With regard to 3A, Rossi's audit One more time, I think the status. only thing they did on this report was to change the date stamp to November Still 23 items outstanding and the last item outstanding is once again the audited financial statements from the Parking Authority for which you did approve a four million dollar loan. So I'm not so sure, you know, what we're going to do next month but we start to start contracting for the 2014 audit when you're going to be still looking for the 2013 audit. I'm also a little nervous with suddenly

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this list is exhausted. I'd be wondering about the credibility of the numbers if it's gone this long with no change in the status if it suddenly materializes in the next month or to That would create a lot of oversight. And the audit leads brings me to the final thing and that's the budget which I know you'll be voting on tonight and I expect it to be passed. But I've got to tell you, I'm still a little surprised when senior citizens are getting a 1.16th percent increase in their COLA and Mr. Bulzoni who is the architect, the primary architect of this budget is getting a 49.2 percent pay raise. Now, I understand that involves grant money but that grant money is only good for three years. And I just don't know. That just -- that doesn't pass my personal smell test, okay. Because we're going to ask those senior citizens to take a 19 percent real estate tax increase when they get a

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1.16th percent COLA increase and Mr.
Bulzoni is going to get a 49.2 percent
pay raise. Think about it. That's
all I have.

MR. MCGOFF: Doug Miller.

MR. MILLER: Doug Miller,

Scranton. I think over the last few weeks coming forward it's pretty clear where I stand on the budget so I don't think I really need to, you know, go into further detail on it other than just to say it's a great disappointment to see that this council has chosen to play politics, so to speak, not have the interest of the residents of the city in mind. When I look at this budget, I think was anything done to protect the seniors, was anything done to protect the poor or the hardworking blue collar residents of this city? And the answer to that question is very simple. No. Nothing was done. again, we are resorting to the same old philosophy of placing the burden

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on the same people over and over again and expecting them to come forward with something that they just simply don't possess and for some reason our government just has yet to grasp that understanding unfortunately and we're just continuing to go down the same failed path and for some reason we actually have this delusional fantasy that we actually think we're moving forward and we're getting somewhere. You know, the previous council made some tough decisions, made some decisions that weren't very popular. We had council members on that council that put a lot of time and effort into the process and then we had those who chose to take the lazy man's approach and I don't think we need to go back in time. I think a lot of us who have been around understand what went on. And some good things took place and we felt were maybe seeing some light at e end of this tunnel and now we had a new council come in and had all sorts

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of, you know, allusions that we were get some somewhere and had, you know, all these illustrative ideas, these visions we brought in, Amoroso who we made out to be the messiah. You know, we had Mr. Bulzoni come forward. you know, ultimately all we're doing here is punching our ticket onto the Titanic. And I know a lot of it sounds repetitive but that's where we are, 19 percent tax increase, tripling the LST. You know, the previous speaker made a very good point about the raises and whether it's grant money or not, it's really at this point irrelevant. It's just the concept. It just doesn't look appropriate at a time when the city is on a verge of a fiscal collapse but the truth of the matter is we probably are at that point and so to come forward and present raises is just an absurdity. And then going back to the point I made previously, you know, it comes to a time where it's pretty

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embarrassing for a city to present a budget and stand up and say we're funding a portion of our city government on grant money. When is the last time we can honestly say we invested in ourselves with our own money without having to rely on state grants, federal grants. When can we actually say we invested in ourselves with our money? You have to go back a long, long, time. And I understand, you know, Scranton is not the only city in this situation. It happening all over the nation. But it doesn't justify the fact that our government has failed us time and time again and, you know, it's just sad because we talked about the need for drastic cuts to be made. You know, we said, you know, possibly 30 percent cuts across the board and that didn't happen, you And yet we have thousands of know. residents fleeing this city on a daily basis. And I have to ask, what was in this budget to address the needs to

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entice people to stay here? What was done to provide the next generation with an opportunity to stay here. There's no jobs here, there's blight everywhere. Just go around the city. People are doing everything they can to get out of her. You know, we talked about the need for a thriving It has happened. downtown. neighborhoods are falling apart and that's not even the tip of the iceberg. You know, as we head into the new year, I think it's appropriate to say an accurate assessment would be that the city certainly is not taking a path that is going to lead to physical solvency because the future looks pretty bleak right now and that's really sad to say. We've seen a lot going on here and looking around and, you know, we all love this city. You know, it's not something where, you know, we're all -- the intention is to harm the city but, you know, at the end of day we have to ask

ourselves are we going to finally show some leadership and make the choices or we are going to continue to just the political thing. And passing this budget tonight is doing the political thing and I would hope that this council would reconsider and vote for the people tonight because that's what this about. It's not about voting for what the administration wants but for looking out for the little guy and I hope that maybe we're put the rubber stamps aside tonight and do the right thing. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Miller. Bob Bolus?

MR. BOLUS: Good evening,
council. Bob Bolus, Scranton. I
don't want you guys to take this the
wrong way tonight but tonight history
is being made right here in this room.
If we approve this budget, I think
it's the demise of the city because at
no point and at no time has anyone
looked at the alternatives other than

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a tax Increase. As the Attorney General Kane stated in the Scranton Times, she calls us the regular people because don't have the means or the ability that she and others have to fight the bullies in the system. That's what is happening right now. Nothing appalled me more than seeing this ad, this headline in the Scranton Times. It's a total embarrassment to all those in legislation to allow this to take place. I attended the council meetings in Dunmore, I attended them in Throop, I raised my issues but I never in a thousand years would believe the weakness of those councils of Dunmore and Throop that allowed us, the regular people to be bullied into a landfill expansion, a 50 year contract that turns around and just embarrasses us, makes us look like bloody fools. As soon as that happened, it turned around and what did DeNaples do? Blames the new arrangement to put the screws to the

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regular people in the City of Scranton. Something we're not going to stand back for. If you take a good hard look, Dunmore sold their souls to the devil so to speak for a penny, this penny. Remember it in the paper, the legislators we have, all the representatives out there, they allowed DeNaples to raise the fee by one penny per ton. Think of that? One penny per ton. Look what he just did to us, 79 cents more yet we had an agreement how we should deal with landfill but yet DeNaples hasn't paid on parking garage. How long has that litigation gone on? Think about it. Yet we're going to be bullied and bowed down because this man wants to sell our souls, we the regular people for a bloody penny. That is sad. And if this city sits back and let's this happen, gentlemen, I'm going to do this for you tonight. I'm going to leave the penny right here because if we allow what happened in Dunmore to

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happen to this city right now, that's what all we're worth is one cent. Think about that? This man dictated who the lawyer should be, he dictated what they should do in Dunmore, everyone, this council, Dunmore and Throop ignored the health issues that I presented here with certified lab reports showing the toxicity and the chemicals that are going into that landfill from the Marcella. Think about it. You have a little nuclear waste, it's only a little bit, but as you dump each container, it get bigger and it gets bigger. It's like putting a cigarette in a pack. You put one cigarette one, you put two, pretty soon you have a pack, then you buy another pack and then soon you have a carton and so on and so forth. So you take the combined compound and multiply over hundreds and hundreds of tons that are going in there, you're sitting on a time bomb. He wants to the move the old landfills that have

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been there for 100 years were unpermitted. DEP is going him to do it? They dictate how we should live or how we should die? This is our community, not DeNaples but that's what it's turning into if we allow this happen. You pass this budget without making modifications to make everyone in this community pay and that's your nonprofits, you pass a fee that goes across everybody instead of a tax because you're only taxing the regular people. You're not taxing everybody else. Put a fee, a one percent fee across everybody in the City of Scranton and everybody pays. That's the universities, the hospitals, everybody. Nonprofits, they all pay one percent. That's fair and it's just. And it's justice for the regular people. You go the other way around, you put the screws to the regular people and you let the bullies with money dictate the future demise of this city. I didn't come here in

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to insult. I came here to be as realistic. I've lived in the city my whole life. I've invested in this city and I believe in this city and I've represented this city all over the world, including Tokyo and Japan, with the Emperor of Japan. And I'm proud of Scranton but if we go where you are, you can't say you're proud anymore if we let happen what's happening now. And, gentlemen, don't be Dunmore, don't be Throop, don't be bullied. Stand up for the regular people. That's why you're here. Don't be like the representatives like Marino and the rest. They work for DeNaples. They won't do nothing about it. You can't let this city be punished and the regular people pay the price if we don't do something right.

Mr. Rogan, thank you for the plug for the dinner. It will go on even though some of the people in this community tried to stop it. I won't

be bullied. This is Scranton. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Bolus. Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,
Marie Schumacher, resident, taxpayer.

First of all, I would like to know why the audit's report status, why the audit status is stalled and will we ever get an audit? I mean, this is -- this is terrible. We were told the end of the year. We keep getting new dates, new dates. We don't even have new ECD. I mean, will it be here by the end of the first quarter of next year?

MR. MCGOFF: I will -- just to answer part of the question. The report that we have received from Rossi and Rossi is not necessarily 100 percent accurate. Some of the items that are listed there is as incomplete have, in fact, been completed by the administration and as far as I know

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the administrations is -- I'll say prepared to move forward with at least the draft of the audit and are waiting for the auditor to move forward as well.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Maybe next week you could mark up that -- their incorrect letter than. And just a word to someone who may be watching, a concerned citizen who wrote me a letter on an issue. I do have the answers but I don't think I'll have time to address them tonight but I will go getting back to her maybe next week.

And just another quick question and then I'll get on what I consider overlooked revenue sources. Why were the only revenues published in the paper for the public hearing and not the expenditures? Every other municipality and township around when they do theirs has both revenue and expenses. Is there some particular reason? Well, I would suggest next

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year we might want to do both or none at all, just said budget.

I did -- I want to thank Mr. McGoff. He did provide late this morning a copy. I ran into him here at City Hall when I was doing some other things and he did provide a copy of the answers to the questions that I asked on the budget. Unfortunately the rest of my day did not provide me enough time to read through them so maybe if I have any comments, I'll make them next week. Although there was one that was -- they deferred to PEL because it was a question about why the parking fees and the answer that I got also I think begs the question that I hope you will take under consideration which is that the primary difference between the amount of that \$500,000 was because this Scranton Parking Authority was not included in that fee structure. if the plan is still to monetize sale or lease, the parking garages, I think

it's only fair that you revise that ordinance and include the Scranton parking garages such that any bidder will have the full knowledge of what they're facing when they prepare their bids. So I think that should be pretty high on next year's.

And I am looking forward to hearing from Mr. Evans on the comparisons, on the real estate comparisons and the information he got I know on the tax bills during fifth h order.

And now to the examples of where we're missing revenue. This is the -- I'm sure at least the third or fourth time I have brought this up at council and not once and I'm not begging for the answer because I'm not going to provide it. It's up to their administration to do their job and that is Pittsburgh properties that are sold. I've done right to knows on some properties. All these people pay. These are eight, nine properties

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that were sold on the Pittsburgh plan or approved by council back in 2010, I believe. The amount was just of the -- wait. I'll just look for that. Just the amount was something like \$56,000. When you take the unpaid taxes, they are still -- they have never paid -- made those payments. So we have people who are buying properties under the Pittsburgh property, letting them sit, probably developers, I don't know but letting them sit -- if I may finish on just this one? I wish I could do more but I'll bring next week. But we are letting people just pay that \$100, do the thing, get the approval here and then maybe they'll come in and pay the purchase price. In the meantime we have lost tax revenue, considerable balance tax revenue just on these properties for every year subsequent to that. I think you need an ordinance that says Pittsburgh Plan once they are approved by this

council, the payments need to be made within 90 days or it's put back on the-- these properties are put back on. And for people who have previously been -- had approval by that council, that they should not get the deeds to those properties until such time as all past -- all taxes that have been due since the time they were approved and the purchase prices are paid immediately. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. I would just like to make two comments concerning the response to the questions that you asked. It was my -- it's my belief that when we hold a public hearing, that the purpose of the public hearing is to address the questions that citizens may have. And I believe that it is our obligation as a council, as an administration to provide answers to those and I brought that up to Mr. Bulzoni and we agreed that, you know, and the responses that you received are from the Business

Administrator. So I just wanted to make that clear.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I just want you to know that I do appreciate ti. They're few and far between when answers are forthcoming but I do appreciate that and I will study them and maybe make comments next week. Thank you.

MR. DOBZYN: Good evening, council. Dave Dobzyn, a resident.

I read in the paper the other day, I guess we a small order of thanks to Mr. Boscov. He did come through with his promise so far so hopefully he's not too mad at us or frustrated with us.

But I also have a question on 5H.

Once again I read the word,
subordinate, and that concerns me
because we're always the ones that
take the beating on these subordinate
loans. So if you want to enter it
tonight but I really would like to see
that word disappear from any loans

that the city gives, any whatsoever.

It shouldn't be subordinate. We're

putting forth money and if it's over

the Woolworth building, we just got a

town for years, many years to come and

they were here for ten years, tax exempt. Parking was constructed for

promise that a business would be in

them which is not any longer being

used by that institution. And where's

the money for us? We didn't make any.

So the bottom line as far as I'm

concerned is, if people don't want to

pay our taxes and fees and especially

reasonable taxes and fees so other

people can pay reasonable taxes and

fees, we don't need them. Just don't

need them, period. We don't need

them.

And on the budget I see some salaries are going up. I'd like to remind everybody that gets a salary from government and I'm not a tea partier. I'm exactly the opposite. But many, many, millions of people

wages hit the trash bin of history and it's really gotten to a point where, for instance, our last governor was campaigning on hands off of any wages freezes like Obama did. He froze federal wages. Just said no more, we can't do this and run around granting tax cuts and taking half of what we used to. So it was a start.

And once again on tax exempts, I think it's time that we start to go to court over the definition and if the state wants to run around and play Santa Claus with our tax money or the county government, then it's time that they replace the money. We have an organization in this town, all good things. And it's a mess, it's always a mess. Do you remember the Forever family? Wayne, we're exactly the same age. That's the same organization. They used to take in runaway kids back in the early seventies, around '74 and have them in a commune feeding them

rotten food, they wound up in a hospital at state expense. It was just ridiculous. They have no, no, absolutely no assemblance or resemblance to a nonprofit. It's strictly profit driven there. A meteor at that time was flying around going to planes and several cars and he had all these kids out in the streets, panhandling. Their mothers were worried, where the hell are they? They disappeared off the map. It's a shame.

And right before the holidays we had a little thing here with the leaf recycling. Unfortunately a lot of newspapers and what have you sat out in my neighborhood for weeks now.

They're hopefully disappear tomorrow which would be our scheduled trash day.

And I don't know how it was around the rest of the town because I just don't go riding around for no purpose. But hopefully they can come

1 up with a better solution to that 2 because the people with people 3 recycling are year round and the 4 leaves are once a year and maybe we 5 should do it after the holidays or 6 something but the paper people should 7 not be discouraged because it is important and it costs us a lot up in 8 9 the DeNaples Landfill instead of the 10 Recycling Center. That's tomorrow night from six to eight at Library Express, and, again, as Ms. Hodowantiz said a great opportunity to order some nice Christmas or holiday presents.

And the last thing I neglected to say at the beginning of the meeting, I would like to express a thank you to Mr. Al Boscov for his donation of approximately \$700,000 to the City of Scranton. I know I was critical in the past but I do want to thank Mr. Boscov and I hope that this goodwill towards the City of Scranton continues. And that is all.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

McGoff. Just a few things. Last

Tuesday I was fortunate enough to

attend the Friend of the Poor dinner,

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sponsored and run by Sister Ann Walsh. It's the first time that I participated in that event and to see the outpouring of volunteerism in the community is something that is very encouraging to me as we go through this holiday season. We do have a lot of problems in the city but our generosity is not one of them.

In reference to the budget this, to vote on the budget, I will be voting for this budget this evening. I did have some concerns that I addressed with Mr. Bulzoni during the I, too, have a big concern about raises and new positions in our city government. The reality is many of these increases are mandated by contracts. The other reality is is that people are doing additional work, we have additional spots that we have fill and I think sometimes you can be pennywise and pound foolish. I think these positions are needed to help us run an efficient government and to

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make sure that we're able to do the things that a lot of times are requested here at the podium, different services and things like that.

But for one of the rare occasions I do agree with one of the speakers tonight. This budget does not do anything to encourage people to live in the City of Scranton. It does not do anything to encourage young people to stay here. But the reality is that we have not paid attention to the things that have been done for so many years that we have been scaring these people away from our city. The one thing that I do feel comfortable with is that we are facing our problems head on and we making progress on dealing with them. Do we have the answers? No. The one thing though I am satisfied with and especially speaking with Mr. Bulzoni who seems to get a lot of criticism here. But Mr. Bulzoni understands the financial

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situation of this city. He realizes that within the next year or so if we don't get our house in order, all these things that we are doing here may not matter one bit. And I don't think it's fair next year when we go into the budget talks again, there is no way that we can have a huge tax increase like this again. There's no reward to it. It's just you're chasing your tail. If we don't see some changes in the way that we compensate our employees or reward our pensioneers, what we're doing here won't matter. So for myself tonight I will vote for this. You can't look into the future and see for the 2016 budget if we're have the same accord on this or not, but like I said, I do feel comfortable with this budget and we are going to work on several different things, the audit being one of tem to get that done on time in 2015. We may have to extend the due date if reality means we can't get it

done on time. We already put things into place to be more efficient in collecting our refuse tax, keeping track of who paid, who didn't pay so there's a lot of things going into 2015 that may put us in better shape for 2016 but, like I said again just to repeat, there is no way that we're going to be able to tax away out of this problem and we're at the point of no return right now. Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, a few comments on some various issues tonight. The first one regarding the budget, Mr. Wechsler hit on some of the points that were already brought up. And there are a few other things that I want to address. I know many of the speakers, they come to council have some concerns about the budget and some criticisms and the one that kind of bothered me today is people are criticizing the city's use of grants.

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Grants aren't free money. They are your tax dollars from either the state or federal level. And the reality of these grants is they're either going to come home to be used in Scranton or they're going to be used in another municipality. They're not funds that if they're not used, just get reimbursed to the taxpayer. I believe he city needs to use grants more. think we need to do everything we can to keep the burden off of the taxpayers in the City of Scranton. For instance, the safety grant that we used to rehire many of the men from the Fire Department that the previous administration cut. That was a good thing for the city. It saved the taxpayers money and at the same time it increased our public safety. used our -- everything we do through the Office of Economic Community Development is a grant. They're federal funds. When you see those neighborhood police officers walking

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the beat, they're funded by grants.

When you see paving in low to moderate income areas, it's also funded by

grants. So grants aren't a bad.

Thing they're t good thing and I commend the mayor and the business

administrator for pursuing them to fund items that would unpopular to

fund through city taxpayer dollars.

The new position, for instance, of

flood control which initially I didn't

see the necessity of it but after

speaking to the mayor and the business

administrator, it was something that

was pushed for actually by the Army

Corps of Engineers because we're not

doing good enough of a job to the

maintain the projects that were done

by the Army Corps. Various salary

adjustments in the budget funded

through grants instead of being funded

through Scrantonian's tax dollar to

the city. In the past I sat here and

rad off probably an hours of worth of

amendments to remove grants -- or to

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remove exorbitant pay increases in the budget for many department heads, under department heads, new positions. This budget, there are a couple salary increases but as I mentioned they're mostly funded through grants which is how we should try to fund those types of items that we can't afford to pay for.

Next, regarding the audit which is also intertwined with the budget, I did have a conversation with Councilman McGoff this morning and I think they are two sides to the budget -- or to the audit. The city receives a lot of criticism for being late chronically and I'm sure there is criticism that needs to be given to the city. But the other side of the If you kind is the audit firm. recall, four years ago when the city picked Rossi and Rossi to continue to be our auditor, it was a somewhat contentious vote. I believe it was approved by a three to two vote.

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know I opposed it and Councilman McGoff opposed it. Rossi was the highest bidding firm. They were the most expensive auditor. And there is a time and a place for a more expensive bid if the service is better. But in the case it's very clear that the service that we're receiving from Rossi is not what we should expect. I believe that that contract is expiring next year. I think the administration and city council needs to take a good look at all the proposals that come in because I do believe we need change the course and chose a different auditor so the audit can be done prior to the budgets.

Next and I know Councilman Evans will talk a little bit more about this but the Quality of the Life Ordinance is up to introduction this week and I will like to thank Councilman Evans for his hard work with this and also Pat Hinton of LIPS and the Mayor of

Hazleton and Police Chief from
Hazleton. Myself, Wayne, the folks
from Hazleton and Pat met I would say
about a month, two months ago and here
it is on the agenda. So great job on
everybody that was involved with this
ordinance. This is just a start.
There are some other items that I
would like to include in there that
I've discussed with Councilman Evans
to address some other issues that may
be brought up in the future but this
is a great first start with the
Quality of Life Ordinance.

Next, regarding the Boscov loan.

I would also like to thank Mr. Boscov and thank Mr. McGoff at the same time for putting some pressure on Mr.

Boscov. That \$700,000 coming back into the city is coming at a time when we really need it. Obviously the budget situation is very tight. I did speak with the mayor regarding the use of that money and encouraged him to consider spending it on neighborhood

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police officers and road paving which are two items that are desperately throughout the city and the mayor did seem agreeable to that and I know that they are two proprieties that he has as well. So definitely thank him for his support on that.

And finally I just wanted to address one issue. It's somewhat related to our Police Department but it's more of a national issue and I try to stay away from larger and national issues at the council meeting. But currently right down the street a block away there's a protest regarding police officers and some of the national issues that we have seen in New York City and Ferguson. would just like to take a moment to thank our police officers in Scranton and the great that they do putting their lives on the line everyday and sometimes unfortunately situations happen where they have to use force and they shouldn't be punished for

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doing their job. So I just wanted to give a little rebuttal to the protest that's going on down the street to say that we have a great law enforcement community in the City of Scranton. We have great officers. The men and women do a great job and I just wanted to thank them. And that is all.

Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. I'm going to use my time to read the report that I got from the treasurer, Wayne Beck to day on the waster disposals. "The amount collected for waste disposal fees from -- through November 15, 2014, totals 5,442,877. The amount collect for the same period is 2013 totaled 3.4 million dollars. amount budget for 2014 is 5.8 million, therefore you're at 94 percent of the total budget allocation with the last 15 days of November yet to counted and all of December so I think we may be on track to meet our budgeted item.

The unpaid trash bills are two million, sixty-four thousand, one hundred and ninety-six dollars. Of course, this does vacancy requests, condemned properties or demolished properties not yet reported so we have some work to do on that front."

The request from Marie Schumacher about the real estate information I gave several years ago, I have a report for you so I'll give this to you at the end of meeting if you don't mind and I'd say it's pretty in depth so I don't want to get into during motions. So that's all I have right now. I'll reserve comment for when we introduce some more legislation.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes. Thank you.

I've received numerous requests to
have streetlights fixed in many parts
of city over the past few weeks.

Joyce Electrical who takes care of
those issues, they are backed up and
are trying to get to whatever request.

From the time a resident reports a streetlight out, it may take 10 to 14 days for it to be fixed. Our office has been touch with DPW so that we are updated ton the status of these reports. I did receive an e-mail earlier today about a streetlight out in the 800 block of Yard Avenue. I will be contacting that resident to get the pole so that we can try to get that taken care of.

Council did request two weeks ago that the proposed 2015 budget be put on the city's website. Unfortunately as of today that hasn't been done. I haven't seen it on website. I think that in the future the proposed budget should be published on our website so that people can review it. Not everyone has the time to come down to City Hall and request a copy of it.

If my colleagues would be agreeable, I would also like to ask that we send a letter to the Mayor's Office on behalf of council asking

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that the trash and recyclable pickup scheduled be posted on the city's website. I have received a few inquiries about this and many people think it would be helpful especially those who are knew to the city.

And that is all I have and I'll reserve the rest of my comments for motions. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: One last thing since Mr. Rogan brought it up. I know there have been a number of protests and one that has been reported on, a significant protest involving what I feel is the desecration of the American flag. I know that this has been excused as freedom of expression. I taught Social Studies for 35 years and one of the things that always talked about was peoples' rights and the idea that all rights are limited. Just because you have the freedom of expression, it does not mean that you can express yourself in any way that you feel appropriate. There are

1	limits and I feel that any time that
2	someone desecrates a national symbol
3	that that goes beyond the right of
4	expression and should be dealt with.
5	And while people do have a right to
6	protest and express themselves, I
7	believe that what took place with the
8	American flag was inappropriate and
9	especially should be dealt with by the

1 neighborhood that do not take care of 2 their property that do, you know, that 3 add to the blight in the city and if 4 this ordinance can help take care of 5 that, fine. Also, you know, if it 6 does produce revenue, I think that 7 that's an even second benefit. 8 Personally I wouldn't mind if this 9 ordinance never collected a cent 10 because that would mean that people 11 are complying with the law and that 12 our neighborhoods have improved. 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MR. EVANS: As chairperson for the Committee on Finance, I recommend final passage of Item 7B.

MR. ROGAN: Second.

MR. MCGOFF: On the question?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question. I will be voting no tonight on Mayor Courtright's 2015 budget. met with the Mayor today to discuss the budget and express my descent. cannot in good conscience vote for a budget that creates new positions, increase discretionary salaries and expenditures and adds additional debt while failing to realize any savings or concessions from the unions. not fair to ask the people of Scranton to once again make sacrifices and bear the burden of a tax increase along with the tripling of the LST tax when Mayor Courtright has not the difficult things and made the necessary sacrifices that he needs to make. The plan that Mayor Courtright adopted earlier this year from Consultant

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Henry Amoroso included specific recommendation regarding union negotiations and targeted concessions to address over 80 percent of the city's budget. The plan makes it very clear that our present financial course is simply unsustainable. Ιf all we can is nickel and dime our way through budgets each year, we will never see long term structural financial change and will continue to plague the people of Scranton with large tax increases. We have a difficult financial situation that calls for bold and tough decisions in order to stabilize the city's finances. I don't see those bold and tough decisions reflected in this budget which is why I will be voting Thank you. no.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. EVANS: On the question.

Turn mic on. It helps. It is never easy to adopt a budget with nearly a 19 percent tax increase and it never

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should be. Our taxpayers are tired, beleaguered and frustrated. What I signed on to support the plan and this budget makes the basic criteria as called for in the plan. It is an honest attempt at transparency and I respect that. I want the plan to work and I'm willing to do whatever is reasonable to make that happen because I honestly feel it is our way to financial solvency. And I fully understand there are a lot of moving parts to the plan but I will tell you right now, I never want to see a budget in the City of Scranton with a double digit tax increase again. is where we have to draw the line for the taxpayers of Scranton because if we have decided our only answer would be future budgets with large tax increases, then the city should move towards receivership or bankruptcy If that is our solution, then let's stop wasting everybody's time. I don't want that to happen but if we

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don't do what needs to be done, then we'll have no choice. We have to know that we are well beyond the point of diminishing returns as it relates to large tax increases and the negative implications loom large. So with that said, I'm already looking ahead and this is what I hope to see prior to next year's budget. One, pension reform which would include or should include a plan to put the balance of the court aware directly into pension funds. Two, union concessions. Three, a comprehensive plan to deal with the nonprofits. Four, a dialogue or more with the county concerning reassessment. Five, a plan for the modernization of the Parking Authority and the Sewer Authority. Six, a feasibility study to determine the impact of a payroll and the elimination of the mercantile and the business privilege tax. Seven, a tax increase of less than six percent. All those items are or should be part

of a new recovery plan. This is our last chance to get it right. Those are my benchmarks for the 2016 budget and those are the criteria I will use when I determine how I will vote on the budget when it comes to city council next year. It's that simple and that hard. I didn't ask for this job because I thought it would easy and believe it's not. So let's all remember that the process starts again the day after this budget is adopted. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. ROGAN: I would just like to reiterate what I mentioned before and I think Councilman Evans make a lot good points regarding moving forward some items that need to be done.

One area where I do disagree is on the idea of receivership for the city. I do believe that would be a disaster and result in even more tax increases than we currently see.

While I respect of Mr. Gaughan, I

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guess I have to ask the question. Why not offer amendments to the budget?

MR. GAUGHAN: I was wondering the same thing about you. Are you going to make amendments to the budget?

MR. ROGAN: No. I already
told -- I already expressed my
support.

MR. GAUGHAN: Well, because -see, I'm glad you brought that up and I wasn't going to say anything but since you brought it up. You're asking me if I'm going to make amendment to this budget. I thought we would be coming from the same playbook. Because in 2012 you were quoted in the Scranton Times as saying, "I do many find it outrageous, I really do. It's not fair to taxpayers to ask them to pay in taxes when a few employees are getting massive raises. How can you justify given \$10,000 a year raises when we're asking everyone to pay more in taxes." Mr. Rogan said, "These salaries should

remain the same." Also, "I'm voting for every single one of the cuts. We need to save money so it's plain and simple for me." You supported cutting out the Pennsylvania League of Cities expense which we find in this budget. You said, "I don't believe it is a valid expenditure of taxpayer's dollars. When you have a city that's broke, we can't afford to be spending money. I voted for 19 cuts tonight." In 2011 you said, "At the end of the day city council has to represent all of the people of Scranton and cuts have to made in every department. It's just the state of affairs the city is in right now."

So before you try to call me out for not make amendments, I was waiting for you to open your mouth. See, the reason I'm not making amendments is because the real change that needs to happen in this budget I can't affect. It's union negotiations and Everything else is a concessions.

drop in the bucket. Do I agree with 1 2 some of the raises in this budget and 3 the new positions? Not at all. Not 4 when there's a 19 percent tax increase 5 and a tripling of the LST tax. 6 anyone should be making amendments based on prior comments and the way 7 8 you used to do things, I would expect 9 that it would come from you. Well, Mr. Gaughan, 10 MR. ROGAN: 11 this actually should have been an area 12 where we could have common ground and 13 worked together on these. 14 MR. There is no question that I wasn't on the same page with the previous mayor. We did have many discussions. I think I met with Mayor Doherty maybe three times. During this budget process I've talked to the Mayor, I've talked to the business administrative. I think we all have. And as was mentioned by a couple other council members, I agree with the plan that was put forth. The long term compiled by Mr. Amoroso, I know it may not be popular, but do think it will work.

Two of the other items that I've

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always fought for and they were never included in budget that are now included in the Amoroso plan, two of the large ones, one is the sale of the Scranton Sewer authority which, I think, needs to be done. It needs to be done to super fund the pension or to pay down other city debt. Another item is the sale of the Scranton Parking Authority garages which I think needs to be done. That is also included in the plan. The one item that I've always supported and I still do even though the department has gotten better is the privatization of the city refuse. That's something I still continue to support. Unfortunately that contract was approved by a four to one vote two years ago. So those are the items that I have supported. I don't know why Mr. Gaughan got so upset about a simple question but that's where I've stood and that's where I continue to stand and if you would like to work

together in the future on cost saving measures, I'd be happy to.

MR. GAUGHAN: Look, I didn't get upset. I am just annoyed. Annoyed is the key word here. When someone asks me if I'm going to make amendments to the budget when -- I mean, I came to this meeting and, in fact, when I didn't hear from you all week, I was surprised. I thought you would have asked me, Mr. Gaughan, you should make amendments to this budget. When I look at your record on this city council, that's what you've done, that's what you'll all about.

And you talk about grants.

There's positions in this budget that aren't funded by grants, \$115,405
