scranton.
12	MR. JOYCE: Good evening.
13	MS. FRANUS: I wanted to throw some
14	questions out, not necessarily for you to
15	answer just to pose them out.
16	MR. JOYCE: Okay.
17	MS. FRANUS: Just so people are
18	aware of things and try to think about these
19	things. Since this budget, the mayor
20	proposed the budget he quite graciously
21	invited the mayor-elect Bill Courtright to
22	open door to come in and help him with the
23	budget to look at it and go over it for any
24	of his input. I can't understand how come
25	no one has heard from Mr. Courtright. Like,

why wouldn't he jump on this opportunity to
have input in this budget? Does anybody
even know what he thinks about this budget?
Has anybody asked him? Has he contacted
council? Has he contacted the mayor?

I mean, here is the newspaper right here, I look every day and see no stories.

Mr. Lockwood, I can't understand how come there is no stories on mayor-elect

Courtright as to his ideas on this budget.

Why he doesn't contribute to it, why he doesn't convey his thoughts, what he thinks about it. He is the man that has live with this budget. He is the one that has to work on this. He also has said many times publically that he has a great relationship with council members now and council members to come in January, and he has a great relationship with the unions and he has a great relationship with the banks. Why are we not hearing his ideas on this budget? Why hasn't he even uttered a word about this? This should be an editorial if nothing else.

I think it's food for thought for

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the people who think about. He should not 1 2 be not saying anything. He should have a 3 direct input, especially since Mayor Doherty 4 invited him to look at it, and I hope. still has a couple of weeks, maybe he will. 5 It will be very good if he does, let's wait 6

and see.

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Now, I want to talk about this garbage fee for a second. I don't know if people understand this or how this thing got created, but this -- the garbage, when you put your garbage out that was part your What are we paying taxes for? For police protection, fire protection and for our garbage pickup. That's the way it is. And when Jimmy Connors was the mayor, he had had an arbitration with the firemen or something and it got messed up, it didn't work out so they had this huge bill with to pay and they didn't know how to pay it, so they created a garbage fee. To me, that's double taxation. You are paying for your garbage through your taxes.

Now, you are going to increase it to \$300, senior citizens cannot afford it.

Even -- nobody could afford it. And I don't
think you should go to per bag because

people will be dumping their garbage in
other people houses and, Mr. Rogan, you

mentioned once that if people don't pay for
the garbage it won't get picked up. Well,
you can't do that either because of skunks
and rats and you can't leave garbage out on
the street. I mean, you just can't.

But to me it's a double taxation. You should never have the garbage fee to start with, let alone increase it to \$300, and the taxes are out of site. I mean, you are there to represent us not to take care of Bill Courtright as the mayor or take care of the firemen and the policemen, you are there to take care of us. I haven't seen it yet.

Mr. Rogan, I'm going to be looking carefully to see how you vote for this budget. You, who have never said -- who have always said rather, "I will not raise taxes. I will not raise care of you, I'm looking out for you."

We'll see. We'll see what you do

with this budget. I'm watching you very
closely.

Another thing, I was in Clarks

Summit last week and I went to the State

Street Grill, and on their meters they have,

7 did not have to pay for the meters."

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So I asked them about it inside and they said they pay, the State Street Grill owners, pay the Borough of Clarks Summit the cost of the meters for the day, every day. This encourages people to come in their restaurant because they don't have to go and pay or worry about coming out and feeding the meters. I think some businesses in Scranton should consider that. They would get much more business if they, themselves, possibly did the same thing and that the people that park in front of their business won't have to feed the meters. It's food for thought. I know I'll go back there because I think Clarks Summit -- they are a step ahead of Scranton.

"If you are going to State Street Grill you

They have the cars getting stopped for overweight. The trucks rather, or

1	overweight trucks on State Street they are
2	getting tons of money. Scranton, nothing.
3	\$300 fine never. Not one fine yet.
4	So I just hope you think about the
5	people and do what you can and start doing
6	the job that you were elected to do and not
7	taking care of special interests and certain
8	people, and try to get rid of this garbage
9	fee, it shouldn't even be a garbage fee.
10	Double taxation.
11	And I hope Billy Courtright comes
12	forward with his ideas on this budget.
13	People want to know what he thinks. He is
14	going to be the mayor. He has to live with
15	this. Thank you.
16	MR. JOYCE: Thank you. Gerard
17	Hetman.
18	MR. HETMAN: Good evening, Council.
19	MR. JOYCE: Good evening.
20	MR. HETMAN: Gerard Hetman from
21	Lackawanna County's Community Relations
22	Department. It's go ahead to see you all as
23	always.
24	To begin this evening just to follow
25	up on a question that Councilman Rogan had

1	asked at my last appearance last month
2	regarding the possibility of Lackawanna
3	County postponing the first installment of
4	the property tax payments for 2014, I have
5	forwarded that request to the County
6	Commissioners' Office, however, I have not
7	heard back from them specifically if they
8	will go ahead with that or if they won't do
9	it, but as soon as I do have an answer I'll
10	remind them about it this week and as soon
11	as they let me know what their plans are for
12	that process, I'll certainly forward it to
13	council's office as soon as they let me
14	know. But I have requested information on
15	it we'll hopefully know soon and we'll let
16	council know ASAP when they have a decision
17	on that.
18	MR. ROGAN: Thank you. I appreciate
19	it.
20	MR. HETMAN: No problem.
21	MR. JOYCE: Thank you very much.
22	MR. HETMAN: No problem. To get to
23	a couple of items related to county and the
24	holiday season coming up, the Lackawanna
25	County Office of Youth and Family Services,

formally known and still known by many as the Office of Children and Youth Services, is conducting it's annual "Adopt an Angel" program again this year. This is a program that allows the community to contribute to help that office provide gifts for underprivileged children at this time of the year who otherwise would not face a very happy holiday season due to unfortunate circumstances.

Children served by the Office of
Family and Youth Services allows people to
contribute and it could be an individual,
could be your office at work, a community or
church group, anybody anyway you want to
slice it they just need to contact some
volunteers that work with that office to
coordinate the program. They suggest a
minimum donation of \$100 per child, but
there is no firm threshold as to what you
have to contribute. The volunteers who work
with whoever would like to participate in
the program to match the child generally
with an age that they request one they will
work to match with that child and whoever

1 participates in the program just donates some funds to provide gifts for those 2 3 children. 4 It's very easy to do. The gifts will actually -- people want to purchase 5 them and they can be dropped off at the M 6 7 all at Steamtown and it's coordinated, I'd 8 like to give you the name of the volunteer 9 who does this, her name is Lea Doherty and her e-mail, I'll spell it out real quick, is 10 11 L-E-A-D-O-U-G-H-R-E-R-T-Y-M-S-W@GMAIL.COM. 12 And her phone number is area code 13 570-630-4506. 14 And again, this program helps many 15 children, a lot of whom may residents of our 16 cities and the communities around us to 17 enjoy a Merry Christmas season, so it's a 18 great way to participate in community 19 service and help those less fortunate this 20 time of year. 21 Second, just a couple of events that 22 will come up in the holiday season, all of them like to hit that first weekend in 23

December. Saturday, December 7, the annual

Lackawanna Heritage Valley Santa train will

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have his last stop on its annual run down the valley at 2:45 p.m. in downtown Scranton at the Scranton State Office building parking lot on Lackawanna Avenue. The Santa train has been a long running program, but this is only the third year that it makes its last stop at the State Office building parking lot. Previously it would go down from Carbondale through the Mid-Valley, Valley View area and would just come back to Steamtown. This is the third year that it actually stops and has stopped in downtown Scranton.

I know we all look for good, positive activity in the city. This is a good example. You can bring the children out, meet Santa, get some photos with Santa and different community groups chip in to provide refreshments and other entertainment at that stop, so it's a great afternoon in downtown Scranton.

And actually coinciding with that, at this time of year everybody seems to ask me this, but the annual county holiday tree lighting takes place this year Friday,

1 December 6, at 5 p.m. on courthouse square coinciding with two events, the first one 2 3 which is the December First Friday, but also 4 in addition to this new this year, Scranton local artists, small businesses and 5 merchants and artists in and around the City 6 of Scranton together with the County's Arts 7 8 and Culture Department are hosting Holiday on the Square. It's a festive, as described 9 10 by them, a festive outdoor winter market. It features a large number of crafters, 11 12 merchants, artists, all selling their wares 13 on Courthouse square and the hours of the 14 market are 5 to 9 p.m. on Friday, December 15 6, Saturday, December 7, 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. 16 It's the same group that did the Arts on the 17 Square festival back during the summer 18 months, really similar to the Lehigh Valley 19 mart down in Bethlehem. It's only one 20 weekend, but it should be a great time, and 21 again, we look forward to seeing those 22 events grow and prosper in downtown Scranton 23 and hopefully residents and visitors will 24 enjoy it and see the best our city has to offer. 25

1	So, thank you, ladies and gentlemen,
2	and we'll follow-up with you on that issue
3	as soon as we get an answer.
4	MR. JOYCE: Thank you.
5	MR. HETMAN: Thank you.
6	MR. JOYCE: Our next speaker is Bill
7	Jackowitz.
8	MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening,
9	Scranton City Council. Bill Jackowitz,
10	South Scranton resident and member of the
11	Taxpayers' Association.
12	MR. JOYCE: Good evening.
13	MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.
14	MR. JACKOWITZ: Scranton's budget
15	might work. I feel your pain. I feel a lot
16	better right now after saying those two
17	statements, repeating those two quotes.
18	7,986 days ago Scranton was declared a
19	distressed city under Act 47, reality not
20	fiction, inching closer to 8,000 days.
21	\$130 million dollar budget for
22	Scranton ridiculous. Who is going to pay
23	for it?
24	Arbitration awards, what is the

latest information on payments? We still

1	haven't heard anything and it's been years
2	now.
3	Would a fair share tax law be fair
4	and include anybody or just the out-of-state
5	University students?
6	Garbage fees, \$300 a year. The city
7	cannot collect \$178 a year, fee, what makes
8	you think they will collect a \$300 a year
9	fee?
10	Scranton population 75,809
11	estimated. Persons 65 and older, 16.4
12	percent of the population. Property tax
13	increases 56.7 percent. Garbage fee
14	increase 68.5 percent. Parking fee
15	increase, 25 percent. Rental registration
16	tripling. Look out, renters, open up your
17	wallet, you are going to get nailed big
18	time.
19	Per capita income, \$19,681 2010
20	census report. Median household income
21	\$36,968 2010 census report.
22	Persons living below the poverty
23	level, 33 percent. Highest unemployment
24	rate in the state over four years, State
25	Department of Labor. Food stamps use source

1	75 percent in five years.
2	Average salary in the United States
3	grew by 6 percent, in Scranton only 3.7
4	percent. Why? But yet Scranton wants to
5	raise taxes, fees, with no cuts in city
6	employee's salaries or layoffs.
7	Mr. Doherty said, "I have always
8	been a realist. You pay your bills and you
9	move on."
10	I am also a realist. I have said
11	that many times from this podium. So,
12	Mr. Doherty, take out your checkbook and
13	write the check to pay your bills you
14	created along with city council members who
15	voted for your ridiculous proposals
16	throughout the years. The taxpayers are not
17	responsible for this. The truth of the
18	matter is 20 million plus gap deficit will
19	not be closed. Period.
20	According to Mr. Doherty everything
21	in the 2014 is an assumption. Did we not go
22	through this in 2013? You know what happens
23	when you assume.
24	Another quote from Mr. Doherty, "But
25	if we are going to the able to borrow,

1	borrow, if we are going to be able to do
2	things ten years from now you need revenues
3	to pay the bills."
4	Really, Mr. Doherty? Mr. McGoff,
5	Mrs. Gatelli, Ms. Fanucci, Mr. Murphy,
6	Mr. Hazzouri, Mr. McTiernan and Mr. Pocius,
7	why did those council members approve the
8	borrowing which put the city into its
9	current status? More importantly, why did
10	these council members support fighting the
11	police and fire unions which lead to this
12	ridiculous \$22 million award? Mr. Reap was
13	correct, the only people making money are
14	the attorneys.
15	The Catholic Diocese of Scranton had
16	the right idea, they appointed Bishop
17	Martino as Bishop, not from the area, no
18	ties or relatives in the area. He closed
19	the churches, schools and everybody
20	complained. Once he completed his job he
21	left the area, mission accomplished. Now
22	nobody complains. Why? Because it had to
23	be done.
24	I recommend to the dysfunctional

Scranton government that you do the same.

1	Otherwise, the city remains distressed.
2	Period
3	As far as last week's comments about
4	the 2013 budget being close to being
5	balanced, should you not accept that
6	considering we had several tax increases in
7	the past five years? Of course, we are
8	going to have more money. We increased
9	taxes. The taxpayers are being milked for
10	more. Period.
11	Has anybody tried getting affordable
12	health care insurance lately?
13	FYI, for your information, there are
14	three, five letter words that go
15	hand-in-hand, money, power, and greed. If
16	you have money, you have power. If you are
17	power, you have money. When you have both
18	that equates to greed. That's government
19	right there.
20	And to the Scranton firefighters and
21	police officers, you know, the majority of
22	you people are good people, you do a hell of
23	a good job, you won your arbitration and I
24	applaud you for that, I support all firemen,
25	I support all police officers, but in the

1	same token I'm asking you to please, please
2	consider renegotiating this arbitration
3	award. I know you are generous enough to
4	give back 15 million, but your fellow
5	residents of this city cannot afford it.
6	I'm not asking I don't want you to give
7	up everything, but I'm just asking you,
8	please, for the benefit of the rest of the
9	citizens of this City of Scranton, please at
10	least think about it and consider it.
11	MR. JOYCE: Thank you. Our next
12	speaker tonight is Bob Bolus.
13	MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.
14	Bob Bolus, Scranton.
15	MR. JOYCE: Good evening.
16	MR. BOLUS: I sat through part of
17	tonight's caucus, I guess we would call it,
18	regarding Alexander's. Let me tell you what
19	I heard and what I didn't like and what I
20	haven't liked in this city for a long, long
21	time. Alexander's, from my understanding,
22	was given a grant. That was changed to a
23	loan. 1/12 percent. That was tried to
24	change to 5 percent, then God knows where
25	else.

You know, when somebody comes in and they agree to do something and this city agrees to do it and you change it that's called bait and switch. Let me bait you in and switch the deal. That was done with car dealers for many, many years and that's what we did in this city. I think if they were entitled to a grant then it's this council's responsibility to live up to your word. You give them a grant, you give anybody else that you gave your word to, and that's to show credibility and integrity. Somebody we are lacking anymore.

Don't ask a business that's actually brought a business here and successful what they earned, what they make. You go to a salon watch these people stand on their feet eight, ten hours a day cutting hair, putting with their big smiling faces, and complaints and so on and so forth. Lackawanna Avenue is ghost town. You spent millions of dollars to do what you did to Lackawanna Avenue. Go take a look at it. Bon-Ton is bailing out. What are you going to get here?

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Alexander's can go anywhere. They are Wilkes-Barre. They can go anywhere they want to be. She elected to be here. It's your responsibility to see that those that want to stay here and you made a deal with don't change it. That's character, to stand up for what's right. This city spent millions of dollars, the Connell building, the hotels, you gave it away.

You took 3 1/2 million dollars, my pet peeve, of the golf course money with the council's before and the administration and flushed it down the toilet and you got this for it in return? Now, you want to penalize the business that's staying here making something happen? It's easy to get another vacant building. Where are we going here, guys? Let's pay attention. Live up to your word, live up to your bond, you have to make corrections for the future so be it, but don't tell somebody that's already been there to pay for the past. That's not their fault.

You know, we are ready to get a tax increase by the state, now we are going to

get it in the city in the budget, where the heck are we going? You are going to borrow 2 3 to get out of debt? It's not going to 4 happen. What do we get for our recyclables? Do we give them away to the Recycling Center 5 or do we sell them? Does anybody got that 6 7 answer? It's an answer that I think we 8 should get and look into. Put your 9 recyclables out for sale to the highest 10 bidder. You are dumping them into a 11 privately owned recycling center that gets 12 cheap labor from the prisons to go out there 13 and work and puts millions off dollars in 14 their pocket. It's time for us to look at 15 making money out of our recyclables. Put 16 them out there, a lot of people will be glad 17 to buy them and if they want them, let them 18 pay for them. They are getting a labor free 19 literally operation out there at our 20 expenses. So those are things to do. 21 22

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Your garbage fee \$300. It's a damn joke, excuse me the French. To a landfill up there that has pirated this city in every direction it can possibly go. There is a leachate line, put \$10 a gallon on that as a

host community. Take what it takes to what it takes to make this city whole again instead of being bullied. You know, one time you got to keep walking across the street from a bully, one day you got to stand up to him and the time is now. There is a new council coming, a new mayor coming, but it's your responsibility to the day you guys leave here to try and clean the house up before you go and you need to do that.

The leachate, I mean, you know, it's DeNaples has two garages in this city, have they ever paid anything on them? I remember going back years and years, have they ever paid anything? Yet you want to hand them more money? You can't even pay the garbage bills from the past and now you want to hand more to the people. It's a taxation without representation. That's as simply as it's put.

If you can tax or better yet put a fee on the citizens of this city that you are already burying with everything else then you can put a fee on nonprofits. It's another group of bullies. It's time. The

1 time is now, not tomorrow or the day after for them to pay to the piper. The free ride is over, they are a contributing factor to the death of this city.

> You got to make cuts. You can't just keeping borrowing to get of debt because that's proven a fallacy. You got awards coming, unions, everything else out Um-hum. We have to get our heads out here. of the sand, gentlemen, and the time is now. If you don't do it now, it's never going to happen. You have broken promises, we have squandered millions of dollars, we haven't made one single cut in this city. We have given our stadium away over there. South Side Center, gave it away, didn't get a dime, could have sold it for more money.

> I bought a church in this city to save it. It's value was \$3, I paid \$35,000 to preserve our history. You know what they assessed me? A half a million bucks for it so stop and think what we are paying to be in the City of Scranton and those that should pay aren't paying.

> > This budget is a joke, it's going to

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1	destroy this city, you are never going to go
2	it done, and you can't keep asking for more
3	blood from the people out of this city, I
4	think they bled enough. The chance and
5	choices are now. You have a gas line going
6	here, you have a leachate line, why don't
7	you look into possibly doing Marcellus Shale
8	drilling in this area. How much gas is
9	under the City of Scranton? Has anybody
10	thought about exploring it? What about
11	windmills up on West Mountain? Sell the
12	power, cut our expenses, here, give the
13	people a break.

There is creativity, but nobody is creative, let's just borrow millions of dollars. You can't even pay the interest on the millions you are going to borrow and now you want to add a garbage fee? Come on, that's what our taxes are for to pay for garbage, so it's time to really smell the roses, gentlemen. You are burying this city and this administration is going to take us to the grave before it goes. Thank you.

Thank you, Mr. Bolus. MR. JOYCE: Our next speaker is Dug Miller.

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MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.

Doug Miller, Scranton. I, too, would like

3 to spend my time tonight addressing this

4 budget. Over the last week or -- good week

I have had a chance to take a look at this

6 budget. I have a lot of concerns with this

budget, particularly the fees, the increased

fees that have been placed in this budget

9 for next year.

But before I get into that I want to make it clear in terms of the property tax increase of roughly 57 percent, coming here long enough and knowing full well the situation the city is in, particularly this last year, going back to last summer and all we dealt with the recovery plan and trying to get ourself in a situation this year where we can somehow float above water.

I knew that a tax increase was inevitable and so that doesn't come as a surprise to me. I know where we are in a situation where we pretty much have no choice in that end and so I don't think this is much we can do with that. In fact, I was actually surprised that it wasn't higher in

terms of the mayor's, you know, suggested
amount.

The concerns I have are mainly the revenue projections and our inability to, yet again, be aggressive and go after revenue that's out there. Yet again, we seem to be lax and there is no sense of urgency whatsoever by this administration and I'm really upset that we haven't put our foot down and held their feet to the fire here.

I'm concerned that when I look at a budget, and I see that through September 30, the city has only generated \$25,000 for an amusement tax. I believe Live Nation is the only organization to contribute towards that tax. My question tonight is where is the rest of the money? Why hasn't the city aggressively pursued these organizations, other organizations so we that get the money that we budgeted. That's a very important question.

My other question is the MBRO,
market based revenue opportunity. According
to this budget through September 30 not a

1 2 dime has been brought in. I understand the process was delayed, so that's obviously a contributing factor, but what is the future of this? I mean, do we intend on this being successful or is this just another, you know, pie in the sky, you know, revenue enhancement?

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I understand that when you put recovery plans together and you place revenue enhancements I understand you are taking a chance and you are counting on things to happen that some times don't happen, but we knew we had to take a chance, but my concern is I don't think there is -we put things down, but we are not being aggressive in our pursuant to bring these things in and make them happen, make them a reality. It's nice to talk about them. It's nice to have it on paper, but we are not realizing them, and a contributing factor of that is we are non-chalant on everything. That's the philosophy of this administration for the last 12 years. we do not have an aggressive attitude and aggressive philosophy and that's why the

1 city is in the shape it's in because we have a laid back, you know, attitude here and 2 3 until the attitude is adjusted, and I'm 4 hoping that happens next year, we are just 5 going to continue the same course year in and year out and nothing is going to change. 6 7 The other question I have going back 8 to this recovery plan, we spent all of this time last summer going back and forth on a 9 10 recovery plan and the recovery of this city 11 for the next three years. Revenue 12 enhancements. We discussed a commuter tax. 13 You know, whether you are for the commuter 14 tax or not is irrelevant to this discussion, 15 my question tonight would be we placed in a 16 the recovery plan to petition the Court for 17 the next three years a commuter tax. 18 didn't we do that this year? The administration chose 19 MR. JOYCE: 20 not to petition the Court. 21 MR. MILLER: So yet again, like 12 22 years ago, this is another recovery plan 23 that we are just going to blatantly refuse 24 to follow. Why did we put all of that time

and effort going back and forth with the

whole summer, we had employees making
minimum wage, we were the laughing stock all
over the nation on national TV to put this
plan together and we don't even follow it.
That's \$2.5 million in the next two years.

Let me move on here. PILOTS, my biggest pet peeve. There has been -- in the last 12 years there has been no aggressive pursuit, other than a few members of this council that went and knocked on their door, and you were accused of all sorts of illegal activity, which was a joke, but there has been no aggressive pursuit by this administration with the nonprofits in this community.

And again, I'm going to bring up the 1 percent tuition. I know people don't like to hear it, but that's where we are right now, and I know I talk about the idea that there was a lot of legality involved and a lot of back and forth and it wasn't something as easy as just putting it in the budget, but you know, the more I think about it, if we have that aggressive attitude and that aggressive mindset and we truly cared

and we are really serious about turning this
city around we would have done all the legal
research by now. That should have been put
in this budget. That's 6 to 8 million
dollars that the city could bring in and
annually, and that we don't have to raise
the garbage fee, and that's my next issue.

This garbage fee it's completely

This garbage fee it's completely asinine, and I apologize for the language, but I'm just so disappointed and disgusted that the mayor had the audacity to even put that in the budget. Last week I have talked to numerous senior citizens, I'm going to use them as an example, who just told me that there is no way they are going to be able to take that on. I mean, it's bad enough it's \$178 now, we want to increase it roughly 69 percent to \$300?

Just months back we saw the names in the paper from the people over \$7 million in delinquent garbage fees that the city didn't even collect, you think the people are going to pay \$300?

As we have said before, it's a taxation without representation. Speakers

have said it before me tonight. It's why

people pay property taxes and pay for police

protection, fire protection, and for your

garbage to be collected each week, and with

this plan we really putting the screws to

the people and I don't think it's right.

This can't happen. The rental registration, all we are doing here is passing this along to the tenants and the landlords are going to see this increase.

Look it, it had good intentions of revenue, but we are to the point now where we are just driving people out of their homes and people are going to rent down in Old Forge, Taylor and Moosic. They are not going to be able to pay this.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you, Mr. Miller.

MR. MILLER: But these are things as this budget stands right now it's completely unacceptable and this council shouldn't stand for it. You need to go ahead a hard look. I want to Mr. Courtright come in. I want to see Mr. Weschler, Mr. Gaughan, all the people that are going to be piloting this ship next year let them come in and

1	let's hear their ideas, your ideas, because
2	this budget can't fly as it is. Thank you.
3	MR. JOYCE: Thank you.
4	MR. MILLER: We need to put the
5	people first.
6	MR. JOYCE: Our next speaker, I can
7	make out the name, Gary War
8	MR. WASSIL: Wassil.
9	MR. JOYCE: Wassil. Sorry, couldn't
10	tell if they were R's or S's, that's all.
11	MR. WASSIL: Good evening. I hope
12	you are ready for a change of pace.
13	MR. JOYCE: Pardon?
14	MR. WASSIL: I hope you are ready
15	for a change of pace. I'm having problems
16	with a condemned home on my property. I'm
17	here to understand the status of the
18	condemned home at the address of 1512
19	Preston Place in West Side. The property
20	was reviewed by the city inspectors about
21	three years ago and was deemed unfit for
22	human habitation. Two years ago the house
23	was (unintelligible.) A year ago I filed a
24	formal complaint with the city. Despite
25	numerous attempts for me to ascertain the

1	status of this project via phone calls,
2	e-mails and in person with Mr. Oleski and
3	Mr. Seitzinger, I was unable to get any
4	information about the property. The house
5	is somewhat secure and I have seen various
6	(unintelligible) in the premises.
7	I would like to help as to when this
8	situation would be taken care of. I worked
9	for the government for many years and it has
10	been challenging and (unintelligible) I
11	found that the project is now in the fourth
12	year. I don't know what to do, I'm here for
13	some help.
14	MR. LOSCOMBE: It was a little bit
15	hard to understand you, Mr. Wassil, but you
16	mentioned about a property on Preston Place?
17	MR. WASSIL: Yeah, the property at
18	Preston Place, 1512 Preston Place. It's
19	condemned, it's been condemned for three
20	years now and I want to know what the status
21	of it is, when it's going to be torn down.
22	MR. LOSCOMBE: We could inquire.
23	MR. JOYCE: Yes, we can send a
24	request.

MR. WASSIL: I have reached out to

1	OECD and nobody has give me any solid
2	answers.
3	MR. ROGAN: I think it would be best
4	directed to Mr. Seitzinger, who will likely
5	be out of a job in a month or so, so with
6	the change of administration there is some
7	department heads may change, some may not,
8	but if you could provide that address to our
9	office.
10	MR. WASSIL: It's on file
11	downstairs.
12	MR. ROGAN: We will look into it,
13	and I'm being honest with you,
14	Mr. Seitzinger has not with forthcoming with
15	information on these type of issues. I know
16	Mr. Joyce and myself put a lot of time into
17	a similar situation about a property in the
18	Tripp Park section of Scranton or West
19	Scranton, and we have been stonewalled as
20	well, but if you leave the information with
21	us we will definitely make sure that the
22	right people are made aware and if the
23	current administration is unwilling to act,
24	you know, I'll be sure to bring it up with
25	our new mayor when he takes office in

1	January.
2	MR. WASSIL: Thank you. I do have
3	comment in regards to the budget, has
4	everyone ever thought about getting with the
5	nonprofits to see if they could provide us
6	with some help, like an advisory committee,
7	people from business and industry, you know,
8	economic department, finance department to
9	see if they can come in and help us with the
10	situation. Maybe like Detroit or Compton,
11	California or Bridgeport, Connecticut and
12	maybe to see to look what they have done in
13	the past, maybe that help what they think.
14	Get some fresh ideas and see.
15	MR. ROGAN: That's a very good idea.
16	MR. JOYCE: Yes.
17	MR. WASSIL: Thank you.
18	MR. JOYCE: If you can leave that
19	address with our clerk we'll be glad to look
20	into that for you.
21	Our next speaker tonight is Les
22	Spindler.
23	MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,
24	Council. Les Spindler, city resident and
25	homeowner and taxpayer. I just want to say

1	a couple of words about Alexander's, I don't
2	often disagree with Mr. Bolus, but I have to
3	disagree with him tonight. To give them a 4
4	1/2 percent drop on their interest rate I
5	think is really unreasonable. As
6	Mr. Loscombe said, everybody is going
7	through tough times. I'm going through
8	tough times, I lost my full-time job in
9	April that I had for 21 years. Nobody is
10	dropping my percentages 4 1/2 percent, so
11	they charge \$30 for a haircut, I think they
12	could pay 5 percent. Their prices are
13	outrageous and I think they should be able
14	to pay what they are now.
15	Moving onto the budget, as everybody

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else has said, I think it's unrealistic. 56 percent is a lot for people to pay in property taxes. I have know we do have to raise the taxes because the banks have to see that we have some income coming in or we're not to get anything, but I think 30 or 40 would be more reasonable.

And as other people have said, I have said it in the past, the garbage fee is illegal. We pay our property taxes for

that. This council should look to disband, get rid of that garbage fee because it's illegal. I wish somebody would take it to Court and get it thrown out, I'm sure it would get thrown out. That's why we pay our property taxes for fire protection, police protection and our garbage gets picked up. I don't know. It's very simple to figure that out. I don't know why we still have this and \$300 is way too much.

There is a woman who lives behind me she is in her 80's, widowed, she puts out maybe a bag or garbage a week. She can't afford \$300. I was talking to her daughter last week, she can't do it. There is lot of people like that. I'm working for a temp agency now, I might not be able to pay it. You might see my name in the paper next year. It's just outrageous. People can't pay all of these fees. Something has got to be done.

Moving on, on a brighter note, for the last 12 years there has not been too much to be proud of this city, but I think there is one thing to be proud of now and

2 think he is a bright light shining from this 3 city. He is kid that walked onto Penn 4 State, turned out to be a record setting quarterback there, wasn't drafted by the 5 NFL, which it turns out now was a big 6 mistake. He was picked up by Oakland as a 7 8 fourth string, and I read in the paper last 9 week the only reason they picked him up was 10 just give the other quarterbacks a rest and 11 now he is starting in the NFL. That's an 12 unbelievable accomplishment and I think 13 every Scrantonian should be proud of Matt. 14 I know his parents are smiling from ear to area and his whole family and everybody 15 16 should be proud of him. 17 You know what, he is a great example 18 for kids that aren't physically talented as 19

some other players. Matt doesn't have the physical abilities that a lot of other quarterbacks have, but he has got the heart, he has got the desire and he has got it up here. He has got the smarts that some guys with the athletic ability don't have.

that's West Scranton's Matt McGloin. I

I think that's one thing to be proud

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1 of and that's Matt McGloin. I know last 2 year council was supposed to bring him in 3 and give a proclamation, I know that didn't 4 happen, so I'm asking -- this probably won't happen until the new council takes over, but 5 I know, Councilman Rogan, we spoke about it 6 7 and you were going to make a note. MR. ROGAN: Yeah. Absolutely. It's 8 9 something I wanted to do and not only for at 10 the time it was just for Matt's Penn State, amazing Penn State career, but now we can 11 12 also even include some of the great work he 13 is doing in the NFL. 14 MR. SPINDLER: Just to make an NFL 15 team is an accomplishment. There is 16 thousands of players that come out of 17 college football and don't make it, and to 18 be a starting quarterback in the NFL, that's 19 fantastic. Like I said, he is doing our 20 city proud. That's one thing we can really 21 be proud of and we'll talk about it again. 22 After the season is over it would nice to 23 aet him down here. 24 And again, I will be here for the

public meeting December 5, but I know you

1 have to introduce the budget tonight, but 2 you've got to make some amendments to it 3 when December 5 rolls around. Thank you for 4 your time. MR. JOYCE: Thank you. And I just 5 want to say that Matt McGloin is definitely 6 7 a role model for many, many children in this city of someone who worked hard, wasn't 8 given a lot of chances, and went out and 9 10 there and really worked hard and got and 11 earned his keep. 12 And with that note, our next speaker 13 is Andrew Porter. 14 MR. PORTER: Good evening. My name is Andrew Porter. I'm a citizen of 15 16 Scranton. A roll model is a great thing. I 17 really came here after, you know, 18 contemplating for approximately a month should I come, should I not come. I'm here. 19 20 I'm here because I love this city. This is 21 God's city. I wanted to particularly thank 22 the president of the city council, Janet 23 Evans, for her service for over the years 24 and she is not here. I wish a speedy

recovery for both Mrs. Evans and Mr. McGoff.

We have a tendencies sometimes to look at all bad and we need to look at good. One of the things I'd like to thank city council for as a unit is for keeping the Pledge of Allegiance in the building. Sometimes we have a tendency to forget that we have made an oath to God and that all that are here are supposed to represent the citizens of this great city. This is God's city in accordance to wishes of God.

Now, we have a responsibility, I'm very disappointed in the fact that there is not as many citizens here as there should be because the citizens I think should be out every day because it's not over until it's over, I think that was once said, and we have until the end of the year to raise certain funds.

Now, I know you are probably thinking that this is ridiculous and this guy is a ridiculous person by even thinking that, but we don't have -- we have a month maybe to do this. We hired a mayor previously. No matter what you may think of him, he has been in the capacity of the

mayor for over a decade and we it's our responsibility as citizens to help as much as we can and this way politicians would be able to be in line with what is required by the city, and what we need I think is to take a different type of approach because to borrow, to continually borrow and to put God's city up for sale is I don't think the appropriate way to move.

Now, we made another decision and we brought in Bill Courtright and the citizens of Scranton has spoken. If you tax the way it is intended to be then you take away homes of your seniors. You take away homes of the lowly, of the poor, and if you take those homes and you foreclose those homes you need to watch what is that you do because God does not look kindly on people who make profit of those less fortunate.

I think what we need to do, if you remember correctly, we have so many people that love this city and do we as individuals, as citizens of Scranton, do we really love the city because if we did then what we need to do is we need to raise

funds. We need to stop borrowing. We need to let the world see that we are in need. We need to have Bill Clinton. We need to have his wife Hilary. We need have the vice president of the United States come in. need to let them know that we need help. need to let the University of Scranton, who has a fine tuition and some of the best students in the country here, as well as Lackawanna County, as well as the high schools, as well as Marywood University and others that I may not have mentioned, these people can raise funds.

> Your media speaks of all of these different organizations that can raise funds. We need to get out here, and you say that it's not possible and you may think that it's not possible, but it is possible. With God all things are possible. And if you take the approach that this is and it will -- and we have elected Bill Courtright, and I'm sure his intentions are good, but we need to stay focused on the matter at hand and that is to help each other.

> > We are an angry people. Sometimes

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if you look we use devices like the cell phone and we don't use it for good purposes in most instances. We drive with the cell phone in one hand and with the cigarette in the other hand, and where is the hand on the wheel? On a two-way street we are crossing over into the other lane and we are running into just about scaring whoever it is that's going the right way when the other people are going the wrong way.

I think that we need to take a different approach. I know that my time is up, I only have minutes to speak to you, but we have, as a city, as a unit, a month and that's a long time. We have 300 and how many days in a year and people are raising funds for Thanksgiving and for Christmas and when those two days are gone where are the people that are foreclosed out of this city? Where are they going to go? Where are they going to live? God will bless us if we do what it is that we need to do and don't you think that we can do it.

And that's what I say to you, I think that we should try as best we can to

1	do whatever we can to save our city. If you
2	love your city, then you will do that. You
3	need to come out. You need to let you
4	need to help the people that you elected and
5	the people that are elected should never,
6	never, even the police department and the
7	fire department, you have taken an oath, you
8	have taken an oath to God that you would
9	protect the citizens of this great city.
10	MR. JOYCE: Thank you, Mr. Porter.
11	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
12	MR. JOYCE: Our next speaker is
13	Ozzie Quinn.
14	MR. QUINN: Good evening. Ozzie
15	Quinn, Taxpayers' Association. I think I
16	can tell you how Mr. Doherty came to that
17	\$300 increase, okay? You know, going back
18	to July of this year PEL reviewed and
19	analyzed the budget for 2014 and they said
20	at that time there was a going to be a \$18
21	million deficit in the budget, older budget,
22	and they said in order to be able to balance
23	the budget you are going to have increase
24	that 117 percent real estate taxes.

Now, I see where Mr. Doherty says, I $\,$

don't think it's a coincidence, you know, he said he wants to raise the taxes 49 percent, okay, and then he wants to increase \$122 on top of \$178 for \$300 increase to the garbage collection fees, which would amount to 68 percent. Add the 68 percent to the 49 percent, and you get 117 percent.

I think Mr. Doherty has deceived us. It's a sham. What he is using is the garbage fee, garbage collection fee, instead of increasing his taxes and I think a lot of the administration, since the garbage tax had come into -- garbage fee, excuse me, has come into existence, they have been able to use that increase in the garbage fees so they wouldn't have to increase the taxes, and that way they look good in the public eye. There is no doubt about it, that 117 percent is what PEL had told Mr. Doherty that increase was needed and that's what he is giving them, 117 percent.

Now, if you look at the Scranton
Times it's not a 117, it would be 125
percent increase, you know? I think the
Scranton Times is more accurate probably,

that garbage collection fee if it walks like a duck and it quacks like a duck it's a duck. That's a tax. There is no doubt about it and they are using that as a front to get around so the people will pay this garbage fee and they will look good in the eyes of the people that they haven't raised the taxes. So I think if you go back in July you are going to see that that's what I'm speaking about is true, okay?

Now, you see a lot of foreclosures in the paper, no doubt about it, hundreds and hundreds and you see a lot of tax sales, hundreds and hundreds, 2/3 of them are from the City of Scranton. How in the heck are you going to raise taxes that much? You know, 117 percent, according to Mr. Doherty, 117 percent, and be able to have people stay in the city?

You know, 33 percent of the people are on social security. It's unbelievable. Then you talk about another 35 percent are making less than 24 or 25 thousand dollars, so you can't get blood out of a stone. You

know, it's a shame it's like that, but we have been deceived ever since in administration has been on board. Not only that, we have been deceived from our administration for a long time back.

You know, that garbage fee, as you know, there is no doubt about it, it was always in the taxes. You paid your taxes you get your garbage hike. Some smart politician said, "Oh, let's go for a garbage collection fee and that way we can deceive the public."

And they have been doing it for years, but Mr. Doherty was really deceiving us because he is raising it 117 percent. If you look at the Scranton Times, it's a 125 percent, and I don't think it's a coincidence.

Lastly, I want to say something about, you know, last year there was a federal audit on the Office of Economic and Community Development, and it was an \$11 million finding, and that finding was to be paid if they didn't resolve the finding by nonfederal funds, meaning taxpayers' fund.

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Now, I haven't heard hide nor hair from the OECD or anybody else or anybody about what's the status of that audit? I used to have a good rapport of trying to get information out of HUD then all of a sudden my wires were cut, they made me go through -- jump through hoops to try and get information and I thought it's not worth it. So I'd appreciate it, Mr. Rogan, you being the chairman of OECD up until January if you could look into that audit because a lot of that audit filings have to do with loans, and you had a caucus tonight about loans and I'm sure you are going to see a lot of discrepancies and I don't want to get left and the public don't want to get left paying, even it's not 11 million, whatever we have to pay to nonfederal funds and it's going to come out to haunt us, okay? might be another thing that would happen.

So I appreciate being here tonight and, you know, I just want to say one thing, you know, that's a sham, that fee is a sham, and there is no doubt about it and it can't be used, it can't be continually used to

1	help the politicians and then put the burden
2	on the people and think that the people are
3	so foolish that they won't understand what's
4	going on. There are people out there that
5	know what's going on and I appreciate coming
6	in here and thank you for everything. Bye.
7	MR. JOYCE: Thank you. Our next
8	speaker is Dave Dobrzyn.
9	MR. DOBRZYN: Dave Dobrzyn, resident
10	of Scranton, taxes paid, fees paid. Once
11	again, I'm going to repeat myself while we
12	still have a majority, at least a resolution
13	no new tax exempts until the tax exempts
14	form an association with the city government
15	to gain compensation from the state over
16	losses and that includes government
17	buildings such as county and county jails
18	and whatever else, nonprofit schools and so
19	forth. I'm tired of paying everybody else's
20	bills.
21	And once again, I'd like to note
22	that we had a \$6 million debacle with the
23	school board and please start to realize
24	like our city is distressed.

And as far as the state legislature

is concerned, we were refused help and, once
again, this is the latest information and
I'm going to read it:

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"Perhaps the most astonishing story main stream media has missed is how companies force consumers to pay tax dollars that never quite make it to the government's pocket. What began is an effort in Kentucky to help a single company in Appalachia to raise capital by keeping state income taxes withheld from it's worker's paychecks has grown to more than 2,700 companies in 19 states when this book was first published. The big banks, carmakers, insurers and a host of Canadian, Chinese, European, Japanese companies all get to profit by pocketing taxes withheld from an America worker's paychecks. Since "The Fine Print" came out in hardback, two more states have joined this trend, Oregon and Pennsylvania.

Now the Pennsylvania law was designed initially to benefit one company, Oracle, a firm so rich it does not need any subsidies. If this pattern continues, I am confident it will then other forms will soon

join Oracle in pocketing tax dollars withhold from their employees' paychecks." 2

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Now, that pertains to us in this respect, we were made fun of by the State of Pennsylvania when we asked for help over the firemen and the policemen's settlement in the arbitration awards.

And it was mentioned on a per bag fee, and I will mention that I helped at the polls with Pat Rogan in the spring, he didn't need my help in fall, so I supported him, but I don't support per bag fees and I don't know how that idea is going, but on trash I found 20 cardboard boxes, two by two, tied up and bundled at the trash pickup, and my advice to Scranton, with aluminum cans and bottles and so forth wise up and complain later. I don't support the \$300. I fully understand, and Ozzie was very enlightening, but a lot of people are failing to recycle, which is free, by the way, on tipping fees. It's free of tipping fees, its just costs us for the trucks and the people to pick it up.

And once again, I'm going to make a

1	golden parrot for Bill Clinton, he is not
2	president anymore, but he is pushing trade
3	packs and bending Obama's ear once again and
4	poor old George Bush with all of his faults
5	got blamed for a lot of the joblessness that
6	came from his Chinese trade packs and NAFTA.
7	And Sara Palin, the welfare queen of
8	the year, 165 paid out to Alaska for every
9	dollar of federal government money paid in.
10	I'll bet you the post office would never
11	miss Alaska, they have to fly their mail
12	around instead of delivering it by walking
13	there. Thank you and have a good night.
14	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
15	MR. JOYCE: Our speaker is
16	Christopher Chimel.
17	MR. CHIMEL: Good evening, Council.
18	ALL COUNCIL: Good evening.
19	MR. CHIMEL: Chris Chimel, West
20	Scranton resident and taxpayer and
21	homeowner, my first time up at the council
22	meeting here. I'm disgusted. I cannot
23	believe the line is when I seen these
24	runners out here I thought that maybe it was
25	the line to get in here tonight. I can't

believe nobody is here with this mayor'sproposal.

I have a couple of newspaper articles here, one from last year, with the taxes that are owed to the city. I got, you know, the recent one here, October 14, 15 pages of -- I'm sure everybody has seen this, the garbage fees that are owed. Then one here from November 16 says, "Collection of delinquent wage tax and delinquent garbage fees are expected to rise by \$450.000."

What are we owed, about \$13 million in taxes and garbage fees combined? We are only going to get \$450,000 of that? That's a joke. It really it. This budget is a joke.

I have a pretty good job in this city. I turn down overtime. They say if you don't vote, you don't voice your opinion you don't get anywhere. It's my first time at council, came down on behalf of the citizens of the City of Scranton, I'm voicing my opinion and, like I said, this is a joke. I don't know how people are going

to afford it. You know, a lot of people on these pages are my family and friends and I don't know whose responsibility or job it is to, I don't want to use the word go after, but we all got to pay our fair share. People on these pages that owe the taxes and the garbage fee have to chip in, have to start paying a little bit. I got to pay, I don't mind paying a little bit of a tax increase, but these people can't just pay \$100 bucks and think, okay, I'm good for another year.

You know, it's ridiculous. They have to -- if everybody else has to start chipping in. I don't know whose job it is, if it's the tax collector's or council's or the mayor's, but these people have to start chipping in. I think if we collected all of this money that was owed to the city, you know, I don't think we would be in the debt we are in. I don't think we'd have to raise taxes as bad as we have to, if all of the fees were collected.

That's about it. I'd like to wish

9	regarding the budget. I guess we'll start
10	with one of the items that was talked about
11	a lot today, which is the garbage fee, and l
12	have been one of the few people that have
13	been an advocate for a per bag fee, and many
14	people have been upset with that idea. This
15	is the other option, and it's not fair to
16	people who only have one bag of garbage.
17	What I'm hopeful that can happen,
18	and I don't know if it can, is that instead
19	of imposing a \$300 yearly garbage fee that
20	it can be broken out to become a quarterly
21	fee where residents would pay \$75 every
22	three months to the city to soften the blow
23	on many people who are going to struggle
24	with this bill. That's another reason why
25	like the per bag fee, which you are only

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paying for what you put out and it was weekly, but it didn't seem that there was any support with the current administration for that idea, so I think that's something that we definitely have to look at to soften the blow on the garbage fee.

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Looking through there, I do have some amendments that I want to make and some of them are smaller things, just different changes in some of the departments. the items I am working on hopefully including in which would generate a little bit more revenue, but it would be put to contingency is the lease of city lands for cell phone towers. We had an individual that came to council I believe it was three weeks ago regarding that and I have been in touch with him quite a lot over the last couple of weeks, and he is going to provide me with some numbers and some projections on that so that's something that I think that we can do to beef up our contingency fund at least a small amount and bring in some additional revenue without increasing taxes.

I do have a couple of the concerns

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on some of the revenue items, one of them was mentioned already which is the sale of assets. I've stated before that the sale of parking meters isn't something that's financially wise because we can sell the meters and get a one-time cash infusion, but then we loose that revenue forever under that kind of agreement so that's something I would be opposed to and it does concern me that money is budgeted for that item when there may not be the support of the current -- of the new mayor and of the new city council to actually go through with that, and I also wonder if that did happen if we would lose control over the rates. The worse thing that could happen is if we sold the meters and a private company decided to charge \$5 an hour to park at a meter in the downtown. That would hurt the businesses as well.

I noticed, and this ties into two state issues actually I want to talk about a little bit, one that Ms. Schumacher brought out and another one that wasn't brought up, there is additional money in this year's

budget that
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budget that was projected assistance from the state for liquid fuels. Now, I may be wrong, but I am almost positive that the Transportation Bill that just passed does not include that increased money for distressed municipalities. If that's the case, the city would not be receiving this money.

Now, that bill, unfortunately, just passed, and I'm sure many of you have read about it, not only does it hurt the City of Scranton on this issue, but it also will increase your tax at the gasoline pumps by 28 cents. Now, I would like to thank our two state representatives in the City, Marty Flynn and Kevin Haggerty for voting against it, unfortunately, our state senator once again left the city out in the cold.

And moving onto the other state issue that was brought up that would really help taxpayers in the city, which is Senate Bill 76. I have spoken about this at council many times, I spoke to one of the directors over the last week of the organizers that's really try trying to push

the state legislative or the state house and state senate to pass this bill, and what it would do is eliminate the school portion of your property taxes, which is by far the largest portion. If that bill were to pass, even with tax increases coming from the city and possibly the county your tax bill on your property would be less.

I know I spoke -- I know State

Representative Flynn supports the bill. I

believe State Representative Haggerty is

opposed to it, and I know Senator Blake,

once again, is staunchly opposed to it. It

seems to be a pattern with Senator Blake

that anything that helps the City of

Scranton he is against, and it's very

disappointing that our state senator hasn't

done a thing to help the city.

To make matters worse, he was one of the guys that DCED when all of this started under Rendell's administration and previous to that that really brought the city into the position we are in.

I don't want to talk about state issues all night, but I did speak with

representatives from PEL, they provided me with quite a lot of reading material for over the weekend to look at regarding the budget, regarding some other ideas, and I'm hopeful that, you know, my colleagues and myself we could look through these and see if this budget is going to work and that is the most important thing on a budget if it's going to work.

Last year there were a lot of things put in the budget that didn't materialize and we are paying for those now, and I hate to say it, I finally agree with the Scranton Times' headlines over the last week that said it's time for Doherty to pay the piper, and this budget is a result of over a decade of mismanagement, fighting city unions instead of sitting down at a table like this one and making a deal, borrowing money to build a tree house and a dog park. They are nice things, but now we are paying for them.

And Mr. Joyce will correct me if I'm wrong, but I believe our debt service of this year is in excess of \$14 million?

MR. JOYCE: Well, you mean for 2014?

1	MR. ROGAN: Yes.
2	MR. JOYCE: In this budget? Yes,
3	you are accurate. The debt service this
4	year, so sorry I'm
5	MR. ROGAN: Oh, that's fine.
6	MR. JOYCE: Was less because of a
7	refinance, but
8	MR. ROGAN: And when you are looking
9	at a budget when you think of 14 just the
10	\$14 million, which is a very large
11	percentage of the budget, you are receiving
12	no services for that money. It's only going
13	to pay the banks for the mistakes of the
14	past. You are paying for that dog park that
15	Mayor Doherty built. At the time, it was
16	the most expensive dog park in the country.
17	You are paying for that tree house, you are
18	paying for all of this waste in the past and
19	because from the past elected officials
20	didn't use the correct numbers or didn't
21	pursue other revenue ideas, pursuing the
22	nonprofits, pursuing enhancements of our
23	parking meters. All of these things have
24	come home to roost and the line of credit is

due. We have to pay this debt service, and

on top of the city's debt service we also have Parking Authority obligations that need to be dealt with, and it seems that they only going to grow. I know in the reports that the garages are in disrepair, the occupancy rates are very low and they are losing money year in and year out.

The city needs to get out of the

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parking business, sell the garages and be done with it. We are going to have pay the

debt regardless, but if we pay it at an

accelerated schedule we will save a ton of

money in interest, and I believe when

Attorney Hughes did a presentation on this

issue the city owes \$50 million in principal

on the parking garages, but if we go out

through the payment schedule we will be

paying nearly \$100 million, so we could save

a nice chunk of money by selling some of

these garages that we are taking a loss on,

paying down the debt a little bit sooner and

we are still going to be saddled with the

remaining debt because the assets are worth

less than the debts, but because of the way

this borrowing is written the city backed it

and previous council supported it. We built garages when we didn't have to, so that's another part on the expenditure side that you are not receiving any service for that money.

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As far as police and fire go, in this budget there are no cuts to the police and fire as far as manning goes for the contracts, and I know the newspaper and many have tried to put the blame on the police unions and the fire unions, but these are Court awards, these salaries are due to a Court award. We could have negotiated a much better deal, and not us, but the administration, council doesn't have the power to negotiate contracts, but much better deals could have been negotiated if the administration, current administration, would have sat down with these guys and worked something out and we wouldn't be looking to borrow in excess of \$20 million to pay off this debt, and we wouldn't be in the scenario where the salaries are what they are and council and the mayor really had nothing to do with that. It was all

settled in the courts. We need to have the elected officials, citizens and our employees involved in decision making, not attorneys and judges.

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I hate to get on a little bit of a rant, but these are the issues of why we are here, and we need to as a city, as residency understands it so these same mistakes aren't made again, but I will be continuing to review the budget, work with my colleagues, look for some changes that could be made. Ι know there are some smaller things that myself and Mr. Loscombe talked about a couple of them, and Mr. Joyce and I as well that can be made to help the city run more efficiently with what we have, because the manpower has decreased over the years, and people always say they don't mind paying the taxes as long as they are getting their services for it, and we have to look to do more with less, and that's what we have to do when we are looking through at these positions and in different ideas to run these departments better, so that is all I have for tonight.

I do have two citizens' requests,

one is regarding the streetlight that is

out, I do have a pole number, I'll give it

to you after the meeting, Mrs. Krake, that's

on West Mountain, and also some potholes on

6 West Mountain as, I'll get both of those to

you after the meeting. Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you, Councilman

Rogan. Councilman Loscombe, do you have any
comments or motions?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, thank you, just a few brief things, and as Mr. Rogan said, we are actively looking at the budget. I won't belabor it this evening, there is a lot of things, you know, line by line that we are looking at to benefit the residents and offset any large tax increases. I don't think I'm going to kid anybody and say there won't be a tax increase, it's inevitable based on our situation, but there are some things and over the past few years there have been some ways to generate revenue that were totally ignored or waited until the last minute and we have gotten deeper and deeper, but I hope the new administration is

1	more proactive on going after revenue that's
2	laying out there without coming out of every
3	taxpayers' pocket, and I'm looking forward
4	to that.
5	But next, with the agreement of my
6	colleagues, I would like to direct Mrs.
7	Krake to send a letter of support to seek
8	funding for the West Scranton Hyde Park
9	Neighborhood Watch as they are looking for a
10	local share account grant from Monroe County
11	gaming funds to help with the renovations of
12	the West Side Community Youth Center. If I
13	have the agreement of my colleagues, I would
14	like to have this Mrs. Krake send that?
15	MR. JOYCE: Absolutely.
16	MR. ROGAN: Yes.
17	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you very much.
18	And just lastly, I know that we have
19	complained a lot about new streets
20	blacktopped and being cut up and all of that
21	but there are some projects going around
22	through the city and I happen to witness one
23	over in West Side where they have gone three
24	blocks last week I guess it was they sliced

their road with the saw all the way up, both

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sides, I believe it's TSE Construction has the project, the problem is they do that and thev leave. I don't know if it's in the agreement or whatever these companies have to clean the street after. There is so much dust in those neighborhoods for days after that it's just making a mess and there should be some type of street sweeper that I believe these companies own and maintain to do it. If not, then we should have other own street sweepers out there, but it's a nightmare, and now they are actually digging the street, and again, after they do that they should clean up after themselves, too. It's the least we can ask for the amount of projects.

But I would like to see down the road that we have some community meetings throughout the city on what's going on, the status of our utility projects in the city, so the residents know and know what to expect in their neighborhoods as far as the sewers, the water and the gas, the paving. I mean, there seems to be very little coordination, traffic coordination and

stuff, but if we let the neighborhoods know, I believe yesterday in this particular place they put cones up on both sides of the streets and told the neighbors they have to park off the street between 6:00 and 7:00. I mean, it's you know, if they knew a week ago it would be easier. Last minute notices don't work, but we have to be more amenable to the public. In the end, the projects are going to be worthwhile, but we can work to minimize the inconvenience to everyone that's involved on that.

If you can, Mrs. Krake, if you can send a letter to the utility company and also the contractors that, you know, I believe it's their duty to follow with the street sweeper once they make these cuts and whatever.

And lastly, my buddy Chris asked me to make sure, he is a little shy tonight, I think he is taking it easy, but if we can notify the DPW and ask them about leaf pickups. I noticed a lot of people have put leaves in the curbs and there is quite a few leaves down now, they are going to be

blocking our sewers, if they have any plans
to pick up the leaves in the city and if
they can notify us or put notice in the
newspaper, so the public would know, so
Chris doesn't burn them. Thanks for
reminding me, Chris.

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MR. SLEDZENSKI: You're welcome.

MR. LOSCOMBE: And I believe that's all I have tonight. Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you, Councilman Loscombe. Well, you know, it's really tough to look at the budget and see what it's going to come to. 56 percent tax increase, 69 percent garbage fee increase, increased rental registration, parking meters. thing that I do know is that the city is definitely revenue strapped and what's very scary is looking at the future and what it holds because one thing that will be a part of 2015 that isn't in this budget is the payment for the borrowing to pay off the Supreme Court award for the police and fire unions plus an extra increase of \$5 million or so to the MMO, which will go from 10 to 15 million dollars.

So, you know, it's just -- it's very unfortunate. It's very unfortunate for people because in the end it's the average guy out there who ends up paying the bill and, you know, Councilman Rogan said something about Senate Bill 76, and I really thought that was a good idea, too, and I thought that it was something that would really help out people as far as lowering their -- or eliminating the school property taxes.

But as I said two weeks ago, one of my biggest frustrations when I came onto council as a new councilman, especially as the Finance Chair, was being handed a budget that I had no say in or that I had that I basically had no voice to even have any control over. And, of course, you know, we were -- as a council we made amendments to that budget and went to Court and ended up losing and it was ruled that only the mayor could open or reopen the budget in mid-year. That's why I won't make any amendments to this budget. I won't propose any amendments to this budget. I will vote either no or

1 yes based on any other amendments that are 2 proposed. I am more than willing to work 3 with any of my colleagues too talk about 4 ideas that bring in revenue. As far as some of our newly elected 5 6 officials, I'm more than willing to work with them, too. I did place a call out to 7 8 our incoming mayor, Bill Courtright, to 9 congratulate him and to ask him to give me a 10 call if he wants to discuss anything with 11 the budget, any ideas, because I know that, 12 you know, he had mentioned during his 13 campaign that he had spoken to a lot of the 14 union members and they had mentioned that 15 there were ideas that they had that could 16 save the city money, so I think I would 17 really like to hear those ideas and I'm sure 18 some of my colleagues would, too. 19 So I'll continue to work with my 20 colleagues, and as far as the budget is 21 concerned, I will vote either yes or no 22 based on any amendments that are proposed,
