Council. Doug Miller of Scranton.

You know, before I get to my comments

this morning, I'd like to start off as
a sign of appreciation for your

service to the city, Mrs. Evans,
there's obviously so many thank you's

that we can possibly give and

certainly that's probably not enough

but just a small token of my

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appreciation to your service, I'd like to present you with these flowers if I can.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

Now, today is a very MR. MILLER: special day where we can finally come together and take the time for a few moments to put politics aside and put our differences aside and honor and reflect on those that served our city well. Today we honor three key individuals that played a very important role in our city government. We start with Mayor Doherty who leaves office after 12 years and, you know, I want to thank him for his service to the city. Solicitor always going above and

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beyond. I can't recall from myself coming here for ten years ever seeing a Council Solicitor step up to the plate in the role that sometimes, you know, obligated and have to go above and beyond and take on extra work that Attorney Hughes had to do so I thank you for that. I'm sure, you know, it's an eventful experience for you and I thank you for everything you di d. And with that said, I wish everyone a Happy New Year. Today is a very special day. You can sit back and reflect on the service of many individuals who have an lasting impact on the city and we only hope that moving forward we can continue to take on the challenges and that, you know, the next generation is bright for the future. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Fay Franus. Oh, I'm sorry.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good morning.

My friend and I are here and he is

part of what motivates me to come to

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these meetings. I think it's a travesty that we are pouring onto our next future citizens at the local and the state and federal level. And for the morning I don't like to be bias a whole lot but I did want to say I think as Christians we all want to -those of us who are want to emulate our Savior and become more Christlike and it was Paul himself who told us that we were to lay aside every income breaks and let us run the race that is set before us. And, Mrs. Evans, I know you've poured yourself into this job and you've done that and I just want to thank you on behalf of the taxpayers who are here today and just wish you well in the future and thank you for running the race and giving it your all. Thank you so much.

MS. EVANS: Thank you so much.

MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus,

Scranton. Good morning. It's a very,

very sweet day today in here and your

honesty brought to the people.

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Hopefully we'll continue in some form but I can't imagine any of the council doing the work that you have done, Mr. Joyce, Mrs. Evans, Mr. Loscombe. are truly going to be missed because you let the people know exactly what was going on in the city. And, Frank, you brought all the figures that needed to be brought. Nobody else has ever done that. You straightened things out. You did the work of the administration and making sure what you're doing, you did it. You handled the way of far and beyond and I hope you run for office in a higher office in City Council because I think you can become anything you want to be. You have the knowledge.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MR. FRANUS: And, Mr. Hughes, there's never been a solicitor in the City of Scranton like you. You put hours in and there were not even enough hours in the day that you put in and I just hope that people

As City Council President, Janet Evans established order and decorum in City Council Chambers, restored accountability and transparency to Scranton City Council, brought down a

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corrupt mismanaged Municipal Authority, seized the administration's checkbook by ending frivolous spending, halted the loss of Scrantonian's homes to sheriff's sales, prevented municipal bankruptcy and solved the individual problems of the people regardless how large or small. Janet Evans embodied her campaign slogan of being the right woman, the right time, the right reason and kept her vow of putting people first. This plague is being presented in recognition of and with gratitude for unparalleled public servi ce. "

And as a friend, Janet, I can only tell you, you're my person, and we appreciate every minute you've spent on here. Your ten years was just beautiful and we'll never forget it and thank you.

MS. EVANS: Is there anyone else who cares to address City Council?

Yes. We welcome our former mayor,

Jimmy Connors.

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MR. CONNORS: Thank you, Council President. Jim Connors, Minooka section of the city. I want to thank President Janet Evans and council member, Frank Joyce, for all the years of dedication and love that you have given to the people of the City of Scranton. And the one advisor that you both had and really and truly the only advisor you had was the people of the City of Scranton. You listened to the people and you responded when you could to agree with them. And so I just want to wish you good health and good luck. And I want to say good luck to Bob McGoff, a basketball mate, and Jack Loscombe who I worked with in the Fire Department when I was a dispatcher; and my new friend, Pat Rogan, good luck to you. And I also want to say thank you, Boyd Hughes, for being an incredible solicitor for the people of this City of Scranton and good health. And good luck to

Nancy Krake, too, for all she did for the people. Good luck.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mayor. Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MS. CARRERA: 5TH ORDER, 5A, MOTIONS.

MS. EVANS: Mr. McGoff, do you have any comments at this time?

MR. MCGOFF: Just very quickly.
When I came on council seven years ago it was under some contentious circumstances and I talked to Mrs.
Evans at that time and I said I knew that we would disagree on many things and she said to me at that time that we will probably agree on more than we will disagree. And over the course of the seven years I have found that to be true and I have treasured and valued the experience that I've had on council with Mrs. Evans as I have had for the past four years with Mr.

Joyce. And I wish them well in the

future. Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Thank you very much.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Councilman Rogan, do you have any comments today?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you. I would like to echo some of Councilman McGoff and some of the speakers. I would also like to wish Mrs. Evans and Mr. Joyce well. It's been a pleasure serving with you on council. We haven't always agreed, we haven't always disagreed but we've always -- all three of us have done our job with passion and done what we thought was right for the people of Scranton. So I wish both of you luck in your future endeavors.

She's really the one person who taught me the inner workings of City Hall and how it works. She knows the city better than almost anyone and, everyone, this was a great four years.

We've had ups and downs but at the end of the day we're all Scrantonians.

And it is a good day for all of us.

So, again, Mrs. Evans and Mr. Joyce, thank you very much for your service.

MS. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. JOYCE: Thank you.

MS. EVANS: Councilman Loscombe, do you have any comments?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I don't know if I have enough time. Again, I'd like to echo the comments of my colleagues, Mr. McGoff and Mr. Rogan. Four years ago my fellow colleagues here had to fill a vacancy when Mr. Courtright was elected to his position and as one of

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the candidates I was in contention with 24 others I believe it was and I really want to thank my colleagues for their unanimous decision to appoint me at that time and I have since successfully run for election at that point. Having never had any political endeavors previously or, you know, really any political background, it's been a real awakening for me and I really, really want to thank Mrs. Evans and to give my colleagues on council but under her leadership as president for her guidance through the four years I've learned quite a bit. And on the workings of, you know, the government and the city here and, you know, everyone here has been an invaluable asset and I continue to learn everyday and I don't know how to thank you for your mentorship over the last four years. You know, it's meant a whole lot to me and I believe that the citizens have seen the service that you have dedicated over the years

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as part of your team here. again, there was sometimes that we don't agree or whatever but I've always used the scenario that, you know, my wife and I have been married for 35 years. I don't know if we agree on half of the things and we'll still together. So it shows that you can disagree, still work together. We all have the thoughts in our hearts with the people that we serve and I can see that dearly and I would hope, you know, you would continue in some way to serve the public or, you know, run for election again. I can go on and on but I do want to thank you for everything.

And my right hand man here, Mr.

Joyce, sitting at my whole tenure here and also a friend. I worked with

Frank's dad. We go back quite a ways, too, and I know he's very proud

Looking down on him at what Frank has done through these years and I think

to them here for those years with me

Frank has a long way to go. He's a young man, he's got a bright future ahead of him. Again, sitting next to him here, I can see the whiz he is with numbers because he's always jotting down as people are speaking different things with the budgets and he's ready with the answers for the numbers. So I do applaud Frank for that part of his service also.

We're losing a great solicitor,
Mr. Hughes. You know, our next
solicitor has some big shoes to follow
along with our new City Clerk. I've
only had the opportunity to work with
them. I know some of my colleagues
have worked with different clerks and
different solicitors but they also
have been part of this whole process,
this whole organization of keeping the
city afloat, keeping us apprised of
what is going on. The clear ways that
Attorney Hughes was able to explains
things to the public, I think that was
a big factor, and I just hope going

forward that those who are filling their shoes will, you know, use them as an example and continue with what's going on here. But, again, I've been proud to serve with everyone on this council. I'm looking forward to serving the new council and working to, you know, bring the city back on track and, you know, without going any further, I thank you all, especially Mrs. Evans, Mr. Joyce, Mr. Hughes, Mrs. Krake from the bottom of my heart. Thank you for everything.

MS. EVANS: Thank you, Mr.

Loscombe. Councilman Joyce, do you
have any comments today?

MR. JOYCE: I do. Good morning,
Scrantonians. Today I will address
you one final time as a member of this
City Council. Over the past four
years it has both been an honor and a
privilege to serve you. To begin
today I'm going to take this time to
recognize and publicly thank some of
the individuals who made it possible

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for me to take on this position four years ago. First, I want to thank my Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Without him, my tenure on Scranton City Council would never have been possible. I want to thank him for blessing me with the opportunity to serve you. I want to thank my father, Frank Joyce. Though he passed away in 1996 a week before my senior year in high school over at Prep, he taught me many lessons that were of paramount value in both running for office and serving as a public official. taught me how to be selfless, how to give the shirt off of your back when others need it. He taught me to be humble and never let success get to my He taught me that no matter where I go in life to never forget where I came from, yes, Bangor Heights in North Scranton. He taught me to be courageous and to never give up no matter what. And last but not least he taught me to fight and stand up for

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what I believe in. I've learned very valuable lessons from him during the first 17 years of my life. I would like to thank my mother, Marie Terrel. Like my father, she also taught me very valuable lessons from an early age. She taught me what it means to care, she taught me the value of hard work and how it pays off and last but not least yet she still managed to earn her college degree having me at the age of 19-years-old and managed to continue onto to graduate school as well. I'm blessed to have such a strong woman as my mother, especially since she put up with me for four years as an earpiece to vent my frustrations about the city and various issues that were faced in some cases and still faces to this day in some instances. I'd like to thank my aunt, Kathy Cavanaugh. Throughout the course of her life she served as the Deputy Director of Communications for former Treasurer Catherine Baker Knoll

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as well as Barbara Hafer and also she served as representative for the Pennsyl vania's Tap 529 Program. She taught me a great deal about politics and about sticking to your beliefs. I'd like to thank my late grandparents, my grandfather, Frank Joyce who taught me about math and how to critically think from the age of My grandfather, Michael Chutna, six. Sr., who taught me about hard work; my grandmother, Anna Joyce, who taught me about empathy, care and compassion; and my grandmother, Pat Lesinsky, who taught me about money and would always get on my case for not going to various senior centers in Scranton enough, all of them which she loved. I would also like to thank other members of my immediate family who have been there for me every step of the way. I'd like to thank my other aunts, Anna Joyce and Kim Marsellos as well as my uncle, Mike Chutna. addition, I'd like to thank my

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brother, Justin, as well as my extended family which consists of many cousins and other family members who are too numerous to mention here. would also like to thank my many friends who had my back when I first decided to run for office. Along with my family and friends, I would like to thank some other individuals that I had the opportunity to work with during my tenure on council as well as during my run for office. First, I'd like to thank our outgoing mayor, Chris Doherty. I would like to thank Mayor Doherty for his services to the We didn't agree on everything, city. however, he was open in working with me and I was open in working with him and we did just that. I worked with the mayor in negotiating concessions on the Supreme Court award which resulted in the city saving nearly 17 million dollars and I've worked with the mayor on a recovery plan and also I worked with the mayor in his

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administration on various lending agreements and budgets.

All members of our office staff did everything they could to get the answer to any question that I had and did everything that they could to make sure that any request that I had from the resident was answered. Finally, I'd like to thank Janet

She believed in me when many others thought that I didn't have a chance to run since I was essentially a political unknown at that time. She also believed that I was an individual that would serve the residents of Scranton with honor, dignity and respect. As a colleague she's taught me a great deal about government through her actions. me, she's always tried her very best to make the tough decisions that had to be made in order to keep the city afloat over the past four years even in the instances where we may not have agreed totally. She's always put people first and out of everyone I have seen in politics I would have to say that she cares for about the residents of this city than anyone I have ever seen.

As well as the individuals that I

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thanked, I would also like to thank the residents of Scranton who voted for me to serve in this office. I'd like to thank the residents who have come to council chambers to voice their opinion regarding various issues. Even if I do not agree with you, believe me, I listened to you and I took everything you said into consideration when making the decisions that I have made during my tenure. I would also like to thank the residents of the city who have not come to council chambers to voice their opinion but spoke to me outside of council chambers. I have listened to you as well and I took everything that you have said to me into consideration when making decisions. I would also like to thank those who have criticized me over the past four You've made me much stronger than I was four years ago. As you can see, I'm very thankful as well as honored and privileged for having the

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opportunity to serve you as a member of City Council over the past four Over the past four years this years. council as a whole has made various accomplishments, many of them I was a Some of the accomplishments part of. that were made over the past four years include but are not limited to, one, restoring a greater level of decorum in council chambers that was present in the past, lowing the bidding thresholds to \$10,000 to give more vendors a chance to engage and providing city services, requiring appointments to boards and commissions to submit a letter of interest or a resume rather than simply voting to appoint them, working with Mayor Doherty to create a recovery plan that was not previously done since 2002, participating in negotiations in regard to the Supreme Court awarding in favor of police and fire union which led to the city saving 17 million dollars, pushing for revenue

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enhancements to lesson the burden of increasing tax rates on homeowners in the city and have come to fruition such as parking tax required to be held for garages, amusement tax, market base revenue opportunities and an enhanced parking meter system, ushering in a new agency to collect delinquent real estate taxes and refuse bills which has resulted in millions of dollars realized for the city, renewing rental registration requirements in an effort to reduce blight and researching into every piece of legislation to insure that residents of Scranton were being well served and researching into contracts to insure that the lowest responsible bidders were chosen. Last but not least the Supreme Court award will need to be I wish our future council members nothing but the best in dealing with the situations that I have just mentioned. I also wish our Mayor Elect Bill Courtright nothing but the best in dealing with these si tuati ons.

As for me and my future, I'm not going away. In addition to my day job as a technical writer and

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instructional designer, I am now Vice President of Greater Scranton Junior Chamber of Commerce or Greater Scranton Jaycees as of this year. the upcoming year and in the future I'll be looking to grow this organization and its environment with the community by promoting benefits that will be beneficial to the general public by serving our senior citizens, children and others. I'll be looking to enhance the organization in its affiliation with the Chamber of Commerce to promote business opportunities as well. I love this city and I love this area. I will still be working hard to make this area a better place. As far as public service aspirations, I will be running for public office again. Future state of affairs and government will decide what office I run for. A subpar leadership will promote leads of a changing agent to better serve the people and make this community a

better place. When I do come back, I can guarantee that I will be stronger than ever. My experiences have taught me a great deal and I expect that my future experiences will teach me even more.

Because I have two often placed them in secondary position to my council duties and responsibilities, I'd like to begin with my family. 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Tomko, and my loving mother and inspiration, Marion Tomko, both of whom were by best friends. I am forever grateful for their love and guidance and I hope I have made them proud.
