live with 911 texting capability for the 25

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1 general public.

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2 So anyone who is in a emergency situation can text 911 and have their text answered by a emergency dispatcher the same 4 way they would if they called on a phone, a 5 6 cell phone or landline. The 911 dispatcher center asks the same protocols be observed for texting, and we all know prank texts, and if someone is texting please remain on 10 the phone so they can text back and forth with the dispatchers to relay information 11 and receive instructions. But again, it's a 12 great capability and one that we know will 13 be used in the future and we want to make 14 15 people aware of it so they can use it if the need arises in an emergency. 16

So thank you as always, ladies and gentlemen. Are there any questions from counsel? Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Bob Bolus. 20 21 MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council, 22 for the second time around. Bob Bolus, 23 Scranton. You know, we had a lot to talk about tonight about the budget and the 24 25 future of where the city is going, but what

nobody is looking at is creativity, and I

think that's our key word here. You have to

become creative. You can't just make senior

citizens or business or commuters pay for

what was our folly. It's our 5

responsibility, but we haven't come up with 6

7 one single suggestion of creativity. Nobody

8 has looked beyond the taxpayers.

We look at Boscov, we want to give him money for the mall. As I said earlier, the mall is dead, nobody wants to go in there. There is just no business and it's unfortunate because the dream when that was

built should have been fulfilled but it

wasn't and why did this happen? We have to 15

16 look back at our history here in the city,

17 the mismanagement, the fiscal mismanagement,

all of the issues that brought us here, but 18

nobody came up with anything creative. Sell

the assets, sold the ballpark, gave away the 20

old bus station to the Ice Box for a dollar 21

a year. There is no creativity. Nobody 22

23 paid attention. The golf course made money,

we took the 3 1/2 million and the interest 24

from it and we threw it down the toilet.

There is no creativity. It should have been developed, it was a money maker.

So anything that made money in the city the past administration, the past councils took it out and executed it. They put it to sleep, just like the turkeys on Thanksgiving, we put the taxpayers to sleep and are continuing to do that.

I suggest a 1 percent fee, you want to raise taxes 19 percent, the mayor said there is no tools, we have used all our tools, we haven't even gotten to the tool shed yet. We walked around it, we walked over it, but we didn't go into it. Every one of you people in this room they all have something to offer, but you always come here and you fall on blackened, blind and deaf ears and nothing comes out of it.

And I don't come here to insult people, I have been in the city my whole life and I looked at the young guys here, the Boy Scouts, and I used to be one at ST. Lucy's many, many, many years ago. I'd like to thank the scout master and all of the other scout masters, not only with the Boy

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Scouts but with the Girl Scouts because they

take their time and energy, but they are

creative. They help them get their badges,

they move forward, and that's what I'm

talking about here. We take a 1 percent fee

across everyone in this city, forget the 6

7 tax, just 1 percent on everybody's gross,

8 that means the KOZ's, the nonprofits, all

have to pay because it's a 1 percent fee. 9

We need to create a fee that could be universal for us, not just let's say for 12 road paving or dog walking or whatever we want to look at, but a universal fee that 13 14 could be utilized through either the public safety or transportation issues that we can 15 dump into our city, into our budget, into 16 our general fund so we could utilize it, but 1 percent brings in millions of dollars. Think of that, millions. More than you are going to get with 19 percent against the people who are suffering.

21 You have to cut the suffering, we 22 23 got to cut the bleed. It's a hard road to 24 hoe right now, but, gentlemen, the decision has got to be made. This budget has got to 25

1 go down. It's a budget of bankers. Bankers

2 deal with balance sheets, pro formas, but

they don't deal realistically, they don't

4 look at the individual. If you don't have

5 the assets or you don't do that they don't

6 take a gamble on you. It's not like the old

7 days where a handshake meant something or

8 people invested in people. Wayne I'm sure

de la with assert des there is recollettent

9 deals with every day, there is people that

10 could buy homes that could grow his

11 business, but this falls on deaf ears

because people aren't looking from the

13 bankers or lending institutions at the

14 individual, what they can or cannot do.

Scranton was bit on immigrants, hardworking people that built Scranton into

17 what Scranton is today, but we have

destroyed it. We have destroyed the whole

19 infrastructure. Don't let this budget

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20 continue to be the demise of the city. Make

21 the hard core changes. You will accounted

22 for it, but you will be proud of yourselves

23 when it's all done and you will be able to

24 look yourselves in the face and say we took

25 and made the hard decisions that prior

24

councils and prior administrations wouldn't

2 do. Don't take it out on the people or the

3 businesses. If you want to grow a business

4 base make the hard decisions now and you

5 will bring business here, but what you are

6 doing now you got to be a bloody fool to

7 come to Scranton and put a business here.

8 Have a Happy Thanksgiving,

Gentlemen. And, Mr. Rogan, thanks for

10 bringing up the dinner, it will go on as it

11 has for the last 19 years, this will be 20

12 years, and I'm proud to say it's in

13 Scranton. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Doug Miller.

MR. MILLER: Good evening. Doug

16 Miller, Scranton. Continuing on the

17 discussion on the budget, even though there

18 is really not a lot to say, but just to

19 continue along here, you know, as we look up

20 and we discuss that we have a budget in

21 front of us that contains realistic numbers,

22 something that council members quote, state

23 that we haven't seen in the past. And, you

24 know, going back to the previous council

25 majority, the supermajority we had

1 previously to this majority, I recall some

2 very difficult decisions that had to be

3 made. I think that over the four years that

4 supermajority I think the defining moment of

5 that majority was in the Summer of 2012, for

6 those that don't remember what took place

6 those that don't remember what took place

7 then, that was a time when the city made

8 national news for paying employees minimum

9 wage. We were the laughing stock in the

10 nation for that entire summer as we were

11 trying to develop a recovery plan, put the

12 budget together, and I can recall a council

13 president, Mrs. Evans, working tirelessly on

14 those numbers. I can recall the Finance

15 Chairmen, Mr. Frank Joyce, working

16 tirelessly around the clock to develop

17 numbers and try to develop a plan that would

18 lead the city forward, and so I take

19 personal offense when individuals, newly

20 individuals seated on this council make

21 statements that this is the first time we

22 have had a quote real numbers and we say

23 that in the same side of our mouth where at

24 the other side of our mouths we acknowledge

25 that we haven't even reviewed the budget

26

25

1 yet. So how we could make such an absurd 2 statement without even having taken the time

3 to review the document I just think does a

4 disjustice to this city, but most of all it

5 does a disjustice to the residents of this

6 city.

7

I don't recall seeing any of you

newly people down here participating in the

9 process. I mean, it's easy to have all of

10 the answers now, but in the critical moment

11 I don't recall seeing any of you here. You

12 know, it's easy to quarterback from the

13 bleachers and play that Monday morning

14 quarterback, and this all goes back to my

15 whole philosophy of how we just keep

16 electing people who aren't qualified to

17 manage this city, and we just continue to do

18 it repetitively, and ultimately the voters

19 are responsible. It all goes back to that

20 at the end of the day, it's very basic. The

21 voters cause these problems because

22 qualifications didn't matter. Political

23 affiliation mattered. Knowing someone,

24 being their best friend, going to school

with somebody, those are the qualifications

in this town and when you really step back 1 and you think about that for a moment that 2 really is sad and pathetic. 3

And believe me, is it only here? 4 5 No, it's all over the nation, but if ou 6 really, really want to sit back and pause 7 and think about that it's really just disturbing that we got to this point because 8 we had voters that weren't educated enough 10 to go to the ballot box and make wise 11 choices. And, of course, we all have that, that's our right that we have that's 12 instilled in us to go out and vote, but if 13 you are not willing to take the time and 15 look at facts and base your decisions on fact I just don't see where we are moving 16 17 forward at all.

18 As I said previously, you know, you thought there was some light at the end of 19 this tunnel, there is no light right now. 20 We just keep, as I have said, kicking the 21 22 same can down the road and we just expect to 23 get a different result. You know, as I said earlier, it's easy to go back to the same 24 25 tools, raising taxes.

28

You know, we had Mr. Rogan who sat previous on council and voted against every budget that contained a tax increase, but had no problem doing it last year and has no problem doing it this year, and I just find that really, really troubling that these are

7 the people that we keep electing, and you 8 ask yourself are your interests really for

us or are you just being politicians as

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usual and representing a certain clientele? 10 And that's the elite few. You know, are you 11

12 carry out the work of the people or are you

13 carrying the work of an administration who

has yet to come forward. I mean, this

evening we had Mr. Bulzoni here, you know, 15

16 it was nice to have him here, but as

17 previous speakers stated tonight where was

Mayor Courtright? And it's not the first 18

19 time we have asked that question, you know,

we are still waiting for the mayor to come 20

forward and speak for himself. This is a 21

gentleman who served on council for six 22

years, sat in the tax office for four years, 23

stated he had a plan and a vision to be 24

mayor of this city and we have yet to this 25

day hear his plan. Not Mr. Amoroso's plan,

not Mr. Bulzoni's plan, Mr. Courtright's

plan, but we haven't heard it yet. Are we

ever going to and are we ever going to do 4 anything to turn this city around?

6 You know, next Thursday being

Thanksgiving, boy, the residents of this

city sure have a lot to be thankful for, tax

increases, an incompetent and incapable 9

10 government that cannot make the right

11 choices and no answers and just more pain

and suffering. Quiet away to sit back and 12

be thankful Thursday. Do I expect you to 13

veto this budget? No, I don't, but if we 14

ever going to do anything it has to start 15

now. Thank you. 16

MR. MCGOFF: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,

Scranton. First of all, can you tell me if 19

the city administration or any council 20

21 members have participated in any meetings

22 with regard to Colts and it's proposed

closure of Saturday service? Has anything 23

moved on Colt's? 24

25 MR. MCGOFF: I personally have not

30

been involved in any of the discussions,

2 but--

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3 MR. GAUGHAN: I think the meeting

got cancelled.

MR. EVANS: There was a meeting that 5

was scheduled and it got cancelled. 6

MS. HODOWANITZ: Has it been

8 rescheduled?

MR. EVANS: Not yet. There has been 9 negotiations going on between the state reps 10

and PennDOT trying to make some changes in 11

12 that ruling.

MR. WECHSLER: I can confirm that.

I spoke to Representative Flynn that other 14

evening and that's why the meeting was 15

cancelled because there are discussions 16 17

taking place.

18 MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, please, I

hope that the city gets involved. Keep in 19 mind that the vast majority of people who 20

21 ride the Colt's buses are either city

residents or people who work in the city or 22

23 students who come into the city to attend

24 class and they are all part of your

constituents and they are going to take 25

quite a hit, many of them, if Colt's has to 1

cut back it's service between Saturday

service. Some people are going to actually

lose jobs. It's very sad. 4

5 With regard to the Item 3-F, Robert

6 Rossi & Company has given us another audit

status report, I was looking at the backup 7

and I see that we still have 23 items 8

outstanding for the annual budget, and I

10 hate to tell you but in six months basically

11 we made almost no progress on the audit

report. You now, I recall Mr. Bulzoni he

made a comment that it would be more 13

realistic to have nine months to complete 14

15 the audit, I am here to tell you that he

should be happy he is not a publically run 16

company because he would have 90 days or the 17

SEC would be talking to him. 18

I could understand that it's running 19

late, but I can't understand why all 20

Mr. Rossi has to do on his report status is 21

22 change the date and just print the document.

If you have been reading those documents in 23

your backup papers, you see there is 24

virtually no progress being made. His 25

32

comment that in December he is hoping to

have a draft of the general fund is a little

scary. They have prepared a budget for next 3

year without benefit of knowing last year's

numbers. That is not a good thing. Also

notice that the Scranton Parking Authority

still has not completed it's audited 7

financial statements and basically we have 8

given them another \$4 million loan without

knowing their financial status. 10

And finally in this morning's paper, "Mayor's finance fix is progressing. Two ideas include selling parking garages and sewer authority."

What about concessions from the unions on the pensions? Has there been any movement on that or are we still making

conversations? 18

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MR. MCGOFF: I would say that it is 19

still conversation. 20

MS. HODOWANITZ: Yeah.

MR. MCGOFF: Or discussions. 22

23 MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, it's very

24 disappointing. Again, I agree with the

other speakers that the mayor should have

been here tonight and he should have been

able to answer questions from the public and

that would have been one of them. After we

sell off the Sewer Authority and the parking

garages I guess the next thing on the docket

will be city hall, the police station, which

is brand new, and the various fire stations.

Maybe we can get down to the fire equipment

and the police cars, but sooner or later we 9

10 are going to run out of assets to monetize.

We are definitely not making

progress, but we in the Army we use short 12

time calendars? Remember that, those of you 13

who served, your short time calendars you 14

15 went overseas for three years and you

counted down the days. I'm going to make 16

you guys a calendar, there are going to be 17

two, one is going to be five years and one 18

is going to be eight years and we are going 19

to cross it off by week, how many days do we 20

have left. Can't be worse than the 21

22 situation we are in now. Good luck,

23 gentlemen.

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MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone else

who wishes to address council? 25

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MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, 1

citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, a

few words on SAPA again. Does anybody know

if Dunmore is really on board with this

deal? Have any of yous talked to Dunmore

and said -- before you go and vote knowing

that Dunmore probably doesn't want to be 7

with us. 8

9 MR. GAUGHAN: No, Dunmore is

involved. They were one of the 10

7 Scranton would have two votes, possibly

Dunmore would have two votes, Abingtons 8

would have 20. 9

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MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Sbaraglia, could I just stop you for one second, they don't vote. It's by consensus. They have two representatives from Scranton and all of the other municipalities, but they do not vote on anything.

MR. SBARAGLIA: They must have 16 17 discussions.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Tell me, how could they come to a consensus without voting or stating their opinion? That's pretty hard to do unless we got somebody there that's in

I am very pleased that we 9 are taking a final vote on this important legislation tonight. SAPA allows Scranton 10 11 to work together with other municipalities for the betterment of our region. SAPA 12 acknowledges the fact that Scranton should 13 be the center of economic development in 14 this area. SAPA certainly is not a fix-all 15 for every problem we face, but it is a 16

17 definite step in the right direction and a blueprint that we can use for the future of 18

the city. There are three main reasons why 19 20 I am will be supporting SAPA, increased

opportunities for economic development, 21 22 increased funding for the state and

opportunities to increase our tax base. 23

In the past year we have witnessed the departure of several significant

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businesses from the downtown. While the 1 SAPA plan alone cannot prevent or halt this

trend, the plan emphasizes the need to

reduce sprawl and in-fill in the city. The

SAPA plan allows participating

municipalities to share land use

attract new or relocating businesses. 8

The plan can give the city a way to 9 facilitate economic development based on the 10 coordinated and comprehensive strategy 11 12 rather than every municipality competing for 13 tax revenue. SAPA puts a strong emphasis on

According to Cindy Campbell, who was 3 here with us tonight, the community planner 4 from DCED, communities that participate in 5 6 the multi-municipal state plan receive priority consideration for grants from some 7 state agencies. PennDOT, DCED and the 8 Department of Conservation and Natural 10 Resources, among others, give priority 11 consideration for grants to communities involved in comprehensive plans. 12

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7 8 Projects such as the Elm Street project in South Scranton, the Main Street project in the downtown and the Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority Trail project would have a better chance of obtaining grants from the state. Should Scranton reject the SAPA plan you would then need to; pursue our own comprehensive plan.

pursue our own comprehensive plan.
In 1993, Scranton's single
comprehensive plan costs approximately
\$100,000. The SAPA plan would replace the
city's comprehensive plan, thereby, avoiding
the costs associated with updating or

25 the costs associated with updating or

1 creating a new city plan. The only cost
2 requirement for Scranton for implementation
3 of the SAPA plan will be \$200 a year for
4 use.

Finally, the city has long needed to update their zoning ordinances. Adopting the SAPA plan would make us eligible for state funding to defray the cost of that update.

9 Finally, SAPA offers the framework 10 to increase our tax base. No one would 11 12 disagree that we need more people and more 13 businesses in this city if we are to continue to receive the same services without burdening those least able to afford 15 it. Most of the targeted growth areas in 16 17 the plan are in an existing urban areas. By keeping rural areas more rural and urban 18 areas more urban, it actually saves the 19

Abingtons from spending money developing theinfrastructure to support sprawl while

22 attracting money to Scranton by directing

23 businesses to where the infrastructure

24 already exists.

25

I would hope that my fellow council

1 members would support SAPA so that we begin

to a step in the right direction. This plan

3 provides a much needed blueprint for the

4 future. It allows us to work together

towards a shared vision. It is a framework

6 for the future of Scranton and anticipates

7 and accommodates opportunities for focus

growth in our city.

And just to respond to one comment
by Mr. Rogan, the city does not give up its
power. Each member of a community reserves
the right to withdraw from the SAPA plan at

13 any time and any each membered community

14 will be continue to maintain its own zoning

15 board. The SAPA plan shall not infringe on

16 any lawful rights granted to any member of

17 the municipality that said member obtained

18 prior to its participation in the

19 association and, the members on the SAPA

20 plan do not vote, as Mr. King explained in

21 the caucus. They have to come to a

22 consensus, so the representation on the

23 board I don't think really makes any

24 difference at all. Thank you.

25 MR. ROGAN: I don't want to belabor

this point all night, but just two quick

2 rebuttals, one regarding the city opting

3 out, yes, we can opt out after we opt in, I

4 think that probably would be the most

5 expensive of the three options, of

6 maintaining the course with what our current

7 zoning is and amending it or opting in and

8 then opting out, but Mr. King did mention

9 that once Scranton adopts SAPA the zoning

10 laws will be changed to reflect SAPA. So we
