MR. MCGOFF: Last week I neglected to mention two things, one very important. I forgot to wish my father a happy birthday, a belated 93rd birthday. My dad who is now in the hospital and struggling a little

bit but nonetheless a belated happy birthday to him.

Also I forgot to mention that two members of the Scranton community, the City of Scranton community ran the Boston Marathon under three hours. For those of you who are unfamiliar with marathon running, under three hours is an exceptional time. I believe that at this point in time there will be members of 5 6 council attending that but that's 7 Monday, May 5th, 7 p.m., at Weston 8 Field, Cinco De Mayo. I don't know if 9 they're margaritas but that might be 10 an extra added attraction. No, they 11 won't. And that was all. 12 MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS PARTICIPATION. 13 14 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. First speaker on this list, Joan Hodowanitz. 15 16 MS. HODOWANITZ: Good evening, 17 council. Joan Hodowanitz, Scranton 18 resident. 19 MR. MCGOFF: Good evening. 20 MS. HODOWANITZ: Item 3-B, Audit 21 Status from Robert Rossi. It's dated 22 April 25th. I was reviewing that 23 document in the Clerk's Office and I 24 noticed that it was just one page. It 25 may have been cutoff. There was no

1 signature block. Went down items one 2 through nine. Do you know if there 3 was more than one page for that 4 document? 5 MR. MCGOFF: I don't have a copy. 6 MS. HODOWANITZ: Miss Reed? 7 MS. REED: Yes, there is. 8 MS. HODOWANITZ: Is there a 9 reason why it wasn't in the review 10 packet? 11 MS. REED: Was it just the top 12 copy? MS. HODOWANITZ: Just the first 13 14 page. MS. REED: It's copied. 15 16 MS. HODOWANITZ: Because you can 17 see it's a fax. It said Page 2 of 18 five pages. Can I see those 19 additional pages maybe next week? 20 MS. REED: Absolutely. Sure. 21 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. Which 22 brings up the whole issue of the 23 audit. According to Mr. Rossi, he was 24 given the status of those items at 25 least as of March 15th. His report

was dated April 24th and he was saying that if I'm to give you an audit by May 31st, I needed this information which suggests to me that, again, the audit is going to be late. How late, I have no idea. But this is very important especially in a financially distressed city such as ours, we need the audit as we go through the budget process. I mean, audits perform many functions, not the least of which is lessons learned, an analysis of last year's budget, and I think you don't want to be wrong two years in a row. So does anyone have an idea of when we might get that budget or that audit finished? If it's not going to be May 31st, how late might it be?

MR. MCGOFF: There's no indication as to when it would be completed.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. Well, traditionally as I've watched these come to meetings, it's been months late and it impacts the preparation of

1	the budget and hopefully we can bring
2	pressure to bear. With the new
3	administration hopefully they're
4	sensitive to the fact that they must
5	apply that information for Rossi to
6	complete the budget and close that
7	loop or we're just going to be
8	performing the same useless drill.
9	MR. MCGOFF: May I? I know that
10	it is the intent of the administration
11	to have the information to the
12	auditors so that the budget or the
13	audit can be completed more
14	expeditiously than in the past.
15	MS. HODOWANITZ: Who in the
16	administration is the point of contact
17	on consolidating
18	MR. MCGOFF: The business
19	administrator.
20	MS. HODOWANITZ: Mr. Bulzoni?
21	MR. MCGOFF: Yes.
22	MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. Thank
23	you.
24	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Les
25	Spindler.

1 MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, 2 council. Les Spindler, resident and 3 homeowner and taxpayer. 4 MR. MCGOFF: Good evening. MR. SPINDLER: I'm concerned 5 6 about several weeks ago you talked 7 about the caucus and the city 8 solicitor and said there's going to be 9 some kind of litigation. 10 MR. MCGOFF: Yes. 11 MR. SPINDLER: Do you have 12 anymore information about that? 13 MR. MCGOFF: Not at this time. 14 MR. SPINDLER: Because I know 15 there's rumors that it might be the 16 city unions? 17 MR. MCGOFF: Please, again, 18 please don't listen to rumors. It is 19 nothing that is eminent. Let's put it 20 that way. 21 MR. SPINDLER: I hope that it's 22 not true. But if this City gets sued 23 again, I'm not -- I've never been an 24 advocate for bankruptcy. I don't 25 think it's a good idea but if the City

gets sued, I don't think that we have a choice. On the other hand, if somebody sues the City and wins, like I don't know where they expect to get the money from because we have no money. Like the old expression, you can't get blood from stone, so.

MR. MCGOFF: But I will say that it had nothing to do with someone suing the city.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay. That's good.

MR. MCGOFF: If that answers your --

MR. SPINDLER: That's good news.

Okay. Okay, the next thing. As
everybody knows that I wrote out again
for a garbage fee bill last week and
they were late which I think I don't
know what happened but I was a little
upset, I mean, we don't have a lot of
time but, you know, I said last year
before the budget was passed that \$300
is way too much. As somebody who has
been out of work full-time for over a

year now, it's hard on me. And I know a 96-year-old woman who lives by herself, puts out one bag of garbage. She has to pay \$300. Where is this woman getting \$300 from? I know there's nothing you can do now but I hope council and the mayor can get together and get some revenue sources and hopefully in the next budget we can lower that garbage fee because it's a big burden on a lot of people in this city. And I own a double house and I have to pay \$600 and it's a big burden. Like I said, for this 96-year-old woman, does anybody up there agree that you think that's fair? I guess by the silence, I guess everybody thinks it's not fair.

MR. ROGAN: I'll answer it and
I -- for a long time I think a per bag
fee because I believe it's more fair.

If you have more garbage, you should
pay more than somebody who has less
garbage.

MR. SPINDLER: Absolutely. I

1 Okay. Moving on. I talked agree. 2 about this problem I have with my 3 property for probably 12 years now and 4 three of you know, two of the council 5 people wouldn't know it but I'll give 6 them a little background. I live on 7 the corner way back when -- I think 8 about 10, 12 years ago they put the 9 handicap accessible corner in. 10 time it rains my property gets 11 flooded. I can't go out my front 12 door. So I'm here to ask the DPW to 13 get that problem fixed. They did fix 14 it in 2010 but it just washed away. 15 It wasn't done properly. Since then 16 as somebody up there would know that 17 the last DPW director was not 18 cooperative in this situation at all. 19 Letters were sent time after time. 20 have copies of them and I gave them to 21 Miss Carrera. So, Councilman Gaughan, 22 you're with DPW? 23 MR. GAUGHAN: Right. If you want 24 to leave your --

MR. SPINDLER: I did. All of the

25

information is in the letters and Miss 1 2 Carrera made copies. 3 MR. GAUGHAN: Right. 4 MR. SPINDLER: It's not all the 5 letters. It's just a few that were 6 sent to Mr. Dougher and the mayor and 7 nothing has been done. 8 MR. GAUGHAN: Okay. I will reach 9 out. 10 MR. SPINDLER: I hope that it can 11 be rectified --12 MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah. I'll pass 13 the request. 14 MR. SPINDLER: The weather being 15 nice, I waved to him and just thought it would nice if he could come and 16 17 talk to him. And I'm sure -- I know 18 Mr. Courtright surrounds himself with 19 a lot of good people. I'm sure the 20 DPW director will be cooperative. I 21 hope he will be. 22 Lastly, Councilman Rogan, last 23 week you talked about the traffic 24 lights and I agree with you, sometimes 25 they're bad. I was thrilled tonight.

I don't know if this was a fluke or what. Coming here from where I live, I came down the expressway all the up Mulberry Street, from Dunkin Donuts to City Hall I hit every green light and I thought of you right away.

MR. ROGAN: It's your lucky day.
But PennDOT is -- they're continuing
to monitor them but we've all gotten
complaints for -- this is going on for
a year now and they have said that
they will continue to monitor and to
make adjustments. I think a simple
solution is you have all green one way
and all red another as bigger cities
do. I guess that causes a problem
with speeders though. That's why they
try to stagger them a little bit.

MR. SPINDLER: I heard you saying that last week.

MR. ROGAN: Right.

MR. SPINDLER: Yeah. I couldn't believe I came up all the way up here and had every green light. All right. That's all I have tonight. Thank you

for your time.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Doug

MR. MILLER: Good evening, council. Doug Miller, Scranton. I'd just to respond to statements that were made last week that, you know, I was quite disturbed by it and I felt rather insulting after I left the meeting during motions. Statements were made by Mr. McGoff, the issue last week that I had addressed with the issues of the swimming pools and how I expressed my dislike with the decision once again not showing a sense of urgency in opening these neighborhood pools, particular down in Pinebrook and over at West Side and the Novembrino pool. We were told by Mr. McGoff that the swimming pools are, quote, a luxury. And, you know, I think that was one of the most insulting statements made here from this chamber that I can remember in a long time.

MR. MCGOFF: Insulting to whom?

MR. MILLER: It was insulting to the residents of the City, Mr. McGoff, that your arrogance as a luxury and it's a luxury. You're right it is a luxury and it's a luxury that you took away by your squandering of our money, the fiscal mismanagement by you and past council, the administration. So you shake your head and continue to insult but, yeah, you're right, it did hurt a lot of people. It was insulting. Okay. This is a luxury that our great grandfathers and forefathers worked their blood, sweat and tears to give us these luxuries, the parks, the pools and you took it away. And I think you owe the children, the seniors and the residents of this community who got their \$300 garbage bill, whose taxes just went up 57 percent, you owe them an apology because they've had to pay their fair share due to your mismanagement and mismanagement of

others. Yeah, you're right. They do deserve a luxury. You know, maybe you benefitted the luxuries and you benefitted giving things in life because you have been successful. There's a lot of unfortunate people in this community that do struggle. You know, Mr. Gaughan hit it on the head last week. There are a lot of people that are poor. This is a very poor community and they rely on these assets that you gave away. You took them away from the children. You did. You're responsible for it. You're responsible for squandering 3.5 million dollars in the golf course proceeds that we've repeatedly addressed that the interest was specifically used for parks and recreation. You spent that. Nobody else. No, it isn't wrong. It's right. It was perpetually put in a trust fund, it was brought by residents of this community -- yes, it most certainly was, Mr. McGoff, and

you took it away when the golf course was sold to Mr. DeNaples, another asset that we sold. So to have the audacity to sit there and insult me and the residents of this community and allow the seniors and the kids now to swelter in the heat once again because you took their luxury away, you should hold your head in shame. But I've been working with the Pinebrook neighborhood group and I'm glad it's comical, I really am. I'm glad it's comical that you took a luxury away from the children and the seniors and all those hardworking people that have paid their fair share through the years. I'm glad it's comical. But since it's comical to you, it isn't comical to me and that's why I'm bringing in an expert, Mr. Greg Herbster, who if we can recall years ago was the Director of Parks and Recreation. He knows those pools like the back of his hand.

MR. MCGOFF: I know him well.

MR. MILLER: That's good. I'm going to bring him in and he's going to look at the pools and we're going to get to the bottom line to determine once and for all what repairs need to be made so that each year we're not going back and forth playing this critical thinking game like it's such, you know, a big deal to determine what repairs need to be made, that we're that incapable of managing our simple assets. And I understand people will talk about that at this critical time the City has a lot of other issues going on that take priority particularly on finances but these are little things that need to be addressed and we have the ability to take care of the little things, let alone the massive things. And that's sad and pathetic. It really is. I'm working with the Pinebrook neighborhood group, Mr. Chilipko and her group and others who have reached out and we are working on some things

so that next year at this time the children do have the pools and their luxury is given back to them and it's not taken away from ignorant people who have no respect for anybody but themselves. So, you know, there's a lot of things. As far as Nay Aug Park goes, the five dollar fee, this council needs to ask that question. understand the Authority, they determine what goes on but this council needs to send a letter to make it quite clear that five dollars is absolutely ludicrous. You know, the residents of this City have taken beating after beating after beating with no sympathy whatsoever because they're the ones that are constantly left out hanging to dry and everything -- every burden is put on them but I can let everybody know tonight that I'm working hard with others who are concerned and I know with the smirk it's funny but I take pride in it and I'm not going to stop

until these pool do open and there's a lot of other people out there that were quite insulted by the statements that have come forward and they're going to work diligently to see that this happens and with Mr. Herbster coming in and looking at them who knows more about those pools than anybody that can be brought in and I look forward to the day that we get our luxury back. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Dave Dobzyn.

MR. DOBZYN: Good evening. Dave Dobzyn, resident of Scranton. Okay.

Last week we mentioned about the running race, the marathon and how it brought people in and I'd like to point out and request that Steamtown, that you send some kind of letters in support of Steamtown to our representatives in Washington. It brings in a minimum per train ride 300 people into the city and they stop at restaurants and it was the Mall at

Steamtown at one time. Now. the mall is up in the air. We don't know what's going to happen to it. But I have seen people shopping there and it's a real interesting experience and there's a lot of static displays and stuff so to see and it's very educational. So, please, consider a letter to our representatives and senators on Steamtown. They've been cut back 20 percent over two years and they were never raised in a day the place opened, they got 5.2 million dollars and it never increased from 1994. I'm happy to see that upper Hickory Street is paved and I'm on lower Hickory Street and it's been milled. Jack, please, don't let the gas company or the Sewer Authority know. Okay? And that was brought up to you on TV land.

MR. LOSCOMBE: We'll try.

MR. DOBZYN: Okay. We need to start to focus on delinquent collections with some of those trash

bills, former trash bills -- I mean, if somebody owes it now it's one thing but owing it for five years or whatever, that's insufferable. Ιt should be paid. And once again I'd like to see council get a little more active at a lot of these state representatives on issues. For instance, a local issue, our taxes went up. Well, guess what, unless you spend in excess of \$12,200 per couple, you cannot claim your property taxes on your income tax. The guy that has a 20 million dollar mortgage, he can claim his interest, he can claim his taxes. But you can't because you live within your means and that's ridiculous. Now, they just turned that around about two years ago with that sequester business and the small guy is the guy that got the hit. got -- it amounts to ten cents deduction on income tax, interest mortgage, interest rate or anything like that; charitable deductions,

forget about it. It's money out of your pocket. Everybody calls me says it's tax deductible. Well, guess It's not. I'll give it to you what? anyway but it's not tax deductible. I get in their face about it. And once again I'd like to mention that our Chamber of Commerce is creating a commercial property bubble and it's going on nationally and it's got to That's why several businesses stop. have moved out of the city and that's why the mall is in the shape it's in. We just have too much commercial properties being built and it's good for a few trade unions or whatever but it does nothing for us except to have people jumping back and forth. You don't even know where they're at anymore and I have better things to do than to freeze my buns off and going up on Montage Mountain. You know, it's like I don't have to walk through the weather with the mall. And, okay, the golden parrot goes to Jenny Beth

1 Martin, Tea Party darling. She makes 2 more than the president. She gets 400 3 grand a year, turns over five percent 4 to the candidates and the rest of the 5 money goes to the consultant fees and 6 what have you, family -- probably 7 family members or who knows. So she 8 gets the golden parrot and don't 9 forget to call your congressman and 10 tell them to scrap the Transpacific 11 Trade Pact because we have enough joblessness to go around. Thank you 12 13 and have a good night. 14 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone 15 else who wishes to address council? 16 Don't fight. 17 MR. MORGAN: Good evening, 18 council. 19 MR. MCGOFF: Good evening. 20 MR. MORGAN: In regards to the 21 pools, I hope there could be a spirit 22 of cooperation between the council and 23 the mayor in letting an independent 24 individual come in and look at this, 25 the state of the pools and try to find

a solution to the problem. In the community maybe we can raise some money somehow with some fundraisers or some of the community block, grant money to be released to make these pools function and I just hope that council would pass that message to the mayor and really I think we can get a lot done if we determine we're going to work together.

The other question I have is I guess it goes to you, Mr. Loscombe, if that's all right, Mr. McGoff. What's going to happen with the firemen when the grant money runs out?

MR. LOSCOMBE: It's still in discussion. You know, we may end up going into more brown outs again. It depends. We haven't worked on a budget for next year. We're still hoping for, you know, a continuation or the new safer grant that hasn't been awarded yet. It's been applied for but there's still a lot of variables at this point.

MR. MORGAN: Okay. And, Mr.

Wechsler, I just have one question and I know you don't have the answer tonight but just out of the sake of my own curiosity. If we were to take a look at the city's complete debt, including all the authorities, all the money that goes to all these different sources, what would the debt be per residence, you know, per structure in the city if that was broken down. just like to -- I was just wondering if that would be a number that you can come up with and, you know, I've talked with some people in the city in the last little period of time here and they're just -- I don't know how to really say without -- I don't want to be critical but there's just really not much left that the people in the city can give and really there's nothing left for us to give and I just think that maybe we should really consider if the state of the condition of the city is because the residents

of this city have been overtaxed for decades, and we can all talk about how taxes should be move up incrementally over a course of time and a period of time but I just think that we need to find some real solutions here. many people are just screaming like they're asking why we just don't rollover and go bankrupt or name a receiver. They don't know what we're going to do with our pensions. These people are just -- they've had it. I mean, they've just lost all faith in city government. And, of course, they have problems with other parts of government but, you know, I just hope that council, the five members of council and the mayor can come together and I still believe that the best course of action for this city at this time for a future to start building a future together is to introduce SAPA and pass it because we have to find a new road to travel and the road we've been on for a long time

has been unproductive. And we can keep voting against everything but sooner or later we have to regionally come together and move together to do one thing, create jobs, and people who come from outside the city to work here will spend money here and the residents will earn money here and they will invest their money here. We've played a lot of games. Look at the North Scranton project. They're waiting to see what HUD is going to I mean, look it, everybody is at the public trough and we need to move in a new direction and I hope that council could understand that SAPA is an avenue of approach that is disparately necessary for this city and I think it's time that we put all politics together. And just end this I'd say, Mr. Loscombe, don't you think that really we could use some revenue to make sure that we have fire protection and police protection and that the City is actually functioning

and can we really lose anything by trying a new direction and giving it a chance? Give it some thought and maybe you'll bring it up and you'll pass it, the mayor will sign it and we'll have a plan to start proceeding. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. UNGUARSKY: Good evening, city council.

MR. MCGOFF: Good evening, Mr. Unguarsky.

MR. UNGUARSKY: I'm Tom Unguarsky and I've coming to these meetings longer than any of you have been on city council and I've seen what happens when a council doesn't investigate, ask questions and debate what's on the agenda. Tonight you're taking from the table for a financial advisor. Now, anybody in business knows that when they hire someone, he has to make them a living, he has to make his living, plus a profit for the employer. I hope tonight you will

tell us what we can expect from this advisor. I can't understand why you're taking this from the table when you have someone, Mr. Amerola, who is going to give you some free advice.

Why can't you wait until Mr. Amerola comes in with his advice and then see what you're going to do. I hope you know what this advisor is going to cost you. He should at least earn what we're going to pay him in some kind of a savings. And I thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MS. SHUMACHER: Good evening.

Marie Shumacher.

Now, tonight in the caucus it was mentioned that PFM representatives were at a city meeting so I can assume that the answer to my first question about that contract that I -- the proposed contract that I raised last week that, in fact, they have been performing pre

So they 11 12 have, in fact, been pre contractural 13 since March? 14 MR. MCGOFF: Yes. MS. SCHUMACHER: Terms and 15 16 conditions may be supplemented. Ιs 17 this with or without the approval of 18 council? 19 MR. MCGOFF: If you would give me 20 a moment. I'm just looking for the 21 e-mail that has Mr. Bulzoni's 22 response. If you would -- I will find 23 the answers. I have too many e-mails. 24 That's the problem. 25 MS. SCHUMACHER: I was going to

1 make that suggestion but what the 2 heck. Got it? 3 MR. MCGOFF: Second question, is 4 that what it was Article 1-11? MS. SCHUMACHER: No. Article 5 6 III, terms and conditions. If you're stating 1-11, they were Roman numerals 7 8 so it would appear to be -- could 9 be -- appeared to be 1-11. 10 MR. MCGOFF: Okay. Article III, 11 Mr. Bulzoni said that this is standard 12 contractual language and does not 13 require modification. 14 MS. SCHUMACHER: That doesn't 15 answer my question which was that the 16 terms and conditions may be 17 supplemented, will those supplements 18 come before council or will they not? 19 I understand terms and conditions. 20 mean, I understand things change 21 throughout the life of the contract 22 but --23 MR. MCGOFF: I do not know. I do 24 not know. 25 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Article 9

states that the City's liability is limited to appropriations approved for this effort. As stated by Mr. McGoff, there is no appropriation for this effort for 2014, nor is it possible to appropriate forward until a proposed budget is received from the mayor and approved by council for next year. So this is a contractural item that is impossible to execute and a dangerous liability for the taxpayers obligating appropriations outside the context of the entire budget is not a good practice.

MR. MCGOFF: PFM on Page 16 of the proposal says that we understand that the City may be under pressure in 2014, therefore, we are willing to defer any hourly compensation until 2015 which, I think, is reasonable.

MS. SCHUMACHER: But then there is no -- still no appropriation and they're -- you are committing to an appropriation and what have they spent for the last two months since they've

1 been working for two months? I mean, 2 at what rate are they burning through 3 this money? 4 MR. MCGOFF: I don't know that 5 they're burning through anything and I 6 don't know how many hours they have been working. 7 8 MS. SCHUMACHER: I would like us 9 to check into that. 10 MR. MCGOFF: Payments being 11 deferred to 2015 is, I believe, good 12 practice for us. 13 MS. SCHUMACHER: I don't think 14 it's good practice because we don't 15 have a budget for next year. You're 16 obligating money for next year's 17 budget that's a big chunk probably out 18 of the -- out of the budget and then 19 what else gives? Does anything else 20 give or are we going to -- I'd like to 21 go through the rest of these since a 22 lot of my time was spent going through 23 your e-mail. Okay? 24 MR. MCGOFF: Go ahead. 25 MS. SCHUMACHER: There is no

1 fixed transaction fee. The No. 2 2 person or No. 2 company did have --3 provide a transaction fee and I think 4 that's very important as well. So --5 MR. MCGOFF: There is no -- the 6 response is no fixed transaction fee. 7 The fees are stated in the proposal 8 and we have the ability to limit the 9 amount of effort in any of the 10 initiatives. 11 MS. SCHUMACHER: I'm sorry. 12 Could you read amount of effort. 13 Somebody coughed and I didn't hear it 14 after that. Sorry. 15 MR. MCGOFF: We have the ability 16 to guide the process by limiting the 17 amount of time on any issue. 18 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. 19 Deferment, oh, well, I already did 20 that one. The analyst hourly rate 21 disconnect was mentioned by Joan the 22 week before. In one place it was 23 stated as \$275 an hour per analyst and 24 in another it was stated as \$225 per 25 hour. Which is it?

MCGOFF: Don't assume 10 anything because somebody doesn't 11 speak. 12 MR. ROGAN: Don't assume that. 13 MR. JACKOWITZ: Pardon me? 14 MR. MCGOFF: That would be 15 improper. 16 MR. ROGAN: Mr. Jackowitz, I 17 spoke on that under motions and I 18 support the pools being open and I 19 actually also mentioned that I believe 20 that Nay Aug should be under the city, 21 not the Recreation Authority. 22 MR. WECHSLER: And we also are 23 attending the meeting on Monday night 24 so please don't assume what my opinion 25 is.

1 MR. JACKOWITZ: Well, I'm not 2 assuming. I'm just stating what a 3 fact that I believe. I'm not assuming 4 anything. 5 MR. MCGOFF: Well, you made an 6 assumption. MR. JACKOWITZ: No, no, I didn't. 7 8 But anyway we've been fighting this 9 battle for pools over years and years 10 and years. I have a question. A 11 returning veteran, let's say a veteran 12 coming back from Iraq or from 13 Afghanistan, he's been out defending 14 the country and the people of this 15 country, do you think their children 16 should be allowed to swim when they 17 come back to Scranton? Mr. Wechsler? 18 MR. WECHSLER: I believe everyone 19 should have free swimming but the 20 reality is there's a cost to it. 21 MR. JACKOWITZ: Mr. Rogan? MR. ROGAN: I believe it should 22 23 be free. 24 MR. JACKOWITZ: Mr. Loscombe? 25 MR. LOSCOMBE: I concur with Mr.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay. Are the 1 2 children in the City of Scranton 3 responsible for the financial distress 4 that the city has been in over 8,000 5 days? Are they responsible for it? 6 Or are the elected officials, past 7 mayors, past city council members, are they the ones who made the decisions 8 9 to squander the money and waste the 10 money? We keep hearing about our 11 financial situation. My question is, 12 are the children of the City of 13 Scranton responsible for that? Would 14 anybody like to answer that? 15 MR. MCGOFF: You're asking 16 something that really can't be 17 answered. 18 MR. JACKOWITZ: Why can't it be 19 answered? Someone's responsible. 20 you saying no one is responsible? The 21 votes that city councilmen have made 22 in the past are not responsible? 23 MR. MCGOFF: You want me to 24 answer? 25 MR. JACKOWITZ: Go ahead.

1 MR. MCGOFF: If some child goes 2 and defaces the pool house at Connell 3 Park, yes, they are responsible. 4 MR. JACKOWITZ: Exactly. If they 5 do vandalism a 100 percent. 6 MR. MCGOFF: Okay. So you've asked. 7 8 MR. JACKOWITZ: Does that mean 9 that they're denied the opportunity 10 because our past mayors and city 11 council members made ridiculous votes 12 and squandered all the money and 13 wasted it and now we use as an excuse 14 to the fact that the city is financial 15 strapped. We've been financially 16 strapped for 22 years, over 8,000 days for God's sakes. We go through this 17 18 every year. Nothing ever gets 19 resolved and then we get a comment 20 that swimming is a luxury in the City of Scranton, you know. 21 22 MR. MCGOFF: It's a personal 23 belief. 24 MR. JACKOWITZ: I tell you it 25 sure offended a lot of people.

mean, I don't know if you guys go out and talk to the people in the City of Scranton but I'll tell you what, most people in the city are totally Not only are they disgusted. disgusted with city government, they're disgusted with county government and state government and federal government. Because people who going to work and they're not making any money because all the money is going to be paid to taxes. then we're told that our children can't swim because it's a luxury. totally disagree with that statement and I think -- I know it was an insult to me, especially being a veteran and I think it was an insult to lot of other veterans who go out there and defend. They defend the right for their children to go out and have the opportunity to swim on a 92 degree Now, if we're going to be fair about all this, then none of pools in the City of Scranton should be open

and that should also be Nay Aug Park unless the City is willing to run a shuttle service throughout all the neighborhoods and shuttle the children to the pools that are open. Otherwise, all the pools should be closed because it's not fair for the children who live in neighborhoods whose pools are closed by South Side, West Scranton and the Pinebrook It's not fair to those section. children. So I really think someone should look into this, get with whoever you need, the mayor, Parks and Recreation and see if we can set up a shuttle or some kind of service so that the children can have at least the opportunity to go swim because it's not a luxury.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone else care to address council?

MS. LEWIS: Good evening,
council. Debbie Lewis, West Scranton.
Haven't been here in awhile and I just
have a few loose ends so I'm kind of

jumping all over the place here. I concur by the way with Mr. Jackowitz' idea. I think if we're going to close pools which I am not totally dismissive of your opinion either, Mr. McGoff. I understand. I do believe they are a luxury but it's a luxury that has become somewhat of a tradition in Scranton, and I think that's where a little bit of, you know, feeling that we have come to feel we deserve.

MS. LEWIS: Right. Well, I sense that you probably don't. But I do also think that if we are going to close them, we have to be fair minded about it and equitable. And if we're going to leave one or two open, we should provide some kind of transportation, shuttle, maybe even twice a week. You know, just to give those children that don't have a pool within walking distance. And if we

can't afford that, then we really should consider, like I said, being fair across the board and shutting all of them down. I know it's hard to take but it's just unfair that you get a certain amenity by virtue of where you live in the city and other people that pay just as much do not receive it. So that's my little two cents on the pools. Other loose ends I have.

First I want to say really quickly hello to my neighbor. She encourages me occasionally to come and speak and if it wasn't for her presence in my block of West Scranton, I don't think I would even be there. So she's a long time West Scranton person, same residence for, I think, over 50 years and I appreciate her presence in my block.

Now, onto the actual points that I'd like to make tonight. Generally speaking I get the impression watching council that I don't sense urgency.

And it's not even a matter of not

having urgency now that we're in this financial situation, pressing situation but I don't sense urgency almost ever in Scranton government Maybe I'm not picking up officials. on it. But I know that I personally, if I lived in a city and I was an elected official right now representing Scranton in any capacity, I would feel and want to project a sense of urgency. I would be coming to these meetings with my sleeves rolled up. That's -- because I feel we need -- we have a lot on our plate and I think if we're going to overcome them that what we're facing, we really need to start rolling up our sleeves and getting down to brass tacks. That's just my personal feeling on the temperament or the demeanor that I sense.

Other than that, I wanted to talk briefly. Councilman Rogan had an idea about the boys clubs and lifeguards and stuff. Good idea. I thought it

This week we received the 13 Single Tax Office City funds 14 distributed comparison for 2014 15 against 2013. This would be for the 16 month ending April 30th, 2014. As you 17 may know, the total real estate tax 18 for the city was budgeted at about 28 19 million dollars. That's a combination 20 of a couple of different things. 21 date about 19 million dollars has been 22 collected of that, represents about 70 23 percent of the total. A number that 24 struck me was that it's a plus seven 25 million dollars from this period last

year.

On the other side, the business privilege tax is currently about \$100,000 behind from last year. This is a bit concerning to me and also to members of the administration and actually it's because of some of the things that we've seen happening in the city where businesses have either closed or left the city.

In addition, I have requested and reviewed -- I actually received this today a report from Berkheimer

Associates containing information about the amount of wage taxes that have been collected in the first quarter of 2013. Like I said, I just received it today and I am going to sit down with Treasurer Wayne Beck and the Business Administrator Dave

Bulzoni to get their input and views on where we are and where we should be at.

And other information from the Business Administrator's Office, due

to an illness of a very key person in that department, we are experiencing some delays in generating some reports that are necessary for us to function with our financial people and also with PEL. So the City has reached out to a former employee and treasurer of Scranton, the person's name is Doug Doug is going to work on a part-time basis in the Business Administrator's Office. He is going to be paid a fee of \$25 per hour. is going to try to limit his hours to five hours per week and right now the amount of money that has been allocated to this will be capped at about \$10,000 coming out of our professional services.

In other news, I agree with some of the comments tonight. I wish things were moving faster also in the city. I'm only here five months.

I've been active in the city for 20 years. And I can tell you things just don't move fast. Everywhere we go, we

get the same frustration. When is something going to happen. I can only tell you this and I've stated this before and people are tired of me saying this. The administration, including the mayor and his people, this council, our office, we're working everyday and we're making progress everyday gaining information. I'm kind of looking at this, you know, we were handed a budget for 2014, we're working with it. The pools, you know, that was kind of handed to us. A lot of things we're working with them and trying to make them the best they are for 2014. In my role as finance chair, a lot of people think I should be saying a lot more. I'm actually looking at numbers for 2015. There's not much that I can do as finance chair right now. There really isn't. I can report information as I get it. To the information that we're getting and, you know, we spoke about this is the budgeting process is a

year long thing. We don't want to get into a situation and I'm not sure if this happened or not but it always appeared that way that everything was done at crunch time. Crunch time for me is going to start when we have six months of information in, we have the true numbers that we can track estimates against the true values and start going from there. And that's, you know, for me that's how I plan on doing my job as finance chair.

Some of the other comments that were made, I go to neighborhood meetings every week. I'm a strong neighborhood person. When we talk about positive people, they're in the neighborhood associations. Last night I attended a meeting of the Oakmont Association on the other -- up by Lake Scranton. Oakmont is a kind of a curious neighborhood because it's entering a stage now where the original residents are reaching time for them to sell their homes and there

is a huge influx of young families who have made the decision to live in Scranton because of the benefits and the things that we have. To me that is a major sign of -- the city, itself, the government, we're having our problems. But the neighborhoods and the people of Scranton, they get it and they're working towards it. There's a new president at Oakmont by the name of Mike Kelly. I turn 55 on Friday so I call these guys young guys now. But he's a young guy, he's a father and he became active in his neighborhood association just because he saw the need and that's what we need. If you have a meeting, we can attend. I would encourage anybody that wants us to attend. We -- when I say we, all this council, we're not afraid of

I don't have a problem with somebody who disagrees with me doing something that they don't think I'm doing right because I'm only on this job four months. It takes a long to get your feet wet. You know, the hardest thing you do is fight to get elected and then you get the job and then you say, What am I going to do? And that's

kind of what we're getting our feet wet.

In terms of the swimming pools, myself, I am attending the rec meeting on Monday night just to get the feedback on what's going on down there. I'll be honest with know, you know, I don't know. I don't have small children anymore. I don't go to those pools anymore. But like I said, the sense of urgency, we have. It may not appear because I don't want to run around like my hair is on fire. I want to work on the job, get information and proceed in the best way possible for the City. Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Just two very brief items. It was reported in the paper regarding the first meeting that was held through our OECD Office reaching out to the community on prioritizing how federal funds are spent. If you haven't already, I

encourage you to check out the City's website, it's www.scrantonpa.gov, print out the survey and fill it in, get it into the City to let your voice be heard.

And I wasn't planning on commenting on the pool again but just because there was such -- it was brought up by so many speakers. reiterate my decision on the swimming. I believe that the children of the City of Scranton should swim for free. Their parents, when they come to the pools, they should have to pay. The children from outside of Scranton should have to pay. But children and residents who are taxpayers do not have to pay. When I was a kid, I would go to the Novembrino all the time and it was one year we paid a dollar and the next year it was free but it was never a five dollar fee and the pool was always open. And it breaks my heart that the kids in my neighborhood, in West Side don't have

a place to swim which is somewhere where I spent a lot of my summers as a kid, there, and West Side Little League right down the way. But I hope moving forward and as Mr. Wechsler mentioned, the current administration is dealing with previous mayor's budget and what was put in there for pools was put in and there was very little communication between that administration and City Council. Ιt was just the way it was. Luckily things are much better on the communication front now but I really think that the City needs to find partners to open up these pools. I don't think it's something that can be done solely on the back of the taxpayer. I think it has to be partnerships, stores, nonprofits, through the school district, through neighborhood organizations and they want to help. You know, I firmly believe that instead of approaching our nonprofits for a cash check and

with taxes, it's a much easier sell to say, well, you know, your nonprofit is located in the Hill Section, would you like to give a donation of X amount that will be go specifically for the Hill Section and if you do that in each area where these nonprofits are, I think they would be much more willing to help when they see the result. If we can go with plans to see, well, you know, we'll pave three roads in this neighborhood with this money instead of just write us a check and it will go to the general fund, I think we would be a lot more successful in pursuing pilots in that manner. And also the pools, sponsorships. I know we've talked about it before on council. I think it's something that really would work. It would be nice to have the Wells Fargo Novembrino Complex or whoever would like to sponsor or a variety of sponsors, even do it on rotating on a weekly basis to have those in the

community to help pay for the swimming instead of the taxpayers. But it is something that it's nice that the kids in the City should have in the summers and I believe one of the speakers summed it up perfectly, it's not a right but it's a tradition in the city and it's something that should continue and we should do everything we can to see that the children have a place to swim. So that's all I have for today.

MR. MCGOFF: If I can just add to that. We hired a group to solicit advertising what we refer to as NBRO's. Pools would be a great place for advertising as Mr. Rogan said. I would encourage this company that we have hired through -- you know, that the City has hired to pursue that.

And you said, the Wells Fargo Pool or, you know, Gerrity's pool or whatever it is, a great idea. That needs to be pursued.

MR. ROGAN: And I think a perfect

Example of that is if you go to any
Little League field in the City on the
back fence are all different
advertisements for different
businesses, nonprofits, stores,
something along those lines or if you
want to have just one gold sponsor and
only that one name is put there for a
very large dollar amount or a bunch of
smaller donors like the Little Leagues
do and I know they're very successful
in raising fund on an annual basis
with those sponsorships. And that's
all.

We received a letter last week regarding parking in the 300 block of Dupont Court which is directly behind the Mulberry Apartments, the old Chamber building and that's the only access to the parking lot, 53 parking spaces for Management Enterprises building there.

And I'm not going to sit here badgering an individual or anything like that. I have to say and I think those that have seen me over the years, I'm closely aligned with Mr. Rogan on this issue. In fact, we've gone to neighborhood meetings in Pinebrook and we've been working and actually Mr. Miller mentioned it. have actually been in contact with Mr. Herbster who is working with us on some issues but the big factor is we had money in the ComD funding for that pool and it's eliminated but we were able to keep I believe it was \$45,000 towards the repairs. Is that enough? We're still working on it. disappointed that the administration came out with a letter they don't have any intention on opening the pools

this year? I definitely am. haven't had a chance to sit down with the mayor yet but we have been working on issues like Mr. Rogan said on advertising and working with the neighborhood organizations and businesses to get this up to speed. The problem is and I know we sit here every week and like some of the speakers say, they run into people on the street and they're complaining and nothing is being done and this and that. It's hard to sit here because we know there's a lot being done. There's a lot we can't broadcast yet, but the pieces of the puzzle are being put together. In my four years on council I have had more e-mails, personal phone calls and meetings with the administration in this last three months than I did in the previous four I find that commendable because it's open. Yes, we're going to have mistakes, we're going to have problems, but I'm just asking for my prospective, I'm very optimistic with what's been going on. The unfortunate thing is some of us here, most of us, you know, have a full-time occupation so we try and get to every meeting that we can or every, you know, again, we're in contact. If we're not at a meeting with someone for the administration, we're forwarding the

information so everyone is in the loop. I think we're all working hard to straighten out the finances of this city, straighten out the finances, then we can straighten out the different departments. But there are a lot of little things that crop up in between, the usuals, the potholes, the, you know, signs and a little bit of everything. Now, we get into the summer season, you have people complaining about barbecue grills and loud music an stuff like that. seasonal thing. But I think this administration is adapting to, you know, what's been going on. It is a hard process. There's a lot of mess out there. And I think given some of the moves that have been done, I think in the long run people will be happy. Was I happy we had to raise the taxes? Definitely not. I took a big hit on Was I happy with the garbage them. fee? Not at all. I mean, it's some hard decisions but by making those

decisions now we have a financial communities looking at us seriously and saying, you know, this City does want to move ahead. This administration, these councilmen are working together to move ahead. They're working together, we have to work together, we have to look at the future. And, you know, you can disagree with me and Mr. Wechsler mentioned a letter he received. mean, get used to it, Joe, because they come in regularly. I had a woman send me a letter because I didn't wear a tie one night so she upset with that. But we do have a lot of big issues. There's a ton of little issues and we're trying to get to all of them at the same time. But I have to tell you, I mean, we know that we're on the verge of not prosperity but straightening things out. We're getting some people to believe in us and I see that. And I just hope everyone is patient with us and with

the administration. Who knows, maybe in two years I'll be bashing the administration but, you know, if things go sour for some reason. But right now I cannot, you know, I have nothing but good things to say with what I have seen going on. And it's not just one person getting information. Everybody is in the same loop. And all I see is progress for all of us. So I'm just hopeful that we all work together and we all start to have a positive feeling about this. I know the tax hurt, the garage fee hurts a lot of elderly. I have a mother who lives alone, I know it. But, you know, if we grit our teeth and get through this, I'm confident we have better days ahead of us. know, we can attract business and stuff like that. Like Mr. Lee Morgan mentioned SAPA. You know, one time I was against SAPA. I haven't reviewed the newest plans. There was a different circumstance back then. Ι

really don't know how it's going to benefit us totally because people cannot be forced to move their business to Scranton or anything like that but I am definitely open minded and willing to give it another look and, you know, if it's going to benefit us a little bit with their latest plans, I'm definitely open to it. You know, things can change over the years. But I just want to say I am hopeful. I am optimistic and, you know, it is hard sitting here sometimes and then listening to -- and don't get me wrong, everyone has a valid, valid argument, valid concern because I mumble those same arguments myself so. But we have to bite our tongue because we see a lot more that is going on and knowing that there are things coming up in the future that I think will benefit us all but they can't be broadcast for fear of destroying the opportunities. So, please, all I ask is to be patient

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes. Thank you. Just a few items. First, I would like to thank the DPW for taking care of a large overturned stump that was creating a problem for residents and blocking the sidewalk in the 900 block of Monroe Avenue. They have been very responsive and I thank them for that.

I have received numerous complaints about the bottom of Cherry Street as you turn onto South Washington Avenue going over the railroad tracks. The DPW blacktopped the one side of that street and did a great job but the other side is still in pretty rough shape and this is a heavily traveled road so I will be reaching out to our DPW director to see if we can eventually rectify the other side of that street.

On the pool situation I requested

last week that council receive a report from the administration of the condition of each City pool, what upgrades are needed and the estimated costs of these upgrades. Just to get us all up to speed on that issue. received a letter. We all received a letter today from Mr. Tom Lynch, the Recreation Specialist. He says, "Gentlemen, per your request, Weston Field and Weston Park pools will be opening this season. If any funding is needed, we will contact the Weston Foundation at PNC Bank. Connell Park pool had extensive repairs done in 2013 with grant money and was opened and will be opening in 2014. maintenance repairs can be paid with any remaining 2013 grant funds. Novembrino Pool Complex will not open Hopefully with grant this year. funding we will be able to open it in 2015. Penn Ridge Pool, also known as Capouse Pool in Pinebrook has grant funding allotted for it but will not

open in 2014 due to time restraint and site analysis. The two pools at Nay Aug Park are under the Scranton Municipal Recreation Authority and will be open in 2014. If you have any further questions, please do not hesitate to contact me. Very truly yours, Thomas P. Lynch, the Recreation Specialist for the City." So that is the response that we have received on the City pools for this summer. And I thank him for the response.

The streets sweeping schedule, the DPW scheduled to be in the West Scranton area, Oram Street to Washburn Street from May 5th to May 9th which will be next week.

I had an interesting meeting today with members of the administration, Lesley Collins from Scranton Tomorrow and a representative from KKPR marketing which is employed through contract by the City. I actually saw this idea in a magazine I just happened to, you know, I almost

looked at it by accident. It's called I-City and what it is is it's an application or an app for your phone if you have a smartphone or an I-phone or an Android phone. And what the company does or what they would do for the City if we were to keep exploring this is we would have a City of Scranton app. So you would download it on your phone. What the app would provide would -- it would promote community engagement involvement and tourism. It would promote economic development, organize business listings, connect residents and merchants, increase local sale and trade and it would keep commerce local. The really cool thing about this and the interesting thing is if, for instance, the City has a emergency like we had a few months ago when we had a water main break in South Side, this, if you had this app on your phone, it would send you -- we would have the control in City Hall to send

your realtime notification, a push notification that would come up on your phone and tell you exactly what was going on. Do not go up this street, it's blocked. There's a water main break, we will be getting service back in such and such hours. There's a number of different things from listening to the presentation from members of I-City as I did today that I think would not only spur economic development but it would increase civic engagement between our local government here in Scranton and the So this is in the infancy residents. phase but it is something that I think would be a great idea. The administration is going to look at it and I will continue to update my fellow members of council and the residents of Scranton as we continue to hopefully move forward on this project. And that is all I have tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Briefly,

as Mr. Gaughan stated, the pools in Scranton this summer are not going to be closed. The pools that were open last year, last summer will be again opened this summer. And we are pursuing or the City is pursuing an attempt to rectify the problems at Novembrino and at the Capouse Avenue pool. The problem is as it was last year that extensive repairs are needed at both and added expense if they were to open and at this point in time the City doesn't see it as feasible to make those repairs or have the funds to make those repairs and to open those two pools. As far as my comment that swimming is a luxury, my wife yelled at me as well for making that statement. I have believed that for awhile. And all I mean by that is that if the City is going to spend money, there are priorities. And I would think that at the bottom of that priority list are swimming pools. there's -- if you're going to ask me

to provide revenue for things that I feel are needed, you know, public safety and where do we get it, one of first things I would say is let's consider, you know, closing pools or closing parks or, you know, the things that I deem are, you know, and I'll again use the term, luxury. I grew up at South Side pool which is now McNichol's Plaza. My kids, you know, went swimming at Nay Aug. Swimming is a nice thing in the summer and I'm glad that we have pools. I'm glad that we have the pools that we do. Ι would never do anything that would deliberately deny or close these pools. And, in fact, even though I was accused of closing them, we have made every attempt even in the past to keep pools open and we'll continue to do so. And even though I may feel that, you know, it's an expense, I've never vote to necessarily close a pool or to deny anybody the right to go, you know, to these pools. But enough

said on that and we will continue to pursue, you know, the situation with pools and with the parks, you know, throughout the city.

There was also a question about maybe I should say this until legislation but about PFM and their contract and PFM is being hired to perform a very distinct function, very distinct from what Mr. Amoroso is doing. Mr. Amoroso was hired to analyze and to provide a plan or ideas for dealing with our financial situation. The role that PFM will play is in negotiation of the finances or the financing of implementing that plan. That's what they do. They are distinct in their purposes. Most cities have financial planners or whatever title you want to give them and that is the function they will perform. We have a lot of negotiations to do in order to deal with the financial situations that we have. And that will be the function

of PFM along with the, you know, the City administration.

And again reiterate what everyone else has said, this administration is working very hard at the problems that the City faces. And while you may not see the results everyday, believe me, things are moving forward and hopefully we begin to see some of the fruits of the labor that has been put into it. And that is all I have.
