MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? I would like to announce that it appears that the elevator repairs will be taking place starting on October 6 which will necessitate moving council meetings to another venue for the time period that the elevator is out of service. The dates for the meetings will be October 9, 16, 23 and 29 and they will be held at the theatre at Lackawanna College. Same time, 6:00 caucus, 6:30 meeting, and the reason for the 29th, which is a Wednesday, is the theatre is not available on that Thursday night, so rather than cancel the meeting we are going to move it ahead one night, okay? So that's the theatre at Lackawanna College for October 9, 16, 23, and 29. That's all.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, Scranton resident. With regard to Item 6-A

1	on the capital budget I was looking at the
2	backup papers and I didn't see the actual
3	itemized budget, did I miss it or was it not
4	attached? Did you see it, Marie?
5	MS. SCHUMACHER: There is none.
6	MS. HODOWANITZ: I saw like the
7	ordinance sheet, but I didn't see the actual
8	budget.
9	MR. MCGOFF: It was on there last
10	week.
11	MS. HODOWANITZ: I'm sorry?
12	MR. MCGOFF: Was it there last week?
13	MS. REED: Yes.
14	MS. HODOWANITZ: Last week, but it's
15	not attached, okay, maybe I can see that
16	later. Does anyone have a status on what's
17	going on with Goodwill now that they got
18	their approval? Have they started any work?
19	MR. MCGOFF: I'm sorry?
20	MS. HODOWANITZ: Goodwill, have they
21	started any work not that they gotten
22	approval from HUD?
23	MR. MCGOFF: That I do not know.
24	MS. HODOWANITZ: I'll be watching
25	that. It's heading towards the winter

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months. I thought maybe they would start by October and they have plans.

Yesterday I went to the Composite Pension Board meeting and the Scranton Parking Authority meetings. With regard to the Composite Pension Board, I asked the board about the state audit and I asked them about the finding where the MMO was paid late and we incurred \$185,300 penalty because of the last year. I asked them if they were aware whether or not we had internal controls that would not happen I was surprised that we were told in May that I should ignore the cause for the finding that is in the report that Mr. DePasquale tells every city the same thing, lack of adequate internal control procedures and basically what they told me are words to some effect was the real problem was that they ran out of money.

So my question becomes, well, why would the city's management give a response that they agreed with the finding without exception if internal controls were not the problem; and number two, what assurance does

the taxpayers have that they were not going to run ought of money again this year? I think this year is a worse year than last year. I didn't really get much of a response, but I think people should be painfully aware of when December 31 rolls around hopefully we will have access to the Business Administrator's Office to get confirmation that that last MMO has been paid or we are going to get hit with another fine, and they said that in the past.

MR. MCGOFF: Just for information sake, it's not a fine it's the interest on what we have been paid.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Yeah, interest by any other -- \$185,000 --

MR. MCGOFF: I'm just saying it's not a fine.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, that we are going to get hit with another interest hi, okay?

MR. MCGOFF: Okay.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I would not want that to happen again. I think the taxpayers should be told before December 31 that

that's coming and people need to be planning for that. Hopefully we don't have such a hole in this year's budget that that's going to happen again, but I don't have a warm and fuzzy because we are not seeing much about the budget really right now.

And I went to the Parking Authority meeting last night and I said to them,
"Where is the Parking Authority's audited financial statements that Mr. Rossi is looking for?"

And they basically referred me to the receiver, Mr. Washo. Does anybody know where I can find him because those auditor financial statements for the Parking Authority are quite important since Parking Authority has what we might call issues. Anybody know how to get ahold of Mr. Washo owe since he is the only one knows the status of those statements for 2013?

MR. MCGOFF: Yes. Mr. Washo would be the one that would have those.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Is he supposed to be right next door to the Hilton, is that where his office is supposed to be?

1 MS. EVANS: Yeah, that's where his 2 office is. The former Parking Authority offices, yes. 3 4 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, because I 5 walked down there, I didn't any little shingle saying the Scranton Parking 6 7 Authority. 8 MS. EVANS: Well, it doesn't. Ι 9 think it says Central Parking. MS. HODOWANITZ: Ah-hah. Central 10 11 Parking. 12 MR. EVANS: Yeah. MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, just wander 13 14 in there. I do hope that he has completed those other financial statements because 15 16 they are a major issue and I don't see how 17 Mr. Rossi can give us a valid audit for the 18 city without that input so somebody needs to 19 be asking those questions. 20 And finally, Mr. Gaughan, many 21 congratulations on your upcoming nuptials. 22 I understand Saturday. I understand 1 p.m.? 23 I won't be there, but rumor has it it's Holy 24 Rosary? 25 MR. GAUGHAN: Yes.

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MS. HODOWANITZ: Good luck.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you very much.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, city council.

MR. GAUGHAN: Good evening.

MR. UNGVARSKY: I'm Tom Ungvarsky. When this council was seated we had a hope for a couple of things, one was that you would answer the questions they was put to The second was that you would be more vou. open and have your caucus meetings out here on the floor. Last week you had a very important meeting back in the office, I think the people had a right to hear what was going on with that one. And the third one was that you would more open and have less emergency legislation passed. It seems like we lost on all three.

So far this year this council has not voted no in final passage on anything.

Let me repeat that, not one councilman has voted no in Seventh Order.

MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Ungvarsky, I did.

1 MR. UNGVARSKY: I think you voted 2 on --3 MR. GAUGHAN: I voted no. MR. UNGVARSKY: -- in Fifth or Sixth 4 Order. 5 MR. GAUGHAN: And Seventh. 6 7 MR. UNGVARSKY: We'll check it out. 8 There is only about 25 or so agendas to 9 check. Pretty soon this council will have 10 some tough decisions to make, I hope you are 11 up to it. MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, 12 13 Council. Maria Schumacher. 14 MR. GAUGHAN: Good evening. MS. SCHUMACHER: I'd like to start 15 16 with 7-C on tonight's agenda. I reviewed 17 the materials that were in last week and I 18 saw nothing about the fee in the contract 19 and I can't imagine a contract without a 20 I did notice tonight the letter that 21 went along with it that Mr. Bulzoni wrote to 22 the mayor and the city clerk and I think the 23 treasurer and the solicitor, but check the 24 fee section. Is says, "Will pay for the 25 above services," but there is no fee that's

in the contract and I think that's very poor business practice. That should be in the contract and I would hope that you would not vote on that tonight until you get that done. That's you are giving an open ended -- open ended offer of the money to the bank.

Okay, moving along, I would like to know last week it was 7-C where I would like to know this was going for a grant to complete Phase II of the community surveillance network and I would like to know where did the dollars come from if the grant is not received. I did review the capital budget, which I believe that's where I would have hoped to find it, but the capital budget gives like no details. Did you guys look at the capital budget and you were satisfied with it that there was sufficient detail for what was going to be -- the work that was going to be performed?

MR. MCGOFF: I thought it was fine.

I thought it was much better than what we have had in the past.

MS. SCHUMACHER: That's one.

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Anybody else?

MR. MCGOFF: I thought it detailed what projects the city was looking at and I thought it detailed where they are going to possibly receive funding.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Well, one out of five. I would like to know, Mr. Rogan, what is -- if you have check or if you would check I recall going back several councils, the building Tom tells me was the Jersey/Lackawanna train station, I understand that the government invested a lot of money to put a slate roof on that building and it was with the intention that that was going to be developed and I recall the last discussion I recall was somebody followed up on it and it was, well, when the Lackawanna -- not going to do anything until after the Lackawanna Avenue bridge is completed and that's been completed for quiet awhile now and I sill see no action there.

MR. ROGAN: You are referring to the large brick building?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah. I mean, I

1 think maybe we made a bad investment if 2 nothing is going to be done with that, but I 3 would like to know that. Again, I discussed the pay agent 4 5 fee, and I'd like to know if council intends it take up Mr. Evans's offer to make contact 6 7 with the nonprofits regarding whether or not 8 they are truly charitable and in what form 9 will that take? MR. EVANS: Well, I don't know, I 10 11 would hope that at some point when the 12 administration is ready that we can get 13 together and I want to participate in those 14 discussions. but --MS. SCHUMACHER: I thought you made 15 a finite offer to --16 MR. EVANS: I did. 17 MS. SCHUMACHER: -- do those letters 18 19 and send it out. MR. EVANS: Well, no, the base of my 20 21 offer is o participate in discussions. 22 MS. SCHUMACHER: Oh, participate. 23 MR. EVANS: Yeah, with the 24 administration and also, you know, whenever 25 they --

1 MS. SCHUMACHER: Have you made any contact with the administration on whether 2 3 they are interested at all? MR. EVANS: No, I'm going to talk to 4 Dave Bulzoni next week about it. 5 MS. SCHUMACHER: So you will know 6 7 something by next Thursday? 8 MR. EVANS: Hopefully. 9 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, I'll ask 10 again next week. Thank you. Any answers to my questions from last week? 11 12 MR. GAUGHAN: On the Kane Street 13 project I'll address that in motions. 14 MR. ROGAN: Regarding the fees for victims of crime, I actually spoke to 15 16 Councilman Wechsler following the meeting 17 and I know he spoke to the police chief 18 regarding that issue. This legislation is 19 specific only to accident reports, not crime 20 reporters. 21 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, accidents can 22 be crimes. 23 MR. ROGAN: Well, they would be 24 covered under insurance in most cases. 25 MR. WECHSLER: Motor vehicles

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accidents.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah. Again, out of time. I'll be back next week. Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dobrzyn, resident of Scranton. Taxes paid. Fees paid. I have a little pass out for you folks. Now, as you can see on the paper it's embossed from University Councilwoman Jones she passed it to me and it's on sales tax, and apparently this study has uncovered that their is sale suppression technology. This article is much longer, I really would have ran out of ink printing the whole thing for everybody, but we are losing about \$900 -- over \$900 billion a year in sales tax just by restaurants alone cheating the system. Every so many customers come in and it deletes, the program deletes the sales tax and, of course, then there is no income tax could be paid on that they are showing a lower profit margin and so forth, and then on the back of the header page there is an article from a book that I have acquired called the Fine Print, David K. Johnston.

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It's about how a multitude of companies have gotten authorization from states to deduct income tax, PA income tax or wherever income tax, whatever state, out of the employees paycheck and keep it in their pocket, not turn it over.

Now, I'm neutral on Act 76 up until this, I heard it mentioned last week and I don't want to rain on anybody's parade, I like everybody up there, but it concerns me that people are salivating as to how much more they can cheat the state out, these businesses. For instance, Michael Francise anybody know who is he? He was the son of a The man wound up -- the father Mafia don. wound up in prison and they abducted him in New York City and he actually went into -he was called an earner. Didn't shoot anybody, didn't kill anybody, but he set up a wholesale gasoline company, it was 39 cents a gallon, his take every week cheating the state was eight to 10 million dollars per week to the Columbo crime family. after six or eight months they come to clamp down on him and it would be shuttered.

Well, after by six or eight years of this they finally caught up with this
Russian immigrant from the Russian mafia and he tattle tailed on the works and we haven't been hearing from him lately. In other words, they took care of him and Michael Francise spent ten years this prison, but you can only imagine that's \$400 million a year minimum they were taking in cheating on sales tax.

So before we go head over heals over something like Act 76 we really need to straighten out the sales tax in Greece and different countries. They actually license the cash register so it would pay us to actually provide a cash register to every small business that they couldn't insert a program and cheat and it's millions and millions of dollars that you can see. I mean, that's not small hardware stores or anything else or boutiques or whatever, that is just \$922 million in the restaurant industry in 2010, so it's no wonder that the state looks at us and says, "What do you want, manna from heaven?

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They are letting people pilfering profit out from under us. And okay, I have another article here I just printed up one, but it's on the drug epidemic and there is a new law in the state that they are trying come out with, but one of the things that I find very important is it would provide legal immunity to witnesses who seek emergency help for someone suffering a drug overdose, and I mentioned that last week. If you help somebody and gave your address you could very well have somebody from the city up putting a pink slip on your house and banking you from occupying it for six months under city ordinances, so that would concern me. A kid went to his mother's house for a visit, took an overdose and the landlord got locked out of his tenant.

Oh, by the way, you are getting married Saturday? Don't forget now, the key to a successful marriage, "Yes, dear, you are absolutely right, dear, and I'll get to that as soon as I can."

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. McGoff. Last week council was addressed by Sandra Moran from the Olive Avenue section of Scranton with some concerns about a bridge problem that she was having. As we looked into the matter Thursday night I spoke to Chief DeSarno and to my pleasant surprise the chief had already been working on this problem beginning in July. He had been having conversations with Steve Pendrak of the UGI company who has control of the access road. As I said, they have been working on this since July and finally they got together last Tuesday to finalize some type of agreement. So at the meeting was Chief Lucas, DPW director Dennis Gallagher, some residents of Hollow Avenue and

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Mr. Christopher Clancy, who was the superintendent of operations for UGI.

As a result of the meeting, and I'll read what they have here in terms of what they are going to do, but the plan is to clear an access road in the bottom of Wales Street going north along the riverbank and connecting to Hollow Avenue on the eastern side of the creek. The sole purpose of this road will be to allow much needed access for emergency vehicles if and when needed and refuse collection vehicles once a week. this time usage as a common, everyday thoroughfare is not part of the plan. and signage will be finalized and posted on either side of the road. Director Gallagher has expectations of this project starting some time in October.

So once again, I'd like to thank the chief, the representative of UGI and Dennis Gallagher and the neighbors for bringing this to our attention and it seems as though this problem will be corrected soon so that was very good.

Yesterday or today in the paper I

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believe it was -- there was a report that the revised Act 205, Act 47 legislation has made it out of the Senate and is heading further into the house. This week we have been in contact with City Business Administrator Bulzoni and Solicitor Shrive in regards to us keeping up-to-date on what's happening when this bill. There are several different possibilities of the bill as proceeds each of which will effect our legislation as we head in toward the budget. The reason why I want to bring that up is I want everyone to know that we are paying attention to this. We are coming up with our plan and how this tax will influence our budget.

Last night I attended an opening in and a viewing party of the new downtown what's going to be called "The Leonard" where Leonard's Hardware was. This building is being done over by Charlie Jefferson who owns the other projects in town, the Connell building and the Chamber of Commerce building. Mr. Jefferson is bringing a special talent to our city with these

buildings and with these remodelings. It's going to be a center of activity downtown, and once again, this is something that Mr. Jefferson is doing with private money and I commend him for taking an active role in the City of Scranton. While we have a lot of problems in our city there is still quite a few positive things that are happening and a Mr. Jefferson is one of the leaders that is doing that.

And I would also to take my time and congratulate Bill and Kellie on their upcoming wedding on Saturday.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Congratulations. You guys make a great couple and I wish you all the best in the word.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, just a couple of brief items, I will look into the status of the Goodwill project following the recent developments there and hopefully we will have good news regarding that as well as the Jersey/Lackawanna train station. It's one I

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know that there were rumors for many years of restaurant and different items and we'll see where that one stands as well.

Regarding the 205 tax that was mentioned in the paper, I think Councilman Wechsler pretty much hit the nail on the head that unfortunately the city is in a position where we have to wait to see what the state does and then react. Hopefully it will pass the state house, but we won't know until their legislative session expires in the next couple of weeks and then at that point we will see how to best maneuver and we'll say I don't think many people, and I know I certainly wouldn't support levying three-quarters of a percent wage tax on residents on Scranton. They certainly can't afford record that and we need to -- the reason support the commuter tax and the reason why I am hoping this becomes law is because we need to do everything we can to reduce the tax burden on our residents whether it be through 205 tax or through an Act 47 commuter tax, which would need Court approval, or other options.

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So that's all on that issue and that's all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans.

MR. EVANS: On the quality of life ordinance, I talked to Pat Hinton. been reviewing the ordinance with City Solicitor Shrive so I hope that's moving along. I also spoke to Hazelton mayor, Mayor Joe Yannuzzi and he agreed to meet with Pat and myself and anybody else on council that would like to join us in Hazelton some time next week to discuss the ordinance along with his police chief and the License and Inspection Department head. He was very excited to share his success with the ordinance, I think it's important to see how their implementation, when and how it is working right now in order to hit the ground running in Scranton, so thank you, Mayor Yannuzzi, and hopefully we will see you next week.

Also, I would like to circle back for a few minutes on the Amoroso plan. As most people know by now I'm in full support of the plan. Do I like every element of the

plan? Not by a long shot. But this is the plan, and as I stated in the past several times, cherry picking things or stating things be removed from the plan will doom this initiative and lead us into receivership or bankruptcy. If we have learned anything from our past failures it must be this. Do I like selling and leasing the Sewer Authority? No, but we must find a way to Superfund pensions so we need to see this through to find out if it's feasible.

Do I like selling all of the assets of the Parking Authority? No, but we must find a way to super fund -- I'm sorry, must possible still stick -- excuse me, let me backtrack a little. Do I like selling assets of the Parking Authority and possibly be stuck with millions of dollars -- tens of millions of dollars of debt? No, but I don't like the prospect of eventually taking five or ten million dollars to repair the garages only taking us further in debt and not having the revenue to support that debt.

Do I like Act 205? No, of course not, but temporarily we me must shore up

pensions, again, to avoid receivership or bankruptcy and, of course, without pension reform and new hires that are rolled into a 401-K-type plan we will only be kicking the can down the road once again.

As each initiative comes before council, I hope to provide ideas to make the that initiative better for our taxpayers and residents and I'm sure my fellow councilmen will as well. As we work to bring financial sovereignty to city government, simply the arranging the deck chairs on the Titanic is nor longer an option, it's time for action.

Thank you. And also, one last comment, good luck, Councilman Gaughan, all the best to you and your future bride.

MR. GAUGHAN: Appreciate it.

MR. EVANS: Best of luck. We all know -- except Pat, we all relate to the experience and it's a great day so enjoy it.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. EVANS: No, I'm not lying.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

Mrs. Schumacher asked a question last week about the Kane Street project, so I'd just

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like to take a minute and explain that. Kane Street project will be broken down into two phases. Phase I will be funded by the city for a total cost of \$281,871.50. Phase I includes Kane Street reconstruction from Stafford Avenue to South Webster Avenue. Phase I is an expected to be funded through the Department of Transportations Pennsylvania Infrastructure Bank Loan The program is a PennDOT operated Program. program that provides low interest loans to help fund transportation projects within the Commonwealth. This city will be repaying the loan if approved through our liquid fuels allocation and the loan repayment has no direct general fund impact.

Phase I has not begun yet, it's expected to begin pending approval of our loan sometimes next spring. It's expected to take approximately one month to complete according to our city engineer.

Phase II, that we voted on last week, is being requested through the Local Share Accounts Fund, Monroe County Gaming Funds. The total cost of Phase II is

\$625,417. Phase II includes Kane Street reconstruction from South Webster Avenue to Winfield Avenue, and is also expected to begin in the Spring of 2015 and take approximately two months to complete.

I received a complaint of constant speeding between Smith's Restaurant and Kelly's Restaurant on Cedar Avenue in South Scranton last week. Chief Graziano forwarded this complaint to Captain Thomas to put out to the patrols in the area to include these blocks on the next speed enforcement details so thank him for that.

Also, a question was posed last week about the contract with A & M Electrical for the maintenance of the traffic signalization within the city and the Electrical is only responsible for maintenance and they are not responsible for altering the timing of the signals.

Finally, the State Senate, as was mentioned by some of my colleagues, passed the Act 47 legislation yesterday. This was a major topic of discussion during our Act 205 debate before we went on recess in

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August. I was concerned then and I am concerned now that this may mean that the residents of Scranton will see arise in their wage tax .75 percent. The bill still has to pass the House of Representatives and needs a signature from Governor Corbett.

Also, part of this equation is the fact that we are unsure if the Act 205 tax will survive a recent Court challenge that begins tomorrow. There are a lot of different scenarios that can play out here over the next few weeks that may impact our 2015 budget and it's my hope that the mayor is preparing for an alternative way to approach this. I am hoping that the mayor has a backup plan, a Plan B or Plan C and that council is involved in these discussions leading up to budget time.

And that is all I have. Thank you.
