9	MR. MCGOFF: First speaker Andy
10	Sbaraglia.
11	MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia,
12	citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians,
13	yeah I had three brother-in-laws that served
14	in World War II, but unfortunately it's
15	getting harder and harder to find a vet from
16	that era because they are all in the grave.
17	I don't think our city's financial
18	position has improved too much since the
19	last time I was there. Every time I pick up
20	the paper we get worse and worse news.
21	Now, I now Boscov claimed he paid,
22	but I could swear we were paying 108 loans
23	for Boscov, so if we were paying 108 loans
24	for Boscov, Boscov was not paying any, and
25	that wasn't in your money 108 loans and

8 1 you know that. Why the paper brought it up 2 in great detail I know not. I just hope the 3 last money that we lent to Boscov went to Boscov and not the mall partners. 4 Does 5 anybody remember where that money went? The last time we lent the money, what was it 6 7 about a year ago, 18 months ago, where it 8 went? Did it go to Boscov or the Mall 9 Partners? 10 MR. MCGOFF: I honestly don't 11 remember. 12 MR. SBARAGLIA: Well, that's good to 13 check because if it went to the Mall 14 Partners he had to intention of the paying that loan off, so if you lent it to them 15 16 that was sort of a bad way to do it. I wish 17 we had known a little better and paid more 18 attention to it at that time. But our financial situation is not 19 20 improving. I hope we paid off our TAN on 21 time like we said we were going to do, so if 22 we assume the TAN is paid off that at least 23 resolves some of the financial problem. 24 With that 22 million that's accruing at 25 \$100,000 a month that isn't going away. Ιt

get worse and worse and I listened to your financial advisor tacking more onto the wage tax, push that way up, raise the real estate tax, sell assets. You didn't need a financial advisor to tell you that. Everybody that sat up there knows what position the city is in. A financial advisor is not needed. What is needed a some type of a workable plan. I still favor filing with the federal Chapter 9 and give us time to reduce some of these contracts. The contracts with the city employees run out for another three years, or two and a half, two and three-quarter, and you can't change them as they are written. If you file Chapter 9 you

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they are written. If you file Chapter 9 you would be able to negotiate. Everybody believes they deserve a decent wage and a pension, but the way it's going we cannot guarantee any of that other than the fact that is complete mobilization of the city to pay more taxes like up in Waverly proportionate wise. The paper already pointed we were close, I think we were ahead.

So any time you vote for a tax increase you are actually taking people's lives and pushing them backwards. They are losing buying power to give to another group so 1,000 people is being supported by I think 172 or 173 thousand. Those works do not work out. The proportional wise will not work out. A long time ago they should have reached out to our neighboring communities and see if we could join them. That's what we should have done, but there is too much politics in Scranton. Too many people that would say, well, a guy from Dickson City may come up and not like we are doing in Scranton here or Dunmore or whatever, but true, that's the only way you are going to increase the base. You got to take in the surrounding communities in some way. Just like when all of the Boroughs I guess joined to form Scranton because that's the only survival. We cannot survive with the way it's going. There is no way. We are going to fall down like a house of cards and we don't even need a stiff wind to do

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1	it. We are already at a danger and tipping
2	point and raises taxes really isn't a great
3	way of doing it.
4	You are going to make hard
5	decisions, and I'm looking at you, raises
6	other people's taxes is not a hard decision
7	especially when you 12,500 to work with that
8	we don't have. To lower your standards,
9	that's a hard decision. Thank you.
10	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you,
11	Mr. Sbaraglia. Ozzie Quinn.
12	MR. QUINN: Good evening. Ozzie
13	Quinn, Scranton. I just want to announce
14	that Scranton/Lackawanna County Taxpayers'
15	Association will meet next Tuesday, June 10,
16	here in Scranton City Hall, Scranton Council
17	chambers. The guests are Marcel Lisi, who
18	is the candidate for D-113, and Melanie
19	Madeira, who is a candidate for D-114.
20	I'm against decreasing the funding
21	for various programs under 6-A and B because
22	the 2010 audit forewarned that OECD staff of
23	what was going on and they didn't listen to
24	it, and if you read the audit, again, I urge
25	you to read the audit, the finding, it's a

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1	mess. It's a mess the way they kept
2	records. So a good lawyer could easily go
3	up to a representative of Boscov and say,
4	"Show me the records."
5	They don't have them. Okay, last
6	Monday I visited I went to the Scranton
7	Municipal Recreation Authority meeting for a
8	compromise to offer \$10,000 from the Hill
9	Neighborhood Association for free swimming
10	for 541 kids from the Hill Section for
11	economically disadvantaged under the
12	Scranton School District free and reduced
13	lunch program. One child, one student, his
14	family can't make over \$14,900 for a free
15	lunch, for a reduced lunch can't make over
16	\$21,700 and some. I was treated like a
17	second class citizen. Mr. Maranucci and his
18	solicitor just like the Hill Section kids
19	are being treated by the city council, the
20	mayor.
21	Why? Because I want to read you
22	something, okay? This is a resolution
23	passed in 2003 establishing the Nay Aug
24	boundaries, Nay Aug Pool, their duties
25	within Nay Aug and whatnot, okay? And in

Section I it says, and I repeated this before in regards to the Scranton Municipal -- yeah the City Municipal Law Act: "The city reserves the right to amend this resolution or any portion thereof from time to time it shall deem advisable in the best interest of the promotion, the purpose and intent of this resolution and effective administration thereof."

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That was approved June 2003, okay? Now, come along 2011, my research, okay, Resolution 47-2011 approved July 12, 2011, amending Resolution No. 174, the one I just read, of 2003 by prohibiting a recreational authority from charging the city residents admission fee to the Nay Aug swim complex. Whereas, Section I, the one I just read, the city reserves the right to amend this resolution or any portion thereof from time to time as it shall deem advisable to the best interest, the promotion, the purpose, so and so on. The city reserves a right to amend the resolution or any portion thereof.

That means you people. You could amend that resolution. You could start

right next Thursday and do it, okay? Now, let me go on and say, this was approved by a 4 to 1 vote, an affirmative vote Mr. Rogan, Mr. Loscombe, Mr. Joyce, Mrs. Evans. A negative vote, Mr. McGoff. It was advertised July 8, 2011 in the Scranton Times-Tribune, however, on July 22, 2011, Mayor Doherty vetoed it and for some reason I don't know city council didn't follow-up to override the veto.

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Now, was there somebody on city council that folded? I don't know, and I'm not blaming anybody, but if they have a -the only one would know would probably be Mrs. Evans, she was the chairman who probably would tell you what was going on, but you had it there. You had the ball in your hands and you folded. The council folded. Don't fold again. You can, you have the right, you have the law on your side to change that resolution to amend that resolution to let those kids swim.

You know, Mr. Maranucci he thinks he owns Nay Aug and he doesn't. So, please, do something about it, okay, and try to

1 consider changing that resolution at next 2 Thursday's meeting, okay? Thank you very 3 much. 4 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Beth 5 Neihaus. 6 MS. NEIHAUS: Good evening, Council. 7 ALL COUNCIL: Good evening. 8 MS. NEIHAUS: Debbie Neihaus, 9 Scranton. was here about starting a group that would work with the city on all kinds of projects, some being very simple, just to beautify streets, neighborhoods, and other things that are a little more complicated, and I met with a young man from the county by the last name of Minora, I believe, I think. He was wonderful. He is great. He told me about the entrepreneurial launch pad, the --MR. MINORA: My nephew Chris. MS. NEIHAUS: Okay, Chris. Great, great young man. I mean, really went beyond the call of duty to instruct me on how to take use of the space that's offered by the county and very, very helpful in accommodating and so I absolutely want to follow up on that, but it's a little hard for me right now until I get a vehicle.

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But, anyway, I look forward to working with him. He was just -- I can't say enough about some of the people working for the county.

Now, the reason why I came tonight is going to mix things up a little bit, has nothing to do with a lot of the things that

I would like to weigh in on, but it's something that I mentioned I think almost three years ago initially, and that was I think I wrote Councilman Loscombe an e-mail regarding taking a look at our noise, current noise ordinance in Scranton and perhaps I think I also mentioned to you a year later in a follow-up e-mail in 2013 where we stood with that, and I don't even know if I got a response at that point. Ι know the city was having all kinds of the issues at that point, but in any event, I'd like to, unless there is a reason not to, provide and actually read into the record an ordinance that I found, actually it's a program, it's a paper, that was drafted by Elkhart, Indiana, their police department working with their city council and citizens on noise and how they addressed noise in their city and I'd like to read that now. The title of it, "Elkhart, Indiana, noise ordinance yields drugs and weapons

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arrests and pays for itself. Noise is unhealthy, unnecessary, illegal and expensive, "and then you have the name of

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1	Dick Moore, mayor of Elkhart, Indiana.
2	And I found that on
3	www.noisefree.org which is an organization
4	that tries to I guess end unhealthy noise
5	and I'll just read it now. "Elkhart,
6	Indiana, is a town of around 52,000 people
7	near the University of Notre Dame. It's an
8	anti-noise success story. The city's
9	anti-noise program relies on active
10	enforcement of noise ordinances to reduce
11	noise. The strict fines from noise
12	enforcement generate revenues to fund a
13	noise enforcement officer and anti-noise
14	publicity. Also, the lessening noise levels
15	have improved the community's quality of
16	life and reduced crime."
17	And this is the mayor speaking here,
18	"In 2008, I told the common council," which
19	is their city council, "we are determined to
20	eradicate noise pollution in our city from
21	boom boxers, broken mufflers, train
22	whistles, loud motorcycles and other sources
23	by initiating a zero tolerance noise
24	ordinance. Police Chief Flipsin and I
25	recently hired a noise control police

2tickets generating more than \$273,000 in3fines. In two years noise fines have4generated more that \$400,000."5Now, you might think, well, \$400,006that's not a lot of money, but this is an7example of one area, one aspect of city lif8being addressed and raising revenue. If we9could do something like this, look into10other areas where we could improve we could11generate money and that would add up, you12know, things add up.13Let me continue, please. May I14continue to finish th is?15MR. MCGOFF: Please.16MS. NEIHAUS: The fines not only17deter noise and punish noisemakers they als18fund the anti-noise program. Noise fine19revenues have been used to equip two		
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	23	Fines for noise violators in Elkhart are
25 \$1,000 third offense, and \$2,500 for a	24	stiff, \$250 first offense, \$500 second,
	25	\$1,000 third offense, and \$2,500 for a

fourth offense. Last year Elkhart's noise control officer did more drug busts than any other Elkhart police officer and he was looking for noise violators not drugs. Elkhart's experience demonstrates the strong link between noise, guns, drugs, gangs, and crime.

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Elkhart officials are enthusiastic about the impact of the noise program. According to the chief, the noise ordinance has had a positive impact on the city's quality of life and residents are saying it has been a great tool to reduce crime. Now. they go on and they provide -- well, let me just read what Ted Roiter, Noise Free America director stated. "Elkhart's anti-noise program is a model for the nation. No taxpayer money is involved. The noisemakers themselves fund the program. Ιf every community took noise enforcement seriously crime would be reduced significantly.

So I don't think it's always a matter of just hiring more boots on the ground, it's working smarter, not

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1	necessarily harder by doing stuff like this.
2	So I have this and if anybody wants a copy I
3	would be glad to give it to them. Thank
4	you.
5	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Doug
6	Miller.

How many17assets have we sold through the years and18what has it done for us? It's provided a19one-time revenue source, the money is there,20we use it, it's gone and we lose an asset21that, you know, a lot of residents through22the years worked very hard for us to be able23to have these assets and to hang on to them24for future generations, but we continue to		22

The idea of selling the parking garages is absolutely absurd, we don't even know what they're worth. We understand millions and millions of dollars in repairs need to be made. We can't even maintain them. It's pathetic. And so we are going to go and sell parking garages and we are not even going to get what's owed on them most likely that's not a solution. We heard Mr. Amaroso talk about a pension tax. Ι mean, that was the tip of the iceberg for When I read that statement I'd ask me. myself one question, is this guy out of his Does he take the time to mind or what? actually look at this city as a whole? It's nice to come in here and pinpoint and Power Point and put numbers on a screen, but does he live here? Does he live the life of a Scranton resident? Does he know what it's like to get a tax bill 57 percent, to pay a \$300 garbage bill? No, I don't think he does.

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And again, when this goes back to we are dealing with someone who has zero credibility to begin with the way he mismanaged the things he had control over so we are going to listen to his input because we have an administration that can't come up with a plan on its own. We need this character to come in from New York and basically come and tell us things that we have already heard from PEL and others, raise taxes and sell assets. Yeah, I'm glad he's here.

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You know, we had a mayor who ran on an alleged plan, we have yet to hear it. We have a council, all we here is, "Oh, we get along, we work together."

But other than that it's business as usual, and I asked myself many times what's changed with this administration as opposed to the previous administration? It's the same politics. I had somebody tell me, and they made a very good point, the only thing changed with this administration to the previous administration is the name. Other than that, it's business as usual in Scranton. And you know, what I tend to agree with that because I haven't seen one -- since January I haven't seen one thing

17	of the day, you know, you have a difficult
18	time blaming the elected official because
19	the voter has to look themselves in the
20	mirror because they went out on election day
21	and they made a decision to put these people
22	in the seats they chose to put in here and
23	so they have to hold themselves
24	responsibility because ultimately they
25	punish themselves and they have allowed

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1	these things to take place because they
2	haven't educated themselves on the
3	candidates and they haven't educated
4	themselves on what's going on in the city.
5	And yet, they're the first ones that
6	stand up and moan and groan when they get
7	their garbage bill and their tax bill yet
8	these are the same people that aren't
9	willing to stand up and do something to help
10	themselves, and it's very sad.
11	And I absolutely have zero
12	confidence in this administration, I have
13	zero confidence in just about everything
14	going on here and, you know, we talk about a
15	SAFER grant, you know, I think that's
16	comical, too, because we talk about funding
17	coming from a federal government that
18	doesn't have any money themselves, and so
19	there is just no reason to have any
20	optimism.
21	But finally, in conclusion, I just
22	want to let everyone know that I will be
23	sponsoring and organized a pasta dinner to
24	benefit free swimming at Nay Aug. It will
25	take place on Sunday, June 29, at the Villa

Maria II, 1610 Washburn Street over in West Side. It will run from 12 to 6. There is a \$10 admission fee and I'd encourage residents across the city to take advantage of this. In working in coordination with Ozzie and the Hill Neighborhood Group we want to ensure that the children have their luxury and that they are given the opportunity to swim.

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And, you know, I appreciate Ozzie bringing up the ordinance on council having the ability to abolish that fee, mand I hope you would actually take the initiative because you have the ability to do it and give the luxury back to these kids that you took away, and as Mr. McGoff being the descending vote when this was initiated, he now has the ability to put it back on the agenda and give them a luxury that he and others took away through the years and give them what they are entitled since these kids have to suffer now because we are so incapable of selling our assets, that we give them away and can't manage the ones we have. This is what has to happen. You have

the ability to do it, forget the Recreation Authority, this is our city and we need to provide the children and the people in the city with the luxuries that they deserve and I hope you do it because it's not a laughing matter, it's not a joke, people have suffered long enough and maybe finally you could actually do something productive instead of continuing to play games. Swimming topic again for seven years. I don't think we could ever go back to free swimming at Nay Aug Park. I would love to see that, but I do believe city council can within their authority if they really wanted to get that swimming fee down to \$2.50 or \$3 a day from \$5. That much I do believe. I think if city council really wanted to punish the issue and wanted to do

something to help the kids out in all of the city, not just the Hill Section, the entire city, they could get that fee reduced down to at least \$2.50 or \$3 a day instead of \$5 a day. If you can't get it down this year then you need to work real hard at it and get it down next year.

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Cameras. Whatever happened to the \$250,000 cameras we bought about five years ago? There is one on Mulberry Street at the Turkey Hill. There is one on the five or six hundred block of Cedar Avenue and several other ones. That's \$250,000 in taxpayers' money, whatever happened to those cameras? Are they still mounted? Do they work? Are they used for anything or do they just sit there for pigeon droppings? Seriously, what happened to those cameras? And you can answer during motions, please.

I would like to have an update, also during motions, and I would like opinions on whether the City of Scranton is in better shape 5 June of 2014 than they were in 5 June 2013. Are we in better shape now financially, economically across the board,

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1	are we in better shape now in 2014 than we
2	were in 2013?
3	My answer is, I don't think so. I
4	think we are in worse shape, you know, I
5	think we continue things just nothing
6	ever seems to get accomplished. We have a
7	lot of meetings, you know, there is a lot of
8	things going on about the arbitration award,
9	I don't think the arbitration award should
10	be kept secret. I think that should be put
11	out to the public because the public is the
12	one that has to pay that bill, okay, and it
13	was caused by the elected officials. That's
14	who caused it. So someone has to have
15	answers. We need to know when and where are
16	we going to get this money? Are we ever get
17	to get this money? Again, my personal
18	answer is no. No one will ever loan the
19	City of Scranton money to pay the police and
20	fire arbitration awards because I think it
21	would be a bad bet. We need to know what's
22	going on. Who are we talking to, how many
23	banks are involved in this, and what is the
24	status and progress? And I hope someone
25	will give that information, maybe not

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1	tonight, but maybe next week or a week down
2	the road because the citizens want to know.
3	I want to know, okay?
4	Now, overall, to be quite honest
5	with you, you know, the city, the country,
6	the state, everything basically stinks right
7	about now. We have people who walk away
8	from a war zone, basically a deserter, being
9	called a war hero by our administration. He
10	walked away. He caused indirectly allegedly
11	six people to be killed in a war, but yet he
12	is being applauded by our government and our
13	elected officials.
14	We have VA Hospitals where vets are
15	dying. No one is doing anything about that.
16	We have problems right here in the City of
17	Scranton, again, I don't think anybody is
18	doing anything about them. So again, one
19	word I think it's I think the government
20	and the system right now really stinks.
21	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
22	MR. MCGOFF: Joan Hodowanitz.
23	MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
24	city resident. I read in the Times-Tribune
25	this week about proposed legislation down in

Harrisburg with regard to the distressed status of the cities and the legislation is trying to put a cap on the length of time the city can remain in distressed status.

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Now, I don't know whether or not that legislation is going to pass, if it does pass how soon, but if it did pass I think that's going to have an impact on Scranton because we are not going to be able to continue distressed status indefinitely which means even without this legislation the city needs a sense of urgency about its financial status.

As of today, the mayor is completing five months in office. I would imagine he had the beginnings of a plan, what he wanted to do with the city to get it out of distressed status when he was a candidate. Certainly having five months in office, the assistance of Mr. Amaroso, the financial consultants that he has hired should help him come up with the beginnings of a plan, so I would ask him and the city leadership to tell the public what he intends to do so that the city ends this year in the black

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1	and has a plan to end the distressed status.	
2	I'm a stakeholder. I'm a taxpayer	
3	which makes me a stakeholder in Scranton. I	
4	have neither the desire nor the capability	
5	to lead the city, so I'm here until they	
6	plow me under, okay? I know there are going	
7	to be hard decisions made, by hard I mean	
8	it's probably going to come out of my	
9	pocketbook, my bank account, but I would	
10	rather be told what the plan is than just to	
11	drift on by reading story after story about	
12	how bad things are getting, okay? Even if	
13	you give me a bad plan we can debate it, we	
14	could come up with some better ideas, but	
15	having no plan makes me very paranoid and	
16	I'm too old to be paranoid. It's not good	
17	for my digestive tract.	
18	On another issue, today is June 5,	
19	we are now five days late for the city audit	
20	for last year and I'm hoping we don't have	
21	another audit that's published on the	
22	November 22 when the next year's operating	
23	budget was due to city council on the 15th	
24	of November. Let's hope that the audit is	
25	not going to be anywhere near that late.	

1 Also, I'm just curious, anything 2 happening at Goodwill? 3 MR. ROGAN: Not yet. 4 MS. HODOWANITZ: Oh, God. You know, 5 my heart can't take it. If you ever tell me 6 something is happening I'll probably 7 collapse at the podium. Can we just like 8 cut them off and cut our losses and maybe 9 get some money back? I mean, just 10 MR. ROGAN: The city didn't put 11 any the vote that we had, what was it, 12 about two or three months ago, it wasn't to 13 put any additional city money into the 14 project. The last we heard was Goodwill was 15 going through the process of trying to get 16 HUD vouchers. 17 MS. HODOWANITZ: But either they did 18 or they didn't. 19 MR. ROGAN: Right. 20 MR. ROGAN: Right. 21 should maybe ask them, you know, what are 22 you doing? 23 MR. ROGAN: I'll check. 24 MS. HODOWANITZ: They were able to 25

9	the mayor and the other city officials.
10	Whether they take it or not, I don't know,
11	but I think it's time for the mayor to tell
12	the public what his plan is. I'm ready to
13	listen. Thank you.
14	MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.
15	MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes
16	to address council?
17	MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.
18	Dave Dobrzyn, resident, all taxes paid, all
19	fees paid and I'd appreciate that people
20	that own half a dozen houses in this town
21	and are delinquent for years in their fees
22	if they would pay it and maybe we wouldn't
23	be so financially distressed.
24	And on this issue with the mall, and
25	I ask we know how done it, well, who done

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1	it. It's important because some day they
2	might be in another position to do even
3	worse, so it would be very interesting to
4	find out who done it on these loans and how
5	it was done and why the money wasn't
6	redirected to the right source.
7	On Mr. Amaroso, once again, we have
8	an issue with that Sewer Authority. We
9	don't need to add icing on the cake by
10	doubling our sewer bill for some hedge fund
11	manager with a lot of money from an oil
12	company or whatever. The water company in
13	Coatsville, Pennsylvania, they pay double of
14	what we pay, and if I can find my sewer and
15	my trash fees I would like to remind
16	everybody that you are getting about two or
17	three hundred percent higher than my city
18	taxes, so, you know, it's up to you whether
19	you want the money or you want to hand it to
20	somebody else because that is a very bad
21	idea. I would call it the coup de gras
22	plan.
23	On the power lines at Nay Aug Park,
24	obviously what I heard last week they were

put their illegally, that that section

wasn't used before, but now it's used and it would be interesting to at least see some kind of account of money coming in, and I'd like to mention, you know, it seems like when I pull out of a corner I look up and down -- or look -- if I'm turning right I look to my left and I don't see anybody for a half a block and as soon as I get out they are there slamming on their horn, and it's my suspicion that either maybe I'm not seeing quick enough or there is somebody in the way or they are speeding, and they are speeding at, like, on Cedar Avenue maybe down around Chamberlain at somewhere around 45 miles per hour, which they shouldn't be doing anymore than 25, and it would be better at 14 or 15. Yesterday I was on my way up Harrison Avenue and it kid jumped out in front of me on the bike. You know, I wasn't driving, but I was in two cars where people were hit. A kid ran caddy corner at North Scranton and ran into the hood of the car, didn't get hurt very bad, but his parents were proud enough to sue for something like \$19,000; and another time I

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38 1 seen a kid's face plastered into the side door window, he came out of the alley on a 2 3 bike and ran into the car and it's not fun. It's not fun to see somebody going off the 4 5 hood, and if your car gets wrecked, well, 6 but we really need to start doing something 7 about speeding in this town. 8 And I saw something alarming on 9 Hickory Street, I see a bunch of yellow 10 letters all over the street that was just 11 recently paved. Jack, you didn't tell them, 12 did you? 13 MR. LOSCOMBE: Isn't your name on 14 there, too? MR. DOBRZYN: No, I think the name 15 16 is the gas company, so I'm hoping that if 17 they tear everything up now that we have a 18 nice street that they'll fix it. 19 And once again, call your 20 Congressman, call the president, call your 21 senators, tell them that take their trade 22 packs and can it because we have two too 23 unemployed and it's not sufficient to give 24 yourself absolution by calling them 47 25 percenters.

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1	And also, I'd like to make a
2	mention, I never served in the military, but
3	I have been watching a lot of this on the
4	vet advocacy, we had the general in charge
5	of the VA retire or resign and these vets
6	are waiting with phony waiting lists forever
7	to get care that they were guaranteed when
8	they came they signed up, and Bernie
9	Sanders introduced a bill from a Vermont
10	senator, in February and 41 senators
11	filibustered against opening 27 new veteran
12	service centers and so forth at the cost of
13	something like 21 or 26 million dollars and
14	they are all crying about their childrens'
15	children or something. So give your
16	Congressman a call on that, too. Thank you
17	and have a good night. By the way, that is
18	a local issue because you have problem with
19	vets that aren't being serviced here.
20	MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.
21	Marie Schumacher.

24	to last year in January, I believe it was

the American people have been in a daydream state for a long time because every branch of our government is it broken from the top right down to the very bottom, and I think the voters and the residents think that, you know, their vote is just a waste of time, but if they don't come back to the polls and do something soon I think our only hope, as crazy as it might sound, is some kind of revolution on the ground because that's what brought us to this country. That's how this country was founded. We got tired of the British pounding the whatever you want to call out of us and some people stood up and did something about it.

23	them thieves, but I don't know what to call
24	them because how can every branch of
25	government be broken, and how can the

10	the country and contributing nothing to our

12	Senate let them do it. It's not a
13	Democratic/Republican issue, it's elected
14	officials who don't serve the people who
15	elect them. Thank you.
16	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.
17	MR. MCGOFF: Is there anyone else
18	who cares to address council?
19	MS. CARRERA: FIFTH ORDER 5-A.
20	MOTIONS.
21	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?
22	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.
23	McGoff. In regards to some of the comments
24	that were made today, I do have some
25	information we received from the Single Tax

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1	Office about at least where our collections
2	are for our city so far this year.
3	To date on real estate taxes we have
4	collected \$19,731,000. That's compared to
5	last year's total of \$12,730,000 which is a
6	55 percent increase on that number. Our
7	delinquent real estate taxes are 61.96
8	percent. Our LST and EMS collections are up
9	7.84 percent, and our business privilege and
10	mercantile tax are down a slight 1.48
11	percent. In light of this economy, I think
12	that's should be called about even.
13	If you look it as a whole, to date
14	we have collected \$20 million against the
15	\$28 million budgeted amount, so as the year
16	is going on and the collections are coming
17	in we do have more money. Is it enough? We
18	don't know that yet.
19	In terms of some of the other things
20	that people have been saying, I disagree
21	with a lot of what was said about this
22	council and the administration not
23	accomplishing anything yet this year. So
24	far we have passed a couple of different
25	pieces of legislation that have helped some

smaller business owners here in the city and protected our people. The administration has been very successful in communicating with the neighborhoods, very successful in communicating through the police department, very successful communicating with the fire department.

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The Business Administrator Office is being to get the financial house and records together. We have been able to talk to several different banks who showed no interest in dealing with us in the past and it's June and I would love to say we have an answer in my briefcase sitting here, but we don't. We don't have an answer. And we are working towards it and until we start working with our budget for next year that's when there is going to be a plan. There won't be a plan, I don't see a plan coming out anywhere towards the end of the summer, but in working together a lot of people say that's not a good thing, but how are we going to accomplish anything if we don't work together and we are.

In terms of the state legislature, I

was disappointed in them passing legislation to say that you have to be done with your status in a short period of time without adding any assistance to that, that doesn't help us at all. I was happy that our local group of legislators tried to get that legislation changed and, unfortunately, they were unsuccessful.

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But in conclusion, there are things happening here. I talk a lot of people who are paying more taxes, but I talked to a lot of people who are very the progress that is being made in the city. I think this council has provided a new face for our city, I think we have added a professional atmosphere to our council meetings, and we are accomplishing a lot, we are working on a lot and I am proud to be a part of it. Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Thank you. Just a few quick comments. During our caucus we talked a little bit many of the vacant lots in the city and the possibility of having Mr. Koldjeski from the Tax Claim Bureau into

a caucus to explain the process of how an individual would go about purchasing a property that is adjacent to them. For instance, I spoke to an individual this week, and I have to get back in touch with them and try to help them through the process, they own a piece of property and next to them is a lot that's been vacant for many, many years and that lot is sitting there it's not paying taxes, and it's government owned and that land isn't doing any good for anyone.

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And if you walk through any neighborhood in the City of Scranton you will see these lots everywhere from where there were vacant buildings that were torn down or there were fires and some of them are owned and people are paying taxes on them, but many, many more are government owned and vacant lots throughout the city they don't do anything good for the city or for the taxpayer. They create blight in the neighborhoods, we see the high grass, we see the problems with them, but by giving residents an opportunity to purchase those properties and improve their property, adding a pool, adding a driveway, adding extra land to what they have and have their kids play that's one thing that we could do to solve multiple problems in the city at one time.

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We will get new revenue onces they are sold. They will get back on the tax rolls and bring back that tax revenue and make the neighborhoods a nicer place because you will have people taking care of that land instead of the grass growing three foot high and no one taking care of it.

So that being said, Ms. Carrera, could we please send letter to Mr. Koldjeski requesting that he attends one of our caucuses to discuss these issues at his convenience. I think we all agreed that it would be good to have him here to hear a little bit more about the process from the county end and try to work to make this process a little bit more easy.

Next, regarding the pools, I know this has been an issue that was brought up many, many times, about a month ago we sent

a letter to the City Engineer John Pocius requesting the status of the pools and an itemized list of what needed to be done to get those pools operational. Could we also send a follow-up on that to see if there has been any action taken? I know it a tall task, there are a number of pools in the city and a number of parts in each one of the pools, but I think we really need to see where each one of these stand and look towards solutions so we don't have big, you know, vacant pools sitting there, whether it's putting in splash parks or doing something that the children in the neighborhoods can use.

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And finally, I spoke to the mayor today regarding some issues regarding East Mountain Road. On East Mountain I know Councilman Wechsler is very familiar with this road, but on the road there seems to be a split in the middle when the paving was laid and it seems to be coming apart and it seems the solution would be to lay a strip of tar. I did talk to the mayor about it, he is going to reach out to the Sewer

Authority to see what can be done. I know when Councilman Reap was on city council he fought very, very hard to see that project come to be and it's much nicer driving down East Mountain Road now than it was prior to that project, so I think we need to work to protect that road and keep it in good shape so we are not going back and spending another \$10 million in ten years to repave that road and to repave it, and also on East Mountain Road I did get an e-mail from a resident who is requesting that the Sewer Authority come out and check out the catch basins.

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And just a couple of quick comments on some of the things that were brought up tonight as far as comparing this council and this administration to the last council and the last administration, and as somebody who was on council during both of those times I can tell you things get done a lot easier and a lot smoother now. You may not always see it, but when it comes to us getting information before we have to make a vote all of the city department heads have been

much more forthcoming than the previous administration. That makes it a lot easier for members of council to make an informed decision whether it be financial, documents, whether it be, you know, regarding OECD or any of our departments it has been much easier to get answers from this administration than the previous administration.

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And as far as council goes, I know it's been brought up, but our caucuses have been very helpful prior to the meetings to discuss other issues that often times we haven't been able to discuss on the floor. The issue of vacant lots, for example, is an issue that was brought up in the caucus, we tossed that around and we talked about it. Our solicitor gave a lot of positive input on a way to go and we are going to move forward with that. We are going to have a meeting with the county and see what can be done.

> So I am a lot happier now and I think things are moving a lot better now, but as Mr. Wechsler mentioned, budget time

is really when you are going to see the changes. We are going to see how many banks come to the table for a TAN. Hopefully more than one or two this year. Maybe, maybe not, but we are going to see what that interest rate is, and even more importantly than the interest rate we are going see what the fees attached to that TAN are because the fees on the TAN are something that the last two years of the previous administration were outrageous when you compare ours to the county's, so the city didn't get into the shape it is in five months. It's 50 years in the making. We are hoping it doesn't take at that long to get out, but things won't change overnight, but slowly we have been making progress. One piece of legislation up for a

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final vote is something that myself and Council Wechsler and the administration on to help local bands and bar owners, exempting them from an amusement tax if they have a small number of people at their venue. That's something that -- and bands contacted me and bar owners contacted

Councilman Wechsler and we worked with the administration to solve that. It's not a major problem, but to those groups it was, to the person who runs the corner bar in West Side and makes his living doing that that's important to him, and that person also pays property taxes and pays mercantile taxes.

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So there are many of these small issues that we need to address to help solve many of the big issues, but I know speaking for all of us, we are up for the task and we are all here to do the best we can. That's all. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Loscombe?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, thank you. First of all, I would have to echo the sentiments of my colleagues who spoke before me, I agree with their comments, Mr. Wechsler and Mr. Rogan, so I won't elaborate on that because it would repetitious, but just to touch on a couple of things that were mentioned here this evening, Ms. Neihaus, the noise ordinance, that's very good. I know we have been in touch before. I do want to get the information again from you and sit down with the police chief. I think we have a much better opportunity now getting things done just because of the communication and everything, too, there is a lot more cooperation as was stated, but I think this is a very good idea. More people realize the noise now as the summer season comes on, but there are people like yourself that put up with it year round and, you know, no one should have to live like that, but if we can actively enforce this and at the same time if it would help benefit everyone, so I'll definitely be getting together with you to get that information and some contact information. Perhaps if I meet the chief I may be able to have you along, too, to discuss some of these issues, okay?

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And Mr. Jackowitz had mentioned -had asked about the cameras. Yes, the cameras are active, they are being monitored and actually when I met with the chief last time he had discussed with me how one of the cameras on Mulberry Street had helped him with the situation where there was a gentleman in a vehicle, they were able to pan on the vehicle and get the information before a police officer got there and see if the man was armed and stuff like that. Ι guess it was an attempted robbery type setup, but they are being used and with the enhancements that will be coming with the things that we have approved so far with the expansion of using private cameras that are already in existence I think as a crime fighting tool it's another big asset to the citizens of the city, but they are actively being monitored by the people at the desk at police headquarters there, the police officers there, but if you need any additional information I would be happy to provide that. But I think that's about all I have.

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Oh, just quickly, Goodwill was mentioned I was just wondering if, you know, on behalf my colleagues if we can send a letter to Goodwill to just ask what their latest status is and, you know, to update us because we are a receiving a lot of

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1	questions and, you know, it has been a long
2	process, okay? That's all I have. Thank
3	you.

Evans." 21 June 9 to June 13 the street sweeper 22 will be in the Bunker Hill section of East 23 Scranton, that's Wheeler Avenue to Matthew 24 Avenue, including the Opont section. 25 And finally tonight, a few speakers

had comments about a plan or a plan from the mayor. I had asked that question about what the plan was from the mayor a few months ago, what the course of action was and I've been waiting just as everyone else has been I did ask President McGoff when waiting. Mr. Amaroso was supposed to come back to council and give his final presentation, we are still waiting on that, so we shall see, but I understand the anxious feeling of the residents of the city. We are waiting to hear what the plan is and what the course of action is over the next few months, because as we continue to wait and we continue to get closer to next year's budget difficult and tough decisions will have to be made. And that is all I have. Thank you. I do want

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MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. I do want to make mention, I should have done this earlier when we did announcements, that there is a traffic update for Jefferson Avenue where the University of Scranton construction is taking place. It's the 200 block of Jefferson. This Saturday from 6 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. the two right-hand lanes of Jefferson Avenue will be closed so that it will be one-way traffic north and one-way traffic south from 6 to 8 a.m. -- or six to 8 p.m. 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. I'm sorry. So, please, if you are traveling in that area you can probably expect that there will be some delays because of the land closures.

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Also, it's being done so that it large crane can be brought in that will be involved in the steelwork for the building and that crane is supposed to be in place until August 1. It will not affect street traffic as such after Saturday, but I am told that they are going to be changing some of the pedestrian traffic to accommodate the crane and the construction that will be taking place after that time.

As far as the plan for the city, I don't think that there is any secret as to what the plan is. I think actually it's pretty simple plan. We need to find -- we need to negotiate the payment of the arbitration awards, that's an ongoing process. We need to find a way to refund the pensions, that's an ongoing process. We

need to do something to stabilize the parking situation and the parking -- the situation with the Parking Authority. That's an ongoing process. We need to find a way to reduce our debt payments, that's an ongoing process. All of this aimed at in the long-term restoring somewhat of the city's credit rating so that we cannot operate in the investment community so that we can work with banks to stabilize the city's finances.

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Now, how we go about doing all of these things is what I guess constitutes the integral part of the plan. Again, it's an ongoing process, it's something that is a going to take time to complete, I think that what we are looking at is probably trying to restore the credit rating within a two-year period. It's not something that's going to happen overnight.

And as far as Mr. Amaroso is concerned, I think, again, we have to remember that whatever Mr. Amaroso presents to us is not a guarantee that the city will follow. He is merely making recommendations

67 1 and it will be up to the city, the 2 administration and the council, to determine 3 which of these recommendations we feel are best for the City of Scranton. 4 5 So, yes, is there a little bit of apprehension waiting for Mr. Amaroso's 6 7 recommendations? Yes. But in the mean time 8 we are not sitting back and just waiting. 9 There are ongoing considerations, ongoing 10 negotiations, and hopefully some of the 11 problems that we have will be solved even 12 prior to the recommendations of Mr. Amaroso, hopefully.
