In Sixth and Seventh Order there is legislation dealing with the surveillance network system that Scranton police Headquarters. There were some questions that were asked last week concerning this, those questions I believe will be addressed by Mr. Loscombe and Mr. Gaughan during motions or when the legislation is ready.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Quinn?

MR. QUINN: Good evening, Council, Ozzie Quinn.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.

MR. QUINN: Hill Neighborhood

Association president. First of all, I want to thank Councilman Wechsler and Councilman

Gaughan for attending our meeting last night at the Hill Neighborhood Association to

listen to the people's concerns. It's great

to have elected officials to be with us who

are able to talk firsthand face-to-face and

it's great. Thank you very much, gentlemen.

And secondly, on our agenda we also have, as Mr. Gaughan previously said in motions, Neighbor Works will be in the Hill Section and you can also get an application at the Hill Neighborhood Association Office 419, Prescott Avenue.

We also discussed the cell tours and we had an M.D. at the meeting last night and she expressed that there is information coming out, new information, that it is negative in regards to cell towers, and if you'd like I'd put you in touch with her, okay?

And on those two CDBG programs, if you look at that HUD audit you are not going

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to approve that. You are not going to approve. It was just chaos being done by that OECD Department since 2008, '9 and '10. That's what that audit is from four years and it's just complete chaos and if you approve that without looking at that audit then I don't know, it's like spitting in the Inspector General's face, you know?

I also want to say that in regards to that I appreciate you having the surveillance for the police on there. You know that the Hill Neighborhood Association has three bikes in its basement which we bought and we used to have the neighborhood patrols, which was a great thing, there was no doubt about it, it was like a beat cop you never knew when that guy was going to show up, that police officer, you know, zipping down on that bike. And the more you realize it the more we got to find ways to get them back into the neighborhoods. There hasn't been any approaches I'd say in the last 12 years and I hope that you gentlemen will sit down with the administration and try to find ways.

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where di all the money go?

You know, when you say that a policeman that's paid from OECD, that's CDBG, can only go to Olive Street and then can't -- can turn around because he is paying with OECD funds is ridiculous and there has got to be some way that if you discuss this with HUD there is a possibility, you know what I mean, that there is it a way that you can do this? I don't see it being done right now by just saying black is black and white is white. It's not going to done. Thank you very much.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Quinn. Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, Scranton City Council, Jamie, Cathene, did I get it right? Lori and Amil, haven't seen you guys in awhile. I'm just going start off by saying the question that I asked about 13 years ago, where is the money and

I think that whenever we get the answer to that question maybe we can solve some of the problems that the city now sees.

The problem, you know, I was at the caucus, and I was here for half the caucus, but, you know, the problem is there was never any documentation of anything, nothing was ever documented, I mean, at OECD or the Single Tax Office. If you remember doing this period of time, I believe Mr. McGowan I think was his name was the tax collector and he lost \$11 million and we couldn't even get a forensic audit done by the FBI or by anyone because it was that messed up, and the FBI came out and said, "We cannot prosecute incompetence."

So these problems go back ten years ago, 15 years ago, and they were allowed to fester for all of those years. I can remember all those three to two votes. We had three to two votes for four years and every one of those votes was basically, in my opinion, a wrong vote because it was against the taxpayers. Now, all of those votes are coming against us now.

The police and fire arbitration award, the Supreme Court award, what's being done on that? Probably nothing yet and

every day the interest builds on that so we have serious problems here.

No. But I'm not an elected official and I didn't run for office either so I just know that we need to do something because we continue to go in reverse. One of these days somebody is going to find the "D" on the shifter level and we are actually going to go forward and get it out of "R" to reverse mode because everything just seems -- nothing seems to get better.

The garages. The garages have \$10 million worth of damage or repairs that needed to be done five years ago. They probably need \$15 million worth of repairs now. Why? Because nothing has ever been done. Now, they are recommending that we sell the garages. I don't know if that's a good idea, I don't know if that's a bad idea, but one thing I do know the garages will never be repaired. They will not be repaired because the city does not have the money, you know?

Borrowing more money, borrowing more $\ensuremath{\mathsf{P}}$

money is not the solution. That's not even a Band-Aid anymore. We tried that for years and years and years and where did it get us? Raising taxes again, that's not a solution because people can't afford to pay the taxes now, most of the people.

Furthermore, the majority of the people that live in the City of Scranton are not taxpayers because they are not property owners, and then you got that 12 percent that never pay anyway. So you got to keep that all in consideration.

The audit, where is the audit? The audit is supposed to done 31 May. Where is it? Is it done? Is it completed? Will it be completed by 31 May? I bet the answer is no, so that's another problem that's been festering for year after year after year after year after year and then we want to know why nobody has any answers or nobody has any solutions?

Has progress been made? Yes, some progress has been made. The new administration is a much better administration than the past administration.

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The people in charge of these department heads are much better people. They are willing to sit down and talk with you and help you, but do they have the solutions to Why? the problems? No. Because we need That's the bottom line. I've said money. this many times from this podium. There is two five letter words that go hand-in-hand, money and power. If you money, you have power. If you have power, you have the money. And there is no truer statement than that and that's exactly what happens not only in Scranton city government, it's happening in state government and in the federal government.

I mean, look at what's going on in the federal government. It's terrible.

It's horrible. And who is getting hammered all the time? The middleman. The little guy. The working guy. The guy who goes packs a lunch every day and take his ham and cheese sandwich to work, he is getting killed. You know, does anybody care? They say they care, but are they doing anything about it, no? Just watch Dave Kearney's

news conference every day and tell me what's going in Washington and whatever.

Absolutely nothing. There is no answers, there is no solutions, and no one is willing to accept the blame. Until people stand up and start accepting the blame for the decisions that they made and the votes that they made and caused the problems that the citizens now face nothing is ever going to change because someone is responsible for it.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Joan Hodowanitz.

MR. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, city resident. I know in the caucus you discussed Mr. Amaroso whether or not he would be making a return engagement to your chambers and that he does not work for the council, but I think we've heard that he does recall care, especially with the publicity he got recently about his recommendation, so to speak, become selling five garages and pensions and income tax. Even the city opts never to follow his recommendations I still would like to hear

what he has to say since he came in here and tried to give us a picture of the city, and we also need to know from the mayor because he's been in office almost five months now what he is going to do about the budget. He opted not to open the budget when he became mayor and modify it, so I think we are getting close to the point where he should be ready to tell the city what he plans to do. So if you hear anything about Mr. Amaroso coming forward make sure it's on page one this time.

I looked at the back up paperwork earlier today and I saw Mr. Rossi's firm give us another status of the audit report as of May 22. Today is May 29. The reports should have been out by Saturday, but there is still 26 outstanding items, I think it's the same 26 outstanding items that was on his prior status report, so I don't think much progress has been made there. I looked on the website and I noticed that the last audit didn't come out until mid-November of last year. If that holds true for this year, it's not going to help much preparing

1 next year's budget. Mr. Loscombe, I think you are going 2 3 to be talking about that surveillance system? 4 MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. 5 MS. HODOWANITZ: You are going to be 6 addressing whether in terms of protecting 7 8 citizen privacy and what's going to happen 9 with that data? 10 MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes. 11 MS. HODOWANITZ: How you are going 12 to store it, who is going to have access to 13 that, I would like to hear that. 14 And I'm not going to go back go OECD and the line of credit, I have had my say on 15 16 that, I just hope that we don't any more 17 rude surprises this week, I've had my quota. 18 Thank you. 19 MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. 20 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Ms. 21 Hodowanitz. Anyone else who wishes to 22 address council? Good evening, Council. 23 MR. DOBRZYN: 24 Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxes paid, garbage 25 fee paid. Last week we missed a great

opportunity once again for tax exempt compensation and I feel that if they don't want to compensate you people through the PILOTS that they should at least be willing to go to our state representatives and the governor and see if we can get some kind of compensation from the state inasmuch as 33 percent of our properties are tax exempt and we receive nothing for them and they benefit the entire region, if not the country.

Now, delinquent fees once again. I paid my trash bill last week and it look a sizeable chunk of my income tax return, there isn't much left after that, and it would be nice to start collecting and this year is the year that personally as a voter I expect to see a line drawn in the sand. No more people with six homes in the city scoffing at the trash fees. If I have to pay extra, they should at least pay their fair share.

And on the OECD now that we know how done it, what about who done it and why -- and how this happened that a million dollars or whatever was some how deposited in the

wrong account and somebody said, yeah, we got it. Let's go. It's like being overpaid at an ATM machine or something, you are supposed to turn that money back. If I put in \$50 and I get \$500 out I'm liable for it.

And once again, I hear about sale of the sewage treatment plant. I fail, I absolutely fail to comprehend how adding a large margin of the profit to some hedge fund manager that would buy up the sewer treatment plant, how that will benefit us as far as reducing our taxes. It absolutely won't because we will be paying three times over down the line. And, by the way, they will be sending lobbyists to our senators and congressmen and lobbyists to our EPA and getting extensions and not doing the proper updates, that's what the problem was the last time we got fined \$2 million, it was reduced to one.

And on these loans that were given out years ago, I'd like to hear about how much of those we're liable for, and I understand about one-third of them never really paid.

And again, this week our hospitals are losing money, somebody has it do something. If you don't like Obama care then come up with a better idea, but I don't think they have a better idea. They got 151 amendments on Obama care, but that is when hospitals lose money when some poor jerk gets run over down the street and you are going to the hospital with a heart attack and he is getting sewn up first, well, you know, you might sit there and die even though you have good insurance.

Okay, once again call your congressman and the president and tell them no more trade packs. Does anybody -- can anybody figure out that when somebody goes from \$15 an hour to \$8 or \$9 an hour that that's less city taxes and less school taxes and so forth they are paying that are being paid in. I mean, it's just unfathomable how gullible it can be. You know, you can have all the import goods on the shelf you want but if people aren't buying they are not worth anything.

And once again, I'll talk about a

small national issue, Congressman Burr of
North or South Carolina walked out on
advocacy groups and returned only to try and
treat them like beggars and, of course, we
have a national scandal with our veterans'
care and, you know, he walked out as soon
they started to talk and he walked back in
right as they were finishing and treated
them, like I said, like beggars and snake
oil. So, Congressman Burron, you get the
golden parrot so bawk, bawk and don't forget
to bawk, bawk, bawk. Have a good night.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, Council. Marie Schumacher.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I'd like to start with the proposed or possibly to be proposed cell phone tower at Nay Aug Park, specifically because I pulled out my copy of the deed and it does state that the only proper use on behalf of the said party of the second part, which is the City of Scranton, its successors and assigns forever as and for a free public open park forever

and for no other use, intent or purpose whatsoever. So I would think a cell tower would fall into that category and not be proper on that piece of the land.

Next, 5-B and C I do have a say something, I think the wrong entity is embarrassed by this. I don't think it should have been Mr. Boscov who was embarrassed, it should be the City of Scranton. We knew how much came in, we know how much goes out, obviously there was a big chunk of unaccounted for money and we have no idea where it went and it's very sad. It's a black eye again going back to the Single Tax Office, just as bad. I guess it will never end.

On election evening there was a meeting held primarily for the municipalities but also for the public on the Keystone Landfill expansion. Sadly, nobody from Scranton attended that, not our engineer, not anybody and if I were an engineer I wonder how it could be treated because the landfill expansion has the same as CECO, the same as we have and how that

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would might possibly be a conflict of interest, but I would hope you would urge the administration to get them involved. Maybe you are not aware because of your location, and I don't even know maybe this Act 101 opens things up again, I don't know if it's just for the host communities or those affected, but those of who live on the east mountain are definitely effected. are affected now when that peak is where it I have already been forced into my is now. home from doing yard work because of the horrible stench from that landfill, and the only thing that DEP would guarantee is that, hey, it's a landfill, it's garbage and it's going to stink and it's going to get worse and it's going it go up what, 165 feet It's going be a peak and when the wind is against us it's going to definitely affect our quality of the life and I think also our property values, and I would hope on behalf of those on the east mountain the City of Scranton would get involved.

Next, the treasurer sale, I did go over the amounts owed and it seems to me, I

don't know, maybe somebody can explain to me how this works. Does a treasurer's sale actually take a property away for say -- a lot that were under \$1,000. I would think that if this actually takes that person's home away from them where they had built up equity over years that there should be some threshold, and you can tell me if that doesn't happen, but I think it does, and I think there should be some threshold where a lien is filed against it so that when -- such that when the home is sold that's when the city gets paid for their back taxes.

Taking someone's life-long equity

for \$635.27 does not seem right nor does it

seem proper that this city would have some

more ownership in our land values and our

property values if they were dependent for

their taxes on the market price of that

home. They continue to sink. It's very bad

and I would like -- does a property get

taken away from an individual due to a

treasurer's sale?

MR. MCGOFF: I do not know.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Perhaps you can

find out and let us know next week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.

MR. MORGAN: You know, I'd just like to say here tonight that, you know, reading the article in the Scranton Times about sale of city assets once again like the garages, I think we need to ask ourselves how much those garages cost to build and then what we are willing to try and sacrifice them for. I think that sale of those garages -- I'm hoping that Mr. Washo and the bondholders refuse to sell or fight the sale. I hope that if comes to council that council will not consider it.

The same with the Sewer Authority.

We had the American Anglican deal, did

nothing for the residents except, you know,

just really cause a lot of havoc with the

equipment at the Sewer Authority and

everybody made money and I don't think that

should be an option either. I think really

what needs to happen here in the city is

really quite simple, I think we need to turn the pensions -- the city's pension fund over to the Commonwealth. There is just absolutely no way the city can finance it. It's time really for the council and the mayor to come forward and tell the residents exactly where we sit and what our options are and in my opinion they are not very pleasant, but to be honest with you, we just don't have the money in this city to pay those debts.

Selling the assets like the Sewer Authority off might be one-time revenue enhancement, but we have done that all along for decades. There is just nothing left. mean that Sewer Authority really also belongs to Dunmore, and I just can't understand how Mr. Amaroso, the mayor, this council or anybody else in elected office can continue to follow a course of action which continues to deplete the city of all of its assets. I believe we are going to lose the firemen again very soon because I haven't heard anything about a new grant and I just have to say to this council that it's

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not -- it's not a black mark on the government to find finally admit that we are beyond our means and over our head, and when people come to the podium here and talk about the Commonwealth stepping in and helping us, the Commonwealth is talking about selling billions of dollars of pension bonds because they are in trouble. We are all in trouble. We have lived beyond our means for decades and pretended that we could just borrow continually forever and everything would be okay and that's why we have double digit unemployment, but we have recalculated the way we calculate somebody as being unemployed so we drive our numbers down and more of the baby boomers in my generation are leaving the job market through retirement than young adults and we still give them employment.

America is a very sick country with very serious problems, and in my opinion they are politically based, and if we are going to right this ship then I think it's time for the elected officials, and I have a great amount of respect for all five of you,

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including the mayor, and I don't want anybody to have the opinion that I have an adversarial position against you, I just think that it's important that at this time to tell the residents not only here but across the state government and the federal government to be honest for once with the people in this country and tell them we have kicked this can down the road as far as we There is no money, there is not going can. to be any money. There aren't any jobs in this country. Listen to people talk about, I don't know, giving businesses tax breaks and then you take a look at what it costs banks to borrow money, nothing.

So it just proves the point that we are in real big trouble here and I think that selling the parking garages isn't going to take us anywhere because if you pull a number out of your hat you say it cost \$20 to build them, and we are going to sell them for \$2 then the residents of this city lost \$18.

And when you talk about the Sewer

Authority, we took a bath the last time with

turn around and sell an asset like this and say that cost \$20 and we are going to sell it for \$2 and then we are going turn around and unleash that company on the residents of this city who are going to double or triple rates to get a return on their investment doesn't make any sense either, and I think it's time to tell the firemen and police or municipal unions that we can't pay that settlement, because if we had the ability to borrow that money it would have been done by now, and if the city's employees want to take city hall I'd tell them, "Let them have it." And if they want to run the Sewer

Authority, let them run in, but the truth of
the matter is we are out of money, we're out
of options. We can move whatever you want
to call it, the little ball under the shells
around a little bit more but the truth of
the matter is when you look at this city

going to get us anywhere, but I appreciate

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I also would like to say that this is a great reason why our crime watches and neighborhood associations really are the extra eyes for our police force in our city to help prevent future incidents like this.

On Monday I was fortunate enough to attend Memorial Day services at both the Cathedral Cemetery and Nay Aug Park. MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Just a few comments on the agenda items and some other items. I will start off with the items in Fifth Order regarding the OECD funds. It's certainly not a position any us up here wanted it be put in because of a mistake that was made nearly 20 years ago, and it is

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unacceptable that that lingered for this long until it was finally discovered.

Unfortunately, that million dollar needs to be paid back and I think as a council we should do everything we can next year when he working with the administration to fund the programs that we can't fund because of this mistake that was made.

Regarding the \$600,000 portion of it of, which is the payment that wasn't made by Boscov and Steamtown Mall Partners, as I mentioned during the public hearing and judging by the comment that Mr. Boscov made in the paper, I hope that he is a man of his word and he does what he said in the paper and makes the city whole. We will see what happens after, you know, the next few months pan out, we will see what happens to the foreclosure process and with the mall and then there is going to come a point in time where the city needs to be repaid or we will have the \$600,000 deficit in our federal funding every year, and that money is used for a lot of programs throughout the city. It helps with Boys and Girls Club, it helps

pave roads, demolish hazardous properties, helps support many local groups, Dress for Success, so many groups.

So I hope that Mr. Boscov keeps that into consideration moving forward and, like I said before, if he does make whole on this the city would be very appreciative of it, but if he doesn't, and I know from talking to many residents out there, people won't patronize his store if the city is on the hook for this kind of money, so we hope for the best on that situation.

Next, and I meant to bring this up in our caucus but I didn't get a chance to, I know there have been some zoning issues regarding North Scranton and the Villa Maria. I'm not sure where that ended. I know there were talks on zoning where a variance was denied, then it came to the city and not really sure where that stands.

So, Mrs. Reed, could we please inquire on that to see where the zoning issues regarding the Villa Maria currently stand so we can get that sorted out on behalf of the residents over there.

Today there was a fire over in the Hill section, a resident and friend of mine who lives in that neighborhood called me and he smelled smoke, starting walking down to the fire, less than 15, 20 minutes the house fire was already out, and our guys just did an excellent job and they deserve a job well done for that.

And finally, and I apologize in advance if I say something things that may be a little harsh on this next topic, but the murder that occurred the other day and the media coverage that followed it, what took place was absolutely disgusting that a hardworking man out their driving a cab trying to support his family working at 3:00 in the morning would be brutally murdered by a thug from outside of this city. He is not a city resident, he is from New Jersey who came to this city to sell drugs, to be in a gang and to cause terror. That's not what Scranton is about.

There are so many people that were following this coverage said, "Boy, Scranton neighborhoods aren't what they used to be."

That's not Scranton. It's some out-of-town thug that came here to harm our neighborhoods and harm our residents, and as Mr. Wechsler mentioned, what an amazing job by our police department. They solved a murder in hours, hours. Almost as quick as you see an episode of Law and Order. Unfortunately, this was real life and children don't have a father anymore because of a coward that came to our city and join a gang and sell drugs.

This is why we need to support our police department, our neighborhood groups, our district attorney and personally, I know this can't happen, I think the perpetrator should receive the death penalty. I know that can't happen because of his age, but this is one of the most disgusting things that has happened in our town in a long time, and I hope that those out there watching don't get the impression that's how the people in Scranton are, because it's not. It's somebody from New Jersey that came to our town. It's not a Scrantonian. The majority of our neighborhoods are safe

and are good places.

If you compare us to Wilkes-Barre we are doing much better, but we need to continue to support our police department in these effort and break into these gangs and stop these incidents from happening, and my condolences to Mr. Darbenzio and his family. I knew him casually, we have met a few times, always a very nice man and this shouldn't happen. And I hope that our District Attorney, and I'm confident that he will prosecute this thug to the fullest extent of the law. And that's all I have to say. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Loscombe?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, thank you. I, too, would like to echo my colleagues who spoke before me regarding the shooting. My condolences to the Darbenzio family for their loss, and again, I met with Chief Graziano and I did commend him for the work that he and his police officers had done in apprehending the suspect quickly and without incident -- without further incident.

An, you know, just in my

conversation with him this man was capable of carrying this on. If anybody saw him on the TV they saw, you know, just how ruthless of a person he is, and as Mr. Rogan said, he is not one of ours. He is not from Scranton. He came here to cause trouble and to join his friends in the gang and, you know, I hope he gets his due justice. And the D.A.'s Office, too, receive some kudos for this situation.

And in speaking with the police, you know, they just didn't drop it after they arrested him. They have done some further investigation, I'm not going to go into details other than they did stop some associates of this man and remove guns from them, three different associates, so they are being proactive, as they do every day out there trying to make it safe for us, and I think we all appreciate what they do for us on a daily basis and this is a fine example of, you know, everyone coming together and solving this quickly.

But it doesn't take back the life of a working man and for that we feel. This is

not something we are used to seeing around here and, you know, I hope we don't see anything further on that aspect. Usually we read about it in the news in other areas. We have to be vigilant in our neighborhood associations and the police that are doing a good job on this.

A couple other things in my conversation with Chief Graziano, he did inform me that one day I believe they are going to be ordering three new police cars with monies that they have raised from fines so they are bringing their fleet right up-to-date.

And, actually, Monday the bids will be open for the junk vehicles that were put out on the internet for bid. I guess the bid date is -- the deadline was Monday and there is approximately 17 vehicles so that money will towards purchase of another vehicle or so, whatever they can raise from that.

Mr. Jackowitz I believe mentioned the arbitration awards, is the administration or anybody doing anything on

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I happen to know they have been working actively on it with the unions, with the administration. Mr. Bulzoni specifically has had a lot of input. I believe Mr. McGoff has been involved in some meetings and he has some further meetings coming up to get this issue out. There is some plans at that Mr. Bulzoni came up with and if everything is acceptable it's going to work out in everybody's favor. But, you know, again, it's another thing you can't get a lot of detail out until the I's are dotted and T's are crossed, but it is ongoing actively it's not just something that's being reported on on a daily basis so I just wanted to let you know on that.

The last thing is on 7-A tonight we are going to be passing legislation for accounts and that for surveillance cameras, and there were a few questions, and I know Mr. Gaughan has some more detail, I'm going to give the questions and he will explain, I think, how they are monitored and stuff like that, too.

But three of the questions that were

asked are: "Will the images by the system be stored?"

And Chief Graziano's answers were,

"The police department will not store any
images. We will only be secondary live feed
of already existing various public cameras."

In other words, they are just being fed from these businesses and they are not storing anything. It's just a live feed.

"Live feed from existing cameras and other entities such as the school district, housing authority, parking garages, and others will be sent to us in addition to be viewed by the owner or possessor of the camera systems."

Question two is, "Who can view the images?"

"On our end, the police and department end, the images will be viewed strictly by police officers."

And the third question, "If they are stored, what is the length of time that the images will be stored?"

Well, that doesn't apply since they won't be doing any storage of these images.

And then just another in our conversation they had an incident, I believe it was on Mulberry Street or lower Mulberry Street the other evening, and they had the opportunity to use this camera and zero in on, I guess the perpetrator or whatever, so it also allowed them, the dispatcher, to give more information to the responding police department what they had to deal with there.

You know, this system, we have to realize there is cameras everywhere anymore. Everybody is taking pictures with our phones and you don't know where there is a camera, but I believe this system here is going to be a great benefit to our safety, to the citizens' safety, and just to have the fact of having cameras, I mentioned before, say someone has a holdup on a certain area and there might be 30 cameras in that live feed from that area, and it gives them the opportunity to make a quick response to the proper area of the getaway. In other words, they look at the cameras going this way, the car didn't go that way so they pick him up here, they can redirect those officers

rather than have them all scrambling in the same area.

And again, you know, they could be some crimes that are being committed that are actually visual right there that they could dispatch right from the office. There is many uses and many benefits. I think the benefits far outweigh any problems with this system and I think it will be good for us all in the future. And I think that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you,

Mr. Loscombe.

Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. I attend the Hill Section neighborhood meeting last night to update the residents on the parking issues in the 900 block of Prescott Avenue. Council will be moving forward with a parking form within the next few weeks as I mentioned a previous meeting and we discussed this in our caucus before tonight's meeting. Hopefully, this will alleviate some of the issues in that neighborhood.

I received a complaint from a resident about a problem of couches and garbage on a porch located on Swetland Street in West Scranton. I forwarded that information along to the Licensing and Inspections Department.

I received concerns from a few residents regarding trucks picking up scrap metal and driving with it unfastened in the back of the truck, which is very dangerous. I reached out to the police chief, Carl Graziano, who explained that this particular issue isn't covered under a city ordinance, but it is covered under the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code. The high unit officers are being vigilant regarding these violations due to the rising prices paid for scrap metal.

And finally, next week from June 2 to June 6 the street sweeper is scheduled to be in the East Scranton area from Arthur Avenue to Taylor Avenue including all streets and avenues. And that is all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: It was mentioned, one

of the things was mentioned earlier was the talk of the beat cops. That has also come up as an issue for downtown that there at one time was a beat cop in the downtown area, no longer exists, and now that there are more people living in the downtown area it seems as though there is even a greater need for police presence in the evenings, especially in the downtown.

I believe that beat cops in all areas of the city would be a great idea. I realize that there are problems with funding of that and all, but hopefully we can move toward some type of system where those police -- where there is a greater police presence in all areas of the city.

As far as the budget process is concerned, I know that, you know, expectations of a budget being done by the end of May are absolutely -- obviously are not going to take place. For a variety of reasons the budget over the past years has traditionally been late, last year very late. I know that the Business

Administration Office is trying to expedite

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the process as best they can. I would think that an end of summer expectation would be prudent. It's not going to be done -- I don't think it will be done before that, but hopefully we can look forward to something maybe by the end of the summer for completion of the budget.

As far the cell towers, they were mentioned, also, keep in mind that this is a -- the idea of the cell towers and using city property for them this is a process that's basically in it's infancy. There is no definite proposal, there have been some sites mentioned, but we are far from seeing any legislation on this issue. There is a lot that needs to be done before this would come before council for approval. Yes, it is something that people should maybe get some information about if it does, in fact, come to council, so that we are informed, but be it known that we are not voting on this very soon.

I will also reiterate what one of my colleagues have said concerning the incident at Valley View. I don't think that we

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should compare ourselves to Wilkes-Barre or Reading or any other city as far as the police presence, we are better than that. think our police department treats the city with a no tolerance policy. No tolerance for violent crime or any type of crime and that is what we should be looking at. don't want to be judged in relation to any other city. We simply want to do, and I think the Scranton Police Department does, it's very best to keep this a safe city and I commend them for that, and I think the Public Safety Department overall does a great job and it should always be commended for the services that they perform. that is all. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mr. McGoff, I believe you refer to the audit, you were saying the budget.

MR. MCGOFF: Did I say budget?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I'm sorry for the correction. I know what you meant, but just for the correction.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Also, in our

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conversation with Chief Graziano we did discuss the police and downtown and stuff like that, too, and he is working on that. That's not something that would happen this year, but he definitely has been working on that and, you know, more OECD/O officers for foot patrols for next year, also. I meant to mention that. Mr. Quinn had brought it up, too. Thank you.

It's very difficult to come out and issue a report that says that the city somehow did not account for so much money, but they did that and this I believe is the first step in many steps that are going to be taken over the next year or so where we get our house in financial order, and when you do that the news isn't necessarily going to be good. If would have been great if they said they found 2 million dollars instead of losing a million dollars, but this is something that had to happen.

The Federal Government has the authority to take money from our account without permission, which it did, and the morning the money was there, in the

afternoon the money was gone, and that's something that we have to deal with. It's my opinion that in the future these programs that we work with will be easier to manage if we concentrate on programs that fit within the federal guidelines without stretching or making our programs fit them. We would like them to fit right from the beginning, and I also think that as we move forward we should select projects that are ready to go and that can be completed on time.

A lot of the programs that are have to come back for funding are organizations and groups that had money sitting on the table for awhile, so we would like to see them -- when the money is appropriated we would like to see those groups get started and complete the program on time and fit within the guidelines as established by the federal government. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: If I could just,
Mr. Wechsler you said it perfectly that's,
you know, I couldn't say it any different
myself. That's exactly how it is. I just

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hope again going into the future that there is more, you know, more attention paid to the accounts coming in and the accounts going out or, you know, maybe modernize our system or whatever. I don't know what the answer is, so in the future we don't run into this again.

But what we have in front us is a fact, it's something that has to be done and it has to be paid and, unfortunately, some of these organizations are going to be penalized and suffer this year on it, but I think, you know, as a whole we are looking to make them whole in the future. again, I understand, like Mr. Wechsler said, they are looking for shovel ready products -- or projects. I learned that by, you know, working on projects with the administration, Mrs. Aebli and Mr. Preambo. They gave me a pretty good education on what has to be done on that, so I do commend them for coming in and explaining it. It is a tough decision, but it's something that our hands are tied and we have to get this done, get our housekeeping in order, and I'll be

voting for it. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: And again, some people spoke to the reasons why this occurred, unfortunately, we at this point in time are not in a position to assess blame nor will it do us any good to assess blame to any person, entity or organization. We need to deal with the problem that exists and these two pieces of legislation that we are looking at address the problem in the present and we need to move forward.

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THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE -FOR ADOPTION -RESOLUTION NO. 58, 2014 - RATIFYING AND APPROVING THE EXECUTION AND SUBMISSION OF THE GRANT APPLICATION BY THE CITY OF SCRANTON POLICE DEPARTMENT FROM THE 2013/2014 JAG SINGLE SOLICITATION LOCAL INITIATIVE PROGRAM FOR THE PENNSYLVANIA COMMISSION ON CRIME AND DELINQUENCY JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$146,390.00 FOR THE CITY OF SCRANTON POLICE DEPARTMENT FOR FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR THE ACQUISITION AND INSTALLATION OF THE "COMMUNITY SURVEILLANCE NETWORK" - A THIRTY-TWO (32) MONITOR VIDEO WALL LOCATED AT SCRANTON POLICE HEADQUARTERS - TO CREATE A SYSTEM IN WHICH ALL SURVEILLANCE OF COOPERATING AGENCIES WILL BE SHARED IN A LIVE FEED TO THE SCRANTON POLICE DEPARTMENT AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND OTHER APPROPRIATE CITY OFFICIALS TO ACCEPT THE GRANT, IF SUCCESSFUL, AND DISBURSE THE GRANT FUNDS FOR THE CITY OF SCRANTON POLICE DEPARTMENT ACQUISITION AND INSTALLATION OF THE COMMUNITY SURVEILLANCE NETWORK SYSTEM.

25 MR. MCGOFF: What is the

recommendation of the Chair for the Committee on Finance?

MR. WECHSLER: As Chairperson for the Committee on Finance, I recommend final passage of Item 7-B.

MR. ROGAN: Second.

MR. MCGOFF: On the question?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, just to mention a few points about this legislation. The police department is soliciting grant funds from the PA Commission on Crime and Delinquency Justice Assistance Grant Program in the amount of \$146,000, \$146,390. This will create a system in which all of the surveillance from security cameras will be used by cooperating agencies in a closed circuit feed to 32 monitors located at Scranton Police headquarters 24 hours a day seven days a week.

Currently there are five agencies
that are committed to this project. They
are the Scranton Housing Authority,
Lackawanna College, Elm Street
Revitalization Project, the Scranton School
District and the University of Scranton.

The Scranton Police Department will continue to recruit businesses and agencies to be involved in this project. The network will be fully operational within six months of funding and none of the cameras that are being monitored actually belong to the City of Scranton. They are cameras that are in place and are currently being monitored and/or recorded by the entities that already have them deployed.

Essentially, the cameras have become a force multiplier in this instance as police can then cover many intersections at once and potentially direct responding officers more effectively and efficiently to the scene and/or to the locations of any suspects. Any recorded video that is needed for evidentiary purposes must be obtained as it is currently done now from the entity possessing the cameras.

And the police department is not guaranteeing 24/7 coverage -- 24/7 coverage to any of the participants, so as I just wanted to mention that just in case -- I know Mrs. Hodowanitz has some questions

about that and Mr. Loscombe touched on it.

And that is all I have on that. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: I think that in addition, that the City of Scranton is not adding additional cameras, none of -- there will not be any cameras that the City of Scranton added to the system.

MR. GAUGHAN: Oh, and one more point, somebody had asked me a question about this and inquired of Chief Graziano, no additional salaries and/or overtime will be expended on this project. While the desk area is staffed 24/7 by an officer, this officer also has other duties to perform and would not be available at all times to watch the cameras. So just to clear that up if anybody had any questions about that. Thank you.
