20	Do any council members have
21	announcements? I would like to make mention
22	of the two things, first on the agenda there
23	are two pieces of legislation that will be
24	taken from the table and placed into Seventh
25	Order. They are the subject of the two

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public hearings held prior to the meeting.

Also, I would like to make note that we did take from our agenda for this week legislation dealing with leases of the little league and baseball fields in West Scranton. I just want to make note that there have been some rumors that somehow the administration and city council were somehow involved in giving these leases inappropriately to people and that we were depriving some children of playing on these fields. That is totally untrue.

What had taken place is that
Attorney Shrive, the city solicitor, met
with representatives of all of the various
concerns, spoke with them and put together
leases that we felt everyone -- that he felt
everyone had agreed to. It seems as though
there is some disagreement now with the
leases and it is council's position and also
the administration's position that we will
not put anything on our agenda that the
respective organizations have not agreed to.
It is up to them to formulate a method for
field use and when they have determined that

it's something that benefits the children of that community and that they can agree to then they will put the leases back on the agenda for approval. It is not our concern to take sides on any of this. This is up to the adults in those respective organizations to do what is best for the children of West Scranton. As I said, when that is done then we will respond.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
PARTICIPATION.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Good evening,
Council. Joan Hodowanitz, Scranton
resident

MR. GAUGHAN: Good evening.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Do we have any information on whether or not Mr. Amaroso is planning another presentation, and if so when?

MR. MCGOFF: I'm unfortunately going to give you the same answer that I been giving you. I am told that, yes, by the end of the month, you know, in two weeks --

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, he will not fall off my radar.

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MR. MCGOFF: There hasn't been a specific date set.

MS. HODOWANITZ: He will not fall off my radar screen, I will keep watching for that.

With regard to 5-G, the acquisition and installation of a community surveillance network, I haven't seen any background information which would tell me are you going to be maintaining stored images that are shared, where and how are you going to store them, who would have access to them? Is that information going to be made public before you decide on this program? anybody have any information on that? understand the basic concept, my concern is the privacy of the citizens, okay, and are you going to maintain. As somebody worked in the intelligence community for 23 years and spent three years at the National Security Agency, I will tell you that the technology exists to abuse that information, so certainly we should have access to the plan. What are you going to do with these Who will have access to them? images? How

long will they be stored?

MR. MCGOFF: This has been a question in the past as well as to the utilization station and operation of this type of equipment, I'm not sure what the plan is, as to how it will be utilized and stored or whatever the case may be, but we will make that query for you.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I would hope that you would at least go back to the administration and see what the plan is and I think the plan should be available before the decision is made. It's not that I'm against the acquisition of the system, it's that I would like to the city to have a plan in place and that the public can see what that plan is before we end up going down the road, and it's something to think about. You may think, oh, well, you know, it's little a backward city, you know, nothing ever happens here, you know, that kind of thing. That's not true. You know, people should guard their privacy very zealously and there should be very strict guidelines on when, you know, the images can be taken

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and what can be done with them and who can see them for how long. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Justine, and we will encourage all to attend.

MS. YEAGER: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Fay Franus.

MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus, Scranton.

Mr. McGoff, may I ask Pat Rogan a question? 1 MR. ROGAN: Sure. 2 3 MS. FRANUS: Pat, when SAPA was on the agenda before, a couple years ago, you 4 5 were against that, weren't you. MR. ROGAN: Yes. 6 7 MS. FRANUS: May I ask you why you 8 were against it? 9 MR. ROGAN: A number of reasons, 10 some of them being the costs weren't defined and I frankly didn't believe and I still 11 don't believe that it's something that 12 13 really will benefit the city. 14 MS. FRANUS: And Jack Loscombe felt 15 the same way. 16 MR. ROGAN: Correct. 17 MS. FRANUS: I just hope that both 18 of you feel strongly against this. I see no 19 reason for SAPA to come to the City of 20 Scranton. If any business wants to come to 21 Scranton, there is nothing stopping them. 22 MR. ROGAN: And I voted yes to 23 introduce it. 24 MS. FANUCCI: Pardon me? 25 MR. ROGAN: I voted yes to introduce

it to allow debate, but I did mention that I am, you know, going to listen to the residents but I am leaning towards voting no.

MS. FRANUS: I see no reason for it whatsoever and I can't even comprehend why anybody on this council representing the people in Scranton would want this. The reason they don't come to Scranton, the businesses, is because the taxes are so high. It's not because of any other reason, so there is nothing stopping any business from coming here. As a matter of fact, that Delta Medix is going to Dunmore, how is SAPA helping them stay? They are not.

The other municipalities, Clarks

Summit and Waverly, see, Scranton has all
the social services. They have all of the
buildings, and the federal building, the
courthouse buildings and all of the
nonprofits and the projects in the city.

Clarks Summit we don't want projects, they
want their places to be green and nice and
open, but the plan that's put forward is to
stop sprawl, so I hope that Scranton, the

city council, who represents the people in this city do not adopt that because we do not need it. If anybody wants to come here they can. Thank you, Mr. Rogan.

Now, on another matter, I listened to what Marie Schumacher said last week about that financial group that you hired until 2018, and she asked a question of Mr. Minora and Mr. McGoff you didn't let him answer and if it's a legal question why wouldn't you want the lawyer for the council to answer?

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$ \operatorname{MCGOFF}:$$ She asked why we voted for it and --

MS. FRANUS: She asked if it was legal, and you answered.

MR. MCGOFF: She asked if I felt it was legal, yes.

MS. FRANUS: But she also asked Mr. Minora and he wasn't able to answer. I just think when there is a legal question the lawyer should be able to answer. Amil, that's what he's there for.

And you said it was legal because there will be money in the budget for it in

2015.

budget for it in and this is the time and amendment that it says the money should be allocated now when it is voted on, not a year from now. So, yes, it is illegal even though you say it isn't, and I want the people at home to know that just because you say something, Mr. McGoff, it doesn't mean it's so. Because, trust me, you don't know. You can laugh, we will find out. We'll find out.

Well, there is no money in this

And another thing, last week when you made a comment about you moved something to Seventh Order like you are tonight, not that this is law or anything, but it's up to you, I guess, but I think if you can be fair if you had people like say, for example, I wanted to speak on that item, I don't think I should have to talk about it in my five minutes in motions. Your meetings are over like in an hour anymore, I mean, I don't know what your rush is to get out of here. I just think it would be fairer if you had people that want to speak on something in Seventh Order that it be moved ahead to have

a chance to speak before the vote not our time in the public comment time, they should be allowed to speak two times. Well, what do you think about that, Mr. McGoff?

MR. MCGOFF: Citizens' participation is the time for public comment on agenda items and --

MS. FRANUS: So you are saying --

MR. MCGOFF: And it was made known -- and it was made known that anyone who wished to speak to those items should do so during citizens' participation.

MS. FRANUS: So you don't think they should be able to speak again on it?

Because most people don't know --

MS. FRANUS: People don't know when they come here, most people have their -- what they are going to say ready and that usually takes five minutes, so people don't know you are going to move something to Seventh Order until you say so that night, so they need a little time to think about it and prepare. I think they should be allowed

1 to speak again on the issue. MR. MCGOFF: We made it known the 2 3 week before that it was going to be moved. MS. FRANUS: Did you let this -- was 4 5 it known for tonight that this was going to be moved? The items you are talking about 6 7 tonight moving to Seventh Order did you let 8 that be known last week or is it just 9 tonight right before the meeting, is that 10 when you first said it? MR. MCGOFF: I don't remember 11 12 offhand. 13 MS. FRANUS: Oh, that sounds 14 convenient. MR. MCGOFF: Well, it is convenient, 15 16 but that's the answer I have. 17 MS. FRANUS: So basically what you 18 are trying to do is you don't want people to 19 have too much say because you are cutting 20 their time. 21 Another thing, last week you had a 22 caucus in the back room about Verizon moving 23 the cell towers, another thing you don't 24 want the people at home and that's watching 25 council on television to see what's going

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on. There is no transparency, there is just no reason in the world why you wouldn't -- shouldn't have people out here doing the caucus on important issues such as the Verizon cell towers or any other important issue. I mean, to me it's just stopping the public from knowing what is going on in this city deliberately.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, a few words on this SAPA. I know you all made up your mind probably which way you are going on that, but I can't see how it will make sense without including Dickson City, Taylor, and Moosic as part of the group. As you know, the way you are dealing with it is not in the best interest of our community. We are going to have to go to Moosic, Dickson City and Taylor for some type of a commuter tax. You know that, I know that, everybody knows that so start reaching out to them communities now because there is nothing else you can do. You are not going

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to go in Chapter 9, which is probably the best way to go at the position we are in. We are and everybody that comes to me says we are bankrupt. You cannot pay off a loan to the firemen and police awards and they are drawing over \$100,000 a month up and you sit there and close your eyes to it. Mr. McGoff you can close your eyes to a lot of things that happened in your watch. are in a position we are now is because of you and the Times didn't realize what was happening, didn't care what was happening, but when blindly what the mayor was doing. When that council came four years ago there was \$22 million in debt sitting on the books, under your watch they were occurred and you sit there and close your eyes to what's happening to the city.

I can't understand people, like I say, you cannot vote your party or your name, you got to look at each candidate individually and vote on their merits, not what name they bare or what party they go on belong to, if you ever want to get out of the mess we're in.

Well, a few words on this
entertainment tax. That lady come before
you for the library would she be exempt from
this tax if it was passed or would she be
required to pay? They are charging
admission to go to this affair. Is it the
same with the political? I went to a lot of
political where they had entertainment and
at the door they were looking for political
contributions, are they exempt from this
tax?

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Sbaraglia, all we are doing is we're trying to make it easier to collect by making it if you are a group of the less than 500 you are not subject to the tax.

MR. SBARAGLIA: For a group of 500.

MR. WECHSLER: Or for an establishment that has less than 500 seats.

MR. SBARAGLIA: It didn't quite say in there, but all groups that are under 500 are exempt.

MR. WECHSLER: Correct.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Which means there is only what, two or three things in the city

1 that actually can be taxed. One is the 2 water park, and the other is the Masonic 3 Temple. Other than that, I think that other thing that they have is up in Moosic, that 4 5 belongs to Moosic up there and not Scranton. And the ballpark, of course, isn't in. 6 7 Scranton either. So you got -you're actually trying to get these two 8 9 entities to pay for a big bunch of taxes. don't know if that's going to work. 10 11 MR. WECHSLER: There are other 12 vendors that have over 500 capacities. 13 MR. SBARAGLIA: Name one? 14 MR. WECHSLER: The hotels in the 15 city. 16 MR. SBARAGLIA: The hotels --17 MR. WECHSLER: The rooms, the 18 banquets. MR. SBARAGLIA: The hotels are 19 20 already taxed by the county. You are 21 putting the tax away you are saying? 22 that what you are planning to tax because 23 you may have 500 people at wedding? 24 MR. ROGAN: Mr. Sbaraglia, if I 25 could jump in, this isn't -- this tax is

already on the books, what we are doing is Councilman Wechsler and myself were approached by bar owners and band owners who were being negatively impacted by the tax. What this exemption does, when this was passed it was never the intention to have people who are going to see a local band at a local tavern pay a tax. This would give them a de facto exemption because their venue is smaller than 500.

Now, if you go to Montage to see a national act the tax would be included or at the Cultural Center that would have large venues as well, but this is not an additional tax, this is an exemption from the current tax.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I realize that, we passed the tax the first time it wasn't very good and we brought all of these objections up to you at that point. At this point, you are clarifying, but not really clarifying, you didn't change the wording. It's not in the -- maybe in the backup it's spelled out a little different, but I can see a lot of people are going to be very unhappy

especially you put things like La Festa in that. Now, that committee -- that has hundreds of thousands of people may come there, what are we going to with that?

MR. ROGAN: It's for ticketed venues. I mean, it has to be a ticketed venue, so the Italian festival you don't get a ticket to go in so they wouldn't pay the tax. It's mostly for concerts is where most of the revenue on an amusement tax comes in, and the issue that we are addressing is that the local -- the small venues, the corner bar that has, you know, a local band play and charges \$5 at the door, we don't think they should be forced to pay this tax but that's why we worked on this exemption.

You know, neighborhood festivals, things like that they are not subject to the tax and I know there are already exemptions carved out for educational, for school say West Side High School wanted to have an event, they were already exempted and I believe nonprofits are exempt as well. So this is just trying to correct a mistake that was in the original legislation and I

think it's most -- you know, one of the problems that it was hurting the little guy and we didn't want to hurt the local music industry and the taverns in the city.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave Dobrzyn, resident and I placed myself here some time going by. Once again, I'd like to express the hope that the audit comes in if not on time but at least by midsummer. The last few years have been insufferable and almost useless if they even had it at that time.

We had a vote a few days ago and, well, once again poor turn out. I wish people would wake up and get out and vote. It must be disconcerting to a politician in realizing that if the majority showed up he could be voted out of office even though they one by a landslide.

Towers. I'm neutral on this tower up at Nay Aug Park, but we have towers at Nay Aug Park, and I'll have to get in touch with the taxpayers or somebody with more resources and see what we can do about finding out whether or not PPL is paying

their fair share because they are taking a considerable swath out of the park, they have power transmission towers right through it and I would almost find it doubtful that someone wouldn't scream that from the rooftops that they aren't paying.

And a few years ago when the Roseland Project, I asked them about it, I wanted the officials to attend the meeting and they mentioned that it would take millions of dollars to remove to relocate those towers so there is a lot of money there.

And once again you poor guys get the dirty end of the stick with the Geisinger issue. I was watching it from my house until I had to leave to get here, and there are concerns. That school should never have been closed. Shame on the school district that shut that down and \$750,000 is not really good compensation for the loss of the school that could have been fixed for six or seven million dollars. It's really ashame and those kids from the Hill section and South Scranton are getting shoved all over

the place. The one lady had a letter in there that her child was in fourth grade and she hadn't attended the same school any given year, so that was four different schools she was located in in four years.

So I don't know how I feel about them tearing that down and putting a parking lot. I would sympathize with those neighbors.

On this issue with Seventh Order, I would consider just allowing people to go up and speak. I wouldn't want to put up with the grief that are you getting over it.

It's really ashame that we can't take two or three more minutes per person and just let them have their say. Then they can't -- they probably just come up and complain some more, at least they had their opportunity.

On parties, what do you do when one party is lame and the other one is crazy? I don't know. That goes for the voting. It's really ashame but there are some crazy people in certain parties and the other ones don't now how to run the party. Drill, baby, drill. They should have had when one party was chanting that during the oil spill

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they should have had -- their commercial should have been US spill in Louisiana which brings me to the golden parrot, I know it's national, but it is local, we have the mines under our houses and now we get to pay for insurance that we would have never needed because some dishonest jerk took the coal out from under our house. Congressman McAllister was badgering an environmental advocate who was there to complain that an oil company repaired an oil leak on a wildlife preservation with duck tape and a garbage bag and he is from Louisiana. mean, how crazy can you get? I wouldn't vote at all if I had two people like that Thanks, and have a good night. running.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. SHOCKER: Good evening. Alan Shocker, West Scranton. I was thrilled to hear tonight that you have taken the leases off the agenda and I'm thrilled here that council is going to wait until we can work something out. I am here for little league and this was kind of dropped on us at the

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The rumors. I don't know where last minute. the rumors came from. We did take two social media, we did pass a petition, but that is all we knew to do. I'm iust a baseball coach, just a dad, I'm not a politician, not a lawyer, it's what we do. But I really appreciate all of you, and Mr. Rogan reached out to us, Mr. Gaughan reached out to u and, you know, the mayor give us great advice, Mr. Shrive gave us great advice and we are going to try and sit down with the other parties and work this out and hopefully everybody is happy again, but I appreciate everything you have done for us. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. McGoff. To touch a little bit as we were speaking before during public comment, tonight we are going to modify the amusement tax. Councilman Rogan and myself, Business

Administrator Bulzoni, Solicitor Jason
Shrive, counsel to the city, along with
Solicitor Minora we have been working on
this since we took our seats in January. We
really feel that this modification will
allow the smaller businesses not to suffer
from an additional tax that really wasn't a
burden to them.

And the other side of the coin, also, it allows the city to move this down to the Single Tax Office where we can actually start collecting some of this revenue. We do have it budgeted for about \$300,000 in our budget this year and, like I said, this will allow us to start collecting that. There is a couple of other bits of legislation, ordinances that are on the books that we are going to try to do the same thing, this is the first of and a start.

A couple of other things, I would like to thank the organizers of the Armed Forces Day parade on Saturday. We got to see the city. My sister visited from Maryland, she didn't know she was going to

end up in the parade Saturday, so she ended up marching in the parade. There was a good turnout along Washington Avenue of people to offer their support. I was in the parade last year, I thought there was more people this year, but it was really great and you have to appreciate our veterans because we lose so many of them every day.

And Sunday night I had the honor of representing the city as the Amos Lodge honored Dave Wenzel with their Americanism award. Mayor Wenzel is a special person. He was handicapped in Vietnam, did not let that determine him. Came back and served the city as mayor and tax collector. Went on to serve on several commissions under President Bush and continues today to do his work throughout the city and I was honored to have dinner with him on Saturday.

Just one other thing, I'd like to mention one of the speakers talked about Delta Medix moving to Dunmore, I can tell you that no decision by Delta Medix has been made on that. The city, other private investors and Dunmore this is going -- a

competition for the city we are all going to have to work very hard in making sure that we try or best to keep Delta Medix here in Scranton and saying that they moved to Dunmore is not going to help us, so we would like to have support from the public.

Whatever you can do to try and convince them to stay, but that's what we are going to have to do, it's going to have to be a team effort. That's all I have.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Mr. Rogan? MR. ROGAN: Thank you. A few items, I'd like to first start off by thanking city employee Paul O'Hora and ECTV volunteer Charlie Newcomb, Jr., there was an emergency on Tuesday, election day, in which city hall was closed and for those of you who watched the election results on Channel 19 you saw they are broadcast from council chambers. Thanks to our city clerk getting in touch with Mr. O'Hora, Mr. Newcomb they were able to get city hall opened up so they could broadcast those election results, so a thank you to all three of you for the great work on your day off, for Mrs. Reed and

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Mr. O'Hora, so we thank you for that and Charlie, as always, does a great job operating the cameras.

I'd also like to congratulate all of the candidates from the election on Tuesday, I'd especially like to congratulate my state rep Marty Flynn on an enormous victory and our new state rep in part of Scranton Representative Frank Farina, who will now be representing Scranton, so we look forward to working with him as well.

A couple of comments regarding the West Scranton baseball fields, and this is an issue that's important to me because as a kid I played on these fields, so to me it's important to see that the younger generation has the same opportunity that I had, to go in and to place baseball in their community, so I know we have all received a lot of calls and e-mails and on election day at the polls and in my neighborhood in West Side and every parent that came up said, "What's happening with the baseball fields?"

So I'm glad, you know, that you all reached out to us and I'm hopeful that an

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agreement will work out that works so kids that play baseball can play baseball, kids that play football can play football, and that's what it's all about at the end of the day doing what we can for the kids.

On the amusement tax, Mr. Wechsler summed it up perfectly. We were both approached by bands and bar owners who were upset that they would have to pay this tax and it wasn't -- when it was passed it was never intended for the local band and the local bar owner to be affected by this tax. It was implemented to offset the costs of large vendors. For instance, when Montage Mountain has a venue, and Montage is in Scranton, we do receive revenue from that venue, there is a large cost associated with a concert where you have 10,000 people That was the point of the amusement tax was to offset that cost. At no point did anyone involved ever want to hurt our local music scene which is great. There are a lot of great local bands in our community and I had the pleasure of talking to many of them in addition in those bands and bar

owners and, you know, myself and Councilman Wechsler, our attorney, the city attorney, the mayor went over together to solve this problem so that the local bar owners and the local bands weren't hurt by that tax, and as also mentioned, it will make it easier for it to be collected by the venues that do have to pay the tax to the larger venues.

Two other things, the Armed Forces parade I agree was a pretty good crowd this year, a little bit better than the year before. Hopefully that will continue to grow. It was great seeing and talking to many veterans and many residents in the downtown, it was a beautiful day, and hopefully next year's attendance will be a little bit higher.

I was going to wait until motions to speak regarding the property in the Hill Section with it being purchased. I'm going to vote "yes" for the zoning change for a number of reasons. One of the main reasons is if we have a building there that if it's not purchased it may sit there vacant for who knows how long. There are certainly no

shortage of vacant buildings in the City of Scranton, and the last thing we need is another one.

Secondly, the school district certainly needs the revenue. There are some members of the school board talking about raising taxes and \$700,000 can certainly offset some of that on the school board's end.

Third, the city will receive tax revenue. Once this transaction is completed what will happen is a property that was not taxed for many, many years as a school will now become taxable, which is a nice because usually it's one or the other way around where taxable properties become tax exempt.

And finally, and this is the strongest argument I have for supporting it is, in the City of Scranton in the last ten years one of the industries, and it's not really an industry, but one of the categories of employment that has done pretty well is the medical field. We have a new medical college, which has been great for the city, and we have great hospitals in

the city. I think that's something the City of Scranton needs to embrace and needs to build on. We want young doctors moving into the city, buying homes in the city and raising a family in the city, and we want good services at our hospitals for the senior citizens and the younger people in the community that need those services, so for those reasons I do support the change in the zoning to allow the purchase of this property to go through.

I do see the other side where some residents can be concerned about sprawl, but in this specific instance we are taking a building that was used as a school so there already was a lot of, you know, hustle and bustle there with buses coming and going, teachers coming and going and turning that into a medical use, which I think will be good for the city, good for business, and hopefully the medical industry in the city continues to draw people here and the medical school, and the hope is that when students come and come to the medical school will come here and work in our hospitals and

take care of the residents in the City of Scranton, and because of those reasons I will be voting "yes" for the zoning change. That's all. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes. Thank you. On Monday, May 26, which is a Memorial Day the DPW will be off and refuse and blue recycle will be a day behind.

On Thursday, May 29, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. the City of Scranton will have a tire recycling event. The cost is \$2 per passenger tire and \$3 for SUV or pickup tires. The tires must be residential only and all tires must be without rims. Anyone wishing to recycle tires are asked to bring them to the Department of Public Works which is located at 101 West Popular Street.

I am happy to report that we are making some progress with the parking issue that I have brought up the past two weeks in the 900 block of Prescott area. The Police Department conducted a parking study this past week. Based on the study and the parking complaints from residents, council

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will be proceeding to a public forum as per city ordinance. I would like to thank

Police Chief Carl Graziano and Attorney Amil Minora for their assistance with this matter.

I received a complaint from a resident about some dangerous potholes in the 800 block of Crown Avenue in South Scranton. I will forward that request to our DPW director.

I also would like to mention that three eighth grade students from West Scranton Intermediate School one third prize in a contest sponsored by CSPAN. contest was called Student Cam where students had to create a documentary. The documentary these students created was called, "Commit support to Veterans." Ιt was very impressive. The students will be honored Friday, May 30, at West Intermediate School where CSPAN representatives will be honoring them with a ceremony. I would like to congratulate these students for being recognized by CSPAN and representing the City of Scranton very well.

Mr. Rogan and Mr. Wechsler, the Armed Forces
Day parade was a great success this past
Saturday. It was an honor to watch the men
and women march who have served our country
throughout the years. There was a nice
crowd in attendance and I thank everyone for
coming out. I urge everyone to continue to
support these veterans and thank them for
all that they have done.

And that is it all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Once again to reiterate what the young lady said, please come out tomorrow evening for Swingin' on Vine. Great opportunity to support the Albright Library. Our library system is I would say second to none and the Albright Library itself is beautiful building that needs it be preserved and anything we can do to help support the Albright Library is certainly a good thing. So, please, if you have the opportunity please come to the Albright Library tomorrow evening and support it.

Just a couple of responses to things that were mentioned, as far as the audit is concerned there has been, and I think it was mentioned last week, there has been a transfer of an employee from the Controller's Office to the Business Administrator's Office that should speed up the process. They are behind simply because of a staffing issue, but hopefully with additional help the audit, audit process will accelerate through the couple of months and hopefully will be completed sooner than it has in the past couple of years.

And I would like as far as the citizens' participation and opportunity to speak at our meetings, no one has been denied their right to speak to council. I believe that we are as transparent and as open as any council has been in the past and I believe that our weekly caucus is an opportunity for the public to -- a greater opportunity for the public to see what is taking place with council. The prior four years we didn't have a weekly caucus, so it was very often people came to the meeting

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without any idea of what might be taking place. I think that we have opened it up quite a bit to allow people to see what's going on with city council.

And the last thing, as far as citizens' participation, our application of I'll say the guidelines for speaking are extremely liberal. If one were to look at Rules of Council and the Administrative Code, Home Rule Charter, there are specific guidelines to be followed for citizens' participation which basically says you can speak to agenda items and matters of concern to the city. We have I would say applied that very liberally in allowing people to speak to council so I don't think that we are denying anyone their opportunity to speak, and actually we encourage anyone to come to council to speak to us to voice their concerns. They would be more than welcome. And that all. Thank you.

In addition, part of the county's approval of this plan was they made a valid point that perhaps when the original zoning ordinance was passed the Audubon School site probably should have been listed as a institutional zone at that time, so right now, although it's one of the most difficult decisions I have had to make since I'm here on council, since people said I'm the neighborhood person and I'm a fiscal person, and I do believe that in this case this site is best served by putting it back on the tax rolls, having it being evaluated for future use and hopefully eventually turned it into That's what I would like to a green space. see after the project has been completed at the hospital and perhaps, like I said, I would like to see this go back to a green space.

up further with this there is going to be all sorts of regulations that would have to go through in terms of the planning, zoning, and I would anticipate just from the turnout that we saw tonight in the community that those people will have the serious input on any future development at that facility.

So, like I said, this is one of the hardest decisions I had to make so far.

Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, I just would agree and echo Mr. Wechsler's comments. I tried to put myself into the neighbor's shoes, so to speak, and I was debating, you know, the negatives and the positives of this whole deal, and voting "no" means that the school will sitting there and nothing will be done with the school. Voting "yes" means something will be done. It will be used as a staging area, and then it will be used as green space and then hopefully a building will be erected there.

I look at the creation of jobs, economic development, as Mr. Rogan stated

earlier, \$155 million invested by Geisinger into the City of Scranton. \$97 million expansion project currently underway, so that is what I am basing my decision on.

Also, today I had our city clerk,
Mrs. Reed, pull from the Licensing and
Inspection Department the amount of money
that Geisinger has given to the city in
permit fees, almost a million dollars. I
did go up there with a few neighbors and I
looked at that site and I did see trucks,
but I did see trucks from people who live in
the City of Scranton, who there is companies
that are in the City of Scranton that are
working on that project so we are employing
some of the tradesmen up there, also.

So again, as Mr. Wechsler said, it's a difficult decision. I sympathize and understand the resident's concerns up in the Hill Section in that neighborhood but I can't base my vote on what might happen in ten years or 20 years, I can only base my vote on what I have in front of me and I will be voting "yes" because of that, so thank you.

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MR. MCGOFF: And I will also agree with what my colleagues have said. Many of the concerns that were expressed this evening during the public hearing I felt were based on supposition that things that could happen. I believe that the immediate benefit to this far outweighs the supposed drawbacks, and one of the things that was brought up that, you know, I would assume that placing an unusable building with even, if there is construction in the future, would only enhance the property value of the people in that area. I can't see that it would be a detriment to them at all, and again, because of the fact that the benefits right now outweigh the drawbacks I, too, am planning to vote "yes."
