MR. REED: Nothing, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Any council members have announcements?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, I just have two. Flag Day is this Saturday, I hope nobody showed up last Saturday when I mentioned it because nobody would have been there, so that was my mistake, I apologize. Flag Day is this Saturday, June 14, at courthouse square from 1 to 2 p.m. The event is open to the public. The event will honor the United States flag and the founding of the United States Army.

Also, the Divine Mercy Parish picnic in Minooka will held next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 19, 20 and 21, please get out and support this event. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? Two announcement as far as council is concerned,

first, the meeting scheduled for July 3 will be I'll say cancelled, and council will meet July 2. July 3 is the evening of the Philharmonic and the fireworks downtown and council felt it would be a good evening to allow the public and council members to partake in those festivities and so we will meet on Wednesday, July 2, not Thursday, July 3.

Also, council has voted to take an August recess. That we will not be meet during the month of August unless there is a need for a special meeting, which will call if that occurs.

And also, this Sunday is Father's Day and we wish all fathers out there, fathers of all counties to have a Happy Father's Day. And that's all.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. MCGOFF: First speaker is Chief Pat DeSarno.

MR. DESARNO: Thank you. Good evening, everyone. One of the few times I come up here with a smile on my face, but

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it's a new ball game here in the city, which is a good thing. I came by tonight to inform all of you and citizens of Scranton both here and at home about a major, major, I think what is a good faith, goodwill and a partnership that has just transpired here in the city. Through the very cooperative efforts of first and foremost Mayor Courtright and Mr. Brooks Turko or Regional Hospital of Scranton along with Elaine Walker, an RN up there and director of diagnostic services, their CFO, Mr. Bob Sikes, Arial Delphi and Juan Wi, all of Regional Hospital and myself and several members of the Scranton Fire Department, our membership will be receiving free of charge, free of charge this partnership was worked out a way -- very, very, very long overdue and very necessary hepatitis B screening, and what's going to happen there is it's going to be on an individual needs basis. Any of our members who are un-inoculated, and I'll get to that in a second, are going to receive the full series of injections and everyone else will be will be typed, which

means their blood will be tested for the antibodies, and anyone from whatever those results dictate they will either get a booster or a whole new full series if needed, so that is a great thing.

And this is all positive stuff.

When I took this position I came in with a glass half full kind of an attitude, but in the context of this, history dictates context so with that said, since -- in March of 2005 through March of 2008 12 members were added to the Scranton Fire Department, and sadly none of those guys are offered Hepatitis B inoculations, and in 2008 Al Lucas obtained a rank of deputy chief and he made every effort he could to get the previous administration to get these men these shots. It fell on uncaring ears, nobody cared, it was left to languish.

Now, in five short months of this new administration this is happening now free of charge to the city. I can't describe it. You can dictate for yourself what that means.

Something I have learned in these

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few months and that is that most times if you go out with a sincere hand, you extend it, and you ask for help there are so many good individuals in this city and in good businesses people in this city that are willing and ready to lend a hand, and some have, indeed, done just that, and that brings me to another thing that should be coming across your desk next meeting, we just received an incredible donation from, and I'd like to thank Mr. Louis Santiko of Management Enterprises and Amos Towers for a very dangerous donation that is going to equip all of our apparatus, all nine of our frontline apparatus with fully stocked too boxes. So again, I'd like to thank them very much so, and that's their actually their second donation. The first one was used to get our fist installment of our opticon system, which are those light changing devices that help us respond, change the lights to avoid accidents and so on and so forth, and earlier this year Pennsylvania American Water came across and, as you know, with a big donation to help us

get the other installment of these devices.

So in closing, again, thanks for all you're doing up there. I want to thank the mayor, Mr. Dansko, Regional Hospital, and I know I speak for everyone when -- all members of the Scranton Fire Department when I say that this latest thing is very much -- and the families, because that's who is going -- that's who they are going to be protecting out there when I say I appreciate what has been done, so everybody have a good night and enjoy the weekend and thank you very much.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, Chief.

Thanks for the good work and the chief has kept me apprised on some issues, but like he said, until we get some letters and that we don't really announce them here, I'm glad he was here to bring that to our attention.

MR. MCGOFF: I would just like to add I believe that -- firmly believe that the health and welfare of all of employees in the City of Scranton is an important component to the public safety of the city and also to the financial stability of the

city. It will go a long way to help.

Next speaker Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Good evening,

Council. Joan Hodowanitz, city resident.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I went through the background papers in the office prior to council meeting and I noted another status from Rossi on the city audit dated June 5 and there are still 26 open items and it's something you need to, you know, keep your finger on that pulse because if memory serves the administration and the mayor must present to you with a proposed budget in five months and three days on November 15 and you will be surprised how fast that time is going to go, but it didn't seem to be much progress from the prior status report, so just bring that your attention.

Could you give me the status of the Goodwill project?

MR. ROGAN: We talked about it a little bit in our caucus today. I did speak to Ms. Aebli last week regarding this status and we still heard the same answer that it's

a matter of vouchers through HUD. What I did mention in the caucus, and I will mention in motions tonight is that we are going to send a letter and call Mr. Langan directly to find out what the status of the project is, whether those vouchers have been approved, denied or pending approval.

MS. HODOWANITZ: What happens if the vouchers are denied?

MR. ROGAN: Well, that would be up to Goodwill. Unfortunately, council doesn't have much say in the matter on what direction they choose to take, but if they were denied he would have to seek, you know, other means on the properties.

MS. HODOWANITZ: All right, I'll be watching that, and I'm glad you followed through on that, that shows great initiative.

And another point of initiative, in this morning's paper, the city pockets \$434,00 in tax sales. That's kind of bitter sweet. You don't want to see anybody lose their home because of delinquent taxes. On the other hand, delinquent taxes have to be

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collected so I commend the city for their efforts in this third annual tax sale and this has brought some money into the city's coffers.

And finally, I know I come up again and again and a lot of what I say sound negative, but I recently retired for the second time in November I'm finding myself with some time on my hands and I'm able to participate in a lot of the downtown city events, and Saturday I took the Lackawanna County Historical Society walking tour of downtown buildings, and they have a series of three that run throughout the summer every Saturday morning. These things are excellent, they are free, and anybody that's got free time and a curious mind and wants to spend an hour learning about the city's history, you know, you should do this. There will be one this Saturday at 11 a.m. and you can go from the walking tour to the Flag Day ceremony, and they are all downtown.

It's amazing the number of things there are to do in downtown Scranton and in

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the Scranton area if anybody just has the time and the desire to participate they are pretty good, so I just recommend that to anybody. And if you want to learn about the walking tours just call the Lackawanna County Historical Society between 10 and 5 p.m. tomorrow and they will book you a slot. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Carl Kupchunas.

MR. KUPCHUNAS: Good evening. Μy name is Carl Kupchunas. I'm a life-long resident of lower Greenridge. One of the reasons I'm here this evening is to invite everyone here and everyone watching to our annual block party, the Mary Mother of God Parish of Holy Rosary Church in North Scranton will hold our annual block party next weekend June 19, 20 and 21st at our parish center, which is on West Market Street near Cole Muffler. The block party will be from 6 and 11 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, and between 5 and 11 p.m. on Saturday.

The block party will include the

following live entertainment: On Thursday, Damian the magician will start the evening between 7 and 8, followed by the Poets who will play until 11 p.m. Pat McGuilt will be playing acoustic music in our bar area. Friday, a local drum band will start the evening between 6 and 7 p.m. followed by one of the very best bands in our area Picture Perfect who will be play until 11 p.m. On Saturday, Jim Cerminaro will be featured between 5 and 6:30. Later, country music with the Gene Zano band will be on stage between 7 and 11 p.m. Featured entertainment should be enjoyable for everyone.

We have a wide variety of games for adults and children. Adults will enjoy our annual raffle, the Big 6 wheel, as well as several other games. For the children we have a plush animals along with Kids corner which will be include face painting, sand art and many more games. We can't forget about our annual diaper derby which we run Friday, June 20, at 7 p.m. All children up to three years of age are warmly invited to

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run for the roses. Ribbons and prizes will be awarded at the medal stand.

Other features of our block party are the silent auction, dining around, baskets galore, book nook, an ice cream truck, bingo and many more.

Also, we have some of the best food around. In addition to the usual burgers, hotdogs, fries, pizza, potato pancakes and usual block party food, a stand from our neighbors and friends at Shilo Baptist Church will feature the best chicken and ribs that you ever had. If you miss our block party you will miss the best food and entertainment of the summer season. As you can see, our block party has something for everyone. We hope to see you there next weekend rain or shine and sincerely thank everyone who comes. Anyone who wishes to volunteer at our block party please call the parish office at 342-4881.

In other matters, I have some safety concerns about a new business that moved into the 1500 block of Albright Avenue a few months ago. This business is Crossfit

Scranton. It's the practice of this gym that several times a week, usually during the early evening rush hours, they have members of the gym run down the middle of the 1500 and 1400 block of Albright Avenue carrying kettle ball weights. There has been times when traffic has been backed up in both directions. Last week it took me almost ten minutes to get out of my driveway because of the gym members running down the middle of the street.

Another practice which they have is their members exercise on people's sidewalks. About a month ago there were five -- four or five members of this gym lifting weights on my sidewalk. This is a liability issue. I can't understand why they do not have their members run and exercise in the former Geldon Company property, which is right next to their gym. Having them run them down the street is an accident waiting to happen. There are three other gyms within a one block radius of my house and they are all great neighbors. I hope Crossfit Scranton realizes the safety

concerns that they are causing and the nuisance that their members are creating for the people that live in the 1400 and 1500 block of Albright Avenue. Luckily, they only do this a couple of times a week not every day.

Finally, I have concerns about several blighted properties in our neighborhood. A few years ago our neighbors had a meeting with Jody Cordaro with renovations he had planned to take place for the Scranton Lacework Corporation building, which would have made the abandoned property an asset to the community. As of now nothing has happened. There are more windows being broke out every week by teenagers throwing rocks at the building. Almost every night you could hear windows being smashed from my house.

Also, there was a fire there a couple of months ago and homeless people were trying to get in the building during the cold winter months. There is another "For Sale" sign on this building. Please let me know in motions if you know the

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status of the Scranton Lace Corporation building renovation or is it a dead issue currently?

Also, in the 1400 block of Mylert Avenue the Sparacino building at the corner of Marion and Mylert is falling down and several walls are partially missing and they have no roof on the building. Two doors down from that building the former land site steal fabricators building is in equally bad shape. Also, this building has no roof and several walls are missing or falling down. Please let me know if they are either planning to demolish or repair either of these two buildings before somebody gets hurt either walking by them or driving by in the streets before the buildings fall down. God forbid somebody gets injured. Thank you for your time and I hope everybody has a great summer.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you, Mr. Kupchunas.

MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Kupchunas, is it?

MR. KUPCHUNAS: Kupchunas, yes.

MR. GAUGHAN: Would you be able to

provide that in writing to council? I was trying to write everything down.

MR. KUPCHUNAS: You want this?

MR. GAUGHAN: That would be great if you could leave it with Jamie.

MR. KUPCHUNAS: They probably -Jody Cordaro had artist's renderings and
there was going to be a museum in there,
there was going to be health club in there,
there was going to be a restaurant, artist
department. It was, like, fantastic. He
showed these pictures and now, I mean, I
don't know if you drive by there on Albright
Avenue eery night you hear people smashing
the windows. I mean, it's terrible. I
mean, our property values are going down
instead of going up.

MR. ROGAN: I do know as of a month ago there was work going in that building. That's actually how the fire started from the work going on in the building. There were currently working on mitigating lead and asbestos the inside of the building, so that was the update and I think the fire was about two months ago and that's actually how

1 the fire started from the torch where they 2 were gutting the property so that they are 3 working on the inside and it's such a large building and there is so much hazardous 4 5 material in there that's really what's consuming their time now. 6 7 MR. KUPCHUNAS: And in the winter 8 there is homeless people trying to get in 9 there. 10 MR. MCGOFF: We will try to find out 11 what the status of the project is. 12 MR. KUPCHUNAS: Because Mr. Cordaro 13 he painted a rosy picture. I mean, our 14 property values would have went up considerably, not they are actually going 15 16 down. 17 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, 18 Mr. Kupchunas. Is there anyone else who wishes to address council? 19 20 MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave 21 Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton. 22 MR. GAUGHAN: Good evening. 23 MR. DOBRZYN: Taxes and fees paid. 24 I appreciate if the welchers would do the 25 same, especially if you do have the money.

I mean, I understand. The only thing I support as far as back taxes and back trash fees for indigent people are just put a lien against their property and collect it some day, but I don't know how soon it has to be put on it or how far back you go, so it would be prudent to put a lien on the property even if you don't act on it.

Once again, I'd like to mention speeders, people showing up at an intersection after you have looked, and I can't tell how fast they are going, but I do suspect it exceeds the speed limit considerably and, by the way, the last one I encountered we sat at a double stoplight.

Oh, we got really far, you know, speeding to a stoplight. I mean, that's very intelligent behavior.

And last week we made a mention of vacant lots and I have a small problem in that area. Years back I bought a vacant lot adjacent to my house and at that time the taxes were kind of high, \$333 for a 40 by 170, not developable by Scranton Code and now we are up to \$551 so before we go into

vacant lots, we have to get something going with the county. I plan to file for an appeal, but they seem to think that it wasn't worth it the person that handed me it, so it is considerable in the fact that it's not a developable property. I need 12 feet easement on both sides. At best I could fit a house trailer in there long ways and that's illegal as per the Scranton Code, so, I mean, it just gets to be a drain and that's why I suspect a lot of these lots are just hanging around year after year after year.

Act 47, he brought that up last week. Once again, our state legislature is just giving themselves absolution for many of the problems that they and our state constitution caused. We don't get compensation for tax exempt properties no matter what they are, and we have 33 percent at this time and it's wrong. It's definitely wrong and probably nothing good will come of that law. It's just makes it sounds like they made it all the tougher on

the poor people that have to put up with it in the city.

Call your Chamber of Commerce, tell them to stop creating a business property bubble, please. Be polite, but it's definitely when you have an excess of business properties there is going to be losers and one of the losers is our mall downtown.

And once again, if anybody can find out if the power lines at Nay Aug PPL owned or if they are compensating for the property they take up. Maybe I could get to a meeting with the Park Authority and get it out of them, I'm not sure.

And, once again, I'd like to warn with the Sewer Authority, once it gets in corporate hands they are going to want tons, tons of money and that's money that could be going to bail the city out. It will be going into rich corporations instead.

And last week I spoke on some

veteran's affairs, I'm not a veteran, I'm

not like this senator in Connecticut that

came with all kinds of the war stories and

in reality he had a plush job in the Army, but I never -- I was available for the draft, but I never volunteered and I wasn't drafted, but Senator Sanders and Senator McCane got together and hopefully we will see some kind of break up in the log jamb with the veterans that they were underfunded and there is -- they encourage people to be dishonest and state that vets were being taken care of and they weren't.

And once again, if you're in an union, non-union, Democrat, Republican, call your Congressman, call your senators, call the president and tell them to can the trade packs and if they start stating about the jobs that it will create ask them how many job you are going to lose over it and subtract that from the jobs you create, you will come up with a negative number, obviously, and if they insist on their sales pitch, well, use some stronger language.

Thank you and have a good night.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, Scranton City Council, Jamie, court

stenographer, Lori, and Amil. I'd like to start off tonight with a question that was asked a few months ago, maybe even longer, by a resident and basically I'm going to rephrase it a little bit, the question is how will the city go about getting the recyclables picked up in the courts and alleys. I'm being told by some concerned residents who live in the courts and alleys that are recycles are still not being picked up so can someone please address this during motions tonight if they know the answer or get the answer for us next week if that's at all possible? And this question has been out there for quite some time now.

Now, the lace building, I was under the impression that when we had the fire there that they had security there. Do they have security there or don't they have security there? If they have security there why isn't the security picking up on these people and kids or whoever they may be who are breaking the windows? I think that's a legitimate question that needs to be answered.

MR. LOSCOMBE: That was my question.

MR. JACKOWITZ: And it needs to be asked and answered by the developer, the people who are in charge. It's not the city's responsibility, it's the developer who is in charge of that. Does he or does he not have security there? If he has security then they need to start doing their job and find out who is breaking these windows and if this is really happening there, okay? That's what hopefully they are being paid for it.

Now, another topic, as far as tax revenue, last week I believe Mr. Wechsler said we had a 55 percent increase in tax revenue corrected from last year, property tax? Well, you know, we had a 56 percent tax increase, so that might be part of the reason we had a 55 tax increase.

MR. WECHSLER: It's all the reason.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Exactly. But I just, you know, okay. Now, lesson -- you know, you have -- school teachers have lesson plans, coaches have game plans, people who are buying houses have housing

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plans for their new house, they are financial plans, why can't the City of Scranton come up with a viable recovery plan for the City of Scranton? It's been 22 years and five months now, over 8,000 days. I would think that's long enough a time for someone to have come up with a viable recovery plan to get this city back on its Myself and a lot of other citizens are really tired of hearing that we are doing this, we are doing this, we are doing this, but we never see anything happen, okay? It's been 22 years now for God's sake, that's a long time, okay? We need to get on this. I don't how hard people are working on it, and I'm sure you are working on it, but maybe we need to work a little harder on it because we need to get this city back on its feet. We are losing people, we are losing business, we are losing population, we are the laughing stock -- almost the laughing stock of the State of Pennsylvania. We have been on national news, we have been on world news, we have been on everything. When is it going to

stop? When is someone going to actually sit down and explain to the citizens of Scranton what is really going on and what the alternatives are and if it's ever going to be resolved or its not going to be resolved?

Okay, I personally believe, and my personal belief only, the city is not going to get the money. They are not -- nobody is going to loan this city money. I might be wrong and if I'm wrong I'll come right here and say I was wrong, but that's my personal belief because it's been too long. We need to know what's going on.

Okay, the mayor stated that this is a difficult situation. I think everyone in this city realizes that this is a difficult situation. It's been a difficult situation for 22 years, but again, I'm must remind people the mayor did get a \$25,000 a year pay raise, okay? He went from \$50,000 to \$75,000 so difficult decisions should be being made, okay? And again, I reemphasize, me need -- the residents of the City of Scranton want to know what's going on.

Basically my solution to all of

this, if you want to just relax, forget everything, come on out to the Dante Club 1916 Prospect Avenue, have a couple of adult beverages, play some pool, play the juke box, have something to eat because we are having food now in the kitchen starting every night, just come out, relax and forget the problems of Scranton and just enjoy yourself and have a good day. Thank you. See you at the Dante Club.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

Council. I'd like to tonight go over a few requests for some bench marks since we do not have a yearend forecast yet other than the budget which we know isn't worth a match to burn it up. So the garbage fees, could we get or do you know, Mr. Wechsler, since you have been in touch with the Treasurer's Office on the number that were mailed, the number that have paid either in total or partially as of the 31st of May, and how that compares with the number that were -- of last year?

MR. WECHSLER: What I have our

dollar amounts. The report that's generated from Northeast does not issue a report as to how many paid partially or complete.

MS. SCHUMACHER: They go to the Treasurer's Office, no?

MR. WECHSLER: Well, the Treasurer gets the information from the collection service as well. The system does not allow them to -- the Treasurer's Office does not allow them -- the report that they have does not allow them to separate who paid in total or who paid in full.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I don't care.

I just want to know compared at the same period of time that they were due either the first payment or a full payment.

MR. WECHSLER: I'm going to do that tonight.

MS. SCHUMACHER: 2013 to 2014, and I would also like to know what the amount was for the landfill last year, if you would recall the 2013 there was nothing paid, it was abated and it could be spread over the following three years, so I would like to know how much the actual was that is being

-- that will be in this year's -- well, I'm sure we put something in for this year's budget, I don't remember what it was, but for the following two years after this year as well.

And then the same for the parking meter revenue from January through May for last year and this year. We had been getting fairly regular reports about the parking meter revenue and I don't believe we have had any.

And then also the mercantile tax, a comparison of the number businesses that have paid the tax this year compared to last year. Have we gained business or we have lost business?

And then, Mr. Rogan, the OECD loan status, and I know it's in court, but I would think that Ms. Aebli is keeping a pretty close watch on what's happening with the 500 block of Lackawanna Avenue Park.

MR. ROGAN: We have had discussions about it. I will see, you know, I will talk to her again this week to provide some information.

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MS. SCHUMACHER: Maybe you could do that next week, and then will we have prior to your leaving on recess a year-end forecast of what our expenses are and revenue?

MR. WECHSLER: That I can't say at this time.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. And I would like to know, too, I mean, I don't know if this falls under Mr. Loscombe who in the past has been meeting with PennDOT, but could we get a timeline for the Harrison Avenue bridge and could we find out if since one of the worker rounds is up through Bunker Hill if anything is going to be done with that road, I believe it's called Sand, at least part of the way up into 307? If we could find out if anything is going to be done with that. And again, what the timeline is.

And then just a comment, I listened to WILK a couple of times a day and it seems every time that I listen they are advertising for the Philharmonic and the fireworks display, which is wonderful, I

plan to partake myself, but I got to tell you it really galls me when I hear that Steamtown Mall is a sponsor, which I assume means they are paying money into this, and they can't pay even a dollar on their loan and they leave that to the taxpayers. I just think that's unconscionable, and that is all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Mrs. Schumacher, you asked about the Harrison Avenue bridge project, I have here the project is scheduled for July 3, 2014, let date, which means that when it will go out to bid, and construction will be completed in 2016.

MS. SCHUMACHER: The bids have not gone out are you telling me?

MR. GAUGHAN: No. As far as I know that's why I have here from Mr. Pocius, our city engineer.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I thought they were supposed to start construction this year?

MR. GAUGHAN: No. It says the project is scheduled for July 3, 2014, let date, and the construction will be completed in 2016.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Well, there must be -- there must be -- those people must be bidding to a schedule of events.

MR. GAUGHAN: Right.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I know they are going to keep the one open, but when they start doing things, and for us who use the intersection a whole lot it would be nice to see what they bid to, so if you could get that from Mr. Pocius, too, that will be helpful.

MR. GAUGHAN: Okay, if you could put that in writing, too, and give it or e-mail or it or however you want to do that.

MS. REED: Mr. McGoff, if I may, just a reminder the Rules of Council do state that all requests for council need to be made in writing.

MR. MCGOFF: Yes, please.

MS. REED: Thank you.

MR. MILLER: Good evening. Doug
Miller, Scranton. A few issues here this
evening. I'd just like to rebut on some of
the statements that were made earlier
tonight, particularly talking about the

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delinquent taxes and, you know, certainly any time we have the ability to collect delinquent taxes it's obviously not a harmful thing because we have some revenue coming into the city, but at the same time it just also highlights a negative effect on the city and that is that we are dealing with a lot of residents through the community who can't pay what they don't have, and so talking about delinquent taxes a nice thing, there is no doubt about that, but when you are dealing with a community of the majority of residents who have an inability to fulfill their obligations it's very difficult to collect that tax revenue and I think we can all agree through the course of time the residents have suffered an awful lot, and I think moving forward, as I have said repetitively from this podium for years, we need to become more creative in the way we generate revenue in this city.

Now, I'd like to discuss a little bit on this PFM Financial Services, and as you are well aware, I don't consistently attend these meetings as I have in the past

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weekly, but I do pay attention as I stated before, so I may be a few weeks behind in my discussion on this issue, but it's come to my attention that we may have jumped the gun when we entered into this deal and I think we inadvertently or intentionally violated the Administrative Code when we went ahead and entered into this contract. As we all -- I'm hoping we are well aware of what the Administrative Code is and I'm going to refer to Section 6-13 which clearly states, and I'm not going to read it verbatim, but basically to summarize it, no money shall be paid out of the city treasury except upon appropriation previously made by the council. So, in other words, the bottom line is real simple here to basically simplify it, this council should have never entertained any contract with this PFM Financial Service because nothing was put in the drafted and the 2014 operating budget, therefore, we violated the Administrative Code by entering into a contract with PFM and I understand this council was given it's blessing by Mr. Bulzoni. That in itself

speaks for itself right there. This is the same Bulzoni character who gave Landmark

Bank his blessing on an SPA loan that was never approved by council.

And, you know, I'd appreciate a little respect. You know, I come to the podium and I don't need grown men shaking their head at me, you know, and I just think that, you know, I don't understand where our mindset is from time to time where we just feel we can blame and violate laws. We seem to have no respect for law in this city and at the end of the day we wonder why we were in the situation we are in.

But this is clearly a violation, this clearly should never happened where due to this negligence it seems we're locked into this deal until 2018, there is no cap. No tough questions were answered -- or asked or answered I should say. You know, it seems like yet again we have a mayor who just continues to play this magical flute and we all just keep waltzing around in our delusional dream world here, not asking any questions, just going with the flow.

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And again, I'm going to remind the residents of this city what has changed in this administration and the previous administration? Absolutely nothing. And yeah, it's nice -- and I hate to be repetitive, but I am so tired of hearing how well we all work together. Oh, the communication is so much better. That's wonderful. That's great. Didn't we know that that was what we were elected to do, work together? Okay, that's nice, so we have that out of the way. We have heard that millions of times. Okay, so now that we know that, well, now when do we roll our sleeves up and come up with some creative solutions instead of bringing in these transplants from New Jersey who recommend tax increases, now talking about pension tax, you got to be kidding me here.

And then the other day we read in the paper we are talking about looting the Workers' Comp Fund to obtain \$5 million for the Supreme Court award. I stated last week we need to face the reality that the money is not coming and the sooner we wake up and

realize that the sooner we are going to be much better off. We frighten the banking community by our failed decisions in the past and we continue to frighten them and, I mean, we just keeping looting one account after another. When is it going to stop?

Another issue is the CDBG money.

You know, due to our negligence on the whole Boscov fiasco we were told that we may now have to forfeit some CDBG money, can someone answer me tonight? Is that correct? Are we now required to forfeit some of that money?

Is there anybody up there who can answer that for me tonight?

MR. ROGAN: We voted two weeks ago to make a change to the allocations from money that was removed, taken away from HUD because of the failure of the payment from Mr. Boscov and other mistakes in the past 20 years.

MR. MILLER: Well, I guess my next question would be then is that going to jeopardize the funding that was allocated for street repairs and other repairs to the neighborhoods?

MR. ROGAN: Not street repair, no.

MR. MILLER: Which repairs.

MR. ROGAN: We had -- I believe

Attorney Hickey went through the presentation. It will be coming back up, but there was a 30-day comment period where was tabled. It will be coming back, it needs two more votes to become law, and I believe it was a week ago so another three weeks it should be back on the agenda.

MR. MILLER: Well, it's just ashame that we are even in this situation, just again, the negligence and mismanagement has even put us in the point where we even have to have this discussion. There is no SAFER grant coming so now we are going to be talking about, you know, reducing the staff of the fire department, probably the potential of, you know, brownouts and closing fire stations. So again, nothing good happening. And again, no reason for optimism, so, you know, it's just more discouraging news.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

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Lee Morgan. I usually don't say that, I don't know why. You know, some people ask what's really going on and, you know, to be honest with you, you know, people talk about the debt whether it's 500 million, three-quarters of a billion, it's really not even relevant because the city needs billions of dollars to recover. We have torn so many structures down, our infrastructure is so torn up, I mean, and the average person walking up and down the street they know that. I'm just thoroughly amazed by conversations I have heard in the last couple of months about people saying they are just getting out of here, they are just leaving. They don't even care anymore, they are just going to leave. Now, my other question is where with they through all of the decades while these meetings were taking place and where is everybody today?

I mean, that should send a very strong message to this council, and not only this council but elected governments across this Commonwealth and across this country because you have lost the support of the

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citizens. They have absolutely no faith in their elected government. That's a pretty scary statement to make. I mean, you can tell that by the voter turnout. There needs to be some real hard choices made during this council chamber. I mean, we can discuss whatever issues you want to discuss, but we you just got done, one of the councilman, I thought it was you, Mr. Rogan, talking about the vouchers for the project at North Scranton. Everybody wants to develop a project, but they have their hands They are not coming here like the founders of this city who built this city with their own money. They all want to use the state treasury, the city's money, grant money, federal money, and then the city itself wants to use that money, also. So where is the private investment in our community at?

The armory is going to probably go for less than \$100,000. You know, if anything was going to be done with grant money, just thinking off the top of my head, don't we still have the remnants of the

Civil War museum in the basement of this building, is it still there?

MR. MCGOFF: It's not remnants, it's still there.

MR. MORGAN: Okay, well, why don't we come up with some grant money and buy that armory building and donate it to them?

MR. MCGOFF: Because they want to be there.

MR. MORGAN: Well, maybe they might want to be somewhere else, and since the armory is a very old building I think it would fit the whole plan. The armory is probably a hundred years old. It's a very beautiful and very strong building. It would be a beautiful place for a museum near the center of the city, center of our city.

But, you know, I mean, it's time to be really realistic. You didn't create all of these debts, previous councils did and previous mayors and previous administrations because what we have done is we have taken grant money, we built unviable projects and didn't care about the results. That's been seen time and time again in my last 20 years

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in this council chamber where we have lost money on the city's alleged investments and projects and where they have turned upside down.

But, you know, if people were investing in their own projects they would be a lot more careful about what they were doing and, you know, when we talk about tax increases and holding people's feet to the fire and you look at the average wage of \$21,000, any tax increases aren't workable. They are just not workable because your residents don't have the income to pay them. So it's really time to tell the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to come up with a plan and do something. They should have been over 20 years ago. I did attend that meeting at St. Mary's Center when we went into this distressed status. There were no real answers there either. There haven't been any real answers for a long time, and to be honest with everybody in the community you keep electing people who have no idea what they are getting elected to and have no vision got a future and you can't find one

because in order to have a future you have to know where you want to take somebody and getting elected and sitting in a seat and not having a vision, you might as well go to a movie.

So, you know, I'm not being critical of council, but, you know, where is our country and where is our community headed? And like I said, we are billions of dollars down from solvency because we have so many projects that we have to accomplish to actually turn this city around. Just paying our debts and our obligations that's nothing compared to the amount of money we would have to invest in our infrastructure to start really having a very successful progressive community. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.
MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. McGoff. As was brought up in public comment, I do have some information

regarding garbage tax collections from 2013 compared to 2014, this would be for the first week of June of each year. In 2013, the city collected \$2,355,594 through that date. For the year they collected \$3.3 million so that represented through June about 70 percent of the total that was collected in 2013.

In 2014, we have received approximately \$3.6 million through the first week of June, and that's against what we had budgeted was a \$5.8 million amount for the garbage tax so right now the collections represent about 63 percent of what the total would be anticipated for our budget this year.

Once again, I did question Mr. Beck about how many of these taxes have been -- or fees had been paid partially or in full and right now the reporting system that they utilize does not identify that and I asked him to do that for next year so we can get a feel for this if the people are paying the full amount or partial amount.

If you take a look at how much the

garbage tax was raised in comparison to the fee for last year and if you use the same math, I would say we are about \$400,000 behind in collecting the tax if we were at the same spot last year, but we did increased the amount of time that people have to pay so I'm not sure if it's a fair comparison. The amount of money that's coming in is on track and hopefully as the summer goes on we will make up with the

difference there.

In terms of the Treasurer's sale, you have to remember that this money has nothing to do with this year. This is the money that was owed the city from past years, and actually there was 665 properties that were up for sale and 456 of those properties paid the amount that they owed, so that was money that the city was owed and it was collected. 126 properties went through the sale, but the owner has a right to come up with the money on those properties by paying the 10 percent penalty, so in the end really only two properties actually exchanged hands during this sale.

This is another one of these things that as an ongoing process that this list has been whittled down and whittled down to a manageable amount, but we are bringing this money in every year, eventually it should be zero. That's what we are hoping for.

In terms of some of the other questions that were asked tonight, I have been working with Mr. Bulzoni going over some revenues and expenditures. The information that he has provided me is through the end of May. I am just getting into those and taking a look at how the collections are.

This is part of the budget process that we will be getting into as the summer rolls along so we can get an idea on the projections real numbers against non-real numbers.

And once again, I know I'm not supposed to say this to the speakers, but Mr. Bulzoni has provided me every bit of information I have asked for. He is very open, he's doing a fine job as the business

administrator and to me working together with information it can't be underrated even though it is. We heard tonight from Mr. DeSarno, Chief DeSarno, there are positive things going on here and we just have to get that through.

In regard to an issue that was brought up last week about East Mountain Road, Mr. Gaughan and I were up there in March and we had the same concerns that Councilman Rogan spoke about last week, the split in the middle can only be repaired with special equipment that the city does not have. Back in March we talked to Mr. Gallagher, who is working with the Sewer Authority, they have the machine that can fix that problem when an opportunity arises so hopefully, you know, the focus of that will get that road fixed. And that's all I have tonight, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you. A few

comments on a couple of items that came up

tonight. As Mr. McGoff mentioned, council

will be recessing for the month of August.

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As in the past four years, this is something that I have opposed. I do thank Councilman McGoff for taking a straw poll of the council this year to at least -- we all had It wasn't a unilateral decision as a say. in past years, but I'm of the firm belief that city council should meet every week when possible. There are far too many pressing issues in this city for council to not meet for four weeks. I believe we should be here, there is legislation that needs to be passed, and historically the meeting when council comes back from recess the agenda has been this thick (indicating) because items have built up, and especially with the new administration I'm sure there are a lot of the items that will be coming down the line for the agenda, so I wish that we would meet. I understand that, once again, the votes didn't go my way, but it's something that I think we should do, and I would support a recess from the city if the city had a balanced budget and things were all well, but that's not the shape we are in so I will continue to oppose taking a recess

in the month of August.

A few items that were brought up on the North Scranton Junior High School, I did speak to Ms. Aebli regarding that project this week and I also brought it up in caucus, city council will be sending a letter and placing a phone call to Mr. Langan from Goodwill to find out what the status of the project is, and also what the status of the vouchers are since that seems to be the big question, whether it was they were approved or whether they were denied or whatever, we are still waiting for an answer, so we can have a little more clarity on that project because that's one we would all have to see moving.

Next, could we please reach out to, and I'll send you an e-mail, Mrs. Reed, regarding this one, Mr. Dobrzyn brought this up a couple of times and I was thinking about it a little bit more, the power lanes at Nay Aug whether or not we received compensation from PPL or whether we had in the past, it may have been a one-time deal where 40 years ago the city received

compensation or we didn't, but if their lines are going through the park we certainly should receive some compensation for that.

Next, I would like to think Chief
Pat DeSarno for coming here today to give us
an update on some of the things him and
Mayor Courtright have been working on. It's
always good when our guys that are working
in the fire department can receive a
valuable service such as these vaccinations
for free he definitely deserves a job well
done. He has been doing a stellar job as
chief, he really cares about his men, and
all of the guys at the fire department have
been doing a great job.

And on that note, I have honor of playing charity softball over the weekend with the Scranton Fire Department against the Police Department, the real winner of the game was the children, my performance wasn't the best at the plate, but we had -- everyone had a good time and job well done for the organizers from the fire department and from the police department that made

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that game happen.

And finally, there was one announcement that I forgot to make, and Mr. Jackowitz reminded me when he mentioned the Dante Club. The Dante Club this Friday and Saturday will have their kitchen open at 5 p.m., it will be \$2 specials, wings, burgers, sausage and peppers, different items, so stop by the Dante Club and try out those items, and that's all I have for tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Councilman Loscombe.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. Just a couple of briefs things. I, too, would like to thank Chief DeSarno for coming in tonight and updating on us on some of the things that are ongoing in the fire department and for his outreach and the cooperation with the administration and these other entities.

Also, if we can, I'll get the names and addresses of the donors, maybe we could send a letter from city council thanking them and appreciating their donations.

The tax sale, Mr. Wechsler explained

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the tax sale and just to alleviate a lot of, you know, angst only two properties were actually sold, the majority of the income came from people who paid what they owed or made arrangements and put something down and made payment arrangements and stuff like that, so it is a big benefit and hopefully in a few years we will get that down to zero.

And the last thing, and maybe Mr. McGoff will explain this after, but it was alluded to by one of our speakers here that the administration is looking to raid the Workers' Comp Fund to pay this award. That is not the case at all. The Workers' Comp fund not one dollar will come out of the Worker's Comp Fund. They had a meeting in Harrisburg and then basically they are looking to reduce the amount of percentage that has to be in there just to collateralize that upper part for the bank. It's, you know -- it's an involved situation, but it does not involve taking one dollar out of the Workers' Comp Fund. Nothing will be touched, it's just a

reduction of percentage that has to be approved by the Department of Labor and Industry, and I don't know, you know, if Mr. McGoff is going to explain that a little bit more or if we are waiting until we get some more details on that, but I just want to clear that because its sounded like they are just going in and taking money out of the Workers' Comp Fund and that is not the case at all nor will it be the case and I don't think any of us up here would allow them to do that. So that's all I have to say on that. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. Good evening. Council had received a complaint from a gentleman in North Scranton about a streetlight that was out in front of his house this past week. He had reported it on the city's website numerous times, but there was no response. Mrs. Reed had inquired with the DPW and they had responded that they, too, had also received numerous calls that streetlights were out throughout the city. Joyce Electrical who handles streetlight maintenance is behind schedule

but will be out to take care of these issues so we thank them for that.

And just a reminder, if there is a street light out in your neighborhood and you are able to get the pole number, which is the 11 yellow digits on the pole, you can report it on the city's website under the DPW link or you can go directly to NEPAlights.com and report that.

I have an update on the Rockwell

Avenue bridge project. Bids were opened on

May 22, there was a Pennsylvania state

requirement of 30 days for the post bidding

period. The bid is scheduled to be awarded

on the week of June 23. Kreiger

Construction was the apparent low bidder at

\$1,323,241.

A gentleman from West Scranton contacted me and was very concerned about speeding on West Elm Street and he feels sense that it would make sense to make that street a one-way down near Cloverfield from Fifth Avenue to Meridan Avenue. I'm going to get together with Mrs. Reed and contact DPW and Police Chief Carl Graziano to see if

he can provide some opinion on this matter. It's very important to this gentleman and the residents of West Elm Street so we'll see if we can try to take care of that. And that is all I have for this week. Thank you.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Can I just add something, Mr. McGoff, I'm sorry?

MR. MCGOFF: Sure.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mr. Gaughan reminded me, I do have several streetlights, a list of several streetlights, also. I had put in for one quite awhile ago and it hasn't been taken care of so I will provide you with the streetlights, and perhaps we can send a letter to Joyce to expedite the situation. I don't know, we never had that problem before.

MR. GAUGHAN: They had said in that correspondence that they were behind schedule but they were going to be out I think this week and they were going to start to get on top of things, so for whatever reason.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I have also spoken to

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the gentleman from West Elm Street about the same situation, I met with the police chief regarding "Do Not Enter" signs on the bottom of the street. He tries to send police officers over there whenever he can. aware of this. This is an ongoing situation for several years. We are trying to help the residents there but, you know, without having an officer to sit there full-time it's tough, and they are trying -- they are trying to get their between the hours that this gentleman suggested so, you know, we are working with him and the neighbors trying to get that situation, but Chief Graziano and I discussed that at length about that and he was familiar with it, too. So, you know, anything helps, just a little push, but just so the neighbors know we are not forgetting them there.

MR. GAUGHAN: No.

MR. ROGAN: On the streetlights, I think we have all had a number of those requests and when Joyce first received the city contract they were days. We would get a request, we would send it in a day or two

1 later it would be fixed and it seems over 2 time it has progressively gotten slower. Hopefully, you know, I'm sure we -- just we 3 have up here between five of us there is 4 5 quite of bit of work that needs to be done but hopefully that will speed up and that 6 7 contract may be coming up shortly. 8 MR. LOSCOMBE: I think it was just 9 renewed. 10 MR. ROGAN: Was it just renewed? 11 MR. LOSCOMBE: I think it was, yes, 12 because I think I put in the one light prior 13 to the renewal and they were waiting to see 14 the renewal or something, but now, you know, that's been awhile, so --15 16 Well, hopefully they can MR. ROGAN: 17 address because especially in the summer 18 with the kids are out playing in the 19 neighborhoods. 20 MR. LOSCOMBE: Exactly. There's a 21 lot of dark streets now. 22 MR. ROGAN: Right. 23 MR. MCGOFF: Two very quick items. 24 First, a thank you to Mr. Lockwood from the 25 Times for the excellent article on the tax

sale. What was reported by the newspaper by Mr. Lockwood was very accurate and I think very informative to the people of Scranton.

Secondly, as Councilman Loscombe mentioned, what Councilman Loscombe said about the meeting in Harrisburg with the Borough of Labor and Industry was correct.

We are simply waiting for a response from Labor and Industry as to a proposal that was made by the City of Scranton and when we receive that response then there will be more information regarding the proposal.
