MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? I would to announce that next Thursday evening at 6:00 p.m. council will be having an executive session with members of the administration to discuss an item of litigation. This executive session because it deals with litigation is not open to the public. We will have our normal caucus afterwards and the meeting at 6:30.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. MCGOFF: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Good evening,

Council. Joan Hodowanitz, city resident.

ALL COUNCIL: Good evening.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I want to thank the IT Department for posting Mr. Amaroso's documents on the website last Thursday.

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It's very prompt. One document is obviously the slides that were shown here last Wednesday. The second document, which is 67 pages long, is the slides some additional slides and information, a narrative which supports the report that he presented last Wednesday, but I'd like to draw to your attention that this document that got posted to the website not all of the pages got There apparently is a problem filled in. with whatever software was used or at least six pages which are incomplete when they are viewed and when they are printed. I checked the clerk's copy in your office and the same pages are missing data, so it wasn't my problem, it's obvious when it got posted to the website there were some issues, and I would just ask if you could have the IT Department check on this so that we could get a complete document. That would be much appreciated.

Also, can you tell me if anybody is chosen a day for this proposed town hall meeting that was discussed last Wednesday that the public can ask questions about the

1 recommendations? Has anyone thought about a 2 date? Remember we were talking about that 3 last Wednesday? 4 MR. MCGOFF: I'm not aware o 5 anything that is taking place. MR. WECHSLER: What we discussed in 6 7 caucus was perhaps having a public comments 8 caucus before the end of July. 9 MS. HODOWANITZ: Before the end of 10 the July. 11 MR. WECHSLER: What we want to do, 12 council want to be very proactive and move 13 the comment period along towards this plan 14 and we would like to do something before the end of July and that would be for council to 15 16 gain information. 17 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. Thank you 18 very much. 19 MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. 20 MR. MCGOFF: Just a comment, I was -- I didn't realize that we are talking 21 about -- there is potential -- there is 22 23 potential litigation coming next week that 24 would be part of the implementation of the 25 plan or the recommendations that Mr. Amoroso

was made. If, in fact, those did come before council, in particular the recommendation for the Act 205, the increase in the Act 205 tax then we would have a public -- we would try and have a public comment on that since it does involver more than just city residents. Ozzie Quinn.

MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn, Hill
Neighborhood Association and Taxpayers
Association. I want to preface by saying
this has no reflection whatsoever on the
LIPS staff up there. There is three
inspectors and one health inspector, they
are doing a good job, but they have to look
at more than 30,000 housing units in the
City of Scranton and it's very difficult how
they are going to do it.

Now, I have written many letters in and we discussed it here about different ordinances in the City of Scranton and one was in regards to that couch, and I know that the couches on the porches and the upholstered furniture on the porches and it still exists, you know, and it was a terrible thing last week in Philadelphia,

I'm not comparing it to Scranton, but those four children died and all of those houses are lost because of a couch on the porch.

That was the cause of the problem and the fire.

Now, when I was here for the public hearing and I spoke in favor of the parking, but the problem is, and I hear it every day, there is no enforcement. It's deception. There is no enforcement of the ordinances. There is the parking -- there is no enforcement and going around, people are saying I have a permit but nobody is -- they park in my spots, I still got furniture all over on the porches up there, and people you collect \$50 on the ordinance for the rental registration per apartment, but you don't do anything about the maintaining of the apartment. You are supposed to have a property manager within 20 miles or something that's supposed to take care of the properties. You know, I'd like to have a percentage of, say 20 percent of the money that City of Scranton is losing on fines because they are not enforcing the

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ordinances and, you know, you can't blame They are three people and it's difficult, but you got to improvise. If you were military men you would know what improvising is, you know? You got to. know, if you don't have a plan obviously you weren't left with a plan, the Courtright administration wasn't left with a plan you got to do something because of the fact that it's just getting worse and worse and worse and it's going continue as long as they know that nobody is going to come after them, and nobody is going to find them, and I'm going to tell you something, I just looked at the absentee landlords in the Hill Section hundreds, literally hundreds, and I'll bring that in to you if you want, okay?

So nobody cares about it. The guy who lives in Brooklyn, New York cares about it; right? Nobody is writing a letter or saying, "We're going to follow-up if you don't come in here in 30 days, you are going to pay \$ 200 fine."

Nobody is doing that, so the poor people that have this parking ordinance

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passed tonight, I don't know, I feel sorry for them because probably maybe in the first week or two maybe there will be people up there watching, but I think it's just going to go fall down just like these other ordinances. So I hope you can do some improvising and doing something, but please enforce the ordinances in the City of Scranton. Thank you very much.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Rosie Davitt, I have some pictures, can I bring them to you? And this is for you. Would you just state your name for the record, please?

MS. DAVITT: Rosie Davitt, Rockwell
Avenue in North Scranton. I'm here to
address the right of entry agreement that I
made with Dennis Gallagher on the 21st of
May in order to demolish the arson home that
was at 2147 Rockwell Avenue.

First, I'd have to say that the people that actually tore the house down did a remarkable job insuring that there was no damage to 2149 and 2145. They did a remarkable job. The young man was

fantastic.

What happened was that I gave agreement that they could come behind my house and go across, because if they had done it in front they probably would have knocked down the walls in front and there was also the electrical wires that they would have to have dealt with, so it would have been dangerous, so I gave that agreement. The agreement was said that they would put the house -- the yard as closely back to the way it was before.

As you can see, there are pictures there. First they put an asphalt mix down so the trucks could go past, and that was agreed on, but they were also supposed to remove that before they put anything else in there. They did not. When I spoke with Dennis Gallagher on the 24th of June, he had -- I had left a message with his secretary on the 16th of June and he was on vacation and I gave her the details of what my concerns were, and he called me on the 24th and said that he been out there on the 23rd. And he said, "Rosie, the grass is growing

great."

Yes, the grass is growing great over part of it, but as you can see from some of the pictures, first of all, the asphalt mix has not been taken out, which means that the grass is going to grow to a certain extent and then it's going to die because it can't go through that asphalt mix. When I addressed that with him his comment to me was that, "We put four inches of top soil over a paved parking lot and put grass seed down and it's growing beautifully."

Well, that's fine and dandy, but
they didn't put four inches of top soil on
top of our land, and they didn't take the
asphalt mix out, which was agreed upon.
They also -- the surfaces are not even.
They are definitely not even. If you look
at page two, four and nine, actually two,
three, four, five, six and nine you will see
pictures of how uneven it is. There is
holes in it that -- that I have had two
knees replaced, I've had to get replaced
already. If I were to fall on one of those
I could be very much in trouble.

The top soil was supposed to be brought in. I don't know what kind of top soil you guys use, but this is not top soil. When I saw top soil before it didn't have glass in it, didn't have bottles in it, didn't have old tooth brushes in it either, which you will see in that bucket. This is not top soil that they put on top of my land. They did not even it, level it out.

I cannot mow it. I tried tonight before I came here, and if you look at page 12 you will see that my daughter took pictures of it before I tried to mow it and as I tried to mow it, and you will -- there is divots in it where my lawnmower wouldn't even go over it because there is so many uneven parts.

We have children up in that area that go across my land all the time and they have permission to do that. We are a very good neighborhood. Everybody looks after everybody else. The kids run over my land all the time. There is glass that we are finding after every single rainfall, we have more glass that comes up, and I'm sorry but

after this goes away I'm going to be responsible for that.

On the agreement, if you look at page three it says -- I mean, paragraph three it says, "The city shall restore the property to its condition as nearly as possible prior to any disturbance that the city is responsible for during the exercise of its rights herein."

It's not that way. Don't get me wrong, I'm thrilled that the property is gone, the house gone. Dennis came out and he took care of it and I appreciate that, but me trying to get ahold of him has not done any good. The last discussion I had with him was on June 24 and he said he would try to get a bobcat out there. It's not there. It hasn't been there and he has not answered my phone calls since then. I appreciate any help you can give me. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Davitt, we will attempt to contact DPW and if you have a contract with the city they should fulfill the terms of that contract.

MS. DAVITT: Thank you, I'll take my basket, if you don't mind. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: David Lewis.

 $$\operatorname{MR}$.$ LEWIS: Before I begin, I have some handouts for the council. Could I approach?

MR. MCGOFF: Please again just state your name for the record.

MR. LEWIS: My name is David Lewis,
Scranton resident and also the president and
general manager of LA Lewis Moving and
Storage 2401 Luzerne Street in Scranton.

The last two years, of course, as you know, we have a project at Keyser Valley that the Keyser Avenue project going into it we knew was going to be a three-year project, we are in the second year of the project. I knew the day would come that they would start at our intersection, which is Dalton Street and Keyser Avenue, and that was approximately four weeks ago, but unfortunately this project has created a real sad situation pertaining to my business and all of the businesses that are located on Luzerne Street.

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They have raised the intersection considerably. They have taken the right-hand turn privilege for trucks if you were approaching from Taylor coming into Scranton, making a right-hand turn onto our street and now about a week ago they directed a sign that coming out of my business on Luzerne Street you can no longer make a left-hand turn going to the Turnpike.

I have made several calls to PennDOT regarding, I have been to their local office, their field office here in Scranton. This past Monday WBRE did a live broadcast from the corner of Dalton Street and Keyser Avenue which has raised a lot of eyebrows to the city residents, number one, because PennDOT's answer to this if you look at the map that I provided to you, they would now like us to continue down Keyser Avenue, make a right-hand turn onto Jackson Street, continue down Jackson to Dewey Avenue, make a right on Dewey, Dewey across to Washburn Street, Washburn Street about a block, make a right on Sherman Avenue and then back over to Luzerne Street and make a right-hand

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turn.

You are taking commercial vehicles and you are creating a situation now where you are putting commercial traffic in residential areas that doesn't belong. Keyser Avenue project was supposed to be an improvement to this area and this certainly has not been an improvement to me. For 30 years we have been able to make a right off of Keyser Avenue coming into our terminal, we have made been able to make a left on Keyser Avenue going back out to Taylor. You know, once again this is an inconvenience to every business that I service, I service a lot of businesses that are in the Stauffer Industrial Park, Kane Trucking, Anthracite Recycling all visit my facility. I have a public scale so, you know, we get on an average, including my own trucks, but just in my facility alone we get, you know, 24 to 30 pieces of equipment daily coming into our facility.

Does the city have -- number one, is the city aware that they have done this?

Not only have they taken the privilege of

making a left-hand turn on Dalton Street on Keyser Avenue, they narrowed this intersection where it's going to be a chore to make a right-hand turn on the Keyser Avenue because of where they have put the light poles and what have you. There is no longer going to be a turn lane, which there has been a turn lane on Dalton Street going to Keyser Avenue for years, and that was in conjunction with the Washburn Street project.

I'd like to know what the city can do for me because I have -- I have told PennDOT that I'm going to continue this fight if I have to, and it's sorry that myself as a, you know, local business that we have to go to Harrisburg to fight this and stop this project, but if we have to that's what I'm going to do.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Lewis, I would just

-- a couple of things that I'd like to

mention. First, the city council is aware

of it. We were actually just talking

previous to the meeting, we are trying to

schedule a meeting with PennDOT regarding

this project and all of the problems that have come up specifically for Westsider such as ourselves. I travel this area on a daily basis and not only is it an inconvenience currently for drivers as it exists, but this detour route it goes right through a residential neighborhood, where there are safety concerns.

MR. LEWIS: Right.

MR. ROGAN: There is speeding in the neighborhoods where you never had it. There is truck traffic in neighborhoods where we never had it, and hopefully when PennDOT comes in they are going to address these issues and we need to go back to the project has to wrap up.

MR. LEWIS: This can't be a hopefully. I have had the privilege, my employees have had the privilege for the last 30 years of turning right off of Keyser Avenue and making a left onto Keyser Avenue. Once again, we utilize the Turnpike, which eliminates truck traffic on Luzerne Street and then the city streets period that access our facility. So, you know, something has

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MR. LEWIS: Today there was none.

to be done, you know, not only am I'm losing, the citizens of Scranton are losing.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Mr. Lewis, if I can just add to that, as my colleague has stated, we have discussed this issue previously and I told them that I would try and get a meeting together with PennDOT. made arrangements, the Keyser Valley president will allow us to use Keyser Valley Community Center. I have been in touch with Representative Flynn's office in Scranton trying to get together some dates to have a public meeting so the business people can address their concerns, so the utilities and the contractors and PennDOT can explain to the public and the businesses what the timeline is for this project, what the changes are going to be. I don't like that change at all, I agree with you. I go back that way all the time myself, and as a matter of fact, I was going to complain today usually when they are working in that section they have a flagger at Jackson Street and Keyser Avenue.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Today there was none and it causes chaos because everybody -- you sit at that light long enough as it is, when they backup on Keyser Avenue there is no way you might sit there for half an hour and something has to be addressed, I agree with you a 1,000 percent. It's going to be an improvement down the road, but we shouldn't have to put up with all of these inconveniences, and again, accessibility to businesses that were -- that was there before should continue there.

MR. LEWIS: Like I said, this is supposed to be an improvement project and, unfortunately, they are not improving the corner of Dalton and Keyser Avenue. They are taking -- they have taken away and took away the turn lane, and also my privilege of accessing our property turning right and turning left on Keyser Avenue.

MR. LOSCOMBE: We'll be sure and notify the businesses and the residents publically.

MR. LEWIS: Soon?

MR. LOSCOMBE: This meeting should

1 be very soon, yes. MR. LEWIS: 2 Okay. 3 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Lewis. MR. LEWIS: 4 Thank you. MR. MCGOFF: 5 Fay Franus. Fay Franus, Scranton. 6 MS. FRANUS: 7 I have quite a few things I want to address. 8 A couple of weeks ago when you had this vote 9 on Pango, the parking meter, Mr. Rogan, 10 Mr. Loscombe --and you weren't here, but you 11 said that had you been here would you have voted with him? 12 13 MR. There is something, like

I said when I was here before, there is an agenda here that you people have. You all know, but you never -- those are your little secrets.

Jack, Mr. McGoff said something to you and I said, "And I believe in Sana Claus," and I forget what it was, but what you said was wrong, and I feel bad for you, you were a gentleman and you apologized. You had no reason to apologize, you were 100 percent correct when you said that, 100 percent.

MR. LOSCOMBE: I was out of line.

MS. FRANUS: Pardon me?

MR. LOSCOMBE: I was a little out of line. I shouldn't have made that --

MS. FRANUS: No, you weren't. Trust me you weren't. I was saying the same thing you were saying because you were right.

Another thing I want to ask about this zoning, Mr. Rogan, maybe you could help me out on this and if you take any time up I want you to extend this, please, about the Villa Maria on Luzerne -- Washburn Street, rather. They built an extension, it didn't

come in front of zoning, they are supposed to have enough parking to accommodate that extension, so I understand there is an agreement between LL Lewis and Villa Maria to use part of their parking lot? Where is this agreement? Is this agreement in the paper? Is it written? Is it law?

MR. ROGAN: I was approached on this issue as well in the past and our office has been involved. We have inquired with Licensing and Inspections to see how that --

MS. FRANUS: A little louder, Pat.

MR. ROGAN: We inquired with

Licensing and Inspection to see how that was
able to move forward without passing through
the zoning board.

MS. FRANUS: What was the answer?

MR. ROGAN: It didn't pass at the zoning board.

MS. FRANUS: It didn't go in front of the zoning board. They didn't come in front of the zoning board. How is that possible to build an extension without coming into front of the zoning board?

MR. ROGAN: Right.

MS. FRANUS: But see what I mean about the city administration, they do what they want? And Mr. Minora sits there and says things are legal when they are not legal, and Mr. McGoff says -- he laughs. Wow, what a group. Other than you, Mr. Loscombe, we have one heck of a corrupt council up here. Such a shame.

Jack, on the bottom of your street with all of those rocks on Parallel Drive who is responsible for cleaning that, the man that put them alongside that curb or the city?

MR. LOSCOMBE: That's a good question and it's a cross between that's -- you know, part of that is a county road, too -- or Newton Ransom takes care of part of that, PennDOT takes care of part, the city has from Parallel in --

MS. FRANUS: Yes, but he puts those stones there.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yeah, do you know where they came from, which property?

MS. FRANUS: Pardon me?

MR. LOSCOMBE: If you can tell us

1 which property later because I'm not sure. 2 The second property --MS. FRANUS: 3 the second property from Parallel Drive in from --4 MR. LOSCOMBE: On the left side or 5 across the street? 6 7 MS. FRANUS: On the right-hand side 8 going in, the second house coming in. 9 MR. LOSCOMBE: I'll look at that 10 again. 11 MS. FRANUS: I forget his name, but 12 he did that to stop water runoff from going 13 into his property. 14 MR. LOSCOMBE: I know it was quite a storm, we do have to get it cleaned up 15 16 because it is slippery. 17 MS. FRANUS: I can't even drive my 18 car up there, my other car it gets hit with rocks. 19 20 But anyway, Mr. Rogan, would you 21 please find out where that paper is that 22 says there is an agreement for the parking 23 and I want to know why the city inspectors 24 allowed that to take place without a zoning 25 I don't know. I don't know what hearing.

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to say here. I'm just thoroughly disgusted about this parking meter thing and there is nothing we can do. And, Jack, I want to thank you for all your help with that. You are the only one up there, Pat in that respect for that vote, we appreciate it.

We spoke about the ordinances before, people not -- city people not doing the ordinances following up, 1995 I had an ordinance passed to stop trucks in my neighborhood, it's a cave area. Today I had a person from the mine company at my house because my backyard is going in a little, so that's being checked now. Every time a truck goes up my house shakes. My garage caved in before, the house behind my garage is gone, caved in it's gone, but yet not one truck is stopped. They are just not stopped. I don't know understand why they can't follow-up. Cops are parked down at the ball field all the time, trucks go right by. I asked one, "Are you stopping the trucks."

He said, "What trucks?"

They didn't know the sign was

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two-teeth from their car. So I don't know what we do about getting ordinances passed in this city.

And one more thing about Mr. Amoroso, his contract is up, we don't need his help and I hope the city doesn't find one penny to pay him any further. Billy Courtright is not doing his job. Не is hiring all of these other people. Why isn't Bill Courtright doing something? has yet to approach the nonprofits. He has done something so far as the mayor. He's hiring other people to do the work he is supposed to. The stuff that Mr. Amoroso didn't do let Bill Courtright do. Why does he have to look to others for work that he supposed to be doing himself.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs. Franus.

MS. FRANUS: One more thing, the community center, I understand that Karen Foster from the West Side Neighborhood Group got a \$250,000 grant for a community center where LA Lewis was supposed to with our tax dollars, I find it amazing that Karen Foster got this. Connect the dots. That money

could have went much further and much better 1 2 use. What about the potholes? 3 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs. Franus. MS. FRANUS: I just want to say one 4 5 more thing about what you say. MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Franus, your time 6 is --7 8 MS. FRANUS: I understand that. But 9 people spoke -- before me spoke five, six, 10 seven minutes after their time, but you 11 don't -- you just call people out when you chose to because you don't want to hear what 12 13 they have to say and you do it for one you 14 have to do it for all when you are not --MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Franus, thank you. 15 16 MS. FRANUS: Mr. McGoff, you're 17 welcome. 18 MR. MCGOFF: Doug Miller. 19 MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council. 20 Doug Miller, Scranton. Before I get into 21 the main agenda here I just wanted to take a 22 few moments just to thank everyone in the 23 community that did support the spaghetti 24 dinner that we held on June 29 over the 25 Villa Maria. I'd like to thank a lot of the

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people that came out on the Sunday, you know, it was a nice day so I'm sure a lot of people had other things going in their lives but for that amount of people to take the time to appear, you know, it's much appreciated. We were able to raise \$500 benefit the free swim. Mr. Gaughan did show You know, a few other elected officials, the commissioners, former mayor Connors so I do appreciate the support in the community and it's nice to see that, you know, on one instance we may have political difference, but there are times when we can put those differences aside and come together as a community and support a good cause.

But most of all, I really want to commend Ozzie Quinn and the Hill
Neighborhood group because without their initiative none of this would be taking place. Due to their hard work and their effort nearly 200 kids across the city will swim for free this entire summer, and I think that has a lot to be said about Ozzie's leadership of stepping in and taking

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over the Hill Neighborhood group and restoring some of the positive things that, you know, once took place on the hill, and I think Ozzie and the group deserves a round of applause tonight.

Now, moving along, I just wanted to comment on the plan brought forward by Mr. Amoroso, and as you can all recall, I certainly was never in favor of Mr. Amoroso coming forward to make recommendations to the city. I still believe that we elected a mayor and we elected a new council to come in and solve these problems for us. You know, everybody claims to have all of these grand masterful ideas that we'd get to hear, but we had to bring in a transplant from New Jersey to basically show how to put two and two together. I don't know if we've still figured that out, but, you know, it's all laid out in what he wants to call the plan.

In my eyes, I see it more as suicide mission. There is not one thing in here that in my eyes turns the city around and, you know, with all due respect to Mr. Amoroso, I would like to refer to him as

Henry the Liquidator because that's all he recommends is liquidating one asset after another. Now we want to sell the Sewer Authority off, we want to sell parking garages that are allegedly worth \$22 million. We have yet to see how we have even come to that determination that they are worth \$22 million. In fact, a lot of us are still waiting to determine how much those garages even cost to build.

But how anybody could justify how it's common sense to sell parking garages and still owe \$30 million on them I'd like Mr. Amoroso or anyone who supports this fantasy to tell now how that's realistic or how that's even common sense. What's sensible about that? We are going to sell an asset off and still be \$30 million in the hole. What's the justification? There is it none. It's ridiculous. There is no common sense involved.

The Sewer Authority we now want to sell. We want to go back to the days of American Anglican and see the rates skyrocket. Again, there is no common sense.

The purpose of having an asset to utilize it to make money, but we have an inability to be creative and not want to use our assets and make money with them. We sold the golf course and squandered that money. Past councils like Mr. McGoff and others who squandered that money and we wonder why we won't open swimming pools this summer, because we squandered \$4 million that that money was perpetually put in trust and to be used for parks and recreation. It shouldn't have been touched, but it was illegally due to the stupidity and the incompetent that we have had in our government, and we try to justify it time and time again.

We want to talk about county reassessment in this fantasy. Well, if we read the paper yesterday we saw that that's going to cost \$8 1/2 million and the county doesn't want anything to do with that. So right off the bat this plan is flawed. You know, it's nice to put things on paper, but what's on paper and what reality is are two different things and, unfortunately, we have had a difficult time grasping the concept of

reality, and until we grasp that concept of reality we are just going to continue to go down this repetitive path and just continue to kick the can down the road.

There is no creativity in our government. Everything is the same. We want to raise taxes and now we want to pass it off to others. You know, it's nice to talk about raising taxes and it's nice to have on paper, you know, that we are going to realize tax revenue, but it's come to the point now where people can't give what they don't have. And the residents of this city have been overtaxed for decade after decade that they don't have anything left to give because their government has let them down and until we restore some common sense in our government.

As I said, nothing is going to change and future of this city won't be bright and, you know, it's come to the point now where maybe it's time to look at the possibility of discussing a bankruptcy petition. That's the first time I have ever said that because in the past I have never

been comfortable with that, but it's come to the point where unless we get our acts together and start solving our own issues it might be time to go that route. But over the next few weeks I'm going to, you know, brain storm some different ideas. As you all know with me, when I am critical and objective of something I always come back with an alternative as I have done in the past and I intend to spend some time and brainstorm some ideas and get discussion going, and maybe we need to have a town hall meeting and bring the residents to go.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. MILLER: Because this is a team effort and we need to solve our problems and we don't need to keep bringing people from out of town. Let's solve our own problems. We caused them, we need to fix them. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Cindy Morgan.

MS. MORGAN: Good evening. I'm
Cindy Morgan and I am a building owner and
business owner up in the Prescott area of
Scranton and I was just concerned, it's the

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first that I was -- I heard about this that they are trying to pass an ordinance for permit parking and I just don't understand how that's going to work. There are a lot of businesses, it's finally a nice growing At one time it was so deserted and, you know, now it's nice businesses and I just feel like in our business area when everybody is working it's very hard to park right in front of your business. I mean, there is a restaurant, there is a bar, I have a hair salon, there is a yoga studio, so sometimes you can't park in front of your place and you have to find alternatives to park. It's a public street, and I'm just concerned if this becomes just permit parking that we are going to lose businesses. I have tenants, so, I mean, if you have your tenants parking in front of your places and then, you know, other people come for the business, you know, sometimes there isn't enough parking.

And I have a couple of the pictures, I didn't have time to run them off, but just to show you on the way down here I took --

the street isn't that busy all the time. I have -- I don't know if I -- could I approach and show a couple of the pictures or I don't know if that's allowed or not?

MR. MCGOFF: If you wish.

MS. MORGAN: I mean, there are people are complaining, but there is -- I mean, you can just scroll through, there is four pictures.

MR. MCGOFF: I'm sorry, I hit the button.

MS. MORGAN: There is only four pictures, just to show that it's not, you know, it's not that busy to make this a permit parking only, you know, only street. I just think that it's going to be a major problem, you know, if that happens and I would just hate to see, you know, businesses leaving the area or us losing business because of, you know, something like that. That's just my concern, so thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

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Permission to pass up a paper. Pass it on, please. I'm going to have to talk pretty fast. This one is on the sewer plant PUC. "Dear Editor, Scranton should not sell or lease the sewer system to American Water or any other private company."

There is a few things here about Mayor Courtright, which may or may not be true so I'm not going to even read that. "This new direction should not involve auctioning off the city's sewer to the highest bidder. Privatizing the utility would be a terrible deal for households and local businesses. Any money that the city receives in exchange for control of the system would be an expensive loan that residents will have to repay through increased sewer bills. Scranton should have already learned it's lesson. In 1999, the City of Dunmore and Scranton leased the sewer to American Water Exchange for \$8 million for short-term budgetary relief. Just five years into the 20-year contract after the company hiked its fees several times and contested the scope of maintenance

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responsibilities," which by the way, we were fined \$2 million for and the next time may involve a prison sentence for somebody --" so, unfortunately, in order to do so the city of Dunmore had to pay back \$6.6 million in upfront fee." There must have been Scranton/Dunmore I missed.

"The city and narrowly avoided bankruptcy at the time by selling its storm water system to the Sewer Authority. It goes on, "In Coatsville, for example, the sewer rates quadrupled 400 percent."

Now, I have a bill at home for about \$62 for two months, so, you know, due to the math. That's probably what, 300 or 400 dollars a year maybe, and if it increases four-fold it's going to be \$1,200 a year, that's way more than you get out of me for both of my properties in this town as far as taxes are concerned, and there is another one and while their policy boosts sprawl, I'll address that next week, but I think it's self-explanatory which we should do everything we can and not.

Federal Court, take the Pennsylvania constitution to Court, 33 and growing percent of the city is tax exempt and it's not sustainable.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, City of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I missed the presentation, but I did read it in the newspaper, and of all of the things that were recommended that Mr. Courtright said he wholeheartedly endorsed was higher taxes and tweaking of the mercantile and business privilege tax, which we know was in there. I mentioned that, the very same -- if it came out of the Chamber that's what they are going to try to do, reduce the business privilege and mercantile tax because it's detrimental. It probably is, but people that pay that wage tax is also detrimental

and you are not going to do anything with that.

I told you before, there is very little things you can do except raise our taxes, and that's what you are going to do. No matter what these other grandioso plans are. First of all, take the parking garages. We cannot sell the parking garage without the bondholders approval. That means that the Parking Authority would have to buy half the bonds to get the garages back into their control so they can sell them. That means they would have to borrow about 22 or 25 million to do that, and you know and I know it's not going to happen.

And same thing with the Sewer

Authority. Dunmore already says they are
not on board with and most of the members
that are on there are not on board with it,
so we are going to have wait until their
time expires until we put people on there
that's going to say, yes, we want to do
this, but that's down the road, too.

There is nothing in this plan that actually can help the city out at present

except the wage tax, increasing the wage tax or that plan they had from is it Blake, I guess it is, our senator, Senator Blake wants to increase the emergency service tax. Notice I'm using the word emergency service tax because that's what it was supposed to be. Now it's going to be three times more than it was originally.

That's one of the reasons why I talked against Harrisburg up there with their 76 going to do something with the school tax. You and I know that's a farce. It's going to be the same thing like the emergency service tax. It's just going to keep rolling over and rolling over and rolling over and rolling over and rolling over. It's not fixed and the only way you can do anything is say you can't raise without a statewide referendum raising taxes on that or changing the form and taking to way from the politicians for that to work and they are not going to do that.

So this is where we are going to stand. You are going sit there and you are going to take the brunt or raising taxes again, and I'm sorry that's what you are

going to have to do. And as far as the union goes, the password for the union is forward, not backward. The unions are not going to give back what they have fought so hard to win, I can tell you that now. You are not going to be able to sell it to the rank and file because you couldn't do it in our union or you can't do it any union. The unions want to go forward not backward.

So these are the problems you got. How you are going to handle them, I don't know, but you are getting \$12,500 a year to figure it out, and if that's all you can figure out is to raise taxes then we're definitely overpaying you. You got to come up with solutions. I don't care how you do them, go out and do them. That's the only way. Otherwise, you are going to get blamed for everything that's going on in the administration.

I mean the administration started off raising salaries of their employees, giving Mr. Pocius a contract when Peters was lower, people don't forget that. They are not going to forget that that was political.

MS. SCHUMACHER: First, I'd like to give a big shout out to Tony Santoli. As we all witnessed, a lot of downed trees in this city from the storm the other evening and I shutter to think how many more there would have been without the hundreds of trees that Mr. Santoli has examined and marked for either take down or trimming and he has taken very many down and without that this city would have been a disaster the other night, so a big shout out to Tony.

The Amoroso report, of course, had lot of issues and there will continue to be issues which I will hold for the town hall and I would like to know who is in charge of setting up the town hall that was discussed last week? Okay.

MR. MCGOFF: There is no procedure, set procedure for doing it so asking who is in charge of doing it, whoever initiates it would be in charge.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I'll have to go back and read the minutes, but I thought

council took that on last week, so I'll go back and come back next week on that, but the thing that I do think is important awhile back several months ago I provided a copy of an article that was written this past January by the first receiver of the City of Harrisburg and it was entitled, "A Critical First and Last Steps in Municipal Workout." It spoke to Vallejo, California, Harrisburg and Detroit, Michigan. I'd just like to read the first one, and I have a copy for each of you so that you can read through it and consider it, but I will read the first paragraph.

It says, "The first critical step in a municipal workout, whether inside or outside of the bankruptcy, is to get all of parties, the debtor and the creditors to accept that they will all have to incur significant losses as a result of the workout process. Secured creditors will do better than unsecured creditors, but taking that into account the losses need to be fair and proportionate and the municipality needs to come out the other end of the process

able to operate successfully into the future."

As I say, after the meeting I will give you each a copy, but I hope you don't piecemeal this thing. I think that's the worse thing you can do is encourage a lot of holdouts. What we need is a giant negotiation, everybody, and get it all done, everything voted on in one night, and if we can come out some money ahead the better for our future, but definitely do not piecemeal it.

Then, Mr. Rogan, do you have the answers to my OECD loan questions or --

MR. ROGAN: To some of them, I spoke to Linda and Attorney Hickey this week regarding two main issues that you brought up, one being the loans in general, and one being Alexander's specifically. On Alexander's specifically, those provisions if they are not brought up by the deadline they will sunset, but there are negotiations ongoing for a longer term, a longer term deal.

Regarding the loan portfolio in

general, I did speak to Linda and Gene,
Attorney Hickey, and we went over -- we are
currently in -- the administration and
myself are currently in the process of
changing the way that we go after the
delinquent loans. Hopefully, I'm hopeful
that by the beginning of -- after the August
recess that we will be able to go into a
little more detail on what the plan is, but
it won't be the way that business was done
where if somebody doesn't pay they just let
it go, and that was the problem.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, we were told that they were in litigation, as a matter of fact, there was like 1.6 million so, you know, we all sort of sucked in our breath a couple of the weeks ago when we learned about the cutbacks for this year -- or the coming year and the monies that can be provided because of old issues, and I think it's way too far. We should hear about those things at least quarterly, and I hope to hear on an individual basis by the end of July not wait until September because September we are going to start hopefully

acting and you have some issues to act on with respect to whether or not we are going to get a workout or whether or not we are going to go to bankruptcy, so I would hope that would occur.

Moving on, there was a request for a proposals for a street lighting project,

Phase II. Oh, I'm sorry, I messed up because there is one on the agenda tonight in Seventh Order, and last chance to talk on that, I guess that's -- this will be it for the night, but if you would tell me when it says -- this is on 7-B, it says, "To execute and enter into an automated red light enforcement program," is this a red light camera that you are introducing into the city?

MR. GAUGHAN: No, this is a modification to the signal head at the intersection of South Washington Avenue and Elm Street. It has -- it's not anything to do with the red light.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Really?

MR. GAUGHAN: That's the name of the grant.

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MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, I'll bring the rest back next week. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: You're welcome.

MR. MCGOFF: Is there anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

ALL OF COUNCIL: Good evening.

MR. MORGAN: Lee Morgan. You know, I just wanted to make some really brief comments I guess about Mr. Amaroso's plan. I find it very troubling that we brought someone here, as others speakers have also stated, that told us stuff we already knew. And as far as turning this city around, I think that maybe council and the mayor should go back to the council and the mayoral races that I was in and look at what I said because it's not very complex. I may have never won an election, but I never spent any money either. I spent over 20 years coming to these council meetings and I have some real ideas and I think if people looked at them and you could accept somebody else's ideas instead of the politically

connected people that maneuver behind the

scenes, I think we can save what's left of this city, but if we keep going down the same broken road that we have perceived our answers lie we are going to be in bring trouble here. The end is within reach here. Very closely within reach because after the Sewer Authority is gone, if it ever happens, and the parking garages are gone, there is nothing more but hellacious tax increases been mountains of debt. And that's how simple it gets. It doesn't get much simpler than that.

And in regard to the city employees, I find it very troubling that they have picked the councils and the mayors in the city for close to 80 years and they have never once protected their own pensions. It's a very troubling thing, but the residents in this city have paid the tax to pay those pensions, but it was diverted. We need to ask where did all of the state and federal revenue that came into the city to turn it around go to? We haven't even figured out I think what happened to the bars at the Nay Aug Zoo.

I mean, this city has been so thoroughly looted over decades and now we are going back to the same people asking them for money and when we look at the census numbers for this city we went to near 140,000 down to 70, which tells you that people have left and, of course, a lot of people have passed away but their children aren't staying here and we kept worrying about utter silliness.

We have the North Scranton project that's stalled for how long, a decade or more? We are worried about the Scranton Lace building and the whole city is just falling apart. People walk through this city, even people who come back here after 30 years can't believe how this city looks. I think any plan has to be liquid, it has to be able to move and maneuver. I think it has to be not firmly placed like Mr. Amoroso and make this council and this mayor believe. This plan has to change according to what's happening on the ground here.

And the employees of the city, I just can't see how a city can employ anyone

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without a population base and the people here have come up and talked about, you know, the age of the average Scrantonian, it's getting older. The baby boomers of the generation I am part of are getting older, but I would like to see the baby boomers solve our problems so we don't kick this can down the road, because like I said here once before, Mr. Rogan, Mr. Gaughan, whatever is left of this city that's what you are going to get and that's all you are going to get, and maybe a mountain of debt because really there aren't very smart decisions being made here, and the people making the decisions for the city behind the scenes they are not worried about us, they are worried about them and that's the problem.

So I think it's time for this mayor and this city and this council to take a good hard look at what's going on, start opening that budget up for the next budget. Don't rely on the administration's plans or numbers, I think that the budget needs to be split up amongst all five council members because one person cannot do it, and that's

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not a shot at any council person, it's just this problem is so big and it's never been solved.

You know, I went to St. Mary's

Center when we went into this distressed
status, nothing has happened, except it's
gotten worse and there is only one question
here that needs to be solved or answered is
there going to be a Scranton after this is
all said and done?

Flint, Michigan, is getting ready to file a bankruptcy. I don't know, you know, when you look at the city's employees saying that this plan is better and anything they have seen before, well, if they call this a plan I don't know. Think it's like going to the funeral, you know, going to the grave site because really honestly and truthfully has this city gotten any better in 20 plus years? Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Good evening.

MR. ELLMAN: I wasn't going to come tonight and bother you people, but a fellow

phoned me about 5:00 and tried to sell me a house across from me and we started talking about the city. This is what you people think is a good report. Shame on you. This is absolute disgust. I don't think, maybe Jack, I know Jack has, I don't think the four of you have ever talked to somebody that lives in a project that lost their house, not because of a fire. I have talked to some people right across the street in that building that had a home paid for and couldn't afford it no more with everything.

Here you are giving Mr. Amoroso hero status for a report that a grammar school kid could have advocated raising taxes. You are not doing nothing about the cause of all of this chaos for crying out loud and that's these phony nonprofits that goes on and on and they keep buying property. I tell you what, somebody get on your computer since Lackawanna College took the little area over there, see how many buildings they got, it's not that many to see how much money every year went off the tax rolls then you can multiply that probably 100 years from the

University been taking property and 150, 60 pieces of property they have you are talking about ten of millions of dollars. Why isn't something done about the Pure Charity Act? If Mr. Amoroso had any thought about this city he would be over there rewriting that Act that these phony colleges are hiding behind, but no, he doesn't even mention the phony colleges.

And he doesn't mention all of the waste this goes on. This week the paper said the jail is buying property up around them for parking. Why can't they have the employees permit parking on the street? They give it to the University students. They are allowed to park all over the place where a car that's inspected and insured and licenses can't use a parking space over there because it's some snotty kid that lives in a house with 75 people.

It's not right what goes on in this city. Why should somebody have their house and lose a house because of all of the waste around here so people can park to visit someone in jail, and I have been in the jail

and I have visited people in the jail, I'm not making fun of no one. You can walk, people have been walking to that jail for 100 years. It's just a continual, constant, never ceasing waste that goes on an everybody sees it. Every place you look you can see it.

Last year I complained they had a crew cut down some trees by my house and a couple of weeks later there was another crew there trimming, cutting trees just to have something to do. I talked to them. I walked my dog down there. That's what -- it just -- you people just don't think of us that put you in those seats. You have just forgotten about us. What are we going to do? You are going to go on and let this man do like he did? He is not no hero of Newark, I guarantee you. All he did was sell everything that wasn't nailed down and blow out a town and on his way out of town he messed up the hospitals.

You can't sell the Sewer Authority.

What if you sell it? Tell me what's going
to happen if you sell the Sewer Authority?

They are going to raise rates where we wouldn't be able to afford to use the water. It would be a private business. They are not going to let -- look at the gas company. We are supposed to be the biggest producer in the world, they raised our gas 6 percent so far this year. You think the Sewer Authority won't be up? It will be outrageous when it goes on.

It's time somebody that's put you into those seats to replace one of them. You are not doing a good job. You are not just doing the job for the people of this city. You ought to stand down there in front of Price Rite and talk to the people from that neighborhood and see what goes on in this city. I told them six, eight years ago it's time for a curfew because we are having problems with gangs. Nothing was done. You people just don't do nothing to help us.

I tell you, if I could sell my house, like I said, I could walk off and get my equity and leave town and be better off.

I love this town. I got friends all over

this country that -- business associates that I have met business wise where I could go and spend some happy days. I stay here by choice and I'd sure like to see somebody do something for the city for a change besides sit there and just take your money and listen to these people every week.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

MR ELLMAN: And I'm very happy they go some new, fresh faces out there. Thank you.

Mr. McGoff. The first thing I'd like to do tonight, and I'm sure the rest of my colleagues would do the same, would be to thank the fire and the police and the DPW of our city for their response to the storm the other night. The city was hit pretty hard and I think our guys and girls did a great job and they do care about the city and they

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are working to make it better.

In terms of the town meeting that was discussed the past week, I suggested the town meeting last week and Mr. Rogan agreed with me and we are looking for comments on this plan, but in my opinion it's up to the administration to take the lead on this town meeting. In order for this plan to work, we need information from the people that are going to put in place and right now as the council we are not the people that are going to put this plan in place. We heard the presentation last week just like you did and we are always looking for information. think as we move forward through the summer I believe that the administration has to do more to make us familiar with what's going on.

We also were in receipt of some concerns about Mary Lane up on East Mountain. Back in March, Mr. Gaughan and I we took a tour of the mountain, took a look at several different streets.

Unfortunately, Mary Lane is not on a paving list for this year, but we are working

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towards getting it on for future paving and if any money does become available we are aware of the conditions on that street. And that's all I have tonight, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Mr. Rogan? MR. ROGAN: Yes, just a few brief comments. Mr. Wechsler is correct, everyone in the city did a great job with the storm our police, our fire and DPW, and I would, like to second what one of our speakers said that Mr. Santoli did a great job, I actually had a request that was sent in and luckily it was taken care of. It was a very large dead tree and lucky it was taken care of right before the storm, you know, over the weekend and on Monday it was topped, it was a tree up on East Mountain and it was a very large tree. I can't even imagine what would have happened if that tree was still there when the storm came through on Tuesday so a great job by all of those items.

Regarding the report that was presented last week, I think there obviously are a lot of items on there, some I support, some I don't support, and I think the public

out there feels the same way, and I agree we need to hear input from the public on what items they would like to see move forward, what items they would like to see not move forward, but I think that process starts by voting, by putting them on the agenda for an up or down vote.

As we know, council takes three votes on any major pieces of legislation. Once those items are put on the agenda it gives the members of the public a chance to come and comment three times at council and when we talked earlier in our caucus about having a special public comment period prior to a council meeting, specifically, on these items. Kind of like we had today regarding the parking in the Hill Section, this would be the same type of venue just specific to items in this plan.

And I did ask my colleagues, and they all agreed, that if city council does consider pursuing the commuter tax that we must have input from those who live outside of the city who normally by rule aren't allowed to speak at city council meetings,

so that is something that I'm glad we all agreed to allow on those from outside the city to come and address council on that issue as well because it will effect a number of people.

That being said, having this plan just being presented to us last week, I would once again like to speak my opposition to the city council recessing throughout the month of the August. There is so many items in this plan that need to be acted on. Whether they are voted up or they have voted down, those items should all be -- as many as we can should be addressed before the budget is created.

Two years ago one of the biggest problems the city had with the budget was there were items that were put in there that were put in the budget that weren't addressed previously and the budget was passed, those items weren't realized and then the city was left with a giant shortfall. That's why I believe by beginning to address them now and having votes and listening to discussion form the

residents that will make the city much better prepared come budget time.

So I would hope that we could possibly consider coming in for the month of August to address these items in the report one by one and that's something that I think we should all consider. I would certainly support it, and that's all I have for tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

Mr. Loscombe?

MR. LOSCOMBE: Yes, thank you. It's my turn to provide some handouts here.

Good evening, ladies and gentlemen.

To all our speakers, viewers, supporters, my colleagues and critics, I humbly announce this will be my last meeting as a sitting city councilman. Effective with the conclusion of this meeting, I will be resigning from my position as a Scranton City Councilman. This decision has not been easy, but at the urging of family and close friends, I have come to the realization that it is now time to step down. It has been no secret that I have faced with financial

difficulties since the seizing of my pension almost immediately after my appointment to city council in January of 2010. I was unaware of the ordinance which was written when I was ten years old until a few days after I was sworn in. At that time, I had a decision to make, do I immediately resign, as was hoped by those who dug up this archaic ordinance, or do I continue to serve as I believe that I could weather the storm as this issue made it's way through the legal system.

I chose the later. Unfortunately, the economy didn't cooperate and I found myself struggling to make ends meet to the point of nearly losing my home.

Fortunately, for those in mortgage distress, there are local problems that provide assistance to those who seriously want to save their homes. I want to personally thank the representatives of the United Neighborhood Centers, more specifically, Terrilynn D'Agostino, my Attorney Ray Ferrario, and especially Judge Terry Nealon for providing a Court option encouraging the

banks to work with individuals in mortgage distress on a plan for payment agreements and mortgage modifications in an effort to keep families in their homes, and I urge anyone out there the same position to seek this help because it's invaluable and a lot of our OECD money goes into these plans.

They don't provide you with any financing, but they provide you with, you know, their expertise.

As a result of this program, I'm happy to report that the bank has approved my mortgage modification as a result of a successful trial period. As the city struggles to implement the financial recovery plan, so too have I been working on a recovery plan to get my personal finances in the order. A big part of my plan is commitment to my bank that I must work to bring my income up to my pre-city council days. In order to accomplish my plan, it is incumbent on me at this time to seek reinstatement of the pension that I earned as a firefighter.

This past year especially has had

it's personal up and downs for me as I have buried some close friends and my kid sister and campaign manager, Kathy Martin. My mother and my wife have both undergone serious surgeries, and I have also been blessed this year with the arrival of a new granddaughter Gracilyn in March, and will be further placed with twin grandchildren, Mason and Sophia, in early September bringing me up to seven lovely grandchildren.

I have loved every minute of serving you as both an appointed and an elected city councilmen and I have been very honored to do so. So as I leave this dais for the final time when I ask for a motion to adjourn at the conclusion of this meeting, I am sure that I leave you in capable hands and have the utmost confidence that my colleagues will find a suitable replacement. May God bless you all, and may we all work together to bring Scranton back to the friendly and prosperous city it once was. Thank you very much. That's all, I'm sorry.

MR. GAUGHAN: Well, that was a

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shock. Well, first, I'd like to thank you, Councilman Loscombe, for your service on council. Sad to see you go and I hope everything works out with you and your family and I wish you a lot of luck.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: First a reminder that the street sweeper is scheduled to be in the Greenridge area next week Deacon Street to Finn Street, including all streets and avenues.

An update on the proposed cell phone towers in the parks that having gone back and forth the last few weeks. I was commented on a letter dated January 9 from Mayor Courtright to Mike Oster, who is the site acquisition specialist for Network Building and Consulting who is trying to seek variances for construction of Verizon cell phone at Weston Field and Cayuga Park. The letter gives Mr. Oster to seek zoning variances for the cellphone towers. Should Mr. Oster receive the variances from the zoning board, the mayor will then determine if he will submit proposed lease agreements

to city council for their review and approval.

I failed to mention this at the beginning of the meeting, but there is a great event going on tonight at courthouse square that I wanted to mention, the Drive-in downtown movie series sponsored by Scranton Tomorrow. It is a free family oriented event. Tonight's movie Frozen 2, the sing along version will be shown at dusk. There are also many kids activities before the movie. The July 24 movie will be Despicable Me 2. For more information please contact Leslie Collins of Scranton Tomorrow at 570-963-1570.

Just a comment on the town hall meeting, I am not opposed to having a town hall meeting, but I would recommend that council invite the mayor because I believe he should be here and he should run it. The ball is now in the mayor's court. He is the executive, we have a strong mayor form of government, he agreed to all of the recommendations in Henry Amoroso's plan so he should be here.

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So if city council is going to run this, I don't know how you guys are going to do this, but I would recommend that whenever you are going to have it to send correspondence down to the mayor's office requesting that he be here for that. And that is all I have.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. McGoff, I apologize for jumping out of turn, but I just wanted to also thank Councilman Loscombe for his service to the city. One of the first votes that I made when I was elected to council was to appoint Mr. Loscombe, and it's been a pleasure working with you. I know you really care for your city and that really shows in the financial hit that you took over the last few years up here fighting the fight with us for what's right for the city, and I know from myself you will be deeply missed on council and that the expertise that you brought to this board, specifically with public safety issues in the fire department will be missed, and I will be calling you many times even after you are gone for advice on those issues.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you. I hope to hear from all of you.

MR. ROGAN: Thanks. Jack.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. McGoff, I would like -- this came as quite a shock to us tonight --

MR. LOSCOMBE: I apologize for the last minute because it was a last minute decision, there has been a lot of --

MR. WECHSLER: I can appreciate all the thought that you went through, I know Jack a long time before I set with him here on council, we worked together on many different projects and I've always enjoyed his company, and also his perspective on what he brings to the table, and I am also going to miss you, and I wish it could be different, but good luck in your future endeavors.

MR. LOSCOMBE: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: A couple of comments.

First of all, a couple of things that came up, I do take issue with people describing our council as being secretive and closed to the public. I have been here for a numbers

of years and I believe that this council has been as open and as transparent as any council, as any previous council.

As far as the specific things that were brought up, yes, we did have a caucus with Audubon, we also had a public hearing held here in council chambers dealing with the Audubon's project.

As far as the Verizon people coming in, there is no legislation yet before us.

Believe me, that if there is legislation for the creation of the cell towers throughout the city or any of the parks, whatever it may, certainly there will be ample opportunity to provided for the public to weigh on the specific proposal.

Yes, the Mobile Now we did not have any public caucus on that other than the one in council chambers, but that was enacted, I'll say after the fact presentation, and one we did not schedule, so when there is something of importance to council we do have and we have had a caucus in council chambers. We are not trying to be secretive at all. We are trying to be as open and

transparent as possible.

As far as the presentation last week by Mr. Amoroso, I agree with other members of council this is something that is extremely important to the city. It's not something that should be addressed simply by council. It's something that should be addressed by the administration, by council, by the public, by everyone that's a stakeholder in these recommendations, in the well-being of the city.

I would hope that as we move forward that the administration and the council takes a very active role in these recommendations and hopefully we can work together as we have for the past six months to bring to fruition some of these recommendations that were made by Mr. Amoroso, but not without leadership that's needed and not without the information that is needed to move forward.

And just one kind of odd -- one of the speakers mentioned the baby boomers, when I taught high school and history I constantly we talked about demographics and

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how various demographics feed into what happens, and one of the things that has been pointed out by many people is that the baby boom generation while it has been a benefit to American society at this point in time it may be the greatest detriment to American society. We, me being one of them, we are using up a lot of resources of this country, and I used to tell the kids in high school somewhat facetiously that probably the best thing the baby boomers can do to help the country is go to their eternal reward, but in dealing with these issues the baby boomer generation does have a great effect on things like pensions, social security, and all and it's not just something that is exclusive to Scranton or the Scranton area. This is a nationwide problem.

As lastly, this was a surprise.

Mr. Loscombe, I know over the past couple of the years we have disagreed on a number of the issues, but I have always said that I feel that disagreement breeds change. If there is constant agreement on everything you never change and I have valued the

1 opinions that Mr. Loscombe has brought to 2 this council and I think that we have to 3 developed a mutual respect for one another 4 and a working relationship that I thought 5 was allowing us as a council make progress towards a better city, and I think that 6 7 Mr. Loscombe's contributions to this council 8 and to this city will be sorely missed. 9 MR.
